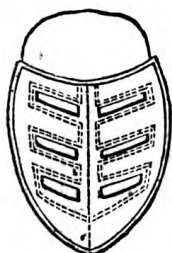

HOW TO PURIFY THE BLOOD ?

To purify the blood, and at the same time endow it with the vigour necessary to sustain animal life, is a task many earnest health-seekers fail to accomplish. We all desire pure blood, but we do not want its serum or watery portion too great for the nutrition it contains ; it cannot be too pure, but it may have with its purity a tenuity, that is equally detrimental with over-richness. The blood is called the life—this is only true in a physical sense—it conveys the elements of animal life and nervous life to the system ; but it is only a vehicle after all. In the brain and nerve centres, the only force exists that may be called life, but the dependence of these on the purity and richness of the blood indicate that life in its fullest sense is a combination of all the fifty-six elements of which we are composed ; and the true mode of purifying the blood is to preserve every element in its homogeneous relation with all the others—do this, and suffering and disease would not exist. The harmony of parts, of organs, of conditions, and of elements are indispensable to health—this implies purity and vigour combined. The force that purifies our blood is unquestionably in the air—as that contains not one life element but many—this is the case throughout all nature—the elements in the air act upon and purify both water and earth and all they contain or maintain. So it acts upon us, and we may ask to what special elements of air are we indebted for bodily vigour ? All are indispensable, but the life elements of electricity and oxygen that furnish the entire nervous system with the force that governs every physical change must take precedence in the process of purification and invigoration.—Oxygen burns up and eliminates the waste carbon in the lung cells, and the electricity which accompanies it penetrates the entire system through myriads of the minutest filaments ; the energy it gives to them enabling them to remove all the waste and drainage as rapidly as accumulated—so that but for these higher elements blood would rapidly become foul and polluted, blood is forced through the system by electricity—purified by the atmosphere through the lungs. If the blood is impure, the cause is a deficient supply of Electric force, and experience has proved that the artificial application of Electricity or Magnetism—which generates electric currents in the body—supplies the deficiency of the electric element that enables the nervous power to carry on a purifying process throughout the whole system.

THE MAGNETIC CONDITION OF THE BLOOD.

ONE of the great distinctive features of Magnetism, as a curative agent, is its action upon the blood. Dr. R. C. Shettle, of the Royal Berks Hospital, Reading, has, by a series of carefully conducted experiments, proved that blood is magnetic. In his pamphlet, "The Nature of the Vital Force, shown from the

growth of the body, and the Laws regulating the Electro-Magnetic Force," he says: "One of the chief characteristics of arterial blood is that it contains a large amount of oxygen. Now oxygen is one of the most powerful magnetic bodies known, and acts the same part to the atmosphere that iron does to the earth ; but it must be remembered that in this case we are not dealing with oxygen simply, but with oxygen in its allotropic condition of oxone—that is the state of its greatest density, and the state in which its magnetic and electro-negative characteristics are most marked—so that we do not hesitate in coming to the conclusion that arterial blood must, by its absorption of oxygen, be rendered magnetic. Acting upon this opinion, and notwithstanding that the late Professor Faraday had stated that fresh blood was diamagnetic, I deemed it expedient to find out whether arterial and venous blood did not differ in this physical respect. I consequently allowed arterial blood to flow through a tube, which tube had been previously tested between the poles of an electro-magnet, and found to be slightly diamagnetic, and then (whilst the blood was flowing through) secured the blood in the tube. The tube was next suspended as soon as possible between the poles of the same electro-magnet. This result was conclusive and most marked. The tube was then removed, and after a while suspended again, when it was found to be decidedly magnetic. The blood was next removed and the tube washed, and upon being suspended again it was found to have resumed its diamagnetic properties." The magnetic condition of the blood being proved, we can readily understand why the magnetic disturbances of the earth should have such a disease-producing tendency, and it is equally easy to understand why Magnetism artificially applied, should counteract the terrestrial influence. "Epidemics," writes Mr. D. Todd, in his work on the blood, "are regular phenomena," and their appearing and disappearing depend not so much on the temperature, humidity, or dryness of the atmosphere, as on the condition of its electrifying force, and consequently on variations of the earth's magnetism. "Dr. Dickson confirms this opinion." Electrical or magnetical perturbations of the earth," he says, "are, to my mind, the causes of epidemics, and, curiously enough, perturbations of the magnetic needle have been observed during their continuance."

CHOLERA.—"The following extract from *The Indian Statesman*, of the 6th January, 1872, contains strong evidence that Cholera is affected by the Magnetic disturbances of the earth:—"Our Umballa correspondent, mentions a curious fact in connection with the Cholera in the Camp of Exercise at Delhi. 'As the view that Cholera is affected by the magnetic condition of the air is supported by many of the medical faculty, the fact positively stated by our correspondent, that no case occurred after the thunder-storm, is a contribution towards the settlement of a question which must depend for its solution on a very wide induction.'"

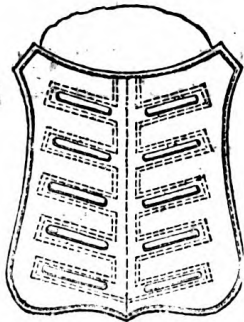

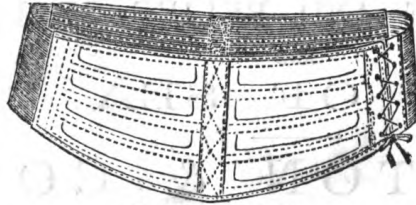

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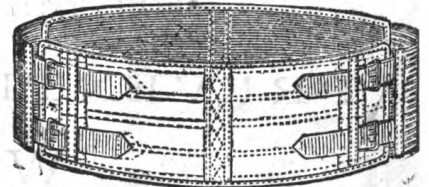
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
