ECLIPSES.

In the year 1869 there will be four eclipses—two of the sun and two of

January 28.— A partial eclipse of the Moon, invisible in Tasmania. February 11.—An annular eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Tasmania.

July 23.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, visible at Hobart Town. Hobart Town mean time:—First contact with the penumbra, July 23rd, 10h. 09.8m. p.m.; first contact with the shadow, July 23rd, 10h. 29 1m. p.m.; middle of eclipse, July 23rd, 11h. 52 0m. p.m.; last contact with the shadow, July 24th, 1h. 14 9m. a.m.; last contact with the penumbra, July 24th, 2h. 34 2m. Magnitude of the Eclipse (moon's diameter = 1) 0.559. The first contact with the shadow occurs 127° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the east. The last contact at 141° towards the west, in each case for direct image.

August 8.—A total eclipse of the Sun, invisible in Tasmania.

PROGRESS OF ASTRONOMY.

NEW MINOR PLANETS Nos. 93 and 94 were 'discovered by Professor Watson, of Ann-Arbor Observatory, 93 on August 24th, and 94 September 6th, 1867. Both planets were of the 11th magnitude.

New Planet 95 was discovered by Dr. Luther, at Bilh-Dusseldorf,

on the 23rd of November, 1867. It appeared of 10 to 11 magnitude. New Planet 96 was discovered by Mr. Coggia, at Longchamp, Marseilles, February 28th, 1868, of the 11th magnitude.

New Planet 97 was discovered by Mr. Tempel, at Marseilles, February

28th, 1868, of 10 to 11 magnitude.

New Planet 98 was discovered by C. H. T. Peters, at Hamilton

College, Clinton, U.S., on the 18th of April, 1868.

New Planet 99 was discovered at the Observatory recently established at Marseilles in connection with the Imperial Observatory of Paris, on the 29th of May, 1868.

New Planet 100 was discovered by Professor Watson, of Ann-Arbor,

U.S., on the 11th of July, 1868.

New Planet 101 was discovered by Professor Watson the 16th of August last. This is the sixth discovery of the kind this year, and by which we enter on the second hundred of the minor planets. The hundreth was, after him, independently, discovered by Peters, at Clinton, N.Y., and also, later still, by the French observers at Marseilles.

Comet No. 3 of 1867 was discovered by Baker, a clockmaker, of Nanem, on the evening of September 26th, and four hours afterwards

by Dr. Winnecke.

Brorsem's Comet.—Schmidt, at Athens, and Tempel, at Marseilles, both saw this interesting little comet on April the 11th, and Professor Burhns observed it on the 12th of April; it was afterwards observed at various places. The results arrived at are not yet fully known.

ENCKE'S COMET.—Professor D'Arrest was the first to detect this interesting body, on the 20th July, at Copenhagen. It was excessively faint, and about 45" in diameter. Several observations have been made upon it, but they are very uncertain, owing to the great faintness of the object. It appears to be undergoing the process of dispersion, and it may be doubted whether there is much likelihood of its being seen at all at future returns.

METEORIC SHOWERS.—The November star showers within the last few years have attracted very general attention, and doubtless many persons would gladly co-operate in observing them if they only knew when, where, and how. In the last number of our Almanac it was shown that Professor Adams had completely calculated the secular variations of the longitude of the node caused by the planetary perturbation of the November shower, from which it was shown that the entire calculation increases the longitude of the node in a period of 33.25 years, about 28', for a maximum display such as appeared in England in 1866, and in America in 1867. At the United States Observatory the maximum was 2,000 in 21 minutes, the radiant point 10h. 1m., dec. 22° 30'. As these bodies annually move westward they would appear in 1868 in the Pacific Ocean at about 10h. a.m., Washington mean time. In the present year, 1869, there is a probability of their being observed in the Australian Colonies with a decreasing maximum. They radiated when seen last in America chiefly from Leo, Canis Minor, and Coma Bereniceo. The August shower never attains the brilliancy which is sometimes displayed by the November one, but it is much more certain in its recurrence. Meteoric showers also take place annually on or about the nights of April 20th, and December 12th; and unusual numbers of meteors may also be looked for on the following dates:-January 15th and 19th, February 19th, March the 1st to the 4th, April 28th to 30th, October 16th to 18th, October 31st to November 6th. Meteors appear in greater or less numbers during almost every clear night, and good observations of them are always valuable. Certain characteristic features in the movements of these meteors induce astronomers to claim them as belonging to their department of science, and every effort is necessary to help the further development of their laws.

It is clear from the foregoing table that Hobart Town has the most equable climate in the list. This arises from its insular position. Heat absorbed by a fluid increases the rate of its evaporation, and the evaporating process reduces the sensible amount of latent heat which the body has acquired. Every accession of temperature brings with it its own remedy; for at night the process is reversed, radiation takes place more slowly, from which, together with minor causes, in connection with that of sea breezes, the temperature at the surface remains comparatively unaltered, and renders our beautiful island the Queen of the South.

The direction of the wind is registered from currents moving at a height of 192 feet, and the force according to Lind's wind gauge. The supposition, however, of a uniform velocity during the month is a very arbitrary one, and the results can be considered only approximately correct.

The relations of the quantities of rain which fell under the different

winds are registered each evening at sundown.

The twenty-five years' standard tables are used for obtaining the difference from the average.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Where budding is required it may still be performed, choosing, if possible, showery weather. Cut off all unnecessary shoots from young trees, if they are not required for scions in the Spring. Continue to pinch off all lateral shoots from the vines. Flower Garden.—Choice carnations may be increased by cuttings and layers with shade and moisture. Choice flowers should be marked for seed. Annuals that have done flowering should be removed, or some will become troublesome weeds. Kitchen Garden.—Plant celery in trenches; plant a succession of French beans; sow turnips when the weather is moist; take up early potatoes that are ripe; gather all kinds of seed as they ripen; cut off all runners from strawberries that are not wanted for plants, to give strength to the roots. Greenhouse.—Calceolarias, Cinerarias, &c., may still be sown. Geraniums that have done flowering should be cut down, and re-potted as soon as they begin to make fresh shoots. Cuttings struck now will make good plants next year, with care. Continue to shade and water as directed last month.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR-Fruit Garden.-But little is required in the fruit garden this month, besides attending to the buds. Strawberry runners should be kept moist to form robust plants in time for transplanting in the first Autumn rains. Flower Garden.-Cut off all flower stalks as soon as done flowering, except those required for seed. When seed is not required, the flowering season is prolonged by cutting seed off as soon as formed. Verbenas, pentstemons, petunias, and other herbaceous perennial plants may now be propagated by cuttings. Encourage the asters, chrysanthemums, dahlias, &c., by frequent watering. You may use the rake now to preserve a neat appearance. Kitchen Garden.-In showery weather some vegetables may be sown to come in during the winter. Mark out plants of the cabbage tribe to be permitted to run to seed. Earth up peas and potatoes; hoe and stir the surface, wherever necessary, among all descriptions of crops. Greenhouse.—As the principal displays of this season are over, we must turn our attention to preparation for the succeeding, by propagating, by seed and cuttings, and preserving such old plants as are desirable for another year. Now is the time for forming plants of the early flowers too frequently neglected by amateurs until the flowering season. Sow mignonette for winter flowering.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Prepare borders for forming new beds of straw-berries on the first approach of rain; and the ground intended to be planted with fruit trees should now be well worked. Collect the leaves as they fall and convert them into manure. Flower Garden.—Continue the general directions given for last month, and sow seed of perennial and annual flowers for Spring flowering as they ripen. Kitchen Garden.—Sow cabbage, cauliflowers, lettuce, spinach, and onions for early use. Sow turnips, thin out those sown last month. Earth up celery, take up potatoes, and house onions when well dried. Greenhouse.—Continue the general directions given for last month.

ST. Patrick's Day.—The shamrock is said to be worn by the Irish upon the anniversary of this their tutelar saint, for the following reason:—When he preached the gospel to the pagan Irish, he illustrated the doctrine of the Trinity by showing them a trefoil, or three-leaved grass, with one stalk; which operating to their conviction, the shamrock, which is a bundle of this grass, was ever afterwards worn upon this saint's anniversary, to commemorate the event.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Continue to prepare the ground intended for planting with strawberries and fruit trees, secure the leaves as directed last month. Flower Garden.—Plant jonquils, snowdrops, crocuses, ranunculuses, anemones, and other early flowering bulbs, sow seeds of stocks, wall-flowers, sweet-williams, and other biennials, for transplanting in the Spring, if you have not sufficient spring sown ones. Verbenas, petunias, pentstemons, &c., may still be propagated by cuttings. Dahlias should be taken up and stored in a dry airy place soon after the frost has killed the stems. Plant deciduous trees. Kitchen Garden.—Sow cauliflowers, cabbages, and lettuce; plant out those sown last month; sow spinach and turnips; sow onions for planting out; earth up celery. Carrots may be sown for early use. Greenhouse.—Remove all tender plants into the house, encourage the growth of geraniums, calceolarias, cinerarias, &c., by repotting as soon as the present pots are filled with roots, and keep them free from aphis, by washing, fumigation, &c. Fuchsias that have done flowering should be kept moderately dry during the dormant state; give plenty of air during fine weather.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Planting vines and fruit trees may be commenced towards the end of the month; in the meantime keep the ground well worked in dry weather, and dig between the old trees as soon as the leaves have fallen. Keep the surface of the ground loose between the rows of newly planted strawberries, and dig between the rows of the old ones. Flower Garden.—Plant bulbs of nearly all the hardy species in dry weather, and dig and manure borders between shrubs and herbaceous plants, and form new ones where required, leaving the ground rough. Carnations, &c., that have been propagated during the Summer may now be formed into beds, and general planting of shrubs, roses, &c., towards the end of the month; examine the haunts of slugs, as every one destroyed now will save considerable trouble and annoyance in the Spring. Kitchen Garden.—Continue to sow and plant a succession of vegetables, salading, &c., dig and manure all spare ground in dry weather. Dress asparagus beds for the winter. Greenhouse.—Cuttings of geraniums that have struck root should be potted into small pots, to be shifted into larger as they advance in growth. The same rule applies to cinerarias, calceolarias, &c.; give air freely during fine weather, and water moderately during damp or wet weather. Gloxinias, achimenes, and other bulbous plants that have done flowering, should be allowed to dry off: primulus and cyclamens that are coming into bloom should be kept near the glass and watered freely.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—The planting of vines and fruit trees should be proceeded with in dry weather, taking care to leave the surface of the ground loose after the operation. The general pruning of fruit trees, vines, &c., may be commenced towards the end of the month, especially such as are in a weak state of growth. Root-prune where necessary. All the ground should now be dug up roughly, burying the leaves and what manure can be afforded. Flower Garden.-Now is the time for putting in order all flower borders, shrubberies, &c., by pruning the shrubs and roses, trimming the edges, dividing and regulating the herbaceous plants, digging the borders and thereby creating a neat appearance during the winter months, and obviating the necessity of digging amongst the roots of plants in the Spring; it likewise breaks into the favourite haunts of the slugs, whereby they are more easily found and destroyed; where new borders are to be formed and planted, it should now be done. Kitchen Garden.-Plant out cabbage, cauliflowers, and lettuce. Sow peas, broad beans, and carrots for early use. Sow spinach and onions. Make plantations of rhubarb and asparagus. Greenhouse.—But little can be done in the greenhouse now beyond giving plenty of air on all favourable occasions, guarding against night frost, watering when the earth becomes dry, and keeping the plants free from vermin and dead leaves. Keep all growing plants as near the glass as possible.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—The planting of vines and fruit trees should be completed this month; should it not be convenient to do so, the trees intended to be planted next month, or later, should now be lifted and laid in by the heels, which will keep them back, always choosing dry weather for the operation; stir the ground around those planted previous to heavy rains as soon as it is dry enough for the purpose. All pruning should be finished this month. Flower Garden.—Continue the general direction for last month, and complete the planting of deciduous trees and shrubs. Keep the ground between the bulbs free from weeds. Kitchen Garden.—Plant early potatoes, &c., in a warm dry border. Early peas and beans may be sown once a fortnight or three weeks from this time. Sow the main crops of onions and carrots, also some radishes, lettuces, spinach, and early cabbage. Propagate plants which are increased by rooted off-sets. Transplant for seed, if not done in autumn, carrots, turnips, beet, celery, parsnips, &c. Greenhouse.—Continue the general directions for last month. Fuchsias that have shed their leaves should now be prepared for the following season by cutting back and re-potting them. Geraniums that are growing tall and thin should have the ends of the shoots pinched off, which will make them more bushy and compact. Re-pot cinerarias and calceolarias as soon as the present pots are filled with roots. This rule will apply to growing plants generally.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Planting and pruning vines and fruit trees, if not finished, should be done immediately. Vine cuttings may be planted. Prepare for grafting, the proper time is as soon as the stocks are well started. Raspberry and strawberry borders may still be prepared, and new ones formed, if not already done. Look carefully over the apple trees, and dress the parts affected by the aphis, or American blight. Manure freely the vines and fruit trees that are weakly. Flower Garden.—Flower beds should now be manured and dug; edgings formed, trimmed, and repaired; herbaceous plants divided; biennials planted. Roses may now be pruned, and most sorts increased by cuttings. Seeds of hardy annuals may be sown in the borders; tender ones may be sown on a moderate heat for transplanting. Choice dahlias should be placed in a gentle heat, for the purpose of propagating by cuttings. Verbenas, shrubby calceolarias, pentstemons, &c., may be increased by the same means. Kitchen Garden.—Asparagus: earth up, plant, sow. Beans, broad: plant. Beet, red: plant out for seed. Cabbage: transplant, hoe, and sow. Carrots: sow. Cauliflower: too early to sow. Celery: too early to sow. French beans: sow end of month in warm border. Garlic: plant. Jerusalem artichoke: plant. Leeks: sow. Lettuces, plant out and sow for succession. Onions: must be finished sowing this month. Potatoes: plant the early kind. Peas: sow and earth up. Turnips: sow. Radish, sow. Spinach: sow. Vegetable marrow: sow end of month in sheltered places. Greenhouse.—Admit air freely in fine weather; re-pot geraniums, cinerarias, calceolarias, &c., as the roots advance to the sides of the pot. Fuchsias that have been dormant should have their roots reduced and be re-potted in fresh soil. Cacti and

CONTINUED FROM AUGUST.] other plants may be watered more freely than in the depth of winter. Sow seeds of balsams, cockscombs, egg plants, &c., &c., on a gentle heat; keep all plants clear of aphis, scale, &c., by washing and fumigation.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—The principal work this month is the grafting, which is performed in various ways, the principal aim of which is to bring the bark of the stock and the scion to fit closely; loosen the ground with a hoe after the operation; the same between vines and fruit trees in general; in dry weather mulch raspberries. Flower Garden.—Seeds of annuals, biennials, perennials, and shrubs should now be sown; tender ones raised in heat may be transplanted towards the end of the month. Dahlia roots may be planted, propagate choice varieties as recommended last month; take the cuttings out of heat as soon as they have struck root, and protect them from the frost till it is safe to plant them; lay shrubs that are difficult of propagation by other means; keep the hoe at work in dry weather, but do not use the rake, except for covering small seeds. Kitchen Garden.—Asparagus beds, keep free from weeds. Sow red beet and French beans. Transplant cabbage, transplant lettuce. Sow carrots, celery, turnips, spinach, radishes, vegetable marrow, scarlet runner. Plant potatoes, sow peas, and earth up those that are ready. Cucumbers may be sown in ridges. Transplant onions, keep the hoe among the crops (as the weeds will grow fast), it will assist the crops in their growth. Greenhouse.—Follow the directions for last month. The plants in flower will require watering copiously and shading from the mid-day sun.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Look over the vines and rub off all superfluous buds. Disbud wall trees. Destroy caterpillars on fruit trees. Keep the surface of the ground loose with the hoe at all convenient seasons, whether/there be weeds or not. Place a layer of fresh stable manure between the rows of strawberries; it will increase the size of the fruit and render it free from grit of sand. Flower Garden.—Seeds of annuals may still be sown. Tender species raised under shelter may be transplanted into the borders, choosing showery weather for the operation. Dahlias from seed and cuttings, and other tender plants, may be planted about the middle of the month. Mark the flowers of choice bulbs, etc., with the view of collecting their seed. Stake and tie the shoots of herbaceous and other plants as they advance. Where quality, rather than the quantity of flowers is the object, the number of flowering shoots should be reduced. Destroy slugs, aphis, scale, bugs, etc., or they will destroy your choice plants. Kitchen Garden.—Continue to sow and plant successional crops. Earth up potatoes and peas, sow all kinds of brocolis, Scotch kale, savoys, and cauliflowers. Sow tomatos and capsicums. Thin early sown carrots, turnips, and spinach, and keep them free from weeds. Greenhouse.—Azaleas, camellias, ericas, etc., that have done flowering, should be taken out of the house and placed in a shady situation, towards the end of the month. Water sparingly the bulbs of achimenes, gloxinia, gesnera, etc., until they appear above the ground. Re-pot all fast-growing plants as often as the pots fill with roots. Use the syringe in the evening during sunny weather; guano or manure water occasionally will assist flowering plants whose pots are full of roots. Wage continual war against the insects.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.-Fruit Garden.-Stop all shoots of vines, except the leaders at one joint beyond the fruit, and lay them to their trellis or supports; pinch off all unnecessary shoots in young fruit trees. Vines, newly planted fruit trees, &c., will be much benefited by a mulching of half decomposed stable manure. Rub off the shoots from stocks that have been grafted, and remove the clay and binding as soon as they have joined, which may be known by their shooting vigourously; lay as many strawberry runners as may be required for new plantations, and remove all others. Flower Garden.—The planting of dahlias and tender annuals if not done, should be immediately; support all tall growing flowers as they advance; keep the surface of the ground loose with the hoe; clip and trim all edgings except roses; mark choice flowers for seed. Kitchen Garden.-Thin and hoe red beet, carrots, and all other spring crops. Plant out capsicums and tomatoes. Prick out celery in small beds from the seed beds. Earth up peas, French beans, and potatoes. A succession of peas and French beans may be sown. Greenhouse. - Sow seeds of primula, cineraria, calceolaria, camellia, geranium, &c.; give plenty of air and water and shade during sunny weather.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—Fruit Garden.—Where the vines have not been attended to, as directed last month, they should be done immediately, and as the lateral shoots appear they should be taken off to within one joint of the main shoots. Where young apple or plum trees are infested with the red spider they should be frequently syringed with tobacco water or soft soap well diluted. Brush off the American blight as it appears on the young shoots of the apple trees. Peaches, &c., on walls will now require frequent attention. Budding may be performed towards the end of the month. Flower Garden.—Dahlias, hollyhocks, &c., will now require frequent attention. Where fine show flowers of dahlias are required, one stem alone should be allowed to grow, and the lower lateral shoots removed from that, and the number of flower buds reduced, a liberal mulching will greatly promote their growth during the approaching hot weather. Bulbs of choice hyacinths, tulips, ranunculuses, anemones, &c., should be taken up and stored as they become dormant. Neatness is now the general order. Kitchen Garden.—Earth up French beans and peas, and scarlet runners, a succession may be planted, prepare trenches and plant celery; transplant all kind of brocolis and cauliflowers, savoys, and cabbage for winter use; tomatoes and capsicums, if not put out, should now be done; vegetable marrows may yet be sown; sow turnips this month, and earth up late potatoes. Greenhouse.—Cinerarias, calceolarias, etc., that are intended to be kept for another season should be removed into a shady situation as soon as they have done flowering. Fuchsias, geraniums, &c., that are flowering, may be watered occasionally with liquid manure; shade and water freely during hot weather.

Ascended the throne at the death of her uncle, King William IV., June 20, 1837; crowned at Westminster Abbey, June 28, 1838; married Feb. 10, 1840, to Prince Albert of Saxe-Coburg-Gotha; widow, Dec. 14, 1861. Issue:—

1. Princess Victoria Adelaide Mary Louisa, born November 21, 1840; married January 25, 1858, to Prince Frederick William, eldest son of King William I. of Prussia. Issue:—Three sons and two daughters, namely, Frederick William, born January 27, 1859; Charlotte, born July 24, 1860; Henry, born August 14, 1862; Francis, born September 15, 1864 (died March 9, 1866); Frederica Wilhelmina Amelia Victoria,

Prince Albert Edward, Prince of Wales and Earl of Dublin, heirapparent, born November 9, 1841; married March 10, 1863, to Princess Alexandra (born December 1st, 1844), eldest daughter of the King of Denmark. Issue:—Two sons and two daughters. Albert Victor Christian Edward, born January, 8, 1864; George Frederick Ernest Albert, born June 3, 1865; Louisa Victoria Alexandra Dagmar, born February 20, 1867; Victoria Alexandra Olga Mary, born July 6, 1868.

3. Princess Alice Mand Mary, born April 25, 1843; married July 1, 1862, to Prince Louis, of Hesse-Darmstadt. Issue:—Three daughters. Victoria, born April 5, 1863; Alice, born Nov. 1, 1864; —, born July 11, 1866.

4. Prince Alfred Ernest Albert, born August 6, 1844; entered the Royal

Navy, August 31, 1858; created Duke of Edinburgh, 1866.

5. Princess Helena Augusta Victoria, born May 25, 1846; married to Prince Christian of Augustenberg, July 5, 1866. Has issue a son, born April 14, 1867.

6. Princess Louise Carolina Alberta, born March 18, 1848.

The inheritance thus limited descended to George I., son and heir of Princess Sophia, she having died before Queen Anne; and it has ever since continued in a regular course of descent.

Coroners hold their Commissions from the Governor, and their jurisdiction extends throughout the colony. Coroners are Magistrates, and they can exercise all the Common Law powers of Justices of the Peace. They are entitled to a fee of twenty shillings for each inquest, and to an allowance of sixpence per mile for every mile travelled away from home to an inquest. They are exempt from service on juries and militia.

The Church of England has 92 places of worship, estimated to seat 15,030 adults. Official returns for 1867 show that the number of communicants was 2,487, the offertory and other church collections amounted to £3,844 9s. 9d; the baptisms were 1,396; the marriages 196, and the burials 753. The parochial church lands are returned at 1,978 acres. The episcopal endowment estate 1,200 acres; the archdeaconry endowment 30 acres and 7 houses; the college estate 3,200 acres.

Church Synod.—The governing body of the Church of England is the Synod, established in 1858, under the Act 22 Vic. No. 20, and consisting of the Bishop, all licensed clergymen, and lay communicant representatives elected by the congregations; no act being valid unless it carries the consent of all three orders. The Synod must meet once at least in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which, at present, the appointment belongs to the Bishop in eleven cases, and to Boards of Patronage (each consisting of at least seven members of Synod) in thirty-one cases. Horton College, Ross.—This College is the result of contributions by friends of education in Tasmania; the late Captain Horton, of Somercotes, Ross, having commenced the enterprise by a gift of twenty acres of land as a site for the College, and the contribution of a £1000.

The object contemplated is to afford to the sons of Protestants the advantage of a sound general education in connection with a Christian home, and careful, moral, and religious training.

The foundation stone of the College was laid in January, 1852. In October, 1855, under the presidency of the late Rev. John A. Mantonthe first pupils were received. Since that period the average number of students has been about fifty; up to the present time about 250 have been entered on the College books. The entire cost of the building and furnishing was about £4,500. To this sum an expenditure of £2,200 has been lately added in additions and alterations, which comprise a dining-hall, school-rooms, class-rooms, library, lavatory, and dormitories, with a residence for the Head Master.

The examinations which have been conducted under the "Tasmanian Council of Education and Scholarships Act" have given to Horton College ten Associate of Arts Degrees, three Certificates of Merit, three Gold Medals, and twelve Prizes of Books.

The Congregational Church, Brisbane-street, is the oldest in the Australasian colonies. It was founded by the Rev. F. Miller, who arrived from England in the year 1830. The present building was erected in 1832. It is about to be removed, and a memorial church is to be commenced at the beginning of the present year, should the subscriptions amount to £3,000. The new church is to be a memorial of the labours of the Rev. F. Miller, and of the introduction of Congregational principles into these colonies.

The several ministers and churches of the Independent body constitute the Congregational Union and Mission of Tasmania, which is established on the following principle:—"The Union of Congregational Churches and Ministers in Tasmania is founded on a full recognition of their distinctive principle, namely, the scriptural right of each church to maintain perfect independence in the government and administration of its own particular affairs." The following are the objects of the Mission :- "1. To promote the spread of the Gospel. 2. To cultivate brotherly love and co-operation among the associated churches. 3. To diffuse information on the principles of the Congregational body. 4. To obtain statistics relative to the condition and work of the churches. 5. To establish fraternal correspondence with other Churches and Unions. 6. To address, when expedient, a circular letter to the Churches of the Union. 7. To bring into the colony accredited Congregational Ministers, to educate young men for the ministry, and to employ Lay Preachers. 8. To maintain our civil rights." Chairman of Union, Rev. G. Clarke. Secretaries, Revs. W. C. Robinson and R. E. Dear.

The Congregationalists have, under the management of Trustees, a Ministers' Provident Fund in aid of any ministers who, through sickness or age, may be incapacitated for public labour,—also a Ministers' Widow Fund. The former of these funds amounts to upwards of £700, and the latter to £400, invested in government debentures.

The Rev. H. Dowling, who had been a pastor of a Baptist Chapel at Colchester, Essex, for twenty-one years, arrived in Hobart Town in 1835, in the character of a Baptist missionary, but not sent by any church or society. He founded the churches at Hobart Town and Launceston, and has taken active part in the foundation of the other churches. For upwards of thirty years Mr. Dowling filled the office of pastor of the Baptist Church, York-street, Launceston. In 1867, at the age of eighty-seven years, he retired from the active duties of his sacred office.

JURORS AND JURIES.

Courts of Requests.—At Hobart Town and Launceston jurors to be those in special jury lists, and resident within 15 miles. In Courts held before Commissioners, except as aforesaid, jurors resident within 15 miles of Court, to be selected by Commissioner from Valuation and Assessment Rolls. No jury required unless demand exceeds £10. Jury to consist of three persons.

CORONER'S JURY to be summoned upon Coroner issuing precept, and to consist of seven persons under 4 Vic., No. 7.

Common and Special Jurors and Juries.—Regulated by Acts 18 Vic. No. 11; 20 Vic. No. 28; 21 Vic. No. 45; 28 Vic. No. 11; and 31 Vic. No. 13.—Every man between 21 and 60 (unless exempt) is liable to serve as a common juror in criminal cases, and as a special juror in civil cases, under the following qualifications:—Having an annual income from real or personal (or real and personal) estate, £50; or clear real or personal estate, £500; or clear real and personal estate, £500; or house in Hobart Town or Launceston, £50, or house in any other part of the colony, £30; or municipal rate, £50; or road assessment, £30; or occupier of land, £80; or salary, £150. Penalty for non-attendance, a fine not exceeding £20.

JURY LISTS to be affixed to Court House or Police Office in each district, within 25 miles of Hobart Town and Launceston, the first week in September, and the justices of the respective districts meet on the first Tuesday in October, to correct and allow the same.

Compensation to special jurors, if residing within three miles of the Court, per diem, 5s.; if residing more than three miles, per diem, 10s.; and for every mile of distance between residence and Court, if exceeding three miles, 1s., i.e., 6d. each way.

COMPENSATION to Common Jurors in Criminal Cases, if residing above five miles from the place of trial, for each day's attendance on the Court, 5s.; if above 10 miles, 6d. per mile each way in addition.

The following persons are exempt from serving upon Coroner's, Common, or Special Juries:—Judges of supreme court, chairman of general sessions, commissioners of courts of requests, ministerial officers of the said courts, members of executive and legislative councils, and ministerial officers thereof, persons holding offices in the departments of the colonial secretary, surveyor-general, treasury, audit-office, post-office, customs, public works, clergymen, Roman Catholic priests, dissenting ministers, practising barristers, attorneys, solicitors and proctors, coroners, gaolers, practising physicians, surgeons, apothecaries and druggists, military and naval officers on full pay, bank managers, pilots and masters of vessels, sheriff's officers, stipendiary magistrates, constables and peace officers, schoolmasters, parish clerks, mayors, aldermen, auditors, and corporate officers of Hobart Town and Launceston, and such public officers as the Governor may think fit to exempt.

HOBART TOWN.--The Judges of the Supreme Court exercise the powers of a Commissioner appointed under 3 Vict., No. 1. John Milward, Provisional Assignee. Sittings weekly on each Wednesday.

LAUNCESTON. -- John Whitefoord, Commissioner; George Smith, Registrar; John Francis Hobkirk, Provisional Assignee. Sittings weekly on each Thursday.

LICENSING MEETINGS OF JUSTICES.

Meetings of justices of the peace for granting public-house and packet licenses and transfers of same are held in all police districts and munici-

palities on the first Monday in the months of February, May, August, and November in every year. Applications for each respectively must be sent to the Clerk of Petty Sessions of each district fourteen clear days previously. The annual meeting is held on the 1st December. Applica-

tions to be sent in fourteen clear days before that day.

Any person desiring to appeal against an adverse decision at any Licensing Meeting must make such appeal to the Court of General Sessions of the District in which such Licensing Meeting took place, and must also give to the Clerk or Deputy Clerk of the Peace for the District notice in writing of his intention so to appeal and the grounds of such appeal seven clear days at least before the time of holding such Court of General Sessions.

COURTS OF GENERAL AND QUARTER SESSIONS OF THE PEACE.

Exercising all the powers and authorities incidental to Courts of General and Quarter Sessions of the Peace in England (8 Vict., No. 13, sec. 8), except Criminal Jurisdiction, which can only be exercised when Court held before a Recorder (21 Vict., No. 10, sec. 3). Recorder at Launceston, John Whitefoord, Esq. Criminal Jurisdiction, all offences except treason; misprision of treason; murder or any capital felony; offences against the Queen's title, prerogative, or Government, or against the Legislature of this colony; offences subject to the penalties of præmunire; blasphemy, or offences against religion; administering or taking unlawful oaths; perjury or subornation of perjury; making or suborning any other person to make any false oath, affirmation, or declaration punishable as perjury; bigamy or offences against the laws relating to marriage; abduction of women or girls; offences against any of the provisions of the laws relating to bankrupts or insolvents; composing, printing, or publishing blasphemous, seditious, or defamatory libels; bribery; unlawful combinations or conspiracies, except conspiracies or combinations to commit any offence which Justices have jurisdiction to try when committed by one person; stealing or fraudulently taking, or injuring, or destroying records or documents belonging to any Court of Law or Equity, or Court with Ecclesiastical or Admiralty jurisdiction, or relating to any proceedings therein; stealing or fraudulently destroying or concealing wills or testamentary papers, or any document or written instrument being or containing evidence of the title to any real estate or any interest in lands, tenements, or hereditaments.

The Court held at Launceston before the Recorder for the trial of prisoners sits once every quarter, upon such days as may be fixed by the Recorder with the concurrence of the Law Officers of the Crown.

Packets containing maps, music, prospectuses, placards, &c., must be under sixteen ounces in weight, and are charged 6d. for each four ounces or portion thereof: if containing price currents or catalogues, must be open at each end. (See 6 Vict., No. 17, Section 7.) Not to contain letter or written communication. Ship book packets are charged 6d. for every 4 ozs. or portion thereof.

Soldiers' and Sailors' Letters.—Non-commissioned officers, seamen, soldiers, and marines employed in Her Majesty's service, can send or receive letters not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., on their own private concerns only, at the rate of one penny each, to be endorsed by the commanding officer for the time being.

Franking.—Members of both Houses of Parliament can receive and send letters during the sittings of Parliament, whether on public or private concerns. When Parliament is not sitting, members are entitled to frank letters from themselves on public business only. Heads of Departments, and other Government Officers, are empowered to frank on public business by authority of the Governor.

Registered Letters must bear stamps to the value of one shilling, as the

registration fee, as also the usual postage.

Photographic Likenesses, if on glass or covered with glass, not permitted to pass through the English Post-Office, except at letter rates, and then

only if securely packed.

Savings Bank Packets.—Packets containing Money or Deposit Books not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, are charged one penny only, which must be paid by means of Tasmanian Postage Stamps. Postmasters are bound to register all such Packets; but each Packet must be marked "Savings Bank Packet only," and bear the signature of the sender or person forwarding it underneath these words.

Packets containing depositions in cases of felony or misdemeanour, addressed to, or transmitted by, the Attorney-General, or other officer appointed for the prosecution of offences. 6th. Packets containing printed forms transmitted by, or addressed to, the Government Printer. GENERAL REMARKS.

Newspapers must not bear any mark, or contain any writing beyond the address, or they will be detained, and the sender be liable to a penalty not exceeding £10.

Letters or Packets insufficiently stamped are detained, and the names exhibited daily at each Post Office, and if not claimed, will be forwarded to the Secretary of the Post Office, opened, and returned to the writers.

In all cases the ordinary and extra postage to be prepaid in Tasmanian Postage Stamps.

The mails for Great Britain, &c., are forwarded every four weeks by the overland route. The boxes at Hobart Town for the reception of letters and newspapers by these mails are closed at 4 p.m. precisely on mail days. Too late letters and newspapers can only be received, on payment of the usual fees, up to 4:30 p.m. After that hour letters for England via Marseilles only can be posted up to 5:45 p.m., upon payment of 1s. fee on each letter.

Mails for Sydney, New Zealand, Queensland, Twofold Bay, Port Albert, and Adelaide, are made up and forwarded viâ Melbourne by every steam vessel departing for that port from Hobart Town or Launceston. The Tasmanian Steam Navigation's Company's vessels leave Launceston for Melbourne on or about every fifth day; Hobart Town for Melbourne every fortnight; and Hobart Town for Sydney every fortnight.

All ship mails to be forwarded viâ Launceston (except those on English Mail Days as above) close at Hobart Town at 5 p.m. Too-late letters

Messages are forwarded from any of the stations on the main line of road to the surrounding districts at a moderate charge for porterage.

Messages for George Town, four miles from Low Head. A messenger leaves Low Head daily at 2 p.m., for George Town, returning from the Police Office at 3.45 p.m. For messages so left no extra charge will be made. Urgent messages can be sent from George Town any time, on payment of 3s. extra.

Messages for Victoria and the other Australian colonies (viâ Melbourne) are forwarded to Low Head, and put on board the steamers for Melbourne, on payment of 6d. additional for postage; on arrival at Melbourne they are forwarded by telegraph to their destination, and

the charges are collected from the receiver of the message.*

A blue flag is exhibited at the Chief Office, Hobart Town, when it is known that the English Mail has arrived at Adelaide, and a red flag immediately it is telegraphed as approaching Low Head. The same flags are also hoisted at the mast-head of the flag-staff at Mulgrave Battery, Hobart Town.

At Launceston, when the English Mail is signalled, a white pennant with red ball in centre and red flag beneath, are hoisted on flagstaff

over the Public Buildings.

REGULATIONS.

Messages will be transmitted in the order of their reception; no precedence allowed, except for special despatches on Government service, the arrest of criminals, and cases of pressing emergency, sickness, or death.

Messages must be written with ink (on the form provided, or plain paper), clearly and legibly; bearing the proper date and address, and the genuine signature of the sender. The full and correct address to be given. Figures not to be used.

Notice of death should contain date of death, name, age, sex, and profession of deceased, and cause of death. The registry of all entries should be signed by the informant or they will not be available, if required, at any future time as evidence. All marriages solemnised in the colony since November, 1838, are registered in the General Register Office, Hobart Town.

The Council of Education was established in 1858 by Act of Parliament, 22nd Vict. No. 21, and consists of fifteen members. The Council is authorised to hold examinations for boys under the age of 19 years, in imitation of the Oxford and Cambridge annual local examinations, -and to confer the Degree of Associate of Arts on successful competitors. Eight scholarships, each of the value of £200 per annum, and tenable for four years at a British University, are also established; of which two are annually competed for by Associates of Arts only, under 20 years of age, who have resided in the colony for at least the preceding five years. Subsequently the privilege of bestowing annually exhibitions to Superior Schools, tenable for four years, was granted by the legislature to the Council, and from June 1860 two exhibitions, originally of £50 but now of £20 each, have yearly been bestowed on boys under 14 years of age who have not during the previous six months been at any of the Common Schools. The first examination for the A.A. Degree took place in September 1860, and that for the Scholarships in September, 1861, no Scholarship, however, being awarded in that year.

ROLL OF TASMANIAN SCHOLARS.

The Board of Education is a body corporate, consisting of not more than seven members appointed by the Governor-in-Council. Members retire after two years' service, unless re-appointed by His Excellency, and cease to be members if absent for six months from the Board meetings. The Board is empowered to frame regulations for the distribution of all moneys granted by the Legislature for the purposes of public education: to determine the locale of Public Schools; to regulate the course of instruction in the schools, the examination and classification of teachers, the issues of certificates of competency to teachers, the inspection of schools, and the functions and duties of Local School Boards; and to fix the maximum fees to be charged by teachers. All regulations must be approved of by the Governor-in-Council before of any force. The Public Schools Act, 32 Victoria, No. 14, provides for the appointment of Local School Boards of not more than nine members, and directs that every child between seven and twelve years of age, and resident within one mile from one of the Public Schools in the subjoined list marked with an asterisk, must be sent to school, unless the parent or guardian of such child holds a certificate of exemption from the Local School Board, which may be obtained on any one of the following grounds, namely:-That (1) the child is being privately educated in reading and writing, (2) is sent to some other school, (3) is prevented by ill-health, (4) can read and write, (5) or cannot safely attend school, or (6) that the parents cannot do, in whole or in part, without the labour of such child. In the absence of such certificate, any parent or guardian refusing or neglecting to send such child to school may be summoned before any two justices, who may order the child to be sent, and may determine what charge, if any, shall be made for such child. Any person refusing to obey such order, or ceasing after a time to do so, shall be fined not more than forty shillings, to be enforced by distress only, not by imprisonment.

Agricultural and horticultural tools and implements, guano, bones, and other manures of every description, wheat, oats, barley, maize, hay, bran, beans, peas oranges, lemons, pine apples, cocoa nuts, grapes, green fruit, and vegetables of every description, salt and saltpetre, wheaten flour and oatmeal, trees, plants, shrubs, bulbs, and seeds for agricultural or horticultural purposes, horses, pigs, poultry, dogs, sheep, cattle, and living animals, empty casks, cases, and boxes of wood, empty bottles and corks, lead piping, galvanized iron sheet or piping, zinc, sheet or piping, anchors and cables of every description, copper, or yellow metal, rod, bolts, or sheathing, and copper and yellow metal nails, felt for sheathing, oakum, and junk, sail canvas, rope, and twine, pitch, tar, and resin, whalebone, whalefins, and oil from the whale fisheries, boats, whaling implements, and gear of every description, ships' blocks, binnacle lamps, signal lamps, compasses, shackles, sheaves, dead-eyes, rings and thimbles, dead lights, boat oars, beef, mutton, pork, and lime juice, printed books, printed paper, mill board, card board (except playing cards), paste board, books and paper of every description, excepting room paper, ink, printing presses, printing type, and other printing materials, maps, charts, and globes, organs specially imported for the Town Hall, Hobart Town or Launceston, passenger's baggage and cabin furniture arriving in the colony at any time not being more than 21 days before or after the owner thereof, upon special application, and proof to the satisfaction of the Collector of Customs that the articles sought to be exempt from duty are bond fide passenger's baggage. Tablets, memorial windows,

harmoniums; organs and bells specially imported for churches or chapels, logwood and dye woods, railway plant, rolling stock, and all material which may be imported solely for the purpose of the construction of railways and tramways only, traction engines and their carriages, mineral cements and plaster of Paris, coke, coals, hides, and skins, raw and unmanufactured, of every description, timber of all kinds except as in schedule (2), veneers of every description, battens split and unsplit, biscuit for ship use, chaff-cutters and machinery for agricultural purposes, cart and carriage axles, arms and boxes, carriage shafts, spokes, naves, and felloes, iron pipes, iron tanks, school slates and pencils, slates for roofing, and slates and stones for flagging, marble, granite, slate, or stone, in block, tallow, soda ash, caustic soda, whiting, chalk, cotton waste, woollen waste, cotton, candle cotton, wool, flax, hemp, tow, unmanufactured, works of art, viz., statues, busts of marble, bronze, iron, alabaster or plaster of Paris, paintings, drawings, prints, engravings, lithographs, photographs, specimens of sculpture, cabinets of coins, medals, gems, and all collections of antiquities, specimens of natural history, mineralogy, or botany, ores of all kinds of metals, gold dust, gold bars, bullion, and coin, philosophical instruments and apparatus, for scientific purposes only, glass retorts and glass apparatus imported for manufacturing purposes, fire engines, steam engines, pumps, and other apparatus for raising water, coir, bristles, and hair, unmanufactured, broom heads and stocks partly manufactured for brush-making purposes, fire clay, fire bricks, kiln tiles, iron bridges, iron fencing, draining tiles, draining pipes and earthenware chimney pots, jars for jam, unmanufactured tin, tin plates, millstones and machinery for mills worked by wind, steam, water, or horse-power, bath bricks, grindstones, blacksmiths' bellows and anvils, rod, bar, hoop, sheet, plate, and pig iron, share moulds. and mould boards, unmanufactured steel of all kinds, ice, lime, bark, and firewood, epsom salts, citric acid, sulphuric and muriatic acids, and chloride of lime, haircloth for hopkilns, all bags certified by ship's manifest as returned to the colony empty after having been used in the export of colonial produce, all goods imported for the use of Her Majesty's government, and wines and spirits for the use of Her Majesty's military officers serving on full pay in this colony, under such regulations as the Governor-in-Council may from time to time cause to be published in the Gazette.

DRAWBACKS.

There is allowed upon the exportation of all articles and goods imported into the colony and enumerated in schedule 4 (if shipped within three years from the date of importation, and if the duty on any one of such articles or goods amounts to £5), a drawback of the duty paid thereon; and upon the exportation of not less than one ton of jam manufactured in the colony, packed in jars or tins only, and shipped within one year of manufacture, a drawback of two pounds eight shillings for every ton nett weight of jam; provided that the exporter or manufacturer gives notice in writing to the Collector of his intention to pack jam for export; and the Collector shall, upon the receipt of such notice, either himself, or an officer of customs appointed by him for such purpose, view such jam, and shall also seal the case or cases in which such jam is packed. drawback of the whole amount of duty paid on a carriage or carriages imported expressly by visitors to this colony for their private use shall be paid to such visitors or their agents, on the re-shipment of such carriage or carriages, provided such re-shipment takes place within six months from the date of inward entry at the Custom House.

MARINE BOARD, HOBART TOWN.

ESTABLISHED BY ACT OF PARLIAMENT, 22ND DEC., 1857.

The jurisdiction of the Hobart Town Marine Board under this Act extends to all ports, harbours, and islands between Cape Portland, near the 148th degree of East Longtitude, and the 42nd parallel of South Latitude, round the eastern, southern, and western coasts, and one nautical league to the seaward from low water mark along the whole coast line between such localities.

Office, Franklin Wharf. Master Warden, H. B. Tonkin; Wardens-W. Crosby, C. M. Maxwell, and the Mayor and the Collector of Customs ex officio. The Board meets for transaction of business every Wednesday at 11 a.m. Secretary, H. S. Nelson. Harbour Master, J. A Babington. Boarding Officer, H. B. Hurburgh. Boat's crew of four men. Pilots, John Bleach, James Hurburgh.

EMIGRATION OFFICER.—Captain Andrew Haig. For regulations as to passengers, see Act of Imperial Parliament 18 and 19 Vic. cap. CXIX. published in Hobart Town Gazette, February 8, 1859, and amended Act 26 and 27 Vic. cap. LI. published in the Hobart Town Gazette, Nov. 24, 1863.

HARBOUR DUES.—The following services performed to any vessel, by or under the direction of the Harbour Master, to be severally paid for at the rate of one penny per ton :- Mooring or anchoring on arrival. ing and moving to the wharf. Hauling off the wharf and re-mooring. Unmooring and moving to a fair way for sea. Any removal from one place of anchorage to another.

N.B.—No vessel is charged for more than three removes during her stay

in port.

PORT CHARGES.—Lighthouse Rates.—For every steam vessel, and for every vessel employed in the coasting trade, on entering inwards at the Customs of this colony, fourpence per ton. For every other vessel enter-

ing inwards at the Customs of this colony, sixpence per ton.

Pilotage (Hobart Town).—On sailing vessels, ninepence per registered ton; and on steam vessels, sixpence per registered ton; provided always that no charge for pilotage shall exceed thirty pounds nor be less than four pounds; and that no vessel under fifty tons shall be subject to pilotage, unless the master of such vessel shall request the service of a Pilot, and

The remuneration to Pilots detained on board vessels in quarantine or otherwise delayed shall be fifteen shillings per diem in addition to the

usual pilotage.

^{*} The expense of these lights is divided between this Colony, Victoria, and New South Wales.

The rate now payable for pilotage shall be reduced one-half whenever it shall be proved to the Marine Board that no Pilot offered himself to the vessel entering the port until such vessel had reached a line drawn from the southern point of Half-moon Bay to Pearson's Point.

The exemption flag denoting the vessel to be exempt from the necessity of taking a Pilot shall be a full-sized red pennant over the allotted distin-

guishing flag of such vessel.

Exemptions from Port Charges .- In order to encourage the resort of vessels of all nations engaged in the whale fishery, and vessels arriving under the circumstances hereinafter mentioned, to the ports of this island, all vessels of all nations outfitting for or refitting from the whale fisheries, and all vessels arriving and sailing in ballast, or which do not break bulk, or only to such an extent as may be necessary to provide funds for the repairs, refittings, or refreshments of such vessels, and all vessels belonging to any foreign Power with which a treaty of commerce declared by any royal order in council to be subsisting has been made, which arrive at any port for the purpose of landing any oil or whalebone, the produce of fish caught or taken by the crews of such vessels, and land such oil and whalebone at any wharf appointed by the Board for that special purpose, shall be and the same are wholly exempted from the payment of all port charges, lighthouse dues, and all port dues whatsoever, except only those of pilotage in cases where the services of a Pilot have been actually required and received.

A pamphlet containing the following information is supplied to all

vessels arriving in the Port :-

"The rules and regulations of the Port of Hobart Town contained in the Marine Board Act, 21 Vict., No. 16, and in Bye Laws passed by the Hobart Town Marine Board, also the Quarantine Act, 5 Vict., No. 14, and the Admiralty Regulations respecting lights and fog signals to prevent collisions."





The arrival at Sydney of the Mail via Panama is signalled by a blue and white chequered flag (No. 14) at the mast-head. When a steamer from Melbourne is signalled at Low Head, a red pennant is hoisted at the end of left yard-arm (viewed from town), for two hours. A Ball at the mast-head denotes that the Parade or Drill of Volunteer Artillery ordered for the day is countermanded.

The rules and regulations pertaining to the port are published by the Board, and contain the pilotage rates, harbour dues, scale of towage, signals for steam tug, regulations respecting lights, wharfage rates, steam tug and boat licenses, boatmen's fares, quarantine act, sailing directions, &c. This book is supplied to all vessels visiting the port.

Quarantine Ground—Western Side, Middle Island, in the river Tamar; day signal, yellow flag, of six breadths of bunting, at main topmast head; at night a signal lantern shown from the same position.

PILOTAGE RATES, LAUNCESTON.

For every sailing vessel liable to pilotage, 1s. per ton inwards, and the same outwards.

For every steam vessel liable to pilotage, 8d. per ton inwards, and the same outwards.

For every day that a pilot is detained on board any vessel whilst under

quarantine, or by an act of the master, 15s. per day.

No charge for a single act of pilotage to exceed thirty pounds, or be less than four pounds. Vessels not exceeding fifty tons to be exempt, unless the master requires the services of the pilot and employs one, in which case the pilotage shall be four pounds. Vessels that do not have the services of a pilot until they pass Whirpool Reach either going up or down the river shall be charged only half pilotage.

FREE PORT.

Vessels seeking freight, or putting in from stress of weather, and not breaking bulk, are exempt from pilotage, light dues, and all port charges whatever, unless they require the services of a pilot and employ one; in which case, if they anchor below George Town, one-third pilotage only will be charged.

HARBOUR DUES.

One penny per ton inwards, and the same outwards, and for each removal whilst in port one penny per ton.

LIGHT DUES.

For every steam vessel and every vessel employed in the coasting trade, on entering inwards at the Customs, four-pence per ton. For every other vessel entering inwards at the Customs, six-pence per ton.

TOWAGE RATES, TAMAR TUG.

All vessels under 150 tons, £15; from 150 to 250 tons, 2s. per ton. Every additional ton up to 500, 1s. per ton. Every ton beyond 500, 6d. per ton.

From Point Rapid, three fourths

, Swan Point, one-half , Fresh Water Point, one-fourth Of the charge from the Heads

But as a general rule the Tamar will not get up steam under £15.

One-third the amount of pilotage will be taken off the towage if the vessel is liable to that charge.

When two vessels are towed together (over 112 tons register each) a reduction of 25 per cent. off the usual charge to the smaller one will be made to each.

Signal for Steam-tug.—The rendezvous or chequered flag, hoisted where best seen.

When this signal is made by a vessel entering the port, the tug, if in Launceston, will be telegraphed for on that vessel's account.

PRIVATE PURCHASE OF CROWN LAND.

There are three Waste Lands Acts in force under which lands may be secured without competition, namely:—The Waste Lands Act, 1863, 27 Vict., No. 22; the Waste Lands Act., No. 4, 31 Vict., No. 25; and the Waste Lands Act, No. 5, 32 Vict., No. 18. Lands reserved for sale, town lands, all lands under lease or that were under lease on 1st August, 1863, and lands advertised for sale by auction, are excepted from private selection.

The upset price of all good agricultural crown land in Tasmania is one per acre, exclusive of the cost of survey, which must be paid in advance in every case, and of the grant deed fee, which is invariably fifteen shillings, and is the last payment that has to be made, except two small ones (about 10s.) to the Recorder of Titles.

Under the Acts already named there are three methods of proceeding. First—By the Waste Lands Act, 1863, any person may purchase, by private contract with the Commissioner of Crown Lands, at a fixed price of £1 per acre, 320 acres of land in one or more lots; if in more than one they must all adjoin; not more than one lot to be selected by any one at the same time. Credit purchasers are required to pay a "credit premium," which adds one-fifth to the purchase money. Selector must make written application to the Commissioner of Crown lands, and if the allotment is available is called upon to deposit the survey fee. The following is the scale of survey fees charged:—

This scale applies to all surveys, no matter which Act the land is taken under.

On receipt of the District Surveyor's plan of the land, the selector is required to pay a deposit of one-fifth of the whole purchase-money, the balance being payable in instalments spread over a term of eight years. He may, however, at any time during that period pay up the balance, in which case all further payments required on account of the credit premium are cancelled.

No credit allowed where the cost of a piece of land is less than £15. Example of mode of payment where credit is taken for 100 acres, sale price being £100; credit premium of one-fifth, £20; total price, £120.

Second—Under the Waste Lands Act, No. 5, 32 Vic. No. 18, any person may select and purchase one lot of land of not more than 100

acres at £1 per acre. No one to hold more than one lot, unless obtained by descent, devise, or marriage. Selector must occupy, either personally or by tenant or representative, within a year after selection, and continue in occupation until the purchase money is paid off. Selectors on credit to pay cash at purchase amounting to one-thirtieth of the upset price, in addition to the survey fee; and a credit premium of one-third of the whole to be added to the purchase money. Payment of balance to extend over fourteen years; but balance may be paid off at any time during that period, a discount at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum being allowed off such balance.

Third—By the Waste Lands Act, No. 4, a person can lease one lot of land of not more than 100 acres for twenty years, on payment in advance of the survey fee, £8 15s., and one year's rent at 6d. an acre £2 10s.; the payments thereafter being:—For two years, rent at 6d. an acre, £2 10s. each; two years, rent at 1s., ditto, £5 each; and for the remaining fifteen years, at 2s. an acre, £10 annually. Total payments, £176 5s. If the lessee then desire to purchase the lot, he must pay as in the first or second method, less the survey fee. But he

The following are the regulations for the guidance of persons desirous of introducing immigrants from the United Kingdom under the bounty system adopted on the 21st December, 1858:—

Application, stating sex and class of immigrant, must be made on printed forms, which will be supplied by the Immigration Agents, the Wardens of Municipalities, or the Police Magistrates.

For a ticket for a single person above 60 years of age, £16 must be paid, and in the case of families, if either of the parents is over 60 years of age, the applicant for the ticket must deposit £20. Documentary evidence of the age of any immigrant must be produced upon his or her arrival if required by the Immigration Agent.

If any immigrant be found on arrival not to answer the description stated in the application, the applicant will be liable to be called upon for repayment of any money which may have been paid from the public funds on account of such immigrant.

The emigrant must sign an engagement (for self and family) agreeing not to leave the colony within four years after arrival without paying one of the Immigration Agents one-fourth of the passage money for every year short of the four years, and a proportionate sum for every part of a year.

Persons introducing immigrants under these regulations must provide for their reception on arrival; or if received into a Government establishment a charge of two shillings a day or part of a day will be made against the introducer.

In the event of death on the voyage half passage money only will be paid.

Under the Immigration Act, 1867, Immigration Agents may be appointed abroad, who shall issue to approved emigrants proceeding direct from Europe to Tasmania at their own expense land order warrants entitling the holders, on arrival in the colony, to a land order in respect of each person named therein. Such land orders to be of the nominal value of £18 for each emigrant of and over fifteen years of age, and £9 for each child between twelve months and fifteen years of age; and to be available to their full value in payment for land purchased under the Waste Lands Act, 1863.

The seventh and following sections, which are now in operation, provide that any cabin or intermediate passenger arriving from Europe or India, with the intention of settling in the colony, and who has not received a land order under the previous sections, may at any time within twelve months after his arrival obtain from the Board of Immigration a certificate entitling him to select thirty acres of land; if married, he shall be entitled to further certificates authorising the selection of twenty acres in respect of his wife, and ten acres in respect of each child, within twelve months after their arrival. Selection to be made within a year after the date of the certificates. These certificates to be received by the Commissioner of Crown Lands in payment for lands selected for purchase under the Waste Lands Act, 1863.

Persons purchasing or selecting land by virtue of these land orders or certificates must reside for five years in Tasmania before entitled to grants from the Crown of such land; but in the event of death before

the expiration of five years, their heirs-at-law or devisees shall be forthwith entitled to grants.

The Act 31 Vict. No. 27 reserves for a period of three years for the settlement, under the Waste Lands Act, 1863, of Europeans emigrating from India to Tasmania, an area of 50,000 acres at Castra, county of Devon.

THE QUEEN'S ASYLUM FOR DESTITUTE CHILDREN.

New Town, three miles from Hobart Town, on Main Road.

This institution is conducted in a manner similar to the Industrial Schools of Germany and Holland; it contains about 500 children, who receive from eight to twelve hours' secular instruction weekly; the whole of Wednesday and half an hour each morning are devoted to religious instruction, the rest of the time being set apart for teaching them to be useful; the boys as farm servants, gardeners, bakers, &c.; and the girls as domestic servants, and in needlework, making and mending clothes, and washing.

Dunne, and the Superintendent, who alone have the power of apprenticing the children, or authorising their removal in any way from the Asylum.

Formation.—This Society was founded at a meeting held at Government House on the 14th October, 1843, the Governor, the late Sir J. Eardley-Wilmot, Bart., being in the chair. The meeting consisted of members of the Tasmanian and Horticultural Societies, and of other gentlemen interested in the advancement of science, and the progress of the Colony. Sir J. E. Eardley-Wilmot subsequently assigned to the Society a large portion of the Government Garden, with an allowance of £400 per annum from the Public Treasury to pay the officers of the Society, and generally to promote its objects. On the 12th of September, 1844, the Governor announced that Her Majesty the Queen had signified her consent to become patron of the Society—that the constitution of the Society had been approved—that the grant of £400 per annum had been confirmed—and that its designation should thenceforward be, "The Royal Society of Van Diemen's Land, for Horticulture, Botany, and the advancement of Science."

Principles and Constitution.—1. The leading objects of the Society are to develop the physical character of the island and to illustrate its natural history and productions. 2. The Society consists of a President, twelve Members of Council, a Treasurer, a Secretary, and an indefinite number of Fellows. 3. The Lieut.-Governor for the time wing is President. 4. The President is annually to nominate and

appoint from the list of persons elected members of the Council four to act as Vice-President in his absence. 5. The President and Council have the ordering and management of the property, officers, servants, and affairs of the Society. 6. The election of all persons into the Society is to be by ballot, according to the rules now or hereafter established.

During the Parliamentary session of 1865 the promoters of this work obtained a bill (29 Vic. No. 24) to enable a Company under the Limited Liability Act to make and maintain this railway, which is intended to connect Deloraine, Westbury, Longford, Perth, and Evandale, with the port of Launceston.

The capital of the Company is £400,000, and the assistance offered by Parliament for the encouragement of the work was the provision that when £50,000 had been paid up the Company might borrow £300,000 on bonds, the Government endorsing these for the due payment of interest thereon at not more than 6 per cent.; and the promoters claim to be entitled under the Waste Lands Act, 28 Vic. No. 3, sec. 3, to a grant of land in consideration of the actual capital expended by the shareholders. The extent of the grant, however, will depend upon the vote of the Parliament, which, on the similar undertaking known as the Deloraine and Mersey tramway, amounted to 15,360 acres of land, to be selected in blocks of not less than 5000 acres of land, so soon as twelve miles of the line are completed, and open to the public.

By the 31st of Victoria, No. 43, the Government may receive the bonds of the Company for the loan of £300,000 and issue debentures in exchange, secured on the public revenues of the colony, to the like amount. These debentures were placed on the London Stock Exchange in April, 1867, and they realized a premium of £2 9s. 4d. per cent.

The first surf of the works was turned by H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh, on the 15th of January, 1868. The ceremony took place in the presence of His Excellency the Governor and suite, the Hon. the Colonial Secretary, the Hon. Treasurer, and members of the suite of His Royal Highness, and a large concourse of people, on the site of the terminus at Launceston. A loyal address was presented to His Royal Highness by the Chairman of the Company, to which the Prince graciously replied at some length.

A contract for the construction of the works has since been taken by Messrs. Overend and Robb, of Melbourne, who are now pushing them on at various points along the line; and they expect to open the railway throughout, in accordance with the terms of their engagement, in April next year.

This Company is formed for the purpose of constructing an iron tramway or railroad, to be worked by horse or steam power, between Deloraine and the Mersey, with (if hereafter desired) branches to Cheshunt, Chudleigh, and Kentish Plains; the Mersey being the nearest port and natural outlet to these places, and to the agricultural lands in their vicinity, and in other parts of Devon.

An Act of Parliament has been passed giving to this Company the

fullest power to carry out their designs. The Legislature has also granted to them 1,280 acres of Crown land in respect of each mile in length of their tramway, making for 30 miles of tramway 38,400 acres. This land will be greatly enhanced in value by its proximity to the tramway.

The land required for the tramway has been obtained free of cost for two-thirds of its length. A considerable portion of the work has been done, and it is expected that during the present year about 18 miles of the tramway will be completed and open to public traffic.

OBLITERATION OF STAMPS. Stamps are to be cancelled by writing across them the date of using the same, "so that the stamp may be appropriated to the instrument, and rendered incapable of being used for any other, and in default thereof such stamps shall be of no avail."

Stamps unnecessarily defaced, or rendered unfit for use, may be replaced by other stamps on application to the Collector within thirty days after they have been so spoiled.

PROBATE DUTIES.

Collector, H. J. Buckland.

The Probate Duties Act, 32 Viet. No. 1, repeals the Succession Duty Act, and imposes the following duties on probate of will and letters of administration:—

Personal estate of £100, and under £500...... 2 per cent. Ditto; £500 and upwards 3 per cent.

The Curator of Intestate Estates is empowered to retain duty out of proceeds of estates passing through his hands as Curator.

No duty payable on sums received under life policies where held by or for deceased, his wife, or child.

The Act is retrospective as to wills proved or letters of administration granted since 1st January, 1866, unless full amount of succession duty was paid before 1st September, 1868.

£55,401 12s. 9d., the number of accounts open being 2,948, and the reserve fund £6,312 8s. 9d.

On the 1st November, 1862, an Act came into operation (26th Vict. No. 15), which enables any person to remit through the post any sum as a deposit to any Savings Bank at the postage of one penny for every packet not exceeding four ounces, for which small charge the packet is to be registered by the Postmaster; thus securing to the depositor an official receipt for the safe delivery of the packet to the Savings Bank.

COUNTRY DISTRICTS.

The colony of Tasmania is divided into nineteen rural municipalities, and seven police pistricts. Seven Councillors are, in the first instance, elected by the ratepayers of the respective municipalities. Two Councillors retire for two successive years, and every third year three Councillors retire, but are eligible for re-election. The Councillors elect one of their number as Warden, whose term of office extends over one year. All powers by law vested in Police Magistrates are also, by Act of Parliament, vested in the Warden while holding office. The Governor has the power of appointing the Warden and Councillors to be Justices of the Peace within their respective municipalities during their term of office; provision is thus made for the discharge of all legal business which formerly devolved on paid officers of the central government.

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THINGS A FARMER SHOULD NOT DO.

A farmer should never break up more land than he can cultivate thoroughly, nor devote his sole attention to fields "easy to work at," while other portions of his farm are neglected. A farmer should never have more cattle, horses, or other animal stock than he can keep in good order; nor depend on his neighbours for what he can by careful management produce on his own land. He should not buy or beg fruit while he can plant trees and cultivate them, nor borrow tools while he can make or buy them. He should never be so immersed in political matters as to neglect doing his work in due season. A farmer should never refuse a fair price for anything he wishes to sell, nor let his buildings and fences go to decay while he can afford the money to keep them in proper repair.

RURAL MUNICIPALITY OF BOTHWELL,

WYNYARD, the principal township, is situated at the mouth of the River Inglis and Camp Creek, and has a population of about 200. It is a port of entry. There are some very substantial buildings, including the new Police Office, Government cottage, Mr. Stutterd's stores and residence, and the Court House Hotel. One of the greatest wants felt on this township is that of a proper church building, the building at present used being a miserable wooden structure resembling a barn more than the parish church of so thriving a township. eligible site, however, has recently been obtained, and it is to be hoped that the inhabitants will now adopt the necessary means to at once supply the deficiency. A very pretty and suitable little church has been lately erected at Hamilton-on-Forth, at a comparatively low cost: a similar building would be very suitable to the requirements of Wynyard. It is believed by many that Wynyard will at some future date be a most important shipping town, and the outlet to a large and paying gold-field. The extensive saw mills situated at a distance of about a mile and a half from the township have been greatly improved within the last few months, the enterprising proprietors, Messrs. Moore and Quiggin, having expended a large sum of money in erecting a most substantial water-wheel in connection with the machinery, which enables them to work the mill both by steam and water power. Messrs. Moore and Quiggin are about to make the necessary arrangements for grinding wheat, &c., which will be a great boon to the residents. A contract has been entered into by Messrs. Moore and Quiggin for the supply of railway sleepers for the Launceston and Deloraine railway. Several shiploads have already been supplied.

Arrangements are being made by the local Board of Works to erect a breakwater on the north-west side of the entrance to River Inglis, which will, when completed, render the harbour accessible to vessels in any weather. A substantial stone jetty is in course of erection, which will enable vessels to lie alongside at any tide without damage. The Marine Board has it in contemplation to expend a few pounds in experimenting upon the flat rock forming the bar at the mouth of the River Inglis by putting a few blasts of gunpowder into it, which, it is believed, will give sufficient proof that the bar is capable of being deepened to the extent of eighteen inches or two feet at a comparatively small expense.

An allotment of land has been obtained adjoining the police reserve, for public purposes, upon which the inhabitants are about to erect an a sembly room and library. Wynyard possesses the great advantage over some of the townships on the North West Coast of not being in the hands of any private company, such as the Van Diemen's Land Company, as both Stanley and Burnie are. Licensing meetings for the police district of Emu Bay are held at Wynyard.

PORT MALDON and SOMERSET, on the River Cam, are at present thinly inhabited, but the latter is a very thriving little township.

RIVERS AND HARBOURS.—Cam, Inglis, and Detention Rivers, with many smaller streams. The three former are easy of access at high tide; the Inglis is capable of admitting vessels drawing from 8ft. 6in. to 9ft of water. Substantial bridges have been erected over the Cam and Inglis, and the same class of bridges are now being erected over the Rivers Inglis (some 2 miles higher up the river than the present bridge) and Detention, and over Big Creek and Sisters Creek, which, when complete 1, will be a great boon to the residents on the North West Coast. The bight under the Promotory at Table Cape forms a safe anchorage for vessels of any tonnage.

REMARKS.—The description of the general character of the soil, &c., at Circular Head is equally applicable to Table Cape. The River Inglis and the various fresh water streams in this district abound with fish, including herring, eels, blackfish, lobsters, and trout. Among the salt water fish may be enumerated trumpeter, rock-cod, flathead, mullet, garnet, saltwater blackfish, and many other varities.

considerable article of export to Melbourne for building purposes. Timber, potatoes, and apples are also largely exported from Franklin. Fruit trees of all descriptions have been planted extensively in this district. There are nine saw mills and three flour mills. A magnificent bed of the finest timber and good land exists at the back of the township of Franklin. The exportation of apples is now very large from this district: the humidity of the climate, and cooler temperature compared to most of the other districts, marks out the Huon as the favoured one for all descriptions of hard or keeping apples. The soft and stone fruits also thrive here wonderfully well, and during the present season no less than four jam making establishments will be in operation, two of them being branches of Hobart Town houses. Notwithstanding the length of time which has elapsed since the foundation of this settlement, comparatively little is known of the back country; now, however, that the new Huon road is being rapidly pushed towards completion, the people are becoming more alive to the necessity for the exploration of the western country, where, it is believed, good pastoral lands will be found, and probably some of the more valuable minerals.

CLIMATE.—The climate of the whole district is most salubrious, Even in winter there is a mildness throughout the atmosphere, and in summer the occurrence of a hot wind is not on record. George Town is much frequented during the summer and autumn months by numerous visitors, not only from the interior, but also from the neighbouring colony of Victoria, for sea-bathing. Flinders' Islands, separated from the main land by Banks's Strait, is included in this district, and contains a population of about 150 souls, chiefly half-caste. The staple commodity of these islands may be said to be the Petrel, commonly known as the Mutton Bird, which are killed and salted every year; the oil collected from the dying bird is considerable in quantity at an average value of 4s. per gallon. Many hundreds of dozens of their eggs are also brought to Launceston, and generally find a ready sale. Some idea may be formed of the quantity of these eggs when it is known for a fact that 23,000 have been collected in one day. At Ilfracombe there are extensive steam and water power saw mills; ironstone of first-class quality may be obtained in any quantity. There is also a slate quarry.

The principal products of Glamorgan consist of grain and apples, a large quantity of the latter being annually shipped direct to Melbourne. Two enterprising persons have lately commenced hop-growing. An abundant supply of fine timber exists throughout the whole length of the district, but consequent upon the difficulty of land carriage it cannot at present be worked to advantage; otherwise an extensive field would be open to the employment of splitters and sawyers.

The Seymour Coal Mines, lying near the boundaries of Fingal and

Glamorgan, and within gunshot of the beach, have been energetically worked for several years, and not only is the coal of a superior quality,

but the mines contain an inexhaustible supply.

The whole country southwards from the scene of these operations, for a distance of from 12 to 20 miles, shows evident signs of being coal-bearing. In scarcely a ravine or gully will seams of coal varying from an inch to four or five feet in thickness be looked for in vain.

Glamorgan is bounded on the east by the sea for a distance of sixty or seventy miles, commencing at Little Swanport River, and thence to the Doctor's Creek, north of Seymour. Its boundary is from there defined by a line passing along the summit of generally rugged and barren tiers, in a south-westerly direction until nearly opposite the head of the Major's Plains on St. Paul's River. From the Doctor's Creek to this there is little land fit for arable purposes, and even such as might be so adapted loses its value in consequence of the limited extent and unapproachable situations. In continuing to follow the boundary you strike a southerly course, bordering upon the extremities of numerous surveyed blocks of land, and passing in the vicinity of Kearney's Bogs,—a large area of magnificent country, at present solely occupied for common grazing purposes, but only requiring an increase of drainage and a passable road to place it on an equality with many first-class dairy farms. Proceeding onward towards Toom's Lake much high country is traversed, principally of inferior quality, though a few spots are to be found worthy of notice for pastoral purposes; the same may be said of that from the Lake to Little Swanport River, the direction being nearly east to the point of commencement. Glamorgan on the whole may be considered a mountainous district, ranges of hills lying north and south from end to end, and in many places approaching to within a few hundred yards of the sea shore, while extending for many miles into the interior. These ranges to a great extent destroy communication with the adjacent districts, the roads to Falmouth, Avoca, Campbell Town, Eastern Marshes, and Spring Bay all being extremely rough; and until the last two or three years such a task was it to accomplish a journey either over the road to Campbell Town or through the St. Paul's (the latter being the principal outlet) that few would venture who were not thoroughly conversant with every turn. Now, however, this difficulty is greatly lessened, and a vehicle may with safety and comparative ease travel from Avoca to Swansea, vià St. Paul's, needed improvements having, under the supervision of the Board of Works, been accomplished.

Granite rocks of immense extent exist on Freycinet's Peninsula, and in the neighbourhood of Bicheno. Every variety of salt and fresh water fish abound in the river and bays; also extensive oyster-beds in the Swan and Little Swanport Rivers.

The climate of Glamorgan is unsurpassed, and very little sickness is found to exist. The scenery is romantic and beautiful. On the sea side Rocky Hills and Swansea may be particularly noticed. At the former place the road winds round the summit of a lofty hill some hundreds of feet above the sea for about a mile, affording a view which has been universally acknowledged to be one of the grandest in Tasmania. The Swansea Bay, too, is very pretty, and bears a strong resemblance to the Bay of Naples. Freycinet's Peninsula and

Schouten Island encircle it at a radius of about 20 miles, and almost entirely shut out the open sea from view. Nothing can exceed the picturesque beauty of their huge granite cliffs at sunset on a calm fine evening. Vessels can remain at anchor at Swansea in almost any wind, and can ensure safety in the roughest weather by running over to a bay at Freycinet's Peninsula. The principal rivers are the Swan, which flows through the centre of the district, and the Little Swanport River, which divides Glamorgan from the adjoining municipality of Spring Bay. The former is a large river, with numerous tributaries, including the Wye, Cygnet, and Apsley, but its navigation is unfortunately prevented by a shifting sand bar, and several mud flats. For many miles between the mud flats this river is of sufficient depth to float the largest vessels. It abounds with swans, pelicans, wild ducks, &c. There are many smaller streams which afford an abundant supply of fresh water all the year round, amongst which are the Douglas, Meredith, Stony, Buxton, and Lisdillon Rivulets. Swansea is the largest town on the East Coast of Tasmania.

The sea washes three sides of the town, affording very fine beaches as roads and promenades to the inhabitants. The site is rather exposed, but the climate beautiful and most conducive to health. The mean annual temperature is 59.7. There are excellent chalybeate springs about eight miles from the town. Smithton, on the Duck River, 13 miles to the west of Stanley, is thinly inhabited, but it is a place from which considerable shipments are made.

In the busy season, i.e. between the months of March and October, it is no unusual thing to find a dozen vessels lying at Circular Head at one time; and a string of upwards of 30 bullock teams laden with produce may frequently be seen on the beach leading from the out-lying farms to the wharf. The shipping business at this place is larger than at any other sub-port on the north coast. Considerable quantities of timber, &c., are shipped from Brickmaker's Bay and Duck River. The imports, exports, and customs collections since 1st January, 1866, have been as follows:—

In addition to the foreign exports, large quantities of produce are shipped coastwise to Launceston, including nearly all the wool, which is transhipped to London. The goods imported direct to Stanley form but a small proportion of those actually consumed, as, in the absence of a warehouse, nearly all the spirits, tobacco, and most expensive articles of consumption are obtained from Launceston. The extremely low prices of all kinds of farm produce during the last two seasons have had a most depressing and injurious effect upon the agricultural and commercial community. The statistics given above show that the annual value of exports has been reduced to the extent of £12,000, which in a district numbering a total population of 1200 has necessarily resulted in ruinous consequences to many industrious and formerly thriving families.

IMPROVEMENTS.—Contracts have been taken for erecting substantial bridges over the Detention River and Crayfish Creek. Much has also

been done by the Government towards improving the road between Circular Head and Table Cape. It is expected that during the year 1869 not only will the various dangerous rivers be bridged, but the worst portions of the present main road will be avoided by the opening of a more level back track now in course of being cleared. The local Board of Works has during 1868 expended upwards of £430 in effecting many much needed improvements. A small paddle steamer and smart schooner are now regular traders between Launceston and Stanley, the former making weekly trips.

The municipality of Spring Bay is bounded on the east by the sea from Little Swan Port to Cape Bernier; thence by the district of Sorell to the district of Richmond; by that district and the electoral district of Oatlands to the Little Swan Port river, which joins the sea at Little Swan Port. Maria Island, Green Island, Lachlan's Island, and the White Rock are included.

Little Swan Port is an inlet of the sea extending four or five miles inland, but so shallow that low tide leaves a large extent of the mud flats dry. Formerly it was a great resort for swans, ducks, and other wild fowl, but in consequence of the indiscriminate slaughter of the birds, and the wanton destruction of their eggs, they have now nearly disappeared. The entrance is across a bar, over which in easterly weather the sea breaks heavily. It was in crossing this bar that Captain Young, of the 21st, then Police Magistrate of Waterloo Point (Swansea), was, with a soldier of his regiment, drowned in 1837. Captain Young was a brother of Sir H. E. F. Young, formerly Governor of Tasmania. The soil on the banks of Little Swan Port is generally poor, badly watered, and only fit for grazing sheep.

Maria Island, named by Tasman in honour of Maria Van Diemen, was a penal settlement in 1827, but when the convicts were removed from Macquarie Harbour to Port Arthur, the station at Maria Island was also relinquished. It was again used as a receptacle for prisoners under the probation system, and a second time abandoned. It is now in the occupation of Melmoth Fletcher, Esq., and is capable of carrying about 3000 sheep. Its merits have been much overrated. The eastern coast is granite, worthless for pasture; at the northern extremitiy the grand and lofty cliffs are limestone, and are interesting to the geologist from the size and variety of fossils they contain. On the west side of the island trap rocks and sandstone prevail, and on

these formations there is grass. The other islands named are small, little more than rocks.

Cape Bernier has no claim to special notice, beyond the fact of its being a very noble headland, better qualified to adorn an artist's

sketch-book than add to a settler's bank-credit.

Spring Bay is one of the finest harbours in the world, and the only one between Cape Pillar and Port Dalrymple. It is sheltered on the east by Maria Island, and may be safely entered in any weather. either from the north or south. The village or town of Triabunna is at the head of the bay. It possesses excellent Municipal Council Chambers, a good Public School, and two comfortable inns. In the absence of a Protestant Church, divine service is performed once a month in the Council Chambers. A Roman Catholic Chapel has been built, but is not opened. Mr. Fennell's mail cart, which runs twice a week to Richmond, through Orford and Buckland, affords safe and expeditious transit for passengers. This accommodation must be counted as one of the many good results of the erection of the Meredith Bridge, over Prosser's River. Previously, this river was the great difficulty and danger to travellers on the east coast of Tasmania. as for nearly its whole course of about thirty miles it flows through deep, rocky, and most picturesque ravines, receiving many smaller tributaries ere reaching the sea. The old road, or rather track, from Swansea and Triabunna to Hobart Town crossed this river five times in six miles, the fords being always hazardous, and after heavy rains impassable. To obviate these perils and inconveniences, a road has been formed, keeping on the south bank of the river, between Backhouse and Orford; and on reaching the latter place, crosses the stream over the Meredith Bridge. so named by the neighbouring settlers in compliment to the Hon. Charles Meredith, the energetic promoter of this and similar beneficial works. It is a pile and timber bridge of 21 spans of 30 feet each.

Prosser's Plains is the very inapt designation of a beautiful undulating valley, comprising the richest land in the municipality; it possesses fine grassy meadows, and is well watered, and the excellence of its dairy produce is second to that of no district in the colony. Here, among other properties, are those of Messrs. Gatehouse, Meredith (Hon. Charles), Olling, Cruttenien, &c. The freestone quarry from which the Post Office in Melbourne was chiefly built, and whence large quantities of fine white stone are now shipped for the new Town Hall of the same city, is situated on the shore of Prosser's Bay.

opposite Maria Island.

The oysters from this coast have been long known in the Melbourne and Hobart Town markets, and new beds of great excellence have lately been discovered. Oyster culture is also likely to be carrried on in the neighbourhood to some extent. Mr. Patton, of Triabunna, has obtained from the Council a lease of two acres of water, on which he has already laid down 100,000 oysters.

The beauty of the coast and scenery along this district is not excelled by any part of Tasmania. The lovely bays, bounded by bold rocky headlands and steep cliffs, crowned in many places by graceful groups of the Oyster Bay pine, forming spires of rich vivid green amid the sombre clive tints of the gum and sheoak forests, alike gladden the traveller and delight the artist.

INSTRUCTIONS FOR SAVING DROWNING PERSONS BY SWIMMING TO THEIR RELIEF.

1. When you approach a person drowning in the water, assure him with

a loud and firm voice that he is safe.

2. Before jumping in to save him, divest yourself as far and as quickly as possible of all clothes; tear them off if necessary, but if there is not time, loose at all events the foot of your drawers if they are tied, as, if you do not do so, they will fill with water and drag you.

not do so, they will fill with water and drag you.

3. On swimming to a person in the sea, if he be struggling do not seize him then, but keep off for a few seconds till he gets quiet, for it is sheer madness to take hold of a man when he is struggling in the water.

4. Then get close to him and take fast hold of the hair of his head, turn him as quickly as possible on his back, give him a sudden pull, and this will cause him to float; then throw yourself on your back also and swim for the shore, both hands having hold of his hair, you on your back and he also on his, and of course his back to your stomach. In this way you will get sooner and safer ashore than by any other means, and you can easily thus swim with two or three persons; the writer has often, as an experiment. done it with four, and gone with them forty or fifty yards in the sea. One great advantage of this method is that it enables you to keep your head up, and also to hold the person's head up you are trying to save. It is of primary importance that you take fast hold of the hair, and throw both the person and yourself on your tacks. You, can, in this manner, float nearly as long as you please, or until a boat or other help can be obtained.

5. There is no such thing as a death-grasp, at least it must be unusual, for we have seen many persons drowned and have never witnessed it. As soon as the drowning man begins to get feeble and to lose his recollection, he gradually slackens his hold until he quits it altogether.

No apprehension need, therefore, be felt on that head.

6. After a person has sunk to the bottom, if the water be smooth, the exact position where the body lies may be known by the air bubbles which will occasionally rise to the surface, allowance being of course made for the motion of the water if in a tide-way or stream, which will have carried the bubbles out of a perpendicular course in rising to the surface. A body may often be regained from the bottom before too late for recovery by diving for it in the direction indicated by these bubbles.

7. On rescuing a person by diving to the bottom, the hair of the head should be seized by one hand only, and the other used in conjunction with

the feet in raising yourself and the drowning person to the surface.

8. If in the sea, it may be a great error to try to get to land. If there be a strong "outsetting" tide and you are swimming, either by yourself or having hold of a person who cannot swim, then get on your back and float till help comes.

9. These instructions apply alike to all circumstances, whether in the

roughest sea or smooth water.

DIRECTIONS FOR RESTORING THE APPARENTLY DROWNED.

Send immediately for medical assistance, blankets, and dry clothing, but

proceed to treat the patient instantly on the spot, in the open air.

The points to be aimed at are, first and immediately, the RESTORATION OF BREATHING and the PREVENTION of any further DIMINUTION of the WARMTH of the BODY; and, secondly, after breathing is restored, the PROMOTION of WARMTH and CIRCULATION.

The efforts to restore breathing, and to prevent any further diminution of the warmth of the body, must be commenced immediately and energetically, and must be persevered in for several hours, or until a medical

man has pronounced that life is extinct. Efforts to promote warmth and circulation must be deferred until natural breathing has been restored.

TO RESTORE BREATHING.

TO CLEAR THE THROAT.

1.—Place the patient on the floor or ground, with his face downwards, and one of his arms under the forehead, in which position all fluids will escape by the mouth, and the tongue itself will fall forward, leaving the entrance into the windpipe free. Assist this operation by wiping and cleansing the mouth.

2.—If satisfactory breathing commences, adopt the treatment described below to promote warmth and natural breathing. If there be only slight breathing, or no breathing, or if it fail, then—

TO EXCITE BREATHING-

3.—Turn the patient well and instantly on the

side, and-

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4.—Excite the nostrils with snuff, hartshorn, or smelling salts, or tickle the throat with a feather, &c., if they are at hand. Rub the chest and face warm, and dash cold water on it.

5.—If there be no success, lose not a moment,

but instantly

TO IMITATE BREATHING -

6.—Replace the patient on the face, raising and supporting the chest well on a folded coat or other article of dress.

7.—Turn the body very gently on the side and a little beyond, and then briskly on the face, back again; repeating these measures deliberately, efficiently, and perseveringly, about fifteen times in the minute, or once every four seconds, occasionally varying the side.

[By placing the patient on the chest, the weight of the body forces the air out; when turned on the side, this pressure is removed, and air

enters the chest.

8.—On each occasion that the body is replaced on the face, make uniform but efficient pressure, with brisk movement, on the back, between and below the shoulder-blades or bones on each side, removing the pressure immediately before turning the body on the side.

[The first measure increases the expiration, the

second commences inspiration.]

*** The result is -respiration or natural breathing, and if not too late—Life.

CAUTIONS.

Be particularly careful to prevent persons crowding round the body.

2.—Avoid all rough usage and turning the body

on the back.

3.—Under no circumstances hold the body up by the feet.

TO PREVENT FURTHER DIMINUTION OF WARMTH.

N.B.—These efforts must be made very cautiously, and must not be such as to promote warmth and circulation rapidly; for if circulation is induced before breathing has been restored, the life of the patient will be endangered. No other effect therefore should be sought from them, than the prevention of evaporation. and its result, the diminution of the warmth of the

1.—Expose the face neck, and chest, except in severe weather.

2.—Dry the face, neck, and chest, as soon as possible, with anything at hand; and then dry the hands and feet.

3.—As soon as a blanket or other covering can be obtained, atrip the body; but if no covering can be immediately procured, take dry clothing from the bystanders, dry and reclothe the body, taking care not to interfere with the efforts to restore breathing.

CAUTIONS.

1. Do not roll the body on casks.

2. Do not rub the body with salt or spirits.

- 3. Do not inject tobacco-smoke or infusion of tobacco.
- 4. Do not place patient in warm bath.

N.B.—The directions are printed in parallel columns to avoid confusion, and to insure that the efforts to obtain both objects shall be carried on at the same time.

CURE FOR SNAKE BITES.

The following recent case of cure from snake poisoning by Professor Halford's valuable discovery of the injection of Ammonia into the veins is published in the Almanac in the hope that it may be of service to persons who may have to act in a like emergency:—

(Abridged from the Australian Medical Journal.)

Mr. Wooldridge's account of a case at Elsternwick, in Victoria.—"The symptoms of this case were as follow:—Cornea insensible to touch, pupil possessed only of the minutest power of action, and considerably dilated. Limbs paralysed. Pulse of large volume, weak, and about 70. Countenance red, rather approaching a livid hue, features swollen, breathing rather slow. . . . In consequence of the very serious aspect of this case, Messrs. Arnold, A'Beckett, and myself, in consultation with Professor Halford, strongly advised him to inject his newly discovered remedy, a solution of diluted Liquor Ammoniæ Fort., into a vein. This was immediately done by exposing the superficial radial vein and inserting the point of the syringe, which was carried up the vein to the extent of an inch or rather more. In two or three minutes after the injection the patient awoke as from a deep sleep. The countenance was expressive of great surprise. The pupils contracted and dilated again and again, and then settled down into pupils of ordinary size. He answered questions, deliberately and coherently. In fact the coma was replaced by consciousness, and the declining functions of life resumed almost at once their normal activity, leading this poor fellow onwards to the happy termination of his misfortune in complete recovery."

Mr. Arnold says:—"Coma has been entirely absent since the time Professor Halford injected ten minims of Liq. Ammoniæ Fort. mixed with twenty of distilled water into the left superficial radial vein. This was the turning point, I am fully satisfied, to the saving of the man's life."

Upon this case the Editor of the Australian Medical Journal remarks :-"A new and most valuable remedial agent in the treatment of one of the most terrible of accidents has been made available. It is to the profession that we now appeal, with the earnest hope that they will lose no opportunity of putting the Ammonia-injection into practice. It is to the country practitioners especially, in whose neighbourhood snake poisoning principally occurs, that we urge this advice. For it is now removed from the category of experiments, and may obviously be used with safety. It is, however, desirable that every item of information should be collected together bearing upon the subject. It is not necessary in these cases that long detailed accounts should be written. All that is desirable is to note carefully the physical signs, especially the state of the pulse, the pupils, the respiration, the degree of consciousness, and the more or less occurrence of paralysis. All these should be noted at intervals, and as they are influenced by Ammonia. It is very necessary, too, that Ammonia of a definite strength should be used, so as to enable it to be known what quantity the system is capable of bearing. In the country districts, where pharmaceutical preparations and especially those of the volatile sort, are of varying strength, the treatment of many affections is occasionally complicated from this cause. A standard preparation of Ammonia, therefore, ought to be fixed upon, and none other used. This would remove much of the doubt, and lessen also the risk, for it is not to be den'ed that an overdose is as undesirable in snake-poisoning as in any other affection."





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
