A SUMMARY OF THE PRINCIPAL ASTRONOMICAL AND METEOROLOGICAL OCCURRENCES FOR THE YEAR 1871.

Explanation.—*Sun's Rising and Setting.*—These numbers show the mean time when the sun's centre, elevated by refraction, appears on the horizon, the eye being on a level with it.

Phases of the Moon.—The times are here given to the nearest minute when the moon is respectively 0deg., 90deg., 180deg., and 270deg. of longitude from the sun.

ECLIPSES, 1871.

In the year 1871 there will be two eclipses of the Sun, and two of the Moon.

First.—A partial eclipse of the moon on the morning of January 7th, invisible in Tasmania. The commencement of the eclipse will be visible in Western Australia.

Second.—An annular eclipse of the Sun on June 18th, visible as a partial one throughout the whole of Australia, Tasmania, and New Zealand. At Fiji, the eclipse will be much larger. For Hobart Town time :—Begins on the earth generally, June 18th, 9h. 26·9m. in long. $105^{\circ} 56'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $22^{\circ} 16'$ S. ; central eclipse begins generally, June 18th, 10h. 39·0m. in long. $93^{\circ} 1'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $31^{\circ} 27'$ S. ; central eclipse at noon, June 18th, 12h. 17·3m. in long. $143^{\circ} 12'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $4^{\circ} 1'$ S. ; central eclipse ends June 18th, 2h. 09·5m. in long. $163^{\circ} 0'$ W. of Greenwich, and lat. $18^{\circ} 15'$ S. ; ends on the earth generally, June 18th, 3h. 21·6m. in long. $176^{\circ} 43'$ W. of Greenwich, and lat. $8^{\circ} 51'$ S.

Third.—A partial eclipse of the Moon, on the night of July 2nd, visible throughout Australia. The Hobart Town time of the different phases will be as follows :—First contact with the penumbra, July 2nd, 9h. 03·0m. ; first contact with the shadow, July 2nd, 10h. 15·9m. ; middle of the eclipse, July 2nd, 11h. 17·1m. ; last contact with the shadow, July 3rd, 12h. 18·3m. ; last contact with the penumbra, July 3rd, 1h. 31·2m. Magnitude of the eclipse (moon's diameter = 1) 0·343. The first contact with the shadow occurs at 36° from the northernmost point of the Moon's limb towards the east. The last contact at 34° towards the west, in each case for direct image.

Fourth.—A total eclipse of the Sun, December the 12th. The eclipse will be visible as a total one in the south of India, Sumatra, Java, and part of the northern portion of Australia ; as a partial eclipse it will be visible over the whole of Australia and Tasmania. For Hobart Town time : It begins on the earth generally, December the 12th, 11h. 15·5m. in long. $73^{\circ} 43'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $15^{\circ} 40'$ N. ; central eclipse begins generally, December 12th, 12h. 11·7m. in long. $61^{\circ} 16'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $19^{\circ} 5'$ N. ; central eclipse at noon, December 12th, 1h. 49·5m. in long. $118^{\circ} 25'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $12^{\circ} 23'$ S. ; central eclipse ends generally, December 12th, 3h. 34·1m. in long. $177^{\circ} 54'$ W. of Greenwich, and lat. $0^{\circ} 27'$ N. ; ends on the earth generally, December 12th, 4h. 30·4m. in long. $169^{\circ} 29'$ E. of Greenwich, and lat. $3^{\circ} 0'$ S. The duration of totality in this eclipse, will be shorter than the eclipse of 1869, and much shorter than the one in 1868.

PROGRESS OF ASTRONOMY.

Few discoveries have been made during the past year, either in cometary or planetary astronomy.

A new Comet was discovered by Herr Temple at Marseilles, on the 9th of October. Its place was R. A. 10h. 34m. N.P.D. $87^{\circ} 50'$, or in the constellation Sextans, on the borders of Leo.

Dr. Winnecki discovered a small comet in the night of May 29-30 in the constellation Pisces. The comet was a pretty round bright nebula of $2\frac{1}{2}$ in diameter.

A new Comet was discovered by M. Coggia at Marseilles, on August 28th. The following positions are applied :—

A minor Planet, 109 Felicitas was discovered October 9th, by Dr. C. H. F. Peters, at Clinton, New York.

A new minor Planet, No. 110, was also discovered by M. Borelly, at Marseilles. Its position, April 19th, was at 10h. 33m. 13s. — R.A. = 13h. 2m. 39s., Dec. + 6° 50' 39", magnitude 12.5.

During the past year, 1870, Aurora displays have been frequent in both hemispheres. Sun-spots have also been numerous, and all through the year more or less have constantly appeared on the Sun's disc. In taking Woolf's date for maximum solar spots in 1836, and deducting four periods of 11.2 years each we arrive at 1791 as a maximum, which is near the period of Sir William Herschel's observations of unusual changes in the planet Jupiter. This kind of family union is traceable with sun-spots, auroras, terrestrial magnitude, and planetary disturbances, their physical properties closely agreeing with each other, both in maximum and minimum. It is worthy of note, however, that there is no 11-years' period. The period is variable, being sometimes more and sometimes less: the average is about 11 1.9th years. It is important, therefore, in taking observations of change, either astronomical or meteorological, to take the real and not the mean time of maximum and minimum. These irregularities will be seen on inspecting the following tables (from Woolf) :—

There has been lately traced a remarkable coincidence which seems to exist between sun-spots and rainfalls, from an average of 21 years' registering.

A new Observatory is about establishing at Cordova, which is one of the oldest cities, and contains the oldest university of the Western Hemisphere. The instruments are all of the best quality. A Repsold meridian circle of 54 inches focal length, and 4½ inches aperture, and an equatorial by Alvan, Clark and Sons, provided with the 11-inch object-glass, by Fitz. A photometer, by Ausfeld, of Gotha, according to Zollner's latest form. A spectroscope will be furnished by Merr of Munich, and a clock by Tiede, of Berlin. Besides these, many smaller instruments have been supplied by various institutions, as well as a large collection of suitable books for the formation of a library. The principal object of the observatory is intended to carry out and complete a systematic series of zone observations in the Southern Hemisphere; and under the superintendence of Dr. Gould, with a qualified number of assistants, there is little doubt but this long-pending object will at last be carried out in America, and not in Australia, as was formerly intended.

It is clear from the foregoing table that Hobart Town has the most equable climate in the list. This arises from its insular position. Heat absorbed by a fluid increases the rate of its evaporation, and the evaporating process reduces the sensible amount of latent heat which the body has acquired. Every accession of temperature brings with it its own remedy; for at night the process is reversed, radiation takes place more slowly, from which, together with minor causes in connection with that of sea breezes, the temperature at the surface remains comparatively unaltered, and renders our beautiful island the Queen of the South.

WEATHER TABLE.

The following table, constructed by the ingenious Dr. Kirwan upon philosophical considerations of the attraction of the sun and moon in their several positions respecting the earth, is submitted to notice, under the recommendation of actual observation in this colony, further confirmed by several years' experience in the Northern Hemisphere. It is not pretended to be infallible; but it comes so near the truth that in very few instances indeed will it be found to fail furnishing the observer with the knowledge of what kind of weather there is the greatest probability of succeeding in any given quarter of the moon.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Where budding is required it may still be performed, choosing, if possible, showery weather. Cut off all surplus shoots from young trees, if they are not required for scions in the Spring. Continue to pinch off all lateral shoots from vines. *Flower Garden.*—Choice carnations may be increased by cuttings and layers with shade and moisture. Choice flowers should be marked for seed. Annuals that have done flowering should be removed, or some will become troublesome weeds. *Kitchen Garden.*—Plant celery in trenches and a succession of French beans; sow turnips when the weather is moist; take up early potatoes that are ripe; gather all kinds of seed as they ripen; cut from strawberries all runners that are not wanted for plants, to give strength to the roots. *Greenhouse.*—*Calceolarias, cinerarias, etc.,* may still be sown. Geraniums that have done flowering should be cut down; re-pot as soon as they begin to make fresh shoots. Cuttings struck now will make good plants next year, with care. Continue to shade and water as directed last month.

JANUARY 6.—Called *Twelfth Day*, as being that number after Christmas, and *Epiphany* from a Greek word signifying "appearance." It is a festival of the Church in commemoration of the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles,—more expressly to the three magi or wise men of the East who came, led by a star, to worship him immediately after his birth.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR—Fruit Garden.—Little is required this month besides attending to the buds. Strawberry runners should be kept moist to form robust plants in time for transplanting in the first Autumn rains. *Flower Garden.*—Cut off all flower stalks as soon as done flowering, except those required for seed. The flowering season is prolonged by cutting off surplus seed as soon as formed. Verbenas, pentstemons, petunias, and other herbaceous perennial plants may now be propagated by cuttings. Encourage asters, chrysanthemums, dahlias, &c., by frequent watering. Use the rake to preserve a neat appearance. *Kitchen Garden.*—In showery weather vegetables may be sown to come in during the Winter. Mark out plants of the cabbage tribe to run to seed. Earth up peas and potatoes; hoe and stir the surface among all descriptions of crops. *Greenhouse.*—As the principal displays of this season are over, turn your attention to preparation for the next by propagating by seed and cuttings and preserving such old plants as are desirable for another year. This is the time for forming plants of the early flowers, too frequently neglected by amateurs until the flowering season. Sow mignonette for Winter flowering.

SEPTUAGESIMA and the next two Sundays are preparatory to the Lenten fast, which begins about forty days before Easter and hence is called Quadragesima. Their names are significant of their situation, thus:—Septuagesima (seventy days), Sexagesima (sixty days), and Quinquagesima (fifty days), before Easter.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Prepare borders for forming new beds of strawberries on the first approach of rain. The ground intended to be planted with fruit trees should now be well worked. Collect the leaves as they fall and convert them into manure. *Flower Garden.*—Continue the general directions given for last month, and sow seed of perennial and annual flowers for Spring flowering as they ripen. *Kitchen Garden.*—Sow cabbage, cauliflowers, lettuce, spinach, and onions for early use. Sow turnips, thin out those sown last month. Earth up celery, take up potatoes, and house onions when well dried. *Greenhouse.*—Continue the general directions given for last month.

SHROVETIDE (Feb. 21) derives its title from the practice of being *shriven* or *shrove*—that is, confessing and receiving absolution—before the Lenten fast.

ASH WEDNESDAY (Feb. 22).—So called on account of penitents wearing sackcloth next their skin and sprinkling ashes on their heads.

ST. PATRICK.—The shamrock is said to be worn by the Irish upon the anniversary of this their tutelary saint for the following reason:—When he preached the gospel to the pagan Irish, he illustrated the doctrine of the Trinity by showing them a trefoil, or three-leaved grass, with one stalk; which operating to their conviction, the shamrock, which is a bundle of this grass, was ever afterwards worn upon this saint's anniversary, to commemorate the event.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Continue to prepare the ground intended for planting with strawberries and fruit trees; secure the leaves as directed last month. *Flower Garden.*—Plant jonquils, snowdrops, crocuses, ranunculuses, anemones, and other early flowering bulbs; sow seeds of stocks, wall-flowers, sweet-williams, and other biennials, for transplanting in the Spring, if you have not sufficient Spring-sown ones. Verbenas, petunias, pentstemons, &c., may still be propagated by cuttings. Dahlias should be taken up and stored in a dry airy place soon after the frost has killed the stems. Plant deciduous trees. *Kitchen Garden.*—Sow cauliflowers, cabbages, and lettuce; plant out those sown last month; sow spinach and turnips; sow onions for planting out; earth up celery. Carrots may be sown for early use. *Greenhouse.*—Remove all tender plants into the house, encourage the growth of geraniums, calceolarias, cinerarias, &c., by repotting as soon as the present pots are filled with roots, and keep them free from *aphis* by washing, fumigation, &c. Fuchsias that have done flowering should be kept moderately dry during the dormant state; give plenty of air during fine weather.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Planting of vines and fruit trees may be commenced towards the end of the month; in the meantime keep the ground well worked in dry weather, and dig between the old trees as soon as the leaves have fallen. Keep the surface of the ground loose between the rows of newly planted strawberries, and dig between the rows of the old ones. *Flower Garden.*—Plant bulbs of nearly all the hardy species in dry weather; dig and manure borders between shrubs and herbaceous plants, and form new ones where required, leaving the ground rough. Carnations, &c., that have been propagated during the Summer may now be formed into beds, and shrubs, roses, &c., may be planted towards the end of the month; examine the haunts of slugs, as every one destroyed now will save considerable trouble and annoyance in the Spring. *Kitchen Garden.*—Continue to sow and plant a succession of vegetables, salading, &c.; dig and manure all spare ground in dry weather. Dress asparagus beds for the Winter. *Greenhouse.*—Cuttings of geraniums that have struck root should be potted into small pots, to be shifted into larger as they advance in growth. The same rule applies to cinerarias, calceolarias, &c.; give air freely during fine weather, and water moderately during damp or wet weather. Gloxinias, achimenes, and other bulbous plants that have done flowering, should be allowed to dry off: primulas and cyclamens that are coming into bloom should be kept near the glass and watered freely.

ROGATION.—From the Latin *rogare*, to beseech. Special prayers are appointed as a preparation for the observance of the Ascension.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—The planting of vines and fruit trees should be proceeded with in dry weather, taking care to leave the surface of the ground loose after the operation. The general pruning of fruit trees, vines, &c., may be commenced towards the end of the month, especially of such as are in a weak state of growth. Root-prune where necessary. All the ground should now be dug up roughly, burying the leaves and what manure can be afforded.

Flower Garden.—Now is the time for putting in order all flower borders, shrubberies, &c., by pruning the shrubs and roses, trimming the edges, dividing and regulating the herbaceous plants, digging the borders and thereby creating a neat appearance during the Winter months and obviating the necessity of digging amongst the roots of plants in the Spring; it likewise breaks into the favourite haunts of the slugs, whereby they are more easily found and destroyed; where new borders are to be formed and planted, it should now be done.

Kitchen Garden.—Plant out cabbage, cauliflower, and lettuce. Sow peas, broad beans, and carrots for early use. Sow spinach and onions. Make plantations of rhubarb and asparagus.

Greenhouse.—Little can be done in the greenhouse beyond giving plenty of air on all favourable occasions, guarding against night frost, watering when the earth becomes dry, and keeping the plants free from vermin and dead leaves. Keep all growing plants as near the glass as possible.

WHITSUNTIDE, May 23.—A pentecostal festival, so called, it is said, because in the Primitive Church the newly-baptised appeared at worship between Easter and Pentecost in white garments.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—The planting of vines and fruit trees should be completed this month; should it not be convenient to do so, the trees intended to be planted next month, or later, should now be lifted and laid in by the heels, which will keep them back, always choosing dry weather for the operation; stir the ground around those planted previous to heavy rains as soon as it is dry enough for the purpose. All pruning should be finished this month.

Flower Garden.—Continue the general directions for last month, and complete the planting of deciduous trees and shrubs. Keep the ground between bulbs free from weeds.

Kitchen Garden.—Plant early potatoes, &c., in a warm dry border. Early peas and beans may be sown once a fortnight or three weeks from this time. Sow the main crops of onions and carrots, also some radishes, lettuces, spinach, and early cabbage. Propagate plants which are increased by rooted off-sets. Transplant for seed, if not done in Autumn, carrots, turnips, beet, celery, parsnips, &c.

Greenhouse.—Continue the general directions for last month. Fuchsias that have shed their leaves should now be prepared for the following season by cutting back and re-potting them. Geraniums that are growing tall and thin should have the ends of the shoots pinched off, which will make them more bushy and compact. Re-pot cinerarias and calceolarias as soon as the present pots are filled with roots. This rule applies to growing plants generally.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Vine cuttings may be planted. Prepare for grafting, the proper time is as soon as the stocks are well started. Raspberry and strawberry borders may still be prepared and new ones formed. Look carefully over apple trees, and dress the parts affected by *aphis* or American blight. Manure freely vines and fruit trees that are weakly. *Flower Garden.*—Flower beds should be manured and dug; edgings formed, trimmed, and repaired; herbaceous plants divided; biennials planted. Roses may be pruned, and most sorts increased by cuttings. Seeds of hardy annuals may be sown in the borders; tender ones on a moderate heat for transplanting. Choice dahlias should be placed in a gentle heat, for the purpose of propagating by cuttings. Verbenas, shrubby calceolarias, pentstemens, &c., may be increased by the same means. *Kitchen Garden.*—Earth up, plant, and sow asparagus: transplant, hoe, and sow cabbage: sow and plant as directed last month, and at end of month sow French beans in a warm border and vegetable marrows in sheltered places: plant out and sow lettuces for succession: sow and earth up peas. *Greenhouse.*—Admit air freely in fine weather; re-pot geraniums, cinerarias, calceolarias, &c., as the roots advance to the sides of the pot. Fuchsias that have been dormant should have their roots reduced and be re-potted in fresh soil. Cacti and other plants may be watered more freely than in the depth of Winter. Sow seeds of balsams, cockscombs, egg plants, &c., on a gentle heat; keep all plants clear of *aphis*, scale, &c.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—The principal work this month is grafting, the chief aim being to bring the bark of the stock and the scion to fit closely; loosen the ground with a hoe after the operation; the same between vines and fruit trees in general; in dry weather mulch raspberries. *Flower Garden.*—Seeds of annuals, biennials, perennials, and shrubs should now be sown; tender ones raised in heat may be transplanted towards the end of the month. Dahlia roots may be planted; propagate choice varieties as recommended last month; take the cuttings out of heat as soon as they have struck root, and protect them from the frost till it is safe to plant them. Lay shrubs that are difficult of propagation by other means. Keep the hoe at work in dry weather, but do not use the rake, except for covering small seeds. *Kitchen Garden.*—Asparagus beds, keep free from weeds. Transplant cabbage, onions, and lettuce. Sow carrots, red beet, celery, turnips, French beans, spinach, radishes, vegetable marrow, scarlet runner. Plant potatoes, sow peas, and earth up those that are ready. Cucumbers may be sown in ridges. Keep the hoe among the crops, it will assist them in their growth. *Greenhouse.*—Follow the directions for last month. The plants in flower will require watering copiously and shading from the mid-day sun.

LAMMAS DAY, August 1.—This is one of the most ancient quarter-days. It has been conjectured that Lammass or Lambmass originated from St. Peter being the supposed patron of lambs; the mass being therefore instituted in his honour, that lambs might escape the danger arising from cold after being shorn at that season.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Look over the vines and rub off all superfluous buds. Disbud wall trees. Destroy caterpillars on fruit trees. Keep the surface of the ground loose with the hoe at all convenient seasons, whether there are weeds or not. Place a layer of fresh stable manure between the rows of strawberries; it will increase the size of the fruit and render it free from grit or sand. *Flower Garden.*—Seeds of annuals may still be sown. Tender species raised under shelter may be transplanted into the borders, choosing showery weather for the operation. Dahlias from seed and cuttings, and other tender plants, may be planted about the middle of the month. Mark the flowers of choice bulbs, etc., with the view of collecting their seed. Stake and tie the shoots of herbaceous and other plants as they advance. Where quality rather than quantity is the object, the number of flowering shoots should be reduced. Destroy slugs, *aphis*, scale, bugs, etc. *Kitchen Garden.*—Continue to sow and plant successional crops. Earth up potatoes and peas, sow all kinds of brocoli, Scotch kale, savoys, cauliflowers, tomatoes, and capsicums. Thin early-sown carrots, turnips, and spinach, and keep them free from weeds. *Greenhouse.*—Azaleas, camellias, ericas, etc., that have done flowering should be taken out of the house and placed in a shady situation towards the end of the month. Water sparingly the bulbs of achimenes, gloxinia, gesnera, etc., until they appear above the ground. Re-pot all fast-growing plants as often as the pots fill with roots. Use the syringe in the evening during sunny weather; guano or manure-water occasionally will assist flowering plants whose pots are full of roots. Wage continual war against insects.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Stop all shoots of vines, except the leaders at one joint beyond the fruit, and lay them to their trellis or supports; pinch off all unnecessary shoots in young fruit trees. Vines, newly-planted fruit trees, &c., will be much benefited by a mulching of half decomposed stable manure. Rub off the shoots from stocks that have been grafted, and remove the clay and binding as soon as they have joined, which may be known by their shooting vigorously; lay as many strawberry runners as may be required for new plantations, and remove all others. *Flower Garden.*—The planting of dahlias and tender annuals, if not done, should be immediately; support all tall growing flowers as they advance; keep the surface of the ground loose with the hoe; clip and trim all edgings except roses; mark choice flowers for seed. *Kitchen Garden.*—Thin and hoe red beet, carrots, and all other Spring crops. Plant out capsicums and tomatoes. Prick out celery in small beds from the seed beds. Earth up peas, French beans, and potatoes, A succession of peas and French beans may be sown. *Greenhouse.*—Sow seeds of primula, cineraria, calceolaria, camellia, geranium, &c. Give plenty of air and water and shade during sunny weather.

GARDENERS' CALENDAR.—*Fruit Garden.*—Vines not yet attended to should be done immediately, and as the lateral shoots appear they should be taken off to within one joint of the main shoots. Young apple or plum trees infested with red spider should be frequently syringed with tobacco water or soft soap well diluted. Brush off American blight as it appears on the young shoots of apple trees. Peaches, &c., on walls will now require frequent attention. Budding may be performed towards the end of the month. *Flower Garden.*—Dahlias, hollyhocks, &c., require frequent attention. Where fine show dahlias are required, one stem alone should be allowed to grow, and the lower lateral shoots removed from that and the number of flower buds reduced; a liberal mulching will greatly promote their growth during the approaching hot weather. Bulbs of choice hyacinths, tulips, ranunculuses, anemones, &c., should be taken up and stored as they become dormant. Neatness is now the order. *Kitchen Garden.*—Earth up French beans, peas, and scarlet runners; a succession may be planted; prepare trenches and plant celery; transplant all kind of brocoli, cauliflowers, savoys, and cabbage for winter use; tomatoes and capsicums, if not put out, should now be done; vegetable marrows may yet be sown; sow turnips this month, and earth up late potatoes. *Greenhouse.*—Cinerarias, calceolarias, etc., that are intended to be kept for another season should be removed into a shady situation as soon as they have done flowering. Fuchsias, geraniums, &c., that are flowering may be watered occasionally with liquid manure. Shade and water freely during hot weather.

The Queen reigns in her own right, holding the crown both by inheritance and election. Her legal title rests on the statute 12 and 13 Will. III. c. 3, by which the succession of the crown of Great Britain and Ireland was settled, on the death of King William and Queen Anne without issue, on the Princess Sophia of Hanover and the "heirs of her body, being Protestants." The inheritance thus limited descended to George I., son and heir of Princess Sophia, she having died before Queen Anne; and it has ever since continued in a regular course of descent.

In accordance with the Electoral Act No. 4, 34 Vict. No. 12, the Electoral Rolls and Polling Lists for every electoral district will be prepared this year within such period as the Governor appoints by proclamation to be published not later than the 1st of August; and the rolls prepared in pursuance of such proclamation will remain in force till the 10th of April, 1873. No electoral rolls or polling lists will be prepared this year except in pursuance of the proclamation.

* The Electoral Act No. 4, passed during the session of 1870, provides for the division of certain districts as follows:—The Legislative Council district of Meander will comprise only the Assembly districts of Westbury and Deloraine; Devon being converted into three districts (East Devon, West Devon, and Wellington), which will together form a new Upper House district, to be called Mersey. The districts of Hobart Town and Launceston are to be divided into five and three districts, respectively; the former becoming North Hobart, South Hobart, East Hobart, West Hobart, and Central Hobart; and the latter North Launceston, South Launceston, and Central Launceston. These provisions are, however, made dependent upon the assent of Her Majesty to the Constitution Act Amendment Act, and do not come into operation until that assent is signified by the Governor.

Diocesan Synod.—The governing body of the Church of England is the Synod, established in 1858 under 22 Vict. The Synod must meet once at least in every year, and a dissolution and fresh election of lay members must take place every three years. The appointment of clergymen to vacant cures is made under regulations laid down by the Synod, by which, at present, the appointment belongs to the Bishop in eleven cases and to Boards of Patronage (each consisting of at least seven members of Synod) in thirty-one cases. THE SUPREME COURT OF TASMANIA.

Having Civil, Criminal, Equity, Ecclesiastical, Matrimonial Causes, and Insolvency Jurisdiction. Established by Royal Charter, March 4, 1831.

All personal actions where the debt or damage claimed is not more than the amount to which the jurisdiction of the Court in which the action is brought is limited, excepting actions of ejectment or replevin, or in which the title to any corporeal or incorporeal hereditaments or to any toll, fair, market, or franchise is in question, or in which the validity of any devise or bequest or limitation under any will or settlement may be disputed, or for the infringement of letters patent or copyright, or for the recovery of any money or thing won or alleged to have been won at or by means of a race, match, wager, or any kind of play, or for any arrest or false imprisonment or malicious prosecution, or for any libel or slander, or for criminal conversation, or for seduction or breach of promise of marriage, or upon any charter-party of affreightment or policy of assurance.

2. Plaints for the recovery of the possession of small tenements.

Actions to be brought in the Court having jurisdiction to the amount claimed nearest to the place of abode or business of the defendant or to the place where the cause of action arose.

Where amount claimed exceeds £10 the action is to be tried by a jury

of three, unless the Commissioner by consent of parties tries the action. Where there is no Commissioner the Justices in General Sessions are judges of law and fact.

Poundages, except where otherwise specified in this schedule, shall be estimated on the amount of the claim.

All fractions of a pound, for the purpose of calculating poundage, shall be treated as an entire pound.

Where the plaintiff recovers less than the amount of his claim so as to reduce the scale of costs, he shall pay the difference, unless the reduction is caused by a set-off.

In cases of execution of writs of *feri facias*, the actual expenses necessarily incurred by the bailiff in respect of such execution shall be allowed by the Court as costs in the cause.

In cases of interpleader the summons to the bailiff shall be issued gratis in the first instance ; the poundage for hearing be estimated on the value of the goods claimed, which, in case of dispute, shall be assessed by the Court ; and the cost of the summons, estimated on the above-mentioned value, and actual expenses incurred by the bailiff in keeping possession of the goods, be included in the general costs which may be awarded by the Court at the hearing.

JURORS AND JURIES.

COURTS OF REQUESTS.—At Hobart Town and Launceston jurors to be those in special jury lists and resident within 3 miles. In Courts held before Commissioners, except as aforesaid, jurors resident within 15 miles of Court to be selected by Commissioner from valuation and assessment rolls. No jury required unless demand exceeds £10. Jury to consist of three persons.

CORONER'S JURY to be summoned upon Coroner issuing precept, and to consist of seven persons, under 4 Vict. No. 7.

COMMON AND SPECIAL JURORS AND JURIES.—*Regulated by Acts 18 Vict. No. 11, 20 Vict. No. 28, 21 Vict. No. 45, 28 Vict. No. 11, and 31 Vict. No. 13.*—Every man between 21 and 60 (unless exempt) is liable to serve as a common juror in criminal cases and as a special juror in civil cases, under the following qualifications :—Having an annual income from real or personal (or real and personal) estate, £50 ; or clear real or personal estate, £500 ; or clear real and personal estate, £500 ; or house in Hobart Town or Launceston £50, in any other part of the colony £30 ; or municipal rate, £50 ; or road assessment, £30 ; or occupier of land, £80 ; or salary, £150. Penalty for non-attendance, a fine not exceeding £20.

JURY LISTS to be affixed to Court House and Police Office in each district within 25 miles of Hobart Town and Launceston the first week in September ; and the justices of the respective districts meet on the first Tuesday in October to correct and allow the same.

COMPENSATION to special jurors, if residing within three miles of the Court, per diem, 5s. ; if residing more than three miles, per diem, 10s. ; and for every mile of distance between residence and Court, if exceeding three miles, 1s., *i.e.*, 6d. each way.

COMPENSATION to common jurors in criminal cases, if residing above five miles from the place of trial, for each day's attendance on the Court, 5s. ; if above 10 miles, 6d. per mile each way in addition.

The following persons are exempt from serving upon juries :—Judges of supreme court, chairmen of general sessions, commissioners and ministerial officers of courts of requests, members and ministerial officers of executive and legislative councils, persons holding offices in the departments of the colonial secretary, surveyor-general, treasury, audit-office, post-office, customs, and public works, clergymen, Roman catholic priests, dissenting ministers, practising barristers, attorneys, solicitors, and proctors, coroners, gaolers, practising physicians, surgeons, apothecaries and druggists, military and naval officers on full pay, bank managers, pilots and masters of vessels, sheriff's officers, stipendiary magistrates, constables and peace officers, schoolmasters, parish clerks, mayors, aldermen, auditors, and corporate officers of Hobart Town and Launceston, and such public officers as the Governor may think fit to exempt.

COURTS OF GENERAL AND QUARTER SESSIONS OF THE PEACE.

Exercising all the powers and authorities incidental to Courts of General and Quarter Sessions of the Peace in England (8 Vict. No. 13 sec. 8), except criminal jurisdiction, which can only be exercised when the Court is held before a Recorder (21 Vict. No. 10 sec. 3).

Criminal Jurisdiction.—All offences except treason; misprision of treason; murder or any capital felony; offences against the Queen's title, prerogative, or government, or against the Legislature of this colony; offences subject to the penalties of *præmunire*; blasphemy or offences against religion; administering or taking unlawful oaths; perjury or subornation of perjury; making or suborning any other person to make any false oath, affirmation, or declaration punishable as perjury; bigamy or offences against the laws relating to marriage; abduction of women or girls; offences against any of the provisions of the laws relating to bankrupts or insolvents; composing, printing, or publishing blasphemous, seditious, or defamatory libels; bribery; unlawful combinations or conspiracies, except conspiracies or combinations to commit any offence which justices have jurisdiction to try when committed by one person; stealing or fraudulently taking or injuring or destroying records or documents belonging to any court of law or equity or court with ecclesiastical or admiralty jurisdiction or relating to any proceedings therein; stealing or

fraudulently destroying or concealing wills or testamentary papers or any document or written instrument being or containing evidence of the title to any real estate or any interest in lands, tenements, or hereditaments.

LICENSING MEETINGS OF JUSTICES.

Meetings of justices of the peace for granting public-house and packet licences and transfers of same are held in all police districts and municipalities on the first Monday in the months of February, May, August, and November in every year. The annual meeting is held on the 1st December. Applications for each respectively must be sent to the Clerk of Petty Sessions of each district fourteen clear days previously.

PRIVATE PURCHASE OF CROWN LAND.

The Waste Lands Act (34 Vict. No. 10) provides that any person may select and purchase one lot of land of not more than 320 acres at £1 per acre. No one to hold more than one lot, unless obtained by descent, devise, or marriage. Selectors on credit under section 24 to pay cash at purchase amounting to one-thirtieth of the upset price, in addition to the survey fee ; and a credit premium of one-third of the whole to be added to the purchase money. Payment of balance to extend over fourteen years ; but balance may be paid off at any time

during that period, a discount at the rate of five per cent. per annum being allowed off such balance. Selector must occupy, either personally or by tenant or representative, within a year after selection, and continue in occupation until the purchase money is paid off.

Example of mode of payment where credit is taken for 100 acres, the sale price being £100; credit premium of one-third, £33 6s. 8d.; total price, £133 6s. 8d., exclusive of survey and grant deed fees.

Where a surveyor marks off at one time two or more adjoining lots, he will be paid one-fourth less than the above scale for each lot after the first one.

For surveys under applications for less than ten acres, the Surveyor-General will determine what lesser amount than is provided above should be paid.

For special services a surveyor will be remunerated at the rate of £2 2s. per day.

Surveys required in very remote situations must be made the subject of private bargain between the applicant and the surveyor.

Holders of licences have a preferential right to a lease. Rent under a lease, 5s. per acre per year, or 2s. 6d. if coal-bearing only. A fee of £1 is charged for preparing the lease.

Immigration Agent in Germany.—Frederick Bück, 25 Schauenburger Strasse, Hamburg.

During 1870, two vessels arrived at Hobart Town from Germany, bringing a total of over 300 immigrants. The building formerly used as a hospital for females has been temporarily converted into an Immigration Dépôt, with Mrs. Peel as matron.

The following are the regulations for the guidance of persons desirous of introducing immigrants from the United Kingdom under the bounty system :—

Application, stating sex and class of immigrant, must be made on printed forms, which will be supplied by the Immigration Agents, the Wardens of Municipalities, or the Police Magistrates.

For a ticket for a single person above 60 years of age £16 must be paid, and in the case of families, if either of the parents is over 60 years of age, the applicant must deposit £20. Documentary evidence of the age of any immigrant must be produced upon his or her arrival if required by the Immigration Agent.

If any immigrant be found on arrival not to answer the description stated in the application, the applicant will be liable to be called upon for repayment of any money which may have been paid from the public funds on account of such immigrant.

The emigrant must sign an engagement (for self and family) agreeing not to leave the colony within four years after arrival without paying one of the Immigration Agents one-fourth of the passage money for every year short of the four years and a proportionate sum for every part of a year.

Persons introducing immigrants under these regulations must provide for their reception on arrival; or if received into a Government establishment a charge of two shillings a day or part of a day will be made against the introducer.

In the event of death on the voyage half passage money only will be paid.

LAND ORDERS.

Under the Immigration Act, 1867, Immigration Agents may be appointed abroad, who shall issue to approved emigrants proceeding

direct from Europe to Tasmania at their own expense land order warrants entitling the holders, on arrival in the colony, to a land order in respect of each person named therein. Such land orders to be of the nominal value of £18 for each immigrant of and over fifteen years of age, and of £9 for each child between twelve months and fifteen years of age; and to be available to their full value in payment for land purchased under the Waste Lands Act.

The seventh and following sections provide that any cabin or intermediate passenger arriving from Europe or India with the intention of settling in the colony, and who has not received a land order under the previous sections, may at any time within twelve months after his arrival obtain from the Board of Immigration a certificate entitling him to select thirty acres of land; if married, he shall be entitled, within twelve months after the arrival of his family, to further certificates authorising the selection of twenty acres in respect of his wife and ten acres in respect of each child. Selection to be made within a year after the date of the certificates. These certificates to be received by the Commissioner of Crown Lands in payment for lands selected for purchase under the Waste Lands Act. Under these sections, during 1869 certificates entitling the holders to 560 acres of land, were issued; and from 1st January to 31st October, 1870, 740 acres were similarly granted.

Persons purchasing or selecting land by virtue of these lands orders or certificates must reside for five years in Tasmania before entitled to grants from the Crown of such land; but in the event of death before the expiration of five years, their heirs-at-law or devisees shall be forthwith entitled to grants.

The Waste Lands Act reserves for a further period of twelve months from 18th October, 1870, an area of 50,000 acres at Castra, Devon, for the settlement of Europeans emigrating from India to Tasmania.

- Tablets, memorial windows, harmoniums, organs, bells, and clocks specially imported for churches or chapels.
- Railway plant, rolling stock, and all material which may be applied to the construction or maintenance of railways or tramways.
- Traction engines and their carriages.
- Millstones and machinery for mills worked by wind, steam, water, or horse-power.
- Fire engines, steam engines, pumps, and other apparatus for raising water.
- All machines or portions of machines to be worked only by steam, wind, or water.
- Hides and skins of every description, raw and unmanufactured.
- Timber of all kinds, except as in schedule 2 of the Customs Duties Act, 1868.
- Veneers of every description.
- Rattans, split or unsplit.
- Carriage shafts, spokes, naves, and felloes.
- Iron bridges, iron pipes, and iron tanks.
- School slates and slate pencils, slates for roofing, and slates and stone for flagging.
- Marble, granite, slate, or stone in rough block.
- Soda ash, caustic soda, and silicate of soda.
- Cotton waste, woollen waste, candle cotton, wool, flax, hemp, tow, and jute, unmanufactured.
- Works of art, viz.—Statues, busts of marble, bronze, iron, alabaster or plaster of Paris, paintings, drawings, prints, engravings, lithographs, photographs, specimens of sculpture, cabinets of coins, medals, gems, and all collections of antiquities.
- Specimens of natural history, mineralogy, or botany.
- Ores of all kinds of metals.
- Gold dust, gold bars, bullion, and coin.
- Coir bristles and hair unmanufactured.
- Broom heads and stocks, partly manufactured for brushmaking purposes.
- Jars of glass or of earthenware, specially imported for jam.
- Unmanufactured tin and tin plates.
- Unmanufactured steel of all kinds.
- Rod bar hoop sheet plate and pig iron and pig lead share moulds and mould boards.
- Epsom salts, citric acid, sulphuric acid, muriatic acid, carbolic acid, chloride of lime, and carbolate of lime.
- Hair cloth for hopkilns.
- All empty casks, cases, boxes, and bags certified by ship's manifest as returned, having been used in the export of Tasmanian produce.
- All goods the produce of Tasmania.
- All goods imported for the use of Her Majesty's Government, and wines and spirits for the use of Her Majesty's military officers serving on full pay in this colony, under such regulations as the Governor-in-Council may from time to time cause to be published in the *Gazette*.

DRAWBACKS.

Drawbacks of the whole amount of duty are allowed upon the exportation of certain articles, as follow :—Wine, tea, sugar, coffee, cocoa, chicory, currants, raisins, dates, rice, hops, wax and composition candles, ginger, pepper, sago, soda crystals, sulphur, white lead, sheet lead, barcelona nuts, mustard. manufactures of silk, cotton, linen, and woollen, and all articles manufactured therefrom, drapery, haberdashery, hosiery, millinery, furs, hats, boots, shoes, wool-bags, and corn-sacks, being in the original packages in which the same were imported (if shipped within three years after the day of importation, and the duty on any one amounts to £5). (2.) Carriages imported by visitors for their own private use, if re-shipped within six months. (3.) Silver plate imported by the owner for his own use. (4.) Malt liquors, if shipped within twelve months of their importation.

Upon the exportation of not less than one ton of jam manufactured in the colony, packed in jars or tins only, and shipped within one year of manufacture, a drawback of £2 8s. for every ton nett weight ; provided that the exporter or manufacturer gives notice in writing to the Collector of his intention to pack jam for export, when the Collector shall view the jam, and seal the cases in which it is packed.

There is also a drawback of sixpence per 100lbs. upon malt shipped within three months after the payment of duty upon the barley from which it is made.

Sea-going steamers may ship coal for fuel from a bonding warehouse free of duty.

MARINE BOARD, HOBART TOWN.

Established by Act of Parliament, December 22, 1857.

The jurisdiction of the Board extends to all ports, harbours, and islands between Cape Portland round the eastern, southern, and western coasts to 42° south latitude, and one nautical league to the seaward from low water mark along the whole of that coast line.

Office, Franklin Wharf. Wardens—H. B. Tonkin (master warden), William Crosby, C. M. Maxwell, and the Mayor and Collector of Customs *ex officio*. The Board meets every Wednesday at 10 a.m. Secretary, H. S. Nelson. Harbour Master, J. A. Babington. Boarding Officer, H. B. Hurburgh. Boat's crew of four men. Pilots, John Bleach and James Hurburgh.

EMIGRATION OFFICER.—Andrew Haig. For regulations as to passengers see 18 and 19 Vict. cap. 119 published in the *Gazette*, February 8, 1859, and amended Act 26 and 27 Vict. cap. 51 published in the *Gazette*, November 24, 1863.

SIGNAL STATIONS.—Battery Point, Richard Shea; Mount Nelson, John Duffy; Mount Lewis, James Hurburgh. (For code of signals see page 86.)

LIGHTHOUSES. — *Kent's Group, revolving; superintendent, Thomas Morgan, and three men. Swan Island, revolving flash; superintendent, Charles Baudinet, and three men. Goose Island, fixed; superintendent, T. Hawkins, and three men. South Bruni, revolving; superintendent, J. H. Scott, and three men. Iron Pot, fixed; Superintendent, J. Oliver, and two men. Low Head, revolving; superintendent, A. C. Rockwell, and two men. *King's Island, fixed; Superintendent, E. N. Spong, and three men.

QUARANTINE GROUND.—Between Sandy Bay Point and the eastern side of the River Derwent; Sandy Bay Point bearing north of west. The usual quarantine signals to be exhibited at the main-top mast-head.

HEALTH OFFICER.—Dr. Benson.

HARBOUR DUES.—One penny per ton both inwards and outwards, and for each removal while in port. N. B.—No vessel is charged for more than three removes during her stay in port.

PORT CHARGES.—*Lighthouse Rates*.—For steamers and coasting vessels, 4d. per ton. For other vessels, 6d. per ton.

Pilotage.—On sailing vessels, 9d. per ton; and on steam vessels, 6d. per ton; no charge for pilotage shall exceed £30, nor be less than £4; and no vessel under 50 tons is subject to pilotage, unless the master employs a pilot.

The remuneration to pilots detained on board vessels in quarantine or otherwise delayed is fifteen shillings per day in addition to the usual pilotage.

The rate for pilotage is reduced one-half whenever it is proved to the Board that no pilot offered himself to the vessel entering the port until she had reached a line drawn from the southern point of Half-moon Bay to Pearson's Point.

The exemption flag is a full-sized red pennant over the allotted distinguishing flag of the vessel.

Exemptions from Port Charges.—In order to encourage the resort of vessels of all nations engaged in the whale fishery and vessels arriving under the circumstances hereinafter mentioned to the ports of this island, all vessels of all nations outfitting for or refitting from the whale fisheries,

and all vessels arriving and sailing in ballast or which do not break bulk or only to such an extent as may be necessary to provide funds for the repairs, refittings, or refreshments of such vessels, and all vessels belonging to any foreign Power with which a treaty of commerce declared by any royal order in council to be subsisting has been made, which arrive at any port for the purpose of landing oil or whalebone the produce of fish caught or taken by the crews of such vessels, and land such oil and whalebone at any wharf appointed by the Board for that special purpose, are exempted from the payment of all port charges, lighthouse dues, and port dues whatsoever, except only those of pilotage in cases where the services of a pilot have been actually required and received.

A pamphlet containing "the rules and regulations of the port of Hobart Town contained in the Marine Board Act, 21 Vict. No. 16, and in by-laws passed by the Marine Board, also the Quarantine Act, 5 Vict. No. 14, and the Admiralty regulations respecting lights and fog-signals to prevent collisions," is supplied to all vessels on arrival.

Fees.—(1.) Engagement and discharge of Crews.—In ships under 60 tons, 5s. ; 60 to 100 tons, 10s. ; 100 to 200 tons, 15s. ; 200 to 300 tons, £1 ; 300 to 400 tons, £1 5s. ; 400 to 500 tons, £1 10s. ; 500 to 600 tons, £1 15s. ; 600 to 700 tons, £2 ; and so on for ships of larger tonnage, adding for every 100 tons, 5s. (2.) Engagement and discharge of seamen separately, 2s. 6d. each.

Office, Lower George-street, Wharf. Wardens—Richard Green (master warden), M. Gaunt, C. J. Weedon, and the Mayor and Collector of Customs *ex officio*. Secretary, G. M. Eddie. Harbour Master, W. N. Ling. Pilots—G. Foster, D. Stewart, G. Smart, and C. Begent ; special pilot, J. Waterland. Boat's crew, Low Head, four men and a coxswain. Boat's crew, Launceston, two men and a coxswain.

Paddle steam-tug *Tamar*. Master, G. Smart.

Shipping Master, Emigration Agent, and Marine Surveyor, Edward P. Tregurtha. (For scale of charges see above.)

Lighthouse, Low Head, A. C. Rockwell, superintendent.

No steamer, other than the *Tamar* tug, allowed to tow on the river except licensed (fee £25), under penalty. Cases of emergency exceptional.

The rules and regulations of the port are published by the Board, and are supplied to all vessels visiting the port.

Quarantine Ground—Western side, Middle Island, in the River Tamar. Day signal, yellow flag, of six breadths of bunting, at main-top mast-head ; at night, a signal lantern shown from the same position.

Health Officer, George Town, James Richardson.

PILOTAGE RATES.—Sailing vessel, 1s. per ton : steam vessel, 8d. per ton. For every day that a pilot is detained on board any vessel whilst under quarantine or by an act of the master, 15s. per day. No charge for a single act of pilotage to exceed £30, or be less than £4. Vessels not exceeding fifty tons are exempt, unless the master employes a pilot. Vessels that do not have a pilot until they pass Whirpool Reach either way are charged only half pilotage.

HARBOUR AND LIGHT DUES, same as at Hobart Town. (See p. 81.)

TOWAGE RATES.—To or from the Heads, for the first 100 tons, 2s. per ton; for every additional ton up to 300, 1s. 6d. per ton; for every additional ton up to 500, 1s.; for every ton above 500, 6d. Steam will not be got up to tow a vessel down alone for a less sum than £10; nor two or more vessels together for less than £12 10s. The pilotage of vessels towed by the tug will be charged at two-thirds of the rate for sailing vessels. When two vessels are towed together a reduction of one-fifth of the usual charge to the smaller one will be made to each, subject to the above minimum.

Signal for steam-tug.—The rendezvous or chequered flag, hoisted where best seen. When this signal is made by a vessel entering the port the tug, if in Launceston, will be telegraphed for on that vessel's account.

FREE PORT.—Vessels seeking freight or putting in from stress of weather and not breaking bulk, are exempt from all port charges whatever, unless they employ a pilot; in which case, if they anchor below George Town, one-third pilotage only will be charged.

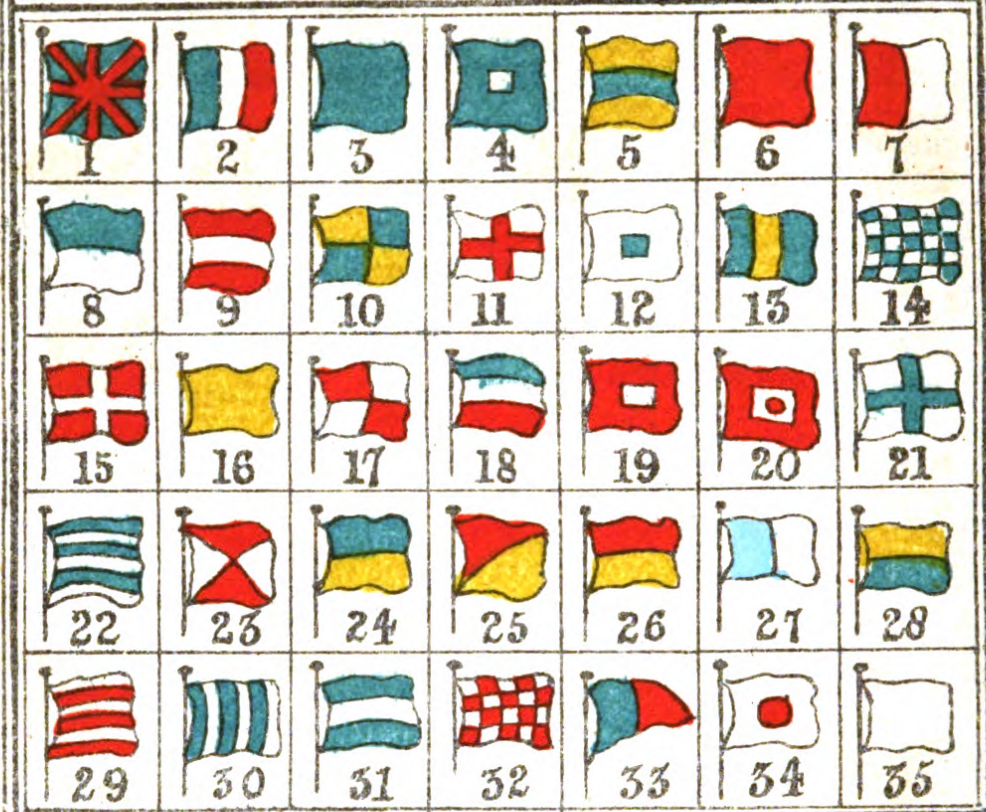

When a sail is in sight, and from the southward, a white flag with a red cross (No. 11) is hoisted at the top-mast-head at Prince Albert Battery; from the eastward, a blue and white flag (No. 8); if in mid-channel, a yellow, blue, and yellow flag (No. 5); when it is ascertained what the vessel is, the flag is hauled down from the top-mast and a ball is affixed to one of the numbers on the yard arm.

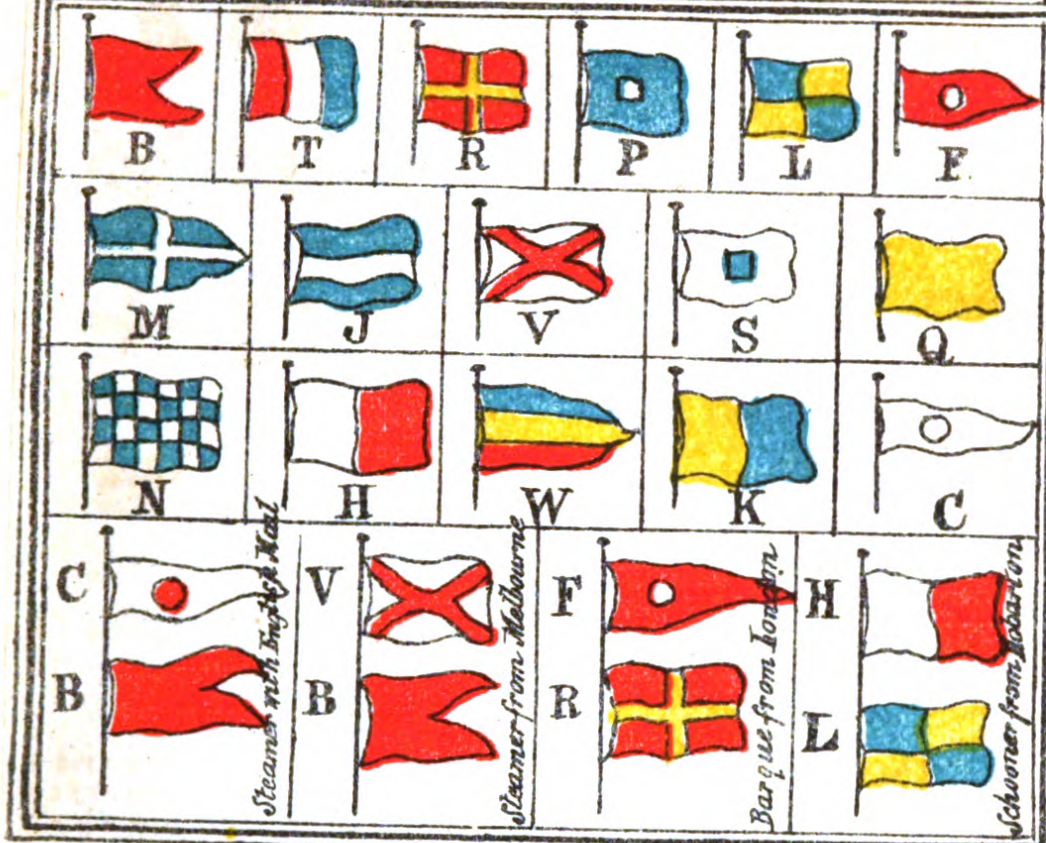

When two or more ships, brigs, schooners, or sloops are coming in from the same place, a white pennant pierced with red is hoisted under the flag. The arrival at Adelaide of the English mail *via* Suez is signalled by No. 3 at the mast-head; its arrival at Melbourne by No. 14; and when it is sighted from Low Head No. 6 is hoisted. No. 32 at the mast-head intimates the arrival at Sydney of the English mail *via* San Francisco. When a steamer from Melbourne is signalled at Low Head a red pennant is hoisted at the end of left yard-arm (viewed from town), for two hours.

The above calculations give the average time when high-water may be expected

at Launceston, but the tides are so influenced by winds and other causes that the actual times of high-water will sometimes differ from the calculated ones by an hour or two.

It is high-water new and full moon at Launceston at 1h. 30m. p.m., and at George Town 1h. 45m. a.m. The tide in the Tamar flows nearly six hours and ebbs nearly seven hours, and rises from ten to twelve feet in settled weather.

FEEs.—Marriage licence, £1; *marriage by Deputy Registrars*, 10s.; entering notice of marriage, 2s. 6d.; copy of notice, 2s. 6d.; certificate of marriage, 1s.; general search of the indices of register books, etc., 5s.; particular search of ditto, 1s.; certified copy of an entry, 2s. 6d.; ditto with seal of office, *being evidence in any court of justice*, 5s.; entering name after baptism, 1s.; making declaration and registering birth of a child more than six weeks old, 5s.; registering places of worship for solemnising marriages therein, 10s. £10 penalty may be recovered on information against occupiers of houses and parents in the colony for not giving notice of a birth *within six weeks*: after six months no birth can be registered. A fee of 5s. is payable if the registry of a birth is delayed beyond six weeks. When notices are sent to the Deputy Registrars, those of birth should contain the date of birth, name, profession or trade, and residence of father, name and maiden name of mother, and sex of child, whose Christian name can be entered at a subsequent period, within six months from the date of registry, on the production of a certificate from the minister who solemnised the rite of baptism or from the Deputy Registrar who shall have been present when the name was given, within seven days afterwards. Notice of death should contain date of death, name, age, sex, and profession of deceased, and cause of death. The registry of all entries should be signed by the informant, or they will not be available, if required, at any future time as evidence. All marriages solemnised in the colony since November, 1838, are registered in the General Register Office, Hobart Town.

The Council of Education, established by 22 Vict. No. 21, is authorised to hold examinations in imitation of the Oxford and Cambridge annual local examinations, and to confer the degree of Associate of Arts on successful competitors. The degree is open to persons of any age; but candidates above nineteen years of age who take honours are placed in separate class lists and are not eligible for prizes. Eight scholarships, each of the value of £200 per annum and tenable for four years at a British university, are also founded; of which two are annually competed for by Associates of Arts of above sixteen and under twenty years of age who have resided in the colony for at least the preceding five years. On only one occasion, however, have both scholarships been awarded. The Council has also the privilege of bestowing annually two exhibitions of £20 each, tenable for four years at a superior school, on boys under fourteen years of age who have not during the previous six months been at any of the public schools. The superior schools to which the choice of successful candidates is confined are Horton College, Ross; High School and Hutchins School, Hobart Town; and the Church Grammar School, Launceston.

Gilchrist Scholarship.—The trustees of the Gilchrist Educational Trust have conferred upon this colony a biennial scholarship of £100 per annum for three years at the University of Edinburgh or University College, London, for the benefit of youths who have been resident in Tasmania for five years or over, and who are above the age of 16 and below 22. The first examination will be held at Hobart Town about September of the present year, under the superintendence of the Council of Education. The scheme will be found in the Hobart Town *Gazette* of November 8, 1870.

The Board of Education is empowered to frame regulations for the distribution of all moneys granted by the Legislature for the purposes of public education; to determine the locale of public schools; to regulate the course of instruction in the schools, the examination and classification of teachers, the issue of certificates of competency to teachers, the inspection of schools, and the functions and duties of Local School Boards; and to fix the maximum fees to be charged by teachers. All regulations must be approved of by the Governor-in-Council and be published in the *Gazette* before of any force. The Public Schools Act, 32 Victoriae No. 14, provides for the appointment yearly of Local School Boards of not more than nine members, and directs that every child between seven and twelve years of age resident within one mile from one of the public schools in the sub-joined list (except those marked with an asterisk) must be sent to school, unless the parent or guardian holds a certificate of exemption from the Local School Board, which may be obtained on any one of the following grounds, namely:—That (1) the child is being privately educated in reading

and writing, (2) is sent to some other school, (3) is prevented by ill-health, (4) can read and write, (5) or cannot safely attend school, or (6) that the parents cannot do in whole or in part without the labour of the child. In the absence of such certificate, any parent or guardian refusing or neglecting to send such child to school may be summoned before any two justices, who may order the child to be sent and may determine what charge, if any, shall be made for such child. Any person refusing to obey such order, or ceasing after a time to obey it, is liable to a fine of not more than £2, to be enforced by distress only, not by imprisonment.

Number of schools in operation 1869, 116 ; number of distinct children on the rolls during the year, 9316 ; average number on rolls, 5992 ; average daily attendance 4511, or a per centage of 75·28 ; average cost per head of scholars in daily attendance, £2 19s. 1d. (this includes cost of administration and inspection). The average number of free scholars attending the schools during the year was 1438 ; amount paid by the Board for their instruction, £586 4s. 3d.

Exhibitions.—The Board awards annually six exhibitions to superior schools of the value of £16 13s. 4d. each and tenable for four years from 1st July. Candidates must be between ten and thirteen years of age, and have been at one of the public schools for at least six months prior to 1st June.

Soldiers' and Sailors' Letters.—Letters not exceeding half an ounce to and from non-commissioned officers, private soldiers, seamen, or marines in Her Majesty's service, one penny.

Registered Letters must bear stamps to the value of sixpence as the registration fee, in addition to the ordinary postage. Unregistered letters containing coin are registered by the postmaster before transmission, the fee being charged upon delivery. The registering office is open from 10 a.m. till 4 p.m., except on English mail days, when it is closed at 3 p.m.

Late Letters for inland mails are charged a uniform fee of 2d. each throughout the colony. Late ship letters pay 2d. extra at country post offices, and 3d. extra at the Hobart and Launceston offices. *Late Newspapers*, 1d. each. On English mail days (when the ship reception boxes are closed at 4 p.m. sharp), ship letters and newspapers may be posted at the ordinary late fees until 4.30 p.m.; after that time letters for the United Kingdom and Victoria only until 6 p.m. at a fee of 1s. each.

Newspapers must not bear any mark or contain any writing beyond the address, under a penalty not exceeding £10.

Ship and Inland Packets must be in covers open at the ends or sides, and parcels of seed or samples of merchandise in bags or papers tied so as to be easily loosened and refastened. They must bear on the outside a statement of their contents and the name and address of the sender; and must not contain any letter or epistolary communication. Packets exceeding 16 ounces in weight or of inconvenient form or size may be refused; and the transmission of any exceeding eight ounces may be delayed for any time not longer than a week, unless for England.

Savings Bank Packets.—Money or deposit books or documents referring thereto may be forwarded to or from Savings Banks in parcels not

* There are three town deliveries daily from the post offices at Hobart Town and Launceston, namely, at 9 a.m., 1 p.m., and 4 p.m. At the country offices town letters are left till called for.

exceeding four ounces in weight at a charge of one penny only for each packet, if bearing the endorsement "Savings Bank Packet only" and the signature of the sender. Postmasters are bound to register these packets without fee.

All Postages must be prepaid in Tasmanian postage stamps. Inland unstamped letters are sent on, and charged on delivery with double the amount due. Unstamped letters and packets for the United Kingdom, the Australian Colonies, and New Zealand are detained and returned to the senders within seven days, if the postage still remains unpaid. When letters and packets for these countries are posted insufficiently stamped but bearing a single rate of postage, they are forwarded, but are charged on delivery with the deficiency, together with a fine of a single rate. Stamps must be affixed above the address, or the letter may be treated as unstamped.

Exemptions from Postage.—Letters and packets to or from members of Parliament during the session. Petitions and addresses to the Governor; demands, remittances (which are also registered free of charge), and receipts on account of rural police rates and road rates; statistical information to the Government Statistician; maps or plans to or from the Surveyor-General; official letters to or from Inspectors under the Scab Act; official returns of births, marriages, and deaths; depositions to or from the Crown Prosecutor; printed forms to or from the Government Printer: in each case the cover being duly endorsed and signed by the sender. Letters on public service only franked by the Governor or by a member of Parliament or Mayor or Warden of a rural municipality or by any officer of the Government authorised to frank official letters.

Mails for Europe.—Mails are forwarded every four weeks by the overland route, the dates of closing at Hobart Town for 1871 being shown on p. 102. There is also a monthly mail to Europe *viâ* San Francisco.

Intercolonial Mails.—Mails for the neighbouring colonies are made up and forwarded by every steam vessel leaving for Melbourne and Sydney. Ship mails to be forwarded *viâ* Launceston and Melbourne (except on English mail days as above) close at Hobart Town at 5 p.m., and for Melbourne only, 6 p.m.

Private Boxes may be secured at an annual charge of 21s.

QUEEN'S ASYLUM FOR DESTITUTE CHILDREN.

The whole of Wednesday and half an hour each morning are devoted to religious instruction, the rest of the time being set apart for teaching them to be useful; the boys as farm servants, gardeners, bakers, etc.; and the girls as domestic servants and in needlework, making and mending clothes, and washing.

This company is formed for the purpose of constructing an iron tramway or railroad, to be worked by horse or steam power, between Deloraine and the Mersey, with (if hereafter desired) branches to Cheshunt, Chudleigh, and Kentish Plains; the Mersey being the

nearest port and natural outlet to these places and to the agricultural land in their vicinity and in other parts of Devon.

An Act of Parliament has been passed giving to this company the fullest power to carry out its design. By resolutions of Parliament the Company is entitled to 1280 acres of Crown land in the county of Devon for each mile in length of the tramway when completed. Wholesale Fish Market.—Dunn-street, opens at 6 a.m. and closes at sunset. All fish intended for sale in Hobart Town must be brought to the Franklin Wharf, in this market, by the owner or his agent, and sold in the market to the highest bidder. Scale of charges—For every boat bringing fish for sale, 6d.; every fishmonger and hawker to pay 1½d. for each time he conveys fish from the market for sale.

COUNTRY DISTRICTS.*

The colony of Tasmania is divided into nineteen rural municipalities and seven police districts. Seven councillors are, in the first instance, elected by the ratepayers of the respective municipalities. Two councillors retire annually for two successive years, and every third year three retire ; in each case they are eligible for re-election. The councillors elect one of their number as Warden, whose term of office extends over one year. All powers by law vested in Police Magistrates are by Act of Parliament vested in the Warden while holding office ; and the Governor has the power of appointing the councillors to be justices of the peace within their respective municipalities during their term of office. Provision is thus made for the discharge of all legal business which formerly devolved on paid officers of the central government.

The imports, exports, and Customs' collections for the year ending 30th November were as follow:—Imports (about), £6,680; exports, £17,263 4s. 1d.; collections (about), £1,180. Potatoes form one of the largest items amongst the exports, 4,753 tons having been shipped during the year 1870. The exports shown above are exclusive of large quantities of produce shipped coastwise to Launceston. The imports form but a small proportion of the goods actually consumed, as, in the absence of a warehouse, nearly all the spirits, tobacco, and most expensive articles of consumption are obtained from Launceston.

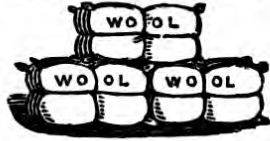

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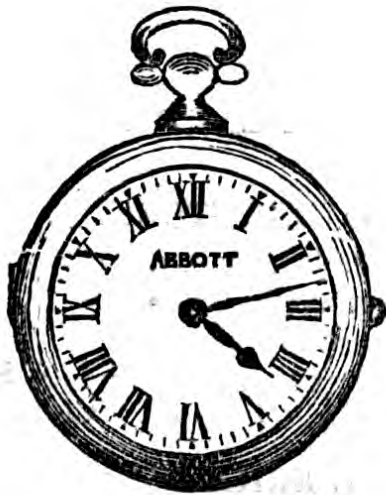
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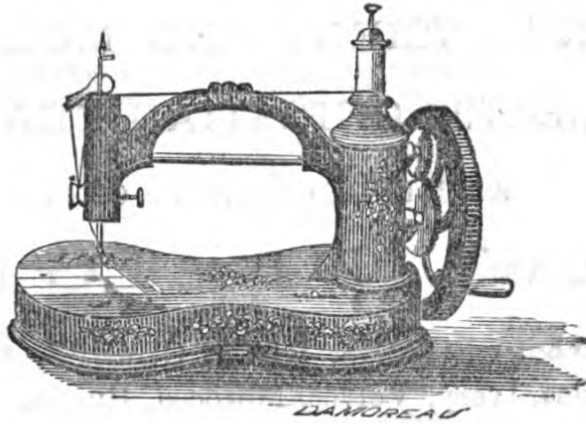
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
