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

PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS ON THE KALENDAR.

TROUGH the Astronomical portion of Oliver & Boyd's New Edinburgh Almanac is specially designed for popular use, it may, in the absence of the Nautical

Almanac, be found serviceable to the Astronomer and the Navigator.

All the computations are adapted to Greenwich mean time. If we subtract 13 m.* from the time in the tables, the remainder is Edinburgh mean time. Mean Time is that which is shown by a well-regulated clock; Apparent Time, that indicated by a sundial. The column called Equation of Time shows the difference between mean and apparent time: when it is headed "Clock before San," the mean is earlier than the apparent noon; and to obtain apparent time, the equation must be subtracted from the mean time: when the column is headed "Clock after Sun," the mean is later than the apparent noon, and to obtain apparent time, the equation must be added to the mean time. To reduce apparent into mean time, add the equation when the clock is before the sun; restract it when the clock is after the sun.

The rising and setting of the centre of the sun are calculated for the latitude of Edinburgh, at the level of the sea, allowance being made for parallax and refraction. The declination, parallax, semi-diameter, right ascension, and logar-ithmic distance of the sun, the equation of time, and the places of the principal

planets, are computed for the instant of mean noon.

The semi-diurnal arcs of the planets are used in ascertaining the times of their rising and setting: thus, to find the approximate time of rising, subtract the arcs from the times of southing; and to find that of setting, add the arcs to

the times of southing.

The time of high water at Leith is computed from manuscript tables deduced from recent observations on the Tides in the Firth of Forth, and the depth from Formula investigated in the second and fifth volumes of the Mécanique Céleste of La Place. The depths are computed for the Albert and Edinburgh Docks at Leith; the depths for the Victoria Dock will be obtained by subtracting 2 feet from them; and for the Old Dock by subtracting 8 feet 4 inches. The times, though calculated for Leith, will be found sufficiently correct for the other ports on the Firth of Forth, as well as for Berwick, Dundee, Holy Island, and London Bridge, as the winds frequently cause a wider difference than that which exists between the times at those places and Leith; but when greater accuracy is required, recourse should be had to the table at page 24.

The time of high water at Granton may be assumed the same as at Leith; the depth of high water at the Victoria Jetty will be obtained by subtracting I foot 10 inches from the depths calculated for Leith; at the two upper jetties

by subtracting 4 inches; and at the end of the pier by adding 2 feet.

The rising and setting of the moon, corrected for parallax and refraction, are computed for Edinburgh, at the level of the sea; and her Semi-diameter, Horizontal Parallax, Right Ascension, and Declination, which are given for each day at noon, afford the means of making many useful and interesting Nautical and Astronomical calculations.

All the results have been carefully checked by means of differences and by frequent independent calculations, so that it is hoped no error of importance

will be found.

Note.—When the time is between noon and midnight, it is indicated by the letter a. or A.; and when between midnight and the following noon, by the letter m. or M.

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FARMER'S AND GRAZIER'S KALENDAR.

January.—In fresh weather, where the soil is moderately dry, the plough may be kept in motion.—To make the feeding of cattle remunerative, it is necessary that the most unremitting attention be paid to the animals. Whether they are fed in courts, byres, or boxes, they ought to be kept warm and comfortably littered, whilst their food, of whatever description, ought to be regularly supplied at stated hours. Crushed grains, and artificial food given in addition to stored roots, will be found a profitable mode of feeding, and chopped straw may also be given as a healthy and economical addition to their diet. Cows require succulent roots or food prepared by steam or hot water, to yield milk copiously. Shelter new-dropt lambs, and give their dams roots, hay, and bruised grain, or oil-cake.

February.—Frost being a powerful agent in obtaining mould for covering seeds, plough grass and other lands intended to produce a crop. Whether turnip be folded or carried from the field, plough the land as the crop is removed, and wheat-sowing may follow. Beans and oats may be sown; but it is only rich dry soils which can be seeded so early with prospect of success. In mild weather thorn hedges may be dressed, and new ones planted. Lay up stores of seed-corn, put implements into working trim, and execute many little jobs, that no interruption may be experienced in sowing-time.—Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,—the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Keep calves warm, clean, and dry; give hay and sliced roots in addition to liquid food to such as are rearing.

March.—Finish wheat-sowing about the middle of the month. Sow beans, oats, and barley as soon as the weather and soil admit,—reserving cold wet lands till the season advances. The seeds of clover and ryegrass should now be sown amongst autumnal-sown wheats, and the surface lightly harrowed or rolled to ensure the seed germinating. Particular fields intended for barley or potatoes may receive a second ploughing. Prepare composts and manures for turnip. Should the weather be favourable, potatoes may be planted after the middle of this month. This is the best time for planting hedges.——In altering the diet of fatting animals, always let the change be to one more nutritious. Fatting cattle may be allowed bruised grain or oil-cake. If there be a scarcity of turnip for cattle intended for grass, give a small allowance of bruised grain, cake, or hay.

April.—No favourable opportunity should now be lost to sow grain crops. Store the residue of the turnip crop, to preserve the bulbs and prevent the exhaustion of soil. Drain lands intended for green crop where previously neglected. Continue the planting of potatoes in favourable situations. Finish planting thorn hedges.—On store farms, this is the chief lambing season, and the shepherd's utmost attention is necessary. Cease folding turnip, and either feed sheep on stored roots, or restrict them to grass. Should the pastures be late, give sheep grains or prepared cakes. Fatting lamb-hogs require good pasture, being unable to eat turnip freely, from shedding teeth. When there is a scarcity of keep at the homestead, lean cattle may be allowed to roam over permanent pastures. Seedling grasses will seldom admit of being depastured with cattle.

May.—Conclude the sowing of grain crops; and, with the advance of the season, use early varieties. From necessity, barley and pease may be sown up to the end of the month; but full crops cannot be counted upon from such late sowing. Prepare soils for turnip, and use every means to produce a fine tilth. Swedish turnips may be sown from the middle of this month to the end of it. Finish potato-planting. Give a second ploughing to summer fallow, and never allow vegetation to make progress at this season on its surface.—Fatting cattle may be continued on well-kept Swedish turnip and potatoes. When there is a sufficiency of grass, and the soil becomes dry, stock pastures with all descriptions of cattle. In cold and wet evenings, shelter milch cows and fat cattle in courts. Wean early calves, and turn late ones out to pasture.

June.—This is the month for sowing turnips. Where Swedes could not be sown during May, they may still be planted during the first days of June. All other varieties may be sown in course of the month. Drilled crops require attention. Weeds are most easily destroyed when young; and, as a general rule, use hand and horse hoes as soon as the crops admit of the operations. Earth up early-planted potatoes. Haymaking commences in early situations. Mow grasses

before the plants seed; remove the crop quickly from the ground, and soon afterwards carry it to the stack.—Sheep-shearing becomes general. Fleeces are proportionate to the treatment of animals; and every progression or falling-off in condition may be traced in the quantity and quality of wool. Cattle may be

best soiled this month, and this mode of feeding has many advantages.

July.—Conclude haymaking from artificial grasses. Single out turnip, leaving on rich soils spaces of from ten to twelve inches between each plant, and let hand and horse hoes be in constant requisition, with a view to improving the crops and benefiting succeeding ones. Work fallows thoroughly with plough, harrow, and roller, carefully removing root-weeds by the hand. Execute draining, and apply lime and lime-composts when such operations are necessary. Hand-weed grain crops.——In warm weather fatting cattle and milch cows are the better of sheds, to shelter them from the sun. Throughout summer examine flocks daily, to preserve them from the attack of flies, and use the common remedies for the prevention and destruction of maggots.

August.—Conclude hand and horse hoeing turnip. Apply manure to the fallows, and immediately plough it into the soil, putting the ridges into proper form, and clearing out water-courses, to guard against wet weather. In mountain districts haymaking from natural grasses engages the attention of store-farmers. In low situations corn-harvest will occupy all hands.—Lambs not separated from their dams last month must be weaned and put on the best pastures. On lowly situated arable farms get in ewes for early lambing. In high districts select and prepare the stock to be sent to market in the course of autumn. Prepare ropes, thatch, and every description of store necessary for

the harvest, and see that the requisite implements are in proper order.

September.—This may be considered the harvest month. Engage plenty of assisting hands for this important season. Guard against shaking winds by reaping before the juices have left the straw; and to avoid sprouting, keep cut crops always standing in an upright position. When the crop is fit for stacking, carry it by day and by night, and cover the stacks as soon as they are built. Handweed turnip where necessary. Finish fallows; and such as are wet and coldly situated may be sown with wheat.—On arable farms, weaned lambs and ewes for early lambing may be allowed to depasture stubbles and seedling grass. The breeders, rearers, and feeders of stock will meet at the different markets, and make arrangements for their customary changes of animals.

October.—Harvest being finished, this month may be considered the first in the agricultural year, as on the carrying of one crop, preparations for the next should be begun. The plough should now be set in motion. Commence wheatsowing in later situations, and defer only such fields as are very dry, and situated in an early climate. Use the preventives for smut immediately before scattering the seed, and never sow unless there be moisture in the soil to effect germination. Gather potatoes, and carefully secure them from frost.—Unless there is abundance of grass, sheep should get turnip on the pastures. In the beginning of the month remove fatting cattle to the courts, and shelter milch cows during

night. Keep weakly calves warm, and allow them nourishing food.

November.—Conclude potato harvest. Finish wheat-sowing, although this grain may be sown any time on rich dry soils up to the middle of March. At this season, sow wheat from day to day as the soil is turned over. Begin to store turnips for winter use; and wheat may be sown where the crop is removed. Form lime-composts for applying in spring and summer. This is the best time for draining soils intended for green crop and fallow. Dress hedges and ditches.—Sheep intended to be fatted should be folded on turnip, and allowed dry fodder. Lamb-bogs will thrive best with an allowance of turnip on pastures. To all flocks apply the salves and lotions in common use. Cattle of all descriptions should receive fodder and shelter during night, and such as are fatting be carefully attended to in the courts or boxes.

December.—Continue to plough stubbles. Store turnip in mild weather. Regulate thrashing, so that there may be straw to last through the season. In mild weather dress ditches and repair fences, drain, and add by every means to the stores of compost and manure. During frosty weather bring forward materials for drains and composts, and remove heavy commodities which require a firm surface for transport.—Cattle of every description should now be in winter quarters, and receive winter fare. Separate the weak from the strong. Have a constant supply of water to store cattle, and apportion their litter and food to last till the arrival of the grass season. Give fatting cattle as much as they can eat, commencing with globe turnip, and proceeding with food of increasing richness.

GARDENER'S KALENDAR.

January.—When the frost is not severe, trench, manure, and turn up in ridges all vacant ground, and prepare hotbeds. In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposures, for a succession, a few early-frame pease, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw; and, in hotbeds, sow cauliflowers, melons, cucumbers, small salading, early cabbages, and kidney-beans. Plant, prune, and train standard and wall fruit-trees, gooseberry, raspberry, and currant bushes. Edge beds, form new flower-gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, ranunculuses, &c. Pot choice dahlias, placing them in a stove or hotbed. Air and keep dry carnations and stage auriculas. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, irises, &c.

February.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and, when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight pease, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes, as directed in the kalendar for the preceding month. Start and cut early kidney-potatoes for seed, and put them into the stove or hotbed in order to planting out. Clean shrubberies, roll walks and lawns, and plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses. Put cuttings into rich light soil in well-sheltered borders, and plant stocks of the common wild rose for standards on which to bud the Chinese and other fine varieties. Protect all tender plants from the effects of frost, and air greenhouse and stage auriculas and polyanthus frames. Top-dress all fine auriculas and polyanthuses in pots or boxes. Strike dahlias from roots in hotbeds, and sow balsams, cockscombs, tricolors, amaranths, sensitive and ice plants, as well as other tender annuals. Plant carnation-layers, ranunculuses, anemones, and bulbous roots, and divide the roots of herbaceous plants.

March.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, beets, brocoli, spinach, onions, Dutch turnips, carrots, pease and beans, savoys, parsnips, and turnip-rooted radishes. Plant red cabbage, sea-kale, kidney-beans, and cauliflowers from frames; and sow cucumbers and melons in hotbeds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. Strike verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet geraniums, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c. Plant gladioluses. This is the best time to graft fruit-trees, and the China, perpetual, moss, and noisette roses, on the common brier or blush China rose, and to propagate them by layers. Pot dahlias that have pushed, and also cuttings from the offsets, placing them in a moderate heat. Protect tender plants and blossoms, and sow polyanthus, auricula, and almost every kind of perennial, biennial, and annual seeds.

April.—Sow whatever was omitted last month, and plant out such of the pot-herbs as are ready for that purpose. Continue to sow brocoli, asparagus, nasturtiums, seakale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and savoys, and plant out rhubarb, artichokes, sea-kale, German greens, and small salading. Earth up pease, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit-trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cuttings jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c., and all the woody kitchen shrubs. Sow dahlias, carnations, pinks, hollyhocks, Cape, Brompton, and German stocks, China asters, and all kinds of hardy annuals. Pot the flowers struck last month. Destroy the green-fly on roses, and preserve the bloom of stage auriculas from sun and rain. Top-dress all flowers in pots by removing withered leaves, and put in fresh earth. Hoe and rake gravel-walks, cut box-edgings, and mow grass plots.

May.—Sow capsicums, cauliflowers, carrots, lettuces, spinach, pease, cucumbers, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney and French beans. Transplant cabbages, winter-greens, lettuces, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake pease, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant out the flowers potted last month, if there be no appearance of frost; and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots; wallflowers, sweetwilliams, lychnis, and rockets, by slips; and China roses, mimuluses, &c., by cuttings. Put out into the open border pelargoniums, with other greenhouse plants; also Neapolitan violets, and such other hardy annuals as were sown last month. Sow biennials and perennials, if formerly omitted.

June.—Continue sowing the vegetables directed last month, and also turnips for autumn use. Plant out brocoli, cabbages, savoys, celery, cauliflowers in shady borders, leeks, lettuces, cucumbers for pickling, and kidney-beans. Watering is requisite in dry weather both evening and morning; and also the hoeing of potatoes, cabbages, and pease. Thin out onions, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen-herbs. Shade and air melon-plants, and strike by cuttings double-wallflowers, rockets, scarlet lychnis, and stocks. Transplant annuals, biennials, and perennials, and seedling pinks into a bed. Lift all hyacinths, tulips, and other bulbs that have ceased flowering. Cut off the foliage an inch above the stem, and before putting by lay them in sand a fortnight. Re-pot auriculas, polyanthuses, &c. Mow and roll grass walks and plots once a fortnight during this and the other summer months.

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July.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Continue to sow turnips, lettuces, and radishes. Plant out brocoli, cauliflower, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full-grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs when in bloom, dressing them in the shade for winter use. Divest wall-trees, espaliers, and standards, of all superfluous shoots. Continue to water in dry weather, and gather all kinds of seeds as they advance to maturity. Propagate evergreens, roses, and other shrubs, by laying the young wood. Inoculate flowering and other shrubs, bud roses in cloudy weather, and divide the roots of double primroses, polyanthuses, and auriculas. Lay or pipe carnations and pinks, take up anemones and ranunculuses, and put in cuttings of pansies, calceolarias, dahlias, geraniums, &c.

August.—Sow onions, early cabbages, savoys, German greens, and parsley, for the succeeding year; and lettuces, spinach, and cauliflowers, to stand the winter. Earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant brocoli, savoys, and cauliflowers, and the principal crop of celery into trenches for blanching. Cut those herbs which are adapted for distillation or for winter use! Make mushroom-beds, propagate kitchen-herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic, and shalots that are withered in the stem. Continue to bud on fruit-trees, roses, and bushes, so long as the bark rises freely and the weather is cloudy. To obtain new varieties, sow auricula, polyanthus, and anemone seeds, and mignonette to blow in winter; as also the seeds of tulips, hyacinths, irises, and all the other bulbous-rooted flowers. Support and thin dahlias to improve their bloom. Shift tender exotics and hardy greenhouse plants into fresh pots. Keep the ground clear of weeds; and continue to water plentifully.

September.—Sow vegetable seeds for a spring-crop, and plant savoys, German greens, lettuces, celery, and perennial aromatic and pot herbs. Hoe winter-spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, weed cauliflowers and young onions, prick out cabbage-plants, gather ripe seeds, and make mushroom-beds. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and also strawberries, taking out old stools when necessary. Make cuttings of verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet gerantams, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c., and keep them in boxes during the winter. Continue to divide and transplant biennial and perennial flower-roots; lay aimost every kind of shrubs; and put in cuttings of evergreens, China roses, and flowering shrubs. Crocuses, snowdrops, Persian irises, dog's-tooth violets, fritillarias, trown imperials, narcissuses, and most of the other bulbous roots, may now be planted. All the rooted pinks and carnations may be planted out. Sow hardy annuals to stand the winter, and trench up ground in which to plant tulips and hyacinths during October or November.

October.—Plant horse-radishes, lettuces, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflowers, mint, and tarragon in frames, for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops, and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Plant all deciduous trees and shrubs. Commence pruning, taking the vertical branches in fruit-trees, and cutting obliquely to prevent rain from lodging; also roses, honeysuckle, and other flowering shrubs. Protest dablias, young carnations, and layers from sudden frost; and, about the end of the month, begin to plant hyacinths, tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. In favourable weather, transplant hardy fibrous-rooted plants, intermixing them in the borders, to keep up a succession in the flowering season.

Nesember.—Although hazardous, early pease and beans may be sown in a warm barder; if neglected, most vegetables recommended in the last two months may still be planted, earthed up, &c., taking care to protect them from frost. Force sea-kale, thubarb, and asparagus. Prune and plant fruit-trees and bushes; and finish flowering strubs and trees. Transplant seedling stocks, and suckers taken from the roots of the pear, codling, plum, and quince trees, to prepare them for budding or grafting different truits upon; also stocks of the tree-rose, for budding upon them the garden and Chinese varieties. Shelter choice flowers. To make the colours of the tulip distinct, the compost ought to be changed every alternate year; an operation which should be performed this month. Tulip-soil should be one-third of fresh, light, turfy loam; one-third of fine sand; and one-third of sandy peat, or leaf-mould. Take up dablia roots whenever the bloom is nipped by frost, and keep them in sand free from damp.

December.—Prepare for future operations, by digging, manuring, or trenching recent ground, and collecting dung, leaves, and turf, to make compost. In mild weather, a few early pease and radishes may be sown in a warm border, and small salads and cucumbers in hotbeds. Cover with fern, straw, litter, or mats, all such plants as are likely to be injured by frost, either in the open ground or in frames, admitting free supplies of air when the weather is favourable. Plant and prune all kinds of trees and bushes, taking care to stake the trees that are newly planted. In gruning roses, remove the old wood, curtail the young straggling branches, adding good store of decayed manure. Fine auriculas, polyanthuses, and carnations must now be treated with great care.

SECTION I.—USEFUL TABLES.

MONETARY SYSTEM OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The integer of account is the pound, divided from a remote period into 20 shillings, each of 12 pence; and the circulating medium consists of coins of gold, silver, and bronze, and of bank notes convertible into gold, which is the metallic basis of the monetary system; the silver and bronze coins being available only for small money or change.

COINS.

Gold: Sovereign (or pound) and halfsovereign, coined at the rate of 1869 sovereigns from 40 lbs. troy of the standard fineness of 22 carats, or 916? milliemes; being minted at 77s. 10 d. per troy ounce. The full weight of the sovereign is 5 dwts. 3.274 grains; but it is a legal tender when 5 dwts. 23 grains, and is received at par by the Bank of England at the "current weight" of 5 dwts. 2½ grains.

Gold has long been the principal medium of large payments, and since 1816 the sole standard and legal tender. Under the Act 56 Geo. III. c. 68, the mint is open to the public for gold coinage, and standard bullion is converted into an equal weight of sovereigns; but in practice, the bullion is sold at the fixed rate of 77s. 9d. to the Bank of England, in exchange for coin (or its equivalent) at 77s. 10id. per oz., the difference of 11d. per oz. being compensation to the Bank for delay in coinage.

Silver: Crown of 5s., half-crown, florin of 2s., shilling, and pieces for 6d., 4d., 3d., 2d., and 1d.; but the last two, called maundy money, are not in circulation. All are coined at the rate of 66s. from 1 lb. troy of the fineness

the present value; but the coins are not a legal tender for more than 40s. at one time.

Bronze: Penny, halfpenny, and farthing, coined at rates greatly exceeding their intrinsic value, but not legal tender beyond one shilling.

The Remedy of the Mint is, for gold coins 12 grains per lb. in weight, and 18 carat in fineness; for silver 1 dwt. per lb. in both weight and fineness.

In England the pound represented at first a Saxon pound of silver, but the coins were successively degraded to about one-third of their original values. The earliest, save the Saxon styca and skeatta, was, A.D. 725, the silver penny, often broken into fourth-things or farthings. Gold was not coined until 1257, and copper not until the 17th century. Of the old gold coins, the chief were the merk of 13s. 4d.; the noble of 6s. 8d.; and later, the guinea, valued after 1717 at 21s.

Scots currency was, when abolished, 1707, of only 1-12th the value of sterling, and £100 Scots = £8, 6s. 8d. sterling, or £1 Scots = 1s. 8d. sterling. The merk = 13s. 4d. Scots, and the plack = 2 bodles = 4d. Scots.

In Irish currency, abolished 1826, £108, 6s. 8d. Irish = £100 sterling.

PAPER MONEY AND BANKS OF ISSUE.

Public banks were introduced shortly after the Revolution of 1688. The earliest and greatest, the Bank of England, founded 1694, advanced its capital, then £1,200,000, to the Government, of 11 oz. 2 dwts., or 925 milliemes; and and acquired important privileges, the full weight of the shilling is 3 dwts. It was immediately, 1695, followed by 151 grains. Silver is thus minted at the Bank of Scotland, of less preten-5s. 6d. per oz., an over-valuation at sion, but which led the way to a sysfulness, especially in attracting and utilizing deposits, and supplying a stable currency, has more than any other cause contributed to the extension and excellence of modern banking. The Bank of Ireland was formed in 1783, on the model of the Bank of England.

The note circulation of the Bank of England was well supported, and save during a short period in 1696, its convertibility into coin was maintained until 1797, when, under adverse circumstances, aggravated by war, the Bank was relieved by Parliament from making specie payments. The notes then became depreciated; but under arrangements consequent on "Peel's Act" of 1819, the exchange of notes for gold was resumed in 1821.

The concessions to the Bank of Enghand from time to time included a restriction, in 1708, of the number of partners in other English banks to six, which limitation continued until 1826, when joint-stock banks of issue were allowed to be formed in places beyond the metropolitan district; and in 1833, when the Bank charter was renewed, and one-fourth of its capital repaid by Government, non-issuing joint-stock banks were also permitted to be established within the metropolitan district itself. The monopoly of the Bank of Ireland was similarly The joint-stock broken up in 1824. banks established in England and Ireland were mainly constituted upon the well-tried Scottish system. No other material change occurred until the introduction of the existing banking regulations in 1844.

Existing Regulations.

The bank issues in England consist of notes for £5 and upwards of the Bank of England (which monopolizes the circulation within 65 miles of London), and of numerous provincial banks; and in Scotland and Ireland of motes for £1 and upwards, all so regulated as to conform to a gold currency. The notes of the Bank of England are legal tender in England, except at the Bank. New banks of issue have been prohibited; and existing banks are limited in their issues except against specie, as in the cases of the Scotch and Irish banks, of which specie one-fifth may be silver; while the publication is required of their circulation and coin, and an annual return of partners for reference and publication.

The Bank of England has been, from August 31, 1844, divided into two entirely separate departments of issue and banking, and notes for £15,750,000 have been transferred from the former to the latter, against special securities lodged with the Government, including £11,015,000 due by the nation to the Bank, all bearing 3 per cent. interest. Beyond this £15,750,000 no notes can be issued, except against coin or bullion lodged in the issue department. The profit on the note issue beyond £15,750,000, however, goes to the Government. The actual circulation averages £28,500,000, issued about two-thirds from London, and one-third from 11 branches. Notes may be demanded from the issue department in exchange for gold bullion at the rate of 77s. 9d. per oz., and they are payable in coin at the mint rate of 77s. 10dd. per oz. Payment of those issued in London can be demanded there only; but branch notes are payable either at the London office or at the branches where issued. The notes are a legal tender, except in Scotland and Ireland.

The English Provincial Banks of issue have a maximum circulation fixed at the average of the twelve weeks to April 27, 1844. The issues must be at certain licensed places, and no union can take place between a joint-stock bank and a private bank, or between two joint-stock banks of issue, without one of them, at least, losing its circulation. The opening of new branches of issue is also restrained. The aggregate fixed issues, originally £8,648,853, have declined to £6,063,389, and the average actual circulation is only about £3,500,000, spread over 106 private and 49 joint-stock banks. The specie held is not published, for the notes are payable in Bank of England paper, and no power is possessed to issue against specie in excess of the fixed circulation.

In Scotland, banks of issue are confined to those which existed in the year to May 1, 1845; and the issue of each is restricted to the amount of its average circulation in that year; and of the specie held at its head office, where the notes are payable. Should two banks join, the united banks may issue to the amount of their joint circulation. The aggregate authorized circulation, originally £3,087,209, is By the Companies Amendment Act now £2,676,350. The average amount issued by ten joint-stock banks, with

about 890 branches.

In Ireland, the authorized circulation is arranged as in Scotland; the issues of two banks which unite are also given to the united banks; but if any bank discontinues its issue, and circulates notes of the Bank of Ireland, the circulation of the latter may be to an equal amount increased. The notes are demandable in gold at the branches where issued; but the specie held against the circulation in excess of that authorized must be held at the head office, or certain licensed places. The total authorized circulation is still, as at first, £6,354,494. The average specie held is nearly £3,000,000, and of actual circulation about £6,000,000, issued by six joint-stock banks.

Under four distinct arrangements, a general system is thus established which gives to all these banks a collective action analogous to that of a single national bank, with a privilege of issue limited upon securities, but expansive upon bullion. Placing together the fixed issues gives-

The authorized issues were adjusted with the knowledge that they must decline; but to the extent fixed, the use of the precious metals (or capital) is economized; while, from the fact of all farther issues being represented by specie,* the whole circulation is rendered conformable to a metallic currency. The actual circulation averages ing departments, as follows:-

of actual circulation about £5,500,000, about 44 millions, which, with the metallic circulation, estimating 100 millions for gold and 13 millions for silver and bronze, makes an aggregate of 156 millions. The issues temporarily rise at the money terms, and during the payment of the dividends by the Bank of England, but show little tendency to increase, notwithstanding the growth of trade and wealth. Indeed, notes and coin may now be regarded as the small change of commerce, as, owing to the extension of the deposit system, with the increased use of cheques, transfers, credits, and other expedients of modern banking, mediums of exchange and payment are supplied, which, while as cheap as notes, are in practice more elastic and convenient. The bank clearing system, too, pervades the whole country, everywhere economizing both currency and capital. Local clearings are adjusted by drafts on Edinburgh, Dublin, or London, which merge into greater clearings in those towns, especially in London, where cheques, bills, etc., representing annually about 2000 millions sterling, are settled without either bank notes or coin-the several balances of the clearing banks being settled by cheques on their accounts with the Bank of England. This system could be farther economized by working the London clearing out of a joint account with the Bank of England, a certain sum in consols being always kept as security for the whole Banks.

^{*} This is a prominent feature of the Act of 1844; and it is usually held that the notes of the Bank of England are specially secured by the specie, &c., in the issue department of the Bank. This is not, however, clear (Bank Report 1857, p. 220), and, as respects all other banks, the specie held is not more applicable to their notes than to their deposits and other liabilities.

The Issue Account is credited with the fixed securities (b+c) for £15,750,000, and the bullion (d+e); and debited with, their constant equivalent, the "notes issued" (a) to the banking department and the public. This amount (a) is termed the "issue circulation;" while that in the banking department (a) is the "note reserve;" and their difference (a-n), called the "active circulation," is that in the hands of the public. The action of the issue department is purely passive, having no function beyond that of giving, when required, notes for bar gold at 77s. 9d., and sovereigns (or bars if preferred) for notes at 77s. 10id. per oz.

The Banking Department separates the business of the public boards from that of commercial or private parties.

The public offices all keep accounts with the Bank, the customs, inland revenue, &c., lodging the revenue as collected, and the pay-office, &c., withdrawing it for public purposes; while, quarterly, the dividends are paid on the national debt, the stocks constituting which are besides recorded and transferred at the Bank. The (h) "public deposits" (which include chancery and savings banks' funds) increase through revenue receipts until the dividend terms in January, April, July, and October.

The banking account is separately debited with the fixed capital of £14,553,000 (f), and the "rest" (g), a variable surplus, increased by accrued profits until April 5, and October 10, when the Bank dividends are paid to the proprietors. The other debits, beside the public deposits (h) already noticed, are "other deposits" (i), which comprise those of bankers merchants, and others,—from £3,000,000 to £5,000,000, being those of London bankers. The "seven days' bills" (k) includes the outstanding bank post bills.

The credit side embraces "government securities" (1), a safe and readily convertible investment; "other securities" (m), composed of bills dis-counted, and stocks, bonds, &c., on which advances have been made; and the reserve of notes and coin (n, o) immediately available for advances on payments. The note reserve may be viewed as merely an arithmetical expression for the bullion in the issue department available for the banking department, as by consolidating the two accounts, and eliminating the unissued notes, an equivalent sum in bullion or coin will be found in excess of that required by the Act of 1844.

The Government of the Bank is vested in a governor, deputy-governor, and 24 directors. The court or board meets every Thursday, when the weekly account is presented. The two governors have the chief administration, and attend daily, and the court is divided into six regular committees:-1. The Committee of treasury, virtually the governor's council, composed of the two governors, the former governors, and directors elected by the court; 2. The Committee of daily waiting, composed of three directors in rotation, who discount or reject bills, take in or decline bullion, examine securities, &c.; and committees of, 3. Branchesandlawsuits; 4. House, clerks, &c.; 5. Inspection of accountants offices; and 6. Inspection of cashiers' offices. Subject to the court, the three departments of issue, banking, and national debt, are worked by two head officers,-first, the chief accountant, with cognizance of all the accounts; second, the chief cashier, with charge of all money matters. There is also a subordinate control of each office by a principal and deputy principal; be-sides, in the larger offices, superintendents. The early theory of the Bank was to keep the divisions of accounts and cash entirely separate; and, though now much blended, the distinction is still mainly preserved, and the two check each other.

The Business Regulations, though precise, comprehend little that is peculiar. Any person respectably intro-duced may keep a drawing account, provided it shall be remunerative to the Bank,-a condition usually fulfilled by maintaining an adequate balance, though in some cases by an annual payment proportionate to the work. No interest is allowed, nor is an over-draft permitted; but the Bank is always ready to discount approved bills for their customers, and to make advances on approved securities. The limit of the eschéance of bills discounted is 90 days; but advances on bills of even six months are granted to parties who transact all their business with the Bank. The rates charged are various, yet never below the advertised "minimum rate of discount" by which the Bank's ordinary transactions are regulated.

The General Management of the Bank does not, in principle, differ from that of any other well-conducted bank. The directors must always look to their present liabilities, their present reserve, and the impending demands on the latter. In respect to investments,—

known, and due regard paid to their temporary or permanent character,-it is usual to invest all above the amount to which they are likely to be reduced, in discounting bills, short loans, stock, or other convertible securities, care being taken to reserve sufficient cash to meet ordinary fluctuations in the deposits, without disturbing the general nature of the investments. The capital of the Bank is not necessarily kept in the same realizable form, although always available should an emergency arise. The progress of the Bank is shown in the weekly returns. In tracing the action of the law of 1844, the fluctuations of the circulation now attract little notice; but increased importance is attached to the movement of the banking department. An increase of the private deposits (i) indicates increased monetary ease, or in times of distrust a want of confidence in ordinary securities, while a decrease, especially when heavy, attests the necessities of traders and bankers. But the items which chiefly command attention are the two which more immediately determine the value of capital,-the advances on commercial securities (m), and the reserve (n, o); the former indicating the demand, the latter the supply which, with close attention to the foreign exchanges, regulates the bank rate of discount; - which, again, materially influences monetary and business transactions throughout the whole kingdom. When the reserve is high, and advances moderate, the rate of cent .- (Bank Report, 1875.)

the average amount of deposits being | discount is low; but it is raised according as the reserve falls, and advances become in greater request, more especially during an adverse foreign exchange and drain of gold. The efflux of capital abroad is thus restrained, and its influx encouraged. The law of 1844, besides securing the convertibility of the note, operates in this way as a general caution to contract, rather than extend, bill and credit transactions, when bullion is being exported.

Generally gold tends to leave the Bank, and reduce the reserve, when the short exchange of London on Paris falls to 25f. 10c.; while an opposite effect is produced by the exchange rising to 25f. 33c. Owing to London being the entrepôt of the mining countries, a foreign demand for gold is often met without disturbing the Bank's reserve. But under exceptional circumstances, political or financial, the Bank is watchful of a diminution of the bullion, and may raise the discount-rate, in anticipation of what is to come, even while the reserve is good, and the foreign exchange not unfavourable; an adequate supply of gold being, in times of doubt or difficulty, peculiarly necessary as a basis of our monetary system.

Since 1844 the reserve stood highest £22,374,587—on Sept. 24, 1879, when the private securities were £17,326,317. and the discount rate 2 p. c. It stood lowest-£1,552,686-on Nov. 18, 1857. when, with the private securities at £26,113,453, the rate was 10 p. c.

The average discount rate in the 50 years to 1874 was £3, 16s. 2d. per

IMPERIAL MEASURES.

This system, introduced 1826, continued the old legal measures of extension and weight, but superseded numerous corn and liquid measures by the "Imperial gallon," a new measure of capacity. The standards fixed were:-

1. Extension .- The "Imperial Standard Yard," or brass "standard yard of 1760," bearing the proportion of 36 inches to 39.1393 inches, the length of a pendulum vibrating seconds in the latitude of London at 62° Fahrenheit, and in a vacuum at the level of the sea.

2. Capacity.—The "Imperial Standard Gallon," containing 10 lbs. avoirdu-pois, or 277-274 cubic inches of distilled water at 62° Fahr., the barometer being at 30 inches.

 Weight.—The Old Troy Pound of 1758, containing 5760 grains; one cubic inch of distilled water at 62° Fahr., the barometer being at 30 inches, weighing 252.458 grains; and 7000 of such grains were declared to be equal to the avoirdupois pound.

In 1834 those standards were accidentally destroyed; and a scientific commission having reported in favour of their restoration from material copies rather than by experimental reference to natural constants, the provisions for the latter were repealed in 1855. A standard yard and a standard avoirdupois pound were then constructed from authentic copies of the old standards, and deposited in the Exchequer—copies being at the same time lodged at the Mint, the Royal Observatory, the Royal Society, and the Palace at Westminster.

GOLD AND SILVER STANDARDS, ETC.

The fineness of gold is expressed in carats, the unit of reference being divided into 24, and its quality denoted by the number consisting of pure or fine gold. The carat is divided into 4 grains. The British standard for gold coin is 22 carats, i.e., 22 parts are fine, and 2 parts alloy. The fineness of silver is similarly denoted by the number of ounces and pennyweights fine in 1 lb. troy; and the money standard is 11 oz. 2 dwts., i.e., 222 parts are fine, and 18 parts alloy. These standards, often now expressed decimally in 1000th parts or milliemes, as in France, are 916 and 925 respectively.

Plate, excepting small articles, &c., is of regulated fineness. The standards for gold until 1854 were 22 carats and 18 carats; but, to meet the competition of foreign jewellers, it is now also stamped of 15, 12, and 9 carats (17 & 18 Vict. c. 96). The standards for silver are 11 oz. 2 dwts. and 11 oz. 10 dwts.; the latter, called "new-sterling," is almost in disuse. Provisions are likewise made for five "marks" of verification:—

1. The Standard mark, for plate of the fineness of coin, is.in England, a lion passant; in Scotland, a thistle (6 and 7 Will. IV. c. 69); in Ireland, a harp crowned. But in England, since 1844, gold of 22 and 18 carats is separately distinguished by a crown (7 and 8 Vict. c. 22): the lower standards of 15, 12, and 9 carats bear only the numbers denoting their fineness in carats and milliemes. SECTION II.—FIARS-PRICES OF SCOTLAND.

STATE OF THE FIARS-PRICES

OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES OF SCOTLAND FOR THE CROPS AND YEARS FROM 1876 TO 1882 INCLUSIVE.

The Fiars are the average prices, yearly ascertained by the Sheriff, with the help of a jury, of the several kinds of grain of the growth of his county, in the preceding crop. Their origin is obscure: it has been referred to the year 1627, when, it is said, they were for the first time ascertained in the county of Haddington; but they appear to have been struck in some other counties in the end of the previous century. The forms of procedure are regulated by the Acts of Sederunt, 21st December 1723, and 29th February 1728.

The Tables have been prepared from official documents in the Teind-Office. The average is that of the period of Seven Years; but in a few cases, distinguished by an asterisk, that of Six Years only. Where blanks of more than one year occur, no average is stated, the Fiars not having been regularly struck.

The Grain is computed by the Imperial Quarter; the Meal by the Boll of 140 Imperial Pounds.

proper officer of customs or excise at the warehouse shall take a sample from each cask containing such British liqueurs, and every such sample shall be examined, under the direction of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, by distillation or otherwise, and the strength of the British liqueurs ascertained by such examination, after making a deduction of five degrees from the degrees of such strength, shall, in the construction of the provisions of the said Act for the purposes of this section, be deemed to be the strength as denoted or indicated by Sykes's hydrometer.

(2.) If the quantity of spirits in any cask of British liqueurs shall, upon such examination as aforesaid, be found to be less than the quantity of spirits as specified in the warehousing entry or note, no drawback or allowance whatever shall be paid in respect of the British liqueurs contained in such

cask.

(3.) British liqueurs warehoused in any customs or excise warehouse shall not be removed to any other warehouse or be delivered out otherwise than for exportation or for ships' stores directly from the warehouse on board the vessel in which the same are to be exported or used as stores.

Allowance is now made for the natural waste of spirits in warehouse; it being provided by the Act 27 Vict. c. 12, sec. 7, that duty shall be charged only on the actual quantity of spirits delivered from bond, unless there be reasonable ground for believing that the deficiency either in whole or in part has been the result of fraud.

Note.—By the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, sect. 4, foreign spirits and wine of which an account has been taken by the proper officer of customs may, upon the prescribed bond being given, without payment of duty, be removed to any excise warehouse, and be removed from thence to any other excise or customs warehouse or for exportation, or for use as ships' stores, and may, upon payment of the proper duties of customs, be delivered for home consumption. And by the Act 38 Vict. c. 23, sect. 10, tinctures or medicinal spirits may be warehoused upon drawback by a licensed rectifier or compounder of spirits, in any customs or excise warehouse, under the like provisions under which British liqueurs may be so warehoused.

III. STAMP* AND LEGACY DUTIES, ETC.

The following is a list of Stamp Duties according to the schedule of the Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97 (amended by 34 Vict. c. 4, and 34 and 35 Vict. c. 103, and other Acts: , with the Duty on Policies of Sea Insurance, Letters Patent, Patent Medicine, and Plate, and Inventory, Legacy, and Succession Duties, which remain under the former Acts. Personal Property—Absolute power of disposal.—Personal estate which a person, dying after 3d April 1860, shall have disposed of by will, under any authority enabling such person to dispose of the same as he shall

think fit, shall be deemed personal or movable estate of the person so dying, for the purpose of payment of inventory, probate, or administration duty. - (23 Vict. chap. 15, §4.) Indian Promissory Notes-Ships. Companies under the Companies Acts whose objects comprise business in a colony may have a branch register of members resident in said colony. When deceased domiciled furth of the U. K.—In case of a person dying domiciled furth of the United Kingdom leaving personal estate in Scotland, England, and Ireland, an inventory must be given up in Scotland, probate or administration taken out in England and Ireland, and duty paid on such in respect of the property in each country.

In exhibiting inventories after 1st June 1881, the amount of debts due and owing by the deceased to persons in the U. K., and funeral expenses, may be deducted from the value of the estate, for the purpose of paying the inventory duty. Allowance of the original inventory as a spoiled stamp will be obtained within six months after the recording of the second inventory.

Annuities commencing to be payable on the death of persons dying after 19th May 1853, are valued for legacy duty according to tables annexed to the Succession Duty Act (16 and 17 Vict. c. 51); and annuities commencing to be payable previous to that date, by the tables annexed to the Legacy Duty Act (36 Geo. III. c. 52).

the testator or intestate S. Strike died before 1st June 1881, duty is not exigible on legacies or residues under £20; but if a legatee take two or more legacies, under any testament, which shall together be of the amount of £20, each shall be charged with duty, though each or either may be separately under that amount (see 44 Vict. c. 12. § 42). Also where the value of the whole of the personal estate of any person dying after 24th March 1880 does not amount to £100, no duty shall be chargeable in respect thereof, or of any portion thereof (43 Viet. c. 14, § 13).

The legacy duty presumptively payable upon an interest in expectancy may be commuted for a present

payment (ib. § 11).

The Commissioners of Inland Revenue have power to accept a composition for legacy duty under a will (44 Vict. c. 12, § 43).

Duty on legacies and residues in arrear, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Estates not exceeding £300. Payment of fixed duty of 30s. on inventory to be in full of claim to legacy duty on estate to which such inventory relates (44 Vict. c. 12,

Printed forms and regulations for payment of the legacy duty may be obtained gratis, on application at Legacy Duty Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh; and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

SUCCESSION DUTY.

(16 and 17 Vict. c. 51.)

The duty commenced on the death of persons dying after the 19th May 1853, and seems to be imposed on all property, both heritable and movable, passing by death, not liable to the duty on legacies and successions to personal estate upon intestacy—the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts.

The duty on Heritable Property is charged on the annual value, after allowance of the necessary outgoings

(§ 22), as an annuity for the life of the successor (§ 21), which is to be valued by tables annexed to Act.

PERSONAL PROPERTY is liable to duty according to the value of the succession; and money charged on heritage—heritable securities—is charged as personalty (§ 1).

RATES OF SUCCESSION DUTY.

Lineal issue or lineal ancestor of the predecessor.....£1 per cent. By § 41-44 Vict. c. 12, this duty is not payable where the estate is in-

cluded in the inventory on which inventory duty has been paid.

Brothers and sisters of the predecessor and their descendants, £3 per ct.
Brothers and sisters of the father or mother of the predecessor and their descendants.....£5 per cent.
Brothers and sisters of a grandfather or grandmother of the predecessor and their descendants...£6 per cent.

Any other person....£10 per cent. The husband or wife of predecessor is not chargeable with duty (§ 18), and if successor's husband or wife shall be of nearer consanguinity than the successor, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship (§ 11).

The following are also exemptions

from the succession duty:—

1 Successions from the same predecessor, passing on any death, not amounting in principal value to £100 (§ 18). 2. Any succession of less value than £20 in the whole (ib.).

3. Legacies and personal property charged with legacy duty, in respect of the same acquisition (ib.).

Duty on successions in arrear, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Note.—Forms of the accounts may be obtained at the Legacy Duty Office, Edinburgh, and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

ADHESIVE STAMPS.

Stamp duties which may be denoted by adhesive stamps of one penny, not appropriated by any word or words on the face, may be denoted by postage stamps, and postage duties may be paid by unappropriated penny adhesive stamps. 44 Vict. c. 12, § 47.

Stamp duties and postage duties, not exceeding 2s. 6d., may be denoted by adhesive stamps not appropriated, if such stamp duties may be legally denoted by adhesive stamps not appropriated. 45 and 46 Vict. c. 72, § 13 (1).

Postage stamps to the amount of 2s. 6d. unissued or unused may be used to denote stamp duties not exceeding 2s. 6d. which may be legally denoted by adhesive stamps not appropriated. Ib. § 13 (2).

Instruments for which Adhesive Stamps may be used, and person by whom to be cancelled, etc., also mode of cancellation.

AGREEMENT-6d. duty.

Cancellation by person by whom it is first executed (§ 36).

BILL of Exchange.—Fixed duty of 1d. Cancellation by person who signs it before he delivers it out of custody

(§ 50).

BILL payable on demand.-If presented unstamped, person to whom presented may affix and cancel and deduct duty from sum in paying; but not to relieve person who may have incurred penalty (§ 54).

LEASE for any definite term less than a year of-

(1.) Dwelling-house, etc., at a rate not exceeding £10 per annum.

(2.) Any furnished house or apartments, also a duplicate of such instrument.

Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 99).

Person who executes or prepares lease, the duty on which may be

denoted by adhesive stamp, and which is not, at or before execution, duly stamped, penalty £5 (§ 100, 1). Penalty not incurred in respect of letters and correspondence (§ 100, 2).

NOTARIAL ACT and PROTEST of a Bill or Promissory Note.—Cancellation

RECEIPT. - Cancellation by person

who gives (§ 121).
REQUEST to PURSER OF OFFICER OF MINING COMPANY on cost book system to enter or register transfer of share or part of share on notice of such transfer. Cancellation by person who writes (§ 128).

GENERAL DIRECTION AS TO THE CAN-CELLATION OF ADHESIVE STAMPS.

§ 24. (1.) An instrument, duty upon which is required, or permitted by law, to be denoted by an adhesive stamp, is not to be deemed duly stamped with an adhesive stamp unless the person required by law to cancel such adhesive stamp cancels the same by writing on or across the stamp his name or initials, or the name or initials of his firm, together with the true date of his so writing, so that the stamp may be effectually cancelled, and rendered incapable of being used for any other instrument, or unless it is otherwise proved that the stamp appearing on the instrument was affixed thereto at the proper time; where two or more adhesive stamps are used, each stamp to be cancelled. 45 and 46 Vict. c. 72 § 14.

Penalty for neglect or refusal, £10.— (2.) Every person, who, being required by law to cancel an adhesive stamp, wilfully neglects or refuses duly to do so in manner aforesaid, shall forfeit the sum of £10.

Penalty for frauds in relation to adhesive stamps, or to any duty, £50

(§ 25).—Any person who-

(1.) Fraudulently removes or causes to be removed from any instrument any adhesive stamp, or affixes any adhesive stamp which has been so removed to any other instrument, with intent that such stamp may be used again;

2.) Sells or offers for sale, or utters. any adhesive stamp which has been so removed, or utters any instrument having thereon any adhesive stamp which has to his knowledge been so removed as aforesaid:

3.) Practises or is concerned in any fraudulent act, contrivance, or device not specially provided for, with intent to defraud Her Majesty, her beirs or successors, of any duty;

shall forfeit, over and above any ether penalty to which he may be liable, the sum of £50.

STAMPING INSTRUMENTS AFTER EXECUTION.

of CLERKSHIP. - Duly ARTICLES stamped articles in order to admission in inferior court may be stamped with duty to make up £60, and shall then be sufficiently stamped for admission into Court of Session, etc. (§ 42).

An original will, testament, or codicil; (3.) The probate or probate copy of a will or codicil; (4.) Letters of administration, or a confirmation of a testament; may be stamped within fourteen days after date of attestation or authentication, without penalty (§79).

FOREIGN SECURITIES.—The Board of Inland Revenue may at any time, without reference to date, allow

them to be stamped without penalty upon being satisfied they were not made or issued, and have not been transferred, assigned, or negotiated, and no interest paid on them, within the United Kingdom (§ 115).

Policy of SEA INSURANCE made or executed out of U. K., but enforceable in U. K., may be stamped within fourteen days after it has been first received in U. K., without penalty (§ 117, 2, 44 Vict. c. 12, § 44 (b).)

POLICY of SEA INSURANCE, by which separate and distinct interests of two or more persons are insured, stamped in respect of aggregate of such interests, but not duly stamped in respect of each of such interests, may be stamped with additional duty within one month after last risk deelared .- 39 Vict. c. 6, § 1.

RECEIPT may be stamped with impressed stamp-

1. Within fourteen days after given,

penalty £5.

2. After fourteen days, and within a month, penalty £10.

In any other case, not to be stamped (\$ 122).

INSTRUMENTS as to which no express provision to prohibit.

Instruments on payment of duty and penalty of £10; if duty exceeds £10, also interest on it (§ 15, 1). cept where express provision to the contrary is made by this or any other Act, any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument may be stamped after the execution thereof, on payment of the unpaid duty, and a penalty of £10, and also by way of further penalty, where the unpaid duty exceeds £10, of interest on such duty, at the rate of £5 per centum per annum, from the day upon which the instrument was first executed up to the time when such interest is equal in amount to the unpaid duty.

And the payment of any penalty or penalties is to be denoted on the instrument by a particular stamp.

Proviso .- (2.) Provided as follows:-Instruments executed abroad within two months after being received in United Kingdom without penalty .-(a.) Any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument, which has been first executed at any place out of the U. K., may be stamped at any time within two months after it has been first received in the U. K., on pay ment of the unpaid duty only. But policies of Sea Insurance made or executed out of the U.K. can only be stamped within 14 days after being received in this country.—44 Vict. c. 12, § 44 (b).

Board may remit penalties within twelve months.—(b.) The Commissioners may, if they think fit, at any time within twelve months after the first execution of any instrument, remit the penalty or penalties, or any part thereof.—(See Note e.)

Unstamped or insufficiently stamped instruments produced in Court, if duty and penalty be paid to officer of Court, may be received in evidence. § 16. (1.) Upon the production of an instrument chargeable with any duty as evidence in any court of civil judicature in any part of the United Kingdom, the officer whose duty it is to read the instrument shall call the attention of the judge to any omission or insufficiency of the stamp thereon, and if the instrument is one which may legally be stamped after the execution thereof, it may, on payment to the officer of the amount of the unpaid duty, and the penalty payable by law on stamping the same as aforesaid, and of a further sum of £1, be received in evidence, saving all just exceptions on other grounds. This provision is to apply to the production of instruments in evidence in proceedings, before an arbiter or referee. In such application the arbiter or referee shall be "the officer" as well as the judge. - 44 Vict. c. 12, § 44 (a).

By 39 Vict. c. 6, § 2, the provision of § 16 (1), 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97, applies to sea policies, but penalty £100, and a further sum of £1.

The officer of the Court to account for duties and penalties.—(2.) The officer receiving the said duty and penalty

shall give a receipt for the same, and make an entry in a book kept for that purpose of the payment and of the amount thereof, and shall communicate to the commissioners the name or title of the cause or proceeding in which, and of the party from whom, he received the said duty and penalty, and the date and description of the instrument, and shall pay over to the Receiver-General of Inland Revenue, or to such other person as the commissioners may appoint, the money received by him for the said duty and penalty.

Commissioners to stamp instrument.—
(3.) Upon production to commissioners of any instrument in respect of which any duty or penalty has been paid as aforesaid, together with receipt of the said officer, the payment of such duty and penalty shall be denoted on such instrument accordingly.

ADJUDICATION.

DOUBTS AS TO SUFFICIENCY OF STAMPS MAY BE REMOVED.

The Commissioners may be required to express their opinion as to duty. Mode and effect of proceeding.—§ 18. (1.) Subject to such regulations as the commissioners may think fit to make, the commissioners may be required by any person to express their opinion with reference to any executed instrument upon the following questions:

(a.) Whether it is chargeable with duty:
(b.) With what amount of duty it is

chargeable.

(c.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is not chargeable with any duty, such instrument may be stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is not chargeable with any duty.

e Instruments to have stamps impressed are received at the Cashier's Office, No. 3 Inland Revenue, Edinburgh, to be stamped, if within two months of the first date (the solicitor may in certain circumstances receive them within two months of the last date), on payment of the duty; if beyond that date, they are received at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5 Inland Revenue, on payment of the duty and penalty. Persons applying will be furnished with a schedule, which, after being filled up, is to be presented, along with the instrument. The amount of duty sought to be impressed is to be inserted in the schedule by the applicant before being presented, and the duty is to be paid at the time of the application.

The Collector of Inland Revenue at Glasgow is authorized to receive and transmit to Edinburgh (without charge for transmission), for the purpose of being stamped, all kinds of unexecuted documents, and all such executed instruments as may legally be stamped, on payment of the duty and penalty

(if any).

Agreements liable to the duty of 6d. must be lodged within fourteen days of their date, in order to be stamped without penalty.

(3.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is chargeable with duty, they shall assess the duty with which it is in their opinion chargeable, and if or when the instrument is duly stamped in accordance with the assessment of the commissioners, it may be also stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is duly stamped.

(4.) Every instrument stamped with the particular stamp denoting either that it is not chargeable with any duty, or is duly stamped, shall be admissible in evidence, and available for all purposes, notwithstanding any objection relating to duty.

5. Provided as follows:-

ta.) Instrument to be stamped according to opinion.—An instrument upon which duty has been assessed by commissioners shall not, if it is unstamped or insufficiently stamped, be stamped otherwise than inaccordance with assessment of commissioners.

(b.) Securities without limit not to be adjudicated.—Nothing in this section contained extends to any instrument chargeable with duty, and made as a security for money or stock without limit.

(c.) Also instruments which cannot be stamped.—Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to authorize the stamping after the execution thereof of any instrument prohibited

by law from being so stamped.

Person dissatisfied may appeal.—§ 19. (L) Any person who is dissatisfied with the assessment of the commissioners made in pursuance of the last preceding section may, within twenty-one days after the date of such assessment, and on payment of duty in conformity therewith, appeal against such assessment to H.M. Court of Exchequerin England, Scotland, or Ireland, according to the country in which the case has arisen, and may for that purpose require the commissioners to state and sign a case, setting forth the question upon which their opinion was required, and the assessment made by them.

Made of proceeding.—(2.) The commissioners shall thereupon state and sign a case accordingly, and deliver the same to the person by whom it is required, and on his application such case may be set down for hearing in the proper court.

(3.) Upon the hearing of such case due notice of which is to be given to

the commissioners) the court shall determine the question submitted, and, if the instrument in question is in the opinion of the court chargeable with any duty, shall assess the duty with which it is so chargeable.

(4.) If it is decided by the court that the assessment of the commissioners is erroneous, any excess of duty which may have been paid in conformity with such erroneous assessment, together with any penalty which may have been paid in consequence thereof, shall be ordered by the court to be repaid by the commissioners to the appellant, together with the costs incurred by him in relation to the appeal.

(5.) But if the assessment of commissioners is confirmed by court, the costs incurred by commissioners in relation to the appeal shall be ordered by the court to be paid by appellant to the commissioners.

The Commissioners may call for and refuse to proceed without evidence .-§ 20. (1.) In any case of application to the commissioners with reference to any instrument, the commissioners may require to be furnished with an abstract of the instrument, and also with such evidence as they may deem necessary, in order to show to their satisfaction whether all the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of the instrument to duty, or the amount of the duty chargeable thereon, are fully and truly set forth therein, and may refuse to proceed upon any such application until such abstract and evidence has been

furnished accordingly. Affidavit not to be used otherwise.

Person paying full duty relieved of penalty, etc., for omission to state truly in instrument.—(2.) Provided that no affidavitor statutory declaration made in pursuance of this section shall be used against any person making the same in any proceeding whatever, except in an inquiry as to the duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable; and every person by whom any such affidavit or declaration is made shall, on payment of the full duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable, be relieved from any penalty, forfeiture, or disability he may have incurred by reason of the omission to state truly in such instrument any of the facts or circumstances aforesaid. (See Note f.)

Instruments are received for adjudication at the Solicitor's Office, Inland Revenue Office, Edinburgh, on the same conditions as to duty and penaltas instruments to be stamped merely. The schedule (the duty to be in

DENOTING STAMP.

DUPLICATES (§ 93).—CONVEYANCE ON SALE (§ 76).—SETTLEMENT (§ 126), etc. § 14. Where the duty with which an instrument is chargeable depends in any manner upon the duty paid upon another instrument, the payment of such last-mentioned duty shall, if application be made to the commissioners for that purpose, and on production of both the instruments, be denoted in such manner as the commissioners think fit upon such first-mentioned instrument. LICENSE TO SELL STAMPS.

Persons selling stamps must have a license from the Commissioners of Inland Revenue. Applications for license may be addressed to the Comptroller of Stamps and Taxes for Scotland, at Edinburgh. License to specify Christian name and surname and place of abode, and specify shop or shops where stamps are to be sold. Bond to be granted. Not to sell but at shops licensed, and not hawk (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, §§ 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11). Persons in the employment of the Post Office to sell postage stamps without license, and carry them about for sale (ib. § 12).

DISCOUNT ON THE PURCHASE OF STAMPS.

Upon the sale of stamps such discount shall be allowed to the purchaser thereof as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall direct (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, § 13).

Executed by any party thereto, but which, by reason of the death of any person by whom it is necessary that it should be executed, without having executed the same, or of the refusal of any such person to execute the same. or to advance any money intended to be thereby secured, cannot be completed so as to effect the intended transaction in the form proposed:

(c. Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of the execution thereof by some material and

or refusal to sign the same, is in fact incomplete and insufficient for the purpose for which it was intended:

(f.) Executed by any party thereto, which, by reason of the refusal of any person to act under the same, or by the refusal or non-acceptance of any office thereby granted, totally fails of the intended purpose:

(g.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of enrolment or registration within the time required by law, becomes null and

void:

(h.) Executed by any party thereto, which becomes useless in consequence of the transaction intended to be thereby effected being effected by some other instrument duly stamped:

(i.) Executed by any party thereto. which is inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, and in lieu whereof another instrument made between the same parties and for the same purpose is executed and duly stamped: Provided:-

(1.) Executed Instruments—

(a.) The instrument is given up to

be cancelled:

(b.) The application is made within six months after the date of the instrument, or, if not dated, within six months after the execution by the person by whom it was first or alone executed. Except, 1. Where from unavoidable circumstances any instrument for which another instrument has been substituted cannot be given up to be cancelled within the aforesaid period, and in that case within six months after the date or execution of the substituted instrument; 2. Where the spoiled instrument has become void for want of enrolment or registration, and in that case within six months next after it has so become void: 3. Where the spoiled instrument has been sent abroad, and in that case within six months after it has been received back in any part of the United Kingdom:

(c.) No action has been brought or suit commenced in which the instrument could or would have been given or offered in evidence :

(2.) Unexecuted Instruments .- In the case of stamped material, not having any executed instrument written thereon, and of an adhesive stamp not affixed to any material, the application is made within six months after the stamp has been spoiled.

Misused Stamps .- § 15. Stamp used of greater value than was necessary,

stamp inadvertently used for an instrument not liable to any duty, application within six months after the date of the instrument, or, if it is not dated, within six months after the execution. The instrument liable to duty to be restamped with the proper duty. The misused stamp to be cancelled and allowed as spoiled.

Allowance how to be made.—§ 16. The commissioners may give in lieu other stamps of the same denomination and value, or if required, and they think proper, stamps of any other denomination to the same amount in value, or, at their discretion, the same value in money, deducting the proper allowance on the purchase of stamps

of the like description.

Stamps not wanted may be repurchased by the Commissioners.—§ 17. A stamp not spoiled or rendered unfit or useless for the purpose intended, but for which the person has no immediate use, the commissioners may, if they in their discretion think fit, repay the amount in money, deducting the proper discount. The stamp to be delivered up to be cancelled, and satis-

factory proof to begiven that it was purchased by him with a bona fide intention to be used, and that the applicant has paid the full value thereof without any deduction (except only the amount of such discount), and that the stamp was so purchased within the period of six months next preceding the application at the chief office or at one of the head offices, or from some person appointed to sell and distribute stamps or duly licensed to deal in stamps.

As to the exchange of Sea Policies of Insurance, see 30 Vict. c. 23, § 17.

The cases for allowing are-

 Where policy shall be inadvertently filled up in an incorrect or improper manner;

(2.) Or be obliterated or otherwise spoiled, and rendered unfit for

use:

(3.) Or shall be filled up for some insurances which shall not be proceeded in, and the same shall not be signed by any underwriter.

Application must be made within six months after the policy shall be spoiled or become useless.

(See Note h.)

IV. INHABITED HOUSE DUTY.

On each inhabited dwelling-house of the annual value of £20 or upwards, occupied as a farm-house, or any shop or warehouse, being part of a dwelling-house, where goods are exposed for sale and sold in the front and basement story, or any house which is licensed for the sale of liquors by retail, or which is occupied as a hotel, although not licensed for the sale of liquors, a duty of 6d. per pound; all others, 9d.

Exemptions.—Any house or tenement occupied solely for the purpose of trade or business, or of any profession or calling by which occupier seeks a livelihood or profit, and although a menial or domestic servant, or other person of a similar grade or description, not otherwise employed by the occupier, may dwell therein for the protection thereof. Where house let in different tenements, relief to be granted in respect of tenement occupied as above, or unoccupied, on notice being given to Surveyor of Taxes.

h The Inland Revenue Office, No. 10 Waterloo Place, Edinburgh, is open for the allowance of spoiled stamps every lawful day, from 10 A.M. to 3 P.M. (on Saturday, 10 to 12). The distributors of stamps, most of the sub-distributors of stamps, and certain postmasters, also receive spoiled stamps for allowance.

A supply of forms of affidavits is kept at the Inland Revenue Office, and by the distributors and sub-distributors of stamps and certain postmasters; and claimants may attend at the Inland Revenue Office and have the affidavits taken; or they may take the oath before a justice of the peace, and shortly afterwards lodge the affidavits and the stamps with any of the above officers. If not brought within ten days or a fortnight afterwards the stamp will not be allowed without a fresh affidavit. If the claim be admitted at Edinburgh, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the new stamps after the next Monday, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If the claim be lodged with a distributor, sub-distributor, or postmaster, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the said stamps after a specified date, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If application be not made within that time, the claim will be forfeited, and no excuse will be accepted.

The stamps must be presented for allowance within six months after being

spoiled.

Deductions. - Deduction is allowed,

when claimed, of any annual premium (not exceeding one-sixth part of the claimant's income from every source) paid for insurance, or deferred annuity, on the claimant's own or his wife's life, to any insurance company in existence on 1st November 1844, or registered pursuant to Act 7 and 8 Vict. c. 110; or of any annual payment made under Act of Parliament to a widows' or children's fund.

By 41 Vict. c. 15, § 12, provision is made for deduction for diminished value by wear and tear of machinery or plant used in any trade, manufacture, adventure, etc., the profits or gains of which are chargeable under

the rules of Schedule D.

By the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 80, landlords in Scotland are entitled to relief (either by abatement or by repayment) from any amount of Income Tax which may be assessed upon them in respect of the annual value of such rates, taxes, assessments, and public burdens, as may be charged upon them and not charged upon landlords in England.

Occupiers of lands for the purposes of husbandry only are entitled, on proof to the satisfaction of the commissioners, to an abatement of duty proportionate to the deficiency of their profits or gains.—13 and 14 Vict. c. 12; 16 and 17 Vict. c. 34, § 46;

RATES OF POSTAGE AND CONDITIONS OF TRANSMISSION.

LETTERS.

A letter weighing more than 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce. Example, 16 oz. would be 1s. 4d. Unpaid Letters are charged double, and deficient postage double the deficiency.

Letters may not exceed in size 18×9×6 inches, unless to or from Government effices.

On re-directed letters the charge for re-direction is the same whether prepaid or collected on delivery.

LATE LETTERS, posted at the provincial offices, are received till within 5 minutes of the despatch of the mails on being prepaid the too-late fee, and posted in the proper box, or handed over the counter. For letters posted at Edinburgh, see p. 144.

Letters, when once posted, cannot be given back upon any pretence whatever, but must be forwarded to the person to whom they are addressed.

Letters containing articles of a perishable or dangerous nature, or anything that might prove injurious to the other letters, are not forwarded, but sent to the Returned Letter Office.

packet, etc., can be registered on the payment of a fee of 2d. in addition to the postage on such letter or packet, and it must be presented half-an-hour before the closing of the

box for ordinary letters, otherwise it is liable to a late fee of 4d. It is recommended that all letters of value should be registered; as any letter discovered unregistered in course of transit, supposed to contain coin, watches, or jewelry, is registered, and charged 8d. on delivery. A letter marked "registered" put into a letter-box, instead of being presented for registration and a receipt obtained, is also charged 8d., any additional stamps on it above the postage being allowed for off that amount. In the event of a registered letter containing an enclosure of intrinsic value, or its contents, being lost while passing through the post, the department under certain regulations makes good the value of the contents up to £2. Letterscontaining moneywill, however, only get the benefit of this regulation if enclosed in the Special Registered-Letter Envelopes, sold by the Post Office for the purpose.

NEWSPAPERS.

All newspapers registered at the General Post-Office, London, printed and published in the United Kingdom at intervals not exceeding seven days, may be sent by post, singly or in a packet, within the United Kingdom, for a postage of one halfpenny for each newspaper. Supplements to newspapers must be unstitched. A newspaper packet posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be charged with the unpaid rate applicable to book packets. The title and date of every publication must be printed at the top of every page, and it must be folded in such a manner that the title may be readily inspected. It must either have

no cover, or be in a cover open at the ends. It must contain no enclosure, except the supplement belonging to it. A newspaper which has any letter written in it or upon its cover, will be charged letter rate. No packet of newspapers must exceed 14 lb. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in width or depth.

Registration for inland circulation includes registration for transmission

abroad.

INLAND BOOK POST.

The rate of postage is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

If not sufficiently paid, double the deficiency will be charged; and if sent unpaid, a double rate is charged. All letters or sealed enclosures in a book packet are forbidden. If this rule is infringed, the entire packet will be treated as a letter. If any letter is written on a book or its cover, it will be chargedunpaid letter postage. (Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, etc., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter.)

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment, and may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three ;-further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, whether loose or attached; also rollers in the case of prints; markers, whether paper or otherwise, in books; in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but every packet must be open at both ends, and put up in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it will be treated as a letter.

Circulars, i.e. letters in identical terms being sent to several persons, the whole or greater part of which must be printed, engraved, or lithographed.

A book packet in dimensions must not exceed 6 in. in depth, 9 in. in width, 18 in. in length, and 5 lb. in

weight.

It is forbidden to forward by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, packet, or card having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character.

PRINTED PARLIAMENTARY PAPERS. of id. on the value of 1s. 8d. as—Same as Book Post rate, but under, and 1d. on 3s. 4d. value, and 1 re is no limitation as to weight. on, being at the rate of 2 per cent.

They must be without covers, or in covers open at the ends. The words "Parliamentary Proceedings" must be written or printed on the cover of the packet, otherwise it will be treated as an ordinary book packet. Prepayment is optional. Petitions and addresses forwarded to her Majesty pass free. Members of Parliament may receive petitions and addresses to her Majesty, or petitions to either House, free, if not exceeding 2 lb., and sent without covers, or in covers open at the ends.

PARCEL POST.

Parcels are conveyed at the rate of not exceeding 1 lb., 3d.; exceeding 1 lb. and not exceeding 3 lbs., 6d.; exceeding 3 lbs. and not exceeding 5 lbs., 9d.; exceeding 5 lbs. and not exceeding 7 lbs., 1s.

POSTAGE AND TELEGRAPH STAMPS, WRAPPERS, ENVELOPES, ETC.

Postage labels are of the respective values of id., ld., lid., 2d., 2id., 3d., 4d., 5d., 6d., ls., 5s., 10s., and £1. Stamped telegraph books, 20s.; interleaved, 2d. extra.

Inland Post Cards (thin) are 7d. and (thick) 8d. per dozen, Reply Cards 7d. and 8d. per half-dozen, Foreign 1d., 1½d., and 2d. each; and ½d. newspaper wrappers at the rate of 6 for 3½d., and 1d.wrappers 8 for 8½d. The public can also obtain these wrappers and post cards uncut in ½ reams of 120 sheets (each sheet consists of 14 wrappers or 42 post cards) by making special application at any post-office.

Stamped Envelopes are made of two sizes—viz., $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3$ in. and $4\frac{3}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$ in. (square shaped), and of three sorts, and are sold at 2s. 2d., and the square shaped 2s. 4d. per packet of 24. Commercial envelopes, 20 for 1s. 9d.

REGISTRATION-LETTER Envelopes, including the registration fee, are of 5 sizes and sold thus—viz., $5\frac{1}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{4}$ in. and $6 \times 3\frac{3}{4}$ in., at $2\frac{1}{4}$ d. each, or 2s. $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. for a packet of 12; 8×5 in., $2\frac{3}{4}$ d. each, or 2s. 7d. per packet; $10 \times 7\frac{1}{4}$ in. and $11\frac{1}{4} \times 6$ in., 3d. each, or 2s. 10d. per packet. The postage must be paid by affixing the necessary stamps.

Any embossed or impressed stamp cut out or otherwise separated from any cover, paper, or card, on which it was embossed, cannot be used for postage. Postage stamps are purchased from the public at the Money Order Office., G.P.O., Branch Offices, and the Receiving-Offices, at a charge of id. on the value of 1s. 8d. and under, and 1d. on 3s. 4d. value, and so on, being at the rate of 21 per cent.

COLONIAL AND FOREIGN POST, GENERAL REGULATIONS.

A letter posted unpaid or insufficiently prepaid, directed to go by a route by which prepayment is compulsory, is returned to the sender.

Letters for Australia, New Zealand, Cape Colony, or Natal, posted unpaid or partially prepaid, are forwarded, charged the deficient postage and an additional rate of 6d., and for St Helena, 1s. extra.

Letters to or from countries in the Postal Union, posted unpaid, are charged double rate, and those partially prepaid, double the deficiency.

Letters containing coin, jewelry, articles of value, or anything liable to customs duties, are not permitted to circulate in the countries comprised in the General Postal Union, nor to Costa Rica. Jewelry and precious articles, if dutiable, sent to the Cape of Good Hope and Queensland, are liable to be detained until the duties have been paid, and, if sent to Victoria, are liable to be forfeited.

Foreign Post Cards are issued under the same regulations as for inland circulation, for countries comprised in the General Postal Union, except that when the regulations are not complied with they are not sent.

NEWSPAPERS for foreign countries and the colonies are subject to the same general regulations as for inland circulation; excepting that for foreign transmission a newspaper may be published at intervals of 31 days, and posted within eight days from and including the date of that of publication.

BOOK POST. - To the colonies and most foreign countries printed paper may be sent under the same regulations as the Inland Book Post, and the name and address of the sender may be written on the book; but to some foreign countries there must be no writing or manuscript marks except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent. There is a customs duty on books, etc., to the United States. Nevertheless any book of not more than a dollar in value, and photographs, when sent in limited numbers, and not for sale, are considered exempt from customs duty; as also pamphlets, periodicals, and like publica- | readily opened.

tions, and books printed more than 20 years; but such as are considered liable are charged.

COMMERCIAL PAPERS sent under the book post regulations comprise documents written or drawn by hand (except letters or communications of the nature of a letter), documents of legal procedure deeds, drawn up by public functionaries, copies of or extracts from deeds under private seal, way bills, bills of lading, invoices, and such like of a commercial character, documents of insurance and other public companies, all kinds of manuscript music, and of books and literary works.

INDIAN AND CEYLON PARCEL POST. Parcels can be sent through the Indian Parcel Post Agency to any part of British India. - Offices in London: 122 Leadenhall St., E.C., and 25 Cockspur St., S.W. The rate is 1s. per lb. or fraction thereof, and to the Straits Settlements at the rate of 1s. 4d. per lb. or fraction of a lb. The maximum weight, size, and value of a parcel, is 50 lb.; two feet long by one foot broad and deep; and £50 in value. Parcels containing jewelry, gold, silver watches, or precious stones, are charged an additional ad valorum rate of 1s. on every £5 or fraction thereof, which must be prepaid. Liquids, or articles of a dangerous or damaging nature, are forbidden. The parcel must be securely closed and packed. Parcels containing books or articles circulating under the Inland Book Post rules are charged at half rates, but the parcel must be advised as books. A letter of advice stating particulars of parcel should be sent to the London office, otherwise the parcel is liable to be charged full rate.

COLONIAL AND FOREIGN PATTERN Post.—The Pattern and Sample Post is restricted to bona fide trade patterns or samples of merchandise.

Patterns or samples, when practicable, must be sent in covers open at the ends, and so as to be easy of examination. But samples of seeds, drugs, and such like articles, which cannot be sent in covers of this kind,—but such articles only,—may be posted enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened.

Samples of intrinsic value or liable to customs duty, must not be sent.

There must be no writing or printing upon any packet except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number, and the price of the articles.

DIMENSIONS AND WEIGHT.—For limitations of letters and packets, see

pages 152 and 154.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS, ETC.— Letters, Newspapers, Book and Pattern Packets may be registered to the colonies and to most foreign countries for a fee of 2d. under the same regulations as for inland letters, etc. To countries in the Postal Union an acknowledgment of delivery may be obtained on payment of 2½d. at the time of posting.

above which sum no single order can be granted. A money order must be presented for payment before the end of the twelfth month, otherwise the order becomes void, nevertheless it may be paid after that period on good reason being shown for the delay in presenting it. Printed forms for making application in case of miscarriage or loss of an order, or when it is desired to stop payment of an inland order, or when alteration in the name of the payee is required, or transfer of payment to another office, or repayment of the amount be required, may be obtained at any money-order office, and full instructions on the subject will be found printed at the back of the money order.

Foreign Money Orders.—The regulations are the same as for inland orders. Money orders are issued on the undermentioned Foreign countries, British Possessions, Agencies, and Colonies, at the following rates of commission, viz.—For sums not exceeding $\pounds^2 - 6d$.; $\pounds 5 - 1s$.; $\pounds 7 - 1s$. 6d.; $\pounds 10 - 2s$. 0d.:—

If a postal order is not presented for payment in three months from the last day of the month of issue, a second poundage is charged, and an additional poundage for every three months or part thereof thereafter.

POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS. -Every money-order office being a post-office savings bank receives de-posits of one shilling (or 12 penny stamps on an official form), or any number of pounds and shillings, from any depositor, provided the sums deposited do not exceed £30 in any year, ending 31st December, and the total amount standing in the depositor's name does not exceed £150, exclusive of interest. terest at the rate of £2, 10s. per cent. per annum allowed on every complete pound. When any depositor's principal and interest amount together to £200, all interest will cease so long as the balance of the account continues to amount to the said sum of £200. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or part of his deposits, must apply on the form which he will procure at any post-office savings bank, and transmit it to the Postmaster-General, who will send him a warrant by post, payable at the post-office named in his application. Further regulations as to details are printed in the book which the depositor receives on making his first deposit, and an abstract of the Act will be found in the Almanac for 1862, p. 143.

INVESTMENTS IN GOVERNMENT STOCKS.—By the Savings Banks Act, 43 and 44 Vict. cap. 36, any depositor in a savings bank who desires to invest a certain sum in Government stock must send to the savings bank, together with his deposit book, an application, signed by him on a form to be obtained at the bank in which he is a depositor, or at any post-office savings bank. The sum invested shall not be less than £10 or the amount of the current price of £10 stock, with the addition of the commission, whichever sum is least. The amount of stock credited to any one account in any savings bank year (whether any stock has been previously sold or not) shall not exceed £100 stock. The whole amount of stock credited to any one account shall not exceed £300 stock. All dividends in respect of stock credited to a depositor in a savings bank shall be carried to the deposit account in like manner as interest on deposits. Any depositor desiring to sell the stock standing to his credit, or part of the stock, must send to the savings bank, together with his deposit book and investment certificate, an applicadepositor in a savings bank may ob-

tain a stock certificate, with coupons annexed, under the National Debt Act, 1870, for such amount of stock standing to his credit (being either £50 or a multiple of £50). The commission chargeable on investment, including the receipt of dividends and on the sale of stock, is 9d. for stock not exceeding £25, and 6d. for every additional £25.

GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES, ETC.— The Act 27 and 28 Vict. c. 43, empowers the Postmaster-General to insure the lives of persons of either sex between the ages of sixteen and sixty for not less than £20, or more than £100; and also to grant immediate or deferred annuities on the lives of persons of either sex, of the age of ten years and upwards. Certain post-offices have been opened for the receipt of proposals, where full instructions for filling up and delivering the necessary forms may be obtained. See Post-towns, p. 159. For Table of Annuities and Assurance, see p. 92.

POST-OFFICE TELEGRAPHS.

The charge for telegrams throughout the United Kingdom is one shilling for the first twenty words, and threepence for each additional five words or part of five words, the names and addresses of senders and receivers not being counted. If the accuracy of a telegram is doubted, it may be repeated at half the original cost, fractions of 3d. being counted as 2d., but which amount will be refunded should the telegram have been inaccurately transmitted. Copies of a telegram directed to more than one firm or person in the same free delivery will be delivered separately at an additional charge of threepence per copy. When the addressee does not reside within the limit of one mile of the terminal telegraphic office, or within the limit of the town postal delivery of that office, if it is a head office, and when the sender desires to have his telegram delivered by

special foot-messenger, sixpence per double mile or any part thereof will be charged. A sum of one shilling per double mile will be charged for the delivery of telegrams by mounted messenger, except in Ireland, where it is usually 8d. per double mile, the charges being reckoned from the office If the telegram is to be forwarded by post or train from the terminal telegraph office, it must be so addressed, and if "by train" one shilling must be deposited to cover cost of conveyance.

A deposit of 5s. is required upon all telegrams addressed to persons on board ship (unless lying in dock), to cover any expense incurred in delivery -but the surplus will be refunded on

application.

FOREIGN TELEGRAMS.

Foreign telegrams are charged for at so much a word, the maximum length of which, in ordinary European tele-grams, is 15 letters, and in extra-European telegrams 10 letters—any additional letters being charged for as

extra words. The name and address of the receiver of a message is charged, and must not consist of less than 2 The sender's name is also words. charged if sent; but if not sent, the form must be signed.

STATUTES AFFECTING SCOTLAND,

PASSED IN THE SESSION OF PARLIAMENT 46 AND 47 VICTORIA, WITH ABSTRACTS OF THE PRINCIPAL ENACTMENTS.*

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[•] The abstracts have been made on the principle of abridging very considerably such provisions as regulate the conduct of official persons, who may be presumed to look for information to the Acts themselves; while those laws which affect the public in general have been abstracted with much anxiety to give a distinct though brief view of their application. The chapters affecting the appropriation of the revenue, diplomatic matters, etc., though they may be said to apply to the inhabitants of Scotland as much as to the other citizens of the empire, are, for obvious reasons, omitted. The numbers within parentheses refer to the sections of the Acts.

EXPLOSIVE SUBSTANCES.

CHAP. 3. To Amend the Law relating to Explosive Substances. April 10.

(1.) Short title: Explosive Substances Act, 1883.

(2) Any person who causes, by any explosive substance, an explosion likely to endanger life or property, to be liable, whether injury results or not, to penal servitude for life or imprisonment for two years.

(3.) Any person who within or (being a subject of Her Majesty) without Her Majesty's dominions,-

(a.) Does any act with intent to cause, or conspires to cause, an explosion in the United Kingdom likely to endanger life or injure property; or,

(b.) Makes or has in his possession er under his control any explosive substance, with intent thereby to endanger life or injure property in the United Kingdom, or to enable any other person to do so,

Whether any explosion occurs or any injury results or not, to be liable to twenty years' penal servitude, or to two years' imprisonment, and explosive substance to be forfeited.

(4) Any person who makes, or knowingly has in his possession or under his control, any explosive substance under circumstances creating a reasonable suspicion that his object is not lawful, shall, unless he can instruct a lawful object, be liable to feurteen years' penal servitude or to two years' imprisonment. The accased and wife or husband, if they think fit, to be admissible as ordinary witnesses in the proceedings.

(5.) Any person who within or (being a subject of Her Majesty) without Her Majesty's dominions, by supplying or soliciting money, providing premises or materials, or in any manuer whatsoever, is accessory to any crime under this Act, to be liable as a principal offender.

(6.) 1. The Lord Advocate may order an inquiry by any justice (including Sheriff and Sheriff-substitute) for the county, borough, or place where a crime under the Act has been, or is suspected to have been, committed, although no person may be charged therewith; and the justice thus authorized may examine and bind any witness by juratory caution to tended to be used, or adapted for

appear and give evidence when called on within three months.

2. A witness so examined not to be excused from answering incriminating questions; but his statement not to be admissible in evidence against him, except in a criminal proceeding for perjury.

3. A justice who conducts such examination of a person concerning any crime shall not take part in committing him for trial therefor.

4. A person bound as above to give evidence may, if absconding, be arrested and imprisoned until the time at which he is bound to give evidence, unless he produces sufficient sureties; person so arrested to be entitled on demand to a copy of the information against him.

(7.) 1. No justice to take proceedings beyond those necessary for remanding or securing the accused, without the consent of the Lord

Advocate.

3. A crime punishable under the Act, when committed out of the United Kingdom, to be deemed to have been committed where accused is apprehended or is in custody.

4. Persons not to be exempted by the Act from punishment for offences at common law, but not to be punished twice for same criminal act.

- (8.) 1. The sections of the Explosives Act, 1875, relating to search for, seizure, forfeiture, and disposal of explosive substances (being secs. 73, 74, 75, 89, and 96), to apply as if a crime or forfeiture under this Act were an offence or forfeiture under the earlier Act.
- 2. Master or owner of ship suspecting that goods of a dangerous nature, which, if found, he might throw overboard under the Merchant Shipping Act, 1873, are concealed on board, may search for such goods, breaking open, if necessary, packages and receptacles; if he finds any such goods, he may deal with them under that Act, and if he fail, he shall not incur any liability, civil or criminal, should it appear to the tribunal before which the question of his liability is raised, that he had reasonable cause of suspicion.

(9.) The expression "explosive substance" includes any materials for making any explosive substance; also any apparatus, machine, implement or materials used, or incausing, or aiding in causing, any explosion in or with any explosive substance; also any part of any such apparatus, machine, or implement.

NATIONAL GALLERY LOANS.

CHAP. 4. For Enabling the Trustees and Director of the National Gallery to Lend Works of Art to other Public Galleries in the United Kingdom. April 10.

(1.) Short title: National Gallery

(Loans) Act, 1883.

(2.) Empowers trustees and director of National Gallery to lend any pictures or works of art, which can be spared from the national collection, to any public gallery authorized by this Act. (3.) Loan to be for such time and under such conditions as trustees and director may determine. Profits of loan exhibition, after paying expenses, must be devoted altogether to promoting science and art.

(4.) Pictures and works of art acquired by National Gallery under gift or bequest not to be lent until fifteen years after acquisition, extended to twenty-five years where the conditions of gift or bequest forbid or are inconsistent with loan.

(5.)The expression " public gallery authorized by this Act" means any gallery situate in the United Kingdom belonging to or under the control of Government, or of any municipal authority, or of any society or body approved by two or more of the trustees of the National Gallery together with the director. The expression "municipal authority" includes inter alios the Town Council or Police Commissioners of any royal burgh in Scotland, and also any other local authority which may be similarly approved.

CUSTOMS AND INLAND REVENUE.

CHAP. 10. To Grant certain Duties of Customs and Inland Revenue; to Alter other Duties; and to Amend the Law relating to Customs and Inland Revenue. May 31.

(1.) Short title: Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1883.

PART I. CUSTOMS AND EXCISE.

(2.) Import duties on tea of 6d. per pound continued.

until 31st July 1884.

(7.) The expression "any vehicle drawn by a horse or mule, or horses or mules," in sec. 19 (6) of 32 and 33 Vict. c. 14, extended to embrace any vehicle drawn or propelled upon a road or tramway, or elsewhere than upon a railway, by steam or electricity, or other mechanical power.

(11.) 1. SEA FISHERIES.

CHAP. 22. To carry into effect an International Convention concerning the Fisheries in the North Sea, and to Amend the Laws relating to British Sea Fisheries. August 2.

Preliminary.

(1.) Short title: Sea Fisheries Act, 1883.

Confirmation of Convention.

(2.) Confirms Convention with Germany, Belgium, Denmark, France. and the Netherlands, for regulating the police of the fisheries in the North Sea, outside territorial waters, and incorporates it with this Act, viz.: (I.) Provisions of Convention to apply to the subjects of the high contracting parties. (II.) The fishermen of each country shall enjoy the exclusive right of fishing within three miles from low-water mark, al ng the whole coasts of their respective countries, as well as of the dependent islands and banks. regards bays, the three miles shall be measured from a straight line drawn across the bay in the part nearest the entrance at the first point where the width does not exceed ten miles. Ordinary freedom of navigation and anchorage of fishing-boats in territorial waters not to be prejudiced. (III.) Miles in preceding article are geographical miles, whereof 60 = 1° of latitude. (IV.) Defines the limits of the North Sea, viz., North-Parallel of 61st degree of latitude. East and South - 1. Coasts of Norway between said parallel and Lindesnaes lighthouse (Norway); 2. Straight line thence to Hanstholm lighthouse (Denmark); 3. Coasts of Denmark, Germany, the Netherlands, Belgium and France, as far as Gris Nez lighthouse (France); West - 1. Straight line thence to easternmost lighthouse at S. Foreland (England); 2. E. coasts of England and Scotland; 3. Straight line joining Duncansby Head (Scotland) and southern point of S. Ronaldshay (Orkney); 4. E. coasts of Orkneys;

shay lighthouse (Orkney), and Sumburgh Head lighthouse (Shetland); 6. E. coasts of Shetlands; 7. Meridian of N. Unst lighthouse (Shetland) to parallel of 61st degree of latitude. (V.) Fishing-boats to be registered, each port having a consecutive series of numbers preceded by initial letter or letters. A list of these letters to be notified by each Power to the others. (VI.) Fishingboat to bear the initial letter and registry number of her port. (VII.) Name and port to be painted on stern, in white oil colour on a black ground, in letters at least 8 centim. (= 3 inches) in height, and 12 millim. (= 1 inch) in breadth. (VIII.) Letter and number to be on each bow of the boat, white on a black ground; and, unless boat of small burden, 8 or 10 centim. (= 3 or 4 inches) below gunwale; dimensions of letters and numbers to be, for boats of 15 tons and upwards, 45×6 centim. (= 18 × 2) inches), and for smaller boats, 25 × 4 centim. (= 10 × 12 inches). Letters and numbers one-third larger to be painted on each side of mainsail, immediately above close reef, in black on white or tanned sails, and in white on black sails. (IX.) Boats not to have any names, letters, or numbers other than those above prescribed; and (X.) These must not be effaced or concealed in any way. (XI.) All small boats, fishing implements, etc., must bear letter and number of boat, large enough to be easily distinguished. They may also bear private marks. (XII.) Master of boat must have official document establishing her nationality and specifying her letter, number, description, and ownership. (XIII.) Nationality of boat must not be concealed. (XIV.) No fishing-boat shall anchor between sunset and sunrise on grounds where drift-net fishing is actually going on, accidental or compulsory anchorings excepted. (XV.) Boats arriving on fishinggrounds shall not either place themselves or shoot their nets in such a way as to injure each other or to interfere with those already fishing. (XVI.) In drift-net fishing, undecked boats shooting their nets at the same time as decked boats must shoot to windward of the latter, which in turn must shoot to leeward of them. 5. Straight line joining N. Ronald- | Decked boats shooting to windward

of undecked boats already fishing, and undecked boats shooting to leeward of decked boats already fishing, shall be responsible for consequent damage to nets, unless they prove compulsory circumstances or absence of fault. (XVII.) No net or other fishing engine shall be set or anchored where drift-net fishing is actually going on. (XVIII.) No actually going on. (XVIII.) No fisherman shall fasten his boat to the fishing-tackle of another fisherman. (XIX.) Trawlers in sight of drift-net or of long-line fishermen must avoid injuring the latter, and shall be responsible for damage caused, unless they prove compulsory circumstances or absence of fault. (XX.) When nets of different fishermen get foul of each other, they shall not be cut save of consent or under necessity. (XXI.) A person hauling lines in which another's long lines are entangled, shall not cut the latter except under necessity, and then the cut line shall be immediately joined together again. (XXII.) Except in cases of salvage and the cases mentioned in the two preceding articles, no fisherman shall, under any pretext, cut, hook, or lift up nets, lines, or other gear not his own. (XXIII.) The use and also the presence on a boat of any instrument or engine serving only to cut or destroy nets are forbidden. (XXIV.) Fishing-boats shall conform to the general rules respecting lights adopted by the Powers. (XXV.) All fishing - boats, gear, implements. etc., marked or unmarked, found at sea, shall be delivered at first port of call to the competent authority, who shall inform the consular agents both of the salvor's and of the owner's countries, and shall restore the articles salved to the owner on the salvor's interests being properly guaranteed. Amount of salvage shall be fixed by the tribunals of the different countries, but right is reserved to the Powers to regulate salvage rates by special arrangement. Unmarked fishing implements to be treated as wreck. (XXVI.) The fisheries shall be superintended by vessels of the national navies of the Powers. (XXVII.) The execution of the regulations in articles VI.-XIII., and of that in article XXIII. as to presence on board of forbidden instruments, is entrusted exclusively to the cruisers of the nation of each fishing boat;

but other cruisers may acquaint these with infractions. (XXVIII.) All cruisers may authenticate infractions of other regulations of the Convention and all fishery offences, irrespective of nationality; and (XXIX.) Any cruiser may require exhibition of the document establishing the nationality of any suspected boat. (XXX.) The commander of a cruiser shall judge of gravity of facts falling under his cognizance, and shall verify any damage sustained by fishing-boats. If necessary, he shall draw up a formal statement of the verification of the facts elicited from the parties and witnesses, and in a serious case may take the offending boat or part of her crew to a port of their own nation. (XXXI.) The formal statement of preceding article shall be in the forms and language of the commander's country, the accused and witnesses being entitled to add thereto signed declarations in their own language. (XXXII.) Resistance to the cruisers of any of the Powers shall be considered as resistance to the authority of the fishingboat's own nation. (XXXIII.) In cases that are not serious, commanders of cruisers may of consent arbitrate at sea, and fix compensation for damage, causing the parties, where the debtor is unable to settle at once. to sign in duplicate a formal document specifying the compensation. one copy of which shall remain on the cruiser, and the other shall be handed to the creditor, that he may sue on it if necessary. (XXXIV.) Contraventions of this Convention to be prosecuted in name of the State. (XXXV.) Each Power to secure the execution of the Convention by legislative measures. (XXXVI.) Courts of country to which offenders' boats belong empowered to try cases of assault and of wilful damage or loss inflicted by fishermen of one nationality upon those of another, and also to try contraventions of the Convention. (XXXVII.) Procedure in contravention cases to be summary. (XXXVIII.) Convention to be ratified. (XXXIX.) Convention to come into force on a day to be afterwards fixed, and to continue for five years, being terminable thereafter as to any one or more of the Powers on twelve months' notice. Additional The King of Sweden and Norway is empowered to adhere to the Convention for these countries either jointly or separately.

Fishery Regulations.

(3.) Empowers Her Majesty to make Orders in Council.

(4.) Any person who within exclusive British limits, and any person belonging to a British sea-fishing boat who outside these limits,—

(a.) Violates Articles XIII.-XXII.

of Convention or any of them;

(b.) Assaults any one belonging to another sea-fishing boat, or damages such boat or property belonging thereto:

(c.) Fishes for oysters or has on board his boat any oyster dredge within prohibited seas and periods;

(5.) (a.) Uses any instrument for damaging or destroying, by cutting or otherwise, any fishing implement of another sea-fishing boat, except as provided in Articles XX. and XXI. of Convention; or,

(b.) Takes or has such an instru-

ment on board his boat;-

Punishable with fine of £50 or three months' imprisonment; and for the offences under section 5, with forfeiture of the instrument.

(6.) Incorporates regulations of Merchant Shipping Acts respecting lights so far as applicable to seafishing boats, and empowers seafishery officers to enforce them.

Exclusive Fishery Limits.

(7.) 1. No foreign sea-fishing boat to enter exclusive British limits, except for purposes recognised by international law, or by any convention with a foreign state, or for any lawful purpose. 2. If such boat enters these limits, it must leave them so soon as its purpose has been answered. While it is within them, no person on board may fish or attempt to fish; and regulations prescribed by Order in Council must be duly observed. 3. In the event of any contravention, master of boat to be liable to fine of £10 for the first, and of £20 for any subsequent offence.

Registry of British Sea-Fishing Boats.

(8.) 1. Sections 22, 23, 24 and 26 of the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, to have effect as if Articles V.-XII. of the present Convention, and as if offences under this Act were embraced therein; but powers given to foreign sea-fishery officers by the Convention

not to be hereby enlarged. 2. Section 176 of Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, not to apply to British seafishing boat duly registered.

Miscellaneous.

(9.) Prohibits the manufacture or sale of any instrument serving only, or intended, to damage or destroy fishing implements, under pain of fine of £50 or three months' imprisonment, and forfeiture of the instrument.

(10.) Boats and things specified in Article XXV. of Convention to be "wreck" within the meaning of Mer-

chant Shipping Acts.

Enforcement of Act.

(11.) 1. Act and relative Orders in Council to be enforced by sea-fishery officers, British and foreign. British officers defined, viz. :- Every officer of, or appointed by, the Board of Trade, every commissioned naval officer on full pay, every officer specially authorized by the Admiralty, every British consular officer, every collector and principal officer of customs in the British Islands, and every officer of customs therein specially authorized, every divisional officer of the coast guard, and every principal officer of a coastguard station. 3. Foreign officers defined, viz.: - The commander of any vessel belonging to the government of any foreign state bound by the Convention, and any officer appointed by a foreign state for enforcing the Convention, or otherwise recognised by Her Majesty as a sea-fishery officer of a foreign state.

(12.) Powers of British sea-fishery officer. Within exclusive British limits he may board any sea-fishing boat, and outside those limits any British sea-fishing boat, may demand papers, muster crew, require explanations, examine sails, lights, fishing implements, etc., seize instruments serving only or intended to damage or destroy fishing implements, make inquiries relative to the discovery of contraventions, or the assessment of compensation for damage, and, in cases of contravention, take the offender and his boat and crew to nearest port, and detain them until trial.

(13.) Similar powers, but not to exceed those authorized by the Convention, are given to foreign sea-fishery officers over British boats, and to all

sea-fishery officers, British or foreign, over foreign boats; boat or person belonging thereto to be taken, unless nationality not officially evidenced, to a port of her own state.

(14.) 1. Protection afforded to seafishery officers acting in the execution of their duty. 2. Person obstructing sea-fishery officer, or refusing or neglecting to comply with his directions or to answer his questions, liable to fine of £50 or three months' imprisonment.

Legal Proceedings.

(15.) 1. Court may adjudge an offender to pay, besides a fine, a sum (recoverable as a fine) as compensation to any one injured in person or property. 2. Compensation specified in a "document" signed under Article XXXIII. of the Convention, or fixed by a sea-fishery officer under any arbitration, may be recovered as a simple contract debt, the formal "document" or the award being suffic ent evidence of liability to pay.

(16.) Offences may in Scotland be prosecuted, and fines recovered, under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts, appeal being provided where imprisonment is awarded without option of fine, or fine or compensation adjudged

exceeding £5.

(17.) Regulates admissibility in evidence of documents framed, signed, or certified by sea-fishery officers under Convention, and fixes punishment for forging, or uttering a forgery of, an officer's signature.

(18.) For the purpose of jurisdiction under this Act, a boat is to be deemed a ship, and a foreign boat within exclusive British limits to be amenable as if a British boat.

(19.) Service of summons, etc., to be good if made on party personally. or at his last place of abode, or on board of boat to which he belongs.

(20.) 1. Master of sea-fishing boat to be liable for every offence committed by person belonging thereto, but to pay only compensation if he proves due diligence to enforce the Act, and that actual offender was another whom he has done his utmost to convict. 2. Fines or compensation to be recovered in ordinary way, or, if Court think fit, by distress or poinding and sale of the boat and her tackle, etc.; Court may, in lieu of distress, order detention of foreign boat.

or forfeiture may direct its application towards expense of proceedings. Balance to be paid into Exchequer.

(22.) Liability, criminal and civil, under other Acts and at common law not to be affected, provided no person is punished or required to pay compensation twice.

Application of Act.

(23.) Act may by Order in Council be made applicable to any convention with a foreign state made after

its commencement.

(24.) The Act 6 and 7 Vict. c. 79 to continue in force as regards French sea-fishing boats and persons belonging thereto within the seas between the British Islands and France, so far as outside exclusive British limits and not within the North Sea as defined by the Convention, until repealed and other provisions substituted, by Order in Council or otherwise.

(25.) Application of Act to foreigners outside exclusive British limits to be confined to the North Sea, as defined by the Convention, and to sea-fishing boats and seafishery officers there of foreign states bound by the Convention, but may be extended to other seas and to subjects of other states by Order in Council following upon future treaty. Save as above, Act to apply to the whole of the British Islands (including Man, Guernsey, Jersey, etc.), and seas surrounding the same. whether within or without exclusive fishery limits.

Supplemental.

(26.) Orders in Council to be published in the London Gazette, or as the Board of Trade may direct.

(27.) Section 170 of Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, substituted for section 200 of Act of 1853 in reference in section 18 of Sea Fisheries

Act, 1868.

(28.) Interpretation: "Sea-fishing" means fishing for every description both of fish and shell-fish, salmon excepted; "Sea-fishing boat" includes every vessel of whatever size, and in whatever way propelled, which is used by any person in seafishing, or in carrying on the business of a sea-fisherman; "Fishing implement" means any net, line, (21.) The Court adjudging any fine | float, barrel, buoy, or other instrument, engine, or implement used, or intended to be used, in sea-fishing.

(29.) Act to come into force by

notice in London Gazette.

(30.) Repeals absolutely portions of French Convention Act (6 and 7 Vict. c. 79), Sea Fisheries Act, 1868 (31 and 32 Vict. c. 45, secs. 25, 58, 71), and Fisheries (Oyster, Crab, and Lobster) Act, 1877 (40 and 41 Vict. c. 42, sec. 15); and repeals, subject to limitations, portions of Sea Fisheries Act, 1868 (31 and 32 Vict. c. 45, secs. 3-16, 20, 21, 59, 61, 63, and first schedule), and of Amendment Act (38 Vict. c. 15, sec. 3).

PUBLIC COMPANIES.

CHAP. 28. To Amend the Companies Acts, 1862 and 1867. August 20.

 Short title: Companies Act, 1883.
 Act to be construed as one with Companies Acts, 1862 and 1867; and (3.) To come into force on 1st

September 1883.

(4.) In liquidations under the Companies Acts there shall be paid in priority to other debts, the wages or salary (a.) of clerk or servant for four months prior to winding up, not exceeding £50; and (b.) of labourer or workman for two months. (5.) These to rank equally, and to abate equally in case of insufficiency of assets; and (6.) Liquidator to discharge same on receipt of sufficient assets, retaining only costs of administration, etc.

COMPANIES COLONIAL REGISTERS.

CHAP. 30. To Authorize Companies registered under the Companies Act, 1862, to keep Local Registers of their Members in British Colonies. August 20.

(1.) Short title: Companies (Colonial Registers) Act, 1883. Act to be construed as one with Companies Acts, 1862 to 1880, and to be cited with these as the Companies Acts,

1862 to 1883.

(2.) Definitions: "Company" means company registered under Companies Act, 1862, and having a capital divided into shares ("shares" including stock); "Colony" excludes United Kingdom, Isle of Man, and Channel Islands, but includes territories for time being vested in Her Majesty under Act of Parliament for the government of India, and any

plantation, territory, or settlement elsewhere within Her Majesty's dominions.

(3.) 1. Any company transacting business in a colony may, if authorized by its regulations as originally framed or as altered by special resolution, keep in such colony branch registers of members resident there.

Company to notify to registrar of joint stock companies situation of such registers, changes therein, and

discontinuance thereof.

- 3. Colonial Register shall be part of company's register of members and prima facie evidence of all particulars entered therein, and shall be kept as provided by Companies Acts, 1862 to 1880, save that advertisement of close of register shall be inserted in newspaper circulating where the register is kept, and that jurisdiction for rectifying the register and for punishing offences under section 32 of Companies Act, 1862, shall be exercised by colonial courts.
- 4. Company to transmit a copy of every entry in its colonial registers to its registered office, and keep there duplicate registers, which shall be subject to section 32 of the Companies Act, 1862, and be deemed part of the register of members.

5. Shares registered in colonial register to be distinguished from shares registered in the principal register, and no transaction respecting them, during continuance of the colonial register, to be registered save in it.

6. Company may discontinue any colonial register, and transfer entries therein to some other colonial register, or to the principal register.

7. Provisions as to stamp duties,—
(a.) Transfer of a share registered in a colonial register to be deemed a transfer of property situated out of United Kingdom, and, unless executed in United Kingdom, to be

exempt from British stamp duty.

(b.) Share or interest of deceased member registered in colonial register to be deemed part of his estate and effects situated in the United Kingdom, in respect of which probate must be granted or an inventory exhibited and recorded as if he were registered in the principal register.

 Company may make such other provisions as it thinks fit respecting the keeping of colonial registers.

WORKMEN'S WAGES.

CHAP. 31. To Prohibit the Payment of Wages to Workmen in Publichouses and certain other places. August 20.

(1.) Short title: Payment of Wages in Public-houses Prohibition Act, 1883.

(2.) "Workman" means any person engaged in manual labour, whether under or above 21 years of age, except domestic or menial servants and persons employed in or about mines to which the Coal Mines and Metalliferous Mines Regulation

Acts, 1872, apply.

(3.) No wages to be henceforth paid to any workman at or within any public-house, beer-shop, or place for the sale of any spirits, wine, cider, or other spirituous or fermented liquor, or any office, garden, or place belonging thereto or occupied therewith, save by the resident owner or occupier to his own bona fide employees. Every person contravening, or permitting contravention, to be guilty of an offence, an employer being liable for the contraventions of his paymaster, unless he prove use of all reasonable means to enforce the Act.

(4.) Offender liable, on summary conviction, to £10 penalty for each

offence.

CHEAP TRAINS.

CHAP. 34. To Amend the Law relating to Railway Passenger Duty, and to Amend and Consolidate the Law relating to the Conveyance of the Queen's Forces by Railway. August

(1.) Short title: Cheap Trains Act. 1883.

(2.) After commencement of this Act, railway passenger duty shall be

varied as follows :-

1. Fares not over 1d. a mile to be exempt; return or periodical tickets exempt only where ordinary fare for single journey is within that rate.

2. Duty to be at rate of 2 per cent. on fares over 1d. a mile between stations within a district certified by Board of Trade to be one continuous urban district containing not less than 100,000 inhabitants.

(3.) 1. If the Board of Trade believe that any passenger railway company or companies do not provide (a.) a sufficient proportion of

accommodation at fares within 1d. a mile, or (b.) sufficient workmen's trains at reasonable fares between 6 P.M. and 8 A.M., then the Board may make inquiry, or, if required, refer the matter to the Railway Commissioners, who shall deal therewith as if a reference under the Regulation of Railways Act, 1873. 2. The Board or Commissioners (as case may be), if on inquiry they hold that sufficient accommodation or workmen's trains are not provided, may order that they be so; and, 3. A company refusing or neglecting for one month to comply with such order, shall lose the benefit of this Act, until the Board certifies that the order has been complied with. 4. A company so ordered by the Board may within six months appeal to the Commissioners; and 5. The Board or the Commissioners may rescind or vary their own orders.

(4.) Prescribes the mode of calculating mileage, etc., of railway for the

purposes of this Act.

(5.) Fares shall be deemed within the rate of 1d. a mile which do not exceed 1d. for a single journey less than a mile, or, in greater distances, d. for every half mile, and ld. for any additional fraction not less than a quarter mile; children between three and twelve years of age to be charged one-half adult's fare, but not less than 1d.; children under three to go free. Fares declared by local or personal Acts consistent with passenger duty enactments hereby repealed shall be deemed fares within rate of 1d. a mile.

(6.) Prescribes the rates, being less than ordinary passenger rates, at which the Queen's forces, namely, the navy and the army (including reserves and auxiliaries), and the police, with their wives, children, luggage, baggage, etc., are to be conveyed by railway companies enjoy

ing the benefit of this Act.

(9.) Act to commence on 1st October 1883.

PUBLIC WORKS LOANS.

CHAP. 42. To grant Money for the purpose of Loans by the Public Works Loan Commissioners and the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland and the Irish Land Commission; and to Amend the Acts relating to the said Commissioners. and for other purposes. August 25.

COUNTERFEIT MEDALS.

CHAP. 45. For preventing the Sale of Medals resembling Current Coin. August 25.

(1.) Short title: Counterfeit Medal Act, 1883.

(2.) Any person who, without due authority or excuse (the proof whereof shall lie on him), makes, possesses, or offers for sale, or sells any medal, cast, coin, or metallic combination resembling in size, figure, and colour, or in the device thereon, any of the Queen's current gold or silver coin, or capable of being made to resemble such current coin by gilding, silvering, colouring, washing, or other like process, shall be punishable with imprisonment not exceeding one year, with or without hard labour.

PROVIDENT NOMINATIONS—SMALL INTESTACIES.

CHAP. 47. To Extend the Power of Nomination in Friendly and Industrial, etc., Societies, and to make further Provision for cases of Intestacy in respect of Personal Property of small amount. August 25.

 Short title: Provident Nomiuations and Small Intestacies Act, 1883.

(2.) Definitions: "Directors" mean. 1, in the case of a society or branch whose property is vested in trustees, the trustees for the time being: 2, in the case of a Post-Office Savings Bank and Bank Insurance, the Postmaster-General; 3, in any other case, the directing authority by whatever name it may be called; "Savings Bank" means a bank to which the Trustee Savings Bank Act, 1863, applies, and a Post-Office Savings Bank; "Society" includes a registered trade union; "Office" means the registered office of a society registered under the Friendly Societies, Industrial and Provident Societies, or Trade Union, Acts; the registered place of a registered branch under the Friendly Societies Acts; the office or head-office of a Trustee Savings Bank or Bank Insurance; the General Post-Office in the case of a Post-Office Savings Bank or Bank Insurance.

(3.) £100 to be substituted for £50 as the pecuniary limit to the "nomination," which may be made by a member of a society in favour of any

person as payee in a sum due by the society at the nominator's death, in the following enactments, viz.:—

Friendly Societies Act, 1875, § 15, (3) & (4); Industrial and Provident Societies Act, 1876, § 11, (5) & (6);

Trade Union Act Amendment Act, 1876, § 10;

Trustee Savings Bank Act, 1863, §§ 41-43; 7 & 8 Vict. c. 83 (Savings Banks, etc.). § 10; Government Annuities Act, 1882, § 6 (e).

(4.) Nomination may be partly printed, and if made in a book kept at the office shall be taken to be delivered at such office.

(5.) A savings bank depositor, not being under sixteen years of age, may, by writing under his hand delivered or sent to the office, nominate any person not an employee of the directors (unless the nominator's nephew, niece, or nearer relative) to be payee of any deposit not over £100 remaining due at his decease, and may similarly revoke or vary the nomination. On proof of the nominator's death, the directors shall pay the

deposit to the nominee.

(6.) In the Friendly Societies Act, 1875, sec. 15, (3), and in any nomination thereunder taking effect after the passing of this Act, the words "moneys payable by the society on the death of such member" shall include deposits under sec. 18 and accumulations under sec. 19 of that Act, with interest thereon. In the Industrial and Provident Societies Act, 1876, sec. 11, (5) and (6), and in any nomination thereunder taking effect after the passing of this Act, "shares" and "interest" respectively shall include loans and deposits under sec. 10 (2c) of that Act.

(7.) On the death, intestate and without nomination, of a member of a registered trade union entitled to a sum therefrom not over £100, such sum shall be payable without confirmation to the person who appears to a majority of the directors, upon evidence they may deem satisfactory,

to be legally entitled to it.

(8.) On the death, intestate and without nomination, of an illegitimate member of a society entitled to make a nomination, the directors may pay the sum which he might have nominated to the persons who, in the opinion of the majority of them, would have succeeded had he been legitimate. Failing such persons, Treasury shall dispose of deposit.

(9.) Subsequent claimants of money

thus paid away by directors shall have no claim against the society or savings bank, or the directors, but may sue the recipient of the money.

(10.) Provides against frauds on

the revenue,-

1. If the sum payable on the death of a member of a society or savings bank exceeds, after deducting funeral expenses, etc., £80, the directors shall not pay the same away save on production of a receipt for succession or legacy duty, or an inland revenue certificate that no duty is payable.

2. If the member's whole movable estate exceeds £100, any sum paid under this Act without confirmation shall notwithstanding be reckoned as part of the estate liable to probate duty, and the directors, before paying such sum, may require a statutory declaration from one of the claimants that the whole movable estate including such sum does not, after deduction of debts and funeral expenses, exceed £100.

CORRUPT AND ILLEGAL PRACTICES.

CHAP. 51. For the better Prevention of Corrupt and Illegal Practices at Parliamentary Elections. Aug. 25.

This Statute uses throughout the legal phraseology of England. But section 68 specially provides for its application to Scotland, and gives the necessary conversion of terms. In this abstract the phraseology is modified accordingly.]

Corrupt Practices.

(1.) Defines Treating, in substitution for section 4 of Corrupt Practices Prevention Act, 1854, which applies

to candidates only,-

1. Any person who by himself or another, before, during, or after an election, directly or indirectly provides, or pays wholly or in part for providing, any meat, drink, entertainment, or provision for any person. in order to influence that or any other person's vote, or on account of his having voted or refrained from voting, or being about to vote or refrain, shall be guilty of treating. 2. Elector corruptly accepting such entertainment shall be also guilty.

(2.) Defines Undue Influence. Every person who directly or indirectly, by himself or another, uses or threatens force or restraint, or the infliction of to induce or compel any person to vote or to refrain from voting, or on account of his having voted or refrained at any election, or who by abduction or fraudulent device impedes any elector's free exercise of the franchise, or thereby prevails on him to vote or to refrain, shall be

guilty of undue influence.

(3.) "Corrupt Practice" in this Act includes (I.) treating, and (II) undue influence as above defined: (III.) bribery and personation as defined in the Corrupt Practices Prevention Act, 1854, sections 2, 3; the Representation of the People (Scotland) Act, 1868, section 49; the Universities Election Amendment (Scotland) Act, 1881, section 2; and the Ballot Act, 1872, section 24 [see Schedule III. Part III., to this Act : and (IV.) aiding, abetting, and procuring commission of the offence of personation. Every such corrupt practice to be also a corrupt practice under the Parliamentary Elections Act, 1868.

(4.) Candidate for county or burgh. if reported to the Speaker by an election court under an election petition as having committed any corrupt practice, or having connived at any such practice, other than treating or undue influence, to be for ever incapable of sitting for such county or burgh, and to be further incapacitated as if convicted on indictment of a corrupt practice. (5.) Candidate so reported as guilty by his agents of corrupt practice, to be incapable of sitting for seven year.

(6.) 1. Person convicted on indictment of any corrupt practice to be punishable with one year's imprisonment or fine of £200, save, 2, in case of personation or abetting of personation, which is punishable with imprisonment, not exceeding two years, with hard labour. 3. Such person to be for seven years incapable of voting at any election, and of holding any public or judicial office, and to vacate any such office; 4, also to be for seven years incapable of sitting in House of Commons, and, if elected. to vacate seat.

Illegal Practices.

(7.) The following acts done in promoting an election to be, save in excepted cases, illegal practices:-The making, and also the accepting temporal or spiritual injury, in order | in knowledge of illegality, of any payment or contract for payment,
(a.) for conveyance of electors to or
from poll; (b.) to (or by) an elector
(save to an advertising agent in
course of business), for use of premises for exhibiting addresses,
notices, etc.; (c.) for any committeeroom in excess of number allowed by
Schedule I.

(8.) It is also illegal practice, save in excepted cases, for a candidate or his election agent, knowingly to incurelection expenses exceeding the maximum specified in Schedule I.

(9.) The following are also illegal practices; but if committed by an agent other than the election agent, do not affect candidate or avoid his

election,-

 Wilful voting by any prohibited person, or procuring such person to vote;
 Wilful publishing, to procure one candidate's return, of a false statement of another's withdrawal.

(10.) Person convicted summarily of an illegal practice to be punishable with fine of £100 and incapacity for five years of voting within county or

burgh where he offended.

- (11.) Section 11 (14.) of Parliamentary Elections Act, 1868, to be read as directing the Election Court under an election petition respecting any county or burgh, to report, not only as to corrupt practices, but also as to illegal practices. Candidate, if reported as having committed or considered at any illegal practice, to be for seven years incapable of sitting for such county or burgh, and further incapacitated as if convicted of such illegal practice; if reported guilty by his agents, to be incapable of sitting during the current parliament.
- (12.) Election commissioners appointed under the Election Commissioners Act, 1852, as amended, shall inquire and report on illegal, as well as on corrupt, practices.

Rilegal Payment, Employment, and Hiring.

(13.) Hiegal Payment. Any person knowingly providing money to pay or replace any expenditure incurred contrary to, or in excess of the maximum allowed by, this Act, shall, save in excepted cases, be guilty of illegal payment.

(14.) Illegal Hiring includes, 1, this prohibition does not apply the letting, lending, or employing any any part of such premises ordinarily carriage, horse, or other animal kept let as chambers, or for public meritage.

for purposes of hire, knowing that it is to be used for conveyance of electors to or from the poll; and also, 2, knowingly hiring, borrowing, or using the same. But, 3, an elector, or several electors jointly, may hire for their conveyance to or from poll; and, 4, no license shall be required for a carriage through its use gratuitously for conveying electors.

(15.) It infers guilt of Illegal Payment to procure a candidate's withdrawal by a payment or promise thereof, and also to withdraw on such

inducement.

(16.) It is also Illegal Payment, save in excepted cases, in promoting an election to make, and in know-ledge of illegality to accept, a payment or contract for payment on account of bands of music, torches, flags, banners, cockades, ribbons, or other marks of distinction.

(17.) It is Illegal Employment, save in excepted cases, in promoting an election to employ any person for payment or promise thereof in any capacity except as authorized in Schedule I., Parts I. and II., and for any person in knowledge of illegality to accept such employment before,

during, or after an election.

(18.) Every bill, placard, or poster having reference to an election must bear on its face the name and address of the printer and publisher. Any person contravening or causing contravention of this rule to be guilty, if a candidate or election agent, of illegal practice, otherwise to be liable on summary conviction to a fine of £100.

(19.) The prohibitions against certain payments and contracts and expenditure in excess of a maximum, are not to affect the rights of creditors ignorant of contravention.

(20.) It is Illegal Hiring to hire or use as election committee rooms, and also to let knowing the intention so to use, (a.) any premises licensed for sale of intoxicating liquor, wholesale or retail, to be consumed on or off premises; (b.) any premises, where such liquor is supplied to members of an association, etc., other than a permanent political club; (c.) refreshment rooms of any kind; (d.) any public elementary school drawing a parliamentary grant. But this prohibition does not apply to any part of such premises ordinarily let as chambers, or for public mer

ings, if it has a separate entrance and no direct communication with the licensed or refreshment rooms.

(21.) 1. Person convicted summarily of illegal payment, employment, or hiring, to be punishable with fine not exceeding £100. 2. Candidate or election agent personally guilty, to be guilty of illegal practice.

Excuse and Exception for Corrupt or Illegal Practice or Illegal Payment, Employment, or Hiring.

(22.) Election not to be void, or candidate incapacitated, where an Election Court reports his agents guilty of treating or undue influence or illegal practice of a trivial character, but exonerates the candidate personally and his election agent.

(23.) Excepted Cases. - Court of Session or Election Court, if satisfied, on application made and after notice given in the electing county or burgh, that an act or omission of a candidate, election or other agent or person, which would strictly be an illegal practice, payment, employment, or hiring, arose from inadvertence, accidental miscalculation, or other reasonable cause, and not from bad faith, may order such act or omission to be an "exception" from the provisions of the Act, and so relieve the person involved from the statutory consequences.

Election Expenses.

(24.) An election agent, and only one, who may, however, be the candidate himself, must be named for each candidate, and declared in writing to the returning officer on or before the nomination day, and forthwith publicly notified by the latter.

(25.) One sub-agent for each polling district may, in counties, be appointed by the election agent, and declared in writing to the returning officer one clear day before poll, and forthwith published by latter. Sub-agent's acts and defaults to affect himself and candidate as if he were election agent.

(26.) 1. Election agent within his county or burgh, and sub-agent within his district, must have an office published by returning officer. 2. Claims, summonses, etc., delivered there, addressed to agent, shall be deemed served on him, and he may be sued regarding election matters

in any court within whose jurisdiction the office is situate.

(27.) 1. Election agent, by himself or sub-agent, must appoint every paid polling agent, clerk, and messenger and hire every committee-room. 2. No contract as to election expenses can be enforced against a candidate unless made by himself, or his election agent or sub-agent; but his liability for agent's corrupt or illegal practice not to be affected.

(28.) 1. Except as permitted by the Act, no payment, advance, or deposit towards election expenses may be made, before, during, or after an election, by a candidate, agent, or other person, save through the election agent or his sub-agent. Money provided in gift, loan, advance, or deposit, must be paid to the candidate or election agent. 2. Contravention hereof to be illegal practice.

(29.) 1. Every payment towards election expenses, unless under 40s., must be vouched by a detailed bill

and receipt. 2. Save in excepted cases, every claim respecting election expenses is to be barred and not paid, unless sent to the election agent within 14 days after declaration of poll; and, 3, all election expenses incurred are to be paid within 28 days after declaration of poll. An election agent paying in contravention of either of these provisions to be guilty of an illegal practice. 6. But election not to be void nor candidate incapacitated, if election court exonerates him of sanctioning or conniving at the contravention.

7. Disputed Claims. — If election agent disputes, or refuses, or fails to pay within such 28 days a claim timeously sent in, it may be sued for in any competent court. 9. Also Court of Session may permit candidate or election agent to pay a claim disputed, or not timeously sent in, or sent to candidate and not to election agent. 10. Claims so allowed, and also claims decerned for, to be deemed timeously paid.

(30.) Claim against candidate or election agent the amount whereof only is disputed to be recovered as taxed by auditor of court.

(31.) Personal election expenses of candidate, not exceeding £100, may be paid by himself, and petty expenses, to an amount named, by a

person authorized by election agent. Further personal and petty expenses can be paid by latter alone.

(32.) Election agent's remuneration to be treated like other claims, both when disputed and otherwise.

- (33.) Return respecting election expenses and relative declaration (in terms of Schedule II.), to be transmitted by election agent to returning officer within 35 days after declaration of poll. Candidate must also transmit a declaration; and supplementary return must be transmitted within 7 days after a payment authorized subsequent to original return. Severe penalties enacted against failure, and also against false declarations.
- (34.) 1. "Authorized excuse" may be allowed to candidate or election agent by Court of Session or Election Court, for failure to transmit return and declaration, or for error, etc., therein, on proof that this occurred from illness, inadvertence, or otherwise consistently with good faith. Excuse when allowed to relieve from statutory consequences of matter excused.
- (35.) 1. Returning officer, within 10 days after receipt of return respecting election expenses, to publish at candidate's expense, in at least two newspapers circulating in the electing county or burgh, a summary thereof, with notice of time and place where same, and declarations, etc., may be inspected. 2. During two years any person may inspect them there on payment of 1s., copies being furnished at 2d. per 72 words.

Disqualification of Electors.

(36.) Person guilty of a corrupt or illegal practice or of illegal employment, payment, or hiring at an election, may not vote at such election: his vote shall be void.

(37.) Person incapacitated, under this or any other Act relating to corrupt practices, from voting at an election, whether for parliament or a public office, may not vote at any such election: his vote shall be

void.

(38.) 1. No person (except parties to election petition) to be reported by Election Court or Commissioners guilty of any corrupt or illegal practice, without opportunity of defence.

2. Person reported guilty by Election Commissioners may appeal, as

if against a summary conviction under this Act, to next Circuit Court of Justiciary for the district. 3. Or Lord Justice General may order such appeals to be heard by a judge on the rota for election petitions.

5. Person reported by Election Court or Commissioners guilty of a corrupt or illegal practice to be incapacitated as if convicted thereof at date of election. But report of Election Commissioners not to avoid election of candidate declared duly elected by

an Election Court.

6. Justice of Peace so reported guilty of corrupt practice may be removed from office; and 7. Advocate, law agent, or member of any profession, the admission to which is regulated by law, may be dealt with as for professional misconduct.

8. Licensed person, if convicted ot bribery or treating on his licensed premises, or reported as having knowingly suffered bribery or treating there, may be refused a renewal of license by the justices. These provisions (5 to 8) apply notwithstanding certificate of indemnity.

(39.) 1. "Corrupt and illegal practices list" to be made up annually by every county and burgh assessor, specifying names, descriptions, and offences of all persons incapacitated from voting by conviction or by report. 4. Claims and objections as to entries in this list to be competent like registration claims and objections; and, 5, to be similarly deter-6. Sheriff shall mined by sheriff. ex proprio motu, after opportunity of explanation, transfer from list of voters to this list names of incapacitated persons. 8. Corrupt, etc., list to be published with register of electors.

Proceedings on Election Petition.

(40.) 1. Election petition questioning an election for illegal practice (including any offence relative to election expenses' return and declarations) may be presented, (a.) within 14 days after receipt by returning officer of the last of said return and declarations, or after allowance of last authorized excuse; (b.) within 28 days after a payment or other illegal practice specifically alleged in the petition to have occurred subsequent to such receipt or allowance.

2. Within similar periods Court of Session may allow amendment, for

purpose of alleging illegal practices, of a petition under Parliamentary Elections Act, 1868.

(41.) Provides against corrupt withdrawal of election petitions.

(42.) Trial of election petition to continue de die in diem till concluded, and without change of judges, though the rota for the year should mean-

while expire.

(43.) 1. Advocate depute or sheriffcourt procurator-fiscal to attend
officially at trial of every election
petition, and to assist judge: further,
to report to Lord Advocate, with a
view to trial, persons charged under
judge's warrant with corrupt or
illegal practice, and others suspected
by himself who have not received

certificates of indemnity.

4. Person prosecuted before Election Court, if he appears, to be tried summarily, and on conviction to suffer the incapacities arising under this Act on indictment or otherwise, and to be further liable for a corrupt practice to six months' imprisonment or a fine of £200, and for an illegal practice to any fine under this Act. In case of corrupt practice, court must give option of jury trial; and, 5, where accused elects this or does not appear, or court thinks he should be tried elsewhere, they shall order his trial either on indictment or summarily, and may name a court to try him (which shall have jurisdiction accordingly), and shall take necessary steps to carry out this order.

(44.) Costs of election petition. 1. Election Court, exonerating the respondent from complicity in corrupt practices, may order the whole or any part of the costs to be paid (a.) by the electing county or burgh, if corrupt practices prevailed extensively at the election; (b) by any persons proved to have extensively engaged in or promoted corrupt practices, and failing recovery from them by either party to petition.

2. Election Court may order any person guilty of corrupt or illegal practice to pay in whole or part costs of proceedings before the court relative to the offence or to him.

3. Costs of petitions, etc., under the Parliamentary Elections Act, 1868, and this Act, to be taxed as costs between agent and client in Court of Session (which may make Acts of Sederunt).

Miscellaneous.

(45.) Lord Advocate, on being informed of any corrupt or illegal practices, to investigate and prosecute as

circumstances require.

(46.) Incapacity arising before or after this Act, under Corrupt Practices Prevention Acts or this Act, to cease on Court of Session being satisfied that it was inflicted owing

to perjury.

(48.) Conveyance by sea may be provided for county electors unable to reach their polling place without crossing the sea or a branch or arm thereof, and the payment for such conveyance may be added to the maximum expenses allowed by Act.

(49.) Election Commissioners appointed after passing of this Act not to inquire into corrupt practices

at elections prior thereto.

Legal Proceedings.

(51.) 1. Proceedings for corrupt or illegal practice or other offence under Corrupt Practices Prevention Acts or this Act to be commenced within one year of offence, or, in case of an Election Commission, within that period or within three months after Commissioners' report if later, but at latest within two years. 2. Issue of summons, etc., to be where accused absconds, service to be in other cases, deemed commencement of proceedings.

(52.) Charge of corrupt practice to warrant conviction of illegal practice; charge of illegal practice to be good although offence amounts to

corrupt practice, etc.

(53.) 1. Sections 10, 12, and 13 of Corrupt Practices Prevention Act, 1854, and section 6 of Corrupt Practices Prevention Act, 1863 (relating to bribery, etc.), to extend to prescutions on indictment for any corrupt practice, and to actions for pecuniary forfeitures under this Act.

 In prosecutions and in actions for pecuniary forfeitures under this Act, accused and husband or wife may, if they think fit, be examined

as ordinary witnesses.

(54.) Offences punishable summarily may be prosecuted in Sheriff Court under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts, 1864 and 1881, subject to appeal to Court of Justiciary.

(55.) Election Court Procedure. 1. In summary prosecutions Summary Jurisdiction Acts to apply, but no appeal allowed. 2. In cases where presecution on indictment is ordered. enactments as to charges before justices for indictable offences to apply as if court were a justice.

56.) Court of Session jurisdiction under this Act to be exercised by one of Divisions, or, subject to appeal therete, by judge to whom Division remits. Court may make Acts of

Sederant.

(58) Recovery of costs, etc.

Supplemental Provisions, Definitions, Savings, and Repeal.

(59.) 1. Witness before Election Court or Commissioners not to be excused from answering questions as incriminating or against privilege; but, if he answers all questions truly, to be entitled to a "certificate of indemnity" from Court or Commissioners. Answers not to be admissible in evidence against him save in a criminal proceeding for perjury. 2. Certificate shall protect recipient from proceedings for any offence under Corrupt Practices Prevention Acts, or this Act, but, 3, not from any incapacity under this Act, or civil proceeding to enforce it. Law agent in election petition, who was not concerned in the election, may not be examined on matters known to him only as agent in the petition.

(60.) Report of Election Court or Commissioners to state what persons guilty of corrupt or illegal practices have received certificates of indemnity, and to be laid before Lord Advocate with view to prosecution of

(SL) 1. Section 11 of Ballot Act, 1972, to cover any wilful misfeasance or contravention of this Act by returning officer, presiding officer, or clerk. 2. Section 38 of County Voters Registration (Scotland) Act, 1861, to cover any such misfeasance, etc., by an assessor.

(62.) 1. Notices by returning officer to be given as under Ballot Act.

2 Summons, etc., for purposes of this Act may be served personally or by leaving it at, or sending it by registered post letter to, the party's last known abode in the electing county or burgh, or otherwise as any court or commissioners may direct. 3. Amends Schedule II. to Ballot Act. 1872.

(63.) 1. Defines "candidate," and "candidate at an election." 2. A candidate nominated or declared by others without his consent is not to be liable as a candidate, unless he afterwards assents, or has been elected. He may, however, make an appropriate declaration respecting election expenses (Schedule II., Part II.); and the election agent must observe the provisions of the Act as

to election expenses.

(64.) General interpretation: "Election," unless qualified, means parliamentary election; "Committee room" does not include candidate's dwelling by reason only of his transacting election business with his agents there, nor any room or building by reason only of addresses being delivered therein; "Public office" means any office under the Crown, or under the charter of a city or municipal burgh, or under the Acts relating to municipal corporations, or to the poor law, or under the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, or under the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867, or under any amending Acts, or other Acts for time being in force relating to local government, etc. (however subordinate the official's position may be); "Judicial office" includes subordinate the official's the office of justice of peace; "Personal expenses" of a candidate includes his reasonable expenses of travelling and of living at hotels or elsewhere for the purposes of, and in relation to, the election.

(65.) 1. Schedule III. specifies the Corrupt Practices Prevention Acts.

nine in number.

2. Schedule IV. provides the short titles, Election Commissioners Act, 1852, for 15 and 16 Vict. c. 57, and Corrupt Practices Prevention Act, 1863, for 26 and 27 Vict. c. 29.

3. Short title of this Act: Corrupt and Illegal Practices Prevention Act, 1883. 4. This Act may be cited with the Acts in Schedule III. as the Corrupt Practices Prevention Acts, 1854 to 1883.

(66.) Repeals the Acts in Schedule V., reserving validity of things done and suffered and incapacities in-

(67.) Act to commence 15th October 1883; and (70.) To expire (along with enactments in Schedule III., Part I.), unless continued, on 31st December 1884.

SCHEDULE I.—LIMITS OF ELECTION EXPENDITURE.

Part 1. — Persons Legally Employed for Payment.

1. One election agent only.

2. In counties one sub-agent for each polling district.

3. One polling agent in each poll-

ing station.

- 4. In a burgh one clerk and one messenger for every 500 electors, and for any additional fraction of 500.
- 5. In a county, for the central committee room, one clerk and one messenger for every 5000 electors, and for any additional fraction of 5000.
 6. Also for each polling district, one clerk and one messenger for every 500 electors in the district, and for any additional fraction. These clerks and messengers may be employed in any district.

7. No paid election agent, subagent, polling agent, clerk, or mes-

senger may vote.

Part II.—Legal Expenses in Addition to Expenses under Part I.

- 1. Payments to returning officer under 38 and 39 Vict. c. 84.
 - 2. Candidate's personal expenses.
- 3. Printing, advertising, publishing, etc., addresses and notices.

 Stationery, messages, postage, and telegrams.

5. Expenses of public meetings.

In a burgh, the expenses of one committee room for every 500 electors, and for any additional fraction.

7. In a county, the expenses of a central committee room; and also, for each polling district, of one committee room for every 500 electors in that district.

Part III.—Maximum for Miscellaneous Matters.

This must not exceed £200, and must not be incurred in any manner involving an offence or prohibition.

Part IV .- Maximum Scale.

For the expenses under Parts I., II., and III., other than personal expenses and returning officer's charges,—

1. If the number of electors does not exceed 2000, the maximum amount shall be in a burgh £350, in a county £650; if it exceeds 2000, in a burgh £380, in a county £710, and an additional £30 in a burgh, and £60 in a county, for every complete 1000 electors above 2000.

Part V .- General.

2. Number of electors to be taken from the register.

3. Where there are two joint candidates, maximum expenses under Parts III. and IV. to be for each reduced by one-fourth, or, if there are more than two, by one-third.

4. Candidates to be deemed joint candidates who have the same election agent, or committee rooms, subagents, clerks, messengers, or polling agents, or who publish a joint address, circular, or notice: unless the joint employment be accidental or trivial. Joint candidature may cease; and an exception from the provisions of the Act shall be allowed where an excess of expenses above maximum for joint candidates arises owing to a candidate in good faith changing from joint to separate candidature, and vice versa.

BANKRUPTCY.

CHAP. 52. To Amend and Consolidate the Law of Bankruptcy. Aug. 25.

- (1.) Short title: Bankruptcy Act, 1883.
- (2.) This Act, which is designed to place the realization of bankrupt estates in England on a footing somewhat analogous to that existing in Scotland under the Act of 1856, does not, except where expressly provided, extend to Scotland or Ireland. The provisions affecting Scotland are alone noticed in this abstract.

(3.) Act to commence from and after 31st December 1883.

(14.) English Bankruptcy Court which makes a receiving order on a bankruptcy petition, if satisfied on application by official receiver, creditor, or other person interested, that a majority of the creditors in number and value reside in Scotland, and that from the situation of the debtor's property, or other causes, his estate ought to be distributed under the Bankrupt Laws of Scotland, may rescind the receiving order, and stay proceedings on, or dismiss, the petition, on such terms as court approves.

(27.) Such court may, on applica-

tion of official receiver or trustee, after a receiving order has been made, order examination in Scotland of the debtor or his wife, or of any person suspected to possess effects of debtor, or to be indebted to him, or of any person deemed capable of informing about debtor's proceedings.

(32.) Person adjudged bankrupt is, until discharged, disqualified in all parts of United Kingdom for (a.) sitting or voting in House of Lords, or being elected as a Scotch representative peer; (b.) being elected to or sitting in House of Commons; (c.) acting as justice of peace; (d.) or as provost, bailie, or councillor; (e.) or as member of parochial board, local authority, school board, etc.

(33.) Member of parliament adjudged bankrupt, and continuing disqualified for six months, to vacate seat, and new election to take place.
(34.) Provost, etc., immediately to

vacate office.

(54.) Certificate of appointment of trustee in English bankruptcy may in Scotland be registered and recorded as a conveyance or assignment of property; (83.) Such trustee may hold property, make contracts, sue and be sued in Scotland and elsewhere by the name of "the trustee of the property of [insert name], a

bankrupt."

(117.) Orders of courts having bankruptcy jurisdiction in England and Ireland to be enforced by like courts in Scotland as if made here; and orders of Scotch courts to be similarly enforced in England and Ireland. (118.) All British courts having bankruptcy jurisdiction to be auxiliary to each other; and an order of one court seeking aid of another to enable latter to exercise both its own and former's jurisdiction in matter referred. (119.) 1. Warrant of English Bankruptcy Court may be enforced in Scotland like a justice's warrant against one charged with indictable offence. 2. Search - warrant of such court for discovery of debtor's property may be executed like a search-warfant for stolen property.

(124.) Privilege of parliament not to protect one who commits an act of bankruptey. (135.) Affidavit for English Bankruptcy Court by person residing in Scotland may be sworn before a judge ordinary, magis-

trate or justice of peace.

FACTORIES AND WORKSHOPS.

CHAP. 53. To Amend the Law relating to certain Factories and Workshops. August 25.

 Short title: Factory and Workshop Act, 1883.

White-Lead Factories.

(2.) After 31st December 1883 every white-lead factory must be certified by inspector as conform to this Act.

(3.) Such factory shall not be so certified save on compliance with certain conditions (relative to ventilation of stacks and stoves, supply of washing materials, meal rooms, and acidulated drink for employees, and overall suits, etc., for workers at tanks, white beds, dry stoves, or rollers) specified in the Schedule to the Act, or with other conditions substituted by a Secretary of State.

(4.) On written application by occupier to chief inspector of factories, an inspector shall inspect, and, if satis-

fied, certify the factory.

(5.) An inspector may at any time notify any default to occupier of factory so certified; and if it be not timeously remedied, certificate may be suspended.

(6.) Occupier of factory carried on uncertified after 31st December 1883 to be liable to fine of £2 per day.

(7.) Special rules to be established in every factory by 1st January 1884, for guiding employees as to requirements of Act and preventing injury to health, and to have force of enactment. Failure of employee to observe these rules, and of occupier to secure observance, punishable with fines of

£2 and £5 respectively.

(8.) 1. Occupier must, within three months from passing of Act or opening of factory (if later), transmit to chief inspector for approval by Secretary of State proposed special rules.

2. These must, with notice that employees may send objections to chief inspector, be posted up in factory for two weeks before transmission, and must bear certificate to this effect.

3. Secretary of State may thereafter approve the rules, as amended by him, after notice to occupier. They shall then be established.

(9.) 1. Occupier may from time to time propose, and, through chief inspector, secure Secretary of State's approval of new or amended rules.
2. Similarly, Secretary of State may of himself establish such rules, after considering occupier's objections.

(10.) False statement by occupier as to posting up of rules and notices punishable with fine of £20. Failing due transmission of rules for approval, Secretary of State may himself establish rules.

(11.) Printed copies of all special rules in force in any factory must be kept posted up in conspicuous places therein, and supplied on application to any person affected by them. Penalty for non-compliance by occupier with this section, a fine of £10.

(12.) Penalty for defacing rules and notices posted up, a fine of £5.

Explanation of certain Provisions of Factory, etc., Act, 1878.

(13.) (a.) Section 53 of Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, only authorizes overtime employment of young persons or women on forty-eight days in all in any twelve months; in reckoning such forty-eight days, every day on which any young person or woman has been employed overtime is to be taken into account.

(b.) Section 56 of said Act only authorizes overtime employment of women on ninety-six days in all in any twelve months; and in reckoning such ninety-six days, every day on which any woman has been employed overtime is to be taken into account.

(14.) Notwithstanding sections 12 and 14 of said Act, employment of a child in an afternoon set, where dinner-time is not before 2 P.M., may begin at noon, provided the morning set ends then.

Bakehouses.

(15.) No room or place shall be let or occupied as a bakehouse which was not so let or occupied before 1st June 1883, unless the following regulations are complied with:—(I.) No watercloset, earthcloset, privy, or ashpit shall be within or communicate directly with the bakehouse; (II.) Any cistern for supplying water to the bakehouse shall be separate and distinct from any cistern for supplying water to a watercloset; (III.) No drain or pipe for carrying off fæcal or sewage matter shall have an opening within the bakehouse.

Contraventions punishable with fine of 40s., and 5s. per diem for continued contravention after conviction. (16.) A Court of Summary Jurisdiction, if satisfied on the prosecution of an inspector or local authority, that a bakehouse (whether or not in use before passing of this Act) is unfit on sanitary grounds for use as such, may fine occupier 40s., and on second conviction £5, and order him to remove ground of complaint within a time named, which may be subsequently extended. Failing compliance within such time, occupier to incur fine of £1 for every day that noncompliance continues.

(17.) 1. As respects retail bake-houses, this part of Act, and sections 3, 33, 34, and 35 of Factory and Workshop Act, 1878 (which relate to sanitary conditions), shall be enforced by local authority of the district, acting under Public Health Act of 1867, and not by a factory inspector. Local authority's medical officer of health shall exercise inspector's powers; and, 2. If he finds any child, young person, or woman employed in any retail bakehouse, shall apprize inspector of the district.

(18.) Act to be construed as one with the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878.

NATIONAL DEBT.

CHAP. 54. To make further Provision respecting the National Debt and the Investment of Moneys in the hands of the National Debt Commissioners on account of Savings Banks and otherwise. August 25.

Preamble narrates that, by the Sinking Fund Act, 1875, a fixed annual sum of £28,000,000 was charged on the Consolidated Fund as the permanent annual charge for the National Debt. Various annuities payable out of this charge will expire in 1885, including certain terminable annuities substituted, under the Savings Bank Investment Act, 1866, etc., for perpetual annuities held by the National Debt Commissioners on account of Trustee and Post-Office Savings Banks. The main object of the present Act is to convert into terminable annuities, similarly payable out of the permanent annual charge for the National Debt,-(I.) Additional perpetual annuities held on account of Trustee and Post-Office Savings Banks. The first terminable annuities so created are to amount to £3,600,000 annual value, divided into

three sets of £1,200,000 each, terminating within five, ten, and fifteen years respectively from 31st March 1884. On expiration of any terminable annuity, a new annuity for fifteen years is to be, by conversion of perpetual annuities, created of an anamount equivalent to the expiring terminable annuity and the interest on the permanent annuities newly converted. (II.) A capital stock not exceeding £40,000,000, being a portion of certain perpetual annuities, representing in all over £61,000,000 capital stock, standing to the account of the Paymaster-General of the Court of Chancery in trust for suitors. The annuities thus created are to be terminable within twenty years from 31st March 1884.

(1.) Short title: National Debt Act, 1883.

(9.) The new terminable annuities are to be applied as follows:—

1. Those payable to the National Debt Commissioners shall be applied, so far as representing interest, as the dividends on the perpetual annuities would have been applied, and, so far as representing principal, as moneys received on account of Trustee or Post-Office Savings Banks. 2. Those payable to the Paymaster-General shall be paid to the National Debt Commissioners, who shall thereout pay to him a sum equal to the dividends on the perpetual annuities had these remained unconverted, and shall invest the residue, with dividends and accumulations, in the purchase of perpetual annuities on account of the Supreme Court of Justice. 4. At the termination of the terminable annuities, the original perpetual annuities shall be replaced to the Paymaster General out of the purchased annuities, and, if necessary, other perpetual annuities created by the Treasury; but if the amount so purchased exceeds the amounts to be replaced, the surplus shall be cancelled as the Treasury may direct.

REVENUE.

CHAP. 55. To Amend the Law relating to the Customs and Inland Revenue, and to make other provisions respecting Charges payable out of the Public Revenue, and for other purposes. August 25.

(1.) Short title: Revenue Act, 1883.

PART I.—AMENDMENT OF LAW BE-LATING TO THE CUSTOMS.

(2.) Substitutes, as from 1st January 1884, the following provisions for certain repealed provisions of section 42 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, prohibiting importation of articles of foreign manufacture designed to pass as British goods:

1. The importation is prohibited of (a.) Articles of foreign manufacture not imported by or for, but bearing the name (or imitation or abbreviation of the name) and address or name and trademark of a manufacturer of, or dealer in, such articles, resident or in business in the United Kingdom; (b.) Articles of foreign manufacture bearing, either alone or in conjunction with other names or words, the name of a part of, or a place in, the United Kingdom, which name, in the opinion of the Commissioners of Customs, has been placed on such articles to impart to them a special character of British manufacture. 2. The proprietary rights of a manufacturer in any name or mark on foreign articles shall be proved as the commissioners may prescribe. 3. Foreign articles bearing the name of a British place not to be admissible though there be another place of same name abroad. 4. Names, addresses, and marks on cases, etc., of foreign articles to be deemed as on the articles themselves.

(3.) Warehoused foreign spirits may, in casks not under 9 gallons, be exported or removed to another warehouse for exportation only, may be imported into the Channel Islands, or exported thence abroad, without license from officers of Customs.

(4.) Diligence in execution of decree of Court of Session as Court of Exchequer, or of High Court of Justiciary, for recovery of penalties under the Customs Acts, to be competent not only against person, but against real and personal estate, whether vested in debtor or held in trust for him.

(5.) [This and the next section are substituted for section 46 of the Customs Act of 1876, repealed.] Vessels arriving inwards must come quickly to the place of unlading, and bring to at the stations for boarding officers, and after arrival must not remove, except with the knowledge of the proper officer, directly to some other place of mooring. Person in charge, whether master or pilot, failing compliance, to forfeit £20.

(6.) Master of a ship failing to provide accommodation on board for officers of Customs to forfeit £20.

(7.) [Substituted for corresponding proviso in section 47 of the Customs Act of 1876 repealed.] If officer of Customs lock, mark, or seal any stores on board a vessel arriving inwards, and such seal, etc., be broken, or stores secretly removed, either at port of arrivalorany other port, or on passage between ports, master to forfeit £20.

(8.) Burgh magistrate may hear informations under section 230 of

Customs Act of 1876.

(9.) Commissioners of Customs may extend to sea-fishing boats provisions of Customs Act of 1876, and any amending Act relative to ships.

(10.) All imported gold and silver plate, except articles exempt from assay or imported for private use, to be warehoused (actually or constructively) until assayed. If found to be of standard quality, to be, on payment of duties, stamped and cleared for home use; but otherwise to be rewarehoused (without being defaced as heretofore), and free for exportation for a month. Thereafter, or sooner if the importer desire, if not exported, to be cut and defaced by the proper officer and delivered duty free on payment of all proper charges.

(11.) This part of the Act to be construed as one with the Customs

Consolidation Act, 1876.

PART II. AMENDMENT OF LAW RE-LATING TO THE INLAND REVENUE.

(12.) Empowers land-tax commissioners, etc., under Taxes Manage-ment Act, 1880 (see section 26 (2) thereof), to meet and act without, as well as within, the division for which they act.

(14.) Declares that section 97 of the Taxes Management Act, 1880, applies only to removals from one parish to another within Scotland, removals from a parish in England or Ireland to a parish in Scotland being regulated by section 90.

(15.) Stamp duty (in lieu of duty under the Stamp Act, 1870), on mortgage or other security for payment or repayment of money not exceeding

£10, to be 3d.

PART III. MISCELLANEOUS.

(17.) Sections 76 to 82, inclusive, of the Bills of Exchange Act, 1882, to customer of any banker and intended to enable any person or body corporate to obtain payment from such banker of the sum mentioned in such document, as if the same were a cheque. Paymaster-General and Queen's Remembrancer to be deemed bankers within this section, and public officers drawing on them to be deemed customers.

(18.) Amends certain provisions of the Consolidated Fund (Permanent Charges Redemption) Act, 1873.

PART IV. REPEALS.

(19.) Sections 42, 46, 47, 92, 93, 98, and 249 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, are, saving acts and consequences of acts already done, wholly or partially repealed.

EDUCATION IN SCOTLAND.

- CHAP. 56. To Amend the Laws relating to Education in Scotland, and for other purposes connected therewith. August 25.
- (1.) Short title: Education (Scotland) Act, 1883. This Act and the Education Acts of 1872 and 1878 to be cited together as the Education (Scotland) Acts, 1872 to 1883.

(2.) Act, save where otherwise provided, to commence 1st January 1884.

- (3.) Definitions: In the Education Acts, sheriff includes sheriff-substitute.
- A Court of Summary Jurisdiction under this Act shall consist of a sheriff, sitting either in the ordinary Sheriff Court or at any place where small debt circuit courts are held, or one or more justices of the peace sitting in open court, or the provost or bailie of any royal or parliamentary burgh, or a magistrate of police of any police burgh, or a judge of police sitting in the police court.
- (4.) Section 69 of the Education Act of 1872 to be read as enacting that every parent must educate his children who are between five and fourteen years of age, and who have not obtained a certificate of proficiency in reading, writing, and arithmetic, under section 73 of that Act as amended.
- (5.) 1. Section 70 of the Education Act of 1872 to be read as enacting that the school board officer shall report what parents have failed and omitted (not, as in that Act, " have extend to any document issued by a failed and omitted and are failing

and omitting") to educate their children; and that the board shall certify of a defaulter simply that "he has been without reasonable excuse failto educate (not, as in that Act, has been and is grossly and without

reasonable excuse failing

2. Section 22 of the Education Act of 1878 to be read as including the case of parents unable from poverty to pay for the elementary education of children between five and fourteen (not thirteen) years of age, and as empowering the sheriff, in ordering a parochial board to pay fees for such parents, to order further that the education shall be given "at any public or inspected school selected by the parent, or, failing such selection,

appointed by the sheriff."

(6.) After 1st September 1885, no one may take into his employment a child of ten and not above fourteen years of age, unless such child, 1, has passed the third standard and is attending a public or inspected school under section 23 of the Factory and Workshop Act, 1878, or under any minute of the Scotch Education Department fixing the number of attendances at school to be required of such children; or, 2, has obtained a certificate for reading, writing, and arithmetic, under section 73 of the Education Act of 1872 as amended in next section. In no case may a child under thirteen be taken into full-time employment in a factory or workshop under the said Factory and Workshop Act of 1878; but a child at service before 1st September 1885, who attends school in accordance with that Act, may be employed after that date.

(7.) A certificate for reading, writing, and arithmetic under section 73 of the Education Act of 1872 shall not be granted to a child unless he has passed the fifth standard.

(8.) Passing a standard, in the two preceding sections, signifies passing in each of the three subjects of reading, writing, and elementary arithmetic as prescribed by the minutes of the Scotch Education Department for 1883 or any subsequent year.

(9.) A school board, after due warning, may complain to a Court of Summary Jurisdiction regarding a parent who, without reasonable excuse, fails to educate his child or to secure his child's regular attendance

upon issue an "attendance order," requiring the child's regular attendance at some public or inspected school willing to receive him and named in the order, such school to be selected by the parent, or, faiting

him; by the court.

(10.) Where an attendance order is not complied with without reasonable excuse, a Court of Summary Jurisdiction, on complaint by the school board, not to be repeated at less intervals than one month, may impose a penalty of 20s., with expenses, or fourteen days' imprisonment.

(11.) Defines "reasonable excuse" under the two preceding sections, and sections 70 and 72 of the Education Act of 1872, namely,-

1. Child's sickness, or other unavoidable cause of non-attendance.

2. His residence more than three miles by nearest road from a public

or inspected school.

(12.) A school board informed by any person of any child in their district as not receiving elementary education, must proceed under sections 9 and 10, unless for reasons to be set forth in their minutes.

(13.) The Scotch Education Department may, after inquiry and notice, require two or more school boards, whether of parishes or burghs or parishes and burghs, to combine for providing and maintaining a common school or schools, and, failing timeous compliance by the boards, may compel them by petition and complaint in the Court of Session; the Department may also combine, on such terms and conditions as they approve, any district or districts having no public schools with district, whether adjoining burghal or landward, or both.

(14.) Repeals section 23 of the Education Act of 1878, and substi-

tutes as follows :-

Prosecutions for penalties or orders under the Education Acts or this Act may take place under the Summary Jurisdiction Acts before a Court of Summary Jurisdiction (whose decision shall be final, subject to the provisions of the Summary Prosecutions Appeals (Scotland) Act, 1875). Any nominee of the school or any inspector or subboard, inspector of factories, workshops, or mines, as case may be, may prosecute, at school; and the court may there- and no expenses can be awarded against such prosecutor. No member of the school board may act as a member of the court.

(15.) Saves right to proceed against defaulters under other enactments instead of under this Act.

PATENTS, DESIGNS, AND TRADE MARKS.

CHAP. 57. To Amend and Consolidate the Law relating to Patents for Inventions, Registration of Designs and of Trade Marks. August 25.

PART I .- PRELIMINARY.

(1.) Short title: Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks Act, 1883.

(2.) Division into parts. (3.) Act to commence from and after 31st December 1883.

PART II .- PATENTS.

Application for and Grant of Patent. -(4.) Any person, whether British subject or not, and two or more persons jointly, may apply for patent. (5.) Application must be in prescribed form, sent to Patent Office in prescribed manner, and must declare applicants' discovery and possession of an invention to be patented. It must also be accompanied by a specification, either provisional, describing nature of invention, or complete. detailing nature and mode of performing it, which must commence with title, and, when complete, end with distinct statement of invention, and have drawings attached, if required. (6.) Comptroller General of Patents, Designs, and Trade Marks to have every application reported upon by an examiner. (7.) 1. If report unfavourable to form, etc., of application, comptroller may require amendment, subject to an appeal to the law officer. 4. Comptroller to intimate acceptance of application to applicant. 5. If before patent on one application is sealed, a second application is lodged with a specification similarly titled, and examiner re-ports that the two inventions are identical, comptroller, after notice to the applicants, may determine the fact, subject to appeal to law officer, and may refuse patent to second applicant.

(8.) Application to be deemed abandoned unless complete specification is lodged within nine months.

tion follows provisional one, examiner is to report on its form, and on identity of invention it describes. If report adverse, specification may be refused till amended, subject to appeal to law officer. 4. Failing its acceptance within twelve months after application, application (unless appeal is pending) to become void. 5. Examiners' reports to be private, unless a court orders their production in the interests of justice.

(10.) Complete specification, when accepted, to be advertised by comptroller, and with application and drawings to be open to public in-

spection.

(11.) 1. Within two months of advertisement any one may intimate at Patent Office opposition to patent, but only on ground that applicant obtained the invention from him or his authors, that it has been already patented, or that it has been reported to comptroller as identical with one in a specification similarly titled and previously lodged. 2. Comptroller to intimate opposition to applicant, and, on expiry of the two months, after hearing parties, to decide the case, subject to appeal to law officer, who may take the aid of an expert.

(12.) Failing successful opposition, patent to be sealed as soon as may be, and not after fifteen months from application, save in case of delay by appeal or opposition, or of appli-cant's death. Within twelve months of last event, patent may be sealed to his legal representatives.

(13.) Patent to bear date of application; but no infringement to be actionable before publication of complete specification. Also sealing of one patent not to prevent sealing of another on an earlier application for same invention.

Provisional Protection means (14.) Right to use and publish an invention between the date of an accepted application and the sealing of a patent, without prejudice to latter.

Protection by Complete Specification. (15.) On acceptance of complete specification, applicant has, until sealing or expiry of time for sealing patent, all privileges and rights of a patentee, save that he cannot sue for infringement unless and until patent is granted.

Patent.-(16.) Patent to extend to United Kingdom and Isle of Man; (9.) 1. Where complete specifica- and (17.) To endure for fourteen years, but to cease on failure to make In case of prescribed payments. secidental failure, comptroller may, for a fee not over £10, grant three months' enlargement of time for payment, but court may refuse damages for an infringement committed after such failure and before enlargement.

Amendment of Specification.—(18.) 1. Leave to amend specification and drawings, by disclaimer, correction, or explanation, may from time to time be requested in writing by applicant or patentee. 2. Request shall be advertised, and within a month any one may intimate at Patent Office opposition thereto, which the comptroller shall notify to person making request. 3. Thereafter, whether there is opposition or not, comptroller shall decide, subject to appeal to law officer, whether and what conditions amendment should be allowed. 8. Amendment must not enlarge or change invention originally claimed, but, 9, when allowed, to be conclusive save in case of fraud, and to be deemed part of 10. This section is specification. not to apply pending an action for infringement or other legal proceeding.

(19.) In proceedings for infringement or revocation, court may grant delay to enable patentee to amend

specification by disclaimer. (20.) Amendment when allowed to bar damages for use of invention prior thereto, unless patentee instructs that his original claim was

honestly and skilfully framed. (21.) Every amendment to be advertised.

Compulsory Licenses. -(22.) Board of Trade may compel a patentee who refuses licenses on reasonable terms to grant same, where (a.) the patent is not being worked in United Kingdom, (b.) the public's requirements in respect of the invention cannot be supplied, or (c.) any one is prevented from advantageous use of an invention which he possesses.

Register of Patents.—(23.) Register to be kept at Patent Office of names and addresses of patentees, of notices of assignments, licenses, amendments, extensions, revocations, etc., and to be prima facie evidence. Copies of deeds, licenses, etc., must be lodged for filing.

Fees.—(24.) The following scale is

prescribed:-

(a.) Up to sealing. On application for provisional protection. On filing complete specification, . Or, on filing complete specification with first application. . (b.) Further before and of four years from date of patent. On certificate of renewal, .

(c.) Further, before end of seven years, or, in case of putents granted after commencement of Act, eight years from date of patent. On certificate of renewal, Or in lieu of the fees of £50 and £100, the following annual fees:-

Before end of 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th years. £10 a year.

Before end of 8th and 9th years, £15 a year. Before end of 10th, 11th, 12th, and 13th years, £20 a year.

Board of Trade, with consent of Treasury, may reduce these fees, and also exact other necessary fees.

Extension of Term of Patent -(25.) 1. Patentee, after prescribed advertisement, may, not later than six months before patent expires, petition Her Majesty in Council for ex-tension of term. 2. Caveat against this may be entered by any one. 3. Petition to be referred to Judicial Committee of Privy Council, and should they report that patent has not been adequately remunerative, its term may be extended, or a new patent granted for seven, or in exceptional cases fourteen, years.

Revocation. - (26.) Revocation in Scotland to be by action of reduction at instance of Lord Advocate, or, with his concurrence granted on just cause, of a party interested (i.e., one alleging that he or his authors have been defrauded by the patent, or are true inventors of, or have made prior public use of, the invention). Where patent is revoked for fraud, true inventor may obtain patent for its unexpired term.

Crown.-(27.) Patent to bind Crown, but Crown authorities and their contractors and agents may use invention on terms to be, failing agreement, settled by the Treasury.

Legal Proceedings. — (28.) In infringement and revocation cases, court (including Court of Appeal and Judicial Committee) may call in the aid of a skilled assessor; and action for infringement shall be tried without jury unless court direct otherwise. (29.) Full grounds of action and defence must be disclosed in (30.) In action for inpleadings. fringement, court may grant interdict, order inspection, etc.

If in such action court certifies that validity of the patent came in question, pursuer succeeding in a subsequent action shall get expenses as between agent and client. (32.) Person aggrieved by another's groundless threats (by advertisement, etc.) of action for infringement may obtain interdict and damages.

Miscellaneous.—(33.) Patents to be in prescribed form, and to be granted for one invention only, but may contain more than one claim, and cannot be questioned on ground of comprising more than one invention.

(34.) On death of an inventor, his legal representatives may apply for

patent within six months.

(35.) Fraudulent application followed by provisional protection and use and publication not to prejudice patent of true inventor.

(36.) Assignment of patent may be limited to a particular part of the United Kingdom or Isle of Man.

(37.) Duplicate patent may sealed if loss of original satisfactorily accounted for.

(38.) Law officers to regulate pro-

cedure before them.

(39.) Inventor's right to protection and patent not to be prejudiced by exhibition, description, or use of his invention at an exhibition certified as industrial or international by Board of Trade, or by its use without his consent elsewhere during such exhibition, provided (a.) exhibitor gives comptroller prescribed notice of intention to exhibit, and (b.) patent is applied for within six months from opening of exhibition.

(40.) Provides for publicity of patented inventions by sale and circulation of -1, an official illustrated journal thereof and of decided patent cases, etc.; 2, complete printed specifications and drawings of all

patents; 3, indexes and abridg-(41.) Existing Patent ments, etc. Museum to be transferred to Science and Art Department; (42.) Which may require patentees to furnish

models on payment of cost.

(43.) 1. Patent not to prevent use of invention in, or for navigation of, foreign vessels within British jurisdiction, except use in manufacturing goods for British sale or export. 2. This privilege to be withheld where a foreign state withholds similar privileges from British vessels.

Such inventions may, without prejudice to a subsequent patent, be communicated to such Secretary with the view having their merits investigated.

Existing Patents.-(45.) 1. Application procedure under Act to rule only cases after its commencement. Existing patents and applications to be unaffected by provisions touching Crown and Compulsory Licenses: but, 3, to be subject to all other provisions (including amount and time for payment of fees). 4. Instruments relating to existing patents to be filed at new Patent Office.

Definitions .- (46.) Defines "invention" as any manner of new manufacture, the subject of letters patent and grant of privilege within sec. 6 of Statute of Monopolies (21 James I., c. 3), including an alleged invention.

PART III.-DESIGNS.

Registration of Designs-(47.) New or original design not previously published in United Kingdom may be registered on application of professed proprietor sent to Patent Office in prescribed form and manner, and stating nature of design and class of goods in which it is to be registered. 4. Same design may be registered in more than one class. the proper class being decided by comptroller. 6. He may refuse registration, subject to appeal to Board of Trade. (48.) Applicant to furnish to comptroller's satisfaction prescribed copies of drawings, photographs, or tracings sufficient to identify design, or, should he prefer, exact representations. (49.) Comptroller to grant certificate of registration and also copies on loss, etc., of original.

Copyright in Registered Designs .-(50.) 1. Proprietor of design to have copyright therein for five years from registration. 2. But registration and copyright may be cancelled if prescribed exact representations are not furnished to comptroller before sale of any articles bearing design,

(51.) Copyright also to cease (unless due diligence proved) if any such articles are sold unmarked with prescribed mark, words, or figures. (52.) (44.) Inventor of any improvement | 1. During existence of copyright. design can be inspected only by proprietor or person authorized either by him or by comptroller or court, and may not be copied. 2. After copyright expires, design may be inspected and copied by any one paying fee. (53.) Comptroller to inform any inquirer, who identifies a particular design, whether and in what class it is registered, giving date of registration, and name and address of proprietor. (54.) If registered design is used in manufacture abroad and not used in this country within six months of registration, copyright shall cease.

Register of Designs.—(55.) Register to be kept at Patent Office of names and addresses of proprietors, of notices of assignment, etc., and to be prima facie evidence.

Fees. (56.) Scale to be prescribed by Board of Trade, with consent of

Treasury.

Industrial and International Exhibitions.—(57.) Proprietor's right to register design not to be prejudiced by its being exhibited at an exhibition certified as industrial or international by Board of Trade, or by its being, without his consent, exhibited elsewhere, or a description of it published during such exhibition, provided (a.) exhibitor or publisher gives comptroller prescribed notice of his intention, and (b.) registration is applied for within six months from opening of exhibition.

Legal Proceedings. — (58.) Person who (a.), without proprietor's license or written consent, applies a copyright design or any fraudulent or obvious imitation thereof in the class of goods in which it is registered for purposes of sale to any article or substance, or (b.) publishes or exposes for sale any article or substance so treated, knowing that proprietor has not consented, shall forfeit to proprietor for every offence a sum not exceeding £50, recoverable as an ordinary debt. (59.) Reserves proprietor's right to bring action of damages for matters provided for in preceding section.

Definitions.—(60.) "Design" means any design applicable to any article of manufacture, or to any substance artificial or natural, or partly both, whether design is for pattern, shape, configuration, ornament, or two or more of such purposes, and by whatever means it is applicable, manual,

mechanical, or chemical, separate or combined, not being a design for a sculpture under Sculpture Copyright Act, 1814: "Copyright" means the exclusive right to apply a design to any such article or substance in the class or classes in which the design is registered: (61.) Proprietor of design includes (i.) Author, (ii.) Person for whom design is executed for good or valuable consideration, (iii.) Person acquiring for such consideration a design or the right, exclusive or not, to apply it to an article or substance as aforesaid, (iv.) Proprietor by devolution of design or right of applying it.

PART IV .- TRADE MARKS.

Registration of Trade Marks.—(62.)

1. Trade mark may be registered on application of professed proprietor sent to Patent Office in prescribed form and manner, accompanied by prescribed number of representations of the mark, and stating particular goods or class of goods for which it is to be registered. 4. Comptroller may refuse registration, subject to appeal to Board of Trade, who may either decide question or refer it to the court. (63.) Application to lapse if uncompleted within twelve months owing to applicant's default.

(64.) 1. Trade mark must contain either—(a.) Name of an individual or firm impressed in some distinctive manner; or (b.) Signature of the individual or firm seeking registration; or (c.) Distinctive device, mark, brand, heading, label, ticket, or fancy word or words not in common use.

2. There may be added to these any letters, words, figures or combinations thereof.

3. Any distinctive words, letters, figures or combinations used as trade mark before 13th August 1875, may be registered under this

Act.

(65.) Trade mark must be registered for particular goods or classes of

goods.

(66.) Several trade marks of one proprietor may be registered as a series in one registration if, while resembling each other in material particulars, they differ in statement—(a.) of goods for which they are to be used, (b.) of numbers, (c.) of price, (d.) of quality, (e.) of names of places. Series to be transmissible only as a whole, but otherwise each mark to be treated as if separately registered.

(67.) Trade mark may be registered in any colour, and shall confer exclusive right of use in that or any other colour. (68.) Application for registration to be advertised by comptroller. (69.) Within two months thereafter any one may intimate opposition at Patent Office, and then applicant must lodge counter-statement within two months further, and opponent give security for costs within fourteen days after that. Thereupon the case shall stand for determination of court.

(70.) Registered trade mark to be transmissible only with, and to be determinable with, goodwill of busi-

ness concerned.

(71.) Where several persons claim same trade mark, comptroller may refuse registration until their rights have been decided, and may submit these to the court. (72.) Save where court recognises joint-ownership, comptroller not to register for same description of goods a mark identical with, or having a misleading resemblance to, one already registered. (73.) Misleading words or scandalous

design not to be registered.

(74.) 1. The following may be registered as additions to trade marks, (a.) If trade mark used before 13th August 1875, any distinctive device, mark, brand, heading, label, ticket, letters, words, or figures, though common to trade in the goods con-"Common" here means cerned. publicly used by more than three persons; (b.) If trade mark not used before 13th August 1875, any distinctive word or combination of words, though common to trade in the goods concerned. 2. Exclusive use of common particulars must be disclaimed in application.

Effect of Registration.—(75.) Registration to be equivalent to public use, and (76.) Prima facie evidence of right to exclusive use, conclusive evidence after five years. (77.) Interdict and damages for infringement not to be allowed unless mark has been registered under this or a previous Act, or unless, in case of a mark in use before 13th August 1875, registration has been refused.

Register of Trade Marks.—(78.) Register to be kept at Patent Office of names and addresses of proprietors, of transmissions, etc.

(79.) Every fourteen years after production of a st registration, upon notice from compof proprietorship.

troller, a prescribed fee must be paid, under pain of removal from register. Marks so removed may be restored on payment of additional fee, and all removed marks are to be deemed as already registered in applications for registration within five years.

PART V .- GENERAL.

(83.) Board of Trade, with approval of Treasury, to appoint officials, etc.

(84.) Patent Office to have official seal.

(85.) No notice of trust to enter any register kept under this Act.

(S6.) Registration may be refused of an illegal or immoral invention,

design, or trade mark.

(87.) Provides for registration of assignees and others in right of patents, registered designs, or trade marks. Registered proprietor for time being is empowered (saving equities and registered rights), absolutely to assign or otherwise deal with the patent, design, or trade mark.

(88.) Registers to be open to public inspection, and certified copies of entries to be furnished on request.

(89.) Copies of documents filed, of entries, etc., when certified and sealed, to be evidence in all courts.

(90.) 1. Register may be rectified by court on application of person aggrieved by an omission or entry. 2. Incidentally in such proceeding questions of fact may be decided and damages awarded.

(91.) Clerical error in application for, or in name style or address of registered proprietor of, patent, etc., may be corrected by comptroller on written request and payment of fee. Similarly the entry or part of entry of a trade mark may be cancelled on production of a statutory declaration of proprietorship.

(92.) Non-essential additions or alterations to registered trade marks may be allowed by court after hearing comptroller. If allowed, to be registered.

(93.) Making false entry in register, or false copy of entry, or tendering same in evidence, to be a crime and

(94.) Comptreller shall hear applicant for patent, etc., before exercising adversely any discretionary power; and (95.) May, in case of doubt or difficulty, apply to law officers. (96.) His certificate in matters authorized by Act to be prima facie evidence.

(97.) Applications, notices, etc., required by Act, may be sent by pre-paid post letter, being held as delivered in due course of post.

(98.) Documents, fees, etc., due at Patent Office on Christmas, Good Friday, Saturday, Sunday, Bank of England heliday, or public fast or thanksgiving day, may be lodged or paid on next business day.

(99.) Declarations and other acts required under Act may be made by guardians or judicial factors for incapable persons, such as infants and

lunatics.

(100.) Printed and sealed copies of all specifications, drawings, and amendments hereafter left at Patent Office to be transmitted to Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art, and also to Enrolments Office of Chancery Division in Ireland and Rolls Office in Isle of Man, within twenty-one days after acceptance. Certified copies of these to be furnished on request, and to be conclusive evidence in all courts.

(101.) Board of Trade may make general rules for regulating business of Patent Office, etc., including classification of goods for purposes of designs and trade marks. Rules to have statutory effect unless annulled

by Parliament.

(102.) Annual report respecting execution of Act to be submitted to

Parliament by comptroller.

International and Colonial Arrangements.— (103.) Arrangements may be made with any foreign state for mutual protection of inventions, designs, and trade marks, and enabling an applicant for foreign protection to obtain, by ordinary procedure, patent or registration under this Act, bearing date of foreign pro- | Money Orders Act of 1880 shall be

tection, in priority to other applicants, provided he apply, in case of patent within seven months, in case of design or trade mark within four months, after his foreign application. POST OFFICE (MONEY ORDERS).

CHAP. 58. To Amend the Post-Office. (Money Orders) Acts, 1818 and 1880, and Extend the same to Her Majesty's Dominions out of the United Kingdom. August 25.

(1.) Alters the form of order under the Money Orders Act of 1880, in terms of Schedule I.

(2.) An order issued under the

for the amount, prescribed in regulations made from time to time by the Postmaster-General, not exceeding 20s., and the poundage thereon shall not exceed 2d. [This section, when read in conjunction with section 8, which repeals the table of amounts and poundages of orders contained in section 1 of the Act of 1880, has the effect of leaving the matter of amount and poundage entirely in the discretion of the Postmaster-General.]

(3.) Postmaster-General may authorize any officer of the Crown to issue money orders under the Act of

1880.

- (4.) The Money Order Act of 1880, as hereby amended, shall apply, both in regard to punishments and otherwise, to any arrangement consistent therewith, made with any British Possession outwith the United Kingdom, for transmission of small sums through the post; but the Postmaster-General's regulations as to such orders, and the poundage, periods of payment, etc., may differ from those relating to other orders.
- (5.) Act to commence 1st January 1884.
- (6.) Act to be construed as one with the Post-Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 and 1880.
- (7.) Short title: Post-Office (Money Orders) Act, 1883. The Act may be cited along with the Acts of 1848 and 1880 as the Post Office (Money Orders) Acts, 1848 to 1883.

(8.) Repeals the first proviso in section 1 of the Money Orders Act of 1880, and also the schedule to that

Act.

AGRICULTURAL HOLDINGS.

CHAP. 62. For Amending the Law relating to Agricultural Holdings in Scotland. August 25.

Compensation for Improvements.

(1.) Tenant who has made on his holding any of the improvements after specified, shall, after commencement of this Act, be entitled, on quitting at determination of a tenancy, to obtain from the landlord as compensation such sum as fairly represents the value of the improvement to an incoming tenant. In estimating such value, improvement due to inherent capabilities of soil not to be included.

The improvements falling under the Act are as follows:—

Part I.—Improvements to which consent of landlord is required.

1. Erecting or enlarging building.

2. Formation of silos.

3. Laying down permanent pasture.

4. Making of water meadows or works of irrigation.

5. Making of gardens.

6. Making or improving of roads

or bridges.

 Making or improving of watercourses, ponds, wells, or reservoirs, or of works for supply of water for agricultural or domestic purposes.

Making of permanent fences.
 Reclamation of waste land.

As to Improvements executed before the Commencement of Act.

(2.) No compensation under this Act shall be payable for improvements executed before its commencement, except to a tenant quitting after commencement, in respect of—

1. An improvement in Part III. executed by him within ten years before commencement, apart from obligation and without right by contract or custom to compensation:

2. An improvement in Part I. or Part II. executed by him within ten years before commencement, without right to compensation by contract or custom, where the landlord, within one year after commencement of Act, consents in writing to the improvement.

As to Improvements Executed after the Commencement of Act.

(3.) Improvements in Part I. -

Compensation under this Act shall not be payable unless landlord, or his agent duly authorized, before execution of an improvement and after passing of the Act, consent in writing to its execution. Consent may be unconditional, or may embody an agreement for compensation, which shall then be substituted for

compensation under Act. (4.) Improvement in Part II. -Compensation shall not be payable unless tenant between three and two months before beginning improvement give to landlord or his agent notice in writing of his intention and of the proposed manner of executing it. Thereupon (I.) landlord and tenant may agree on terms, and fix compensation to be substituted for compensation under Act; or (II.) Landlord may (unless notice is previously withdrawn) undertake to execute improvement, charging tenant and recovering as rent not more than £5 per cent. per annum on his outlay, or such annual sum as will repay the outlay, with interest at 3 per cent. per annum, in 25 years. (III.) Failing such agreement or undertaking, and also failing the landlord's timeous implement of such undertaking, tenant may execute the improvement himself and obtain compensation under Act. Express limitation in a lease current at passing of the Act of outlay on improvement in Part II. is not to be exceeded in a claim for compensation under Act. Notice may be dispensed with by agreement in terms of a lease or

otherwise. (5.) All specified improvements .-Under a lease current at commencement of Act, specific compensation provided by written agreement or custom shall be substituted for compensation under Act, although the improvement is executed after commencement.

Improvements in Part III.—Under a lease beginning after commencement of Act, compensation, if fair and reasonable in the circumstances, secured to tenant by any particular agreement in writing, shall be payable, and not compensation under Same rule to apply to a lease current at commencement of Act, where specific compensation for an improvement is not provided by any agreement in writing or custom.

Regulations as to Compensation for Improvements.

(6.) Deductions to be reckoned in ascertaining compensation payable to tenants under this Act :-

(a.) Benefit allowed by landlord to tenant for executing an improvement; (b.) In case of compensation for manures, value of manure that would have been produced by consumption on the holding of any crops sold off or removed therefrom within the last two years or other shorter duration of the tenancy, save where an equivalent return of manure has been

Deductions to be made from ascer-

tained compensation :-

Sums due to the landlord for-1, Rent; 2, Tenant's share of taxes, rates, public burdens, interest, drainage money, insurance premiums; 3, Breach of any stipulation of lease or relative contract committed by tenant not more than four years before determination of tenancy; 4, Deterioration committed or permitted by tenant within the like period.

Addition to tenant's compensation: Any sum due to him in respect of a breach by the landlord of any stipulation in lease or relative contract.

Procedure.

(7.) Written notice of a claim for compensation under Act must be given by tenant to landlord at least four months before determination of tenancy. Landlord may, within fourteen days after determination, give tenant notice of a counter claim. Notice and counter-notice to state particulars and amount of claims.

(8.) Landlord and tenant may agree on compensation to be paid to either. Otherwise settlement shall be by

reference.

(9.) Rules regarding appointment

of referees and oversmen:

1. If parties concur, they may appoint a single referee. 2. On his death or incapacity, or failure to accept and act for seven days after notice of appointment, proceedings

shall begin afresh.

3. If parties differ respecting referee, they shall each appoint one. 4. On death or incapacity of one of two referees, or his failure to accept and act for seven days after notice of appointment from the party appointing him, such party shall appoint another. 5. Every appointment shall be notified to the other party. 6. If for seven days after notice by one party, the other fails to appoint, or to renew appointment of, referee, the Sheriff shall, on the application of the party giving notice, appoint a referee within fourteen days.

7. Two referees appointed must, before entering on the reference, appoint an oversman; and, 8, on his death or incapacity, must appoint another. 9. If for seven days after request from either party, the referees fail to appoint, or renew appointment of, oversman, the Sheriff shall, on application of either party, appoint one within fourteen days.

10. Every appointment, notice, and request shall be in writing. Sheriff may act although not within the

county.

(10.) Oversman and his successors shall, on application of either party, be appointed by the Sheriff, if either party at appointing a referee notifies to the other in writing that he will require this.

(11.) Delivery to a referee of his appointment to be deemed a submission by the party delivering it: a submission or an appointment to be

irrevocable, save of consent.

(12.) Referees or oversmen may require parties to produce samples, vouchers, or other documents or evidence, and may examine parties and witnesses on oath. (13.) They may also after notice proceed, if expedient,

in absence of either party.

(14.) Award to be in writing, and signed; and (15.) To be pronounced within twenty-eight days after appointment, or last appointment if there are two referees. They may, however, extend the time by writing to forty-nine days. (16.) Failing award within above period, their powers shall cease, and matters stand referred to the oversman. Oversman shall pronounce award within twentyeight days, or-if time is extended by the Sheriff (acting although not within the county) on application of the oversman or of either partywithin forty-nine days at most after notice of devolution has been given in writing by either party or referee.

Award of referees or oversman shall embrace improvements for which compensation is substituted, in terms of sections 3, 4, and 5, for compensation under Act, distinguishing, when

necessary, such improvements and the amount awarded in respect thereof, and an award under this section shall be appealable.

(17.) Award not to decern for

slump sum, but to specify-

(a.) The several improvements, etc., in respect of which compensation is awarded, and the deductions and augmentations taken into account; (b.) The date of each item; (c.) The sum awarded in respect of each item; (d.) Where landlord desires to charge his estate with the amount found due, the time at which each improvement, etc., is to be deemed exhausted.

(18.) Incidence and amount of expenses of reference (including arbiters' fees) to be decided by referees or oversman, subject to taxation by Sheriff-Court auditor and review by Sheriff. (19.) Award to fix a day, not sooner than one month after its delivery, for payment of compensation, expenses, etc., awarded.

(20.) Appeal to Sheriff allowed within seven days after delivery of award, where the compensation claimed exceeds £100, on the follow-

ing grounds :-

1. That the award is invalid;

2. That it misapplies the special provisions of sections 3, 4, or 5;

3. That compensation has been awarded for improvements, etc., in respect of which the claimant was not entitled to compensation:

 That compensation has not been awarded for improvements, etc., in respect of which he was so entitled.

Sheriff may order re-hearing, is whole or part, by referees or overs-man.

Failing appeal, award to be final. Sheriff's decision on appeal to be final.

(21.) Agreement or award may, failing payment within one month after the date fixed, be recorded in Sheriff-Court Books, so that execution may pass thereon; the Sheriff's order for payment on appeal shall be enforced like an ordinary decree.

(22.) Sheriff may appoint guardian, for purposes of Act, to landlord or

tenant under incapacity.

(23.) Court of Session may, by Act of Sederunt, prescribe scale of expenses for Sheriff-Court proceedings.

Charge of Tenant's Compensation

(24.) Landlord on paying tenant compensation under Act, or substi-

tuted compensation, or on himself defraying the cost of improvements proposed by tenant, may obtain from the Sheriff authority to charge the holding, or the estate comprising it, by bond and disposition in security, or, if he is a lease-holder, by registered assignation of his lease in security, for repayment of the amount paid, or any part thereof, with such interest and by such instalments as the Sheriff may determine.

Where the landlord is not an absolute owner, no such instalment or interest shall be payable after the time when, according to an award, or, if there is no award, according to the judgment of the Sheriff, the improvement charged for has been exhausted. The bond or assignation shall specify the terms of payment of the tetal amount charged and

each instalment.

The charge shall rank after prior heritable securities, and shall not infer contravention of any prohibition against charging or burdening with debt.

Price of entailed land sold under the Entail Acts may be applied by landlord in paying expenditure on, or compensation for, improvements mentioned in Parts I. and II., or in discharging any charge under this Act effected upon the remainder of the entailed estates, or upon other estate entailed upon the same series of heirs.

(25) Any incorporated company empowered to advance money for improvement, etc., of land, may advance sum to be charged, and assign the

charge, etc.

(26.) The charge shall affect the landlord's and all subsequent interests in the estate, but shall not extend beyond his interest if only a leasehold one.

Removing for Non-Payment of Rent.

(27.) Where right of hypothec has ceased, landlord may, on six months' rent being due and unpaid, raise an action of removing before Sheriff against tenant, concluding for his removal at next term of Whitsunday or Martinmas, and unless arrears of rent then due are paid, or caution is found for these and one year's rent further, Sheriff may order tenant's removal at such term, as if his lease were determined and legal warning given,—tenant having the rights of

an outgoing tenant at the natural

expiry of his lease.

Secs. 2 and 3 of the Hypothec Abolition (Scotland) Act, 1880, are repealed, and sec. 5 of Act of Sederunt anent Removing of 14th December 1756 declared inapplicable where procedure is competent under this section.

Notice of Termination of Tenancy.

(28.) Notwithstanding expiration of lease, tenancy shall continue by tacit relocation from year to year, unless (a.) in case of a lease for three years and upwards, not less than one year nor more than two years before its termination, and (b) in case of a lease from year to year, or under three years, not less than six months before its termination, either party gives the other written notice of intention to end the tenancy, notice by landlord being in the form and manner prescribed by the Sheriff-Courts (Scotland) Act, 1853.

Landlord's right not to be affected of removing tenant who has been sequestrated under the Bankruptcy Act, or has incurred an irritancy, and provisions as to notice not to apply to land resumed in terms of lease for building, etc., or to subjects

let for less than a year.

(29.) Tenant may bequeath lease to any legatee, subject as follows:—

(a.) Legatee shall intimate the bequest to landlord or his known agent as nearly as possible within twenty-one days after tenant's death.

(b.) This intimation shall import

his acceptance of lease.

(c.) Landlord may, within one month after intimation, object to receive legatee as tenant: otherwise the lease shall bind them respectively as from deceased's death.

- (d.) Legatee, objected to by landlord, may petition the Sheriff to declare him tenant, and landlord may appear and state his objections; if these satisfy the Sheriff, he shall declare the bequest void; but otherwise he shall sustain the petition.
 - (e.) Sheriff's decision to be final.

(f.) Legatee to possess holding pending proceedings, unless Sheriff direct otherwise.

(g.) On legatee's non-acceptance, or on voidance of the bequest, the lease shall descend to tenant's heir.

Fixtures.

(30.) Fixtures (engines, machinery,

by tenant after commencement of Act, not being such as entitle him to compensation, or are erected under obligation, or instead of others belonging to landlord, shall be property of and be removable by tenant before or shortly after termination of tenancy. Provided as follows :-

1. Before removing any of them, tenant shall satisfy all rent and other obligations due to landlord.

2. In the removal he shall not do avoidable damage to the holding.

3. He shall immediately make good all damage thereby occasioned.

4. He must give landlord one month's written notice of intention to remove.

5. During this month landlord may, by written notice to tenant, elect to purchase any fixture or building specified in tenant's notice. Such fixture shall then become landlord's property, and he shall pay tenant the fair value thereof to an incoming tenant of the holding. Difference regarding value to be settled. like compensation, by reference under this Act (but without appeal).

Crown Lands.

(31.) The Act shall apply to Crown Lands, the Commissioners of Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues, etc., being deemed to be the landlord.

Ecclesiastical and Charity Lands.

(32.) Ministers, in respect of their glebes, can exercise landlord's powers under the Act only with previous written approval of their Presbytery; trustees for ecclesiastical, educational, or charitable purposes only with previous written approval of a Principal Secretary of State.

(33.) In all other cases a limited owner may do landlord's part in respect to improvements compensated under Act, as if absolute owner.

General Provisions.

(34.) Act to commence 1st January 1884.

(41.) Written consents and agreements under Act, signed by parties or by persons authorized by them, to be valid, although not executed with statutory solemnities of deeds.

(42.) Interpretation: "Lease," "determination of tenancy," "holding, etc., are defined in accordance with their popular significations. A tenancy from year to year under a lease current at commencement of Act, shall, for purposes of Act, be deemed to continue a tenancy under a lease so current until the first day after the commencement, on which either the landlord or tenant could, the one by giving notice to the other, cause such tenancy to determine; and on and after such day shall be deemed a tenancy under a contract beginning after commencement of Act. "Landlord" or "tenant" includes the executors, administrators, assignees, legatee, disponee, or next-of-kin, husband, guardian, curator bonis, or trustees in bankruptcy, of a "Sheriff" inlandlord or tenant. cludes Sheriff-substitute.

LICENSING ACTS.

- 1. An hotel-keeper may lawfully permit guests of his lodgers to remain after 11 P.M.; and, 2, may even after that hour admit such guests and supply liquor for them on his lodgers' order.

LIABILITY OF EMPLOYER TO WORKMAN.

Morrison v. Baird & Co., Dec. 2, 1882.

An injured workman may, under the Employers' Liability Act, 1880, obtain damages from an employer with whom he has no direct contract of service, if hired by a servant who is under direct contract, and authorized to engage subordinates.

- 1. Held (by First Division) that if a workman furnished by his master with defective plant for performing

strating, to work with such plant in full knowledge of its defects, and is consequently injured, he is barred from recovering damages, having worked in face of a seen danger. 2 and 3. Held (by Second Division) that a servant who, relying on the sufficiency of his master's plant and machinery, works near it while in operation, and so sustains injury, is not barred from recovering although his duty might have been fully discharged at another place or time. The master is bound to provide safe plant and machinery, and there is no contributory negligence in working where there can be no danger unless there is defect, or even where a remote danger is suspected from plant alleged by the master to be sufficient.

WRONGOUS USE OF DILIGENCE.

Smith & Co. v. Taylor and Others. Dec. 8, 1882.

A law agent employed by a client to enforce a judicial decree charged the debtor to pay within a wrong number of days, and on non-payment petitioned under the Debtors (Scotland) Act, 1880, for cessio of the debtor's estates. Held that, his work continues, after remon- the charge being inept, these pre-

ceedings amounted to a wrongous use of diligence, and that the agent as well as the client was liable to the alleged debtor in damages therefor, without malice and want of probable cause being proved against them.

TRIENNIAL PRESCRIPTION.

Mitchells v. Moultrys, Dec. 16, 1882.

A writ to prove the constitution and resting owing of a prescribed merchant's account must be unequivocal, either specifying the debt or ferming part of a correspondence produced in which it is specified. Observed that in an action against a husband for a debt incurred by his wife after marriage, the resting owing must be referred to his oath, though the constitution may be referred to hers.

Chisholm v. Robertson, Mar. 10, 1883.

Held that a blank order-form issued by a merchant to his customers becomes, when returned to him filled up, a written obligation, to which the triennial prescription does not apply.

LEASE-BIGHT TO ABANDON.

Allan v. Markland, Dec. 21, 1882.

A shoemaker, tenant of several large shops in the same city, had the back part of one of them seriously injured, and the fore part slightly scorched, by an accidental fire. He thereupon at once intimated abandonment of a current lease for seven years, on the ground that the subject had perished. The Court being satisfied that all necessary repairs could have been made in about a week, and business meanwhile carried on, though at some inconvenience, held that he was not entitled to abandon.

SHIP-CONSTRUCTION OF CONTRACT.

Donaldson Brothers v. Little & Co., Dec. 21, 1883.

The charterers of a coasting steamer sued her owners for breach of a contract to convey a cargo to a certain port by a fixed date, "unforeseen circumstances" and "accidents of the sea" excepted. The steamer was several days late in reaching port, owing to detention in the course

of a separate short voyage undertaken in the interval between the conclusion of the contract and the endeavour to implement it. The detention arose, however, entirely from excepted causes, and under ordinary conditions both voyages could have been completed within the time allowed. Held that the owners were not liable.

PUBLIC COMPANY-WINDING UP.

Turnbull v. Liquidators of Benhar Coal Co., Feb. 6, 1883.

Held that a creditor of a limited company who uses arrestments against it on the dependence of an action, however shortly before the company resolves on voluntary liquidation or commits any other act of constructive bankruptcy, acquires a preferential right to the assets over other creditors, provided he timeously thereafter constitutes his claim.

HIRE-CONTRACTOR'S LIABILITY.

Pearcey v. Player, Feb. 8, 1883.

Where a person hired a van and two men to remove his luggage from one lodging to another, but gave no list of articles and did not inspect the luggage immediately on the removal being completed, and it was necessary for the men to leave the van unguarded in the street while taking the luggage up and down stairs, held that he had no claim against the removal contractor for the loss of a portmanteau missed within twenty-four hours after the removal.

M Lean v. Warnock, June 28, 1883.

Where a farmer, who for hire had taken a horse to graze in his field, failed to examine the field and to fence a subsidence therein, in consequence of which the horse met with a fatal accident, held that he was bound to pay the value of the horse.

FEU-IRRITANCY-SUB-FEU.

Sandeman v. Scottish Property, etc., Building Society, Feb. 21, 1883.

Held that irritancy of a feu ob non solutum canonem (whether conventional or under the Act 1597, c. 250) will not be declared except under reservation of sub-feus granted by the defaulting vassal for a competent avail.

AGRICULTURAL LEASE.

Lumb v. Mitchell's Trustees, Feb. 23, 1883.

A landlord acquiesced for many years in a tenant's departure from a rotation of cropping stipulated in his lease under pain of additional pactional rent for each acre miscropped. He was held barred from recovering such rent in a subsequent year in which miscropping occurred as the necessary consequence of what he had previously acquiesced in.

CONTRACT-TIME OF COMMENCEMENT.

Mackenzie v. Liddell, Feb. 28, 1883.

Held that in a charter-party for hire of a tug for salvage purposes the expression "commencing from 8th September, at which date the vessel is to be at the disposal of the charterer," meant that the vessel should be ready at the earliest moment of the 8th, and that the owner was liable for loss occasioned by some hours' delay.

WRIT-SETTLED ACCOUNT.

M'Adie and Others v. M'Adie's Executrix, Mar. 9, 1883.

A document signed by a debtor, but neither holograph nor tested, acknowledging the accuracy of an account against him in his creditor's ledger, does not prove the debt, or, even after the debtor's death, preclude inquiry and the necessity for regular vouchers.

CIVIL IMPRISONMENT.

Tevendale v. Duncan, Mar. 20, 1883.

Held that a person whose father had obtained parochial relief could not be imprisoned under a decree against him at the instance of the parochial board for repayment of the aliment, the sums in the decree not being "decerned for aliment" within the meaning of the Civil Imprisonment (Scotland) Act, 1882.

Bulerno Paper Mill Co. v. Mackenzie, July 11, 1883.

An order of Court to consign a sum of money in the hands of the

clerk of Court is a decree ad factum præstandum, and failure to obtemper it may be competently followed by imprisonment under the provisions of the Debtors (Scotland) Act, 1880.

TRADE MARK-INFRINGEMENT.

Dunnachie v. Young, May 22, 1883.

Certain brick - makers stamped their bricks with the word "Glenboig," being the name of the estate whence they obtained their clay, which was of a superior kind. They also registered the word as a trade mark. Brick-makers on an adjoining estate, having struck the same seam of clay in their own lands, began to advertise and sell bricks as "Young's Glenboig." It was held that the original makers were entitled to interdict them from using this word.

BANK CHEQUE.

British Linen Company Bank v. Fergusson's Trustee, June 6, 1883.

A cheque granted for value operates, on being presented for payment at the drawer's bank, an assignation of such funds as are at his credit, although insufficient to meet it in full.

BANKRUPTCY-SECURITY OVER MOVABLES,

Allan & Co.'s Trustee v. Gunn & Co., June 20, 1883.

Held that a transaction whereby, for an advance of £100, a merchant in difficulties sold certain goods "to be returned upon repayment of the above amount," was a bona fide sale, with a right of pre-emption in the seller's favour, and that the purchaser was entitled to the goods, though, while they remained undelivered, the seller became bankrupt.

M Caul's Trustee v. Thomson, June 30, 1883.

A person in difficulties had the price of his household furniture paid by a friend to a private trustee for creditors, but retained possession on a contract to repay his friend by annual instalments. After paying several he became bankrupt. Held that the furniture, having been sold and resold, fell under his sequestration, and that the friend could only

rank as creditor for his unpaid instalments.

TITLE TO LAND-ADJUDICATION.

Hinton and Others v. Connell's Trustees. July 6, 1883.

Held that infeftment on a decree of adjudication for debt does not, even as from the date of a decree of expiry of the legal, constitute an "ex facie valid, irredeemable title to an estate in land," sufficient under the Conveyancing Act of 1874 to give a prescriptive title in twenty years.

Arbitration clauses in executory contracts are of two kinds, the one including only disputes arising in the execution of the contract, the other including every claim and obligation that may arise. A clause which refers disputes as to the true intent and meaning of the contract, the implement of its provisions, and the construction of the work, is of the first kind, and though, 1, it covers a claim for stipulated damages in respect of delay in implement, 2 and 3, it does not exclude an action raised after completion of the work for money due as the contract price, etc. But, 4, a clause referring not only such disputes, but also "any matter, claim, or obligation whatever. arising out of or in connexion with the work," is an absolute bar to action. In deciding case 3, the Lord President urged that contracting parties would keep this distinction in view.

HUSBAND AND WIFE-SUCCESSION.

Poë v. Paterson, July 16, 1883.

(House of Lords.)

Held (aff. judgment of the Court of Session) that in virtue of the Married Women's Property (Scotland) Act, 1881, the husband of any woman dying domiciled in Scotland is entitled to the same interest in her separate movable estate as under the previously existing law is taken by a widow in her deceased husband's estate (one-third if there are, onehalf if there are not, children), even although the marriage took place before the passing of the Act. The decision implies that the children of a woman married before the Act are entitled at her death to legitim out of her movable estate.

POOR LAW SETTLEMENT - DESERTED INFANT.

Caldwell v. Dempster, July 20, 1883.

Held that an illegitimate pupil child, born in Scotland of a mother having no settlement, and deserted by her, is chargeable to the parish where it was found destitute, and not to that of its birth.

PUBLIC TRUST-COMPULSORY SALE.

Oswald v. Ayr Harbour Trustees, July 23, 1883.

(House of Lords.)

Held (aff. judgment of the Court of Session) that statutory trustees for a public harbour cannot, in taking land compulsorily under the Lands Clauses Act, limit the nature of the right of property to be acquired, or burden it with any servitude which might subsequently interfere with the trust purposes. Accordingly, they must acquire the land absolutely, and pay the landowner a full price.

During the year 1882 the number of sailing vessels registered in the United Kingdom decreased by 412, and their tonnage decreased by 63,135 tons; the number of steam vessels registered increased by 303, and the tonnage by 330,518 tons. The number of vessels built in the United Kingdom in 1882, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, was 972, tonnage 667,275 tons; of which 362 were sailing vessels, tonnage 145,700 tons, and 610 were steam vessels, tonnage 521,575 tons. The number of vessels built in the United Kingdom in 1882 for foreigners was 181, tonnage 115,776 tons; of which 1 was a sailing vessel, tonnage 2139 tons; and 180 were steam vessels, tonnage 113,637 tons—31 steamers, tonnage 447 tons, being war vessels. The number of vessels built at ports in Scotland in 1882, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, was 271, tonnage 239,321 tons; of which 79 were sailing vessels, tonnage 73,422 tons (64 of iron, 6 of steel, and 9 of wood); and 192 were steamers, tonnage 165,899 tons (126 of iron, 57 of steel, 8 of wood, and 1 composite). There were built for foreigners, 53 vessels (1 sailing vessel and 52 steamers), aggregate tonnage 49,391 tons.

SEA CASUALTIES.

During the year ended 30th June 1882, the number of British (including colonial) vessels totally lost on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom, and the number of such vessels reported as having been totally lost abroad, was 1303, and their tonnage was 378,424 tons. 906 of those vessels, tonnage 290,287 tons, were of the United Kingdom (755 of them sailing vessels, tonnage 191,796 tons, and 151 steamers, tonnage 98,491 tons); and 397 belonged to the colonies, tonnage 88,137 tons (23 of these steamers, tonnage 4793 tons). The number of sailing vessels lost was 1129, and the number of steamers was 174. Of the 1303 vessels lost, 385, tonnage 229,186 tons, were classed (in Lloyd's Register, the Liverpool Book, or the Bureau Veritas), and 918, tonnage 149,238 tons, were unclassed. 182 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom and 75 colonial (69 classed) were lost through foundering; 419 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom and 238 colonial (175 classed) through stranding; 90 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom and 8 colonial (30 classed) through collisions; 43 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom and 40 colonial (34 classed) through other causes; and 172 belonging to the United Kingdom and 36 colonial (77 classed) were missing vessels, 26 of which were steamers (20 of these classed). The number of British vessels which sustained damage in serious casualties during the same year, on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom, and the number reported to have sustained damage through serious casualties abroad, was 1622, tonnage 696,971 tons. 1314 of those vessels were of the United Kingdom, tonnage 581,214 tons (832 of them sailing vessels, tonnage 213,065 tons, and 482 steamers, tonnage 368,149 tons); and 308, tonnage 115,757 tons, belonged to the colonies (26 of them steamers, tonnage 9819 tons). 1114 were sailing vessels, and 508 were steamers. 533 suffered damage through stranding; 222 through collisions; and 867 through other causes. The number of British vessels which sustained damage through minor casualties on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom, and the number reported to have sustained damage through minor casualties abroad, during the same year, was 3170, tonnage 1,410,123 tons.

of those vessels were of the United Kingdom, tonnage 1,250,114 tons (2076 of them sailing vessels, and 1002 steamers); and 392, tonnage 160,009 tons, belonged to the colonies (37 of them steamers). 2431 were sailing vessels, and 1039 were steamers. 620 suffered damage through stranding; 1079 through collisions; and 1771 through other causes. The whole number of sea casualties to British (including colonial) vessels which occurred on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom, and which were reported to have occurred abroad, during the year 1881-82, was 6834; and the number of vessels lost or damaged was 6395. 1301 casualties involved the total loss of 1303 vessels; 1502 were serious casualties, in which 1622 vessels sustained damage; and 4031 were minor casualties, in which 3470 vessels sustained damage. Of the 1303 vessels lost, 498 were engaged in the coasting trade, 623 in oversea trades, and 182 were fishing vessels; of the vessels damaged in serious casualties 404 were engaged in the coasting trade, 1069 in oversea trades, and 149 were fishing vessels; of the vessels damaged in minor casualties 1333 were engaged in the coasting trade, 1764 in oversea trades,

and 373 were fishing vessels.

The total number of sea casualties, excluding collisions, which occurred on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year ended 30th June 1882, was 2974, of which 526 involved total loss, 719 were serious casualties, and 1729 were minor casualties. Of the ships lost 432 belonged to the United Kingdom, 12 to the colonies, and 82 were foreign; of the serious casualties 587 happened to vessels belonging to the United Kingdom, 28 to colonial vessels, and 104 to foreign vessels; of the minor casualties 1485 happened to vessels belonging to the United Kingdom, 79 to colonial vessels, and 165 to foreign vessels. 48 of the vessels belonging to the United Kingdom which were lost were steamers; 186 of the vessels belonging to the United Kingdom, and 8 of the foreign vessels, which sustained serious casualties were steamers; 357 of the vessels belonging to the United Kingdom, 1 of the colonial vessels, and 10 of the foreign vessels which sustained minor casualties were steamers. Of the total losses 111 occurred through foundering, 353 through stranding, 10 through other causes, and 52 were missing vessels; of the serious casualties 406 occurred through stranding, and 313 through other causes; of the minor casualties 556 occurred through stranding, and 1173 through other causes. Of the 444 British (including colonial) vessels lost, 276 were lost through causes connected with the weather, 20 through causes connected with the ship's equipment or stowage, 55 through causes connected with navigation and seamanship, 3 through causes connected with machinery or boilers, 22 through other causes, and 68 from unknown causes. 24 of the serious casualties and 104 of the minor casualties occurred from causes connected with the ship's equipment or stowage.

The total number of collisions which occurred on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year 1881-82 was 686; and of these 80 involved the total loss of one or both vessels, and 606 partial damage. 525 of the collisions occurred between British vessels, 137 between British and foreign

vessels, and 24 between foreign vessels.

On the average of the ten years ended 30th June 1882, the annual number of collisions on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom involving total loss was 6815, and the annual number of other casualties involving total loss was 42715; the annual number of collisions involving partial damage was 59515, and the annual number of other casualties involving partial damage was 2101.

The whole number of wrecks, casualties, and collisions on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1881-82 which involved total loss was 606; and the number which involved partial damage was 3054. On the average of the ten years ended 30th June 1882, the number of such wrecks, casualties, and collisions which involved total loss was 4952, and the number which involved partial damage was 269616.

The number of lives lost by sea casualties to British vessels on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom during 1881-82 was 1021, of which 1000 were lost on 211 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (748 on 181 sailing vessels, and 252 on 30 steamers, 15 of those lost on sailing vessels and 49 of those lost on steamers being passengers), and 21 on 4 colonial vessels (all sailing vessels). The number of lives reported during the same year as having been lost on British vessels abroad was 2957, of which 2277 were lost on 234 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (1380 on 178 sailing vessels, and 897 on 56 steamers, 15 of those lost on sailing vessels and 184 of those lost on steamers being passengers), and 680 on 110 colonial vessels. Taking together the loss on British vessels on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom and the loss on such vessels abroad, 3277 lives were lost, or reported to have been lost, in 1881-82, on 445 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (2128 on 359 sailing vessels, and 1149 on 86 steamers, 30 of the former and 233 of the latter being passengers), and 701 lives on board 114 colonial vessels (all of these but 13 being sailing vessels, and 103 of those lost being passengers). Total loss of life in British vessels reported in 1881-82, 3378. The number of lives lost in foreign vessels on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1881-82 was 76, lost on 20 vessels, all of which

were sailing vessels; and 39 lives were lost on 8 foreign sailing vessels

on the coasts of British Possessions abroad.

The total number of lives lost on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1881-82 was 1097 (1021 on 215 British, including colonial, vessels,

and 76 on 20 foreign vessels).

The number of lives lost, or reported from abroad as having been lost, on vessels belonging to the United Kingdom (445 in number) in 1881-82, being 3277, 445 were lost on 74 vessels by foundering; 592 on 66 vessels by stranding; 107 on 29 vessels by collisions; 200 on 104 vessels through other causes; and 1933 in 172 missing vessels. The number of lives lost, ar reported from abroad as having been lost, on board colonial vessels (114 in number) in 1881-82, being 701, 138 were lost in 20 vessels by foundering; 140 in 18 vessels by stranding; 18 in 6 vessels by collisions; 93 in 34 vessels through other causes; and 312 in 36 missing vessels. Of the 3978 lives lost as aforesaid on British (including colonial) vessels, 2042 were lost on 204 classed vessels, and 1936 in 355 unclassed vessels; 3688 were lost in 415 vessels which were totally lost, and 290 on 144 vessels which were not lost.

The number of lives saved from shipwreck on the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1891-82 was 4066; the number saved from British and foreign vessels on the coasts of British Possessions abroad was 2950; the number saved from British vessels on the coasts of foreign countries was 3755; and the number saved from British vessels at sea was 2368. Of the 4066 lives saved on the coasts of the United Kingdom, 407 were saved by rocket and mortar apparatus and assistance from the shore; 475 by lifeboats; 441 by luggers, coast guard boats, and small craft; 1153 by ships and steamboats; 1452 by ships' own boats; 7 by life-buoys and appliances kept on

board; and 131 by other means.

The whole number of British vessels returned as missing in the year 1881-82 was 208, of which 172, tonnage 62,897 tons (147 sailing vessels and 25 steamers), belonged to the United Kingdom; and 36, tonnage 8749 tems (all except one sailing vessels), to the colonies. The whole number of sea casualties which involved the total loss of vessels reported in 1881-82 to British vessels on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom and abroad, and to foreign vessels on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom, and on or near the coasts of British Possessions abroad, was 1447, tonnage of vessels lost 420,454 tons. 906 vessels belonging to the United Kingdom were lost. tonnage 290,287 tons; 397 belonging to the colonies, tonnage 88,137 tons; and 144 foreign vessels, tonnage 42,030 tons.

HARBOUR ACCOMMODATION.

The Report of the Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed to inquire into the Harbour Accommodation on the Coasts of the United Kingdom, having regard to the laws and arrangements under which the Construction and Improvement of Harbours may now be effected, is dated 13th July 1883. The Committee was appointed on the 10th May 1883, and

consisted of Mr Marjoribanks (Chairman), Mr Stevenson, Sir Thomas Brassey, Viscount Baring, Mr Arthur Arnold, Sir Donald Currie, Mr Hanbury Tracy, Mr Hastings, Mr Heneage, Sir G. Balfour, Colonel Nolan, Mr Blake, Mr Charles Ross, Mr Salt, Sir Earldey Wilmot, Sir Edward Watkin, Colonel Walrond, Mr Akers Douglas, Lord Arthur Hill, Sir Charles Mills, Colonel Milne-Home, Lord Rendlesham, and Mr Guy Dawnay. The Report states that, owing to the late period of the session at which the Committee commenced the inquiry, and the extent and importance of the subject, they had found it impossible to complete their investigation. They thought it desirable to report the evidence at the stage arrived at, to briefly refer to certain facts which appeared to them to deserve immediate attention, and to make recommendations on some matters which seemed to be of an urgent character.

While the question of national harbours of refuge, to be constructed by means of convict labour, was not, strictly speaking, referred to the Committee, it had been impossible wholly to ignore it. They had been obliged to take into consideration what works of this description were likely to be undertaken, as the construction of such works would necessarily greatly modify the general requirements of the country. They had, for the purposes of this inquiry, assumed that three great national harbours of refuge were to be constructed by means of convict labour, at places to be carefully selected between Beachy Head and Duncansby Head. From evidence that had been incidentally given to the Committee, they were deeply impressed with the increasing importance of such harbours, alike for purposes of national defence, for the commercial development of the country, for the extension of sea fisheries, and for the safety and protection of life and property. They strongly recommend that three such works as they had indicated should, without delay, be undertaken, and they beg further to suggest for consideration a fourth harbour of a similar character, but of somewhat smaller dimensions, on the north coast of Cornwall. The same observations, they add, would apply to the need of a similar harbour on the west coast of Ireland.

The Committee proceed to draw attention to three points connected with

the administration of the Harbours and Passing Tolls Act, 1861:

(a.) The Act as originally passed sanctioned loans to harbours for periods not exceeding 50 years at 3½ per cent. interest. By the Public Works Loans Act, 1879 (42 & 43 Vict. c. 77), and the Treasury Minute thereunder, the following sliding scale was substituted for the 3½ per cent., viz.:—3½ per cent. on loans repayable within a period not exceeding 20 years; 3½ per cent. on loans repayable within a period exceeding 20, not exceeding 30 years; 4 per cent. on loans repayable within a period exceeding 30, not exceeding 40 years; 4½ per cent. on loans repayable within a period exceeding 40, not exceeding 50 years. The effect of this change, they say, has been to cause a material increase in the rate of interest, as it is in most cases impossible to repay out of the harbour rates the capital expended on harbour works within a short period. They suggest for consideration that these loans should be made at a rate of interest of 3½ per cent., and should be made repayable by means of a sinking fund, extending over 50 years.

(b.) During the first years after the passing of the Act, the Board of Trade made all inquiries respecting proposed works, and reported as to their expediency or otherwise, and the Public Works Loan Commissioners granted the loans on the authority of the recommendation of the Board of Trade, provided they were satisfied as to the security offered by the applicants. The evidence taken has shown, they observe, that the Board of Trade report and recommendations have become a mere formality, and that the Public Works Loan Commissioners decide both as to the policy of the works, and as to the value of the security offered by the applicants, but do not necessarily exercise supervision over the execution of the works. The Committee suggest a return to the original practice under the Act; that the powers of the Harbour Department of the Board of Trade should be increased, and its authority enlarged; that it should be its function to decide all questions of the policy of harbour works proposed to be executed

by the aid of loans of public money under the Act of 1861, and that it should be responsible for their execution in conformity with the plans which have received its sanction, while the functions of the Public Works Loan Commissioners should be confined to judging as to the value of the security offered by applicants for loans, and whether the object proposed to be attained is one which the terms of the Acts of Parliament which govern their action would admit.

(c.) Under Clause 7 of the Public Works Loans Act, 1882, a valuable provision is made, enabling localities to give the local rates as collateral security to the Public Works Loan Commissioners for harbour loans. The rating authority is strictly defined and limited by that clause. In the case of small places, the additional security to be gained by mortgaging such rates is not great; and the Committee suggest that, when willing to do so, larger areas as, e.g., counties or divisions of counties, should be empowered to give their rates as such collateral security for such a portion of the required loan as they may decide.

THE FISHERIES.

By the Act 45 and 46 Vict. cap. 78, the Board of British White Herring Fishery was dissolved on the 16th of October 1882, and a new Fishery Board was established under the title of the Fishery Board for Scotland. The new Board consists of the following members:—Sir Thomas J. Boyd, Chairman; Mr John Guthrie Smith, Sheriff of Aberdeen, Kincardine, and Banff, Deputy-chairman; Mr G. H. Thoms, Sheriff of Caithness, Orkney, and Shetland; Mr A. Forbes Irvine, Sheriff of Argyll; Sir J. R. Gibson-Maitland, Bart.; Mr Stephen Williamson, M.P.; Professor Cossar Ewart, M.D.; Mr J. Maxtone Graham, and Mr J. Johnstone Grieve. Mr Archibald Young, advocate, has been appointed Inspector of the Salmon Fisheries of Scotland, and Mr Dugald Graham, Secretary to the Board. The first Annual Report of the Board is for the year ended 31st December 1882, and therefore embraces statistics which were in great part collected by the former Board; but it also includes some matters which came under con-

sideration subsequently to the above date.

The former Fishery Board had divided the coasts of Scotland into 36 districts, at each of which it stationed a fishery officer, and at some, an assistant officer also. The general duties of the officers were to collect statistics relating to the herring, cod, and ling fisheries; to affix the government brand for herrings in the proper cases; to examine and brand the standard cran measure for the sale of fresh herrings, and see that all barrels used for white herrings were of the standard size; to restore to the owners fishing property lost at sea and recovered; to aid in keeping order at the fishery stations, and settle disputes referred to them; to aid in carrying out the provisions of the Sea Fisheries Act; and to furnish for the Scottish Meteorological Society returns of the fishing and weather during the herring fishing season. A general inspector, stationed at Leith, and an assistant inspector, stationed at Greenock, inspected the fishery districts; superintended and checked the fishery officers in the performance of their duties; and, from the returns made by these officers, prepared abstracts of the statistics of the herring and of the cod and ling fishings for presentation to Parliament. The vessels employed in the superintendence of the fisheries were H.M.S. "Jackal" and the "Vigilant" cruiser belonging to the Board. These were assisted during the great summer herring fishings by other vessels, the use of which had been granted by Their duties consisted in preserving order, enforcing the Admiralty. conventions with foreign countries, preventing encroachments by foreign fishermen upon the three-mile limit, and compelling observance of the fishery regulations in regard to carrying lights by, and the registering, numbering, and lettering of fishing boats. The Board had also administered, from the year 1828, the expenditure of an annual grant of £3000 -£2500 of which were applied to the building or repairing of piers or harbours, and £500 towards the repair of boats of poor fishermen. The application of the latter sum ceased in 1850, and the amount was consolidated with the general grant for harbours. Upwards of 30 piers and harbours had been constructed, repaired, or improved, at a cost of £248,651, of which £72,118 had been contributed by persons interested in the several works.

All the duties and functions of the old Board were transferred to the new Board. The services of the staff employed by the old Board were continued. The new Board was further empowered to take cognisance of (1) the coast and deep sea fisheries; and (2) the general superintendence of the salmon fisheries of Scotland; and was (3) directed to make an annual report to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, to be laid before Parliament. The new Board at once applied itself to the consideration of questions connected with the regulation and improvement of the fisheries, which embraced the revision of the existing regulations as to the herring brand, the herring close time, the herring mesh, beam trawling, fishery police, oyster and mussel fisheries, besides other matters. It collected much valuable information, by which it was enabled to ascertain to what

extent future legislation was desirable.

The attention of the Board was prominently directed to the great want of suitable harbour accommodation for fishing boats, especially on the east The herring fishery has in recent years been carried on much further out at sea than formerly, large shoals being found at fifty or sixty miles distance from the shore or even more, and the open boats formerly used are being gradually superseded by decked boats—the tonnage of the first-class deck boats, 5101 in number, having been, in 1882, 82,318 tons, and that of all other fishing boats (9872 in number), only 34,423 tons, while the number of the decked boats has even since then been increased. It is most important, the Report observes, that boats should be able to get into harbour at all states of the tide, especially on their return from distant fishing-grounds, that the herrings may be at once landed and the curing proceeded with. In fact, during sultry weather or with calms prevailing, herrings are often tainted and deteriorated in value, while large quantities sometimes become unfit for food and can only be thrown into the sea or sold for manure. In bad weather there is danger to the boats in their not being able to run into harbour at any time; and the fear of this frequently prevents their going to fish—the loss from this cause in a single season at Peterhead, while that station had insufficient harbourage, being estimated to have been £60,000. The herring fishery of Scotland, it is further observed, has become one of the greatest fishing industries in Europe, and of great value to the country, and is still a growing industry. 90,185½ barrels of herrings only were cured in 1809; in 1882 the number of barrels cured was 1,282,973½; and the average yearly cure, which was 462,326 barrels in the ten years 1833-42, was 641,855 in the ten years 1853-62, and 994,398 barrels in the ten years 1873-82. Again, the value of the boats employed in the fishery was estimated at £272,960 in 1862, at £381,338 in 1872, and at so much as £646,883 in 1882; the value of the nets at £407,237 in 1862, and £521,327 in 1872, while it had risen to £711,039 in 1882. And since the number of persons employed in the fisheries in 1882 was estimated at 99,396, there may be, it is added, somewhere about half a million people dependent upon the fisheries. All this being so, instead of there being, as might have been expected, the necessary harbour accommodation, there are, it is stated, only four really good harbours for fishing boats on the east coast—those at Aberdeen, Peterhead, and Fraserburgh, and the Cluny harbour at Buckie; while on the north coast there is no good harbour between Scrabster, near Thurso, and Loch Erribol, fifty miles away on the west. On the west coast and in Orkney and Shetland there are many large bays indented with natural creeks suitable for boats, so that the need of harbours is less urgent than elsewhere, but in some localities on the west coast too the construction or improvement of harbours is highly desirable. The importance of increasing the number of piers and harbours was acknow-ledged by Parliament when, in 1828, the grant of £3000 a year for this purpose, which is still continued, was first made. Between 1828 and 1882 there has been, it is observed, a complete revolution in the number and

size of the boats employed in the fishing. There should, it is added, be a corresponding revolution in the size and depth of the harbours. Since 1881 the surplus profits of the herring brand (£3000 in 1881 and £2300 in 1882) have been available for the improvement of harbours, but of this £1000 a year may be applied to telegraphic extension in remote fishery districts. This and the annual grant of £3000, however, are all the funds at the com-

mand of the Board for the building or improvement of harbours.

The old Fishery Board gave assistance for harbour works on condition that they were carried out on the plans and under the supervision of its own engineers, and that fishermen or others interested contributed not less than a fourth of the cost. The new Board has proceeded on the same principles. The old Board had assisted in constructing or improving 28 harbours or piers. Two of these, Rosehearty in Aberdeenshire and Findochty in Banfishire, were unfinished when the old Board was dissolved, and were being completed by the new Board-the estimated cost of the former being £2300, and that of the latter £10,000. The new Board had received thirteen applications for assistance-from Eyemouth, in Berwickshire: Port Errol, in Aberdeenshire; St Andrews, in Fifeshire; Fair Isle, between Orkney and Shetland; Crovie, in Banffshire; Stonehaven, in Kincardineshire; Port Knockie, in Banffshire; Scoraig, in Little Lochbroom, Ress-Waternish, in Skye; Stroma, in the Pentland Firth; Buckhaven, in Fifeshire; Kinlochbervie, in Sutherlandshire; and Ness, on the north-east coast of Lewis. The application from Eyemouth had been declined. A harbour of refuge for fishing boats at that place would be of manifest advantage, but the plans proposed would have involved an expenditure of £80,000-which was beyond the resources of the Board-and the Board. moreover, is precluded from assisting works not designed and carried out by its own engineers. The applications from Scoraig and Kinlochbervie had also been declined, but the Board had arranged for the construction of a harbour at Ness at a cost of £6000, of which Lady Matheson was to comtribute a fourth. The Report goes on to express a hope that, in view of the great and increasing value of the fisheries, and the absolute necessity. for their full development, of enlarging and deepening existing harbours and building new ones in suitable places, the funds at the disposal of the Board for such purposes should be largely increased. It was thought advisable that the Chairman of the Board should give evidence on this subject before the House of Commons Committee on Harbour Accommodation. and this he had done, supplying all the statistical information in his

The Board had resolved, as soon as it was provided with the necessary appliances, to institute investigations into the habits and life-history of some of our more important food-fishes, such as the herring, cod, ling, haddock, mackerel, sole, plaice, and flounder; but for such investigations a steam-vessel, dredging apparatus, etc., were required. An application it had made to the Lords of the Admiralty for the use of a steam-pinnace had for the time been declined, but communications were going and a hope is expressed that the application should yet be granted, important results being confidently looked for, even in the current season, if the investigations could be set on foot at once. The Board was also impressed with the importance of testing new methods of fishing, such as the Seine purse net and the Cod gill net—both used successfully on the American coast—and had no doubt that, with increased Government assistance, much

might thus be done for the development of the fisheries.

The Treasury authorized the expenditure by the Board of £1000 out of the herring-brand surplus to assist in extending the telegraphs to remote fishery districts. Such extension, it is said, would be most beneficial, both as it might enable fishermen to learn at once where shoals of herrings were to be found and to proceed thither, and as enabling fishermen, when a large catch had unexpectedly been made, to procure supplies of salt and barrels quickly. A list of nine stations to which the telegraph should be extended in the first instance was accordingly prepared and sent to the Post-Office—the stations selected being Castle Bay, Island of Barra; Carloway, Island of Lewis; Port of Ness; St Margaret's Hope, Westray; Orkney; Reawick.

Shetland Islands; and Vaila Sound, Hillswick, and Whalsay, also in the Shetland Islands—but the guarantee which the Post-Office required for much extension amounted to £4523 for each of seven years, whereas the Board had at its disposal only £1000 a year. Communications had been expend with a view to ascertaining what assistance could be got in the realities interested, and such communications were going on. In the case of Castle Bay, for which a guarantee for £1244 for seven years was demanded, the owner of the land, Lady Gordon Cathcart, had expressed her willingness to assist if the guarantee were somewhat reduced; but an application to this effect made to the Treasury had for the time been declined.

The Scotch herring fishery of 1882 was, with the single exception of that of 1880, the largest upon record. The results of it were, 1,282,9734 barrels cured, 825,9827 barrels exported, 462,6121 barrels branded, and £7710, 4s. 2d. of brand fees. The fishing of 1881 yielded 1,111,1551 barrels cured, 745,8792 barrels exported, 494,1821 barrels branded, and £8236, 7s. 6d. of brand fees. There was therefore an increase in 1882, as compared with 1881, of 171,8181 berrels cured, and of 80,103 exported, but a decrease of 31,570 barrels branded, and of £526, 3s. 4d. in the brand fees. The number of barrels cured in 1880 was 1,473,6001. Comparing the fishing of 1882 with the average of the ten years 1872-81, the former showed an increase above that average of 339.486 barrels cured, 175,087 barrels exported, 9350 barrels branded, and £155, 16s. 10d. of brand fees. The increase in 1882 of 171,8181 barrels cured over 1881 was made up thus: East Coast, increase 73,8723 barrels; West Coast, increase 97,945 barrels. The weather in the season of 1882, on the East Coast more especially, was not favourable for fishing, being alternately too calm and too rough. A good deal of fishing property was destroyed by gales during the year. The loss of life, it is believed, was

not above the average of previous years.

Of the East Coast districts, 17 in number, extending from Eyemouth to the Shetlands, 9 showed an increase over the returns of 1881, amounting in all to 126,4884 barrels cured, and 8 a decrease of 52,6154 barrels, so that on the East Coast there was a net increase in 1882 over 1881 of 73,8723 barrels. The number of barrels cured in 1882 showed an increase of 8-1 per cent. over 1881; an increase of 19-3 per cent. over the average of the previous 10 years; an increase of 51-7 per cent. over the average of the previous 25 years; and an increase of 77.8 per cent. over the average of the 50 years 1833-82. The average number of barrels cured on the East Coast was 38,045 in the 10 years 1833-42, and it was 978,226 in 1882. The herring fishing continues to be much more extensively prosecuted on the Aberdeenshire coast than in any other part of Scotland. The number of boats engaged in 1882 in the Aberdeen, Peterhead, and Fraserburgh districts was 482, 822, and 900 respectively, making together 2204, which, however, was a falling off of 153 from the corresponding total for 1881. This decrease was chiefly owing to the successful fishing in Shetland having attracted Eshermen to that district. The gross number of boats engaged at Wick was 600, an increase of 30 over the preceding year. 266 large decked boats were engaged in the Shetland herring fishing, to which were added about the middle of August about 106 small boats, and the prosperity which attended the fishing on the east coast of that district was extraordinary. At Balta Sound, Unst, 11 boats fished, and their average catch for the season was 440 crans per boat; and the 266 decked boats averaged 362 crans each. The average at Aberdeen was 166 crans; at Peterhead, 151; at Fraserburgh, 155; at Wick, 116.

The fishing on the West Coast in 1882 was far more productive than it had been in any previous year. The number of barrels cured was 304,747, being 97,945½ more than in 1881, and 32,252 more than in 1880, the year in which, on the whole, the fishing was the largest recorded. The number of barrels cured showed an increase of 47.3 per cent. over 1881; an increase of 74.4 per cent. over the average of the previous 10 years; an increase of 92.6 per cent. over the average of the previous 25 years; and an increase of 158 per cent. over the average of the 50 years 1833-82. The number of barrels cured was 64,280 on the average of the 10 years 1833-42, and was 304,747 in

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the year 1882. Of the 9 West Coast districts all showed an increase except Loch Broom and Ballantrae, which together showed a decrease of 7294 barrels. The increase at the other 7 districts amounted to 105,239½ barrels, and was mainly due to 3 localities—Loch Hourn, Kilbrannan Sound, and Loch Fyne. At these places there had never been known such fishing before. Loch Fyne, so long famous for its extraordinary productiveness and for the rich flavour of its herrings, more than maintained its former reputation. No fewer than 780 boats were engaged in the fishing at Loch Hourn, while about 80 vessels were occupied in curing the herrings on board, and 10 steamers were employed in carrying them to market. About half the gross catch was sent to the home markets, either fresh or slightly salted. Between Kilbrannan Sound, in the Campbeltown district, and Otter Spit, in the Inveraray district, there was a denser shoal of herrings than the oldest fisherman had ever known, and the fishing was carried on from June to December with great success, both by drift and seine-trawl nets—the success of the latter mode of fishing being most marked.

On the whole, the fishing of 1882 showed, in the number of barrels cured, an increase of 15.4 per cent. over 1881; an increase of 29 per cent. over the average of the previous 10 years; an increase of 59.5 per cent. over the average of the previous 25 years; and an increase of 91.9 per cent. over the average of the 50 years 1833-82. The average number of barrels cured was 462,326 in the 10 years 1833-42, and was 1,282,973½ in 1882. Nearly all the herrings caught on both the East and the West Coasts were of good quality. The diminution of 31,570 barrels in the herrings branded in 1882, as compared with 1881, was chiefly due to the boats with their cargoes being kept at sea in calms, and to the almost complete failure of the fishing at Helmsdale and Lybster, both of which are branding districts. Of the increase of 80,103 barrels in the herrings exported, Ireland got 6917¾ barrels, and places out of Europe 2057; so that the great bulk of the increased export, 71,128½ barrels, went to the German and other Continental ports.

The results of the Cod, Ling, and Hake fishing of 1882 were, 121,337 cwts. cured dried, and 7737 barrels cured in pickle, while the quantity exported was 56,497 cwts. cured dried, being an increase upon the preceding year of 5823½ cwts. cured dried, and 3661½ barrels cured in pickle, and a decrease of 4929 cwts. cured dried in the quantity exported. 23,846 cwts. cured dried were sent to Ireland in 1882; 23,326 cwts. to the Continent; and 9325 cwts. to places out of Europe. There was a decrease in the quantities exported to Ireland and the Continent, caused by an increased demand in the home

markets.

The number of fishing-boats employed in 1882 was 14,973, an increase of 164 over the number for 1881; the number of fishermen and boys employed was 48,296, or 175 more than in 1881; the number of fishcurers was 1072, 9 more than in 1881; the number of coopers 2564, or 165 more; while the number of other persons employed about the fishing was estimated at 47,464, or 2173 more than in 1881. There had been an increase in the number of fishermen and boys of 990 in 1881 as compared with 1880. The amount of capital employed in boats, nets, and lines was greater in 1882 than in 1881. The value (estimated) of the boats was £646,883, as against £622,452; that of the nets £711.039, as against £663,572; and that of the lines £114,278, as against £112,437. The total estimated capital thus employed, £1,472,200, was £73,739 more than it had been in 1881. The tonnage of British vessels and boats employed in connexion with the fisheries of Scotland in 1882 was 275,592\frac{1}{2} tons—an increase of 6100\frac{3}{2} tons upon the preceding year. The tonnage of foreign vessels so employed also increased, being 36,318 tons, against 31,388 in 1881.

In 1882 the number of applications made through the Board's officers to register fishing-boats under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, was 925; the number of registers issued was 925; and the number of registers examined and endorsed was 5294. These numbers, as compared with the corresponding numbers for 1881, showed a decrease of 317 in the applications to register and of 315 in registers issued, but an increase of 54 in registers examined and endorsed. The decrease in the applications to register and in registers issued nearly all occurred in the case of small boats classed as third class.

The number of beats detained for non-compliance with the Act was 189, being an increase of 75 over the preceding year. Boatbuilders, it is said, were busily occupied in 1882 in fulfilling orders for boats of the first class, testing, when equipped for sea, from £220 to £300 each.

The following Table shows the number of boats, decked or undecked, employed in the shore curing herring, and cod and ling fisheries, in the several districts of Scotland in the year 1882; the number of fishermen and boys by whom manned; the number of fishcurers and coopers; with the estimated value of boats, nets, and lines; —

Besides the 51,932 fishermen, curers, and coopers employed in 1882, it is estimated (as already stated) that 47,464 other persons were employed in the fisheries in the same year. The tonnage of the boats was 116,741 tons. 5101 of the boats were of the first class (30 feet keel and upwards), 4423 of the second class (from 18 to 30 feet keel), and 5449 of the third class (under 18 feet keel).

The number of cod, ling, or hake taken, whether by vessels or by open boats, in 1882 (3,666,596), was distributed between the several districts as follows:—Anstruther, 222,785; Montrose, 110,392; Stonehaven, 12,35°

A report by Mr Young, Inspector of Salmon Fisheries, on the salmon rivers on the east coast of Scotland, from the Forth to the Kyle of Sutherland, both inclusive—a district which includes all the principal salmon rivers in Scotland with the exception of the Tweed—is appended to the Report of the Fishery Board, which conveys a general approval of it. It is stated that when Mr Young has inspected and reported upon the remaining salmon rivers of Scotland, the Fishery Board will submit a definite report on the whole subject of the salmon fisheries in Scotland.

INLAND REVENUE.

The Twenty-sixth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Inland Revenue on the Inland Revenue is for the year ended 31st March 1883. The net receipts for the year 1882-83 amounted to £53,683,572, being a net increase of £1,410,095 upon the previous year. There was a decrease of £187,882 on excise; a decrease of £657,125 on stamps; an increase of £3755 on the land tax; an increase of £89,774 on the inhabited house duty; and an increase on the income-tax of £2,161,573. The decrease on stamps, however, was not a true decrease, but arose from the fact that the fee and patent stamps are now paid over to the Treasury as miscellaneous revenue. The amount derived from these stamps was £856,532, so that the total stamp revenue showed an increase of £199,407.

I. Excise Duties.

The following Table exhibits the net receipts of the duties of excise in the United Kingdom in the years (ended 31st March) 1882 and 1883. The duty on railways was levied in Great Britain only, and the duty on chicory in England only:—

Spirits.—The number of gallons of spirits charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the financial year 1882-83 was 29,770,721 (viz., England, 13,587,389; Scotland, 8,729,169; Ireland, 7,454,163); in the year 1881-82 it was 29,680,560 gallons (viz., England, 13,868,006; Scotland, 8,620,225; Ireland, 7,192,329). In the year 1882-83 there was, therefore, a decrease of 280,617 gallons in England; an increase of 108,944 gallons in Scotland; an increase of 261,834 gallons in Ireland; and in the United Kingdom an increase of 90,161 gallons. [These figures show the quantities of spirits used for all purposes in respect of which duty was paid.] The number of gallons consumed as beverage in the United Kingdom in 1882-83 was 28,529,330 (viz., England, 16,655,808; Scotland, 6,496,070; Ireland, 5,377,452); in the year 1881-82 it was 28,624,187 (viz., England, 16,950,078; Scotland, 6,542,324; Ireland, 5,131,785). The decrease of consumption in the year

1882-83 in the United Kingdom was therefore 94,857 gallons, or 33 per cent. In England it was 294,270 gallons (1.73 per cent.); in Scotland it was 46,254 gallons ('70 per cent.); while in Ireland there was an increase of 245,667 gallons (4.79 per cent.) Though the decrease in the consumption in England and Scotland was comparatively small, it was, considered in connexion with the natural increase of population, the report observes, significant of altered habits; and there could not be any doubt that in some localities the spread of temperance principles had caused a marked diminution in the consumption of intoxicating liquors. It was remarkable, on the other hand, to find in Ireland, with a decrease of population, an increased consumption of 245,667 gallons. The stock of British spirits in bonded stores in the United Kingdom rose from 49,354,510 gallons at the close of 1881 to 51,436,936 gallons at the close of 1882 (an increase of 2.082.426 gallons), and was equal to rather more than a consumption of a year and three-quarters. This showed that the demand of consumers for matured spirits continued. The quantity of spirits distilled in the year ended 31st March 1883 in the United Kingdom was 38,442,814 gallons; in the year preceding it had been 39,339,722 gallons. The number of distilleries at work during the year 1882-83 was 171-13 in England, 125 in Scotland, and 33 in Ireland, and it is estimated that there was consumed in making spirits 859,363 quarters malt, 1,054,081 quarters raw grain, and 165 529 cwts. of molasses. The quantity of British spirits exported in the year ended 31st March 1883 was 2,551,466 gallons; in the year preceding it had been 2,815,644 gallons. The diminution thus shown was chiefly due to dulness of trade in Australia. The quantity of spirits methylated continued to increase, but it is believed (one attempt at defrauding the revenue was detected, however) that this arises solely from a legitimate demand. In the United Kingdom it was 2,100,765 gallons in 1882-83, while it had been 1,991,765 gallons in the year preceding. The quantity of plain foreign spirits imported (which competes with plain British spirits in the home market) was 697,253 gallons in 1882-83; it had been 445,851 gallons in the year preceding. The number of detections of illicit distillation in 1882-83 was 910 (11 in England, 16 in Scotland, and 883 in Ireland). In the year preceding it was 894 (5 in England, 8 in Scotland, and 881 in Ireland). The amount of duty received in the financial year 1881-82, in respect of foreign spirits and wines stored in excise warehouses, was, in the United Kingdom, in 1882-83, spirits £775,237, wines £162,967. The amount received in the United Kingdom in the preceding year was, spirits £615,675, wines £135,104, so that there was an increase of £159,561 on spirits, and an increase of £27,862 on wines.

Chicory.—The quantity of chicory charged with duty in the year ended 31st March 1883 was 2803 cwts.; it was 2869 cwts. in the year ended 31st March 1882—decrease in 1882-83, 66 cwts. The quantity of chicory brought to charge continues to decrease, and has been still further affected by the Act 45 and 46 Vict. cap. 41, which repealed the duty chargeable on vegetable substances prepared under the general name of chicory, substituting a system of affixing labels—carrying a duty of a halfpenny for every quarter of a pound—to every package containing ingredients other than coffee or chicory to be used with or instead of coffee.

Coffee Mixture Labels.—The number of coffee mixture labels issued in the year 1882-83 was—id. labels, 1,440,305; 1d. labels, 802,434. The net amount received for them was £6344—£5462 in England, £125 in Scotland, and

£756 in Ireland.

ended 31st March 1882 was, in England, 24,738,113; in Scotland, 1,088,000; in Ireland, 2,044,413; and in the United Kingdom, 27,870,526. In the year ended 31st March 1883 the number of barrels charged with duty was, in England, 23,874,632; in Scotland, 1,122,360; in Ireland, 2,143,899; in the United Kingdom, 27,140,891. The gross receipts from the beer duty in 1882-83 amounted to £8,570,746, and, deducting the sum repaid in respect of beer exported, the net receipt was £8,400,368. This was £130,450 less than the net receipt in the year preceding, and was £149,632 below the net receipt

as estimated. As in the case of spirits, the decrease in duty may to some extent be due to the influence of temperance societies, but the failure of the hop crops, both at home and abroad, was a great discouragement to brewers. That hops could not be got at a moderate price was also a sufficient explanation of a falling off which occurred in the number of persons brewing for domestic use. The total number of licenses issued in 1882-83 was 96,676; in the preceding year it was 110,025. The quantity of beer charged with duty in 1882-83 was 27,140,891 barrels, and 539,188 barrels were exported on drawback—so that the quantity retained for home consumption was 26,601,703 barrels. In the preceding year the quantity charged with duty was 27,870,526 barrels; the quantity exported, 499,353 barrels; and the quantity retained for home consumption, 27,371,173 barrels. As regards the import of beer, 1665 barrels spruce and 17,223 barrels beer were imported in 1882-83, as against 1932 and 12,013 respectively in the year preceding.

Licenses.—The numbers of licenses issued in Great Britain in the year ended 31st December 1882 were as follows:—Male servants, 181,994 (Scotland, 15,920), duty, £136,495; carriages with four wheels and weighing four cwts., 154,556 (Scotland, 15,446), duty, £324,568; carriages with less than four wheels or weighing less than four cwts., 305,020 (Scotland, 27,071), duty, £228,765; armorial bearings on carriages, 18,055 (Scotland, 1505), duty, £37,915; armorial bearings otherwise used, 39,246 (Scotland, 2943) duty, £41,208; dogs, 908,360 (Scotland, 84,363), duty, £340,635. The whole revenue from the establishment licenses in 1882, £768,951, showed an increase upon the previous year of £3348. The increase was due entirely to carriages (which showed an increase of nearly £5000), there being a decrease in each of the other branches of the revenue. There was a large decrease in the revenue from dog licenses (over £10,000) which is attributed to the higher rate of license duty. The number of game licenses issued in the United Kingdom in the year 1882-83 was 60,028 (Scotland, 7121), duty, £167,731; the number of licenses to deal in game was 3161 (Scotland, 353), duty, £6322; and the number of gun licenses was 155,565 (Scotland, 14,856), duty, £77,782. In the preceding year the duty from game licenses was £167,694; from licenses to deal in game, £6320; and from gun licenses, £76,824.

II. STAMPS.

The net receipts from stamps in the year ended 31st March 1883 was £11,691,025; in the previous financial year—including patents for inventions, £197,475, and fee stamps, £679,007, both now paid to the Exchequer as miscellaneous revenue—it was £12,348,150—decrease, £657,125. The principal items in the year 1882-83 were as follows:—Probate, inventory, and account duty, £3,759,391 (Scotland, £354,429); legacy duty, £2,714,778; succession duty, £821,760 (legacy and succession duty, Scotland, £360,639)—total probate, legacy, and succession duty, £7,295,929; deeds and other instruments, £2,043,711; bills of exchange and promissory notes, £757,918;

receipt, draft, and other penny Inland Revenue stamps, £915,045; bankers' notes and composition for do., £131,416 (Scotland, £24,757); licenses and certificates, £152,546 (Scotland, £29,439); patent medicines, £154,439; marine ces, £153,690. Taking the probate, legacy, and succession together, there was an increase in 1882-83 of £239,960— ASSUTANCES, £153,690. duties £7,25,929 against £7,055,969. There was an increase of £244,007 in probate duty, a decrease of £89,463 on legacy duty, and an increase of 285,416 on succession duty. All the items of the general stamp revenue showed an increase, with the exception of the deed duty, which showed a decrease of £77,050. The increases in inland revenue penny stamps, £25,525, in marine insurances, £11,997, and in the composition for bankers' bills and notes, £3,373, were evidence of greater activity in business. On bills of exchange and promissory notes there was only a slight increase, £1441, which, it is said, probably shows the growth of a practice of entering into fresh transactions by telegrams and settling balances by a Dr. and Cr. account, instead of drawing bills in connexion with each particular venture. It is stated that the working of the provisions of the Act of 1881, regarding estates not exceeding £300 in gross value, has proved eminently satisfactory. In 1881-82 about 5510 estates were dealt with under these provisions. In 1882-83 the number increased to nearly 11,000.

III. LAND TAX AND HOUSE DUTY.

The produce of the land tax was £1,055,188 in the year 1882-83; it was £1,051,433 in the year 1881-82. The produce of the inhabited house duty was £1,787,966 in 1882-83; it was £1,698,192 in 1881-82. The total produce of land tax and house duty in 1882-83 was £2,843,154; in 1881-82 it was £2,749,625; net increase in 1882-83, £93,529. The annual value of houses charged with house duty was, in Great Britain, £56,351,292 in 1880-81 (year ended 5th April), and £57,658,178 in 1881-82. In the latter year there was an increase in the gross amount of duty charged of £1,306,886, and an increase in the gross amount of duty charged of £46,415. The number of houses charged with duty was 1,111,386, as against 1,080,983 in the previous year—consisting of 232,223 shops, 81,979 beer-houses, and 33,316 farm-houses, all charged at 6d. per pound, and 763,868 dwelling-houses charged at 9d. per pound. Of the increase in the annual value charged to house duty in 1881-82 (£1,306,886), the sum of £855,321 occurred in the metropolis, partly owing to the new valuation of property in 1881-82. It is observed that the result of a new valuation in the metropolis, as affecting the yield of taxes, is not so marked now as it was formerly.

IV. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

The net receipts from property and income tax in the years (ended 31st March) 1882 and 1883, appropriated to schedules, are shown in the following Table:—

The rate of tax was, in 1881-82, at 5d. per pound, with arrears of the prior year at 6d., and, in 1882-83, at 6½d. per pound, with arrears of the prior year at 5d. The assessments for the year ended 5th April 1882 showed an increase of £16,227,087 in the gross annual value, and an increase of £13,191,776 in the net annual value—the gross annual value having been £601,450,977, and the net annual value £504,158,462. In the net annual raise there was an increase of £11,384,165 (2.71 per cent.) in England, an

increase of £1,854,277 (4.17 per cent.) in Scotland, and a decrease of £46,666 (0.18 per cent.) in Ireland. Under schedule A there was an increase in the gross assessments of £2,933,333, distributed as follows:— England, £2,794,057, or 1.80 per cent.; Scotland, £91,750, or 0.47 per cent.; Ireland, £47,526, or 0.36 per cent. Under schedule B the gross assessments showed a decrease of £387,652—a decrease of £324,193 in England, a decrease of £63,024 in Scotland, and a decrease of £435 in Ireland. The decreases under schedule B were due to the continued agricultural distress. In addition the sum of £3600 had been repaid, and the sum of £5902 included in schedules of discharge, both in respect of claims arising out of agricultural depression. These represented a total reduction in assessment equal to £1,059,373 in value, in addition to the £387,652 above mentioned. In the three years from 1879-80 to 1881-82 the total decrease in the assessments (including repayments) amounted to £2,242,568. Schedule C showed a trifling increase—from £39,846,473 to £39,992,771. Under schedule D there was an increase in the gross assessments of £12,046,275—an increase of £10,080,703, or 4.58 per cent., in England, an increase of £1,963,594, or 7.67 per cent., in Scotland, and an increase of £1978, or 02 per cent., in Ireland. So large an increase in the profits of trades and professions had not occurred since the year 1874-75. The gross amount of salaries assessed under schedule E showed an increase of £1,488,833 as compared with 1880-81, and the number assessed increased by 3080—from 168,609 to 171,689.

In 1881-82 the abatement of £120 allowed on incomes under £400 a year was claimed by 390,296 persons (336.559 in England, 37,130 in Scotland, and 16,607 in Ireland); and the amount exempted from taxation in consequence of the abatement was £45,570,518 (£39,048,685 in England, £4,623,956 in Scotland, and £1,897,877 in Ireland). It is stated that 12,087 persons obtained repayment of duty under the same provision of the law, and that this makes an addition of £2,025,792 to the amount of income relieved from duty. The result of the allowance of £120 on incomes under £400 on the assessments for 1881-82 was therefore to afford to 402,383 persons relief from the incidence of the income tax to an amount of about £47,596,310, which was 9.44 per cent. of the total amount charged in that year. It appears, too, that during the year 55,354 persons had the benefit of allowance on premiums for life insurance to the amount of £1,296,299, while 6616 obtained repayment of duty

on account of insurances, the amount allowed being £1,022,112.

In 1877-78, the income tax (then at 3d. per pound) produced £1,894,721 for each penny. In 1880-81 (at 6d. per pound) it produced £1,849,000 for each penny. In 1875-76 (the rate per pound being 2d.) it produced

£1,935,712 for each penny.

The net receipt of property and income tax levied in Scotland was £886,610 in 1881-82, and £1,193,967 in 1882-83. The total obtained from land tax, inhabited house duty, and property and income tax in Scotland was £1,038,859 in 1881-82, and £1,348,792 in 1882-83.

THE POST-OFFICE.

The Twenty-ninth Report of the Postmaster-General on the Post-office

is for the year ended 31st March 1883.

The number of post-offices in the United Kingdom at 31st March 1883 was 920 head and 14,486 sub-offices, being an increase of 488 offices on the number reported in the previous year. In the number of road letter-boxes during the year there was an increase of 770. Thus the whole number of postal receptacles in the United Kingdom was about 30,100 at 31st March 1883.

Letters. Post-cards, Book-packets, and Newspapers. - In the year ended 31st March 1983 the estimated number of letters delivered by the post-office 1.250,636,200 (England, 1,077,647,200; Scotland, 116,509,800; Ireland, 85,479,200); of post-cards 144,016,000 (England, 121,243,300; Scotland, 15,541,800; Ireland, 7,230,900); of book-packets and circulars 288,206,400 (England, 244.713,800; Scotland, 28,896,000; Ireland, 14,596,600); and of newspapers 140,602,600 (England, 108,613,500; Scotland, 15,784,600; Ireland, 16.304.500). As compared with 1882, there was an increase of 4.2 per cent. in letters, of 6.4 per cent. in post-cards, of 6.3 per cent. in book-packets and circulars; while there was a slight decrease in newspapers-attributable probably to increased facilities for their carriage offered by railways. In letters there was an increase of 3.9 per cent. in England, of 6.1 per cent. in Scotland, and of 5-2 per cent. in Ireland; in post-cards there was an increase of 6-1 per cent. in England, of 6-1 per cent. in Scotland, and of 12-5 per cent. in Ireland; in book-packets and circulars, an increase of 6.9 per cent. in England, of 3.7 per cent. in Scotland, and of 3.1 per cent. in Ireland; in newspapers an increase of 2.0 per cent. in Scotland, and trifling decreases in England and Ireland. The average number of letters delivered to each person in the population in 1882-83 was 41 in England, 31 in Scotland, 17 in Ireland, and 36 in the United Kingdom. The average yearly number of letters for each individual in the population of the United Kingdom was 3 in 1839 (before the introduction of penny postage); 7 in 1840 (after such introduction); 28 in 1872; and 35 in 1882. Taking the latest returns available with respect to foreign countries (those of 1881), the average number per head was, in the United States, 21; in France, 15; in Germany, 13; in Italy, 6; in Spain, 5. The number of registered letters in the United Kingdom in 1882-83 (excluding the official remittance letters) was 11,264,926, an increase of 3 3 per cent. upon the previous year. The number of letters received in the Returned Letter Offices in the year ended 31st March 1883 was 5,651,443, while in the previous year it had been 5,454,885. 82,082 letters were reissued to correct addresses, 4,829,218 were returned to the senders, 177,852 were returned unopened to foreign countries, and 562,291 could neither be delivered nor returned to the senders. 596,614 post-cards were received at the Returned Letter Offices in 1882-83, as against 559,409 in the previous year; 4,988,990 books, as against 4,701,394; and 477,978 newspapers, as against 414,794 in the previous year.

Telegraphs.-The telegraph business continued to increase during the year, but the increase in the number of messages was 746,155 only, as compared with 1,933,879 in 1881-82. The diminution in the rate of increase was partly accounted for by there having been two Easters, involving four holidays in the financial year. The number of messages was 32,092,026, viz. England, provinces, 14,455,015; London, 12,374,707 (an increase of 308,673); Scotland, 3,244,202; Ireland, 1,919,102. These figures include the number of certain press messages. 102 additional post-offices and 15 railway stations were opened for telegraph work during the year, making the total number of telegraph stations 5742. The revenue from private wires at the close of the financial year was £101,523, as compared with £88,736 in 1881-82. Although the minimum charge for inland telegrams was to be reduced from a shilling to sixpence as soon as the necessary increase of plant could be effected, the form the new tariff was to take had not been decided upon at the date of the report. Additional telephor

exchanges had been established by the post-office in ten large towns, and the nine companies to whom licenses had been granted for the establishment of telephone exchanges had 47 exchanges in operation—37 in England, 8 in Scotland, and 2 in Ireland.

Post-office Savings Banks.—On November 22nd, 1880, there came into operation an Act by which any person desiring to invest any sum between £10 and £100 in government stock can do so through the agency of a savings bank, at a trifling expense varying from 9d. to 2s. 3d., and have the dividends collected free of further charge. The purchase can be effected either by transferring money from the purchaser's account or by means of a sum specially deposited for immediate investment. Government stock to the amount of £1,143,717 was held by 16,609 persons at the close of 1882, as against £738,968 held by 11,812 persons at the close of 1881. The continued high price of government stocks had affected investments to a considerable extent. Thus, stock to the amount of £694,957 was purchased during 1881, while the amount sold was £75,868; and during 1882 the number of investments was only 12,153, the amount of stock purchased £588.211, and the sales were 4355 in number and to the amount of £177,122. The average amount of stock held by each person at the end of 1882 was £68, 17s. 3d., as compared with £62, 11s. 3d. in 1881. The number of ordinary depositors in post-office savings banks (2,607,612 at the end of 1881) was 2,858,976 at the end of 1882. The amount due to depositors (£36,194,495 at the end of 1881) had risen to £39,037,821 at the end of 1882. and was £40,087,000 on 31st March 1883. The increase in the amount of deposits in 1882 (£2,843,326) was the largest annual increase there had been since the establishment of the post-office savings banks. The number of depositors in post-office savings banks and old savings banks combined (4,140,098 at the end of 1881) was 4,411,958 at the end of 1882. The number of ordinary deposits made in post-office savings banks during 1882 was 6,110,208, and the amount deposited was £12,227,528 (an average per deposit The amount of interest credited to depositors at the end of the year was £891,629. There were besides 10,047 deposits, amounting to £382,847 (an average of £38, 2s. 1d.), made for immediate investment in government stock; and there was received for sales of government stock and stock certificates obtained £184,322, and from dividends on stocks £26,533, so that the total amount received by the post-office savings banks during the year was £12,821,230. The number of withdrawals (not including those relating to stock) was 1,918,544, and the amount withdrawn was £10,094,974; and the total number of withdrawals (including those made for investment in stocks and also sales of stocks and stock certificates obtained) was 1,935,129, and the amount withdrawn was £10.869,554 The average amount of each ordinary withdrawal was £5, 5s. 3d. The average amount at the credit of each depositor at the close of the year was £11 The charges of management in 1882 amounted to £221,653, being 11s. 41d. per cent. on the funds in possession of the banks; and the average cost of each transaction was 6 od. The total sum standing to the credit of the post-office savings banks on the books of the National Debt Commissioners at the close of 1882 was £40,862,640, and the balance in the hands of the Postmaster-General at the same date, after making provision for the amount required to meet interest warrants issued but not cashed, was £145,924; and the total sum applicable to the payment of depositors at the close of the year was £41,128,564. The number of post-office savings banks in the United Kingdom at the end of 1882 was 6999, and was at 31st March 1883, 7081; the number of post-office and old savings banks, taken together, at the end of 1882, was 7429. The proportion of the depositors in post-office savings banks at the end of 1882 to the population was ! to 10 in England, with an average sum of £13, 14s. 10d. to each account, 1 to 35 in Scotland, with an average of £7,3s.9d. to each account, and 1 to 48 in Ireland, with an average of £18, 1s. 7d. to each account. The funds of the post-office savings banks increased in Ireland during the year 1882. # they had done in the three previous years. The total amount of the deposits in Ireland at the end of 1882 was £1,925,460, as against £1,723,3%

in 1881—an increase of £202,065. This did not include the amount of government stock standing to the credit of depositors in Ireland, which was estimated at £125,000.

Money-orders.—By an arrangement commenced on 1st April 1882 the payment of army and navy pensions and of reserve pay is now made by means of money-orders. The amount thus paid within the year was £2,562,256, the number of orders being 552,029. This addition of business has checked the decrease which had occurred in inland orders in recent years. The total number of inland money-orders in 1882 was 14,306,297, as against 14,692,328 in the preceding year (a decrease of 386,531, or 2.8 per cent.), and the amount for which they were issued was £25,223,763, an increase upon the preceding year of £1,855,091. The returns for 1881-82 had shown a decrease of 1,636,648 in number and £861,091 in amount as compared with 1880-81. It is estimated that about 50 per cent, of the total number of inland orders are for sums over £1. The number of colonial money-orders in the year ended 31st March 1883, counting the issues both in this country and abroad, was 277,052, and the amount for which they were issued was £1,043,158, being an increase of 13 per cent. upon the number and of 17 per cent. upon the amount in the preceding year. The number of foreign money-orders, counting the issues both in this country and abroad, was 507,509, and their value £1,330,962, an increase of 14 per cent. upon the number and 17 per cent. upon the amount in the preceding year. The proportion of inland money-orders to population was, in England 46.2 to 100 persons, in Scotland 33 to 100 persons, in Ireland 16.6 to 100 persons, and in the United Kingdom 40.5 to 100 persons. The rates of commission upon foreign money-orders were reduced on 1st January 1883 by one-third, which will, it is believed, tend to an increase of this class of business. The postal-order returns in 1882-83 showed a large increase. About £3,451,000, as compared with £2,000,000 in 1881-82, were transmitted by means of those orders during the year, and no less than 7,980,328 orders were used. The 1s., 5s., 10s., and 20s. orders continued to be most in request. Proposals for the improvement of the system and its extension to the colonies were under consideration.

Post-office Annuities and Life Insurances.—The Act of 1882, designed to facilitate this class of business, had not, when the report was issued, been brought into operation, owing to the necessity of preparing new actuarial tables. The number of immediate annuities subsisting at the close of 1882 in the United Kingdom was 8793, and the amount of the annuities was £130,644. The number of immediate annuities granted during the year was 799, the purchase-money was £155,528, and the amount of the annuities £13,435. The whole number of immediate annuities granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1882 was 12,455; the amount of the purchase-money of those annuities was £1,845,354; and the amount of the annuities, £170,041. The number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money not returnable, subsisting at the end of 1882 was 267, and their amount £4827; the number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money returnable, was 313, and their amount £6799. Of the former 31, the amount of which was £561, of the latter 41, the amount of which was £941, were granted in 1882. The amount of purchase-money and instalments of premiums received in 1882 was £6449. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money not returnable, granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1882, was 299, and the amount was £5498. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money returnable, granted in the same period was 562, and the amount was £12,000. The number of contracts of life insurance entered into with the post-office, current at the end of 1882, was 4615; the amount insured was £371,540. The amount received during the year on contracts was £11,069. The number of payments made on account of contracts during the year was 141, and the amount paid on death or surrender was £5694. The number of new contracts entered into during the year was 234, and the amount insured by them £8,446. The whole number of contracts of life insurance entered into by the post-office, from the commencement of business on 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1882, was 6758, and the amount insured was £533,525.

Licenses.—The number of licenses issued in the year ended 31st March 1883 by the post-office, on behalf of the Board of Inland Revenue, was 1,243,457, of which 658,660 were for dogs. The revenue produced was £774,117. The number of licenses was greater than the number in the preceding year by 66,623, and the revenue increased by £64,936.

In the year ended 31st March 1883 the cost (included in the totals given above) of the manufacture of postage stamps, post-cards, and stamped newspaper wrappers was £117,765; of stationery,£39,789; of buildings and repairs, rents, rates, taxes, fuel, and light, £207,202; of supply and repair of mailbags and boxes, tolls and ferryage, and other charges, £30,495; of the conveyance of mails over the Isthmuses of Suez and Panama, and in other foreign parts,£14,716. From the total cost of conveyance given above is to be deducted the cost of conveyance of savings bank correspondence—£35,632 in 1882-83—so that the net cost of conveyance in that year was £1,566,621.

The gross postal revenue as given above includes the amount of unclaimed money-orders, which for 1882-83 was £3800. The net revenue of the year 1882-83 showed an increase of £14,558 upon the previous year. During the five years 1873-77 the average net revenue of the post-office was £1,833,368; and during the five years ended 31st March 1883 it was £2,605,279.

The gross earnings of the Telegraph Service in the year ended 31st March 1883 amounted to £1,740,063—an increase of £109,620 upon the previous financial year. It was made up as follows:—From messages and wires rented by cable companies, £1,781,617; news produce and special wire rentals, £97,989; private wire rentals, £84,429; miscellaneous, £29,517; extra receipts, £15,515—total revenue collected, £2,009,067; from which there had to be deducted—payments to cable companies, £265,860; and on account of porterage and message-money refunded, £3144; balance, being the total tele-

graph revenue, £1,740,063. The expenditure during the year charged to the Telegraph vote was £1,504,493. This gives as the net revenue from Telegraphs in 1882-83, £235,570. Adding to the total telegraph revenue, as given above, £27,997, the value of old stores, etc., sold by other departments, and, on the other hand, adding to the telegraph expenditure expenses incurred on account of the telegraphs by other departments, the total telegraph revenue for the year 1882-83 is found to be £1,768,060, and the total expenditure to be £1,585,013, which shows the net telegraph revenue

for the year to have been £183,047.

Taking together the net revenue of post-office and money-order business (£7,300,960), the savings banks profits (£344,792), and the total revenue of the telegraph business (£1,768,060), it appears that the gross revenue of the Post Office Department for the year 1882-83 was £9,413,812. On the other hand, taking together the total expenditure for the postal and money-order services (£4,545,398), the expenditure on savings banks (£221,653), and the total expenditure for telegraph business (including expenditure by other departments, £1,585,013), it appears that the total expenditure of the Department in the same year was £6,352,064. The net revenue of the postoffice in the year 1882-83 is therefore found to have been £3,061,748, being a decrease of £38,727 on the previous year. From this there has to be made a further deduction of £326,417, the interest on £10,880,571, the amount raised by the Government for the purchase of the telegraphs not provided for out of the post-office votes, but charged upon the Consolidated Fund. There was again, during 1882-83, a large increase of expenditure. Much of it was due to the development of business, but special items of outlay-for instance, the improvement of the letter-carriers position, the improved remuneration of sub-postmasters, and the improvement of telegraphic communication with Ireland-account for a considerable portion of it.

The births registered in 1882 (126,182) were at the rate of 3:33 per cent. of the estimated population. In the principal towns the birth-rate was slightly greater than that of 1881; in the other districts it was less. It was highest in the large towns, being 3:64 per cent. In the principal towns it was 3:57 per cent.; in the small towns, 3:39; in the mainland-rural districts, 2:93; and in the insular-rural districts, 2:46 per cent. Of the 126,182 children born, 64,572 were males, and 61,610 females, and the proportion of boys to girls was therefore 104:8 to 190. The proportion of male births was greatest in the insular-rural districts, and least in the large towns. Births were most numerous in May, when 383 per day were registered; least numerous in August and December, when 329 were registered daily.

The death-rate in 1882 (193 for every 10,000 of the estimated population—an unusually low rate) was almost the same as that for 1881. The average number of deaths was greatest in December, when 241 per day were registered; in September only 178 per day were registered; and the daily average throughout the year was 200.

The marriage-rate in 1882 was 70 for every 10,000 of the population. It was 78 per 10,000 in 1873. In 1879 it had sunk to 64 per 10,000. Since then it has been gradually rising. In 1882 in the principal towns it was 88 per 10,000; in the large towns, 75; in the small towns, 64; in the mainland-rural districts, 54; and in the insular-rural, 42. 120 marriages per day were registered in June; and in May so few as 40.2 per day—the daily average throughout the year being 72.8.

Of the children born in the eight towns (43,549 in number), 22,285 were males, and 21,264 were females, so that 104.8 boys were born for every 100 girls. The highest birth-rate was that of Greenock, the lowest that of Edinburgh. 8.0 per cent. of the births were illegitimate. If the relative numbers of illegitimate births among possible mothers be considered, the towns ranked as follows in respect of illegitimacy in 1882:—Edinburgh, 1.49 per cent. of illegitimacy; Paisley, 1.62; Perth, 1.67; Greenock, 1.85; Leith, 1.87; Dundee, 1.97; Glasgow, 2.19; and Aberdeen, 2.77 per cent.

The death-rate of the eight towns in 1882 (228 per 10,000 of estimated population) was lower than that recorded in any previous year except 1881. Leith had the lowest death-rate—186 per 10,000 persons, and Paisley the highest—257 per 10,000. Of the persons who died in the eight towns, 13,897 were males and 13,862 were females.

Out of every thousand children under five years of age at the middle of 1882, there died—in Leith, 53.5; in Aberdeen, 55.7; in Edinburgh, 56.6; in Perth, 64.1; in Dundee, 67.1; in Greenock, 68.2; in Paisley, 74.5; and in Glasgow, 84.8. The proportion of deaths at ages under five to the deaths at all ages was 33.9 per cent. in Perth; 35.4 in Edinburgh; 37.8 in Aberdeen; 39.0 in Paisley; 42.7 in Dundee; 43.3 in Leith; 44.6 in Greenock; and 45.8 per cent. in Glasgow.

The estimated population of the eight towns being 1,219,586, and the number of marriages 10,753, there were, in 1882, 88 marriages per 10,000 persons. In 1879 the marriage-rate in the eight towns had sunk to 80 per 10,000; since that year it has been gradually rising. In Edinburgh and Paisley it was lower than in 1881; in Aberdeen it was the same; in the other towns it was somewhat higher.

The following Table (in continuation of similar Tables in the Almanac for former years) shows the number of births, of marriages, and of deaths registered in the eight principal towns of Scotland in each month of the year 1882 and in each of the first ten months of the year 1883, together with the mean temperature of those towns in each month (having for their mean position 56° 12′ N. lat., 3° 30′ W. long., and 123 feet above the sea-level). The aggregate population of these eight towns was 889,133 at the middle f 1861, 1,073,608 at the middle of 1871, and 1,206,057 at the middle of 1881,

Appended to the Report on Births, Deaths, and Marriages is the Eighteenth Report by the Registrar-General on Vaccination in Scotland. The Report shows what proportion of the children whose births were registered in 1881 were vaccinated in terms of the Act 26 and 27 Vict. c. 108. From the vaccination returns it appears that of 126,277 children whose births were registered in 1881, 87:908 per cent. were successfully vaccinated; 1:256 per cent. had their vaccination postponed from ill health or other causes, 0-119 per cent. were found insusceptible of vaccination from constitutional insusceptibility, and 0.279 per cent. insusceptible from their mothers or nurses having previously vaccinated them. 8:384 per cent. died under the age of six months unvaccinated, while 2.054 per cent. (2594 persons) were removed from the districts before vaccination could be enforced, or were otherwise unaccounted for. Deducting from the children born during the year the number who died under the age of six months, it appears that, of the living children (115,690 in number), 95.953 per cent. (111,008 persons) were successfully vaccinated, while 1.371 per cent. had their vaccination postponed. Adding the number of those known to have been irregularly but

successfully vaccinated (352), it appears that 96.257 per cent. of the children born in 1881 who attained the age of six months had received the protection which vaccination affords. The number of cases in which a certificate of insusceptibility from some constitutional peculiarity was given was 150. The number of children who, by being removed from the district of their birth, or from any other unknown cause, were not vaccinated, or not known to be vaccinated (2594), was 2.242 per cent. of children alive at the age of six months. On the average of the ten years 1871-80 it was 2.242 per cent. (2522 persons). The proportion of cases in which vaccination is postponed has been increasing, and was greater in 1881 than that recorded in any previous year.

The number of deaths from smallpox was 1309 in 1855; 1306 in 1856; 845 in 1857; 332 in 1858; 682 in 1859; 1495 in 1860; 766 in 1861; 426 in 1862; 1646 in 1863; 1741 in 1864; 383 in 1865; 200 in 1866; 100 in 1867; 15 in 1868; 64 in 1869; 114 in 1870; 1442 in 1871; 2446 in 1872; 1126 in 1873; 1246 in 1874; 76 in 1875; 39 in 1876; 38 in 1877; 4 in 1878; 8 in 1879; 10 in 1880; and is

estimated at 12 in 1881, and 4 in 1882.

The population of the United Kingdom, as estimated to the middle of the year 1883 (exclusive of the army and navy and merchant seamen abroad), was 35,631,290, viz., England and Wales, 26,762,974; Scotland, 3,825,744; Ireland, 5,042,572.

THE CENSUS OF 1881.

The second volume of the Census of Scotland shows the ages of the people, their civil condition, occupations, birthplaces, and also the number of persons receiving instruction at each year of life. [For an account of the first volume, see the Almanac for 1883, pp. 237-251]. The tables in this volume are made for registration counties and districts, not for civil counties and parishes, because otherwise they would not be comparable with the Registrar-General's Returns of Births, Deaths, and Marriages. In the case of the principal burghs, however—that is, those with a population of 10,000 and upwards—the returns are prepared to afford information relative to the inhabitants resident within their municipal or parliamentary boundaries. The differences between the populations of the registration and civil counties are not inconsiderable, which is a consequence of parishes which extend to more than one county being held, for the purposes of the Registration Act, to be within the county in which the parish church is situated. As in former censuses, Scotland is, for convenience in presentation of facts,

divided according to the density of the population in various parts, locality, etc., the whole country being, on this occasion, divided first into two great portions, Northern and Southern, which are subdivided into eight divisions, five in the Northern, and three in the Southern, the counties being grouped geographically in the divisions; and, again, into the five groups of districts of the Registrar-General's Returns, viz., principal towns (with populations over 25,000), large towns (populations between 10,000 and 25,000), small towns (populations from 2000 to 10,000), mainland-rural districts (embracing the remaining districts on the mainland), and insular-rural districts (embracing the remaining districts on the islands).

AGES OF THE PEOPLE.

The male population of Scotland in 1881 (1,799,475) showed an increase of 196,332, or 12-2 per cent., and the female population at the same date (1,936,098) an increase of 179,223, or 10-2 per cent., as compared with 1871, the total increase, 375,555, being 11.17 per cent., so that the increase of the males in the 10 years was at the rate of 2 per cent. more than that of the females. The greatest rate of increase during the 10 years among both males and females, taking periods of 5 years from birth, was between the ages of 20 and 25, when there was, in the case of the males, an increase of 28,121 persons, or 20.3 per cent., and in the case of the females 23,149 persons, or 15 per cent. Taking Scotland on the whole, males preponderated over females between birth and 20 years of age, the numbers being, in the case of the males (0-5 years) 258,425, (5-10) 227,783, (10-15) 205,748, (15-20) 189.673, and, in that of the females, (0-5) 252,166, (5-10) 222,241, (10-15) 199,243, and (15-20) 188,597. At all ages after this the females were greatly in excess of the males. The proportion for all Scotland was 107.6 females to every 100 males in 1881; in 1871 it had been 109.6 females to every 100 males. In England the proportion in 1881 was 105.5 females to every 100 males, and in Ireland it was 104.3 females to every 100 males. While there had been a steady increase of both males and females at all earlier ages, the census of 1881 showed for both males and females a diminution of the numbers towards the end of life. In the males above 85 years of age there was a diminution of 83, from 2601 to 2518, and in the females above 90 a diminution of 71, from 1279 to 1208. While in the whole of Scotland the sexes were most nearly equal in number between 15 and 20 years of age, the excess of males being then 1076, that occurred in the same quinquennium in the large town districts, the excess of males being 545, in the small town districts, the excess of males being 734, and in the insular-rural districts, the male excess being 82; while it occurred in the principal town districts between 5 and 10 years of age, the excess of males being 544, and in the mainland-rural districts between 20 and 25, with a male excess of After the age named in each case the numbers of the female sex was greater than that of the male in every quinquennial period.

Between 1871 and 1881 the population of the eight principal towns increased by 217,596, of which 133,394 was due to excess of births over deaths, so that 84,202 persons must have immigrated into those towns from other places; the population of the large town districts increased by 61,063, the excess of births over deaths being 55,597, so that 5466 persons must have immigrated into those districts. On the other hand, in the same period, the population of the small town districts increased only by 93,838, while the excess of births over deaths was 121,735; the population of the mainland-rural districts increased by only 4674, while the excess of births over deaths was 145,529; and the population of the insular-rural districts actually decreased by 1616, though the births exceeded the deaths by 12,628. In these last cases respectively, 27,897 persons, 140,855 persons, and 14,244 persons must have left the districts to seek a living in other parts of the kingdom or of the world. The number of Scotch emigrants who left the United Kingdom during the ten years for places out of Europe was 170,686.

Taking the males between 20 and 40, the average for all Scotland was 28:543 per cent,—that is, there were 28,543 males between 20 and 40 in every 100,000 males in the population. The counties most under this average were Wigtown with 23.815 per cent.; Kincardine with 23.415 per cent.; Shetland with 22-717 per cent.; Banff with 22-712 per cent.; and, lowest of all, Kinross with 22-209 per cent. The counties most above the average were Dumbarton with 30-182 per cent.; Renfrew with 30-400 per cent.; Edinburgh with 31.643 per cent.; and Lanark with 32.505 per cent. The proportion of males between 40 and 60 years of age to the total male population was pretty uniform, varying from 14.644 per cent. in Selkirk to 18.141 per cent. in Sutherland, the mean for all Scotland being 15 652 per cent. The proportion of males at and above 60 to the whole male population—the percentage for all Scotland being 6.811-exhibited marked variations, varying from 4:385 per cent. in Lanarkshire to 12:405 per cent. in Shetland and 12:613 per cent. in Kinross. In the case of females between 20 and 40, the mean for all Scotland was 29.314 per cent., while the percentage fell so low as 25.141 in Banff and 25 019 in Kinross, and rose to 32 230 per cent. in Edinburgh and 32-666 per cent. in Selkirk. Females between 40 and 60, again, were 17-434 per cent. of the whole female population of Scotland; while they were only 15-719 per cent. in Linlithgow and 16-081 per cent. in Ayr, and were as much as 21.020 per cent. in Sutherland and 22.371 per cent. in Shetland. The females of 60 years of age and above were 8717 per cent. of the whole female population of Scotland. In Lanark they were only 6.058 per cent.; while, on the other hand, they were 16:315 per cent. in Sutherland and 16 417 per cent. in Shetland. In the burghs having a population of 10,000 and upwards, the males between 20 and 40 were 31.517 per cent. of the whole male population; those between 40 and 60, 15 477 per cent.; and those 60 years of age and above, 4.946 per cent.; while the females between 20 and 40 were 31.758 per cent. of the whole female population; those between 40 and 60, 17.240 per cent.; and those 60 years of age and above, 7.029 per cent.

THE BLIND AND THE DEAF AND DUMB.

The number of the blind in Scotland in 1881 was 3158 (1556 males and 1602 females), being 1 in 1182 of the population; of males, 1 in every 1156 was blind; of females, 1 in 1208. Otherwise put, there were 86 blind in every 100,000 males, and 83 blind in every 100,000 females. Only 280 of the 3158 blind were blind from birth (134 males and 146 females). Only 1 in every 13,341 of the population, therefore, was blind from birth; while 1 in every 1298 became blind from disease or accident afterwards. In 1871 the number of the blind in Scotland was 3019, or 1 in every 1112 of the population. There were 406 blind under 20 years of age in 1881 (245 males and 161 females), or 1 in every 4295 of the population under that age. There were 1359 blind under 50 years of age (811 males and 548 females); or 1 person in every 2342 under that age was blind. The males over 50 years old returned as blind numbered 745, and the females 1054, together 1799; or 1 in every 306 persons over 50 years of age was blind. The number of blind males exceeded the number of blind females until the age of 60 was reached, after which the female blind were the more numerous. The number of blind males increased gradually from birth until the sixtieth year of life, after which they began to fall off; in the case of the other sex, the numbers went on increasing (putting aside a falling away between 30 and 40) until the age of 80 was reached, after which they also declined in number. There were 845 persons blind per million in the whole population of Scotland. The average was exceeded in the north-eastern registration division, where the proportion of blind was 848 per million; in the south-eastern, where it was 982; in the north-western, where it was 1404; and in the northern, where it was no less than 1726 per million. In the southern division this proportion was 754; in the south-western, 748; in the west-midland, 705; and in the east-midland, 703 per million. The average was greatly exceeded in the northern counties -the blind being at the rate per million of 1311 in Orkney, 1497 in Ross and Cromarty, 1519 in Sutherland, 1731 in Caithness, and 2323 in Shetland. In

Selkirk, on the other hand, they were only 76 per million. The largest numbers of blind, however, were found, among the counties, in Forfar, 196; Aberdeen, 250; Edinburgh, 450; and Lanark, 735; which is accounted for to a great extent by the existence of charities in the chief towns of these counties. The number of deaf and dumb persons in Scotland in 1881 was 2142 (1149 males and 993 females). 1078 (560 males and 518 females) were returned as deaf and dumb from birth; but the Report suggests that it is improbable that so many were deaf and dumb from the first. 1064 deaf and dumb persons (589 males and 475 females) were returned as not born deaf and dumb. The deaf and dumb were 573 per million of the population in all Scotland, or 1 in every 1744 persons. In 1871 they were 1 in every 1610 persons, so that an improvement took place in the decennium, and it extended to all the divisions except the south-western, in which there was an increase from the rate of 528 to the rate of 546 per million. The greatest numbers of the deaf and dumb occur at early ages of life. \$26 persons (456 males and 370 females) under 20 years of age were deaf and dumb, or 1 in every 211 persons under that age-of whom 487 were between 10 and 20; 423 persons between 20 and 30; 290 between 30 and 40; 240 between 40 and 50; 163 between 50 and 60; 124 between 60 and 70; and only 76 above 70. The largest proportion of the deaf and dumb, as of the blind, were found in the northern and north-western divisions, while the smallest was in the southern division. The proportion of the deaf and dumb to a million persons, being for all Scotland 573, was 589 for the northern division; 609 for the north-western; 502 for the north-eastern; 549 for the east-midland; 550 for the west-midland; 546 for the south-western; 772 for the south-eastern; and 439 for the southern. The greatest numbers of deaf and dumb occurred, taking the counties, in Aberdeen, 126; in Forfar, 144; in Renfrew, 220; in Edinburgh, 363; and in Lanark, 427; which, as in the case of the blind, is to be accounted for by the existence of charities in the chief towns of these counties.

THE INSANE AND THE IMBECILE.

8406 persons (3939 males and 4467 females) were returned as lunaties in Scotland in 1881, which was in the proportion of 2250 per million, or 1 in every 444 of the population. In 1871 the proportion was 2021 per million, or 1 in every 494 of the population. Lunatics are comparatively few in the early years of life; but they increase rapidly after 20, attaining their maximum at 50, the largest numbers appearing between 30 and 60. Up to the age of 20 there were but 152 lunatics (92 males and 60 females), or 1 in every 11,473 of the population of the same years. Between 20 and 30 there were 1403; between 30 and 40, 1890; between 40 and 50, 2060; between 50 and 60, 1629; and the number over 60 was 1632, or 1 in every 163 of the population over that age. Up to the age of 40 the male lunatics outnumbered the female, there being 1673 of the former, or 1 in every 834 males of the same age, and 1412 of the latter, or 1 in every 1012 females of the same age. After 40 years the female lunatics outnumbered the males, numbering 3055, or 1 in every 165 of the female population over 40. while there were only 2266 male lunatics, or 1 in every 178 males over 40. The number of imbeciles returned in 1881 was 5991 (2896 males and 3095 females), or 1 in every 623 of the population, or 1603 per million of the population. In 1871 there had been 1 idiot in every 727, or 1375 per million of the population. Under five years of age there were comparatively few idiots—only 75 (45 males and 30 females); but between 5 and 10 years there were 400; and between 10 and 20, 1266 (724 males and 542 females). After this they gradually diminished -the number between 20 and 30 being 1103; the number between 30 and 40. 822; between 40 and 50, 672; between 50 and 60, 563; between 60 and 70, 525; and above 70, 565, 24 of whom were over 90. Up to the age of 30 the males outnumbered the females—the male idiots under 30 being 1579, and the female 1265. The number of male idiots over 30, on the other hand, was 1317, and that of the females 1830. Of the total number of the imbecile, 1128 (595 males and 533 females) were returned as imbecile from birth.

EDUCATIONAL STATISTICS.

Of the total population of Scotland in 1881 there were 510,591 under 5 years of age, 855,015 between 5 and 15 years, and 2,369,967 above this age. There were in receipt of education 14,152 infants under 5 years of age, 675,314 children between 5 and 15, and 30,633 above 15. 720,099 children, therefore, were being educated-2.77 per cent. of the population under 5 years; 78.98 per cent. of those between 5 and 15; and 129 per cent. of those over 15; and the total percentage of all receiving instruction to the whole population was 19.28 per cent. In 1871 the total number receiving instruction was 574,121-10,025 under 5 years; 541,995 between 5 and 15; and 22,101 above 15-being 2:19 per cent. of those under 5 years, 69:77 per cent. of those between 5 and 15, and 104 of the population above 15 years; and the total percentage of all receiving instruction to the population was 17.09. The total of both sexes under 15 years receiving education in 1881 was 689,466, or 18.45 per cent. of the population. The corresponding percentage in 1871 was 16.42 per cent. Of the children under 5 years receiving instruction in 1881 there were 11,203 between 4 and 5 years of age. In the burghs with over 10,000 inhabitants, which had a total population of 1.640,360 in 1881, there were 227,052 under 5 years, 358,792 between 5 and 15, and 1,054,516 over 15 years. There were receiving instruction 6092, or 2.68 per cent., of those under 5 years; 270,950, or 75.52 per cent., of those between 5 and 15; and 13,972, or 1.32 per cent., of those above 15 years—the total number receiving education in the burghs being 17.74 per cent. of their total population. The percentage of persons in receipt of education (including persons above 15) to the total population of each county in 1881 was 16.98 in Shetland; 19.66 in Orkney; 21.91 in Caithness; 18.43 in Sutherland; 20.43 in Ross and Cromarty; 20.97 in Inverness; 21.58 in Nairn; 21.80 in Elgin; 23.18 in Banff; 21.81 in Aberdeen; 21.91 in Kincardine; 18-83 in Forfar; 19-59 in Perth; 20-97 in Fife; 18-54 in Kinross; 22-53 in Clackmannan; 20-34 in Stirling: 17-98 in Dumbarton; 20-04 in Argyll; 16-62 in Bute; 17-98 in Renfrew; 20-01 in Ayr; 17.19 in Lanark; 21.49 in Linlithgow; 19:30 in Edinburgh; 19:41 in Haddington; 20-23 in Berwick; 18-90 in Peebles; 18-30 in Selkirk; 19-95 in Roxburgh; 20-53 in Dumfries; 20-95 in Kirkcudbright; and 20-98 in Wigtown. At ages between 5 and 15, the average percentage of those in receipt of education to the population of the same years, which was for all Scotland 78.98, was most exceeded in Orkney with 85.59 per cent., Ross and Cromarty with 85.88 per cent., Kirkcudbright with 85.90 per cent., Elgin with 85.96 per cent., Banff with 86.04 per cent., Nairn with 86.53 per cent., Caithness with 87.71 per cent., and Inverness with 87.86 per cent.; while most under the mean were Forfar with 76.49 per cent., Renfrew with 75.40 per cent., Bute with 74.89 per cent., Dumbarton with 74.87 per cent., and Lanark with 72.69 per cent. Of the 30,633 persons above 15 receiving instruction in Scotland in 1881, 16,716 were males and 13,914 were females; 655 were divinity students; 366 were law students; and 2342, including 7 females, were medical students. 13,972 persons above 15 were receiving instruction in the burghs with populations over 10,000, including students in divinity, law, and medicine.

CONJUGAL CONDITION OF THE PEOPLE.—HUSBANDS AND WIVES.— WIDOWERS AND WIDOWS.—BACHELORS AND SPINSTERS.

Of the 1,799,475 males in Scotland in 1881, there were 1,192,713 single, 547,772 were husbands, and 58,990 were widowers; of the 1,936,098 females 1,216,921 were single, 560,630 were wives, and 158,547 were widows. Taking those only of marriageable age—that is, above 15—of a total of 1,107,579 males, 500,757 were single, 547,772 were married, and 58,990 were widowers; and of 1,262,488 women 543,271 were single, 560,630 married, and 158,547 widows. The marriageable women exceeded the marriageable men in number by 154,969, or 12.3 per cent. Moreover 45.2 per cent. of the men were

single. The following Table shows the proportion of single, married, and widowed, as well to the whole of each sex as to the proportion of each sex above 15 years for Scotland, and also for England and Ireland:—

This Table shows that Ireland has, of the three kingdoms, by far the largest proportions of single men and women in the population, and the smallest proportions of married persons. At the same time there is about 2 per cent. more widows in Ireland than in Scotland in proportion to the female population,—14.470 per cent. against 12.559. The average number

of marriages in Scotland is 72 per 10,000, and in Ireland only 47.

There were 547,772 husbands in Scotland at the census, and 560,630 wives; 49.459 per cent. of the marriageable men were married, and 44.408 per cent. of the marriageable women. The difference between the number of husbands and wives, 12,858, represents the excess of husbands over wives who were absent from Scotland when the census was taken. Of every 100 men above 15 years of age 41 were husbands in Argyll; 42 in Inverness and Sutherland; 43 in Nairn; 45 in Perth; 46 in Bute, Caithness, Dumfries, Ross and Cromarty; 47 in Dumbarton, Elgin, Kirkcudbright, and Wigtown; 48 in Aberdeen, Banff, and Berwick; 49 in Edinburgh, Haddington, Kincardine, Linlithgow, Peebles, and Roxburgh; 50 in Kinross, Lanark, Renfrew, and Stirling; 51 in Ayr, Clackmannan, and Orkney; 52 in Selkirk; 53 in Forfar and Shetland; and 54 in Fife. Of every 100 females above 15, 33 were wives in Shetland; 35 in Sutherland; 36 in Bute; 37 in Inverness and Nairn; 38 in Ross and Cromarty; 39 in Argyll, Caithness, Dumfries, Perth, and Wigtown; 40 in Elgin and Kirkcudbright; 41 in Berwick and Orkney; 42 in Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Forfar, Kinross, Peebles, and Roxburgh; 43 in Banff and Haddington; 44 in Clackmannan, Dumbarton, and Selkirk; 45 in Fife, Kincardine, and Renfrew; 48 in Ayr; 49 in Lanark; 50 in Stirling; and 55 in Linlithgow. In the burghs, of every 100 males above 15 years of age, nearly 51 (50 909 per cent.) were husbands, the proportion varying from 44 per 100 in Inverness to 58 in Dysart. In Edinburgh the proportion was 48 per 100; in Glasgow, Greenock, and Perth it was 49; in Aberdeen and Paisley 51, in Leith 58, and in Dundee 54. The largest proportions occurred in Arbroath, Dunfermline, Kinning Park, and Kirkcaldy, each with 55, in Forfar with 56, and in Dysart with 58; the smallest in Hamilton and Maryhill, with 47 each, Dumbarton with 45, and Inverness with only 44. Of every 100 females above 15 in the burghs, 45 were wives, the proportions varying from 38 in Edinburgh and Dumfries to 66 in Motherwell. In Aberdeen and Dundee the proportion was 41 per 100; in Paisley it was 42; in Perth 44; in Glasgow 47; in Leith 52; and in Greenock 53. Next to that of Motherwell, the largest proportion occurred in Govan, Kinning Park, and Wishaw, in each of which it was 59, and the smallest, next to Edinburgh and Dumfries, in Inverness and Montrose, in each of which it was 40.

In Scotland 318,712 men between 15 and 45 years were husbands, and 369,442 women between the same limits were wives; while there were between 45 and 65 years 184,318 husbands, and only 163,684 wives; and of 65 years and upwards, 44,742 husbands, and only 27,504 wives.

The proportions of husbands and wives to the males and females respectively of the like age were much the same for those between 15 and 45 (40-142 per cent. for the men, and 42-864 for the women), but varied much at the later periods, the husbands between 45 and 65 being 77.953 per cent. of the men between those years, and the wives only 56.116 of the females, while at 65 and over there were 58 030 per cent. of husbands against 25 264 per cent. of wives. The mean age of husbands was greater by 3 0 years than that of wives, the former being 43.8 years and the latter 40.8.

Of the persons above 15 years of age in 1881, 500,757 males, or 45 214 per cent. of the males above 15, were bachelors, and 543,271 females, or 43.033 per cent. of the females above 15, were spinsters. For every 100 bachelors there were 108 spinsters, whereas in 1871 there had been 114 (and in 1861, 120). Of the males above 15 years in 1881, 39-180 per cent. were bachelors in England, and 50814 per cent. in Ireland. Of the females above 15 years, 36738 per cent. were spinsters in England, and 44.793 per cent. in Ireland. The proportion of unmarried men and women was, therefore, much smaller in England than in Scotland, and much higher in Ireland, where rather more

than half of the male population of marriageable age were single.

The widowers in Scotland in 1881 numbered 58,990, and the widows 158,547; of the marriageable males 5:327 per cent. were widowers, while of the marriageable females 12.559 per cent. were widows. There were 268 widows in the population to every 100 widowers. Between 15 and 45 there were 11,425 widowers-1.439 per cent. of the men between those years -and 27,523 widows, being 3.193 per cent. of women between those years. Between 45 and 65 there were 23,508 widowers and 71,470 widows; and at 65 and above there were 24,057 widowers and 59,554 widows. In 1881 Scotland had 53 widowers for every 1000 males above 15, and 125 widows for every 1000 females above 15; while the corresponding numbers for England were, 55 widowers and 116 widows, and for Ireland 59 widowers and 144 widows. In the burghs with over 10,000 inhabitants, 5 031 per cent. of the males over 15 were widowers, and 13:368 per cent. of the females over 15 were widows.

BIRTHPLACES OF THE PROPLE.

Of the 3,785,573 persons in Scotland when the census was taken, 3,397,759 (90-957 per cent.) were born in Scotland; 218,745 (5.856 per cent.) were born in Ireland; 90,017 (2.410 per cent.) were born in England; and 1806 (0.048 per cent.) in Wales; 949 (0.025 per cent.) were born in the Channel Islands; 12,874 (0.345 per cent.) were born in British Colonies; 7024 (0.188 per cent.) were British subjects born abroad or at sea; and 6399 (0.171 per cent.) were foreigners. Of the foreigners, however, 1125 were on board of 162 foreign vessels as crew, etc., and 773 were emigrants on board of three vessels going to America, so that the true resident foreign population numbered 4501 (0.120 per cent. of the population). In the burghs having populations of 10,000 and upwards, of the total population, 1,640,360, 87-116 per cent. were native-born, and 8-634 per cent. were born in Ireland, and 3-134 per cent. in

England. The percentage of persons born in Scotland, but not in the division of it in which they resided at the date of the census, was 5.828 in the northern registration division (Shetland, Orkney, Caithness, and Sutherland); 8742 in the north-western (Ross and Cromarty, and Inverness); 6:371 in the north-eastern (Nairn, Elgin, Banff, Aberdeen, and Kincardine); 12:388 in the east-midland (Forfar, Perth, Fife, Kinross, and Clackmannan); 29:593 in the west-midland (Stirling, Dumbarton, Argyll, and Bute); 16:484 in the south-western (Renfrew, Ayr, and Lanark); 26:342 in the south-eastern (Linlithgow, Edinburgh, Haddington, Berwick, Peebles, and Selkirk); 12:108 in the southern (Roxburgh, Dumfries, Kirkcudbright, and Wig-

Of the persons in each of the eight principal towns who were born in Scotland, the proportion who were natives of the town was, in Glasgow (parliamentary burgh), 62.063 per cent., Glasgow (municipal burgh), 61.886 per cent.; in Edinburgh, 53-664 per cent.; in Dundee, 61-839 per cent.; in Aberdeen, 58 972 per cent.; in Greenock, 63 232 per cent.; in Paisley, 69 358 per cent.; in Leith, 47.525 per cent.; and in Perth, 51.352 per cent.

OCCUPATIONS OF THE PEOPLE.

The general plan followed in exhibiting the occupations of the people in Scotland, as they were disclosed by the census of 1881, was that recommended by the Registrar-General of Eugland. The people were divided into six classes - professional, domestic, commercial, agricultural, industrial (or manufacturing), and unoccupied and non-productive (or indefinite). These classes were again subdivided into 25 orders, and the orders were still further subdivided into 81 sub-orders, which embraced 432 occupations or groupings of occupations. In 1871, wives, children, and scholars were treated as dependants on the various orders or sub-orders to which their husbands or fathers belonged. In 1881 this arrangement was departed from, and they were placed in the sixth class with those who have no specified occupation. Paupers, who were included in the sixth class in 1871, were in 1881 included under the occupation or trade at which they used to work. The following Table shows the total number of persons of each sex, distinguishing persons under 20 years from persons above 20 years, engaged in each of the six great classes of occupations :-

The total number returned as engaged in some occupation in 1881 was 1,606,984, or 43.018 per cent. of the population (3,735,573). The males returned as workers numbered 1,108,713, and were 61.613 per cent. of the male population (1,799,475); and the females returned as workers numbered 498,271, and were 25.736 per cent. of the female population (1,936,098). In 1871, out of a population of 3,360,018, there were 1,468,585 persons at work, or 43.707 of the total population. The male workers then numbered 977,980, and were 61.003 per cent. of the whole male population (1,603,143); and the female workers numbered 490,605, and were 27.925 per cent. of the whole female population (1,756,875). The proportions of the professional, commercial, and industrial classes to the total population increased, and those of the domestic, agricultural, and unoccupied decreased between 1871 and 1881.

EMIGRATION AND IMMIGRATION.

The total number of emigrants from the United Kingdom to places out of Europe, including foreigners, in the year 1882 was 413,288—an increase of 20,774 on the number in 1881 (392,514), which was itself an increase of 60,220 on the number in 1880 (332,294). The number of emigrants of British and Irish origin in 1882 was 279,366—an increase of 36,364 over the number of such emigrants in 1881 (243,002), which was an increase of

15,460 over the number of such emigrants in 1880 (227,542). The total emigration for 1882 was the largest ever recorded, and the increase occurred mainly in the emigration of persons of British and Irish origin, the number of foreigners emigrating being less than in the previous year. The emigration of persons of British and Irish origin in 1882 was larger than in any year since 1853, when the nationality of emigrants began to be distinguished. The character of the emigration of natives from the United Kingdom is now much more largely English and Scotch and less Irish than it was thirty years ago. It is said to be not improbable that the diminution in the number of foreign emigrants who passed through the United Kingdom which occurred in 1882 (about 15,000) implies rather a change in the route of the European emigration than any falling off in the amount. Besides the emigration recorded by the Board of Trade, it appears that in 1882 about 5000 persons proceeded from the United Kingdom to the Continent, and were thence shipped in foreign vessels as emigrants to the United States.

The number of immigrants into the United Kingdom, including foreigners, in 1882 was 78,268—an increase of 1163 upon the number in 1881 (77,105); but the number of immigrants of British and Irish origin, 50,599, showed a decrease of 2108 as compared with the number in 1881 (52,707). The excess of the total emigration, including foreigners, in 1882, over the total immigration was 335,020; and taking the emigration and immigration of persons of British and Irish origin, it was 228,767—the figures in both cases being unprecedentedly large. The loss of population to the United Kingdom by emigration in 1882 was very nearly half the total excess of births over deaths. As already noticed, the loss is more largely than it was thirty years ago a loss of English and Scotch as distinguished from Irish population. But the Irish emigration continues large in proportion to the population of Ireland, and it increased in 1882.

The increase of emigration in 1882 was not so marked in the numbers going to the United States as in the numbers going to other places. The increase in the excess of emigrants of British and Irish origin to the United States in 1882, as compared with 1881, was 7000 only, while the increase in the excess of emigrants to British North America was no less than 16,000, and to Australasia about 14,000. It is remarked that the Canadian Government has been making great efforts to have its north-western provinces settled; and that the increase to Australasia is not improbably due to renewed efforts of the colonial governments to obtain emigrants. The United States still receives much the largest share of the emigration to

North America. Taking the total emigration (413,288), it was made up of 56,739 cabin passengers and 356,549 steerage passengers, against 54,270 cabin passengers and 338,244 steerage passengers in 1881. In 1882 the increased emigration of persons of English origin was 23,000, the total being 163,000; the increased emigration of persons of Scotch origin about 5400, the total being 32,000; and the increased emigration of persons of Irish origin about 8000, the total being 84,000. There were about 195,000 English and Scotch emigrants, as compared with 84,000 Irish; and the circumstances determining emigration in 1882 may be considered to have been general, and not very specially connected with the condition of Ireland. The Irish emigration, however, contains only 13 per cent. of children, while they are 20 per cent. of the English emigration and nearly 23 per cent. of the Scotch; and among the single adults emigrating from Ireland there is only a small excess (about a fourth more) of males over females, while in the corresponding class of emigrants from England and Scotland there are about three males to one female—so that the Irish emigration is proportionately far more effective in retarding the growth of population at home than is the English or Scotch emigration. During the three years 1880-82 the number of Irish emigrants from the United Kingdom exceeded the excess of births over deaths in Ireland by about 160,000.

In 1882, 305,999 emigrants sailed from ports in England; 49,101 from ports in Scotland (only 4 from other ports than Glasgow and Greenock); and 58,188 from ports in Ireland. Of the total of emigrants, including foreigners, 256,154 were males, and 157,134 were females. Of the English emigrants 101,680 were males, and 61,312 females; of the Scotch, 20,155 were males, and 12,087 females; of the Irish, 44,427 were males, and 39,705 females; of the

emigrants of British origin, 166,262 were males, and 113,104 females. Of the English emigrants, 129,588 were adults, and 33,404 children under twelve years of age; of the Scotch, 24,930 were adults, and 7312 children; of the Irish, 72,883 were adults, and 11,249 children. Of the total of emigrants of British origin, 227,401 were adults, and 51,965 children. Of the total number of emigrants, including foreigners, 334,127 were adults, and 79,161 were children under twelve. Of the adult English emigrants 63,992 were single males and 22,519 single females; of the adult Scotch, 13,451 were single males and 4857 single females; of the adult Irish, 34,937 were single males and 28,605 single females.

The total number of emigrants from the United Kingdom to places out of Europe from 1815 to 1882, both inclusive, including foreigners, was 10,047,835, of whom 6,608,035 went to the United States; 1,712,020 to British North America; 1,364,226 to Australasia; and 363,554 to all other places. The number of emigrants of British origin from the United Kingdom to places out of Europe from 1853 (when the nationality of emigrants was first distinguished) to 1882, both inclusive, was 5,085,799, of whom 3,383,601 went to the United States; 496,047 to British North America; 996,003 to Australasia; and 210,148 to all other places. The number of emigrants of British origin to all places out of Europe was 1,312,683 in the eight years 1853-60; 1,571,829 in the ten years 1861-70; and 1,678,919 in the ten years 1871-80. Of the 5,085,799 emigrants of British origin who left the United Kingdom in the 30 years 1853-82, 2,333,120 were English, 494,331 were Scotch, and 2,258,348 were Irish.

EDUCATION.

The Tenth Annual Report of the Committee of Privy Council on Education in Scotland is for the year ended 30th September 1882. The Report states that in the year ended at that date the inspectors visited 3073 dayschools in Scotland to which annual grants were made, containing 3380 departments under separate teachers, and furnishing accommodation, at 8 square feet of superficial area per child, for 619,086 scholars, or about one-sixth of the estimated population. There were on the registers the names of 555,660 children, of whom 115,907 were under seven years of age; 399,344 were between seven and thirteen; 26,155 were between thirteen and four-teen; and 14,254 were above fourteen. Of these scholars, 490,372 were present on the day of the inspector's visit to their respective schools, while 421,265 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 413,266, having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to be examined, 57,731 (under seven) collectively, and 355,535 (above seven) individually, in reading, writing, and arithmetic; 54,207 were actually presented for collective and 320,750 for individual examination, and while of these last 243,814 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects, 92.31 scholars out of every 100 examined passed in reading, 89.28 in writing, and 85.13 in arithmetic. Each scholar examined made on an average 2.67 passes. These figures showed a remarkable improvement upon the results of the administration of the department up to 1872, the year in which the Education Act was passed. In ten years the accommodation had increased by 337,418 school-places (or 119.79 per cent.); the scholars on the register by 288,612 (108.08 per cent.); those present at inspection by 265,072 (117.65 per cent.); and the average attendance by 207,716 (97.27 per cent.); while the number of children individually examined increased by 190,828 (or 146.88 per cent.) During the year 1881-82, the accommodation had increased by 6,603 places, the scholars on the register by 10,678, those present at inspection by 15,351, the average attendance by 11,299, and the number of children individually examined by 9522, or 3.06 per cent. The local effort which resulted in this improvement was to be measured by the continued support derived from voluntary contributions (£30,128 from 4198 subscribers), and by the contributions from rates to the maintenance of public schools, which

had, however, decreased from £196,563 to £191,797. The school pence had increased by £8717 during the year 1881-82, and amounted to £269,218. The government grant rose in the year from £359,903 to £372,901, or from 17s. 64d. to 17s. 84d. per scholar in average attendance. The night-schools examined during the year were 221 in number; 11,094 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; and 13,542 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances during the Of these, 10,664 were actually examined, and night-school session. out of every 100 scholars so examined 9546 passed in reading, 8356 in writing, and 73:57 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 5728 certificated teachers at work in the aided schools which they visited, while the seven training colleges, from which the supply of such teachers is mainly recruited, were attended in 1882 by 850 students. These students (with very few exceptions), and 242 acting teachers, were examined for certificates in December 1882. At midsummer 1883, 1150 candidates for admission to the training colleges were examined; and of these 932 passed creditably, and 416 were, at the date of the Report, in their first year of residence, along

with 442 students of the second year.

In connexion with school-supply, the Report states that the aided schools, which in 1872 provided for 281,668 scholars, or for 8.3 per cent. of the population, were in 1882 sufficient for 619,086 scholars, or 16.4 per cent. of the population. Of the total increase of 337,418 seats, some 63,260 were required to meet the growth of the population during the ten years. The rest, or upwards of 274,000 seats, was to be taken as the measure of the deficiency in inspected schools at the passing of the Education Act. The accommodation now in existence has been supplied in various ways. The returns made to the Committee show (1) that between 1839 and 31st December 1882 grants to the amount of £677,083 had been paid in aid of building 987 residences for teachers, and of building 1384 new schools for 281,001 scholars, and enlarging or improving 497 schools for 53,475 scholars, or for 334,476 scholars in all. For 72,081 of these scholars accommodation was provided by voluntary effort in 422 new and 128 improved schools, at a cost to the promoters of £230,122, and to the State of £109,411, or at the rate of about £4, 14s. 2d. per scholar. Since the passing of the Act of 1872, provision had been made for 262,395 scholars in 962 new and 369 improved public schools, and for 749 teachers' residences, at a cost to the rates of £2,057,274, and to the State of £567,672, or at a cost of £7, 16s. 10d. per scholar from the rates, and of £2, 3s. 3d. from the Parliamentary grant—that is, at the rate of £10, 0s. 1d. per scholar. (2) The Board of Education had sanctioned applications of School Boards for leave to borrow to the amount of £2,398,802. The Department, since succeeding to the functions of the Board, had authorized further loans amounting to £422,647. The returns show (3) that the number of schools to which annual grants were made was, in 1872, 1902 (many of these schools have been discontinued, or transferred to school boards); in 1880, 3056; in 1881, 3074; in 1882, 3073. Of the 1902 schools to which grants were made in 1872, 1311 (including the parish schools) belonged to the Established Church. 523 to the Free Church, 46 to the Episcopal Church, and 22 to the Roman Catholic Church. Of the 3073 schools aided in 1882, 2477 were public schools, 123 Church of Scotland schools, 32 Free Church schools, 77 Episcopal schools, and 137 Roman Catholic schools, and there were 227 undenominational and other schools (included with Church of Scotland and Free Church schools in former years). (4) By the 31st December 1873, when the time for applying for building grants expired, 1685 applications for such grants had been received, the applications relating to the provision of school-room for about 250,000 children, and of 1083 residences for teachers. At 1st April 1883, 1419 of these applications had been granted, 54 refused, and 213 withdrawn by the school boards; and in 1412 cases grants had been announced to the amount of £573,519, and 1402 grants, to the amount of £568,955, had been paid. In 6 cases the amount of the grant to be awarded had not been fixed; in 10 more the awards had been made but not paid. Coming to the question, how far the existing school-supply (619,086 seats) provides for the wants of the country, the Report points out (the age statistics of the census of 1881

had not been published when it was written) that about 23·1 per cent. of the population are between 3 and 13 years of age; that, assuming that six-sevenths of that population are of the class whose children may be expected to be in State-aided schools, about 19·8, or say 20 per cent., of the whole population should be found on the registers of aided schools; that, making due allowance for absence on account of sickness, weather, distance from school, and other reasonable causes, school seats should be provided for one-sixth of the whole population; and, therefore, the estimated population of 1882 being 3,775,364, there is need for 629,227 school places. The actual school-supply, therefore, was somewhat defective; and, moreover, it was not evenly distributed. It is stated, however, that when the outstanding building grants should have been paid, and several schools in course of erection without State aid have been completed, the school-supply of the country would be virtually complete.

While with the population of Scotland in 1882 there might be 755,072 (1 in 5) on the registers, and 629,227 (1 in 6) in average daily attendance, there were only 555,560 children on the registers, and 421,265 in attendance. other words, for every 100 children of school age, for whom 82 school seats had been provided, there were only 74 scholars on the registers and 56 in daily attendance. Making still further deductions for the absence of children under five, of half-timers, and of those who had passed the standards exempting them altogether from school attendance—on the calculation that every child should go to school for seven years, there should have been at least a hundred thousand scholars more on the registers of aided schools. and a further increase of the same amount in the average attendance. That. nevertheless, had risen from 213,549 in 1872 to 421,265 in 1882, or from 6-29 to 11:16 per cent. of the population, and the increase in the average attendance in 1881-82 (2:17 per cent.) had been fairly satisfactory, for it was slightly in excess of that (1.06) of the population generally. It was obvious, however, that there had been great neglect on the part of many boards in putting their compulsory powers into operation—the number of children under seven in the schools being too small, and there being a disproportion between the registered scholars and the number found qualified for examinationand it appeared from the inspectors' reports that illegal employment prevailed in the northern and other districts. The total number of children on the registers of schools in Scotland in 1882 (528,990) was 67.66 per cent. of the total number of children in the population between five and fourteen years of age; and assuming that a seventh of the children between these ages receive instruction in schools of higher grade than those aided by the Department, it was 78.94 per cent. of the remainder. Taking the children between six and thirteen only, the returns show that the school registers contain the names (465,085) of 77.01 per cent. of the whole number of such children, and 89-84 of the number of those who would naturally be found in aided schools. If the number in attendance approached closely to the number on the registers this might be regarded as satisfactory. But that was not the case. There had been neglect especially with regard to chil-Only 114,267 such children (out of 290,000 between dren below seven. four and seven years of age) were on the registers; and of these the average attendance was not more than 81,087. And of these only 25,987 were taught in infant schools proper; 10,454 were in the lower classes of mixed schools under schoolmistresses; and as many as 44,646 were in similar classes under male teachers, who, it is said, are obviously unsuited for such a charge. It is stated that the Department had brought in a Bill to give school boards further powers for procuring the attendance of children who were withheld from the schools.

The counties in which the school registers contained the names of the largest proportion of the children who ought to be at school were, in order of merit, Linlithgow, Banff, Kincardine, Aberdeen, Elgin, Stirling. The counties which secured the best attendance on the part of the scholars on the registers were, Bute, Peebles, Berwick, Dumfries, Fife, Edinburgh. The counties in which the average attendance approaches most closely to the number who ought to be daily at school were, Linlithgow, Banff, Aberdeen, Kincardine, Berwick, Fife.

While there was an increase of 10,678 scholars on the registers, of 11,299 in average attendance, and of 9522 individually examined, in 1882, as respared with 1881, the Report notices, with an expression of regret, the arge number (34,785) of scholars who, though qualified by attendance for inividual examination, were not presented to the inspectors; and the small number (114,699) of scholars above ten presented in the upper standards out of the total number on the registers (220,694) qualified by age for examinatrue in those standards, of whom as many as 89,799 were over twelve, and 14.254 above fourteen years of age. Out of 320,750 scholars examined, 162,057, being over ten years of age, ought to have been presented in Standards IV .-VI., while only 114,699, or 70.78 per cent., were so presented; and the others 47.358, were presented in standards suitable to children of seven, eight, and mine years of age. There had, however, been a gradual improvement, probably due to the payment of certain grants being made dependent upon the proportion of scholars examined in the higher standards. Since 1875 the proportion of children examined in the higher standards had risen from 18-77 to 36-69 per cent. It is noticed with regret that the education of so many children of ten years old and upwards is discontinued as soon as, by passing the prescribed standard, they are freed from the

sbligation to attend school, and become entitled to go to work.

The statistics of the year show the following results, the corresponding results in England being, for purposes of comparison, given in brackets:-For every 100 scholars in average attendance—i. 54 (53) were boys, 46 (47) were girls; fi. 19 29) were infants, i.e., below seven years of age, 40 (37) were between seven and ten, 41 (34) were above ten; iii. 14 (23) infants had attended 250 times and upwards, of whom 13 (22) were presented to H.M. inspectors; iv. 84 (75) scholars above seven had made the requisite number of attendances, and 76 (70) were presented to H.M. inspectors, of whom 38 (35) were above ten years of age, while of these only 27 (19) were presented in Standards IV.-VI.; v. 78 (62) secured grants under Art. 19, c.; vi. 14 (6) were presented for examination under Art. 21 (specific subjects); and vii. each scholar presented to H.M. inspectors made, on an average, 2:67 (2:48) passes in the standard examination. Of the children above seven there were 77 (75) in daily attendance, and 80 (78) qualified for examination; of whom 72 (73) were presented to the inspectors, being 90 (94) per cent. of those qualified. It is noted that, of 58,210 scholars presented, under Article 21 of the Code, in subjects beyond the standard examination, 3798 were examined, and 2805 passed in three such subjects; 35,034 were examined, and 24,190 passed in two such subjects; and 23,088 passed in one subject. This, it is said, showed a satisfactory advance upon the numbers of the preceding year. Considering the number of new schools, that in 1863 out of 351 departments (the number exclusive of infant schools) scholars were examined in specific subjects showed a greater rate of progress than could reasonably have been anticipated.

The number of certificated teachers in the schools inspected in 1882 (5728) gave 1 certificated teacher to every 74 of the average attendance. Assuming that there should be not less than 500,000 children in daily attendance, between 6000 and 7000 certificated teachers would be required to meet the wants of the country; but, owing to the limitation of the staff of pupil-teachers, and the disposition to form separate departments for girls and infants, and the number of small schools required in country districts, it is anticipated that sgreater number will eventually be required. The training colleges at present are furnishing a yearly supply of 430 teachers who have been trained for two years, which would of itself be sufficient to fill up the waste

(calculated at 6 per cent.) in a staff of 8000 teachers.

The expenditure from the parliamentary grant in Scotland during the year ended 31st December 1882 was-on public schools, £312,047 (a decrease of \$2240); on schools connected with the Established Church, £28,206 (a decrease of £235); on schools connected with the Free Church, £18,215 (a decrease of £122); on undenominational and other schools, £26,207 (an increase of £595); on schools connected with the Episcopal Church, £9393 (a decrease of £473); on Roman Catholic schools, £25,642 (an increase of £1887); on administration (viz., inspection and poundage on Post-office orders only), £31,641; grants to school boards under section 67 of the Education Act, £6332—total, £457,687, being an increase of £2690 upon the previous year. The expenditure from the Parliamentary grant on Normal Schools in Scotland in the year ended 31st December 1882 was £26,073.

The returns received from inspected schools show that the average cost of the maintenance of the schools per child in average attendance in the year ended 30th September 1882 was—in board schools, Scotland, £2, 2s. 1d.; in board schools, England, £2, 1s. 6½d.; in voluntary schools, Scotland, £1, 16s. 5½d.; in voluntary schools, England, £1, 14s. 6½d. The charges were met in board schools—by the ratepayers, Scotland, 11s. 6d.; England, 17s. 0d.; by the children, Scotland, 12s. 8½d.; England, 9s. 4d.; by endowment, Scotland, 7½d.; England, ½d.; by miscellaneous receipts, Scotland, 4d.; England, 6½d. The charges were met in voluntary schools—by subscribers, Scotland, 6s. 3½d., England, 6s. 10½d.; by the children, Scotland, 12s. 2d., England, 11s. 0d.; by endowment, Scotland, 2s. 1d., England, 1s. 4½d.; by miscellaneous receipts, Scotland, 4d., England, 4½d.

The Report of the Committee of Council on Education in England and Wales, for the year ended 31st August 1882, shows that in England and Wales, in that year, 18,289 day-schools to which annual grants were made were visited by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools. These schools contained 26,779 departments under separate teachers, and furnished accommodation for 4,538,320 scholars. There were on the registers of those schools the names of 4,189,612 children, of whom 1,314,609 were under seven years of age, 2,670,480 were between seven and thirteen, 158,956 were between thirteen and fourteen; and 45,567 were above fourteen. 3,542,742 scholars were present on the day of inspection, while 3,015,151 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 2,943,114, having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to bring grants to their schools, 690,660 without individual examination, and 2,252,454 on passing a satisfactory examination in reading, writing, and arithmetic. 661,056 were presented for collective, and 2,119,374 for individual examination; and while, of these last, 1,378,175 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects, 89:22 scholars out of every 100 examined passed in reading, 81.92 in writing, and 77.27 in arithmetic. These figures showed some improvement upon those for the preceding yearan increase in accommodation of 3:39 per cent. (the increase in the population being estimated at 1.35 per cent.), in scholars registered of 3.57 per cent., in the average attendance of 5-29 per cent., while the number of children individually examined increased by 6.2 per cent, (123,676). The night-schools visited during the year were 1015 in number; 33,135 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; 34,492 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances; 25,370 were actually examined, and out of every 100 scholars so examined, 89-68 passed in reading, 69-07 in writing, and 49-27 in arithmetic.

The government grant to elementary day schools was 15s. 10id. per scholar in average attendance, as against 15s. 8id. in the previous year. The statistics of results of instruction, as compared with those obtained in Scotland, have been given above.

At 31st August 1882 there were in England and Wales 3868 board schools, with accommodation for 1,248,746 children, and attended on the average by 945,231 scholars. The population under school boards in 1883 is stated at 15,980,403, the whole population of Eugland and Wales in 1881 having been 25,974,439. Under the Education Act of 1876, school-attendance committees have been appointed in all the municipal boroughs (109) which are not under the jurisdiction of school boards, and in all those unions (579) of which any portion was not under the jurisdiction of a school board, while 71 urban sanitary authorities had been authorized to appoint school-attendance committees for parishes under their jurisdiction. The population under school-attendance committees in 1883 was 9,994,036. Bye-laws for enforcing attendance at school have now been sanctioned for all the districts in which provision has not otherwise been made for the compulsory attendance of

children at school. The bye-laws, it is stated, differ in respect of the limits of age between which attendance is made compulsory, and still more in respect of the conditions on which attendance from school is dispensed with. Some slight progress towards uniformity was made in 1882, but it is stated that a general measure dealing with the educational conditions of employment is desirable for removing the hindrances which obstruct the efficient administration of the law.

The expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, in the year ended 31st December 1882, was as follows:—On schools connected with the Church of England, £1,317,803; on British, undenominational, and other schools, £221,933; on Wesleyan schools, £111,956; on Roman Catholic schools, £137,244; on board schools, £813,408; on parochial union schools, £120; on administration (including part of the cost of administration for Scotland), £196,929; on organization of districts under the Education Act of 1870, £283; grants to school boards under section 97 of the Education Act of 1870, £2325,—total, £2,802,005. The whole expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, from 1839 to 31st December 1882, was £33,658,349.

The expenditure by the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland from parliamentary grants and rates, in the year ended 31st March 1883, was £719,535. The number of schools in operation at the close of the year 1882 was 7705. The average daily attendance of children for the year was 469,192; while the total number of children at any time on the rolls for the year was 1,083,298 (but this was greater than the number of individual pupils enrolled-children who had left school and gone back again being counted more than once), and the number who had made any attendance within fourteen days of the school examinations was 678,970. Of the number last mentioned, 95 per cent. were Episcopalians, 10 5 per cent. were Presbyterians, 789 per cent. were Roman Catholics, and 1.1 per cent. of other persussions. The average attendance in 1882 was greater by 15,625 than in 1881, There were, at the end of 1882, 1333 schools vested in trustees, and 823 vested in the Education Board, but 162 of these were not yet in operation, and 102 were on the "suspended list." There were 5813 non-vested schools The teaching staff at the end of 1882 consisted of 7497 principal teachers, and 3035 assistant teachers, making 10,532 persons, of whom 3491 had been trained in the Normal establishment. There were, besides, 208 workmistresses, 74 junior literary assistants, 81 temporary assistants, and 4 temporary work mistresses. These numbers do not include the conductors of 202 convent and monastery schools paid by capitation.

THE SCIENCE AND ART DEPARTMENT.

The Thirtieth Report of the Science and Art Department of the Committee of Council on Education is dated 21st May 1883. The Report states that 1402 science schools, comprising 4881 different classes, were examined in 1882, and that the number under instruction in those schools was 68,581; while 43,331 of the students, and in addition 7290 others, came up for examination in May. 1492 candidates came up in honours, and 102 passed in the first class, and 425 in the second. The number of science schools examined in 1881 was 1360, and the number under instruction in them was 61,177, and the whole number examined 44,461. The number of papers worked by the 50,621 students examined in 1882 was 76,063, as against 72,300 in the previous year. The number of papers passed was 50,741, and the number of first classes granted in elementary and advanced stages was 13,568. The examinations were held at 1025 centres in the provinces, and at 92 centres in London. The total amount paid to teachers on results in 1882 was £45,376, being at the rate of 13s. 3d. for each person under instruction, and it averaged £24, 10s. 3d. each to 1851 teachers. In 1881 the payments made were at the rate of 14s. 2d. for each scholar. The grants made towards the purchase of apparatus, diagrams, and examples in 1882 amounted to £1170. The distribution of the schools was as follows:-1064 in England and Wales, 155 in Scotland, and 184 in Ireland.

Ten new schools of art were established in the United Kingdom during 1882; and the total number of schools of art in operation throughout the kingdom was 169, with 13 branch classes. The number of students in these schools and their branch classes was 33,729. There had been 160 schools of art with 11 branch classes and 31,592 students in 1881. At the annual examination in April 1882, 21,291 students submitted 211,748 drawings or models; the corresponding numbers in 1881 having been 19,940 students and 197,048 works. 18,745 of the students, on account of whose instruction payments were made, were of the industrial classes. The examinations in second-grade drawing were attended by 11,716 students of schools of art, of whom 5501 were successful, and 1517 obtained prizes. The amount of fees paid in schools of art was £36,467 in 1880; £35,452 in 1881; and £39,198 in 1882; while the payments on results were £17,091 in 1880; £16,415 in 1881; and £16,978 in 1882. The number of art classes in 1882 was 545, and the number of students was 21,215; the corresponding numbers having been, in 1880, 632 classes and 26,646 students, and, in 1881, 584 classes and 23,026 students. The decrease in 1881 and 1882 is attributed to a rule requiring a higher certificate to be held by teachers of art classes, and to some of the larger art classes having been each year converted into schools The number of elementary day schools in which drawing was taught in 1882 was 4812; 842,100 children were taught drawing in them. and 572,188 children and 12,373 pupil teachers were examined at the annual examination in March 1882. These numbers, compared with those of 1881, showed a decrease of 285 schools, 8463 children taught, and 59,520 children and 1255 pupil teachers examined. The grants in aid of instruction in drawing in elementary schools in 1882 amounted to £31,304-a decrease of £322 on the previous year. At the examination of 48 training colleges in November 1882, 939 students in training, teachers and pupil-teachers, obtained certificates for drawing. The amount granted to the training colleges in 1882 was £1188-£26 less than in 1881.

The grand totals of persons taught drawing, painting, or modelling through the agency of the department were 837,308 in 1880; 917,101 in 1881;

and 909,216 in 1882.

The schools of art in Scotland in 1882, and the numbers of those who attended each in 1882, were as follows:—Aberdeen, day classes, 82; evening classes, 222; Dollar, evening classes, 13; Dumfries, day classes, 186; evening classes, 48; Dundee, day classes, 577; evening classes, 186; Edinburgh, male, day classes, 130; evening classes, 467; Edinburgh, female, day classes, 264; evening classes, 96; Elgin, day classes, 20; evening classes, 91; Falkirk, day classes, 17; evening classes, 76; Glasgow, day classes, 154; evening classes, 545; and at five branches, 46 in day classes and 124 in evening classes; Inverness, day classes, 21; evening classes, 76; Kilmarnock, day classes, 55; evening classes, 91; Perth, day classes, 164; evening classes, 46; Stirling, day classes, 125; evening classes, 56.

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Twenty-sixth Report of the Inspector appointed to visit the certified Reformatory and Industrial Schools is for the year 1882.

REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

The number of reformatory schools in Great Britain at the close of 1882 was 61 (49 in Engand and 12 in Scotland), of which 52 were for Protestants (29 for boys and 13 for girls in England, and 7 for boys and 3 for girls in Scotland), and 9 for Roman Catholics (4 for boys and 3 for girls in England, and 1 for boys and 1 for girls in Scotland). One reformatory, that at Carlisle, had been closed during the year. The numbers under detention in reformatories in Great Britain at the close of 1882 were 6601—5454 boys and 1147 girls (in England, 3412 boys and 731 girls, Protestants, and 1021 boys and 339 girls, Roman Catholics; in Scotland, 758 boys and 100 girls, Protestants, and 39 boys and 77 girls, Roman Catholics). But, of those, 887 boys and 122

girls were out on license, 26 boys were in prison, 64 boys and 13 girls had absconded, and the numbers actually in the schools only amounted to 5489-467 boys and 1012 girls. The number actually in the schools at the close of 181 was 5635-4569 boys and 1066 girls. The admissions to reformatory schools in 1882 were 1674, viz., 1412 boys and 262 girls, which showed an increase of 197 boys and a decrease of 10 girls on 1881, when there were 1487 Mmissions-1215 boys and 272 girls. The number of new admissions in the Scotch schools in 1882 was 248 (boys, Protestant, 163, Roman Catholic, 61; girls, Protestant, 16, Roman Catholic, 8). Of the 1412 boys received in 1882, 14 were under 10 years of age, 205 between 10 and 12, 537 between 17 and 14, and 656 from 14 to 15 years of age. Of the 262 girls received, more were under 10, 24 were between 10 and 12, 95 between 12 and 14, and 143 between 14 and 15 years of age. 632 boys and 218 girls had not been curicted before; 518 boys and 32 girls had been once previously convicted, 178 boys and 9 girls twice, 56 boys and 3 girls three times, and 28 boys four times and upwards. Inquiries and proceedings were taken in 1176 cases in England, with the following results :- Excused by the magistrates on the score of poverty, 353; placed under contribution, from 6d. to 5s. a week. 823. In about 91 cases parents had been put under contribution in Scotland, and 90 had been excused on the ground of poverty. The number of discharges in 1882 was 1810 (boys 1478, girls 332); 748 were placed in service or employment in Great Britain, and 633 were placed out with the aid of relatives, 89 emigrated, 209 went to sea, 32 enlisted, 38 died in the schools, 27 were discharged on account of disease, and 7 as incorrigible, 27 had absconded and had not been recovered.

The total admissions to reformatory schools to 31st December 1882, excluding transfers from one school to another, amounted to 41,049, viz., 33,307 boys and 7742 girls. The total discharges to the same date amounted to

34,444, viz., 27,553 boys and 6591 girls.

Of 3666 boys and 814 girls discharged from reformatories in the years 1879-81, 85 boys and 14 girls had died, leaving 3581 boys and 800 girls to be reported on (2910 boys and 627 girls discharged from English, 671 boys and 173 girls from Scotch, reformatories). 2728 boys and 551 girls were doing well, 83 boys and 73 girls were of doubtful character, 528 boys and 66 girls had been convicted, 242 boys and 110 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 84 per cent. of boys and 67 per cent. of girls were doing well, and 10 per cent. of boys and 9 per cent. of girls had been reconvicted. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 64 per cent. of boys and 81 per cent. of girls were doing well, and 26 per cent. of boys and 14 per cent. of girls had been reconvicted. The number of persons in prison in 1882 who were found to have been trained in a reformatory school was, in England, 551 (505 males and 46 females), and in Scotland, 121 (102 males and 19 females)—total, 672.

The total expenditure upon reformatories in Great Britain for 1882 amounted to £134,204. This included rent £3466, cost of disposal £5397, building expenses £10,024, and loss on industrial departments £682. The average net cost per head for maintenance, including rent and expenses on disposal, and setting off the profit from labour, was, boys' reformatories in England, £20, 3s. 3d., and in Scotland, £18, 15s. 4d.; girls' reformatories in

England, £21, 4s. 3d., and in Scotland, £20, 14s. 4d.

The total receipts of reformatory schools in Great Britain in 1882 amounted to £133,209, made up as follows:—Treasury payments, £87,241; subscriptions, legacies, etc., £5956; contributions from rates, county, £13,882, and berough, £9828; from voluntary associations, £170; sundries, £1793; profit on industrial departments, including hire of labour (£3101), £14,337. The amounts received from parents of juvenile offenders in reformatory schools were, England and Wales, £5596; Scotland, £322—total, £5918; an increase of £112 upon the previous year's receipts.

The following Table shows, for each of the reformatories certified in Scotland, the date of its certification, and the average number of inmates, the average cost of the inmates per head for maintenance and management, and the net cost per head, including rent and expenses of disposal, are

deducting industrial profit or adding industrial loss; also the total receipts of each, with the amount received by it from Parliamentary grants and the amount paid to it from rates, in the year 1882:—

The industrial profit amounted, in the boys' schools, to £120 at Rossie, £225 at Inverness, £127 at Kibble, £403 at Stranraer, £162 at Wellington Farm, £114 at Glasgow, £919 at Old Mill, and £200 at Parkhead. In the girls' schools, the industrial profit was £105 at Aberdeen, £108 at Glasgow, £116 at Dalry, and £202 at Dalbeth.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The number of certified industrial schools on 31st December 1882 was 138. Five new schools were certified in 1882, all in England. There had been no changes in mixed schools during the year. The Inspector reiterates the opinion expressed in former reports, that it is desirable that boys and girls should not be received in the same school. There are now only four mixed schools in England—Newcastle, Gateshead, Chester, and Birkenhead. The mixed schools remaining in Scotland are, Leith, Kilmarnock, Bute, Greenock, Paisley, and Falkirk. In the Falkirk School, the Inspector says, the separation of the sexes is not sufficiently attended to, and the accommodation is not satisfactory. In the others the separation is better.

Of the 138 schools in operation at the close of 1882, 104 were in England and 34 in Scotland. In England there were 51 Protestant and 14 Roman Catholic schools for boys; 27 Protestant and 8 Roman Catholic schools for girls; and 4 Protestant schools for boys and girls. In Scotland there were 12 Protestant and 2 Roman Catholic schools for boys; 10 Protestant and 2 Roman Catholic schools for girls, and 6 Protestant schools for boys and girls, making, with the Burghal school, Edinburgh, and Govan Parochial school, 34. (The United Industrial Schools in Edinburgh, most of the school ships, and two or three others, receive children of both denominations.)

The number of children under order of detention at the close of 1882 was 17,614—14,074 boys and 3540 girls (in England, 8523 boys and 1612 girls, Protestants, and 2137 boys and 629 girls, Roman Catholics; in Scotland, 3005 boys and 1037 girls, Protestants, and 409 boys and 262 girls, Roman Catholics). But, of those, 1696 boys and 150 girls were out on license, and 74 boys and 6 girls were absent from the schools, having absconded and not been recovered. The number actually in the schools at the close of 1882, therefore, was 15,688 (12,304 boys and 3384 girls), with 41 boys and 26 girls whose sentences were expired, and who were retained until employment could be found for them. The number actually in the schools at the close of 1881 was 15,336—12,086

boys and 3250 girls. The admissions for the year 1882, excluding transfers, were 4640—3909 boys and 731 girls. In 1881 the admissions were 4250. The admissions in the Scotch schools in 1882 were 940 (boys, Protestant, 675, Roman Catholic, 82; girls, Protestant, 132, Roman Catholic, 51). The discharges for the year amounted to 3993—3360 boys and 633 girls. 1084 boys and 390 girls were placed in service or situations, 1342 boys and 183 girls were assisted to employment through their relatives; 79 boys and 13 girls emigrated, 523 boys were sent to sea, 130 enlisted, 54 boys and 13 girls were discharged on account of disease, 49 boys and 3 girls were committed to reformatory schools, 58 boys and 27 girls died, and 41 boys and 4 girls had absconded and not been recovered. Of the 4640 children admitted in 1882, 78 boys and 77 girls were from 6 to 8 years old; 539 boys and 156 girls between 8 and 10; 1810 boys and 265 girls between 10 and 12; and 1482 boys and 233 girls between 12 and 14 years old. 204 of the children were illegitimate; 191 had lost both parents; 1111 had lost the father, and 694 the mother; 196 had been deserted by their parents; and one or both parents of 58 were destitute or criminal; 2186 had both parents alive and able to take care of them.

The total number of admissions to industrial schools up to the close of 1882 was 56,058—44,619 boys and 11,439 girls; and the total number of discharges up to the same date was 38,377—30,504 boys and 7873 girls.

The number discharged from industrial schools during the three years 1879-81, omitting deaths, transfers, and committals to reformatory schools, was 8858, and deducting those since dead, there were 7068 boys and 1580 girls to be reported on. 5624 boys and 1247 girls were doing well, 284 boys and 118 girls were doubtful, 355 boys and 27 girls had been reconvicted or recommitted, and 805 boys and 189 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 83 per cent. of the boys and 89 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 3 per cent. of the boys and 4 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 4 per cent. of the boys and 1 per cent. of the girls had been reconvicted or recommitted, and 10 per cent. of the boys and 6 per cent. of the girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 81 per cent. of the boys and 95 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 6 per cent. of the boys and 2 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 5 per cent. of the boys and 2 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 5 per cent. of the boys and 2 per cent. of the girls were muknown.

2559 children were sent to industrial schools in England in 1882 at the instance of school boards—which was about 69 per cent. of the total admissions for the year. Of these, 1151 were sent for vagrancy or petty theft, 101 as uncontrollable, and 1307 under the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, 1876, section 12. In the previous year, 1125 were similarly committed for vagrancy or petty theft, 115 as uncontrollable, and 1192 under the provisions of the Elementary Education Act, section 12.

The total expenditure upon industrial schools in 1882, including rent, disposal, cost of building, and industrial loss (£378), was £338,200. The receipts amounted to £340.046, of which £170,472 was derived from the Treasury, £42.726 from rates, £30,918 from subscriptions, legacies, etc., £59,583 from school boards, £1172 from parochial authorities, £5956 as payment for voluntary inmates, £5358 from sundries, and £23,857 from industrial profit, including hire of labour (£5232). The net average cost per head for maintenance, allowing for the results of the industrial departments, was, in English schools for boys only (on 59 schools), £19, 2s. 2d.; in English schools for girls only (on 31 schools), £18, 14s. 5d.; in mixed English schools for boys and girls (on 5 schools), £15, 7s. 3d. In Scotland the average cost per head was, for boys' schools (on 12 schools), £14, 2s. 7d.; girls' schools (on 10 schools), £12, 19s. 9d.; and mixed schools (on 8 schools), £13, 12s. 10d.

The sums received by the Treasury during the year from the parents of children under detention in industrial schools, and for Scotch industrial schools from parents and parochial boards, were—England and Wales, £10,640; Scotland, £6353—total, £16,993—£138 more than the amount in the

previous year.

There are now 12 day industrial schools in operation, 2 in Scotland, at

Glasgow. The total cost of these schools for the year was £13,494, of which £2592 was contributed by the Treasury, £5890 by the Local Authority, and £2183 by the parents of children attending. The average cost per head for the English schools was £13,8s.1d., and for the Glasgow schools, £10,12s.8d. At the close of 1882 there were 1440 children under order of attendance in the English schools—1022 boys and 418 girls—and 252 in the Glasgow schools—163 boys and 89 girls. The Inspector says that the majority of the schools have been doing well, but that the considerable cost of such schools makes itself felt when the area of operation is limited, and this gives rise to efforts to get rid of them. No one, he says, can visit the schools in Liverpool, Wolverhampton, or Glasgow without acknowledging their utility.

LUNACY.

The Twenty-fifth Annual Report of the General Board of Commissioners in Lunacy for Scotland is dated 24th February 1883, and is for the year 1882.

The numbers and distribution of insane persons in Scotland at 1st January 1883 (exclusive of unreported lunatics maintained in private dwellings from private sources, of whom the Commissioners have no official cognizance or control), is shown in the following Table:—

It appears from this Table that of the insane of whom official cognizance was had at 1st January 1883, 1654 were maintained from private sources, 8793 by parochial rates, and 63 at the expense of the State. In course of the year 1882 there was in royal and district asylums an increase of 17 private and a decrease of 15 pauper patients; in private asylums, a decrease of 7 private patients, while no pauper patient was provided for in any private asylum; in parochial asylums, an increase of 27 pauper patients; in lunatic wards of poorhouses, a decrease of 2 pauper patients; in the lunatic department of the General Prison, an increase of 1 inmate; in training schools for imbeciles, an increase of 2 private and an increase of 3 pauper inmates; and in private dwellings, an increase of 4 private and of 125 pauper patients. The whole increase of registered lunatics (not including the inmates of training schools for imbeciles and of the lunatic department of the General Prison, these being registered separately) during 1882 was 149, made up of an increase of 14 private and an increase of 135 pauper patients. These figures show (1) that the increase of the number of pauper lunatics in asylums and other establishments during that year was only 10, which was the smallest increase during any year since the establishment of the Board; (2) that there was an increase of 125, which was the largest increase during any year since the establishment of the Board, in the number of the pauper lunatics accommodated in private dwellings; and (3) that all pauper lunatics continued to be provided for in public establish-

The number of lunatics placed in establishments (other than the schools for imbecile children and the lunatic department of the General Prison),

excluding transfers, was, in 1858, 1448—406 private and 1042 pauper; in 1881 it was 2540—439 private and 2101 pauper; on the average of the five years 1875-79 it was 2317—486 private and 1831 pauper. In the year 1882 it was 2390—415 private and 1975 pauper. The number of private lunatics placed in establishments in 1882 was 24 less than in 1881, and 71 less than the average for the five preceding years; while the number of pauper lunatics so placed was 126 less than in 1881, but 144 above the average of the five years 1875-79. The number of transfers from one establishment to another in 1882 was 438—24 of private and 414 of pauper patients. Of the transfers 50 were authorized by sheriffs, and 388 by the Board.

While the admissions to establishments in 1882, excluding transfers, were 2390 (415 private and 1975 pauper), the number removed, recovered, was 1112 (150 private and 962 pauper); the number removed, not recovered, was 582 (123 private and 459 pauper); the removals by death were 673 (107 private and 566 pauper)—total removals, 2367 (380 private and 1987 pauper). [The training schools for imbeciles and the lunatic department of the General Prison are not included in this statement.] In the five years 1875-79, while the average annual number of admissions into establishments was 2317, the average annual number of removals was 2062,—excess of admissions over removals, 255. There was an increase of 10 in the number of private patients in establishments caused by the changes of 1882; and an increase of 10 in the number of pauper patients in establishments. This increase was remarkably small in comparison with the increase in the previous year, which was 285, and also in comparison with the average annual increase of the five years 1875-79, which was 240.

The number of voluntary patients (who are not registered as lunatics) admitted into asylums in 1882 was 42. The average number for the five years ended in 1880 had been 49, and the number in 1880 was also 49, and the number in 1881 had been 38. The number in asylums at 1st January 1883 was 29.

The Table which follows shows the result of the treatment of lunatics in public asylums, in private asylums, in parochial asylums, and in lunatic wards of poorhouses, in the year 1882:—

At 1st January 1882, 46 patients had been absent from asylums on probation. Of these, 19 had been finally discharged as recovered, 9 sent back, 18 remained under the care of friends. In the course of 1882, 192 patients were discharged on probation. Of these, 41 were finally discharged as recovered, 26 remained under the care of friends, 35 had been returned to asylums, and 90 remained on probation.

The total number of probationary removals since their authorization in 1862 to the close of 1882 had been 2480, and of this total 440 had been re-

placed in asylums before the expiry of the period of probation. The number of discharges on probation in 1882, 192, was higher than the number for any previous year, and 115 above the number for the year 1881. The increase was entirely accounted for by an increase of discharges from four asylums—the Argyll, Fife, and Inverness District Asylums, and the Crichton Royal Institution—in which there was a considerable accumulation of chronic patients, whom it was thought desirable to transfer to private dwellings. The report observes that in such cases probationary discharge is of special use.

The subjoined Table (in continuation of similar Tables in former Almanacs) shows for each county, and for the whole of Scotland, the number of pauper lunatics chargeable on the 1st January 1883, and the total expenditure on account of pauper lunatics, and the average daily expenditure (exclusive of the cost of medical certificates, of transport to asylums, etc.) for each pauper lunatic during the year ended 14th May 1882:—

Of the £210,550 spent upon pauper lunatics in the year ended 14th May 1882, £79,711 was contributed by the imperial exchequer, and £10,211 was contributed by relatives. £168,448 was cost of asylum treatment, £13,958 was for maintenance in lunatic wards of poorhouses, £21,830 was for boarding in private dwellings, and £6314 for certification, transport, and other expenses. The total number of pauper patients relieved during that year was 10,593 (4894 males and 5699 females), and the number of days for which relief was granted was 3,135,964; of which 73.4 per cent. was given in asylums, 8.3 per cent. in licensed wards of poorhouses, and 18.3 per cent. in private dwellings. Between 1858 and 1882, the total expense for maintenance alone increased 161 per cent., the expenditure for patients in asylums having increased 198 per cent., and that of boarding in private dwellings 53 per cent.

The daily cost of maintaining a pauper lunatic in royal, district, and parochial asylums averaged 1s. 5id. in the year ended 14th May 1882, and varied in different asylums from 1s. 1d. to 1s. 8d., which would give for the year £19, 15s. 5d. and £30, 8s. 4d. respectively. In licensed wards of poorhouses it averaged 1s. 1d., and varied from 10id. to 1s. 5id., or from

£15, 11s. 9\flatdel{\flat}d. to £26, 4s. 8\flatdel{\flat}d. per annum. It averaged 9\flatdel{\flat}d. in private dwellings, and varied from 5\flatdel{\flat}d. to 11\flatdel{\flat}d., or from £8, 7s. 3\flatdel{\flat}d. to £17, 2s. 2\flatdel{\flat}d. per annum. The general average daily rate for all modes of providing for pauper lunatics in 1881-82 (1s. 4d.) was the same as in the three preceding years. Between 1858 and 1882 the average cost per annum for each patient increased, in asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses, from £20 to about £26; and in private dwellings, from £8 to about £13—while the average expenditure for establishments and private dwellings taken together, with all other costs, increased from about £16 to about £24.

The number of persons sent to asylums at the instance of the procuratorfiscal as dangerous lunatics in 1882 was 10. In the preceding year it had been 13. 54 pauper lunatics were removed from Scotland in 1882, as having

no settlement in the country. All were removed from asylums.

Between 1st January 1858 and 1st January 1883, the number of lunatics officially known to the Board rose from 5823 to 10,510. There was an increase of 3809 in the numbers in royal and district asylums, a decrease of 596 in the private asylums, an increase of 1254 in the parochial asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 9 in the number left in private dwellings, an increase of 37 in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, and an increase of 174 in the schools for imbecile children. These figures show that, of the increase of 5283 which took place in the number of patients in public establishments, 596 may have arisen from the decrease in private asylums; leaving an increase of 4687, or 80 per cent. (the increase of the population during the same period having been only 26 per cent.), which is probably due in a large measure to an increasing readiness to place persons as lunatics in establishments. Comparing the numbers at 1st January 1858 and 1st January 1883, there had been an increase since 1858 of 4064 in the number of pauper patients placed in establishments, and of 402 in the number of private patients similarly disposed of; a decrease of 91 in the number of pauper lunatics in private dwellings; and an increase of 100 in the number of private lunatics in ordinary dwellings.

The ratio of lunatics officially known (pauper and private) to the general population at the 1st of January in each year was, per 100,000 of the population (at the middle of each year), 192 in 1858, 223 in 1870, 231 in 1875, 258 in 1880, 267 in 1881, 270 in 1882, and 271 in 1883—the ratio for 1883 being made up of 222 (37 private and 185 pauper) in establishments, and 48 (3 private and 45 pauper) in private dwellings. The number of private lunatics in asylums was 34 per 100,000 of the population in 1858, and 37 per 100,000 in 1883. The number of pauper lunatics in establishments was 98 per 100,000 of the population in 1858, and was 185 per 100,000 in 1883. The number of private lunatics in establishments increased 9 per cent. between 1858 and 1883, while the number of pauper lunatics in establishments increased 89 per cent. The proportion of pauper lunatics in establishments to the population decreased, however, between 1st January 1882 and 1st January 1883, from 188 to 185. This is the first time since its establishment

that the Board has had such a decrease to report.

The proportion of pauper lunatics to paupers was 6800 per 100,000 in 1861, and was 14,244 per 100,000 in 1883. While the proportion of registered paupers to population was 2630 per 100,000 in 1858, and was only 1615 per 100,000 in 1883, the proportion of pauper lunatics to population had risen between the same years from 157 to 230 per 100,000. In 1858 the pauper lunatics formed only about 6 per cent. of the total number of paupers. They formed more than 14 per cent. of the total number of paupers in 1883.

SAVINGS BANKS.

At 20th November 1882 the number of unpaid officers of those banks was 434 (Scotland, 51). The number of paid officers was 1603 (Scotland, 217), and the salaries and allowances of those officers amounted to £119,634 (Scotland, £19,015). The expenses of management for the year then ended amounted to £151,954 (Scotland, £22,972), being at the rate of 6s. 9d. per cent. (Scotland, 6s. 5d.) per annum on the capital of the banks. The total amount invested with the National Debt Commissioners at 20th November 1882 was £44,459,562 (Scotland, £7,073,090). The balances in the hands of treasurers at the same date amounted to £315,260 (Scotland, £40,884). The average rate of interest paid to depositors was £2, 14s. 5d. The total amount of the separate Surplus Fund in the hands of the Commissioners was £398,109 (Scotland, £4124). The total amount of Government stock standing to the credit of depositors was £242,524 (Scotland, £26,436).

The number of Savings Banks which, under the provisions of 26 Vict. c. 14 or otherwise, had been closed in the United Kingdom, and had transferred their funds or any part thereof to Post-Office Savings Banks, up to 20th November 1882, was 224 (193 in England and Wales, 7 in Scotland, and 24 in Ireland). The number of accounts transferred to Post-Office Savings Banks from such closed banks was 111,706. The amount of the accounts transferred (viz., by transfer certificates, excluding £254,371 estimated to have been paid in cash by about 13,449 of the depositors in these closed banks to the Post-Office Savings Banks) was £2,787,759. The amount of compensation paid to officers of these closed banks, under the Act 26 Vict. c. 14, was £37,166.

POLICE.

The Twenty-fifth Annual Report upon the Constabulary of Scotland is for the year ended 15th March 1883. The Inspector of Constabulary reports the police forces of all the counties of Scotland, and of 33 burghs, as efficient in numbers and discipline, though he considers the force in some places somewhat weak in proportion to population. He had, as before, to refuse a certificate of efficiency to the burgh of Pulteneytown; and with respect to the three burghs with population under 5000 which still maintain separate police forces, he has to report that, were they eligible for the government grant, he could not certify the force of any of them as sufficient. The clothing of the forces had generally been good; and the maximum of cost prescribed by the Secretary of State had been exceeded in only one instance, that of the burgh of Hamilton. The Secretary of State's circulars had, as regards alterations in the number of the force or the scale of pay, again been in a few instances disregarded owing to the misunderstanding or carelessness of officials.

During the year 1882-83, 71 men had been added to county forces and 30 to burgh forces. The principal increase had been in the county of Inverness, where 54 men had been added; but the additional duties thrown on the

police by the closing of local prisons had made additions to county forces necessary in other cases. There were 160 changes during the year in county forces and 395 in burgh forces as against 169 and 414 in the previous year. Most of the counties and burghs now pay their men liberally (except in some cases the head of the force). Lauarkshire and Ayrshire, the two counties with the largest police forces, practically adopted the model scales of pay suggested by the Secretary of State during the year, but the Inspector did not think these would be largely used by burgh forces until Edinburgh and Glasgow had led the way in resorting to them.

In addition to the numbers of the police given above, the River Tweed Commissioners pay for constables in the county of Berwick, and some constables are paid for by other fishery boards. Including these, there were 49 constables in counties paid for by companies and private persons, in terms of the 7th section of the General Police Act. In the burghs there were 172 constables employed by Harbour Boards (including the Clyde division of the Glasgow police), and 45 employed by companies or individuals.

The total number of vagrants, tinkers, and unlicensed hawkers reported by the police in the Scotch counties during the year 1882 was 88,692, an increase of 1191 as compared with the previous year. The total number of pedlars' certificates for the year 1882 was, in counties, 3042 (the number refused being 41), and in burghs 3125 (the number refused being 27). 621 fewer pedlars' certificates were granted than in the previous year.

PRISONS.

The Fifth Annual Report of the Commissioners appointed under the Prisons (Scotland) Act, 1877 (being in continuation of the Reports of the late General Board of Prisons and the managers appointed under the Prisons Act of 1860, the Forty-fourth Annual Report on Prisons in Scotland) is for

the year ended 31st March 1883.

In the year ended 31st March 1883 the accommodation at the disposal of the Commissioners in the several prisons was as follows:—In prisons, cells for 1945 males and 989 females—2934 persons, including cells for 64 civil prisoners (50 males and 14 females); and in legalized police cells, cells for 63 males and 31 females—94 persons. The number of criminal prisoners at the commencement of the year 1882-83 was 2558—1742 males and 816 females; and the number of civil prisoners was 17—all males. The number of criminal prisoners at the end of the year was 2365—1634 males and 731 females; and the number of civil prisoners was 2—both males. The daily average number of prisoners during the year was, civil prisoners 9 (all males), and criminal prisoners 2513 (1730 males and 783 females).

Since the Prisons Act of 1877 came into force there has been, the Report points out, a continuous and steady decline in the daily average number of criminal prisoners in confinement, which, between the year ended 31st March 1879 and the year ended 31st March 1883, fell from 3052 to 2513. While this daily average was 3052 in 1878-79, it was 2940 in 1879-80; 2862 in 1880-81; 2671 in 1881-82; and 2513 in 1882-83. In 1882-83, when compared with the previous twelve months, the decrease of the daily average number was continuous and progressive, there being a decrease from 2622 to 2579 in the June quarter, and from 2754 to 2596 in the September quarter; from 2654 to 2455 in the December quarter; and from 2659 to 2419 in the quarter ended 31st March. In the year the decrease in the daily average amounted to 159, or 5.9 per cent. The daily average number of civil prisoners was 13 in the year ended 31st December 1882, but (as stated above)

only 9 in the year ended 31st March 1883.

It is stated that the pressure on the accommodation in Scotch prisons has now so far ceased that convicts under sentence of penal servitude, who since 1878 have passed the probation period of their sentences in England, might now be retained for that period in Scotch prisons; but the whole question of the employment of male convicts being under the consideration of a Treasury Committee, the Commissioners had not proposed that this, the old arrangement, should be recurred to. Female convicts are still detained in the General Prison at Perth during the whole term of their confinement. The probation period served in separation is twelve months, instead of nine as in England, but the Commissioners have seen no reason to recommend that the period should be reduced to what it is in England. It is pointed out, as showing that the longer period of probation has had no prejudicial effect, that the number of female convicts in Scotland in 1871 was 323, while at 31st March 1883 it only was 141. The number of female convicts in the General Prison at 1st April 1882 was 149. 37 were received during the year—29 on

new sentences, and 8 on revocation of license; and 45 were removed during the year, 10 by expiry of sentence, and 31 by order of license, while 4 died.

There is now accommodation in the lunatic department of the General Prison at Perth for 88 persons-58 males and 30 females. At 1st April 1882 there were 66 inmates—45 males and 21 females; at 31st March 1883 there were 57 inmates—37 males and 20 females. The daily average number of inmates throughout the year was 63—43 males and 20 females. The number of males admitted to this department during the year had been raised by the transference of 8 male convicts from English prisons, who had become insane whilst in prison in England, and had been detained there after the expiration of their sentences. One of these, shortly after his reception, was certified to be of sound mind. The others, being fit subjects for ordinary treatment, had been disposed of by removal to the prison to which they had been originally committed, in order that, when discharged, they should be cared for by the local authorities. No inmate was conditionally discharged during the year, but it is stated that there are several females in the department who have recovered their sanity, and could be discharged if suitable guardians were found to become responsible for them. The prisoners discharged into the guardianship of friends in previous years were all conducting themselves properly. Four inmates of the lunatic department died during the year-3 from natural causes, and 1 from self-inflicted injuries.

The following is an abstract of the earnings in all the prisons of Scotland in the year ended 31st March 1883:—Value of work sold, £6130, 2s. 3d.; value of work done for prison use, £3593, 4s. 0d.: total, £9723, 6s. 3d.

Five prisons were closed during the year—those of Lanark, Airdrie, Hamilton, Rothesay, and Forfar. The first block of 200 cells of the Barlinnie prisons were already in use, and a second block, of similar accommodation, was expected to be ready in the summer of 1883. The number of the prisons had been reduced to 30. The number of legalized police cells was 12, cells at Dunoon having been added in course of the year. The new prison for the south-western district at Maxwelltown, near Dumfries,

was to be ready for occupation in August 1883.

The daily average of criminal prisoners in the prisons of Scotland, which in 1840 (year ended 31st December) had been 1940, rose to 3143 by 1849, fell again to 2083 by 1861, was 2742 in 1870, and was 3112 (2050 males and 1062 females) in 1878—only 31 short of the number returned in 1849. In 1879 it fell to 2876 (1911 males and 965 females), but this was partly accounted for by the removal of the male convicts—143 in number—to England. In 1880 it was 2977 (1940 males and 1037 females), and in 1881 it was 2642 (1752 males and 890 females). In 1882 it was 2572 (1761 males and 811 females). The daily average during the first quarter of 1883 (as given in the quarterly returns issued by the Prisons' Board) was 2426 (1696 males and 730 females), being a decrease of 242 on the corresponding period of 1882; in the second quarter of 1883 it was 2401 (1617 males and 784 females), a decrease of 185 on the corresponding quarter of 1882; in the third quarter of 1883 it was 2505 (1654 males and 851 females), being a decrease of 98 on the corresponding quarter of 1882.

The expenditure under the charge of the Commissioners in the year ended 31st March 1883 was as follows:—Expenses of management, £6473: expenses of prisons, £66,271; expenses of new buildings, £45,627: total, £118,372. The outlay for materials and implements for the manufacturing department was £10,938, and the amount received for manufactured

goods was £17,068.

The principal sums to be recovered from local authorities in Scotland, for deficient cell accommodation, in terms of the 18th section of the Prisons Act, 1877, amounted to £87,722, of which £32,946 had been paid previous to the commencement of the year 1882-83. £38,215, with interest at 4 per cent. from 11th April 1880-£42,216—had been received during the year. The remaining outstanding sum of £16,560 was due by the prison authority of North Lanarkshire, and was not payable until the work of reconstructing the east and west wings of Glasgow prison should be commenced.

The average net number of commitments was 18,575 in the quinquennial period ended 30th June 1861; 23,423 in the quinquennial period ended 30th June 1866; 27,156 in the quinquennial period ended 31st December 1871; 37,586 in the quinquennial period ended 31st December 1876; an 47,705 in the quinquennial period ended 31st December 1881. The average annual total expenditure for current expenses in the five years ended 1882 was, in the county prisons of Scotland, £47,604; and if the General Prison, Perth, £18,247—total, £65,852. The average annual net profit on the labour of prisoners during the same period was, in county prisons, £4504, and in the General Prison, Perth, £2739—total, £7245. The average annual cost per prisoner during that period was, in county prisons £22, 14s. 10d., and in the General Prison £25, 6s. 5d., and on county prison and the General Prison taken together, £23, 7s. 5d.; while the average annual earnings per prisoner were, in county prisons £2, 8s. 9d., in the

General Prison £3, 15s. 10d., and on county prisons and the General Prison taken together £2, 11s. 10d. The net average annual cost per prisoner during the five years was, therefore, in county prisons, £20, 11s. 1d., in the General Prison, Perth, £21, 10s. 7d., and in all the prisons of Scotland,

£20, 15s. 7d.

The number of criminal prisoners in Scottish prisons at the close of 1881 was 2557 (1720 males and 837 females). The number of prisoners received during the year 1882, not including cases of recommitment of the same individual, was 37,944 (27,832 males and 10,112 females). The whole number of criminal prisoners in confinement during the year, including cases of recommitment, was 53,694. The number of criminal prisoners at the close of 1882 was 2281 (1596 males and 685 females). The average daily number of criminal prisoners was 2659 in the first quarter of 1882, 2578 in the second quarter, 2593 in the third quarter, and 2454 in the fourth quarter. The number of revenue prisoners in Scotland in 1882, imprisoned until payment of fine or penalty, was 9 (8 males and 1 female). There was no escape from prison in 1882. There were 3 cases of suicide.

The total number of civil prisoners in 1882, including those in custody at the beginning of the year, and including cases of recommitment, was

111 (139 males and 2 females).

Of the 1215 final judgments returned as delivered in the Outer House in 1882, 1018 were on process initiated by summons, 149 on process initiated by petition, and 48 on process initiated by writ other than summons or petition. 488 followed on procedure requiring closed records, and 727 on procedure not requiring closed records. Of the 640 final judgments pronounced in the Inner House in 1882, 203 were on process initiated by reclaiming note, 157 on process initiated by petition, and 280 on process initiated by appeal or other writ. 403 were in proceedings initiated in the Inner House, 234 in proceedings brought from the Outer House, and 3 in proceedings otherwise brought before the Court. 201 were judgments on decisions, pronounced in the Outer House; and of the decisions, 128 were adhered to, 5 were repeated, but the grounds of decision altered, 53 were reversed, and 17 were partially adhered to and partially reversed.

While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts was 5470 in 1882, it was 5469 in 1881, 5918 in 1880, 6540 in 1879, 6744 in 1878, and 6028 on the average of the five years 1878-82. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts was 54,874 in 1882, it was 56,163 in 1881, 61,257 in 1880, 58,516 in 1879, 57,336 in 1878, and 57,629 on the average of the five years 1878-82. While the total number of causes in Justice of Peace Courts was 16,731 in 1882, it was 14,862 in 1881, 15,971 in 1880, 14,041 in 1879, 15,717 in 1878, and 15,464 on the average of the five years 1878-82.

V. JUDICIAL RECORDS.

(1.) Bankruptcy.

The number of bankruptcies in dependence in Scotland at the commencement of the year ended 31st October 1881 was 3629, the number awarded during the year, 450; and 4 were reopened during the year-total, 4083. The number awarded was 543 in 1877, 717 in 1878, 1072 in 1879, and 582 in 1880—the average number for the five years 1877-81 being 673. The total number in dependence was 3343 in 1877, 3553 in 1878, 4161 in 1879, and 4255 in 1880-the average number for the five years 1877-81 being 3879. The number disposed of in 1881 was 569, viz., recalled, 6; wound up by final division and discharge, 396; by composition, 92; by deed of arrangement, 16; otherwise wound up, 59. The time between awarding and discharge in 32 cases was 6 months and under a year; in 66, a year and under 18 months; in 70, 18 months and under 2 years; in 138, 2 years and under 3; in 43, 3 years and under 4; in 23, 4 years and under 5; and in 24 it was 5 years and upwards. Of the 450 bankruptcies awarded during the year, 85 were awarded by the Court of Session and remitted to Sheriffs, and 365 were awarded by Sheriffs of counties. The number of the bankrupts was 506-403 in sole sequestrations, and 103 in joint or partnership sequestrations. Of the bankrupts, 372 were traders, 32 manufacturers, 56 farmers, 6 lawyers, 3 medical practitioners, 14 persons not acquiring income by any occupation, and 23 were of other descriptions.

In the 396 bankruptcies concluded by final division and discharge in 1881 the amount of gross estates, per inventory and valuation by trustees, was £696,271; the amount of the debts was £1,610,253; the amount of the sums recovered by the trustees during the period of the sequestration was £514,850. The amount of expenses was £116,917 (viz., allowances to bankrupts, £1739; trustees' commission, £23,418; law expenses, £32,291; miscellaneous expenses — ordinary, £13,985; extraordinary, £45,482); the amount divided among the creditors was £396,777 (viz., secured creditors, £196,756; unsecured, £200,020); and the amount of surpluses paid to bankrupts or their representatives, less overpayments made by trustees in certain sequestrations, was £1156.

(2.) Judicial Factories.

The number of bonds by judicial factors at 1st October 1880 was 927; in the year ended 30th September 1881, 138 bonds were lodged with the accountant—total bonds in accountant's hands during the year ended 30th September 1881, 1065; of which 477 were by factors loco tutoris, 64 by factors loco absentis, 524 by curators bonis. The average number of bonds for the five years 1877-81 was 1025. In 1880-81, in 114 cases the estate was wound up or the appointment recalled; the number of bonds remaining at the end of the year was therefore 951. In the year ended 30th September 1881, 927 accounts were rendered; 137 were not rendered, as not being due before the end of the year; 1 account was due but had not been rendered. The personal estate dealt with by judicial factors, ascertained and estimated, was £2,425,306; the value of the lands and heritages under their charge was not ascertained. The revenue of estates under judicial factors in the year ended 31st October 1831 was £231,249; the expenditure was £120,892, viz., on maintenance of wards, £99,843; factors' commission, £12,429; accountants' charges, £1440; law agents' charges, £7178.

(3.) Judicial Records kept at Edinburgh.

At the Register of Deeds Office, the number of entries in the presentmentbook in 1882 was 4184. 3885 were entries of original writs, and 299 second extracts of writs previously recorded. The fees amounted to £4236. The average of entries was 4147, and of fees £4289, in the five years ended 1882.

The number of protests entered in the Register of Protests on bills and notes in 1882 was 326. The number of persons protested against was 425; the amount of the sums protested for was £23,061. The average number of protests was 500, and the average amount protested for, £48,395, in the five years ended 1882.

The number of certificates entered under 31 and 32 Vict. c. 54, in "The Register for English and Irish Judgments," in 1882, was 47-45 from

England, and 2 from Ireland.

At the Register of Adjudications Office, the number of entries in the presentment-book in 1882 was 595. 425 were mercantile sequestrations, 4 were for recovery of specified debts, the amount of which was £10,346, and 166 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £52.

At the Register of Inhibitions Office, the number of entries in the presentment-book in 1882 was 1039. 449 were mercantile sequestrations, 180 were for recovery of specified debts, and 410 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £163. The average number of entries was 1442 in the five years ended 1882.

At the Register of Hornings Office, the number of entries in the present-

ment-book in 1882 was 24. The fees received amounted to £5, 10s.

The business which passed through the Bill-Chamber in 1882 was as follows:—Suspensions, interdicts, and liberations, 141; bills for loosing arrestments, 3; petitions for sequestration under Bankrupt Act, 130; other petitions, etc., 86. Total, 360—the average number for the five years ended 1882 being 408.

At the Register of Sasines Office, the number of entries in the presentment-book during the year 1882 was 27,825. The amount of fees received was £25,726. The average number of entries was 30,272, and the average

amount of fees £27,131, in the five years ended 1882.

The whole number of registered protests on bills and notes (including those entered in the General Register stated above, along with those entered in district registers) in 1882 was 1911. The whole number of persons protested against was 2267; the amount of the sums protested for was 188361. The number registered was 2802, and the amount protested for £140,640, on the average of the five years ended 1882.

SPIRITS.

The number of gallons of proof spirits distilled in the United Kingdom in 1882 was 38,377,820, viz., in England, 10,124,467; in Scotland, 19,206,892; in Ireland, 9,046,461. The number of gallons on which duty was paid was 29,778,162, viz., in England. 13,710,985; in Scotland, 8,699,119; in Ireland. 7,368,058. The number of gallons consumed was 28,554,264, viz., in England 16,811,494; in Scotland, 6,502,955; in Ireland, 5,239,815. The number of gallons removed from England to Scotland was 61,603 duty free, 22,592 duty paid: from England to Ireland, 167,220 duty free, 17,121 duty paid; from Scotland to England, 2,472,351 duty free, 1,932,739 duty paid; from Scotland to Ireland. 425,257 duty free, 18,352 duty paid; from Ireland to England, 1,880,260 duty free, 1,870,200 duty paid; from Ireland to Scotland, 42,814 duty free, 268,551 duty paid. The number of gallons delivered duty paid from distillers' stocks was 2,971,079, viz., in England, 2,395,257; in Scotland, 474,053; in Ireland. The number of gallons put into bond in the year ended 31st December 1882 was 34,998,269, viz., in England, 7,613,011; in Scotland, 18,537,183; in Ireland, 8,848,075. The number of gallons in bonded stores on the 31st December 1882 was 51,436,936, viz., in England, 7,369,815; in Scotland, 23,475,365; in Ireland, 20,591,756. The number of gallons permitted from distillers' stocks and duty-free warehouses to customs warehouses in 1892 was 2,646,015, viz., in England, 590,874; in Scotland, 1,557,321; in Ireland, 497,820. These figures show the spirits exported as merchandise. for use as ships' stores, etc. The number of gallons, at proof strength, of foreign and colonial spirits received into rectifiers' stocks for rectification in 1882 was 865,059, viz., 537,775 gallons of foreign spirits, and 327,284 gallons of colonial spirits. 576,687 gallons of proof British brandy were permitted out of rectifiers' stocks, viz., in England, 549,200 gallons; in Scotland, 27,058; and in Ireland, 429. The number of gallons of British compounded spirits permitted from rectifiers' stocks to customs warehouses for exportation, ships' stores, and home consumption in 1882, was 526,408, viz., in England, 290,577; in Scotland, 235,568; in Ireland, 263.

The number of gallons of methylated spirits sent out by persons licensed to sell the same in 1882 was 1,387,729, viz., in England, 1,005,665; in Scot

land, 365,719; in Ireland, 16,345.

[The quantities of British spirits removed from customs warehouses in each part of the United Kingdom to each of the other parts, and the quantities remaining in customs bonded stores at the close of 1882, are included in the figures given above.]

LICENSED BREWERS AND VICTUALLERS.

In the year ended 30th September 1882 there were in Scotland 152 persons licensed as brewers for sale; of whom 93 were common brewers, not being victuallers or persons licensed to sell beer by retail, and 59 were victuallers. The number of persons licensed as brewers not for sale, in Scotland, at the same date, was 2427. The number licensed as victuallers was 12,156. The materials used in brewing in Scotland during the same year were, by common brewers, 2,029,347 bushels of malt or corn, and 954,832 lbs. of sugar (including in sugar the equivalent of syrups); by victuallers, 255,907 bushels malt or corn, and 102,270 lbs. of sugar; and by brewers not for sale, 771 bushels malt or corn, and 2471 lbs. of sugar.

In the same year the number of persons licensed as brewers for sale was, in England, 16,402 (of whom 2428 were common brewers); in Ireland, 55 (of whom 54 were common brewers); and in the United Kingdom, 16,609 (of whom 2575 were common brewers). The number of persons licensed as brewers not for sale was, in England, 101,108; in Ireland, 3; in the United Kingdom, 103,538. The number of licensed victuallers was, in England,

72,378; in Ireland, 16,679; in the United Kingdom, 101,213. There were also in England 34,146 persons licensed to sell beer to be drunk on the premises, and 13,791 licensed to sell beer not to be drunk on the premises. The materials used by brewers for sale, in the United Kingdom, in the same year, were 53,097,139 bushels of malt or corn, and 129,047,817 lbs. sugar (including the equivalent of syrups); whereof there was used by common brewers 46,784,560 bushels of malt or corn, and 123,117,522 lbs. of sugar. The materials used by brewers not for sale, in the United Kingdom, were 332,947 bushels malt or corn, and 137,339 lbs. of sugar. Of the 16,609 brewers for sale, 14,499 brewed less than 1000 barrels; and one, who used 2,354,792 bushels of malt or corn (and no sugar), brewed between 1,150,000 and 1,200,000 barrels.

There were exported from Scotland, in the year ended 30th September 1882, 56,640 barrels of beer, declared value £253,922. In the year ended 30th September 1881 there were exported 48,341 barrels of beer, of the declared value of £186,898; and in the year ended 30th September 1880 there were exported 49,102 barrels, of the declared value of £212,767.

THE POOR LAW AND THE PUBLIC HEALTH.

The Thirty-eighth Annual Report of the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor, and of the Public Health in Scotland, is for the year

ended 14th May 1883.

At August 1883, the number of parishes in Scotland in which assessments were levied for the relief of the poor was 825; and in 61 parishes the poor were relieved by means of voluntary contributions. Two parishes, which previously had raised the funds for the relief of the poor by voluntary contributions, resolved during the year to raise the funds by assessment. In 19 of the assessed parishes the assessment was made according to local usage. In 617 parishes, the assessment was made equally upon owners and occupants respectively, and in 189 parishes there was a classification of occupants, in terms of the 36th section of the Act 8 and 9 Vict. c. 83.

Poorhouses.—The number of poorhouses on 1st August 1883 was 63 (with accommodation for 15,548 inmates) for 436 parishes, having a population of 2,843,935. When the poorhouses in progress or the erection of which had been resolved on were completed, 452 parishes, having a population of 2,882,826, would be provided with poorhouses. The Board during the year approved of the rates for boarding paupers belonging to 243 parishes in the poorhouses of other parishes or combinations. The approval of such rates has to be asked for every year. The population of the 243 parishes which have a right to send paupers to poorhouses belonging to other parishes was 584,512. The total population to which poorhouse accommodation was available was 3,428,447. The total population of the parishes to which poorhouse accommodation was still not available was 307,126. number of poor (and their dependents) receiving in-door relief was 10,504 at 1st January 1881, 10,155 at 1st January 1882, and 9915 at 1st January 1883; 9040 at 14th May 1881, 8964 at 14th May 1882, and 8722 at 14th May 1883; 8945 at 1st July 1881, 8683 at 1st July 1882, and 8600 at 1st July 1883. The total average weekly expenditure per head of ordinary inmates of all the poorhouses of Scotland was 4s. 11d. in the half-year ended 31st December 1882, and 4s. 111d. in the half-year ended 30th June 1883.

The Parliamentary Grants.—The number of parishes which, in the year 1882-83, complied with the conditions annexed to participation in the Parliamentary grant of £20,000 in aid of medical relief of the poor was 762. 16 more made claim to a share in the grant, but failed to show that the conditions of the grant had been fulfilled. The total amount distributed was £19,998, 2s. 2d. The whole sum expended on medical relief in all parishes in Scotland during the year was £40,419, which is equal to 2.59 pence per

head of the population of Scotland in 1881. The population of the 778 parishes which resolved to comply with the conditions of the grant was 3,660,074, and that of the 108 parishes that did not so resolve was 75,499. The sum expended by the former parishes was £39,881, or about 2-61 pence per head of the population, and that by the latter parishes was £538, or

about 1.71 pence per head of the population.

The aggregate amount distributed from the Parliamentary grant in aid of the cost of maintenance of pauper lunatics in the year 1882-83 was £81.495; in the year 1881-82 it was £79,711. 897 parishes participated in the grant in the year 1881-82, and 806 in the year 1882-83. The number of pauper lunatics in respect of whom claims were allowed was 10,130 in 1881-82, was 10,366 in 1882-83, and the total cost of their maintenance in the latter year, exclusive of the amount recovered or recoverable from relatives or other sources, was £194,094.

Receipt and Expenditure.—The sum received from all sources for the relief and management of the poor in the year 1882-83 was £958,844, of which £810,139 was raised by assessment, £100,316 was contributed by Her Majesty's Treasury, in aid of expenditure on medical relief of the poor and maintenance of pauper lunatics, and in lieu of rates on Government property; and £48,389 was received from voluntary contributions, church collections, mortifications, and all other sources. In addition to the above. £10,665 was borrowed during the year on security of the rates. The sum expended for the relief and management of the poor (including £3777 expended on buildings not being authorized poorhouses, £20,224 expended on authorized poorhouse buildings, and £13,219 on repairs and furnishings) was £871,878. In the year 1881-82 the expenditure for the same purposes was £898,002. There was thus a decrease in the expenditure of £26,124. The decrease was chiefly under the head of buildings (£15,999). the decrease in the cost of relief to registered and casual poor being £10.638. A return of the cost of collection of the poor-rate (included in the total expenditure given above) was again procured in the year 1882–83. For that year it was £20,725, or 2.56 per cent. on the amount of assessment received. In 1881-82 it was £21,251, or 2.58 per cent. In addition to the expenditure of £871,878 stated above, £6684 was expended in 1882-83 in payment of feuduties, interest, vaccination, etc., and £36,660 in repayment of money borrowed, of which £20,134 represented the annual instalments of loans incurred for the erection or enlargement of poorhouse buildings.

The following Table shows the expenditure for the relief and management of the poor (exclusive of the cost of buildings, but including every other charge), the estimated valuation based on parliamentary returns, the rate of expenditure per cent. and per £ of valuation, and the rate of expenditure per head of the population (estimated from the census returns), for the years 1880-81, 1881-82, and 1882-83:—

It is stated that the cost of maintaining the lunatic poor continues to increase. In 1866-67 it amounted to £108,172, and in 1882-83 it was £215,832, an increase of £107,659. The cost of maintaining the lunatic poor is included in the expenditure upon registered and casual poor—the amount of which would have been considerably less had there been no increase in the cost of the lunatic poor. The increase in 1882-83 over the previous year was £4151

The average annual cost of each pauper lunatic on the roll that date was £23, 12s. 114d.

The number of paupers of all classes, including dependants, in receipt of relief at 14th May 1883 was 97,097, being 2244 less than on the same day in the preceding year, and being in the proportion of 25 per cent. of the

estimated population, instead of 4.1 per cent., as in 1868 and 1869.

In 1882-83, 56 paupers, having 38 dependants, were, either voluntarily or by warrant of the Sheriff or Justices, removed to England; and 181, having 77 dependants, were similarly removed to Ireland; 913 paupers, having 555 dependants, were, either judicially or otherwise, removed from one parish to another in Scotland; 3972 persons were refused relief during the year; and the number of poor relieved under order (final or interim) of the Sheriff was 183. The number of applicants for relief, who were offered relief in the poorhouse only, and who declined that offer, and thus did not become chargeable to the poor's fund, was 7105. 7074 paupers and 1044 dependants died during the year.

The number of lunatic poor relieved in the year 1882-83 was 10,897. 2016 of them died or were cured, or ceased to receive relief; so that the number at 14th May 1883 was 8881, being an increase, as compared with the number at the same date in the preceding year (8717), of 164. Of these 6408 were in asylums, 720 in licensed wards of poorhouses, and 1753 were in private

dwellings.

The number of orphan and deserted children chargeable during 1882-83 was 7387; but the number on one day (14th May) was only 5623. Of these

3668 were orphans, and 1955 deserted.

25,646 pauper children were receiving education during 1882-83, at a cost fer the year to the parishes of £16,742. 14,654 other children, for whom application had been made under section 69 of the Education Act, were also receiving education during that year, at a cost to the parishes of £7970. The expenditure from the poor's funds on account of education, exclusive of the cost of education in industrial schools, deaf and dumb institutions, and other similar places, was therefore £24,712. 6653 applications were made to parochial boards under the 69th section of the Education Act during the year; 5115 were granted, 1122 refused, and 416 had not been disposed of when the return was made up, or had been withdrawn.

Church Collections, Voluntary Contributions, and Mortifications.—The whole sum derived from church collections in assessed parishes during the year ended 14th May 1883 was £36,197, of which £8250 is stated to have been expended on relief of the poor. Of this sum £27 was handed over to the

parochial boards. It would appear, therefore, that the sum of £8223 derived from church collections was actually applied in 1882-83 by the kirk-sessions to the relief of persons in their parishes who required assistance.

In the year ended 30th June 1883 the total number of applications to sheriffs, on the ground that relief had been improperly refused, was 420 (but defects of registration have to be allowed for). Interim orders of relief were granted in 234 cases, and final orders in 47 cases. The average annual number of such interim orders in the ten years ended at the above date was 271, and of such final orders 55. The number of prosecutions under the 79th and 80th sections of the statute in the year ended 30th June 1883 was 94, and the number of convictions 54. The average annual number of such prosecutions in the ten years then ended was 108, and of convictions 53.

The total amount of poor-rates received in England in 1882 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £14,918,273 (the annual value of rateable rental having been, in 1882, £139,636,307), and the amount expended in actual relief of the poor was £8,232,472. The total amount of poor-rates received in Ireland in 1882 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £1,240,638, and the amount expended in the relief and management of the poor was £1,237,389.

The Public Health Act.—The number of parishes in which, during the year ended 14th May 1883, money was received or expended under the Act was 684; in the year preceding it was 672. The total receipts were £152,925; of which £139,890 was derived from assessment, £281 from penalties and from authors of nuisances, and £12,754 from other sources. expenditure under the Act amounted to £249,711. £26,967 had been expended upon drainage; £92,228 on water supply; £5075 on removal of nuisances; £41,668 on hospital accommodation; and £83,773 on other purposes. The "other purposes" include interest on money borrowed, vaccination, burials, disinfectants, salaries, and heads of miscellaneous expenditure. sums stated do not represent the whole receipts and expenditure in Scotland for sanitary purposes, as in many places important sanitary operations have been carried on under the provisions either of local Acts or of the General Police Acts, and none of these operations are embraced in the returns under the Public Health Act. In addition to the above, £163,411 was received during the year from loans on the security of rates, and £31,171 was expended in repayment of money borrowed in former years. The total expenditure under the Public Health Act, from the passing of the Act (15th August 1867) to the 14th May 1883, amounted to £1,835,583; of which £258,053 was expended upon drainage, £732,530 upon water supply, and, within the last ten years, £323,686 upon hospital accommodation. The aggregate amount of loans proposed by local bodies for the approval of the Board from 11th August 1875 was £1,190,027, and the total amount of loans recommended by the Board was £1,129,574. Of this amount, £802,427 was for the construction of water-works, £159,277 for sewage and drainage works, £115,450 for the erection of hospitals, and £52,420 for water and drainage.

THE CUSTOMS.

Owing to changes in the Customs Department, the annual Report of the Commissioners of the Board of Customs for the year 1882 was not presented to Parliament during the session of 1883, and therefore could not be issued as a Parliamentary paper during that year.

The subjoined Table exhibits the gross amount of revenue collected for Customs (after deducting repayments and drawbacks), distinguishing the

principal articles subject to duty, in each of the years (ending 31st March) 1881, 1882, and 1883:—

APPEALS FROM THE COURT OF SESSION TO THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

The number of Appeals from the Court of Session presented to the House of Lords in the year 1882 was 14, of which 2 were in matters of real property, 9 in matters of personal property, and 3 in matters of a miscellaneous kind. 2 causes were withdrawn, and 5 were dismissed for want of prosecution.

The number of judgments delivered in 1882, including causes heard in previous sessions and standing over for judgment, was 11. In 6 causes the judgment appealed from was affirmed; in 1 it was affirmed with variations; in 1 it was affirmed with a declaration or direction; in 2 it was reversed; in 1 it was reversed with declaration or direction or finding. There were 2 causes standing over for judgment at the end of the year. The total number of effective causes remaining for hearing was 5. The fees received faring the year amounted to £415, 16s. 6d.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Army Estimates.—The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of Her Majesty's land forces (exclusive of Her Majesty's British forces on the East Indian establishment, 61,641 in number) provided for in the Army Estimates for the year ending 31st March 1884, was 137,632 (viz., officers 7199, warrant officers 1015, sergeants 14,838, drummers and trumpeters 3670, rank and file 110,910). This includes the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India; the general and departmental staff (viz., general staff, 242 officers, 25 warrant officers, and 138 sergeants; army accountants, 281 officers and 69 sergeants; veterinary department, 63 efficers, 1 warrant officer, 3 sergeants; chaplain's department, 87; medical department, including head-quarters staff, 614; and commissariat, transport, and ordnance store departments, 348 officers and 161 warrant officers—in all, 263 men); 160 officers, 138 warrant officers, and 358 sergeants, 2 drummers and trumpeters, and 148 rank and file—in all, 806 men—employed in various establishments connected with the army, and not included in regimental establishments; and the staff of militia regiments (viz., artillery, 55)

officers, 35 warrant officers, and 552 sergeants, and 196 drummers and trumpeters-in all, 838 men; engineers, 1 officer, 3 warrant officers, and 39 sergeants, and 15 drummers and trumpeters-in all, 58 men; infantry, 256 officers, 138 warrant officers, and 2781 sergeants, and 1045 drummers and trumpeters-in all, 4220 men; Channel Islands militia, 9 officers, 9 warrant officers, and 66 sergeants-in all, 84 men); and of the artillery volunteers (54 officers and 283 sergeants), and the engineer volunteers (5 officers and 6 sergeants—in all, 11 men). The strength of the regiments on the British establishment, provided for in the Estimates, including the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India, was 127,611 (viz., 4775 officers, 504 warrant officers, and 9158 sergeants, 2412 drummers and trumpeters, and 110,762 rank and file). The number of horses provided for (exclusive of officers' horses) was 13,979. The number of officers, noncommissioned officers, and rank and file of the reserve forces, for which provision was made in the Army Estimates for 1883-84, was, army reserve, class 1, 31,000, with 2500 supplementary army reserve; class 2, 9,000; militia (including permanent staff as given above, and militia reserve), 142,874; yeomanry cavalry (including permanent staff), 14,404; volunteers (including staff), 247,921. The estimated charge was, for effective services, £12,689,900 (viz., regular forces, £4,525,200; auxiliary and reserve forces, £1,429,800; commissary and ordnance store establishments, etc., £5,592,400; works and buildings, £739,400; and various other services, £403,100; and for non-effective services £2,916,800-total, £15,606,700. The net estimated charge for the reserve forces was distributed between the forces as follows:-Militia pay and allowances, £520,000; yeomanry cavalry pay and allowances, £69,000; volunteer corps pay and allowances, £562,800; army reserve force pay and allowances (including enrolled pensioners), £278,000. The estimate for the volunteer corps was made up as follows:-Pay, etc., of 276 adjutants of volunteer corps, £60,000; allowance to them in lieu of servants, £5020—total (with £180 added for leap-year) £65,200; pay, etc., of sergeant-instructors, £66,000; capitation grants to volunteer corps, etc. (36,591 artillery volunteers, 210 light horse, 8551 engineers, 38 mounted rifles, 153,983 rifle volunteers—in all, 199,373 men, at 30s. each), £299,060; travelling allowance, for attendance at united drill or gun practice, £32,000; special capitation allowance of £2, 10s. for proficient officers and sergeants, £44,540), £376,000; miscellaneous charges for volunteer corps, £56,000.

The Militia.—The militia force of Great Britain at the time of the training in 1882 consisted of 2421 officers, exclusive of the permanent staff; the permanent staff consisting of 114 adjutants, 113 quartermasters, 2551 sergeants, and 882 drummers; and 1295 sergeants, 3666 corporals, and 81,052 privates-or 92,094 of all ranks. The numbers present at the training of 1882 were, 2035 officers, exclusive of the permanent staff; 112 adjutants, 113 quartermasters, 2537 sergeants, and 881 drummers of the permanent staff; and 1223 sergeants, 3428 corporals, and 70,662 privates-or 80,991 men of all ranks. There were 14,422 men of all ranks (including 321 officers) wanting to complete the establishment of the regiments as authorized by army circulars of 1892; and there were 280 men of all ranks supernumeraries in certain regiments. Of the numbers enrolled of all ranks, 10,773 men were in artillery regiments (7863 in English, and 2910 in Scotch regiments); 1229 in regiments of engineers (all in England); and 80,092 in infantry regiments (69,758 in English, and 10,334 in Scotch regiments). There were 78,850 men in English, and 13,244 in Scotch regiments. The total number of men of the militia reserve effective at inspection, and included in the foregoing numbers, was 23,019, viz., in England 19,711, and in Scotland 3308; 3054 were in artillery regiments, 268 in engineer regiments, and 19,697 in infantry regiments. The number of men enrolled for the militia reserve during the year was 6068. Under an order in council, the training of the Irish militia was not carried out in 1882. The establishment of the Irish militia, as authorized by army circulars of 1882, consists of 857 officers, exclusive of the permanent staff; of the permanent staff, consisting of 45 adjutants, 34 quartermasters, 855 sergeants, and 298 drummers; and of 596 sergeants, 1192 corporals, 28,900 privates—being 32,777 men of all ranks.

The Colonies and Army Expenditure.—The amount included in the Army Estimates for 1883-84 for military purposes in the Colonies was £1,825,446. In the previous financial year it had been £1,907,876. These sums, however, do not include the cost of arms, accourtements, stores, etc., nor any proportion of recruiting and administrative expenses and non-effective charges. The amount of Colonial contributions in aid of military expenditure to be received in 1883-84 was estimated at £205,000; viz., Honduras, £5000, Natal, £4000; Mauritius, £18,000; Hong Kong, £20,000; Ceylon, £103,000; Straits Settlement, £50,000; Malta, £5000.

The Navy Estimates .- The number of officers, seamen, boys, and marines proposed to be voted for the service of Her Majesty's Navy for the year ending 31st March 1884 was 57,250 (or 56,290, deducting 960, the number of the officers and crews of Indian troop ships), viz., 44,850 officers, seamen, and boys for the fleet and coastguard service, and 12,400 marines. The estimated charge was £10,757,000, made up as follows:-For effective services, £8,549,300; for non-effective, £2,071,400; for conveyance of troops, £136,300. On the 1st November 1882, the number of ships in commission effective for general service was 114, viz., 6 line-of-battle ships, first class, and 7 line-of-battle ships, second class, 3 cruisers, first class, and 2 special ships, all armour-plated; 23 frigates or corvettes (2 third class, and 21 fourth class) not armour-plated; and 73 sloops and small vessels not armour-plated, of which 67 were steamers and 6 were sailing vessels. There were also in commission 9 first reserve ships (all armour-plated, and all steamers). Of gunnery and training ships, stationary, receiving, and depôt ships (including royal yachts), surveying vessels, troop ships, store ships, and drill ships for the royal naval reserve, there were 50 (32 sailing vessels and 18 steamers), exclusive of Indian troop ships; and of tenders (including late coastguard cruisers) there were 73 (34 sailing vessels and 39 steamers). There were in all 246 vessels (72 sailing vessels and 174 steamers, 27 of the latter being armour-plated) in commission.

The Ordnance Survey.-The year 1882 marked a very definite stage in the operations of the ordnance survey, inasmuch as the survey of Scotland was brought to a conclusion in that year, the last man employed upon it having left Scotland in November 1882. The publication of some of the one-inch maps remained incomplete. This was being proceeded with at Southampton. The survey of the whole of Great Britain and Ireland, as originally contemplated, may therefore be said to be completed—the work now in progress being the re-survey on the 25-inch scale of that portion of England, to the south of Yorkshire and Lancashire, which had previously been published on the one-inch scale, and the revision of the six-inch map of Ireland. The whole of Scotland has now been published on the six-inch scale, but on the Tiso scale there are the following exceptions—the counties of Edinburgh, Fife, Haddington, Kinross, Kirkcudbright, and Wigtown, and the Island of Lewis, which were all published before the 1100 scale was adopted, and the uncultivated portions of the Highlands and of some of the islands, for which the six-inch scale was considered sufficient. The one-inch map of Scotland, which is still in progress, is to consist of 131 sheets, of which 91 have been published in outline with contours and 73 with hills. The area published on the Tion scale for Scotland in 1882 was 171 square miles, and the total area published on that scale at the close of that year was 12,687 square miles. The area of Scotland published on the six-inch scale in 1882 was 1985 square miles, which made a total area of 30,902 square miles published on the six-inch scale. The area of Scotland published on the one-inch scale at the close of 1882 was, in outline, 27,013 square miles, and with hills, 20,538 square miles-of which areas 1386 square miles in outline were published in 1882. The survey of the towns in Scotland is completed. With a few exceptions, the maps of the towns of Scotland are on the san or ten-feet scale.;

Parliamentary Constituencies.—The total number of electors on the register in force in 1883 (before the registrations of that year) was, in England, counties 966,631, cities and boroughs 1,651,761, universities 13,831—total 2,632,223; in Ireland, counties 164,679, cities and boroughs 57,784, university 4048—total 226,511; in Scotland, counties 99,346, burghs 210,858, universities 12,763—total 322,967.

Irregular Marriages in Scotland.—The number of irregular marriages registered in Scotland (the bulk of them by warrant of the Sheriff) in the five years 1877-1881 was 1847, and the amount of fees charged by registrars in connexion with such marriages was £1304, 7s.

Drunkenness on Sunday in Scotland.—The number of convictions of persons arrested for drunkenness on Sunday in Scotland (omitting Orkney and Shetland, which have no police forces), in the six years from 29th September 1876 to 29th September 1882, was, in counties 1639, and in burghs 12,072—total 13,711. But there is not uniformity of practice throughout the country either in dealing with this offence or in compiling statistics, and the provisions for dealing with the offence are to a large extent inoperative in the landward parts of some counties—so that the return from which the figures are taken (as is stated in a note prefixed to it) cannot be said to show correctly the number of persons arrested for drunkenness on Sunday, and as regards many districts it gives no idea of the number of persons chargeable with the offence.

Coal and Metals.—The estimated value at the place of production of coal and metals produced in the United Kingdom was, in 1868, £41,521,705 (coal, £25,785,289); in 1878, £64,712,332 (coal, £46,429,210); and, in 1881, £88,082,670 (coal, £65,528,327).

The Coinage.—The total value of gold, silver, and copper (bronze) monies coined at the Royal Mint was £2,896,091 in 1878; £628,755 in 1879; £4,930,824 in 1880; £1,036,477 in 1881; and £252,440 in 1882. The value of gold coined was, in 1878, £2,265,069, and, in 1880, £4,150,052. No gold was coined in 1881 and 1882.

The Police.—The strength of the police forces of the United Kingdom in 1882 was—England and Wales, 33,173; Scotland, 3,562; Ireland, 14,772—total, 51,507.

Pauperism.—The number of paupers (exclusive of vagrants) in receipt of relief in England and Wales at 1st January 1883 was 799,296—190,386 receiving iu-door and 608,910 receiving out-door relief. 105,357 were adult able-bodied persons-24,867 of whom received in-door and 80,490 out-door relief. The number of paupers receiving relief in Ireland at the same date was 115,684-53,749 receiving in-door relief (8,430 of them able-bodied), and 61,186 receiving out-door relief, and 749 in deaf and dumb asylums and extern hospitals. The number of registered paupers in Scotland at 14th May 1882 (exclusive of casual poor) was 61,149, with 33,932 dependentstotal, 95,081. The total amount of poor-rates received in 1882 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £14,918,273, and the amount expended in actual relief of the poor was £8,232,472. The total amount of poor-rates received in Ireland in 1882 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £1,240,638, and the amount expended in the relief and management of the poor was £1,237,389. The total amount received from poor-rates and all other sources (exclusive of loans) for the relief of the poor in Scotland in the year ended 14th May 1882 was £963,614, and the total sum expended in the relief and management of the poor was £912,536.

January 10. Newhall House, the chief hotel in Milwankee, Wisconsin, U S., destroyed by fire, and upwards of 90 lives lost.

13. By the burning of a circus in Berditscheff, Russian Poland, 280

persons lost their lives.

16. Prince Napoleon issued a manifesto in Paris, proclaiming himself the representative of the Napoleonic idea, and denouncing the was subsequently Republic. He arrested by order of the Government, but liberated on 9th February.

19. During a thick fog off the island of Borkum, opposite the mouth of the river Ems, the Hamburg-American Company's steamship Cimbria collided with the steamer Sultan, when the former vessel foundered, and about 400 lives were lost.

24. The Court of Queen's Bench, Ireland, gave judgment in the application of the Crown authorities against Messrs Healy, Davitt, and Quinn, for using seditions and treasonable language at public meetings. They were bound over, on heavy sureties, to be on their good behaviour for twelve months, or otherwise to suffer six months' imprisonment.

Having elected to go to prison, they were arrested on 8th February, and liberated on 8th June.

February 1. A Bill to expel from French territory the Bourbon and Bonaparte families passed the Chamber of Deputies, France. The Senate, however, on 12th February, declined to pass it, but adopted a proposal submitted by M. Waddington, to the effect that any prince committing any act in furtherance of his pretensions to the throne of France, or engaging in manifestations tending to affect the safety of the State, shall be punished by banishment from French territory.

15. The fourth session of the tenth Parliament of the present reign opened by Royal Commission. The debate on the Address in answer to the Queen's Speech extended over several sittings. In the course of the discussion on an amendment to the Address moved by Mr Gorst, having relation to the Government's Irish policy, the Right Hon. W. E. Forster sought to bring home to Mr Parnell and his associates of the Land League theresponsibilit

for the outrages and murders that had in recent times brought disgrace upon Ireland. During Mr Forster's speech, Mr O'Kelly, Member for Roscommon County, conducted himself so offensively that he was suspended from the service of the House. Towards the close of the sitting on the 24th February the House divided on Mr Gorst's amendment, when there voted for it 176; against it 259. An amendment proposed by Mr Parnell, on the 26th February, was negatived by 133 votes to 15. The debate closed on 1st March.

February 16. The Attorney-General moved in the House of Commons for leave to bring in a Bill to amend the Parliamentary Oaths Act. After considerable discussion, the Bill was introduced and read a first time on 19th February. The motion that the Bill be read a second time was moved by the Attorney-General on 23rd April. The debate was adjourned from time to time, and at last brought to a close on the morning of 4th May, when there voted for the second reading 289; against, 292.

26. The Lord Chancellor brought before the House of Lords a Bill having reference to the election of Representative Scottish Peers. It was read a first time. On the following day the Earl of Galloway introduced another Bill on the same subject, which also was read a first time. The Lord Chancellor's Bill was read a second time on 10th April, while Lord Galloway's was rejected.

March 5. George William Foote, William James Ramsey, and Henry Arthur Kemp, the editor, proprietor, and printer of the Freethinker, found guilty at the Central Criminal Court, London, of having published a blasphemous and impious libel in their journal. Foote was sentenced to twelve months', Ramsey to nine months', and Kemp to three months' imprisonment.

9. Anarchists created disturbances in Paris.

14. The second reading of a Bill to amend the Land Law (Ireland) Act moved by Mr Parnell in the House of Commons, and negatived by 250 votes against 63.

15. Attempts made by dynamitards to blow up the offices of the Local Government Board and the Times newspaper, London.

March 17. A severe snowstorm raged over Scotland and part of England, blocking the Great North of Scotland and Highland Railway lines, and causing several sad disasters at sea.

22. The Right Hon. John Bright, M.P., LL.D., installed as Rector of the University of Glasgow. On the following day he was presented with the freedom of the city of Glasgow.

29. The Most Rev. Edward White Benson, D.D., Archbishop of Canterbury, enthroned in Canterbury Cathedral with great ceremony.

April 4. A Bill for the better administration and endowment of the Universities of Scotland introduced to the House of Commons by the Lord Advocate, and read a first time.

4. The island of New Guinea taken possession of in the name of Queen Victoria, by order of the Government of Queensland. Her Majesty's Ministers, however, declined to approve of the procedure

clined to approve of the procedure.

5. A man named Whitehead apprehended at Birmingham for secretly manufacturing nitro-glycerine on a large scale. The police suspected his connexion with an organized Irish-American conspiracy to destroy public buildings in this country, and shortly afterwards a number of his confederates were arrested in London and elsewhere. After a trial extending over several days, Whitehead and three others were, on 14th June, found guilty of treason-felony, and sentenced to penal servitude for life.

5. The Chancellor of the Exchequer made his financial statement to the House of Commons. The principal changes proposed were sixpenny telegrams, reduction of railway passenger duty, and reduction of the income-tax to fivepence in the pound.

9. The Home Secretary brought before the House of Commons a Bill dealing with explosives. It was passed through all the stages at that sitting, and ordered at once to the Upper House, where it was also promptly passed.

10. Joseph Brady brought to trial at Dublin for assassinating Lord Frederick Cavendish and Mr Burke in Phænix Park, Dublin, on 6th May 1881. Three days afterwards he was found guilty, and sentenced to be executed on 14th May. Subsequently other four members of the secret society (the Invincibles) that planned the murder, viz., Daniel Curley, Michael Fagan, Thomas Caffrey, and Timothy Kelly, were tried, condemned, and executed.

May 4. Mr Bradlaugh appeared at the bar of the House of Commons, accompanied by Mr Burt and Mr Labouchere, for the purpose of taking the oath required by law. On the motion of the Right Hon. Sir Stafford Northcote, the House, by 271 votes against 165, declined to permit him to go through the form he desired.

8. The Earl of Dunraven moved in the House of Lords that all the public museums and picture-galleries throughout the kingdom should be opened on Sundays. The motion was supported by 67 votes

and opposed by 91.

French war-ships opened fire upon the town of Majunga, on the N.-W. coast of Madagascar. After a bombardment of six hours, a landing was effected and the place occupied.

23. St Giles's Church, Edinburgh, having been restored, chiefly at the expense of the late Dr William Chambers, was re-opened with befitting ceremony by the Earl of Aberdeen, by command of the Queen.

24. The suspension bridge linking New York to Brooklyn opened for traffic. It is said to be the longest bridge of the kind in the world.

Alexander III., Emperor of Russia, and his Empress, crowned at Moscow with most imposing religious and military ceremonial.

June 11. A Bill to legalize marriage with a deceased wife's sister passed the second reading in the House of Lords by a majority of seven votes. It was, however, on 28th June, thrown out on the third reading by a majority of five votes.

14. Tamatave, the chief port of Madagascar, on its E. coast, bombarded and taken by the French.

183 children suffocated or crushed to death in a staircase of the Victoria Hall, Sunderland. They had been present at an entertainment for young people in the hall.

29. A Bill relating to the conduct of Scottish business was brought before the House of Commons by the

July 3. While the screw-steamer Daphne was being launched at Govan, on the Clyde, she suddenly capsized, carrying with her a large number of workmen, 124 of whom

were drowned.

6. Mr Mason moved in the House of Commons, "That in the opinion of this House the Parliamentary franchise should be extended women who possess the qualifications which entitle men to vote, and who in all matters of local government have the right of voting." After some discussion the House divided, and there voted for the

motion, 114; against it, 130.

9. Sir Stafford Northcote called the attention of the House of Commonsto a letter which Mr Bradlaugh had sent to the Prime Minister, intimating that he intended, at an early day, to take his seat for the borough of Northampton. After some remarks by Mr Gladstone, Sir Stafford moved that "The Sergeant-at-Arms do exclude Mr Bradlaugh from the House until he shall engage not further to disturb the proceedings of the House," which was carried by 232 votes against 65.

10. The joint committee appointed by both Houses of Parliament to consider and report upon the general question of the Channel Tunnel resolved that the report to Parliament should simply state that four members were in favour of the scheme

and six against it.

11. The Prime Minister announced in the House of Commons that the French Admiral at Tamatave, Madagascar, had been guilty of extraordinary conduct towards the British subjects there, and that explanations had been requested from the French Government.

11. Mr Childers communicated to the House of Commons the terms of the provisional agreement between the representatives of H.M. Government and M. de Lesseps, President of the Suez Canal Company.

23. Mr Gladstone intimated to the House of Commons that the provisional agreement between the Government and M. de Lesseps, concerning the construction of a second Suez Canal, had been abandoned.

24. The Fifty-sixth Annual Show

of the Highland and Agricultural Society opened at Inverness.

July 24. Captain Matthew Webb, celebrated English swimmer, drowned while attempting to swim through the whirlpool below the Falls of Niagara.

28. By an earthquake in the island of Ischia, at the entrance of the Bay of Naples, about 2450 lives

were lost.

- 29. James Carey, the informer, whose evidence led to the conviction of the assassins of Lord Frederick Charles Cavendish and Mr Burke in Phœnix Park, Dublin, shot dead on board a steamer proceeding from Cape Town to Natal, South Africa. An Irishman named Patrick O'Donnell was apprehended for the murder, and brought to England for trial. He was indicted for the crime at the Central Criminal Court, Old Bailey, London, on Nov. 30, and, next day, was found guilty and sentenced to death.
- 30. Sir Stafford Northcote, in the House of Commons, moved that an address be adopted praying that in any negotiations with reference to the Suez Canal no claim on the part of the Canal Company should be recognised to such a monopoly as would exclude the possibility of competition on the part of other undertakings designed to open communications between the terranean and the Red Sea. votes were given in favour of the motion, and 282 against it.

The habit and insignia are, The Garter, of dark-blue velvet, inscribed with the motto, Honi soil qui mal y pense; The Mantle, of blue velvet; The Hood and Surcoat, of crimson velvet; The Hat, of black velvet; The Collar, of gold; The George, or figure of St George, suspended from a broad dark-blue riband; and The Star, of silver. The number of knights is restricted to twenty-five, exclusive of the Sovereign, princes of the blood royal, and foreign princes.

SECT. I.

THE MOST ANCIENT AND MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE THISTLE.

The Most Ancient Order of the Thistle appears to have been projected by King lames V. about 1540, but he died before the design could be carried out. It renewed by King James VII., who created eight Knights in 1687. After abeyance of fifteen years, the Order was restored by Queen Anne in 1703. It consists of the Sovereign and sixteen knights. silver, inscribed with the motto, Nemo me impune lacessit; The Jewel, or figure of St Andrew, suspended from a green riband; and The Collar, of gold.

THE MOST HONOURABLE ORDER OF THE BATH,

Established in 1399, was revived by King George I. in 1725, enlarged in 1815, and enlarged and remodelled in the month of April 1847. It consists of the Sovereign, of a Great Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal, descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one thousand two hundred and eighteen Companions or Members, divided into the three classes following, each class being subdivided into two sections, Military and Civil: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, seventy-five in number, of whom not more than fifty shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major-General in the army, or Rear-Admiral in the navy; 2d, Knights Commanders, two hundred and three in number, of whom not more than one hundred and twenty-three shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Colonel in the army, or Captain in the navy; 3d, Companions, nine hundred and forty in number, of whom (except under special and temporary exigencies) not more than six hundred and ninety shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major in the army, or Commander in the navy, whose services shall have been marked by the especial mention of their names and despatches. The qualification of members of the civil divisions of each of these three classes is no otherwise limited than that, by their personal services to the Crown or by the performance of public duties, they shall have merited the Royal favour; and that no person shall be appointed to one class who is not qualified for the other and higher classes. Honorary members, being foreigners, may be appointed in such numbers as the Sovereign shall think fit. For each class and division, appropriate insignia are appointed by the Statutes of the Order, enacted by Her Majesty the Queen, and published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 1st June 1847. THE VICTORIA CROSS, OR ORDER OF VALOUR.

This naval and military decoration was instituted by an instrument under the sign-manual of the Queen, dated the 29th of January 1856, "for the purpose of rewarding individual instances of merit and valour." It is ordained that the distinction shall be styled "The Victoria Cross;" that it shall consist of a Maltese cross of bronze, with her Majesty's royal crest in the centre, and, on an escroll underneath, the inscription "For Valour;" that the Cross shall be suspended from the left breast by a blue riband for the navy, and by a red riband for the army; that the names of those upon whom her Majesty may be pleased to confer the decoration shall be published in the London Gazette; that any one who, after having received the Cross, shall again perform an act of bravery, which if he had not received such Cross would have entitled him to it,

shall have such farther act recorded by a Bar attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, an additional Bar being added for every additional act; that the Cross shall be awarded to those officers or men only who have served the Queen in the presence of the enemy, and have there performed some signal act of valour or devotion to their country; that with the view of placing all persons on a perfectly equal footing of eligibility for the decoration, neither tank nor long service nor wounds nor any other circumstance or condition whatsoever, save the merit of conspicuous bravery, shall be held to establish a sufficient claim to the honour; and that every warrant officer, petty officer, seaman, or marine, or non-commissioned officer or soldier who shall have received the Cross shall be entitled to a special pension of ten pounds a year, each additional Bar carrying with it an additional pension of five pounds a year.

THE MOST EXALTED ORDER OF THE STAR OF INDIA.

This order of knighthood was instituted by the Queen, in February 1861, and enlarged and remodelled in March 1866, by letters patent under the Great Seal, in order to afford to the princes, chiefs, and people of the Indian Empire, a public and signal testimony of Her Majesty's regard; to commemorate Her Majesty's resolution to take upon herself the government of the territories in India; and to enable Her Majesty to reward conspicuous merit and loyalty. The order is to be called "The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India." is now to consist of the Sovereign, a Grand Master, and two hundred and fortysix Ordinary Companions or Members, divided into three classes: 1. Thirty Knights Grand Commanders; 2. Seventy-two Knights Commanders; 3. One hundred and forty-four Companions; together with such Extra and Honorary Knights as the Sovereign may appoint. The Sovereign shall be the King or Queen regnantof the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Grand Master, first and principal Knight Grand Commander of the Order, shall be the Viceroy and Governor-General of India for the time being. The Sovereign may confer the dignity of a Knight Grand Commander of the Order upon such native princes and chiefs of India as shall have entitled themselves to the Royal favour, and upon such British subjects as have, by important and loyal services rendered by them to the Indian Empire, merited such Royal favour. No person shall be nominated a Knight Commander, or a Companion, who shall not, by his conduct and services in the Indian Empire, have merited the Royal favour.

THE MOST DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF SAINT MICHAEL AND SAINT GEORGE

Was instituted in 1818, for natives of the Ionian Islands and of Malta, and for such other British subjects as should be distinguished in connexion with the said islands, or with H.M. service in the Mediterranean. By certain statutes, bearing date 4th December 1868, Her Majesty was pleased to enlarge and re-organize the Order, so as to extendit to such natural-born subjects of the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as might be persons of conspicuous merit, or have rendered important services to the Crown, within or in connexion with any of Her Maiesty's colonial possessions; and a supplementary statute, bearing date 3d April 1869, ordains that naturalized foreigners may be admitted in like manner as if they were natural-born subjects of the British Crown. A supplementary statute, of date 6th May 1879, increased the number of Members of the Order, which consists of the Sovereign, of a Grand Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal descended of the body o

King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of four hundred and sixty Members, divided into three classes, viz.: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, fifty in number, in addition to such Extra or Honorary Members as the Sovereign may appoint; 2d, Knights-Commanders, one hundred and fifty in number; 3d, Companions, two hundred and sixty in number, and provides for admission into the Order for important and loyal services in relation to the foreign affairs of the Empire.

THE ROYAL RED CROSS.

This decoration was established by Royal warrant, on 23rd April 1883. It consists of a cross, enamelled crimson edges with gold, having on the arms the words, "Faith, Hope, and Charity," with the date of the institution of the decoration, the centre having thereon the effigy of Her Majesty the Queen. On the reverse side the Royal and Imperial Cipher and Crown are shown in relief on the centre. The cross is attached to a dark blue riband, edged red, tied in a bow, and worn on the left shoulder. It may be worn by the Queen, and conferred upon any of the Princesses of the Royal Family, as well as upon ladies of any nationality recommended by the Secretary of State for War for special exertions in providing for the nursing or for attending to sick and wounded soldiers and sailors.

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ENTRY OF OFFICERS TO THE ROYAL NAVY.

Every flag officer or commodore, first class, appointed to the chief command of a station or a separate command, will have one nomination to a naval cadetship. Every captain, on his first appointment to command a ship, will have one nomination, but the privilege will be given only once during the time he holds the rank of captain, and must be exercised at the time of the appointment. No captain at present on the list who during his service in that rank has had a nomination will be entitled to this privilege. Captains who have not yet had a nomination will be allowed one upon their next appointment to command a ship.

Appointments to naval cadetships will be made by limited competition, with the following exceptions:—Four cadetships given annually to sons of gentlemen in the Colonies, on the recommendation of the Secretary of State for the Colonies. Service cadetships, the total number of which is not to exceed five, given by the Board of Admiralty to (a) sons of officers of the army, navy, or marines who have been killed in action, or who have been lost at sea on active service, or killed on duty, or who have died of wounds received in action or injuries received on duty within six mentles from the date of such action or injury; (b) sons of officers of the navy who have performed long or distinguished service, and who hold or have held rank or relative rank on the active list not lower than that of commander; not more than two such service cadets to be nominated annually. Colonial and service cadets will be entered on passing a test examination.

The examination of candidates nominated to compete, and also of service cadets, will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners. Except in special circumstances, not more than one-third of the number of candidates actually presenting themselves before the Civil Service Commissioners will be entered. Nominations for naval cadetships will take place half-yearly. as soon as convenient after the report of the last examination has been received. Examinations of the young gentlemen who have obtained nominstions will be held in London, and will commence on the second Wednesday in June and the last Wednesday in November in each year, and the appointments will date from the 15th July and 15th January following respectively. No candidate will be eligible for examination in June whose age will not be within the following limits on the 15th July following, viz., not less than twelve nor more than thirteen and a half years of age, nor in November whose age will not be within those limits on the 15th January following. Every candidate must be in good health, free from any physical defect of body, impediment of speech, defect of sight or hearing, and also from any predisposition to constitutional or hereditary disease or weakness of any kind, and in all respects well developed and active in proportion to his ag-Before being examined by the Civil Service Commissioners he will be required to pass the medical examination according to the prescribed regulations, and must have been found physically fit for the navy; rejection at such examination will finally exclude him from the navy.

A candidate who passes the test examination, but does not succeed in the

competition, will be entitled to compete at the next examination, provided he is within the regulations as to limits of age at that time. No candidate will be allowed to compete more than twice. A candidate who fails to pass the test will not be entitled to another trial, but he will be allowed to compete at the next examination if he receives a fresh nomination and is still within the limits of age.

For all cadets entered under the regulations, the payment will be at the rate of £70 per annum for the period in the "Britannia," to be paid halfyearly in advance to the Accountant-General of the Navy. But the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty reserve the power of selecting, from among the cadets entered at each half-yearly examination a number, not to exceed ten, being sons of officers of the navy, army, or marines, or of civil officers under the Board of Admiralty, with respect to whom the annual payment will be £40 only. In this selection their Lordships will have regard solely to the pecuniary circumstances of the cadets. The period of training on board the "Britannia" will be four terms; there will be two terms in each year. The first term of each year will be from February to July, the second from September to December. There will be examinations in seamanship and study at the end of each term. Cadets who pass unsatisfactory examinations, or who are reported for unsatisfactory conduct, will be "warned," and they will be liable to be discharged at the end of the following or any subsequent term, should they again be reported as failing to attain the proper number of marks at the examinations, or for unsatisfactory conduct. If a cadet is reported for unsatisfactory conduct during his final term, he will be discharged without being allowed to present himself at the examination for passing out of the "Britannia." Any cadet who shall appear to their Lordships for any reason to be unfit for the service will be removed from the "Britannia." Cadets will, on passing out of the "Britannia," rank according to the amount of sea time they obtain at their final examination, and those who obtain equal amounts of sea time will rank in the order of merit in which they pass out of the "Britannia." The parent or guardian of every cadet will be required to provide outfit under the regulations in force.

SECTION II.—ENGLAND.

ENGLAND AND WALES.

Extent, etc.—The length of England and Wales, from Portland Bill, Dorsetshire, in lat. 50° 31' N., to Berwick-on-Tweed, in lat. 55° 46' N., is 363 miles; the extreme breadth, from the North Foreland, Kent, in long. 1° 26' E. to the Land's End, Cornwall, in long. 5° 41' W., is 320 miles. The area of England is 50,933 square miles, or 32,597,398 acres; that of Wales, 7378 square miles, or 4,721,823 acres; that of England and Wales, 58,311 square miles, or 37,319,221 acres. Of the 52 counties into which they are divided, England contains 40, Wales, 12. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act in 1815 was, in England and Wales, £51,898,423; in 1851, £94,809,106; in 1861, £114,058,538; in 1865, £131,341,499; in 1867, £110,696,900;* in 1874, £131,084,816; in 1875, £132,720,684; in 1877, £142,888,539; in 1878, £145,481,534; in 1879, £147,921,687; in 1880, £152,553,738. The rateable rental of property in England and Wales assessed to the Poor's Rate was £71,840,271 in 1856; £100,668,698 in 1868; £112,317,603 in 1873; £119,079,589 in 1875; £127,948,380 in 1878; £131,021,019 in 1879; £133,769,875 in 1880.

Education.

UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

This ancient University consists of a union of Colleges and Halls devoted to the purposes of study and education, and incorporated under the style or title of "The Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford." There are at present twenty-one Colleges, each having a mansion for the residence of members of the foundation, and for the reception of students. These Colleges may be said to be an institution peculiar to England, as none exist in foreign universities, nor even in Scotland. They are bodies corporate, independent of the University, being governed, as to their own concerns, by their respective statutes; and each has in connexion with it numerous valuable fellowships, scholarships, and exhibitions. The three remaining Academical Halls at Oxford are places in which students reside, under discipline and instruction, and pass through the curriculum to their several degrees in precisely the same manner as the student inmates of the Colleges. The term Hall, however, implies also a Society, and in this sense there is an important difference between Halls and Colleges, inasmuch as the former are not incorporated, have no endowments for fellows, and have all their property held in trust for them by the University. Magdalen Hall was constituted Hertford College in 1874, and St Alban Hall was absorbed into Merton College in 1883. The recent foundation of the Keble College was established in 1870 from funds collected by private subscription, and suitable buildings have been erected. In pursuance of the Oxford University Act, 1854, Private Halls have been instituted for the purpose of affording a cheaper education than is to be had at the Colleges. The scholars are subject to the laws of the University, partake of its privileges, and are admissible to its degrees in the same way as the other students. By a statute passed in the year 1868, students may be admitted mem-

By a statute passed in the year 1868, students may be admitted members of the University without belonging to any College or Hall. Such students are called Scholares non ascripti, or unattached students, and keep terms by residing at Oxford, either with their parents or in licensed lodging-

houses. They are under the control of certain delegates.

There are four terms for academical exercises in each year, but for many Professors' lectures and some other purposes, the third and fourth together count as only one. Two of the four can be kept by six weeks' residence, and two by three weeks'. The ordinary residence in the College extends to twenty-six weeks in the year. Candidates for admission to the University are required to pass a preliminary examination at their respective Colleges or Halls.

The degrees conferred by the University upon students are those of Bachelor and Master in Arts, and of Bachelor and Doctor in Music, and in the three superior faculties of Civil Law, Medicine, and Divinity. Twelve terms of residence are required for the degree of B.A. No further residence is necessary for any degree. Thus the education of a young man at Oxford is spread over about three years; but in the case of candidates for the

higher honours, a degree is seldom taken in less than four years.

Candidates for the degree of B.A. are required to pass three distinct examinations—viz., 1. Responsions before the masters of the schools; 2. First Public Examination before the moderators; 3. Second Public Examination before the public examiners. For this last there are now six schools of honours, called the schools of Literæ Humaniores, Scientiæ Mathematicæ et Physicæ, Scientia Naturalis, Jurisprudentia, Historia Moderna, and Theologia, and one mixed school for passmen, divided into several groups of subjects. At the responsions, candidates are examined in Latin and Greek grammar, one Latin and one Greek author, arithmetic, and either Euclid or algebra. The examination is conducted partly in writing, partly viva vocs.

Candidates at the first public Examination are examined either in logic or in algebra, together with three books of Euclid, in the four Gospels in Greek,

and in portions of three classical authors, there being a higher examination

both in Classics and Mathematics for candidates for honours.

All candidates at the second public Examination are required to offer themselves in Divinity also; but candidates not members of the Church of England may substitute an equivalent amount of other matter for examination. The term "Divinity" comprises the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, the Old and New Testaments, the Thirty-nine Articles, and the Evidences of the Christian Religion. In the mathematical school candidates are examined either in the first six books of Euclid or in the first part of algebra. In the school of natural science they are examined in the principles of mechanical philosophy, chemistry, physiology, and further in some one of the particular sciences dependent on mechanical philosophy. In the school of law and modern history every candidate must offer himself for examination in English history and law. In all the schools there are examinations for honours as well as the ordinary or "pass" examination. A fifth school of theology was instituted in 1870, and the school of law and modern history was, in 1873, separated into two distinct schools.

For the degree of M.A., no further examination or exercise is required; a B.A. may proceed to the degree of M.A. on the expiry of the twenty-sixth term from his matriculation, provided he has had his name on the books of some College or Hall during that period. For degrees in the superior faculties there are annual examinations.

UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

This University, like that of Oxford, is a union of Colleges or Societies devoted to the study of the liberal arts and sciences. There are seventeen such Colleges at Cambridge, each being a body corporate, maintained by the endowments of benefactors, and governed by its own laws, but controlled by

the paramount statutes of the University. The terms of the academical year are three,—viz., 1. Michaelmas, beginning on the 1st of October and ending on the 19th of December; 2. Lent, extending from the 8th of January to 27th March, if Easter * falls between 30th March and 16th April; and 3. Easter, commencing on 18th April, and closing on the 24th of June. Students are admitted, either by a personal examination before the tutor and some of the College officers, or by sending to the tutor a recommendatory certificate from some M.A. of the University stating the qualifications, etc., of the person applying for admission, and at the same time transmitting the caution-money, which is £15 in the case of an ordinary student intending to join a college, and £2 in the case of a noncollegiate student. If this certificate be deemed satisfactory, the student is admitted, and his name placed on the boards which hang in the butteries of the several Colleges. The day after the division of any of the terms is the time fixed for matriculation, i.e., enrolment of the student's name in the University books. At Cambridge, as at Oxford, persons may be admitted as students, and have degrees conferred upon them, without the necessity of their being members of any College or Hall.

Undergraduates are required to give a constant attendance on lectures, and, yearly or half-yearly, undergo an examination in those subjects to which their attention has been devoted. By this course they are prepared for those public examinations which must be passed before the degree in Arts can be obtained. What is called "The Previous Examination" is held towards the end of the Michaelmas and Easter terms, and is open to students in their first term of residence. Exemption from this examination may be gained by students who have shown sufficient merit in the Uni-

versity Local Examinations, or in an examination at school conducted by the Oxford and Cambridge Schools' Examination Board. The subjects of this examination are, one of the four Gospels in Greek, Paley's Evidences of Christianity, Latin and Greek Grammar, one Greek and one Latin author, the Elements of Euclid, Algebra, and Arithmetic. No student can be examined for the degree of B.A. who has not previously kept nine terms; and a B.A. "may be admitted ad incipiendum in artibus at any time after three academical years have passed from the completion of his Bachelor's degree. The inceptors in every year become complete Masters of Arts by creation on the Commencement Day, i.e., on the last Tuesday but one in June." No one has a vote in the Senate until after creation.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.

Unlike other universities, this confers its degrees upon the results of its examinations only. It was founded in 1836 "for the purpose of ascertaining, by means of examination, the persons who have acquired proficiency in literature, science, and art, and other departments of knowledge," by the pursuit of a regular and liberal education at University College and King's College, London, or at any of the other colleges and houses of learning named

in the royal charter; "and of rewarding them by academical degrees and certificates of proficiency, as evidence of their respective attainments, and marks of honour proportioned thereto." But by later charters, students from any or no college are admissible to all examinations but those in Medicine and Surgery. All Examinations for degrees, with the prizes, scholarships, etc., attached thereto, are open to women on precisely the same conditions

There are two examinations for matriculation in each year; one commencing on the second Monday in January, and the other on the third Monday in June; they are held at the new University Buildings, Burlington Gardens, London, and also, under special arrangement, in various cities, towns, and colleges, of the United Kingdom and the Colonies. Candidates must produce a certificate showing that they have completed their sixteenth year. The subjects of the examination which they must pass are—Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Latin, English, two of the languages, Greek, French, German, and Arabic or Sanskrit, and Outlines of English History and Modern Geography. The matriculation fee is £2.

For each of the degrees of B.Sc. and B.A., two examinations besides the one at matriculation require to be passed—the intermediate on the third Monday in July, and the B.Sc. on the third, and B.A. on the fourth The fee payable at each examination is £5. No Monday in October. candidate is admitted to the examination for the degree of M.A. until after the expiration of one academical year from the time of his passing that for B.A., nor unless he can show evidence that he has completed his twentieth

year. A fee of £10 is exacted for the M.A. examination.

The highest degree in the Faculty of Arts in this University is D.Lit., or Doctor of Literature. A candidate who is only B.A. must pass two examinations at an interval of at least a year; but Masters of Arts who have taken their degree in classics need pass only the second examination. former of these is in the Greek and Latin classics generally, with prose composition in Greek, Latin, and English, and in history to the end of the eighteenth century; the second examination is in the English language, literature, and history, and in any two of the following subjects, provided that either French or German be one of these :- French; German; Anglo-Saxon, with Icelandic; Sanskrit; Arabic; Hebrew, with Syriac. These examinations are conducted by means of printed papers. A fee of £10 is payable at each examination.

The degree of D.Sc. (Doctor of Science) is open to all Bachelors of Science of two years' standing; who may elect to be examined in any one or more

of sixteen branches of science. The fee is £10.

By the late Reform Act, the University of London returns one member to serve in Parliament; the constituency (above 2200) is composed solely of "Members of Convocation;" which comprises all graduates of certain standing who have chosen to secure their privileges by payment of a trifling fee.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, LONDON, FOUNDED 1826.

Re-incorporated by Act of Parliament, passed 24th June 1869.

The purpose of the foundation of this College, as expressed in the Act, is "To afford, at a moderate expense, the means of education in Literature, Science, and the Fine Arts, and in the knowledge required for admission to the medical and legal professions; and, in particular, for affording the means of obtaining the education required for the purpose of taking the degrees now, or hereafter to be, granted by the University of London." The subjects taught are at present classed under (I.) The Faculty of Arts and Laws, including the department of the Fine Arts; and the Indian School (classes chiefly in aid of preparation for the periodical examination of selected candidates for the Indian Civil Service); (II.) The Faculty of Science, to which belongs the department of Engineering, applied Science, and Technology; and (III.) The Faculty of Medicine; and are specified below. Students are admitted without previous examination; and female students are admitted to the classes in the faculties of arts and laws, and of science, but not to those in the faculty of medicine. The session commences early in October, and terminates towards the end of June. In connexion with University College, and occupying portions of its buildings, there is a school for boys under sixteen years of age.

KING'S COLLEGE, LONDON,

Was founded in 1828, upon the following fundamental principle:-"That every system of general education for the youth of a Christian community ought to comprise instruction in the Christian religion as an indispensable part, without which the acquisition of other branches of knowledge will be conducive neither to the happiness of the individual, nor to the welfare of the state." The subjects taught are enumerated below, and are comprised under the following departments:- I. General Literature and Science; II. The Applied Sciences; III. Theology; IV. Medicine; V. The Evening Classes; VI. The School. In the first-named department, new students are subjected to an examination, that it may be ascertained whether they are competent to take advantage of the College classes. The course of study pursued in Department II. is practical in its nature, and is designed "for the large class of young men who, in after life, are likely to be engaged in commercial and agricultural pursuits, or in professional employments, such as civil and military engineering, surveying, architecture, and the higher branches of manufacturing art." The whole course occupies three years. Candidates for admission as students in theology must be twenty-one years of age, and be recommended by the clergyman of their parish; they must also pass an examination in Greek, Latin, English literature, the Church Catechism, etc. The course must be continued for at least six terms (two years) before students can offer themselves for final examination. No degrees are conferred by King's College, but its students are privileged to graduate at the University of London.

The academical year consists of three terms, as at Cambridge; and students

are admitted at the commencement of each term.

There is accommodation within the walls of the College for only a limited number of matriculated students.

Classes for evening instruction are conducted from October to March and

from April to July in each year.

King's College School (for boys from eight to sixteen years of age) consists of two divisions-viz., the division of Classics, Mathematics, and General Literature; and the division of Modern Instruction.

SECTION III.—IRELAND.

EXTENT, ETC.—The length of Ireland, from Cork Harbour, in lat. 51° 51′ N., to Malin Head, Donegal, in lat. 55° 23′ N., is 244 miles; the breadth, from Howth Head, Dublin, in long. 6° 5′ W. to Slyne Head, Galway, in long. 10° 11′ W. is 168 miles. Its area is 30,500 square miles, or 19,516,668 acres. It is divided into four provinces, and subdivided into 32 counties. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act was £12,893,829 in 1860; £12,994,735 in 1875; £13,059,253 in 1877; £13,084,622 in 1878; £13,121,880 in 1879; and £13,241,587 in 1880. Dublin, the capital, had in 1881 a population of 273,064.

EXTENT AND POPULATION.

The length of the mainland of Scotland, from the Mull of Galloway. in Wigtownshire, in lat. 54° 39′ N. to Dunnet Head, in Caithness-shire, in lat 58° 40′ N. is 278 miles; the breadth, from Buchan-ness, in Aberdeenshire, in long. 1° 41′ W. to the most westerly point in Ross-shire, in long. 5° 52′ W., is 150 miles. The area is 29,819 square miles, or 19,084,659 statute acres.

The number of counties is thirty-three. The number of parishes in 1871 was 918, and the total population 3,360,018. The old valued rent of the counties, as ascertained in 1674, was £3,656,408 Scots, or £319,281 sterling. The amount of real property assessed to Income Tax in 1875 was £16,716,474; in 1876, £17,106,207; in 1877, £18,225,321; in 1878, £18,573,422; in 1879, £18,994,329; in 1880, £19,582,445; in 1881, 19,688,444.

LIST OF THE PEERAGE OF SCOTLAND,

AS IT STOOD ON THE 1ST MAY 1707, ORDERED TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HOUSE OF LORDS 22ND DECEMBER 1707.

By this document, commonly called The Union Roll, it is understood that the order of precedence among the Peers of Scotland is regulated; and, with certain amendments, it is that called at all elections of their representatives, though it cannot be looked on as a complete list, such as should exclude claims to Peerages not entered in it. By the Act 10 and 11 Vict. c. 52, it is ordered that, until otherwise directed by the House of Lords, the Lord Clerk Register, or the Clerks of Session officiating at elections in his name, shall not call the title of any Peerage on The Union Roll in right of which no vote has been received or counted since the year 1800. It is farther provided by the Act 14 and 15 Vict. c. 87, that after every election the titles of Peerages in right of which no vote has been received or counted for fifty years or upwards, shall be transmitted to the Clerk of Parliament, and on an order to that effect being issued from the House of Lords such titles shall not be called at future elections, until the House of Lords shall otherwise direct.

The Roll, as originally framed, contained 154 Peers; namely, 10 Dukes, 3 Marquesses, 75 Earls, 17 Viscounts, and 49 Barons; and there have been subsequently enrolled 11 Peers; namely, 1 Duke, 2 Marquesses, 2 Earls, and 6 Barons. These are distinguished by the letters ad. and a date (that of their enrolment) placed after their names. The dates of the creations have been prefixed; Peerages which are attainted, extinct, or dormant, are printed in italics; the date of the attainder, extinction, or abeyance, being added; and an asterisk * has been placed after the names of those who are likewise Peers of England, of Great Britain by special creation (all Peers of Scotland being, in terms of the Act of Union, Peers of Great Britain), or of the United Kingdom.]

Meets on the first day after the dissolution of the Assembly, if there be any business left over by the Assembly, and on the second Wednesday of August, third Wednesday of November, and first Wednesday of March, at 12 noon.

REGULATIONS FRAMED AND ENACTED IN 1883 BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, TO BE OBSERVED IN THE ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT OF MINISTERS.

 Upon Vacancy occurring, Moderator of Kirk-Session to be appointed.— Upon a vacancy occurring in any parish, a meeting of the presbytery shall be held as soon as possible and within ten days of the vacancy coming to the knowledge of the moderator or clerk, at which meeting the presbytery shall appoint a minister to declare the vacancy, and shall appoint one of their own number to be moderator of the kirk-session; provided that in collegiate charges, and in cases for the appointment of an assistant and successor, such appointment of a moderator shall be for the purposes of these Regulations only, and shall not be made if the minister of the parish should intimate that he desires to perform the duties. At all meetings of the congregation in connexion with the vacancy, the moderator of the kirk-session, whether appointed or minister of the parish as above provided, shall preside, and the roll of the congregation, as hereinafter defined, shall be in his hands. In case of the unavoidable absence of the moderator, he may in writing authorize a member of the presbytery to act for him, and shall specify the occasion on which that member is to act.

II. Procedure in case of Appointment of Assistant and Successor.-The presbytery shall not take any step toward the appointment of an assistant and successor in any parish until they have cited from the pulpit the parishioners and all concerned to a meeting of the presbytery, to be held not less than seven free days after the citation, and have thereafter come to a finding that, in consequence of the mental or bodily incapacity of the minister, or other lawful and sufficient cause, to be specified in the deliverance, it is necessary that steps be taken for the appointment of an assistant and successor. The Presbytery shall not pronounce any such finding unless they are satisfied that such appointment would be in accordance with the general wish of the parties interested. The date of such finding by the presbytery shall be held to be the date of the occurrence of the vacancy. The procedure thereafter shall, subject to the qualification in Regulation I., be the same as if the parish had become vacant, provided that in the event of the death of the minister before an election has been made, the date of the vacancy shall in that case be held to be the date of the death of the minister, and procedure shall begin de novo. But if the death of the minister occur after the election, but before induction, this shall not affect the procedure.

III. Intimations to be made on occurrence of Vacancy.—The minister appointed to declare the vacancy shall be furnished by the presbytery with the declaration, which may be in the form of Schedule A 1. He shall at the same time make the intimations provided for in Schedule A 2. The kirk-session shall appoint the meetings therein specified, and shall furn

him with the intimations of the Schedule complete. The time allowed for giving in certificates as communicants and claims to be enrolled as adherents shall be not less than seven nor more than eleven free days; and the time during which the roll of the congregation, as proposed by the kirk-session, shall be open for inspection shall be not less than three free days. The claim for enrolment as an adherent shall be in the form of Schedule B.

IV. Roll of Congregation.—The roll of the congregation shall include—

1. As communicants, all persons not being under church discipline, whose names are upon the communion roll at the date of the occurrence of the vacancy, as the same shall be adjusted in manner hereinafter provided, or who are, and at that date were, parishioners in communion with the Church of Scotland, and have given in certificates within the time intimated in terms of Schedule A; it being hereby provided that communicants who have received certificates of transference shall be held as removed from the roll; 2. As adherents, only such other persons, being parishioners not under twenty-one years of age, as have claimed to be enrolled as members of the congregation, and have shown to the satisfaction of the kirk-session that they desire to be connected with the congregation, and in regard to whom no reason appears to the kirk-session for refusing to admit them to the communion if they should apply. Declaring that as regards adherents the decision of the kirk-session shall be final.

V. Making up Roll of Congregation.—The kirk-session, at the meeting appointed for the purpose, shall hear any party having an interest, and shall prepare a list of the names and designations of those persons whom it is proposed by the kirk-session to place on the roll as communicants and adherents respectively, and the list shall be open for inspection for such time as shall have been appointed. Thereafter at the meeting appointed for the purpose, any party having an interest shall be heard, and the list shall be revised and adjusted. It shall then be attested by the moderator and clerk, and shall thereafter be held to be the roll of the congregation for the purposes of these Regulations, and a certified copy shall be forthwith transmitted to the clerk of the presbytery. If, after the roll has been attested, any communicant, on his own application, receives a certificate of transference, the session-clerk shall give intimation of such transference to the moderator, and the name of that communicant shall thereafter be removed from the roll of the congregation.

VI. Appointment of Committee by Congregation.—When the roll of the congregation has been made up, the moderator of kirk-session shall summen a meeting of the congregation by intimation from the pulpit, in the form of Schedule C, given not less than seven nor more than fourteen free days before the meeting. At this meeting the congregation shall appoint a committee of their own number for the purpose of nominating one or more persons to the congregation with a view to the election and appointment of a minister. Before proceeding to the appointment of this committee, or of a new committee as hereinafter provided, a resolution shall be passed that the number of members constituting the committee shall not exceed a certain number specified in the resolution. At the close of the meeting the committee shall meet, and shall appoint one of their number to be convener.

VII. Contents of Committee's Report.—The report of the committee shall state the name of one or more persons whom they have resolved to nominate to the congregation with a view to the election and appointment of a minister; and, on the demand of any member of committee, it shall also state the name of any person or persons as having been proposed and seconded for nomination and voted upon in the committee. Any member of the committee may also require that the report shall give the state of the vote in the committee upon any or all of the names mentioned in the

VIII. Giving in of Committee's Report.-When the committee has resolved to report, the convener shall communicate with the moderator of the kirksession, who shall call a meeting of the congregation, to be held not less than seven free days after intimation from the pulpit, in terms of Schedule D. The report of the committee shall be read from the pulpit when the meeting is intimated. If such intimation has not been given within three months after the appointment of the committee then in office, any six persons whose names are on the roll of the congregation may require the moderator to call a meeting of the congregation. On receiving the requisition, he shall give notice to the convener of the committee of the time at which intimation of the meeting is to be given. If the committee should lodge their report with the moderator or clerk of the kirk-session before the day on which the meeting is to be intimated, the intimation shall be in the manner hereinbefore provided; but otherwise it shall be in terms of Schedule E, such meeting to be held not less than three free days after the intimation. The committee may at any time have a meeting of the congregation called by the moderator, to be held not less than three free days after intimation from the pulpit, in order to give information or explanation or to obtain instructions.

IX. Congregational Meeting on Report of Committee, or on their Failure to Report .- At any meeting of the congregation held for the purposes of Regulation VIII .: - 1. If no report is submitted as hereinbefore defined in which at least one person is nominated, or if all the persons nominated in the report have withdrawn, or if from any cause an election and appointment as hereinafter provided for are not effected, the matter shall be remitted. with or without special instructions, to the same or to a new committee. 2. In order to making an election and appointment, any elector present may propose that any person mentioned in the report, either as nominated or as having been voted upon in committee for nomination, shall be elected and appointed. (a.) If only one person is thus proposed and seconded, the moderator shall put the question, "Shall the Rev. A. B. [naming him] be now elected and appointed—yes or no?" If the number who vote "Yes" exceed the number who vote "No," a minute to that effect, bearing the signature of the moderator attested by two witnesses, shall be held to be a minute of election and appointment by the congregation to the effect of being laid before the presbytery of the bounds as hereinafter provided, and adjudicated upon by the courts of the Church in ordinary course. (b.) If more persons than one are thus proposed and seconded and not withdrawn. their names shall be simultaneously put to the vote, and the name having fewest votes shall be struck off; and this method shall be followed till, by names being struck off or withdrawn, the name of only one person remains. His name shall then be put to the meeting in the same form, and the same course shall be followed as if he had been the only person proposed and seconded, as hereinbefore provided. In the event of the two names having fewest votes being supported by equal numbers, a vote shall be taken between these to ascertain which shall be struck off. 3. At any meeting, when such an election and appointment has been made, a call previously prepared, in the form of Schedule F, with the name left blank, shall be filled up with the name of the person so elected and appointed. The call shall be left for not less than seven nor more than eleven free days with the sessionclerk, or other suitable person named by the meeting, to receive additional signatures of members of the congregation and of parishioners.

X. Adjourned Meetings of Congregation and Failure to Meet.—Any meeting of a congregation may resolve to defer any part, or the whole, of the business of that meeting to an adjourned meeting; and when any meeting, as provided for in these Regulations, remits a matter to the same or a former or a new committee with or without instructions, it may require the committee to give its report, or to give an account, at an adjourned meeting or within a specified time. The time of holding any adjourned meeting, and the intimation to be given of it from the pulpit (if intimation is resolved on), may be fixed by the adjourning meeting, or may be left wholly or

partially to be afterwards fixed by the moderator. If the adjournment is for more than twelve days, intimation shall be given of the meeting; in every case in which the time of the meeting is left in any measure to be fixed by the moderator, intimation of it shall be given not less than three free days before the meeting. If any congregational meeting which has been called should not be held, another shall be called in like manner by the moderator; and if a meeting which has been appointed by adjournment without being also called should not be held, another shall be called by the moderator, to be held not less than three free days after intimation from the pulpit. Provided always that no election and appointment of a minister shall take place at any meeting of which at least seven free days' intimation has not been given from the pulpit, accompanied by the reading of the report upon which the appointment is to proceed.

- XI. Transmission of Documents to Presbytery. The congregational minutes, the report of the committee, and the minute of election and appointment, shall be forthwith transmitted by the moderator of the kirk-session to the moderator or clerk of the presbytery, along with information of the address of the person in whose hands the call has been left for additional signatures, and of the length of time for which it has been so left. At the expiry of that time, the person with whom the call has thus been left shall transmit it to the moderator or clerk of the presbytery.
- XII. In case of Presbytery giving Judgment against a Settlement.—If the presbytery should resolve not to sustain the appointment, or if, having sustained it, they should afterwards from any cause resolve not to proceed with the settlement, or find that it cannot be proceeded with, the moderator of the kirk-session shall as soon as possible call a meeting of the congregation (that is, the congregation on the roll made up on the occurrence of the vacancy as aforesaid), to be held not less than three free days after intimation from the pulpit. This meeting, having heard the deliverance of the presbytery, shall, with or without instructions, either re-appoint any former committee or appoint a new committee, to proceed again as committees are directed to do in these Regulations.
- XIII. Appeals.—No complaint or appeal against any judgment or any step of procedure affecting the appointment or settlement of a minister shall make it incompetent to continue the proceedings; and no complaint or appeal against a judgment of the presbytery refusing to sustain an appointment or to proceed with a settlement shall make it incompetent for the congregation to proceed to the appointment of another person. Provided that, pending any complaint or appeal, the proceedings shall not in any case include the fixing of a day by the presbytery for the admission of a minister.
- XIV. Counsel and Agents.—It shall not be competent for any one to be represented by counsel or agents at any of the meetings of the congregation referred to in these Regulations.
- XV. Proviso as to Instructions.—Nothing hereinbefore contained shall be held as authorizing a congregation to give instructions to any committee to nominate a particular person or persons in their report.
- XVI. Direction for Existing Vacancies.—In cases where proceedings for supplying a vacancy have been commenced before the date of the enactment of these Regulations, the proceedings, after such date, shall be by the Regulations now enacted, so far as the same may be applicable.

The Forty-third General Assembly of the Free Church convened at Edinburgh on 24th May 1883, when, among other proceedings, they passed the following Acts of Legislation: -- Act reducing the Wynd Church, Glasgow, to a Preaching Station; Act anent Mode of taking Evidence in Church Courts; Act anent the Formation of a Presbyterian Church in South Africa; also the following Acts, important for the general use of the Church: Address to Her Majesty with reference to the anniversary of Her Majesty's Birthday; Act anent the Sustentation Fund, declaring the Dividend payable to all Ministers on the Platform of the Equal Dividend to be £160, with an additional Dividend of £23 and one of £11, 10s. to those Ministers whose Congregations, besides having contributed £60 and upwards, have contributed at the rate of 10s. and 7s. 6d. respectively per Communicant to the Sustentation Fund during the last year; Act anent the Platform of the Equal Dividend; Act anent Instrumental Music; Act anent Relation between Church and State; Act anent Collections, appointing for those yet to fall due the third Sabbath of January for a Collection for the Continent, the third Sabbath of February for the College Fund, and the third Sabbath of April for the Home Mission; Act anent "Scottish Psalter": Act appointing the Commission of Assembly; Act appointing the Meeting of next Assembly to be at Edinburgh on the 22nd May 1884.

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SECT. III.—EDUCATIONAL AND LITERARY ESTABLISHMENTS.

THE UNIVERSITIES OF SCOTLAND.

The four Scottish Universities—at St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh—were in 1858-62 reorganized by an Executive Commission, and as far as possible assimilated. The Universities (Scotland) Act of that year made "provision for the better government and discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and improving and regulating the course of study therein." Since then the four Universities have possessed a constitution and arrangement nearly uniform. Each is now governed by three internal bodies, called respectively the General Council of the University, the University Court, and the Senatus Academicus. The official Heads of each University are:—the Chancellor (who nominates a Vice-chancellor for conferring degrees in his absence), chosen for life by the General Council; the Rector, chosen every three years by the matriculated students; and the Principal (at St Andrews, Senior Principal) or resident Head of the University, who is President of the Senatus.

The General Council consists of the Chancellor, who is President of the Council; the Rector, who is President of the University Court; the Principal, and the Professors; the Graduates of the University; four Assessors nominated to sit in the University Court respectively by the Chancellor, Rector, General Council, and Senatus. Failing the Chancellor, the Rector presides; whom failing, the Principal; whom failing, the senior Professor present.

The University Court is a court of appeal from the Senatus, and consists of the Rector, Principal, and Assessors. In Edinburgh, two additional members of the Council and Court are, the Lord Provost of the city, and an Assessor nominated by the Town Council; and in Glasgow, one additional member is the "Dean of Faculties"—an extra representative of the Senatus.

The Senatus Academicus, which consists of the Principal and Professors, is entrusted with the control of the teaching and discipline, and, subject to review of the University Court, with the administration of the revenues and property of the University.

Two members of Parliament are returned by the four Universities. One of these represents Edinburgh and St Andrews; the other Glasgow and Aberdeen. The electors are the members of the General Councils. The Vice-Chancellor is empowered to superintend the election. The Vice-Chancellors at Edinburgh and Glasgow are the Returning Officers.

Each University has considerable endowments for its distinguished stadents and graduates. They are applied in the form of Prizes (Class and University), Bursaries, Scholarships, and Fellowships. Edinburgh possesses a great number of valuable Scholarships and Fellowships; Glasgow also is rich in Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries; and there is a good Bursary organization in Aberdeen. The Scholarships and Fellowships are for the most part confined to those who have passed the examinations necessary for the degree of Master of Arts.

Open to all the Scottish Universities are-

I. THE FERGUSON SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1860 by the Trustees of the late John Ferguson, Esq. of Cairnbrock. They are six in number, of the value of £80 each per annum, and tenable for two years. Three are offered for competition every year,—one in Classics, one in Mathematics, and one in Mental Philosophy. The competitions take place in Glasgow in the month of October, and are open to all who have passed the examinations required for the degree of M.A. in one of the Universities of Scotland within the two years immediately preceding the competition. Candidates are enrolled, not later than 1st September in each year, at the office of the Trustees, 94 Bath Street, Glasgow, where all necessary information may be obtained.—Secretary, M. S. Tait.

II. SHAW FELLOWSHIP IN MENTAL PHILOSOPHY,

Founded in 1867 by contributors to a Memorial of Sir James Shaw, Bart. It is of the annual value of £170, tenable for five years, and is in the patronage of the Senatus Academicus of the University of Edinburgh. It is destined for the encouragement of the study of Psychology, Logic, Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and the History of Philosophy,—studies for which the Scottish Universities have long been celebrated in Europe. It is awarded after competitive examination on these subjects, open to all who have passed the examinations for the degree of Master of Arts in any of the Scottish Universities not more than five years before the time of competition. The present Shaw Fellow was elected in December 1883.

III. GUNNING THEOLOGICAL SCHOLARSHIPS AND FELLOWSHIP.

Founded by Dr Gunning of Rio de Janeiro. Designed to encourage the study of—(1) The Natural Sciences among students of Theology; (2) and open to students preparing for the Ministry of the Churches of Scotland holding the Confession of Faith without modification.

The Scholarships are three in number, of the annual values of £50, £30, and £20, each tenable for three years; open to students who have completed a three years' course in the Faculty of Arts in any Scottish University,

and are on the point of commencing their studies in theology.

The subjects of examination are Natural History, Botany, Geology, and some Department of Natural Theology or Christian Apologetics having special reference to the connexion between religion and science. The Scholarships were awarded for the first time in May 1880. The Fellowship, of the annual value of £100, open to students or licentiates of the Church of Scotland, or of some other Scottish Church holding the Confession of Faith without modification, was awarded for the first time in May 1883. Examination will be in Natural History, Botany, Geology, and the The examination for Scholarships and subjects of Theological study. Fellowships to be held in Edinburgh.

The Degrees conferred by each of the Universities are the following:-Master of Arts (M.A.); Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master in Surgery (C.M.), Doctor of Medicine (M.D.); Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.), Bachelor of Law (B.L.); Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.); and the two honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) and Doctor of Divinity (D.D.);—together with some which are confined to Edinburgh, viz., Bachelor and Doctor in Natural and Physical Science; in the Department of Public Health; and in Engineering (B.Sc. and D.Sc.); Doctor in Mental Science (D.Sc.); Doctor in Philological Science (D.Sc.) The Degree of B.Sc. in the three departments of Biological, Geological, and Engineering Science, is also conferred by Glasgow.

A Certificate conferring the title of Literate in Arts is granted by Glasgow and Edinburgh. A Certificate of Proficiency in Engineering

Science is conferred by Glasgow.

The Professorships are distributed (except at St Andrews, where Law is not taught) under four Faculties-Arts, i.e., Literature, Science, and

Philosophy; Theology; Law; Medicine.

The Professorships in the Faculty of Arts are concerned with the leading branches of liberal education required for general culture; the Curriculum in Arts is also the preparatory discipline for the three professional Faculties. The province of the Faculties of Theology, Law, and Medicine

is special, namely, to train in professional studies.

The Faculty of Arts is, accordingly, the basis of University education. It embraces three departments: — viz., (1) Classical Languages and Literature: (2) Philosophy, including Psychology, Logic, and Metaphysics; Moral Philosophy; Rhetoric, with which English Literature is associated. (3) Mathematics; the various branches of Experimental Physics comprehended in Natural Philosophy. A degree in Arts is a pass to any of the other three Faculties. The possession of it exempts from preliminary examination on general subjects any one desirous of entering the Church or the Medical or Legal professions, and the principal departments of the Public Service.

To obtain the degree of Master of Arts a University course of Four Winter Sessions is necessary; or (if an entrance examination in Latin and Greek is passed) a Course of Three Winter Sessions. Attendance on the classes of Humanity (Latin), Greek, Logic and Psychology, Moral Philosophy, Rhetoric and English Literature, Mathematics, and Natural Philosophy, is required of all candidates for this Degree. The examinations to be gone through for the M.A. degree are in the three Departments, viz., Classics; Mental Philosophy; and Mathematics and Experimental Physics. These three examinations may be passed at the conclusion of the curriculum; or any one (or two) of them at an earlier period—provided that the classes corresponding to the subjects of examination have been previously attended. When a student has passed all the necessary examinations, he may either at once proceed to take his degree, or, with a view to presenting himself

in the Honours examinations, he may pursue his studies further for a year before graduating. The names of those who graduate with Honours are published in alphabetical order, in Classes of the First and Second rank. Honours may be taken in each of the three Departments—Classics; Mental Philosophy; Mathematics and Experimental Physics; also in Natural Science.

The degree of B.D. is given to candidates who have completed their Theological Curriculum with a view to the ministry in the communion to which they belong. The degree has this peculiarity, that candidates are not required to attend any classes in the Faculty of Divinity; but those who are not Masters of Arts of the University in which they apply for B.D. must have attended two classes in one or more of the Faculties of the University. The subjects of examination are Apologetics, Hebrew,

Church History, Divinity, and Biblical Criticism.

In the University of St Andrews the title of LL.A. is conferred upon women who pass in any four of the following subjects, or who pass in any two and take Honours in a third, one of the three being a Language—viz., Latin. Greek, Mathematics, Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, English Literature, Natural Philosophy, Education, Political Economy, French, German, Italian, Comparative Philology, History, Chemistry, Mineralogy, Physiology, Botany, Zoology, Geology, Theology, Biblical Criticism, Church History, and Hebrew. The standard of attainment is the same as that required for the M.A. degree, the books prescribed, the questions set, and the hours of examination being identical. In the event of the several subjects necessary for the M.A. degree being passed successfully the University indicates the fact in the certificate granted.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ST ANDREWS,

The most ancient of the Scottish Universities, was founded in 1411 by Wardlaw, Bishop of the diocese. Two years later, on petition of James I., the Bishop, and others, the foundation, with benefactions annexed to it, was sanctioned, and privileges and immunities were secured to it, by Papal bull of Benedict XIII. From the first there existed the Faculties of Arts, Theology, and Canon Law. In 1430, a pedagogium was erected for the Faculty of Arts. The University has undergone numerous changes of constitution. In the sixteenth century it came to comprise three distinct corporate colleges:—

1. St Salvator's College, founded in 1455; 2. St Leonard's College, founded in 1552; 3. The College of St Mary, founded in 1537.

In 1747, the colleges of St Salvator and St Leonard were united by Act of Parliament, and called the United College of St Salvator and St Leonard. The University now "consists," to quote the Calendar, "of three distinct corporations, viz.:—The United College of St Salvator and St Leonard, with its Principal and nine Professors; St Mary's College, with its Principal, who is also Primarius Professor, and three Professors; and the University, comprising the members of both colleges, and of which the senior Principal

(senior according to priority in office) is also president."

The session in the *United College* opens in the first week of November, and closes towards the end of April. In St Mary's College, it commences about ten days later, and closes in the end of March.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the last Thursday of March and the last Friday of November. The election of Rector takes place every third year.

The aggregate annual value of the prizes, bursaries, and fellowships at St

Andrews is about £2500.

In 1883 the number of students who matriculated was 194; the number who graduated was 31—viz.; in Arts, M.A., 19; in Medicine, 11; in Divinity, B.D., 1; in Science, 0. Members of the General Council, 1583. The number of those who voted for the M.P. returned in April 1880 was 1351.

THE UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW

Was founded by bull of Pope Nicholas V., obtained by King James II. at the instigation of Bishop Turnbull in 1450. From the beginning it taught Canon and Civil Law, Theology and the Arts, and was empowered to confer degrees in all Faculties. In its earlier days, its educational labours are said to have been carried on near the cathedral, in a building afterwards known as the "Old Pedagogy," now swept away by the operations of the City Improvement Trust; while the General Congregations of the University and of the Faculties met in the chapter-house of the cathedral. In 1459, James, first Lord Hamilton, granted to the Faculty of Arts, which thenceforward grew in importance, the site occupied by the buildings abandoned in 1870

In 1577, King James VI. granted increased funds in a charter called the Nova Erectio.

By this charter provision was made for the support of a Principal, who was to teach Theology, and three Regents in Philosophy. From this small beginning the University continued to make progress till the era of the Restoration, at which time it had, besides the Principal, eight Professors and Regents in Theology, Medicine, and Arts. The restoration of the Episcopal Church deprived it of a considerable portion of its revenues, and in consequence several of the Professorships fell into abeyance, but after the Revolution it began again to prosper. In the first twenty years of last century, five new Professorships were founded, and another in 1760. The remaining fourteen Professorships have been founded during the present century.

Among the eminent men who have adorned this University during the last and present centuries, may be mentioned the names of Hutcheson, Adam Smith and Reid, Black and Cullen, Robert Simson, John Millar, Moor, and Sandford.

The University occupied the site which it quitted a few years ago for upwards of four hundred years, and its late buildings for upwards of two hundred years. In 1864 these buildings and adjacent lands were sold, and extensive and handsome new buildings, designed by Sir G. Gilbert Scott of London, have been erected on an admirable site in the west end of Glasgow. The new buildings, of which the foundation-stone was laid by the Prince and Princess of Wales in October 1868, and which were formally opened for the purposes of the University on the 7th November 1870, are estimated to cost, when completed, upwards of £470,000; and in aid of their erection subscriptions have already been received, chiefly in Glasgow and the neighbourhood, to the amount of above £165,000.

The winter session commences on the first Tuesday of November, and ends on May 1st. The Medical classes open a week earlier, and close in the beginning of April. There is also a Medical summer session from the beginning of May till the end of July.

The Exhibitions, Scholarships, Bursaries, and Prizes, founded in this University, amount in annual value to about £8000. The most valuable of these are the George A. Clark Scholarships, four in number, each about £200 in annual value, the Black Theological Fellowship (£140), the Luke Fellowship (£120), the Metcalfe Fellowship (£100), two Eglinton Fellowships (each £100), and the Snell Exhibitions, ten in number, and each £110 in annual value, the object of which is to assist Scottish students in prosecuting their studies in Oxford University. These exhibitions have been held by not a few who afterwards became distinguished, among whom may be mentioned Adam Smith, Sir William Hamilton, Archbishop Tait, and the present Lord President of the Court of Session. The Bursaries in connexion with the Faculty of Arts are 159 in number, and are of the aggregate annual value of £3553; there are 36 in the Faculty of Theology, worth annually about £840, 2 in the Faculty of Law, worth annually £43, and 14 in Medicine, with an annual value of £347. Besides these there are 48 bursaries, worth annually above £1205, which are not restricted to any one of the Faculties. Competitive examinations for the Bursaries in Arts, Theology, and Medicine are held in the University at the beginning of each winter session.

University Certificates, conferring on those who obtain them the title of Literate in Arts (L.A.) are open to those who, in the course of two sessions, have given attendance at not less than five of the classes included in the curriculum of study for the degree of Master of Arts, and who may undergo satisfactory examinations at the standard of those necessary for that degree.

Local Examinations are held by the University annually in May, at

Glasgow and at various centres throughout the country.

For students desirous of entering the Army, the University holds an Examination which the War Office accepts as equivalent to the examination at the English and Irish Universities for similar candidates. It consists of three out of the seven examinations required for the degree of Master of Arts.

The University Library contains an extensive and valuable collection of books, which is always increasing by donations and by a grant of £707 per annum from the Treasury as compensation for the loss of the Stationers'

Hall privilege.

The Hunterian Museum was founded by the eminent William Hunter, M.D., who, by his will dated 1783, bequeathed to the University his valuable collection of books, manuscripts, coins, paintings, anatomical preparations,

zoological and mineral specimens, and archæological relics.

The number of matriculated students in the session 1882-83 was:—In the Faculty of Arts, 1307; Divinity, 98; Medicine (summer, 107), 624; Law, 197; in Arts and Medicine, 20; in Arts and Law, 16; in Arts and Theology, 10; in Medicine and Theology, 3: total, 2275.

Matriculated Students, in voting for the Rector, are divided into four

nations:-

Natio Glottiana (those born in Lanarkshire); Natio Transforthana (those born in the counties lying north of the Forth); Natio Rothseiana (those born in the counties of Renfrew, Bute, or Ayr); Natio Loudoniana (those not already included).

This election takes place every three years on the 15th (or 16th, if the 15th

be a Sunday) of November.

The number of Degrees conferred in session 1882-83, after examination, was 301-viz., in Arts (M.A.), 92; Science (B.Sc.), 8; Law, 18 (LL.B. 5, B.L. 13); Medicine and Surgery, 170 (M.D. 10, M.B. 79, C.M. 81); Theology (B.D.), 13. Twenty-three Honorary Degrees were conferred, viz., D.D., 5, LL.D., 18.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the Wednesday immediately preceding the opening, and on the Wednesday immediately preceding the closing, of the winter session.

who voted for the M.P. at the election in April 1880 was 2579.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ABERDEEN

Was, until 1860, two Universities and Colleges. The one, the University and King's College of Aberdeen, was founded in 1494 by Elphinstone, Bishop of the diocese, and sanctioned by a Papal bull obtained by James IV.; the other, Marischal College and University of Aberdeen, was founded in 1593, under

a charter ratified by Parliament, by George Keith, Earl Marischal.

The Universities (Scotland) Act, 1858, includes (as mentioned in the preamble) "The union of the two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen;" which union the Commissioners appointed by Parliament dated from Sept. 15, 1860. Among the other Scottish Universities, that of Aberdeen now ranks from the foundation of 1494. It consists now of but one University, having its classes for Arts and Divinity in what was King's College, and its classes of Law and Medicine in what was Marischal College. Both Colleges had classes in all four Faculties.

In the election of Lord Rector, the matriculated students are divided, according to their birthplace, into four "nations"—Mar, Buchan, Moray, and Angus; and each nation chooses a procurator to vote for the Rector; and, in case of a tie, the Chancellor (failing him, the Principal) has a casting vote.

In Arts, the session commences on the second last Monday of October, and closes on the first Friday of April. In Divinity, the session commences on the Monday following the opening of the Arts classes, and closes on the same day as that on which lectures in Arts close. In Law, the session extends from the first Monday of November to the end of March. In Medicine, the winter session commences not later than 24th October, and extends over six months; and the summer session commences, as nearly as possible, on the 1st of May, and extends over three months. The General Council meets twice a year—on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of April, and on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of October. The number of Matriculated Students in the winter session of 1882-83 was 821; in the summer session of 1883, 277, of whom 47 were new Students. The Graduates in 1883 were as follows:—M.A., 63; M.D., 20; M.B., 62; C.M., 62; D.D., 0; LL.D., 9; B.D., 2.

The registered members of the General Council for the year 1883 numbered 2721. The number who voted at the election in April 1880 was 2080.

THE UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH.

This, though the youngest of the Scottish Universities, annually enrols the largest number of students. It was founded by James VI. in 1582, and entitled Academia Jacobi VI., or "King James's College," but it originated in a bequest made in 1558, by Reid, Bishop of Orkney, to the Town-Council of Edinburgh, for the erection of a College. The money was at first retained by the Abbot of Kinloss. After a delay of five years, the Council, on the faith of ultimately obtaining the bequest, purchased part of the present site of the University. Queen Mary lent her assistance, granting a charter of presentation to some confiscated church property, but the College buildings were not commenced until 1581. In April 1582, King James incorporated the University by Royal Charter, increasing the grants of Queen Mary.

The title of Edinburgh University to the various rights, privileges, and immunities possessed by the other Universities of the kingdom rests on an Act of the Scottish Parliament passed in 1621, and on subsequent ratifications made in the Treaty of Union and in the Act of Security.

The work of teaching began in 1583, under Robert Rollock, who was at first called Regent. Other Regents or Professors in Greek, Logic and Metaphysics, Ethics, and Physics, were appointed in the following year,

when Rollock became Principal.

The University of Edinburgh has long been famous. It has had Archbishop Leighton, Carstairs, and Robertson, the historian, among its Principals. In the Faculty of Divinity it has numbered among its Professors, Samuel Rutherford, Chalmers, John Lee, Robert Lee, T. J. Crawford. Its Medical fame, which rose under Dr Alexander Monro after 1720, is second to that of no university in Europe. As a School of Mental Philosophy it can boast, as students and professors, of the names of David Hume, Ferguson, Stewart, Brown, Sir James Mackintosh, and Sir William Hamilton. Dalzel, Playfair, Leslie, and Forbes were eminent in other departments of the Faculty of Arts.

The Legal Curriculum, comprising Roman Law, Scotch Law, Conveyancing, Medical Jurisprudence, Constitutional Law and History, International Law and the Philosophy of Law, is more complete than that of any other University in the United Kingdom. The degree of LL.B. qualifies for the profession of Advocate; and either this degree or that of B.L. exempts from the Law Agent's Examination, with the exception

of the examination in procedure.

Until 1858, the Town-Council had a large share of the patronage of the University. The appointments to such chairs as the Town-Council were patrons of are now in the hands of seven Curators—four elected by the Town-Council and three by the University Court.

The University Library contains above 160,000 volumes and many valuable MSS. There is also a Theological Library containing many valuable books on philosophy and divinity. The new Museum of Science

and Art is connected with the University.

The aggregate annual value of the Fellowships and Scholarships (all founded since 1858), including the eighteen newly-founded Vans Dunlop Scholarships, each of the annual value of £100 and tenable for three years, is above £6000. Ten of these are given for eminence in Classics; ten in Mental Philosophy; fifteen in Mathematics and the Physical Experimental Sciences; and eleven in Divinity, Law, and Medicine. There are above a hundred Bursaries in connexion with the Faculty of Arts, of the aggregate annual value of more than £2000. For those of them that are open by the deeds of foundation to unrestricted competition, there is an annual Bursary Competition at the beginning of each winter session, There are also thirty-one in the Faculty of Divinity, worth annually about £740, and several in Law. In Medicine there are six Scholarships, of the value each of £100 yearly, and several of lesser value; also some Bursaries.

University Certificates, conferring on those who obtain them the title of Literate in Arts (L.A.), are open to those who have been students in the Faculty of Arts for at least two sessions, and who during that time have given attendance in not less than five classes in that Faculty, of which at least four must have been on four of the subjects necessary for the degree of Master of Arts, and who have undergone satisfactory examinations in the five subjects at the standard necessary for that degree.

The University of Edinburgh is one of the institutions selected by the Secretary of State for India in which candidates for the Civil Service of

India may pass their probation.

"University Certificates in Arts for Women" are given, after examination, to candidates who have studied in the classes of the "Edinburgh Association for the University Education of Women.

Local Examinations of schools, corresponding to those of Oxford and

Cambridge, are held by the University annually, in June.

The University, by an arrangement with the War Office, holds special

examinations which qualify for admission to the Army.

The University Buildings consist partly of a large, modern, quadrangular structure, covering the site of the "Kirk o' Field," the scene of the murder of Darnley. Its architect was Mr Adam, who also designed the The foundation-stone was laid in 1789, on the site of Register House. the old buildings; but, from want of funds, it remained only half completed till after 1815. The magnificent dome, designed to rise above the grand entrance, has never been erected. The interior of the quadrangle is handsome, in the Grecian style. The accommodation therein provided proved inadequate to the rapid growth of the University, under the Universities Act (1858). Extensive additional buildings have recently been constructed, to meet, more particularly, the increasing requirements of the Faculty of In these the Faculty of Medicine is provided with laboratories and class-rooms unequalled, probably, in Great Britain for their extent and equipment. The Music Class-room in Park Place, the finest University building of the kind, was erected in 1860. The Organ therein is of European celebrity, and the Museum contains a unique collection of musical instruments.

There are two sessions—the winter session, opening in the end of October, and closing in April; the summer session, opening in the beginning of May, and closing in the end of July. In the winter session, the classes in all the four Faculties are assembled; in summer, only those of

Law and Medicine, with tutorial classes in Arts.

The number of matriculated students for 1882-83 was 3351, viz., in the Faculty of Arts, 1020; in the Faculty of Divinity, 105; in the Faculty of Law, 485; in the Faculty of Medicine, 1741. The attendance during the current Session, 1883-84, is already considerably higher than last year, and higher than it has been in the whole past history of the University.

The Public Ceremonial of Graduation in Arts, Divinity, Law, and Science is in April; in Medicine in August. The number of Degrees conferred in 1883, after examination, was 528—viz., in Arts (M.A.), 80; Science, 22 (D.Sc. 4, B.Sc. 18); Divinity, 9 (B.D.); Law, 8 (LL.B.); Medicine and Surgery, 409—viz., 31 M.D., 189 M.B., and 189 C.M.

The Degrees of Doctor of Divinity and of Doctor of Laws are conferred

honoris causa tantum.

The General Council meets twice a year—on the first Tuesday after the 14th of April, and on the last Friday of October. The membership of the Council is about 5000; Members enrolled on or before 30th November annually are placed on the registers of the following and subsequent years. number of those who voted at the election of the M.P. in March 1880 was 3619.

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The Society grants annually ten bursaries of £20 each, and five of £10 each, to be competed for by pupils of schools approved of by the Directors, which include or are willing to introduce the teaching of chemistry and the following branches of natural science—physical geography, botany, and geology—into their curriculum. The £20 bursaries are tenable for one year at the University of Edinburgh for the purpose of enabling the holders to take the classes necessary to qualify for the Society's certificates or diploma; and the £10 bursaries are tenable for the same period to enable the holders to receive another year's preparation at the schools. The bursaries are determined by examination held in Edinburgh by the Society's Examiners.

VETERINARY DEPARTMENT.

The Society established a veterinary department in 1823, but by an arrangement made with the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, the Society's examinations ceased in 1881. Holders of the Society's veterinary certificate are entitled to become members of the Royal College of Veterinary Surgeons, on payment of certain fees, without being required to undergo any further examination. The number of students who have passed for the Society's certificate is 1183.

FORESTRY DEPARTMENT.

The Society grants First and Second Class Certificates in Forestry. The Examinations are open to Candidates of any age.

PLACES AND TIMES OF MEETING OF THE COURTS UNDER THE SMALL DEBT ACT AND DEBTS RECOVERY ACT.

At Oban, Lochgilphead, and Bowmore in the Island of Islay, four times a year, and at Dunoon eight times a year. The district attached to each Court consists of the following parishes, viz.:—Oban—The parishes of Kilmore and Kilbride, Kilbrandon and Kilchattan, Kilninver and Kilmelford, Ardchattan and Muckairn, Lismore and Appin, and that part of the parishes of Kilchrenan and Dalavich which is situated on the west of Lochawe. Their constituencies now vote in the election of representatives for the counties within which they are situated. SECTION I.-MUNICIPAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY.

AS DEFINED IN ACT 2ND AND 3RD WILLIAM IV. CAP. 76.

From a point on the road from Leith to Queensferry, which is distant 400 yds. (measured along such road) to the west of the point at which the same meets the Inverleith road at the house called Golden Acre, in a straight line to the northwestern corner of the enclosure of John Watson's Institution; thence in a straight line to the second stone bridge, marked No. 2, on the Union Canal; thence in a straight line to the point at which the western wall of the enclosure of the Lunatic Asylum at Morningside meets the Jordan or Pow Burn; thence down the said burn to a point which is

distant 150 yards (measured along such burn) below the arch over the same on the Carlisle road; thence in a straight line to the summit of Arthur Seat; thence in a straight line to the point at which the feeder enters the western side of Lochend Loch; thence in a straight line to the point at which Pilrig Street joins Leith Walk; thence along Pilrig Street and the Bonnington Road to the point at which the same meets the road from Leith to Queensferry; thence along the road from Leith to Queensferry to the point first described.

MUNICIPAL AND POLICE BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY.

As defined by the Edinburgh Municipal and Police Extension Act, 1852.

From the point on the south side of the road leading from Edinburgh by Comely Bank to Queensferry, where that road is at present intersected by the parliamentary and municipal boundary of the city westwards along the south side of the said road to the west side of the point where the same is crossed by the road from Granton by Crew to the Queensferry Road; thence in a straight line by the present Dean Toll, to a point on the north side of the road leading from Edinburgh to Glasgow by Coltbridge, 217 yards, or thereby, eastwards of the centre of the road leading by Murrayfield from Ravelstone Dykes to the said Edin-burgh and Glasgow Road; thence in a straight line southwards to the point of junction between the two branches joining the Edinburgh Suburban and South Side Junction Railway with the Edinburgh and Glasgow section of the North British Railway near Gorgie; thence south-eastwards along the east side of the said railway to the cross-road from Morningside to Colinton Road, near Myreside Cottage; thence southwards along that road and the western boundary of the lands of Plewlands to the south-western extremity of the said lands; thence eastwards along the south boundary of the said lands

to a point on the old road from Edinburgh to Carlops 165 yards, or thereby. north from the Greenbank Road; thence eastwards and north-eastwards along the stone fence for a distance of 823 yards, or thereby, to the point where the said fence meets the fence skirting or bounding the base of the Blackford Hill, 388 yards, or thereby, north-east from Braid House; thence in a north-easterly, easterly, and southeasterly direction along the last-mentioned fence which separates the arable from the hilly ground to a point 340 yards or thereby south-eastwards from Blackford House; thence north-east-wards in a straight line for a distance of 339 yards, or thereby, to the corner of the farm road leading from Liberton West Mains to Blackford Farm, 24 yards or thereby west from Liberton West Mains Cottages; thence eastwards along the south-side of the said road to where it meets the Old Liberton Road; thence north-eastwards in a straight line to Mayfield Toll on the Carlisle Road; thence along the south side of the road leading from Mayfield Toll to Cameron Bridge Toll; thence in a south-easterly direction along the Old Dalkeith Road for 45 yards or thereby; thence in a north-easterly and easterly direction along the road

leading from the Old Dalkeith Road to Niddry by Peffermill to the point where the said road crosses the Braid Burn; thence northwards and northeastwards along the course of and including the Braid Burn, to the bridge over the same on the road from Cairntows Toll to Duddingston, thence north-eastwards along the west side of that road, and a straight line in continuation thereof to Duddingston Loch: thence eastwards, northwards, and westwards along the margin of that loch to the south-eastern boundary of the Queen's Park; thence northwards along that boundary to the boundary of the property called Parson's Green, 312 yards or thereby south westwards of the house called Willowbrae; thence eastwards along the southern boundary of the said property of Parson's Green to the road leading from Jock's Lodge to Duddingston at the north side of the said house called Willowbrae; thence north-westwards along that road to the London Road at Jock's Lodge Toll; thence westwards along that road to the existing police boun-

dary of Edinburgh at the junction of the old and new roads at Meadowbank; thence by a line through the grounds now or formerly belonging or reputed to belong to the Orphan Hospital, Sir Graham Graham Montgomery, Bart., and the Earl of Moray, to the Lockend Road, and along the centre of the said roadway to the point where the parliamentary and municipal boundary of Leith intersects; thence in a straight line south-westwards through Lochend Loch to the point at which the feeder enters the western side of the said loch; thence in a straight line to the centre of the street of Leith Walk in line with the centre of Pilrig Street; thence along the centre of Pilrig Street and the Bonnington Road to the point at which the latter meets the road from Leith to Queensferry, thence along the road from Leith to Queensferry to the north-western extremity of the parliamentary and municipal boundary of the city; thence south westwards along that boundary to the point first described.

PARLIAMENTARY POLLING DISTRICTS AND MUNICIPAL WARDS OF THE CITY,

As DEFINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED UNDER "THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS AMENDMENT (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1868," AND "THE EDINBURGH MUNICIPAL AND POLICE EXTENSION ACT, 1882."

NOTE.—Clause 19 of the Edinburgh Municipal and Police Act, 1882, provides that "the Wards of the Burgh, for the purposes of Parliamentary Elections. shall continue to be identical with the Wards to be formed for Municipal Elections, in so far as such Wards are within the Parliamentary boundaries of the city.

I. CALTON WARD.

From a point forming the northeast boundary of the Queen's Park at Parson's Green; thence along Municipal boundary, northeastwards, north-westwards, westwards, northwards, north-westwards, south-westwards, and north-west-wards to Leith Walk, at the point the Municipal boundary where crosses that road at Pilrig; thence south-westwards along the centre of Leith Walk to a point on that road opposite Leopold Place and Blenheim Place; thence south-eastwards along the centre of the road in front of Blenheim Place and Greenside Parish Church to the footpath leading from Royal Terrace to

wards along the centre of that footpath and of Greenside Row to the junction with that Row and Calton Street: thence south-westwards along the centre of Calton Street and Leith Street to the junction of that street with Waterloo Place; thence eastwards, south-eastwards, and northeastwards along the centre of Waterloo Place and Regent Road to the junction between that road and Abbey Mount; thence southwards along the centre of the street of Abbey Mount to the junction of that street with Abbey Hill; thence northeastwards and south-eastwards along the centre of Abbey Hill and Spring Gardens to the point at Meadowbank where the boundary of the Queen's Greenside Row; thence south-west- Park joins that of the property at Parson's Green; thence south-eastwards along the boundary of the Queen's Park to the point first mentioned.

II. BEOUGHTON WARD.

From a point at the junction of Catherine Street, Greenside Street, Union Place, Little King Street, and Broughton Street, at the Theatre Royal, north-eastwards along the centre of Greenside Place and Leith Walk to the point at which the Parliamentary boundary intersects Leith Walk at Pilrig Street; thence north-westwards and westwards along the Parliamentary boundary to Inverleith Row at Golden Acre; thence south eastwards, south-westwards, and southwards along the centre of Inverleith Row, Howard Place, Warriston Place, Brandon Terrace, and Brandon Street to Eyre Place; thence north-eastwards along the centre of the street of Eyre Place, East Eyre Place, and the road in continuation thereof to Canonmills Road: thence south-eastwards along the centre of that road, Bellevue Road and Broughton Street, to the point first mentioned.

III. ST BERNARD'S WARD.

From a point at the junction of North Pitt Street, Henderson Row, Eyre Place, and Brandon Street, northwards, north - eastwards, and north-westwards, along the centre of Brandon Street, Brandon Terrace, Warriston Place, Howard Place, and Inverleith Row to the Parliamentary boundary at Golden Acre; thence westwards and south-westwards along the Parliamentary boundary to the point at which it joins the Municipal boundary on the road westward of Comely Bank; thence westwards and south-westwards along the Municipal boundary to the point at Murrayfield where that boundary crosses the Water of Leith; thence eastwards, north - eastwards, south - eastwards, eastwards, and northwards, along the course of the Water of Leith to the point at which that stream is crossed by Bell's Mills Bridge on the Old Queensferry Road; thence eastwards, north - eastwards, and south - eastwards, along the centre of that road to the junction between it and Dean Bridge Road; thence north-westwards along the centre of the latter road to

the point at which it crosses by the Dean Bridge the centre of the stream of the Water of Leith; thence eastwards and north-eastwards along the course of that stream to the bridge which crosses it at Stockbridge; thence south-eastwards along the centre of the bridge to the janction of Hamilton Place and Kerr Street; thence north-eastwards and eastwards along the centre of the streets of Hamilton Place, Claremont Place, and Henderson Row, to the point first mentioned.

IV. ST GEORGE'S WARD.

From a point at the junction of Tobago Street, Romilly Place, and Gardner's Crescent, westwards along the centre of Tobago Street and Morrison Street to Haymarket; thence north-eastwards along West Maitland Street to Palmerston Place; thence north-westwards along the centre of Palmerston Place and the road or footpath leading to the Old Queensferry Road; thence westwards along the centre of that road to the centre of the stream of Water of Leith at Bell's Mills Bridge; thence southwards, westwards, north-westwards, south-westwards, and westwards along the course of that stream to the point at which it is crossed by the Municipal boundary at Murrayfield; thence southwards along that boundary to the point at which it crosses the Caledonian Railway main line; thence northeastwards along the main line of that railway to the point at which it is crossed by the entrance street to Gardner's Crescent; thence northwards along the centre of that street to the point first mentioned.

V. ST STEPHEN'S WARD.

From a point at the junction of Broughton Street, London Street, East London Street, and the Bellevue Road, north-westwards along the centre of Bellevue Road and Canon-mills Road to the road leading from the latter road to Eyre Place; theres south - westwards, westwards, and south-westwards, along the centre of the road last mentioned, East Eyre Place, Eyre Place, Henderson Row, Claremont Place, and Hamilton Place, to Kerr Street: thence south-eastwards, southwards, eastwards, and southwards along the centre of

Kerr Street, Church Street, Gloucester Place, and India Street, to Heriot Row; thence eastwards, northwards, north-eastwards, and eastwards, along the centre of Heriot Row, Abercromby Place, Dublin Street, Drummond Place, and London Street, to the point first mentioned.

VI. ST LUKE'S WARD.

From a point at the junction of Frederick Street and Princes Street northwards along the centre of Frederick Streets and the continuation thereof through Queen Street Gardens to Heriot Row; thence westwards along the centre of Heriot Row to India Street; thence northwards, westwards, northwards, and north-westwards along the centre of India Street, Gloucester Church Street, and Kerr Street, to Stockbridge at the point where that bridge crosses the centre of the stream of the Water of Leith; thence south-westwards and north-westwards along the bed of that stream to the point where it is crossed by the Dean Bridge; thence south-eastwards along the Dean Bridge Road to the junction of that road with the Old Queensferry Road; thence northwestwards and south-westwards along that road to the footpath or road leading therefrom to Palmerston Place; thence along the centre of said road or footpath and Palmerston Place to West Maitland Street; thence south-westwards along the centre of West Maitland Street to Haymarket to the point at its junction with Morrison Street; thence south-eastwards along the centre of Morrison Street, Tobago Street, Castle Barns, and St Anthony Place, to the junction between that line of roadway and Lothian Road; thence northwards and eastwards along the centre of Lothian Road and Princes Street to the point first mentioned.

VII. ST ANDREW'S WARD.

Waterloo Place, Princes Street, and Leith Street, north-eastwards along the centre of Leith Street, Calton Street, and Greenside Row, to the footpath leading from thence to Royal Terrace; thence north-eastwards along the centre of said footpath to Royal Terrace; thence north-eastwards along the centre of the westwards along the centre of the

road in front of Greenside Parish Church and Blenheim Place to Leith Walk; thence south-westwards along the centre of Leith Walk, Baxter's Place, and Greenside Place, to Broughton Street; thence northwestwards along the centre Broughton Street to London Street; thence westwards, south-westwards, southwards, westwards, southwards, and eastwards, along the centre of London Street, Drummond Place, Dublin Street, Abercromby Place, Heriot Row, continuation of Frederick Streets through Queen Street Gardens, Frederick Streets, and Princes Street, to the point first mentioned.

VIII. CANONGATE WARD.

From a point at which the Municrosses the St cipal boundary Leonard's Branch of the North British Railway near Duddingston along the said boundary north-eastwards, north-westwards, eastwards, northwards, westwards, and northwards to the north-east boundary of the Queen's Park at Parson's Green; thence north-westwards along the boundary of said park to Meadowbank; thence north-westwards and south-westwards along the centre of the Abbey Hill Road, by Spring Gardens to Abbey Hill, and Abbey Hill to Abbey Mount; thence northwards along the centre of the street of Abbey Mount to Regent Road; thence south-westwards, westwards, north - westwards, and westwards along the centre of Regent Road and Waterloo Place to the centre of the bridge over the street of Low Calton; thence south-eastwards along the centre of the street of Low Calton and Cranston Street to the junction of that street with Canongate; thence westwards and southwards along the centre of Canongate, St Mary Street, and Pleasance, to the junction with that street and Salisbury Street; thence eastwards along the centre of Salisbury Street and the stair at the eastern end of that street to Dumbiedykes Road; thence northwards along the centre of that road to the entrance from thence to the Queen's Park; thence southwards and southeastwards along the boundary of said park and along the line of the said St Leonard's Branch of the North British Railway to the point first

IX. ST GILES' WARD.

From a point at the junction of East Drummond Street and Pleasance, northwards, eastwards, and northwards along the centre of Pleasance, St Mary Street, Canongate, Cranston Street, and Low Calton, to Waterloo Bridge; thence westwards and southwards along the centre of Waterloo Place, Princes Street, Lothian Road, and Downie Place, to Fountainbridge; thence north-eastwards, south-eastwards, southwards, eastwards, and north-eastwards along the centre of Fountainbridge, Main Point, West Port, Grassmarket, Candlemaker Row, Forrest Road, Teviot Place, Lothian Street, South College Street, Drummond Street, and East Drummond St., to the point first mentioned.

X. ST CUTHBERT'S WARD.

From a point at which the Municipal boundary crosses the Penicuik Road at Braid, northwards, north-eastwards, northwards, westwards, and southwards along the centre of Penicuik Road, Morningside Road. Boroughmuirhead Bruntsfield Place, North Bruntsfield Place, Wright's Houses, Leven Place, Wright's Houses, Leven Street, Home Street, Tollcross, Earl Grey Street, Downie Place, St Anthony Place, Castle Barns, Tobago Street, Romilly Place, and entrance street to Gardner's Crescent, to the point at which said entrance street crosses the main line of Caledonian Railway; thence southwestwards along the said railway line to the Municipal boundary near Gorgie Park; thence south-eastwards, southwards, and eastwards, along the Municipal boundary, to the point first mentioned.

XI. GEORGE SQUARE WARD.

From a point at the junction of Lutton Place with St Leonard's Street, north-westwards and southwestwards along the centre of St Leonard's Street and Rankeillor Street to Clerk Street; thence northwards, south-westwards, northwards, northwestwards, and south-westwards along the centre of Clerk Street, St Patrick Street, Nicolson Street, South College Street, Lothian Street, Teviot Place, Forrest Road, Candlemaker Row, Grassmarket, West Port, Main Point, and Fountainbridge, to Earl Grey Street; thence southwards, eastwards, northwards, east- first mentioned.

wards, southwards, and eastwards along the centre of Earl Grey Street, Tolicross, Home Street, Leven Street, Glengyle Terrace, the southern boundary of the Meadows, Hope Park, Hope Park Terrace, South Clerk Street, and Lutton Place, to the point first mentioned.

XII. ST LEONARD'S WARD.

From a point where the Municipal boundary crosses the St Leonard's Branch of the North British Railway near Duddingston, north-westwards and northwards along the line of said railway and the boundary of the Queen's Park to the entrance gate of said park from Dumbiedykes Read; thence southwards and westwards along the centre of Dumbiedykes Road, the stair leading therefrom to Salisbury Street, and Salisbury Street to Pleasance at its junction with Salisbury Street; thence northwards, south-westwards, southwards, north-eastwards, and south-eastwards along the centre of Pleasance, East Drummond Street, Drummond Street, Nicolson Street, St Patrick Street, and Clerk Street, to Rankeillor Street, the centre of Rankeiller Street, St Leonard's Street, and Dalkeith Road, to the point at which it is intersected by the Municipal boundary at Cameron Bridge; thence along said boundary north-eastwards. south-eastwards, and north-eastwards, to the point first mentioned.

XIII. NEWINGTON WARD.

From a point at which the Dalkeith Road is intersected by the Municipal boundary at Cameron Bridge, north-westwards, south-westwards, northwards, westwards, southwards, westwards, south-westwards, and southwards, along the centre of Dalkeith Road and St Leonard Street to Lutton Place, Lutton Place, South Clerk Street (northward from Lutton Place to Hope Park Terrace), Hope Park Terrace, Hope Park, the southern boundary of the Meadows, Glengyle Terrace, Wright's Houses, Bruntsfield Place, Boroughmuirhead Road. Morningside Road. Penicuik Road, to the point at which it is intersected by the Municipal boundary at Braid; thence eastwards. south-eastwards, north-eastwards. north-eastwards. eastwards, and along said boundary, to the point

III. CANONGATE DISTRICT.

The boundary whereof is: From a point at the junction of North Bridge Street and Princes Street, thence eastwards, south - eastwards, eastwards, north-eastwards, and northwards, along the centre of Waterloo Place, Regent Road, West Norton Place, Maryfield, and Easter Road, to the point where that road is intersected by the Municipal boundary, thence south-eastwards, north-eastwards, south-eastwards, southwards, south - eastwards, south - westwards, southwards, eastwards, southwards, westwards, and south-eastwards along the Municipal boundary to the point where it intersects the St Leonard's branch of the North British Railway, near Duddingston, thence northwestwards, westwards, north-west-wards, and northwards, along the St Leonard's branch of the North British Railway and the southwestern boundary of the Queen's Park to the entrance gate of said park from Dumbiedykes Road, thence southwards and westwards along the centre of Dumbiedykes Road, the stairs leading therefrom to Salisbury Street, and Salisbury Street to Pleasance, thence northwards, westwards, northwards, and westwards along the centre of Pleasance, East Adam Street, West Adam Street, Roxburgh Place, and Drummond Street, to the junction of that street with Nicolson Street, thence northwards along the centre of South Bridge Street and North Bridge Street to the point first mentioned.

IV. ST GILES' DISTRICT.

Lauriston Place, and Lauriston Place, to the junction of the latter place with the street or lane known as Heriot Place or Vennel, thence north-westwards, northwards, and north-westwards, along the centre of Heriot Place and Vennel to Grassmarket, across Grassmarket by a line immediately in front of the block of buildings forming the western end thereof to King's Stables Road, the centre of that road, the road under King's Bridge, and the road leading thence to Lothian Read, at a point where the last-mentioned road joins it, thence northwards and eastwards along the centre of Lothian Road and Princes Street to the point first mentioned.

V. NEWINGTON DISTRICT.

The boundary whereof is: From the point at which the Union Canal is intersected by the Municipal boundary at Meggetland, thence north-eastwards along the centre of the Union Canal to the Drawbridge at Leamington Road, thence southeastwards, north - eastwards, and eastwards, along the centre of Leamington Road and Gilmore Place to a point at the junction of Home Street with Gilmore Place and Tarvit Street, thence southwards, eastwards, south-eastwards, northwards, and eastwards, along the centre of Leven Street and Glengyle Terrace, the southern boundary of the Meadows, Hope Park Crescent, and the passage on the north side of Newington Parish Church to Clerk Street, thence northwards, north-eastwards, southwards, north-eastwards, southwards, eastwards, and north - eastwards, along the centre of Clerk Street, St Patrick Street, Nicolson Street, Drummond Street, Roxburgh Place, West Adam Street, East Adam Street, Pleasance, Salisbury Street, the stairs leading therefrom to Dumbiedykes Road, the centre of Dumbiedykes Road to the entrance gate therefrom to the Queen's Park, thence southwards, south-eastwards, eastwards, and south - eastwards, along the south-western boundary of the Queen's Park and the St Leonard's branch of the North British Railway to the point where the Municipal boundary intersects that railway near Duddingston, thence West south-westwards, north-westwards south-westwards, north-westwards, southwestwards, north-westwards, southwestwards, north-westwards, south-

westwards, northwards, and northwestwards along the Municipal boundary to the point first mentioned.

PAROCHIAL DIVISIONS OF THE CITY.

ANCIENT ROYALTY.

I. TOLBOOTH PARISH.

Castle-hill, both sides, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the Lawnmarket, down to and including the west side of Bank Street and the Bank of Scotland. Both sides of the new west approach as far west as the Castle Wynd.

II. HIGH CHURCH PARISH.

The east side of Bank Street, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of the North Bridge.

III. TRINITY COLLEGE PARISH.

The east side of the North Bridge, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of Leith Wynd, now Cranston Street.

IV. OLD CHURCH PARISH.

All buildings and closes on the south side of the High Street and Head of Canongate from South Gray's or Mint Close down to St John's Cross; thence along the boundary of the ancient royalty to the South Back of Canongate; thence westward by the foot of St Mary Street and the middle of the Cowgate to the foot of South Gray's or Mint Close. The eastside of said close.

V. TRON CHURCH PARISH.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street from the head of South Gray's or Mint Close to the west side of the Tron Church. The east side of Blair Street and the north side of the Cowgate from the foot of said street downwards to the foot of and including the west side of said close.

VI. NEW NORTH PARISM.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street and north side of the Cowgate, from and including the west side of Blair Street and Hunter Square, to and including the east side of George IV. Bridge.

VII. ST JOHN'S PARISH.

From the Castle Wynd, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket and the Cowgate, to the centre of George IV. Bridge; thence northward to the Lawnmarket; westward, along the middle of the Lawnmarket and the back of the new west approach, to the Castle Wynd; and southward, along the centre of said wynd.

VIII. WESTER OR NEW GREYFRIARS' PARISH.

That portion of the ancient royalty on the north side of the Grassmarket, and westward from the centre of the Castle Wynd. From the extremity of the city at the foot of the Vennel, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket, to the centre of the Candlemaker Row; thence southward along the said row and Bristo Place to the eastern point of Teviot Place; and from thence westward along the ancient boundary of the city, viz., Teviot Place and back of George Heriot's Hospital; then northward to the foot of the Vennel.

IX. EASTER OR OLD GREVFRIARS'

The lands of West Coates and part of East Dalry, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, will, when feued and built upon, fall to be added to St George's Parish.

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the east of a line drawn from the northern boundary of said Royalty through the centre of Pitt and Dundas Streets to a point in the centre of Queen Street opposite to Hanover Street, and on the north of a line from that point eastward through the centre of Queen Street, York Place, and Picardy Place, and Leith Walk, to

the boundary of said Royalty at a point in Leith Walk opposite to Union Street. The lands of Logie-green, Broughton Park, Blandfield, and Park of Powderhall, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, will, when feued and built upon, fall to be added to St Mary's Parish.

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the west of a line drawn from the northern boundary of said Royalty through the centre of Canonmills Road opposite to Branden, Pitt, and Dundas Streets, to a point in the centre of Queen Street opposite to Hanover Street, and on the north of a line from that point westward through the centre of Queen Street to the boundary of the Royalty at StColme St. The Deaf and Dumb Institution, New

Academy, and Feus of Heriot's Hospital as far east as Brandon Street, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, fall to be included in St Stephen's Par.

V. SECTION III.

EDUCATIONAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

HIGH SCHOOL OF EDINBURGH, REGENT ROAD.

The date of the foundation of the High School is unknown, but it appears to have existed as early as the beginning of the twelfth century. From that time to the Reformation, "the Grammar School of Edinburgh," as it was then called, was under the control of the Canons of Holyrood. In 1598 it was remodelled on a more comprehensive plan, and from the patronage vouchsafed to it by James VI., it received the name of Schola Regia Edimburgensis. The course of study has since, from time to time, been extended and improved, so as to meet the advancing demands of the age. Although at first exclusively a classical seminary, it now furnishes systematic instruction in all the departments of a Commercial as well as of a Liberal Education. The English Language and Literature, including Reading, Orthography, Recitation, Grammar, and Composition, together with the History of Great Britain, form prominent parts of the system; while the entire curriculum of study—which occupies six years—embraces the Latin, Greek, French, and German languages, History, Geography, and Physiology, with Writing, Arithmetic, Algebra and Geometry, Drawing, Fencing, Gymnastics and Military Drill. There is a Library containing nearly 7000 valumes selected by the Poster and Masters to which all taining nearly 7000 volumes selected by the Rector and Masters, to which all the pupils have access.

The High School originally stood in the Old Town, near the site of the old Infirmary. It was rebuilt on nearly the same spot in 1777. As this situation had become unsuitable, from the great extension of the city northwards, and as the accommodation had proved inadequate to the rapidly increasing number of pupils, the present splendid structure was founded in 1825, on the south slope of the Calton Hill, which was deemed more convenient for the inhabitants of the city. The edifice, which cost £30,000, and was designed by the late

Thomas Hamilton, architect, was completed in 1829.

The main building, 270 feet in length, has a magnificent hexastyle Doric portico in the centre, which is united to the wings by two corridors, the entablatures of which are supported by twelve columns, also of the Doric order. There is ample accommodation for conducting the various branches of study. The playground, a portion of which is roofed over, is spacious, extending to nearly two acres, and commands a picturesque view of the ancient city and surrounding country.

EDINBURGH ACADEMY, HENDERSON Row.

The Edinburgh Academy, which was established in 1824, and incorporated by royal charter from George IV., is under the superintendence of a Board of fifteen Directors, three of whom are elected annually from the body of shareholders. The education is conducted by a Rector, who exercises constant supervision over all the classes, besides instructing those under his immediate care; four Classical and English Masters; a Master of French and German; two Mathematical Masters; and Masters of Writing, Fencing, and Each class is taught in the classical department by the same master exclusively for the first four years. At the commencement of the fifth it comes under the tuition of the Rector, assisted by the same master, and continues under them during the sixth and seventh years. In the three junior classes all the boys in each class are instructed together in the various branches. But for the fourth and subsequent years of the course, the School is separated into two Divisions: one of these—"The Classical School"—is adapted for boys destined for the learned professions, or who desire a thorough classical training; the other—" The Modern School"—is intended for boys who are to enter upon the civil or military service, or upon mercantile pursuits. The complete course extends to seven years, and combines a thorough classical education with systematic instruction in English, French, and German, Writing, Ancient and Modern History, Geography, and the various branches of Mathematics. There are certain additional classes which are recognised as voluntary. The Academy is situated to the N.E. of the Royal Circus. It is a handsome building, after a design by Mr Burn, and cost upwards of £16,000.

FETTES COLLEGE, COMELY BANK.

Sir William Fettes, Bart., of Comely Bank, who was born in 1750, and died in 1836, left the residue of his estate for an endowment for the education, maintenance, and outfit of young persons whose parents have died without leaving sufficient funds for that purpose, or who, from innocent misfortune during their own lives, are unable to give suitable education to their children. For the purposes of the endowment, a building called "The Fettes College" has been erected on the grounds of Comely Bank, part of the trust property, according to plans by the late David Bryce, Esq., R.S.A., architect, and was opened in October 1870. The number of boys to be admitted on the foundation, and maintained and educated in the College at the expense of the endowment, is not at any one time to exceed fifty; but such a number of boys as the Trustees may from time to time determine will be received as day scholars, or boarders, from whom such fees will be exacted as shall be fixed by the Trustees. For the accommodation of non-foundationers, and in connexion with the College, there are three Boarding-Houses, one capable of receiving fifty-two boys, and the other two each capable of receiving thirty boys. The largest is under the superintendence of Mr Cotterill, and the other two under that of Mr Heard and Mr Forster. The system adopted is that of the English Public Schools, and the education given is in the full sense of the word liberal, and includes

English, Latin, Greek, Modern Languages, Mathematics, scientific and artistic instruction. There is a Classical and Modern side.

GEORGE HERIOT'S HOSPITAL, LAURISTON.

George Heriot was born at Edinburgh about the year 1563. He followed his father's trade of a goldsmith, and in 1597 was appointed goldsmith to Anne of Denmark, the queen of James VI. Shortly afterwards he was nominated jeweller and goldsmith to the king; and when the court was removed to London, in 1603, Heriot followed in its train. He died there February 12, 1624, having, by a will dated in the previous year, bequeathed the residue of his property, amounting to £23,625, to the erection of an hospital, "for the mainetenance, releife, bringing upp, and education of poore fatherlesse boyes, freemen's sonnes of the towne of Edinburgh.

The foundation stone was laid July 1, 1628, but owing to the civil war and other causes, the building was not opened till April 11, 1659. The expense of the erection exceeded £30,000 sterling.

The management is vested in the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the city, and in the Established Clergy of Edinburgh, -in all fifty-four in number.

Two hundred and sixteen boys are maintained in the Hospital—one hundred and twenty resident, and ninety-six non-resident. The age of admission is between seven and ten; in exceptional cases, non-residents may be admitted between ten and twelve. The boys leave at fourteen, unless they pass examination as "hopeful scholars." They are taught English, French, Latin, and Greek, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, geography, mathematics, drawing, shorthand, vocal music, and dancing. Those who manifest talents and a desire for the learned professions are sent to the University of Edinburgh, with an allowance for four sessions of £30 a year; and there are a number of apprentices who receive bursary allowances to forward them in their calling. Ten out-door bursaries of £20 a year are likewise bestowed on deserving students in the On leaving the Hospital, the boys are provided with clothes and College. suitable books; such of them as become apprentices for five years or upwards receive £50, divided into equal annual payments during the term of their apprenticeship, besides a sum of £5 at the end of their apprenticeship as a reward for good behaviour. Those who are apprenticed for a shorter term than five years, receive a correspondingly less allowance than £50. One of the teachers resides in the House, all the others are non-resident. The House Governor also resides in the House.

The revenue of the Hospital in 1882 amounted to £25,426, 4s. 11,72d.

THE HERIOT FOUNDATION SCHOOLS.

By Act of Parliament (6th and 7th William IV. cap. 25), the Governors of the Hospital were empowered to erect, from the surplus revenues, elementary schools within the city, for educating, free of all expense, 1st, The children, in poor circumstances, of deceased burgesses and freemen; 2nd, The children of burgesses and freemen who are unable to provide for their support; and, 3rd, The children of poor citizens and inhabitants of Edinburgh residing within the boundaries of the city. They were also empowered "to allow to any of the boys, in the course of their education at such schools, being sons of burgesses and freemen, such uniform fixed sum of money in lieu and place of maintenance, and such uniform fixed sum for apprentice fee, after their education at the said schools is completed, as shall be determined." There are now sixteen Heriot Schools, namely, eleven juvenile and five infant schools, attended by about 5000 boys and girls. There are also seven schools open for gratuitous evening instruction in Reading, Writing, Book-keeping, Arithmetic, Mathematics, English Grammar and Composition, French, German, Drawing, and Shorthand. These classes are attended by about 1000 young men and young women.

THE EDINBURGH MERCHANT COMPANY SCHOOLS.

1. THE EDINBURGH EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION

(LADIES' COLLEGE), 70, 72, and 73 QUEEN STREET.

This Institution was founded in 1695 by the Company of Merchants, and Mary Erskine, widow of James Hair, druggist in Edinburgh, as an hospital for girls, and was known as the Merchant Maiden Hospital. The Governors were incorporated by an Act of Parliament in 1707. The original edifice was situated in Bristo Street; but having become insufficient for its purpose, the foundation stone of another building waslaid in Lauriston in 1816; and the erection, which was designed by Mr Burn, was completed in 1818, at the cost of £12,250. Up to 1870 this building continued to be used as an hospital for the board and education of the foundationers, but in that year it was converted, under a provisional order, into a day-school, and opened as such in September 1870. It having been sold to the governors of George Watson's Hospital, the governors of this institution purchased extensive buildings in Queen Street for the purposes of the institution, and they were opened in October 1871. The institution provides a highclass education, the course of study embracing English, French, German, Latin, lectures on literature and science, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, pianoforte, drill, calisthenics, dancing, needlework, and cookery. The governors had the right of presenting thirty-four foundationers to the hospital, but the provisional order directs that this number be reduced to twenty, and that at least one-fourth of these -as well as of presentations belonging to private parties-shall be elected by competitive examination from girls attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Girls attending the institution may obtain, by competition, the following benefits, viz., 1. A presentation to the foundation, tenable for six years; 2. And a bursary on leaving the institution of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100. Besides the above benefits, a large number of school bursaries is awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are, under the supervision of the governors, boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted to the foundation, the girls must be of the age of nine and under that of sixteen years. A number of the presentations was formerly limited to the daughters or grand-daughters of such as were of the order or calling of merchant burgesses of Edinburgh, or ministers thereof, or suburbs of the same, or had been benefactors to the hospital or governors of the same; but the provisional order removes this limitation, and declares that the patrons shall be at full liberty to present such girls as they consider most suitable. On leaving, the foundationers by favour receive

2. GEORGE WATSON'S COLLEGE-SCHOOLS.

(1.) COLLEGE FOR BOYS .- LAURISTON.

George Watson, born at Edinburgh about 1650, served an apprenticeship to a merchant in the city, and, after a short residence in Holland, entered into the service of Sir James Dick, a wealthy trader in Edinburgh. This employment he relinquished in 1695, on being appointed accountant to the Bank of Scotland. He died in April 1723, and by his will bequeathed £12,000 to endow an hospital for the maintenance and instruction of the male children and grandchildren of decayed merchants in Edinburgh; and by the statutes of his trustees a preference was given to the sons and grandsons of members of the Edinburgh Merchant Company. An hospital for the board and education of the foundationers was founded in the year 1738, and opened in June 1741, and it continued to be used for this purpose until 1870, when the governors of the four hospitals connected with the Merchant Company, taking advantage of the powers given by the Endowed Institutions (Scotland) Act, applied for and obtained provisional orders empowering them to convert the hospitals into dayschools, and they were opened as such in September 1870. This building was, however, sold to the corporation of the Royal Infirmary in 1871, and the building formerly called the Merchant Maiden Hospital was acquired for and is now being occupied as George Watson's College for Boys. Another house adjoining has since been purchased for the extension of the Schools. The design of the schools is to provide boys with a liberal education, qualifying them for commercial or professional life, the civil service, the universities, etc. The course of study includes English, Latin, Greek, French, German, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, shorthand writing, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, natural and physical science, chemistry, drill, gymnastics, and fencing. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to sixty, and that at least one-fourth of these shall be elected by competitive examination from boys attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Boys attending the College may obtain, by competition, the following benefits—viz., 1. A presentation to one of the foundations of this College, tenable for six years; 2. A bursary on leaving the schools of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100; and 3. A scholarship, after attending two sessions at Edinburgh University, of £100 per annum, tenable for two years. Besides the above benefits, a large number of school bursaries is awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are, under the supervision of the governors, boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted as foundationers, they must be of the age of nine and under that of fourteen years. On leaving, each foundationer by favour is allowed £7 for clothes; he may receive for five years of an apprenticeship £10 annually; and on attaining the age of twenty-five, a further

sum of £50 to enable him to commence business in Edinburgh.

(2.) COLLEGE FOR LADIES .- GEORGE SQUARE.

The governors have also, in virtue of power given them in the provisional order, established a school for girls called George Watson's College for Ladies. The school buildings were in 1876 largely added to and improved by the Governors, so as to make them more commodious, and in every respect suitable as a Young Ladies' Institution. The course of study is the same as that of the Edinburgh Educational Institution Ladies' College (see before), and girls attending the school may obtain by competition the same benefits as those attending that institution.

3. DANIEL STEWART'S COLLEGE (FOR BOYS), DEAN.

Daniel Stewart of the Exchequer, who died in 1814, left the residue of his property, amounting (after the erection and endowment of a free school in his native parish of Logierait) to upwards of £13,000, to accumulate for the purpose of building and endowing an hospital for the maintenance and education of boys, the children of honest and industrious parents, whose circumstances in life do not enable them suitably to support and educate their children at other schools. Taking advantage of the powers given by a provisional order obtained in 1870, the hospital was opened as a day-school in September of that year. This institution provides boys with a superior education, and the course of study is similar to that in George Watson's College for Boys. Instruction is also given in Technical Education. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to forty, and that at least one half of them shall be elected from the day scholars of this institution, George Watson's College, and James Gillespie's Schools. Boys attending the institution have valuable benefits open for their competition.

The boys, on admission to the foundation, must be of the age of nine and under that of fourteen years.

4. JAMES GILLESPIE'S SCHOOLS (FOR BOYS AND GIRLS), BRUNTSFIELD LINKS.

This institution was founded by James Gillespie of Spylaw, merchant and tobacconist in Edinburgh, who, by his will dated in the year 1796, destined the greater part of his property to the endowment of a charitable school, and of an hospital for the aliment and maintenance of old men and women. The edifice, which was designed by Mr Burn, was founded in 1801, and opened in 1802. The free school was founded in 1801, and opened in 1803. Up to 1870 the hospital continued to be occupied by old persons, of whom about 40 were maintained in it. In that year the governors obtained a provisional order empowering them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and it was opened as such in September 1870. These schools are established as primary schools, and the course of instruction includes English in all the branches, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, geometry, elementary French and Latin, physical geography, freehand and mechanical drawing, vocal music and drill. The girls are also taught sewing, knitting, cutting-out, the sewing-machine, and domestic economy. Boys and girls attending these schools may obtain by competition the same benefits as pupils of the other Merchant Company Schools.

Those entitled to the benefits of the hospital as aged foundationers are persons not under 55 years of age, first, of the name of Gillespie, whatever part of Scotland they may come from; and, second, persons belonging to Edinburgh and its suburbs; failing these, persons from Leith, Newhaven, and other parts of Mid-Lothian; whom failing, persons from any part of Scotland. By the provisional order, the governors have power, instead of maintaining the foundationers in the then present or any other building, to allow them a pension of not less than £10 and not exceeding £25 a year.

THE MAIDEN HOSPITAL, MEADOWS,

FOUNDED BY THE CRAFTSMEN OF EDINBURGH AND MARY ERSKINE.

This Institution was founded in 1704, by the Freemen of the Incorporated Trades, aided by Mary Erskine, widow of Jas. Hair, druggist. The Governors

were incorporated by statute in 1707.

The management is in the Deacons of the thirteen Incorporations, two Trades-Councillors, two persons of the name of Erskine, the Preses of the Society of Barbers, and nine persons elected by the other Governors,—in all, twenty-seven. Forty-nine girls are maintained in the Institution. Those eligible for admission under presentations held by the Trades Incorporations or the Society of Barbers of the city of Edinburgh are the daughters, granddaughters, or great-granddaughters of freemen craftsmen, whom failing, any girl qualified by age and otherwise presented by the Incorporation or Society, and in the case of private presentations, any girl qualified by age and otherwise presented by the holder of the presentation. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of seven and under that of eleven years: they are not retained above the age of seventeen. They are instructed in the English language and grammar, in French and music, in writing, arithmetic, geography, history, sewing, and laundry work. On leaving, each girl receives £10 and a Bible.

THE ORPHAN HOSPITAL, DEAN.

This Institution was projected in 1727 by Andrew Gairdner, merchant in Edinburgh; and in 1733 a house was hired, and thirty children received into it. In 1735 an edifice was erected near the Trinity College Church; but by the increase of the city this situation being rendered unhealthy, the present building was erected in 1833, from the designs of the late Mr Thomas Hamilton. The revenue is derived from voluntary contributions and legacies, in addition to the interest on accumulated donations since its foundation.

About 120 boys and girls, including presentees and boarders, are maintained in the Institution, the benefits of which are not confined to any district of Scotland. When admitted they must be of the age of seven, and not above ten years: they receive the benefit of a thoroughly good education suitable to their station in life, a godly upbringing, and a comfortable home. Boarders from any part of Scotland are now received into the Hospital at £16 per annum for boys, and £14 for girls, which include all expenses of whatever kind.

JOHN WATSON'S INSTITUTION, DEAN.

In the year 1759, John Watson, writer to the signet, bequeathed the residue of his estate to certain Trustees, by them to be applied "to such pious and charitable uses within the City of Edinburgh as they shall think proper." In the year 1822 an Act of Parliament was obtained, empowering the Trustees to establish and endow "an hospital for the maintenance and education therein of destitute children, and bringing them up to be useful members of society; and also for assisting in their outset in life such of them as may be thought to deserve and require such aid."

The edifice, which was designed by Mr William Burn, was founded in 1825, and completed in 1828. About 100 children are maintained in it, who must be fatherless, and of the better classes, such as clergymen, officers in the army and navy, legal or medical practitioners, and such like; when admitted, they must have completed the seventh year of their age, and be under the age of nine. They are not retained after the age of fourteen. They are instructed in English, Latin, French, mathematics, drawing, vocal and instrumental music, dancing, drill, etc.

The establishment is under the management of fifteen directors,—the Keeper and Deputy-keeper of the Signet, the Treasurer of the Institution, and twelve Commissioners of the Writers to the Signet. The fund, which in 1781 amounted to less than £5000, has been largely increased by the care and attention of the Trustees.

CAUVIN'S HOSPITAL, DUDDINGSTON.

This Institution was founded by Louis Cauvin, Teacher of French in Edinburgh, and afterwards farmer at Duddingston, who died in 1825, bequeathing his property for the erection and endowment of "an Hospital for the relief, maintenance, and education of the sons of respectable but poor teachers; the sons of poor but honest farmers; whom failing, the sons of respectable master-printers or booksellers, and the sons of respectable servants in the agricultural line." This settlement was explained and modified, and the Governors incorporated, by a parliamentary statute in 1827.

The management is in the survivor of certain individuals nominated by the founder, and others assumed by them, and in the following ex officio trustees, viz., the Lord Provost of the City, the Principal of the University, the Rector

of the High School, the Ministers of Duddingston, Liberton, and Newton, the Proprietor of the estate of Niddrie, and the Factor of the Duke of Abercorn.

The Institution, which is situated at Duddingston, was opened in 1833, and the number of boys at present maintained there is eighteen. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of seven, and not more than nine years; and are retained for six years. They are taught the ordinary branches of education, and Latin, Greek, French, German, and Mathematics.

DONALDSON'S HOSPITAL, COLTBRIDGE.

This Hospital was founded by James Donaldson of Broughton Hall, printer, who died at Edinburgh in October 1830, bequeathing the greater part of his property, amounting to about £200,000, to trustees, for the endowment and erection of an hospital for the maintenance of poor boys and girls, after the plan of the Orphan Hospital in Edinburgh and John Watson's Institution.

The building can accommodate 150 boys and 150 girls: it contains at present 216 children (114 boys and 102 girls), of whom 119 (56 boys and 63 girls) are deaf and dumb. Those eligible for admission are declared to be, "1st, Poor children of the name of Donaldson or Marshall, if appearing to the Governors to be deserving; 2nd, Such poor children as shall appear to be in the most destitute circumstances and the most deserving of admission." None are received whose parents are able to maintain them. The children are clothed and maintained in the Hospital, and taught such useful branches of a plain English education as will fit the boys for trades and the girls for domestic service. The age of admission is from seven till nine, and that of leaving the Hospital fourteen

years.

The building, which occupies a commanding position at the west end of the city, is a large and beautiful quadrangular structure, in the Elizabethan style, from a design by the late W. H. Playfair.

BENEVOLENT AND CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

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By interlocutor of the First Division of the Court of Session, of 3rd February 1880, a new scheme was authorized for the distribution of this charity. The number of pensioners, of whom one-eighth are incurables, on the higher scale of pension of £25, has been fixed at 60, of whom 22 are appointed by private patrons, and on the lower scale of pension of £15 at 100. Applicants for the benefit of this fund require to have resided in Edinburgh for two years at some time, and supported themselves by their own industry during that period, without aid from any charity, or be widows or children of burgesses, and must be in decayed circumstances at the date of their application, and not under 50 years of age, except

where they are prevented from working by incurable disease, in which ass there is no limit in point of age.

ALEXANDER FUND.

Formerly this fund was administered by the Governors of the Trially Hospital, in conjunction with the Trinity Hospital Fund proper; but by interlocutor of the Lords of Council and Session, of 3rd February 1889, the management has been vested in a body of Trustees, and a scheme adopted by the Court for its future administration. Under this scheme the income is to be divided amongst twelve beneficiaries, eight men and but women, with a maximum pension of £27, 15s. 6d. In the event of the free income of the fund being more than sufficient to provide for these the Trustees have power to appoint additional pensioners, and they have cretionary powers as to the amount of such pensions. Applicants for the fund must be unmarried when elected, and not under 50 years of age, encepting any additional beneficiaries whom the Trustees may appoint, in the selection of whom there shall be no restriction of sex or marriage. The beneficiaries shall be indigent persons of good reputation who have not fallen into decay through their own vice and prodigality, and who are we in receipt of parochial relief. First, those of the kindred of Mr Alexander of Knockhill, who died in 1696, either upon his father's or his mother's side; Secondly, Those of the surname of Alexander, who shall apply within three score days next after any vacancy shall be publicly announced; and Thirdly, Other persons qualified as aforesaid as the Patrons shall think fit All persons bearing the name of Alexander, whether as their parents' name or their husbands' name, shall be deemed to fall within the favouring clause of the bequest. Applicants not claiming on the footing of being entitled to a preference must have resided in Edinburgh for two years, and for that period must have supported themselves by their own industry. or at least without aid from any charity.

JOHN WATT'S HOSPITAL.

The late Mr John Watt, merchant in Leith, by his trust-disposition and settlement, dated in 1827, bequeathed the residue of his means and estate to trustees, with directions to expend such part thereof as they might consider proper in the erection of an hospital in Leith, to be called "John Watt's Hospital," for the reception and maintenance of men and women in destitute circumstances of 55 years of age and upwards, in the following order of priority: 1st, Persons of the name of Watt; 2d, Natives of the parish of South Leith of whatever name; 3d, Persons of whatever name who have constantly resided in the parish of South Leith, at least ten years preceding their admission; and 4th, Natives of, or persons who have constantly resided in, the city of Edinburgh or county of Mid-Lothian; provided such persons are not pensioners or in receipt of an allowance from any charitable institution except the Parochial Board of South Leith. The trustees acquired what was formerly the Golf House and Ground at the south-west corner of Leith Links, and built an Hospital, which was opened in the beginning of 1862.

MEMORANDUM.

Penalties for acting as a Solicitor, etc., or as a Conveyancer, without having an Attorney Certificate.

By 33 and 34 Vict. cap. 97, § 59, it is enacted that every person who, in any part of the United Kingdom, directly or indirectly, acts or practises in any Court as a solicitor, etc., or as a notary public, without having in force at the time a duly stamped certificate, or who, on applying for such certificate, dees not truly specify the facts and circumstances upon which the amount of duty chargeable upon his certificate depends, shall forfeit the sum of £50, and shall be incapable of maintaining any action or suit for the recovery of any fee, reward, or disbursement on account of any act done or taken by him in any such capacity.

By section 60 of the same Act, it is enacted that every person who (not being a serjeant-at-law, barrister, or a duly certificated solicitor, etc.), either directly or indirectly, for or in expectation of any fee, gain, or reward, draws or prepares any instrument relating to real or personal estate, or any proceedings in law or equity, shall forfeit the sum of £50. The term "instrument" in this section does not include wills or other testamentary instruments, agreements under hand only, letters or powers of attorney, and transfers of stock containing no trust or limitation thereof.

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

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
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
