PRELIMINARY OBSERVATIONS ON THE KALENDAR.

Though the Astronomical portion of Oliver & Boyd's New Edinburgh Almanac is specially designed for popular use, it may, in the absence of the Nautical

Almanac, be found serviceable to the Astronomer and the Navigator.

All the computations are adapted to Greenwich mean time. If we subtract 13 m.* from the time in the tables, the remainder is Edinburgh mean time. Mean Time is that which is shown by a well-regulated clock; Apparent Time, that indicated by a sundial. The column called Equation of Time shows the difference between mean and apparent time: when it is headed "Clock before Sun," the mean is earlier than the apparent noon; and to obtain apparent time, the equation must be subtracted from the mean time: when the column is headed "Clock after Sun," the mean is later than the apparent noon, and to obtain apparent time, the equation must be added to the mean time. To reduce apparent into mean time, add the equation when the clock is before the sun; subtract it when the clock is after the sun.

The rising and setting of the centre of the sun are calculated for the latitude of Edinburgh, at the level of the sea, allowance being made for parallax and refraction. The declination, parallax, semi-diameter, right ascension, and logarithmic distance of the sun, the equation of time, and the places of the principal planets, are computed for the instant of mean noon. The semi-diurnal arcs of the planets are used in ascertaining the times of their rising and setting: thus, to find the approximate time of rising, subtract the arcs from the times of southing; and to find that of setting, add the arcs to the times of southing.

The time of high water at Leith is computed from manuscript tables deduced from recent observations on the Tides in the Firth of Forth, and the depth from Formulæ investigated in the second and fifth volumes of the Mécanique Céleste of La Place. The depths are computed for the Old Dock at Leith; the depths for the Victoria Dock will be obtained by adding 6 feet 4 inches to them; and for the Albert Dock by adding 8 feet. The times, though calculated for Leith, will be found sufficiently correct for the other ports on the Firth of Forth, as well as for Berwick, Dundee, Holy Island, and London Bridge, as the winds frequently cause a wider difference than that which exists between the times at those places and Leith; but when greater accuracy is required, recourse should be had to the table at page 25.

The time of high water at Granton may be assumed the same as at Leith; the depth of high water at the Victoria Jetty will be obtained by adding six feet six inches to the depths calculated for Leith; at the two upper jetties by adding eight feet; and at the end of the pier by adding ten feet three inches.

The rising and setting of the moon, corrected for parallax and refraction, are computed for Edinburgh, at the level of the sea; and her Semi-diameter, Horizontal Parallax, Right Ascension, and Declination, which are given for each day at noon, afford the means of making many useful and interesting Nautical and Astronomical calculations.

All the results have been carefully checked by means of differences and by frequent independent calculations, so that it is hoped no error of importance

will be found.

Note.—When the time is between noon and midnight, it is indicated by the letter a. or A.; and when between midnight and the following noon, by the letter m. or M.

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FARMER'S AND GRAZIER'S KALENDAR.

January.—In fresh weather, where the soil is moderately dry, the plough may be kept in motion.—To make the feeding of cattle remunerative, it is necessary that the most unremitting attention be paid to the animals. Whether they are fed in courts, byres, or boxes, they ought to be kept warm and comfortably littered, whilst their food, of whatever description, ought to be regularly supplied at stated hours. Crushed grains, and artificial food given in addition to stored roots, will be found a profitable mode of feeding, and chopped straw may also be given as a healthy and economical addition to their diet. Cows require succulent roots or food prepared by steam or hot water, to yield milk copiously. Shelter new dropt lambs, and give their dams roots, hay, and bruised grain, or oil-cake.

February.—Frost being a powerful agent in obtaining mould for covering seeds, plough grass and other lands intended to produce a crop. Whether turnip be folded or carried from the field, plough the land as the crop is removed, and wheat-sowing may follow. Beans and oats may be sown; but it is only rich dry soils which can be seeded so early with prospect of success. In mild weather thorn hedges may be dressed, and new ones planted. Lay up stores of seed-corn, put implements into working trim, and execute many little jobs, that no interruption may be experienced in sowing-time.—Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,—the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Keep calves warm, clean, and dry; give hay and sliced roots in addition to liquid food to such as are rearing.

March.—Finish wheat-sowing about the middle of the month. Sow beans, oats, and barley as soon as the weather and soil admit,—reserving cold wet lands till the season advances. The seeds of clover and ryegrass should now be sown amongst autumnal-sown wheats, and the surface lightly harrowed or rolled to ensure the seed germinating. Particular fields intended for barley or potatoes may receive a second ploughing. Prepare composts and manures for turnip. Should the weather be favourable, potatoes may be planted after the middle of this month. This is the best time for planting hedges.—In altering the diet of fatting animals, always let the change be to one more nutritious. Fatting cattle may be allowed bruised grain or oil cake. If there be a scarcity of turnip for cattle intended for grass, give a small allowance of bruised grain, cake, or hay.

April.—No favourable opportunity should now be lost to sow grain crops. Store the residue of the turnip crop, to preserve the bulbs and prevent the exhaustion of soil. Drain lands intended for green crop where previously neglected. Continue the planting of potatoes in favourable situations. Finish planting thorn hedges.—On store farms, this is the chief lambing season, and the shepherd's utmost attention is necessary. Cease folding turnip, and either feed sheep on stored roots, or restrict them to grass. Should the pastures be late, give sheep grains or prepared cakes. Fatting lamb-hogs require good pasture, being unable to eat turnip freely, from shedding teeth. When there is a scarcity of keep at the homestead, lean cattle may be allowed to roam over permanent pastures. Seedling grasses will seldom admit of being depastured with cattle.

May.—Conclude the sowing of grain crops; and, with the advance of the season, use early varieties. From necessity, barley and pease may be sown up to the end of the month; but full crops cannot be counted upon from such late sowing. Prepare soils for turnip, and use every means to produce a fine tilth. Swedish turnips may be sown from the middle of this month to the end of it. Finish potato-planting. Give a second ploughing to summer fallow, and never allow vegetation to make progress at this season on its surface.—Fatting cattle may be continued on well-kept Swedish turnip and potatoes. When there is a sufficiency of grass, and the soil becomes dry, stock pastures with all descriptions of cattle. In cold and wet evenings, shelter milch cows and fat cattle in courts. Wean early calves, and turn late ones out to pasture.

Junc.—This is the month for sowing turnips. Where Swedes could not be sown during May, they may still be planted during the first days of June. All other varieties may be sown in course of the month. Drilled crops require attention. Weeds are most easily destroyed when young; and, as a general rule, use hand and horse hoes as soon as the crops admit of the operations. Earth up early-planted potatoes. Haymaking commences in early situations. Mow grasses

before the plants seed; remove the crop quickly from the ground, and soon afterwards carry it to the stack. - Sheep-shearing becomes general. Fleeces are proportionate to the treatment of animals; and every progression or falling off in condition may be traced in the quantity and quality of wool. Cattle may be best soiled this month, and this mode of feeding has many advantages.

July.—Conclude haymaking from artificial grasses. Single out turnip, leaving on rich soils spaces of from ten to twelve inches between each plant, and let hand and horse hoes be in constant requisition, with a view to improving the crops and benefiting succeeding ones. Work fallows thoroughly with plough, harrow, and roller, carefully removing root-weeds by the hand. Execute draining, and apply lime and lime-composts when such operations are necessary. Hand-weed grain crops.—In warm weather fatting cattle and milch cows are the better of sheds, to shelter them from the sun. Throughout summer examine flocks daily, to preserve them from the attack of flies, and use the common remedies for the prevention and destruction of maggots.

August.—Conclude hand and horse hoeing turnip. Apply manure to the fallows, and immediately plough it into the soil, putting the ridges into proper form, and clearing out water-courses, to guard against wet weather. In mountain districts haymaking from natural grasses engages the attention of storefarmers. In low situations corn-harvest will occupy all hands.— -Lambs not separated from their dams last month must be weaned and put on the best pastures. On lowly situated arable farms get in ewes for early lambing. In high districts select and prepare the stock to be sent to market in the course of autumn. Prepare ropes, thatch, and every description of store necessary for

the harvest, and see that the requisite implements are in proper order.

September .- This may be considered the harvest month. Engage plenty of assisting hands for this important season. Guard against shaking winds by reaping before the juices have left the straw; and to avoid sprouting, keep cut crops always standing in an upright position. When the crop is fit for stacking, carry it by day and by night, and cover the stacks as soon as they are built. Handweed turnip where necessary. Finish fallows; and such as are wet and coldly situated may be sown with wheat. - On arable farms, weaned lambs and ewes for early lambing may be allowed to depasture stubbles and seedling grass. The breeders, rearers, and feeders of stock will meet at the different markets, and make arrangements for their customary changes of animals.

October .- Harvest being finished, this month may be considered the first in the agricultural year, as on the carrying of one crop, preparations for the next should be begun. The plough should now be set in motion. Commence wheatsowing in later situations, and defer only such fields as are very dry, and situated in an early climate. Use the preventatives for smut immediately before scattering the seed, and never sow unless there be moisture in the soil to effect germination. Gather potatoes, and carefully secure them from frost. - Unless there is abundance of grass, sheep should get turnip on the pastures. In the beginning of the month remove fatting cattle to the courts, and shelter milch cows during

night. Keep weakly calves warm, and allow them nourishing food.

November .- Conclude potato harvest. Finish wheat-sowing, although this rrain may be sown any time on rich dry soils up to the middle of March. At this season, sow wheat from day to day as the soil is turned over. Begin to store turnips for winter use; and wheat may be sown where the crop is removed. Form lime-composts for applying in spring and summer. This is the best time for draining soils intended for green crop and fallow. Dress hedges and ditches. Sheep intended to be fatted should be folded on turnip, and allowed dry fodder. Lamb-hogs will thrive best with an allowance of turnip on pastures. To all flocks apply the salves and lotions in common use. Cattle of all descriptions should receive fodder and shelter during night, and such as are fatting be carefully attended to in the courts or boxes.

December. - Continue to plough stubbles. Store turnip in mild weather. Regulate thrashing, so that there may be straw to last through the season. In mild weather dress ditches and repair fences, drain, and add by every means to the stores of compost and manure. During frosty weather bring forward materials for drains and composts, and remove heavy commodities which require a firm surface for transport .- Cattle of every description should now be in winter quarters, and receive winter fare. Separate the weak from the strong. Have a constant supply of water to store cattle, and apportion their litter and food to last till the arrival of the grass season. Give fatting cattle as much as they can eat, commencing with globe turnip, and proceeding with food of increasing richness.

GARDENER'S KALENDAR.

January.—When the frost is not severe, trench, manure, and turn up in ridges all vacant ground, and prepare hotbeds. In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposures, for a succession, a few early-frame pease, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw; and, in hotbeds, sow cauliflowers, melons, cucumbers, small salading, early cabbages, and kidney-beans. Plant, prune, and train standard and wall fruit-trees, gooseberry, raspberry, and currant bushes. Edge beds, form new flower-gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, ranunculuses, &c. Pot choice dahlias, placing them in a stove or hotbed. Air and keep dry carnations and

stage auriculas. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, irises, &c.

February.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and, when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight pease, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes, as directed in the kalendar for the preceding month. Start and cut early kidney-potatoes for seed, and put them into the stove or hotbed in order to planting out. Clean shrubberies, roll walks and lawns, and plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses. Put cuttings into rich light soil in well-sheltered borders, and plant stocks of the common wild rose for standards on which to bud the Chinese and other fine varieties. Protect all tender plants from the effects of frost, and air greenhouse and stage auriculas and polyanthus frames. Top-dress all fine auriculas and polyanthuses in pots or boxes. Strike dahlias from roots in hotbeds, and sow balsams, cockscombs, tricolors, amaranths, sensitive and ice plants, as well as other tender annuals. Plant carnation-layers, ranunculuses, anemones, and bulbous roots, and divide the roots of herbaceous plants.

March.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, beets, brocoli, spinach, onions, Dutch turnips, carrots, pease and beans, savoys, parsnips, and turnip-rooted radishes. Plant red cabbage, sea-kale, kidney-beans, and cauliflowers from frames; and sow cucumbers and melons in hotbeds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. Strike verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet geraniums, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c. Plant gladioluses. This is the best time to graft fruit-trees, and the China, perpetual, moss, and noisette roses, on the common brier or blush China rose, and to propagate them by layers. Pot dahlias that have pushed, and also cuttings from the offsets, placing them in a moderate heat. Protect tender plants and blossoms, and sow polyanthus, auricula, and almost every kind of perennial, biennial, and annual seeds.

April.—Sow whatever was omitted last month, and plant out such of the pot-herbs as are ready for that purpose. Continue to sow brocoli, asparagus, nasturtiums, seakale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and savoys, and plant out rhubarb, artichokes, sea-kale, German greens, and small salading. Earth up pease, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit-trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cuttings jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c., and all the woody kitchen shrubs. Sow dahlias, carnations, pinks, hollyhocks, Cape, Brompton, and German stocks, China asters, and all kinds of hardy annuals. Pot the flowers struck last month. Destroy the green-fly on-roses, and preserve the bloom of stage auriculas from sun and rain. Top-dress all flowers in pots by removing withered leaves, and put in fresh earth. Hoe and rake gravel-walks, cut box-edgings, and mow grass plots.

May.—Sow capsicums, cauliflowers, carrots, lettuces, spinach, pease, cucumbers, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney and French beans. Transplant cabbages, winter-greens, lettuces, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake pease, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant out the flowers potted last month, if there be no appearance of frost; and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots; wallflowers, sweetwilliams, lychnis, and rockets, by slips; and China roses, mimuluses, &c., by cuttings. Put out into the open border pelargoniums, with other greenhouse plants; also Neapolitan violets, and such other hardy annuals as were sown last month. Sow biennials and perennials, if formerly omitted.

June.—Continue sowing the vegetables directed last month, and also turnips for autumn use. Plant out brocoli, cabbages, savoys, celery, cauliflowers in shady borders, leeks, lettuces, cucumbers for pickling, and kidney-beans. Watering is requisite in dry weather both evening and morning; and also the hoeing of potatoes, cabbages, and pease. Thin out onions, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen-herbs. Shade and air melon-plants, and strike by cuttings double-wallflowers, rockets, scarlet lychnis, and stocks. Transplant annuals, biennials, and perennials, and seedling pinks into a bed. Lift all hyacinths, tulips, and other bulbs that have ceased flowering. Cut off the foliage an inch above the stem, and before putting by lay them in sand a fortnight. Re-pot auriculas, polyanthuses, &c. Mow and roll grass walks and plots once a-fortnight during this and the other summer months.

July.—In this month prepare all unoccupied plots of ground for autumn and winter crops. Continue to sow turnips, lettuces, and radishes. Plant out brocoli, cauliflower, savoys, leeks, and winter cabbages, and earth up celery. Lift full-grown winter onions, and prepare mushroom spawn. In fine weather, gather medicinal flowers and sweet herbs when in bloom, dressing them in the shade for winter use. Divest wall-trees, espaliers, and standards, of all superfluous shoots. Continue to water in dry weather, and gather all kinds of seeds as they advance to maturity. Propagate evergreens, roses, and other shrubs, by laying the young wood. Inoculate flowering and other shrubs, bud roses in cloudy weather, and divide the roots of double primroses, polyanthuses, and auriculas. Lay or pipe carnations and pinks, take up anemones and ranunculuses, and put in cuttings of pansies, calceolarias, dahlias, geraniums, &c.

August.—Sow onions, early cabbages, savoys, German greens, and parsicy, for the succeeding year: and lettaces, spinach, and cauliflowers, to stand the winter. Earth celery; hoe and thin turnips; transplant brocoli, savoys, and cauliflowers, and the principal crop of celery into trenches for blanching. Cut those herbs which are adapted for distillation or for winter use. Make mushroom-beds, propagate kitchen herbs by slips, and take up all onions, garlic, and shalots that are withered in the stem. Continue to bud on fruit-trees, roses, and bushes, so long as the bark rises freely and the weather is cloudy. To obtain new varieties, sow auricula, polyanthus, and anemone seeds, and mignonette to blow in winter; as also the seeds of tulips, hyacinths, irises, and all the other bulbous-rooted flowers. Support and thin dahlias to improve their bloom. Shift tender exotics and hardy green-house plants into fresh pots. Keep the ground clear of weeds; and continue to water plentifully.

September.—Sow vegetable seeds for a spring-crop, and plant savoys, German greens, lettuces, celery, and perennial aromatic and pot herbs. Hoe winter-spinach and turnips, earth up celery and cardoons, weed cauliflowers and young onions, prick out cabbage-plants, gather ripe seeds, and make mushroom-beds. Plant cuttings of gooseberries, currants, raspberries, and also strawberries, taking out old stools when necessary. Make cuttings of verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet geraniums, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c., and keep them in boxes during the winter. Continue to divide and transplant biennial and perennial flower-roots; lay almost every kind of shrubs; and put in cuttings of evergreens, China roses, and flowering shrubs. Crocuses, snowdrops, Persian irises, dog's-tooth violets, fritillarias, crown imperials, narciasuses, and most of the other bulbous roots, may now be planted. All the rooted pinks and carnations may be planted out. Sow hardy annuals to stand the winter, and trench up ground in which to plant tulips and hyacinths during October or November.

October.—Plant horse-radishes, lettuces, early cabbages, and other greens neglected last month, in sheltered situations; also cauliflowers, mint, and tarragon in frames, for winter use. Earth up savoys and cabbages as high as the leaves. Take up carrots and parsnips, cut off their tops, and bury them in dry sand. Crop the tops of parsley, to make fresh leaves for winter. Plant all deciduous trees and shrubs. Commence planing, taking the vertical branches in fruit-trees, and cutting obliquely to prevent rain from lodging; also roses, honeysuckle, and other flowering shrubs. Protect dahlias, young carnations, and layers, from sudden frost; and, about the end of the month, begin to plant hyacinths, tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. In favourable weather, transplant hardy fibrous-rooted plants, intermixing them in the borders, to keep up a succession in the flowering season.

Norember.—Although hazardous, early pease and beans may be sown in a warm border; if neglected, most vegetables recommended in the last two months may still be planted, earthed up, &c., taking care to protect them from frost. Force sea-kale, rhubarb, and asparagus. Prune and plant fruit-trees and bushes; and finish flowering shrubs and trees. Transplant seedling stocks, and suckers taken from the roots of the pear, codling, plum, and quince trees, to prepare them for budding or grafting different fruits upon; also stocks of the tree-rose, for budding upon them the garden and Chinese varieties. Shelter choice flowers. To make the colours of the tulip distinct, the compost ought to be changed every alternate year; an operation which should be performed this month. Tulip-soil should be one-third of fresh, light, turfy loam; one-third of fine sand; and one-third of sandy peat, or leaf-mould. Take up dahlia roots whenever the bloom is nipped by frost, and keep them in sand free from damp.

December.—Prepare for future operations, by digging, manuring, or trenching vacant ground, and collecting dung, leaves, and turf, to make compost. In mild weather, a few early pease and radishes may be sown in a warm border, and small talads and cucumbers in hotbeds. Cover with fern, straw, litter, or mats, all such plants as are likely to be injured by frost, either in the open ground or in frames, admitting free supplies of air when the weather is favourable. Plant and prune all kinds of trees and bushes, taking care to stake the trees that are newly planted. In pruning roses, remove the old wood, curtail the young straggling branches, adding good store of decayed manure. Fine auriculas, polyanthuses, and carnations must now be treated with great care.

Information in Commerce, Agriculture, Law, Chronology, and Statistics.

SECTION I.—USEFUL TABLES.

MONETARY SYSTEM OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The integer of account is the pound, divided from a remote period into 20 shillings, each of 12 pence; and the circulating medium consists of coins of gold, silver, and bronze, and of bank notes convertible into gold, which is the metallic basis of the monetary system; the silver and bronze coins being available only for small money or change.

COINS.

Gold: Sovereign (or pound) and half-sovereign, coined at the rate of 1869 sovereigns from 40 lbs. troy of the standard fineness of 22 carats, or 9162 milliemes; being minted at 77s. 101d. per troy ounce. The full weight of the sovereign is 5 dwts. 3.274 grains; but it is a legal tender when 5 dwts. 22 grains; and the two coins are received at par by the Bank of England at the "current weights" of 5 dwts. 22 grains and 2 dwts. 131 grains respectively.

Gold has long been the principal medium of large payments, but a double standard legally existed until 1816, when gold coins became the sole standard and legal tender, without limitation (56 Geo. HI. c. 68). Under this law the mint is open to the public for gold coinage, and standard bullion is converted into an equal weight of sovereigns; but in practice, the bullion is sold at the fixed rate of 77s. 9d. to the Bank of England, in exchange for coin (or its equivalent) at 77s. 10½d. per oz., the difference of 1½d. per oz. being compensation to the Bank for the delay in coinage.

Silver: Crown of 5s., half-crown, florin of 2s., shilling, and pieces for 6d., 4d., 3d., 2d., and 1d.; but the last two, called maundy money, are not in circulation. All are coined at the rate of 66s. from 1 lb. troy of the fineness of 11 oz. 2 dwts., or 925 milliemes; and the full weight of the shilling is 3 dwts. 152 grains. Silver is thus minted at 5s. 6d. per oz., an over-valuation of about 8 per cent.; but the coins are not a legal tender for more than 40s. at one time.

Bronze: Penny, halfpenny, and farthing, coined at rates greatly exceeding their intrinsic value, but not legal tender beyond one shilling.

The Remedy of the Mint is, for gold coins 12 grains per lb. in weight, and 16 carat in fineness; for silver 1 dwt. per lb. in both weight and fineness.

In England the pound represented at first a Saxon pound of silver, but the coins were successively degraded to about one-third of their original values. The earliest, save the Saxon styca and skeatta, was, A. D. 725, the silver penny, often broken into fourth-things or farthings. Gold was not coined until 1257, and copper not until the 17th century. Of the old gold coins, the chief were the merk of 13s. 4d.; the noble of 6s. 8d.; and later, the guinea, valued after 1717 at 21s.

Scots currency was, when abolished, 1707, of only 1-12th the value of sterling, and £100 Scots = £8, 6s. 8d. sterling, or £1 Scots = 1s. 8d. sterling. The merk = 13s. 4d. Scots, and the plack = 2 bodles = 4d. Scots.

In Irish currency, abolished 1826, £108, 6s. 8d. Irish = £100 sterling.

PAPER MONEY AND BANKS OF ISSUE.

Public banks were introduced shortly after the Revolution of 1688. Unlike the old banks of Venice and Amsterdam, which were solely banks of deposit, they became banks of deposit, loan, circulation, and exchange. The earliest and greatest, the Bank of England, founded 1694, advanced its capital, then £1,200,000, to the Government, and acquired important privileges. It was immediately, 1695, followed by the Bank of Scotland, of less pretension, but which led the way to a system which, from its economy, especially in utilizing deposits, and supplying a stable currency, has more than any other contributed to the excellence of modern banking. The Bank of Ireland was formed, 1782, on the model of the Bank of England.

The note circulation of the Bank of England was well supported, and save during a short period in 1696, its convertibility was maintained until 1797, when, under adverse circumstances, aggravated by war, the Bank was ex-

empted from specie payments. The 77s. 101d. per oz. Payment of those notes then became depreciated; but issued in London can be demanded under arrangements consequent on "Peel's Act," 1819, the exchange of notes for gold was resumed in 1821.

The concessions to the Bank of England included a restriction, in 1708, of the partners in other English banks to six, which continued until 1826, when joint-stock banks of issue were allowed in places beyond the metropolitan district; and in 1833, when the Bank charter was renewed, and one-fourth of its capital repaid by Government, non-issuing joint-stock banks were allowed within the metropolitan district. The monopoly of the Bank of Ireland was similarly broken up in 1824. The joint-stock banks thus established were all mainly constituted upon the Scottish system. No other change occurred until the introduction of the existing regulations in 1844.

Existing Regulations.

The bank issues consist in England of notes for £5 and upwards of the Bank of England (which still monopolizes the circulation within 65 miles of London), and of numerous provincial banks; and in Scotland and Ireland of notes for £1 and upwards, all regulated so as to conform to a gold currency. New banks of issue are prohibited; and existing banks are limited in their issues, except against specie, of which one-fifth may be silver; while a publication is required of their circulation and specie, and an annual regis-

tration of their partners.

The Bank of England was, from August 31, 1844, divided into two entirely separate departments of issue and banking, and notes for £14,000,000 were transferred from the former to the latter, against special securities lodged with the Government, including £11,015,000 due by it to the Bank, all bearing 3 per cent. interest. Beyond this £14,000,000 no notes could be issued, except against coin or bullion lodged in the issue department. But the Bank was empowered to increase its issues upon securities to the extent of two-thirds of that withdrawn by any English provincial bank, and its authorized issue has been thus increased to £15,000,000—the profit of this increased issue, however, going to the Government. The actual circulation averages £25,000,000, issued about two-thirds from London, and one-of actual circulation about £7,5 third from 11 branches. Scotland and Ireland.

The English Provincial Banks of issue have a maximum circulation fixed at the average of the twelve weeks to April 27, 1844. The issues must be at certain licensed places, and no union can take place between a joint-stock bank and a private bank, or between two joint-stock banks of issue, without one of them, at least, losing its circulation. The opening of new branches of issue is also restrained. The aggregate fixed issues, originally £8,631,647, have declined to £6,653,966; and the average actual circulation is only about £5,400,000, spread over 118 private and 56 joint-stock banks. The specie held is not published, the notes being payable in Bank of England paper, and no power being possessed to issue against specie in excess of the fixed circulation.

In Scotland, banks of issue are confined to those which existed in the year to May 1, 1845; and the issue of each is restricted to the amount of its average circulation in that year, and of the specie held at its head office, where the notes are payable. Should two banks join, the united bank may issue to the amount of their separate circulations. The aggregate authorized circulation, originally £3,087,209, is now £2.749,271. The average amount of specie held is nearly £3,500,000, and of actual circulation nearly £5,500,000, issued by 11 joint-stock banks, with upwards of 700 branches.

In Ireland the authorized circulation is arranged as in Scotland; the issues of two banks which unite are also given to the united bank; but if any bank discontinues its issue, and circulates notes of the Bank of Ireland, the circulation of the latter may be to an equal amount increased. The notes are demandable in gold at the branches where issued; but the specie held against the circulation in excess of that authorized must be held at the head office, or certain licensed places. The total authorized circulation is still, as at first, £6,354,494. The average specie held is about £3,000,000, and of actual circulation about £7,500,009,

The authorized issues were adjusted with a declining tendency; but to their operative extent the use of the precious metals (or capital) is economized; while, from all farther issues being represented by specie, * the whole is rendered conformable to a metallic currency. The actual circulation averages about 42 millions, which, estimating 75 millions for gold and 13 millions for silver and copper, makes an aggregate of 130 millions. The issues temporarily rise at the money terms, but show little tendency to increase, notwithstanding the growth of trade and wealth. Indeed, notes and coin may now be regarded as the small change of the deposit system, with the increased ing departments, as follows:-

use of cheques, transfers, credits, and other expedients of modern banking, mediums of exchange and payment are now supplied, which, while as cheap as notes, are in practice more elastic and convenient. The bank clearing system, too, pervades the whole country, everywhere economizing both currency and capital. Local clearings are adjusted by drafts on Edinburgh, Dublin, or London, which merge into greater clearings in those towns, especially in London, where cheques, bills, etc., representing annually about 2000 millions sterling, are settled without either bank note or coin-the mutual balances of the clearing banks being settled by cheques on their several accounts with the Bank of England. This system could be farther economized by working the London clearing out of a joint account with the Bank of England, or by exchequer bills, as in Edinburgh.

revenue, &c., lodging the revenue as collected, and the pay-office, &c., withdrawing it for public purposes; while, quarterly, the dividends are paid on the national debt, the stocks constituting which are besides recorded and transferred at the bank. The (h) "public deposits" (which include chancery and savings banks' funds) increase through revenue receipts until the dividend terms in January, April, July, and October; but in order to lessen the inconvenience of so much capital being withdrawn from use, certain special advances are, in the latter part of each quarter, made out of these deposits to the discount-houses and others, which are repayable when the dividends on stock become due.

The banking account is separately debited with (f) the fixed capital of £14,553,600, and (g) the "rest," a variable surplus, increased by accrued profits until April 5, and October 10, when the bank dividends are paid to the proprietors. The other debits, beside (h) the public deposits already noticed, are (i) "other deposits," which comprise those of bankers, merchants, and others,—from £3,000,000 to £5,000,000, being those of London bankers. (k) The "seven days' bills" includes the outstanding bank post bills.

The credit side embraces (l) "government securities," a safe and readily convertible investment; (m) "other securities," composed of bills discounted, and stocks, bonds, &c., on which advances have been made; and (n, o) the reserve of notes and coin immediately available for advances on payments. The note reserve may be viewed as merely an arithmetical expression for the bullion in the issue department available for the banking department, as by consolidating the two accounts, and eliminating the unissued notes, an equivalent sum in bullion or coin will be found in excess of that required by the Act of 1844.

The Government of the Bank is vested in a governor, deputy-governor, and 24 directors, whose qualifications in stock are £4000, £3000, and £2000 respectively. The court or board meets every Thursday, when the weekly account is presented. The two governors have the chief administration, and attend daily, and the court is divided out into six regular committees:—1. The committee of treasury, virtually the governor's council, composed of the two governors, the former governors, and directors elected by the court; 2. The Committee of daily waiting, composed of three directors in rota-

tion, who discount or reject bills, take in or decline bullion, examine securities, &c.; and committees of, 3. Branchesand lawsuits; 4. House, clerks. &c.; 5. Inspection of accountants offices; and 6. Inspection of cashiers' offices. Subject to the court, the three departments of issue, banking, and national debt, are worked by two head officers,-first, the chief accountant, with cognizance of all the accounts; second, the chief cashier, with charge of all money matters. There is also a subordinate control of each office by a principal and deputy principal, besides, in the larger offices, superintendents. The early theory of the bank was to keep the divisions of accounts and cash entirely separate; and, though now much blended, the distinction is still mainly preserved, and the two check each other. Including branch clerks, mechanics, &c., upwards of 1000 persons are employed, about 400 being in the national debt department; and the annual charge is nearly £240,000, besides £20,000 in pensions. The bank building covers nearly 4 acres, and bears an estimated rental of £40,000.

The Business Regulations, though precise, comprehend little that is peculiar. Any person respectably intro-duced may keep a drawing account, provided it shall be remunerative to the bank,-a condition usually fulfilled by maintaining an adequate balance, though in some cases by an annual payment proportionate to the work. No interest is allowed, nor is an over-draft permitted; but the bank is always ready to discount approved bills for their customers, and to make advances on approved securities. The limit of the eschéance of bills discounted is 90 days; but advances on bills of even six months are granted to parties who transact all their business with the bank. The rates charged are various, yet never below the advertised "minimum rate of discount" by which the bank's ordinary transactions are regulated. The bank will also buy or sell, or take charge of securities, and receive dividends; and will also remit money to or from her branches; and from one branch to another. At London are issued bank-post bills drawn at 7 days, and notes at 60 days, for transmission to India, &c.

The General Management of the bank does not, in principle, differ from that of any other well-conducted bank. The directors must always look to their present liabilities, their present reserve, and the impending demands on the latter. In respect to investments,—

the average amount of deposits being known, and due regard paid to their temporary or permanent character,-it is usual to invest all above the amount to which they are likely to be reduced, in discounting bills, short loans, stock, or other convertible securities, care being taken to reserve sufficient cash to meet ordinary fluctuations in the deposits, without disturbing the general nature of the investments. The capital of the bank is not necessarily kept in the same realizable form, but it is desirable always to preserve a considerable portion of it in good banking securities, in case more than ordinary demands should arise. The progress of the bank is shown in the weekly returns. In tracing the action of the law of 1844, the fluctuations of the circulation now attract little notice; but increased importance is attached to the movement of the banking department. An increase of (i) the private deposits indicates increased monetary ease, while a decrease, especially when heavy, attests the necessities of traders and bankers. But the items which chiefly command attention are the two which more immediately determine the value of capital, -(m) the advances on commercial securities, and (n, o) the re-serve; the former indicating the demand, the latter the supply which regulate the bank rate of discount, -which. as the best practical index of the value of capital, materially influences transactions throughout the kingdom. When the reserve is high, and advances mo-

derate, the rate is low; but it is raised according as the reserve falls, and advances become in greater request, more especially during an adverse foreign exchange and drain of gold. The efflux of capital abroad is thus restrained, and its influx encouraged. The law of 1844, besides securing the convertibility of the note, operates in this way as a general caution to other banks and the public to contract, rather than extend, bill and credit facilities, when bullion is being arrowed.

Generally gold tends to leave the bank, and reduce the reserve, when the short exchange of London on Paris falls to 25f. 10c.; while an opposite effect is produced by the exchange rising to 25f. 33c. Owing to London being the entrepôt of the mining countries, a foreign demand for gold is often met without disturbing the bank's reserve. But under exceptional circumstances, political or financial, the bank is watchful of a diminution of the bullion, and may raise the discount-rate even while the reserve is good, and the foreign exchange not unfavourable; an adequate supply of gold being, in times of doubt or difficulty, peculiarly necessary as a basis of our credit and monetary system.

Since 1844 the reserve stood highest—£17,861,747—on June 21, 1871, when the private securities were £16,816,887, and the discount rate 2½ p. c. It stood lowest—£1,552,686—on Nov. 18, 1857, when, with the private securities at £26,113,453, the rate was 10 p. c.

IMPERIAL MEASURES.

This system, introduced 1826, continued the old legal measures of extension and weight, but superseded numerous corn and liquid measures by the "Imperial gallon," a new measure of capacity. The standards fixed were:—

1. Extension.—The "Imperial Standard Yard," or brass "standard yard of 1760," bearing the proportion of 36 inches to 39·1393 inches, the length of a pendulum vibrating seconds in the latitude of London at 62° Fahrenheit, and in a vacuum at the level of the sea.

2. Capacity.—The "Imperial Standard Gallon," containing 10 lbs. avoirdupois, or 277-274 cubic inches of distilled water at 62° Fahr., the barometer being

at 30 inches.

3. Weight.—The Old Troy Pound of 1758, containing 5760 grains; one cubic inch of distilled water at 62⁵ Fahr., the barometer being at 30 inches, weighing 252.458 grains; and 7000 of such grains were declared to be equal to the avoir-

dupois pound.

In 1834 those standards were accidentally destroyed; and a scientific commission having reported in favour of their restoration from material copies rather than by experimental reference to natural constants, the provisions for the latter were repealed in 1855. A standard yard and a standard avoirdupois pound were then constructed from authentic copies of the old standards, and deposited in the Exchequer—copies being at the same time lodged at the Mint, the Royal Observatory, the Royal Society, and the Palace at Westminster.

GOLD AND SILVER STANDARDS, ETC.

The fineness of gold is expressed i carats, the unit of reference being divided into 24, and its quality denoted by the number consisting of pure or fine gold. The carat is divided into 4 grains. The British standard for gold coin is 22 carats, i.e., 22 parts are fine, and 2 parts alloy. The fineness of silver is similarly denoted by the number of ounces and pennyweights fine in 1 lb. troy; and the money standard is 11 oz. 2 dwts., i.e., 222 parts are fine, and 18 parts alloy. These standards, often now expressed decimally in 1000th parts or milliemes, as in France, are 9167 and 925 respectively.

Plate, excepting small articles, &c., is of regulated fineness. The standards for gold until 1854 were 22 carats and 18 carats; but, to meet the competition of foreign jewellers, it is now also stamped of 15, 12, and 9 carats (17 & 18 Vict. c. 96). The standards for silver are 11 oz. 2 dwts. and 11 oz. 10 dwts.; the latter, called "new-sterling," is almost in disuse. Provisions are likewise made for five " marks" of verification :-

1. The Standard mark, for plate of the fineness of coin, is. in England, a lion passant; in Scotland, a thistle (6 and 7 Will. IV. c. 69); in Ireland, a harp crowned. But in England, since 1844, gold of 22 and 18 carats is separately distinguished by a crown (7 and 8 Vict. c. 22): the lower standards of 15, 12, and 9 carats bear only the numbers denoting their fineness in carats and milliemes. SECTION II.—FIARS-PRICES OF SCOTLAND.

STATE OF THE FIARS-PRICES

OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES OF SCOTLAND FOR THE CROPS AND YEARS FROM 1866 TO 1872 INCLUSIVE.

The Figra are the average prices, yearly ascertained by the Sheriff, with the help of a jury, of the several kinds of grain of the growth of his county, in the preceding crop. Their origin is obscure: it has been referred to the year 1627, when, it is said, they were for the first time ascertained in the county of Haddington; but they appear to have been struck in some other counties in the end of the previous century. The forms of procedure are regulated by the Acts of Sederunt, 21st December 1723, and 29th February 1728.

The Tables have been prepared from official documents in the Teind Office. The average is that of the period of Seven Years: but in a few cases, distinguished by an asterisk, that of Six Years only. Where blanks of more than one year occur, no average is stated, the Fiars not having been regularly struck.

The Grain is computed by the Imperial Quarter; the Meal by the Boll of 140 Imperial Pounds.

Stalks, and flour of, and snuff work and cavendish or negrohead containing leaves of trees or plants other than of the tobacco plant, are prohibited. Cavendish and negrohead are not to be imported except to be warehoused in the first instance. All imports of manufactured tobacco (other than eavendish or negrohead) containing prohibited ingredients, are to be forfeited.

On tobacco manufactured in Great Britain or Ireland, when exported as merchandise, by a licensed manufacturer, or when deposited in a bonded warehouse to be used as ships' stores, being packed in complete cases, each containing not less than 80 lbs. net weight, there is a drawback of 3s. 3d. per lb., subject to a proportionate increase or reduction for every pound of moisture more or less than 13 lbs. of moisture in every 100 lbs. of tobacco. No drawback is allowed on the exportation of cavendish or negrohead manufactured in bond and delivered for home consumption, or on any tobacco (except snuff) containing more than 22 lbs. of inorganic matter, or more than 2 lbs. of sand, or more than 25 lbs. of tobacco stalks fairly cut, with portions of the lamina of the leaf adhering, in every 100 lbs. weight, exclusive of water. If there be less than

22lbs. and more than 18lbs. ofinorganic matter in every 100 lbs. weight, exclusive of water, there shall be a deduction from the drawback in respect of every pound of inorganic matter above 18 lbs. in every 100 lbs. The full drawback of 3s. 3d. shall be allowed on the exportation of snuff, containing not more than 18 lbs. of inorganic matter in every 100 lbs. weight, exclusive of water; but a deduction shall be made for every pound of inorganic matter above 18 lbs. in every 100 lbs.

Goods not prohibited to be imported or used, composed of any article liable to duty as a part or ingredient thereof, are chargeable with the full duty payable on such article, or if composed of more than one article liable to duty, then with the full duty payable on the article charged with the highest rate of duty.

II. CHARGES ON DELIVERY FROM WAREHOUSE FOR HOME CONSUMPTION.

Section 7 of 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103 enacts that there shall be charged upon the goods after-mentioned, upon the delivery of the same for home consumption from any customs or excise warehouse, in addition to the duties of customs or excise payable in respect of such goods, and any other charges thereon, the

DRAWBACKS, ABATEMENTS, AND ALLOWANCES.

 BEER exported: for every 36 gallons, and so in proportion for any greater quantity, made by any licensed brewer for sale in the U. K. from worts which before fermentation were of the specific gravity of not less than 1040 degrees and for every additional 5

degrees, up to 1125 degrees, a farther sum of 6d. for every 36 gallons.

 BREWERS of beer for sale: when the quantity of beer brewed in any year shall be less than the quantity for which the license was granted, the difference shall be repaid to the brewer; if the quantity begreater, he shall be surcharged for the difference.

On the death of a brewer, or on the business being discontinued before the expiration of his license, a proportionate part of the duty may be returned.

When the license duty exceeds £10, it may be paid in moieties, one half on 10th Oct., the other on 1st March.

3. MALT exported : No malt can be exported on drawback, which, when screened and cleaned, shall weigh more than 44 lbs. avoirdupois a bushel; and no malt (other than blown, roasted, and crystallized) can be exported on drawback, which, when screened and cleaned. shall weigh less than 36 lbs. avoirdupois a bushel. On exportation, a drawback is allowed on malt weighing less than 40 lbs. a bushel, at the rate of the duty payable on 1 bushel of malt exported: on malt weighing 40 lbs. or more a bushel, drawback is allowed, according to the quantity ascertained by measure; subject in either case to the deduction of 7½ per cent. on the ascertained quantity. Roasted malt can be exported on drawback only by licensed roasters or dealers in roasted malt, under the same regulations as other malt. (Acts 23 and 24 Vict. c. 113, sect. 28, no. 3; 28 and 29 Vict. c. 66, sect. 13; 29 and 30 Vict. c. 64, sect. 5 and 6.)
[By the Act 27 Vict. c. 9,

As certain British compounded spirits or British liqueurs are of such a nature that the strength thereof cannot be ascertained by Sykes's hydrometer, section 13 of the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, enacts that, subject to any regulations which may be from time to time made by the Commissioners of Customs and the Commissioners of Inland Revenue respectively, British liqueurs may be warehoused by a licensed rectifier or compounder of spirits in any customs or excise warehouse under the provisions of the said Act, subject to the modifications following:

(1.) The rectifier or compounder intending to warehouse any British liqueurs shall specify in the warehousing entry or note to be delivered by him under section 4 of 28 and 29 Vict. c. 98, in addition to the matters thereby required to be specified other than the strength of such British liqueurs, the actual number of gallons at proof of the spirits from which the British liqueurs contained in each cask were compounded; and as soon as any British liqueurs are warehoused, the proper officer of customs or excise at the warehouse shall take a sample from each cask containing such British liqueurs, and every such sample shall be examined, under the direction of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, by distillation or otherwise, and the strength of the British liqueurs ascertained by such examination, after making a deduction of five degrees from the degrees of such strength, shall, in the construction of the provisions of the said Act for the purposes of this section, be deemed to be the strength as denoted or indicated by Sykes's hydrometer.

(2.) If the quantity of spirits in any cask of British liqueurs shall, upon such examination as aforesaid, be found to be less than the quantity of spirits as specified in the warehousing entry or note, no drawback or allowance

whatever shall be paid in respect of the British liqueurs contained in such cask.

(3.) British liqueurs warehoused in any customs or excise warehouse shall not be removed to any other warehouse or be delivered out otherwise than for exportation or for ships' stores directly from the warehouse on board the vessel in which the same are to be exported or used as stores.

Allowance is now made for the natural waste of spirits in warehouse; it being provided by the Act 27 Vict. c. 12, sec. 7, that duty shall be charged only on the actual quantity of spirits delivered from bond, unless there be reasonable ground for believing that the deficiency either in whole or in part has been the result of fraud.

5. Worts (Solidified) exported (Act 29 and 30 Vict. c. 64): for worts made and solidified by any licensed brewer for sale in the U.K., from malt or sugar, or malt and sugar on which full duties of excise and customs have been charged or paid, a drawback at the rate of the duty payable on one bushel of malt, with the addition of 1½d. for every 28 lbs. avoirdupois of such wort.

Note.—By the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, sect. 4, foreign spirits and wine of which an account has been taken by the proper officer of customs may, upon the prescribed bond being given, without payment of duty, be removed to any excise warehouse, and be removed from thence to any other excise or customs warehouse or for exportation, or for use as ships' stores, and may, upon payment of the proper duties of customs, be delivered for home consumption.

III. STAMP AND LEGACY DUTIES, ETC.

The following is a list of Stamp Duties according to the schedule of the Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97 (amended by 34 Vict. c. 4, and 34 and 35 Vict. c. 103), with the Duty on Policies of Sea Insurance, Letters Patent, Patent Medicine, and Plate, and Inventory, Legacy, and Succession Duties, which remain under the former Acts. Generally, the items are given in the words of the schedule. New matter is put within brackets. When the sections are merely cited without the Act, they are the sections of 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97. All items in the schedule of the Act relating solely to England and Ireland are excluded. In the same session were passed the Acts 33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, Stamp Duties Management, and 33 and 34 Vict. c. 99, repealing certain enactments relating to the Stamp Duties.

The Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97, came into operation on 1st January 1871, and

by § 3 the exemptions in other Acts in force are preserved.

The attention of the public may be directed to the following matters:

 The general deed duty, or duty on a deed, not otherwise charged, is reduced to 10s.

Progressive duty on words is not imposed.

 Provisions are made for charging ad valorem duty on conveyances in respect of periodical payments or anunities.—(§ 72.) 4. An agreement for a lease for a term not exceeding 35 years is to be charged with the lease duty.—(§ 96.)

5. An instrument chargeable as a lease in consideration, in whole or in part, of produce or other goods—

Where it is stipulated that the value shall amount to or not exceed a given sum, ad valorem lease duty on such sum.

A statement in the lease in regard

to the value of such produce or goods to be conclusive as to stamp duty, unless and until shown to be incorrect. - (§ 97.)

6. A notarial instrument is liable to the same duty as an instrument of

seisin-to wit, 5s.

7. Any instrument specifically charged by any previous Act with the duty of 35s., is chargeable with the duty of 10s.—(§ 4.)

8. Instruments relating to the property of the crown, and to the private property of the sovereign, are liable to same duties as instruments relating to the property of the subject, except where express provision is made to the contrary. - (§ 5.)

9. Instruments are to be so stamped that the stamp may appear on the face of the instrument, and cannot be applied to any other instrument written upon the same piece of material. - § 7 (1.) Every instrument on the same piece of material is to be separately

stamped. - § 7 (2.)

10. Instruments relating to several distinct matters are to be separately stamped in respect of each .- § 8 (1.) An instrument liable to ad valorem duty, if made for any other valuable consideration, is to be charged in respect of it, as if it were a separate instrument for such.- § 8 (2.)

11. An appropriated stamp (by word on the face of it) cannot be used for an instrument of another description .-§ 9 (1.) An instrument of the description to which a stamp is appropriated is not to be duly stamped unless stamped with the stamp appropriated to it.-

\$ 9 (2.)

12. All the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of an instrument to ad valorem duty, or the amount of it, are to be fully and truly set forth. If not, penalty on person who executes and on person concerned in the preparation, £10.—(§ 10.)

13. Instrument chargeable with ad valorem duty in respect of money in foreign or colonial currency, the duty

to be calculated on the value in British currency, according to the current rate of exchange at the date of the instrument.—(§ 11.)

14. Instrument chargeable with ad valorem duty in respect of stock or marketable security, the duty to be calculated on the value, according to the average price at the date of the

instrument. - (§ 12.)

15. If the instrument contains a statement of the current rate of exchange, or average price, and is stamped accordingly, it is to be deemed duly stamped until statement shown to be untrue, and that the instrument is in fact insufficiently stamped. - (§ 13.)

16. The duties apply to instruments executed in the United Kingdom, and to instruments wheresoever executed, relating to property situated, or to any matter or thing done or to be done, in the United Kingdom .- (§ 17.)

17. No instrument, except in criminal proceedings, shall be pleaded or given in evidence, or admitted to be good, useful, or available in law equity, unless it is duly stamped in accordance with the law in force when executed. -(§ 17.)

If any person registers an instrument not duly stamped, penalty £10.

-(§ 22.)

19. Except where express provision is made to the contrary, all duties are to be denoted by impressed stamps only.—(§ 23.)

Indian Promissory Notes-Ships .-Indian Government promissory notes and certificates issued, or stock in lieu thereof, being assets of a deceased person, the interest of which shall be payable in London, registered in London, or enfaced in India for the purpose of such registration before the death of the owner; also Indian Government promissory notes, with coupons attached, in the same circumstances as to registration, and certificates issued, or stock created in lieu thereof, shall be personal estate, and bona notabilia in England of the deceased person (23 Vict. c. 5, § 1); also any ship, or any share of a ship, belonging to a deteased person, registered in any port in the United Kingdom, notwithstanding such ship at the time of the death may have been at sea, or elsewhere out of the United Kingdom, shall be deemed to be at the port at which she may be registered (27 and 28 Vict. c. 56), and liable to inventory, probate, or adminis-

specialty Debts.—For probate and administration duty, debts and sums of money due from persons in the United Kingdom to a deceased on obligation or other specialty, shall be estate and effects of the deceased within the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Court of Probate in England or Ireland, in which the same would be if they were debts upon simple contract, without regard to the place where the obligation or specialty shall be at the time of the death.—(25 Vict. c. 22, § 39.)

Foreign Bonds and Stocks.—Documents of the debts of foreign governments and foreign companies which pass from hand to hand are property where the documents

may be. Debentures or bonds by foreign companies and governments, and the title to stocks of foreign companies and governments, are property in this country, if in the possession of any person in this country, and can be sold in the market, and the title of the purchasers completed to them in this country.—See Attorney-General v. Bouwens, 4 Meeson & Welsby, 171. Rents of Heritage.-If the deceased survive Whitsunday, one moiety of the rents of the crop of that year is personal estate. If he survive Martinmas, the whole rents of that crop fall into the executry. In addition, from and after 1st August 1870, the Act 33 & 34 Vict. 1870, c. 35, would seem to give the executor a proportion of the rents from the term preceding the date of death to the date of death. That Act would also seem to give a proportion of the term's rents of quarries, minerals, and houses, and also feu-duties current at the death. The executor's right to house - rents would not therefore be to the half-year's rents current at death, but to a proportion only to the date of death.

Modes in which Duty may be paid. When deceased domiciled in Scotland. -In the case of a person dying domiciled in Scotland, having personal property in Scotland, England, and Ireland, and also heritable securities excluding executors, and personal bonds excluding executors, duty in respect of the whole may be paid on the inventory required to be recorded in the Commissary Court; or inventory duty may be paid on the personal property situated in Scotland, including heritable securities made movable by the Act 31 and 32 Vict. c. 101, § 117, and duty may be paid on a "special inventory" of the heritable securities excluding executors and personal bonds excluding executors, and probate or administration may be obtained in England and Ireland in respect of the personal estate in these countries, and duty paid in respect of such on these instruments.

When deceased domiciled furth of the U. K.—In case of a person dying domiciled furth of the United Kingdom leaving personal estate in Scotland, England, and Ireland, an inventory must be given up in Scotland, probate or administration taken out in England and Ireland, and duty paid on such in respect of the property in each country.

Exemptions.—Inventory of the estate of any common seaman or soldier dying in service.

Additional inventory when duty on the whole estate does not exceed that already paid on former inventory.

RETURN OF INVENTORY DUTY.

The inventory duty and probate and administration duty are paid on the whole personal property, without deduction of debts; but the Act 5 & 6 Vict. c. 79, § 23, provides for a return being given on proof of the constitution and payment of the debts. This return must be claimed within three years; but the time will be prolonged on application to the Board of Inland Revenue. No return to be granted in respect of a voluntary debt due from a person dying after 28th June 1861. expressed to be payable on death of such person, or payable under an instrument which shall not have been bona fide delivered to the donee three months before the death of such person. (24 and 25 Vict. c. 92, § 3.)

Note.—Forms of inventory and additional inventory will be found in the Juridical Styles, vol. iii., App. pp. 8-11. Forms of inventories, and also regulations for return of inventory duty, may be obtained at the Office of the Solicitor, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh. Claims are to be lodged in the Solicitor's Office, Room No. 5, and Monday and Friday between 12 and 2 o'clock are the days for receiving claims from the claimants or their agents.

The husband or wife of the deceased is not chargeable with duty. If the legatee's husband or wife is of nearer consanguinity than the legatee, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship. (16 & 17 V.c.51, § 11.)
This duty is payable for every legacy

out of the personal or movable estate. or out of or charged upon the real or heritable estate of the deceased, or out of any estate which he has power to dispose of, or out of any moneys to arise by the sale, mort gage, or other disposition of the deceased's real or heritable estate. or any part thereof: Also for the clear residue (after deducting debts, funeral expenses, legacies, and other charges first payable thereout) of the personal or movable estate, whether the title to such residue shall accrue by virtue of any testamentary disposition, or upon a partial or total intestacy: And also for the clear residue of the moneys to arise from the sale, mortgage, or other disposition of any real or heritable estate, directed to be sold, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of by any will or testamentary instrument.

Annuities commencing to be payable on the death of persons dying after 19th May 1853, are valued for legacy duty according to tables annexed to the Succession Duty Act (16 and 17 Vict. c. 51); and annuities commencing to be payable previous to that date, by the tables annexed to the Legacy Duty Act (36 Geo. III. c. 52).

Duty is not exigible on legacies or residues under £20; but if a legatee take two or more legacies, under any testament, which shall together be of the amount of £20, each shall be charged with duty, though each or either may be separately under that amount.

Duty on legacies and residues in arrears, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Printed forms and regulations for payment of the legacy duty may be obtained gratis, on application at Legacy Duty Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh; and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

SUCCESSION DUTY.

(16 and 17 Vict. c. 51.)

The duty commenced on the death of persons dying after the 19th May 1853, and seems to be imposed on all property, both heritable and movable, passing by death, not liable to the duty on legacies and successions to personal estate upon intestacy—the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts.

The duty on Heritable Property is charged on the annual value, after allowance of the necessary outgoings

(§ 22), as an annuity for the life of the successor (§ 21), which is to be valued by tables annexed to Act.

PERSONAL PROPERTY is liable to duty according to the value of the succession; and money charged on heritage—heritable securities—is charged as personalty (§ 1).

RATES OF SUCCESSION DUTY. Lineal issue or lineal ancestor of the predecessor.....£1 per cent. Brothers and sisters of the predeces-sor and their descendants, £3 per ct. Brothers and sisters of the father or mother of the predecessor and their descendants £5 per cent. Brothers and sisters of a grandfather or grandmother of the predecessor and their descendants . . £6 per cent. Any other person £10 per cent. The husband or wife of predecessor is not chargeable with duty (§ 18), and if successor's husband or wife shall be of nearer consanguinity than the successor, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship (§ 11).

The following are also exemptions from the succession duty:

Successions from the same predecessor, passing on any death, not amounting in principal value to £100 (§ 18).
 Any succession of less value than £20 in the whole (ib.)
 Legacies and personal property charged with legacy duty, in respect of the same acquisition (ib.).

Duty on successions in arrear, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Note.—Forms of the accounts may be obtained at the Legacy Duty Office, Edinburgh, and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

GENERAL DIRECTION AS TO THE CAN-CELLATION OF ADHESIVE STAMPS.

§ 24. (1.) An instrument, the duty upon which is required, or permitted by law, to be denoted by an adhesive stamp, is not to be deemed duly stamped with an adhesive stamp unless the person required by law to cancel such adhesive stamp cancels the same by writing on or across the stamp his name or initials, or the name or initials of his firm, together with the true date of his so writing, so that the stamp may be effectually cancelled, and rendered incapable of being used for any other instrument, or unless it is otherwise proved that the stamp appearing on the instrument was affixed thereto at the proper time.

Penalty for neglect or refusal, £10.— (2.) Every person, who, being required by law to cancel an adhesive stamp, wilfully neglects or refuses duly to do so in manner aforesaid,

shall forfeit the sum of £10.

Penalty for frauds in relation to adhesive stamps, or to any duty, £50

(§ 25).—Any person who—

(1) Fraudulently removes or causes to be removed from any instrument any adhesive stamp, or affixes any adhesive stamp which has been so removed to any other instrument, with intent that such stamp may be used again;

(2.) Sells or offers for sale, or utters, any adhesive stamp which has been so removed, or utters any instrument having thereon any adhesive stamp which has to his knowledge been so removed as aforesaid;

(3.) Practises or is concerned in any fraudulent act, contrivance, or device not specially provided for, with intent to defraud Her Majesty, her heirs or successors, of any duty;

shall forfeit, over and above any other penalty to which he may be

liable, the sum of £50.

STAMPING INSTRUMENTS AFTER EXECUTION.

ARTICLES of CLERKSHIP. — Duly stamped articles in order to admission in inferior court may be stamped with duty to make up £60, and shall then be sufficiently stamped for admission into Court of Session, etc. (§ 42).

With this exception, articles of clerkship are not to be stamped after the expiration of six months from the date, except on payment of the pen-

alties as follows :-

ADJUDICATION.

DOUBTS AS TO SUFFICIENCY OF STAMPS MAY BE REMOVED.

The commissioners may be required to express their opinion as to duty. Mode and effect of proceeding .- § 18. (1.) Subject to such regulations as the commissioners may think fit to make, the commissioners may be required by any person to express their opinion with reference to any executed instrument upon the following questions:
(a.) Whether it is chargeable with

any duty:

(b.) With what amount of duty it is

chargeable.

(c.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is not chargeable with any duty, such instrument may be stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is not chargeable with any duty.

(3.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is chargeable with duty, they shall assess the

duty with which it is in their opinion chargeable, and if or when the instrument is duly stamped in accordance with the assessment of the commissioners, it may be also stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is duly stamped.

(4.) Every instrument stamped with the particular stamp denoting either that it is not chargeable with any duty, or is duly stamped, shall be admissible in evidence, and available for all purposes, notwithstanding any objection relating to duty.

(5.) Provided as follows:-

(a.) Instrument to be stamped according to opinion .- An instrument upon which duty has been assessed by commissioners shall not, if it is unstamped or insufficiently stamped, be stamped otherwise than in accordance with assessment of commissioners.

(b.) Securities without limit not to be adjudicated.-Nothing in this section contained extends to any instrument chargeable with duty, and made as a security for money or

stock without limit.

(c.) Also instruments which cannot be stamped.-Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to authorize the stamping after the execution thereof of any instrument prohibited by law from being so stamped.

Person dissatisfied may appeal.—§ 19. (1.) Any person who is dissatisfied with the assessment of the commissioners made in pursuance of the last preceding section may, within twenty-one days after the date of such assessment, and on payment of duty in conformity therewith, appeal against such assessment to Her Majesty's Court of Exchequer in England, Scotland, or Ireland, according to the country in which the case has arisen, and may for that purpose require the commissioners to state and sign a case, setting forth the question upon which their opinion was required, and the assessment made by them.

Mode of proceeding .- (2.) The commissioners shall thereupon state and sign a case accordingly, and deliver the same to the person by whom it is required, and on his application

(5.) But if the assessment of commissioners is confirmed by court, the costs incurred by commissioners in relation to the appeal shall be ordered by the court to be paid by appellant to the commissioners.

The commissioners may call for and refuse to proceed without evidence .-§ 20. (1.) In any case of application to the commissioners with reference to any instrument, the commissioners may require to be furnished with an abstract of the instrument, and also with such evidence as they may deem necessary, in order to show to their satisfaction whether all the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of the instrument to duty, or the amount of the duty chargeable thereon, are fully and truly set forth therein, and may refuse to proceed upon any such application until such abstract and evidence has been furnished accordingly.

Affidavit not to be used otherwise.

Person paying full duty relieved of penalty, etc., for omission to state

truly in instrument.—(2.) Provided that no affidavit or statutory declaration made in pursuance of this section shall be used against any person making the same in any proceeding whatever, except in an inquiry as to the duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable; and every person by whom any such affidavit or declaration is made shall, on payment of the full duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable, be relieved from any penalty, forfeiture, or disability he may have incurred by reason of the omission to state truly in such instrument any of the facts or circumstances aforesaid.

a Instruments are received for adjudication at the Solicitor's Office, Inland Revenue Office, Edinburgh, on the same conditions as to duty and penalty as instruments to be stamped merely. The schedule (the duty to be impressed not being inserted), the instrument after execution, and an abstract giving the names and addresses of the parties to it, the substance of the provisions, particularly dates and sums, and a reference to the part of the deed on which each commences, are to be left at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5, on Mondays and Wednesdays, between 10 and 12 o'clock. Between 10 and 12 o'clock on Thursday following, a person, who can give explanation, must call on the Assistant Solicitor, No. 6; and he should be prepared to pay the proper duty and penalty, if any, to the Cashier, No. 3, Lobby.

licensed, and not hawk (33 and 34 Viet. c. 98, §§ 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11). Persons in the employment of the Post Office to sell postage stamps without license, and carry them about for sale (ib. § 12).

DISCOUNT ON THE PURCHASE OF STAMPS.

Upon the sale of stamps such discount shall be allowed to the purchaser thereof as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall direct (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, § 13).

The Treasury have sanctioned the continuance for the present of the several rates of discount formerly

granted, viz.:

Purchasers of stamps (except receipt, labels for medicines, and postage-stamps) at London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, under the value of £10 each, but to the value of £30 or upwards in whole, are allowed discount at the rate of 30s. per cent. (12 and 13 Vict. c. 80). The like discount is allowed to any person lodging at Edinburgh, paper or forms containing printed matter only, to be impressed with stamp duties under the value of £10 each, but to the value

of £30 or upwards in whole. To persons who at one time shall produce at the office of Inland Revenue in London (Edinburgh) or Dublin, paper to be stamped with, or shall purchase at the office in London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, stamps to the amount of £2 or upwards, or of any distributor of stamps at any place not within ten miles from the said offices. stamps to the amount of £1 or upwards, denoting any duty not exceeding Is. on bills of exchange, drafts or orders, or promissory notes, or stamps, for denoting the duty of ld. (except postage-stamps), an allowance shall be made of 10d. for every 20s. of the duties denoted by such stamps (23 & 24 Vict. c. 111, § 3). No person selling such stamps shall charge for the paper whereon the same are impressed: penalty, £10.

EXCHANGING SPOILED STAMPS.

(17 & 18 Vict. c. 83, § 25).]

STAMP DUTIES MANAGEMENT ACT, 1870 (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98).

Allowance for Spoiled Stamps. - § 14. The commissioners may make regulations regarding allowance for stamps spoiled in the following cases, viz.:-Instruments not executed .- (1.) Inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled,

obliterated, or by any means rendered unfit for the purpose intended: Adhesive stamps.—(2.) Any never used nor affixed to any material, but inadvertently and undesignedly

spoiled or rendered unfit for use: Bills and Notes .- (3.) Signed by the drawer, but not delivered out of his hands to the payee, or any person on his behalf, or deposited with any person as a security for the payment of money, or in any way negotiated, issued, or put in circulation, or made use of in any other manner whatever, and which being a bill has not been accepted by the drawee, and does not bear any signature intended as or for

the acceptance: (4.) Signed by or on behalf of the drawer thereof, but which from any omission or error has been spoiled or rendered useless, although the same, being a bill of exchange, may have been presented for acceptance or accepted or endorsed, or, being a promissory-note, may have been delivered to the payee, provided that another completed and duly stamped bill or note is produced identical in every particular, except in correction of such error or omission as aforesaid, with the spoiled bill or note:

(5.) The following executed instru-

(a.) Presentation to an ecclesiastical benefice not followed by institution:

(b.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found to be absolutely void in law from the be-

ginning:

(c.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found unfit by reason of any error or mistake therein for the purpose originally intended:

(d.) Executed by any party thereto, but which, by reason of the death of any person by whom it is necessary that it should be executed, without having executed the same, or of the refusal of any such person to execute the same, or to advance any money intended to be thereby secured, cannot be completed so as to effect the intended transaction in the form proposed:

(e.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of the execution thereof by some material and necessary party, and his inability or refusal to sign the same, is in fact incomplete and insufficient for the purpose for which it was

intended:

(f.) Executed by any party thereto, which, by reason of the refusal of any person to act under the same, or by the refusal or non-acceptance of any office thereby granted, totally fails of the intended purpose:

(g.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of enrolment or registration within the time required by law, becomes null and

void:

- (h.) Executed by any party thereto, which becomes useless in consequence of the transaction intended to be thereby effected being effected by some other instrument duly stamped:
- (i.) Executed by any party thereto, which is inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, and in lieu whereof another instrument made between the same parties and for the same purpose is executed and duly stamped:

Provided :-

(1.) Executed Instruments—

(a.) The instrument is given up to

- be cancelled:
 (b.) The application is made within six months after the date of the instrument, or, if not dated, within six months after the execution by the person by whom it was first or alone executed. Except, 1. Where from unavoidable circumstances any instrument for which another instrument has been substituted cannot be given up to be cancelled within the aforesaid period, and in that case within six months after the date or execution of the substituted instrument; 2. Where the spoiled instrument has become void for want of enrolment or registration, and in that case within six months next after it has so become void; 3. Where the spoiled instrument has been sent abroad, and in that case within six months after it has been received back in any part of the United Kingdom:
- (c.) No action has been brought or suit commenced in which the instrument could or would have been given or offered in evidence:
- (2.) Unexecuted Instruments.-In the case of stamped material, not having any executed instrument written thereon, and of an adhesive stamp not affixed to any material, the ap-

plication is made within six months after the stamp has been spoiled.

Misused Stamps. - § 15. Stamp used of greater value than was necessary, or stamp inadvertently used for an instrument not liable to any duty, application within six months after the date of the instrument, or, if it is not dated, within six months after the execution. The instrument liable to duty to be restamped with the proper duty. The misused stamp to be cancelled and allowed as spoiled.

Allowance how to be made. - § 16. The commissioners may give in lieu other stamps of the same denomination and value, or if required, and they think proper, stamps of any other denomination to the same amount in value, or, at their discretion, the same value in money, deducting the proper allowance on the purchase of stamps of the like description.

Stamps not wanted may be repurchased by the Commissioners .- § 17. A stamp not spoifed or rendered unfit or useless for the purpose intended, but for which the person has no immediate use, the commissioners may, if they in their discretion think fit, repay the amount in money, deducting the pro-per discount. The stamp to be delivered up to be cancelled, and satisfactory proof to be given that it was purchased by him with a bona fide intention to be used, and that the applicant has paid the full value thereof without any deduction (except only the amount of such discount), and that the stamp was so purchased within the period of six months next preceding the application at the chief office or at one of the head offices, or from some person appointed to sell and distribute stamps or duly licensed to deal in stamps.

As to the exchange of Sea Policies of Insurance, see 30 Vict. c. 23, § 17. The cases for allowing are-

(1.) Where policy shall be inadver-tently filled up in an incorrect or improper manner;

(2.) Or be obliterated or otherwise spoiled, and rendered unfit for use:

(3.) Or shall be filled up for some insurances which shall not be proceeded in, and the same shall not be signed by any underwriter.

Application must be made within six months after the policy shall be spoiled or become useless.

(See Note a.)

⁽a.) The Solicitor's Office, No. 5 in the Inland Revenue Office, Edinburgh, is open for the allowance of spoiled stamps every Tuesday and Thursday

IV. INHABITED HOUSE DUTY.

On each inhabited dwelling-house of the annual value of £20 or upwards, occupied as a farm-house, or any shop or warehouse, being part of a dwelling-house, where goods are exposed for sale and sold in

the front and basement story, or any house which is licensed for the sale of liquors by retail, or which is occupied as a hotel, although not licensed for the sale of liquors, a duty of 6d. per pound; all others, 9d.

Exemptions .- Any house occupied for the purpose of trade only, or as a warehouse for the sole purpose of lodging goods, or used as a shop or countinghouse, where a servant may dwell for the protection thereof.

upon £80 of their income. Deductions. - Deduction is allowed, when claimed, of any annual premium

(not exceeding one-sixth part of the claimant's income from every source) paid for insurance, or deferred annuity, on the claimant's own or his wife's life, to any insurance company in existence on 1st November 1844, or registered pursuant to Act 7 and 8 Vict. c. 110; or of any annual payment made under Act of Parliament to a

widows' or children's fund. By the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 80, landlords in Scotland are entitled to relief (either by abatement or by repayment) from any amount of Income Tax which may be assessed upon them in respect of the annual value of such rates, taxes, assessments, and public burdens, as may be charged upon them and not charged upon landlords

in England.

A supply of forms of affidavits is kept by the solicitor and the distributors of stamps, and by most of the sub-distributors; and claimants may attend at the Solicitor's Office and have the affidavits filled up and taken; or they may get copies of the forms, and take the oath before a justice of the peace, and afterwards lodge the affidavits and the stamps with any of the above officers. If the claim be admitted at Edinburgh, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the new stamps after the next Monday, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If the claim be lodged with a distributor or sub-distributor, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the said stamps after a specified date, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If application not made within that time, the claim will be forfeited.

The stamps must be presented for allowance within six months after being

spoiled.

A letter weighing more than 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce. Example, 16 oz.would be 1s. 4d. Unpaid Letters are charged double, and deficient postage double the deficiency. Letters may not exceed in size 18×9×6 inches, unless to or from Government offices. On re-directed letters the charge for re-direction is the same whether prepaid or collected on delivery.

LATE LETTERS, posted at the provincial offices, are received till within 5 minutes of the despatch of the mails on being prepaid one penny additional, and posted in the proper box, or handed over the counter.

Letters, when once posted, cannot be given back upon any pretence whatever, but must be forwarded to the person to whom they are addressed.

Letters containing articles of a perishable or dangerous nature, or anything that might prove injurious to the other letters, are not forwarded, but sent to the Returned Letter Office.

REGISTRATION.—Any inland letter, book-packet, &c., can be registered on the payment of a fee of 4d. in addition to the postage on such letter or packet. The full amount in stamps for postage and fee must be on the letter when presented for registration, and it must be presented half-an-hour before the closing of the box for the mail by which it will be sent, otherwise it is liable to a late fee of 4d. It is recommended that all letters of value, and letters containing coin, should be re-gistered; as any letter discovered in course of transit, supposed to contain coin, is registered, and a fee of 8d. charged on it, which must be paid on delivery. A letter marked " registered" posted in any letter-box, instead of being presented for registration and a receipt obtained, is also charged a fee of 8d., any additional stamps on it above the postage being allowed for off that amount. For the rates of registered letters going abroad, see pp. 146-153.

POST CARDS.

Post Cards are for inland circulation only.

Any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed. Nothing whatever may be attached; nor may the Card be folded, cut, or otherwise altered. If any of these rules be infringed, the Card will be charged 1d. on delivery.

No Card other than one of those issued by the Government will pass under a halfpenny stamp, if it bear on it a written communication of the

nature of a letter.

It is forbidden to forward by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, packet, or card having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character.

NEWSPAPERS.

All newspapers registered at the General Post-Office, London, printed and published in the United Kingdom at intervals not exceeding seven days, and on a sheet, or sheets, unstitched, may be sent by post, singly or in a packet, within the United Kingdom, for a postage of one halfpenny for each newspaper. A newspaper packet posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be charged with the unpaid rate applicable to book packets. The title and date of every publication must be printed at the top of every page, and it must be folded in such a manner that the title may be readily inspected. It must either have no cover, or be in a cover open at the ends. It must contain no enclosure, except the supplement belonging to it. A newspaper which has any letter, written in it or upon its cover, will be charged as an unpaid or insufnciently paid letter. No packet of newspapers must exceed 14 lb. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in width or depth.

Registration for inland circulation includes registration for transmission abroad. Newspapers for foreign countries and the colonies are subject to the same general regulations as for inland circulation; excepting that for foreign transmission a newspaper may be published at intervals of 31 days, and that it (but not its supplement) may be printed on sheets stitched together. It must be posted within eight days from the date of publication, including the day of publication. packet of newspapers must exceed 2 feet in length, and I foot in depth or width. The rates of newspapers going abroad will be found in the list of Colonial and Foreign Postages, p. 146.

INLAND BOOK POST.

The rate of postage is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction thereof, and must be prepaid in stamps.

If not sufficiently paid, double the deficiency will be charged; and if sent unpaid, a double rate is charged. All letters or sealed enclosures in a book packet are forbidden. If this rule is nfringed, the entire packet will be treated as a letter. If any letter is written on a book or its cover, it will be charged unpaid letter postage. (Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, etc., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter.)

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment, and may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three ;-further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, whether loose or attached: also rollers in the case of prints; markers, whether paper or otherwise. in books; in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but every packet must be open at both ends, and put up in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it will be treated as a letter.

Circulars require to be in identical terms, the whole or greater part of which must be printed, engraved, or lithographed, notwithstanding such may be letters or communications of the nature of a letter.

A book packet in dimensions must not exceed 6 inches in depth, 9 inches in width, 18 inches in length, and 5 lb. in weight.

COLONIAL AND FORRIGN PATTERN POST.

The Pattern and Sample Post is restricted to bona fide trade patterns or samples of merchandise. Goods sent for sale, or in execution of an order (however small the quantity may be), or any articles sent by one private individual to another, which may not actually be patterns or samples, are not admissible.

POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS. -Every post-office, being a money-order office, which the Postmaster-General shall authorize to receive and repay deposits, will be open for that purpose during the same hours as are appointed for money-order business. Deposits of one shilling, or any number of pounds and shillings, will be received from any depositor, provided the sums deposited do not exceed £30 in any year, ending 31st December, and the total amount standing in the depositor's name does not exceed £150, exclusive of interest. Interest at the rate of £2, 10s. per cent. per annum allowed on every complete pound. When any depositor's principal and interest amount together to £200, all interest will cease so long as the balance of the account continues to amount to the said sum of £200. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or part of his deposits, must apply on the form

which he will procure at any post-office savings bank, and transmit it to the Postmaster-General, who will send him a warrant by post, payable at the post-office named in his application. Further regulations as to details are printed in the book which the depositor receives on making his first deposit, and an abstract of the Act will be found in the Almanac for 1862, p. 143.

GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES, ETC.— The Act 27 and 28 Vict. c. 43, empowers the Postmaster-General to insure the lives of persons of either sex for not less than £20, or more than £100; and also to grant immediate or deferred annuities on the lives of persons of either sex, of the age of ten years and upwards. Certain post-offices have been opened for the receipt of proposals, where full instructions for filling up and delivering the necessary forms may be obtained. See Post-towns, p. 154. POSTAGE TO THE COLONIES AND ALL FOREIGN PARTS.

In the following Table, the route first specified is that by which a letter will be sent if not specially addressed. If, however, the letter is paid by postage stamps, it will be sent by the route with which the amount agrees; and if unpaid, although addressed by a route which requires pre-payment, it will not be returned to the writer if it can be sent by another route with-

out the postage being paid.

No letter exceeding 250 grammes (a little more than 82 oz.), and containing any other enclosure than paper, is allowed to circulate in Germany by Such letters will be stopped at the frontier, and sent to the Customhouse for delivery as freight. Coin, watches, jewelry and other artieles of value, which are liable to customs duties, are not permitted to circulate in Spain and Egypt, and the circulation of coin, jewelry, and other articles of value is also prohibited in Belgium and Italy. similar prohibition, on pain of forfeiture, is placed on the transmission of diamonds and other jewels to the Turkish empire, of money and jewelry to Costa Rica, and of jewelry, etc., to the colonies of Canada, Queensland, New South Wales, and Victoria.

BOOK AND PATTERN POST .- To the colonies and most foreign countries printed paper may be sent under the same regulations as the Inland Book Post, and the name and address of the sender may be written on the book; but to some foreign countries there must be no writing or manu-

script marks except the name and address of the person to whom it is

The following limitations of the Newspaper, Book, and Pattern Post must be adhered to-viz., A packet of newspapers, books, or patterns for Belgium, or countries via Belgium (Holland, Denmark, Sweden, and Switzerland excepted), must not exceed 8 oz. in weight; and for Portugal, Madeira, the Azores, or Cape de Verds, must not exceed 1 lb. To Denmark and places via Denmark, Greece, the Ionian Islands, New South Wales, and Queensland, the weight must not exceed 3 lb. every other case the limit is 5 lb.

A packet of patterns or samples sent to Portugal, Madeira, the Azores, Cape de Verds, France, or to Turkey, Syria, or Egypt, by French packet, must not exceed 18 inches in length, width, or depth; a packet to any other place abroad must not exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

Samples of intrinsic value must not be sent to foreign countries except the

United States.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS.-Letters may be registered to the colonies and to most foreign countries for a fee of 4d. To France, and countries via France, the registration fee is the same as the postage. Book packets, etc., for the colonies may be registered as such, but for most foreign countries must be paid letter rates.

SHIP-LETTERS, ETC.

Letters intended to be sent by private ship must be so addressed:—"By Private Ship,"-and if by a particular vessel, the name of the ship must be added. The ship postage, single rate, is generally 6d., with the following exceptions:—To Belgium, Norway, Canada, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Prince Edward Island, United States, and the British West Indies, 3d. every 1 oz., or part thereof; the Cape of Good Hope, Natal, St Helena, and Ascension, 4d. 1 oz.; to France, 3d. 1 oz.; to Holland, 8d. 1 oz. or part thereof. With the exception of Ascension, letters may be sent to the other places unpaid, and also to Azeres, Cape de Verd Islands, Ceylon, Falkland Islands, France and Algeria, Gambia, Gibraltar, Gold Coast, Hong-Kong, India, Lagos, Madeira, Malta, Mauritius, Portugal, and Sierra Leone,—but to all other places the postage must be pre-paid, 6d. per i oz. Letters for the Azores, Cape de Verds, Madeira, and Portugal, not wholly prepaid, are chargeable on delivery with an additional Postage of 2d. per 1 oz.; those for France and Algeria, 3d. 1 oz.; and those for the other places (except Hol-

land, which are not chargeable with any addition), one extra rate each; but to all other places prepayment is compulsory. Unpaid letters inward are charged in the same manner as unpaid letters outward. Newspapers by private ship to the Azores, Cape de Verd Islands, Madeira, Norway, and Portugal, must be prepaid 2d.each, per 4 oz., and to all other places 1d. each, per 4 oz. Book packets and packets of patterns must be prepaid the packet rates of postage.

LETTERS for non-commissioned officers, bandmasters, army schoolmasters (if not superintendents of schoolmasters, or schoolmasters of the 1st class), schoolmistresses, private soldiers, or seamen belonging to H.M. ships, whether serving on sea or on land, either in a British possession or foreign country, can be sent and received, under | oz., by direct packet or vessel of war for a postage of ld.; but if any such letters have to pass through a foreign country, they are subject in addition to the foreign rate. Marines and seamen serving abroad are allowed to prepay such of their letters as are conveyed in their ship's bag with English postage stamps.

SECTION V.

ABSTRACTS OF ACTS OF PARLIAMENT, ACTS OF ASSEMBLY, PARLIAMENTARY PAPERS, ETC.

STATUTES AFFECTING SCOTLAND,

PASSED IN THE SESSION OF PARLIAMENT 36TH AND 37TH VICTORIA, WITH ABSTRACTS OF THE PRINCIPAL ENACTMENTS.*

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PORTPATRICK HARBOUR AND LIGHT-HOUSE.

CHAP. 14. To repeal the Acts relating to the Harbour of Portpatrick in Scotland, and to vest the Lighthouse of Portpatrick in the Commissioners of Northern Lighthouses. May 15, 1873.

The object and effect of this statute are sufficiently indicated by the title.

EAST INDIA STOCK.

CHAP. 17. To provide for the Redemption or Commutation of the Dividend on the Capital Stock of the East India Company, and for the transfer of the Security Fund of the said Company shall be dissolved.

India Company to the Secretary of State in Council of India, and for the Dissolution of the East India Company. May 15, 1873.

The provisions of this statute do not properly fall within the province of this abstract. But the following clause is of some interest:—

(36.) On the 1st of June 1874, and on payment by the East India Company of all unclaimed dividends on East India Stock to such accounts as are hereinbefore mentioned, in pursuance of the directions hereinbefore contained, the powers of the East India Company shall cease, and the said Company shall be dissolved.

The abstracts have been made on the principle of abridging very considerably such provisions as regulate the conduct of official persons, who may be presumed to look for information to the Acts themselves; while those laws which affect the public in general have been abstracted with much anxiety to give a distinct though brief view of their application. The chapters affecting the appropriation of the revenue, and diplomatic matters, as well as the Mutiny and other annual Acts, though they may be said to apply to the inhabitants of Scotland as much as to the other citizens of the empire, are, for obvious reasons, omitted. The numbers within parentheses refer to the sections of the Acts.

CUSTOMS AND INLAND REVENUE.

CHAP. 18. To grant certain Duties of Customs and Inland Revenue, and to alter other Duties. May 15, 1873.

See tables of Customs and Excise

Duties and Income Tax.

(4.) Exempts, from and after 1st January 1874, any hotel-keeper, retailer of intoxicating liquor, or refreshment house keeper, from necessity of taking out a license, under 32 and 33 Vict. c. 14, for any servant wholly employed by him for the purposes of his business.

CROWN LANDS.

CHAP. 36. For making provision as to certain portions of Her Majesty's Woods, Forests, and Land Revenues, and for other purposes relating thereto. July 7, 1873.

(1, 2, and 3.) Apply to certain localities in England. Mining Leases -(4.) Power to the Commissioners of Woods and Forests, with consent of the Treasury, to grant mining leases for sixty-three years. This does not apply to gold or silver mines. Registration of Deeds in Scotland .- (5.) Provides for the registration of any lease, conveyance, deed, or document for behoof of the Crown. (6.) Evidence of Commissioners of Woods Reports to Parliament.-Printed copies of such reports to be evidence. General Saving .- (7.) Saving rights of private persons and others. Short title .- (8.) "The Crown Lands Act, 1873."

RAILWAY AND CANAL TRAFFIC.

CHAP. 48. To make better provision for carrying into effect the Railway and Canal Traffic Act, 1854, and for other purposes connected therewith. July 21, 1873.

Preliminary.—(1.) This Act may be cited as the Regulation of Railways Act, 1873. (2.) Act to come into operation on 1st September 1873. (3.) Definitions. Appointment and Duties of Railway Commissioners.—(4.) To carry into effect the provisions of the Act of 1854 and of this Act, the Crown is empowered to appoint not more than three Commissioners, and not more than two Assistant-Commissioners. One of the Commissioners shall be of experience in the law, and one of experience in railway business. The Lord Chancellor may, if he think

fit, remove a Commissioner for inability or misbehaviour. The Commis-sioners may act notwithstanding any vacancy in their number. The Assistant-Commissioners to hold office during the Queen's pleasure. Commissioners shall, within three months after their appointment, divest themselves of any interest they may have in railway or canal stock. They have three months given them to divest themselves of any interest in such stock which may accrue to them after their appointment. They may not, except with the consent of parties, exercise jurisdiction under this Act in any case in which they have any direct or indirect interest. Their whole time to be given to their duties. (6.) Contraventions of section 2 of the Act of 1854, of section 16 of the Act of 1868. or of this Act, may, at the instance of any person, or at the instance of the Board of Trade, be tried under this Act. For this purpose, the jurisdiction conferred upon Courts and Judges by section 3 of the Railway Traffic Act of 1854 is hereby transferred to the Commissioners appointed under this Act. (7.) After complaint lodged, the Commissioners are empowered, if they see fit, to give the railway or canal company an opportunity of explaining the alleged violation of the law before requiring or permitting any formal proceeding to be taken. (8.) Commissioners are made arbitrators to determine any differences which may arise between railway and canal companies, in lieu of any general reference to arbitration provided by statute. But for this section to take effect, one of the parties to the difference must require and the Commissioners must consent to it. This section does not apply where the statutory arbitrator is appointed by name or office, nor where the Commissioners are of opinion that the difference had better be determined by the standing arbitrator previously appointed under the provisions of some statute. (9.) Empowers reference of any difference to which a railway or a canal company is a party to the Commissioners, if the parties apply and the Commissioners assent. (10.) Transfers to the Commissioners the powers of the Board of Trade under Part III. of the Railway Clauses Act of 1863, or any special Act, with respect to the appro-

val of working agreements between | railway companies. Also the powers and duties of the Board of Trade under section 35 of that Act as to exercise by railway companies of their powers in relation to steam-Explanation and Amendvessels. ment of Law .- (11.) Enacts rules, and anthorizes through rates and routes to be made and agreed on by railway companies, subject to the approval of the Commissioners, for facilitating traffic, with the view of carrying out the purposes of section 2 of the Railway and Canal Traffic Act of 1854. (12.) Gives full powers to the Commissioners to declare that any proposed through rate is due and reasonable, though under the maximum rate which the forwarding company is entitled to charge. (13.) Complaints of contraventions of sect. 2 of Railway and Canal Traffic Act of 1854 may be made by a municipal corporation, or other local board, without proof that the complainants are aggrieved by the contravention. In such case, certificate by Board of Trade is necessary to support the complaint. (14.) Every railway and canal company must, at each station and wharf, keep a book open to public inspection, showing every rate charged for traffic other than passengers and their luggage, and stating distances to every place to which they book. Penalty for contravention not exceeding £5 a day for every day during which the offence continnes. (15.) Commissioners empowered to fix terminal charges, and to decide what is a reasonable sum for loading, unloading, collecting, and delivery, and other services of a like nature. (16.) Arrangements between railway and canal companies as to traffic rates or tolls require the sanction of the Commissioners, otherwise to be void. Publication of the proposed arrangement before such sanction is obtained. (17.) Railway company owning or having the management of a canal shall at all times keep the same in good order. Conveyance of Mails .- (18, 19, and 20.) Obligation to convey mails laid on every railway company, and its remuneration provided for. Regulations as to Commissioners. its (21.) Assistant-Commissioners to be subject to the orders of the Commis-Assistant-Commissioners sioners. may undertake arbitrations. (22.) in force for five years.

Salary of Commissioner not exceeding £3000 a year; of an Assistant-Commissioner, not exceeding £1500 year, as the Treasury may determine. (23.)Commissioners, with consent of Treasury, may call in the aid of one or more assessors, being persons of engineering or technical knowledge, who are to be paid by Treasury on recommendation by Commissioners. (24.) Commissioners may appoint such officers and clerks, with such salaries, as they think fit, with the sanction of the Treasury. (25.) HIGHLAND SCHOOLS.

CHAP. 53. To make better provision respecting certain sums payable to Schoolmasters of Highland Schools under the Act 1 and 2 Vict. c. 87, intituled, "An Act to facilitate the foundation and endowment of additional Schools in Scotland." July 28, 1873.

Preamble sets torth that under the statute above referred to—viz., the Highland Schools Act of 1838—a sum of £24,666, 10s. 4d. consols had been purchased by the Treasury, producing dividends out of which certain payments were made to the schoolmasters of certain parishes, as set forth in the schedule below.* These dividends are insufficient to pay these sums; and this insufficiency could have been supplied under the Act of 1838 had it not been repealed by the Scotch Edu-cation Act of last session. The repeal was subject to this proviso, that any sum payable to a schoolmaster under the Act of 1838 should continue to be paid to him so long as he holds the office of schoolmaster, and should thereafter be paid to the school board for the purposes of the school fund. The preamble farther sets forth, that no provision was made for the disposal of the said sum of consols, nor for meeting the insufficiency of the dividends thereon to pay the said sums, now that the Act of 1838 is repealed. (1.) Short title, "The Highland Schools Act, 1873." (2.) Sums in schedule to be charged on Consolidated Fund, and made payable to the school board of every one of the 30 parishes mentioned therein.

EXTRADITION ACT AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 60. To amend the Extradition Act, 1870. August 5, 1873.

(1.) This Act to be construed as one with the Extradition Act of 1870. (2.) Explains a doubt which had arisen upon the construction of section 6 of the Act of 1870. The said section applies to a crime committed before the passing of said Act. (3.) Explains a doubt. Any person accused or convicted of having counselled, procured, commanded, aided, or abetted, the commission of any extradition crime, or of being acessory thereto, before or after the fact, shall be deemed for the purpose of this and the Act of 1870 to be accused or convicted of having committed such crime, and shall be liable to be apprehended and surrendered accordingly. (4.) Statements on oath taken in a foreign state to mean and include affirmations taken in a foreign state. (5.) A Secretary of State may, by order under his hand and seal, require a police magistrate or a justice of the peace to take evidence (3.) Schedule first of Act of 1870 to be read as including list of crimes contained in schedule appended to this Act, which schedule specifies kidnapping, false imprisonment, perjury, subornation of perjury, and various offences indictable under the statutes 24 and 25 Vict. c. 96, 97, 98, 99, and 100; also any indictable offence in relation to bankruptey not included in first schedule of the Act of 1870.

LAW AGENTS IN SCOTLAND.

CHAP. 63. To amend the Law relating to Law Agents practising in Scotland. August 5, 1873.

(1.) Interpretation: "Law agent" shall include Writers to the Signet, Solicitors in the Supreme Courts, Procurators in any sheriff-court, and every person entitled to practise as an agent in a court of law in Scotland. (2.) No person to be hereafter admitted as a law agent except in accordance with the provisions of this Act. Once enrolled under this Act, he shall be deemed to be admitted, and be entitled to practise in any court of law im Scotland, after complying with sections 12 and 13 of this Act. (3.) On or before 1st Feb.1874, the heads of all the societies of law agents incorporated prior to the passing of the Procurators Act of 1865, shall deliver to the versity in Great Britain or Ireland

registrar of law agents appointed under this Act, certified lists containing the names and designations of all persons who are members of these societies. The registrar shall then enrol as a law agent every such person applying for enrolment, and grant certificate to the applicant that such enrolment has taken place. (4.) On or before said date, the sheriff-clerk of each county shall deliver to the registrar a certified list of all persons entitled to practise in the sheriff-court of such county, and not included in the lists referred to in the preceding section. On application, the registrar to enrol and grant certificate as above. (5.) Rules as to future admissions:-1. An applicant for admission as a law agent under this Act must be twentyone years of age, and must, except in the cases after mentioned, have served an apprenticeship of five years with a practising law agent or with a sheriff-clerk in office at the passing of this Act. 2. An apprenticeship entered upon after the passing of this Act must be served under indenture recorded in the Register of Probative Writs for the county, and intimated to the registrar appointed under this Act, within six months from the date at which such apprenticeship is to begin. Any assignation of such indenture shall, within six months, be intimated to the registrar. 3. Any existing apprentice, with or without indenture for a shorter term than five years, serving with a master qualified according to the existing law, may serve, without indenture, with the same or another master the additional period necessary to make up five years. When, from necessary or reasonable cause, the whole period of apprenticeship under an indenture cannot be completed with the master therein named, the remainder of the period may be completed with another qualified master. 5. A master may permit his apprentice to serve any part of his term, not exceeding two years, with another qualified master. Any of the following persons shall be qualified to apply for admission if he shall have served an apprenticeship as aforesaid for three years, viz., (a) one who has been for five years a practising law agent's clerk; (b) a graduate in law or arts of an uni-

to whom his degree has been granted | without necessity, however, to unafter examination; (c) a member of the Faculty of Advocates; (d) one who has been called to the degree of Utter Barrister in England; (e) an admitted and enrolled English attor-(6.) Every person, before admission as a law agent according to this Act, shall make affidavit that he has served an apprenticeship as required by this Act. (7.) Any person qualified as before provided may present a petition to the Court of Session, praying to be admitted as a law agent. Court to inquire whether such person is duly qualified and fit and competent to act as a law agent. On being satisfied, the Court shall cause the applicant to be admitted as a law agent, and his name to be enrolled as such. The admission shall be in writing, and be signed by one of the judges; it shall also be stamped as required by law. Petition for admission may be made to a single judge, who shall be entitled to act as the Court with reference to all petitions for admission as a law agent under this Act. (8.) To ascer-tain due service under indenture, as also fitness and capacity of any person to act as a law agent, it shall be lawful for the Judges of the Court of Session (or any seven or more of their number, of whom the Lord President and Lord Justice Clerk shall be two), from time to time to appoint examiners for the purposes of this Act. The Judges may prescribe the subjects of examination in law and general knowledge. Also, they may make rules for the conduct of such examinations, and for the entrance-examination of apprentices, intermediate examinations. (9.) Three examiners shall be a quorum. The examiners present shall appoint a chairman. Each applicant shall, prior to his examination, pay two guineas to the chairman, to be divided among the exam-(10.) During three iners present, years immediately following the passing of this Act, the Court may admit an applicant, although not qualified under this Act, provided he satisfy the Court:-1. That he was entitled to be admitted a procurator under the Procurators Act of 1865: 2. That he had qualified for an examination under that Act; in which case he shall be remitted change the same. Register to be kept in the office held by the registrar as principal, depute, or assistant aforesaid in the Register House. Registrar to be under directions of the Lord President and Lord Justice Clerk. (12.) Roll of agents practising in the Court of Session to be kept by the clerk of the Lord President in such form as the Lord President may direct. Every en-rolled law agent who has paid the stamp-duty exigible for practice in the Court of Session, shall be entitled to subscribe said roll, 5s. being payable to the clerk for each subscription. On subscribing said roll, every agent shall deliver to the clerk a note, specifying his place of business, and shall deliver a similar note so often as he shall change the same. (13.) Roll of agents practising in any sheriff-court to be kept by the sheriff-clerk in such form as the Lord President of the Court of Session may direct. Every enrolled law agent who has paid the stampduty exigible for practice upon a sheriff-court, shall be entitled to subscribe said roll, 5s. being payable to the sheriff-clerk for each subscription. On subscribing said roll, every agent shall deliver to the sheriff-clerk a note, specifying his place of business, and shall deliver a similar note as often as he shall change the same. (14.) The Lord

make rules for keeping and subscribing these rolls. The name of say person may be struck off in obedience to an order of the Court of Session, upon application duly made, and after hearing parties or giving them an opportunity of being heard; the name may be struck off upon the agent's own application. (15.) A law agent may not borrow a process depending before any Supreme Court sitting in Edinburgh, unless he shall have a place of business in Edinburgh or Leith. A law agent shall not be entitled to borrow a process depending before an inferior court, unless he shall have a place of business within the jurisdiction of such court. (16.) From and after 1st Feb. 1874, no person shall be allowed to practise as an agent in the Court of Session, or any sheriffcourt, until he shall have subscribed the roll of agents practising before such court, or after his name shall have been struck off such roll, unless the same shall have been subsequently restored thereto. (17.) An enrolled law agent who has paid the stamp duty for sheriff-court practice, shall be qualified to sign the roll of Court of Session agents, on paying the difference of stamp duty. (18.) Any enrolled law agent may apply to the Court of Session for admission as notary-public. Court may admit him, and grant warrant for his enrolment as such, on payment of the stamp duty. After the passing of this Act, it shall not be necessary for any person to find caution on his admission as a notarypublic. (19.) Any society of law agents may, not with standing any law, statute, or usage hitherto in force, admit any enrolled law agent to membership on such terms as he may see fit. (20.) Any society of law agents may accept a five years' apprenticeship served under this Act with an enrolled law agent not being a member of such society as a qualification for admission. (21.) Agreements between law agents acting for the same client to share fees or profits shall be lawful. A law agent authorized by and acting for a client whom he discloses, shall not incur liability to any other law agent employed by him, except such as he shall expressly undertake in writing. (22.) Every enrolled law agent shall

(25.) Repeals Procurators Act of 1865 from and after 1st Feb. 1874. Societies formed under that Act may continue to exist as incorporated societies. Not necessary for any agent admitted under this Act to become a member of any such society. (26.) Except in so far as relates to the striking the name of any person off the roll of law agents, nothing in this Act shall be held to affect the existing powers of inferior courts, or the judges thereof, over procurators practising before such courts, so far as these powers may be necessary for supporting the jurisdiction and maintaining the authority of their several courts.

MILITIA.

CHAP. 68. For extending the Period of Service in the Militia, and for other purposes. August 5, 1873.

(1.) Private men for the militia may, by voluntary enlistment only, without regard to quota, be recruited and enrolled for six years' service. A private in the militia may be reenrolled for six years from date of such re-enrolment. (2.) Form of oath: "I, A. B., do solemnly promise and swear that I will be faithful to Her Majesty Queen Victoria, her heirs and successors, and that I will faithfully serve in the militia, in any part of Great Britain and Ireland, for the defence of the same, until I shall be discharged." (3.) Militia recruits, during the period of their recruit training, when the militia battalions be subject to the jurisdiction of the to which they belong are not for the time being out for training and exereise, be subject to the command of such officers, whether of the militia or the regular forces, as may from time to time be appointed to serve with the force with which such These recruits are being trained. officers to be competent to sit on any court-martial appointed for the trial of any such recruit for an offence committed during the period of training. (4.) Repeals section 107 of 42 Geo. III. c. 90, and section 103 of 49 Geo. III. c. 91, also section 38 of 49 Geo. III. c. 120, as to the custody of arms and stores, and residence of non-commissioned officers when militia is not embodied. (5.) When commanding officer of a militia regiment is absent on leave, the command of such regiment shall devolve, without special authority from the Crown, in accordance with the usual custom of the service. (6.) Substitutes six years for five years in section 4 of Militia Reserve Act of 1867. (7.) Relates to Duchy of Lancaster only. (8.) Provides for reimbursement to any municipal borough of contribution to expense of barracks, etc.

BAILWAY REGULATION.

CHAP. 76. To make further Provision for the Regulation of Railways. August 5, 1873.

(1.) Enacts a short title, for "The Railway Regulation Acts, 1840, 1842, and 1873." (2.) Summary jurisdiction provided for the purposes of these Acts, under Summary Procedure Acts. (3.) Formal definition of "Board of Trade." (4.) On or before the 15th February in each year, every railway company shall make a return to the Board of Trade under the schedules annexed to the Act; this return showing in great detail the extent of the line open for traffic, and the precautions taken for its safe working. Default punishable by a penalty not exceeding £5 a day for each day the default continues. (5.) Where any person is proved to have been killed on a railway, the coroner in England, and in Scotland the procurator-fiscal, shall, within seven days, make a return to the Secretary of State of the death, and the cause thereof. (6.) Increased powers given Board of Trade to postpone opening

of a railway, until all requisitions made by the inspecting officer, with a view to the public safety, have been complied with, or until the Board is otherwise satisfied that such railway, or portion of a railway, can be opened with safety to the public.

ROYAL NAVAL ARTILLERY VOLUNTEER FORCE.

CHAP. 77. To provide for the establishment of a Royal Naval Artillery Volunteer Force. August 5, 1873.

PART I. ORGANIZATION OF ROYAL VOLUNTEER NAVAL ARTILLERY FORCE.-Acceptance of Service.-(1.) It shall be lawful for Her Majesty to accept the services of any persons desiring to be formed under this Act into a Royal Naval Artillery Volunteer Corps, and offering their services to Her Majesty through the Admiralty. On such acceptance, the proposed corps shall be deemed lawfully formed under this Act. manent Staff .- (2.) The Admiralty may from time to time constitute for any naval artillery volunteer corps a permanent staff, consisting of a naval officer, and so many seamen instructors as may seem fit. (3.) Any petty officer of the naval artillery volunteer permanent staff who enters into any engagement which, in the opinion of the Admiralty, is inconsistent with his duties as such petty officer, shall be deemed to have quitted the corps. Any petty officer quitting the corps must deliver up arms, clothing, and appointments in good condition. Money payable to him through the Admiralty may be stopped till he has repaid value of such arms, etc., not so delivered up. Officers and Volunteers.-(4.) Officers of a naval artillery volunteer corps to be commissioned by the Admiralty. (5.) Officers of this force to have the same rank with respect to officers of the royal navy as officers of the royal naval reserve, and to rank with officers of the royal naval reserve as the youngest of their respective ranks. Officers of this force, when not on actual service, shall not be entitled to exercise any command over any officers or men of the royal navy or marines or royal naval volunteers. When on actual service, such command not to be exercised by them otherwise than as provided by regu-

lation. (6.) Acceptance of a commission in this force by a member of the House of Commons not to vacate his (7.) Except when on actual service, any volunteer may quit his corps on complying with the following conditions, viz.:-1. Fourteen days' notice in writing to commanding officer: 2. Delivery up in good order of arms, clothing, and appointments issued to him: 3. Payment of all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of his corps. Thereupon, he shall be struck out of the muster roll by the officer commanding the corps. If, upon such notice, the commanding officer refuses to strike out the name from the muster roll. such volunteer, considering himself aggrieved, may appeal to some court of summary jurisdiction for the place in which the headquarters of the corps are situate. Such court, on being satisfied that the above conditions (Nos. 2 and 3) are complied with, may order the commanding officer forthwith to strike such volunteer out of the muster roll of his corps, and their determination shall be binding on all persons. (8.) If any volunteer enrols himself in the royal navy or marines, or in the royal naval volunteers, or as a volunteer or substitute in the militia, or is attested to serve on the permanent staff thereof, or enlists in Her Majesty's army, he shall be deemed discharged from the naval artillery volunteer force, and be struck out of the muster Arms, clothing, etc., to be delivered up by him, and money due, or becoming due by him, to be paid. Stoppage out of the bounty may be made to secure compliance with these requirements. General Command .-(9.) Volunteers of this force on duty to be under the command of the officers and petty officers of the royal navy. If circumstances admit, they are to be led by their own officers and petty officers under such command. Inspection .- (10.) Annual inspection of every volunteer corps shall be held by some officer appointed by the Admiralty. Efficiency .- (11.) Admiralty regulation to declare what is requisite to entitle a volunteer to be deemed an efficient volunteer. Such regulation to define extent, attendance at drill, course of instruction to be gone through, and proficiency to be attained by him and his corps; such proficiency to be judged of by the

inspecting officer at the annual inspection, or otherwise, as from time to time provided by regulation. Disbanding of Corps.-(12.) Admiralty may disband or discontinue the services of any naval artillery volunteer corps, or any part thereof, when deemed expedient. Administrative Organization .- (13.) The Admiralty may form two or more corps of this force into a brigade, and may constitute for such brigade a permanent staff. consisting of an officer, and so many seamen instructors as may seem fit. Officers of every such brigade to be commissioned by the Admiralty. Courts of Inquiry.—(14.) The Admiralty may at any time assemble a court of inquiry to inquire into any matter relative to any corps or brigade of this force, or to any officer or volunteer or any officer or petty officer of the permanent staff belonging thereto. Court to record facts and circumstances, and report the same to the Admiralty. When the inquiry relates to an officer, such court to be composed of officers either of the royal navy or of the naval artillery volunteer force, or partly of both. In other cases, the court to be composed either of such officers as aforesaid, and of volunteers belonging to the corps or brigade, or of such officers or of such volunteers. The commanding officer of a corps or brigade of this force may at any time assemble a court of inquiry, composed either of officers and volunteers belonging to the corps or brigade, or of such officers or of such volunteers, to inquire into any matter relative to the corps or brigade, or to any volunteer or petty officer of the permanent staff belong-ing thereto. But only a court assembled by direction of the Admiralty. and composed exclusively of officers as above provided, shall make inquiry with reference to an officer. Regulations.—(15.) Empowers the Admiralty to make regulations for government of the naval artillery volunteer force.

Part II. Actual Service.—
(16.) In case of actual or apprehended invasion of any part of the United Kingdom (the occasion being first communicated to both Houses of Parliament if Parliament is sitting, or declared in Council, and notified by proclamation if Parliament is not sitting), Her Majesty may direct the Admiralty to call out the naval artillery volunteer

corps, or any of them, for actual ser-Officers and volunteers to obey directions given under such call, but not liable except with their own consent to be employed otherwise than in ships engaged in defence of the coasts of the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, and Isle of Man, and on service on the seas adjacent. Refusal to obey call, except through bodily incapacity, to be deemed desertion. (17.) When a corps of this force is called out for actual service, the sum of two guineas shall be issued for the use of every officer and volunteer and officer and petty officer of the permanent staff. Such sum, under the direction of the commanding officer, shall be laid out in providing neces-saries, and its application is to be accounted for within a month. Unapplied residue to be paid to such officer, volunteer, and petty officer. Such officers, volunteers, and petty officers, shall be entitled to receive pay and to be victualled, and to allot a share of pay to wives and families, in like manner as the officers, petty officers, and seamen of Her Majesty's navy respectively. On release of corps from actual service, a guinea additional to pay to be paid to each officer, volunteer, and petty officer. (18.) Release of corps from actual service to be operated only by an order in writing from Admiralty to the senior officer under whose command the corps is serving. Admiralty to do this upon proclamation by the Queen that the occasion has passed away. Before release from actual service, the corps shall be returned to the place in which its headquarters were situated at the time that it was called out. (19.) An officer of this force, disabled on actual service, shall be entitled to half-pay, according to his rank. Widow of such officer killed on actual service, shall be entitled to the like pension for life as the widow of an officer of Her Majesty's navy. A volunteer or petty officer of the volunteer permanent staff, disabled on actual service. shall, according to his rank, be entitled to the like pension and other benefits, if any, as a petty officer or seaman of Her Majesty's navy.

PART III. DISCIPLINE. - Officers and Volunteers. — (20.) When this force is not on actual service, the commanding officer of the corps may,

discharge and strike off from the muster roll any volunteer for disobedience, neglect of duty, or other Such discharged vomisconduct. lunteer to deliver up arms, etc., in good order, and pay all money due or becoming due by him under the rules of the corps. If any volunteer of this force, when on board one of Her Majesty's ships or on march or duty with the corps or brigade to which he belongs or any part thereof, or being engaged in drill, or wearing the clothing or accoutrements of the corps, going or returning from any of Her Majesty's ships or place of drill, or being otherwise on duty, is guilty of disobedience or misconduct, he may be ordered into arrest if an officer, or into custody if not an officer. Arrest or custody to endure no longer than the corps or brigade is on duty. Arrest to be reported to commanding officer. Admiralty may for sufficient reason, after inquiry or trial, remove from the naval artillery volunteer permanent staff any officer or petty officer of such staff. Actual Service.—(21.) When on actual service, volunteers of this force shall be under the same rules of discipline in all respects as the officers and seamen of Her Majesty's navy, subject to this variation, that a court-martial appointed to try them shall be composed, partly at least, of officers of this force.

PART IV. RULES AND PROPERTY OF CORPS .- (22.) The officers and volunteers of this force may make rules for the management of the property of the corps, to be transmitted by the commanding officer to the Admiralty for approval; after which approval, these rules to be binding on all persons. (23.) Property of the corps to vest for all legal purposes in the commanding officer thereof. Civil or criminal proceedings taken by him under this section not to abate by his death, but may be carried on by and in name of his successor in office. (24.) Commanding officer to appoint a proper storehouse for the depositing and safekeeping of arms, ammunition, and stores. (25.) Provides for recovery of subscriptions and fines from any person belonging or having belonged to a corps of this force. The court of summary jurisdiction enforcing this section shall not order imprisonsubject to an appeal to the Admiralty, ment, unless satisfied that the de-

faulter has the money, and refuses or neglects to pay. (26.) If any member of this force shall designedly make away with, sell, pawn, or wrongfully destroy, or negligently damage, anything issued to him as a volunteer, or if he wrongfully refuses or neglects to deliver up such article en demand, he shall be liable, on a prosecution at the instance of the commanding officer, to restore the value, and also to pay a penalty not exceeding £5. (27.) Any one inducing a member of this force to sell or pawn arms, clothing, or accoutrements, or having in possession, without satisfactorily accounting therefor, such arms, etc., or any public stores or ammunition issued for the use of any corps or brigade of this force, shall be liable in a penalty not exceeding £20 for the first offence, and for any subsequent offence a penalty not exceeding £20 or less than £5, besides imprisonment not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour. (28.) Provides a summary remedy for non-delivery of arms, etc., on demand, by prosecution before a court of summary jurisdiction. (29.) Any one damaging butts or targets belonging to, or lawfully used by, any corps or brigade of this force, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5.

PART V. ACQUISITION OF LAND FOR RANGES.—(30.) Applies and extends for the purposes of this Act the provisions of the Volunteer Act of 1863, as extended by section 17 of the Regulation of the Forces Act of 1871.

PART VI. - EXEMPTIONS. - (31.) Members of this force to be exempt from militia service. Certificate of commanding officer to be conclusive evidence. (32.) Penalty not exceed-ing £200, on commanding officer giving a false certificate, to be recovered by action in the Superior Courts. (33.) Volunteers not to lose their interest in friendly or benefit societies by reason of their enrolment or service in this force. (34.) Officers and volunteers of this force being on march or duty, to be entitled to the same exemption from dues, tolls, etc., as any officers or seamen of the navy. The taking any toll or duty in contravention hereof, or the falsely and fraudulently obtaining an exemption under this section from toll or duty, to be an offence liable to a penalty not exceeding £5.

PART VII. - MISCELLANEOUS. -(35.) Provides for summary recovery of pecuniary penalties. In Scotland procedure to take place before the Sheriff under the Summary Procedure Act of 1864. (36.) Makes general provisions as to the manner in which such summary proceedings are to be conducted. (37.) Provides right of appeal when pecuniary penalty, including costs, exceeds £5, or imprisonment awarded exceeds one month. (38.) Applies to England only. (39.) Appeal in Scotland to be to the next Circuit Court of Justiciary, or to High Court of Justiciary when there is no circuit. (40.) No order or conviction to be quashed from want of form. (41.) Pecuniary penalty recovered on the prosecution of a commanding officer, to be paid to him, and to be applied as part of the general fund of the corps or brigade. (42.) Commanding officer may appear in any county court or court of summary jurisdiction by any member of the corps duly authorized by him in writing. (43.) Definition of terms. (44.) All the provisions of this Act relating to a brigade shall apply to any united body formed of two or more separate corps by authority of the Admiralty. (45.) This Act shall not extend to Ireland. (46.) Short title: "The Naval Artillery Volunteer Act, 1873."

TELEGRAPHS.

CHAP. 83. For explaining the Telegraph Acts 1868 to 1871, and for enabling a farther Sum to be raised for the purposes of the said Acts, and of the Pensions Commutation Act, 1872. August 5, 1873.

This statute is of a purely administrative and financial character, and need not therefore be included in this abstract. But it is interesting to note, as part of its preamble, the following passage: "And whereas an estimated sum of about £812,800, part of the Post-Office revenue, which ought to have been paid into the Consolidated Fund, has been improperly expended for the purpose of the said Telegraph Acts, and it is necessary that funds should be provided to make good to the said fund the sum so improperly diverted from it."

MERCHANT SHIPPING ACTS AMEND-MENT.

CHAP. 85. To amend the Merchant Shipping Acts. August 5, 1873.

Preliminary .- (1.) Short title: "The Merchant Shipping Act, 1873." (2.) To be construed as one with the Act of 1854 and amending Acts. Collective short title: "The Merchant Shipping Acts, 1854 to 1873." Registry (Part II. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854).—(3.) From and after 1st January 1874, every registered British ship shall have her name marked on each of her bows, and her name and the name of the port of registry shall be marked on her stern, on a dark ground, in white or vellow letters, or on a light ground in black letters; such letters to be of a length not less than four inches, and of proportional breadth. Official number, and number denoting her registered tonnage, to be cut on her main beam. A scale of feet, denoting her draught of water, shall be marked on each side of her stem and of her stern-post in Roman capital letters, or in figures, not less than six inches in length, the lower line of such letters or figures to coincide with the draught line denoted thereby. All this to be done to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade, who may, however, exempt any class of ships from the requirements of this section, or any of them. Inaccuracy in scale of feet showing ship's draught of water is punishable by a penalty on the owner, not ex-ceeding £100. Non-compliance with the provisions of this section to infer a penalty not exceeding £100. Fishing vessels lettered and numbered under Sea Fisheries Act of 1868 do not require to have their name and port of registry marked under this section. If any registered British ship be not within a port of the United Kingdom at any time before 1st January 1874, she shall be marked as required by this section within one month after her next return to a British port of registry subsequent to that date. (4.) The record of the draught of water of any seagoing ship under section 5 of the Act of 1871 shall, in addition to the particulars thereby required, specify the extent of her clear side in feet

height from the water to the upper side of the plank of the deck from which the depth of hold, as stated in the register, is measured, and the measurement of the clear side is to be taken at the lowest part of the side. Any person appointed to record the ship's draught of water, must have free access to the ship. The master of any sea-going vessel who impedes, or allows any one under his control to impede, any person so appointed in the execution of his duty, shall incur a penalty not exceeding £5 for each offence. (5.) Foreign ship becoming a British ship, must be registered under the name she last bore as a foreign ship, unless with the leave of Board of Trade. Penalty for contravention not exceeding £100. Where a ship has ceased to be registered as a British ship by reason of having been wrecked or abandoned, or for any reason other than capture by the enemy, or transfer to a person not qualified to own a British ship, such ship shall not be re-registered till surveyed by Board of Trade surveyor, and certified by him to be seaworthy. Masters and Seamen (Part III. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854).-(7.) Any agreement with a seaman under section 149 of that Act may, instead of stating the nature and duration of the intended voyage or engagement, as required by that section, state the maximum period of the voyage or engagement, and the places or parts of the world (if any) to which the voyage or engagement is not to extend. (8.) The owner or master of any vessel engaged in fishing off the coast of the United Kingdom, may agree with the men to remunerate them wholly by a share in the profit of the fishing. Such agreement to be in writing or partly printed, and to be signed in presence of a superintendent or deputy-superintendent of a mercantile marine office. Such official shall read and explain the agreement to parties, and certify that he has done so, besides attesting the signatures. (9.) If a seaman or apprentice belonging to any ship is detained on a charge of desertion, and the ship be proved to be unseaworthy, or not to have sufficient accommodation, the owner or master shall be liable to pay to such seaman or apprentice such compensation for his detention as and inches. "Clear side" means the the court having cognizance of the

proceedings may award. (10.) When the business of a mercantile marine office is conducted otherwise than under a local marine board, the Board of Trade may establish mercantile marine offices, and make provision for the holding of examinations for the purpose of granting certificates of competency. (11.) When a foreign government so desire, the Queen may, by order in Council, apply certain provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts, to be specified in such order, to the ships of such foreign state. Safety and Prevention of Accidents (Part IV. of Merchant Shipping Act, 1854).— (12.) When a ship is suspected of being unfit to proceed to sea without serious danger to human life, the Board of Trade may appoint a survey, and require a report. Such surveyor may require unloading of cargo, and shall have all the powers of an inspector under the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854. Any person obstructing him, to be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50. Board of Trade may order detention of ship, for the purpose of such survey. If report be that ship cannot proceed to sea without serious danger to life, the Board may order detention of the ship, and make such farther order as may be necessary. Copy of order to be delivered to the owner or master. Ship detained under this section, not to be released by reason of her British register having been closed. (13.) If report or survey be unfavourable, owner to pay costs. If report be the other way, Board of Trade shall be liable to pay compensation for de-tention. When a complaint is made to the Board of Trade that a ship is not fit to proceed to sea, they may require the complainant to give security for costs of survey, and for the compensation which the Board may be called on to pay. complaint have been made without reasonable cause, the complainant shall be liable to the Board to make good any costs and sums the Board may have had to pay by reason thereof. All sums payable by the Board, under this section, shall be paid out of moneys to be provided by Parliament. (14.) If the owner of any ship surveyed under this Act is dissatisfied with any order of the Board of Trade made upon such

to the court of the sheriff of the county. The court may, on such application, appoint one or more competent persons to survey the ship The court may make orders anew. as to the detention of the ship, and payment of costs and damages. (15.) At the request of the owner, the Board of Trade may authorize re-duction of number of boats required by section 292 of the Shipping Act, and also substitution of rafts, or other appliances for saving life. (16.) In case of collision, it shall be the duty of the master of each vessel, so far as he can safely do so, to stay by the other vessel and render assistance. He must give the master of the other vessel the name of his own vessel, and of her port of registry. failure, the collision shall be pre-sumed to have been caused by his wrongful act or default. Such failure, without reasonable cause, to be deemed a misdemeanour inferring cancellation or suspension of certificate. (17.) In cases of collision, any infringement of the provisions of the Merchant Shipping Acts shall infer that the ship committing such infringement is in fault, unless it be shown to the satisfaction of the court that the circumstances of the case justified such infringement. (18.) Signals of distress. In the daytime: 1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute; 2. The International Code signal of distress, indicated by N.C.; 3. The distant signal, consisting of a square flag, having either above or below it a ball, or anything resembling a ball. At night: 1. A gun fired at intervals of about a minute; 2. Flames on the ship (as from a burning tar barrel, oil barrel, etc.); 3. Rockets or shells, of any colour or description, fired one at a time at short intervals. If such signals be displayed by a ship not in distress, the master shall be liable to pay compensation for any labour undertaken, risk incurred, or loss sustained, in consequence of such signal having been supposed to be a signal of distress. (19.) Signals for a pilot. In the day-time: 1. To be hoisted at the fore, the Jack or other national colour usually worn by merchant ships, having round it a white border one-fifth of the breadth of the flag; or, 2. The International Code pilotage signal, indicated by survey, he may apply (in Scotland) P.T. At night: 1. The pyrotechnic

light commonly known as a blue light, every fifteen minutes; or, 2. A bright white light, flashed or shown at short or frequent intervals, just above the bulwarks, for about a minute at a time. If a ship displays any of said signals for any other purpose than that of summoning a pilot, or uses any other signal for a pilot, the master shall incur a penalty not exceeding £20. (20.) These rules as to signals are liable to be altered or repealed by order in Council. (21.) Private code of signals may be registered with the Board of Trade, if approved by them. Public notice to be given thereof to prevent mistakes. (22.) When there is reason to apprehend that a ship has been wholly lost, a written and detailed notice by owner or ship's-husband to be sent to Board of Trade. Failure to do so within a reasonable time shall infer a penalty not exceeding £50. (23.) If any one sends or attempts to send, or not being master or owner carries or attempts to carry, in any British or foreign vessel, any aquafortis, vitriol, naphtha, benzine, gunpowder, lucifer matches, nitro-glycerine, petroleum, or any other goods of a dangerous nature, without distinctly marking their nature on the outside of the package containing the same, and giving written notice of the nature of such goods, and of the name and address of the sender or carrier thereof, to the master or owner of the vessel, at or before the time of sending the same to be shipped or taking the same on board, such offence shall infer a penalty not exceeding £100. If the party prosecuted shows he was merely an agent, and did not suspect the dangerous nature of the goods shipped by him, the penalty shall not exceed £10. (24.) Enacts a penalty not exceeding £500 for wilful misdescription of dangerous goods to be carried by a British or foreign vessel. (25.)Master or owner suspecting a package to contain dangerous goods may refuse to take it on board, and may require it to be opened to ascertain the fact. (26.) Master empowered to throw overboard any dangerous goods brought on board, and not (27.) Any marked as aforesaid. court having Admiralty jurisdiction may declare the forfeiture of any dangerous goods brought on board in contravention of the provisions of

this Act. (28.) Reserves any action that may be taken under the Dangerous Goods Acts. Miscellaneous and Repeal.-(29.) When, in accordance with the Foreign Jurisdiction Acts, Her Majesty exercises jurisdiction within any port out of Her Majesty's dominions, it shall be lawful, by order in Council, to declare such foreign port to be a port of registry for British ships. (30.) Authorizes fees for measurement, inspection, and survey of ships. (31.) Board of Trade may take legal proceedings (31.) Board of in the name of any of their officers. (32.) Certain sections of this Act not to come into operation till 1st Nov. 1873. (33.) Repeals sections 29, 33, and 38 of the Act of 1862; sections 4, 9, and 10 of the Act of 1871; and sections 327 and 329 of the Act of 1854.

SLAVE TRADE.

CHAP. 88. For consolidating with Amendments the Acts for carrying into effect Treaties for the more Effectual Suppression of the Slave Trade, and for other purposes connected with the Slave Trade. August 5, 1873.

This is an Act to be construed as one with the Slave Trade Act of 1824. It consolidates the provisions of various Acts made in consequence of treaties entered into with divers countries for the suppression of the slave trade. It provides for the visitation of suspected slave ships by our cruisers, and defines the equipments which are prima facie evidence of a vessel being engaged in the slave trade. No jurisdiction is given to any Scotch court for the purpose of enforcing any of its provisions. A "British Slave Court," as defined by the Act, means the High Court of Admiralty of England, every Vice-Admiralty Court out of the United Kingdom, and the East African Courts within the meaning of the Slave Trade (East African Courts) Act of the present session.

GAS AND WATER FACILITIES.

CHAP. 89. To extend and amend the Provisions of the Gas and Water Works Facilities Act, 1870. August 5, 1873.

(1.) Short title: "The Gas and

Water Works Facilities Act, 1870, Amendment Act, 1873." (2.) Interpretation. (3.) This Act applies when any amended Act is required referring to the illuminating power and maximum price of the gas, and the pressure at which it is to be supplied. (4.) Subject to the provisions of this Act, provisional orders amending a special Act may be obtained from the Board of Trade, on application made prior to 15th Feb. 1874. (5.) The undertakers or local authority intending to make application for a provisional order shall publish notice of their intention, by advertisement, during the thirty days preceding their application, in terms of schedule, and deposit certain documents specified in schedule, on or before the fifth day after the last publication of such advertisement. (6.) The Board of Trade to determine upon (7.) Board of Trade application. empowered to make provisional order, of which the operation is to be limited | to the metropolis.

to such period, not exceeding two years, as the Board may therein prescribe. (8.) Provisional order, duly signed, shall be conclusive evidence of every fact and circumstance necessary to authorize the making thereof. (9.) Provisional order to be published by advertisement. (10.) Board of Trade to procure a bill to be introduced into Parliament to confirm the provisional order, which shall be set out at length in the schedule to the bill. (11.) Costs to be paid by the persons applying for such order. (12.) Board of Trade empowered to revoke, amend, extend, or vary provisional order, by a farther provisional order to be made and confirmed in like manner. (13.) Authorizes and regulates inquiries by the Board of Trade for purposes of Gas and Water Facilities Act, 1870, and this Act. (14.) Board of Trade empowered to make rules. (15.) Act not to extend

ABSTRACTS OF LEADING CASES

IN THE SUPREME COURTS,

From the Beginning of the Winter Session 1872-73, to the End of Summer Session 1873.*

OWNERSHIP OF ROOF OF HOUSE DI-

Dunlop v. Taylor, Nov. 1, 1872.

Conveyance of the upper storey of a common tenement carries the right of property in the roof as an essential

part thereof.

This was held in a case in which the original owner of the whole tenement conveyed to A "all and whole the second or upper flat of the tenement," and thereafter to B the whole area and buildings thereon, excepting the second or upper flat previously conveyed to A. Between the ceiling of the upper tenement and the roof there was a space not expressly conveyed to any one, and capable of being converted into attics.

A having claimed the right to convert this space into attics as part of his house, B objected, on the ground that this space was vested in himself by the tenor of his title.

The Court, applying the above general principle, allowed A's claim, the Lord President (Inglis) dissenting, on the ground that there was no conveyance of the intermediate space to A, and that the only person who has the roof is he whose house is formed by the roof, whereas there was no one here in that position.

All the Judges held that the obligation expressly laid on A to uphold the roof was not decisive of this

question.

BANKRUPT—TRUST—SPECIFIC APPRO-PRIATION.

Macadam v. M'Cutcheon, Nov. 5, 1872. Money received by a law agent from a client for investment in a specified security, and paid by him into his bank deposit account (but distinguishably from his own funds) for interim safe custody till completion of the investment, is so appropriated by trust and specific destination, that in the law agent's bankruptcy the trustee cannot claim it as part of the bankrupt's funds divisible among his creditors.

PATERNITY-BASTARDY.

Brodie v. Dyce, Nov. 29, 1872.

Clear evidence to the satisfaction of the Court, that de facto a husband has not had intercourse with his wife, and cannot therefore be the father of his wife's child, is sufficient to rebut the presumption pater est quem nuptiæ demonstrant.

BANKRUPTCY - PRIVATE TRUST-ARRESTMENT.

Nicholson v. Wright, Dec. 6, 1872.

Where a private trust becomes reducible by notour bankruptcy (in this instance absconding from diligence) occurring within sixty days thereafter, arrestments used within a few days before and after the notour bankruptcy in the hands of the private trustee, by a non-acceding creditor, give him a preference in a sequestration occurring more than four months after such notour bankruptcy.

Here the private trust was dated 22d November 1870. The truster absconded from diligence on 3d December. The non-acceding creditor arrested in the hands of the private

trustee on 26th November and 5th December. The sequestration was

on 18th April 1871.

Under the combined effect of the recent Act and the old statute of 1696, the private trust was dissolved by the supervening notour bankruptey, without the necessity of a reduction; and the non-acceding creditor's arrestments in the trustee's hands were thereby made valid. These arrestments, again, were protected from the equalizing effect of the 12th section of the recent Act by the lapse of more than four months between the notour bankruptcy and the sequestration.

EDINBURGH BOYAL INFIRMARY-VOTES OF FIRMS-COMPOSITE VOTES.

Walker v. Law, Dec. 10, 1872.

By virtue of usage, a firm subscribing to a sufficient amount may, through one (and only one) of its partners, vote without written mandate at a meeting of contributors to the Edinburgh Royal Infirmary; and a joint contribution confers a vote on each individual contributor when the sum, divided by the number of persons, brings out a qualifying contribution for each.

The Royal Infirmary of Edinburgh received a charter of incorporation from the Crown in 1736. Its administration was farther regulated by statute passed in June 1870. Both in the charter and in the statute members of the incorporation are spoken of as "persons" and as "contributors." One payment of £5, or three successive annual payments of £1, are sufficient to give membership.

On proof of usage the Court determined as above in favour of firms and joint-contributors; leaving over the question whether the partner of a firm, qualified to vote by the contribution of his firm, is also capable of being elected as a manager.

PROMISSORY NOTE WITHOUT A PAYEE.

Duncan's Trustees v. Shand, Jan. 7, 1873.

A holograph document, duly stamped, signed, and delivered, in the following terms-"I promise to pay on demand the sum of £100, value received "-is of no avail to the sheriff-clerk pro hac vice.

receiver thereof as a promissory note; nor can the receiver's address, after his death and after production of the document in process, be filled in by his executors.

REPARATION-FELLOW-SERVANT.

Leddy v. Gibson and Co., Jan. 18, 1873.

A seaman has no action against the shipowner for injury done to him by the fault of the captain.

The Court held that both master and seaman are fellow-servants ("collaborateurs") under one employer, the owner, who is therefore not liable for injuries done to the one by or through the fault of the other.

INSURANCE-GOOD FAITH.

Life Association of Scotland v. Foster, Jan. 31, 1873.

Where a party insuring his own life denies untruly, but honestly, to the insurers that he has a particular disease, of which he thereafter dies,

his policy is good.

In this case, the insured, a lady, had a swelling in her groin, which, if examined by a medical man, would have indicated to him the existence of rupture. The swelling gave her no inconvenience or pain at the time the insurance was effected. answered the insurance company's inquiries in perfect good faith, as she attached no importance whatever to this swelling. One of the diseases enumerated in the query, to which she returned a negative answer, was rupture. She insured in May 1871, and died of rupture in November following. The validity of her policy was sustained on the ground, in fact, that her answer was made in good faith, and did not in law guarantee the non-existence of that disease. as it might have done had she been proposing to insure the life of a third party.

SHERIFF-CLERK.

Macbeth v. Troy and Innes, Feb. 8, 1873.

Where a sheriff-clerk sues an action in his own court, neither he nor his depute can act as clerk to the process. The proper course is to apply to the sheriff to appoint a AGENT AND PRINCIPAL-COMPEN-SATION.

Matthews v. Auld and Guild, Feb. 19, 1873.

Dealing with an agent as such, though the principal's name be undisclosed, precludes the party so dealing from pleading in defence against the principal a counter-claim due by the agent.

CONFLICT OF STATUTES.

Black and Others v. Edinburgh Tramways Co., Feb. 21, 1873.

Where a tramway is laid down in conformity with the parliamentary plan referred to and embodied in the special Act of Parliament authorizing the line, it is nevertheless illegal, if it be inconsistent with a provision made for the public safety in a prior general Act incorporated therewith.

The Lord President dissented from this decision, observing that the provision in the General Tramways Act was no more than a direction to the Board of Trade, to be observed by them in framing provisional orders for the sanction of Parliament.

[Decision reversed by the House

of Lords on 8th July.]

AGENT AND PRINCIPAL-BILLS-FORGERY.

Union Bank of Scotland v. Makin and Son, March 7, 1873.

Where a principal authorizes his agent to make bills, and guarantees a bank against any loss in the course of his doing so, he is liable to the bank for bills forged by his agent, there being nothing in the circumstances to awaken any suspicion on the part of the bank when the bills were presented for discount.

FRU CONTRACT - MINERALS - PUBLIC POLICY.

Henderson and Others v. Andrew, March 10, 1873.

[House of Lords.]

The public law of the land does not annul, but, on the contrary, up-

holds as valid and effectual a contract whereby the full owner of land, including minerals below and surface above, grants a feu of the surface, and takes the feuar bound to erect thereon and keep in repair a dwellinghouse of certain value, while he, the granter, yet reserves to himself the power of working out the whole minerals below, so as to leave no adequate support for the house to be so erected by the grantee, who is held to take the risk of the subsidence made possible by the working out of the minerals.

In this case it was held, contrary to the view adopted by the Court below, that such a contract had been entered into; and interdict was refused, which had been applied for by the feuar to prevent the minerals from being so worked as to endanger his dwelling-house by subsidence of

the surface.

LIBEL-ACTIONABLE WORDS.

Jameson v. Bonthrone, June 13, 1873.

It is not actionable to call a man

"a damned puppy."

Lord Deas, while concurring in the decision, observed that he was not prepared to say that the epithet "puppy" never can be actionable; and that a good deal would depend on the circumstances in which it was used.

LICENSING STATUTES.

Ashley and Others v. the Magistrates of Rothesay, June 20, 1873.

Under the licensing statutes, the magistrates may not alter the closing hour of licensed inns, hotels, and public-houses from eleven to ten o'clock throughout an entire burgh, by virtue of their statutory power to do this in any particular locality within a burgh.

In this case, the resolution of the Magistrates of Rothesay was expressely limited to a part of their burgh; but the boundary line was so contrived as to include every inn, hotel, or public-house in the burgh. The Court held that this was in excess of their statutory powers, and therefore illegal.

UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH—FRMALE STUDENTS.

Jex-Blake and Others v. The Senatus of University of Edinburgh, June 27, 1873.

Women are not admissible as students within the University of Edinburgh.

The Lord Ordinary (Gifford) de-

cided in favour of the women's claim. But this decision was reversed by a majority of the whole Court. The Lord President, being called as a defender in his capacity of Chancellor of the University, did not vote. Lords Justice-Clerk, Deas, Ardmillan, Jerviswoode, and Gifford, were on the one side; and Lords Cowan, Benholme, Neaves, Ormidale, Mure, Mackenzie, and Shand, were on the other.

The value of the imports from British Possessions was £79,372,853 in 1872. It was £72,944,418 in 1871, and £64,832,413 in 1870. It was £65,283,251 in 1862.

The value of the total exports of merchandise from the United Kingdom was £314,588,834 in 1872. It was £283,574,700 in 1871, and £244,080,577 in 1870. It was £166,168,134 in 1862. The value in 1872 shows an increase of £31,014,134 upon 1871; of £70,508,257 upon 1870; and of £148,420,700 upon 1862. The value of the total exports to foreign countries was £248,979,616 in 1872. It was £228,013,406 in 1871, and £188,689,245 in 1870. It was £120,744,247 in 1862. The value of the total exports to British Possessions was £65,609,218 in 1872. It was £55,561,294 in 1871, and £55,391,332 in 1870. It was £45,423,887 in 1862. The value of the exports of British and Irish produce was £256,257,347 in 1872. It was £223,066,162 in 1871, and £199,586,822 in 1870. It was £123,992,264 in 1862. It was equal to £8, 1s. 0d. per head of the population of the United Kingdom in 1872; to £7, 1s. 7d. per head in 1871; to £6, 7s. 11d. per head in 1870; and only to £4, 5s. 7d. per head in 1862. The value of the British and Irish produce exported to foreign countries in 1872 was £195,701,350; the value of that exported to British Possessions, £60,555,997. The value of the exports of Foreign and Colonial merchandise was £58,331,487 in 1872. It was £60,508,538 in 1871, and £44,493,755 in 1870. It was £42,175,870 in 1862. The value of the foreign and colonial produce exported to foreign countries in 1872 was £53,278,266; the value of that sent to British Possessions, £5,053,221.

The total value of imports into and exports from the United Kingdom, taken together, was £669,282,548 in 1872. It was £614,590,180 in 1871, and £547,338,070 in 1870. It was £391,885,110 in 1862. It was equal to £21,08.6d. per head of the population of the United Kingdom in 1872; to £19, 10s. 1d. per head in 1871; to £17, 10s. 10d. per head in 1870; and only to £13, 8s. 5d. per head in 1862.

The number of new vessels, British built, added to the register in the United Kingdom during 1872 was 910, viz.: sailing vessels 448, tonnage 65,454; steam vessels 462, tonnage 303,550. The number of vessels purchased from foreigners or the colonies and registered in 1872 was 167, viz.: sailing vessels 148, tonnage 67,184; steam vessels 19, tonnage 6567. 44 other vessels were added to the register, 31 being sailing vessels, tonnage 11,772, and 13 steamers, tonnage 2193. The number of registered vessels wrecked, broken up, or otherwise destroyed, was 907, viz.: sailing vessels 806, tonnage 229,157; steam vessels 101, tonnage 52,300. The number of registered vessels sold to foreigners or the colonies was 277, viz.: sailing vessels 185, tonnage 71,193; steam vessels 92, tonnage 42,476. 38 other vessels were taken off the register, 28 being sailing vessels, tonnage 3826, and 10 steamers, tonnage, 5320. In 1872 the number of sailing vessels registered decreased by 396, and the tonnage by 159,224 tons; the number of steam vessels registered increased by 291, and the tonnage by 218,527. The number of vessels built in the United Kingdom in 1872, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, was 911, tonnage 392,971 tons; of which 408 were sailing vessels, tonnage 54,967 tons, and 503 were steam vessels, tonnage 338,004 tons. The number of vessels built in the United Kingdom in 1872 for foreigners was 151, tonnage 81,747 tons; of which 19 were sailing vessels, tonnage 3790 tons, and 132 were steam vessels, tonnage 77,957 tons, 4 steamers, tonnage 40 tons, being war vessels. The number of vessels built in British Possessions, first registered in 1872, was 675, viz.: 636 sailing vessels, tonnage 122,724, and 39 steam vessels tonnage 2565 tons. The number of steam vessels registered at London was 782, tonnage 391,770; at Liverpool, 525, tonnage 378,467; at Glasgow, 376, tonnage 185,873; at Hull 193, tonnage 188,493 tons 376, tonnage 185,873; at Hull, 193, tonnage 138,493 tons.

THE CUSTOMS.

The Seventeenth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs on the Customs is for the year 1872. It is observed that, as to the exports of the year, the quantities show an increased demand abroad for British produce, and the values show that some of the commodities exported have commanded advanced prices; but that, as to the imports, though the values have been kept up by the rise in prices and show no diminution, the quantities show that trade has not progressed in 1872 as it did in the two

previous years.

The total value of the British and Irish exports in 1872 (£256,257,347) exceeded by 14.8 per cent. (£33,191,185) those of 1871, and by 28 per cent. (£56,670,525) those of 1870. The prices of all the principal articles exported rose in 1872; those of cotton yarn, and cotton and linen manufactures, very slightly; those of linen and woollen yarn, and woollen and worsted manufactures, more decidedly; those of iron and iron manufactures, very considerably; while the wholesale export price of coal rose from 9s. 71d. in 1870 and 9s. 94d., in 1871, to 15s. 92d. in 1872, an increase of 62 per cent. The value of exports to foreign countries in 1872 (£195,701,350) was 13.9 per cent. above their value in 1871, and 32 per cent. above the value of 1870. The value of exports to British Possessions in 1872 (£60,555,997) was 18 per cent. above the value in 1871, and 16.8 per cent. above their value in 1870. [See Imports and Exports, p. 190, et seq.] In exportation to foreign countries, the principal increases took place in the case of Sweden (80 per cent.), Chili (56.6 per cent.), Norway (34.7 per cent.), Peru (32.9 per cent.), Portugal and dependencies (31.1 per cent.), Turkish dominions, excluding Egypt (26.1 per cent.), Japan (23.8 per cent.), Brazil (19.9 per cent.), United States (19 per cent.), Greece (19 per cent.), Denmark (17.6 per cent.), Germany (15.3 per cent.), Spain and Canary Islands (15 per cent.), Holland (14-9 per cent.); and there were small increases in the case of Belgium, Italy, Egypt, and Russia. Very large increases in the exportation to Germany, Holland, Belgium, and Spain took place in 1871. The large increase in the value of exports to Sweden took place on the articles coals, iron, machinery, woollens, and hardware. The value of exports to the United States reached the vast amount of 401 millions. Almost all the principal articles of export to the United States showed an increase in 1872, and the only important articles on which there was a decrease were haberdashery and millinery, old iron, and silk manufactures. The only three great foreign countries the exports to which showed a falling off in 1872 were France (decrease 5:15 per cent.), Austria (decrease 7:38 per cent.), and China (decrease *06 per cent.). There was an enormous rise in the exports to France in 1871 consequent on the termination of the war with Germany (61 millions), and it is surprising that the decline in 1872 should have only been a million. Of the increased value of the exports to British Possessions (£9,305,784) the exports to Australia account for £4,089,691 (an increase of 40 per cent.), and those to India for £993,599 (an increase of 4.7 per cent.). The values of the exports to all the other British Possessions (with four trifling exceptions) showed an increase in 1872. The exports to the Cape of Good Hope increased by 63 per cent.; those to the Dominion of Canada by 24 per cent.; those to other North American Colonies by 13 per cent.; and those to the British West India Islands by 13 per cent. The only article of importance of which the quantity exported fell off in 1872 was linen yarn, an article in the first stage of manufacture, which showed a decrease of 13.9 per cent. The increase in the quantity exported of iron and steel manufactures was 6.7 per cent; but on pig iron there was an increase in the quantities exported of 26 per cent., and an increase in the value of 108 per cent. The increase in the quantity of coal exported was 36 per cent.; and the increase in the value was 67 per cent.

The total value of our exports of Foreign and Colonial produce fell from £60,508,538 in 1871 to £58,331,487; but the value in 1872 was higher than that in any previous year except 1871. The decrease is explained by the resumption of direct communication between France and foreign markets.

There was a decrease in our export of the following articles of foreign and colonial produce:—cocoa, coffee, wheat and wheat flour, copper (unwrought), cotton (raw), cotton manufactures, currants, palm oil, flax and rape seed, silk (raw), silk manufactures, spirits, spices, sugar (refined and unrefined), and tea. The exportation of foreign and colonial produce to the United States has gone on increasing. The value of this export was £2,970,695 in 1870; £4,465,136 in 1871; and £5,171,401 in 1872.

The total value of our exports, British and Irish, and Foreign and Colonial, in 1872 (£314,588,834), was 11 per cent. above the corresponding value

(£283,574,700) in 1871.

The value of our imports in 1872 (£354,693,624) was 7 per cent. (£23,678,144) above the value of 1871, and 17 per cent. above the value of 1870. In 1872, as in the three preceding years, the increase in the value of our imports was below the increase in the value of our exports of British and Irish produce, the rate in 1872 having been 7 per cent. for the former, against 14 per cent. in the case of the latter. The increase in our imports from foreign countries in 1872 was £17,249,709, or 6.6 per cent.; in our imports from British Possessions it was £6,428,435, or 8-8 per cent. was an increase in the value of our imports from 34, and a decrease in the case of 29 foreign countries. There was an increase of our import trade in the case of Sweden, Norway, Denmark, France, Portugal, Spain, Asiatic Turkey, Egypt, China, Japan, Central America, Foreign West Indies, Peru, Chili, and Brazil; and a decrease in the case of Germany, Holland, Belgium, Italy, Austria, Greece, European Turkey, and the United States. The greater part of the increase in the value of our imports (nearly 12 millions) was due to France. The value of our imports from France was £29,848,488 in 1871, and £41,798,005 in 1872. It was, however, £37,607,514 in 1871. The decrease in the value of our importations from the United States (61 millions) and Germany (£321,000) is explained by the very large increase there had been in either case in the previous year; over 10 millions in the case of the United States, and nearly 4 millions in the case of Germany. Of British Possessions, 21 showed an increase, and 11 a decrease in 1872. The imports from all our most important colonies showed an increase in values. There was an increase in the quantities imported of corn and flour, potatoes, hemp and jute, sugar (refined and unrefined), tea, wine, wood and timber; a decrease in the quantities imported of coffee, cotton (raw), flax, silk (raw), spirits, tobacco, and wool. There was an increase in the quantities entered for home consumption of all dutiable articles except spirits not sweetened (decrease 32.7 per cent.), and sugar unrefined (decrease 1 per cent.), but the increase was in general not considerable.

The value of merchandise transhipped in the United Kingdom in 1872 having been £13,896,760, the value of gold and silver bullion imported, £29,608,012, and that of gold and silver bullion exported, £30,335,861; the total value of our export, import, and transhipment trade in 1872 was £743,123,091, being an increase upon 1871 of £45,273,679, or 6.5 per cent.

The net customs revenue was £20,167,846 in 1871, and £20,626,088 in 1872, showing an increase in 1872 of £458,242. The gross customs revenue, including the receipt from British spirits when housed in customs warehouses, was £20,534,848 in 1871, and £20,927,863 in 1872, showing an increase in 1872 of £393,015. The payments out of revenue on account of drawbacks and repayments (£301,775 in 1872) were less in 1872 than in 1871 by £65,227. There was a loss, owing to the reduction of the duty on coffee and chicory, estimated at £243,105, and a gain, due to increased consumption of dutiable articles, of £636,120.

The rate per cent. of the charges of collection on the gross produce of the customs revenue of the United Kingdom, as above stated, was £3, 10s. 9d. in the financial year 1871-72, being a decrease upon the rate in the previous year, £3, 11s. 1d. The rate per cent. of collection on the net produce was £3, 11s. 10d. in the financial year 1871-72, against £3, 12s. 5d. in the previous

The gross receipt of customs revenue (amounting, without including the duty on customs goods delivered out of excise warehouses, to £20,538,548) was divided among the different ports as follows:—London, £9,785,126; Liver-

pool, £3,030,843; other ports in England, £3,279,709; ports in Scotland, £2,498,805; ports in Ireland, £1,944,065. The greatest increase occurred at the outports of England (£287,821); the next greatest at Liverpool (£155,259). While the Irish ports collectively showed an increase of £1344, London showed a heavy decrease, £238,447; and at the Scotch ports there was a falling-off of £3322.

The revenue from British spirits collected by the Customs Department in 1872, and handed over to the Inland Revenue Department, amounted to £2,702,456, being an increase on the previous year of £551,310. There was an increase in England of £235,456, in Scotland of £139,698, and in Ireland of

£176,156.

THE POST-OFFICE.

The Nineteenth Report of the Postmaster-General on the Post-office is

for the year 1872.

The number of post-offices in the United Kingdom was increased during the year by nearly 300, so that there are now upwards of 12,200, of which 870 are head-offices. The number of road letter-boxes was increased by over 700, making a total of nearly 8400. Thus the whole number of postal receptacles is now upwards of 20,600, as compared with about 14,800 ten years ago, and with little more than 4500 before the establishment of penny postage in 1840. In London alone there are now more than 1500 of such receptacles. At nearly 450 places, free deliveries were established for the first time in 1872; and at more than 800 other places the deliveries were extended in their area or increased in number. Measures for relieving rural messengers of part of their Sunday duty (by arranging for the performance of this duty on alternate Sundays by substitutes), and for diminishing, where practicable, the whole amount of Sunday labour, were carried into effect during the year. Many places were provided with day mail accommodation for the first time; and additional day mails were established between many other places. The day mail from London to Edinburgh and Glasgow was accelerated, so as to allow of the delivery of letters on the evening of arrival; and the day mail service to London, from Ipswich, Norwich, and Yarmouth, was also greatly improved. An important acceleration was made in the night mail to Perth, Dundee, and Aberdeen; benefiting by the way several towns in Fifeshire. A similar improvement was effected in the night mail from the north to the west of England; and the arrangement under which extra night mails are despatched to many places, and an early delivery obtained for a great number of letters posted at late hours, was much extended.

Letters, Post-Cards, Newspapers, and Book-Packets.—The number of letters in 1871, as stated in the Report for that year, was nearly 915,000,000; but after that report was written, grave doubts arose regarding the accuracy of some of the returns on which the statement was made; and a strict examination showed that the real number was probably about 870,000,000. Beginning with the last quarter of 1872, such a system of check-counting has now been established, as will in future bring to light any considerable error which a postmaster may make in his return. The same remarks apply to the numbers of post-cards, newspapers, and book-packets; which were respectively entered in the Report for 1871 at 75,000,000, 99,000,000, and 103,000,000. In future Reports, it will be possible to state the numbers of letters, post-cards, etc., with confidence. The numbers are not stated for 1872. In compliance with the urgent solicitations of the committee of wholesale and retail stationers of the United Kingdom, permission was given, under certain restrictions, for private cards, impressed with a halfpenny stamp at the Office of Inland Revenue and serving as letters, to pass through the post like post-cards issued by Government. But of this concession little use has been made. The privileges of the Inland Book Post are, it is stated, greatly abused. Not only letters, partly printed and partly written, which have no claim to be regarded as circulars, but letters, about which there cannot possibly be any mistake, are posted in large numbers, in halfpenny wrappers, contrary to the express regulations of the book post; a common notion on the part of the public appearing to be that because a letter may be sent for a halfpenny as a post-card, it may also be sent for a halfpenny as a book-packet. Such contravention of rules of course involves injury to the revenue, and cannot readily be detected. The Report draws attention to the enormous number of cases in which newspapers posted for transmission abroad are not forwarded, owing to their being insufficiently stamped, or their not being posted within eight days from the date of their publication, as required by the Post-office regulations. The number not forwarded for the latter reason was, in 1872, more than 100,000.

Returned Letters, etc.—The number of letters received at the Returned Letter Offices of London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, in 1872, was 3,906,185; in 1871 it was 3,601,959. In 1872, 107,593 letters were re-issued to corrected addresses, 3,359,215 were returned to the senders, 171,826 were returned unopened to foreign countries, 267,551 (a large portion of which were anonymous, and were refused, very many being valentines) could neither be delivered nor returned to the senders. The number of post-cards received at the offices was 296,710, of books, 2,187,134, and of newspapers, 891,752. About 88,000 of the undelivered letters contained property of some kind (being an increase of about 10 per cent. upon the previous year); and of these more than 300 had no address, although enclosing coin or bank-notes. The number of letters posted without any address-in, 1872 was upwards of 15,000. Upwards of 2700 valuable books were found unaddressed, owing to careless packing or weak envelopes, and more than 51,000 postage stamps were found loose in the different post-offices.

Compulsory Registration of Letters .- In his preceding Report, the Postmaster-General stated that he intended to ask the authority of the Treasury for making registration, which is now compulsory only in regard to letters containing coin, compulsory also in regard to letters containing bank-notes, jewellery, or postage stamps; unless these are so packed that their contents cannot be detected; and that, as a preliminary step, he had issued a notice urging the public carefully to fold, seal, and register all packets containing bank-notes or jewellery, and, besides careful folding, either to register all letters containing postage stamps or to keep down the number of such stamps by the use, when necessary, of stamps of considerable value. He states that this notice, though not altogether inoperative, had had little effect, and that he had felt obliged to obtain the authority adverted to from the Treasury. As an example of the heedlessness with which risks are sometimes run, he mentions that an unregistered letter, containing an uncrossed cheque for £500, was lately sent from a Scotch bank, and that the letter was stolen, and the cheque promptly cashed.

Telegraphs.—There was, during 1872, a large and steady increase of postal telegraphic business. The number of new offices opened during the year was 305, and the total number of offices open at the end of the year was 5400. The number of ordinary messages sent in 1872 was 14,858,000, being an increase of 3,098,000, or 25 per cent, upon the number in the previous year. The press messages in 1872 (excluding some sent as ordinary telegrams) contained more than 28,000,000 words, being an increase of 7,000,000, or 33 per cent., above the number in 1871. The total length of the postal telegraph wires at the end of the year was more than 105,000 miles, of which about 5000 miles were rented by private persons. In 1871 the total mileage was rather less than 88,000. The progress of the private wire system during the year was very satisfactory; for while it was estimated that the aggregate rentals for private wires in the year ending March 1873 would be £31,000, the actual amount was £38,000. It is stated that the prospects of the current financial year are still more satisfactory; and that already the aggregate rentals are at the rate of £39,000. The telegraph instruments at the end of the year numbered more than 7500; being an increase during the year of nearly 1200.

Money-Orders.—During 1872 nearly 270 additional money-order offices (serving also as savings banks) were opened; making the whole number upwards of 4600. The money-order system was, during the year, extended to India and Ceylon; and now, with a few minor exceptions, it is in full action between this country and all her colonies and possessions. It was also, in 1872, established with Italy. In May 1873 it was established with Paris, and it is hoped that this is a forerunner of its extension to the whole of France. In 1872 the number of inland money-orders issued in the United Kingdom was 13,984,189, against 12,062,886 in 1871, an increase of 16 per cent.; and the amount for which they were issued was £24,013,747, against £21,799,583 in 1871, an increase of 10 per cent. In England, the number

issued was 11,901,482, an increase of 16 per cent. upon 1871, and the amount was £20,375,179, an increase of 10 per cent.; in Scotland, the number was 1,164,629, an increase of 18 per cent., and the amount was £2,046,062, an increase of 15 per cent.; in Ireland, the number was 918,078, an increase of 14 per cent., and the amount £1,592,506, an increase of 10 per cent. The number of colonial and foreign money-orders in 1872, counting the issues both in this country and abroad, was 258,423 (viz., colonies 152,173, foreign countries 106,250), an increase of about 37 per cent.; and the amount for which they were issued was £1,005,936 (viz., colonies £633,927, foreign countries £372,009), an increase of nearly 30 per cent. These orders yielded a profit of nearly £9000, being an increase during the year of about £3500. The greatest amount of colonial business is with Canada, and the greatest amount of foreign business is with the United States. Owing to the great reduction in the commission on money-orders for small sums (which constitute a large proportion of the whole), the increase in the inland money-order business, instead of producing an increase of profit, has actually led to a diminution of profit. The estimated profit in 1872 (including about £3000 for unclaimed money-orders) was less than £10,000; whereas it was nearly £23,000 in 1871, and nearly £49,000 in 1870, the last complete year before the reduction in the rate of commission. In 1872 there was issued one money-order to every two persons in the population of England, to every three persons in Scotland, to every six persons in Ireland, and three to every seven persons in the United Kingdom.

Post-office Savings Banks.—The number of depositors in post-office savings banks (1,303,492 at the end of 1871) had risen at the end of 1872 to 1,442,448, an increase of 138,956. The amount of the deposits (£17,025,004 at the end of 1871) had risen to £19,318,339 at the end of 1872, an increase of £2,293,335. The number of depositors in post-office savings banks and old banks combined (2,707,570 at the end of 1871) had risen to 2,867,595 at the end of 1872, an increase of 160,025. By the closing of nine more of the old savings banks, the number of such banks was reduced to 480, and deposits amounting to upwards of £260,000 were transferred to the post-office. The number of deposits made in post-office savings banks during 1872 was 2,745,245, and the amount deposited was £7,699,916 (an average per deposit of £2, 16s. 1d.). The amount of interest credited to depositors, at the end of the year, was £430,079, an increase of about £53,000 on the previous year. The number of withdrawals was 933,975, and the amount withdrawn was £5,836,660 (an average per withdrawal of £6, 4s. 11d.). The average amount at the credit of each depositor was £13, 7s. 10d. The charges of management in 1872 amounted to £78,404, being Ss. 11d. per cent, on the funds in possession of the banks; and the average cost of each transaction was 5.1d., or, including postage, about 6d., as compared with about 1s. in the old savings banks. The total sum standing to the credit of the post-office savings banks on the books of the National Debt Commissioners at the close of 1872 was £19,559,804, and the balance in the hands of the Postmaster-General at the same date was £301,070; so that the total sum applicable to the payment of depositors at the close of the year was £19,860,874. The whole sum held by the post-office and old savings banks together, at the end of 1872, was nearly £59,000,000 against rather less than £56,000,000 at the end of 1871. The number of post-office savings banks in the United Kingdom at the end of 1872 was 4607; the number of post-office and old savings banks, taken together, was 5087. The proportion of the depositors in post-office savings banks and old savings banks combined, at the end of 1872, to the population was, in England and Wales, 1 to about 9; in Scotland, 1 to about 13; and in Ireland, only 1 to about 50.

Post-office Annuities and Life Insurances. — The number of immediate annuities subsisting at the close of 1872 in the United Kingdom was 2764, and the amount of the annuities was £45,810. The number of immediate annuities granted during the year was 1018, the purchase money was £97,269, and the amount of the annuities, £9870. The whole number of immediate annuities granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1872 was 2911; the

amount of the purchase money of those annuities was £528,661; and the amount of the annuities, £48,863. The increase in the number of immediate annuities was chiefly owing to the grant of annuities to masters and seamen of the mercantile marine, who had formerly contributed out of their wages 6d. a month towards the support of Greenwich Hospital. The number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money not returnable, subsisting at the end of 1872, was 117, and their amount £2194; the number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money returnable, was 158, and their amount £3086. Of the former, 16, on account of which there was paid £1024, and the amount of which was £342; of the latter, 22, on account of which was paid £1813, and the amount of which was £379, were granted in 1872. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money not returnable, granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1872, was 133, on account of which was paid £8667, and the amount of which was £2517. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money returnable, granted in the same period, was 241, on account of which was paid £11,689, and the amount of which was £4867. The number of contracts of life insurance entered into with the post-office, current at the end of 1872, was 3347; the amount insured was £255,789. The amount received during the year on contracts was £7420. The number of payments made on account of contracts during the year was 54, and the amount paid was £2184. The number of new contracts entered into during the year was 757, and the amount insured by them, £55,982. The whole number of contracts of life insurance entered into by the post-office, from the commencement of business on 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1872, was 3804, and the amount insured was £289,284. The funds applicable to payments under contracts of life insurance consisted, at the close of 1872, of £30,088, new £3 per cents. (average interest, £3, 5s. 7d.), £1152 reduced £3 per cents. (average interest, £3,5s. 1d.); and an uninvested balance of £736. The "English Life Table, No. 3, "for males," is the basis of the rate charged, the rate of interest being taken at 3 per cent. per annum. The expenses of management of the government annuities and insurances amounted to £1107, besides £510 of fees received on the grant of certain annuities.

Licenses.—The number of licenses issued in 1872 by the post-office, on behalf of the Board of Inland Revenue, was 1,037,608, of which 573,728 were for keeping dogs. The revenue produced was £485,439.

Force, Expenditure, and Revenue.—The following Table shows the force or numbers of persons employed in the post-office (exclusive of officers employed in the telegraphs and post-office savings banks, and distinguishing effective from pensioners or non-effective); the cost of collection and delivery, of management, and of money-order business; the cost of conveyance of mails (distinguishing conveyance by coaches, carts, and omnibuses from conveyance by railways and conveyance by ships and packets); and the total cost of the post-office service, in each of the years 1870, 1871, and 1872:—

In 1872 the cost of the manufacture of postage stamps, post-cards, and stamped newspaper wrappers, was £58,200; of stationery, £46,037; of buildings and repairs, rents, rates, taxes, fuel, and light, £164,308; of supply and repair of mail-bags and boxes, tolls, and ferryage, and other charges, £19,774; of the conveyance of mails over the Isthmuses of Suez and Panama, and in other foreign parts, £23,599. The staff of officers engaged exclusively on telegraph duties at the end of 1872, consisted of 19 chief-engineers and other superior officers, 5915 clerks, subordinate engineers, etc., and 3657 messengers: total, 9591.

The next Table shows the gross and net revenue of the post-office (distinguishing the gross revenue from letters, books, etc., the amount of commission on money-orders, and the produce of the impressed stamp on newspapers collected by the Inland Rev. Office) in the years 1870, 1871, 1872:

The gross revenue for 1872 includes £3502, the amount of unclaimed money-orders, formerly used in aiding officers of the department to insure their lives, but now paid into the Treasury. The impressed stamp on newspapers was discontinued on 30th September 1870. During the five years 1863-67, the average net revenue of the post-office was £1,298,507; during the five years 1867-72, it was £1,405,922.

THE POOR LAWS.

The Twenty-seventh Annual Report of the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor in Scotland, is for the year ended 14th May 1872.

During the year the number of parishes in Scotland in which assessments were levied for the relief of the poor was 800; and in 87 parishes the poor were relieved by means of voluntary contributions. In 24 of the assessed parishes, the assessment was made according to local usage. In 594 parishes the assessment was made equally upon owners and occupants respectively, and in 182 parishes there was a classification of occupants, in terms of the 36th section of the Act 8 and 9 Vict. c. 83.

Receipt and Expenditure.-The sum received from all sources for the relief and management of the poor was—in the year 1869-70, £908,063; in the year 1870-71, £900,197; and in the year 1871-72, £888,002. The sum expended during the year ended 14th May 1872, for the relief and management of the poor (including £4496 expended on buildings not being authorized poorhouses, and £47,984 expended on authorized poorhouse buildings), was £862,171. In the preceding year the expenditure for the same purposes was £882,106. There was thus a decrease in the expenditure of £19,935.

In the following Table are shown the amount and details of the poor-law expenditure in each of the three years ended 14th May 1870-72, together with the rate per head of the population, and the rate per cent. on the annual value of real property assessed to the property and income tax in 1856; also the averages of the same items for the last ten years:-

The rate per head of population is calculated for the two latter years on the census of 1871. The total expenditure in the year ended 14th May 1872 was less than it had been in any year since 1867. The rate per cent. of expenditure for 1872 on the annual value of real property for that year, as returned by the inspectors of poor, is £4, 18s. 04d. But this can only be regarded as an approximation.

Poorhouses .- The number of poorhouses on 1st August 1872 was 62 (with accommodation for 14,462 inmates), for 392 parishes, having a population of 2,353,663. The number of poorhouses in progress was 2, for 14 parishes, having a population of 53,778; so that, when the latter are completed, there will be 64 poorhouses, for 406 parishes, having a population of 2,407,441. The Board during the year approved of the rates for boarding paupers belonging to 169 parishes in the poorhouses of other parishes or combinations. The approval of such rates has to be asked for every year. There are 190 parishes, with a population of 475,503, which have a right to send paupers to poorhouses belonging to other parishes; but some of these are in combinations for proposed poorhouses, or propose to have poorhouses of their own. The population to which poorhouse accommodation was available was therefore 2,829,166. The number of poor receiving in-door relief was 9447 at 1st January 1870; 9359 at 1st January 1871; 8191 at 1st January 1872; 7984 at 1st July 1870; 7629 at 1st July 1871; 7144 at 1st July 1872. The number of poor who received in-door relief during the half-year (including readmissions) ended 31st December 1871 was 17,731, of whom 9540 were discharged, or died during the half-year. There were 8983 on the sick-list during the half-year, and 1109 died. The number of lunatics who were inmates of poorhouses during the halfyear was 1370; the number of children at school at 1st January 1871 was 1040. In the half-year ended 30th June 1872, the number of inmates in poorhouses (including readmissions) was 17.951, of whom 10,807 were discharged or died; the number on the sick-list was 8792, of whom 1214 died; the number of lunatic inmates was 1352; and the number of inmates at school at 1st July 1872 was 899. The average weekly cost per head of inmates of all the poorhouses of Scotland for food, fuel, clothing, light, and all other necessaries of maintenance, was, for the half-year ended 31st December 1871, 3s. 03d.; it was 3s. Id. in the half-year ended 30th June 1872. The average weekly expenditure per head of ordinary inmates for whom there was accommodation, in the poorhouse on account of salaries of officials, feu-duties, insurance, repairs, etc., was 93d. in the first half-year, and 93d. in the second; on account of estimated rent it was 73d. in the first, 81d. in the second half-year; on account of medical attendance. medicine, etc., it was 11d. in the first, and 11d. in the second half-year. The poorhouses in progress at 7th August 1872 were the Kirkintilloch Combination (3 parishes, with population, in 1871, 18,598), which will accommodate 90 inmates; and the Lauark Combination (11 parishes, with a population of 35.180 in 1871).

The Public Health Act.—The number of parishes in which, during the year

The Public Health Act.—The number of parishes in which, during the year ended 14th May 1872, money was received or expended under the Act was 542; in the year preceding it was 402. The total receipts were £31,258; of which £19,633 was derived from assessment, £70 from penalties, £468 from authors of nuisances, and £11,085 from other sources. The total expenditure under the Act amounted to £47,803. £6010 had been expended upon drainage; £10,933 on water supply; £3025 on removal of nuisances; and £27,883 on other purposes, including salaries. The sums stated do not represent the whole receipts and expenditure in Scotland for sanitary purposes, as in many places important sanitary operations have been carried on under the provisions either of local Acts or of the General Police Acts, and none of these operations are

embraced in the returns under the Public Health Act. The total expenditure under the Public Health Act, from the passing of the Act (15th August 1867) to the 14th May 1872, has amounted to £135,782; of which £26,343 has been expended upon drainage, and £42,299 upon water supply.

Number of Poor and Amount of Expenditure in each County.—The next Table shows the number of permanent and casual poor in each county (distinguishing the number of assessed and unassessed parishes) relieved during the years ended on 14th May 1871 and 14th May 1872, and the amount of money expended for their relief during the same period, distinguishing the amount for permanent poor from the amount for casual poor:—

Of the 99,329 poor on the roll or registered, during the year 1871-72, 30,547 were males, and 68,782 were females. Of the 37,390 casual poor relieved during the year, 16,122 were males, and 21,268 females.

Church Collections, Voluntary Contributions, and Mortifications.—The whole sum derived from church collections in assessed parishes during the year ending 14th May 1872, was £25,407, of which £10,278 is stated to have been expended on relief of the poor. Of this sum, however, £134 was handed over to the parochial boards. It would appear, therefore, that the sum of £10,144 derived from church collections was actually applied by the kirk-sessions to the relief of persons in their parishes who required assistance. "But these funds," the Report intimates, "are generally employed to afford aid to persons who have fallen into temporary difficulties, with a view to prevent them from becoming chargeable to the parish as paupers; and it is probable that few of the persons so assisted have also been chargeable to the

funds raised by assessment." The whole amount derived from voluntary contributions and church collections for the relief of the poor (not including the sum expended by kirk-sessions in assessed parishes) in 1872 was £14,330. The corresponding amount in 1871 was £15,105. The amount derived from mortifications and all other sources (assessments, voluntary contributions, and church collections excepted) in 1872 was £72,394. The corresponding amount in 1871 was £47,001.

Paupers in the United Kingdom.—The following Table shows (1.) the number of paupers (exclusive of vagrants) in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in the unions and parishes under boards of guardians in England and Wales, on the 1st of January in each of the three years 1871-73; (2.) the number of paupers in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in unions in Ireland at the close of the first week of January in each of the same years; and (3.) the number of paupers and their dependants (exclusive of casual poor) in receipt of relief in parishes in Scotland, on the 14th of May in each of the three years 1870-72.

The total amount of poor-rates received in England in 1872, including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £12,608,938 (the annual value of rateable property being £109,447,111), and the amount expended in actual relief of the poor was £8,007,463. The total amount of poor-rates received in Ireland in 1872, including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £838,579, and the amount expended in the relief and management of the poor was £868,820.

The total number of the insane in Scotland, on 1st January 1872 (exclusive of unreported lunatics placed in private dwellings and maintained from private resources, of whom the Lunacy Commissioners have no official cogni-

zance or control), is shown in the preceding Table.

Adding to the total shown in the foregoing Table, 3 lunatics (2 males and 1 female) maintained at the cost of prison boards, the whole number of insane persons of whom official cognizance was had at 1st January 1872, was 7849, and of these 1393 were maintained from private sources; 6405 by parochial rates; and 51 (criminal lunatics) at the expense of the State. On the 1st of January 1871, the corresponding numbers were 1860, 6318, and 51. There was thus, in 1871, an increase of 33 in the number of private patients, an increase of 87 in the number of paupers, and no increase in the number of criminal lunatics. The Commissioners estimate the number of unreported insane at nearly 2000, of whom the greater number belongs to the classes little removed from pauperism. In 1871, there was, in royal and district asylums, an increase of 18 in the number of private patients, and 37 in the number of pauper patients; in private asylums, an increase of 3 private and 17 pauper patients; in parochial asylums, an increase of 17 pauper patients; in lunatic wards of poorhouses, a decrease of 15 pauper patients; in training schools for imbeciles, an increase of 6 private and 2 pauper patients; in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, a decrease of 2 male and an increase of 2 female patients; and in private dwellings, an increase of 6 private and 29 pauper patients.

Since 1st January 1858, the number of lunatics officially known to the Board (excluding the inmates of idiot-schools, who are not certified as lunatics) has risen from 5794 to 7718. There has, since the same date, been an increase of 2199 in the numbers in royal and district asylums, a decrease of 387 in the private asylums, an increase of 337 in the parochial asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 25 in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, and a decrease of 250 in the number left in private dwellings. These figures show that, of the increase in the number of patients in public and parochial asylums, 2561, only 637 is due to the diminution of the numbers accommodated in private asylums and private dwellings. There has been since 1858 an increase of 1924 in public and parochial asylums ascribable to the growth of lunacy, or, at any rate, to the increased number of lunatics in asylums. The cost incurred for the accommodation of this number, calculated at the average rate of £150 per head.

amounts to £288,600.

There being no trustworthy information as to the number of private patients who have not been intimated to the Board, it is impossible to institute a comparison between the numbers of the private insane and of the pauper insane; but of the two classes resident in establishments at 1st January 1872, the proportion per cent. was 20 private and 80 pauper. At 1st January 1858, the proportion was 25 private and 75 pauper. On an average of the ten years 1863-72, of every 100 patients sent to asylums, 25 were private and 75 pauper. The ratios of recoveries and of deaths have been only slightly different in the case of private and of pauper patients; but a much larger proportion of private patients are removed unrecovered, the proportion in the ten years 1863-72 being 41.2 private and 58.8 pauper. There is, however, an increasing tendency to the removal of unrecovered pauper patients. Thus, the number removed was 225 in 1870 and 251 in 1871.

The number of pauper lunatics intimated in 1871 was 1415, of whom 1341 were sent to asylums, and 74 were left in private dwellings. On an average of the seven years 1865-71, of every 100 intimations 92.7 were sent to asylums, and 7.3 were left at home. Private lunatics already in asylums, who have become paupers, are reckoned among paupers whose insanity has

been intimated during the year.

In all Scotland, in the fourteen years 1858-71, 5.5 pauper lunatics were intimated for every 1000 of the population, which is equivalent to 39.0 per annum for every 100,000 inhabitants. The average was exceeded in the following counties, Aberdeen, Argyll, Dumfries, Edinburgh, Forfar, Haddington, Lanark, Perth, and Renfrew. In 1872 the proportion of females to every 100 males in the population of Scotland being 1096, and

the proportion of female paupers to every 100 male paupers 261.5, the proportion of female pauper lunatics to every 100 male pauper lunatics was 116.5. While the proportion of male to female pauperism shows a slight tendency to equalization, the proportion of male to female pauper

lunacy is nearly stationary.

Admissions, Recoveries, Deaths, in 1872.—During the year 1872, the admissions into establishments (excluding transfers) were 1866,—886 males and 980 females; the recoveries were 876,—380 males and 496 females; the deaths, 514,—270 males and 244 females. The statistics show a preponderance of admissions and recoveries in April, May, June, July, and August; and of deaths in November, December, January, Pebruary, March, April, and May. The last-mentioned months are those in which the mortality of the general population is highest. The number of deaths of both sexes is greatest in winter, but there is a greater tendency to death among female than among male patients in summer, and a less one in winter. Thus in the summer period, May to October, the deaths in 1872 were, males 108, females 110; while in the winter season, November to April, they were, males 162, females 134. The proportion of female recoveries is at all seasons considerably more favourable than that of the male recoveries. The death-rate of the Scotch asylums is much below that of the English asylums. In the 10 years 1861-70, it was 8:33 per cent. per annum of both sexes on the average numbers resident; while for the 12 years 1859-70, the corresponding rate of the English county and borough asylums was 10:85 per cent.

The subjoined Table (in continuation of similar Tables in former Almanacs) shows for each county, and for the whole of Scotland, the number of pauper lunatics chargeable on the 1st January 1872, and the total expenditure on account of pauper lunatics, and the average daily expenditure (exclusive of the cost of medical certificates, of transport to asylums, etc.) for each pauper

Of the expenditure shown in the preceding table, £4906 was, in 1871, contributed by the patient or his relatives. The tendency of this contribution is towards an increase. The total number of patients relieved during 1871 was 7417, and the average number of days of relief to each patient was 309.

The average annual mortality in the ten years 1863-72 was, in public asylums, males 8.8 per cent., females 7.9 per cent.; in private asylums, males 9.7 per cent., females 8.1 per cent.; in parochial asylums, males 11.2 per cent., females 9.0 per cent.; and in lunatic wards of poorhouses, males 8.7 per cent., females 7.4 per cent. The average annual mortality among pauper lunatics in private dwellings in the years 1862-71 was, males 5.4 per cent., females 5.8 per cent.

Fourteen deaths from accident or violence occurred in asylums in 1872, viz., seven from suicide, one from accidental drowning, one from a bone sticking in the throat, two from fractured ribs, one from fractured thigh-bone, one from suffocation in a fit, and one from perforation of gut by a syringe-pipe. Fractured bones and dislocations occurred in 21 cases, from falls in fits or by accident, or from struggles with other patients or attendants.

The number of lunatics reported as under judicial factors at 31st December 1872 was 289, of whom 196 were in asylums, and 93 in private dwellings.

At 1st January 1873, the number of patients in public and district asylums was 4660, males 2312, females 2348—private patients 973, paupers 3687; the number in private asylums was 341—males 132, females 209; the number in parochial asylums was 572—males 228, females 344; the number in lunatic wards of poorhouses was 653—males 291, females 362.

PRISONS.

The "Thirty-fourth Report on Prisons in Scotland, being (in continuation of the Reports of the late General Board of Prisons) the Twelfth Annual Report of the Managers appointed under the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act

The Report states that, while a portion of the prison of Ayr continues to be available for female convicts, a portion of the prison of Paisley has, since 14th May last, been available for male convicts. The accommodation for prisoners at the disposal of the Managers is now as follows: in the Penal Department of the General Prison at Perth, cells for 341 males and 372 females—713 persons, exclusive of the Hospitals, which, on an average, contained, in 1872, 17 males and 20 females—37 persons—in all, accommodation for 750 persons; in the Lunatic Department of the General Prison, accommodation for 40 males and 18 females—58 persons; in the prison of Ayr, cells for 96 female convicts; in the prison of Paisley, cells for 62 male convicts. The daily average number of prisoners throughout the year was, in the Penal Department of the General Prison, 716 (346 males and 370 females); in the Lunatic Department, 53 (36 males and 17 females); in Ayr prison, 89 females; in Paisley prison, 27 males—in all, 885 (409 males and 476 females). 14 lunatic male convicts, who had been convicted in Scotland, but were undergoing sentences of penal servitude in England, habeen brought to the General Prison during the year, on the approach of their period of discharge, with a view to arrangements for their disposal in Scotland. 6 prisoners in the 1 unatic Department, who had recovered their sanity, had been conditionally liberated during the year.

As bearing on the question of prison accommodation, it is remarked that,

while there has been an almost uniform increase in the number of criminal prisoners in the prisons of Scotland since 1861, the symptoms at the close of 1872 were still those of steady increase. In every quarter of 1872, the daily average showed an increase as compared with the corresponding quarter of 1871, the increase for each quarter being, March 168, June 124, September 222, December 116. The daily average of 1872 (2777) was, however, less by 366 than the daily average of 1849, the climax of a previous almost uniform increase. The average daily number of criminal prisoners was, during the quarter ended 31st March 1873, 2730, being an increase of 17 upon the corresponding period of 1872; during the quarter ended 30th June 1873, it was 2765, an increase of 116 on the corresponding period of 1872; during the quarter ended 30th September, it was 2768, a decrease of 134 on the corresponding quarter of 1872.

The Stipendary Manager of Prisons, besides his duties as superintendent of the collection and publication of the Judicial Statistics of Scotland, is now also charged with the registration of Habitual Criminals, under the Prevention of

Crimes Act, 1871.

The expenditure under the charge of the Prison Managers was, in 1872, as follows, management expenses, £1749; General Prison at Perth expenses (exclusive of fuel, light, rates, and taxes, now paid by the Board of Works), £17,601; maintenance of female convicts in Ayr prison, £2356; maintenance of male convicts in Paisley prison, £405; escort and conveyance of prisoners, £1643: total, £23,756. The amount of the Parliamentary grant received by the department in 1872 was £23,859. The outlay for material and implements for the manufacturing department of the General Prison, in 1872, was £4498. The amount of Exchanger extra receipts (profits of prisoners' labour, sale of old The amount of Exchequer extra receipts (profits of prisoners' labour, sale of old stores, etc.) paid over to the Queens Remembrancer was £5:97. The amount received at the General Prison from manufactured goods, was £8626, and the amount received on account of prisoners' labour in the prisons of Ayr and Paisley, and other miscellaneous receipts, was £550.

POLICE.

The Fifteenth Report upon the Constabulary of Scotland is for the year ending 15th March 1873. The Inspector of Constabulary, the Hon. Charles Carnegie (who, during the year, succeeded Colonel Kinloch as inspector) reports that the police of all the counties of Scotland is in an efficient state, and that of all the burghs, except the following, Annan, Ardrossan, Blairgowrie, Kelso, Kirriemuir, Maxwelltown, Pulteney town, and Wick. He thinks it desirable that there should be some legislative enactment to require -mall places, such as those reported inefficient are, either to combine with their counties or to maintain a sufficient force. The burghs of Alloa, Dumbarton, and Galashiels, also appeared to him to be under-manned, but he has not reported them inefficient, in the hope that before his next inspection they will bring their forces up to a higher standard. The burgh of Dunfermline, subsequently to 15th March 1873, added two men to its force; otherwise he should not have felt

justified in reporting its police as efficient.

During the year 1872-3, the police in the counties was increased by 32 men, and that of the burghs by 27 men. There were 201 changes in the counties and 503 in the burghs, a total of 704, being an increase of 95 upon the previous year. There were 474 resignations. The number of resignations is attributed to the prevailing high rate of wages, and to the system recently adopted by some of the English counties of recruiting their forces from the constabulary of

Scotland.

The Inspector states that, while in some of the counties the station-houses are in a very satisfactory state, in others there is much room for improvement, and that in some of the burghs they are very incommodious, especially in Perth, where they are not fit for the purpose for which they are used. He recommends that there should be an addition to the Secretary of State's circular on the subject of extra duties, stating for what duties payments in addition to salary may be made, and that this should be made clear, in particular, with respect to the office of sanitary inspector. He draws attention to the importance of establishing a police superanuation fund.

He remarks upon a system which prevails in two counties, Perth and Renfrew, of swearing in as special constables certain individuals, principally gameConstables Act, nor are they under the General Police Act, but they are sworn in by the justices under the Act 22d James VI., 1617. These men, though not in any way under the control or orders of the chief constable, have all the powers conferred on constables, not only under the Poaching Prevention Act, but under every other Act of Parliament. The Inspector thinks that this is a violation of the spirit of the General Police Act, which evidently intends that the chief constable is, subject to the orders of the Police Committee and the Sheriff, to have the complete command of the criminal officers of the county.

In addition to the numbers of the police given above, the River Tweed Commissioners pay for 23 constables in the counties of Berwick, Roxburgh, and Selkirk, and 9 constables are paid for by other fishery commissioners. There are also 32 constables paid for by companies and private persons, in terms of the 7th section of the General Police Act. Of the 150,706 persons apprehended or cited at the instance of the police in 1872, 106,743 were males and 43,963 were females; viz., in counties, 22,923 males and 4098 females; and in burghs 83,820 males and 39,865 females. Of the 94,565 persons convicted at the instance of the police in 1872, 69,879 were males and 24,686 were females; viz., in counties, 16,449 males and 2961 females; and in burghs, 53,430 males and 21,725 females.

The number of criminal prisoners in Scottish prisons at the close of 1871 was 2597 (1519 males and 1078 females). The number of prisoners received during the year 1872, not including cases of recommitment of the same individual, was 21,728 (15,352 males and 6376 females). The whole number of criminal prisoners in confinement during the year, including cases of recommitment, was 35,153. The number of criminal prisoners at the close of 1872 was 2736 (1588 males and 1148 females). The average daily number of criminal prisoners was 2709 in the first quarter of 1872; 2748 in the second

quarter; 2895 in the third quarter; and 2759 in the fourth quarter. The number of revenue prisoners in Scotland in 1872, imprisoned until payment of fine or penalty, was 23 (all males). There were no escapes from prison or recaptures in 1872. There were 4 cases of suicide.

Civil Prisoners.—The average daily number of civil prisoners in the prisons of Scotland in 1872 was 57 (52 males and 5 females). The total number of civil prisoners in 1872, including those in custody at the beginning of the year, was 647 (602 males and 45 females). The date of committal of the civil prisoner, who at the end of 1872 had been longest in prison in Scotland, was 10th March 1868. With the exception of a prisoner committed on 15th November 1869, all the other civil prisoners in prison at the end of 1872 had been committed during that year.

Current Yearly Expenses of County Prisons. - The expenditure under the prison boards of the several counties, chargeable on the general fund for current annual expenses, was, for the year 1872, as follows: - Aberdeenshire, £1918; Argyllshire, £762; Ayrshire, £3966; Banffshire, £317; Berwickshire, £305; Bute, £526; Caithness-shire, £337; Clackmannanshire, £457; Dumbartonshire, £939; Dumfriesshire, £763; Edinburghshire, £8439; Elginshire, £466; Fifeshire, £1699; Forfarshire, £3854; Haddingtonshire, £517; Inverness-shire, £1663; Kincardineshire, £389; Kinross-shire, £183; Kirkcudbrightshire, £447; Lanarkshire, North, £23,457; Lanarkshire, South, £2436; Linlithgowshire, £657; Nairnshire, £159; Orkney, £160; Peeblesshire, £281; Perthshire, £1435; Renfrewshire, £4276; Ross and Cromarty, £749; Roxburghshire, £698; Selkirkshire, £651; Stirlingshire, £1787; Sutherlandshire, £242; Wigtownshire, £555; Zetland, £214. Total, £65,716; of which there was paid for prisons, £46,289; for prisoners in prisons of other counties, £259; for removal of prisoners to government prisons, £727; for removal to reformatories and industrial schools, £207; for general management, £2644; for retired allowances, £943; for interest, £869; for miscellaneous purposes, £10,153; for materials and implements of work, £3620. The total receipts in 1872 were as follows: - From the assessment for current expenses, £44,269; from Exchequer for maintenance of prisoners, £5155; for maintenance of military, naval, and revenue prisoners, £345; for prisoners from other counties, £408; in reimbursement of expense of removals, £660; from sales of old prison stores, £139; from interest, £76; from other sources, £3153; from employers and purchasers of work, £6429. Total receipts for 1872, £60,638. balances at the credit of boards at 31st December 1872 amounted to £5263, and the balances at the debit of boards to £20,402.

Treasury Maintainance of Prisoners.—The amount of the accounts rendered by county prison boards to Exchequer for maintenance of convicted prisoners confined in local prisons who had been tried with a jury, or by the Sheriffs without a jury, when proceedings were conducted under Sheriffs' warrants, in the year ended 30th September 1872, was £5311, viz., Aberdeen, £185; Argyll, £99; Ayr, £251; Banff, £23; Berwick, £89; Bute, £65; Caithness, £35; Clackmannan, £64; Dumbarton, £66; Dumfries, £97; Edinburgh, £1019; Elgin, £55; Fife, £218; Forfar, £414; Haddington, £55; Inverness, £120; Kincardine, £58; Kinross, £28; Kirkcudbright, £51; North Lanark, £630; South Lanark, £251; Linlithgow, £98; Nairn, £15; Orkney, £3, 18s.; Peebles, —; Perth, £216; Renfrew, £436; Ross and Cromarty, £57; Roxburgh, £48; Selkirk, £57; Stirling, £270; Sutherland, £13; Wigtown, £42; Zetland, £50. The total given above included the following arrears: Bute, £99; Zetland, £18. No accounts have been rendered by the county of Peebles for ten half-years.

The returns for the Outer House of the Court of Session in 1871 were incomplete. Of the 829 final judgments delivered in the Outer House in 1872, 741 were on process initiated by summons, 44 on process initiated by petition, and 44 on process initiated by writ other than summons or petition. 368 followed on procedure requiring closed records, and 461 on procedure not requiring closed records. Of the 505 final judgments pronounced in the Inner House in 1872, 143 were on process initiated by reclaiming note, 160 on process initiated by petition, and 202 on process initiated by appeal or other writ. 323 were in proceedings initiated in the Inner House, 180 in proceedings brought from the Outer House, and 2 in proceedings otherwise brought before the Court. 136 were judgments on decisions pronounced in the Outer House, and of the decisions, 73 were adhered to, 7 were repeated but the grounds of decision altered, 40 were reversed, and 16 were partially adhered to and partially reversed.

In 1872, of the 8610 causes in dependence in the Sheriffs' Ordinary Courts, 5835 were on process initiated by summons, and 2775 on process initiated by petition or otherwise than by summons. The number of appeals from Sheriffs-substitute to Sheriffs in dependence at the commencement of the year was 168; the number of appeals received within the year was 1416. Total of appeals in 1872, 1584. 1350 appeals were decided in 1872; 87 were otherwise taken out of Court; 147 were in dependence at the end of the year. The number of judgments reversed on appeal was 306; the number affirmed was 869; the number neither reversed nor affirmed was 175. The number of applications for cessio bonorum in the Sheriffs' Ordinary Courts in 1872 was 147; and 104 of these were disposed of by extracted protection or decree for pursuer, 18 were otherwise removed out of Court, and 25 were in dependence at the end of the year. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Ordinary Courts was 8607 in 1871, and 8610 in 1872, it was 9163 in 1870. In the Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts in 1872, there were 11 reponings at the pursuer's instance, 67 at the defender's instance. Of the 780 primary decrees in fore, 56 were pronounced by the Sheriff and 724 by the Sheriff-substitute. The number of appeals from the Sheriff-substitute to the Sheriff was 195. The decision appealed against was affirmed in 147 cases, and altered in 31, while 3 appeals were withdrawn, and 14 were in dependence at the end of the year. 3 appeals to the Court of Session were in dependence during the year; of which 2 were withdrawn, and 1 was in dependence at the end of the year. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts was 3451 in 1872, it was 3649 in 1871, and 3880 in 1870.

In the Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts in 1872, there were 62 reponings on decrees in absence pronounced in the previous year at the defender's instance, and 34 of the decrees were reversed; there were 18 such reponings at the pursuer's instance, and 14 of the decrees were reversed. On decrees pronounced within the year, there were 477 reponings at the defender's instance, and 234 of the decrees were reversed; there were 207 at the pursuer's instance, and 140 of the decrees were reversed. Of the £142,548 claimed in causes decided by decree, £115,966 consisted of claims for debt, £8872 of claims of damages, £13,282 of claims made in sequestrations for rent, and £4426 of other claims. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts was 43,196 in 1872, it was 48,705 in 1871, and 60,976 in 1870.

In the Justice of Peace Small Debt Courts in 1872, the number of sales under pointings was 38; the principal sums in the decrees of pointings amounted to £78; the total expenses in decrees of pointings to £6; the free proceeds of the sales to £61; the total expenses of pointing and sale to £26; and the total of surpluses paid to debtors to £5, 3s. 3d. Of the £19,178 claimed in causes decided by decree, £18,063 consisted of claims of debt, £107 of claims of damages, and £1007 of other claims. The returns for Justice of Peace Small Debt Courts were incomplete in 1871.

V. JUDICIAL RECORDS.

(1.) Bankruptcy.

The number of bankruptcies in dependence in Scotland at the commencement of 1871 was 2408; the number awarded during the year, 490—total, 2898. The number awarded was 589 in 1869, and 555 in 1870. The total number in dependence was 2665 in 1869, and 2849 in 1870. The number disposed of in 1871 was 437, viz., recalled, 3; wound up by final division and discharge, 246; by composition, 141; by deed of arrangement, 22; otherwise wound up, 25. The time between awarding and discharge in 10 cases was 6 months and under a year; in 44, a year and under 18 months; in 39, 18 months and under 2 years; in 68, 2 years and under 3; in 34, 3 years and under 4; in 20, 4 years and under 5; and in 31 it was 5 years and upwards. Of the 490 bankruptcies awarded during the year, 96 were awarded by the Court of Session and remitted to Sheriffs, and 394 were awarded by Sheriffs of counties. The number of the bankrupts was 546, 442 in sole sequestrations, and 104 in joint or partnership sequestrations. Of the bankrupts, 374 were traders, 100 manufacturers, 22 farmers, 10 lawyers, 1 a medical practitioner, 1 a clergyman, 17 persons not acquiring income by any occupation, and 21 were of other descriptions.

In the 246 bankruptcies concluded by final division and discharge in 1871, the amount of gross estates, per inventory and valuation by trustees, was £421,646; the amount of the debts was £1,428,833; the amount of the sums recovered by the trustees during the period of the sequestration was £313,936. The amount of expenses was £74,288 (viz., allowances to bankrupts, £1217; trustees' commission, £15,096; law expenses, £22,957; miscellaneous expenses—ordinary, £9529; extraordinary, £25,488); the amount divided among the creditors was £239,592 (viz., secured creditors, £76,785; unsecured, £162,807); the amount of surpluses paid to bankrupts or their representatives, less overpayments made by trustees in certain sequestrations, was

£55.

(2.) Judicial Factories.

The number of bonds by judicial factors at 30th September 1870 was 829; in the year ended 30th September 1871, 109 bonds were lodged with the accountant-total bonds in accountant's hands during the year ended 30th September 1871, 938; of which 452 were by factors loco tutoris, 52 by factors loco absentis, 434 by curators bonis. The total number of bonds in 1869 was 947, and in 1870, 944. In 1871, in 131 cases the estate was wound up or the appointment recalled; the number of bonds remaining at 30th September 1871 was therefore 807. In the year ended 30th September 1871, 804 accounts were rendered; 132 were not rendered, as not being due before the end of the year; 2 due at that date had not been rendered within the year. The personal estate dealt with by judicial factors, ascertained and estimated, was £2,018,718; the value of the lands and heritages under their charge was not ascertained. The revenue of estates under judicial factors in the year ended 30th September 1871 was £192,486; the expenditure was £89,771, viz., on maintenance of wards, £69,115; factor's commission, £11,558; accountant's charges, £1275; law agent's charges, £7822.

(3.) Judicial Records kept at Edinburgh.

At the Register of Deeds Office, the number of entries in the presentment book was 2236 in 1870, 2365 in 1871, and 2603 in 1872. 2405 in 1872 were entries of original writs, and 198 second extracts of writs previously recorded. The fees received amounted to £4114 in 1870, £2759 in 1871, and to £3098 in 1872.

The number of protests entered in the Register of Protests on bills and notes was 525 in 1870, 468 in 1871, and 413 in 1872. The number of persons protested against was 569 in 1872; the amount of the sums protested for was £30,480 in 1872.

The number of certificates entered under 31 and 32 Vict. c. 54, in "The Register for English and Irish Judgments," was 9 in 1870, 15 in 1871, and 25 in 1872. 17 came from England and 8 from Ireland in 1872.

At the Register of Adjudications Office, the number of entries in the presentment book was 746 in 1870, 710 in 1871, and 564 in 1872. In 1872, 364 were mercantile sequestrations; 3 were for recovery of specified debts; and 197 were for other purposes. The amount of the specified debts was £2711. The fees received during the year amounted to £131.

At the Register of Inhibitions Office, the number of entries in the presentment book was 1074 in 1870, 1048 in 1871, and 950 in 1872. In 1872, 374 were mercantile sequestrations; 141 were for recovery of specified debts; and 435 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £237.

At the Register of Hornings Office, the number of entries in the presentment book was 252 in 1870, 234 in 1871, and 184 in 1872. The fees received in 1872 amounted to £31.

The business which passed through the Bill-Chamber in 1872 was as follows:—Suspensions, interdicts, and liberations, 168; bills for loosing arrestments, 11; petitions for sequestration under Bankrupt Act, 82; other petitions, etc., 149. Total of 1872, 410. Total of 1870, 1091; total of 1871, 386.

At the Register of Sasines Office, the number of entries in the presentment book during the year 1872 was 22,640. It was 15,901 in 1870, and 20,524 in 1871. The amount of fees received in 1872 was £33,766.

The whole number of registered protests on bills and notes (including those entered in the General Register stated above, along with those entered in district registers) in 1872, was 1871. It was 2648 in 1870, and 2165 in 1871. The whole number of persons protested against in 1872 was 2325; the amount of the sums protested for was £81,125.

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Sixteenth Report of the Inspector appointed, under the provisions of the Act 5 and 6 Will. IV. c. 38, to visit the certified Reformatory and Industrial Schools of Great Britain, is for the year 1872.

REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

The number of institutions certified under the Act 17 and 18 Vict. c. 86, in Great Britain, for the reformation of young offenders, on the 31st December 1872, was 65, viz., 45 (37 in England and 8 in Scotland) for boys only; 20 (16 in England and 4 in Scotland) for girls only. Of these 65 reformatories, 55 were Protestant (45 in England and 10 in Scotland), 9 were Roman Catholic (7 in England and 2 in Scotland), and 1 in England (the North-Eastern in Northumberland) received boys of both denominations. Of the 55 Protestant reformatories, 39 were for boys (32 in England and 7 in Scotland), and 16 for girls (13 in England and 3 in Scotland). Of the 9 Roman Catholic reformateries, 5 were for boys (4 in England and 1 in Scotland), and 4 for girls (3 in England and 1 in Scotland). The number of young offenders under sentence of detention in reformatories in Great Britain at the close of the year was 6562 in 1870, 6612 in 1871, and 6671 in 1872. The admissions for the year 1872 were 1725, viz., 1363 boys and 362 girls. Of those under sentence of detention at the close of the year, 22 were in prison, 119 were at large, having absconded, and 955 (817 boys and 138 girls) were out on license, preparatory to discharge; so that the number of actual inmates of reformatory schools was 5575 (boys 4424, girls 1151). The inmates, at the end of 1872, were distributed as follows: in English schools, 4501 (boys, Protestant, 2687, Roman Catholic, 914; girls, Protestant, 694, Roman Catholic, 206); in Scotch schools, 1074 (boys, Protestant, 636, Roman Catholic, 187; girls, Protestant, 162, Roman Catholic, 89). The number of new admissions in the Scotch schools in 1872, was 318 (boys, Protestant, 184, Roman Catholic, 72; girls, Protestant, 38, Roman Catholic, 24). It is observed, that the inmates of Roman Catholic schools, and of new admissions to them, are pretty regularly one-fourth of the whole number of inmates and of new admissions respectively. The Roman Catholics in England and Scotland are usually reckoned at about a twelfth of the population. The average population of the schools, it is said, may be regarded as nearly stationary. Several of the schools are short of their full complement of inmates. Of the 1363 boys received in 1872 into the reformatories of Great Britain, 24 were under 10 years of age, 248 between 10 and 12, 500 between 12 and 14, and 591 above 14. Of the 362 girls received, 2 were under 10, 40 between 10 and 12, 143 between 12 and 14, and 177 above 14 years old. 675 boys and 284 girls had not been convicted before, 518 boys and 67 girls had been once previously convicted, 123 boys and 6 girls twice, 31 boys and 3 girls three times, 10 boys and 2 girls four times, and 6 boys five times or upwards. The Inspector remarks that the proportion of offenders committed who are very young is increasing, as also the proportion of those committed who have not been previously convicted. or only convicted once. The number of discharges in 1872 was 1712 (boys, 1403; girls, 299). 665 were placed in service or employment in Great Britain, and 452 were placed out with the aid of relatives, 133 (of whom 9 were girls) emigrated, 252 went to sea, 22 enlisted, 49 died in the schools, 27 were discharged on account of disease or as incorrigible, 53 had absconded and not been recovered.

Of 3489 boys and 850 girls discharged from reformatories in the years 1869-71 (2773 boys and 650 girls from English, 716 boys and 200 girls from Scotch reformatories), 118 boys and 32 girls have died, 2446 boys and 598 girls were doing well, 104 boys and 93 girls were of doubtful character, 512 boys and 76 girls had been convicted, 309 boys and 51 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 74·3 per cent. of boys and 78·0 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 12·5 per cent. of boys and 2·3 per cent. of girls had been convicted, and 8·4 per cent. of boys and 6·0 per cent. of girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 69·8 per cent. of boys and 80·6 per cent. of girls were doing well, 3·1 per cent. of boys and 8·1 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 27·1 per cent. of boys and 8·1 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 27·1 per cent. of boys and 8·1 per cent. of girls makes and 3·2 per cent. of girls were unknown. The number of persons in prison in 1872 who were found to have been trained in a reformatory school was, in England, 387 (348 males and 39 females), and in Scotland, 127

(113 males and 14 females)-total, 514.

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The next Table shows, for each of the Reformatories certified in Scotland, the date of its certification, the average number of inmates, the average cost of the inmates per head for maintenance and management, for food, and for clothing, and the net cost per head, including rent and expenses of disposal, and deducting industrial profit, or adding industrial loss; also the amount of industrial profit or loss (the latter distinguished by the prefix —) at each reformatory, in the year 1872:-

The total expenditure upon Reformatories in Great Britain for 1872 amounted to £128,425. This included rent, £2816, cost of disposal £5834, building expenses £7172, and loss on industrial departments £121. Deducting the cost for buildings, and deducting also the industrial profits, the average cost per head for the year 1872 was:—English boys' schools, £18, 19s. 91d.; English girls' schools, £17, 16s. 31d.; Scotch boys' schools, £17, 6s. 81d.; Scotch girls' schools, £12, 19s. 31d.

The total receipts of reformatory schools in Great Britain in 1872 amounted to £131,024, made up as follows:—Treasury payments, £84,222; subscriptions, legacies, etc., £6960; contributions from rates, £19,232; contributions from voluntary associations, £202; sundries, £4460; profit on industrial de-

partments, £15,944.

CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The number of Certified Industrial Schools in Great Britain increased in 1872 from 95 to 100. The five new schools certified during the year were all in England. The number of children under order of detention at the close of 1872 was 10,905 (boys, 8130; girls, 2775). There were under order of detention in Protestant schools in England, 4097 boys, 1013 girls; in Roman Catholic schools in England, 1332 boys, 646 girls: in Protestant schools in Scotland, 2378 boys, 931 girls; in Roman Catholic schools in Scotland, 301 boys, 158 girls. 351 boys and 142 girls, however, were out on license, and 159 boys and 19 girls were absent from the schools, having absconded and not been recovered; the numbers actually in the schools at the close of 1872, therefore, were 7598 boys and 2587 girls, with 22 boys and 27 girls whose sentences were expired, and who were retained until employment could be found for them. The number admitted during the year, omitting transfers, was 2752-in England, 1544 boys and 427 girls; in Scotland, 592 boys and 189 girls. The discharges for the year amounted to 1970—boys 1545, girls 425. 583 boys and 241 girls were placed in service or situations, 362 boys and 107 girls were assisted to employment through their relatives, 55 boys and 7 girls emigrated, 287 boys were sent to sea, 27 enlisted, 21 boys and 8 girls were discharged on account of disease, 55 boys and 8 girls were committed to reformatory schools, 97 boys and 44 girls died, and 58 boys and 10 girls had absconded and not been recovered. Of the 141 deaths, 87 occurred in English and 54 in Scotch schools, a percentage of nearly 1.03 for the English and of 1.4 for the Scotch schools. Of the 2752 children admitted in 1872, 115 boys and 99 girls were from 6 to 8 years old; 415 boys and 132 girls between 8 and 10; 884 boys and 248 girls between 10 and 12; and 722 boys and 137 girls between 12 and 14 years old. 172 of the children were illegitimate; 285 had lost both, and 885 one, of their parents; 300 had been deserted by their parents; and one or both parents of 250 were destitute or criminal. Thus, of the 2752, only 860 had both parents living, and in a condition to take charge of them.

The number discharged from industrial schools during the years 1869-71 was 3053 (boys 2378, girls 675). 53 of the boys and 17 of the girls have died; 1670 boys and 491 girls were doing well, and 147 boys and 60 girls were doubtful, 192 boys and 15 girls had been convicted, and 316 boys and 92 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 72.3 per cent of the boys and 83.2 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 4.4 per cent. of the boys and 5.5 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 9.7 per cent. of the boys and 3.8 per cent. of the girls had been convicted, and 13.6 per cent. of the boys and 7.5 per cent. of the girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 62.8 of the boys and 82.9 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 15.4 per cent. of the boys and 1.4 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 11.5 per cent. of the boys and 4.3 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 11.5 per cent. of the boys and 11.4 per cent. of the girls were unknown. The Inspector thinks that these results are scarcely satisfactory, being scarcely equal to those of the

reformatory schools.

The total expenditure upon industrial schools in 1872, including rent, disposal, cost of building, and industrial loss (£101), was £222,066. The receipts amounted to £219,692, of which £120,535 was derived from the Treasury, £20,490 from rates, £47,380 from subscriptions, legacies, etc., £7503 from school boards, £6833 as payment for voluntary inmates, £5217 from sundries, and £11,731 from industrial profit. The average cost per head for maintenance and management, deducting for the results of the industrial departments, was in the English schools for boys only, £15, 18s. 10d.; in ships in England, £18, 6s. 2d.; in English schools for girls only, £14, 14s. 11d.; in mixed English schools for boys and girls, £13, 19s. 2d. In Scotland the average cust per head was, for boys' schools, £14, 4s. 8d.; ship-schools, £16, 5s. 10d.; girls schools, £12, 12s. 10d.; and mixed schools, £10, 10s. 1d.

The sums received by the Treasury during the year from the parents of children under detention, and for Scotch industrial schools from parochial boards, were—for reformatory schools, £4060; for industrial schools, £6966; total, £11,027.

EDUCATION.

The Report of the Committee of Council on Education shows that the expenditure in Scotland, during the year ended 31st March 1872, from the grants of the Committee of Council on Education, was, on schools connected with the Established Church, £71,323 (being an increase on the previous year of £7444); on schools connected with the Free Church, £42,106 (being an increase of £5520); on schools connected with the Episcopal Church, £5165 (being an increase of £651); on Roman Catholic schools, £4802 (being an increase of £348). For the estimated expenditure in the year ending 31st March 1874, see p. 240. The expenditure from the beginning of the grants in 1839 to the 31st March 1872, was, on schools connected with the Established Church, £920,281; with the Free Church, £640,277; with the Episcopal Church, £75,813; on Roman Catholic schools, £48,996.

The expenditure in *Great Britain* during the year ended 31st March 1872 was £1,107,430. The expenditure in Great Britain from 1839 to 31st March 1872 was £13,874,487. On schools connected with the Church of England it was £8,098,788; on British and Foreign Society schools, £1,327,305; on Wesleyan schools, £656,952; on Roman Catholic schools in England and Wales, £538,901; on Parochial Union (or workhouse) schools, £78,323; on inspection and admin-

istration, £1,445,625.

The number of day schools in Great Britain to which annual grants were made, visited by her Majesty's inspectors in the year ended 31st August 1872, was 11,833, containing 16,234 departments under separate teachers, and furnishing accommodation for 2,557,562 scholars. There were 1,832,811 scholars present at the inspection; the daily average attendance throughout the year was 1,549,707; 1,346,505 having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to bring grants to the schools, 378,561 without individual examination, and 967,944 on passing a satisfactory examination in reading, writing, and arithmetic; 791,511 were actually presented for examination, and

507,833 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects. There were on the registers of the inspected day schools 2,235,936 children, of whom 547,990 were under six years of age, 1,468,551 were between six and twelve, and 219,395 were above twelve. The inspectors visited 880 schools which do not comply with the conditions on which annual grants are made, and found 57,707 scholars present on the day of inspection. The night schools examined were 2122 in number; 69,794 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance in these schools each night; 75,537 were qualified for examination by having made 24 attendances during the night-school session of (at least) 40 nights; 60,157 night-school scholars were actually examined, and out of every 100 examined, 91-56 passed in reading, 82:32 in writing, and 75:95 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 17.337 certificated teachers in the aided schools which they inspected in the year ended 31st August 1872. There were, at 31st December 1872, actually employed in teaching in Great Britain, 18,073 certificated teachers (2663 in Scotland); 1407 assistant teachers (none in Scotland); and 25,581 pupil-teachers (3759 in Scotland). The inspectors visited 45 training colleges, having 3347 students in preparation for the office of schoolmaster or schoolmistress in February 1872. The number of students at normal schools or training colleges in February 1873 was 3651.

The expenditure under the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland, during the year 1872, was £503,958. The number of schools in operation at the close of the year was 7050. The average daily attendance of children for the year was 355,821; while the total number of children at any time on the rolls for the year was 1,010,148, of whom it was estimated that 80,893 belonged to the Established Church, that 804,222 were Roman Catholics, that 112,465 were Presbyterians, and 7911 of other persuasions. 8.04 per cent. were Episcopalians, 11:19 per cent. were Presbyterians, 79:98 per cent. were Roman Catholics, and 0.79 per cent. of other persuasions. The number of children enrolled fell off by 11,552, and the average attendance by 8029, in 1872. The decrease is ascribed to decrease of population and the prevalence of epidemics.

There were actually inspected in Scotland (on account of annual grants), in the year ended the 31st August 1872, 1306 schools (including infant and evening schools), containing 1399 departments, connected with the Established Church, having 141,118 children present at examination, 1659 certificated teachers, and 2195 pupil-teachers; 550 Free Church schools, containing 623 departments, having 67,634 children present at examination, 751 certificated teachers, and 1124 pupil-teachers; 58 Episcopal Church schools, containing 65 departments, having 5279 children present at examination, 64 certificated teachers, and 99 pupil-teachers; 65 Roman Catholic schools, containing 105 departments, having 13.910 children present at examination, 92 certificated teachers, and 223 pupil-teachers. (The results given are not to be taken as complete accounts of each denomination, being those of actual inspection only between 1st September 1871 and 31st August 1872). There were also visited during the same period, for simple inspection only, 39 Established Church schools, containing 39 departments, having 2833 children present at examination, and 2 certificated teachers; 8 Free Church schools, containing 8 departments, having 573 children present at examination; 1 Episcopal Church school, containing 1 department, having 24 children present at examination; and 3 Roman Catholic schools, containing 3 departments, having 153 children present at examination. The whole number of schools, i.e. of departments under separate head teachers, receiving annual grants in the year 1871-72 (including 78 day schools [institutions], and 3 evening schools not inspected during the year) was 2279. The number of certificated teachers employed in schools receiving annual grants, and in schools simply inspected, in Scotland in 1871-72 was 2655, and the number of pupil-teachers 3765. The number of those studying in training schools in Scotland in 1871-72 There was accommodation in annual-grant schools in Scotland for 291,632 scholars; the number present at examination in them was 227,941; the average attendance was 224,088; and the number presented for examination was 131,020,

In Scotland, in 1871-72, grants were made under the Code of 1860, but inspection and examination were conducted according to the Revised Code. In England the examinations in day schools were held under the Code of 1871; the examinations in night schools were held under the Code of 1870 up to the end of February 1871, and thereafter under the Code of 1871. The following

In England the average attendance of scholars was 1,336,158, the number of day scholars qualified by attendance for examination was 792,706, and the number presented for examination was 661,589. Regret is expressed at the largeness of the number who are not presented for examination, and also at the proportion of scholars examined in Standards 1-3 of the New Code.

In 1872 the expenditure of Church of Scotland Normal Schools was £11,097, of which £8234 was granted by the Privy Council; that of Free Church Normal Schools, £10,321, the grant being £8280; that of the Episcopal Normal School £1264, the grant being £987. The number of students resident, in February 1873, was:—In Church of Scotland Normal Schools, 364 (195 male and 169 female); in Free Church Normal Schools, 348 (129 male and 219 female); in the Episcopal Normal School, 43 (all females). There quitted the Church of Scotland Schools at the end of 1872, 168 students (81 male and 87 female). There quitted the Free Church Normal Schools 183 students (75 male and 108 female). There quitted the Episcopal Normal School 15 students (all female).

The Report states that the duties of the Committee in connexion with public Education in Scotland have come to an end, a separate Education Committee for Scotland having been appointed in terms of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, and a Board of Education having, under the same Statute, been temporarily established in Edinburgh, charged with the task of organizing the local machinery by which the means of instruction will be supplied to the people of Scotland. It will devolve upon the Scotch Education Department to report on the working of the New Code which has been adopted for Scotland, and on the mode in which the Act is carried out. The New Code for Scotland was adopted by the Scotch Education Department on the 22d May 1873, and was thereafter submitted to and approved of by Parliament. It regulates all annual grants made on applications received after 1st July 1873. Annual grants falling due on or before 1st August 1873 were to be paid according to the regulations previously in force in Scotland. Annual grants falling due at the end of each school year in the twelve months ending 31st August 1874, will be paid, at the option of the managers, either according to the Scotch Code, or according to the regulations previously in force. But if the managers of a school elect to receive grants according to the Scotch Code, they must undertake to pay in full, for the school year ending on or before 31st August 1874, the stipends, gratuities, and augmentation grants which would otherwise have been severally payable out of the parliamentary grant to the teachers and pupil-teachers employed in their school.

THE SCIENCE AND ART DEPARTMENT.

The Twentieth Report of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education upon the Science and Art Department is for the year 1872. The number of persons receiving instruction in science and art applicable to industry decreased from 38,015 in 1871 to 36,783. The number of persons instructed in

art increased from 212,501 in 1871 to 244,134, or nearly 15 per cent. The lectures at the South Kensington Museum were attended by 11,958 persons in 1872, or 2927 more than in 1871. There were in 1872, at the Royal School of Mines, 20 regular and 148 occasional students; at the Royal College of Chemistry, 212 students; at the Royal School of Naval Architecture, 35; and at the Metallurgical Library, 30 students. The evening lectures at the Royal School of Mines were attended by 2400 persons; and 186 science teachers attended special courses of lectures provided for their instruction in the new Science Schools at South Kensington. At the Royal College of Science, Ireland, there were 20 regular and 19 occasional students; and 2577 persons attended the courses of lectures delivered in connexion with the department in Dublin. The attendance at the evening popular lectures which were delivered in the Edinburgh Museum. of Science and Art, in 1871-72, was 1416. The total number of persons who received instruction as students, or by means of lectures, in connexion with the Science and Art Department in 1872, was nearly 299,000, a total exceeding that of the previous year by 28,000, or 10 per cent. The museums and collections under the superintendence of the department in London, Dublin, and Edinburgh, were visited in 1872 by upwards of 2,922,000 persons, showing an increase of 1,141,000 or about 63 per cent. on the number in the preceding year. The attendance at the Art and Educational Libraries at South Kensington, and at the Library of the Royal Dublin Society, reached a total of 56,586 in 1872, being 4777 more than in 1871. The returns of the number of visitors at various local Art and Industrial Exhibitions to which objects were contributed from the South Kensington Museum, showed an attendance of upwards of 574,000. The expenditure of the department, during the financial year 1872-73, exclusive of the vote for the Geological Survey, was £209,117, or £17,596 more than in 1871-72.

The area surveyed for the Geological Survey of the United Kingdom in 1872 was 3597 square miles, being 152 less than in 1871, and considerably less than the average of the four previous years. There had been four vacancies on the staff during the year. 2165 miles were surveyed in England and Wales, 764½ in Scotland, and 667½ in Ireland. In Scotland the amount of work completed considerably exceeded that of any previous year. The whole of the coal and iron fields in the centre of Scotland, including the coal-fields of the Lothians and Fife, of Sanquhar, Ayrshire, Renfrewshire, Lanarkshire, Stirlingshire, Linlithgowshire, and Clackmannan, have now been completely surveyed. The coal survey is to be continued in the southern counties of Scotland, so as to connect the work with that of the survey in the north of England. During the year five sheets of maps for Scotland were published, two upon the scale of one inch to the mile, and three upon the scale of six inches to the mile, the latter completing the map of the coal field of Ayrshire. There were sixty maps of parts of Scotland at the Ordnance Survey Office for engraving when the Report was written. The expenditure on the Geological Survey in the financial year 1872-73 was £21,385; the expenditure on the Scotch branch of the survey being £3638.

In the Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art, the arrangement of the specimens in the Industrial Department had been considerably advanced during 1872, and space had been provided by the occupation of a further portion of the new buildings, for the exhibition of many additional objects of interest which had previously been stored. The number of visitors to the Museum in 1872 was 314,848, being 30,913 more than in 1871. There were admitted, free of charge, by day, 145,357; in the evenings, 154,452; the number admitted on pay days was 15,039, and the amount of the admission fees was £375. The average attendance during the year was, on pay days, 100.2, and on free days, 1862.2. Six courses of scientific lectures to artisans were delivered during the winter of 1871-72. The expenditure on the Museum in the year ended 31st March 1873 was £8677; viz., salaries and wages, £2153; occasional assistance, £321; purchase of specimens, books, etc., £1791; repairs, fittings, etc., £2331; fuel and light, £1210; travelling expenses, £163; police, £427; incidents, £277.

The number of Science Schools—which, in 1871, was 908, with 38,015 persons under instruction—was, in 1872, 948, comprising 2803 different classes, with 36,783 under instruction. 19,568 students of these classes came up for examination in May 1872, besides 2110 self-taught students and pupils of classes not under certificated masters. The number of papers worked by the 19,568 students from science schools was 39,383, and the number passed was 27,806. The number of students from science schools examined in 1871 was 18,750; the number of papers worked was 38,098, and the number of papers passed was

22,105. Though the number of science scholars decreased in 1872, it thus appears that the amount of instruction given was considerably higher than in the previous year. The number of first classes, 3431 in 1871, increased to 7375 in 1872. The examinations were held at 653 centres, of which 56 were in London. The number of teachers who received payments according to results was 979; the average payment to each was about £26; and the sum paid (£25,201) was at the rate of 13s. 8d. for each person under instruction. Prizes and medals (5880 in number), to the value of £1544, were awarded on the results of this examination. Grants amounting to £757 were made towards the purchase of apparatus, diagrams, and examples. The latest returns, made in November 1872, showed that the number of science schools had increased to 1238, of which 823 were in England, 119 in Scotland, and 296 in Ireland, irrespective of the navigation schools, which do not send up pupils for examination, and therefore receive no payments on results of instruction from the parliamentary vote. In the 1238 schools there were 3816 classes, with 44,012 students, being 7229 below the number in May 1872, and 5997 above the number in May 1871. The number of students in May 1872 was, in England, 26,141; in Scotland, 4264; in Ireland, 6191. As compared with the previous year, these figures show an increase of 1051 students in England, a decrease of 360 in Scotland, and a decrease of 2206 in Ireland. It is remarked in the Report that the great increase in the number of students shown by the returns made in November 1872, indicates that the effect of the reductions in the scale of payments made in 1859 has worn off. A hope is expressed that the science schools will in future obtain a larger amount of local support. In order to render the system one not wholly dependent on State aid, a minute has been passed requiring the payment of fees by students. The fees of pupils amounted in 1872 to about a fourth of the State grant for payments on results; the ratio of grants to fees of pupils being as 4 to 1 in England, 13 to 1 in Scotland, and 17 to 1 in Ireland. In the schools classed as science schools, in some cases there is only a single class for instruction in one subject; in others there is a more or less complete course of study in different branches of science.

At the National Art Training School during the year ended 31st July 1872, 45 students in training to become art-teachers, and 16 national scholars in training to become designers, or art-workmen, received allowances to enable them to study in the school and museum. 6 students in training received appointments as masters in local schools of art. 18 students gained certificates of the third grade (giving qualification as instructors in schools of art). In addition to the students maintained, 134 were instructed gratuitously. The whole number of students in the year was 765, and the fees paid amounted to £2220. There are now 122 schools of art, giving instruction to 22,854 students, an increase in the year of 1699. 11,184 students submitted 73,542 drawings or models, of whom 8078 were students of the industrial classes, on whose account payments were made to the committees of the schools. In the elementary examinations of the second grade, 4147 students were successful. The amount of fees paid in schools of art was £21,468 in 1870, £23,432 in 1871, and £24,836 in The number of night classes increased from 465 in 1871 to 538 in 1872; the number of students attending them from 16,140 in 1871 to 17,256 in 1872. The number of schools for the poor in which drawing is taught increased from 1534 in 1871 to 1770 in 1872; and the number of children taught drawing in these schools, from 166,456 in 1871 to 194,549 in 1872. 457 teachers of elementary schools obtained certificates for drawing at the examination of the schools in November 1872, a number greater than that of any preceding year.

The number of separate payments made on the results of art examinations in 1872 were—1st grade (1s., 2s., or 3s., or 5s. on account of children taught in schools for the poor), 104.021; 2d grade (10s. on account of students in schools of art and night classes and schools for the poor), 8678. 3d grade (15s. on account of elementary works executed in schools of art, night classes, and science classes), 2332; 3d grade (20s. on account of advanced works executed in schools of art), 734; 3d grade (£3 on account of free studentships in schools of art), 734; 3d grade payment of £5 on a student obtaining an art-teacher's certificate), 734; 3d grade payment of £5 on a student prepared for a national scholarship, 734;

for the poor, £11,516; to science classes, £145; to schools not entitled to receive payment on results (for prizes, examples, fittings, etc.), £125; total, £31,716. The corresponding total was, in 1871, £27,972, and in 1870, £26,085.

APPEALS FROM THE COURT OF SESSION TO THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

The number of appeals to the Court of Session, presented to the House of Lords, in the year 1872, was 21, of which 5 were in matters of real property, 7 in matters of personal property, 2 in matters of real and personal property, and 7 in matters a of miscellaneous kind. 1 cause was withdrawn,

and 8 causes were dismissed for want of prosecution.

The number of judgments delivered in 1872, including causes heard in previous sessions and standing over for judgment, was 12. In 5 causes the judgment appealed from was affirmed; in 1 the judgment appealed from was varied; in 4 the judgment appealed from was reversed in part; and in 2 the judgment appealed from was reversed with a declaration or finding. The number of causes heard during the session of 1872, including causes standing over for judgment, was 13. The number of effective causes remaining for hearing was 11. The amount of fees was £507.

The number of Births registered in 1872 (118,873, or 349 in every 10,000 persons of the estimated population), is the largest that has been recorded in Scotland since the Registration Act came into operation. The increase in the number was due solely to the increase of population, the proportion of births to population being exactly the same as the mean rate of the ten previous years. As for every 10,000 persons in the districts respectively, 381 births occurred in the principal towns, 390 in the large towns, 356 in the small towns, 310 in the mainland-rural districts, and only 271 in the insular-rural districts, the proportion of births very closely corresponded with the density of the population in the several districts. Taking the groups of Registration Counties, the connexion between the birth-rate and the more or less dense aggregation of the population is also apparent. In the Northern Division, where the population is scarcely 36 to a square mile. there were 258 births to every 10,000 persons; in the Southern Division. with 64 persons to a square mile, there were 312; in the North-Eastern Division, with 104 persons to a square mile, 325; in the South-Eastern Division, with 253 persons to a square mile, 335; and in the South-Western Division, with 516 persons to every square mile, 410 births to every 10,000 persons. The greatest daily number of births occurred during the months of April, May, July, and January; the lowest daily number occurred during the months of September and August. Of the 118,873 children born in 1872, 61,422 were boys, and 57,451 were girls; so that there were born 106.9 boys to every 100 girls. During the ten years 1861-70, the proportion of the sexes at birth was 1053 boys to every 100 girls.

Of the 118,873 births, 10,817 (9.1 per cent.) were illegitimate. As usual, the proportion of illegitimate births was lowest in the insular group of districts, next lowest in the town districts, and highest in the mainland-rural districts. It was 4.9 per cent. of the births in the insular-rural districts; 7.4 per cent. in the large towns; 8.6 per cent. in the small towns; 9 per cent. in the principal towns; and 10.8 per cent. in the mainland-rural districts. Eight counties had above 12 per cent. of illegitimate births, viz., Kincardine, 13 per cent.; Kinross, 13.7; Aberdeen, 14.4; Kirkcudbright, 14.7; Wigtown, 15.4; Elgin and Dumfries, each 15.9; and Banff, 16.4 per cent.

The number of Deaths registered in 1872 (75,741, or 222 deaths in every 10,000 persons), was in exactly the mean proportion to population of deaths in the ten previous years. The mortality of England in 1872 was considerably below the average of that country (227 deaths in every 10,000 persons), being only at the rate of 213 deaths in every 10,000 persons. In Scotland in 1872, one out of every 36 persons died in the principal towns, one out of every 40 in the large towns, one out of every 46 in the small towns, one out of every 58 in the mainland-rural districts, and one out of every 64 persons in the insular-rural districts.

The number of Marriages registered in 1872 (25,580), was 1714 above the number registered in the previous year, and gives the highest proportion of marriages to population (75 marriages in every 10,000 persons) which has ever been registered in Scotland. The average annual marriage-rate of the ten previous years was 70 marriages in every 10,000 persons. For every 10,000 persons in the districts respectively there were 95 marriages in the principal towns, 87 in the large towns, 70 in the small towns, 58 in the mainland-rural districts, and 48 in the insular-rural districts

Of the children born in 1872 in those towns (41,657), 21,402 were boys, and 20,255 were girls; being 105.7 boys for every 100 girls. The birth-rate was highest in Greenock, where it was 4.39 per cent. of the population, and lowest in Perth, where it was 2.96 per cent. Of the 41,657 births in the eight towns, 3729, or 9 per cent., were illegitimate. The proportion of illegitimate births varied greatly in the several towns. In Greenock, where it was lowest, it was only 5.7 per cent., while in Dundee it was 11.0 per cent., and in Aberdeen 11.4 per cent. The number of births in the eight towns was the greatest that has ever been registered, but the birth-rate (381 births in every 10,000 persons) in 1872 was, as in 1871, below that of the eight previous years. The birth-rate in these towns attained its highest proportion in 1865, and its next highest in 1867, when 397 and 396 births respectively occurred for every 10,000 persons. The greatest monthly numbers of births in the eight towns occurred in April, January, May, and July; the lowest in September, November, and June.

The deaths registered in the eight towns (30,186) give a death-rate of 276 deaths in every 10,000 persons, somewhat below the average of the ten previous years (286 deaths in every 10,000 persons). The mortality was far from uniform in each of the eight towns. It was highest in Paisley (295 deaths in every 10,000 persons), and lowest in Perth (222 deaths in every 10,000 persons). The mean death-rate of the ten years 1862-71 was, for every 10,000 persons, in Glasgow, 309; in Edinburgh, 259; in Dundee, 283; in Aberdeen, 240; in Paisley, 282; in Greenock, 310; in Leith, 237; and in Perth, 245. Of the persons who died in the eight towns, 15,171 were males and 15,007 were females. 12,394, or 41.07 per cent. of those who died, were under five years of age; 3544, or 11.74 per cent., between five and twenty years of age; 9196, or 30'48 per cent., were between twenty and sixty; and 5014, or 16:71 per cent., were above sixty years of age. Of the persons who died, there were, under five years of age, 23.8 per cent. in Perth, 32.2 per

cent. in Edinburgh, 34.5 per cent. in Aberdeen, 38.9 per cent. in Paisley, 39.2 per cent. in Leith, 44.2 per cent. in Glasgow, 44.9 per cent. in Dundee, and 46.7 per cent. in Greenock. Of the children under five years of age in 1872, 4.42 per cent. died in that year in Perth, 5.88 per cent. in Aberdeen, 6.96 per cent. in Edinburgh, 7.38 per cent. in Leith, 8.36 per cent. in Greenock, 8.65 per cent. in Paisley, 9.22 per cent. in Dundee, and 9.32 per cent. in Glasgow.

The numbers and causes of death, at four periods of life (from birth to 5 years, from 5 years to 20, from 20 to 60, and from 60 upwards), in the eight principal towns of Scotland, during the year 1872, are shown in the subjoined Table:—

Appended to the Report on Births, Deaths, and Marriages is the Eighth Report by the Registrar-General on Vaccination in Scotland. The Report shows what proportion of the children whose births were registered in 1871 were vaccinated in terms of the Act 26 and 27 Vict. c. 108. From the vaccination returns it appears that, in 1871, 116,184 children were born. Of these, 87.726 per cent. were successfully vaccinated; 0.724 per cent. had their vaccination postponed from ill health or other causes; 0.208 per cent. were found insusceptible of vaccination from constitutional insusceptibility, 0.150 per cent. insusceptible from having had an attack of smallpox, and 0.150 insusceptible from their mothers or nurses having previously vaccinated them. 8.848 per cent. died before vaccination could be performed; while 2.222 per cent. (2582 persons) were removed from the districts before vaccination could be enforced, or were otherwise unaccounted for. Deducting from the children born during the year the number who died before they could be vaccinated, it appears that, of the living children, 105,904 in number, the high proportion of 96-241 per cent. were successfully vaccinated. In addition to the number vaccinated (101,923), 558, or 0.527 per cent., were found insusceptible of vaccination. and 841, or 0.794 per cent., had their vaccination postponed. Adding the number of those found to be insusceptible to the number successfully vaccinated, it appears that 97.562 per cent. of the children born in 1871 were protected against smallpox. The proportion of children who, by being removed from the district of their birth, or from any other unknown cause, were not vaccinated, or not known to be vaccinated, as 2.710 in 1864, 2.528 in 1865, 2·557 in 1866, 2·370 in 1867, 2·363 in 1868, 2·683 in 1869, 2·395 in 1870, and 2.438 per cent. in 1871. It is urged that the number of children who escape vaccination would be reduced were the statutory period of six months, which may be allowed to elapse before the enforcement of vaccination under penalties, shortened to four months.

114 in 1870; and is estimated at 1760 for 1871, and 3073 for 1872.

EMIGRATION.

The "Thirty-fourth Report of the Emigration Commissioners" is for the year 1872. The Commissioners state that, as the administration of the Passengers Act has been transferred to the Board of Trade, it is the last report which they shall have to make on emigration from this country.

The following Table shows the number and the nationality of the emigrants from the United Kingdom in 1872, as compared with 1870 and 1871:—

The emigration of 1872 was the largest since 1854, and exceeded the average emigration of the 17 years from that date by 109,971. But it included a large proportion of foreigners who emigrated through this country—the number of whom was inconsiderable before 1864—and the real excess of the British emigration of 1872 over the average of the preceding 17 years was only 53,521. In 1872, as compared with 1871, there was an increase in English emigrants of 15,765, in Scotch of 309, in Irish of 1696. Of the emigrants from our own population in 1872, the English were 56·15 per cent., the Scotch, 9·28 per cent., and the Irish 34·57 per cent. The proportion of English emigrants to Irish in 1872 was 61·59 to 38·41.

In 1872, as compared with 1871, there was an increase of 10,413 in the number of English emigrants to the United States, and of 1161 in the number of Irish. Of the whole number of emigrants in 1872, 179,067 were males, and 116,146 females; there were 110,765 unmarried male adults, and 50,277

unmarried female adults.

In the fifty-eight years from 1815 to 1872 inclusive, there left the United Kingdom 7,561,285 emigrants, of whom 4,905,262 went to the United States of America; 2,473,173 to British colonies (viz., 1,456,647 to the North American colonies, 1,016,526 to the Australian colonies and New Zealand); and 182,850 to other places. The average annual emigration from the United Kingdom was 130,366 for the fifty-eight years ending 1872; and 230,223 for the ten years ending 1872.

Of the emigrants to North America in 1872, 261,846, or 98.04 per cent. of the whole, went in steamers, and 4106 in sailing vessels. The deaths among 230,531 of the former, of which the Commissioners received intelligence, were 102, which, taking the voyages at an average of twelve days, is equal to a mortality

of only 13.38 per 1000 per annum.

The amount remitted from the United States and Canada to persons in this country during 1872 was £749,644, of which £301,849 was in the shape of 58,044 prepaid passages from Liverpool. This return, it is stated, is more than usually incomplete; still, the remittances were far more than sufficient to take out the whole number of Irish emigrants. The remittances of which the Commissioners have obtained information, have in 25 years amounted to £17,786,463.

The number of persons assisted to emigrate by means of public funds in 1872 was 15,752, distributed as follows:—To Canada, 5279; to New South Wales, 465; to Victoria, 1331; to Queensland, 2343; to New Zealand, 6279; to

Western Australia, 10; to the Falkland Islands, 45.

Of the 295,213 emigrants in 1872, there sailed from English ports, 227,455; from Scotch ports, 23,192; from Irish ports, 44,566. Of the 23,192 who sailed from Scotch ports, 432 were English, 14,978 were Scotch, 908 were Irish, and 6874 were foreigners. 22,311 sailed from Glasgow, and 881 from Greenock.

SPIRITS.

The number of gallons of proof spirits distilled in the United Kingdom in 1872 was 35,176,325, viz., in England, 8,701,118; in Scotland, 15,594,061; in Ireland, 10,831,146. The number of gallons on which duty was paid was 27,800,533, viz., in England, 11,607,680; in Scotland, 8,883,109; in Ireland, 7,309,744; the amount of duty so paid (at ten shillings a gallon) was £13,900,270, viz., in England, £5,803,843; in Scotland, £4,441,553; in Ireland, £3,654,873. The number of gallons consumed was 26,872,183, viz., in England, 14,468,803; in Scotland, 6,452,831; in Ireland, 5,950,549. The number of gallons removed from England to Scotland was 7717 duty free, 13,860 duty paid; from England to Ireland, 74,018 duty free, 25,473 duty paid; from Scotland to England, 2,033,824 duty free, 2,089,145 duty paid; from Scotland to Ireland, 808,323 duty free, 26,512 duty paid; from Ireland to England, 952,014 duty free, 1,294,621 duty paid; from Ireland to Scotland, 21,888 duty free, 116,094 duty paid. The number of gallons delivered duty paid from distillers' stocks was 5,496,960, viz., in England, 3,727,258; in Scotland, 1,610,363; in Ireland, 159,339. The number of gallons put into bond in the year ended 31st December 1872 was 29,293,946, viz., in England, 4,885,822; in Scotland, 13,815,928; in Ireland, 10,592,196. The number of gallons in bonded stores on the 31st December 1872

was 22,557,104, viz., in England, 3,290,762; in Scotland, 6,681,398; in Ireland, 12,584,944. The number of gallons permitted from distillers' stocks and dutyfree warehouses for exportation in 1872 was 1,769,864, viz., in England, 527,575; in Scotland, 1,094,513; in Ireland, 147,776. These figures show the spirits exported as merchandise, for use as ships stores, and mixed with foreign spirits, as furnished by the Customs Department. The quantities permitted from distillers' stocks no longer show the export trade of the country, as spirits permitted to customs warehouses may now be taken out for home consumption. The number of gallons of British compounded spirits permitted from rectifiers' stocks to customs warehouses for exportation, ships' stores, and home consumption in 1872, was 521,014, viz., in England, 253,114; in Scotland, 267,435; in Ireland, 465.

The supply of methylic alcohol by the Excise was discontinued from the 1st January 1969. The number of gallons of methylated spirits sent out by persons licensed to sell the same in 1872, under 18 and 19 Vict. c. 38, was 747,822, viz., in England, 486,708; in Scotland, 247,170; in Ireland, 13,944.

The number of gallons, at proof strength, of foreign and colonial spirits

received into rectifiers' stocks for rectification in 1872 was 115,139, viz., 70,725 gallons of foreign spirits and 44,414 gallons of colonial spirits. 53,856 gallons foreign spirits, and 44,414 gallons colonial spirits, were received into rectifiers' stocks; in Scotland, 16,869 gallons foreign spirits. 506,512 gallons of proof British brandy were permitted out of rectifiers' stocks, viz., in England, 473,103 gallons; in Scotland, 32,320 gallons; in Ireland, 1089 gallons.

INLAND REVENUE.

The Fifteenth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Inland Revenue on the Inland Revenue is for the year ended 31st March 1872. It is observed that the year did not present much to chronicle beyond the satisfactory growth of the Revenue from the increasing prosperity of the country. There was a net increase on the year, as compared with the preceding year, of £4,018.982. There was an increase of £580,753 in excise, arising chiefly from the spirit duties; an increase of £772,675 in stamps, arising in the largest degree from the legacy and succession duties, but in some degree from nearly all the heads of charge; a decrease of £371,937 in taxes, consequent on the repeal of the assessed taxes; and an increase of £3,037,491 in income tax, which was little more than was to be expected as a consequence of the addition of 2d. to the previous rate of 4d, in the pound.

I. EXCISE DUTIES.

The following Table exhibits the net receipt of the duties of excise in the United Kingdom in the years ended 31st March 1871 and 1872. The duties on railways and race horses are levied in Great Britain only, and the duty on chicory in England only.

Spirits .- The number of gallons of spirits charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the year 1870-71 was 23,843,448 (viz., England, 9,637,339; Scot-

land, 7,757,696; Ireland, 6,448,413); in the year 1871-72 it was 25,560,884 gallons (viz., England, 10,464,308; Scotland, 8,137,747; Ireland, 6,958,829). The number of gallons consumed as beverage in the United Kingdom in 1870-71 was 22,961,125 (viz., England; 12,191,386; Scotland, 5,556,993. Ireland, 5,212,746); in 1871-2 it was 24,587,681 gallons (viz., England, 13,036,097; Scotland, 5,801,773; Ireland, 5,749,811). The increase of consumption in the latter year in the United Kingdom was therefore 1,626,556 gallons, or 7.08 per cent. In England it was 844,711 gallons (6.91 per cent.); in Scotland it was 244,780 gallons (4.40 per cent.); in Ireland, 537,065 gallons (10.30 per cent.). The quantity consumed per head of the population in 1871-72 was, in England, 0.574 gallons; in Scotland, 1.727 gallons; in Ireland, 1.064 gallons; in the United Kingdom, 0.781 gallons. The quantity of foreign spirits unenumerated, not sweetened, not being brandy, rum, or Geneva, entered for home consumption in the United Kingdom, was 908,349 gallons in 1870-71, and 704,493 gallons in 1871-72. The quantity of British spirits exported from the United Kingdom was, in 1870-71, 1,512,505 gallons, and, in 1871-72, 1,601,545 gallons. The increase in the quantity charged with duty in 1871-72 was, in the United Kingdom, upwards of 1,700,000 gallons, or 71 per cent. The increase was 8.58 per cent. in England, 4.89 per cent. in Scotland, and 7.91 per cent. in Ireland. The favourable state of the spirit duty in 1871-72 is ascribed to the high wages enjoyed by the working classes during the year, and, in some degree, to the "short time" movement. It is stated that a change in the public taste, as respects spirits, seems to be gradually taking place—both Englandand Scotland now showing a preference for Irish whisky, or spirits called by that name, though not exclusively made in Ireland. This change in taste is affecting the warehousing department of the Excise. Irish whisky requires to be kept longer than Scotch malt whisky before it is fit for use; and it is kept in bond, whereby the quantity of spirits in the bond warehouses has been considerably increased. The quantity of proof spirits in excise warehouses in the United Kingdom was 13,491,314 gallons in 1869, 16,941,149 gallons in 1870, 19,210,411 gallons in 1871. The quantity in bond in Ireland at the end of 1871 was 10,141,343 gallons, or nearly twice the annual consumption of whisky in Ireland. The amount of duty received by the Inland Revenue on account of foreign spirits and wines warehoused in excise warehouses in the year 1871-72 was, in England, spirits £138,104, wines £48,142—total £186,247; in Scotland, spirits £17,821, wines £5,090—total £22,912; in Ireland, spirits £36,015, wines £12,769—total £48,785; in the United Kingdom, spirits £191,941, wines £66,003—total £257,944. The amount received in the United Kingdom in the preceding year was, spirits £68,308, wines £15,025—total £83,333. The quantity of spirits methylated in the year 1870-71 was 1,002,298 gallons (England 576,003, Scotland $\frac{1}{2}$ 6,005); in the year 1870-71 was 1,002,298 gallons (England 576,003, Scotland 426,295); in the year 1871-72 it was 1,086,671 (England 655,671, Scotland 431,000). The number of detections of illicit distillation in the year 1871-72 was the smallest recorded for twenty years, being 1144 (England 21, Scotland 8, Ireland 1115).

Mall.—The number of bushels of malt charged with duty in the United Kingdom was, in the year 1870-71, 52,929,392, and, in 1871-72, was 52,061,010, showing a decrease in the latter year of 868,382 bushels, or 1.64 per cent. The quantity of malt made in the United Kingdom, free of duty for distillation and exportation, was, in the former year, 5,463,263 bushels (viz., for exportation 96,148, for distillation 5,367,117 bushels), and in the latter year, 5,400,238 bushels (for exportation 63,558, for distillation 5,336 680 bushels; which shows a decrease in 1871-72 of 63,027 bushels. The quantity of malt exported on drawback, or used in beer exported on drawback, in the United Kingdom in the year 1870-71, was 1,687,277 bushels (viz., malt exported 359,974, used in beer exported 1,327,303 bushels); in 1871-72 it was 1,740,115 bushels (viz., malt exported 493,533, used in beer 1,402,719 bushels). The decrease in the malt charged with duty in 1871-72 is ascribed to the unexampled quantity of malt made in the previous year. The quantity of malt charged by weight in the United Kingdom in 1870-71 was 582,189 bushels, the average weight per bushel being 50 lbs., the quantity charged by gauge 616,283 bushels, and the duty surrendered £4624; the quantity charged by weight in 1871-72 was 1,025,363 bushels, the average weight being 50₁bs., and the duty surrendered £7587. This increase was the consequence of a scarcity of fine malting barley.

Sugar used in Brewing.—The quantity of sugar used in brewing in the United Kingdom was 31,950,240 lbs. in 1870-71, and 29,188,303 lbs. in 1871-72. This decrease of 2,761,937 lbs. is ascribed partly to a rise in the price of sugar and partly to the moderate price of malt.

Home-made Sugar.—The quantity of home-made sugar charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the year 1870-71 was 29.721 cwts. (viz., made from beet-root 5714 cwts., from starch 24,007 cwts.); in 1871-72 it was 34,902 cwts. (viz., made from beet-root 5,890 cwts., from starch 29,012 cwts.).

Chicory—The quantity of chicory charged with duty in 1870-71 was 15,666 cwts.; in 1871-72 it was 11,168 cwts.—decrease 4498 cwts. It is remarked that our growers are unable to compete with the Belgians, who produce a better article at a lower cost.

Licenses.—The numbers of licenses issued in Great Britain in the year ended 31st December 1871, were as follows:-Male servants, 275,064 (Scotland, 23,200), duty, £206,298; carriages with four wheels and weighing four cwts., 144,828 (Scotland, 13,270), duty, £304,139; carriages with less than four wheels, or weighing less than four cwts., 280,877 (Scotland, 22,422), duty, £210,658; horses and mules, 844,971 (Scotland, 73,897), duty, £443,610; horse-dealers, 1280 (Scotland, 134), duty, £16,000; armorial bearings on carriages, 20,473 (Scotland, 1560), duty, £42,993; armorial bearings otherwise used, 38,582 (Scotland, 1560), duty, £40,511; dogs, 1,123,023 (Scotland, 125,701), duty, £280,756. It is stated that the correspondence in connexion with the establishment licenses and the number of respondence in connexion with the establishment, licenses, and the number of prosecutions necessary for securing the revenue derived from them, are out of all proportion to the amount of the revenue. While the number of dog licenses issued in 1871 was 1,123,023, the highest number charged under the assessed taxes was below 440,000. duty on dog licenses in 1871 was £280,756, while the highest net receipt from the old assessed tax (under which a dog was charged at 12s., the present charge being 5s.), was £231,630. The number of game licenses issued in the United Kingdom in the year 1871-72 was 65,857 (Scotland, 6894), duty, £184,747; the number of licenses to deal in game was 2551 (Scotland, 273), duty, £5102; and the number of gun licenses was 124,939 (Scotland, 11,612), duty, £62,469. The number of licenses for the sale of excitable liquors issued in the United Kingdom in 1871-72 was 348,750, being 1027 more than the number in the preceding year. There was a reduction of 751 in England, but an increase in Scotland and Ireland. There was a decline of 996 in the number of brewers' licenses issued in England, which is ascribed to the absorption of the brewing trade into the hands of the great brewers.

The following table shows the net receipt of the duties of excise in Scotland

in the years ended 31st March 1870, 1871, and 1872:-

II. STAMPS.

The net receipt from stamps in the year ended 31st March 1872 was £9,739,548; in the previous financial year it was £8,966,873. The principal items in the year 1871-72 were as follows:—Deeds and other instruments, £1,842,422; bills of exchange and promissory notes, £846,258; probates of wills and letters of administration and testamentary inventories, £1,852,560 (Scotland, £152,909); legacy and succession duty, £3,360,489 (Scotland, £327,791); receipts, drafts, and other 1d. Inland Revenue stamps, £648,843; bankers' notes and composition for do., £140,842 (Scotland, £23,840); licenses and certificates, £132,043 (Scotland, £26,068); fee stamps, £525,787. The stamp revenue in 1871-72 was the largest on record, notwithstanding considerable reductions in rates on the consolidation of the stamp laws in 1870. The

principal increase was in legacy and succession duties, which were never before so productive. The practice of collecting fees by means of stamps was extended to various new offices, including the Register House, Scotland, in 1871-72.

III. LAND AND ASSESSED TAXES.

The produce of the Land Tax was £1,091,292 in the year 1870-71, and £1,086,568 in the year 1871-72, a decrease of £4724. The produce of the inhabited house duty was £1,129,125 in 1870-71, and £1,262,611 in 1871-72, an increase of £133,486. The taxes levied upon servants, carriages, horses, horse-dealers, and the additional 10 per cent. per Act 3 Vict. c. 17, hair-powder and armorial bearings, having been repealed and replaced by licenses, were not levied in the year 1871-72, but £3002 of arrears of such taxes were recovered. The total produce of land and assessed taxes in 1871-72 was £2,352,181. In 1870-71 it was (including £503,701 received from taxes now repealed), £2,724,118. Net decrease in 1871-72, £371,937. The house-duty is now the only assessed tax. As regards the land tax, the Commissioners state that it has, in a large number of parishes, become stereotyped as a fixed charge upon the lands not exonerated, and that such a thing as a yearly assessment, distributing the quota according to an equal pound rate among all the properties in the parish as the law requires, is unknown in practice. The consequence of a general re-assessment, they say, would probably be very startling; while, if any scheme for compulsory redemption of the tax were to be adopted, it would be absolutely necessary, as a preliminary step, that the assessment should be adjusted. In the case of one parish, where a correct assessment was demanded by some of the inhabitants and carried into effect, the old assessment comprised 2715 charges at the rate of about 4s. in the pound, and the new assessment comprised 8392 charges at the rate of 6d. in the pound.

IV. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

The net receipts from property and income tax in the years ended 31st March 1871 and 1872, appropriated to schedules, are shown in the following Table:—

The tax was levied at the rate of 4d. in the pound in 1870-71, and at 6d. in the pound in 1871-72. The assessments for the year ended 5th April 1871 exhibited an increase of £21,622,000 over those of the preceding year, the amounts being, for 1869-70, £398,229,000, and, for 1870-71, £419,851,000. The increase was restricted to the assessments for England and Scotland, there being a slight decrease in the case of Ireland. The increase was, in England, £20,311,000, and, in Scotland, £1,359,000; the decrease in Ireland was £48,000. Under Schedules A and B, new assessments were made for the year 1870, and they yielded an increase of £5,938,000, distributed as follows:— England, £5,385,000; Scotland, £506,000; Ireland, £47,000. Under the head of lands the following increases appear:—England, £1,135,000; Scotland, £106,000; Ireland, £6000; and the following under the head of houses:— England, £4,474,000; Scotland, £379,000; Ireland, £40,000. There was a decrease on the other constituents of Schedule A, amounting to £233,000. Under Schedule B there was a net increase, in the later year, of £1,117,000; there was an increase, in England, of £1,115,000; in Scotland, of £106,000; and a decrease in Ireland of £104,000. Under Schedule D there was an increase in the assessments, in England, of £9,883,000; in Scotland, of £719,000; in Ireland, of £42,000—total increase, £10,644,000. The most noticeable increases were in trades and professions, railways, and iron-works. The increase

on trades and professions was, in England, £5,415,000, in Scotland, £349,000; the increase upon railways, in England, £993,000, in Scotland, £193,000; the increase upon iron-works, in England, £618,000, in Scotland, £65,000.

In the year 1870-71, 276,332 persons—234,957 in England, 28,949 in Scotland, and 12,426 in Ireland—claimed abatement of taxation in respect of incomes of £100 and under £200 a year, being 15,387 more than in the preceding year: and the amount of income exempted from taxation in consequence of the abatement was, in England, £14,089,335; in Scotland, £1,730,048; in Ireland, £744,980—total, £16,564,363. It is stated that at least 11,617 persons obtained repayment of duty under the same provision of the law, and this makes an addition of £697,000 to the amount of income relieved from duty.

The net receipt of property and income tax levied in Scotland was £521,157 in 1876-71, and £826,213 in 1871-72. The total obtained from land and assessed taxes and property and income tax in Scotland was £632,548 in

1870-71, and £940,433 in 1871-72.

When this sheet was prepared for the press, the report of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue for the year ended 31st March 1873 had not been issued. From other sources we give the principal facts relative to the produce of the Inland Revenue during that year. The net receipt (after deducting drawbacks, repayments, etc.) was:—Excise, £25,904,450; stamps, £9,998,032; land tax and house duty, £2,339,033; income tax, £7,403,736—total, £45,645,252, being an increase of £839,357 upon the previous year. The net receipt from excise was made up as follows:—Spirits, £13,749,542; malt, £7,544,175; railways, £507,079; licenses, £3,934,393; racehorses, £8726; chicory, £6646; sugar, 153,893. The quantity of spirits, home made, charged with duty was 28,425,563 gallons. The quantity of malt charged with duty was 57,213,785 bushels. The net receipt from stamps comprised the following items:—Deeds, etc., £1,955,233; probates of wills and letters of administration, £1,943,359; bills of exchange, bankers' notes, and composition for duty on bills and notes, £1,102,111; receipt and other 1d. stamps, £694,603; legacies and successions, £3,177,710; fee stamps (Register House, Scotland, £46,309), £560,404. The net receipt from land-tax was £1,095,728; from house-duty, £1,243,082. The net produce of the income tax as distributed between the different schedules is approximately stated as follows:—Schedule A, £2,539,976; B, £329,581; C, £712,123; D, £3,369,745; E, £452,312. The amount of property and income assessed in 1872-73 under Schedule A was £142,736.057; under Schedule B, £38,723,585; under Schedule C, £38,646,360; under Schedule D, £189,305,247; under Schedule E, £25,391,653. The rate per pound during the year was 4d.

LICENSED BREWERS AND VICTUALLERS.

In the year ended 30th September 1872, the number of persons licensed to sell beer in Scotland was, 73 brewers, 12,689 victuallers—total, 12,762. The number of victuallers who brewed their own beer was 125; the number of bushels of malt consumed by brewers was 2,336,475, by victuallers 330,887.

There were exported from Scotland in the year ended 30th September 1872, 57,065 barrels of beer, of the declared value of £253,820; in the year ended 30th September 1871, there were exported 57,303 barrels, of the declared value of £255,278. Of the 57,065 barrels exported from Scotland in the year ended 30th September 1872, there were sent 3637 barrels to British India (continental territories), of the declared value of £15,295; 1200 barrels to Singapore, of the declared value of £5037; 607 barrels to Ceylon, of the declared value of £2251; 2662 barrels to Victoria (Australia), of the declared value of £11,565; 1405 barrels to New South Wales, of the declared value of £5394; 525 barrels to New Zealand, of the declared value of £2211; 2797 barrels to British North America, of the declared value of £9622; 6038 barrels to British West Indies, of the declared value of £25,799; 5634 barrels to the Spanish West Indies, of the declared value of £25,786; 1142 barrels to the Danish West Indies, of the declared value of £5363; 4940 barrels to British Guiana, of the declared value of £17,918; 7324 barrels to the United States of America, of the declared value of £43,171; 3855 barrels to Chili, of the declared value of £17,588; 2417 barrels to Peru, of the declared value of £10,790; 3331 barrels to Brazil, of the declared value of £14,302; 1801 barrels to Uruguay, of the declared value of £7988; 3017 barrels to the Argentine Republic, of the declared value of £13,676.

The total number of bushels of malt made in the United Kingdom in the year 1872 was 57,308,082, viz., in England, 51,558,658 bushels; in Scotland, 2,957,615 bushels; and in Ireland, 2,791,809 bushels; and the amount of duty charged thereon was £7,771,227. The quantity of barley imported into the United Kingdom in 1872 was 15,046,566 cwts., equivalent to 4,213,038 quarters.

FISHERIES.

The fee of 4d. per barrel charged upon the branding of barrels of herrings yielded, in 1872, £7045. In 1859, the first year in which the fee was charged, it yielded £2644. In 1862 it yielded £5778, and this was the largest sum derived from it in any year previous to 1872. Although the amount received from it in 1872 exceeded the amount received in 1862 by £1266, or 22 per cent. the fishing of 1872 was less by 3 per cent. than the fishing of 1862. From this, and the general tendency of the revenue from branding to increase in amount, the Commissioners of the Fishery Board infer that the demand for branded herrings is decidedly increasing; that the value of the brand is real; and that the merchants upon the Continent, the chief market for herrings, transact their business by the brand. The quantity of herrings branded in 1872 was 422,731 harrels. The highest years of branding previous to 1872 were 1820, 1862, and 1871, in which respectively the number of barrels branded was 363,872; 346,712; and 346,633. The branding of 1872 exceeded that of 1820 by 16 per cent., and those of 1862 and 1871 respectively, by 22 per cent. The return for 1820 included brandings at stations in England; and at that time, instead of a fee being paid for branding, a bounty was given for it by the Government, which, in 1820, amounted to £72,000. The produce of the branding fees in the fourteen years during which they have been levied has been £63,442; and, taking the tost of branding at £3280, at which it was estimated by a Treasury Commission in 1856, the branding fees have over that period yielded a large surplus to the revenue, and have, in 1872, exceeded the estimated cost of branding by more than cent. per cent. In 1872, the number of barrels cured was 773,8594; of barrels branded, 422,731; of barrels exported, 549,631. In 1871, the corresponding numbers were—barrels cured, 825,4752; barrels branded, 346,6331; barrels exported, 551,6052. The fishery of 1871 exceeded that of 1872 by 51,616; barrels; but in 1872 there was an increase over 1871 of 76,098 barrels in the quantity branded, and a decrease of only 1974; barrels in the quantity exported. The quantity branded in 1872 bore an unusually high proportion to the quantity sported. Only 126,900 barrels were exported which were not branded; and this included unguitted fish; also the export to Ireland, not originally selected for first-class cure, and the greater part of the fish from the early herring fishing of the Hebrides, which are prepared for immediate sale, and broken or damaged fish exported anywhere for sale at such prices as they can obtain. The quantity branded in 1872 was 77 per cent. of the quantity exported. The brand fees in 1872 (£7045) exceeded those of 1871 by £1268.

As compared with the average of the seven years, 1865-71, the returns for 1872 show an increase of 56,4161 barrels in the number of barrels cured, of 153,6291 barrels in the number branded, of 114,961 in the number exported,

and of £2560 in the amount of the brand fees.

The Commissioners state that at Fraserburgh, Peterhead, and Aberdeen (at which place the fishing is of recent development), the largest fishings ever known were made in 1872. A difficulty in getting barrels was found at these places. The price of barrel staves has greatly increased, and it is suggested that the propriety of prohibiting the use of fir for barrels should be reconsidered. The fishing upon the west coast was deficient in 1872. The winter herring fishing in the Firth of Forth was very deficient; and in Caithness, where the winter herring fishing is more actively prosecuted than on any other part of the coast, the quantity taken was not large. The sprat fishing in the Firth of Forth and in the Beauly Firth was very abundant.

The Commissioners observe that the use of trawling nets for catching sprats on our coasts, for catching whitebait in the Thames, and for catching herrings in the Campbelton district, does not seem to be to any extent injurious to the

fishing grounds.

The Cod, Ling, and Hake Fishery of the year 1872 produced 145.976½ cwt. cured dried, and 11,940½ barrels cured in pickle, as compared with 119,030 cwt. cured dried, and 9283 barrels cured in pickle, in 1871. There was thus an increase of 26,946½ cwt. cured dried, and of 2657½ barrels cured in pickle. There was exported in 1872, 53,631 cwt. cured dried, being a decrease of 540½ cwt. upon 1871; 25,668 cwt. were exported to Ireland; 20,870 cwt. to the Continent; and 7093 cwt. to places out of Europe. The number of fish taken in 1872 was 4,436,110, being 853,840 more than in the previous year.

There was a decrease in 1872 as compared with 1871, of 81 in the boats employed in the fisheries under charge of the Board, and in the persons engaged in those fisheries, a decrease of 368 fishermen; but there was an increase of £12,613 in the estimated value of the boats, nets, and lines employed. There has been, it is stated, in the last ten years, a great improvement in the boats used in the fisheries; and now decked boats are fast supplanting open boats. In 1862 the number of fishing boats belonging to Scotland was 12,545; in 1872 it was 15,232, being an average increase of 268 boats per annum. In 1862 the number of fishermen was 41,008; in 1872 it was 46,178, being an average increase of 517 fishermen per annum. In 1862 the value of the boats and their gear was £747,794; in 1872 it was £997,293, being an average increase in value of nearly £25,000 per annum.

COAL.

The Report of the Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed to inquire into the causes of the dearness and scarcity of Coal was adopted on 16th July 1873. The Committee consisted of Mr Ayrton, Mr Corrance, Mr Hussey Vivian, Mr Wharton, Mr Carter, Mr Denison, Mr Liddell, Mr Pease, Mr Pim, Mr Grieve, Mr Edmund Potter, Mr Watney, Mr Stanhope, Mr W.

H. Smith, Mr Anderson, Mr Mundella, and Mr Elliot.

Evidence was given to the Committee showing that there had been considerable disturbance in the minds of colliery workmen, respecting the number of hours per day or per week during which it was their interest to labour, and that the general tendency had been to reduce the hours of labour. It was also stated to the Committee that the Mines Regulation Act, 1872, had tended to the same result. Consequently the mines did not produce in 1872 the quantity of coal which would otherwise have been obtained from them. The effect of the circumstances above noticed, according to returns supplied to the Committee through the inspectors of mines, was that, whereas the quantity of coal raised per man was 316 tons in 1869, 321 tons in 1870, and 317 tons in 1871, it was only 299 tons in 1872; and the Committee, after taking evidence on the subject, came to the conclusion that the diminution of the yield per man was not much less than that shown by the The number of men employed in the mines in 1872 (413,334) was considerably greater than the number employed in any previous year (greater by 42,453 than the number employed in 1871); and therefore, notwithstanding the diminished yield per man, the quantity of coal raised in 1872 (123,386,758 tons), though showing a smaller ratio of increase than that recorded in the immediately preceding years, was greater by more than six million tons than the quantity produced in any previous year. The production of coal was equal to 4 tons, 1 cwt. 1 qr. 23 lbs. per head of the population of Great Britain in 1872, while it was equal to 3 tons, 13 cwt. 3 qrs. 26 lbs. per head in 1869, 3 tons, 14 cwt. 1 qr. 23 lbs. per head in 1870, and 3 tons, 17 cwt. 3 qrs. 23 lbs. in 1871. It was equal to only 2 tons, 9 Some witnesses, however, doubted cwt. 3 qrs. 24 lbs. per head in 1858. whether the quantity of coal raised in 1872 had not been over-estimated.

The Committee, after remarking that it takes several months to open out new workings or to qualify new labourers for employment in coal mines, express the opinion that both those operations are going on under the stimulus of high prices, and that, in a short time, the collieries now existing, and others likely to be opened, will be capable of producing a large increase of marketable coal. The general introduction of the double-shift system, to which, however, the labourers in some districts were averse,

would greatly increase the production and diminish the cost of coal.

With regard to the consumption of coal, according to an estimate supplied by Mr Robert Hunt, the official keeper of mining records, founded upon data furnished to the Coal Commission for the year 1869, and the mineral statistics of the office, the coal produced in 1871 was disposed of as follows: used in manufactures-pig iron, 19,881,537 tons; bar iron and steel, 18,648,686 tons; tin, 27,168 tons; copper (British and imported ore), 376,412 tons; lead (British and imported ore), 157,353 tons; zinc (British and imported ore), 171,920 tons; collieries, 6,578,800 tons; metal mines, 529,920 tons; manufactures, for steam and other purposes, steam navigation, railways, army departments, gas-making, waterworks, and miscellaneous, 39,000,000 tons. Total of coal used in all manufactures, and for steam, 85,371,796 tons. Exports, 12,747,989 tons; domestic use, etc., 16,639,046 tons; exported to Ireland, 2,593,197 tons. Total consumption of coal, 117,352,028 tons. Of the quantity of coal used for household purposes, a more exact idea may be obtained from the accounts of the importation of coal into the London district. In 1872 this district included a population of 3,977,569 persons, and the quantity of coal available for domestic consumption, railways, and steamboats in the district was 2,535,090 tons. The Committee formed the opinion that the purely domestic consumption of coal had been greatly over-estimated by the Coal Commissioners, who thought it might be taken as constant at about a ton per head of the population.

Again, qualifying conclusions of the Commissioners, they were of opinion that owing to the increased price of coal, the increase in the consumption of coal would be diminished by greater economy in its use; but that, on the other hand, it could not be assumed that the exportation of coal (which has increased since 1869) would not increase still further.

As to the explanation of the existing condition of the coal trade, the Committee found a very general concurrence of opinion among the witnesses examined by them, that, while the flourishing state of the country had increased the demand for coals for every purpose, it was the increased use of coal for the manufacture of pig-iron, and its conversion into the various forms of rolled iron, which had raised the demand for coal to an amount beyond what could be supplied by the producers. The quantity of coal used in the iron manufacture was 28,331,977 tons in 1867; it was 38,540,102 tons in 1871; and 38,228,875 tons in 1872. On the other hand, the whole quantity of coal produced was 104,375,480 tons in 1867; 117,186,278 tons in 1871; and 123,386,758 tons in 1872. The demand for coal in the iron trade in 1872 was apparently so urgent that it could not be satisfied from the yield of the particular quality of coal generally used in the manufacture of iron; it extended itself to other qualities, and raised their prices; and the prosperous condition of several branches of industry produced a competition for coal which led to the great enhancement of prices which took place in 1872. It is observed that the effect of any disturbance of the relations of demand and supply on prices is beyond calculation; that, when the demand for an article is urgent, each buyer being eager to guard against deficiency in his own case, a comparatively small deficiency of supply may produce a very large increase of price, if the buyers are able to pay what the sellers demand; and that such considerations account for a great rise in price having followed upon a comparatively small derangement in the production and consumption of coal in 1872. It is added, that the coal trade has had no immunity from the violent fluctuations which arise in a trade when the ordinary course of business is disturbed, through panic demands and speculations for the rise or fall.

The Committee saw no reason for believing that colliery owners had endeavoured to restrict the supply of coal for the purpose of creating a scarcity in the market; on the contrary, it appeared that means had been taken by them to meet the extra demand. Some efforts had been made to induce the workmen to prevent the owners from increasing the output of coals, under the impression that a scarcity could thereby be created, and wages consequently kept up; also to induce them to prevent the owners from having stocks of coal at bank ready for use, under the impression that such stocks increased the employers' power of reducing wages; but these objects had been disclaimed by the representatives of the workmen who gave evidence before the Committee. The Committee, considering the great extent of the coal-fields worked in Great Britain, came to the conclusion that no combination, either of employers or workmen, could permanently affect the supply or price of coal, and that the interference of Parliament with the course of industry and trade in coal could not be beneficially carried beyond what has been done in recent legislation for the protection of young persons and the prevention of accidents. Arguing against the proposal to reimpose an export duty on coal, they submit that a great portion of coal exported is sent abroad for the use of British shipowners, and that it would be injurious to the shipowner, to the merchant whose goods he carries, and to the workman who made them, to deny the shipowner the use of English coal; that even when consumed in the interior of a foreign country, our coal is often used for bringing by railway to a port goods, raw or manufactured, to be exchanged for English goods, and that to enhance its price or diminish the supply of it would prejudice our trade; also, that our export of iron is in effect an export of coal-coal being largely used in manufacturing iron-and the greater part of our export, and it would not be touched by an export duty; and that if the result of an export duty on coal should be to deprive foreign countries of the means of manufacturing for themselves commodities in which coal is used, the effect would be to increase the export of those commodities and the consumption of coal in England. м

The Committee were informed that the high price of iron was checking the foreign demand for iron, and that the high prices were tending to bring about such a relation between supply and demand as must prevent prices from rising still further, and even reduce them. The prices of coal during several years were so low that they did not give a reasonable profit to colliery owners in general, and did not afford the workmen such remuneration as, considering the hazardous and arduous nature of their work, they might reasonably expect. The rise which took place in the wages of the workmen was, under the circumstances, not unreasonable, and has been attended with considerable benefit to them. It is observed that the increased payment for labour cannot be considered as the primary cause of the increase in the price of coal; it followed upon it rather than preceded it; and the real order of events was-the rise in the price of iron, the rise in the price of coal, the rise in the price of wages. The increased wages, no doubt, resulted in a reduced output per man, and so indirectly tended in an important degree to maintain the high price of coal; but the average rate of wages in collieries has not been more than sufficient to attract the requisite labour to the mine. The Committee did not inquire into the profits made by colliery owners since the rise in prices; a careful inquiry would have been required for estimating them in each particular case; and, in the opinion of the Committee, any such inquiry would have been unjustifiable. High prices, with exceptional profits, it is remarked, arise occasionally in every trade; and the true policy of the State is to leave trade free, and maintain an inflexible resolution of non-interference with it. To adopt the opposite course would be to make one class pay for the benefit of others; whilst any restraint on the profits of private business or industry, by the power of the law, must in justice carry with it the guarantee of the State against loss, which, in the opinion of the Committee, it would be altogether impolitic to give.

The 52 banks, on the 20th November 1872, had 56 unpaid and 181 paid officers. The amount of security given by the unpaid officers was £13,550; by the paid officers, £41,600. The salaries and allowances of the paid officers amounted to £11,630. The annual expenses of management, inclusive of all payments and salaries, amounted to £15,053, being at the rate of 6s. 8d. per cent. on the capital of the banks. The total amount invested with the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt (exclusive of the surplus fund) was £4,441,734; the balance in the hands of the treasurers, £26,091; the surplus fund in the hands of the Commissioners, £2812. The average rate of interest paid to depositors was £2, 19s. 5d.

The amount of the accounts transferred (viz., by transfer certificates, excluding £215,989 estimated to have been paid in cash by about 11,122 of the depositors in these closed banks to the Post-office Savings Banks) was £2,217,096 (£2,168,974 in England and Wales, £634 in Scotland, and £47,487 in Ireland). The amount of compensation paid to officers of these closed banks, under the Act 26 Vict. c. 14, was £30,945.

THE ORDNANCE SURVEY.

In the Report of Major-General Sir Henry James on the progress of the Ordnance Survey for the year 1872, it is stated that during the year the progress of the survey was to a certain extent retarded by the very abnormal state of the weather. The map of England and Wales, on the scale of one inch to a mile, commenced in 1784 and finished in 1869, having been found to contain errors which could not be corrected on the existing plates, the consent of the Treasury had been obtained to the production of a new one-inch map, to be made by reducing the plans of the cadastral survey on the six-inch scale to the one-inch scale. The sheets of the new map are first to be engraved in outline with the contours and altitudes; and thereafter a duplicate plate is to be made, on which the hills are to be engraved. Of the one-inch map of Ireland, which has long been published in outline, 81 sheets have been completed, with the hill features engraved. The department has computed the mean height of Forfarshire, and was, at the date of the Report (3d March 1873) engaged in computing the mean height of Kincardineshire and Aberdeenshire. It is intended to calculate the mean height of every county in the kingdom.

Among many and onerous services performed for public departments, the Survey officers have made to the Inland Revenue Office a return of the acreage of each parish and county in Scotland, as far as the survey has extended, to assist it in making a return, showing,—(1) the name and address of each owner of land to the extent of an acre and upwards, together with the estimated acreage of the property of each owner, and its annual value; and (2) the number of owners of land to the extent of less than an acre,

together with the annual value of such lands.

In Scotland, the survey of all the mainland, except the mountainous parts of Ross-shire, has been completed. The plans of the eastern cultivated part of Ross-shire, between Dornoch Firth and Loch Beauly, have been published on the 25-inch scale. All the plans of Caithness have been drawn on the 25 and 6 inch scales, but the publication has been kept back at the request of the Office of Woods and Forests, the boundaries of some Crown property in Caithness not having been satisfactorily settled. The plans of Inver-

ness-shire are drawn and in course of publication. The plans of the cultivated part of Sutherland on the eastern coast, including the Brora coal-field, have been published. But for the weather, the survey of the mountainous part of Ross-shire would have been so far advanced in 1872, that its completion during 1873 (now only probable) would have been ensured.

The area surveyed in England, on the scales of 25 and 6 inches to a mile, up to the end of 1872, was 22,693 square miles (the area of the country being 58,000 square miles); of which 1666 square miles were surveyed in 1872.

The area surveyed in Scotland, on the same scales, up to the end of 1872, was 25.830 square miles (the area of the countrybeing 30,000 square miles); and of this, 1561 square miles were surveyed in 1872. The counties in which the work of the survey had not been completed were, Argyll, Inverness, Ross and

Cromarty, and Sutherland.

The plans of parishes in Scotland on the 1-2500 scale had been published for the cultivated portions of the counties of Aberdeen, Ayr, Banff, Berwick, Bute, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Elgin, Forfar, Kincardine, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairo, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling; and the publication was in progress for Argyllshire, Caithness, Inverness-shire, Ross, Cromarty, and Sutherland. The area published in 1872 was 653 square miles; and the total area published on this scale amounted at the end of the year to 10,094 square miles.

The six-inch maps had been published of the following counties in Scotland, viz., Ayr, Berwick, Bute, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Edinburgh, Forfar, Fife, Haddington, Kincardine, Kinross, Kirkcudbright, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairn, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling, Wigtown, and the Isle of Lewis; and the maps of Aberdeenshire, Argyllshire, Banffshire, Caithness, Elginshire, Inverness-shire, and Sutherland, were in progress of engraving. The area published during 1872 was 1153 square miles, making a total area of 17,086 square miles published on

this scale.

Of the one-inch map of Scotland, four sheets, including 1167 square miles, were published during 1872, making the area published on this scale 13,098 square miles.

The survey of the towns in Scotland is complete. With a few exceptions,

the maps of towns in Scotland are on the 1-500 or ten feet scale.

The sale of the Ordnance Maps of Scotland (including £443, the value of those supplied to public departments, and under the provisions of the Copyright Act), during the year 1872, yielded the sum of £1633 (viz., one-inch maps, £285; six-inch maps, £503; 1-2500 scale maps, £722; town maps on various scales, £121.

AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.

In his Report prefixed to the Agricultural Returns of Great Britain for the year 1872, Mr Valpy states that a summary of the principal results of the returns was published on the 20th September 1872, early enough to be of great use to farmers in their business transactions. As an illustration of the usefulness of agricultural statistics, he points out that the publication of a summary of the returns for 1871 in the autumn of that year, by showing that there had been a great falling-off in the number of sheep in the country, had put a stop to the falling-off and led to an increase in the number of sheep. Many other circumstances besides this, he observes, show that frequent use is made of the information contained in the returns.

In 1872 information was collected as to the number and agricultural condition of holdings of 1 and under 1 acre, and of from 1 to 5 acres. The general returns for 1872 do not include all those small holdings, the information respecting them not having been received early enough. Almost all the holdings of a quarter of an acre and under one acre are in England, the number of them in England being 67,422, in Wales 1103, and in Scotland 1319. 49,000 were held in England by agricultural labourers and working men. This number is much short of the total number of allotments in

England, a common limit for allotments being an eighth of an acre. Of holdings of from 1 to 5 acres there were in 1872, 93,148 in England, 10,041 in Wales, and 21,091 in Scotland, the total number in Great Britain being 124.280. The total acreage of holdings of from 1 to 5 acres in Great Britain was 356,000 acres, of which 204,000, or 57 per cent., were under permanent pasture, and 152,000 acres, or 43 per cent., were arable. Corn and green crops were cultivated in about equal proportions. The total number of live stock upon this class of holdings was 21,279 horses, 132,408 cattle, 219,539 sheep, and

177,361 pigs.

The total extent of land returned in 1872 as being under all kinds of crops, bare fallow, and grass, was 31,004,173 acres in Great Britain, 15,746,547 acres in Ireland, 88,573 acres in the Isle of Man, 18,026 acres in the Island of Jersey, and 12,007 acres in the islands of Guernsey, Alderney, etc., making a total for the United Kingdom of 46,869,326 acres. The total acreage of land returned as under cultivation in Great Britain has been larger in each year since the returns were first collected from all occupiers of land in 1868; but allowing for omissions in the earlier years, and incorrect classification of land, especially as regards grass in permanent pasture and under rotation, the period of five years, between 1868 and 1872, is too short for showing in a reliable manner the actual increase in the total quantity of cultivated land. Although exact figures cannot at present be given, the results exhibited in the returns indicate that an addition is annually made to the land under cultivation in Great Britain. The reclamation of waste land is mentioned by the collecting officers in many parts of the country, as one of the causes of the increase of the acreage returned in their districts.

The returns as to land used for orchards or fruit-trees of any kind, which were made in 1871 for the first time, seem to have been inaccurately made in that year, and the returns of 1872, which show an acreage under this head of 156,000 acres in England, 10,000 in Wales, and 3000 in Scotland, may be taken as more correct. The acreage returned in 1872 for market gardens was 32,937 acres in England, 850 in Wales, and 2417 in Scotland. For nursery gardens, used for growing trees and shrubs, there were 8906 acres in England, 790 in Wales, and 2083 in Scotland. The acreage of woodland was returned in 1872 at 1,325,675 acres in England, 126,823 in Wales, and

734,490 in Scotland.

The extent of land returned as under corn crops in 1872 exhibits the following variations from the corresponding figures in 1871 and other previous years:-In 1872 there was less land under all kinds of corn in Great Britain by 102,000 acres than in 1871, and in Ireland there was a decrease of 34,000 acres. The aggregate of land under corn in Great Britain has alternated between an increase and decrease in the four years from 1869 to 1872; in Ireland there was a falling-off in each of the years 1870. 1871, and 1872. The total acreage of the wheat crop in 1872 was larger in Great Britain by 27,000 acres than in 1871, and smaller in Ireland by 18,000 acres. In the five years 1868 to 1872, the largest wheat acreage in Great Britain was in 1869, and the smallest in 1870. The difference amounted to 188,000 acres. 1872 showed 90,000 fewer acres under wheat than 1869. The acreage of the wheat crop in Ireland decreased in each year from 1868 to 1872, the last of these years showing 58,000 acres, or 20 per cent., less than the first. By comparing the extent of land under wheat with the population in 1872, it will be found that the following were the average number of acres of wheat grown per 100 individuals in different parts of the United Kingdom: -In England 15.5 acres, in Wales 10.4, in Scotland 4.0, in Ireland 4.2, in the Isle of Man 163, in Jersey 48, and Guernsey 28. As regards the supply for the population of home-grown wheat, the relative production, computed at 28 bushels per acre upon these averages of the land under wheat would be 4.3 bushels per individual person in England, 2.9 in Wales, 1.2 in Scotland, 1.2 in Ireland, and 4.5 in the Isle of Man. At the higher estimated average yield of 35 bushels per acre, the production per individual would be 1.7 bushels in Jersey, and 1.0 in Guernsey. In the ten years from 1863 to 1872 the quantities of foreign wheat and flour retained for consumption in the United Kingdom show a variation in the supply per individual of the population of 1871, of from 1.5 bushels, the lowest quantity, in 1865, to

2-6 bushels, the highest quantity, in 1869. The barley crop in 1872, as compared with 1871, showed a decrease of 69,000 acres in Great Britain, and 2000 acres in Ireland. The acreage under barley in Great Britain in 1872, though below what it was in 1871 and in 1870, was larger than in the years 1868 and 1869. There was less land under oats in Great Britain in 1872 than in 1871 by 10,000 acres, and there was a decrease to the same extent in Ireland. This crop has fallen off in Ireland in each year from 1868 to 1872, and the decrease between those years amounted to 78,000 acres or 4½ per cent. The quantity of land under pease and beans in Great Britain in 1872, as compared with 1871, showed a decrease of 28,000 acres in pease and 16,000 acres in beans.

As regards green crops, the returns for 1872, compared with those for 1871, show a falling-off in Great Britain of 122,000 acres, and of 38,000 acres in Ireland. There was a large decrease in the acreage under potatoes both in Great Britain and in Ireland, amounting to 63,000 acres in the former and to 67,000 acres in the latter country. Potatoes had been planted in Great Britain upon considerably larger quantities of land in each year between 1868 and 1871, and the acreage of the crop in 1872 was lessened in some parts of the country by bad weather, and in others by a scarcity of labour at the planting season. The large acreage which is devoted to potatoes in Ireland fluctuated very little in the four years preceding 1872. Turnips and Swedes were sown in Great Britain upon 80,000 fewer acres in 1872 than in 1871, but upon 19,000 more acres in Ireland. Mangold, which in the four previous years had shown a largely increased acreage in Great Britain, fell off in 1872, in comparison with 1871, by 31,000 acres; but there

was a larger acreage under mangolds in Ireland by 3000 acres.

In the acreage under clover and other rotation grasses, there was an increase in Great Britain of 144,000 acres, or 3½ per cent., in 1872, as against 1871. Allowing for the effect of an improved classification, making a more correct distinction between lands under rotation grasses and in permanent pasture, Mr Valpy remarks, that it is probable that there has been an increased attention to this description of grass crops. Of the acreage under rotation grasses in Great Britain a larger quantity was reserved for hay in 1872 than in 1871, to the extent of 135,000 acres. The acreage of this description of hay in 1872 was 2,299,000 acres, and the probable value of the total crop of hay from clover and artificial grasses in Great Britain in 1872 would amount to £9,196,000, taking the grass at one ton per acre, and the average price at £4 per ton. The increased acreage of permanent pasture in 1872 was 140,000 acres, and the increased acreage under hay from permanent pasture was \$8,000 acres. The acreage of permanent pasture set apart for hay in 1872 was 3,577,000 acres, and the probable value of the crop of meadow hay in 1872, taking the yield at 18 cwt. per acre, and the price

at £3 per ton, would be £9,658,000.

The number of horses included in the returns for Great Britain showed an increase of 3000 as against 1871; but the number of licenses issued in 1872 for horses (not included in the returns) showed a decrease of about 7000. The number of unbroken horses and mares, kept solely for breeding in Great Britain in 1872, was 319,199. The probable number of young unbroken horses is estimated at 300,000, which, upon 2,150,000, the total of all the horses in Great Britain (unlicensed and licensed), would give about 14 per cent. as the probable proportion of young unbroken horses. The number of horses in Ireland was larger in 1872 than in 1871 by 3000. The number of horses under two years of age in Ireland was returned at 96,000 in 1872. or nearly 18 per cent. of the total number of horses in Ireland. If yearlings may be reckoned at one-half the young horses, 150,000 in Great Britain and 48,000 in Ireland would be about the number annually added to our stock of horses. In 1872 there were 7 horses to every 100 cultivated acres in Great Britain, against 31 in Ireland, 5 in Belgium and Holland, and 3 in France. In Great Britain in 1872 there were 287,000 (5 per cent.) more cattle in 1872 than in 1871, and 200,000 more than in any previous year. The stock of cattle in Ireland was larger in 1872 than in 1871 by 84,000, or rather more than 2 per cent. There was a larger increase in cattle under two years than above that age in Great Britain in 1872, a proof that the high prices of M2

meat are encouraging the rearing of more stock. The total number of sheep and lambs in Great Britain in 1872 exceeded the total number in 1871 by 802,000, or 3 per cent. But the stock of sheep still remains much lower in number than it was in each of the three years preceding 1871, and is below the highest number, which was returned in 1868, by 2,790,000. In Ireland the number of sheep was increased in 1872 over 1871 by 34,000. The stock in Ireland is smaller than in 1868 by 560,000. The occurrence of so large and serious a decrease as 3,592,000 head, or 12 per cent., in the stock of sheep in Great Britain between 1868 and 1871, and chiefly, if not entirely, in consequence of the dryness of the seasons, may direct attention to better preparations for meeting the occasional want of water and grass in future. Under the influence of high prices for meat, the number of pigs in Great Britain was increased in 1872 over 1871 by 272,000, or 11 per cent. In Ireland, on the contrary, partly owing probably to a smaller potato crop, there was a decrease of pigs in 1872 to the extent of 230,000, and the proportionate number per 100 acres was rather below what it was in Great Britain.

The following Table shows, for each division of the United Kingdom, and for the United Kingdom (including the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands), the population, the total area (in statute acres), the abstract of acreage under all kinds of crops, bare fallow, and grass; under corn crops (including beans and pease); under green crops; under bare fallow; under grass, clover, etc., under rotation, and under permanent pasture; and also the percentage of acreage under each description of crop (stated exclusively of the small percentages for flax and hops), in each of the years 1871 and 1872. [In this and the succeeding tables the first row of figures placed opposite to each particular, consists of the figures for 1871; the second row, of the figures for 1872.]

In Great Britain there were 15,357 acres under flax in 1872, against 17,366 in 1871. In Scotland there were 1262 acres under flax in 1872, against 1242 in 1871. In Ireland there were 122,003 acres under flax in 1872, against 156,883 acres in the previous year. There were, in 1872, fourteen counties in Scotland in which flax was more or less grown, but only nine counties in which the land under this crop amounted to 12 acres. There were, in 1872, 45 acres under flax in Aberdeenshire, 157 in Ayrshire, 118 in Dumbartonshire, 50 in Fifeshire, 273 in Lanarkshire, 48 in Linlithgowshire, 21 in Perthshire, 22 in Renfrewshire, and 507 in Stirlingshire.

The next Table gives the abstract of live stock returned, and the proportionate number of live stock to every 100 acres under crops, fallow, and grass in each division of the United Kingdom, and the totals for the United Kingdom (including the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands); also the number of persons from whom returns were obtained for the years 1871 and 1872. In Great Britain only horses used for agriculture, unbroken horses, and mares kept solely for breeding, are included in the returns. In Ireland all descriptions of horses are included.

An abstract of Agricultural Returns for Great Britain for 1873, issued from the Statistical Department of the Board of Trade, states that the number of acres under wheat in 1873 was 3,490,392, a decrease of 3 per cent. from 1872. The acreage under barley in 1873 was 2,336,020 acres, an increase upon 1872 of 0.9 per cent. 2,676,234 acres were under oats, showing a decrease, as compared with 1872, of 1.1 per cent. The largest decrease occurred in potatoes, which claim only 514,693 acres, a decrease of 8.8 per cent. from 1872. The hop acreage in 1872 was 63,283, an increase of 2.2 per cent. Comparing 1873 with 1871, there was a decrease in everything except hops. The total numof live stock in Great Britain on June 25, 1873, was as follows:—Cattle, 5,764,549; sheep, 29,427,635; pigs, 2,500,259. These figures represent an increase in cattle of 6 per cent. over 1872, and 11.7 per cent. over 1871; while in sheep the increase was equal to 5.4 per cent. compared with 1872, and to 8.5 per cent. compared with 1871. The pigs, however, were fewer in 1873 than in 1872 by 9.9 per cent., though they were fractionally more numerous than in 1871.

In Ireland, in 1873, there were returned as under wheat 168,435 acres; under oats, 1,510,089 acres; under barley, 230,188 acres; under potatoes, 903,282 acres. Wheat showed in 1873, compared with 1872, a decrease of 56,859 acres; oats, of 114,622 acres; potatoes, of 88,589 acres; and barley, an increase of 11,175 acres. Since 1869 there has been in Ireland a steady decrease of the area under wheat and oats. The return of live stock in Ireland in 1873 was as follows:—Horses, 532,146; cattle, 4,142,400; sheep, 4,482,053; pigs, 1,042,244. These numbers show in 1873, compared with 1872, a decrease of 8828 in horses, and of 346,327 in pigs; an increase of 83,003 in cattle, and of 218,799 in sheep.

WRECKS AND CASUALTIES.

The number of wrecks, casualties, and collisions from all causes on and near the coasts of the United Kingdom (in waters within 10 miles from the shores of the United Kingdom, in waters within any bays or estuaries, in waters around any outlying sandbanks which are dry at low water, in the seas between Great Britain and Ireland, and between the Orkney and Shetland and Western Islands and the mainland of Scotland) reported in 1872 was 1958; 383 more than the number reported in 1871; and more by 1782 than the average of the five years 1868-72 (17791). In the wrecks, casualties, and collisions of 1872, 590 lives were lost on 125 vessels; in those of 1871, 626 lives were lost on 135 vessels. Of the casualties of 1872, about 1 in 16 resulted in loss of life. The most destructive gales of the year occurred on the 8th and 9th December, and on the 21st-23d November. It having been found in numerous instances that the direction and force of the wind, as given by the masters in their reports, differed more or less from the particulars of weather reported to the Meteorological Office, during 1872 steps were taken towards making strict inquiry at the moment into all such variations. The number of ships lost or damaged in the 1958 casualties of 1872 was 2381-454 more than in 1871-and their tonnage was upwards of 581,000 tons; 1878 of those vessels are known to have belonged to Great Britain and its dependencies, and 430 to have belonged to foreign countries, while the country and employment of the remaining 73 are unknown. Of the British vessels, 1156 were employed in the coasting trade, and 722 in the (over-sea) foreign and home trade. 19 of the foreign

vessels were employed in the British coasting trade. The number of collisions in 1872 was 409, and of wrecks and casualties other than collisions, 1549. Of these 1549, 439 resulted in total loss, and 1110 in partial damage; while the average of the 17 years 1856-72 was-total loss, 47211; partial damage, 74817. Of the 439 total losses, 159 are said to have been caused by stress of weather, 109 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, 56 by defects in the ships or their equipments (40 vessels foundering from unseaworthiness); of the other 1110 casualties, 524 were caused by stress of weather, 229 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, and 157 by defects in the ships or their equipments. In the last ten years 555 ships appear to have been lost, and 770 to have been damaged, from defects in the ships or their equipments. In 1872 there were on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom 95 wrecks and casualties to smacks and other fishing vessels. Of the remaining 2286 vessels which suffered wreck or other casualty, nearly a half, 1097, belonged to colliers and vessels carrying ores, chiefly employed in the coasting trade. The life lost in 1872 was distributed as follows :- In fishing smacks, 101; in vessels of the collier class, 194; and in other vessels, 295. 211 wrecks and casualties happened in 1872 to nearly new ships; 374 to ships from three to seven years of age; 481 to ships from seven to fourteen years old; 666 to ships from fifteen to thirty years old; 298 to old ships from thirty to fifty years old; 47 to ships between fifty and sixty; 24 to ships between sixty and seventy; 17 to ships between seventy and eighty; 4 to ships between eighty and ninety; 5 to ships between minety and a hundred; and 2 to ships over a hundred years old. The ages of 252 vessels were unknown. Of the 409 collisions, 62 resulted in total loss, and 347 in partial damage; the averages of the ten years 1863-72 beingtotal loss, 821; partial damage, 301;. Of the 2381 vessels lost or damaged in 1872, 88 were rigged as ships, 211 were steam-ships, 649 schooners, 357 brigs, 409 barques, 242 brigantines, and 124 smacks, the remainder being small vessels rigged in various ways. 911 of them did not exceed 100 tons burthen, 836 were from 100 to 300 tons, 418 from 300 to 600, and only 216 were above 600 tons burthen. Of the 211 steamers, 204 were built of iron; and of the 2170 sailing vessels, 37 were built of iron. Of the 1958 casualties of all kinds 885 occurred on the east coast (from Dungeness to Duncansbay Head), 276 on the south coast, 516 on the west coast (from the Land's End to the Mull of Cantyre), 44 on the north and west coast of Scotland (from the Mull of Cantyre to Duncansbay Head, including Orkney and Shetland, the Hebrides, etc.), 198 on the Irish coast. 947 happened when the wind was at force 6 or under, that is to say, when it did not exceed a strong breeze in which the ship could carry single reefs and top-gallant sails, 365 with the wind at forces 7 and 8, that is, with a moderate to fresh gale, and 622 with the wind at force 9 and upwards, that is to say, from a strong gale to a hurricane. Of the 125 vessels on which life was lost, 83 were laden, 39 in ballast, and it is unknown whether the others were laden or light; 102 were entirely lost. 87 lives were lost in vessels that foundered, 67 through collisions, 325 in vessels stranded or cast ashore, the remaining 111 from various causes. The total number of casualties in rivers in the United Kingdom was 306, of which 35 were total losses. Of these casualties collisions numbered 156, founderings 10, strandings 102, and miscellaneous 38; 240 were casualties to British sailing-vessels, 182 to British steam-vessels, 43 to foreign sailingvessels, and 8 to foreign steam-vessels. The number of lives reported to have been lost in casualties in rivers was 36. 20 of the 409 collisions off the coasts of the United Kingdom were between two steam-ships both under weigh, and 24 of the 156 in harbours and rivers were also between two steamships both under weigh.

Of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, which occurred on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the number reported in 1872 (some of which may have occurred in the previous year) was 498; 440 to British vessels, of which, 314 were totally lost, and 126 partially damaged; 58 to foreign vessels, of which 39 were totally lost, and 19 partially damaged. Of vessels lost or damaged in collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the num-

ber reported was 55; of which 48 were British vessels (of which 3 were lost, and 45 were partially damaged), and 7 were foreign vessels (2 lost, and 5 partially damaged). The tonnage of the 358 vessels totally lost was 100,157, viz., British vessels 84,707 tons, foreign vessels 15,453 tons; the tonnage of the 195 vessels partially damaged was 75,719, viz., British vessels 67,251 tons, foreign vessels 8468 tons. The number of lives lost was 479, viz., on British vessels 391, on foreign vessels 88; the number of lives imperilled but saved was 9901, viz., on British vessels 8387, on foreign vessels 1514. The number of wrecks, etc., other than collisions, which occurred to British vessels on foreign coasts or at sea in 1872 was 1733, of which 483 involved total loss, and 1250 partial damage; and the number of vessels lost or damaged in collisions was 194, of which 23 were lost, and 171 sustained partial damage. The tonnage of vessels totally lost was 218,216 tons, and the tonnage of vessels partially damaged was 561,055 tons. The number of lives lost was 1501, and the number of lives imperilled but saved was 27,965. The total number of wrecks, casualties, or collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and other British Possessions abroad, and to British vessels on foreign coasts and at sea, in 1872, was 2480, 2415 of which occurred to British vessels, and 65 to foreign vessels; and the total number of lives lost was 1980, of which 1892 were lost on 248 British vessels, and 88 on 6 foreign vessels. In 1872, 88 vessels, not heard of after sailing or being spoken at sea, are reckoned as lost, 1214 lives being supposed to have been lost in them. Of these missing vessels, 63 belonged to the United Kingdom, involving the loss of 928 lives, and 25 belonged to British Possessions abroad, involving the loss of 286 lives. Only 4 were steamships. 36 of those vessels sailed from ports in the United Kingdom, 32 from ports in British Possessions abroad, and 20 from foreign ports. 54 were laden vessels, 7 were vessels in ballast, 9 were fishing vessels, and in 18 cases it is unknown whether the vessels were laden or in ballast. Many of the missing vessels, however, sailed previously to 1872.

The sum paid by the Board of Trade, out of the Mercantile Marine Fund, for providing apparatus for saving life on the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1872 was £6077; the expenditure on this account in the eighteen years 1855-72 had been £140,414, besides £1181 paid by the Admiralty on account of life-belts. At the end of 1872 there were on the coasts of the United Kingdom 282 sets of rocket and mortar apparatus provided by the Board of Trade (38 in Scotland). The number of life-boats in 1872 was 261, of which 233 belonged to the National Life-Boat Institution, and 28, of which 6 were subsidized by the Board of Trade, were under other management (34 life-boats at stations in Scotland). 508 stations (31 in Scotland) were supplied with Captain Ward's life-jackets for the use of the coast-guard. The number of volunteer life-brigades at the end of 1872 was 8, and the number of volunteer life-companies 143; 2 of the brigades and 31 of the companies were in Scotland. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in 1872 was 4634-485 being saved by life-boats, 399 by rocket and mortar apparatus, lines, etc., 602 by luggers and coast-guard and other boats, 930 by ships and steamboats, 2026 by ships' own boats, and 192 by other means. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the eighteen years 1855-72, was 68,720.

RAILWAYS.

At 31st December 1872 the amount of railway capital authorized was in England and Wales, £532,365,223 (£389,230,869 by shares and £143,134,354 by loans); in Scotland, £76,461,819 (£56,875,379 by shares and £19,586,440 by loans); in Ireland, £35,762,311 (£26,313,625 by shares and £9,448,686 by loans); in the United Kingdom, £644,589,353 (£472,419,873 by shares and £172,169,480 by loans). At the same date the amount of paid up stock and share capital was, in England and Wales, £346,025,457 (ordinary, £201,583,027; guaranteed, £55,034,092; preferential, £89,408,338; in Scotland, £49,052,741 (ordinary, £21,906,656; guaranteed, £7,502,066; pre-

ferential, £19,644,019); in Ireland, £21,725,565 (ordinary, £15,549,406; guaranteed, £468,155; preferential, £5,708,004); in the United Kingdom, £416,803,763 (ordinary, £239,039,089; guaranteed, £63,004,313; preferential, £114,760,361). The amount of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at the same date was, in England and Wales, £127,576,279 (by loans, £49,201,716; by debenture stock, £78,374,563); in Scotland, £17,659,021 (by loans, £13.279,659; by debenture stock, £4,379,362); in Ireland, £6,970,428 (by loans, £3,742,842; by debenture stock, £3,227,586); in the United Kingdom, £152,205,728 (by loans, £66,224.217; by debenture stock, £85,981,511). The total of stock and share capital paid up and of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at 31st December 1872 was, in England and Wales, £473,639,591 (including £37,855 capitalized rent-charge); in Scotland, £66,711,762; in Ireland, £28,695,993; in the United Kingdom, £569,047,346. The amount of subscriptions made by railway companies to other companies at the same date was, in England and Wales, £14,337,314; in Scotland, £1,507,143; in Ireland, £492,679; in the United Kingdom, £16,337,136.

In the year ended 31st December 1872 the total gross receipts of railway companies from all sources were, in England and Wales, £45,039,155 (passenger traffic and mails, £18,876,764; goods traffic, £24,499,414; miscellaneous, £1,662,977); in Scotland, £5,775,090 (passenger traffic and mails, £2,087,795; goods traffic, £3,454,975; miscellaneous, £232,320); in Ireland, £2,421,265 (passenger traffic and mails, £1,322,996; goods traffic, £1,062,170; miscellaneous, £36,099); in the United Kingdom, £53,235,510 (passenger traffic and mails, £22,287,555; goods traffic, £29,016,559; miscellaneous, £1,931,396). The total working expenditure finclinding all expenses) was, in England and Wales, £22,065,151; in Scotland, £2,943,518; in Ireland, £1,284,635; in the United Kingdom, £26,293,304. The net receipts were, in England and Wales, £22,989,668 (including £15,644 received by the North London Railway for working other lines); in Scotland, £2,831,572; in Ireland, £1,136,630; in the United Kingdom, £26,957,870. The number of miles of railway open at the end of 1872 was, in England and Wales, 11,136; in Scotland, 25x7; in Ireland, 2091; in the United Kingdom, 15,814. In the United Kingdom the total capital received by railway companies, including loans and debenture stock, up to the end of 1872, was at the rate of £35,984 per mile of railway constructed. In 1872 the gross receipts from goods traffic, 54.50 per cent. of the total gross receipts; the gross receipts, exclusive of the miscellaneous receipts, were at the rate of £3244 per mile of railway constructed, and at the rate of 5s.4½d, per train mile; the total working expenditure was 49 per cent. of the total receipts; and the net receipts were 4.74 per cent. of the total capital received (including loans and debenture stock).

The aggregate balance in the hands of treasurers at Whitsunday 1871 was £102,455; the aggregate balance due to treasurers at the same date was £10,814. During the year 1871-72, the revenue derived from fines was nil; from ineidental receipts, £12,972; from money borrowed on security of tolls, £11,474. The expenditure for manual labour was £70,818; for carriage of materials, £9693; for materials for surface repairs, £22,511; for land purchased, £21, 10s.; for damage done in obtaining materials, £432; for tradesmen's bills, £5345; for salaries of treasurers, £1607; for salaries of clerks, £4010; for salaries of surveyors, £7850; for law charges, £4017; for interest of debt, £23,009; for annuities, £58; for improvements, £25,920; for watering roads, £283; for debts paid off, £16,351; for incidental expenses, £9300. The amount of bonded or mortgage debts was £1,095,042; of floating debts, £15,262; of unpaid interest, £648,806; of balances due to treasurers at Whitsunday 1872, £11,831. The arrears of tolls for the current year of the account amounted to £1470; the arrears of other receipts for the current year, to £410; the arrears of former years to £6876; and the balances in the hands of treasurers at Whitsunday 1872 to £103,735.

MILITIA.

The following Table shows the establishment of each regiment of Militia in Scotland, distinguishing officers, non-commissioned officers, and privates (including drummers), and the numbers of each class present at the training of 1872; also the numbers of militia reserve men enrolled in 1872, and the numbers of militia reserve men effective, at the training of 1872, and the corresponding totals for England and Wales, for Ireland, and the United Kingdom:—

Of supernumeraries, there were in certain regiments, 2 officers, 42 sergeants, 29 corporals, 3 drummers, and 2390 privates; there were of supernumeraries, 23 sergeants, 16 corporals, and 821 privates in Scotch militia regiments. The numbers wanted to complete the militia force of the United Kingdom—the difference, that is, between the numbers enrolled and the establishment—in 1872, was 1347 officers, 397 sergeants, 400 corporals, 36 drummers, and 16,974 privates.

THE GAME LAWS.

The Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed to consider the Game Laws of the United Kingdom, with a view to their amendment, and to inquire into the laws for the protection of deer in Scotland, with reference to their general bearing upon the interests of the community, consisted of Mr Ward Hunt, Sir G. Grey, Mr Whitbread, Sir Michael Hicks Beach, Mr M'Combie, Mr Rowland Winn, Sir John Trelawny, Mr Clare Read, Mr Cowper, Mr Sturt, Mr Dent, Mr Cameron, Mr M'Lagan, Lord Elcho, Mr Hardcastle, Viscount Mahon, Mr Sherlock, Sir Henry Selwin-Ibbetson, Mr Winterbotham, Mr Muntz, and Mr Pell. The Committee was appointed during the session of 1872, and was reappointed on 12th February 1873. Its report was adopted on 8th July 1873, three members—Mr Clare Read, Sir John Trelawny, and Mr Winterbotham—voting against

its adoption. Mr Ward Hunt acted as chairman of the Committee.

In the course of the two sessions during which they conducted their inquiry, the Committee examined 74 witnesses, -viz. gentlemen learned in the law, one from each of the three parts of the United Kingdom; tenant farmers, 18 Scotch and 8 English; proprietors, 10 Scotch, 7 Irish, and 1 English; chief constables, 8 English and 2 Scotch; lessees of shootings in Scotland, 2; game-dealers, 3 English and 1 Scotch; legal officials, 2 Scotch; labourer, 1 English; forester, 1 Scotch; and miscellaneous, 4. The Committee having had referred to them the evidence taken before the Committee which sat upon the Game Laws in 1845 and 1846, thought it unnecessary to examine many witnesses upon those portions of the subject which were fully dealt with in that inquiry. A great part of the evidence taken therefore relates to the working of the Poaching Prevention Act which passed in 1862; to the state of things in Scotland with reference to game, which was not much considered by the former Committee; and to deer-forests, which did not come under the consideration of that Committee at all. In Ireland, what is generally known as the game question does not appear to exist, and the witnesses from that part of the kingdom confined themselves almost exclusively to the point of the proper close-time for grouse and partridges.

The Report treats, first, of the game laws as regards the United Kingdom; secondly, of the deer forests of Scotland; and, thirdly, of the question of the

close-time for grouse and partridges in Ireland.

^{1.} The Game Laws of the United Kingdom.—Evidence as to the law relating to game was given to the Committee by Mr Adolphus Liddell, Q.C., Under Secretary of State for the Home Department, for England; by Mr A. Forbes Irvine, for Scotland; and by Mr Serjeant Sherlock, for Ireland. The Committee find that the term "game" properly includes hares, pheasants, partridges, grouse, heath or moor game, black game, and bustards only; but that woodcocks, snipes, quails, landrails, conies (or rabbits), and deer, though not technically game, are treated as such in various Acts of Parliament relating to trespass in pursuit of and the taking of game, as well as in such as grant certain duties to the Crown in respect to licenses to take, kill, or deal in game; and that the eggs of birds of game, and of swan, wild duck. teal, and widgeon, are specially protected by law in England; and a similar protection is given in Ireland to the eggs of these birds, with the exception of swans, and also to those of quail, landrail, plover, and snipe; while the Poaching Prevention Act (1862), which applies to the United Kingdom, includes for the purposes of that Act, under the term game, the eggs of pheasants, partridges, grouse, and black or moor game. The statutes relating to game may be classified under three heads, according as they relate to (1) the preservation of species by fixing close-times; (2) the protection of rights to kill or take game; (3) the raising of revenue. The first class of provisions relates exclusively to winged game, unless the existence of a penalty for killing hares on Sunday or Christmas-day be considered an exception; while, as regards the third class, there is an exception from the necessity of taking out a game license for shooting in favour of the occupiers of lands or persons authorized by them, unconditionally as regards

rabbits, and on certain conditions as regards hares. The law, it is observed, gives greater protection to winged than to ground game. It is stated that the game-laws have been objected to mainly on the following grounds:—
1st, That they militate against the interests of agricultural tenants and agriculture generally, and consequently against the interests of the whole community; 2d, That they are injurious to the morals of the working classes; 3d, That they are oppressive in the punishments they impose; 4th, That the administration of them is committed to a body of men who, from personal interest, have a bias in favour of conviction and severity of sentence. The first branch of complaint is the one that was most pressed on the attention of the Committee. The Committee show how far the law in England and Ireland differs from the law in Scotland, and then examine

into the merits of this complaint.

They state that in Eugland and Ireland the right of every freeholder to take and kill game and wild animals found upon his own premises, passes by the common law to the tenant where the land is let, but that it may be reserved by the landlord; while in Scotland the landlord is entitled to game by law, but not to rabbits, to which latter the right is in the tenant in the absence of special reservation. In Scotland, on the other hand, a tenant can obtain compensation in a court of law from his landlord for damage caused by an increase of game during his tenancy; while in England and Ireland no such claim can be enforced in the absence of express stipulation between the parties. But though the law thus differs, the condition of most agricultural holdings throughout the United Kingdom is, that both game and rabbits are in the hands of the landlord; the tenants, however, in very many cases, both in England and Scotland, having liberty to kill rabbits,

and not unfrequently hares.

Strong remonstrances, they say, had been offered against the state of the law which reserves or allows of the reservation of ground game in the hands of the landlord upon the farms which he lets, under which the privilege of shooting the game so reserved may be hired by a third party to the detriment of the tenant; and evidence had been given by several witnesses that agricultural tenants would frequently be willing to pay a rent for the shooting, equal to that which is paid by a shooting tenant, in order that they might retain in their own hands the control over the ground game. The Committee observe, that this reservation in Scotland and the power of reservation in England, though its existence is recognised in many statutory enactments, does not directly depend upon any of them; that the repeal of every Game Act would still leave this alleged mischief untouched, and that landlords would still have the power, by agreement, of prohibiting the destruction of game by the occupier or his servants, while the competition for farms is alleged to be so great as to oblige tenants to submit to such a reservation by the landlord. They observe that the complaints have been directed principally against ground game; that the evidence goes to show that, as a general rule, little harm, which cannot be prevented by the most ordinary care, and at a comparatively small expense to the occupier, is done by winged game; and that as regards partridges, there seemed an almost universal consent that, by their consumption of grubs and insects, they are of considerable service to the farmer.

They found that in Scotland a much stronger feeling has been evoked by the preservation of game than in England. This, they say, is partly due to the excessive preservation of ground game on certain large estates, and to the sale of the game from those estates, and partly to the conditions of agricultural tenancies in Scotland. In parts of Scotland it is a common practice for a landlord (who, in addition to the reservation of game by law, reserves rabbits by agreement) to let to a stranger the right of shooting over cultivated farms when they are adjacent to his moors. The shooting tenant, between whom and the agricultural tenant there is no common bond of interest, having generally to pay a considerable rent, not unfrequently keeps up an excessive head of game; and the farmer, whose crops are injured by their depredations, has no redress except by the distasteful process of suing his landlord, and leaving him in turn to recover from the shooting tenant. The same complaint exists in England, where the shooting is let to a third

party; and in such case the grievance is aggravated by the fact that the tenant has no legal claim against his landlord for compensation except under

special agreement.

The Committee observe that husbandry is more artificial than heretofore, and that the production of human food in this kingdom depends less upon the natural fertility of the soil, and more upon the operations of skilled cultivators directed towards the growth of plants particularly attractive to the ground game at present protected by the game laws. There can be no question, they say, that the existence of a large number of hares and rabbits upon an arable farm is most prejudicial to its profitable occupation, and that the practice of some landlords and their shooting tenants of keeping up a large stock of those animals on cultivated lands, to the injury of the crops of the farming tenants, cannot be too strongly reprobated. They consider that no landlord should object to the insertion of such engagements in his leases or agreements as will ensure the keeping down of ground game within moderate limits, and that no tenant should enter upon a farm without securing protection from loss by such engagements on the part of the landlord; and they are satisfied that no means so efficient for that purpose can be devised as the concession to the tenant of the power to kill the ground game upon his farm, either exclusively or concurrently with his landlord. The Committee have, however, been satisfied that the practice of keeping up an excessive quantity of ground game is by no means general, either in England or in Scotland. The evidence goes to show that during the last few years there has been in parts of the country a considerable diminution of both hares and rabbits on cultivated lands.

The opinion was strongly pressed upon the Committee by some witnesses that a concurrent inalienable right to kill hares and rabbits should be given the tenant by law. They state, however, that they are convinced that means would be found of evading such a law by some understanding between the parties; and in corroboration of the inadequacy of such a remedy, they call attention to the evidence of a Mr Matthews, who stated to them that he quitted his farm owing to the damage done to his crops by rabbits and hares, and that, notwithstanding that he had the privilege of killing the former, for several years he did not exercise that privilege, because he thought that his landlord would not approve of it. They add, that there are cases of farms so situated that it is most difficult for the joint efforts of landlord and tenant to prevent serious damage to the latter by ground game. They refer to the case of holdings adjacent or near to woods and plantations, or other ground used as a game preserve in the hands of another proprietor.

With reference to this part of the subject, the Committee recommend—

1. That the protection given to rabbits by the game laws should be with-

drawn, except in warrens or similar enclosed places.

2 (a). That the person having the right to take game or rabbits on any land shall be entitled to recover for the damages occasioned to him by the taking of game or rabbits on such land by a trespasser, provided that in the case of rabbits the consent of the occupier of such land shall be required before any action for damages shall be brought.

2 (b). That, saving rights under existing leases, the law of Scotland be assimilated to that of England as regards the right to game in land which is let so as to give the tenant that right in the absence of reservation by the

landlord.

3. That the law of England be assimilated to that of Scotland, so as, in the absence of agreement to the contrary, to give a right of action to tenants in case of the increase of game during their term of occupancy where it is reserved.

4. That in both countries an easy and summary mode of obtaining redress

by arbitration, in respect of game, be given to tenants.

5. That all cases of compensation for damage done by game, if not settled out of court, should be referred to the County Court judges in England and to the Sheriffs in Scotland, against whose decisions there should be no appeal.

6. That when the shooting is let, and proceedings are taken by a tenant against his landlord for game damage, the law should be that the latter may

compel the shooting tenant to come in and take his place as the defendant.

7. That the occupier of game preserves should be made liable to the occupiers of adjacent farms belonging to other proprietors for damages done

by the ground game harboured in the preserves.

The Committee state that no objection was specifically taken by any witness against the system of game licenses, or the preservation of winged game by means of a close-time. A few witnesses were in favour of the total abolition of the game laws, and many in favour of taking both hares and rabbits out of the game list. Most of those who made these suggestions thought that a more stringent law of trespass would be required; while the rest, with rare exceptions, made them under a misapprehension as to the state of the law as regards simple trespass and the degree of protection now afforded by it. There was an almost unanimous opinion among the witnesses that some effectual law was necessary for the protection of the rights of proprietors and occupants against the unauthorized incursions of persons in pursuit of game and wild animals; and in all the most civilized countries (it is observed) some such legislation has been found necessary. Should, then, the present mode of granting such protection be retained? That the taking of that which the law does not consider property should not be treated as a crime; and that many of those who are guilty of poaching are persons of general good character, and are apt, after being sent to jail, to lose selfrespect and take to dishonest courses, were urged upon the Committee as considerations against retaining it. The Committee having found, from the evidence of the chief constables examined by them, that a great number of those convicted of day poaching are persons generally obtaining an honest livelihood, and that night peachers are almost invariably men of general bad character, who are ready to steal as well as poach, and being satisfied that little or no sympathy is given by any class to the night poacher, while the man who kills a hare or rabbit in the day-time is not looked upon with any disfavour by his equals or by society in general, are of opinion that poaching by day should be taken out of the category of criminal offences, and that a sufficient protection against peaching by day could be obtained by an alteration of the law of trespass without making it oppressive to the population generally. In England and Ireland, they say, redress for trespass, other than trespass in pursuit of game, must be sought by civil process, and actual damage must be proved. The same law holds good in Scotland (except in the case of proceedings under an old Act, which imposes a penalty for leaping over a dyke); but there is in Scotland a process by which a person whose lands are trespassed upon can obtain the protection of the Sheriffs' Court or Court of Session against a repetition of the offence. This process is known by the name of "interdict." A person upon whose land a trespass has been committed may petition the Court to interdict the trespasser from repeating the offence; and the defendant on breach of the interdict, which is obtained at his expense, may be apprehended and brought before the Court and fined, and is liable to imprisonment in default of payment. The Committee are of opinion that a procedure of a similar nature, with such modifications as may be necessary, might be adopted in the case of trespass in pursuit of game in the day-time, and perhaps in some other cases of trespass—in England through the medium of the County Court, and in Ireland through the Civil Court of Quarter Sessions; and that such cases might be provided for in Scotland by a simplified and cheap form of interdict procedure to be instituted in the Sheriffs' Small Debts Court. They recommend that provisions to carry out these proposals be substituted for the present enactments as regards day poaching. They further recommend that, when upon the letting of any farm, game is reserved, the farming tenant shall not be held criminally liable for the destruction of game upon the farm, excepting under any provisions relating to close time or excise licenses.

In making the recommendation that the protection given to rabbits by the game laws should be withdrawn except in warrens, or similar enclosed places, the Committee state that they have been chiefly influenced by the strong opinion they entertain that these animals should be looked upon as vermin on cultivated land, where they consume or destroy more food than

they are worth. At the same time, they do not ignore the desirableness of having in the country a variety as well as a quantity of animal food. It is a fact, they say, that rabbits are largely consumed by the working classes in the towns. The number of rabbits produced annually in the United Kingdom is stated to be about 30,000,000, supplying about 40,000 tons of food, while the collection and manufacture of the skins furnish employment to many thousands of people.

The Committee do not approve of the proposal that game should be made property, holding that it would be at once extremely difficult, and obnoxious to the general feeling of the community, to confer upon game all the attributes of property. They advise, however, that the eggs of game be made the property of the owner of the soil and the subject of larceny.

The Committee recommend that in the case of night poaching, except where the offenders are armed and more than two in number, a discretion should be given to the Justices or the Court to inflict a fine instead of imprisonment, and that the convicted person should no longer be required to find sureties against the repetition of the offence, and that a person charged with this offence should be entitled to be tried by a jury, if he

prefers it, as in cases under the Criminal Justice Act.

The evidence leads the Committee to believe that the Poaching Prevention Act of 1862 has been of considerable benefit in diminishing night-poaching, and to a certain extent other crimes, and that the apprehensions felt by some at the time of its passing, that the police would thereby be taken from their other duties, have not been borne out. Some evidence had been given of the arbitrary exercise of the power of search under this Act, but latterly this had been checked. They recommend, however, that the Act should be so altered as to make it only a night-poaching prevention Act, and thus be brought into harmony with the other alterations of the law that have been suggested; and they think it is worth consideration whether the principle of this Act might not be extended to cases other than poaching.

They observe, that much has been said of the severity of the game law, in reference to the cumulative penalties to which a transgressor may become liable for what is only one act, and that there is much ground for this complaint so far as regards the law. But they have found that of late years it has not been the practice for more than one penalty to be inflicted, except that excise penalties for want of a certificate are enforced against persons previously convicted of trespassing in pursuit of game. The law in this respect was condemned by the Committee which sat in 1845, and their recommendation on the subject meets with the approval of the Committee. This, they say, if carried out, would place the law in conformity with the modern practice.

It is stated that there had been a strong expression of opinion from many of the Scotch witnesses against magistrates having jurisdiction in game cases, on the ground of their being chosen almost exclusively from the class of game preservers, and that some evidence had also been given by English witnesses that a similar feeling exists in England on the subject. The Committee have no reason to believe that there is any just ground for dissatisfaction with the manner in which the game laws have been administered by the magistrates generally, either in England or Scotland. At the same time it must, they say, be admitted that a considerable amount of distrust in a tribunal tends to impair the authority of the law which it administers. They are of opinion that the complaints which have been made on this head will be removed if day-poaching cases be taken out of the category of criminal offences, and the option of trial by jury given to persons accused of night-poaching, as above recommended.

The Committee recommend that, so far as regards the question of game, land employed for agricultural purposes be assessed upon the principle

contained in Mr Clare Read's bill of 1868.

The Committee recommend that persons authorized in writing by the occupiers of land to kill hares upon such land be exempt from license duty, other than the gun tax, while acting under such authority, without restriction as to the number of persons so authorized, and without any registration of such authority.

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It had been brought to the notice of the Committee that an old Scotch Act, requiring a property qualification to enable a man legally to hunt or hawk, has been inadvertently left upon the statute-book. They recommended that this should be repealed.

They have also ascertained that it is the practice in some parts of Scotland for landlords to have their gamekeepers sworn in as constables without their being put under the authority of the chief of the constabulary. This appears to the Committee to be most objectionable. They recommend that the practice be prohibited.

2. Deer-Forests.—In regard to the complaints which have been made against deer-forests in the Highlands-viz., that they have tended to depopulation of the country, and that, by the displacement of sheep to make way for deer, they have diminished the food-supply and raised the price of meat to the consumer-the Committee are of opinion that they are not borne out by the evidence. It has been shown to them that the depopulation of the Highlands has been mainly due to two causes -one, the suppression of illicit whisky-stills, by the working of which many small crofters were, until half a century ago, enabled to eke out a precarious subsistence; the other, the eviction of the crofters and small tenants for the purpose of converting their holdings into large sheep-farms. Some instances of the removal of cottar tenants from one part of an estate to another, and the demolition of their former dwellings in the interests of the deer-forests, have been proved before them; but such removals have been shown to have been attended with no change for the worse in the condition of the tenants, and in most cases with an improvement, both as regards their habitations and their circumstances. As to the food-supply, it was shown to the Committee that the number of sheep actually displaced by deer cannot exceed 400,000; that only a fourth of this number could have been brought to market every year; and that as the sheep must have been kept on other ground during the winter, not much more than half the mutton supplied by 50,000 sheep could be credited to the grazing ground now devoted to deer. The number of sheep in Great Britain, in 1871, was 28,397,589; so that the price of meat could not be perceptibly affected by the change, even if we depended upon our home supply alone. The complaints against the deerforests have mostly come from sheep-farmers; and the Committee observe, that the cause of their discontent is apparent—they have felt keenly the competition for the mountain grazing which the desire of sportsmen to rent deer-forests has created.

Evidence had been given that the crops of farmers and crofters in the neighbourhood of deer-forests have suffered damage from the incursion of deer at night, and the Committee are of opinion that this has sometimes been the case. It had been proved to them that in numerous instances the owners or occupiers of forests have voluntarily erected or supplied materials for the erection of fences to prevent annoyances to the tenants on the same estate, and they think that all landlords would do well to follow this example. They are of opinion that it should be in the power of any proprietor of a sheep-farm to call upon the owner of any adjoining deerforest to be at half the expense of erecting and maintaining a boundary fence adapted to keep in sheep, in the same way that he can now call upon him to share the expenses of a march dyke to prevent the intrusion of cattle or sheep, and that until such request is complied with, the owner of the forest and his tenants should lose the power of pounding sheep straying from such sheep-farm into the forest; and that any person should have a claim for damages done to his crops by deer from the forest of a neighbouring proprietor, unless the owner or occupier of the forest shall be willing to be at half the expense of protecting such crops from damage by a deer fence. They recommend that the necessary provisions should be made by law for these objects.

3. The Close-time for Grouse and Partridges in Ircland.—The Committee are of opinion that the time for the commencement of grouse-shooting in Ireland should be altered from the 20th to the 12th of August, and of partridge-shooting from the 20th to the 10th of September.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Army Estimates.—The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of Her Majesty's land forces (exclusive of Her Majesty's British forces on the East Indian establishment, 62,924 in number) provided for in the Army Estimates for the year ending 31st March 1874, was 128,968 (viz., officers 7020, non-commissioned officers 12,965, drummers and trumpeters 3133, rank and file 105,850). This includes the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India; the general and departmental staff (viz., general staff, 77 officers; chaplain's department, 78; medical department, 596; and control department, 504-in all, 1255 men); 93 officers, 455 non-commissioned officers, 2 drummers and trumpeters, and 89 rank and file-in all, 639 men -employed in various establishments connected with the army; and the number of officers and non-commissioned officers, etc., of the regular army to be added to the staff of the brigade depots which are to be formed from the staff of the auxiliary forces (viz., 164 officers, 3170 non-commissioned officers, and 630 drummers and trumpeters-in all, 3964 men). The strength of the regiments on the British establishment, provided for in the estimates, including the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India, was 123,110 (viz., 5508 officers, 9340 non-commissioned officers, 2501 drummers and trumpeters, and 105,761 rank and file). The number of horses provided for (exclusive of officers' horses) was 15,120. The number of officers, noncommissioned officers, and rank and file of the reserve forces, for which provision was made in the Army Estimates for 1873-74, was, militia (including permanent staff), 129,000; yeomanry cavalry (including permanent staff), 13,000; volunteers (not including staff), 160,750; army reserve, class 1, 10,000; class 2, 25,000. The estimated charge was for effective services, £12,166,000 (viz., regular forces, £5,393,700; reserve forces, £1,447,800; control establishments and services, £4,182,800; works and buildings, £778,000; and various other services, £363,700); and for noneffective services, £2,250,400-total, £14,416,400; from which, however, was to be deducted the estimated Exchequer extra receipts, £1,185,000; making the net charge for army services in 1873-74, £13,231,400. The estimated charge for the reserve forces was distributed between the forces as follows:—militia pay and allowances, £815,410; yeomanry cavalry, £78,900; volunteer corps, £430,300; army reserve corps, £123,200. The estimate for the volunteer corps was made up as follows:-Pay, etc., of 288 adjutants of volunteer corps, £57,820; pay, etc., of sergeant-instructors, £56,500; capitation grants to volunteer corps, etc. (30,750 artillery volunteers at 30s.; 130,000 light horse, engineers, and rifle volunteers at 20s.; and 113,300 extra efficients at 10s.), £279,400; miscellaneous charges for volunteer corps, £36,600.

The Navy Estimates .- The number of officers, seamen, boys, and marines proposed to be voted for the service of Her Majesty's navy for the year ending 31st March 1874, was 60,000 (or 58,800, deducting 1200, the number of the officers and crews of Indian troop ships), viz., 46,000 officers, seamen, and boys for the fleet and coastguard service, and 14,000 marines. The estimated charge (including supplementary estimate) was £9,899,725, made up as follows:—For effective services, £7,929,859; for non-effective, £1,802,126; for conveyance of troops, £167,740. On the 1st December 1872, the number of ships in commission effective for general service was 107 (viz., 7 line-of-battle ships, all armour-plated; 8 frigates or corvettes armour-plated, and 31 not armour-plated; 61 sloops and smaller vessels, all, except one, steamers). There were also in commission 9 armour-plated first reserve ships (all steamers); of gunnery and training ships, stationary, receiving, and depot ships (including royal yacht), surveying vessels, troop ships, store ships, and drill ships for the royal naval reserve, there were 43 (27 sailing vessels and 16 steamers), exclusive of Indian troop ships; and of tenders (including late coastguard cruisers) there were 67 (31 sailing vessels and 36 steamers). There were in all 226 vessels (59 sailing vessels, and T67 steamers, 24 of the latter being armour-plated) in commission.

Dublin and Edinburgh Police.-From a return procured by Mr M'Laren. it appears that the net annual expenditure from the National Exchequer on account of the Dublin metropolitan police was £48,313 in 1870-71; £66,347 in 1871-72; £63,004 in 1872-73; and was estimated at £106,784 for 1873-74. The payment from imperial funds for Edinburgh police was £5072 in 1869-70; £5011 in 1870-71; £5084 in 1871-72; and was estimated at £5100 for each of the two following years.

Purchase of the Telegraphs.-A return, bearing the name of Mr Plunkett, dated 15th July 1873, shows that the whole sum paid by the post-office to telegraph companies in the United Kingdom for the purchase of their interests in the telegraph systems, was £5,847,347. The aggregate amount claimed by railway companies in the United Kingdom against the postoffice, in respect of their interests in the telegraph systems worked over their railways, was £4,032,032, 19s. 6d. (and interest); also £26,500 in annual payments; and rents for way-leave. Claims to the amount of £2,068,804, 9s. 6d. (and interest); as also for £26,500 in annual payments; and rents for wayleave, were undecided at the date of the return. Of the claims adjudicated upon, amounting to £1,963,228, 10s., the amount admitted by the postoffice to be due and awarded on arbitration was £865,659; and of this £846,253 had been paid, and £20,406 remained due, at the date of the return.

The Register House Fees .- A reduced table of fees in the department of the Lord Clerk Register of Scotland, and in the office of the General Register of Sasines, and General Register of Hornings, Inhibitious, and Adjudications, was sanctioned by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury. in terms of the Act 31 and 32 Vict. c. 64, on 5th March 1873, and appointed to come into operation on 1st April following. It was estimated that the reduction would involve a diminution of receipts to the extent of £16,852. and leave a probable surplus, after defraying expenses, of £2593.

Disputed Parochial Settlements, Scotland .- A return, procured by Mr Craufurd, shows that at 1st March 1873, there were two cases of disputed parochial settlements pending in the Court of Session, and nine such cases pending in the Sheriff Courts.

Piers and Harbours .- From the Report of the Board of Trade for the session of 1873, it appears that, among the schemes approved of by the Board, and for which provisional orders had been granted by it, were schemes for : (1) the construction of a pier at East Loch, Tarbert, in the island of Harris and county of Inverness; power to levy rates; promoter, Edward Henry Scott; estimated cost of the works, £2061: (2) the construction of a breakwater at Fraserburgh Harbour; power to borrow £60,000, inclusive of money previously borrowed; promoters, the Fraserburgh Harbour Commissioners; estimated cost of the works, £44,000; (3) the construction of a pier at Kirk Point on the estate of Lochaline in the county of Argyll; power to levy rates, and to borrow £1900; promoter, Mrs Magdalene Hardie or Paterson; estimated cost of works, £1797: (4) the construction of a pier in the vicinity of the "Mill of Sandhaven," in the county of Aberdeen, the extension of the existing jetty of the Harbour of Sandhaven, and the deepening, dredging, and otherwise improving the said harbour; power to levy rates, to borrow £10,000, to provide and license steam-tugs, and to be a local and pilotage authority; promoter, Lord Clinton; estimated cost of the works, £8500. No new regulations as to the issuing of orders had been made by the Board of Trade.

Constituencies of the United Kingdom .- A return, bearing the name of Sir Charles Dilke, shows, with respect to each parliamentary constituency of the United Kingdom, the number of electors on the register in force at the date of the return (7th February 1873). In England and Wales the number of county electors was 800,769, and the number of burgh electors, 1,356,526. In Scotland the number of county electors was 81,298, and the number of burgh electors, 181,460. In Ireland, the number of county electors was 174,341, and the number of burgh electors, 50,170.

Railway Accidents.-The number of persons killed on railways in the United Kingdom in 1872 was 1145 (930 in England, 168 in Scotland, and 47 in Ireland); and the number of persons injured was 3038 (2617 in England, 383 in Scotland, and 38 in Ireland). In 1871 the number returned as killed was 411, the number returned as injured 1261. In 1872, 127 passengers were killed, and 1462 injured; 632 servants of companies were killed, and 1395 injured; 70 other persons were killed while passing at level crossings, and 23 injured; 225 trespassers were killed, and 107 injured; 33 persons committed suicide; and 58 others were killed, and 51 injured from various causes. The number of passengers killed from causes beyond their own control was 24 (13 in England, 10 in Scotland, and 1 in Ireland); and the number injured, 1247 (1086 in England, 151 in Scotland, and 10 in Ireland); the number of servants of companies or contractors killed from causes beyond their own control was 64 (56 in England, 5 in Scotland, and 3 in Ireland); and the number injured, 376 (321 in England, 49 in Scotland, and 6 in Ireland). The large apparent increase in the numbers killed or injured on railways in 1872 is attributed to the fact that the returns for 1872 were the first prepared for a full year under the Regulation of Railways Act, 1871. Many railway companies did not previously make returns of accidents to their servants; and the great discrepancies between the number of accidents returned by the various railway companies still lead to a doubt whether all the companies make the returns with care and completeness. The number of passengers conveyed by railway, exclusive of season-ticket holders, in 1872 was 372,450,223 in England, 34,097,183 in Scotland, 16,327,416 in Ireland, and 422,874,822 in the United Kingdom; and the number of season-ticket holders was 217,838 in England, 35,233 in Scotland, 19,271 in Ireland, and 272,342 in the United Kingdom. The number of passengers killed from causes beyond their own control, was, to the whole number of passengers, exclusive of season-ticket holders, in the proportion of 1 in 28,650,017 in England, 1 in 3,409,718 in Scotland, 1 in 16,327,416 in Ireland, and 1 in 17,619,784 in the United Kingdom.

Accidents in the United Kingdom.—From a return procured by Sir Thomas Bazley it appears that the number of persons who sustained fatal or other accidents, as reported in the reports of the Inspectors of Factories for the year ending 31st October 1870, was 18,579-16,415 males and 2164 females, 354 males and 19 females were killed; 1043 males and 335 females had to undergo amputation; 15,018 males and 1810 females sustained other injuries; 136 persons were killed and 6356 injured in blast furnaces or iron-works; 50 were killed and 3821 injured in engineering works; 54 were killed and 1439 injured in shipbuilding yards; 25 were killed and 2539 injured in cotton factories; 14 killed and 589 injured in woollen factories. The same return shows the number of fatal and other accidents (additional to those reported under the Factory Acts) for either the year ending the 31st October 1870, or a subsequent year, so far as could be ascertained, in the United Kingdom or on British ships, the particulars given being as follows:-Killed in collieries and ironstone mines, 991; killed on railroads 404, injured 1261; killed on ships of the Royal Navy (including the whole service affoat) 603, injured 12,150; coastguardsmen, killed 13, injured 280; merchant service, killed 2946; streets of London, killed 213, injured 2964; total killed 5170, total injured, 16,655. Total for one year (including accidents in works under the Factory Acts), killed 5543, injured 34,861.

Regular Forces for Service in the United Kingdom.—From a return procured by Mr Vernon Harcourt of the numbers of the regular forces maintained for service in the United Kingdom, in each year since 1800, it appears that the number so maintained was 101,145 in 1872 and 98,719 in 1873, and that these numbers exceeded the number maintained for service in the United Kingdom in every year since 1810. The force maintained for home service in 1873 was made up as follows:—Cavalry, 13,051; artillery, 19,205 engineers, 3646; infantry, 62,817.

January 22. The emigrant ship "Northfleet," bound from London to Tasmania, while riding at anchor in Dungeness Roads, was run down by a passing steamer, the "Murillo," and about 300 lives lost.

The number of knights is restricted to twenty-five, exclusive of the Sovereign, princes of the blood royal, and foreign princes.

THE MOST ANCIENT AND MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE THISTLE.

The Most Ancient Order of the Thistle appears to have been projected by King James V. about 1540, but he died before the design could be carried out. It was renewed by King James VII., who created eight Knights in 1687. After an abeyance of fifteen years, the Order was restored by Queen Anne in 1703. It consists of the Sovereign, and sixteen knights. The badges are, The Star, of silver, inscribed with the motto, Nemo me impune lacessit; The Jewel, or figure of St Andrew, suspended from a green riband; and The Collar, of gold.

THE MOST HONOURABLE ORDER OF THE BATH,

Established in 1399, was revived by King George I. in 1725, enlarged in 1815, and enlarged and remodelled in the month of April 1847. It consists of the Sovereign, of a Great Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal, descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one thousand one hundred and forty-eight Companions or Members, divided into the three classes following, each class being subdivided into two sections, Military and Civil: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, seventy-five in number, of whom not more than fifty shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major-General in the army, or Rear-Admiral in the navy; 2d, Knights Commanders, one hundred and eighty-three in number, of whom not more than one hundred and twenty-three shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Colonel in the army, or Captain in the navy; 3d, Companions, eight hundred and ninety in number, of whom (except under special and temporary exigencies) not more than six hundred and ninety shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major in the army, or Commander in the navy, whose services shall have been marked by the especial mention of their names in despatches. The qualification of members of the civil divisions of each of these three classes is no otherwise limited than that, by their personal services to the Crown or by the performance of public duties, they shall have merited the Royal favour:

and that no person shall be appointed to one class who is not qualified for the other and higher classes. Honorary members, being foreigners, may be appointed in such numbers as the Sovereign shall think fit. For each class and division, appropriate insignia are appointed by the Statutes of the Order, enacted by Her Majesty the Queen, and published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 1st June 1847. THE VICTORIA CROSS, OR ORDER OF VALOUR.

This naval and military decoration was instituted by an instrument under the sign-manual of the Queen, dated the 29th of January 1856, "for the purpose of rewarding individual instances of merit and valour." It is ordained that the distinction shall be styled "The Victoria Cross;" that it shall consist of a Maltese cross of bronze, with her Majesty's royal crest in the centre, and, on an escroll underneath, the inscription "For Valour;" that the Cross shall be suspended from the left breast by a blue riband for the navy, and by a red riband for the army; that the names of those upon whom her Majesty may be pleased to confer the decoration shall be published in the London Gazette; that any one who, after having received the Cross, shall again perform an act of bravery, which if he had not received such Cross would have entitled him to it, shall have such farther act recorded by a Bar attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, an additional Bar being added for every additional act; that the Cross shall be awarded to those officers or men only who have served the Queen in the presence of the enemy, and have there performed some signal act of valour or devotion to their country; that with the view of placing all persons on a perfectly equal footing of eligibility for the decoration, neither rank nor long service nor wounds nor any other circumstance or condition whatsoever, save the merit of conspicuous bravery, shall be held to establish a sufficient claim to the honour; and that every warrant officer, petty officer, seaman, or marine, or non-commissioned officer or soldier who shall have received the Cross shall be entitled to a special pension of ten pounds a year, each additional bar carrying with it an additional pension of five pounds a year.

THE MOST EXALTED ORDER OF THE STAR OF INDIA.

This order of knighthood was instituted by the Queen, in February 1861, and enlarged and remodelled in March 1866, by letters patent under the great seal, in order to afford to the princes, chiefs, and people of the Indian Empire, a public and signal testimony of Her Majesty's regard; to commemorate Her Majesty's resolution to take upon herself the government of the territories in India; and to enable Her Majesty to reward conspicuous merit and loyalty. The order is to be called "The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India." It is to consist of the Sovereign, a Grand Master, and one hundred and seventyfive Ordinary Companions or Members, divided into three classes: 1. Twentyfive Knights Grand Commanders; 2. Fifty Knights Commanders; 3. One
hundred Companions; together with such Extra and Honorary Knights as the
Sovereign may appoint. The Sovereign shall be the King or Queen regnant of
the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Grand Master, first and principal Knight Grand Commander of the Order, shall be the Viceroy and Governor-General of India for the time being. The Sovereign may confer the dignity of a Knight Grand Commander of the Order upon such native princes and chiefs of India as shall have entitled themselves to the Royal favour, and upon such British subjects as have, by important and loyal services rendered by them to the Indian Empire, merited such Royal favour. No person shall be nominated a Knight Commander, or a Companion, who shall not, by his conduct and services in the Indian Empire, have merited the Royal favour.

THE MOST DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF SAINT MICHAEL AND SAINT GEORGE

Was instituted in 1818, for natives of the Ionian Islands and of Malta, and for such other British subjects as should be distinguished in connexion with the said islands, or with H.M. service in the Mediterranean. By certain statutes, bearing date 4th December 1868, Her Majesty was pleased to enlarge and reorganize the Order, so as to extend it to such natural-born subjects of the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as might be persons of conspicuous merit, or have rendered important services to the Crown, within or in connexion with any of Her Majesty's colonial possessions; and a supplementary statute, bearing date 3d April 1869, ordains that naturalized foreigners may be admitted in like manner as if they were natural-born subjects of the British Crown. The Order consists of the Sovereign, of a Grand Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal descended of the body of King George I., or other

exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one hundred and eighty-five Members, divided into three classes, viz.: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, twentyfive in number; 2d, Knights Commanders, sixty in number; 3d, Companions, one hundred in number.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GRANTING OF COMMISSIONS IN THE ARMY.

CAVALRY AND INFANTRY.

I .- FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

Medical Examination. — All candidates, excepting non-commissioned officers, will be inspected by a Medical Board; and no candidate will be allowed to proceed to examination by the Civil Service Commissioners unless certified by the Board to be free from any bodily defects or ailments, and in all respects, as to height and physical qualities, fit for Her Majesty's service

Age.—The limits of age for candidates for admission by competition queen's cadets, Indian cadets, and pages of honour, will be from 17 to 20;

for students of the universities who shall have passed the interim examination as specified below (c), from 17 to 21; for graduates of the universities who shall have passed the examination for the degree of B.A. or M.A., from 17 to 22; and for lieutenants from the militia, from 19 to 22.

Entrance Examination.—The entrance examinations will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and will take place three times a year, in the months of January, May, and October.

- 1. Sub-Lieutenants.—A commission as sub-lieutenant in the army may be given:—
 - (a) To a successful candidate at a competitive examination in general subjects, to be held under such regulations as may be issued from time to time.
 - (b) To the cadets styled Queen's cadets, to those styled Indian cadets, and to the pages of honour. Queen's cadets must be recommended by the Commander-in-Chief or First Lord of the Admiralty. Indian cadets are nominated by the Secretary of State for India in Council. These cadets and pages of honour shall pass such a qualifying examination in general subjects as may be fixed from time to time.
 - (c) To a student from the University of Oxford, Cambridge, Durham, London, Dublin, Edinburgh, St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, or the Queen's University, Ireland, who has passed "Moderations" at Oxford, the "Previous Examination" at Cambridge, or the corresponding examination at the other universities, under such regulations as may be issued from time to time.
 - (d) To a lieutenant of militia who shall have served for two annual trainings with his militia regiment, and be recommended by his commanding officer, confirmed by the general officer commanding the district, and who shall pass such a professional examination as may be fixed, and produce a certificate of qualification similar to that prescribed for Queen's and Indian cadets, or possess a university certificate.
 - (c) To a non-commissioned officer who is in possession of a first-class certificate of education, including English history and general geography, and who shall pass such a professional examination as may be fixed from time to time.
 - (f) To a quartermaster recommended for promotion. He will be required to pass the examination prescribed for non-commissioned officers.

II.-PROMOTION.

- 2. Sub-lieutenants, in order to qualify for the rank of lieutenant, shall be required to serve with a regiment for twelve months, or such period as the Secretary of State may require, and after such service (except in the case of non-commissioned officers promoted to be sub-lieutenants), to go through such a course of study at a military college, and to pass such a professional examination as may be fixed from time to time.
- Sub-lieutenants will be removed from the service for moral or physical
 unfitness, or if they fail to pass the examination at the military college
 within three years from the date of their commissions as sub-lieutenants.
- 4. Lieutenants.—(a) Sub-lieutenants, promoted from the rank of non-commissioned officers, will, after twelve months' satisfactory service with a regiment, be promoted to the rank of lieutenant. They will not be called upon to pass any examination.
 - (b) Other sub-lieutenants will be promoted as laid down in article 2.

- 5. Captains.—Lieutenants, before they are eligible for promotion to the rank of captain, will be required to pass such professional examination as shall be prescribed from time to time; and if they fail to do so within five years from the date of their commissions as lieutenants, they will be removed from the service. Officers who received their first commissions before August 26, 1871, will be under a special arrangement.
- 6. Field Officers.—Captains, before they are eligible for promotion to be field officers (whether substantive or brevet), will be required to pass such examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Captains who obtained their rank prior to October 30, 1871, may be appointed majors without examination, if approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

ARTILLERY AND ENGINEERS.

Cadets.—Admission to the Royal Military Academy as cadets will be granted to the successful candidates at an open competitive examination, conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners. The limits of age will be from 16 to 18. Before proceeding to examination, the candidate will require to produce a certificate from a Medical Board that he is free from any bodily defect or ailment, and in all respects as to height and physical qualities, fit for Her Majesty's service.

I. FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

Lieutenants.—Appointments to the office of lieutenant will be conferred upon cadets who shall have passed through a course of instruction at the Royal Military Academy in a satisfactory manner, as evidenced at a test examination in the subjects of instruction. If a cadet fails to come up to the required standard at two examinations, or be unable to qualify for a commission within three years, or to acquire sufficient proficiency in military exercises he will be removed.

II. PROMOTIONS.

- 1. Captains.—Officers, before they are eligible for promotion to the rank of captain, will be required to pass such professional examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Every officer appointed after October 30, 1871, is required to pass the above examination within five years from the date of his commission as lieutenant, or he will be liable to be removed from the service. Lieutenants of Engineers who completed five years' service previous to October 30, 1871, may be promoted without examination if specially approved by the Commander-in-Chief.
- 2. Field Officers.—Captains, before they are eligible for promotion to be field officers (whether substantive or brevet), will be required to pass such professional examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Captains who attained their rank previous to October 30, 1871, may be promoted without examination if specially reported on and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.
- * Officers serving with their regiments at distant foreign stations may be provisionally promoted to vacancies previous to passing the prescribed examination, but such promotion will be cancelled should the officer fail in his examination.

SECTION II.—ENGLAND.

ENGLAND AND WALES.

EXTENT, ETC.—The length of England and Wales, from Portland Bill, Dorsetshire, in lat. 50° 31′ N., to Berwick-on-Tweed, in lat. 55° 46′ N., is 363 miles; the extreme breadth, from the North Foreland, Kent, in long. 1° 26′ E. to the Land's End, Cornwall, in long. 5° 41′ W. is 320 miles. The area of England is 50,933 square miles, or 32,597,398 acres; that of Wales, 7378 square miles, or 4,721,823 acres; that of England and Wales, 58,311 square miles, or 37,319,221 acres. Of the 52 counties into which they are divided, England contains 40, Wales, 12. The number of parishes in England and Wales in 1871 was 14,793. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act in 1815 was, in England and Wales, £51,898,423; in 1851, £94,809,106; in 1861, £114,058,538; in 1865, £131,341,499; in 1867, £110,696,900;* in 1870, £119,429,807. The rateable rental of property in England and Wales assessed to the Poor's Rate was £71,840,271 in 1856; £100,612,734 in 1868; £109,447,111 in 1872. The gross estimated rental in 1872 was £129,038,976.

Coucation.

UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

This ancient University consists of a union of Colleges and Halls devoted to the purposes of study and education, and incorporated under the style or title of "The Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford." There are at present twenty Colleges, each having a mansion for the residence of members of the foundation, and for the reception of students. These Colleges may be said to be an institution peculiar to England, as none exist in foreign universities, nor even in Scotland. They are bodies corporate, independent of the University, being governed, as to their own concerns, by their respective statutes; and each has in connexion with it numerous valuable fellowships, scholarships, and exhibitions. The five Academical Halls at Oxford are places in which students reside, under discipline and instruction, and pass through the curriculum to their several degrees in precisely the same manner as the student inmates of the Colleges. The term Hall, however, implies also a Society, and in this sense there is an important difference between Halls and Colleges, inasmuch as the former are not incorporated, have no endowments for fellows, and have all their property held in trust for them by the University. The recent foundation of the Keble College was established in 1870 from funds collected by private subscription, and suitable buildings have been erected. In pursuance of the Oxford University Act, 1854, two Private Halls have been instituted for the purpose of affording a cheaper education than is to be had at the Colleges. The scholars are subject to the laws of the University, partake of its privileges, and are admissible to its degrees in the same way as the other students.

By a recent decree of the authorities at Oxford, students may be admitted members of the University without belonging to any College or Hall. Such students are called Scholares non ascripti, or unattached students, and keep terms by residing at Oxford, either with their parents or in licensed lodging houses.

They are under the coutrol of certain delegates.

There are four terms for academical exercises in each year, but for many Professors' lectures and some other purposes, the third and fourth together count as only one. Two of the four can be kept by six weeks' residence, and two by three weeks'. The ordinary residence in the College extends to twenty-six weeks in the year. Candidates for admission to the University

are required to pass a preliminary examination.

The degrees conferred by the University upon students are those of Bachelor and Master in Arts, and of Bachelor and Doctor in Music, and in the three superior faculties of Civil Law, Medicine, and Divinity. Twelve terms of residence are required for the degree of B.A., and for the position of Student of Civil Law or of Medicine. No further residence is necessary for any degree. Thus the education of a young man at Oxford is spread over about three years; but in the case of candidates for the higher honours, a degree is seldom taken in less than four years.

Candidates for the degree of B.A. are required to pass three distinct examinations—viz., 1. Responsions before the masters of the schools; 2. First Public Examination before the moderators; 3. Second Public Examination before the public examiners. For this last there are now six second public examiners.

called the schools of Literæ Humaniores, Scientiæ Mathematicæ et Physicæ, Scientia Naturalis, Jurisprudentia, Historia Moderna, and Theologia. At the responsions, candidates are examined in Latin and Greek grammar, one Latin and one Greek author, arithmetic, and either Euclid or algebra. The examination is conducted partly in writing, partly viva voce.

Candidates at the first public Examination are examined either in logic or in algebra, together with three books of Euclid, in the four Gospels in Greek, and in one Latin and one Greek author at the least, there being a higher examination both in Classics and Mathematics for candidates for honours.

As a general rule, every candidate is required to pass the Second Public Examination both in the classical school and also in some one of the other three schools. In the classical school he is examined in divinity and in one Latin and one Greek author at the least. The term "Divinity" comprises the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, the Old and New Testaments, the Thirty-nine Articles, and the Evidences of the Christian Religion. In the mathematical school candidates are examined either in the first six books of Euclid or in the first part of algebra. In the school of natural science they are examined in the principles of mechanical philosophy, chemistry, physiology, and further in some one of the particular sciences dependent on mechanical philosophy. In the school of law and medern history every candidate must offer himself for examination in English history and law. In all the schools there are examinations for honours as well as the ordinary or pass" examination. A fifth school of theology was instituted in 1870, and the school of law and modern history was, in 1873, separated into two distinct schools.

For the degree of M.A., no further examination or exercise is required; but a B.A. cannot obtain the degree of M.A. until the expiry of the twenty-sixth term from his matriculation, provided he has had his name on the books of some College or Hall during that period.

UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

This University, like that of Oxford, is a union of Colleges or Societies devoted to the study of the liberal arts and sciences. There are seventeen such Colleges at Cambridge, each being a body corporate, maintained by the endowments of benefactors, and governed by its own laws, but controlled by

the paramount statutes of the University.

The terms of the academical year are three, -viz., 1. Michaelmas, beginning on the 1st of October-and ending on the 16th of December; 2. Lent, extending from the 13th of January to the Friday before Palm Sunday; and 3. Easter, commencing on the Friday after Easter-day, and closing on the last Friday but one in June. Students are admitted, either by a personal examination before the tutor and some of the College officers, or by sending to the tutor a recommendatory certificate from some M.A. of the University, stating the qualifications, etc., of the person applying for admission, and at the same time transmitting the caution-money, which varies from £10 to £50, according to the social status of the candidate. If this certificate be deemed satisfactory, the student is admitted, and his name placed on the boards which hang in the butteries of the several Colleges. The day after the division of any of the terms is the time fixed for matriculation, i.e., enrolment of the student's name in the University books. At Cambridge, as at Oxford, persons may be admitted as students, and have degrees conferred upon them, without the necessity of their being members of any College or Hall.

Undergraduates are required to give a constant attendance on lectures, and, yearly or half-yearly, undergo an examination in those subjects to which their attention has been devoted. By this course they are prepared for those public examinations which must be passed before the degree in Arts can be obtained. What is called "The Previous Examination" is held towards the end of the Michaelmas term, and is open to all who have kept two terms at least, and entered upon their third. The subjects of this examination are, one of the four Gospels in Greek, Evidences of Christianity, Latin and Greek Grammar, one Greek and one Latin author, the Elements of Euclid, and Arithmetic. No student can be examined for the degree of B.A. who has not previously kept eight terms; and a B.A. "may be admitted ad incipiendum in artibus at any time after three academical years have passed from the completion of his Bachelor's degree. The inceptors in every year become complete Masters of Arts by creation on the Commencement Day, i.e., on the last Tuesday but one in June." No one has a vote in the Senate until after creation.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.

Unlike other universities, this confers its degrees upon the results of its examinations only. It was founded in 1836 "for the purpose of ascertaining, by means of examination, the persons who have acquired proficiency in literature, science, and art, and other departments of knowledge," by the pursuit of a regular and liberal education at University College and King's College, London, or at any of the other colleges and houses of learning named in the royal charter; "and of rewarding them by academical degrees and certificates of proficiency, as evidence of their respective attainments, and marks of honour proportioned thereto." But by later charters, students from any or no college are admissible to all examinations but those in Medicine and Surgery.

There are two examinations for matriculation in each year; one commencing on the second Monday in January, and the other on the last Monday in June; they are held at the new University Buildings, Burlington Gardens, London, and also, under special arrangement, in various cities, towns, and colleges, of the United Kingdom and the Colonies. Candidates must produce a certificate showing that they have completed their sixteenth year. The subjects of the examination which they must pass are—Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Latin, English, Greek or French or German, and Outlines of English History and Modern Geography. The matriculation fee is £2.

lines of English History and Modern Geography. The matriculation fee is £2. For each of the degrees of B.Sc. and B.A., two examinations besides the one at matriculation require to be passed—the first on the third Monday in July, and the second on the fourth Monday in October. The fee payable at each examination is £5. No candidate is admitted to the examination for the degree of M.A. until after the expiration of one academical year from the time of his passing that for B.A., nor unless he can show evidence that he has completed his twentieth year. A fee of £10 is exacted for the M.A. examination.

The highest degree in the Faculty of Arts in this University is D. Lit., or Doctor of Literature. A candidate who is only B.A. must pass two examinations at an interval of at least a year; but Masters of Arts who have taken their degree in classics need pass only the second examination. The former of these is in the Greek and Latin classics generally, with prose composition in Greek, Latin, and English, and in history to the end of the eighteenth century; the second examination is in the English language. literature, and history, and in any two of the following subjects, provided that either French or German be one of these:—French; German; Anglo-Saxon, with Icelandic; Sanskrit; Arabic; Hebrew, with Syriac. These examinations are conducted by means of printed papers. A fee of £10 is payable at each examination.

The degree of D.Sc. (Doctor of Science) is open to all Bachelors of Science of two years' standing; who may elect to be examined in any one of sixteen branches of science. The fee is £10.

By the late Reform Act, the University of London returns one member to serve in Parliament; the constituency (about 1400) is composed solely of "Members of Convocation;" which comprises all graduates of certain standing who have chosen to secure their privileges by payment of a trifling fee.

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The academical year at Durham consists of three terms, viz., Michaelmas, Epiphany, and Easter. The qualifications of students to enter on the course of education pursued in the several Faculties of Arts, Theology, Physical Science, and Medicine, are ascertained by examination before admission.

For the degree of B.A., or the licence in Theology, a residence of two years is required, the period of residence in the year being six months in both cases. A Graduate may proceed to a licence in Theology after one term's residence, and a Licentiate may proceed to a Degree after one term's residence, the term, in either case, being of eight weeks; but this may also be done by keeping two short terms of five weeks each. Terms kept by students in Theology are allowed to count in part towards the degree of B.A., and vice versa. A graduate may proceed to the degree of M.A. when he is of the standing of nine terms from his admission to that of B.A.

No student is obliged to attend the services of the Episcopal Church unless he belongs to that church; and no religious test or subscription is required from any member of the University except he be studying in the

EXTENT, RTC.—The length of Ireland, from Cork Harbour, in lat. 51° 51′ N., to Malin Head, Donegal, in lat. 55° 23′ N. is 244 miles; the breadth, from Howth Head, Dublin, in long. 6° 5′ W. to Slyne Head, Galway, in long. 10° 11′ W. is 168 miles. Its area is 31,754 square miles, or 20,322,641 acres. It is divided into four provinces, and subdivided into 32 counties. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act was £11,767,810 in 1854, £12,893,829 in 1860, £13,876,913 in 1866, and £13,251,507 in 1871. The net annual value of property assessed to the Poor's Rate was £11,614,296 in 1851, £12,280,029 in 1860, and £13,153,498 in 1869. Dublin, the capital, had in 1871 a population of 267,717.

Population, ETC.—The population of Ireland (excluding men in the army and the navy) in each decennial period from 1801 to 1871 is shown in the following Table:—

EXTENT AND POPULATION.

The length of the mainland of Scotland, from the Mull of Galloway, in Wigtownshire, in lat. 54° 39' N. to Dunnet Head, in Caithness-shire, in lat. 58° 40' N. is 278 miles; the breadth, from Buchan-ness, in Aberdeenshire, in long. 1° 47' W. to the most westerly point in Ross-shire, in long. 5° 52' W. is 150 miles. The area, including the islands, is 30,463 square miles, or 19,496,132 statute acres.

The number of counties is thirty-three. The number of parishes in 1871 was 887. The old valued rent of the counties, as ascertained in 1674, was £3,656,408 Scots, or £319,281 sterling [See the Almanac for 1857, pp. 25?, 253]: the new valued rent of the counties, in 1858-9, was £8,883,935, exclusive of the annual value of the real property in the royal and parliamentary burghs, amounting to £3,952,586 [see the Almanac for 1861, pp. 335, 337.]

LIST OF THE PEERAGE OF SCOTLAND,

AS IT STOOD ON THE 1ST MAY 1707; ORDERED TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HOUSE OF LORDS 22D DECEMBER 1707.

By this document, commonly called The Union Roll, it is understood that the order of precedence among the Peers of Scotland is regulated; and, with certain amendments, it is that called at all elections of their representatives, though it cannot be looked on as a complete list, such as should exclude claims to Peerages not entered in it. By the Act 11 and 12 Vict. c. 52, it is ordered that, until otherwise directed by the House of Lords, the Lord Clerk Register, or the Clerks of Session officiating at elections in his name, shall not call the title of any Peerage on The Union Roll in right of which no vote has been received or counted since the year 1800. It is farther provided by the Act 14 and 15 Vict. c. 87, that after every election the titles of Peerages in right of which no vote has been received or counted for fifty years or upwards, shall be transmitted to the Clerk of Parliament, and on an order to that effect being issued from the House of Lords such titles shall not be called at future elections, until the House of

Lords shall otherwise direct.

The Roll, as originally framed, contained 154 Peers; namely, 10 Dukes, 3 Marquesses, 75 Earls, 17 Viscounts, and 49 Barons; and there have been subsequently enrolled 9 Peers; namely, 1 Duke, 2 Marquesses, 1 Earl, and 5 Barons. These are distinguished by the letters ad. and a date (that of their enrolment) placed after their names. The dates of the creations have been prefixed; Peerages which are attainted, extinct, or dormant, are printed in italics; the date of the attainder, extinction, or abeyance, being added; and an asterisk * has been placed after the names of those who are likewise Peers of England, of Great Britain by special creation (all Peers of Scotland being, in terms of the Act of Union, Peers of Great Britain), or of the United Kingdom.]

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SECT. III.—EDUCATIONAL AND LITERARY ESTABLISHMENTS.

THE UNIVERSITIES OF SCOTLAND.

The four Scottish Universities—at St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh—were in the year 1858 completely reorganized and as far as possible assimilated. The Universities (Scotland) Act of that year made "provision for the better government and discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and improving and regulating the course of study therein." Since then the Universities have possessed a nearly uniform constitution, and each is now governed by three internal bodies, called respectively the General Council of the University, the University Court, and the Senatus Academicus. The official Heads of each University are:—the Chancellor (who nominates a Vice-chancellor for conferring degrees in his absence), chosen for life by the General Council; the Rector, chosen every three years by the matriculated students; and the Principal (at St Andrews, Senior Principal) or resident Head of the University, who is President of the Senatus.

The General Council consists of the Chancellor, who is President of the Council; the Rector, who is President of the University Court; the Principal, Professors, and Graduates of the University; as well as four Assessors nominated to sit in the University Court by the Chancellor, Rector, General Council, and Senatus. Failing the Chancellor, the Rector presides; whom failing, the Principal or Senior Principal; whom failing,

the senior Professor present.

The University Court is a court of appeal from the Senatus, and consists of the Rector, Principal, and Assessors. In Edinburgh, two additional members of the Council and Court are the Lord Provost of the city, and an Assessor nominated by the Town Council; and in Glasgow, one additional member is the "Dean of Faculties"—an extra representative of the Senatus.

The Senatus Academicus, which consists of the Principal and Professors, is entrusted with the superintendence of the teaching and discipline, and the

administration of the revenues and property of the University.

Two members of Parliament are returned by the four Universities. One of these represents Edinburgh and St Andrews; the other Glasgew and Aberdeen. The electors are the members of the General Councils. The Vice-Chancellor is empowered to superintend the election. The Vice-

Chancellors at Edinburgh and Glasgow are the Returning Officers.

Each University has certain endowments with which to reward its distinguished students and graduates. They are applied in the form of Prizes (Class and University); Bursaries; Scholarships, and Fellowships. Edinburgh possesses the greatest number of valuable Scholarships and Fellowships, while the Bursary organization is very efficient in Aberdeen. Bursaries and Scholarships differ from each other in this, that while the former are bestowed (many of them now on competitive examination) with the view of benefiting undergraduates, the latter are offered for competition to graduates, to induce them to prosecute their studies further. Nearly all the Scholarships in the four Universities are confined to students who have passed the three ordinary examinations necessary for a degree in Arts.

Open to all the Scottish Universities are-

I. THE SIX FERGUSON SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1860 by the Trustees of the late John Ferguson, Esq. of Cairnbrock. They are each of the value of £80 per annum, and tenable for two years. Three are offered for competition every year,—one in Classics

one in Mathematics, and one in Mental Philosophy. The competitions take place in Glasgow in the month of October, and are open to all who have taken the M.A. degree in one of the Universities in Scotland within two years immediately preceding; or who have passed the last of the ordinary examinations for that degree within the same period, and who have not already gained one of these scholarships. The Scholarships are adjudged upon the report of the Examiners. Candidates are enrolled, not later than 1st September in each year, at the office of the Trustees, 66 George Square, Glasgow, where all necessary information may be obtained. — Secretary, M. S. Tait.

II. THE SHAW FELLOWSHIP IN MENTAL PHILOSOPHY,

Founded in 1867 by contributors to a Memorial of Sir John Shaw, Bart. It is of the annual value of £160, tenable for five years, and is in the patronge of the Senatus Academicus of the University of Edinburgh. It is lestined for the encouragement of the study of Logic, Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and the History of Philosophy,—studies for which the Scottish Universities have long been celebrated in Europe. It is awarded after competitive examination on these subjects, and is open to graduates in Arts of any of the Scottish Universities, and to those who have passed the examinations for that degree, of not more than five years' standing at the time of the competition.

The different professorial chairs are distributed (except at St Andrews, where Law is not taught) under the four Faculties of Arts, Medicine, Law.

and Theology.

The degrees conferred by each of the Universities are the following:—Master of Arts (M.A.), Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master in Surgery C.M.), Doctor of Medicine (M.D.), Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.),* Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.), and the two purely honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws LL.D.) and Doctor of Divinity (D.D.); together with some which are conined to Edinburgh and Glasgow, viz. Bachelor and Doctor in Natural and Physical Science; and in Engineering (Sc. B. and Sc. D.); Doctor in Mental Science (Sc. D.), and Doctor in Philology Sc. D.)

In the chairs of the Faculty of Arts are taught the leading branches of liberal education, required for general culture, or needed as a preparatory discipline for the three professional Faculties. The province of the latter Faculties—Medicine, Law, Theology—is special, namely, to train for the

learned professions.

It is in the Faculty of Arts that the fundamental part of University Education is given:—viz., Latin and Greek; Mental Philosophy, including Logic and Metaphysics, and Moral Philosophy, with which department English Literature is conjoined; and Mathematics, with the various translates of Experimental Physics. A degree in Arts is a pass to any of the other three Faculties. The possession of it exempts from all pre-iminary examination on general subjects any one desirous of entering the Medical or Legal professions or the Church, and the principal departments of the Public Service.

To obtain the degree of Master of Arts entails a University course of Four Winter Sessions, or (in the case of certain entrance examinations being passed) of Three Winter Sessions. Attendance on the classes of Humanity (Latin), Freek, Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, Rhetoric and English Literature, Mathematics, and Natural Philosophy, is required of all canditates for this Degree. The examinations to be gone through for the M.A. degree are in three Departments, viz., Classics; Mental Philosophy; and Mathematics (including Natural Philosophy or Experimental Physics). These three examinations may be all passed at the conclusion of the curriculum; or any one or two of them at an earlier period—provided that the classes corresponding to the subjects of examination have been previously attended. When a student has passed the examinations, he may at once

proceed to take his degree, or, with a view to attaining greater distinction in the Honours examinations, he may delay doing so for a year. Those who graduate with Honours are named in alphabetical order in Classes of the First and Second rank; and Honours may be taken in each of the three Departments—Classics, Mental Philosophy, Mathematics and Physics,—or in a fourth, Natural Science.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ST ANDREWS,

The most ancient of the Scottish Universities, was founded in 1411 by Wardlaw, Bishop of the diocese. Two years later, on petition of James I., the Bishop, and others, the foundation, with benefactions annexed to it, was sanctioned, and privileges and immunities were secured to it, by Papal bull of Benedict XIII. From the first there existed the Faculties of Arts, Theology, and Canon Law. In 1430, a pedagogium was erected for the Faculty of Arts. The University has undergone numerous changes of constitution. In the sixteenth century it came to comprise three distinct corporate colleges:—

1. St Salvator's College, founded in 1455; 2. St Leonard's College, founded in 1512; 3. The College of St Mary, founded in 1537.

1512; 3. The College of St Mary, founded in 1537.

In 1747, the colleges of St Salvator and St Leonard were united by Act of Parliament, and called the United College of St Salvator and St Leonard. The University now "consists," to quote the Calendar, "of three distinct corporations, viz.:—The United College of St Salvator and St Leonard, with its Principal and nine Professors; St Mary's College with its Principal, who is also Primarius Professor, and three Professors; and the University, comprising the members of both colleges, and of which the senior Principal

(senior according to priority in office) is also president."

The session in the United College opens in the first week of November, and closes towards the end of April. In St Mary's College, it commences

about ten days later, and closes in the end of March.

St Leonard's College Hall was opened in 1861 as a residence for students attending College. The new building is capable of accommodating upwards of 30. The charge for board, etc., during the session, is from £60 to £70; and the hall is also open during the months of May, June, and July, for which the charge is from £30 to £40. The establishment is superintended by a Warden, who, along with a tutor, assists students in preparing for their classes. The students have their meals in common.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the last Thursday of March and the last Thursday of November. The election of Rector takes place

every third year, on the last Thursday of November.

The aggregate annual value of the prizes, bursaries, and fellowships at St Andrews is about £2000. The two colleges possess between them the patron-

age of nine livings of the Church of Scotland.

In 1873 the number of students who matriculated was 156; the number who graduated was 33—viz.: in Arts, M.A., 17; in Divinity, 2; in Laws, 3; in Medicine, 11. Members of the General Council, 1211. The number of those who voted for the M.P. returned in December 1868 was 1126.

THE UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW

Was founded by Bull of Pope Nicholas V., obtained by King James II. at the instigation of Bishop Turnbull in 1450. From the beginning it taught Canon and Civil Law, Theology, and the Arts, and was empowered to confer degrees in all Faculties. In its earlier days, its educational labours were carried on near the cathedral, in a building now in ruins, still pointed out as the "Old Pedagogy;" while the General Congregations of the University and of the Faculties met in the chapter-house of the cathedral. In 1459, James, first Lord Hamilton, granted the site of the late buildings to the Faculty of Arts, which thenceforward grew in importance.

In 1577, King James VI. granted increased funds in a charter called the

Nova Erectio.

By this charter provision was made for the support of a Principal, who

was to teach Theology, and three Regents in Philosophy. From this small beginning the University continued to prosper till the era of the Restoration at which time it had, besides the Principal, eight Professors and Regents Theology, Medicine, and Arts. The restoration of the Episcopal Church deprived it of a considerable portion of its revenues, and in consequence several of the Professorships fell into abeyance, but after the Revolution it began again to prosper. In the first twenty years of last century, six new Professorships were founded, and another in 1760. The remaining twelve Professorships have been founded during the present century.

Among the eminent men who have adorned this University during the last and present centuries, may be mentioned the names of Hutcheson Adam Smith and Reid, Black and Cullen, Robert Simson, John Millar, Men

and Sandford.

The University occupied the site which it has lately quitted, for upwards of four hundred years, and its late buildings for upwards of two hundred years. In 1864 these buildings and adjacent lands were sold, and extensive and handsome new buildings, designed by Sir G. Gilbert Scott of London, have been erected on an admirable site in the west end of Glasgow. The new buildings, of which the foundation-stone was laid by the Prince and Princess of Wales in October 1868, and which were formally opened for the purposes of the University on the 7th November 1870, are estimated to cost, when completed, upwards of £350,000; and in aid of their erection subscriptions have already been received, chiefly in Glasgow and the neighbourhood, to the amount of above £150,000.

The winter session commences on the first Tuesday of November, and estate on May 1st. The Medical classes open a week earlier, and close in the beginning of April. There is also a Medical summer session from the begin-

ning of May till the end of July.

The Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries, founded in this University, amount in annual value to about £4500. The most valuable of these are the George A. Clark Scholarships, four in number, each about £220 in annual value, and the Snell Exhibitions, ten in number, and each £108 in annual value, the object of which is to assist Scottish students in prosecuting their studies in Oxford University. These exhibitions have been held by not a few who afterwards became distinguished, among whom may be mentioned Adam Smith, Sir William Hamilton, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, and the present Lord President of the Court of Session.

The University Library contains an extensive and valuable collection of books, which is always increasing by donations and by a grant of £707 per annum from the Treasury as compensation for the loss of the Stationers'

Hall privilege.

The Hunterian Museum was founded by the eminent William Hunter, M.D., who, by his will dated 1783, bequeathed to the University his valuable collection of books, manuscripts, coins, paintings, anatomical preparations, zoological and mineral specimens, and archeological relics.

The number of matriculated students in the session 1872-73 was:-In the Faculty of Arts, 742; Divinity, 52; Medicine (summer, 22), 346; Law,

118 : total, 1258.

Matriculated Students, in voting for the Rector, are divided into four

nations:-

Natio Glottiana (those born in Lanarkshire); Natio Transforthana (those born in the counties lying north of the Forth); Natio Rothseiana (those born in the counties of Renfrew, Bute, or Ayr); Natio Loudoniana (those not already included).

This election takes place every three years on the 15th (or 16th, if the 15th

be a Sunday) of November.

The graduates in 1872-73 were as follows: D.D., 4; B.D., 10; LL.D., 4;

M.D., 18; M.B., 45; C.M., 40; M.A., 34.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the Wednesday immediately preceding the opening, and on the Wednesday immediately preceding the closing of the winter session.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ABERDEEN

Was, until 1860, two Universities and Colleges. The one, the University and King's College of Aberdeen, was founded in 1494 by Elphinstone, Bishop of the diocese, and sanctioned by a Papal bull obtained by James IV.; the other, Marischal College and University of Aberdeen, was founded in 1593, under

& charter ratified by Parliament, by George Keith, Earl Marischal.

The Universities (Scotland) Act, 1858, includes (as mentioned in the preamble) "The union of the two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen;" which union the Commissioners appointed by Parliament dated from Sept. 15, 1860. Among the other Scottish Universities, that of Aberdeen now ranks from the foundation of 1494. It consists now of but one University, having its classes for Arts and Divinity in what was King's College, and its classes of Law and Medicine in what was Marischal College. Both Colleges had classes in all four Faculties.

In the election of Lord Rector, the matriculated students are divided, according to their birthplace, into four "nations"-Mar, Buchan, Moray, and Angus; and each nation chooses a procurator to vote for the Rector; and, in case of a tie, the Chancellor (failing him, the Principal) has a casting vote.

In Arts, the session commences on the Tuesday before the last Monday of October, and closes on the first Friday of April. In Divinity, the session commences on the first Monday after the October Synod, and closes after lasting four months. In Law, the session extends from the first Monday of November to the end of March. In Medicine, the winter session commences in the last week of October, and extends over six months; and the summer session commences on the first Monday of May, and extends over three months. The General Council meets twice a year on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of April, and on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of October. The number of Matriculated Students in the winter session of 1872-73 was 625; in the summer session of 1873, 173. The Graduates in 1873 were as follows:-M.A., 46; M.D., 16; M.B., 57; C.M., 50; B.D., 2; D.D., 4; LL.D., 3.

The registered members of the General Council for the year 1873 numbered 2075. The number who voted at the election in November 1869 was 1710.

THE UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH.

This, though the youngest of the Scottish Universities, annually enrels the largest number of students. Although formally founded by James VI in 1582, and entitled Academia Jacobi VI., or "King James's College," it originated in a bequest made in 1558 by Reid, Bishop of Orkney, to the Town-Council of Edinburgh, for the erection of a College. The money was long retained by the Abbot of Kinloss. After a delay of five years, the Council, on the faith of ultimately obtaining the bequest, purchased a part of the property of the University. One of Mary lant has a part of the present site of the University. Queen Mary lent her assistance, granting a charter of presentation to some confiscated church property; but no building was commenced until 1581, 23 years from the date of the bequest In the following year, King James incorporated the University by Reval Charter; increasing the grants of Queen Mary. Its poverty, from deficienty of endowments, has always been an impediment to the University of Ediz-

The title of Edinburgh University to the various rights, privileges, and immunities possessed by the other Universities of the kingdom, ress on an Act of the Scottish Parliament passed in 1621, and on subsequent ratifications made in the Treaty of Union and in the Act of Security.

The work of teaching began in 1583, under Robert Rollock, who was at first called Regent. Other Regents were subsequently appointed, and Rellock became Principal. For a considerable time, each of the Regents taught all branches of learning, and the student was then carried through his whole course by the same teacher.

The University of Edinburgh has long been famous. Its Medical fame, which rose under Dr Alexander Monro in 1720, is second to no other in Europe.

It is also celebrated in Mental Philosophy.

Until 1858, the Town-Council had a large share of the patronage of the University. Now, the filling up of such chairs as the Town-Council were patrons of is in the hands of seven Curators—four of them elected by the Town-Council, and the remaining three by the University.

The University Library contains about 150,000 volumes and many valuable MSS. The new Museum of Science and Art is connected with the

University.

The aggregate annual value of the Fellowships and Scholarships (all founded since 1858) is about £3200. Eight of these are given for eminence is Classics; six in Mental Philosophy; twelve in Mathematics and the Experimental Sciences; and two in Divinity. There are above a hundred Bursaries in connexion with the Faculty of Arts, of the aggregate annual value of considerably more than £2000; and twenty-four in the Faculty of Divinity, worth annually nearly £400. There are also several newly founded Bursaries in Law and Medicine.

University Certificates in Arts for women are also given to candidates who have studied in the classes of the Edinburgh Ladies' Educational Association, and whose qualifications have been tested by examinations

corresponding to those required at graduation in Arts for men.

Local examinations of schools, corresponding to those of Oxford and

Cambridge, are held by the University annually, in June.

The University, by an arrangement with the War Office, holds special

examinations which qualify for admission to the Army.

The present University building is a large, modern, quadrangular edifice, covering the site of the "Kirk o' Field," the scene of the murder of Darnley. The architect was Mr Adam, who also designed the Register House. The foundation-stone was laid in 1789; but, from want of funds, the building remained only half completed till after 1815. It is still unfinished. The magnificent dome, designed to rise above the grand entrance, has never been erected. The interior of the quadrangle is very handsome, in the Grecian style. The accommodation in the present buildings, however, is very inade quate to the rapid growth of the University under the Universities Ad (1858), and the institution suffers seriously in consequence.

There are two sessions—the winter session, opening in the beginning of November, and closing in the end of April; and the summer one, opening in the beginning of May, and closing in the end of July. In the winter session, the classes in all the four Faculties are assembled; in summer, only those of Law and Medicine, with tutorial classes in Arts.

The number of matriculated students for 1872-73 was 1906.

For particulars relative to degrees, etc., see University Calendar. The Public Ceremonial of Graduation in Arts, Divinity, Laws, and Science is in April, and in Medicine in August. Those who graduated in 1873, after examination, numbered 257,-viz., in Arts (M.A.), 57; Medicine, 183, -viz., M.D. 26, M.B. 82, C.M. 75; Divinity (B.D.), 10; Science 7.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the first Tuesday after the 14th of April, and on the last Friday of October. The membership of the Council is about 3650; the number of those who voted at the election of the M.P. in

December 1868 was 3263.

Peterhead. Port-Glasgow, and Portobello. EXTENDED ROYALTY.

SECTION III.

EDUCATIONAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

HIGH SCHOOL OF EDINBURGH, REGENT ROAD.

The date of the foundation of the High School is unknown, but it appears to have existed as early as the beginning of the twelfth century. From that time to the Reformation, "the Grammar School of Edinburgh," as it was then called, was under the control of the Canons of Holyrood. In 1598 it was remodelled on a more comprehensive plan, and from the patronage vouchsafed to it by James VI., it received the name of Schola Regia Edimburgensis. The course of study has since, from time to time, been extended and improved. so as to meet the advancing demands of the age. Although at first a merely classical seminary, it now furnishes systematic instruction in all the departments of a Commercial as well as of a Liberal Education. The English Language and Literature, including Reading, Orthography, Recitation, Grammar, and Composition, together with the History of Great Britain, form prominent parts of the system; while the entire curriculum of study—which occupies six years—embraces the Latin, Greek, French, and German languages, History, Geography, Physiology, Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, Zoology, and Botany, with Writing, Arithmetic, Algebra and Geometry, Drawing, Fencing, Gymnastics and Military Drill. There is a Library containing nearly 7000 volumes selected by the Rector and Masters, to which all the pupils have access.

The High School originally stood in the Old Town, near the site of the present Infirmary. It was rebuilt on nearly the same spot in 1777. As this situation had become unsuitable, from the great extension of the city northwards, and as the accommodation had proved inadequate to the rapidly increasing number of pupils, the present splendid structure was founded in 1825, on the south slope of the Calton Hill, which was deemed more convenient for the inhabitants The edifice, which cost £30,000, and was designed by the late

Thomas Hamilton, architect, was completed in 1829.

The main building, 270 feet in length, has a magnificent hexastyle Dorie portico in the centre, which is united to the wings by two corridors, the entablatures of which are supported by twelve columns, also of the Doric order. There is ample accommodation for conducting the various branches of study. The playground, a portion of which is roofed over, is spacious, extending to nearly two acres, and commands a picturesque view of the ancient city and surrounding country.

EDINBURGH ACADEMY, HENDERSON Row.

The Edinburgh Academy, which was established in 1824, and incorporated royal charter from George IV., is under the superintendence of a Board fifteen Directors, three of whom are elected annually from the body of The education is conducted by a Rector, who exercises conant supervision over all the classes, besides instructing those under his mediate care; four Classical Masters; a Master of French; a Master of erman; two Mathematical Masters; a Master of English and Elocution; d Masters of Writing, Fencing, Drawing, Fortification, and Military and ivil Engineering. Each class is taught in the classical department by the me master exclusively for the first four years. At the commencement of the fth it comes under the tuition of the Rector, assisted by the same master, and ontinues under them during the sixth and seventh years. In the three junior asses all the boys in each class are instructed together in the various ranches. But for the fourth and subsequent years of the course, each class is parated into two Divisions: one of these—"The Classical School"—is adapted r boys destined for the learned professions, or who desire a thorough classical aining; the other—" The Modern School"—is intended for boys who are to ater upon the civil or military service, or upon mercantile pursuits. The ther branches (with the exception of German, which is introduced in the fifth ear) are begun with the youngest class, and are continued without interrup-on during the whole course. The complete course extends to seven years, nd combines a thorough classical education with systematic instruction in inglish, French, and German, Writing, Ancient and Modern History, Georaphy, and the various branches of Mathematics. There are certain addional classes which are recognised as voluntary. The Academy is situated to ne N.E. of the Royal Circus. It is a handsome building, after a design by Ir Burn, and cost upwards of £14,000.

FETTES COLLEGE, COMELY BANK.

Sir William Fettes, Bart., of Comely Bank, who was born in 1750, and died in 1836, left the residue of his estate for an endowment for the education, maintenance, and outfit of young persons whose parents have died without leaving sufficient funds for that purpose, or who, from innocent misfortune during their own lives, are unable to give suitable education to their children. For the purposes of the endowment, a building called "The Fettes College" has been erected on the grounds of Comely Bank, part of the trust property, according to plans by David Bryce, Esq., R.S.A., architect, and was opened in October 1870. The number of boys to be admitted on the foundation, and maintained and educated in the College at the expense of the endowment, is not at any one time to exceed fifty; but such a number of boys as the Trustees may from time to time determine, will be received as day scholars, or boarders, from whom such fees will be exacted as shall be fixed by the Trustees. THE EDINBURGH MERCHANT COMPANY SCHOOLS.

1. THE EDINBURGH EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION (FOR YOUNG LADIES), WEST END OF QUEEN STREET.

This Institution was founded in 1695 by the Company of Merchants, and Mary Erskine, widow of James Hair, druggist in Edinburgh, as an hospital for girls, and was known as the Merchant Maiden Hospital. The Governors were incorporated by an Act of Parliament in 1707. The original edifice was situated in Bristo Street; but having become insufficient for its object, the foundation-stone of a new building was laid in Lauriston in 1816; and the erection, which was designed by Mr Burn, was completed in 1818, at the cost of £12,250. Up to 1879 this building continued to be used as an hospital for the board and education of the foundationers, but in that year it was converted, under a provisional order, into a day-school, and opened as such in September 1870. It having been sold to the governors of George Watson's Hospital, the governors of this institution purchased extensive buildings in Queen Street for the purposes of the institution, and they were opened in October 1871. Upwards of 1200 young ladies are now attending the institution, which provides a high-class education, the course of study embracing English, French, German, Latin, lectures on literature and science, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, pianoforte, drill, calisthenics, dancing, and needlework. The governors had the right of presenting thirty-four foundationers to the hospital, but the provisional order directs that this number be reduced to twenty, and that at least one fourth of these-as well as of presentations belonging to private parties-shall be elected by competitive examination from girls attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Girls attending the institution may obtain, by competition, benefits estimated as worth £700 viz., 1. A presentation to the foundation, valued at £50 a year, and tenable for six years, equal to £300; 2. A bursary on leaving the institution of £25 a year. and tenable for four years, equal to £100; 3. And thereafter a scholarship of £100 a year, tenable for three years, equal to £300. Besides the above benefits, a number of school bursaries are awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are maintained in boarding-houses rented by the governors, with the exception of those who are boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted to the foundation, the girls must be of the age of nine and under that of sixteen years. A number of the presentations were formerly limited to the daughters or grand-daughters of such as were of the order or calling of merchant burgesses of Edinburgh, or ministers thereof, or suburbs of the same, or had been benefactors to the hospital or governors of the same; but the provisional order removes this limitation, and declares that the patrons shall be at full liberty to present such girls as they consider most suitable. On

leaving, the girls receive £9, 6s. 8d. each.

2. GEORGE WATSON'S COLLEGE-SCHOOLS.

(1.) FOR BOYS .- LAURISTON.

George Watson, born at Edinburgh about 1650, served an apprenticeship to a merchant in the city, and, after a short residence in Holland, entered into the service of Sir James Dick, a wealthy trader in Edinburgh. This employment he gave up in 1695, on being appointed accountant to the Bank of Scotland. He died in April 1723, and by his will bequeathed £12,000 to endow an hospital for the maintenance and instruction of the male children and grandchildren of decayed merchants in Edinburgh; and by the statutes of his trustees a preference was given to the sons and grandsons of members of the Edinburgh Merchant Company. An hospital for the board and education of the foundationers was founded in the year 1738, and opened in June 1741, and it continued to be used for this purpose until 1870, when the governors of the four hospitals connected with the Merchant Company, taking advantage of the powers given by the Endowed Institutions (Scotland) Act, applied for and obtained provisional orders empowering them to convert the hospital into dayschools, and they were opened as such in September 1870. This building was, however, sold to the corporation of the Royal Infirmary in 1871, and the building formerly called the Merchant Maiden Hospital was acquired for and is now being occupied as George Watson's College-Schools for Boys. Another house adjoining has since been purchased for the extension of the Schools. There are about 1100 pupils The design of the schools is to provide boys with a liberal education, qualifying them for commercial or professional life, the civil service, and for the universities, etc. The course of study includes English, Latin, Greek, French, German, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, botany, natural history, natural philosophy, chemistry, drill, gymnastics, fencing and dancing. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to sixty, and that at least one-fourth of these shall be elected by competitive examination from boys attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Boys attending the College-Schools may obtain, by competition, benefits in all estimated as worth £700-viz., 1. A presentation to one of the foundations of this or Daniel Stewart's Institution, valued at £50 a year, and tenable for six years, equal to £300; 2. A bursary on leaving the schools of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100; 3. And thereafter a scholarship of £100 a year, tenable for three years, equal to £300. Besides the above benefits, a number of school bursaries are awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are maintained in a boarding house rented by the governors, with the exception of those who have been boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted as foundationers, they must be of the age of nine and under that of fourteen years. On leaving, each foundationer is allowed £7 for clothes; he receives for five years £10 annually; and on attaining the age of twenty-five, a further sum of £50 to enable him to commence business in Edinburgh.

(2.) FOR YOUNG LADIES .- GEORGE SQUARE.

The governors have also, in virtue of power given them in the provisional order, established a school for girls called George Watson's College-Schools (for Young Ladies). The course of study is the same as that of the Edinburgh

Educational Institution for Young Ladies (see before), and girls attending the school may obtain by competition the same benefits as those attending that institution. The number of pupils is 600.

3. DANIEL STEWART'S INSTITUTION (FOR BOYS), DEAN.

Daniel Stewart of the Exchequer, who died in 1814, left the residue of his property, amounting (after the erection and endowment of a free school in his native parish of Logierait) to upwards of £13,000, to accumulate for the purpose of building and endowing an hospital for the maintenance and education of boys, the children of honest and industrious parents, whose circumstaness in life do not enable them suitably to support and educate their children at other schools. Taking advantage of the powers given by a provisional order obtained in 1870, the hospital was opened as a day-school in September of that year. This institution provides boys with a superior education, and the course of study is similar to that in George Watson's College-Schools for Boys). Instruction is also given in Technical Education. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to forty. and that at least one half of them shall be elected from the day scholars of this institution, George Watson's College-Schools, and James Gillespie's Schools. Boys attending the institution have the same benefits open for their competition as those attending George Watson's College-Schools for Boys.

The boys, on admission to the foundation, must be of the age of nine and

under that of fifteen years.

4. JAMES GILLESPIE'S SCHOOLS (FOR BOYS AND GIRLS). BRUNTSPIRLD LINKS.

This institution was founded by James Gillespie of Spylaw, merchant and tobacconist in Edinburgh, who, by his will dated in the year 1796, destined the greater part of his property to the endowment of a charitable school, and of an hospital for the aliment and maintenance of old men and women. The edification which was designed by Mr Burn, was founded in 1801, and opened in 1802. The free school was founded in 1801, and opened in 1803. Up to 1870 the hospital continued to be occupied by old persons, of whom about 40 were maintained in it. In that year the governors obtained a provisional order empowers them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and it was opened as such in September 1870. About 1200 boys and girls are now being educated in the schools. These schools are established as primary schools, and the coarse of instruction includes English in all its branches, writing, arithmetic, was and drill. GEORGE HERIOT'S HOSPITAL, LAURISTON.

corge Heriot was born at Edinburgh about the year 1563. He followed his ther's trade of a goldsmith, and in 1597 was appointed goldsmith to Anne of enmark, the queen of James VI. Shortly afterwards he was nominated weller and goldsmith to the king, and when the court was removed to London, 1603, Heriot followed in its train. He died there February 12, 1624, having, y a will dated in the previous year, bequeathed the residue of his property, mounting to £23,625, to the erection of an hospital, " for the mainetenance, leife, bringing upp, and education of poore fatherlesse boyes, freemen's sonnes f the towne of Edinburgh.

The foundation stone was laid July 1, 1628, but owing to the civil war and ther causes, the building was not opened till April 11, 1659. The expense of

ie erection exceeded £30,000 sterling.

The management is vested in the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town ouncil of the city, and in the Established Clergy of Edinburgh,—in all fifty-four number.

One hundred and eighty boys are maintained in the Hospital—one hundred nd twenty resident, and sixty non-resident. The age of admission is between even and ten; in exceptional cases, non-residents may be admitted between en and twelve. The boys leave at fourteen, unless they pass examination as hopeful scholars." They are taught English, French, Latin, and Greek, rriting, arithmetic, book-keeping, geography, mathematics, drawing, vocal nusic, and dancing. Those who manifest talents and a desire for the learned rofessions are sent to the University of Edinburgh, with an allowance or four sessions of £30 a year; and there are several apprentices who eceive bursary allowances to forward them in their calling. oursaries of £20 a year are likewise bestowed on deserving students in the On leaving the Hospital, the boys are provided with clothes and mitable books; such of them as become apprentices for five years or upwards receive £50, divided into equal annual payments during the term of their apprenticeship, besides a sum of £5 at the end of their apprenticeship as a reward for good behaviour. Those who are apprenticed for a shorter term than five years, receive a correspondingly less allowance than £50. One of the teachers resides in the House, all the others are non-resident. The House Governor also resides in the House.

The revenue of the Hospital in 1872 amounted to £22,436, 16s. 8d.*

children, in poor circumstances, of deceased burgesses and freemen; 2d, The children of burgesses and freemen who are unable to provide for their support; and, 3d, The children of poor citizens and inhabitants of Edinburgh residing within the boundaries of the city. They were also empowered "to allow to any of the boys, in the course of their education at such schools, being sons of burgesses and freemen, such uniform fixed sum of money in lieu and place of maintenance, and such uniform fixed sum for apprentice fee, after their education at the said schools is completed, as shall be determined." There are now sixteen Heriot Schools, namely, eleven juvenile and five infant schools, attended by upwards of 4000 boys and girls. There are also four schools open for gratuitous evening instruction in Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, French, and Drawing. These classes are attended by about 600 young men.

JOHN WATSON'S INSTITUTION, DEAN.

In the year 1759, John Watson, writer to the signet, bequeathed the residue of his estate to certain Trustees, by them to be applied "to such pious and charitable uses within the City of Edinburgh as they shall think proper." By a deed, dated in 1764, they destined the revenue of the property to "the pious and charitable purpose of preventing child-murder" by the erection of a Foundling Hospital. From doubts of the expediency of such an institution, no measures were taken for its erection; and in the year 1822 an Act of Parliament was obtained, empowering the Trustees to establish and endow "an hospital for the maintenance and education therein of destitute children, and bringing them up to be useful members of society; and also for assisting in their outset in life such of them as may be thought to deserve and require such aid."

The edifice, which was designed by Mr William Burn, was founded in 1825, and completed in 1828. About 100 children are maintained in it; when admitted, they must have completed the seventh year of their age, and be under the see of nine. They are not retained after the age of fourteen. They are instructed

in reading, writing, arithmetic, etc.

The establishment is under the management of fifteen directors,—the Keeper and Deputy-keeper of the Signet, the Treasurer of the Institution, and twelve Commissioners of the Writers to the Signet. The fund, which in 1781 amounted to less than £5000, has been accumulated by the care and attention of the Trustees, and now, including the grounds and buildings, exceeds £132,800.

TRINITY HOSPITAL.

Forty-two persons were formerly maintained within the Hospital, who, upon its demolition in 1845, received pensions of £26 a year each. Those elected since that period receive £20 a year each. One hundred and twenty others have an annual allowance of £10 each. The benefits of the endowment are destined to "burgesses, their wives or children, not married, nor under the age of fifty years." Ten others have pensions of £10 each, out of the funds mortified to the Hospital by the late William Lennie, Esq.

THE ORPHAN HOSPITAL, DRAN.

This Institution was projected in 1727 by Andrew Gairdner, merchant in Edinburgh; and in 1733 a house was hired, and thirty children received into it. In 1735 an edifice was erected near the Trinity College Church; but by the increase of the city this situation being rendered unhealthy, the present building was founded in June 1831, and finished in October 1833, from the designs of the late Mr Thomas Hamilton. The revenue is derived from voluntary contributions and legacies, in addition to the interest on accumulated donations since its foundation.

A bout ninety boys and girls, including boarders, are maintained in the Institution, the benefits of which are not confined to any district of Scotland. When admitted they must be of the age of seven, and not above ten years: they are taught reading, writing, arithmetic, and geography. Day boarders from any part of the United Kingdom are now received into the Hospital at £16 per annum for boys, and £14 for girls, which include all expenses of whatever kind.

THE MAIDEN HOSPITAL, MEADOWS,

FOUNDED BY THE CRAFTSMEN OF EDINBURGH AND MARY ERSKINE.

This Institution was founded in 1704, by the Freemen of the Incorporated Trades, aided by Mary Erskine, widow of Jas. Hair, druggist. The governors were incorporated by statute in 1707.

The management is in the Deacons of the thirteen Incorporations, two Trades-Councillors, two persons of the name of Erskine, the Preses of the Society of Barbers, and nine persons elected by the other Governors,—in all, twenty-seven. Forty-eight girls are maintained in the Institution. Those eligible for admission are, "the children or grandchildren of craftsmen, which failing, any others presented by the incorporations,"—the girls being children belonging to one of the Incorporations of the city of Edinburgh or Society of Barbers. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of seven, and under that of elevery years: they are not retained above the age of seventeen. They are instructed in the English language and grammar, in French and music, in writing, arithmetic, geography, history, sewing, and laundrywork. On leaving, each girl receives £10 and a Bible.

CAUVIN'S HOSPITAL, DUDDINGSTON.

This Institution was founded by Louis Cauvin, Teacher of French in Edinburgh, and afterwards Farmer at Duddingston, who died in 1825, bequeathing his property for the erection and endowment of "an Hospital for the relief, maintenance and education of the sons of respectable but poor teachers; the sons of poor but honest farmers; tohom failing, the sons of respectable master-printers of booksellers, and the sons of respectable servants in the agricultural line." This settlement was explained and modified, and the Governors incorporated, by a parliamentary statute in 1827.

The management is in the survivor of certain individuals nominated by the founder, and others assumed by them, and in the following ex officio trustees, viz., the Lord Provost of the City, the Principal of the University, the Rector of the High School, the Ministers of Duddingston, Liberton, and Newton, the Proprietor of the estate of Niddrie, and the Factor of the Duke of Abercorn.

The Institution, which is situated at Duddingston, was opened in 1833. Twenty-six boys are maintained in it. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of six, and not more than eight years; and are retained for six years. They are taught the ordinary branches of education, and Latin, Greek, French. German, and Mathematics.

DONALDSON'S HOSPITAL, GLASGOW ROAD.

This Hospital was founded by James Donaldson of Broughton Hall, printer, who died at Edinburgh in October 1830, bequeathing the greater part of his property, amounting to about £200,000, to trustees, for the endowment and erection of an hospital for the maintenance of poor boys and girls, after the plan of the Orphan Hospital in Edinburgh and John Watson's Institution.

The building can accommodate 150 boys and 150 girls: it contains at present 193 children (109 boys and 84 girls), of whom 91 (53 boys and 38 girls) are deaf and dumb. Those eligible for admission are declared to be, "1st, Poor children of the name of Donaldson or Marshall, if appearing to the governors to be deserving; 2d, Such poor children as shall appear to be in the most destitute circumstances and the most deserving of admission." None are received whose parents are able to maintain them. The children are clothed and maintained in the Hospital, and taught such useful branches of a plain English education as will fit the boys for trades and the girls for domestic service. The age of admission is from six till nine, and that of leaving the Hospital fourteen years.

The building, which occupies a commanding position at the west end of the city, is a large and beautiful quadrangular structure, in the Elizabethan style, from a design by the late W. H. Playfair.

JOHN WATT'S HOSPITAL.

The late Mr John Watt, merchant in Leith, by his trust-disposition and setlement, dated in 1827, bequeathed the residue of his means and estate to trusees, with directions to expend such part thereof as they might consider proper in the erection of an hospital in Leith, to be called "John Watt's Hospital," for the reception and maintenance of men and women in destitute circumstances of 55 years of age and upwards, in the following order of priority: 1st, Persons of the name of Watt; 2d, Natives of the parish of South Leith of whatever name; 3d, Persons of whatever name who have constantly resided in the parish of South Leith, at least ten years preceding their admission; and 4th, Natives of, or persons who have constantly resided in, the city of Edinburgh or county of Mid-Lothian; provided such persons are not pensioners or in receipt of an allowance from any charitable institution except the Parochial Board of South Leith. The trustees acquired what was formerly the Golf House and Ground at the south-west corner of Leith Links, and built an Hospital, which was opened in the beginning of 1862.

MEMORANDUM.

Penalties for acting as a Solicitor, etc., or as a Conveyancer, without having an Attorney Certificate.

By 33 and 34 Vict. cap. 97, § 59, it is enacted that every person who, in any part of the United Kingdom, directly or indirectly, acts or practises in any Court as a solicitor, etc., or as a notary public, without having in force at the time a duly stamped certificate, or who, on applying for such certificate, does not truly specify the facts and circumstances upon which the amount of duty chargeable upon his certificate depends, shall forfeit the sum of £50, and shall be incapable of maintaining any action or suit for the recovery of any fee, reward, or disbursement on account of any act done or taken by him in any such capacity.

By section 60 of the same Act, it is enacted that every person who (not being a serjeant-at-law, barrister, or a duly certificated solicitor, etc.), either directly or indirectly, for or in expectation of any fee, gain, or reward, draws or prepares any instrument relating to real or personal estate, or any proceedings in law or equity, shall forfeit the sum of £50. The term "instrument" in this section does not include wills or other testamentary instruments, agreements under hand only, letters or powers of attorney, and transfers of stock con-

taining no trust or limitation thereof.

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
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
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
