January.—In fresh weather, where the soil is moderately dry, the plough may be kept in motion.—To make the feeding of cattle remunerative, it is necessary that the most unremitting attention be paid to the animals. Whether they are fed in courts, byres, or boxes, they ought to be kept warm and comfortably littered, whilst their food, of whatever description, ought to be regularly supplied at stated hours. Crushed grains, and artificial food given in addition to stored roots, will be found a profitable mode of feeding, and chopped straw may also be given as a healthy and economical addition to their diet. Cows require succulent roots or food prepared by steam or hot water, to yield milk copiously. Shelter new dropt lambs, and give their dams roots, hay, and bruised grain, or oil-cake.

February.—Frost being a powerful agent in obtaining mould for covering seeds, plough grass and other lands intended to produce a crop. Whether turnip be folded or carried from the field, plough the land as the crop is removed, and wheat-sowing may follow. Beans and oats may be sown; but it is only rich dry soils which can be seeded so early with prospect of success. In mild weather thorn hedges may be dressed, and new ones planted. Lay up stores of seed-corn, put implements into working trim, and execute many little jobs, that no interruption may be experienced in sowing-time.—Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,—the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Keep calves warm, clean, and dry; give hay and sliced roots in addition to liquid food to such as are rearing.

March.—Finish wheat-sowing about the middle of the month. Sow beans, oats, and barley as soon as the weather and soil admit,—reserving cold wet lands till the season advances. The seeds of clover and ryegrass should now be sown amongst autumnal-sown wheats, and the surface lightly harrowed or rolled to ensure the seed germinating. Particular fields intended for barley or potatoes may receive a second ploughing. Prepare composts and manures for turnip. Should the weather be favourable, potatoes may be planted after the middle of this month. This is the best time for planting hedges.—In altering the diet of fattening animals, always let the change be to one more nutritious. Fattening cattle may be allowed bruised grain or oil cake. If there be a scarcity of turnip for cattle intended for grass, give a small allowance of bruised grain, cake, or hay.

April.—No favourable opportunity should now be lost to sow grain crops. Store the residue of the turnip crop, to preserve the bulbs and prevent the exhaustion of soil. Drain lands intended for green crop where previously neglected. Continue the planting of potatoes in favourable situations. Finish planting thorn hedges.—On store farms, this is the chief lambing season, and the shepherd's utmost attention is necessary. Cease folding turnip, and either feed sheep on stored roots, or restrict them to grass. Should the pastures be late, give sheep grains or prepared cakes. Fattening lamb-hogs require good pasture, being unable to eat turnip freely, from shedding teeth. When there is a scarcity of keep at the homestead, lean cattle may be allowed to roam over permanent pastures. Seedling grasses will seldom admit of being depastured with cattle.

May.—Conclude the sowing of grain crops; and, with the advance of the season, use early varieties. From necessity, barley and pease may be sown up to the end of the month; but full crops cannot be counted upon from such late sowing. Prepare soils for turnip, and use every means to produce a fine tilth. Swedish turnips may be sown from the middle of this month to the end of it. Finish potato-planting. Give a second ploughing to summer fallow, and never allow vegetation to make progress at this season on its surface.—Fattening cattle may be continued on well-kept Swedish turnip and potatoes. When there is a sufficiency of grass, and the soil becomes dry, stock pastures with all descriptions of cattle. In cold and wet evenings, shelter milch cows and fat cattle in courts. Wean early calves, and turn late ones out to pasture.

June.—This is the month for sowing turnips. Where Swedes could not be sown during May, they may still be planted during the first days of June. All other varieties may be sown in course of the month. Drilled crops require attention. Weeds are most easily destroyed when young; and, as a general rule, use hand and horse hoe as soon as the crops admit of the operations. Earth up early-planted potatoes. Haymaking commences in early situations. Mow grasses

GARDENER'S KALENDAR.

January.—When the frost is not severe, trench, manure, and turn up in ridges all vacant ground, and prepare hotbeds. In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposures, for a succession, a few early-frame pease, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw; and, in hotbeds, sow cauliflowers, melons, cucumbers, small salading, early cabbages, and kidney-beans. Plant, prune, and train standard and wall fruit-trees, gooseberry, raspberry, and currant bushes. Edge beds, form new flower-gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, ranunculuses, &c. Pot choice dahlias, placing them in a stove or hotbed. Air and keep dry carnations and stage auriculas. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, irises, &c.

February.—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and, when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight pease, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes, as directed in the kalendar for the preceding month. Start and cut early kidney-potatoes for seed, and put them into the stove or hotbed in order to planting out. Clean shrubberies, roll walks and lawns, and plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses. Put cuttings into rich light soil in well-sheltered borders, and plant stocks of the common wild rose for standards on which to bud the Chinese and other fine varieties. Protect all tender plants from the effects of frost, and air greenhouse and stage auriculas and polyanthus frames. Top-dress all fine auriculas and polyanthuses in pots or boxes. Strike dahlias from roots in hotbeds, and sow balsams, cockscombs, tricolors, amaranths, sensitive and ice plants, as well as other tender annuals. Plant carnation-layers, ranunculuses, anemones, and bulbous roots, and divide the roots of herbaceous plants.

March.—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, beets, brocoli, spinach, onions, Dutch turnips, carrots, pease and beans, savoys, parsnips, and turnip-rooted radishes. Plant red cabbage, sea-kale, kidney-beans, and cauliflowers from frames; and sow cucumbers and melons in hotbeds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. Strike verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet geraniums, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c. Plant gladioluses. This is the best time to graft fruit-trees, and the China, perpetual, moss, and noisette roses, on the common brier or blush China rose, and to propagate them by layers. Pot dahlias that have pushed, and also cuttings from the offsets, placing them in a moderate heat. Protect tender plants and blossoms, and sow polyanthus, auricula, and almost every kind of perennial, biennial, and annual seeds.

April.—Sow whatever was omitted last month, and plant out such of the pot-herbs as are ready for that purpose. Continue to sow brocoli, asparagus, nasturtiums, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and savoys, and plant out rhubarb, artichokes, sea-kale, German greens, and small salading. Earth up pease, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit-trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cuttings jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c., and all the woody kitchen shrubs. Sow dahlias, carnations, pinks, hollyhocks, Cape, Brompton, and German stocks, China asters, and all kinds of hardy annuals. Pot the flowers struck last month. Destroy the green-fly on roses, and preserve the bloom of stage auriculas from sun and rain. Top-dress all flowers in pots by removing withered leaves, and put in fresh earth. Hoe and rake gravel-walks, cut box-edgings, and mow grass plots.

May.—Sow capsicums, cauliflowers, carrots, lettuces, spinach, pease, cucumbers, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney and French beans. Transplant cabbages, winter-greens, lettuces, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake pease, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant out the flowers potted last month, if there be no appearance of frost; and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots; wallflowers, sweetwilliams, lychnis, and rockets, by slips; and China roses, mimuluses, &c., by cuttings. Put out into the open border pelargoniums, with other greenhouse plants; also Neapolitan violets, and such other hardy annuals as were sown last month. Sow biennials and perennials, if formerly omitted.

June.—Continue sowing the vegetables directed last month, and also turnips for autumn use. Plant out brocoli, cabbages, savoys, celery, cauliflowers in shady borders, leeks, lettuces, cucumbers for pickling, and kidney-beans. Watering is requisite in dry weather both evening and morning; and also the hoeing of potatoes, cabbages, and pease. Thin out onions, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen-herbs. Shade and air melon-plants, and strike by cuttings double-wallflowers, rockets, scarlet lychnis, and stocks. Transplant annuals, biennials, and perennials, and seedling pinks into a bed. Lift all hyacinths, tulips, and other bulbs that have ceased flowering. Cut off the foliage an inch above the stem, and before putting by lay them in sand a fortnight. Re-pot auriculas, polyanthuses, &c. Mow and roll grass walks and plots once a fortnight during this and the other summer months.

PART SECOND.

Information in Commerce, Agriculture, Law, Chronology, and Statistics.

SECTION I.—USEFUL TABLES.

MONETARY SYSTEM OF THE UNITED KINGDOM.

The integer of account is the pound, divided from a remote period into 20 shillings, each of 12 pence; and the circulating medium consists of coins of gold, silver, and bronze, and of bank notes convertible into gold, which is the metallic basis of the monetary system; the silver and bronze coins being available only for small money or change.

COINS.

Gold: Sovereign (or pound) and half-sovereign, coined at the rate of 1869 sovereigns from 40 lbs. troy of the standard fineness of 22 carats, or 916 $\frac{2}{3}$ milliemes; being minted at 77s. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per troy ounce. The full weight of the sovereign is 5 dwts. 3.274 grains; but it is a legal tender when 5 dwts. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ grains; and the two coins are received at par by the Bank of England at the "current weights" of 5 dwts. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ grains and 2 dwts. 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ grains respectively.

Gold has long been the principal medium of large payments, but a double standard legally existed until 1816, when gold coins became the sole standard and legal tender, without limitation (56 Geo. III. c. 68). Under this law the mint is open to the public for gold coinage, and standard bullion is converted into an equal weight of sovereigns; but in practice, the bullion is sold at the fixed rate of 77s. 9d. to the Bank of England, in exchange for coin (or its equivalent) at 77s. 10 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per oz., the difference of 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per oz. being compensation to the Bank for the delay in coinage.

Silver: Crown of 5s., half-crown, florin of 2s., shilling, and pieces for 6d., 4d., 3d., 2d., and 1d.; but the last two, called *maundy money*, are not in circulation. All are coined at the rate of 66s. from 1 lb. troy of the fineness of 11 oz. 2 dwts., or 925 milliemes; and the full weight of the shilling is 3 dwts. 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ grains. Silver is thus minted at 5s. 6d. per oz., an over-valuation of about 8 per cent.; but the coins are not a legal tender for more than 40s. at one time.

Bronze: Penny, halfpenny, and farthing, coined at rates greatly exceeding their intrinsic value, but not legal tender beyond one shilling.

The *Remedy of the Mint* is, for gold coins 12 grains per lb. in weight, and $\frac{1}{4}$ carat in fineness; for silver 1 dwt. per lb. in both weight and fineness.

In England the pound represented at first a Saxon pound of silver, but the coins were successively degraded to about one-third of their original values. The earliest, save the Saxon styca and skeatta, was, A. D. 725, the silver penny, often broken into *fourth-things* or farthings. Gold was not coined until 1257, and copper not until the 17th century. Of the old gold coins, the chief were the merk of 13s. 4d.; the noble of 6s. 8d.; and later, the guinea, valued after 1717 at 21s.

Scots currency was, when abolished, 1707, of only 1-12th the value of sterling, and £100 Scots = £8, 6s. 8d. sterling, or £1 Scots = 1s. 8d. sterling. The merk = 13s. 4d. Scots, and the plack = 2 bodles = 4d. Scots.

In Irish currency, abolished 1826, £108, 6s. 8d. Irish = £100 sterling.

PAPER MONEY AND BANKS OF ISSUE.

Public banks were introduced shortly after the Revolution of 1688. Unlike the old banks of Venice and Amsterdam, which were solely banks of deposit, they became banks of deposit, loan, circulation, and exchange. The earliest and greatest, the Bank of England, founded 1694, advanced its capital, then £1,200,000, to the Government, and acquired important privileges. It was immediately, 1695, followed by the Bank of Scotland, of less pretension, but which led the way to a system which, from its economy, especially in utilizing deposits, and supplying a stable currency, has more than any other contributed to the excellence of modern banking. The Bank of Ireland was formed, 1782, on the model of the Bank of England.

The note circulation of the Bank of England was well supported, and save during a short period in 1696, its convertibility was maintained until 1797, when, under adverse circumstances, aggravated by war, the Bank was ex-

empted from specie payments. The notes then became depreciated; but under arrangements consequent on "Peel's Act," 1819, the exchange of notes for gold was resumed in 1821.

The concessions to the Bank of England included a restriction, in 1708, of the partners in other English banks to 21, which continued until 1826, when joint-stock banks of issue were allowed in places beyond the metropolitan district; and in 1833, when the Bank charter was renewed, and one-fourth of its capital repaid by Government, non-issuing joint-stock banks were allowed within the metropolitan district. The monopoly of the Bank of Ireland was similarly broken up in 1824. The joint-stock banks thus established were all mainly constituted upon the Scottish system. No other change occurred until the introduction of the existing regulations in 1844.

Existing Regulations.

The bank issues consist in England of notes for £5 and upwards of the Bank of England (which still monopolizes the circulation within 65 miles of London), and of numerous provincial banks; and in Scotland and Ireland of notes for £1 and upwards, all regulated so as to conform to a gold currency. New banks of issue are prohibited; and existing banks are limited in their issues, except against specie, of which one-fifth may be silver; while a publication is required of their circulation and specie, and an annual registration of their partners.

The Bank of England was, from August 31, 1844, divided into two entirely separate departments of issue and banking, and notes for £14,000,000 were transferred from the former to the latter, against special securities lodged with the Government, including £11,015,000 due by it to the Bank, bearing 3 per cent. interest. Beyond this £14,000,000 no notes could be issued, except against coin or bullion lodged in the issue department. But the Bank was empowered to increase its issues upon securities to the extent of two-thirds of that withdrawn by any English provincial bank, and its authorized issue has been thus increased to £15,000,000—the profit of this increased issue, however, going to the Government. The actual circulation averages £25,000,000, issued about two-thirds from London, and one-third from 11 branches. Notes may be demanded from the issue department in exchange for gold bullion at the rate of 77s. 9d. per oz., and they are payable in coin at the mint rate of

77s. 10½d. per oz. Payment of £1 issued in London can be demanded there only, but branch notes are payable either at the London office, or at the branches where issued. Other than the notes are a legal tender except in Scotland and Ireland.

The English Provincial Bank issue have a maximum circulation fixed at the average of the two weeks to April 27, 1844. The issue must be at certain licensed places, no union can take place between joint-stock bank and a private bank between two joint-stock banks of issue without one of them, at least, losing its circulation. The opening of new branches of issue is also restrained. The aggregate fixed issues, originally £8,631,647, have declined to £6,460,000, and the average actual circulation only about £5,000,000, spread over private and 54 joint-stock banks. The specie held is not published, the notes being payable in Bank of England paper, and no power being possessed of issue against specie in excess of fixed circulation.

In Scotland, banks of issue are confined to those which existed in 1845; and the issue of each is restricted to the amount of average circulation in that year, plus one-fifth of the specie held at its head office where the notes are payable. Should two banks join, the united bank may issue to the amount of their separate circulations. The aggregate authorized circulation, originally £3,087,209, now £2,749,271. The average amount of specie held is about £4,000,000, and of actual circulation about £5,600,000 issued by 11 joint-stock banks, with upwards of 700 branches.

In Ireland the authorized circulation is arranged as in Scotland; the issue of two banks which unite are also given to the united bank; but if any bank discontinues its issue, and circulation of the Bank of Ireland, the circulation of the latter may be to an equal amount increased. The notes are demandable in gold at the branch where issued; but the specie held against the circulation in excess of that authorized must be held at the head office, or certain licensed places. The total authorized circulation is still as at first, £6,354,494. The average specie held is nearly £3,000,000, and of actual circulation about £7,000,000 issued by six joint-stock banks.

Under four distinct arrangements a general system is thus established which gives to all these banks a collective action analogous to that of

revenue, &c., lodging the revenue as collected, and the pay-office, &c., withdrawing it for public purposes; while, quarterly, the dividends are paid on the national debt, the stocks constituting which are besides recorded and transferred at the bank. The (h) "public deposits" (which include exchequer and savings banks' funds) increase through revenue receipts until the dividend terms in January, April, July, and October; but in order to lessen the inconvenience of so much capital being withdrawn from use, certain special advances are, in the latter part of each quarter, made out of these deposits to the discount-houses and others, which are repayable when the dividends on stock become due.

The banking account is separately debited with (f) the fixed capital of £14,553,000, and (g) the "rest," a variable surplus, increased by accrued profits until April 5, and October 10, when the bank dividends are paid to the proprietors. The other debits, beside (h) the public deposits already noticed, are (i) "other deposits," which comprise those of bankers, merchants, and others,—from £3,000,000 to £5,000,000, being those of London bankers. (k) The "seven days' bills" includes the outstanding bank post bills.

The credit side embraces (l) "government securities," a safe and readily convertible investment; (m) "other securities," composed of bills discounted, and stocks, bonds, &c., on which advances have been made; and (n, o) the reserve of notes and coin immediately available for advances on payments. The note reserve may be viewed as merely an arithmetical expression for the bullion in the issue department available for the banking department, as by consolidating the two accounts, and eliminating the unissued notes, an equivalent sum in bullion or coin will be found in excess of that required by the Act of 1844.

The Government of the Bank is vested in a governor, deputy-governor, and 24 directors, whose qualifications in stock are £4000, £3000, and £2000 respectively. The court or board meets every Thursday, when the weekly account is presented. The two governors and have the chief administration, and attend daily, and the court is divided out into six regular committees:—1. The committee of treasury, virtually the governor's council, composed of the two governors, the former governor, and directors elected by the court; 2. The Committee of daily waiting, composed of three directors in rota-

tion, who discount or reject to take in or decline bullion, exchange securities, &c.; and committees of Branches and lawsuits; 4. House, clerk, &c.; 5. Inspection of accounts offices; and 6. Inspection of cash offices. Subject to the court, the departments of issue, banking, and national debt, are worked by two heads, officers,—first, the chief accounts with cognizance of all the accounts; second, the chief cashier, with charge of all money matters. There is also subordinate control of each office by a principal and deputy principal, besides, in the larger offices, superintendents. The early theory of the bank was to keep the divisions of accounts and cash entirely separate; and, though now much blended, the distinction is still mainly preserved, and the branches check each other. Including branches, clerks, mechanics, &c., upwards of 1000 persons are employed, about 400 being in the national debt department; the annual charge is nearly £240,000, besides £20,000 in pensions. The building covers nearly 4 acres, and bears an estimated rental of £40,000.

The Business Regulations, though precise, comprehend little that is peculiar. Any person respectably introduced may keep a drawing account provided it shall be remunerative to the bank,—a condition usually fulfilled by maintaining an adequate balance, though in some cases by an annuity payment proportionate to the work. No interest is allowed, nor is overdraft permitted; but the bank is always ready to discount approved bills for their customers, and to make advances on approved securities. The limit of the *échéance* of bills discounted is 90 days; but advances of even six months are granted to parties who transact all their business with the bank. The rates charged are various, yet never below the advertised "minimum rate of discount" by which the bank's ordinary transactions are regulated. The bank will also buy, sell, or take charge of securities, and receive dividends; and will also receive money to or from her branches; and from one branch to another. Bank notes in London are issued bank-post bills drawn at 7 days, and notes at 60 days for transmission to India, &c.

The General Management of the bank does not, in principle, differ from that of any other well-conducted bank. The directors must always look to the present liabilities, their present service, and the impending demands of the latter. In respect to investments

the average amount of deposits being known, and due regard paid to their temporary or permanent character,—it is usual to invest all above the amount to which they are likely to be reduced, in discounting bills, short loans, stock, or other convertible securities, care being taken to reserve sufficient cash to meet ordinary fluctuations in the deposits, without disturbing the general nature of the investments. The capital of the bank is not necessarily kept in the same realizable form, but it is desirable always to preserve a considerable portion of it in good banking securities, in case more than ordinary demands should arise. The progress of the bank is shown in the weekly returns. In tracing the action of the law of 1844, the fluctuations of the circulation now attract little notice; but increased importance is attached to the movement of the banking department. An increase of (i) the private deposits indicates increased monetary ease, while a decrease, especially when heavy, attests the necessities of traders and bankers. But the items which chiefly command attention are the two which more immediately determine the value of capital,—(m) the advances on commercial securities, and (n, o) the reserve; the former indicating the demand, the latter the supply which regulate the bank rate of discount,—which, as the best practical index of the value of capital, materially influences transactions throughout the kingdom. When the reserve is high, and advances mo-

derate, the rate is low; but it is raised according as the reserve falls, and advances become in greater request, more especially during an adverse foreign exchange and drain of gold. The efflux of capital abroad is thus restrained, and its influx encouraged. The law of 1844, besides securing the convertibility of the note, operates in this way as a general caution to contract, rather than extend, bill and credit facilities, when bullion is being exported.

Generally gold tends to leave the bank, and reduce the reserve, when the short exchange of London on Paris falls to 25f. 10c.; while an opposite effect is produced by the exchange rising to 25f. 33c. Owing to London being the entrepôt of the mining countries, a foreign demand for gold is often met without disturbing the bank's reserve. But under exceptional circumstances, political or financial, the bank is watchful of a diminution of the bullion, and may raise the discount-rate even while the reserve is good, and the foreign exchange not unfavourable; an adequate supply of gold being, in times of doubt or difficulty, peculiarly necessary as a basis of our monetary system.

Since 1844 the reserve stood highest—£17,861,747—on June 21, 1871, when the private securities were £16,816,887, and the discount rate $2\frac{1}{2}$ p. c. It stood lowest—£1,552,686—on Nov. 18, 1857, when, with the private securities at £26,113,453, the rate was 10 p. c.

The average discount rate in the 50 years to 1874 was £3. 16s. 2d. per cent.—(*Bank Report*, 1875.)

IMPERIAL MEASURES.

This system, introduced 1826, continued the old *legal* measures of extension and weight, but superseded numerous corn and liquid measures by the "Imperial gallon," a new measure of capacity. The standards fixed were:—

1. *Extension*.—The "Imperial Standard Yard," or brass "standard yard of 1760," bearing the proportion of 36 inches to 39.1393 inches, the length of a pendulum vibrating seconds in the latitude of London at 62° Fahrenheit, and in a vacuum at the level of the sea.

2. *Capacity*.—The "Imperial Standard Gallon," containing 10 lbs. avoirdupois, or 277.274 cubic inches of distilled water at 62° Fahr., the barometer being at 30 inches.

3. *Weight*.—The Old Troy Pound of 1758, containing 5760 grains; one cubic inch of distilled water at 62° Fahr., the barometer being at 30 inches, weighing 252.458 grains; and 7000 of such grains were declared to be equal to the avoirdupois pound.

In 1834 those standards were accidentally destroyed; and a scientific commission having reported in favour of their restoration from material copies rather than by experimental reference to natural constants, the provisions for the latter were repealed in 1855. A standard yard and a standard avoirdupois pound were then constructed from authentic copies of the old standards, and deposited in the Exchequer—copies being at the same time lodged at the Mint, the Royal Observatory, the Royal Society, and the Palace at Westminster.

Troy weight is chiefly used for gold and silver. At the Mint, the troy ounce is divided decimally into 1000ths.

In Jewellery, the ounce is divided into 600 *pearl* grains, and 15½ *diamond* carats.

Apothecaries' Weight. †—20 troy grains make 1 scruple; 3 scruples make 1 dram; and 8 drams make 1 troy ounce.

GOLD AND SILVER STANDARDS, ETC.

The fineness of gold is expressed in carats, the unit of reference being divided into 24, and its quality denoted by the number consisting of pure or *fine* gold. The carat is divided into 4 grains. The British standard for gold coin is 22 carats, i.e., 22 parts are fine, and 2 parts alloy. The fineness of silver is similarly denoted by the number of ounces and pennyweights fine in 1 lb. troy; and the money standard is 11 oz. 2 dwts., i.e., 222 parts are fine, and 18 parts alloy. These standards, often now expressed decimally in 1000th parts or *milliemes*, as in France, are 916½ and 925 respectively.

Plate, excepting small articles, &c., is of regulated fineness. The standards for gold until 1854 were 22 carats and 18 carats; but, to meet the competition of foreign jewellers, it is now also stamped of 15, 12, and 9 carats (17 & 18 Vict. c. 96). The standards for silver are 11 oz. 2 dwts. and 11 oz. 10 dwts.; the latter, called "new-sterling," is almost in disuse. Provisions are likewise made for five "marks" of verification:—

1. The *Standard mark*, for plate of the fineness of coin, is, in England, a lion passant; in Scotland, a thistle (6 and 7 Will. IV. c. 69); in Ireland, a harp crowned. But in England, since 1844, gold of 22 and 18 carats is separately distinguished by a crown (7 and 8 Vict. c. 22): the lower standards of 15, 12, and 9 carats bear only the numbers denoting their fineness in carats and *milliemes*. Silver of 11 oz. 10 dwts. has a Britannia. Articles of all standards likewise bear—2. The *Maker's mark* or initials; 3. The *Date mark*, a variable letter; 4. The *Hall mark*, or device of the district assay office—that of the London Goldsmiths' Company being a

* Corn is now also sold by weight, and by weight and measure combined, but there is a perplexing diversity of units and denominations. In *Glasgow* the boll of wheat is 240 lbs., of barley 320 lbs., and of oats 264 lbs. In *Ireland* the barrel of wheat, etc., equals 280 lbs.; of barley, etc., 224 lbs.; of oats, 196 lbs. In *Liverpool*, etc., the cental of 100 lbs. is now in partial use for wheat and flour.

The date letter of the London Goldsmiths' Company commenced in May 1716 with A in Roman capitals, reckoning on to 20 letters or years, omitting J, and ending with U. Small Roman

is then used; next old English capitals; then small Roman; again commencing with a Roman A in May 1796; a small a in 1816; an old English capital in 1836; and small old English in 1856.

The assay cuttings are kept, in each assay office, in the *Pix* or *Diet Box*, to await the *Trial of the Pix*, an ancient usage which also exists at the Mint.

imp. grains. — The multiples of these units are denoted by prefixing to them the Greek derivatives *deca*, ten, — *hecto*, hundred, — *kilo*, thousand, — and *myria*, ten thousand; and their subdivisions by the Latin prefixes *deci*, tenth of, — *centi*, hundredth of, — *milli*, thousandth of. Thus the kilometre = 1000 metres, and the decimetre = 1-10th metre.

No drawback is allowed on the exportation of cavendish or negrohead manufactured in bond and delivered for home consumption, or on any tobacco (except snuff) containing more than 22 lbs. of inorganic matter, or more than 2 lbs. of sand, or more than 25 lbs. of tobacco stalks fairly cut, with portions of the lamina of the leaf adhering, in every 100 lbs. weight, exclusive of water. If there be less than 22 lbs. and more than 18 lbs. of inorganic matter in every 100 lbs. weight, exclusive of water, there shall be a deduction from the drawback in respect of every pound of inorganic matter above 18 lbs. in every 100 lbs. The full drawback of 3s. 3d. shall be allowed on the exportation of snuff, containing not more than 18 lbs. of inorganic matter in every 100 lbs. weight, ex-

clusive of water; but a deduction shall be made for every pound of inorganic matter above 18 lbs. in every 100 lbs.

DRAWBACKS, ABATEMENTS, AND ALLOWANCES.

1. BEER exported: for every 36 gallons, and so in proportion for any greater quantity, made by any li-

censed brewer for sale in the U. K. from worts which before fermentation were of the specific gravity of not less than 1040 degrees. . . . £0 4 3

and for every additional 5 degrees, up to 1125 degrees, a farther sum of 6d. for every 36 gallons.

2. BREWERS of beer for sale: when the quantity of beer brewed in any year shall be less than the quantity for which the license was granted, the difference shall be repaid to the brewer; if the quantity be greater, he shall be surcharged for the difference.

On the death of a brewer, or on the business being discontinued before the expiration of his license, a proportionate part of the duty may be returned.

When the license duty exceeds £10, it may be paid in moieties, one half on 10th Oct., the other on 1st March.

3. MALT exported: No malt can be exported on drawback, which, when screened and cleaned, shall weigh more than 44 lbs. avoirdupois a bushel; and no malt (other than blown, roasted, and crystallized) can be exported on drawback, which, when screened and cleaned, shall weigh less than 36 lbs. avoirdupois a bushel. On exportation, a drawback is allowed on malt weighing less than 40 lbs. a bushel, at the rate of the duty payable on 1 bushel of malt exported: on malt weighing 40 lbs. or more a bushel, drawback is allowed, according to the quantity ascertained by measure; subject in either case to the deduction of 7½ per cent. on the ascertained quantity. Roasted malt can be exported on drawback only by licensed roasters or dealers in roasted malt, under the same regulations as other malt. (Acts 23 and 24 Vict. c. 113, sect. 28, no. 3; 28 and 29 Vict. c. 66, sect. 13; 29 and 30 Vict. c. 64, sect. 5 and 6.)

[By the Act 27 Vict. c. 9, malt may be made duty-free for feeding cattle only.]

4. SPIRITS distilled in the U. K., and exported from duty-free warehouses, or used in bond in fortifying wines, *gallon hydro. proof.* £0 0 2

By the Act 28 and 29 Vict. c. 98, British compounded spirits, not more than 11 per cent. overproof, as defined by the Act 23 and 24 Vict. c. 114, sect. 148, may, if compounded from excise-duty-paid spirits, be warehoused, upon drawback of the duties paid, in customs or excise warehouses, for exportation or ships' stores, or for home-consumption (on payment of the duty on plain British spirits, and of 3d. a gallon); and spirits of wine, if rectified from excise-duty-paid spirits, may be warehoused upon drawback of the duties paid in customs warehouses, for exportation or ships' stores, but not for home-consumption.

As certain British compounded spirits or British liqueurs are of such a nature that the strength thereof cannot be ascertained by Sykes's hydrometer, section 13 of the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, enacts that, subject to any regulations which may be from time to time made by the Commissioners of Customs and the Commissioners of Inland Revenue respectively, British liqueurs may be warehoused by a licensed rectifier or compounder of spirits in any customs or excise warehouse under the provisions of the said Act, subject to the modifications following:—

(1.) The rectifier or compounder intending to warehouse any British liqueurs shall specify in the warehousing entry or note to be delivered by him under section 4 of 28 and 29 Vict. c. 98, in addition to the matters thereby required to be specified other than the strength of such British liqueurs, the actual number of gallons at proof of the spirits from which the British liqueurs contained in each cask were compounded; and as soon as any British liqueurs are warehoused, the proper officer of customs or excise at the warehouse shall take a sample from each cask containing such British liqueurs, and every such sample shall be examined, under the direction of

the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, by distillation or otherwise, and the strength of the British liqueurs ascertained by such examination, after making a deduction of five degrees from the degrees of such strength, shall, in the construction of the provisions of the said Act for the purposes of this section, be deemed to be the strength as denoted or indicated by Sykes's hydrometer.

(2.) If the quantity of spirits in any cask of British liqueurs shall, upon such examination as aforesaid, be found to be less than the quantity of spirits as specified in the warehousing entry or note, no drawback or allowance whatever shall be paid in respect of the British liqueurs contained in such cask.

(3.) British liqueurs warehoused in any customs or excise warehouse shall not be removed to any other warehouse or be delivered out otherwise than for exportation or for ships' stores directly from the warehouse on board the vessel

in which the same are to be exported or used as stores.

Allowance is now made for the natural waste of spirits in warehouse; it being provided by the Act 27 Vict. c. 12, sec. 7, that duty shall be charged only on the actual quantity of spirits delivered from bond, unless there be reasonable ground for believing that the deficiency either in whole or in part has been the result of fraud.

5. WORTS (SOLIDIFIED) exported (Act 29 and 30 Vict. c. 64): for worts made and solidified by any licensed brewer for sale in the U. K., from malt or sugar, or malt and sugar on which full duties of excise and customs have been charged or paid, *a drawback at the rate of the duty payable on one bushel of malt, with the addition of 1½d. for every 28 lbs. avoirdupois of such wort.*

NOTE.—By the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, sect. 4, foreign spirits and wine of which an account has been taken by the proper officer of customs may, upon the prescribed bond being given, without payment of duty, be removed to any excise warehouse, and be removed from thence to any other excise or customs warehouse or for exportation, or for use as ships' stores, and may, upon payment of the proper duties of customs, be delivered for home consumption. And by the Act 38 Vict. c. 23, sect. 10, tinctures or medicinal spirits may be warehoused upon drawback by a licensed rectifier or compounder of spirits, in any customs or excise warehouse, under the like provisions under which British liqueurs may be so warehoused.

III. STAMP* AND LEGACY DUTIES, ETC.

The following is a list of Stamp Duties according to the schedule of the Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97 (amended by 34 Vict. c. 4, and 34 and 35 Vict. c. 103, and other Acts), with the Duty on Policies of Sea Insurance, Letters Patent, Patent Medicine, and Plate, and Inventory, Legacy, and Succession Duties, which remain under the former Acts. Generally, the items are given in the words of the schedule. New matter is put within brackets. When the sections are merely cited without the Act, they are the sections of 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97. All items in the schedule of the Act relating solely to England and Ireland are excluded. In the same session were passed the Acts 33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, Stamp Duties Management, and 33 and 34 Vict. c. 99, repealing certain enactments relating to the Stamp Duties.

The Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97, came into operation on 1st January 1871, and by § 3 the exemptions in other Acts in force are preserved.

The attention of the public may be directed to the following matters:—

1. The general deed duty, or duty on a deed, not otherwise charged, is reduced to 10s.

2. Progressive duty on words is not imposed.

3. Provisions are made for charging *ad valorem* duty on conveyances in respect of periodical payments or annuities.—(§ 72.)

4. An agreement for a lease for a term not exceeding 35 years is to be charged with the lease duty.—(§ 96.)

5. An instrument chargeable as a lease in consideration, in whole or in part, of produce or other goods—

Where it is stipulated that the value shall amount to or not exceed a given sum, *ad valorem* lease duty on such sum.

A statement in the lease in regard to the value of such produce or goods to be conclusive as to stamp duty, unless and until shown to be incorrect.—(§ 97.)

6. A notarial instrument is liable to the same duty as an instrument of seisin—to wit, 5s.

7. Any instrument specifically charged by any previous Act with the duty of 35s., is chargeable with the duty of 10s.—(§ 4.)

8. Instruments relating to the property of the crown, and to the private property of the sovereign, are liable to same duties as instruments relating to the property of the subject, except where express provision is made to the contrary.—(§ 5.)

9. Instruments are to be so stamped that the stamp may appear on the face of the instrument, and cannot be applied to any other instrument written upon the same piece of material.—§ 7 (1.) Every instrument on the same piece of material is to be separately stamped.—§ 7 (2.)

10. Instruments relating to several distinct matters are to be separately stamped in respect of each.—§ 8 (1.)

An instrument liable to *ad valorem* duty, if made for any other valuable consideration, is to be charged in respect of it, as if it were a separate instrument for such.—§ 8 (2.)

11. An appropriated stamp (by word on the face of it) cannot be used for an instrument of another description.—§ 9 (1.) An instrument of the description to which a stamp is appropriated is not to be duly stamped unless stamped with the stamp appropriated to it.—§ 9 (2.)

12. All the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of an instrument to *ad valorem* duty, or the amount of it, are to be fully and truly set forth. If not, penalty on person who executes and on person concerned in the preparation, £10.—(§ 10.)

13. Instrument chargeable with *ad valorem* duty in respect of money in foreign or colonial currency, the duty to be calculated on the value in British currency, according to the current rate of exchange at the date of the instrument.—(§ 11.)

14. Instrument chargeable with *ad valorem* duty in respect of stock or marketable security, the duty to be calculated on the value, according to the average price at the date of the instrument.—(§ 12.)

15. If the instrument contains a statement of the current rate of exchange, or average price, and is stamped accordingly, it is to be deemed duly stamped until statement shown to be untrue, and that the instrument is in fact insufficiently stamped.—(§ 13.)

16. The duties apply to instruments executed in the United Kingdom, and to instruments wheresoever executed, relating to property situated, or to any matter or thing done or to be done, in the United Kingdom.—(§ 17.)

17. No instrument, except in criminal proceedings, shall be pleaded or given in evidence, or admitted to be good, useful, or available in law or equity, unless it is duly stamped in

Where property contracted to be purchased for one consideration for the whole by two or more persons jointly, or by any person for himself and others, or wholly for others, is conveyed in parts or parcels by separate instruments to the persons by or for whom the same was purchased for distinct parts of the consideration, the conveyance of each separate part or parcel is to be charged with *ad valorem* duty in respect of the distinct part of the consideration therein specified.

Sub-sales before conveyance.—(3.) Where a person having contracted for the purchase of any property, but not having obtained a conveyance thereof, contracts to sell the same to any other person, and the property is in consequence conveyed immediately to the sub-purchaser, the conveyance is to be charged with *ad valorem* duty in respect of the consideration for the sale by the original purchaser to the sub-purchaser. (4.) Where a person having contracted for the purchase of any property, but not having obtained a conveyance, contracts to sell the whole or any part or parts thereof to any other person or persons, and the property is in consequence conveyed by the original seller to different persons in parts or parcels, the conveyance of each part or parcel is to be charged with *ad valorem* duty, in respect only of the consideration moving from the sub-purchaser thereof, without regard to the amount or value of the original consideration.

Sub-purchaser obtaining a conveyance from original seller in addition to conveyance from first purchaser.—(5.) Where a sub-purchaser takes an actual conveyance of the interest of the person immediately selling to him, which is chargeable with *ad valorem* duty in respect of the consideration moving from him, and is duly stamped accordingly, any conveyance to be afterwards made to him of the same property by the original seller shall be exempt from the said *ad valorem* duty, and chargeable only with the duty to which it may be liable under any general description, but such last-mentioned duty shall not exceed the *ad valorem* duty.

As to the sale of an annuity or right not before in existence.—§ 75. Proviso as to letters or correspondence.—(2.) Provided that nothing in this section contained shall render any person liable to the said penalty of £5 in respect of any letters or correspondence.

Exemption.—Instrument of appointment relating to any property in favour of persons specially named or described as the objects of a power of appointment, created by a previous settlement, stamped with *ad valorem* duty in respect of the same property, or by will, where probate duty has been paid in respect of the same property as personal estate of the testator.

[Money in foreign or colonial currency, duty to be calculated on the value in British currency according to the current rate of exchange at the date of the instrument (§ 11). Stock or marketable security, duty to be calculated on the value according to the average price at the date of the instrument (§ 12).]

(See Note a.)

a As to settlement of policy or security.—§ 124. Where any money which may become due or payable upon any policy of insurance, or upon any security not being a marketable security, is settled or agreed to be settled, the instrument whereby such settlement is made or agreed to be made is to be charged with *ad valorem* duty in respect of such money:

Proviso as to policies.—Provided as follows—

(1.) Where, in the case of a policy of insurance, no provision is made for keeping up the policy, the *ad valorem* duty is to be charged only on the value of the policy at the date of the instrument.

(2.) If in any such case the instrument contains a statement of such value, and is stamped in accordance with such statement, it is, so far as regards such policy, to be deemed duly stamped, unless or until it is shown that such statement is untrue and that the instrument is in fact insufficiently stamped.

Provision for payment or transfer of money or stock settled.—§ 125. (1.) An instrument chargeable with *ad valorem* duty as a settlement in respect of any money, stock, or security is not to be charged with any further duty by reason of containing provision for the payment or transfer of the same money, stock, or security.

Reversionary property settled—Annuity by person in possession.—(2.) Where any money, stock, or security is settled or agreed to be settled by a person who has only a reversionary interest therein, and the instrument whereby such settlement is made or agreed to be made contains a covenant by the person entitled in possession to the interest or dividends of such money, stock, or security for the payment, during the continuance of such possession, of any annuity or yearly sum not exceeding interest at the rate of £4 per centum per annum upon the amount of value of such money, stock, or security, such instrument shall not be charged with any duty in respect of such covenant.

Where several instruments, one only to be charged with ad valorem duty.—§ 126. (1.) Where several instruments are executed for effecting the settlement of the same property, and the *ad valorem* duty chargeable in respect of

SHARE WARRANT issued under the provisions of "The Companies Act, 1867."—See section 33 of that Act. [By this section the share warrant of a limited liability company issued to bearer is liable to stamp duty of three times the amount of the conveyance on sale duty on the nominal value of the shares.] (See Note a.)

TACK of lands, etc., in Scotland. See **LEASE** or **TACK**.

TACK IN SECURITY. See **MORTGAGE**, etc.

TESTAMENTARY INSTRUMENTS. See **General Exemptions at end of Table.**

TRANSFER. See **CONVEYANCE** or **TRANSFER**.

TRANSFER.—Any request or authority to the purser or other officer of any mining company, conducted on the cost book system, to enter or register any transfer of any share, or part of a share, in any mine, or any notice to such purser or officer of such transfer.....6d.

(See Note b.)

TRUSTEE.—Conveyance or Transfer for effectuating the appointment of a new trustee, no higher duty than 10s.

VALUATION. See **APPRAISEMENT**.

VOTING PAPER. See along with **LETTER** or **POWER** of **ATTORNEY**.

WADSET. See **MORTGAGE**, etc.

WARRANT FOR GOODS. 3d. See along with **DELIVERY ORDER**.

WARRANT under the sign manual of Her Majesty, her heirs or successors.....10s.

WRIT—

(1.) Of *Acknowledgment* under "The Registration of Leases (Scotland) Act".....5s.

(2.) Of *Acknowledgment* by any person infest of lands in Scotland in favour of the heir or donee of a creditor fully vested in right of an heritable security constituted by infestment.....5s.

(3.) Of *Clare Constat*.....5s.

(Charter, precept, or writ by progress, as a title to land, is abolished; but charters of novodamus, or precepts or writs from Chancery, or clare constat, or writs of acknowledgment, are excepted.—37 and 38 Vict. c. 94, § 4.)

GENERAL EXEMPTIONS FROM ALL STAMP DUTIES.

(1.) Transfers of shares in the Government or Parliamentary stocks or funds.

(2.) Instruments for the sale, transfer, or other disposition, either absolutely or by way of mortgage, or otherwise, of any ship, or vessel, or any part, interest, share, or property of or in any ship or vessel.

(3.) Instruments of apprenticeship, bonds, contracts, and agreements entered into in the United Kingdom for or relating to the service in any of Her Majesty's colonies or possessions abroad of any person as an artificer, clerk, domestic servant, handicraftsman, mechanic, gardener, servant in husbandry, or labourer.

(4.) Testaments, testamentary instruments, and dispositions *mortis causa* in Scotland.

(5.) Bonds given to sheriffs or other persons upon the replevy of any goods or chattels, and assignments of such bonds.

(6.) Commissions granted to officers of militia, yeomanry, or volunteers.

(7.) Instruments made by, to, or with the Commissioners, or the First Commissioner of Her Majesty's Works and Public Buildings, for any of the purposes of the Act 15 and 16 Vict. c. 28.

The exemptions from duty in Acts not otherwise relating to stamp duties remain in force (§ 3).

the settlement of such property exceeds 10s., one only of such instruments is to be charged with the *ad valorem* duty.

(2.) Where a settlement is made in pursuance of any previous agreement, or articles upon which any *ad valorem* settlement duty exceeding 10s. has been paid in respect of the same property, such settlement is not to be charged with any *ad valorem* settlement duty.

(3.) In each of the aforesaid cases the instruments not chargeable with *ad valorem* duty are to be charged with the duty of 10s.

a § 127. If a share warrant is issued without being duly stamped, the company issuing the same, and also every person who, at the time when it is issued, is the managing director or secretary or other principal officer of the company, shall forfeit £50.

b § 128. (2.) Every person who writes or executes any such request, authority, or notice, not being duly stamped, and every purser or other officer of any such company who in any manner obeys, complies with, or gives effect to any such request, authority, or notice, not being duly stamped, shall forfeit £20.

INVENTORY DUTY.**PROPERTY LIABLE TO THE DUTY.—**

Generally—All personal property (heritable securities are personal property, which include bonds of annual rent and bonds of annuity, and real burdens on land, but not securities by absolute disposition qualified by back bond) belonging to the deceased in the United Kingdom, heritable securities, and personal bonds excluding executors.—(48 Geo. III. c. 149, § 38, etc.; 55 Geo. III. c. 184, Schedule, Part III.; 21 and 22 Vict. c. 56, §§ 9, 12, 13, etc.; 16 and 17 Vict. c. 59, § 8; 31 and 32 Vict. c. 101, §§ 3 and 117; 37 and 38 Vict. c. 94, § 30; and 23 and 24 Vict. c. 80.)

Personal Property—Absolute power of disposal.—Personal estate which a person, dying after 3d April 1860, shall have disposed of by will, under any authority enabling such person to dispose of the same as he shall think fit, shall be deemed personal or movable estate of the person so dying, for the purpose of payment of inventory, probate, or administration duty.—(23 Vict. c. 15, § 4.)

Indian Promissory Notes—Ships.—

Indian Government promissory notes and certificates issued, or stock in lieu thereof, being assets of a deceased person, the interest of which shall be payable in London, registered in London, or enfaced in India for the purpose of such registration before the death of the owner; also Indian Government promissory notes, with coupons attached, in the same circumstances as to registration, and certificates issued, or stock created in lieu thereof, shall be personal estate, and *bona notabilia* in England of the deceased person (23 Vict. c. 5, § 1); also any ship, or any share of a ship, belonging to a deceased person, registered in any port in the United Kingdom, notwithstanding such ship at the time of the death may have been at sea, or elsewhere out of the United Kingdom, shall be deemed to be at the port at which she may be registered (27 and 28 Vict. c. 56), and liable to inventory, probate, or administration duty.

Specialty Debts.—For probate and administration duty, debts and sums of money due from persons in the United Kingdom to a deceased on obligation or other specialty, shall be estate and effects of the deceased within the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Court of Probate in England or Ireland, in which the same would be if they were debts upon

simple contract, without regard to the place where the obligation or specialty shall be at the time of the death.—(25 Vict. c. 22, § 39.)

Foreign Bonds and Stocks.—Documents of the debts of foreign governments and foreign companies which pass from hand to hand are property where the documents may be. Debentures or bonds by foreign companies and governments, and the title to stocks of foreign companies and governments, are property in this country, if in the possession of any person in this country, and can be sold in the market, and the title of the purchasers completed to them in this country.—See Attorney-General v. Bouwens, 4 Meeson & Welsby, 171.

Rents of Heritage.—If the deceased survive Whitsunday, one moiety of the rents of the crop of that year is personal estate. If he survive Martinmas, the whole rents of that crop fall into the executry. In addition, from and after 1st August 1870, the Act 33 & 34 Vict. 1870, c. 35, would seem to give the executor a proportion of the rents from the term preceding the date of death to the date of death. That Act would also seem to give a proportion of the term's rents of quarries, minerals, and houses, and also feu-duties current at the death. The executor's right to house-rents would not therefore be to the half-year's rents current at death, but to a proportion only to the date of death.

MODES IN WHICH DUTY MAY BE PAID.**When deceased domiciled in Scotland.**

—In the case of a person dying domiciled in Scotland, having personal property in Scotland, England, and Ireland, and also heritable securities excluding executors, and personal bonds excluding executors, duty in respect of the whole may be paid on the inventory required to be recorded in the Commissary Court; or inventory duty may be paid on the personal property situated in Scotland, including heritable securities made movable by the Act 31 and 32 Vict. c. 101, § 117, and duty may be paid on a "special inventory" of the heritable securities excluding executors and personal bonds excluding executors, and probate or administration may be obtained in England and Ireland in respect of the personal estate in these countries, and duty paid in respect of such on these instruments.

When deceased domiciled furth of the U. K.—In case of a person dying

domiciled furth of the United Kingdom leaving personal estate in Scotland, England, and Ireland, an inventory must be given up in Scotland, probate or administration taken out in England and Ireland, and duty paid on such in respect of the property in each country.

In the case of intestate estates not

exceeding £150, the widow, or any one or more of the children, or, in the case of a widow dying intestate, any one or more of her children, may apply to the Commissary Clerk, and he shall prepare an inventory and oath, and record the inventory and expedite confirmation according to statutory forms.—(38 and 39 Vict. c. 41.)

Exemptions.—Inventory of the estate of any common seaman or soldier dying in service.

Additional inventory when duty on the whole estate does not exceed that already paid on former inventory.

RETURN OF INVENTORY DUTY.

The inventory duty and probate and administration duty are paid on the whole personal property, without deduction of debts; but the Act 5 & 6 Vict. c. 79, § 23, provides for a return being given on proof of the constitution and payment of the debts. This return must be claimed within three years; but the time will be prolonged on application to the Board of Inland Revenue.

No return to be granted in respect of a voluntary debt due from a person dying after 28th June 1861, expressed to be payable on death of such person, or payable under an instrument which shall not have been *bona fide* delivered to the donee three months before the death of such person. (24 and 25 Vict. c. 92, § 3.)

Note.—Forms of inventory and additional inventory will be found in the Juridical Styles, vol. iii., App. pp. 8-11. Forms of inventories, and also regulations for return of inventory duty, may be obtained at the Office of the Solicitor, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh. Claims are to be lodged in the Solicitor's Office, Room No. 9, on Mondays and Fridays between 12 and 2 o'clock.

The husband or wife of the deceased is not chargeable with duty. If the legatee's husband or wife is of nearer consanguinity than the legatee, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship. (16 & 17 V.c. 51, § 11.)

This duty is payable for every legacy out of the personal or movable estate, or out of or charged upon the real or heritable estate of the deceased, or out of any estate which he has power to dispose of, or out of any moneys to arise by the sale, mortgage, or other disposition of the deceased's real or heritable estate, or any part thereof: Also for the clear residue (after deducting debts, funeral expenses, legacies, and other charges first payable thereout) of the personal or movable estate, whether the title to such residue shall accrue by virtue of any testamentary disposition, or upon a partial or total intestacy: And also for the clear residue of the moneys to arise from the sale, mortgage, or other disposition of any real or heritable estate, directed to be sold, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of by any will or testamentary instrument.

Annuities commencing to be payable on the death of persons dying after 19th May 1853, are valued for legacy duty according to tables annexed to the Succession Duty Act (16 and 17 Vict. c. 51); and annuities commencing to be payable previous to that date, by the tables annexed to the Legacy Duty Act (36 Geo. III. c. 52).

Duty is not exigible on legacies or residues under £20; but if a legatee take two or more legacies, under any testament, which shall together be of the amount of £20, each shall be charged with duty, though each or either may be separately under that amount.

Duty on legacies and residues in arrears, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Printed forms and regulations for payment of the legacy duty may be obtained gratis, on application at Legacy Duty Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh; and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

SUCCESSION DUTY.

(16 and 17 Vict. c. 51.)

The duty commenced on the death of persons dying after the 19th May 1853, and seems to be imposed on all property, both heritable and movable, passing by death, not liable to the duty on legacies and successions to personal estate upon intestacy—the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts.

The duty on HERITABLE PROPERTY is charged on the annual value, after allowance of the necessary outgoings (§ 22), as an annuity for the life of the successor (§ 21), which is to be valued by tables annexed to Act.

PERSONAL PROPERTY is liable to duty according to the value of the succession; and money charged on heritage—heritable securities—is charged as personalty (§ 1).

RATES OF SUCCESSION DUTY.

Lineal issue or lineal ancestor of the predecessor.....£1 per cent.
 Brothers and sisters of the predecessor and their descendants, £3 per ct.
 Brothers and sisters of the father or mother of the predecessor and their descendants.....£5 per cent.
 Brothers and sisters of a grandfather or grandmother of the predecessor and their descendants...£6 per cent.
 Any other person.....£10 per cent.
 The husband or wife of predecessor is not chargeable with duty (§ 18), and if successor's husband or wife shall be of nearer consanguinity than the successor, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship (§ 11).

The following are also *exemptions* from the succession duty:—

1. Successions from the same predecessor, passing on any death, not amounting in principal value to £100 (§ 18).
2. Any succession of less value than £20 in the whole (*ib.*).
3. Legacies and personal property charged with legacy duty, in respect of the same acquisition (*ib.*).

Duty on successions in arrear, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Note.—Forms of the accounts may be obtained at the Legacy Duty Office, Edinburgh, and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

ADHESIVE STAMPS.

Instruments for which Adhesive Stamps may be used, and person by whom to be cancelled, etc., also mode of cancellation.

AGREEMENT—6d. duty.

Cancellation by person by whom it is first executed (§ 36).

BILL of EXCHANGE.—Fixed duty of a penny.

Cancellation by person who signs it before he delivers it out of custody (§ 50).

BILL payable on demand.—If presented unstamped, person to whom presented may affix and cancel and deduct duty from sum in paying; but not to relieve person who may have incurred penalty (§ 54).

BILLS or NOTES.—Drawn or made out of United Kingdom.

Person before he presents bill or note for payment, negotiates or pays it, to affix and cancel.

Provided—

(a.) If at time it comes to hands of *bona fide* holder a stamp is on it and cancelled, it shall be deemed duly cancelled, although not affixed and cancelled by proper person.

(b.) If a stamp shall be on it and not duly cancelled, *bona fide* holder may cancel it, and it shall be deemed duly stamped (§ 51).

Person not relieved of penalty incurred by him for not cancelling adhesive stamp (*ib.*).

CHARTER-PARTY.—Cancellation by person by whom it is last executed, or by whose execution it is completed as a binding contract (§ 66).

CONTRACT NOTE.—Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 69).

CERTIFIED COPIES or EXTRACTS from REGISTERS of BIRTHS, etc.—Cancellation by person signing before he delivers the same out of his hands (§ 80).

DELIVERY ORDERS and WARRANT for GOODS.—Cancellation by the person by whom made (§ 89).

LEASE for any definite term less than a year of—

(1.) Dwelling-house, etc., at a rate not exceeding £10 per annum.

(2.) Any furnished house or apartments, also a duplicate of such instrument.

Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 99).

Person who executes or prepares lease, the duty on which may be denoted by adhesive stamp, and which is not, at or before execution, duly stamped, penalty £5 (§ 100, 1).

Penalty not incurred in respect of letters and correspondence (§ 100, 2).

NOTARIAL ACT and PROTEST of a Bill or Promissory Note.—Cancellation by notary (§ 116).

POLICY of INSURANCE on LIFE, and compensation for accident.—Cancellation by person who first executes (§ 119).

PROXY and VOTING PAPER—liable to

duty of 1d. Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 102, 2).

RECEIPT.—Cancellation by person who gives (§ 121).

REQUEST to PURSER or OFFICER of MINING COMPANY on cost book system to enter or register transfer of share or part of share on notice of such transfer. Cancellation by person who writes (§ 128).

GENERAL DIRECTION AS TO THE CANCELLATION OF ADHESIVE STAMPS.

§ 24. (1.) An instrument, the duty upon which is required, or permitted by law, to be denoted by an adhesive stamp, is not to be deemed duly stamped with an adhesive stamp unless the person required by law to cancel such adhesive stamp cancels the same by writing on or across the stamp his name or initials, or the name or initials of his firm, together with the true date of his so writing, so that the stamp may be effectually cancelled, and rendered incapable of being used for any other instrument, or unless it is otherwise proved that the stamp appearing on the instrument was affixed thereto at the proper time.

Penalty for neglect or refusal, £10.—

(2.) Every person, who, being required by law to cancel an adhesive stamp, wilfully neglects or refuses duly to do so in manner aforesaid, shall forfeit the sum of £10.

Penalty for frauds in relation to adhesive stamps, or to any duty, £50 (§ 25).—Any person who—

(1.) Fraudulently removes or causes to be removed from any instrument any adhesive stamp, or affixes any adhesive stamp which has been so removed to any other instrument, with intent that such stamp may be used again;

(2.) Sells or offers for sale, or utters, any adhesive stamp which has been so removed, or utters any instrument having thereon any adhesive stamp which has to his knowledge been so removed as aforesaid;

(3.) Practises or is concerned in any fraudulent act, contrivance, or device not specially provided for, with intent to defraud Her Majesty, her heirs or successors, of any duty;

shall forfeit, over and above any other penalty to which he may be liable, the sum of £50.

STAMPING INSTRUMENTS, AFTER EXECUTION.

ARTICLES of CLERKSHIP.—Duly stamped articles in order to admission in inferior court may be stamped with duty to make up £60,

and shall then be sufficiently stamped for admission into Court of Session, etc. (§ 42).

With this exception, articles of clerkship are not to be stamped after the expiration of six months from the date, except on payment of the penalties as follows:—

- (1.) If brought to be stamped within one year after date, £10.
- (2.) If so brought after one year and within five years after date; for every year, and also for any additional part of a year, elapsed since the date, £10.
- (3.) In every other case, £50 (§ 43).

BILLS and NOTES having an impressed stamp of sufficient amount but improper denomination may be stamped, if not then payable, penalty £2; if payable, penalty £10. With these exceptions, not to be stamped after execution (§ 53).

CHARTER-PARTY.

Within seven days after first execution, penalty 4s. 6d.

After seven days, and within a month, penalty £10.

In any other case, cannot be stamped (§ 68).

If executed abroad, any party to it may, within ten days after receipt in United Kingdom, affix and cancel adhesive stamp (§ 67).

ATTESTED COPIES, or EXTRACTS of or from—

- (1.) An instrument chargeable with duty;
 - (2.) An original will, testament, or codicil;
 - (3.) The probate or probate copy of a will or codicil;
 - (4.) Letters of administration, or a confirmation of a testament;
- may be stamped within fourteen days after date of attestation or authentication, without penalty (§ 19).

FOREIGN SECURITIES.—The Board of Inland Revenue may at any time, without reference to date, allow them to be stamped without penalty upon being satisfied they were not made or issued, and have not been transferred, assigned, or negotiated, and no interest paid on them, within the United Kingdom (§ 115).

POLICY of INSURANCE made or executed out of the United Kingdom, but enforceable in the United Kingdom, may be stamped within two months after it has been first received in the United Kingdom, without penalty (§ 117, 2).

RECEIPT may be stamped with impressed stamp—

1. Within fourteen days after given, penalty £5.
 2. After fourteen days, and within a month, penalty £10.
- In any other case, not to be stamped (§ 122).

INSTRUMENTS as to which no express provision to prohibit.

Instruments on payment of duty and penalty of £10; if duty exceeds £10, also interest on it (§ 15, 1). Except where express provision to the contrary is made by this or any other Act, any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument may be stamped after the execution thereof, on payment of the unpaid duty, and a penalty of £10, and also by way of further penalty, where the unpaid duty exceeds £10, of interest on such duty, at the rate of £5 per centum per annum, from the day upon which the instrument was first executed up to the time when such interest is equal in amount to the unpaid duty.

And the payment of any penalty or penalties is to be denoted on the instrument by a particular stamp.

Proviso.—(2.) Provided as follows:—

Instruments executed abroad within two months after being received in United Kingdom without penalty.—

(a.) Any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument, which has been first executed at any place out of the United Kingdom, may be stamped at any time within two months after it has been first received in the United Kingdom, on payment of the unpaid duty only.

Board may remit penalties within twelve months.—(b.) The Commissioners may, if they think fit, at any time within twelve months after the first execution of any instrument,

remit the penalty or penalties, or any part thereof.

(See Note a.)

Unstamped or insufficiently stamped instruments produced in Court, if duty and penalty be paid to officer of Court, may be received in evidence.—

§ 16. (1.) Upon the production of an instrument chargeable with any duty as evidence in any court of civil judicature in any part of the United Kingdom, the officer whose duty it is to read the instrument shall call the attention of the judge to any omission or insufficiency of the

a Instruments to have stamps impressed are received at the Cashier's Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh, to be stamped, if within two months of the first date (the solicitor may in certain circumstances receive them within

stamp thereon, and if the instrument is one which may legally be stamped after the execution thereof, it may, on payment to the officer of the amount of the unpaid duty, and the penalty payable by law on stamping the same as aforesaid, and of a further sum of £1, be received in evidence, saving all just exceptions on other grounds.

The officer of the Court to account for duties and penalties.—(2.) The officer receiving the said duty and penalty shall give a receipt for the same, and make an entry in a book kept for that purpose of the payment and of the amount thereof, and shall communicate to the commissioners the name or title of the cause or proceeding in which, and of the party from whom, he received the said duty and penalty, and the date and description of the instrument, and shall pay over to the Receiver-General of Inland Revenue, or to such other person as the commissioners may appoint, the money received by him for the said duty and penalty.

Commissioners to stamp instrument.—(3.) Upon production to the commissioners of any instrument in respect of which any duty or penalty has been paid as aforesaid, together with the receipt of the said officer, the payment of such duty and penalty shall be denoted on such instrument accordingly.

ADJUDICATION

DOUBTS AS TO SUFFICIENCY OF STAMPS MAY BE REMOVED.

The commissioners may be required to express their opinion as to duty.

Mode and effect of proceeding.—§ 18.

(1.) Subject to such regulations as the commissioners may think fit to make, the commissioners may be required by any person to express their opinion with reference to any executed instrument upon the following questions:

- (a.) Whether it is chargeable with any duty;
- (b.) With what amount of duty it is chargeable.
- (c.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is not chargeable with any duty, such in-

strument may be stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is not chargeable with any duty.

(3.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is chargeable with duty, they shall assess the duty with which it is in their opinion chargeable, and if or when the instrument is duly stamped in accordance with the assessment of the commissioners, it may be also stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is duly stamped.

(4.) Every instrument stamped with the particular stamp denoting either that it is not chargeable with any duty, or is duly stamped, shall be admissible in evidence, and available for all purposes, notwithstanding any objection relating to duty.

(5.) Provided as follows:—

(a.) *Instrument to be stamped according to opinion.*—An instrument upon which duty has been assessed by commissioners shall not, if it is unstamped or insufficiently stamped, be stamped otherwise than in accordance with assessment of commissioners.

(b.) *Securities without limit not to be adjudicated.*—Nothing in this section contained extends to any instrument chargeable with duty, and made as a security for money or stock without limit.

(c.) *Also instruments which cannot be stamped.*—Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to authorize the stamping after the execution thereof of any instrument prohibited by law from being so stamped.

Person dissatisfied may appeal.—§ 19.

(1.) Any person who is dissatisfied with the assessment of the commissioners made in pursuance of the last preceding section may, within twenty-one days after the date of such assessment, and on payment of duty in conformity therewith, appeal against such assessment to Her Majesty's Court of Exchequer in England, Scotland, or Ireland, according to the country in which the case has arisen, and may for that purpose require the commissioners to state and sign a case, setting forth the question upon which their opinion was required, and the assessment made by them.

two months of the last date), on payment of the duty; if beyond that date, on payment of the duty and penalty. Persons applying will be furnished with a schedule, which, after being filled up, is to be presented, with the instrument, at the Cashier's Office, No. 3 Inland Revenue. The amount of duty sought to be impressed is to be inserted in the schedule by the applicant before being presented, and the duty is to be paid at the time of the application.

Agreements liable to the duty of 6d. must be lodged within fourteen days of their date, in order to be stamped without penalty.

Mode of proceeding.—(2.) The commissioners shall thereupon state and sign a case accordingly, and deliver the same to the person by whom it is required, and on his application such case may be set down for hearing in the proper court.

(3.) Upon the hearing of such case (due notice of which is to be given to the commissioners) the court shall determine the question submitted, and, if the instrument in question is in the opinion of the court chargeable with any duty, shall assess the duty with which it is so chargeable.

(4.) If it is decided by the court that the assessment of the commissioners is erroneous, any excess of duty which may have been paid in conformity with such erroneous assessment, together with any penalty which may have been paid in consequence thereof, shall be ordered by the court to be repaid by the commissioners to the appellant, together with the costs incurred by him in relation to the appeal.

(5.) But if the assessment of commissioners is confirmed by court, the costs incurred by commissioners in relation to the appeal shall be ordered by the court to be paid by appellant to the commissioners.

The commissioners may call for and refuse to proceed without evidence.—

§ 20. (1.) In any case of application to the commissioners with reference to any instrument, the commissioners may require to be furnished with an abstract of the instrument, and also with such evidence as they may deem necessary, in order to show to their satisfaction whether all the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of the instrument to duty, or the amount of the duty chargeable thereon, are fully and truly set forth therein, and may refuse to proceed upon any such application until

such abstract and evidence has been furnished accordingly.

Affidavit not to be used otherwise.

Person paying full duty relieved of penalty, etc., for omission to state truly in instrument.—(2.) Provided that no affidavit or statutory declaration made in pursuance of this section shall be used against any person making the same in any proceeding whatever, except in an inquiry as to the duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable; and every person by whom any such affidavit or declaration is made shall, on payment of the full duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable, be relieved from any penalty, forfeiture, or disability he may have incurred by reason of the omission to state truly in such instrument any of the facts or circumstances aforesaid. (See Note a.)

DENOTING STAMP.

DUPLICATES (§ 93).—CONVEYANCE ON SALE (§ 76).—SETTLEMENT (§ 126), etc. § 14. Where the duty with which an instrument is chargeable depends in any manner upon the duty paid upon another instrument, the payment of such last-mentioned duty shall, if application be made to the commissioners for that purpose, and on production of both the instruments, be denoted in such manner as the commissioners think fit upon such first-mentioned instrument. (See Note b.)

LICENSE TO SELL STAMPS.

Persons selling stamps must have a license from the Commissioners of Inland Revenue. Applications for license may be addressed to the Comptroller of Stamps and Taxes for Scotland, at Edinburgh. License to specify Christian name and surname and place of abode, and specify shop

a Instruments are received for adjudication at the Solicitor's Office, Inland Revenue Office, Edinburgh, on the same conditions as to duty and penalty as instruments to be stamped merely. The schedule (the duty to be impressed not being inserted), the instrument after execution, and an abstract giving the names and addresses of the parties to it, the substance of the provisions, particularly dates and sums, and a reference to the part of the deed on which each commences, are to be left at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5, on Mondays and Wednesdays, between 10 and 2 o'clock. Between 10 and 12 o'clock on Thursday following, a person, who can give explanation, must call on the Assistant Solicitor, No. 6; and he should be prepared to pay the proper duty and penalty, if any, to the Cashier, No. 3, Lobby.

b Instruments requiring to be impressed with the denoting stamp to render them valid may be lodged at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5 Inland Revenue, Edinburgh, between 10 and 2 o'clock on Monday and Wednesday. The principal instrument, as well as the subordinate instrument, must be lodged, and both must appear to be properly stamped.

or shops where stamps are to be sold. Bond to be granted. Not to sell but at shops licensed, and not hawk (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, §§ 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11). Persons in the employment of the Post Office to sell postage stamps without license, and carry them about for sale (*ib.* § 12).

DISCOUNT ON THE PURCHASE OF STAMPS.

Upon the sale of stamps such discount shall be allowed to the purchaser thereof as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall direct (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, § 13).

[The Treasury have sanctioned the continuance for the present of the several rates of discount formerly granted, viz.:

Purchasers of stamps (except receipt, labels for medicines, and postage-stamps) at London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, under the value of £10 each, but to the value of £30 or upwards in whole, are allowed discount at the rate of 30s. per cent. on every complete sum of £5. The like discount is allowed to any person lodging at Edinburgh, paper or forms containing printed matter only, to be impressed with stamp duties under the value of £10 each, but to the value of £30 or upwards in whole.

To persons who at one time shall produce at the office of Inland Revenue in London (Edinburgh) or Dublin, paper to be stamped with, or shall purchase at the office in London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, stamps to the amount of £2 or upwards, or of any distributor of stamps at any place not within ten miles from the said offices, stamps to the amount of £1 or upwards, denoting any duty not exceeding 1s. on bills of exchange, except adhesive foreign bill stamps, drafts or orders, or promissory notes, or stamps, for denoting the duty of 1d. (except postage-stamps), an allowance shall be made of 10d. for every 20s. of the duties denoted by such stamps (23 & 24 Vict. c. 111, § 3). No person selling such stamps shall charge for the paper whereon the same are impressed: penalty, £10. (17 & 18 Vict. c. 83, § 25).]

EXCHANGING SPOILED STAMPS.

STAMP DUTIES MANAGEMENT ACT, 1870 (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98).

Allowance for Spoiled Stamps.—§ 14.

The commissioners may make regulations regarding allowance for stamps spoiled in the following cases, viz. :—

Instruments not executed.—(1.) Inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, obliterated, or by any means rendered unfit for the purpose intended :

Adhesive stamps.—(2.) Any never used nor affixed to any material, but inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled or rendered unfit for use :

Bills and Notes.—(3.) Signed by the drawer, but not delivered out of his hands to the payee, or any person on his behalf, or deposited with any person as a security for the payment of money, or in any way negotiated, issued, or put in circulation, or made use of in any other manner whatever, and which being a bill has not been accepted by the drawee, and does not bear any signature intended as or for the acceptance :

(4.) Signed by or on behalf of the drawer thereof, but which from any omission or error has been spoiled or rendered useless, although the same, being a bill of exchange, may have been presented for acceptance or accepted or endorsed, or, being a promissory note, may have been delivered to the payee, provided that another completed and duly stamped bill or note is produced identical in every particular, except in correction of such error or omission as aforesaid, with the spoiled bill or note :

(5.) The following *executed instruments* :—

(a.) Presentation to an ecclesiastical benefice not followed by institution :

(b.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found to be absolutely void in law from the beginning :

(c.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found unfit by reason of any error or mistake therein for the purpose originally intended :

(d.) Executed by any party thereto, but which, by reason of the death of any person by whom it is necessary that it should be executed, without having executed the same, or of the refusal of any such person to execute the same, or to advance any money intended to be thereby secured, cannot be completed so as to effect the intended transaction in the form proposed :

(e.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of the execution thereof by some material and necessary party, and his inability or refusal to sign the same, is in fact incomplete and insufficient

for the purpose for which it was intended:

(f.) Executed by any party thereto, which, by reason of the refusal of any person to act under the same, or by the refusal or non-acceptance of any office thereby granted, totally fails of the intended purpose:

(g.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of enrolment or registration within the time required by law, becomes null and void;

(h.) Executed by any party thereto, which becomes useless in consequence of the transaction intended to be thereby effected being effected by some other instrument duly stamped:

(i.) Executed by any party thereto, which is inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, and in lieu whereof another instrument made between the same parties and for the same purpose is executed and duly stamped:

Provided:—

(1.) *Executed Instruments*—

(a.) The instrument is given up to be cancelled:

(b.) The application is made within *six months* after the date of the instrument, or, if not dated, within *six months* after the execution by the person by whom it was first or alone executed. Except, 1. Where from unavoidable circumstances any instrument for which another instrument has been substituted cannot be given up to be cancelled within the aforesaid period, and in that case within *six months* after the date or execution of the substituted instrument; 2. Where the spoiled instrument has become void for want of enrolment or registration, and in that case within *six months* next after it has so become void; 3. Where the spoiled instrument has been sent abroad, and in that case within *six months* after it has been received back in any part of the United Kingdom:

(c.) No action has been brought or suit commenced in which the instrument could or would have been given or offered in evidence:

(2.) *Unexecuted Instruments*.—In the case of stamped material, not having any executed instrument written thereon, and of an adhesive stamp

not affixed to any material, the application is made within *six months* after the stamp has been spoiled.

Misused Stamps.—§ 15. Stamp used of greater value than was necessary, or stamp inadvertently used for an instrument not liable to any duty, application within *six months* after the date of the instrument, or, if it is not dated, within *six months* after the execution. The instrument liable to duty to be restamped with the proper duty. The misused stamp to be cancelled and allowed as spoiled.

Allowance how to be made.—§ 16. The commissioners may give in lieu other stamps of the same denomination and value, or if required, and they think proper, stamps of any other denomination to the same amount in value, or, at their discretion, the same value in money, deducting the proper allowance on the purchase of stamps of the like description.

Stamps not wanted may be repurchased by the Commissioners.—§ 17. A stamp not spoiled or rendered unfit or useless for the purpose intended, but for which the person has no immediate use, the commissioners may, if they in their discretion think fit, repay the amount in money, deducting the proper discount. The stamp to be delivered up to be cancelled, and satisfactory proof to be given that it was purchased by him with a *bona fide* intention to be used, and that the applicant has paid the full value thereof without any deduction (except only the amount of such discount), and that the stamp was so purchased within the period of *six months* next preceding the application at the chief office or at one of the head offices, or from some person appointed to sell and distribute stamps or duly licensed to deal in stamps.

As to the exchange of *Sea Policies* of Insurance, see 30 Vict. c. 23, § 17. The cases for allowing are—

(1.) Where policy shall be inadvertently filled up in an incorrect or improper manner;

(2.) Or be obliterated or otherwise spoiled, and rendered unfit for use;

(3.) Or shall be filled up for some insurances which shall not be proceeded in, and the same shall not be signed by any underwriter.

Application must be made within *six months* after the policy shall be spoiled or become useless.

(See Note a.)

a The Inland Revenue Office, No. 6 Waterloo Place, Edinburgh, is open for the allowance of spoiled stamps every lawful day, except Saturday, from 10 A.M. to 2 P.M. The distributors and most of the sub-distributors of stamps also receive spoiled stamps for allowance.

IV. INHABITED HOUSE DUTY.

On each inhabited dwelling-house of the annual value of £20 or upwards, occupied as a farm-house, or any shop or warehouse, being part of a dwelling-house, where goods are exposed for sale and sold in

the front and basement story, or any house which is licensed for the sale of liquors by retail, or which is occupied as a hotel, although not licensed for the sale of liquors, a duty of 6d. per pound; all others, 9d.

Exemptions.—Any house occupied for the purpose of trade only, or as a warehouse for the sole purpose of lodging goods, or used as a shop or counting-house, where a servant may dwell for the protection thereof.

V. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

SCHEDULE A.—(Real Property.) On each 20s. of annual value of lands, tenements, and heritages, in respect of the property2d.

SCHEDULE B.—(Occupancy of Real Property.) On each 20s. of annual value of lands, tenements, and heritages (other than a dwelling-house separate from a farm), in Scotland, in respect of the occupancy3d.

SCHEDULE C.—(Public Funds.) On each 20s. of annual amount of profits from interest, annuities, dividends and shares of annuities, payable out of the public revenue2d.

SCHEDULE D.—(Trades and Professions.) On each 20s. of annual amount of gains, profits, or returns, from trades, professions, employments, or vocations, or from personal or other property not included in Schedules A, B, C, or E2d.

SCHEDULE E.—(Public Salaries.) On each 20s. of annual amount of salaries, pensions, or annuities, paid out of the public revenue, or for public offices or employments2d.

Exemption and Abatement.—Under the Act 26 Vict. c. 22, sect. 3, persons

whose whole incomes from every source are less than £100 a year are exempted. Persons whose incomes amount to £100 a year, but to less than £300 a year, are entitled to an abatement equal to the duty upon £80 of their income.

Deductions.—Deduction is allowed, when claimed, of any annual premium (not exceeding one-sixth part of the claimant's income from every source) paid for insurance, or deferred annuity, on the claimant's own or his wife's life, to any insurance company in existence on 1st November 1844, or registered pursuant to Act 7 and 8 Vict. c. 110; or of any annual payment made under Act of Parliament to a widows' or children's fund.

By the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 80, landlords in Scotland are entitled to relief (either by abatement or by repayment) from any amount of Income Tax which may be assessed upon them in respect of the annual value of such rates, taxes, assessments, and public burdens, as may be charged upon them and not charged upon landlords in England.

A supply of forms of affidavits is kept at the Inland Revenue Office, and by the distributors and sub-distributors of stamps; and claimants may attend at the Inland Revenue Office and have the affidavits taken; or they may take the oath before a justice of the peace, and shortly afterwards lodge the affidavits and the stamps with any of the above officers. If not brought within ten days or a fortnight afterwards the stamp will not be allowed without a fresh affidavit. If the claim be admitted at Edinburgh, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the new stamps after the next Monday, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If the claim be lodged with a distributor or sub-distributor, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the said stamps after a specified date, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If application not made within that time, the claim will be forfeited, and no excuse will be accepted.

The stamps must be presented for allowance *within six months* after being spoiled.

A letter weighing more than 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce. Example, 16 oz. would be 1s. 4d. Unpaid Letters are charged double, and deficient postage double the deficiency. Letters may not exceed in size 18×9×6 inches, unless to or from Government offices. On re-directed letters the charge for re-direction is the same whether prepaid or collected on delivery.

LATE LETTERS, posted at the provincial offices, are received till within 5 minutes of the despatch of the mails

on being prepaid one penny additional, and posted in the proper box, or handed over the counter. For letters posted at Edinburgh, see p. 136.

Letters, when once posted, cannot be given back upon any pretence whatever, but must be forwarded to the person to whom they are addressed.

Letters containing articles of a perishable or dangerous nature, or anything that might prove injurious to the other letters, are not forwarded, but sent to the Returned Letter Office.

REGISTRATION.—Any inland letter, book-packet, &c., can be registered on the payment of a fee of 4d. in addition to the postage on such letter or packet. The full amount in stamps for postage and fee must be on the letter when presented for registration, and it must be presented half-an-hour before the closing of the box for the mail by which it will be sent, otherwise it is

liable to a late fee of 4d. It is recommended that all letters of value, and letters containing coin, should be registered; as any letter discovered in course of transit, supposed to contain coin, is registered, and a fee of 8d. charged on it, which must be paid on delivery. A letter marked "registered" posted in any letter-box, instead of being presented for registration and a receipt obtained, is also charged a fee of 8d., any additional stamps on it above the postage being allowed for off that amount.

POST CARDS.

Post Cards at 7d. and 8d. per packet of 12 are issued for inland circulation, and Foreign Post Cards at 1½d. each for countries comprised within the General Postal Union.

Any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed. Nothing whatever may be attached; nor may the Card be folded, cut, or otherwise altered. If any of these rules be infringed, a fine will be charged on delivery.

NEWSPAPERS.

All newspapers registered at the General Post-Office, London, printed and published in the United Kingdom at intervals not exceeding seven days, and on a sheet, or sheets, unstitched, may be sent by post, singly or in a packet, within the United Kingdom, for a postage of one halfpenny for each newspaper. A newspaper packet posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be charged with the unpaid rate applicable to book packets. The title and date of every publication must be printed at the top of every page, and it must be folded in such a manner that the title may be readily inspected. It must either have no cover, or be in a cover open at the ends. It must contain no enclosure, except the supplement belonging to it. A newspaper which has any letter, written in it or upon its cover, will be charged as an unpaid or insufficiently paid letter. No packet of newspapers must exceed 14 lb. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in width or depth.

Registration for inland circulation includes registration for transmission abroad.

INLAND BOOK POST.

The rate of postage is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

If not sufficiently paid, double the deficiency will be charged; and if sent unpaid, a double rate is charged. All letters or sealed enclosures in a book packet are forbidden. If this rule is

infringed, the entire packet will be treated as a letter. If any letter is written on a book or its cover, it will be charged unpaid letter postage. (Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, etc., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter.)

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment, and may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three;—further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, whether loose or attached; also rollers in the case of prints; markers, whether paper or otherwise, in books; in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but every packet must be open at both ends, and put up in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it will be treated as a letter.

Circulars require to be in identical terms, the whole or greater part of which must be printed, engraved, or lithographed, notwithstanding such may be letters or communications of the nature of a letter.

A book packet in dimensions must not exceed 6 inches in depth, 9 inches in width, 18 inches in length, and 5 lb. in weight.

It is forbidden to forward by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, packet, or card having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character.

PRINTED PARLIAMENTARY PAPERS.—Same as Book Post rate, but there is no limitation as to weight. They must be without covers, or in covers open at the ends. The words "Parliamentary Proceedings" must be written or printed on the cover of the packet, otherwise it will be treated as an ordinary book packet. Prepayment is optional. Petitions and addresses forwarded to her Majesty pass free. Members of Parliament may receive petitions and addresses to her Majesty, or petitions to either House, free, if not exceeding 2 lb., and sent without covers, or in covers open at the sides.

POSTAGE STAMPS, WRAPPERS, ENVELOPES, AND POST CARDS.

Postage labels are of the respective values of ½d., 1d., 1½d., 2d., 2½d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., 10d., 1s., 2s., and 5s.

Inland Post Cards are 7d. and 8d.

FOREIGN MONEY ORDERS.—The regulations are the same as for inland orders. Orders payable in the Ger-

man Empire are subject to the conditions that govern the payment of orders in that empire. Orders issued in France on the United Kingdom, and *vice versa*, cannot be paid after three months from the date of issue, without the authority of the Post-office of the respective countries. POST-OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.—Every post-office, being a money-order office, which the Postmaster-General shall authorize to receive and repay deposits, will be open for that purpose during the same hours as are appointed for money-order business. Deposits of one shilling, or any number of pounds and shillings, will be received from any depositor, provided the sums deposited do not exceed £30 in any year, ending 31st December, and the total amount standing in the depositor's name does not exceed £150, exclusive of interest. Interest at the rate of £2, 10s. per cent. per annum allowed on every complete pound. When any depositor's principal and interest amount together to £200, all interest will cease so long as the balance of the account continues to amount to the said sum of £200. Any depositor wishing to withdraw the whole or part of his deposits, must apply on the form

which he will procure at any post-office savings bank, and transmit it to the Postmaster-General, who will send him a warrant by post, payable at the post-office named in his application. Further regulations as to details are printed in the book which the depositor receives on making his first deposit, and an abstract of the Act will be found in the Almanac for 1862, p. 143.

GOVERNMENT ANNUITIES, ETC.—The Act 27 and 28 Vict. c. 43, empowers the Postmaster-General to insure the lives of persons of either sex for not less than £20, or more than £100; and also to grant immediate or deferred annuities on the lives of persons of either sex, of the age of ten years and upwards. Certain post-offices have been opened for the receipt of proposals, where full instructions for filling up and delivering the necessary forms may be obtained. See Post-towns, p. 150. For Table of Annuities and Assurance, see p. 87.

POSTAGE TO THE COLONIES AND ALL FOREIGN PARTS.

The rates of postage are given in the following Table. A letter posted unpaid or insufficiently prepaid, directed to go by a route by which prepayment is compulsory, is returned to the sender unless the letter can be sent by a route by which prepayment is not required.

Letters, however, for Australia and New Zealand, posted insufficiently prepaid, are not returned if prepaid one rate, but are forwarded, charged the deficient postage, and a fine.

No letter exceeding 250 grammes (a

little more than 8½ oz.), and containing any other enclosure than paper, is allowed to circulate in Germany by post. Such letters will be stopped at the frontier, and sent to the Customhouse for delivery as freight. Coin, jewelry, and other articles of value, are not permitted to circulate in the countries comprised in the General Postal Union. Such articles sent to Costa Rica and Peru are liable to confiscation, and if sent to the colonies of Canada, Cape of Good Hope, Queensland, and Victoria, are liable

to be detained until the customs duties have been paid.

POST CARDS for countries comprised in the General Postal Union are issued at 1½d. each, under the same regulations as for inland circulation.

NEWSPAPERS for foreign countries and the colonies are subject to the same general regulations as for inland circulation; excepting that for foreign transmission a newspaper may be published at intervals of 31 days, and that it (but not its supplement) may be printed on sheets stitched together. It must be posted within eight days from the date of publication, including the day of publication.

BOOK POST.—To the colonies and most foreign countries printed paper may be sent under the same regulations as the Inland Book Post, and the name and address of the sender may be written on the book; but to some foreign countries there must be no writing or manuscript marks except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent.

INDIAN PARCEL POST.—Parcels can be sent through the Indian Parcel Post Agency* to any part of British India.—Offices in London: 122 Leadenhall St., E.C., and 25 Cockspur St., S.W. The rate is 1s. per lb. or fraction thereof. The maximum weight, size, and value of a parcel, is 50 lb.; two feet long by one foot broad and deep; and £20 respectively. Jewelry, watches, precious stones, liquids, or articles of a dangerous or damaging nature are forbidden. The parcel must be securely closed and packed. A letter of advice stating particulars of parcel should be sent to the London office.

PATTERN POST.—The Pattern and Sample Post is restricted to *bona fide trade patterns or samples of merchandise*.

Patterns or samples, when practicable, must be sent in covers open at the ends, and so as to be easy of examination. But samples of seeds, drugs, and such like articles, which cannot be sent in covers of this kind,—but such articles only,—may be posted enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened; or in bags entirely closed, provided such closed bags are transparent, so as to enable the officers of the Post-Office readily to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

Samples of intrinsic value must not be sent to any foreign country.

There must be no writing or printing upon any packet except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number, and the price of the articles.

LIMITATIONS as to weight, etc., of the Newspaper, Book, and Pattern Post.—For places included in the General Postal Union, a packet of newspapers or books must not exceed 2 lb., and patterns or samples, 8 oz. To New South Wales and Queensland, the weight must not exceed 3 lb. In every other case the limit is 5 lb. No letter or packet must exceed 24 inches in length, or 12 inches in breadth or depth.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS, ETC.—Letters, Newspapers, Book, and Pattern Packets may be registered to the colonies and to most foreign countries for a fee of 4d. under the same regulations as for inland letters, etc.

SHIP-LETTERS, ETC.

Letters intended to be sent by private ship must be so addressed—"By Private Ship,"—and if by a particular vessel, the name of the ship must be added. The ship postage—To the Continent of Europe, Azores, Madeira, Dominion of Canada, and United States, is 2½d. per ½ oz.; British West

Indies and Newfoundland, 3d. per ½ oz.; Cape of Good Hope, Natal, St Helena, and Ascension, 4d. ½ oz.; to all other places 6d. per ½ oz., or part thereof. To the countries named above, with the exception of Ascension, letters may be sent unpaid, and also to Cape de Verde Islands, Ceylon,

PROTECTION OF FOREIGN DRAMA.

CHAP. 12. *To amend the Law relating to International Copyright.*
May 13, 1875.

Preamble recites 15 Victoria, c. 12, an Act which deals with international copyright, and carries into effect a convention with France on that subject. Foreign dramatic authors could, under that statute, obtain an Order in Council empowering them to prevent the representation in the British dominions of any unauthorized translation of dramatic pieces for a time not exceeding five years, and were, for that purpose and during that

period, put in the same position as the author of any dramatic piece first publicly represented in the British dominions. There was a salvo, provided by the sixth section, to the effect that the statute was not to be so construed as to prevent fair imitations or adaptations to the English stage of any foreign drama or musical composition.

(1.) An Order in Council made under the enactments above recited may direct that section sixth of the statute shall not apply to the dramatic pieces and translations thereof to which protection is by such Order extended.

* The abstracts have been made on the principle of abridging very considerably such provisions as regulate the conduct of official persons, who may be presumed to look for information to the Acts themselves; while those laws which affect the public in general have been abstracted with much anxiety to give a distinct though brief view of their application. The chapters affecting the appropriation of the revenue, and diplomatic matters, as well as the Mutiny and other annual Acts, though they may be said to apply to the inhabitants of Scotland as much as to the other citizens of the empire, are, for obvious reasons, omitted. The numbers within parentheses refer to the sections of the Acts.

SEA FISHERIES.

CHAP. 15. *To amend the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868.* May 28, 1875.

(1.) Any oyster fishery company subject to the control of the Inspectors of Fisheries shall pass out of such control, and henceforth be under the control of the Board of Trade, as if they had been original grantees under a Board of Trade order by virtue of the Act of 1868. (2.) Board of Trade and its inspectors shall have for the purpose of their inquiries and examination under section 45th of said statute, the same powers as they are empowered to exercise under section 32d. (3.) Saving clause as to regulations to prevent collisions at sea. (4.) Short title: "The Sea Fisheries Act, 1875."

REGIMENTAL EXCHANGES.

CHAP. 16. *To amend the Law relating to Regimental Exchanges.* May 28, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Regimental Exchange Act, 1875." (2.) The Crown may, by regulation, authorize exchanges by officers in the regular forces from one regiment or corps into another, on such conditions as may to the Crown seem expedient. Nothing in the Army Brokerage Acts shall avail against this. (3.) Defines these Acts,—viz., 5 and 6 Edw. VI. c. 16, and 49 Geo. III. c. 126.

EXPLOSIVE SUBSTANCES.

CHAP. 17. *To amend the Law with respect to Manufacturing, Keeping, Selling, Carrying, and Importing Gunpowder, Nitro-Glycerine, and other Explosive Substances.* June 14, 1875.

Preliminary.—(1.) Short title: "The Explosives Act, 1875." (2.) Act to come into operation on 1st January 1876. Orders in Council, rules, bye-laws, and appointments to office may be made at any time after the passing of the Act, but shall not take effect till the date above specified. (3.) Act to apply to gunpowder and other explosives as defined by this section. These are gunpowder, nitro-glycerine, dynamite, gun-cotton, blasting powders, fulminate of mercury or other metals, coloured fires, and every other substance used or made

to produce a practical effect by explosion or a pyrotechnic effect. The definition also includes fog signals, fireworks, fuzes, rockets, percussion caps, detonators, cartridges, ammunition of all descriptions, and every adaptation or preparation of an explosive as above defined.

PART I. LAW RELATING TO GUNPOWDER.—*General Law as to Manufacture and Keeping of Gunpowder.*—

(4.) Gunpowder shall not be made, nor any process of such manufacture be carried on, except at a factory lawfully existing, or licensed under this Act. This does not apply to the making of a small quantity for chemical experiment, and not for practical use or sale. The making of gunpowder at an unauthorized place to infer forfeiture of ingredients, and a penalty not exceeding £100 a day. (5.) Gunpowder (except for private use and not for sale, to the extent of 30 lbs. on the same premises, or for the purpose of conveyance in accordance with the provisions of this Act) to be kept only in the factory or in a magazine or store either lawfully existing or licensed under this Act, or in premises registered under this Act for that purpose. Contravention infers forfeiture of the powder, and penalty not exceeding 2s. for every lb. so kept. *Licensing of Factories and Magazines for Gunpowder.*—(6.) A new factory or magazine for gunpowder shall not be established except on the site and in the manner specified in a license for the same granted under this Act by the Secretary of State. Here follow the details to be set forth in an application for such license. (7.) Assent of the local authority to the establishment of a new factory or magazine on the proposed site must be applied for. If the proposed site be partly within the jurisdiction of one local authority and partly within the jurisdiction of another, the assent of both must be applied for. Notice of such application is to be published, and of the time and place at which the applicant is to be heard. Special notice to be served by applicant on any urban sanitary authority, or any harbour authority, within one mile of the proposed site. Local authority may, after hearing, either dissent altogether, or assent under conditions. (8.) If there be assent by the local

authority, or assent under conditions accepted by the applicant, he shall be entitled to the license as approved by the Secretary of State. If the local authority dissent, or assent on conditions not accepted by the applicant, there may be appeal to the Secretary of State. If there be dissent, the Secretary of State may refuse. Otherwise, he may grant on such conditions as are in the draft previously approved by him, or such as he may consider required to meet the objections of the local authority. When a factory or magazine is completed to the satisfaction of the Secretary of State, the license requires to be confirmed by him, and shall not come into operation till it be so confirmed. *Regulations of Factories and Magazines for Gunpowder.*—(9.) Terms of the license to be observed. No enlargement or material alteration without an amending license. Contravention to involve forfeiture of gunpowder or materials in any building or machine, in respect to which the offence is committed, with a penalty of £50 for first and £100 for every subsequent offence, besides £50 for every day during which such breach continues. Temporary emergency provided for. (10.) Enacts, under thirteen specific heads, the general rules to be observed in every gunpowder factory and magazine, being, in the main, precautions to prevent explosion. Power is given to the Secretary of State to modify these rules. Contravention infers forfeiture of all the gunpowder or ingredients in any building or machine in respect to which the offence was committed, and a penalty not exceeding £10, with the addition in case of a second offence of £10 for every day during which the breach continues. (11.) Every occupier of a gunpowder factory or magazine shall, with the sanction of the Secretary of State, make special rules for the regulation of the persons managing or employed in or about such factory or magazine, with a view to secure the observance of this Act therein, and the safety and proper discipline of the said persons, and the safety of the public. Penalties authorized for breach not exceeding 40s. Alteration or repeal of these special rules to be made within three months on requisition by Secretary of State. On failure the Secretary may alter or

repeal. Occupier feeling aggrieved may have recourse to arbitration as provided for by this Act. *Supplemental as to Factories and Magazines for Gunpowder.*—(12.) Where alteration is needed in terms of the license or in the premises, by enlargement or by new works, an amending license is to be applied for. If the occupier satisfy the Secretary of State that the proposed changes will not increase the risks, the Secretary of State may grant the amending license of his own authority; but the provisions otherwise of this Act as to the grant of a new license shall apply. (13.) Change of the occupier shall not void the license. But detailed notice of the change must be sent to the Secretary of State within three months, subject to a penalty not exceeding 20s. for every week during which the default continues. Discontinuance of the business for two years shall determine the license; also, the use of the factory or magazine for any purpose not authorized by the license. Effect of two years' lapse may be prevented by notice that the right to the license is not intended to be surrendered. This notice will keep up the license for five years after the first discontinuance of the business, whether or not the premises have been used for some purpose not authorized by the license. *Application of Act to existing Factories and Magazines for Gunpowder.*—(14.) Occupier of a factory or magazine used at the time of the passing of this Act must within three months obtain a continuing certificate from the Secretary of State. Particulars required, such as the maximum of gunpowder to be kept, etc. Where a license for a factory or magazine has been obtained before 25th February 1875, but the factory has not been completed prior to the passing of this Act, the same shall be held to be an existing factory or magazine for the purposes of this section. Continuing certificate to be deemed a license for the purposes of this Act. Assent of local authority not needed to an amending license for an alteration in the terms of such certificate, or for an alteration in the factory or magazine. If the certificate be determined by discontinuance of business, the factory or magazine shall cease to be deemed an existing factory or magazine. Occupier of existing factory or magazine may

carry on his business within the three months allowed him to apply for a continuing certificate, and also till he obtains it, if he has duly sent in his application. *Consumers' Stores for Gunpowder. Licensing and Regulation for Stores.*—(15.) License for a gunpowder store to be obtained from the local authority on payment of a fee not exceeding 5s., provided the proposed site, construction, and quantity of gunpowder be in accordance with the Order in Council mentioned in next section. (16.) Order in Council may be made to regulate details of construction and situation of gunpowder stores; also, the maximum of gunpowder, not exceeding two tons, to be stored therein. Such order not to require removal of building lawfully in use at the date thereof. (17.) Enacts, under ten specific heads, the general rules to be observed in every gunpowder store, being mainly precautions to prevent explosion. Contravention to infer forfeiture of gunpowder, and penalty not exceeding £10. In case of a second offence, £10 to be forfeited in addition, for every day during which the breach continues. (18.) A store license is valid only for the person named in it, and is subject to annual renewal on payment of a fee not exceeding 1s. Such license is to be in the form directed by the Secretary of State. (19.) Occupier of gunpowder store may, with sanction of the Secretary of State, make, repeal, or alter, special rules for the regulation of the persons managing or employed in or about such store, to secure the observance of this Act, and the safety and proper discipline of the said persons and the safety of the public. Penalties not exceeding 40s. authorized for contravention. *Application of Act to existing Stores for Gunpowder.*—(20.) Defines an existing store as any magazine established without a license from a local authority in pursuance of the Gunpowder Act 1860, or of any enactment repealed by that Act, for the use of any mine, quarry, colliery, or factory of safety-fuzes, and in use at the passing of this Act. It requires a continuing certificate from the local authority. Application, with necessary particulars, to be made within three months of the passing of this Act. Continuing certificate, with particulars, including maximum of gunpowder as fixed prior to 1st January

1875, to be granted on payment of a fee not exceeding 2s. 6d. Regulations in part two of first schedule shall apply. Continuing certificate to be deemed a license. Store not to be enlarged, added to, or altered, so as to be of a less secure construction. Continuing certificate not to be limited in duration. Discontinuance of the business for twelve months, or use for another purpose, shall cause the store to cease to be deemed an existing store. License may be applied for, as in the case of a new store, in behalf of an existing store. Occupier of existing store may lawfully carry on his business within the three months, above provided as the interval within which he must apply for a continuing certificate, and for six months after his application duly sent in. *Retail Dealing with Gunpowder. Registration and Regulation of Registered Premises.*—(21.) Premises for the keeping of gunpowder must be registered; the name and calling of applicant being given to local authority for that purpose. Fee not exceeding 1s. to be paid. Such registration not to be transferable, and to be annually renewed. (22.) Enacts, under five specific heads, general rules to be observed in registered premises, so as to secure the safety of the public, and prevent explosions. Contravention to infer forfeiture of gunpowder, and penalty not exceeding 2s. for every lb. thereof, in respect of which the offence was committed. *Supplemental Provisions.*—(23.) Occupier of every factory, magazine, store, and registered premises, must take all due precautions to prevent accidents by fire or explosion, also to prevent access of unauthorized persons. Contravention of this section to be deemed breach of general rules. (24.) All gunpowder and ingredients within twenty yards of a building, in course of removal to or from it, shall be deemed to be in the building in estimating the quantity limited by this Act. Certain excess allowed within that radius where machines and manufacturing processes are wholly stopped. Provision when limitation of quantity is on machine only. Where limitation is not specific in quantity, government inspector may interfere to require diminution of quantity, if he considers it excessive. If occupier

be dissatisfied, arbitration is open. (25.) Authorizes arbitration to be conducted in manner set forth in second schedule. (26.) Regulates fees for licenses. (27.) Adjoining places occupied together to be included in one license or one registration. (28.) Local authority to cause registers of all store licenses and registered premises to be kept. Copy thereof, on requisition, to be sent to the Secretary of State. Register to be open, for inspection and copy, to ratepayers and licensees, on payment of 1s.; and to government inspectors, local authority and police officers, without payment. (29.) On death or bankruptcy of an occupier of a store or registered premises, or on supervening incapacity, reasonable time to be allowed to the person carrying on the business of such occupier to obtain store license or registration, provided he otherwise conform with the provisions of this Act. *Sale of Gunpowder.*—(30.) Gunpowder shall not be hawked, sold, or exposed for sale upon any highway, street, public thoroughfare, or public place. Contravention to infer penalty not exceeding 40s., and forfeiture of the gunpowder. (31.) Gunpowder shall not be sold to any child apparently under the age of thirteen years, under a penalty not exceeding £5. (32.) Gunpowder sold in any quantity exceeding 1 lb. in weight, must be in a substantial case, bag, canister, or other receptacle made and closed so as to prevent the gunpowder from escaping, and marked "gunpowder." Exception when vendor sells to one in his own employment for immediate use in his own service. Contravention to infer forfeiture of powder, and penalty not exceeding 40s. *Conveyance of Gunpowder.*—(33.) Enacts general rules for the public safety, under seven specific heads, to be observed in the conveyance of gunpowder. Powers to Secretary of State to add, to alter, and repeal these rules. (34.) Bye-laws to be made by harbour authorities, with the sanction of the Board of Trade, to regulate the conveyance, loading, and unloading of gunpowder. The subjects of these bye-laws are specifically enumerated under eleven heads. Penalties provided for. (35.) Powers to railway and canal companies to make bye-laws for the conveyance, loading, and unloading of gunpowder. The sub-

jects of these bye-laws, which require the sanction of the Board of Trade, are enumerated under nine specific heads. Penalties authorized. (36.) Bye-laws to be made for the loading or unloading of gunpowder at wharves and docks by the occupiers thereof. These are to be sanctioned by the Secretary of State, who is empowered to require repeal, addition, or alteration. (37.) Secretary of State may make, rescind, or alter bye-laws to regulate the conveyance, loading, or unloading of gunpowder in any case not otherwise provided for. Subjects of these bye-laws enumerated under seven specific heads. (38.) Provides for the official confirmation and publication of bye-laws.

PART II. LAW RELATING TO OTHER EXPLOSIVES.—(39.) The first part of this Act is made applicable to other explosives, subject to provisions hereinafter enacted. (40.) Modification, under nine specific heads, of Part I. as applied to explosives other than gunpowder. Among these may be noticed a provision that the outermost package containing an explosive must exhibit its name, with the addition of the word "explosive." If such name be materially false, a penalty not exceeding £50 shall be incurred. An importation license from the Secretary of State is necessary for the importation from any place out of the United Kingdom, of dynamite, gun-cotton, or any explosive other than gunpowder, cartridges made with gunpowder, percussion caps, fireworks, and any prescribed explosive [*i.e.*, prescribed by Order in Council]. Commissioners of Customs and their officers to have necessary powers. (41.) Nothing in this Act shall apply to the filling or conveying for private use, and not for sale, any safety cartridges to the amount allowed by this Act to be kept for private use. (42.) Extends to every explosive within the meaning of this Act the provisions applicable to gunpowder contained in section 29 of the Passengers Act of 1855, and in sections from 23 to 27, both inclusive, of the Merchant Shipping Act of 1873. Commissioners of Customs and their officers to have necessary powers. *Specially Dangerous Explosives.*—(43.) Order in Council may be made prohibiting either absolutely, or except under license by the Secretary of State, or

under conditions, the manufacture, keeping, or importation of any explosive of so dangerous a character that it is deemed expedient to make such an order. Anything lawful to be done under a continuing certificate cannot be absolutely prohibited by such order. Provides for contravention, and gives necessary powers to officers of customs. *Provisions in favour of certain Manufacturers and Dealers.*—(44.) Factory license not necessary for making up cartridges either for cannon or blasting purposes, not containing within themselves their own means of ignition. Such cartridges may be kept in a magazine, store, or registered premises, as if the explosive of which they consist were not so made up, the provisions of this Act remaining in like manner applicable. (45.) The occupier of a factory for any explosive, who manufactures a new explosive similar to the one mentioned in his license, shall not be held as contravening this Act, if he does this on a small scale and exclusively for experiment and not for sale. He must send notice to the Secretary of State, and observe provisions of this Act so far as applicable. (46.) Factory license not necessary for the filling of cartridges for small arms, provided that certain regulations, detailed under five specific heads, be duly observed. This section not to apply, except with consent of Secretary of State, to any magazine or store for which a continuing certificate has been obtained. Contravention provided for. (47.) Factory license not required by one who, in his magazine or store, fills cartridges or otherwise adopts an explosive for use exclusively in his mine or quarry or other excavation carried on by him, provided he observes certain regulations detailed under five specific heads. Same proviso as in previous section for magazine or store held under a continuing certificate. Provision for contravention. Application of general rules. (48.) Distinction between firework factory, and small firework factory; the latter not containing at the same time more than 100 lbs. of any explosive other than made up fireworks and coloured fires, or more than 500 lbs. of finished or partly finished fireworks, or more than 25 lbs. of coloured fires not made up into fire-

works. License from local authority sufficient. Under such license one may, without contravening this Act, manufacture an explosive (other than nitro-glycerine or other prescribed explosive) for the purpose only of coloured fires for sale duly packed as required by this Act. (49.) Regulates the licensing of a small firework factory by the local authority. (50.) Neither license nor registration of premises shall be necessary for the keeping of percussion caps, or safety fuzes for blasting, or fog signals kept by any railway company for use on their railway, or any prescribed explosive [*i.e.*, prescribed by Order in Council]. No harbour authority, or railway or canal company, or wharfinger requires to make bye-laws for the conveyance, loading, or unloading of any explosives to which this section applies. Order in Council may exempt these explosives from the provisions of this Act, or may declare that a license is needed to keep them, and that bye-laws must be made to regulate the loading, unloading, and conveyance thereof. *Existing Factories, Magazines, and Stores.*—(51.) In the continuing certificate of a lawfully existing magazine or store for any explosive other than gunpowder, the regulations in first schedule shall not form part thereof. Secretary of State to insert conditions. New license for keeping an explosive other than gunpowder in an existing gunpowder store, shall determine the continuing certificate as for a gunpowder store. (52.) Provides for expiry within twelve months of the passing of this Act of a license of a factory or magazine for any explosive other than gunpowder. Occupier may, without continuing certificate, go on till expiry of license as though this Act had not passed. He may thereafter apply for license under this Act. Occupier of a magazine licensed under the Nitro-Glycerine Act of 1869, may go on for six months after the commencement of this Act without a continuing certificate, as if this Act had not passed. Same provision as to holder of an importation license under the Nitro-Glycerine Act of 1869.

PART III. ADMINISTRATION OF LAW.—*Government Supervision Inspection.*—(53.) Authorizes appointment of Government inspectors. (54.)

No manufacturer, storer, carrier, importer, or exporter of, or trader or dealer in an explosive, or holder of a patent therein, can be a Government inspector; and this disqualification extends to partnership, or other direct or indirect connexion. (55.) Powers of Government inspector to make such examination and inquiry as may be necessary to ascertain whether this Act be complied with. He may enter premises and require samples. Penalty not exceeding £100 on any one refusing entry of premises to an inspector, or failing to comply with a requisition by him. (56.) If in any matter not provided for by this Act, the inspector sees danger to the public safety, he may require a remedy; and if this be refused, he may require arbitration as provided by this Act. Contract not pleadable against such requisition or award. Party may save himself from forfeiture or penalty under contract by giving notice thereof to inspector or arbitrators previous to requisition or award. Reasonable time to be given for complying with requisition. (57.) Annual report to be made by the inspector of all his proceedings under this Act to the Secretary of State. These annual reports to be laid before Parliament. (58.) The Board of Trade may order their inspectors of railways, and their inspectors under the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854, to inquire into the observance of this Act, in those two departments. (59.) As to magazines or stores used for mines, the Secretary of State may direct the inspectors appointed under the Coal Mine and Metalliferous Mine Acts of 1872, to act as Government inspectors under this Act. (60.) License confirmed by Secretary of State, and special rules certified by a Government inspector, to be evidence. (61.) Keeping and carriage of samples, by inspector or person authorized by him, for the purposes of this Act to infer no penalty. (62.) Salaries to be defrayed out of moneys to be provided by Parliament. *Accidents.*—(63.) Notice of accident by explosion or by fire in store, magazine, or registered premises, occasioning loss of life or personal injury, to be sent by occupier to the Secretary of State. Similar provision as to the owner or master of any carriage, ship, or boat, and owner of explosive, through which an accident

with the like results occurs in conveyance, loading, or unloading; provided the gunpowder exceeds half a ton, or, in the case of any other explosive, the prescribed amount. Contravention to infer penalty not exceeding £20. (64.) Where an accident by fire or explosion has wholly or partly destroyed a factory, magazine, or store, reconstruction shall not take place except with the sanction of the Secretary of State, nor shall any further supply of an explosive be put therein without such sanction. Provision made for the case of two or more buildings so destroyed, that not more than one of them shall be reconstructed without the sanction of the Secretary of State. Also other provisions relating to the reconstruction of buildings so destroyed. (65.) Provision as to coroner's inquests. (66.) Inquiry into accident by explosion or fire may be ordered by the Secretary of State to be made by Government inspector with the assistance of persons possessing legal or special knowledge. Persons making this formal investigation to have the powers of a court of summary jurisdiction, and to proceed in open court. Report to be made to the Secretary of State. Expenses of witnesses and penalties for refusal to comply with summons of the court provided for. *Local Supervision, Definition and Powers of Local Authority.*—(67 and 68.) Define the local authority for London and other places in England. (69.) Defines duty of local authority and powers of their officer. Officer, on production of his authority, may require occupier of any store (not subject to the inspection under this Act of any inspector of mines) or any registered premises, or any small firework factory, to show him all or any of the receptacles in which any explosive or ingredient of an explosive is kept, and to give him samples. Officer may require samples of any substance which he believes to be an explosive. Contravention to infer penalty not exceeding £20. (70.) Expenses of local authority provided for. *Power of Local Authority to provide Carriages and Magazines.*—(71.) Special carriages, ships, and boats may be provided for the conveyance of explosives by harbour authorities and canal companies. A reasonable sum may be charged for the use of such

vehicles under a bye-law under this Act. (72.) When a local authority other than justices in petty session satisfy the Secretary of State that the erection of a magazine either within or without their jurisdiction would conduce to the safety of the public within their jurisdiction, and would not be injurious to any harbour or urban sanitary district out of their jurisdiction, the Secretary of State may grant his license for such a magazine. Further provisions to carry out this enactment. *General Power of Search.*—(73.) Any Government inspector, or constable, or officer of a local authority, having reason to believe that any offence has been or is being committed with respect to an explosive in any place, may at any time enter the same, if needs be, by force. A constable or officer of the local authority requires a warrant from a justice, obtainable on reasonable ground assigned on oath. If it appear that the case is one of emergency, and that delay in obtaining a warrant might endanger life, then a written order from a Government inspector, or superintendent or other superior officer of police, will empower the constable or officer of the local authority to enter the premises as above, examine the same, search for explosives therein, and take samples. Obstruction to infer penalty not exceeding £50, with forfeiture of explosives and ingredients. Report to be sent to Secretary of State when search is made as above by written order without a justice's warrant. (74.) Power to seize and detain any explosive or ingredient of an explosive, or substance which is reasonably believed to be liable to forfeiture, until a court of summary jurisdiction has determined whether it is liable to be forfeited. Special regulations given as to procedure. Officer seizing as above is not liable in damages unless it be proved that he had no reasonable cause for his acting, or that he damaged the article seized by some wilful neglect or default. (75.) Power to enter, inspect, and examine at any time any wharf, carriage, ship, or boat, where there is reasonable cause to believe an explosive to be for the purpose of conveyance. Power to seize, detain, and remove. Power to stop, enter, and examine a carriage (not being on a railway) or boat, where offence

against this Act is reasonably suspected. Penalties for obstruction. (76.) Where samples are taken under the above powers, the market value must be tendered to the owner. Excess of real over tendered value is recoverable as a debt in the county court.

PART IV. SUPPLEMENTAL PROVISIONS, LEGAL PROCEEDINGS, EXEMPTIONS, AND DEFINITIONS. — *Supplemental Provisions.*—(77.) Trespasser on any factory, magazine, or store, or land adjoining thereto, is liable to penalty not exceeding £5 and instant removal. Any one, other than the occupier or his servants, found committing an act which tends to cause fire or explosion in or about a factory, magazine, or store, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50. Notices to be posted up to the above effect; but absence of such notice is not pleadable to exempt from penalty. (78.) Authorizes arrest without warrant of any one committing an act for which he is liable to a penalty under this Act, and which tends to cause explosion or fire. Offender to be conveyed as soon as conveniently may be before a court of summary jurisdiction. (79.) Where the offence is such, in the opinion of the court, as to endanger personal safety, or as likely to cause a dangerous accident, and when it is committed by wilful act or wilful negligence, such offence, if in the opinion of the court the pecuniary penalty provided by the statute will not meet the circumstances of the case, shall be punishable by imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a period not exceeding six months. (80.) If any person throw, cast, or fire any fireworks in or into any highway, street, thoroughfare, or public place, he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £5. (81.) Forgery or falsification of documents required for the purposes of this Act to infer imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two years. (82.) Defacing or pulling down notices affixed in pursuance of this Act to infer a penalty not exceeding £2. (83.) Legality of Orders in Council, and Orders of Secretary of State, made in pursuance of this Act, not to be questioned. Provision for their publication. (84.) Provides for publication of bye-laws, notices, etc., by advertisement in local news-

papers, etc. (85.) Orders, notices, etc., to be in writing. Transmission by post to be equivalent to service. Notices, etc., required by this Act to be sent to the Secretary of State, shall be deemed to have been so sent if sent to a Government inspector. (86.) Provisions of this Act with respect to the search for and seizure, detention and removal of an explosive by a Government inspector, held to be referred to by all existing legislative enactments relating to powers of searching for gunpowder. *Legal Proceedings.*—(87.) Occupier of a factory, etc., to be exempt from penalty or forfeiture on proof that the statutory offence has in fact been committed by some other person. Offender to be liable in a penalty not exceeding £20. Exemption of occupier on showing that all proper means taken, and all proper orders issued to enforce observance of the Act, and all practicable steps taken to obtain conviction of offender. Not necessary in such case to prosecute the occupier in the first instance. Party accused may be a witness, if he think fit. Enactments of this section extended to the case of warehouseman, carrier, wharfinger, shipmaster, etc. (88.) Where compliance with this Act is wilfully prevented by consignor, consignee, or some other person, conviction of such persons shall infer same penalties as against carrier or shipmaster, who shall thereby be protected from liability. (89.) Instead of forfeiting explosive, court may impose additional pecuniary penalty, not exceeding what appears to be its value. Provision for the forfeiture, after notice, of an explosive of which the owner is unknown. (90.) Settles the jurisdiction of courts adjoining tidal waters. (91.) Offences may be prosecuted either summarily under Summary Jurisdiction Acts, or by indictment. Penalty recoverable in court of summary jurisdiction not to exceed £100, exclusive of costs and forfeiture; and the term of imprisonment imposed by such court shall not exceed one month. A court of summary jurisdiction may by order prohibit a person from doing an act for which he has been twice convicted, and may imprison for six months for disobedience of such order. (92.) When statutory penalty exceeds £100, the accused may elect to be prosecuted on indictment. (93 and

94.) Do not apply to Scotland. below, sect. 114. (95.) Authorised distress or arrestment and sale of ship, boat, and tackle, in addition to other means of compelling payment of statutory penalties. (96.) Application of penalties and disposal of forfeitures. *Exemptions and Savings.*—(97.) Government factories, etc., and ships are exempted from the provisions of this Act, reserving provision as to trespassers. See sect. 77, above. (98.) Act not to apply to the keeping of any rockets for use in any apparatus for saving life, kept under the control of the Admiralty or the Board of Trade, or to explosives kept for the purpose of signalling, under the control of any general lighthouse authority, as defined by the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854. (99.) Exemption of floating magazines in the river Mersey. (100.) Shipmaster or carrier to be exempt from penalty for act done in proved cases of emergent necessity or inevitable accident. (101.) Rockets, gunpowder, etc., on board ship under provisions of the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854, are exempted from this Act; but in harbour those are subject to bye-laws which may be made under this Act. (102.) Reserves the effect of common law and existing statutes. (103.) Powers under this Act cumulative, with power to make provisional order to repeal local Acts. *Definitions.*—(104.) Order in Council may declare any substance appearing to have dangerously explosive properties to be an explosive within the meaning of this Act. (105.) The unmaking, making up, or repairing explosives shall be included in the expression "manufacture" of explosives within this Act. (106.) Order in Council may, from time to time, define composition, quality, and character of an explosive, and classify explosives. (107.) Defines chief officer of police and police district. (108.) *Definitions. Application of Act to Scotland.*—(109.) Defines various terms. "Court of summary jurisdiction" means the sheriff of the county or any one of his substitutes. (110.) Local authority means the magistrates and town council of a royal burgh, or any burgh returning or contributing to return a member to Parliament. In any harbour, the local authority shall be the harbour authority, to the exclusion of any

ether. In any other place, the local authority shall be the justices of the peace for the county. (111.) Expense of local authority under this Act provided for. (112.) Police commissioners of a burgh, other than as defined above, may, on application to the Secretary of State, be declared a local authority for the purposes of this Act. (113.) Local authority to have same powers for the taking and purchase of land as under section 90 of the Public Health Scotland Act of 1867. (114.) Court of Session may, on summary application at the instance of a party interested, compel harbour authority, company, or local authority, to make or enforce bye-laws, or grant license. Offences under this Act to be prosecuted at the instance of the Lord Advocate or fiscal, and the prosecutions may be before the Court of Justiciary, the sheriff and jury, or the sheriff summarily. Penalties under this Act to infer as an alternative imprisonment for a term not exceeding six months. (115.) Special provision for the river Clyde, in respect of doubts as to the limits of the several harbour authorities on that estuary. Board of Trade empowered to make bye-laws for the lower estuary of the Clyde. Secretary of State to define the authority for enforcing such bye-laws. (116-121.) Apply to Ireland. *Repeal of Acts.*—(122.) Repeals, under usual reservations, certain enactments in fourth schedule.

SCHEDULE I. Part First.—Regulations, seven in number, which are to form part of the terms of every continuing certificate of a factory for gunpowder. **Part Second.**—Regulations, six in number, which are to form part of every continuing certificate for a gunpowder store.

SCHEDULE II. Rules, fifteen in number, on the subject of arbitrations under this Act.

SCHEDULE III. Table of fees for licenses granted by the Secretary of State.

SCHEDULE IV. Table of repealed enactments.

SEAL FISHERY (GREENLAND).

CHAP. 18. *To provide for the establishment of a Close Time in the Seal Fishery in the Seas adjacent to the Eastern Coasts of Greenland.* June 14, 1875.

The area to which this Act applies is included between the parallels of 67° and 75° of north latitude, and between the meridians of 5° E. and 17° W. longitude, reckoned from the meridian of Greenwich. (1.) When foreign states make, with reference to their ships engaged in the seal fishery within said limits, provisions like those contained in this Act, then an Order in Council may be made to direct the application of this Act to the area above defined. Powers to rescind, limit, and modify such order. (2.) Makes the capture or killing of seals within said area, or part thereof, unlawful before such day in any year as may be fixed by the order. Penalty not exceeding £500 for each offence. (3.) Prosecution in Scotland to be by action as for debt in the Sheriff Court or Court of Session. Half the penalty shall be payable to the prosecutor. Offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was actually committed or in the place where the offender may for the time be found. (4.) When an offence under this Act is committed, connivance of master and owner shall make them liable to the like penalty. (5.) Penalty may be levied, in that case, by distress or arrestment, and sale of the ship and her tackle. (6.) Defines a seal, and empowers Order in Council to extend the definition to any animal of the seal kind. (7.) Short title: "The Seal Fishery Act, 1875."

POST-OFFICE.

CHAP. 22. *For the further regulation of the Duties on Postage, and for other purposes relating to the Post-Office.* June 14, 1875.

Preamble refers to powers given to the Treasury to fix rates of British, foreign, and colonial postage by warrant. It also refers to the Treaty of Berne of 9th October 1874, and the stipulations and regulations therein as to exchange with foreign countries of letters, post-cards, books, newspapers, and other printed papers, patterns of merchandise, and legal and commercial documents. The purpose of the present statute is to give the necessary powers for carrying into effect these treaty regulations and stipulations, and also to comprise in one Act the powers of the Treasury in relation

to the fixing of the rates of postage.

(1.) Power to Treasury within certain fixed limits to fix the rates of postage. For these rates, see p. 146.

(2.) Treasury empowered to carry into effect postal regulations with foreign countries. (3.) Provides for registration of, and receipts to be given for, postal packets. But such registration or receipt shall not render the Post-Office liable. (4.)

Authorizes Treasury to make regulations on the representation of the Postmaster-General. (5.) If any question arises whether any postal packet is a letter, post-card, newspaper, supplement, book-packet, circular, or other description of postal packet within the meaning of this Act, or any warrant made by authority thereof, the decision of the Postmaster-General shall be final, subject to appeal to the Treasury. (6.) Postage rates to be deemed duties on postage granted by the Post-Office Acts. Proper dies and implements to be provided by Commissioners of Inland Revenue. (7.) Rates of postage not to be increased for seamen and soldiers. (8.) Official mark of postage shall be received as evidence of the liability of postal packet to the sum so marked. (9.) Evidence of Treasury warrant. Such warrant may be revoked or varied. Publication of warrant. (10.) "Postal packet" means any letter, post-card, etc., and every packet or article which is not, for the time being, prohibited from being sent by post. (11.) Definitions. (12.) Channel Islands and Isle of Man to be deemed part of the United Kingdom for the purposes of this Act. (13.) Short title: "The Post-Office Act, 1875." (14.) Repeal of Acts so far as inconsistent herewith.

CUSTOMS AND INLAND REVENUE.

CHAP. 23. To grant certain Duties of Customs and Inland Revenue, to alter other Duties, and to amend the Laws relating to Customs and Inland Revenue. June 14, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Customs and Inland Revenue Act, 1875."

PART I. CUSTOMS.—(2.) Tea-duty 6d. per lb. from 1st August 1875 till 1st August 1876.

PART II. TAXES.—(3.) Income-tax to be 2d. for every 20s. under schedules (A), (C), (D), or (E). For every 20s. of the annual value of the

occupation of lands, tenements, hereditaments, and heritages chargeable under schedule (B) in Scotland, the duty is to be three farthings. (4 and 5.) Provisions of Income-Tax Acts to apply to duties hereby granted, and to be granted for succeeding year. (6.) Provides for assessment of income-tax under schedules (A) and (B), and of inhabited house duties.

PART III. EXCISE.—(7.) Beer licenses. See p. 97. (8.) License for sale of medicine liable to stamp duty of 5s. (9.) Wine-dealers' license to include sweets. (10.) Tinctures or medicinal spirits may be warehoused upon drawback. (11.) Repeals provision numbered 7 of sect. 19 of 32 and 33 Vict. cap. 14. Every one who lets for hire a carriage for any period less than one year, shall be deemed to be the person keeping such carriage for the purpose of said Act. Any person who shall hire a carriage for a year, or any period longer than a year, shall be deemed to be the person keeping such carriage. (12.) Applies to Ireland only.

PART IV. STAMPS.—(13.) The Stamp-Duties Management Act of 1870 made applicable to all fee stamps, and to all penalties and offences relating to stamp-duties. (14.) Repeals stamp-duties on any admission and appointment or grant by any writing to, or of any office or employment having salary, fees, or emoluments appertaining thereto, including commissions or deputations granted by the Commissioners of Inland Revenue or of Customs.

PUBLIC STORES.

CHAP. 25. To consolidate, with amendments, the Acts relating to the Protection of Public Stores. June 29, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Public Stores Act, 1875." (2.) Interpretation. (3.) Defines public stores as all stores under control of a Secretary of State, or the Admiralty or any public department or office. (4.) Certain marks described in schedule to be appropriated for public stores. Any person applying these marks unauthorizedly to be liable to imprisonment not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour. (5.) Obliteration of these marks with felonious intent to infer penal servitude for any term not exceeding

seven years, or imprisonment for any term not exceeding two years, with or without hard labour. (6.) Power to stop by constable deputed to that effect suspected boats, vehicles, or persons engaged in unlawfully conveying any of the public stores. (7.) Summary conviction of possessing, or conveying public stores reasonably suspected of being stolen or unlawfully obtained, to infer penalty not exceeding £5, or two months' imprisonment with or without hard labour. (8.) No one without written permission shall gather or search for stores, or shall creep, sweep or dredge in the sea or any tidal water within 100 yards from any vessel in Her Majesty's service, or from any mooring place appropriated to such vessel, or from any moorings, wharves, docks, factory yards, etc., belonging to the Crown, or within 1000 yards from any battery or fort used for artillery practice either by the Royal Artillery, or by militia or volunteer artillery, or within any artillery range duly marked out as such, whether covered with water or not. Contravention to infer penalty not exceeding £5, or imprisonment not exceeding two months with or without hard labour. (9.) Penalty not exceeding £5 on unlawful possession of stores, recoverable on summary conviction. (10.) Stores to be deemed in the possession or keeping of any one if he knowingly has them in the actual possession or keeping of any other person, or in any house, etc., whether occupied by himself or not. (11 and 12.) Do not apply to Scotland. (13.) Act not to apply to stores issued as regimental necessities or otherwise for any soldier, militiaman, or volunteer. Obligations imposed as to these by any other Act to continue in force. (14.) Prosecution provided for (in Scotland) before sheriff under Summary Procedure Act of 1864. (15.) Application of penalties. (16.) This Act not to prevent prosecution by indictment of any offence committed under it or otherwise, provided that no person be punished twice for the same offence. (17.) Refers to an English statute. (18.) Repeal of Acts, with usual reservation.

BANKRUPTCY—WAGES.

CHAP. 26. To amend the law of

Bankruptcy in Scotland. June 29, 1875.

(1.) Limits the application of the Act to Scotland. (2.) Repeals section 122 of the Bankruptcy Scotland Act of 1856. (3.) Wages of clerks, shopmen, and servants employed by the bankrupt shall be entitled to the same privilege as the wages of domestic servants, to an extent not exceeding four months' wages prior to the date of sequestration, or prior to the concurrence of diligence for distribution of the estate of a notour bankrupt. This privilege not to exceed £50. In the case of workmen's wages, two months to be the limit in point of time instead of four months.

RAILWAY COMPANIES ACTS.

CHAP. 31. To make perpetual Section 4 of the Railway Companies Act 1867, and Section 4 of the Railway Companies (Scotland) Act 1867. June 29, 1875.

The purpose of this Act is sufficiently indicated by the title.

SURVEY.

CHAP. 32. To continue for ten years the Survey (Great Britain) Acts. June 29, 1875.

The purpose of this Act is sufficiently indicated by its title.

MINES REGULATION AMENDMENT—ANNUAL RETURNS.

CHAP. 39. To amend the Provisions of the Metalliferous Mines Regulation Act 1872, with respect to the Annual Returns from Mines. July 19, 1875.

(1.) The owner or agent of every mine to which the above statute applies shall, on or before 1st February in every year, send to the inspector of the district a correct return, specifying with respect to such mine for the year ending 31st December preceding, the quantity in statute weight of the mineral dressed, and of the undressed mineral which has been sold, treated, or used during that year; also the number of persons ordinarily employed in or about such mine, distinguishing between below-ground and above-ground employment, and distinguishing the different classes and ages of the persons so employed

whose hours of labour are regulated by the recited Act. Exception as to mine where not more than twelve persons are employed underground. In such mines the barmaster or other officer employed to collect the royalty dues shall return the quantity of mineral produced; and where there is a barmaster or other officer as aforesaid, a return of the number of persons employed shall not be required. (2.) Act to begin on 2d August 1875. (3.) Short title and construction. (4.) Repeals section 10 of recited Act, with usual reservation.

WIDOWS AND CHILDREN OF INTESTATES.

CHAP. 41. For the relief of Widows and Children of Intestates in Scotland where the personal estate is of small value. July 19, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Intestate Widows and Children (Scotland) Act, 1875." (2.) Limits the application of the Act to Scotland only. (3.) Provides, with reference to schedules, a short form of completing title by confirmation, where the whole personal estate and effects of an intestate dying domiciled in Scotland shall not exceed in value the sum of £150. This procedure is open to his widow or any one or more of his children. In the case of a widow dying intestate, it is open to any one or more of her children. It consists of an inventory and relative form of oath, to be prepared by the commissary clerk on application, on which after completion there follows a decree by the commissary decerning and confirming the applicant as executor. (4.) The commissary clerk of the county may require such proof as he may think sufficient to establish the identity and relationship of the applicant. (5.) If the commissary clerk has reason to believe that the whole personal estate and effects in question exceed £150, he may refuse to proceed until he is satisfied as to the real value. (6.) Powers to commissary clerks to administer oaths, etc., for the purposes of this Act. Commissary clerk depute included. (7.) Procedure and fees to be regulated by act of sederunt. Total amount to be charged to applicants shall not exceed 5s. when the estate is below £20 in value. Above that sum the fees not to exceed 5s. and 1s.

for every £10 or fraction of £10 above £20. (8.) This Act does not affect inventory duty.

NATIONAL DEBT SINKING FUND.

CHAP. 45. To amend the Law with respect to the Reduction of the National Debt, and the Charge for the National Debt in the Consolidated Fund. August 2, 1875.

New Sinking Fund.—(1.) To pay the annual charge on account of the national debt, there shall be issued out of the consolidated fund £27,400,000 during the financial year ending 31st March 1876, £27,700,000 during the year 1877, and £28,000,000 annually thereafter. This is to be called the permanent annual charge for the national debt. (2.) Out of the permanent annual charge shall be paid the following charges:—1. All annuities, whether perpetual or terminable, charged on the consolidated fund; 2. Interest on exchequer bonds or bills; 3. Interest on advances by the Banks of England or Ireland, under section 2 of the Exchequer and Audit Act of 1866; 4. Interest on loans to meet ways and means; 5. Five shillings annually on each sum of £110 per cent. bank annuities, payable to the account of the National Debt Commissioners under section 69 of the National Debt Act of 1870; and, 6. Sums annually payable to the Banks of England and Ireland for the management of the national debt. Annuities and interest of exchequer bonds or bills are excepted, which are payable either under any prior Act relating to the Public Works Loan Commissioners, or any subsequent Act which does not direct the same to be paid out of the said permanent annual charge. (3.) Such portion of the permanent annual charge as may not be required for the above purposes, shall be called the New Sinking Fund. This fund shall be from time to time issued to the National Debt Commissioners, to be applied within six months in buying, redeeming, or paying off any one or more of the following descriptions of debt, viz., annuities perpetual or terminable charged on the consolidated fund, and exchequer bonds or bills. The new sinking fund shall be applied in paying off any advances to the Banks of England or Ireland,

under section 12 of the Exchequer and Audit Act of 1866, or in paying off any loan for ways and means.

Old Sinking Fund.—(4.) Within fifteen days after the expiration of every financial year, an account of public income and expenditure is to be prepared, showing surplus of income or excess of expenditure. Issues for payment of expenses, authorized by some other Act than the Annual Appropriation Act, so far as provided for by loans, are not to be deemed part of such expenditure. Copy to be laid before Parliament, and to be sent to the National Debt Commissioners. (5.) Surplus of income, if any, may be called the old sinking fund, and is to be applied to reduce debt in like manner as the new sinking fund. (6.) Repeals section 16 of the Exchequer and Audit Act, 1866.

Miscellaneous.—(7.) Accounts of old and new sinking funds to be kept. (8.) Publication in *Gazette* and supplemental provisions. (9.) Definitions. (10.) Short title: "The Sinking Fund Act, 1875."

CONSTABLES AND PEACE OFFICERS.

CHAP. 47. *To amend the Law in regard to Constables and Peace Officers in Scotland.* August 2, 1875.

(1.) After 1st October 1875, no constable appointed under the Scots Acts 1617, 1633, and 1661, shall exercise powers of constables and peace officers under the Poaching Prevention Act of 1862.

ARTIZANS' DWELLINGS.

CHAP. 49. *For facilitating the Improvement of the Dwellings of the Working Classes in Large Towns in Scotland.* August 2, 1875.

Preamble sets forth, that various portions of many cities and burghs in Scotland are so built, and the buildings so densely inhabited, as to be highly injurious to the moral and physical welfare of the inhabitants; that there is in such places a want of light, air, ventilation, and proper conveniences, whereby fevers and diseases are generated; that the houses, courts, and alleys where these evils are present often belong to several owners, whereby it is not in the power of any one owner to make such alterations as are neces-

sary for the public health; that the public health requires many of such places to be pulled down and reconstructed; and that in connexion with such reconstruction it is expedient that provision be made for the dwellings of the working class who may be displaced in consequence thereof. *Preliminary.*—(1.) Short title: "The Artizans and Labourers' Dwellings Improvement (Scotland) Act, 1875."

PART I. UNHEALTHY AREAS.—1. *Scheme by Local Authority.*—(2.) This Act to apply only to royal and parliamentary burghs in Scotland having a population of 25,000 and upwards according to the last published census. Same local authority as under Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867. (3.) Local authority on official representation, as in next section, that a certain area under their jurisdiction is in the condition described in the preamble, shall, if satisfied of the truth thereof and the sufficiency of their resources, pass a resolution that such area is an unhealthy area, and forthwith proceed to make a scheme for its improvement. No person interested is to vote as member of local authority, under a penalty not exceeding £20 on summary conviction. Such vote not to invalidate resolution. (4.) Official representation as above, is to be made by the local authority's medical officer. He can do so whenever he sees cause. If two justices or twelve ratepayers complain, it shall be his duty to inspect the area complained of, and make an official representation, setting forth whether in his opinion it is or is not an unhealthy area. (5.) Improvement scheme to be accompanied by maps, particulars, and estimates. It may exclude any part of the area, or include neighbouring lands. It may widen existing approaches. It must distinguish lands to be compulsorily taken, and provide for the accommodation of at least as many persons of the working class as may be displaced, in suitable dwellings within the same area or vicinity thereof, with proper sanitary arrangements. Scheme may be carried out by the owner or with the concurrence of the owner of any property therein, under the superintendence and control of the local authority, upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed on. 2. *Confirmation of Scheme.*—(6.) Upon completion of the scheme,

publication to be made, notices to be served on owners and occupiers, and petition to be presented by the local authority to the Secretary of State, praying that an order may be made confirming such scheme. If the Secretary of State, as confirming authority, thinks fit to proceed, then he shall direct a local inquiry. After report on such inquiry, the confirming authority may make a provisional order, with such conditions and modifications as he may think fit, provided no addition be made to the lands proposed in the scheme to be taken compulsorily. Notices of such order to be served by the local authority. Provisional order to have no validity till confirmed by Parliament. Provision for costs properly incurred by owner of lands compulsorily taken. Costs, charges, and expenses to be paid as the confirming authority may direct. The Lord Advocate, on behalf of the confirming authority, may obtain decree therefor from the Court of Session. (7.) Where bill for confirmation of provisional order is opposed, the parliamentary committee to whom, on prayer of the opponent, the bill is referred, may consider reasonableness of opposition and award costs accordingly. (8.) Secretary of State, as confirming authority, has power to inquire, on failure or refusal of local authority to pass an improvement scheme, on official representation made to them by their medical officer of health. 3. *Execution of Scheme by Local Authority.*—(9.) Duty imposed on local authority to carry scheme when confirmed into execution by purchase of lands and otherwise. Rules laid down for their guidance. (10.) If within five years after the removal of any buildings on the land set aside by any provisional order as sites for working men's dwellings the local authority fail to carry out such purpose, the Secretary of State, as confirming authority, may order the land to be sold by public auction or public tender, with power to fix reserve price, subject to the conditions of the scheme, and a special condition to erect dwellings for the working classes. (11.) Local authority, not less than thirteen weeks before taking any fifteen houses or more, shall make known their intention to take the same by placards, hand-bills, or other general notices, placed in public view, upon or within

a reasonable distance of such houses. Local authority not to take such houses without sheriff's certificate that this provision has been complied with. (12.) Secretary of State, as confirming authority, may, on cause shown, permit local authority to modify any part of an improvement scheme authorized by the confirming Act which it may appear inexpedient to carry into execution in accordance with the Act. Statement of modifications to be laid before Parliament. If larger public expenditure be thereby rendered necessary, or the taking of any property otherwise than by agreement, or if other property be injuriously affected, then the modification must be made by provisional order to be confirmed by Parliament.

PART II. PROVISIONS ANCILLARY TO IMPROVEMENT SCHEME.—*As to Local Authority.*—1. *Medical Officer.*—

(13.) In case of illness or unavoidable absence of the medical officer, the local authority may appoint a duly qualified practitioner, who shall, for six months or any less period named in the appointment, have and perform all the powers and duties of medical officer of health under this Act. (14.) Provides for appeal by twelve or more ratepayers against default or negative decision of medical officer to the Secretary of State, as confirming authority, by whom a medical officer shall be appointed to inspect the area complained of. If report be that area is unhealthy, then local authority shall proceed as it is above directed to do on official representation. Costs to be paid according to success or failure of appeal, either by appellants or by local authority under order of Secretary of State, which may be enforced as provided for in section 6th. 2. *Local Inquiry.*—(15.) Where a local inquiry is directed, an officer shall be sent by the Secretary of State, as confirming authority, to the area in question. Correctness of official representation and sufficiency of scheme to be inquired into, as also any local objections to the scheme. (16.) Public notice of such inquiry to be made by advertisement or otherwise. (17.) Power to such officer to administer an oath. 3. *Acquisition of Land.*—(18.) Lands Clauses Acts, as amended by the schedule for the purposes of this Act, to apply to the purchase and taking of lands otherwise than by

agreement. Confirming Act necessary for the exercise of compulsory powers. Directions given for the equitable assessment of compensation, without any additional allowance in respect of the compulsory purchase. In construing the Lands Clauses Acts, this Act to be deemed the special Act, and the local authority to be promoters of the undertaking. Powers for compulsory purchase to last only for three years after the passing of the confirming Act. (19.) Purchase by local authority of any lands required for the purposes of this Act shall extinguish all rights of way and other servitudes therein or relating thereto. Rights to compensation therein arising reserved and provided for. 4. *Expenses*.—(20.) Local authority to keep a separate account of all their expenditure and receipts under this Act. Receipts to be called "The Dwelling-house Improvement Fund." Moneys required to establish such fund, or to supply deficiency therein, shall be supplied out of the local rate or out of moneys to be borrowed in pursuance of this Act. Directions as to settling accounts, and application of balances of profit. Local rate herein referred to shall mean an assessment to be levied and recovered along with, but distinguished from, any one of the assessments mentioned in section 95 of the Public Health (Scotland) Act of 1867. Moneys or produce legally applicable to purposes similar to those of this Act shall be carried to the account of the "Dwelling-house Improvement Fund." Doubts arising on this point to be settled by decision of the Secretary of State as confirming authority. (21.) Power to local authority to borrow money for the purposes of this Act. Public Works Commissioners, with consent of the Treasury, and on recommendation of Secretary of State as confirming authority, may lend to local authority on security of the local rate. Existing statutory limitations on local rates not to apply to any rate required to be levied to defray any expenses under this Act. (22.) Audit of accounts provided for, similar to the audit of account of police assessment of the burgh.

PART III.—GENERAL PROVISIONS.—(23.) Authentication by seal or signature of a document proceeding from a local authority. *Notices*.—

(24.) To be served on clerk of local authority for their behoof. (25.) Forms of advertisements and notices. (26.) Secretary of State, as confirming authority, may, on reasonable cause shown, dispense with notices, due care being taken by him to prevent the interest of any person from being prejudiced. (27.) Notice by local authority may be signed by their clerk. *Penalties*.—(28.) Obstruction of officer of health, or of any officer of the local or confirming authority, to infer a penalty not exceeding £20, recoverable before the sheriff under the Summary Procedure Act of 1864, at the instance of the procurator-fiscal. Penalty is subject to mitigation, and conviction is appealable to the Court of Justiciary. *Saving Clause*.—(29.) Where there is a local Act having the same objects as this Act, the provisions of both may be used concurrently or not, at the discretion of the local authority. But no local authority shall plead such local statute as an exemption from any duty laid upon it by this Act. *Definitions*.—(30.) Certain terms defined.

There is appended to this statute a schedule of provisions, under 32 heads, with respect to the taking of lands otherwise than by agreement, and otherwise amending the Lands Clauses Consolidation Act of 1845. These provisions relate to the deposit of maps and plans, the appointment of an arbitrator, the proceedings in the arbitration, the payment of purchase-money, the entry on lands on making deposit, the appeal to trial by sheriff and jury when the interest at issue exceeds £500, the costs of arbitration, and certain miscellaneous details.

CANADA COPYRIGHT.

CHAP. 53. *To give effect to an Act of the Parliament of the Dominion of Canada respecting Copyright.* Aug. 2, 1875.

Preamble refers to an Order in Council, dated 7th July 1868, suspending all British statutory prohibitions against importing into Canada, or against selling or possessing there, foreign reprints of books having copyright in Great Britain. It then refers to a Canadian bill, entitled "An Act respecting Copyrights," which bill, referred to

as a measure to secure copyright in Canada, has been reserved by the Governor-General for the signification of Her Majesty's pleasure thereon. Lastly, the preamble refers to doubts having arisen whether said Canadian reserved bill be not repugnant to the said Order in Council, and to the expediency of removing these doubts and confirming said bill.

(1.) Short title: "The Canada Copyright Act, 1875." (2.) Defines the terms "book" and "copyright" as having the meanings assigned to them in the Copyright Act, 5 and 6 Vict. c. 45. (3.) The Queen in Council empowered to assent to the Canadian bill, which is set forth at length in the schedule. Such Order in Council to assign the time and manner in which said bill is to come into operation. (4.) If a book having British copyright obtains Canadian copyright under the provisions of said bill, no one other than the holder of the copyright shall import into this country any Canadian reprint thereof. For the purposes of such importation, section 17 of the 5 and 6 Vict. c. 45, to apply to all such books in the same manner as if they had been reprinted out of the British dominions. (5.) Order in Council of 7th July 1868 reserved, so far as relates to books not entitled to copyright for the time being, in pursuance of the said Canadian bill.

Schedule.—An Act respecting Copyrights.*—[i.] Registers of copyrights to be kept in the office of the Minister of Agriculture. [ii.] Regulations to be made and forms to be issued. [iii.] If any person prints or publishes, or causes to be printed or published, any manuscript whatever, the said manuscript having not yet been printed in Canada or elsewhere, without the consent of the author or legal proprietor first obtained, such person shall be liable to the author or proprietor for all damages occasioned by such publication, to be recovered in any court of competent jurisdiction. [iv.] Secures copyright in Canada for 28 years to any person domiciled in Canada, or in any part of the British possessions, or being citizen of a state having an inter-

national copyright treaty with Great Britain. The conditions are, 1. That the literary, scientific, or artistic (including photographs) work to be so protected, be printed and published, or reprinted or republished, in Canada, whether for the first time or not; provided that in no case shall the exclusive privilege in Canada continue to exist after it has expired anywhere else. 2. No immoral, licentious, treasonable, or seditious work to be so protected. [v.] If at the end of said period of 28 years the author be still alive, a second period of 14 years is secured to him. If he be dead before the 28 years are out, leaving a widow and children, they shall have the same privilege of an additional 14 years' term. Regulations must be complied with in respect of such renewed copyright. [vi.] Publication of renewal of copyright in the *Canada Gazette*. [vii.] Deposit of two copies of the work in the office of the Minister of Agriculture. [viii.] One of these copies to go to the library of the Parliament of Canada. [ix.] Notice of copyright having been secured, to be published according to a certain form in the work itself. [x.] Mode of obtaining interim copyright in Canada pending publication or republication there. Such interim copyright not to endure for more than one month from the date of the original publication elsewhere, within which period the work shall be printed or reprinted and published in Canada. Provides for copyright in newspaper or magazine articles. Allows importation into Canada of newspapers and magazines published in foreign countries, and containing portions of British copyright works published therein with consent of the authors. [xi.] Penalty for breach of copyright in books is forfeiture of every volume, besides such sum per volume, being not less than 10 cents, nor more than 1 dollar, as the Court may determine, one-half of said sum to go to the Crown, and the other half to the owner of the copyright. [xii.] Same provision, *mutatis mutandis*, for the protection of works of art. [xiii.]

* As this Canadian statute affects the interests of British authors in the Dominion, and seems intended to save them, if they comply with its provisions, from piracy by importation of Canadian reprints into this country, it has been thought right to make an abstract of its provisions.

Same provision, *mutatis mutandis*, to protect prints, engravings, etc. [xiv.] Nothing herein contained shall prejudice the right of any person to represent any scene or object notwithstanding that there may be copyright in some other representation of such scene or object. [xv.] Works of which the copyright has been granted and is subsisting in the United Kingdom, and copyright of which is not secured or subsisting in Canada under any Canadian or Provincial Act, shall, upon being printed and published, or reprinted and republished, in Canada, be entitled to copyright under this Act; but nothing in this Act shall be held to prohibit the importation from the United Kingdom of copies of such works legally printed there. In the case of the reprinting of any such copyright work subsequent to its publication in the United Kingdom, any person who may, previous to registration of copyright in Canada, have imported into Canada any foreign reprints, shall have the privilege of disposing of such reprints by sale or otherwise; the burden of proof, however, in such case will lie with such person to establish the extent and regularity of the transaction. [xvi.] As to sale of literary, scientific, or artistic work with or without a reservation of copyright. [xvii.] Penalty for publishing a false claim of copyright in the work. Penalty on any one entering a work in the register of interim copyright, and not publishing within the time prescribed. [xviii.] Copyright assignable. [xix.] Provides for conflicting claims of copyright. [xx.] Correction of clerical errors. [xxi.] Authentication of official extracts and copies. [xxii.] Provides for failure to supply demand when work out of print, by license from Minister of Agriculture to publish or import. [xxiii.] Author or party entitled to copyright may apply for registration by his agent. Penalties on fraudulent assumption of agency. [xxiv.] Penalty on false entries in the registry books of the Minister of Agriculture. [xxv.] Anonymous book may be entered for copyright in name of first publisher. [xxvi.] It shall not be requisite to deliver any printed copy of the second or of any subsequent edition of any book or books, unless the same shall contain very important alterations or

additions. [xxvii.] No act or prosecution for the recovery of any penalty under this Act shall be commenced more than two years after the cause of action arose. Fee for registering a copyright, or recording an assignment, 1 dollar; and interim copyright, 50 cents; and for certified copy of registration, 50 cents. Other fees are also provided for office copies of other documents. [xxviii.] Repeals former Act. [xxix.] Reserves copyright formerly acquired. [xxx.] Short title.

PUBLIC WORKS LOANS.

CHAP. 58. *To authorize Advances to the Public Works Loan Commissioners for enabling them to make Loans under divers Acts authorizing such Loans.* August 11, 1875.

The purpose of this Act is to enable the Treasury to make from time to time to the Public Loans Commissioners advances out of the Consolidated Fund, when the money required for loans appears unattainable under any Act in force at the passing of this Act. The limit in amount of these authorized advances is three millions sterling; the limit in time, three months after the end of the financial year expiring March 31, 1876. See below, chap. 89.

FRIENDLY SOCIETIES.

CHAP. 60. *To consolidate and amend the Law relating to Friendly and other Societies.* August 11, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Friendly Societies Act, 1875." (2.) This Act comes into operation on 1st January 1876. But sections 10, 37, and 38 are to be effectual immediately on the passing of the Act. (3.) This Act extends to Great Britain and Ireland, the Channel Islands, and the Isle of Man. (4.) Definitions. (5.) Repeal of Acts and parts of Acts in first schedule. (6.) Every society now subsisting whose rules have been registered, enrolled, or certified under any Act relating to friendly societies, or cattle insurance societies, shall be deemed to be a society registered under this Act. Its rules, so far as not contrary to any express provision hereof, shall continue in force till altered or rescinded. Reserves validity of rules of friendly societies established before 15th August 1850, although contingent

annual payments to members or their nominees should exceed the limit hereby fixed. (7.) Reserves effect of section 44 of 18 and 19 Vict. c. 63 (notwithstanding its repeal by this Act), with regard to any society whose rules have been deposited thereunder. This, however, is to last only till such society be registered under this Act, or until 31st December 1878, whichever shall first happen. (8.) The societies which are admitted to registration under this Act are here enumerated under five different heads. These are friendly societies, cattle insurance societies, benevolent societies, working men's clubs, and societies for any purpose which the Treasury may authorize as a purpose to which the powers and facilities of this Act ought to be extended. 1. Friendly societies are such as are established to provide, by voluntary subscriptions of members, with or without donations, for the relief or maintenance of members, their husbands, wives, children, fathers, mothers, brothers or sisters, nephews or nieces, or wards being orphans, during sickness or other infirmity, whether bodily or mental, in old age (which shall mean any age after fifty), or in widowhood, or for relief or maintenance of the orphan children of members during minority. Also societies for insuring money to be paid on the birth of a member's child, or on the death of a member, or for the funeral expenses of the husband, wife, or child of a member, or of the widow of a deceased member, or, as respects persons of the Jewish persuasion, for the payment of a sum of money during the period of confined mourning. Also societies for the relief or maintenance of members on travel in search of employment, or in distress, or in shipwreck, or suffering loss of or damage to boats and nets. Also societies for the endowment of members or nominees of members at any age. Also societies for insurance against fire (not exceeding £15) of tools or implements of the trade or calling of members. But this Act does not apply to insurance contracts for an annuity exceeding £50 a year, or for a gross sum exceeding £200. 2. Cattle insurance societies are those established to insure to any amount against loss by death of neat cattle, sheep, lambs, swine, and horses from disease or otherwise. 3.

Benevolent societies under this Act mean societies established for any benevolent or charitable purpose. 4. Working men's clubs are defined to be societies for purposes of social intercourse, mutual helpfulness, mental and moral improvement, and rational recreation. 5. Societies specially authorized by the Treasury as aforesaid. (9.) As to these last, the Treasury may limit the application of the Act to such provisions as may be specified in the authority for registering. (10.) There are to be in England a chief registrar of friendly societies, and one or more assistant registrars. These shall constitute the central office. In Scotland there is to be an assistant registrar; also in Ireland. These officers are to be appointed by, and hold office at the pleasure of, the Treasury. Chief registrar in England to be a barrister of not less than twelve years' standing. In Scotland the assistant registrar is to be an advocate, a writer to the signet, or solicitor, of not less than seven years' standing. Central office in England to exercise all functions and powers now by law vested in the registrar of friendly or building societies, or in the certifying barrister for savings banks, etc. Other functions are then laid on the central office with reference to the whole kingdom—such as the preparation of model forms, the circulation of information, and the construction of tables. Chief registrar to make a yearly report to Parliament. The assistant registrars, except as otherwise provided, shall be subordinate to the chief registrar. Within the countries for which they are appointed they shall exercise all the functions and powers given by this Act to the registrar, who may also, by written authority, delegate some of his functions to them. In Scotland the assistant registrar shall exercise all the functions and powers now vested in the registrars of friendly and building societies, and the powers vested in the Lord Advocate or his deputy appointed to certify the rules of friendly societies, so far as regards building societies and societies instituted for purposes of science, literature, or the fine arts, including power to levy fees. Copies of documents to be sent to the central office as the chief registrar may direct. The assistant registrar is to record docu-

ments sent him by central office for that purpose, circulate information and documents, and report his proceedings as directed by the chief registrar. Rules, or amendments of rules, registered by the central office are entitled to registration by the assistant registrar, who cannot refuse it. (11.) No society to be registered which does not consist of seven persons at least. Application for the purpose of registry to be sent to the registrar (*i.e.*, the assistant registrar for Scotland). It must be signed by seven members and the secretary. Written or printed copies of the rules must be sent, as also a list of the names of the secretary, trustee, or other officer authorized to sue and be sued on behalf of the society. Identity or deceptive similarity of name not to be allowed. No change of name without sanction of the registrar. Dividing societies may be registered if claims on the funds be provided for prior to division. Societies granting annuities shall not be entitled to registry unless they have tables certified by the Actuary of the National Debt Commissioners, or by an approved actuary of five years' standing. Society carrying on business in the three countries, England, Scotland, and Ireland, shall be registered in that country where their registered office is situate; but rules and amendments must be recorded in each country. Acknowledgment of registry to be issued. Appeal to the Court of Session in Scotland against refusal to register. Acknowledgment to be conclusive proof that society is duly registered. (12.) The chief registrar, or the assistant registrar in each of the three countries, may cancel the registry of a society by a writing under his hand, if he thinks fit, at the request of the society itself. He may do so with approval of the Treasury, if registry have been obtained by fraud or mistake, if society exists for illegal purpose, if it has received notice from a registrar of having violated any provision of this Act, or if it have ceased to exist. Where the registrar, with approval of Treasury, may cancel a registry, he may suspend the same for any time not exceeding three months. He may, with approval of the Treasury, renew such suspension from time to time. Two months' previous notice to be given of cancella-

tion or suspension, except when cancellation is at society's own request. Subsequent notice to be published in *Gazette* or newspaper. Appeal lies against cancellation or suspension in like manner as above provided in the case of refusal to register. Cancellation or suspension to take away privileges, but not liabilities. (13.) Rules of every society sent in for registry shall, according to the class in which the society is to be registered, contain provisions in respect of the several matters mentioned in the second schedule. Amendment of a rule requires registration to make it valid. Provisions as to appeal against refusal of registry shall apply to amendments of rules. Registrar to grant acknowledgment of registry of amended rule. Copy rules exigible by any one from the society on payment of a sum not exceeding 1s. Delivery of untrue rules shall, in Scotland, be a crime and offence. (14.) Registered society must have registered office to which all communications and notices are to be addressed. Its situation, or any change therein, must be communicated to the registrar. Trustee or trustees to be named by vote of the society, and appointment to be communicated to the registrar by trustee and secretary. Audit by public auditor, or by two or more persons appointed in conformity with the rules. On 1st June yearly, an annual return to be sent to the registrar, brought down to the previous 31st December inclusive. Quinquennial returns to be sent to the registrar of the sickness and mortality experienced by the society during the five years ended at 31st December preceding. The first of these returns to be sent in within six months following 31st December 1875. Provides for a valuation of assets and liabilities every five years. This is to be done once at least in the five years next after the commencement of the Act, and so again within six months after the expiry of every five years succeeding the date of the first valuation. It may be done either by a valuer of the society's own choosing, who must, in his report to the registrar, supply any required information as to the benefits assured, the contributions receivable, the funds and effects, debts and credits; or it may

be done by the society itself sending these materials to the registrar, who shall then cause the assets and liabilities to be valued and reported on by an actuary. Books to be open at the office to the inspection of any person interested. But no one shall inspect a loan account, unless he be an officer of the society, or specially authorized by resolution, or hold the written consent of the member whose loan account he proposes to inspect. Copy of last annual return to be supplied to every member or person interested in the funds of the society. Copy of last annual balance sheet, with auditor's report, to be hung up in a conspicuous place in the office. Official certificates of death are essential, and no money is to be paid without them. Offences defined as any contravention of or failure to comply with the provisions of this Act. Penal responsibility to attach to every officer charged with the duty in connexion with which the offence is committed. Where there is no officer, such responsibility shall attach to every member of the committee of management, unless he shows either that he was ignorant of the contravention or tried to prevent it. Contravention constitutes a new offence every week that it continues. Returns to be in form prescribed by chief registrar. Documents to be deposited with rules and recorded by registrar, with such observations thereon, if any, as the chief registrar shall direct. Quinquennial returns and valuations may be dispensed with by chief registrar, with consent of the Treasury, in certain cases; also where information as to sickness and mortality experienced by any society may, at the request of the society, be obtained by him through any person whom he appoints. Provisions as to quinquennial return and valuation shall not apply to benevolent societies, working men's clubs, or cattle insurance societies, nor to specially authorized societies, unless specially directed. (15.) Provisions of 39 Geo. III. c. 79, or, 57 Geo. III. c. 19 (Corresponding Societies Acts) not to apply to societies registered under this Act, provided they transact no business except as declared in the registered rules. But full information as to the nature, objects, proceedings and practices of any registered society shall be given

to any two justices who may request the same in writing. Failing compliance with such requisition, these statutory provisions shall apply. Stamp duty not chargeable on powers of attorney granted by trustee of registered society to transfer money in the public funds, nor to receipt for money contributed to or received from the society under its rules, nor to bonds given to or on account of the society, or by its treasurer or other officer, nor to any draft or order or form of policy, or appointment or revocation of appointment by an agent, or other document required by the Act or by the rules. A member of a society other than a benevolent society or working man's club, not being under the age of sixteen years, may, by writing under his hand, constitute a nominee to whom, on death of the nominator, a sum not exceeding £50 shall be payable. This may be revoked by the nominator in similar manner. Nomination or revocation must be sent to registered office. Nominee must not be servant or officer of the society. On death in intestacy and without nomination, the society may pay without confirmation (in Scotland) to the person who appears to a majority of the trustees to be entitled by law to receive the same. Payment by society to any one, who after death of a member seems entitled thereto, to be valid and effectual. Provides for absence, bankruptcy, lunacy, death or removal of a trustee holding stock in the Bank of England or Ireland. Where funds of a society are in the hands of one of its officers who dies, becomes bankrupt or insolvent, provision is made for the handing over of these funds to the society. One who is less than twenty-one years of age, but above sixteen, may be member of a society under this Act, unless the rules make provision to the contrary, with all rights of membership, except as otherwise provided by this Act. But he cannot be a member of the committee of management, nor manager, trustee, or treasurer. Societies and branches consisting wholly of members of any age between three years and sixteen years, may be allowed to register under this Act, subject to regulations. As to any society already registered, no rule admitting members under sixteen years shall be deemed a contravention

of this Act. Official certificates of births and deaths for the purpose of this Act shall not cost more than 1s. A society may lawfully subscribe to an infirmary, hospital, or other charitable institution to secure its benefits to members or their families. (16.) Societies may invest their funds in the Post-Office Savings Bank, or in any certified Savings Bank, in public funds, in the hands of the National Debt Commissioners, in purchase of land and erection of offices and buildings, and on any security, except personal security, as provided by the rules. A society may hold, purchase, or take on lease land in any county in which it has an office, and may sell or grant loan of land, and mortgage and build on the same. Receipt of trustees for price, etc., to be sufficient. No benevolent society to hold land exceeding one acre in extent at any one time. All property of a society to be vested in the trustees for the time being. Conveyance or assignment not necessary on death or removal of trustee, to give title to succeeding trustee. Public securities to be transferred to names of new trustees. Trustees to be stated as owners for the purpose of any legal proceedings. Fraud or misappropriation to the detriment of a society is punishable on summary conviction by a penalty not exceeding £20 and costs; power to prosecute by way of indictment being reserved. Trustees are not personally liable for any deficiency, but only for moneys actually received. (17.) Contains a code of eleven regulations as to the investment of societies' funds with the National Debt Commissioners. Among these may be noted here that the society shall be entitled to a receipt bearing interest at the rate of twopence *per centum per diem*, and that moneys so invested upon a false declaration shall be forfeited to the commissioners. (18.) As to loans to members, not more than half the amount insured on life may be advanced, on members' own written security, and two satisfactory sureties. Separate loan fund may be got up by the contributions of members, out of which loans without sureties may be made. Moneys contributed for other purposes cannot be so lent. No member to hold interest in loan fund exceeding £200. No loan to be made to any member out of this fund beyond the amount

fixed by the rules, nor beyond £50, including moneys owing by the borrower to the society for the time being. Where there is a loan fund, the amount authorized by the rules to be held by the society on deposit of members shall not exceed two-thirds of the obligations contracted to the society by borrowers from the loan fund. (19.) Rules may provide for surplus of contributions being accumulated at interest, and for the withdrawal of such accumulations from time to time. (20.) Officers of registered societies having receipt or charge of money, must find security, as specially provided, that they will render a true and just account. On failure to account, such officer is liable to summary prosecution. (21.) Trustees, or other officers authorized by the rules, may sue and be sued. Any person receiving contributions or issuing policies on behalf of the society within the jurisdiction may be sued in that behalf. Death of officer not to interrupt proceedings. Provision for service, and for intimation by registered letter to committee of management. (22.) Disputes to be settled as provided for by the rules. Award not removable into any court of law, and enforceable in Scotland by the sheriff court. Provides for reference of any dispute to the registrar. Where the rules direct a reference to justices, the dispute shall in Scotland be determined by the sheriff. Where the rules contain no direction as to disputes, or where there is no decision within forty days after a demand for a reference under the rules, the party aggrieved may apply to the sheriff court. A case may be stated by the court for the opinion, in Scotland, of the Court of Session. (23.) In certain proportions, varying according to the total number, a certain number of members may require the registrar in any one of the three countries to exercise certain powers. *Prima facie* evidence is needed; also the consent of the Treasury. These powers are to appoint inspectors to examine into the affairs of the society, or to call special meetings, with directions to discuss and determine certain matters. (24.) Special resolutions are to be passed after due notice by a majority of not less than three-fourths at a general meeting, and to be confirmed by a majority at a subsequent general

meeting, held at an interval from the other not less than fourteen days nor more than one month. Chairman's declaration that the resolution is carried shall be conclusive. Society may by special resolution, and with written leave of registrar, change its name. This change not to affect rights and obligations. Amalgamation of societies and transfer of obligations from one society to another may be carried by special resolution. A society may by special resolution determine to convert itself into a company under the Companies Acts, or to amalgamate with or transfer its engagements to such a company. Rights of creditors reserved. Special resolution to be registered at central office before it can take effect. Special resolution, if it contains the necessary particulars, duly registered at the central office, shall have effect as a memorandum of association. Such amalgamation, transfer or conversion into a company, shall void the registration, the liabilities of the society being all reserved preferably to claims against the company. Special provisions as to friendly societies. These are, that for amalgamation or transfer under this section the assent of five-sixths in value of the members be obtained thereto, and the written consent of every person receiving an annuity or other benefit from the funds, unless such claim be satisfied or provided for. Penalties and remedies to apply to the case of amalgamation and transfer of engagements. Upon application, to be advertised in the *Gazette*, the chief registrar may, with consent of Treasury, dispense with prescribed consents and conditions of transfer on amalgamation. This section of the statute shall not apply to branches. (25.) Dissolution of registered societies provided for. It may take place by the happening of an event as provided for by the rules. Societies other than friendly societies may dissolve by consent of three-fourths. Friendly societies require five-sixths; also the consent of every annuitant or benefit-holder whose claims are not duly provided for. A branch friendly society may dissolve with the consent of the central body. Registered societies may also be dissolved by the award of the chief registrar or assistant registrar. Contents of the instrument of dissolution are speci-

ally provided for, viz., liabilities and assets, number of members and their interests, claims of creditors, and provisions for their payment; as also appropriation or division of funds. Alterations in this instrument to be made with the like consents as above. Statutory declaration by a trustee, or by three members and secretary, to be sent with instrument of dissolution to the registrar. False declaration punishable as a crime and offence. Registration of instrument of dissolution provided for. Registrar shall cause notice of dissolution to be advertised. If within three months of this *Gazette* notice no one commences proceedings to set it aside, the dissolution shall take place as from the date of the advertisement. The value of a member of a friendly society shall be ascertained by giving one vote to every member, and an additional vote for every five years that he has been a member, no one having more than five votes. No instrument of dissolution of a friendly society shall provide for division of funds unless the claim of every benefit-holder be duly provided for. Any one aiding or abetting the dissolution of a friendly society otherwise than as in this Act provided shall, on summary conviction, be punished with imprisonment with hard labour for any term not exceeding three months. If a member of a dissolved friendly society, or benefit-holder therein, be dissatisfied with the provision made for satisfying his claim, he may apply (in Scotland) to the sheriff court for relief or other order. A certain proportion of members of a registered society, varying according to the total number, may apply to the chief registrar, setting forth insufficiency of funds, or of the rates of contribution, and requesting an investigation with a view to dissolution. Chief registrar may by himself, or by the assistant-registrar, or by an actuary or public auditor duly appointed, investigate the affairs of the society, after two months' previous notice at the registered office. If chief registrar be satisfied that the statements in the application are well founded, he may award dissolution, winding up of affairs, and appropriation of funds. He may suspend award to enable matters to be rectified, so as to supersede the necessity of dissolution.

Award fund and expenses to be paid out of the funds of the society, preferably to any appropriation thereof. Notice of award for dissolution to be within twenty-one days advertised in *Gazette*, and in some newspaper circulating within the county in which registered office is situated. If within three months no proceedings are commenced to set aside the dissolution consequent upon such award, the society shall be legally dissolved from the date of the advertisement. Provisions of this section not to apply to branches without consent of central body. (26.) Militiamen and volunteers not to lose benefits in a friendly society, registered or unregistered, or be fined for absence occasioned by military or naval duty. Disputes upon this point (in Scotland) to be decided by sheriff court. Special provision as to society certified before 23d July 1855. (27.) No member of a registered friendly society, nor any person claiming through a member, shall be entitled to receive more than £200 by way of gross sum, together with bonuses etc. on assurances not exceeding that amount. Except as provided by section 6, no annuity shall exceed £50 a year. Any society may require a statutory declaration from a member, or person claiming through a member, that the total amount claimable from one or more such societies does not exceed these sums. False declaration punishable as a crime and offence. (28.) Provides for payments on the death of children under ten years of age. Limit of £6 payable by one or more societies on death of child under five, and £10 on death of any child under ten years. Sums payable on the death of a child shall only be payable to the parent, or the parent's personal representative, upon official certificate of death, which certificate, on being applied for with that purpose, shall contain certain particulars to be entered therein by the registrar. Certificate of death not to be delivered in such circumstances by the registrar for payment of a sum exceeding £6 on the death of a child aged less than five years, or £10 on the death of a child aged less than ten years. Cause of death to be duly certified. All certificates of the same death obtained for such purpose to be numbered in consecutive order. If a

certificate of death, not bearing to be the first, be presented to a society, such society shall be bound to inquire if any or what sums of money have been paid on the same death by any other society. It is an offence under this Act to pay on death of a child under ten years of age otherwise than is provided by this Act, or if the certificate of death produced be other than what is thereby required, or be fraudulent or false, or if any attempt be made to defeat the Act with respect to payments upon the death of children. In this section, the word "Society" includes all industrial assurance companies assuring the payment of money on the death of children under the age of ten years. Such insurances not to be void under the statute 14 Geo. III. c. 48, prohibiting insurances on lives, except where the person insuring shall have an interest. Nothing in this section shall apply to insurance on the lives of children of any age where the person insuring has an interest in the life of the person insured, or to existing contracts. (29.) Applicable only to societies having branches. Details specially required in the registration of such societies. Society having a fund under the control of a central body to which every branch is bound to contribute may be registered as a single society. Provision is made as to societies having branches in more than one of the three countries. Notice of establishment of new branches, with details, to be sent under the hand of the registrar to the secretary whom it may concern. Until branch rules are registered in each country where such a branch is established, the society is not entitled to any privilege of this Act in respect of such branch. Same as to amendments of rules. Provision of Act as to appeals to apply. Where a society has no fund under control of a central body to which every branch is bound to contribute, every branch must be registered as a separate society. (30.) Enacts a code of regulations, thirteen in number, to be contained in the rules of all societies to which this section applies. These are friendly societies only, and industrial assurance companies receiving contributions by means of collectors at a greater distance than ten miles from the registered office of the society.

When the premiums are receivable at greater intervals than two months, this section does not apply. The regulations enacted hereby have regard to notices of forfeiture, transfers, exclusion of collector from committee of management, and from right to vote, meetings, balance sheets, etc. (31.) As to cattle insurance and certain other societies, the rules are to be binding as if each member had legally bound himself and his heirs by signature. Money payable by the members of such societies to be recoverable as debt in the county or (in Scotland) the sheriff court. (32.) Falsification of balance sheet or of any document or return to be punishable by penalty not exceeding £50. Other offences against this Act are punishable with penalties not less than £1, nor more than £5, recoverable at suit of registrar or person aggrieved. Penalties recoverable in court of summary jurisdiction. (33.) In Scotland, all offences and penalties under this Act may be prosecuted and recovered by the procurator-fiscal of the county, in the sheriff court, under the provisions of the Summary Procedure Act of 1864, with appeal to the High or Circuit Court of Justiciary, under 20 Geo. II. c. 43; or to the Court of Justiciary at Edinburgh, in terms of the Summary Prosecutions Appeals Act of the present session. See *infra*, c. 62. (34.) Applies to England only. (35.) Treasury empowered to appoint public auditors and valuers for the purposes of this Act. (36.) Scale of fees to be adjusted for matters transacted, or for inspection of documents. No fees payable on the registry of any friendly, benevolent, or cattle insurance society or working man's club. Fees received by registrar are payable into Exchequer. (37.) Treasury to pay salaries and expenses. (38.) Treasury to make regulations to carry out provisions of this Act. (39.) Documents bearing seal or stamp of the central office shall be receivable in evidence; likewise documents officially signed under this Act, without the necessity of proving signature. (40 and 41.) Apply to the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands. Schedule II. contains, under nine heads, the special matters to be provided for by the rules of societies to be registered under this Act, and, under five heads

more, the additional matters so to be provided for in the case of friendly and cattle insurance societies.

LAW OF ENTAIL AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 61. *To further amend the Law of Entail in Scotland.* August 11, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Entail Amendment (Scotland) Act, 1875." (2.) Act to come into operation immediately on its passing. (3.) Interpretation, including a detail of those works or operations which are to be held as improvements under this Act. (4.) Age of nearest heir giving consent for application under Entail Act of 1848 to be twenty-one years instead of twenty-five years. (5.) Amends section 8 of Entail Act of 1848. Consents to disentail may be given in while application is in dependence. Provision made when any heir, except the nearest, declines, refuses or is incapable of giving consent. In such case, the court may dispense with consent, the money value of the expectancy of such heir being ascertained and provided for by payment into bank, or by proper security over the estate. Consent of nearest heir cannot be so dispensed with. Repeals provision in said section of the Act of 1848, that the heir of entail in possession, being only heir of entail in existence at the time he exercises the powers thereby conferred upon him, shall be unmarried when he does so. Section 8 of the said Act remains untouched by this enactment. (6.) Provisions of last section to apply to petitions for power to sell, alienate, dispoise, charge with debt, lease, feu, or excamb. (7.) In the case of a tailzie dated prior to 1st August 1848, court may authorize heir of entail in possession to borrow money to defray cost of improvements, and grant security as after provided. Special provisions, under eight specific heads, to carry this out. Limitation where improvements have been executed more than twenty years before authority to charge the estate with the cost is applied for. (8.) With authority of the court, the heir of entail may charge the fee and rents of such estate other than the mansionhouse, offices, and policies thereof. The bond to be for an annual rent of £7, 2s. per £100, and to last twenty-five years.

If the improvements were executed before the date of the application, the heir to have option of executing a bond and disposition in security for two-thirds till repaid. Bond of annual rent, or bond and disposition in security, to operate as discharge of all claims on account of improvements. (9.) In the case of a tailzie dated prior to 1st August 1848, relief is provided to heir of entail, where estate has already been duly charged with the cost of improvements, by substitution of bond and disposition in security in room of previous deeds under former statutes for portion remaining unpaid; or otherwise the money may be obtained on loan to pay the creditor the unpaid balance, for which bond and disposition in security may be granted in favour of such creditor or other person. Rate of interest stipulated to be set forth. (10.) Provision to child under the Aberdeen Act, to take effect in favour of issue of such child predeceasing grantor. Provision may be granted to the issue of a predeceasing child, and may be apportioned. Amount not to exceed what is at present lawful under said Act, and any statute amending the same or under the entail. (11.) Improvement expenditure may be expressly conveyed or bequeathed in the case of an entail dated prior to 1st August 1848, by the heir in possession dying after the passing of this Act, without having charged the estate. This charging may be done by means of a petition at the instance of the legatee or assignee, setting forth the situation of matters, on which petition the heir in possession may be decerned and ordained to execute a bond and disposition accordingly, for the amount with which the deceased himself might have charged the estate. Sums to be a debt against the estate and the heirs of entail therein, and to bear interest only from and after the date of the decree. (12.) Contains special rules, under seven heads, to regulate procedure in applications under the Entail Acts. Court of Session empowered to make an act of sederunt varying and adding thereto. (13.) Where a tailzie is invalid, in respect its destination is in favour of the institute or heir in possession, and his heirs whomsoever, or his heirs general, such estate shall be deemed

to be a fee simple estate, without any declarator or judicial procedure. Money or other property invested in trust to buy land to be entailed, or land directed to be entailed, where the direction has not been carried into effect, shall be dealt with under this section in all respects as if entail had been made. (14.) Reserves power to heir of entail in possession to improve estates under "The Improvement of Land Act, 1864."

SUMMARY PROSECUTIONS APPEALS.

CHAP. 62. *To alter and amend the Law relating to Appeals in Summary Prosecutions before Inferior Judges in Scotland.* August 11, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Summary Prosecutions Appeals (Scotland) Act, 1875." (2.) Interpretation. "Inferior judge" means and includes any sheriff or sheriff-substitute, justice of the peace or magistrate. This last term means any burgh magistrate, and includes any police commissioner authorized by statute to act as a police judge. "Cause" includes every proceeding which may be brought under the Summary Procedure Act of 1864; and every other summary proceeding for the prosecution of an offence or recovery of a penalty competent to be taken before an inferior judge. (3.) On an inferior judge hearing and determining any cause, either party, if dissatisfied with the judge's determination as erroneous in point of law, may appeal, notwithstanding any existing enactment to the contrary. The appeal shall be by application in writing, within three days, to the judge, to state and sign a case, setting forth the facts and grounds of such determination, for the opinion thereon of a superior court of law. 1. Caution to abide the judgment of the superior court, and for costs, must be found; or otherwise, in the discretion of the inferior judge, consignment must be made to meet the penalty awarded, if any, besides costs. 2. Clerk's fees must be paid for preparing the case. Till these two things be done, the appellant is not to have his case; and they must be done within the three days. Within five days after caution or consignment and payment of fees as aforesaid, the clerk shall prepare the case, and

submit the same in draft to the parties or their agents. On failure to agree as to its terms, the inferior judge is to settle them. A skeleton form of a case is given in the schedule. Notice of appeal to be given by appellant within three days of his receiving the case; and the case is to be transmitted by post or otherwise to the clerk of the superior court, along with a certificate of intimation. Clerk immediately to lay the case before a judge of the superior court, who may grant liberation, if the appellant is in custody, on such conditions as are usual in cases of suspension and liberation, and may also grant sist of execution, with or without caution, or make such interim order as the justice of the case may require. Process and notes of evidence, if any, to be transmitted by clerk of inferior to clerk of superior court. No note of appeal and no written pleadings and question of law arising upon the facts of the case to be heard and determined. The superior court may affirm, reverse, amend, or remit. They may require the case to be amended. Orders of superior court to be final. Inferior judge signing a case to incur no liability for costs. (4.) Inferior judge may refuse application for a case as frivolous, with certificate of refusal. Such application shall not be refused when made on behalf of the Lord Advocate or the procurator-fiscal. (5.) Remedy against such refusal is by written note, within three days of refusal, to the superior court, for order to show cause why case should not be stated. Form of written note in schedule. Any judge of the superior court may determine the matter so raised in a summary way, and order a case or not. His determination to be final. No costs to be awarded against inferior judge. (6.) Note of objections to admissibility of evidence, to be taken with a view to appeal on a case under this Act. (7.) The superior court, as above, shall be either the High Court of Justiciary or one of the Divisions of the Court of Session, according as the cause is criminal or civil, under the provisions of the 28th section of the Summary Procedure Act of 1864. (8.) Superior court may make rules and orders to regulate the practice and proceedings and fees of court. (9.) Appeal, as provided by this Act,

implies abandonment of title to appeal in any other way which might be competent. (10.) When a person, having been sentenced to a term of imprisonment by an inferior judge, shall bring an appeal, suspension, or other process of review of the sentence, and obtains interim liberation, such person shall appear personally in court on the day of hearing, or be held to have abandoned his appeal. Power to superior court thereupon to grant warrant for imprisonment during the uncompleted period of the sentence. (11.) Where a sentence of imprisonment is appealable to the Justiciary under 20 Geo. II. c. 43, such appeal shall be held timeously made, if lodged any time during imprisonment or within ten days of liberation. This section does not apply unless imprisonment commenced within ten days of the date of the sentence.

Schedule D fixes a fee of £1 for drawing case not exceeding five sheets of 250 words each, and beyond that, £1, 10s. But the Court of Session may vary this by act of sederunt.

SALE OF FOOD AND DRUGS.

CHAP. 63. *To repeal the Adulteration of Food Acts, and to make better provision for the Sale of Food and Drugs in a pure state.* August 11, 1875.

(1.) Repeal of Acts. (2.) Interpretation. "Food" to include all that men eat or drink, other than drugs or water. "Drug" includes medicine for internal or external use. *Description of Offences.*—(3.) No one shall, by himself or another, colour, stain, or powder any article of food with any thing so as to render the article injurious to health, with intent to sell it in that state. Nor shall any one sell an article so treated. Penalty not exceeding £50 for either offence, if a first offence. After a first conviction, every offence shall be in law a crime or offence, inferring imprisonment for a period not exceeding six months, with hard labour. (4.) Same provision as to drugs, of which the quality or potency should by any such means be injuriously affected. (5.) Seller of food or drug prosecuted under the two preceding sections shall be entitled to plead with effect that he did not know the fact or

adulteration, and could not, with reasonable diligence, have obtained that knowledge. (6.) Penalty not exceeding £20 enacted against any one who sells, to the prejudice of the purchaser, any article of food or any drug which is not of the nature, substance, or quality demanded. No penalty where an ingredient not injurious to health has been added, because the same is required for the production or preparation thereof as an article of commerce, in a state fit for carriage or consumption, and not with fraudulent purposes of increasing bulk, weight, or measure, or of concealing its inferior quality. No penalty where the drug or food is a proprietary medicine, supplied in conformity with specification of the patent. No penalty where food or drug is compounded as in this Act provided for, nor when mixture with extraneous matter is unavoidable in the process of collection or preparation. (7.) Penalty not exceeding £20 against any one selling any compound article of food, or compounded drug, not composed of ingredients in accordance with the demand of the purchaser. (8.) Provides protection by notice in distinct and legible label delivered with the article setting forth that the same is mixed; provided the ingredients be not injurious to health, and are not fraudulently intended to increase its bulk, weight, or measure, or to conceal its inferior quality. (9.) No person shall, with intent that an article of food be sold in its altered state, abstract, without notice, from the same any part of it so as to affect injuriously its quality, substance, or nature. Penalty not exceeding £20; and the like penalty on any one selling the article so altered without notice of alteration. *Appointment and Duties of Analysts, and Proceedings to obtain Analysis.*—(10.) In Scotland, the Commissioners of Supply in counties, and the Commissioners of Police for burghs, shall appoint one or more competent persons as analysts of food and drugs within their respective jurisdictions. Remuneration to be agreed upon. The same bodies to have power of removal. Such appointments and removals to be subject to the sanction of the Secretary of State. (11.) Town-council may agree that analyst of neighbouring burgh or county shall act as analyst

for them during such time as they may think proper, paying him for his services. If such analyst agree, he shall during such time be analyst for the burgh for the purposes of this Act. (12.) Purchaser of an article of food or of a drug may obtain analysis on payment of 10s. 6d. to analyst of the town, county, or district. If there be no analyst, then analysis may be obtained from analyst of another place on payment of such sum as may be agreed upon. Certificate of analysis to be delivered on such payment. (13.) Medical officer of health, inspector of nuisances, of weights and measures or of markets, or a constable acting under direction of local authority, may procure samples of food or drugs and get them analyzed, and obtain certificate. (14.) The person purchasing any article with the intention of submitting the same to analysis, shall, after completion of the purchase, notify his intention to the seller. He shall offer to divide the article then and there into three parts, to be separately sealed and fastened up; and one of these parts is to be delivered to the seller or his agent. Purchaser to retain one, and the other to be submitted to the analyst. (15.) If the seller do not accept the offer to divide into three parts in his presence as above, the analyst receiving the same shall divide it into two parts, one of them to be sealed and fastened up and delivered to the purchaser, who shall retain the same for production in subsequent proceedings. (16.) Provides for transmission by post of article to analyst residing beyond two miles' distance from residence of person requiring analysis. Letter to be registered, and to be subject to regulations of Postmaster-General as to carrying or delivering such an article. (17.) Refusal to sell to officer or inspector, etc., as above, on tendered price, by person exposing article for sale, shall infer penalty not exceeding £10. (18.) Certificate of analysis to be in form given in the schedule. (19.) Provides for quarterly report by analyst to the authority appointing him. *Proceedings against Offenders.*—(20.) Person causing the analysis to be made may take proceedings for recovery of penalty in a summary manner, (in Scotland) before sheriff in sheriff court, or in police court in any place

where the sheriff officiates as a police magistrate. Penalty (in Scotland) recoverable at the instance of the procurator-fiscal of the jurisdiction, or of the person who caused the analysis to be made. Penalties are liable to mitigation. (21.) Production of the analyst's certificate shall be sufficient evidence of the facts therein stated, unless the defender shall require the analyst to be called as a witness. Defender may tender himself or his wife for examination as a witness. (22.) The court may in its discretion, upon the request of either party, cause any article of food or drug to be sent to the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, by whom analysis may be ordered to be made at Somerset House. Expense to be paid by prosecutor or defender as the court may direct. (23.) Provides for appeal to quarter sessions in England or Ireland. In Scotland appeal provided to Circuit Court or to the High Court of Justiciary under 20 Geo. II. c. 43. (24.) In any prosecution defender to prove that he is protected by any exception or provision in this Act. (25.) If defender prove that he has himself purchased the article in question as the same in nature, substance and quality as that demanded of him by the prosecutor, and with a written warranty to that effect, that he had no reason to believe at the time he sold it that the article was otherwise, and that he sold it in the same state as when he purchased it, he shall be discharged from the prosecution. But he shall be liable to pay the costs of prosecution if he gave no notice of this defence. (26.) Application of penalties. (27.) Any one guilty of forgery or uttering forged certificate or writing, purporting to contain a warranty, shall be guilty (in Scotland) of a crime or offence, and be punishable, on conviction, by imprisonment for a term not exceeding two years, with hard labour. Wilful misapplication of warranty to infer penalty not exceeding £20. False warranty in writing to infer the same penalty, whether the party sells as principal or as agent. Also giving a false label to infer the like penalty. (28.) Reserves power to proceed by indictment. Other remedies against offenders under this Act are not taken away. Contracts and bargains between individuals not inter-

fered with, nor the rights and remedies belonging thereto. If a person who has been convicted under this Act, brings an action for breach of contract on the sale to him of the food or drug in respect of which he has been convicted, he may recover from the defender, in addition to damages, the penalty and costs he has paid on conviction, on proving his good faith. The defender is to be entitled to show that the conviction was wrongful, and the costs of unreasonable amount. *Expenses of Executing this Act.*—(29.) Applies to England and Ireland. In Scotland, the expenses to be borne by the county general assessment, and in burghs by the police assessment. *Special Provision as to Tea.*—(30.) From and after 1st January 1876, all tea imported as merchandise at any port of Great Britain and Ireland shall be subject to examination by persons to be appointed by the Commissioners of Customs, with approval of the Treasury, for inspection and analysis. If found to be mixed with other substances, or exhausted tea, the same shall not be delivered, either for home use, ship stores, or exportation. If unfit for human food, the same shall be forfeited and destroyed, or otherwise disposed of as the said Commissioners may direct. (31.) Defines exhausted tea as having been deprived of its proper strength by steeping, infusion, or otherwise. (32.) Applies to England only. (33.) Application of the Act to Scotland. (34.) Application of the Act to Ireland. (35.) Act to begin on 1st October 1875. (36.) Short title: "The Sale of Food and Drugs Act, 1875."

MILITIA LAWS CONSOLIDATION.

CHAP. 69. To consolidate and amend certain Laws relating to the Militia of the United Kingdom. August 11, 1875.

It seems unnecessary to make an abstract of this statute in detail, being mainly a consolidation Act. But the title is given above as notice that such a measure has passed the Legislature.

PUBLIC HEALTH.

CHAP. 74. To amend the Public Health (Scotland) Act, 1867, and other Sanitary Acts, in respect of Loans for

Sanitary purposes. August 11, 1875.

The purpose of this statute is contained in the third section. (3.) Authorizes the Public Works Loan Commissioners, with consent of the Treasury, and on the recommendation of the Board of Supervision, to make any loan to any local authority in pursuance of any powers of borrowing conferred by the sanitary Acts. This may be done either for works already executed or for works to be executed. It may be done on the security of any fund or rate applicable to any of the purposes of these Acts. Loan to be repaid within a period not exceeding fifty years, at 3½ per cent., or such other rate as in the judgment of the Treasury may be necessary to save the Exchequer from loss.

CONTAGIOUS DISEASES (ANIMALS) ACT AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 75. To amend the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869.

This Act, which applies to Scotland only, is intended to supply an omission in section 106 of the Act of 1869. That section gives one half of the penalties recovered to the person who sues or proceeds for the same, the other half being left in that section unapplied. This latter half of penalties or forfeitures is in Scotland hereby made payable to the Queen's and Lord Treasurer's Remembrancer, when the court is the sheriff court; to the collector of county rates, in aid of the county general assessment, when the court is the justice of peace court; to the treasurer of the burgh, when the court is a burgh court; to the treasurer of the board of police, in aid of the police funds, when the court is a police court.

SHERIFF-SUBSTITUTES (SCOTLAND).

CHAP. 81. To authorize the payment out of the Consolidated Fund of the United Kingdom of the Salary of an additional Sheriff-Substitute in Scotland, and for other purposes. August 13, 1875.

The preamble mainly refers to the necessity of making farther provision for the efficient administration of justice in the county of Lanark

and in Glasgow. (1.) An additional sheriff-substitute for Lanarkshire is to be appointed after the passing of this Act. Salary not exceeding £1000, nor less than £700. (2.) Empowers the Secretary of State to direct, if he shall think fit, that the sheriff-substitute of one county shall perform the duties of sheriff-substitute in a conterminous county. Such direction to be equivalent in all respects to a commission from the sheriff of such conterminous county in favour of the sheriff-substitute so directed. (3.) Provides for the appointment by the Secretary of State, on application of the Magistrates and Town Council of Glasgow, of a police magistrate for said city and burgh. Secretary of State to fix the salary, payable out of the police funds, at a sum not less than £500 nor more than £1000 a year. The person to be so appointed shall possess the qualifications required for a sheriff-substitute in Scotland. Such judge of police is removeable from office by the Secretary of State for incompetency or misbehaviour.

CONSPIRACY AND PROTECTION OF PROPERTY.

CHAP. 80. For amending the Law relating to Conspiracy and to the Protection of Property, and for other purposes. August 13, 1875.

(1.) Short title: "The Conspiracy and Protection of Property Act, 1875." (2.) Act to begin on 1st September 1875. *Conspiracy and Protection of Property.*—(3.) Two or more persons cannot be indicted for conspiring to do that which if done by any one singly would not be punishable as a crime; the act in question being one in contemplation or furtherance of a trade dispute between employers and workmen. This not to exempt from punishment any conspiracy punishable by Act of Parliament; nor does it alter the law as to riot, unlawful assembly, breach of the peace, or sedition, or any offence against the State or the Sovereign. Defines crime under this section as an offence punishable, either on indictment or summarily, by imprisonment either absolutely or as an alternative for some other punishment. Conspiracy as above limited, when summarily punishable, shall

infer no more than three months' imprisonment, or such longer sentence as the statute relating thereto prescribes for punishment of the act when committed by one person. (4.) Workmen employed for the supply of any city, town, or place, with gas or water, who wilfully and maliciously break their contract of service, knowing, or having reasonable cause to believe, that the probable consequences will be to deprive the inhabitants of that city, town, or place, wholly, or to a great extent, of their gas or water supply, are made liable to conviction either summarily or upon indictment. Such conviction to infer a penalty not exceeding £20, or imprisonment not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour. Printed copy of this section to be posted up in waterworks and gasworks: £5 per day penalty for default in so doing. Penalty not exceeding 40s. for defacing such notice. (5.) Wilful and malicious breach of contract of service or of hiring, with the probable consequence of danger to human life, serious bodily injury, or exposure of valuable property to destruction or serious injury, infers conviction either summarily or on indictment. Conviction to infer a penalty not exceeding £20, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour. *Miscellaneous.*—(6.) A master legally liable to provide his servant or apprentice with food, clothing, medical aid, or lodging, incurs a penalty not exceeding £20, or imprisonment not exceeding six months, with or without hard labour, on summary conviction of wilful failure so to do, whereby health is, or is likely to be, seriously injured. (7.) Every one who, with a view to compel wrongfully some one else to do or abstain from doing certain things which he can lawfully do or abstain from doing, is guilty of certain specified acts, thereby incurs on summary conviction a penalty not exceeding £20, or imprisonment not exceeding three months, with or without hard labour. The acts in question are specified thus under five separate heads:—1. Using violence to, or intimidating such other person, or his wife or children, or injuring his property. 2. Persistently following such other person about from place to place. 3. Hiding any tools,

clothes, or other property owned or used by such other person, or depriving him of, or hindering him in the use thereof. 4. Watching or besetting the house or other place where such other person resides, or works, or carries on business, or happens to be, or the approach to such house or place. 5. Following such other person, with two or more other persons in a disorderly manner, in or through any street or road. But attending at or near a house or place, merely to obtain or communicate information, shall not be deemed a watching or besetting within the meaning of this section. (8.) Where in any act relating to employers and workmen, a pecuniary penalty is imposed without power to reduce it, such power is hereby given to reduce it to any sum not less than one fourth. *Legal Proceedings.*—(9.) Alleged offender under this Act, liable to £20 penalty or imprisonment, may elect to be tried on indictment instead of summary prosecution. (10.) Summary Jurisdiction Act made applicable. See below, as to Scotland, section 18. (11.) In prosecutions under sections 4, 5, and 6 of this Act, parties and their husbands and wives are examinable as witnesses. (12.) Appeal to quarter sessions in England and Ireland. *Definitions.*—(13 and 14.) Not applicable to Scotland. (15.) Applicable to England or Ireland only. *Saving Clause.*—(16.) Nothing in this Act shall apply to seamen or to apprentices to the sea service. (17.) Repeals the Criminal Law Amendment Act of 1871, and the Master and Servant Act of 1867; also certain sections of other statutes. *Application of Act to Scotland.* (18.) "Summary jurisdiction" means sheriff-substitute acting under Summary Jurisdiction Act of 1864. (19.) Penalties recoverable by Lord Advocate and procurator-fiscal. Proceedings may be on indictment either in Justiciary or in Sheriff Court. An imprisonment not exceeding two months may be pronounced as an alternative to a pecuniary penalty in default of payment within a time to be fixed in the conviction. Penalties payable to clerk of court, and by him accounted for to the Queen's and Lord Treasurer's Remembrancer. (20.) Appeal to Justiciary reserved as prescribed by 20 Geo. II. c. 43. (21.) Applies to Ireland.

UNSEAWORTHY SHIPS.

CHAP. 88. *To make provision for giving further powers to the Board of Trade for stopping unseaworthy Ships. August 13, 1875.*

(1.) Board of Trade may from time to time, by special order, appoint a sufficient number of fit and proper persons, from their own staff or otherwise, to be officers having authority to detain unseaworthy ships, and may from time to time revoke any such appointment. If any officer so appointed has reason to believe, upon inspection or otherwise, that any British ship is by reason of the defective condition of her hull, equipments, or machinery, or by reason of overloading or improper loading, unfit to proceed to sea, without serious danger to human life, he may order that the ship be detained for the purpose of being surveyed. He shall, when he orders a ship to be so detained, at once report to the Board of Trade. Any one impeding him in his inspection is liable to the penalties enacted by the Merchant Shipping Act of 1854 against obstruction of a Board of Trade inspector. (2.) On complaint to Board of Trade or to such officer, made by one fourth of crew, if the same be made within time sufficient for that purpose before the sailing of the ship, proper steps to be taken to ascertain whether the ship ought to be detained for survey. (3.) From and after 1st October 1875, no cargo of which more than one-third consists of any kind of grain, etc., shall be carried on board any British ship, except such grain, etc., be contained in bags, etc., or be secured from shifting by boards, bulkheads, or otherwise. Penalty on master for knowingly infringing this enactment to be a sum not exceeding £200. (4.) Repeals section 11 of the Merchant Shipping Act, 1871. Every person who sends to sea, or is a party to any attempt to do so, and every master who knowingly takes to sea, a ship in such unseaworthy state, that the life of any person would be likely to be thereby endangered, shall be guilty of a misdemeanour. Burden laid on the accused of proving that he did all he could to ensure seaworthiness, or the ship going to sea in such unseaworthy state was, in the circumstances, reasonable and justifiable. Accused may be a wit-

ness. Name of manager, or managing owner, to be registered at the custom-house of the port of registry of the ship. Penalty not exceeding £500 for every time the ship leaves a port in the United Kingdom, after 1st November 1875, without this enactment being complied with. Each owner liable to this penalty in proportion to his interest. Consent of Board of Trade necessary for prosecution. No misdemeanour under this section shall be punishable on summary conviction. (5.) Deck-line to be permanently and conspicuously marked on every British ship registered on or after 1st November 1875. Mark of each deck to be a line not less than twelve inches long and one inch broad on each side amidships, indicating the position of each deck which is above water. Coast traders, fishing boats, and pleasure yachts excepted. If a registered British ship is not within a British port of registry at any time before 1st November 1875, she shall be marked as above within one month of her return to a British port of registry after that date. (6.) Provision as to load-line. From and after 1st November 1875, every British ship, before being entered outwards from any British port for any voyage for which such entry is required, or as soon after as may be, shall have marked upon each of her sides amidships, in white or yellow on a dark ground, or in black on a light ground, a circular disc twelve inches in diameter, with a horizontal line eighteen inches in length drawn through its centre. The centre of this disc shall indicate the maximum load-line in salt water to which the owner intends to load the ship for that voyage. Written statement of the distance in feet and inches between the centre of this disc and the upper edge of the deck-lines above to be delivered to the principal officer of customs. On default, entry outwards may be refused by the customs. This statement to be entered in the agreement with the crew before it is signed by any member of the crew; and the superintendent of any mercantile marine office is not to proceed with the engagement of the crew till this entry be made. It is also to be made in the official log. Ship to be kept so marked till the next return to a port of discharge in the United King-

dom. (7.) Neglect of provision as to marks, or concealment or obliteration thereof, to infer a penalty not exceeding £100, against the owner or master doing or suffering to be done any infringement of this Act in this respect, except to escape capture by an enemy. If marks be inaccurate, or likely to mislead, the owner shall incur a penalty not exceeding £100. (8.) Claim for compensation against Board of Trade to be by action against principal secretary thereof. (9.) In every contract with a master, seaman, or apprentice, an obligation shall be implied notwithstanding any agreement to the contrary, that the shipowner shall make and keep the ship seaworthy. Reserves shipowner's exemption of liability to master, seaman, or apprentice, for fault of another seaman or apprentice, where such exemption legally exists. (10.) Short title: "Merchant Shipping Act, 1875." (11.) Act to endure till 1st October 1876.

PUBLIC WORKS LOANS.

CHAP. 89. *To consolidate, with Amendments, the Acts relating to Loans for Public Works.* August 13, 1875.

This statute, in so far as it is a consolidating statute, need not be given here in abstract, nor in so far as it regulates the duties of public officials. It will be sufficient, as matter of general information, to take from the first schedule the list of works for the purpose of which the Public Works Loans Commissioners may lend money. These are as follows: viz., baths and wash-houses provided by local authorities; burial grounds provided by burial boards, or (in Scotland) by burial boards or parochial boards; conservation or improvement of rivers or main drainage; docks; harbours and piers; improvement of towns; labourers' dwellings; lighthouses, floating lights, buoys and beacons; lunatic asylums; police stations; justices' rooms and offices, sheriff-court buildings; prisons; public libraries and museums; school-houses; waterworks; poor-houses; and, generally, other public works for behoof of which loans from the Public Loans Commissioners are authorized by statute. See above, Chap. 58.

EMPLOYERS AND WORKMEN.

CHAP. 90. *To enlarge the powers of County Courts in respect of dispute between Employers and Workmen and to give other Courts a limited civil jurisdiction in respect of such disputes.* August 13, 1875.

Preliminary.—(1.) Short title: "The Employers and Workmen Act, 1875." (2.) Act begins on 1st September 1875.

PART I. *Jurisdiction.*—*Jurisdiction of County Court.*—(3.) In any proceedings before a county court—in Scotland, a sheriff court—in relation to any dispute between an employer and a workman arising out of, or incidental to, their relation as such, the court shall have the following powers as additional to its existing jurisdiction:—1. To set off one claim against another, whether liquidated or unliquidated, or for wages, damages, or otherwise. 2. To rescind any contract apportioning wages or damages, as may be thought just. 3. To accept, in room of damages, where defender is willing, security for so much of the contract as remains unperformed, and order performance of the contract accordingly, provided the pursuer consents. *Court of Summary Jurisdiction.*—(4.) Where the claim is under £10, a court of summary jurisdiction—in Scotland, the sheriff small debt court—may exercise all the above powers in relation to disputes between employers and workmen. No order to be pronounced by such court for any sum exceeding £10, exclusive of costs, nor security to be required above that amount. (5.) Any dispute between master and apprentice, as defined by this Act, may be tried by this summary (in Scotland, sheriff small debt) court. (6.) Such court, in dealing with a dispute between master and apprentice, shall have the same powers as between employer and workman, with the following additional powers: viz., 1. To order apprentice to perform his duties under the indenture. 2. To order the whole or any part of the premium to be repaid, if the indenture be rescinded. 3. If an order be made directing an apprentice to perform his duties, the court (sheriff small debt court in Scotland) may, from time to time, if satisfied, after the expiration of not less than one month from the date of the order, that the apprentice has failed to

comply therewith, order him to be imprisoned for a period not exceeding fourteen days. (7.) In a proceeding before the summary court (sheriff small debt court in Scotland) in relation to a dispute between master and apprentice, the cautioner under the indenture may, if the court so direct, be summoned in like manner as if he were the defender, to attend the hearing. He may also be ordered to pay damages for breach of contract, and may give security for fulfilment by the apprentice of his obligations, in room or in mitigation of any punishment which the court is authorized to inflict.

PART II. Procedure.—(8.) Security may be given by oral or written acknowledgment under the direction of the court. Court may order payment of any sum which may become due in pursuance of such security. Court here means, in Scotland, the sheriff in his ordinary or his small debt court. Rules as to this matter of giving security may in Scotland be adjusted by act of sederunt of the Court of Session. (9.) Enacts rules to regulate summary procedure, which is not in any case to be deemed a criminal proceeding.

PART III. Definitions and Miscellaneous.—(10.) The expression "workman" in this Act does not include a domestic or menial servant. It means any person who, being a labourer, servant in husbandry, journeyman, artificer, handicraftsman, miner, or otherwise engaged in manual labour, whether under the age of twenty-one years or above that age, has entered into, or works under, a contract with an employer. It matters not whether the contract be made before or after the passing of this Act, express or implied, oral or in writing. It may be a contract of service, or a contract personally to execute any work or labour. (11.) In the case of a child, young person, or woman subject to the provisions of the Factory Acts, any forfeiture on the ground of absence or leaving work, shall not be deducted from or set off against a claim of wages or other sum due for work done before such absence or leaving work, except to the amount of the damage sustained by the employer by reason of such absence or leaving work. (12.) *Apprentices.*—This Act shall apply only to an apprentice to the

business of a workman as defined by this Act, when either there is no premium paid, or the premium does not exceed £25. It shall also apply to any apprentice bound under the Acts relating to the relief of the poor. (13.) Local or special jurisdictions as to apprentices reserved. This Act does not apply to seamen or apprentices to the sea service.

PART IV. Application of this Act to Scotland.—(14.) Conversion of English into Scotch law terms. All jurisdictions, powers, and authorities necessary for the purposes of this Act are conferred on sheriffs in their ordinary or small debt courts, with full powers to do anything competent under this Act to be done by the English county courts, or courts of summary jurisdiction.

PART V. Application of Act to Ireland.—(15.) Application made accordingly.

TRADE MARKS.

CHAP. 91. To Establish a Register of Trade Marks. August 13, 1875.

(1.) Register of trade marks and their proprietors to be established under the superintendence of the Commissioners of Patents. After 1st July 1876, no proceeding shall be taken to prevent infringement, unless the trade mark be registered under the statute. (2.) Trade mark to be registered as belonging to particular goods or classes of goods. Once registered, it shall be assignable only in connexion with goodwill of the business concerned in those goods, and shall be determinable with such goodwill. Registration of a trade mark shall be equivalent to public use thereof. (3.) Registration of person as first proprietor shall be *prima facie* evidence of his right to its exclusive use, and after five years it shall be conclusive evidence to that effect. (4.) Every proprietor registered in respect to a trade mark subsequently to the first registered proprietor, shall, as respects his title, stand as if it were a continuation of the first. (5.) If name of party not entitled be entered in the register as proprietor of a trade mark, or if registration be refused to a party entitled, or if a mark be registered which is not authorized to be so registered, any person aggrieved may apply for an order of court that the register be

rectified. Court may or may not make order to rectify and award damages. In case of several claimants for registration as proprietors of a trade mark, registrar may refuse till claims are adjudicated upon by the court. Registrar may himself submit, or require parties to submit, their claims to the court. Court may decide any question as to whether a mark is or is not such a trade mark as is authorized to be registered under this Act, also as to right thereto of any party to the proceeding. Court may direct an issue to be tried. Order of court rectifying the register shall direct that due notice be given to the registrar. (6.) Without special leave of the court, a registrar shall not, in respect of the same goods or classes of goods, register a trade mark identical with one already registered, or so nearly resembling it as to be calculated to deceive. Registration as part of a trade mark not allowed, as to words, the exclusive use of which would not be protected by a court of equity, by reason of their being calculated to deceive or otherwise. Scandalous designs not to be registered. (7.) Register office to be established not later than 1st January 1876, with such officers and salaries as the Lord Chancellor may, with consent of Treasury, direct. General rules to be made by the Lord Chancellor for the purposes of this Act, which shall be of the same validity as if they had been enacted by Parliament, but liable to be suspended by a resolution of either house of Parliament. (8.) Registrar's certificate to be evidence. (9.) Special provisions as to the Company of Cutlers in Hallamshire in the county of York, and the Sheffield corporate marks. (10.) A trade mark consists, for the purposes of this Act, of one or more of the following essential particulars: viz., a name of an individual or firm printed, impressed,

or woven in some particular or distinctive manner; a written signature or copy of a written signature of an individual or firm; a distinctive device, mark, heading, label, or ticket. To any one or more of the said particulars there may be added any letters, words, or figures, or combination of letters, words, or figures. Any special and distinctive word or words, or combination of figures or letters, used as a trade mark before the passing of this Act, may be registered as such under this Act. "Court" in this Act means any of Her Majesty's superior courts of law or equity at Westminster, or any court to which the jurisdiction of such courts may be transferred, or any one or more of such courts which may be declared to be the court for the purposes of this Act, by the general rules to be made by the Lord Chancellor (*supra*, section 7). Provisions of this Act conferring a special jurisdiction on the court, as above defined, shall not, excepting so far as such jurisdiction extends, affect the jurisdiction of any court in Scotland or Ireland, in causes, actions, suits, or proceedings relating to trade marks. If the register requires to be rectified in consequence of any proceedings in such court in Scotland or Ireland, due notice of such requirements shall be given to the registrar, and he shall rectify the register accordingly. (11.) Short title: "The Trade Marks Registration Act, 1875."

COPYRIGHT OF DESIGNS.

CHAP. 93. *To amend the Copyright of Designs Acts.* August 13, 1875.

The purpose of this Act, which it is unnecessary to abstract in detail, is to transfer to the Commissioners of Patents for Inventions all the powers and duties hitherto vested in the Board of Trade, under the Copyright of Designs Acts.

ABSTRACTS OF LEADING CASES

IN THE SUPREME COURTS,

*From the Beginning of the Winter Session 1874-75, till the End of Summer Session 1875.**

REPARATION—CULPA—LOADED GUN.

King v. Frew & Pollock, Oct. 27, 1874.

One who puts away his gun without ascertaining whether it be loaded or not, otherwise than by noticing that there is no cap on the nipple, incurs no liability for an accident happening through the gun being thereafter unwarrantably taken from its receptacle by A, exploding in A's hands, and injuring B.

In the Sheriff Court of Lanarkshire, the owner of the gun had, in the above circumstances, been held liable along with A. But the Court, while not interfering with the general principle on which the Court below had proceeded, held that it did not apply here, there being no sufficient *culpa* to infer liability against the owner.

TUTORS AND CURATORS.

Walker & Others, Nov. 23, 1874.

A father may declare in his settlement that A, B, and C, his trustees named therein, shall be tutors and curators to his children; but the power of assuming new trustees does not carry with it the power of com-

municating the tutorial and curatorial office to the assumed trustees. The Court held, that the father alone can nominate to that office, and cannot delegate his power of nomination.

DEBTS RECOVERY ACT OF 1867— MERCHANTS' ACCOUNTS.

Sandys v. Lowden, November 26, 1874.

[High Court of Justiciary.]

An account for goods supplied by an English manufacturer to a Scotch wholesale dealer, is recoverable by means of the summary procedure provided in the Debts Recovery Act of 1867.

The words of the statute defining the class of cases to which its procedure is limited, are an exact transcript of the limiting words in the Triennial Prescription Act of 1579, c. 83; which, by various decisions, has been held not pleadable against a claim arising out of a proper mercantile dealing as distinguished from a mere shopkeeper's account.

But the Court, reversing the decision of the Sheriff of Mid-Lothian and Haddington, held that in a modern statute like that of 1867, "merchants' accounts" could not be

read with the restricted meaning which had been attached to "merchant's comptes" in the old Act of 1579.

LONG PRESCRIPTION—INTERRUPTION
BY PAYMENT OF INTEREST.

Kermack v. Kermack, Nov. 27, 1874.

Payments of interest interrupt the long prescription established by the Statutes 1469, c. 28, and 1474, c. 54; but such payments can only be instructed by the creditor "taking document," which, in this connexion, means giving receipts to the debtor in exchange for such payments.

The Lord President observed: "There is no example of a proof by witnesses of partial payment or payment of interest, to the effect of interrupting prescription."

BILL—CONSIDERATION.

Law v. Humphrey, Nov. 21, 1874.

The grantee of a bill does not require to prove consideration in a question with the granter's executor; the law of Scotland being different from the law of England in that respect.

FOREIGN SEQUESTRATION.

Goetze & Sohn v. Aders, Preyer, & Co., Nov. 27, 1874.

Where a foreign firm is made judicially bankrupt and sequestered in the forum of its domicile, and a trustee is appointed there having, by the law of that country, an universal title to the moveable estate wherever situated, the Scotch courts will not, upon jurisdiction created by arrestment of a debt due to the firm in this country, issue a Scotch process of sequestration implying the appointment of a Scotch trustee.

The Lord Ordinary had refused the application in respect that arrestment *jurisdictionis fundandæ causæ* did not give jurisdiction under the Bankruptcy Act to issue sequestration of a foreigner. The Court adhered, on the broader ground that, according to international law, *mobilia non habent situm*, and that the fund in this country had, by the law of the foreign domicile, vested in the foreign trustee.

SLANDER—TRANSMISSIBLE ACTION—
PRIVILEGE—TITLE TO SUE.

Auld v. Shairp, Dec. 16, 1874, and July 14, 1875.

The widow and executrix of a can-

didate for a professorship has a title to sue for alleged slander to the effect that the deceased was unfit for the appointment on account of deficient energy, scholarship, and skill in teaching; and the Roman maxim, *actio personalis moritur cum personâ*, is not pleadable in bar.

The principal of an university, writing privately to the patron of a chair (which, on the occurrence of an expected vacancy, had been promised to A) in the following terms—"It is a well-known fact that A, though an amiable and respectable man, has not proved himself an energetic or efficient teacher, but has notoriously failed in his present post as classical master in our burgh school"—is protected by privilege from any liability in damages for slander, no malice being proved. Lord Neaves doubted whether the communication was not so clearly in itself lawful as not to need the protection of privilege.

A professor who intimates his intention to resign, and then retains possession so as to exclude one who had obtained a promise of the chair from the patron, gives the promisee (and consequently the promisee's widow and executrix) no title to sue an action of damages.

HEIR AND EXECUTOR—MINERAL
LEASE—FIXED MACHINERY.

Brand's Trustees v. Brand, Dec. 19, 1874.

Fixed machinery erected by a mineral tenant who dies during currency of the lease, belongs to his executor, and not to his heir.

SCHOOL BOARD—RIGHT TO VISIT
SCHOOL—EDUCATION ACT OF 1872
—SHERIFF COURT.

School Board of Kelso v. Hunter, Dec. 18, 1874.

A school board's right to visit a school under their management during school hours, without previous notice to the schoolmaster, in order to ascertain its educational efficiency, is too doubtful to be tried by way of interdict in the sheriff court.

The school here in question was, by the Education Act of 1872, placed under the management of the School Board of Kelso. Hunter, the schoolmaster, having refused admission to certain members of the board who had been delegated to test the educational efficiency of the school

by visiting it during school hours, without his permission, and without notice, the board obtained interdict in the sheriff court to prevent such refusal or obstruction on his part in future.

The Court recalled the interdict, and found the school board liable in the whole expenses of the litigation. They held that the sheriff court was incompetent to try this question by way of interdict, in respect no right, nor duty of inspection in this manner and for this purpose, had been expressly conferred or imposed upon school boards by the Education Act of 1872; although, by section 36, they are expressly bound to keep their schools efficient. The judgment also proceeded on section 60 of the Act, which provides: "If the school board of any parish or burgh shall consider that any teacher is incompetent, unfit, or inefficient, they may require a special report regarding the school and the teacher from Her Majesty's inspector charged with the duty of inspecting such school."

POSTHUMOUS CHILD—TRUST.

Spalding v. Spalding's Trustees,
Dec. 18, 1874.

A posthumous child is entitled to aliment from trustees to whom, after providing for his own liferent, the father had conveyed his whole estate for behoof only of three existing children *nominatim*.

RISK—BUILDING CONTRACT.

M'Intyre v. Clow, January 8, 1875.

When a house is in course of construction, and its gable falls in a gale through no fault of the builder, the gable perishes to the ground owner on whose employment it has been built, even although the owner has not taken it expressly off the builder's hands.

Lord Deas dissented from this decision, holding, on the facts, that the builder had not shown his work to be blameless, and, on the law, that even without fault on the builder's part, the risk was with him.

SALE—SHIP'S CHRONOMETER.

Armstrong v. M'Gregor, Jan. 19, 1875.

Sale of a ship "with all belonging to her on board and on shore," in-

cludes the ship's chronometer at that time in the maker's hands for the purpose of rating.

The opposite view, which had been affirmed by the Sheriff of Lanarkshire, was founded on an alleged usage of trade. The Lord President (Inglis) remarked—"We are told that the usage of trade does not include the chronometer in such a sale as this. I think it would be a very curious usage which selected the chronometer for such exclusion; but I am quite satisfied that no such usage has been proved; indeed, I never saw a more inadequate attempt to prove usage."

GENERAL LIEN—CARRIER—RAILWAY TRAFFIC ACT OF 1854—RAILWAY CLAUSES ACT OF 1845.

Peebles v. Caledonian Railway Company, January 20, 1875.

In a question with a consignee for value, a railway company cannot refuse to deliver goods on a plea of general lien for unpaid carriage tolls due to them on previous parcels by the consignor.

The railway company relied on an express stipulation with the consignor. They also relied on section 90 of the Railways Clauses Act of 1845, enabling a railway company to detain and sell carriages or goods belonging to any one who shall, on demand, fail to pay tolls which may be due. But the Court held, under the Railway Traffic Act of 1854, that the stipulation, in a question with an onerous consignee, was not just or reasonable; and as to the Act of 1845, they held that it did not apply.

DISMISSED SCHOOLMASTER'S RIGHT TO RETIRING ALLOWANCE—EDUCATION ACT OF 1872.

Robb v. School Board of Logiealmond,
Feb. 5, 1875.

Morrison v. School Board of Glenshiel,
May 28, 1875.

A parish schoolmaster appointed before the Education Act of 1872, and dismissed by the school board in the exercise of their powers under that Act, does not require to allege old age or infirmity as the grounds of his removal in order to entitle him to a retiring allowance; such allowance being due on removal without fault. But a written dismissal for fault sufficiently set forth therein, is not

examinable on its merits; the school board being final judges of fault subject to no other checks than the previous report by a Government inspector, and the subsequent sanction of the Education Board.

CARRIERS ACT—LIABILITY OF RAILWAY COMPANY FOR EXCEPTED GOODS STOLEN IN TRANSIT—ONUS PROBANDI.

Campbell v. North British Railway Company, Feb. 18, 1875.

In an action against a railway company for the value of silk dresses worth more than £10, and stolen in transit, the pursuer requires to prove something more than the bare fact that the servants of the company had better opportunities than any one else to commit the theft.

Silk above £10 in value is one of the articles enumerated in section 1 of the Carriers Act (1 Will. IV. c. 68) for the loss of which a carrier by land is not liable unless the value be declared enabling the carrier to assess a higher rate of freight. There was, in the present case, no declaration. But section 8 expressly withdraws this protection from the carrier when the loss is by the felonious act of his servants.

SCHOOL BOARD'S POWERS OVER STANDARD OF TEACHING AND SCHOOL FEES—EDUCATION ACT OF 1872.

Hunter v. School Board of Kelso, March 5, 1875.

A school board who lower the standard of teaching in a school below its former level, reducing at the same time the scale of fees, do no legal wrong, and incur no liability to the schoolmaster, appointed though he be prior to the Act of 1872, beyond making good to him any consequent decrease of emoluments as provided for by section 55 thereof.

Lord Young expressed the opinion, "that with regard to everything implied in the notion of school management (including the scale of fees), the school board are supreme and responsible only to their constituents, like other representative and popularly elected bodies."

SHIPBUILDER'S LIEN FOR REPAIRS.
[House of Lords.]

Shearer v. Cooper, Feb. 26, 1875.

Where a shipbuilder, after exe-

cuting repairs on a ship placed on his own private slip for that purpose, launches her into the public dock to make room for another, and completes his work on her there, he does not thereby part with possession so as to lose his lien for the cost of repairs; the launch having been made by him for his own convenience.

HUSBAND AND WIFE—INTERIM ALIMENT—SHERIFF'S JURISDICTION.

McDonald v. McDonald, May 25, 1875.

Where married persons live in family together, and the wife complaining of her husband's cruelty, and suing him for interim aliment, leaves his house while the action is in dependence, the sheriff has no jurisdiction—in respect of the husband's proved cruelty, together with the separation so made in fact by the wife *pendente processu*—to grant her a decree of interim aliment. If there be a case for separation and aliment, the remedy must be sought in the Court of Session.

BANKRUPTCY — ADVANCE AGAINST GOODS TO BE AFTERWARDS DELIVERED.

Gourlay v. Hodge, June 2, 1875.

One who advances £500 to another on his obligation to deliver grain to that value within one month—the grain undertaken to be delivered not being made specific in the obligation—and, after an interval of a week or two, takes delivery of certain parcels of grain accordingly, is liable, on bankruptcy of his debtor within sixty days of the advance, to have these deliveries set aside as a preference in satisfaction of a prior debt contravening the Act 1696, c. 5.

This was a decision reversing the interlocutor of the Lord Ordinary Young. It will be noticed that the advance and the deliveries that followed upon it, though separated by an interval from one another, were both within the period of constructive bankruptcy.

Two particulars, in the opinion of the Lord President, made this transaction fall under the Act of 1696 as read by recent judgments. These were—(1.) That the obligation was not one to deliver any specific parcel; and (2.) That there was no stipulated right to demand from the obligant immediate performance of his obligation.

SCHOOL FEES—COLLECTION BY SCHOOL-MASTER—EDUCATION ACT OF 1872.

*Buchanan v. School Board of Tullis-
allan*, June 11, 1875.

A schoolmaster in office at the passing of the Education Act of 1872, is bound, on requisition by the school board, himself to collect the school fees, notwithstanding the provision in section 53, which provides that the school fees "shall be paid to the treasurer of the board."

This decision was pronounced, Lord Deas dissenting, by a court of seven judges, who affirmed Lord Curriehill's judgment to that effect.

Lord Deas observed—"I do not find in the Education Act any duty

laid on the pursuer to collect those fees, which admittedly must go into the school fund."

PROCLAMATION OF BANNS—QUOAD SACRA PARISH.

Hutton v. Harper, July 7, 1875.

Proclamation of banns may be lawfully made within a church erected as a *quoad sacra* parish church under the provisions of 7 and 8 Vict. c. 44.

This decision was unanimously pronounced by seven judges, reversing the judgment of Lord Mackenzie. The ground of decision was mainly that proclamation of banns is an ecclesiastical, not a civil, act.

The total number of boats registered in Scotland under the Sea Fisheries Act 1868, at the close of 1874, was 15,218, of which 2407 were boats of fifteen tons and upwards, with a tonnage of 40,629 tons. 1807 boats were registered at Lerwick, 2168 at Inverness, 1757 at Greenock, 1370 at Wick, 1117 at Kirkwall, 1267 at Banff, 1117 at Peterhead, and 955 at Stornoway. Of boats of fifteen tons and upwards, 62 were registered at Lerwick, tonnage, 2817 tons; 110 at Inverness, tonnage, 1669 tons; 18 at Greenock, tonnage, 313 tons; 329 at Wick, tonnage, 5085 tons; 92 at Kirkwall, tonnage, 1452 tons; 651 at Banff, tonnage, 9984 tons; 541 at Peterhead, tonnage, 8745 tons; 47 at Stornoway, tonnage, 701 tons; 128 at Leith, tonnage, 2460 tons; and 186 at Kirkcaldy, tonnage, 2997 tons. The number of boats, the certificates of which were endorsed in 1874, was 12,829, and the number of men and boys employed in them was 51,093. The number of men and boys constantly employed in fishing, in Scotland, was 24,914, and the number of persons other than regular fishermen, occasionally employed in fishing, was 16,319.

During the year 1874, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, there were built at Aberdeen 13 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 9598; 6 sailing vessels (4 of iron and 1 of wood, and 1 composite), and 7 steamers (all of iron). At Alloa, 3 sailing vessels (of wood), tonnage, 157. At Banff, 13 sailing vessels (of wood), aggregate tonnage, 2222. At Borrowstounness, 2 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 1234; 1 sailing vessel (of wood), and 1 iron steamer. At Dundee, 12 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 8802; 6 sailing vessels (3 of iron and 3 of wood), and 6 steamers (4 of iron and 2 of wood). At Fraserburgh, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage 137. At Glasgow, 140 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 140,456; 34 being sailing vessels (33 iron and 1 of wood), and 106 steamers (104 of iron and 2 composite). At Greenock, 75 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 64,388; 29 being sailing vessels (22 of iron and 7 of wood), and 46 steamers (41 of iron, and 5 of wood). At Irvine, 3 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 157 (2 sailing vessels of wood, and 1 iron steamer). At Kirkcaldy, 3 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 2858, all steamers (of iron). At Kirkwall, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), of 76 tons. At Montrose, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage 402 tons. At Peterhead, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 89. At Stornoway, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage 45 tons. At Troon, 2 vessels, tonnage 234 tons; 1 sailing vessel (of wood), and 1 steamer (of wood). The number of ships built at ports in Scotland in 1874, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, was 271, tonnage, 230,855; of which 100 were sailing vessels (62 of iron, 37 of wood, and 1 composite), and 171 were steamers (161 of iron, 8 of wood, and 2 composite). There were built for foreigners, for mercantile purposes, 1 steamer, tonnage 409 tons, at Aberdeen; 1 steamer of 224 tons, at Dundee; 21 vessels (2 sailing vessels, and 19 steamers), aggregate tonnage 29,329 tons, at Glasgow; 14 steamers, aggregate tonnage 16,339 tons, at Greenock; and 1 steamer of 411 tons at Kirkcaldy. The total number of vessels built at ports in Scotland in 1874, was 309, tonnage 277,567 tons, of which 102 were sailing vessels, tonnage 83,904 tons, and 207 steamers, tonnage 193,663 tons.

THE CUSTOMS.

The Nineteenth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs on the Customs is for the year 1874. It is observed that the advancement in prosperity and wealth of the country, as measured by the amount of imports and exports, received a slight check in 1874; but notwithstanding this, the customs duties increased during that year. The explanation of this suggested is that, though the wages of skilled labourers were lower during the year than in 1873, the wages of agricultural labourers advanced sufficiently to more than balance the fall, so far as the power of consuming dutiable articles was concerned. There was a diminution both in imports and exports, however, in 1874, and the combined value of the two was less than it was in the previous year by 2·1 per cent. The increase in the net customs revenue (excluding the duty from sugar in both years) was 2·7 per cent.

The value of our imports in 1874 (£370,082,701) was about ·3 per cent. (£1,200,000) below the value in 1873, a difference scarcely appreciable. This is the first year in which a decrease has taken place since 1867, and it is to be attributed greatly to a fall in prices, though there was a considerable re-

duction in the quantities of some imported articles. The value of foreign produce imported was £287,919,862, against £290,277,250 in 1873; and that of colonial produce imported, £82,162,839, against £81,010,122 in 1873. There was therefore scarcely a change in the value of either foreign or colonial imports worth considering in 1874; and as regards British possessions, there was scarcely any variation in the trade of any of them in the two years. There were curious variations in the imports from the several provinces of India, and variations also of some importance in the imports from the several Australian colonies, but the totals from India and from Australia underwent little change. The figures for India as a whole were almost identical in the two years. Australia showed an improvement of 7·4 per cent. in 1874, a falling off of 19·3 per cent. in the imports from South Australia being more than made up by an increase of 21·7 per cent. in the case of Victoria, and of 5·5 per cent. in the case of New South Wales. Ceylon showed a diminution of 16 per cent., owing to a smaller importation of coffee, and the Straits Settlements a diminution of 25 per cent., the result of a diminished supply of pepper, guttapercha, and tin. Though the foreign imports showed only a variation (a decrease) of ·8 per cent. in 1874, this was the result of a varied range of increases and decreases in the case of individual countries. Holland showed an increase of 8·8 per cent. (£1,191,714); Belgium, of 15 per cent. (£1,973,679); France, of 7·3 per cent. (£3,179,337); the United States (Atlantic and Pacific ports taken together), of 3·3 per cent. (£2,425,907). Spain, on the other hand, showed a decrease of 20·7 per cent. (£2,368,711); Italy, of 5·1 per cent. (£196,731); Egypt, of 25·7 per cent. (£3,641,115); China, of 10·5 per cent. (£1,308,325); the Spanish West Indies, of 26·3 per cent. (£1,344,672); and the Argentine Republic, of 51·1 per cent. (£1,332,598). Many of these countries, it should be observed, are either countries of transit or send their produce to the United Kingdom through other countries. The increase in the case of France was due to a larger importation of butter, silk goods, and sugar, there being a diminution in the importation of corn and meal (1,706,000 cwts.), of brandy (3,156,000 gallons), and of wine (1,137,000 gallons). It is said that goods to the value probably of two millions passed through France to the United Kingdom from countries in the East. In regard to the United States, the increase (3·3 per cent.) was much less than it was in 1873, but in that year it was very large (15 per cent.). The decline in the value of Spanish imports was chiefly attributable to a decrease of £938,695 in wheat and wheaten flour, and of £756,330 in wine. There was an increase in the quantities imported in 1874 of raw cotton (2½ per cent.), flax (8 per cent.), wool (8 per cent.), butter (26 per cent.), eggs (3 per cent.), wrought and unwrought iron (19 per cent.), the last coming mainly from Belgium; and a decrease in the quantities imported of hemp (·5 per cent.), raw silk (8 per cent.), raw hides (5·6 per cent.), indigo (1·7 per cent.), and also in bacon and hams, rice, and raw sugar. The value of articles of food imported in 1874 was £74,681,857, against £76,214,650 in 1873, a decrease of 2 per cent.; the value of the raw material of manufacture imported was £123,156,042 in 1874, against £131,336,455 in 1873, a decrease of 1·6 per cent.; the value of metallic products and metal manufactures imported was £14,992,268 in 1874, against £15,759,111 in 1873, a decrease of nearly 5 per cent.

The total value of British and Irish exports in 1874 (£239,558,121) showed a decrease of 6·1 per cent. upon the value of 1873 (£255,164,603), and of 6·5 per cent. on the value of 1872 (£256,257,347). The falling off was partly due to a depreciation of values, but there was also a reduction in the quantities exported of such articles as iron and steel, linen yarn, linen piece goods, silk (thrown, twist, and yarn), and worsted stuffs. The decrease first showed itself in June 1873, and was continuing at the end of 1874. The value of the exports of British and Irish produce to foreign countries (£167,278,029) in 1874 showed a decline of 11·4 per cent. as compared with the value in 1873 (£188,836,132), and of 14·5 per cent. as compared with the value in 1872 (£195,701,350). The value of the exports of British and Irish produce to British Possessions in 1874 (£72,280,092) showed an increase of 9 per cent. as compared with the value in 1873 (£66,328,471), and of 19·3 per cent. as compared with the value in 1872 (£60,555,997).

In the case of many countries, the amount of trade shown by the export tables is delusive, because these countries are countries of transit, or their imports from the United Kingdom reach them through other countries. Putting such cases aside, there was an increase in our exports to Sweden (£240,000), to Norway (£130,000), to Spain (£340,000), to the Danubian Principalities (£165,000), to Brazil (£130,000); and there were trifling increases in our trade with the Channel Islands, Sierra Leone, the British Possessions on the River Gambia and the Gold Coast, Natal, and British Guiana. The decreases, which were much more numerous, included Russia (£620,000), Denmark (£150,000), Germany (£2,470,000), Holland (£2,300,000), Belgium (£1,370,000), Portugal, the Azores, and Madeira (£380,000), Italy (£1,070,000), the Austrian Territories (£420,000), European Turkey (£330,000), Asiatic Turkey (£360,000), the West Coast of Africa (£190,000), the Spanish West Indies (£890,000), Peru (£930,000), Chili (£410,000), Uruguay (£540,000), and the Argentine Republic (£600,000). There were small decreases in our trade with the Cape of Good Hope, the Mauritius, Newfoundland, and the Bermudas, and a decrease of about 10 per cent. (£240,000) in our exports to the British West Indian Islands. Our exports to India showed an increase of £3,429,002, or 14 per cent.; our exports to Australia, an increase of £1,452,768, or 8·2 per cent.; our exports to Canada, an increase of £736,996, or 9 per cent., or, allowing for goods sent to Canada through the United States, an increase of £974,156, or 9·8 per cent. Our exports to the United States showed a decrease of £5,332,855 as compared with 1873, and of £93,585 as compared with 1870.

The total value of our exports of Foreign and Colonial produce rose from £55,840,162 in 1873 to £58,092,343 in 1874, an increase of 4·3 per cent.; there was a decrease of slightly larger amount in 1873 as compared with 1872. There was an increase in 1874 of £1,441,481 in the export to foreign countries, and of £810,700 in the export to British Possessions.

The value of merchandise transhipped in the United Kingdom in 1874 having been £11,421,241, the value of gold and silver bullion imported, £30,379,188, and that of gold and silver bullion exported, £22,853,593, the total value of our export, import, and transhipment trade in 1874 was £732,387,187, as against £758,555,053 in the previous year.

The net customs revenue was £20,672,007 in 1873, and £19,342,442 in 1874, showing a decrease in 1874 of £1,329,565 (explained by the loss of the sugar duty, £1,950,000). The gross customs revenue was £20,954,188 in 1873, and £19,503,942 in 1874, showing a decrease in 1874 of £1,450,246. The payments out of revenue on account of drawbacks and repayments (£161,500 in 1874) were less in 1874 than in 1873 by £120,681.

The rate per cent. of the *charges of collection on the gross produce of the customs revenue of the United Kingdom*, including therein the gross amount of duty collected on British spirits deposited in customs warehouses (£23,853,224), was £3, 7s. 11d. in the financial year 1873-74, being an increase upon the rate in the previous year, £3, 5s. 4d. The rate per cent. of collection on the *net produce* (including duty on British spirits as aforesaid, £23,577,350) was £3, 8s. 9d. in the financial year 1873-74, against £3, 6s. 3d. in the previous year.

The gross receipt of customs revenue (amounting, without including the duty on customs goods delivered out of excise warehouses, to £18,893,994) was divided among the different ports as follows:—London, £9,506,721; Liverpool, £2,966,241; other ports in England, £3,002,081; ports in Scotland, £1,666,215; ports in Ireland, £1,752,736. There was a decrease, as compared with 1873, of £374,684 at London, of £210,685 at Liverpool, of £269,104 in the other ports of England, of £600,805 in Scotland, and of £132,203 in Ireland—in all, of £1,587,481 (attributable mainly to the abolition of the sugar duties).

The revenue from British spirits collected by the Customs Department in 1874, and handed over to the Inland Revenue Department, amounted to £3,272,578, being an increase on the previous year of £185,348. There was an increase in England of £160,965, a decrease in Scotland of £20,948, and an increase in Ireland of £45,331.

The following Table (continuing tables in former Almanacs) shows the amount of customs revenue collected at the several ports of Scotland, at the three principal ports of England, and at the three principal ports of Ireland, in each of the years (ending 31st December) 1873 and 1874:—

THE POST-OFFICE.

The Twenty-first Report of the Postmaster-General on the Post-office is for the year 1874.

The number of post-offices in the United Kingdom was increased during 1874 by 280, so that there are now nearly 13,000, of which about 900 are head-offices. The number of road letter-boxes was increased by about 700, making the number of them nearly 9700. Thus the whole number of postal receptacles in the United Kingdom is now more than 22,000, as compared with about 15,600 ten years ago, and with little more than 4500 before the

establishment of penny postage in 1840. In London alone there are now nearly 1700 such receptacles. At 760 places, free deliveries were established for the first time in 1874; and at more than 830 other places the deliveries were increased in number or otherwise improved. About 40 towns got the benefit of a midnight despatch of letters from London by the Midland Railway, and the morning mails from London were accelerated by sending them by new trains provided for the conveyance of the London newspapers, which also usually carry the Continental correspondence arriving by the Belgian mail. The accommodation offered to the public was also improved in many districts during the year.

Letters, Post-Cards, Book-Packets, and Newspapers.—In 1874 there passed through the post-office about 967,000,000 letters (England, 804,000,000; Ireland, 73,000,000; Scotland, 90,000,000); 79,000,000 post-cards (England, 66,000,000; Ireland, 4,000,000; Scotland, 9,000,000); and 259,000,000 book-packets and newspapers (England, 207,000,000; Ireland, 23,000,000; Scotland, 29,000,000). As compared with 1873, there was an increase of $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in letters, of $9\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in post-cards, and of 2 per cent. in book-packets and newspapers. In letters there was an increase of $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in England, of $8\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in Ireland, and of $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in Scotland; in post-cards, an increase of $8\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in England, of $15\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in Ireland, and of $13\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in Scotland; in book-packets and newspapers, an increase of $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. in England, of 5 per cent. in Ireland, and of 5 per cent. in Scotland. The average number of letters delivered to each person in the population in 1874 was 33 in England, 25 in Scotland, 14 in Ireland, and 30 in the United Kingdom. The number of registered letters in the United Kingdom was upwards of 4,000,000, or about 1 in 250 of the total number of letters. The number of letters received in the Returned Letter Office was more than 4,400,000, or about 1 in 220 of the total number of letters; more than three-fourths of these (3,883,000) were re-issued to corrected addresses or returned to the writers. Upwards of 20,000 letters were posted without any address (one of them containing more than £2000 in bank notes), and about 61,000 postage stamps were found loose in different offices. The number of newspapers for places abroad, detained for insufficient postage or other cause, which was 700,000 in 1872, and 250,000 in 1873, was in 1874 only 173,000. It is stated that newspapers sent to this country from the United States and from Canada frequently contain enclosures liable to the letter rate of postage, and that in six months in 1874, more than 14,000 newspapers were found to have such enclosures secreted in them.

Telegraphs.—The telegraph business in 1874 showed a large increase. The number of messages (exclusive of messages for newspapers) was above 19,000,000, or about 10 per cent. more than in 1873. In the number of postal telegraph offices there was no material change. There was no very important change in the mode of carrying on the service; but, by means of minor improvements, increased facilities had been given to the public, and the cost of the service had at the same time been reduced. The system of "duplex" telegraphy had been further applied, and the "Sonder" instrument had been brought into more general use. The revenue from private wires rose from £47,000 in 1873 to about £53,000 in 1874.

The gross revenue from telegraphs in 1874 was £1,160,000, and the expenditure £1,051,000; which left the sum of £109,000 applicable to the payment of interest upon the capital raised for the purchase of the telegraphs by the state.

Money-Orders.—During 1874, 231 additional money-order offices were opened, making the whole number in the United Kingdom upwards of 5000. Inland orders now remain in circulation for 12 clear months from the month of issue, and a like arrangement applies to orders passing between the United Kingdom and the colonies, and, with a few exceptions, to orders between the United Kingdom and foreign countries. In 1874 the number of inland money-orders issued in the United Kingdom was 15,900,562, against 15,118,636 in 1873, an increase of 5 per cent.; and the amount for which they were issued was £26,296,441, against £25,600,069 in 1873,

an increase of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. In England, the number issued was 13,550,011, an increase of $5\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. upon 1873, and the amount was £22,246,625, an increase of 3 per cent.; in Scotland, the number was 1,324,415, an increase of 4 per cent., and the amount was £2,268,799, an increase of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.; in Ireland, the number was 1,026,136, an increase of $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent., and the amount £1,781,017, an increase of 1 per cent. The number of colonial and foreign money-orders in 1874, counting the issues both in this country and abroad, was 320,941 (viz., colonies 163,486, a decrease of $1\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.; foreign countries 157,455, an increase of $6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.); and the amount for which they were issued was £1,211,231 (viz., colonies £576,231, an increase of 1 per cent.; foreign countries £535,000, an increase of 1 per cent.). The average amount of inland money-orders was about £1, 12s. 6d.; and the proportion of inland money-orders to population was in England 7 to 11, in Scotland 2 to 5, in Ireland 1 to 5, and in the United Kingdom 1 to 2. About £585,000 was sent by money-orders from the colonies to the United Kingdom, against about £90,000 sent from the United Kingdom, and nearly £363,000 was sent by money-orders to the United Kingdom from foreign countries.

Post-office Savings Banks.—The number of depositors in post-office savings banks (1,556,645 at the end of 1873) had risen at the end of 1874 to 1,668,733, an increase of 112,088. The amount of the deposits (£21,167,749 at the end of 1873) had risen to £23,157,469 at the end of 1874, an increase of £1,989,720. The number of depositors in post-office savings banks and old banks combined (3,002,134 at the end of 1873) had risen to 3,134,871 at the end of 1874, an increase of 132,737. The number of deposits made in post-office savings banks during 1874 was 3,044,692, and the amount deposited was £8,341,256 (an average per deposit of £2, 14s. 10d.). The amount of interest credited to depositors at the end of the year was £524,559, an increase of £46,708 on the previous year. The number of withdrawals was 1,069,669, and the amount withdrawn was £6,876,095 (an average per withdrawal of £6, 8s. 7d.). The average amount at the credit of each depositor was £13, 17s. 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. The charges of management in 1874 amounted to £99,616, being 8s. 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. per cent. on the funds in possession of the banks; and the average cost of each transaction was 5s. 8d., or, including postage, about 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ d., as compared with about 1s. in the old savings banks. The total sum standing to the credit of the post-office savings banks on the books of the National Debt Commissioners at the close of 1874 was £24,030,711, and the balance in the hands of the Postmaster-General at the same date was £21,499, to meet outstanding warrants to the amount of £36,217; so that the total sum applicable to the payment of depositors at the close of the year was £24,016,836. The number of post-office savings banks in the United Kingdom at the end of 1874 was 5068; the number of post-office and old savings banks, taken together, was 5543. The proportion of the depositors in post-office savings banks at the end of 1874 to the population was, for the United Kingdom, about 1 to 20. It is stated that more than 400 accounts with friendly societies were opened, and nearly 1300 accounts with trade, charitable, and provident societies during 1874. 140 accounts were opened with penny banks in 1874, making the number of such accounts more than 300; several accounts on behalf of school banks have also been opened. The profit of the savings banks for the year (not charging for postage, £36,000) was £119,000. The aggregate profit since the establishment of savings banks in 1861, making no deduction for postage, has been £829,000.

Post-office Annuities and Life Insurances.—The number of immediate annuities subsisting at the close of 1874 in the United Kingdom was 5629, and the amount of the annuities was £64,621. The number of immediate annuities granted during the year was 1814, the purchase-money was £115,021, and the amount of the annuities, £12,259. The whole number of immediate annuities granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1874 was 6069; the amount of the purchase-money of those annuities was £749,560; and the amount of the annuities, £71,413. The number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money not returnable, subsisting at the end of 1874,

was 142, and their amount £2556; the number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money returnable, was 181, and their amount £3411. Of the former 17, the amount of which was £257, of the latter 36, the amount of which was £735, were granted in 1874. The amount of purchase-money and instalments of premiums received in 1874 was £4827 (money not returnable, £1068; money returnable, £3758). The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money not returnable, granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1874, was 160, on account of which there had been paid £10,995, and the amount of which was £2969. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money returnable, granted in the same period, was 302, on account of which there had been paid £18,114, and the amount of which was £5991. The number of contracts of life insurance entered into with the post-office, current at the end of 1874, was 3630; the amount insured was £284,069. The amount received during the year on contracts was £8615. The number of payments made on account of contracts during the year was 92, and the amount paid was £3766. The number of new contracts entered into during the year was 278, and the amount insured by them, £21,622. The whole number of contracts of life insurance entered into by the post-office, from the commencement of business on 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1874, was 4478, and the amount insured was £343,979.

Licenses.—The number of licenses issued in 1874 by the post-office, on behalf of the Board of Inland Revenue, was 1,163,207, of which 685,636 were for keeping dogs. The revenue produced was £521,249.

Force, Expenditure, and Revenue.—The following Table shows the force or numbers of persons employed in the post-office (exclusive of officers employed in the telegraphs and post-office savings banks, and distinguishing effective from pensioners or non-effective); the cost of collection and delivery, of management, and of money-order business; the cost of conveyance of mails (distinguishing conveyance by coaches, carts, and omnibuses from conveyance by railways and conveyance by ships and packets); and the total cost of the post-office service, in each of the years 1872, 1873, and 1874:—

In 1874 the cost of the manufacture of postage stamps, post-cards, and stamped newspaper wrappers, was £70,000; of stationery, £37,420; of buildings and repairs, rents, rates, taxes, fuel, and light, £168,855; of supply and repair of mail-bags and boxes, tolls and ferryage, and other charges, £23,865; of the conveyance of mails over the Isthmuses of Suez and Panama, and in other foreign parts, £18,434. The staff of officers engaged exclusively on telegraph duties at the end of 1874 (who are not included in the table given above), consisted of 19 chief-engineers and other superior officers, 6628 clerks, subordinate engineers, etc., and 4572 messengers: total, 11,219. The total number of persons in the employ of the post-office at home and abroad (including certain officers partly engaged in telegraph and partly in other duties) at the close of 1874 was 43,982.

The next Table shows the gross and net revenue of the post-office (distinguishing the gross revenue from letters, books, etc., and the

amount of commission on money-orders), in the years 1872, 1873, and 1874:—

The gross revenue as given above includes £5116, the amount of unclaimed money-orders. The true gross revenue of the year 1874, after making certain adjustments as between it and the preceding and succeeding years, was £5,651,000, an increase of £280,000 as compared with the corrected gross revenue of 1872 (£5,371,000). The net revenue of 1874, similarly corrected, was £1,736,000, an increase of £158,000, or almost 10 per cent., on the corrected net revenue for 1873 (£1,578,000). During the five years 1865-69, the average net revenue of the post-office was £1,404,828; during the five years 1870-74, it was £1,539,817.

THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

A committee, appointed by the Treasury in March 1875, to investigate the causes of the increased cost of the telegraph service since the acquisition of the telegraphs by the State, have issued a report, dated 17th July 1875. The report states, that the staff employed in the telegraph service is very much larger than that formerly employed by the telegraph companies. A reduction of staff had been reckoned upon, but the staff had been more than doubled within six months of the transfer of the telegraphs to the State. It is stated, too, that the supervising staff is much more costly than that employed by the telegraph companies, notwithstanding their divided management; and that the salaries of all the officials of the telegraph companies were very largely raised after their entry into the Government service, it having been deemed necessary to approximate their remuneration to that given in other departments of the Post-office. Then the price of iron has risen, wages are higher, and the Government has to pay for the transit of men and materials by railway, whereas the companies virtually got free transport from the railway companies. Certain expenses, too, which are properly chargeable to capital, such as cost of construction, especially in the case of private wires, are now (as the committee think wisely) included in the annual expenditure, and one-third of the cost of sites purchased for the Post-office is charged to the telegraph service, which the committee are disposed to think too much. Allowing for all this, the committee say they have been much struck by the very high percentage of the working expenses on the gross receipts of the telegraph service, and its tendency to rapid increase. The proportion of working expenses to income was more than 57 per cent. in the fourteen months ended 31st March 1871; it was nearly 78½ per cent. in the financial year 1871-72; nearly 89½ per cent. in 1872-73; nearly 91½ per cent. in 1873-74; and more than 96½ per cent. in 1874-75. The average cost of working to the telegraph companies was about 60 per cent. of the gross receipts. The committee supply an estimate for the year 1875-76, which shows on the side of revenue £1,216,362, and puts the expenditure at £1,191,180. This gives a surplus of only £25,182, so that, the interest of capital being £293,706, there would be a deficiency of revenue to meet current expenditure and interest of £268,524. It appeared that there were 449 offices (out of a total of 3692) which did not pay their expenses in 1874; but in 1872 there had been 728 such offices (out of a total of 3444); and, as the number of losing offices tends to diminish,

and there would be expense as well as loss involved in relinquishing them, the committee recommend that this should not be done without careful inquiry in each case.

The committee recommend the abolition of postal surveyors, and the transfer of their duties to the divisional engineers of the telegraph service, as a means of saving expense; and they also recommend the fusion generally of the postal and telegraph services as a means of securing economical administration. The two services have recently been amalgamated in Germany. They also strongly recommend the employment of Royal Engineers in the maintenance of the telegraph system, as a means of saving expense. The railway companies at present maintain for the Post-office the telegraphs laid along their lines. The Commissioners suggest that they should be asked to undertake the maintenance of the road lines of telegraph adjoining their own lines, believing that a great saving would follow from the abolition of the double system of maintenance. The committee, to illustrate the increase in the expense of working the telegraphs, point out that, though the number of inland messages increased from six millions under the companies to about twenty millions (in the financial year 1874-75), the surplus of income over working expenses decreased from £303,456 in 1870-71 to £36,725 in 1874-75, and they say the conclusion cannot be avoided that unless either a check is put on the expenditure, or some means is devised for augmenting the receipts, the management of the telegraphs will become a permanent charge on the finances of the country. To prevent this, they state certain suggestions made by one of their number, Mr Weaver, and advise their adoption. It appears that the average number of words telegraphed on account of each shilling message at present is 43, made up as follows:—Service instructions 14 words, address of sender 4, address of receiver 8, message 17. Mr Weaver considers that the words used in the service instructions can be considerably reduced. In this the Post-office authorities agree with him, and they are prepared to introduce certain modifications which will result in an economy of time and labour. Mr Weaver considers that the addresses (12 words on an average, the number of words allowed free by the companies having been 10) which go with the message for a shilling are at present not paid for, that to send unpaid matter over the lines is unsound policy, and that the addresses should be expressly paid for. He also considers that the press tariff—100 words for a shilling—is far too low, occupying the wires with unremunerative traffic, forcing on extensions of the telegraph system, and adding greatly to the cost of working it. To withdraw the right of sending addresses without special payment, might, it is admitted, be difficult, unless some equivalent for the withdrawal were given to the public. It is suggested (1) that a tariff at the rate of sixpence per 10 words, inclusive of addresses, might be introduced; or (2) that the word system of charging messages should be introduced, the words of the addresses being charged for, each word in the address and message being charged a penny to begin with, the charge to be reduced to $\frac{1}{2}$ d. when the system became profitable. Either of these tariffs would, in the opinion of Mr Weaver, be profitable. A concession to the press upon these rates would have to be made, but the committee are of opinion that, if Government appeared resolved to carry an amending measure through Parliament, an arrangement upon far less onerous terms than the present would not be difficult. The Postmaster-general, writing to the Lords of the Treasury on 26th July 1875, to acknowledge receipt of a copy of the report, observes that some of the recommendations of the committee are of a grave character, that all require the most careful and deliberate consideration, and therefore that, if the report were to be immediately laid before Parliament, it could not be accompanied by detailed observations from him.

LUNACY.

The "Seventeenth Annual Report of the General Board of Commissioners in Lunacy for Scotland" is dated 24th February 1875.

The number and distribution of the insane in Scotland on 1st January 1874 (exclusive of unreported lunatics maintained in private dwellings from private sources, of whom the Commissioners have no official cognisance or control), is shown in the following Table:—

It thus appears that the whole number of insane persons of whom official cognisance was had at 1st January 1874, was 8069, and of these 1455 were maintained from private sources; 6563 by parochial rates; and 51 (criminal lunatics) at the expense of the State. On the 1st of January 1873, the corresponding numbers were 1423, 6505, and 54. There was thus, in 1873, an increase of 32 in the number of private patients, an increase of 58 in the number of paupers, and a decrease of 3 in the number of criminal lunatics. The Commissioners estimate the number of unreported insane at nearly 2000, of whom the greater number belongs to the classes little removed from pauperism. In 1873, there was, in royal and district asylums, an increase of 30 in the number of private patients, and 22 in the number of pauper patients; in private asylums, an increase of 1 private, and a decrease of 5 pauper patients; in parochial asylums, an increase of 78 pauper patients; in lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 9 pauper patients; in training schools for imbeciles, an increase of 1 private and 1 pauper patient; in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, a decrease of 3 patients; and in private dwellings, a decrease of 47 pauper patients.

Since 1st January 1858, the number of lunatics officially known to the Board (excluding the inmates of idiot-schools, who are not certified as lunatics) has risen from 5794 to 7986. There has been an increase of 2337 in the numbers in royal and district asylums, a decrease of 407 in the private asylums, an increase of 474 in the parochial asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 25 in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, and a decrease of 287 in the number

left in private dwellings. These figures show that, of the increase in the number of patients in public and parochial asylums, 2836, 407 arise from the decrease in private asylums, and 287 from the decrease in private dwellings; leaving an increase of 2142 in public and parochial asylums ascribable to the growth of lunacy, or, at any rate, to the increased number of lunatics in asylums. Comparing the numbers at 1st January 1858 and 1st January 1874, there has been an increase since 1858 of 2135 in the number of pauper patients placed in establishments, and of 268 in the number of private patients similarly disposed of; a decrease of 843 in the number of pauper lunatics in private dwellings; and an increase of 56 in the number of private single patients under the sheriff's order or sanction of the Board. The results of 1874 give an increase of 104 pauper patients and of 1 private patient in establishments.

There were 228 lunatics in Scotland per 100,000 of the population (census of 1871) in 1874; of whom 184 were in establishments, and 44 were in private dwellings. The proportion per 100,000 of the population was 191 in 1858, 203 in 1865, and 222 in 1870. There has been a progressive increase in the number of lunatics under cognisance of the Board, and the increase is greater still in the proportion borne by lunatic paupers to ordinary paupers. Since 1861 there has been a fall of 22·6 per cent. in the proportion of ordinary paupers to population, and there has been a rise of 10·5 per cent. in the proportion of lunatic paupers to population; the rise in the proportion of lunatic paupers to ordinary paupers during the period being 34·2 per cent. The proportion of pauper lunatics to paupers was 6800 per 100,000 in 1861, and was 9127 per 100,000 in 1874. The number of female pauper lunatics exceeds the number of male pauper lunatics by 17·9 per cent., which scarcely exceeds the proportion of females to males in the population; it therefore indicates that women on the whole are not more liable to insanity than men. The relation of male to female pauperism, and that of male to female pauper lunacy, do not vary much in Scotland from year to year. There were 283·3 female to every 100 male paupers in 1865, 260·5 in 1870, and 266·0 in 1874; there were 117·7 female pauper lunatics to every 100 male pauper lunatics in 1865, 116·6 in 1870, and 117·9 in 1874. Between 1858 and 1874, the yearly number of pauper lunatics placed in establishments rose from 1042 to 1577, or by more than 50 per cent., the population increasing only about 14 per cent. in the same period; but the Commissioners are not disposed to think that this indicates a greater production of insanity in the country. The rise in the yearly number of private lunatic patients placed in establishments in the same period has been but slight; it was 406 in 1858, and 428 in 1874. On an average of the ten years 1865–74, of every 100 patients sent to asylums, 24·1 were private, and 75·9 were pauper.

The number of pauper lunatics intimated in 1873 was 1666, of whom 1609 were sent to establishments, and 57 were left in private dwellings. On an average of the seven years 1867–73, of every 100 pauper lunatics intimated 94·3 were sent to establishments, and 5·7 were left at home. The proportion of intimations varies greatly in different counties. On an average of the sixteen years 1858–73, there were annually, per 100,000 of population, 56·5 intimations in Edinburgh, 46·4 in Argyll, 45·7 in Renfrew, 45·5 in Lanark, 42·0 in Forfar, 41·8 in Aberdeen, 40·1 in Dumfries; and, on the other hand, only 18·2 in Orkney, 20·3 in Shetland, 23·8 in Sutherland, 24·6 in Nairn, 27·6 in Berwick, 28·7 in Banff, 28·9 in Linlithgow, 28·9 in Kinross, and 29·2 in Ross—the average number for all Scotland being 40·3.

Admissions, Recoveries, Deaths, in 1874.—During the year 1874, the admissions into establishments (excluding transfers) were 2005,—949 males and 1056 females; the recoveries were 940,—436 males and 504 females; the deaths, 518,—237 males and 276 females. The statistics of the ten years 1865–74 show a preponderance of admissions in April, May, June, July, August, and September; of recoveries in June, July, August, September, October, and December; and of deaths in January, February, March, April, and December. The number of deaths of both sexes is greatest in winter, but there is a greater tendency to death among female than among male patients in summer, and a less one in winter.

The subjoined Table (in continuation of similar Tables in former Almanacs) shows for each county, and for the whole of Scotland, the number of pauper lunatics chargeable on the 1st January 1874, and the total expenditure on account of pauper lunatics, and the average daily expenditure (exclusive of the cost of medical certificates, of transport to asylums, etc.) for each pauper lunatic, during the year ended 14th May 1874:—

Eight deaths from accident or violence occurred in asylums in 1874,—four from strangulation, one from fire, one from a fall from a window, one from the passage of food into the windpipe during forcible feeding, and one from drowning in the case of a patient absent on pass. Numerous other

accidents were reported. Fractured bones occurred in 34 cases, and dislocations in 3. In 5 cases grave injuries resulted from attempts at suicide.

The number of voluntary patients admitted into asylums in 1874 was 43. The corresponding numbers in 1872 and 1873 were 35 and 44. Such patients are not certified as lunatics.

At 1st January 1875, the number of patients in public and district asylums was 5003, males 2455, females 2548—private patients 1047, paupers 3956; the number in private asylums was 226—males 77, females 149; the number in parochial asylums was 760—males 317, females 443; the number in lunatic wards of poorhouses was 575—males 249, females 326.

THE POOR LAWS.

The Twenty-ninth Annual Report of the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor in Scotland, is for the year ended 14th May 1874.

During the year the number of parishes in Scotland in which assessments are levied for the relief of the poor rose to 811; and in 75 parishes the poor were relieved by means of voluntary contributions. In 22 of the assessed parishes the assessment was made according to local usage. In 604 parishes the assessment was made equally upon owners and occupants respectively, and in 185 parishes there was a classification of occupants, in terms of the 36th section of the Act 8 and 9 Vict. c. 83. During the year seven parishes which had previously raised the funds for the relief of the poor by voluntary contributions, resolved to raise those funds by assessment, and one parish abandoned assessment according to established usage for what is known as the first mode in the statute of 1845 (the only statutory mode now legal).

Receipt and Expenditure.—The sum received from all sources for the relief and management of the poor was—in the year 1871-72, £888,002; in the year 1872-73, £853,136; and in the year 1873-74, £853,432. The sum expended during the year ended 14th May 1874, for the relief and management of the poor (including £4538 expended on buildings not being authorized poorhouses, and £44,013 expended on authorized poorhouse buildings), was £847,682. In the preceding year the expenditure for the same purposes was £873,075. There was thus a decrease in the expenditure of £25,393. Putting aside the expenditure on buildings in each year, however, there was a decrease in 1873-74 as compared with 1872-73 of only £2765. Putting aside the expenditure on buildings, there has been a decrease in the expenditure on the poor in every year since 1868-69—the decrease on five years amounting to £22,054. The sum expended in actual relief of the registered poor was less in 1873-74 than it had been since 1867, and the expenditure on casual poor had not been so low in any previous year.

In the following Table are shown the amount and details of the poor-law expenditure in each of the three years ended 14th May 1872-74, together with the rate per head of the population, and the rate per cent. on the annual value of real property assessed to the property and income tax in 1856; also the averages of the same items for the last ten years:—

The rate per cent. of expenditure for 1873-74 on the annual value of real property for that year, as returned by the inspectors of poor, is £4, 9s. 9½d., being 2½d. less than the rate per cent. for the same period calculated on the annual

value for 1872. The expenditure in 1873-74 on account of questions of settlement was £1438.

Though the total sum expended on the relief of registered and casual poor during the year 1873-74 was £37,413, 10s. 11d. less than the sum expended on the same objects in the year 1868-69, the average allowance to each pauper on the roll or registered was greater by 13s. 10d. in 1873-74 than in 1868-69.

The number both of registered and casual poor relieved in 1873-74 was smaller than it had been since the Act of 1845 came into operation; and there is no reason to suppose that this is due to reprehensible action on the part of parochial boards, or to any other cause that would require correction. The Report attributes it to a more careful investigation of claims for relief, and to a more firm and extended use of the poorhouse test; and intimates that a considerable further reduction in the number of persons supported by the poor-rate might be made were the law equally well administered in all the parishes of Scotland.

Lunatic Poor.—The number of lunatic poor relieved in the year 1873-74 was 8208. Of these 1657 died, or were cured, or ceased to receive relief; so that the number at 14th May 1874 was 6551, being an increase on comparison with the previous year (same date) of 78. 4170 were in asylums, 950 in licensed wards of poorhouses, and 1431 in private dwellings. The cost of maintaining the lunatic poor continues to increase, and to counteract the tendency to decrease in other branches of the expenditure on the poor. In 1867, it was £108,172; in 1873-74, it was £144,567, showing an increase during the interval of £36,394. The increase in 1873-74, as compared with the immediately preceding year, was £7882, while on the total expenditure for the poor, exclusive of buildings and lunatics, there was a decrease of £10,648.

Poorhouses.—The number of poorhouses on 1st August 1874 was 62 (with accommodation for 14,217 inmates), for 400 parishes, having a population of 2,398,522. The number of poorhouses in progress was 2, for 11 parishes, having a population of 35,180; so that, when the latter are completed, there will be 64 poorhouses, for 411 parishes, having a population of 2,434,702. The Board during the year approved of the rates for boarding paupers belonging to 193 parishes in the poorhouses of other parishes or combinations. The approval of such rates has to be asked for every year. There are 206 parishes, with a population of 526,384, which have a right to send paupers to poorhouses belonging to other parishes; but some of these are in combinations for proposed poorhouses, or propose to have poorhouses of their own. The population to which poorhouse accommodation was available was therefore 2,924,906. The total population of the parishes (280 in number) to which poorhouse accommodation is still not available, is 435,112. The number of poor receiving in-door relief was 8191 at 1st January 1872; 8172 at 1st January 1873; 8189 at 1st January 1874; 7144 at 1st July 1872; 7004 at 1st July 1873; 7318 at 1st July 1874. The number of poor who received in-door relief (including readmissions) during the half-year ended 31st December 1873 was 17,574, of whom 9385 were discharged, or died during the half-year. There were 7564 on the sick-list during the half-year, and 1036 died. The number of lunatics who were inmates of poorhouses during the half-

year was 1593; the number of children at school at 1st January 1874 was 940. In the half-year ended 30th June 1874, the number of inmates in poorhouses (including readmissions) was 18,699, of whom 11,381 were discharged or died; the number on the sick-list was 8705, of whom 1123 died; the number of lunatic inmates was 1547; and the number of inmates at school at 1st July 1874 was 876. The average weekly cost per head of inmates of all the poorhouses of Scotland for food, fuel, clothing, light, and all other necessities of maintenance, was, for the half-year ended 31st December 1873, 3s. 5½d.; it was 3s. 5½d. in the half-year ended 30th June 1874. The average weekly expenditure per head of ordinary inmates for whom there was accommodation in the poorhouse on account of salaries of officials, feu-duties, insurance, repairs, etc., was 9½d. in the first half-year, and 10d. in the second; on account of estimated rent it was 8½d. in the first, 8½d. in the second half-year; on account of medical attendance, medicine, etc., it was 1½d. in the first half-year, and 1½d. in the second. The poorhouses in progress at 7th August 1872 were the Lanark Combination (10 parishes, with a population of 27,339 in 1871); and the Lanark poorhouse (single parish, with a population of 7841).

Of the 90,530 poor on the roll or registered, during the year 1873-74, 27,220 were males, and 63,310 were females. Of the 32,602 casual poor relieved during the year, 13,847 were males, and 18,755 females.

Church Collections, Voluntary Contributions, and Mortifications.—The whole sum derived from church collections in assessed parishes during the year ending 14th May 1874, was £25,257, of which £8934 is stated to have been expended on relief of the poor. Of this sum, £239 was handed over to the parochial boards. It would appear, therefore, that the sum of £8695 derived from church collections was actually applied by the kirk-sessions to the relief of persons in their parishes who required assistance. "But these funds," the Report intimates, "are generally employed to afford aid to persons who have fallen into temporary difficulties, with a view to prevent them from becoming chargeable to the parish as paupers; and it is probable that few of the persons so assisted have also been chargeable to the funds raised by assessment." The whole amount derived from voluntary contributions and church collections for the relief of the poor (not including the sum expended by kirk-sessions in assessed parishes) in 1874 was £11,236. The corresponding amount in 1873 was £13,102. The amount derived from mortifications and all other sources (assessments, voluntary contributions, and church collections excepted) in 1874 was £46,788. The corresponding amount in 1873 was £47,648.

Paupers in the United Kingdom.—The following Table shows (1.) the number of paupers (exclusive of vagrants) in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in the unions and parishes under boards of guardians in England and Wales, on the 1st of January in each of the three years 1873-75; (2.) the number of paupers in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in unions in Ireland at the close of the first week of January in each of the same years; and (3.) the number of paupers and their dependants (exclusive of casual poor) in receipt of relief in parishes in Scotland, on the 14th of May in each of the three years 1872-74.

The total amount of poor-rates received in England in 1874, including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £12,803,762 (the annual value of rateable property having been in the previous year £112,317,603), and the amount expended in actual relief of the poor was £7,664,957. The total amount of poor-rates received in Ireland in 1874, including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £1,014,560, and the amount expended in the relief and management of the poor was £977,890.

The Public Health Act.—The number of parishes in which, during the year ended 14th May 1874, money was received or expended under the Act was 599; in the year preceding it was 536. The total receipts were £71,942; of which £52,288 was derived from assessment, £136 from penalties, £112 from authors of nuisances, and £19,404 from other sources. The total expenditure under the Act amounted to £102,275. £15,005 had been expended upon drainage; £34,465 on water supply; £6679 on removal of nuisances; £22,749 on hospital accommodation; and £23,375 on other purposes, including salaries. The sums stated do not represent the whole receipts and expenditure in Scotland for sanitary purposes, as in many places (Glasgow, for example, where the expenditure is considerable) important sanitary operations have been carried on under the provisions either of local Acts or of the General Police Acts, and none of these operations are embraced in the returns under the Public Health Act. The total expenditure under the Public Health Act, from the passing of the Act (15th August 1867) to the 14th May 1874, has amounted to £284,660; of which £50,666 has been expended upon drainage, £88,051 upon water supply, and, within the last two years, £28,825 upon hospital accommodation.

The number of criminal prisoners in Scottish prisons at the close of 1873 was 2659 (1576 males and 1083 females). The number of prisoners received during the year 1874, not including cases of recommitment of the same individual, was 26,483 (18,686 males and 7797 females). The whole number of criminal prisoners in confinement during the year, including cases of recommitment, was 39,637. The number of criminal prisoners at the close of 1874 was 2562 (1638 males and 924 females). The average daily number of criminal prisoners was 2745 in the first quarter of 1874; 2825 in the second quarter; 3027 in the third quarter; and 2799 in the fourth quarter. The number of revenue prisoners in Scotland in 1874, imprisoned until payment of fine or penalty, was 24 (all males). There were 7 escapes from prison and 4 recaptures in 1874. There were 2 cases of suicide.

Civil Prisoners.—The average daily number of civil prisoners in the prisons of Scotland in 1874 was 65 (61 males and 4 females). The total number of civil prisoners in 1874, including those in custody at the beginning of the year, was 738 (690 males and 48 females). The date of committal of the civil prisoner, who had been longest in prison at the end of 1874, was the 16th June 1873.

Current Yearly Expenses of County Prisons.—The expenditure under the prison boards of the several counties, chargeable on the general fund for current annual expenses, was, for the year 1874, as follows:—Aberdeenshire, £1869; Argyllshire, £894; Ayrshire, £4564; Banffshire, £319; Berwickshire, £297; Bute, £507; Caithness-shire, £415; Clackmannanshire, £482; Dumbartonshire, £837; Dumfriesshire, £754; Edinburghshire, £8422; Elginshire, £454; Fifeshire, £1854; Forfarshire, £4525; Haddingtonshire, £587; Inverness-shire, £1702; Kincardineshire, £319; Kinross-shire, £154; Kirkcudbrightshire, £494; Lanarkshire, North, £28,374; Lanarkshire, South, £3263; Linlithgowshire, £650; Nairnshire, £152; Orkney, £195; Peeblesshire, £253; Perthshire, £1958; Renfrewshire, £5119; Ross and Cromarty, £723; Roxburghshire, £788; Selkirkshire, £414; Stirlingshire, £1834; Sutherlandshire, £293; Wigtownshire, £711; Zetland, £185. Total, £74,356; of which there was paid for prisons, £50,494; for prisoners in prisons of other counties, £120; for removal of prisoners to government prisons, £859; for removal to reformatories and industrial schools, £223; for general management, £3113; for retired allowances, £1088; for interest, £1419; for miscellaneous purposes, £12,089; for materials and implements of work, £4946. The total receipts in 1874 were as follows:—From the assessment for current expenses, £61,496; from Exchequer for maintenance of prisoners, £6162; for maintenance of military, naval, and revenue prisoners, £533; for prisoners from other counties, £108; in reimbursement of expense of removals, £849; from sales of old prison stores, £136; from interest, £3828; from other sources, £3871; from employers and purchasers of work, £9383. Total receipts for 1874, £86,370. The balances at the credit of boards at 31st December 1874 amounted to £6749, and the balances at the debit of boards to £24,709.

Two offices in the Outer House made no returns for 1874. Of the 61 final judgments returned as delivered in the Outer House in 1874, 52 were on process initiated by summons, 77 on process initiated by petition and 17 on process initiated by writ other than summons or petition. 24 followed on procedure requiring closed records, and 377 on procedure not requiring closed records. Of the 558 final judgments pronounced in the Inner House in 1874, 178 were on process initiated by reclaiming note, 20 on process initiated by petition, and 179 on process initiated by appeal or other writ. 301 were in proceedings initiated in the Inner House, 208 in proceedings brought from the Outer House, and 49 in proceedings otherwise brought before the Court. 175 were judgments on decisions pronounced in the Outer House; and of the decisions, 118 were adhered to, 8 were repeated but the grounds of decision altered, 33 were reversed, and 16 were partially adhered to and partially reversed.

Of the 5501 final judgments pronounced in 1874, 2123 were made by decree *in foro*, and 3378 by decree in absence. Of the 2123 judgments *in foro*, 19 were pronounced by the Sheriff, 715 by the Sheriff on appeal, and 1389 by the Sheriff-substitute. In 537 of the 715 appeals decided by the Sheriff, the original judgment was sustained, in 108 it was reversed, and in 70 there were mixed judgments. There were 427 causes out of the 2123 decided *in foro* in which costs were not taxed or otherwise fixed; 459 in which costs were refused to both parties; and 1237 in which the amount of costs was entered in process—the sum total of costs entered in process in these cases being £15,331. There were 2044 applications to Sheriffs under the Bankruptcy Act, 711 under the Poor Law Acts, 1914 under the Lunacy Acts, 592 under the Registration of Births, etc., Acts, 462 under the Master and Servants Act, 528 petitions for service of heirs, 41 appointments of tutors or curators to minors, 140 applications by prisoners for aliment, 116 applications under the Sanitary Act, 57 under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 109 for *fugæ* warrants, 16 for lawburrows, 1157 for admission to the Poor Roll, 37 petitions for admission, suspension, etc., of sheriff-officers, and 1245 miscellaneous applications. In the Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts in 1874, there were 11 reponing at the pursuer's instance, 87 at the defender's instance. Of the 796 primary decrees *in foro*, 58 were pronounced by the Sheriff, and 738 by the Sheriff substitute. The number of appeals from the Sheriff-substitute to the Sheriff was 177. The decision appealed against was affirmed in 119 cases and altered in 42, while 9 appeals were withdrawn, and 7 were in dependence at the end of the year. 6 appeals to the Court of Session were in dependence during the year. While the total number of causes in dependence in the Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts was 3886 in 1874, it was 3530 in 1873, 3451 in 1872, 3649 in 1871, 3880 in 1870, and 3679 on the average of the five years 1870-74.

In the Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts in 1874, there were 44 reponings of decrees in absence pronounced in the previous year at the defender's instance, and 26 of the decrees were reversed; there were 8 such reponings at the pursuer's instance, whereof 7 were decided in his favour. On decrees pronounced within the year, there were 479 reponings at the defender's

instance, and 256 of the decrees were reversed; there were 223 at the pursuer's instance, whereof 153 were decided in his favour. Of the £149,951 claimed in causes decided by decree, £125,012 consisted of claims for debt, £9692 of claims of damages, £12,291 of claims made in sequestrations for rent, and £2954 of other claims. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts was 44,529 in 1874, it was 43,455 in 1873, 43,196 in 1872, 48,705 in 1871, 60,976 in 1870, and 48,172 on the average of the five years 1870-74.

In the Justice of Peace Small Debt Courts in 1874, the number of sales under poindings was 56; the principal sums in the decrees of poindings amounted to £135; the total expenses in decrees of poindings to £8; the free proceeds of the sales to £140; the total expenses of poinding and sale to £49; and the total of surpluses paid to debtors to £8, 2s. 1d. Of the £23,785 claimed in causes decided by decree, £23,071 consisted of claims of debt, £219 of claims of damages, and £494 of other claims. While the total number of causes in Justice of Peace Courts was 13,620 in 1874, it was 12,340 in 1873, 12,873 in 1872, and was returned (but the returns were defective) as 15,271 in 1871—the average for the four years 1871-74 being 13,526.

V. JUDICIAL RECORDS.

(1.) *Bankruptcy.*

The number of bankruptcies in dependence in Scotland at the commencement of 1873 was 2504; the number awarded during the year, 391—total, 2895. The number awarded was 589 in 1869, 555 in 1870, 490 in 1871, and 368 in 1872—the average number for the five years 1869-73 being 478. The total number in dependence was 2665 in 1869, 2849 in 1870, 2898 in 1871, and 2869 in 1872. The number disposed of in 1873 was 368, viz., wound up by final division and discharge, 232; by composition, 95; by deed of arrangement, 17; otherwise wound up, 24. The time between awarding and discharge in 10 cases was 6 months and under a year; in 32, a year and under 18 months; in 46, 18 months and under 2 years; in 65, 2 years and under 3; in 33, 3 years and under 4; in 20, 4 years and under 5; and in 27 it was 5 years and upwards. Of the 389 bankruptcies awarded during the year, 75 were awarded by the Court of Session and remitted to Sheriffs, and 314 were awarded by Sheriffs of counties. The number of the bankrupts was 419, 364 in sole sequestrations, and 55 in joint or partnership sequestrations. Of the bankrupts, 284 were traders, 58 manufacturers, 38 farmers, 9 lawyers, 4 medical practitioners, 2 clergymen, 13 persons not acquiring income by any occupation, and 11 were of other descriptions.

In the 232 bankruptcies concluded by final division and discharge in 1873, the amount of gross estates, per inventory and valuation by trustees, was £497,956; the amount of the debts was £786,230; the amount of the sums recovered by the trustees during the period of the sequestration was £299,347. The amount of expenses was £60,284 (viz., allowances to bankrupts, £452; trustees' commission, £14,812; law expenses, £23,090; miscellaneous expenses—ordinary, £9081; extraordinary, £12,848); the amount divided among the creditors was £236,895 (viz., secured creditors, £88,238; unsecured, £148,656); the amount of surpluses paid to bankrupts or their representatives, less overpayments made by trustees in certain sequestrations, was £2167.

(2.) *Judicial Factories.*

The number of bonds by judicial factors at 30th September 1872 was 825; in the year ended 30th September 1873, 104 bonds were lodged with the accountant—total bonds in accountant's hands during the year ended 30th September 1873, 929; of which 423 were by factors *loco tutoris*, 61 by factors *loco absentis*, 445 by *curators bonis*. The total number of bonds in 1869 was 947, in 1870, 944, in 1871, 938, and in 1872, 929. In 1872-73, in 81 cases the estate was wound up or the appointment recalled; the number of bonds

remaining at 30th September 1873 was therefore 848. In the year ended 30th September 1873, 795 accounts were rendered; 129 were not rendered, as not being due before the end of the year; 5 due at that date had not been rendered within the year. The personal estate dealt with by judicial factors, ascertained and estimated, was £1,970,997; the value of the lands and heritages under their charge was not ascertained. The revenue of estates under judicial factors in the year ended 30th September 1873 was £196,512; the expenditure was £97,774, viz., on maintenance of wards, £77,749; factors' commission, £11,852; accountants' charges, £1441; law agents' charges, £6730.

(3.) *Judicial Records kept at Edinburgh.*

At the Register of Deeds Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1874 was 3053. 2750 were entries of original writs, and 303 second extracts of writs previously recorded. The fees received amounted to £3053.

The number of protests entered in the Register of Protests on bills and notes in 1874 was 367. The number of persons protested against was 491; the amount of the sums protested for was £39,379.

The number of certificates entered under 31 and 32 Vict. c. 54, in "The Register for English and Irish Judgments," in 1874, was 15. 13 came from England and 2 from Ireland.

At the Register of Adjudications Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1874 was 536. 375 were mercantile sequestrations, 1 for recovery of specified debts, the amount being £396, and 160 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £41.

At the Register of Inhibitions Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1874 was 936. 403 were mercantile sequestrations; 154 were for recovery of specified debts; and 379 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £153.

At the Register of Hornings Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1874 was 192. The fees received amounted to £29.

The business which passed through the Bill-Chamber in 1874 was as follows:—Suspensions, interdicts, and liberations, 200; bills for loosing arrestments, 10; petitions for sequestration under Bankrupt Act, 106; other petitions, etc., 66. Total, 382.

At the Register of Sasines Office, the number of entries in the presentment book during the year 1874 was 26,114. The amount of fees received was £25,006.

The whole number of registered protests on bills and notes (including those entered in the General Register stated above, along with those entered in district registers) in 1874 was 1958. The whole number of persons protested against was 2337; the amount of the sums protested for was £108,278.

PRISONS.

The "Thirty-sixth Report on Prisons in Scotland, being (in continuation of the Reports of the late General Board of Prisons) the Fourteenth Annual Report of the Managers appointed under the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act 1860," is for the year 1874.

The Report states that the accommodation for prisoners at the disposal of the Managers is now as follows: in the Penal Department of the General Prison at Perth, cells for 341 males and 372 females—713 persons, exclusive of the Hospitals, which, on an average, contained, in 1874, 11 males and 18 females—29 persons—in all, accommodation for 742 persons; in the Lunatic Department of the General Prison, accommodation for 40 males and 18 females—58 persons; in the prison of Ayr, cells for 80 female convicts; in the prison of Paisley, cells for 62 male convicts. The daily average number of prisoners throughout the year was, in the Penal Department of the General Prison, 689 (343

males and 346 females); in the Lunatic Department, 51 (39 males and 12 females); in Ayr prison, 76 females; in Paisley prison, 50 males—in all, 866 (432 males and 434 females).

The buildings of the General Prison required to be improved by the construction of new hospital wards for male prisoners and some minor works, and the Managers had recommended the construction of such works to the Home Secretary. No new works had been erected in the prison since 1866.

The pressure on the accommodation at the disposal of the Managers had during the year been such as to necessitate the detention in local prisons for two months of prisoners to be removed to the General Prison. It is stated that a proposal to lessen the pressure on the Lunatic Department, by conditionally discharging some of those placed at Her Majesty's disposal on the ground of lunacy into specially licensed houses, made by the Lunacy Commissioners, was at the end of the year under the consideration of the Home Secretary.

It is stated that a new office, that of deputy-governor, has been created in the prison. Formerly, in the governor's absence, his duties were discharged by the steward.

The daily average of criminal prisoners in the prisons of Scotland, which had been 2721 (1619 males, and 1102 females) in 1873, was 2849 (1760 males, and 1089 females) in 1874. With casual fluctuations, there has been since the year 1861 an increase in the average daily number of prisoners—from 2083 in that year to 2849 in 1874. In 1849, however, the average daily number had been 3143. In each of the four quarters of the year 1874, there was an increase on the numbers in the corresponding quarter of 1873. The ratio of this increase, however, showed a tendency to abate towards the end of the year, in so far that, while the average number for the quarter ending in September exceeded that of the corresponding quarter for 1873 by 266, the increase for the quarter ending in December 1874 showed an increase over the corresponding quarter in 1873 of only 116. This modification was effected on the female side, where there was a virtual decrease of 51; there was an increase on the male side of 167. The average daily number of criminal prisoners was, during the quarter ended 31st March 1875, 2804 (1790 males, and 1014 females), being an increase of 52 upon the corresponding period of 1874; during the quarter ended 30th June 1875, it was 2991 (1848 males, and 1143 females), being an increase of 159 on the corresponding period of 1874; during the quarter ended 30th September 1875, it was 3093 (1937 males, and 1156 females), being an increase of 58 on the corresponding quarter of 1874.

A new code of rules for prisons under the administration of county boards in Scotland was adopted and certified by the Secretary of State on the 18th of March 1874, and came into force on the 1st July following.

The Stipendiary Manager of Prisons, besides his duties as superintendent of the collection and publication of the Judicial Statistics of Scotland, is now also charged with the registration of Habitual Criminals, under the Prevention of Crimes Act, 1871.

The expenditure under the charge of the Prison Managers was, in 1874, as follows: management expenses, £1477; General Prison at Perth, expenses (exclusive of fuel, light, rates, and taxes, now paid by the Board of Works), £17,129; maintenance of female convicts in Ayr prison, £2091; maintenance of male convicts in Paisley prison, £1345; escort and conveyance of prisoners, £1495; total, £23,599. The amount of the Parliamentary grant received by the department in 1874 was £23,685. The outlay for material and implements for the manufacturing department of the General Prison, in 1874, was £5396. The amount received at the General Prison from manufactured goods was £7853, and the amount received on account of prisoners' labour in the prisons of Ayr and Paisley, and other miscellaneous receipts, was £749.

POLICE.

The Seventeenth Report upon the Constabulary of Scotland is for the year ending 15th March 1875. The Inspector of Constabulary, the Hon. Charles Carnegie, reports that the police of all the counties of Scotland is in an efficient state, and that of all the burghs, except the following, Annan, Ardrossan, Blairgowrie, Kelso, Kirriemuir, Maxwelltown, Pulteneytown, and Galashiels. The most striking instances of inefficiency are Ardrossan, where there is only one man, of whose reports the procurator-fiscal refuses to take cognizance; and Maxwelltown, where, owing to the resignation of the former superintendent, there was for some time absolutely no police. Pulteneytown is also in a most anomalous position; it has no local magistracy, and it has been held that the county of Caithness is legally responsible for any damage done by rioting in the town, yet, owing to a local Act of Parliament, this place is able to maintain a separate, independent, inefficient police force, and to free itself from county assessments. It is part of the parliamentary burgh of Wick (now amalgamated with the county), and ought to be united absolutely with that burgh. The burgh of Galashiels was in the previous year reported as efficient, and its police establishment was at the date of the report up to its former strength. In the month of August 1874, however, the Police Commissioners ordered that the constables should relieve the scavengers from the work of extinguishing the street lamps; and as the men refused to do this, three men were dismissed, and the others were permitted to resign without being called upon to work out their month's notice. Thus, by the action of the Police Commissioners in calling on the men to do work other than police duty, the burgh was left in an unprotected state, and though in a month's time the force was again up to its full numbers, yet during that period the force was in an inefficient state. [Since the date of the Report, Galashiels has been restored to the list of burghs whose police force is efficient.] The burgh of Haddington during the year united with the county.

During the year 1874-75, the police force of the counties was increased by 14 men (including 3 appointed for the burgh of Haddington), and that of the burghs by 60 men. There were 209 changes in the county forces and 568 in the burghs, as compared with 213 and 492 in the previous year, being an increase on the whole of 72. During the year there had, however, been rather less difficulty than before in getting suitable men to fill vacancies, and the new men were in education and appearance superior to the recruits of the two previous years. Captain Carnegie again calls attention to the system of swearing in gamekeepers as special constables, practised in the counties of Perth and Renfrew. He again presses the importance of providing superannuation allowances for constables.

The circulars prohibiting the employment of the police as sanitary inspectors having been cancelled, many of the police have been re-appointed to these offices. There still remain some appointments, which, though not included amongst those recognised in the Home Office Circular, as duties which may be performed by the police, are held by police officers in some of the burghs. There are, especially in the burghs, extra duties, such as attending places of public amusement, public meetings, etc., which are undertaken by the ordinary police force, the system of remuneration for which requires some consideration, especially as the Secretary of State's rules for the government of constables only apply indirectly to burghs. Captain Carnegie thinks that when there is any legislation on police matters, the burghs should be put on the same footing as the counties with regard to the enforcement of these rules.

The total number of vagrants, tinkers, and unlicensed hawkers reported by the police in the Scotch counties during the year 1874 was 40,817, an increase of 139 as compared with the previous year. The total number of pedlars' certificates for the year 1874 was, in counties, 13,430 (3383 granted and 10,047 endorsed), and in burghs, 8163 (3368 granted and 4795 endorsed). 67 applications for certificates were refused in counties, and the same number in burghs.

Police Force in Counties.—The following Table shows the numbers of the police force in each county of Scotland, the amount of population to each constable, and the yearly pay of the chief constable:—

In addition to the numbers of the police given above, the River Tweed Commissioners pay for 27 constables in the counties of Berwick, Roxburgh, and Selkirk, and 12 constables are paid for by other fishery commissioners. There are also 13 constables paid for by companies and private persons, in terms of the 7th section of the General Police Act. In the burghs there are 161 constables employed by Harbour Boards and 7 employed by companies or individuals.

BIRTHS, DEATHS, AND MARRIAGES.

The Twentieth Annual Report of the Registrar-General contains statistics of the Births, Deaths, and Marriages registered in Scotland during the year 1874.

The following Table shows the number of Births, of Deaths, and of Marriages registered in each Registration County, and in each Group of Registration Counties, in Scotland, in the year 1874, and also in the years 1872 and 1873, distinguishing the number of males and the number of females for the year 1874. For the population of the Registration Counties according to the Census of 1871, see Almanac for 1873, page 320. In most cases it differs somewhat from the population of the civil or proper counties, by reason that parishes which lie partly within one county, partly within another, are held, for the purposes of the Registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, to lie wholly within the county in which the parish church is situated.

The number of *Births* registered in 1874 (123,795, or 357 for every 10,000 of the estimated population) was the largest ever recorded in Scotland, and, no doubt, the exceptionally high marriage-rates of 1872 and 1873 materially contributed to it. As in 1873, the birth-rate was higher in the group of large towns than in the group of principal towns; and, indeed, since 1870, the birth-rate has been increasing in the former group, and, on the whole, diminishing in the latter. In the large towns it was 406 per 10,000 persons in 1873, and rose to 429 per 10,000 persons in 1874; in the principal towns it was 373 per 10,000 persons in the former year, and 375 per 10,000 persons in the latter. As usual, it was in 1874 lowest in the insular-rural districts (2·64 per cent. of the population), next lowest in the mainland-rural districts (3·15 per cent.), while the small towns (with 3·71 per cent. of births) came next in the ascending order. Of the 123,795 children whose births were registered in 1874, 63,642 were males, and 60,153 were females, so that there were born 105·8 males to every 100 females. This is not above the usual proportion. The proportion appears to vary considerably in the several groups of districts. Thus, in the large towns the proportion was, in 1874, 104·8 males to every 100 females, whereas in 1873 it had been 107 males to every 100 females; and in the insular districts it was 110 males to every 100 females in 1874, while it was only 107 males to every 100 females in 1873. These two groups contain between them less than a seventh of the population of Scotland, and the smallness of

the population under observation may account for such fluctuations. The greatest proportion of births occurred in June, when, on an average, 360 were registered per day, and the smallest proportion in August, when the average number registered per day fell to 320.

10,837, or 8·7 per cent., of the births were illegitimate. In 21 counties the illegitimate births constituted at least six and not more than twelve per cent. of the total births; and in eight counties the rate exceeded 12 per cent. Banffshire, with 17·1 per cent. of its births illegitimate, furnishing the highest proportion.

The *Death-rate* in 1874 (233 deaths per 10,000 persons) was unusually high—far above the mean rate of the previous ten years; to find a heavier mortality it is necessary to go back to 1864, when there were 236 deaths per 10,000 persons. The unusual mortality was due partly to the prevalence in some localities of scarlatina and other destructive zymotic diseases, but perhaps even more to the trying cold of the last month of the year. The death-rate varied considerably in the different registration groups—from 283 per 10,000 persons in the principal towns, to 168 per 10,000 persons in the insular-rural districts; but in every group it exceeded the previous year's average.

The number of *Marriages* registered in 1874 (26,247, or 76 per 10,000 persons) was below the number in the previous year (when the highest proportion of marriages ever recorded, 78 per 10,000 persons, occurred), but it exceeded the number registered in any other year. The frequency of marriage varies exceedingly in the different registration districts, and, in the Report, it is stated to be beyond all question connected with the degree of

density or massing of the population in each. There were, for every 10,000 persons, in each 92 marriages in the principal towns, 86 in the large towns, 72 in the small towns, 65 in the mainland-rural districts, and only 47 in the insular-rural districts.

Of the children born in those towns (42,641 in number), 21,864 were males, and 20,777 were females, being at the rate of 105·2 boys for every 100 girls. The birth-rate (375 per 10,000 persons), though higher than it was in 1873 (when it was 373 per 10,000 persons), was decidedly below the average of the previous ten years (386·5 per 10,000 persons). The birth-rate varied less than usual in the different towns. It was lowest in Edinburgh (323 per 10,000 persons); and highest in Greenock (425 per 10,000 persons). The proportion of illegitimate births was lowest in Greenock (4·9 per cent. of the births), and highest in Aberdeen (12 per cent.).

The death-rate of those towns in 1874 was 283 per 10,000 persons, which was the mean death-rate of the previous ten years. But the mortality was by no means proportionately distributed between the towns. For every 10,000 persons in each, 222 died in Aberdeen, 236 in Edinburgh, 249 in Leith, 256 in Greenock, 264 in Perth, 286 in Paisley, 312 in Glasgow, and 316 in Dundee. The average death-rate of the previous ten years was exceeded, in 1874 in Perth, Leith, Glasgow, and Dundee; while the death-rate fell short of it in Aberdeen, Edinburgh, Paisley, and Greenock.

Of the persons who died in the eight towns, 16,237 were males and 15,875 were females. Of the persons who died, there were, under five years of age, 32·8 per cent. in Perth, 34·6 per cent. in Aberdeen, 34·7 per cent. in Edinburgh, 35·2 per cent. in Paisley, 37·7 per cent. in Greenock, 40·3 per cent. in Leith, 45·3 per cent. in Glasgow, and 47·7 per cent. in Dundee. Of

every 1000 children under five years of age in each, there died in 1874, 54·8 in Aberdeen, 64·8 in Greenock, 66·6 in Edinburgh, 72·4 in Perth, 74·9 in Leith, 75·8 in Paisley, 103·4 in Glasgow, and 108·2 in Dundee.

Appended to the Report on Births, Deaths, and Marriages is the Ninth Report by the Registrar-General on Vaccination in Scotland. The Report shows what proportion of the children whose births were registered in 1873 were vaccinated in terms of the Act 26 and 27 Vict. c. 108. From the vaccination returns it appears that of 119,810 children born in 1873, 87·786 per cent. were successfully vaccinated; 0·93 per cent. had their vaccination postponed from ill health or other causes, 0·135 per cent. were found insusceptible of vaccination from constitutional insusceptibility, 0·033 per cent. insusceptible from having had an attack of smallpox, and 0·136 insusceptible from their mothers or nurses having previously vaccinated them. 8·786 per cent. died before vaccination could be performed; while 2·194 per cent. (2629 persons) were removed from the districts before vaccination could be enforced, or were otherwise unaccounted for. Deducting from the children born during the year the number who died before they could be vaccinated, it appears that, of the living children, 109,283 in number, 96·243 per cent. (105,177 persons) were successfully vaccinated, while 1·018 per cent. had their vaccination postponed. Adding the number of those found to be insusceptible of vaccination (364), and the number of those whose vaccination was postponed (1113), to the number successfully vaccinated, it appears that 2·406 per cent. of the children born in 1873 who could be vaccinated escaped vaccination. No doubt, also, some of the children who are unaccounted for have been vaccinated. The proportion of children who, by being removed from the district of their birth, or from any other unknown cause, were not vaccinated, or not known to be vaccinated, was 2·710 in 1864, 2·528 in 1865, 2·557 in 1866, 2·370 in 1867, 2·363 in 1868, 2·683 in 1869, 2·395 in 1870, 2·438 in 1871, 2·164 in 1872, and 2·406 per cent. in 1873.

The number of deaths from smallpox was 1309 in 1855; 1306 in 1856; 845 in 1857; 332 in 1858; 682 in 1859; 1495 in 1860; 766 in 1861; 426 in 1862; 1646 in 1863; 1741 in 1864; 383 in 1865; 200 in 1866; 100 in 1867; 15 in 1868; 64 in 1869; 114 in 1870; 1442 for 1871; and is estimated at 2946 for 1872, 895 for 1873, and 682 for 1874.

The Report insists on the importance of reducing the period within which vaccination should be performed from six to four months. It is shown that in the eight principal towns in 1874, of those who died of smallpox (356 in

number), 25.00 per cent. were under five years of age, 30.62 per cent. between five and twenty, 43.82 per cent. between twenty and sixty, and 0.56 per cent. above sixty years of age. The Vaccination Act came into force in 1864. In the ten years 1855-64, of 5415 persons who died of smallpox, 4062, or 75.03 per cent., were under five years of age. The inference is drawn that vaccination, though it has failed to put an end to smallpox epidemics, has vastly diminished their mortality among those who are protected by vaccination. It is suggested that were everybody thus protected, the disease would be nearly unknown.

It is observed that, owing to the defective state of the registration of births, deaths, and marriages in Ireland, the foregoing figures are only an approximation to the real numbers.

INLAND REVENUE.

The Seventeenth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Inland Revenue on the Inland Revenue is for the year ended 31st March 1874. The receipts for the year showed a net decrease upon those of the preceding year of £65,434. There was an increase of £1,211,520 on excise, derived mainly from spirits and beer; an increase of £499,569 on stamps (to which the legacy and succession duties contributed largely); a decrease of £14,577 on taxes; and a decrease of £1,761,946 from income tax, consequent upon a reduction of the rate of duty.

I. EXCISE DUTIES.

The following Table exhibits the net receipt of the duties of excise in the United Kingdom in the years ended 31st March 1873 and 1874. The duties on railways and race-horses are levied in Great Britain only, and the duty on chicory in England only.

Spirits.—The number of gallons of spirits charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the year 1872-73 was 28,425,563 gallons (viz., England, 11,972,297; Scotland, 8,997,939; Ireland, 7,455,327); in the year 1873-74 it was 30,112,579 (viz., England, 13,105,068; Scotland, 9,293,539; Ireland, 7,713,972). The number of gallons consumed as beverage in the United Kingdom in 1872-73 was 27,556,234 gallons (viz., England, 14,855,641; Scotland, 6,610,059; Ireland, 6,090,534); in 1873-74 it was 29,308,989 (viz., England, 16,222,329; Scotland, 6,910,159; Ireland, 6,176,501). The increase of consumption in the latter year in the United Kingdom was therefore 1,752,755 gallons, or 6·36 per cent. In England it was 1,366,688 gallons (9·19 per cent.); in Scotland it was 300,100 gallons (4·54 per cent.); in Ireland, 85,967 gallons (1·41 per cent.). The quantity consumed per head of the population in 1873-74 was, in England, 0·694 gallons; in Scotland, 2·014 gallons; in Ireland, 1·155 gallons; in the United Kingdom, 0·912 gallons. The quantity of foreign spirits unenumerated, not sweetened, not being brandy, rum, or Geneva, entered for home consumption in the United Kingdom, was 555,644 gallons in 1872-73, and 731,503 in 1873-74. The falling-off which occurred in the former year was about made up in 1873-74. The quantity of British spirits exported from the United Kingdom was, in 1872-73, 1,858,511 gallons, and in 1873-74, 1,542,252 gallons. This decrease is owing to a smaller exportation to the West Coast of Africa and to Portugal. The export was about the average of the preceding six years. The increase in the quantity of spirits charged with duty in 1873-74 was, in the United Kingdom, 1,687,016 gallons, or 5·93 per cent. More than five-eighths of the increase occurred in England. The increase was 9·46 per cent. in England, 3·28 per cent. in Scotland, and 3·46 per cent. in Ireland. The amount of duty received in respect of foreign spirits and wines stored in excise warehouses was also considerably in excess of the preceding year, the increase amounting to £83,000 in the case of spirits, and to about £30,000 in the case of wines. It was in England, spirits £310,715, wines £107,942—total £418,657; in Scotland, spirits £50,101, wines £8629—total £58,730; in Ireland, spirits £53,846, wines £17,875—total £71,721; in the United Kingdom, spirits £414,663, wines £134,447—total £549,110. The amount received in the United Kingdom in the preceding year was, spirits £331,607, wines £104,491—total £436,099. The quantity of spirits methylated in the year 1872-73 was 1,071,949 gallons (England 634,345, Scotland 437,604); in the year 1873-74 it was 1,099,699 (England 671,243, Scotland, 428,456). The tendency towards an increase in the quantity of spirits deposited duty free in bonded stores continued in 1873-74, the amount so deposited increasing from 22,557,104 gallons in 1872-73 to 25,295,073 gallons. The number of detections of illicit distillation in the year 1873-74 was 814 (England 12, Scotland 6, Ireland 796).

Malt.—The number of bushels of malt charged with duty in the United Kingdom was, in the year 1872-73, 57,913,785, and in 1873-74, 59,437,976, showing an increase in the latter year of 2,224,191 bushels, or 3·88 per cent. The quantity of malt made in the United Kingdom, free of duty for distillation and exportation, was, in the former year, 6,171,006 bushels (viz., for exportation 32,003, for distillation 6,139,003 bushels), and in the latter year, 6,230,355 bushels (for exportation 29,485, for distillation 6,200,870 bushels). The quantity of malt exported on drawback, or used in beer exported on drawback, in the

United Kingdom, in the year 1872-73, was 1,777,035 bushels (viz., malt exported 407,754, used in beer exported 1,369,281 bushels); in 1873-74 it was 1,965,314 bushels (viz., malt exported 513,303, used in beer 1,452,011 bushels). The quantity of malt charged by weight in the United Kingdom in 1872-73 was 3,981,905 bushels, the average weight per bushel being 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ lbs., the quantity charged by gauge 4,209,795 bushels, and the duty surrendered £30,907; the quantity charged by weight in 1873-74 was 3,065,247 bushels, the average weight being 49 $\frac{7}{8}$ lbs., the quantity charged by gauge 3,267,663 bushels, and the duty surrendered £27,452. Though the quantity of malt brought to charge increased in 1873-74, the rate of increase fell off, which is attributed chiefly to the scarcity of good malting barley. The cause of the increased shipment of malt on drawback to the colonies is presumed to be the failure of attempts to produce native barley fit for malting, and the high price of imported beer.

Sugar used in Brewing.—The quantity of sugar used in brewing in the United Kingdom was 46,714,253 lbs. in 1872-73, and 68,889,131 lbs. in 1873-74. The increased use of sugar in brewing is attributed to the high price of malt.

Home-made Sugar.—The quantity of home-made sugar charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the year 1872-73 was 62,674 cwts. (viz., made from beet-root 7560 cwts., from starch 55,114 cwts.); in 1873-74 it was 83,690 cwts. (viz., made from beet-root 8442 cwts., from starch 75,248 cwts.).

Chicory.—The quantity of chicory charged with duty in 1872-73 was 9131 cwts.; in 1873-74 it was 7895 cwts.—decrease, 1236 cwts. The growing of chicory is now confined to the neighbourhood of York.

Licenses.—The numbers of licenses issued in Great Britain in the year ended 31st December 1873, were as follows:—Male servants, 269,994 (Scotland, 23,034), duty, £202,495; carriages with four wheels and weighing four cwts., 148,916 (Scotland, 13,708), duty, £312,724; carriages with less than four wheels, or weighing less than four cwts., 285,694 (Scotland, 22,984), duty, £214,270; horses and mules, 864,521 (Scotland, 77,537), duty, £453,873; horse-dealers, 1626 (Scotland, 159), duty, £20,325; armorial bearings on carriages, 20,185 (Scotland, 1572), duty, £42,388; armorial bearings otherwise used, 39,051 (Scotland, 3078), duty, £41,004; dogs, 1,176,272 (Scotland, 135,632), duty, £294,065. The number of game licenses issued in the United Kingdom in the year 1873-74 was 65,846 (Scotland, 6662), duty, £184,500; the number of licenses to deal in game was 2826 (Scotland, 121), duty, £5652; and the number of gun licenses was 132,036 (Scotland, 11,872), duty, £66,018.

II. STAMPS.

The net receipt from stamps in the year ended 31st March 1874 was £10,497,601; in the previous financial year it was £9,998,032. The principal items in the year 1873-74 were as follows:—Deeds and other instruments, £1,291,001; bills of exchange and promissory notes, £985,023; probates of wills, letters of administration, and testamentary inventories, £2,065,210 (Scotland, £188,018); legacy and succession duty, £3,413,712 (Scotland, £365,723); receipts, drafts, and other Id. Inland Revenue stamps, £733,158; bankers' notes and composition for do., £142,922 (Scotland, £26,275); licenses and certificates, £135,595 (Scotland, £28,061); fee stamps, £576,791. There was an increase under all the more important heads of duty.

* The duties levied on racehorses are tabulated for Great Britain only.

III. LAND AND ASSESSED TAXES.

The produce of the land tax was £1,095,946 in the year 1872-73, and £1,071,991 in the year 1873-74, a decrease of £23,955. The produce of the inhabited house duty was £1,243,083 in 1872-73, and £1,252,464 in 1873-74, an increase of £9381. The total produce of land and assessed taxes in 1873-74 was £2,324,456. In 1872-73 it was £2,339,033. Net decrease in 1873-74, £14,577. The annual value of houses charged with house duty for 1872-73 (the last year for which the accounts were fully made up), was, in England, £39,725,713, and in Scotland, £2,298,014. The value of messuages charged under the Property Tax Acts (Schedule A), in the same year, was, England, £77,831,983; Scotland, £7,876,487. The house duty therefore affects little more than half the property charged in Schedule A. This arises from properties not being charged, or being exempt from house duty.

IV. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

The net receipts from property and income tax in the years ended 31st March 1873 and 1874, appropriated to schedules, are shown in the following Table:—

The tax was levied at the rate of 4d. in the pound in 1872-73, and at 3d. in the pound in 1873-74. The assessments for the year ended 5th April 1873 exhibited an increase of £18,782,000 over those of the preceding year, the amounts being, for 1871-72, £434,803,000, and for 1872-73, £453,585,000. The increase was, in England, £15,658,000 or 4·2 per cent.; in Scotland, £2,524,000 or 6·94 per cent.; and in Ireland, £600,000 or 2·32 per cent. Under Schedule A there was an increase of £1,805,000, distributed as follows:—England, £1,376,000; Scotland, £388,000; Ireland, £41,000. Under the head of lands there was an increase of £45,000 in England, an increase of £37,000 in Scotland, and an increase of £1000 in Ireland; under the head of houses there was an increase of £1,356,000 in England, of £346,000 in Scotland, and of £32,000 in Ireland. Under Schedule B there was an increase of £33,000 in England, of £38,000 in Scotland, and a decrease of £21,000 in Ireland. Under Schedule D there was an increase in the assessments of £21,725,000 in England, £3,248,000 in Scotland, and £991,000 in Ireland. The increase in the assessments on trades and professions was £14,091,000 or 11·52 per cent. in England, £2,102,000 or 16·24 per cent. in Scotland, and £722,000 or 11·85 per cent. in Ireland.

In the year 1872-73, 369,548 persons—315,462 in England, 38,008 in Scotland, and 16,078 in Ireland—claimed abatement of taxation in respect of incomes under £300 a year, being 77,967 more than in the preceding year (attributable to extension of the area of abatement); and the amount of income exempted from taxation in consequence of the abatement was, in England, £25,196,995; in Scotland, £3,017,654; in Ireland, £1,283,970—total, £29,498,619. It is stated that about 10,269 persons obtained repayment of duty under the same provision of the law, and that this makes an addition of £821,500 to the amount of income relieved from duty.

The net receipt of property and income tax levied in Scotland was £605,332 in 1872-73, and £494,173 in 1873-74. The total obtained from land and assessed taxes and property and income tax in Scotland was £722,898 in 1872-73, and £613,682 in 1873-74.

The net produce of income tax for each penny in the pound, according to the net amount of the assessments, after deducting sums discharged on various

grounds, or irrecoverable, was, £1,614,761 in 1870-71 (the rate of duty being 4d.); £1,674,342 in 1871-72 (the rate of duty being 6d.); and £1,757,537 in 1872-73 (the rate of duty being 4d.). In 1867-68 (the rate of duty being 5d.), it was £1,451,342. It is stated to have constantly occurred that reductions of the rate of duty have not been attended by proportional decreases in the produce of the tax.

When this sheet was prepared for the press, the report of the Commissioners of Inland Revenue for the year ended 31st March 1875 had not been issued. From other sources we give the principal facts relative to the produce of the Inland Revenue during that year. The net receipt (after deducting drawbacks, repayments, etc.) was:—Excise, £27,254,132; stamps, £10,547,729; land tax and house duty, £2,459,132; income tax, £4,315,132—total, £44,576,127. The net receipt from excise was made up as follows:—Spirits, £14,895,768; malt £7,746,740; railways, £629,736; licenses, £3,499,756; racehorses, £5801; chicory, £3200; sugar, £473,129. The net receipt from stamps comprised the following items:—Deeds, etc., £1,995,792; probates of wills and letters of administration, £2,153,797; bills of exchange, bankers' notes, and composition for duty on bills and notes, £1,044,496; receipt and other ld. stamps, £744,301; legacies and successions, £3,400,375; fee stamps (Register House, Scotland, £37,777), £586,971. The net receipt from land-tax was £1,078,362; from house-duty, £1,380,769. The net produce of the income tax as distributed between the different schedules is approximately stated as follows:—Schedule A, £1,407,824; B, £175,745; C, £374,680; D, £2,112,563; E, £244,320.

SPIRITS.

The number of gallons of proof spirits distilled in the United Kingdom in 1874 was 35,352,232, viz., in England, 9,670,525; in Scotland, 16,300,161; in Ireland, 9,381,546. The number of gallons on which duty was paid was 30,690,051, viz., in England, 13,482,071; in Scotland, 9,322,198; in Ireland, 7,885,782; the amount of duty so paid (at ten shillings a gallon) was £15,345,027, viz., in England, £6,741,037; in Scotland, £4,661,098; in Ireland, £3,942,890. The number of gallons consumed was 29,875,401, viz., in England, 16,662,802; in Scotland, 7,013,581; in Ireland, 6,199,018. The number of gallons removed from England to Scotland was 39,742 duty free, 29,235 duty paid; from England to Ireland, 100,710 duty free, 32,438 duty paid; from Scotland to England, 2,065,945 duty free, 2,171,486 duty paid; from Scotland to Ireland, 821,652 duty free, 29,652 duty paid; from Ireland to England, 1,128,934 duty free, 1,553,523 duty paid; from Ireland to Scotland, 14,760 duty free, 190,854 duty paid. The number of gallons delivered duty paid from distillers' stocks was 5,429,873, viz., in England, 3,954,737; in Scotland, 1,356,581; in Ireland, 118,555. The

number of gallons put into bond in the year ended 31st December 1874 was 29,431,939, viz., in England, 5,510,255; in Scotland, 14,760,572; in Ireland, 9,161,112. The number of gallons in bonded stores on the 31st December 1874 was 26,249,079, viz., in England, 4,014,057; in Scotland, 7,817,493; in Ireland, 14,417,529. The number of gallons permitted from distillers' stocks and duty-free warehouses for exportation in 1874 was 1,313,017, viz., in England, 484,365; in Scotland, 662,566; in Ireland, 166,086. These figures show the spirits exported as merchandise, for use as ships' stores, and mixed with foreign spirits, as furnished by the Customs Department. The quantities permitted from distillers' stocks do not show the export trade of the country, as spirits permitted to customs warehouses may now be taken out for home consumption. The number of gallons of British compounded spirits permitted from rectifiers' stocks to customs warehouses for exportation, ships' stores, and home consumption in 1874, was 368,123, viz., in England, 257,920; in Scotland, 105,727; in Ireland, 4476.

The supply of methylic alcohol by the Excise was discontinued from the 1st January 1869. The number of gallons of methylated spirits sent out by persons licensed to sell the same in 1874, under 18 and 19 Vict. c. 38, was 830,365, viz., in England, 556,431; in Scotland, 263,916; in Ireland, 10,018.

The number of gallons, at proof strength, of foreign and colonial spirits received into rectifiers' stocks for rectification in 1874 was 556,237, viz., 215,909 gallons of foreign spirits and 340,328 gallons of colonial spirits. In England 178,436 gallons foreign spirits, and 339,872 gallons colonial spirits, were received into rectifiers' stocks; in Scotland, 37,473 gallons foreign spirits and 456 gallons colonial. 603,382 gallons of proof British brandy were permitted out of rectifiers' stocks, viz., in England, 560,373 gallons; in Scotland, 42,246 gallons; in Ireland, 763 gallons.

EDUCATION.

The Report of the Committee of Privy Council on Education for England and Wales, dated 16th June 1875, shows that in England and Wales in the year ending 31st August 1874, 12,167 day-schools to which annual grants were made, were visited by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools. These schools contained 17,646 departments under separate teachers, and furnished accommodation for 2,871,826 scholars. There were on the registers of those schools the names of 2,497,602 children, of whom 916,591 were under seven years of age, 1,498,138 were between seven and thirteen, and 82,873 were above thirteen. 2,034,007 scholars were present on the day of inspection, while 1,678,759 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 1,457,075 having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to bring grants to their schools, 444,007 without individual examination, and 1,013,068 on passing a satisfactory examination in reading, writing, and arithmetic. 857,611 were actually presented for such examination, and 508,232 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects. The inspectors also visited 917 schools which do not fulfil the conditions on which annual grants are made. In these schools 59,173 children were present on the day of inspection. The night-schools visited during the year were 1432 in number; 48,690 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; 44,357 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances; 34,992 were actually examined, and out of every 100 scholars so examined, 87·59 passed in reading, 71·14 in writing, and 60·45 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 18,714 certificated teachers at work in the aided schools which they examined, with 2489 assistant-teachers, and 27,031 pupil-teachers. The number of students in the 40 training colleges in 1874 was 2982. In 1875 there were in these colleges 2975 students, 1548 of the first year, and 1427 of the second year. Besides most of the students of the training colleges, 1534 acting teachers were examined for certificates at Christmas 1874. Since 1869 additional school accommodation for 1,105,882 children in inspected schools has been provided in England and Wales, so that there was in such schools in 1874 accommodation for 2,871,826 scholars, or 12·14 per cent. of the population; but much still remains to be done. The average attendance in aided schools (day and night) has increased from 1,225,764 in 1870 to 1,727,449 in 1874. But the attendance is very irregu-

lar, and the proficiency attained far too low. The average attendance being as above stated in 1874, the whole number on the registers of schools was 2,497,602—916,591 below and 1,581,011 above seven years of age. Of the 916,591 children below seven, only 444,007 had made the number of attendances required to bring grants to the school; while of the 1,581,011 children above seven, only 904,650 day-scholars had made the requisite number of attendances (250 and upwards), with 90,509 half-timers, under the Half-time Acts, and in rural districts (150 attendances each)—in all, 1,013,068, or 64 per cent. of the number on the register. Only 54 per cent. of the number on the register (857,611 persons) was presented for examination. Of these, 415,704, being above ten years of age, ought to have been examined in Standards 4-6 of the Code now in force, while only 151,349 of them were presented in these standards. The statistics of the year show the following results, the corresponding results in Scotland being, for purposes of comparison, given in brackets:—For every 100 scholars on the registers there were 67·2 (76·5) in average attendance; and out of every 100 scholars in average attendance—i. 55 (54) were boys, 45 (46) were girls; ii. 37 (26) were infants, *i.e.* below seven years of age; 35 (39) were between seven and ten; 28 (35) were above ten; iii. 26 (17) infants had attended 250 times and upwards, of whom 24 (10) were presented to H.M. inspectors; iv. 60 (74) scholars, above seven, had made the requisite number of attendances, and 51 (59) were presented to H.M. inspectors, of whom 25 (27) were above ten years of age, while of these only 9 (12·5) were presented in Standards 4-6. v. Each scholar presented to H.M. inspectors made, on an average, 2·4 (2·67) passes in the standard examination. Of 155,240 children presented under Standards 4-6, however, 84,620 were examined in one or more "specific subjects," of whom 61,686 passed successfully, and 26,474 (out of 51,172 examined) passed in two subjects. The number of certified teachers *actually engaged in teaching* at the end of 1874 in England and Wales, the Isle of Man, and Channel Islands, was 20,162 (9651 males and 10,511 females); the number of assistant-teachers, 1999 (650 males and 1349 females); the number of pupil-teachers, 27,321 (10,548 males and 16,773 females). It has been found that in the case of inspected schools the average income of mistresses of infant schools is £62, 7s. 11d.; of mistresses of girls' or mixed schools, £64, 6s. 4d.; and of schoolmasters, about £107, a large proportion of the teachers having houses besides.

The advance made in school accommodation and in other respects in England and Wales up to 31st August 1873, was mainly the result of voluntary effort; but since that date school boards have made considerable additions to the school supply of the country. At 31st August 1874 there were 838 board schools, with accommodation for 245,508 children, and attended on the average by 142,017 scholars. Besides London, which was provided for by statute, 113 boroughs (out of 224) in England and Wales have school boards (all except five voluntarily established), and there are 1100 school boards in parishes, comprising 1479 parishes (out of 14,082), of which 296 in the case of single parishes, and 180 for united districts, have been formed under the compulsory provisions of the Education Act. The population under school boards in 1875 is stated at 11,647,998, the whole population of England and Wales in 1871 having been 22,712,266. The inquiries preliminary to a further compulsory application of the school-board system had not been completed at the date of the Report. Bye-laws for enforcing attendance at school had been sanctioned for London, for 96 municipal boroughs, and for 316 civil parishes, or, in all, for a population of 9,856,041. Compulsory attendance at school is now the law for 43 per cent. of the population of England and Wales, and for about 80 per cent. of the whole borough population. 53 boards in England and 8 in Wales paid the fees of children under the 25th section of the Act of 1870, during the year ended 31st August 1874. The highest payments under this head were, Bristol, £386; Liverpool, £824; Manchester, £2405; Salford, £1323; Wakefield, £318. The whole sum thus paid was £6623 in the account year ended at Michaelmas 1874.

The expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, in the year ended 31st March 1874, was as follows:—On schools connected with the Church of England, £784,227; on British and Foreign Society schools, £157,055; on Wesleyan schools, £77,221; on Roman Catholic schools, £64,713; on board schools, £52,319; on parochial union schools, £120; on administration (including administration for Scotland, except cost of inspection), £114,328; on organization of districts under the Education Act of 1870,

£18,579: Total, £1,268,773. The whole expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, from 1839 to 31st March 1874, was £14,630,678.

The expenditure under the Commissioners of National Education in *Ireland*, during the year ending 31st March 1875, was £576,409. The number of schools in operation at the close of the year 1874 was 7257. The average daily attendance of children for the year was 395,390; while the total number of children at any time on the rolls for the year was 1,006,511, of whom it was estimated that 8·6 per cent. were Episcopalians, 11·0 per cent. were Presbyterians, 79·6 per cent. were Roman Catholics, and 0·8 per cent. of other persuasions. The average attendance was higher by 22,019 than in 1873; and the number on the rolls and in attendance at some part of the year was higher by 31,815 than in 1873. There were at the end of 1874, 2096 vested schools, of which, however, 137 were not yet in operation, and 5356 non-vested schools. The teaching staff at the end of 1874 consisted of 7038 principal teachers, and 2901 assistant-teachers, and 204 junior literary and industrial assistants, making 10,143 persons, of whom 3514 had been trained in the Normal establishment. There were, besides, 310 work-mistresses. These numbers do not include the conductors of convent schools paid by capitation.

The Second Annual Report of the Committee of Privy Council on Education in Scotland is for the year ended 31st August 1874. The Report states that in the year ending 31st August 1874 the inspectors visited 2366 day schools in Scotland to which annual grants were made, containing 2577 departments under separate teachers, and furnishing accommodation, at 8 square feet of superficial area per child, for 372,090 scholars. There were on the registers the names of 344,628 children, of whom 46,276 were under 6 years of age; 252,521 were between 6 and 12; and 45,831 were above 12. Of these scholars 297,247 were present on the day of the inspector's visit to their respective schools, while 263,748 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 240,500 having made the requisite number of attendances were qualified to be examined, 44,230 collectively and 196,270 individually, in reading, writing, and arithmetic; 154,646 were actually presented for individual examination, and 114,035 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects. The inspectors also visited 221 schools which do not fulfil the conditions on which annual grants are made. In these schools 17,329 scholars were present on the day of inspection. The night schools examined during the year were 102 in number; 5555 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; 4547 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances during the night-school session. Of these, 3209 were actually examined, and out of every 100 scholars so examined 95·81 passed in reading, 88·17 in writing, and 82·5 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 3165 certificated teachers at work in the aided schools which they visited, while the five training colleges, from which the supply of such teachers is mainly recruited, were attended in 1874 by 822 students. These students (with very few exceptions), and 185 acting teachers, were examined for certificates in December 1874; and in the following week 736 candidates for admission to the vacancies declared in the training colleges were examined; of these, 586 were successful, and 529 are now in their first year of residence, along with 421 students of the second year.

The Report points out that, according to the figures of the census, there ought to be about 477,360 children daily under instruction in public schools. There was accommodation in aided day schools in 1874 for only 372,090 children; but the accommodation had increased by 32·10 per cent. between 1872 and 1874. In 1872 there were 1902 schools to which annual grants were made—1311 (including the parish schools) belonging to the Established Church, 523 to the Free Church, 46 to the Episcopal Church, and 22 to the Roman Catholic Church. The number of aided schools in 1874 was 2388; viz., public schools, 1352; Church of Scotland schools, 607; Free Church schools, 275; Episcopal schools, 75; and Roman Catholic schools, 79. By the 31st December 1873, when the time for applying for building grants expired, 1685 applications for such grants had been received, the applications relating to the provision of school-room for about 250,000 children, and of 1083 residences for teachers. At 1st June 1875, 1249 of these applications had been granted, 82 refused, and 48 withdrawn by the school boards, leav-

ing 356 undecided; and in 605 cases, grants had been announced to the amount of £194,715, and 27 grants, to the amount of £5129, had been paid. As to school attendance, it is stated that the boards are using their compulsory powers vigorously where the existing school supply allows them to do so, the result being seen in the fact that the average attendance in aided schools, which in 1871 was 203,054, was, in 1874, 263,748. For the *financial* year ended 31st March 1874, grants were paid on an average attendance of 233,101 scholars, and for the financial year ending 31st March 1875, on 287,249 scholars—which shows an increase of 54,148, or 23·2 per cent. in the year. The aid given to poor parents to enable them to pay school fees for their children (under section 69 of the Act of 1872) in 1874 was £3327; and it was paid on behalf of 4049 children who attended public schools, 1970 who attended Church of Scotland schools, 844 who attended Free Church schools, 114 who attended Episcopal, and 465 who attended Roman Catholic schools.

While there was an increase of 64,000 scholars on the registers, of 43,240 in average attendance, and of 20,163 individually examined—19,907 of the additional number being above 10 years of age—in 1874, as compared with 1873, the Report notices, with an expression of regret, the large number (nearly 42,000) of scholars who, though qualified by attendance for individual examination, were not presented to the inspectors; and the small number (32,972) of scholars above 10, presented in the upper standards out of the total number on the register (125,457) qualified by age for examination in those standards, of whom as many as 45,831 were over 12, and nearly 10,000 above 14 years of age. The comparison as to the results of instruction between England and Scotland has been given above; the results in either case are declared unsatisfactory. Of 4407 scholars presented in subjects beyond the examination standard, however, 103 were examined, and 69 passed in three such subjects; 1905 were examined, and 1101 passed in two such subjects; and 2168 passed in one subject.

It is stated that it was discovered during the year that, in several cases, the registers had been tampered with, or carelessly or inaccurately kept. The same thing occurred in England also.

The Committee have no doubt that the supply of teachers will before long be found sufficient to meet fully the requirements of the country, and they think it may even be necessary to restrict the number of students admissible to the training colleges for training at the public expense. The extent to which the training colleges have contributed to the existing supply of efficient teachers in Scotland is shown by the fact that of 2346 masters employed in schools reported on in 1873-74, 1106, or 47·1 per cent., had been trained for two years; 327, or 13·9 per cent., for one year; while 913, or 38·9 per cent., were untrained. In like manner, of 1145 schoolmistresses, 789, or 68·9 per cent., had been trained for two years; 124, or 10·8 per cent., for one year; and 232, or 20·2 per cent., were untrained. Having had occasion to inquire into the salaries of the teachers engaged in the inspected schools in Scotland, the Committee find that, while the average professional income of 660 schoolmistresses (of whom 212 have houses) is about £64, 10s., that of 1062 masters (of whom 686 have houses), in schools to which grants were made under the old Code, is £121; while 780 masters (of whom 504 have houses), in schools aided under the New Code, have an average income of about £124. Out of 1850 masters reported upon, 28 had incomes of £300 a year and upwards, 38 had between £250 and £300, 114 between £200 and £250, and 262 between £150 and £200 a year; and out of 836 schoolmistresses reported upon, 6 had between £150 and £200, 50 between £100 and £150, and 142 between £75 and £100 a year.

The expenditure from the Parliamentary grant in Scotland during the year ended 31st March 1874, was, public schools, £13,637; on schools connected with the Established Church, £70,004 (being a decrease on the previous year of £4551); on schools connected with the Free Church, £39,482 (a decrease of £2274); on schools connected with the Episcopal Church, £5513 (a decrease of £927); on Roman Catholic schools, £8052 (an increase of £3081); on administration (*viz.*, inspection and poundage on Post-office orders only), £14,088; expenses of Education Board not otherwise provided for, £5327; total, £156,104,

being an increase of £15,813 upon the previous year. The whole expenditure upon schools in Scotland from 1839 till 31st March 1874 was £1,981,765, viz., on public schools, £13,637; Established Church schools, £1,064,841; on Free Church schools, £721,515; on Episcopal Church schools, £87,766; on Roman Catholic schools, £62,020; on administration (inspection and poundage on Post-office orders), £25,170; towards expenses of Education Board, £6812.

In 1874 the expenditure of Church of Scotland training colleges was £14,256, of which £10,432 was granted by the Privy Council; that of Free Church training colleges was £10,509, of which £8821 was granted by the Privy Council; that of the Episcopal training college was £1734, and the grant £1220. The number of students resident in February 1875 was, in Church of Scotland training colleges, 467 (200 males and 267 females); in Free Church training colleges, 433 (152 males and 281 females); and in the Episcopal training college, 50 (all females). There quitted the Church of Scotland colleges at the end of 1874, 176 students (89 males and 87 females); there quitted the Free Church colleges, 175 students (60 males and 115 females); and the Episcopal college, 29 females, at the same date.

The whole number of certificated teachers *actually engaged in teaching* in Scotland at 31st December 1874 was 3412 (2291 males and 1121 females); there were 36 assistant-teachers (17 males and 19 females), 3833 pupil-teachers (1828 males and 2005 females).

The Second Annual Report of the Scottish Education Board, dated 1st July 1875, sets forth the causes which have delayed the disposal of the proposals of school boards for the provision of new school accommodation. It being necessary that applications for building grants should be made to the Scotch Education Department before the end of 1873, the schemes forwarded were in many cases hastily prepared, and had to be altered; while, on consideration, the members of many school boards became alarmed at the cost their schemes involved, and in other cases the discontinuance of existing schools necessitated a change of plan, or changes in the constitution of the school board led to a complete change in its proposals. Many of the schemes submitted were found crude and defective; in many cases, local differences of opinion respecting the sites for schools forced the Board to hesitate in giving its sanction, and in other cases difficulties arose through proprietors refusing to grant the sites which were desired. The difficulty of fixing on the site of a school was increased where more than one parish was concerned (combination of parishes for the maintenance of schools in common is optional, but in 84 cases it has been adopted). Another thing which the Board had to keep in view in dealing with such applications was the desirableness of forming portions of adjoining parishes in certain cases into separate school districts. In only two instances, however, has this arrangement been adopted. The proposals of 753 school boards had, at the date of the Report, been examined and approved; these being to provide accommodation for 217,516 scholars by the erection of 947 new schools and the enlargement of existing buildings. This does not altogether represent an addition to the school supply, as in those parishes 1450 of the pre-existing schools, with 104,269 school places, have been discontinued or are to be superseded. It is stated that the transference of pre-existing schools to school boards has almost ceased; only 64 were transferred during the year; and only 147 of 548 Free Church schools, and only 80 of 1250 schools connected with the Established Church, have been transferred. The reason is that the Act of 1872 does not enable the school boards to take over with the schools the debts—usually small—with which they were burdened; and does not enable the school boards to come under any conditions as to the use subsequently to be made of the buildings—conditions which the managers of the schools usually wish to impose, on account of the vicinity of the school to a church and manse.

The Board during the year sanctioned applications from 349 school boards for loans for the providing or enlarging of school buildings and teachers' houses to the amount of £1,109,241. It has been found that the Act does not justify borrowing for the repair of school buildings, which, as many school boards have come into possession of premises in a bad state, is extremely inconvenient; and it almost disables school boards for doing any-

thing for the secondary schools which have been transferred to them. The Board has, in terms of the Education Act, appointed an accountant to examine the accounts of school board treasurers; but it has been found that he has no power of disallowing items in their accounts, however indefensible, even if they are illegal expenses.

As in their first Report, the Board points out the oppressive working of the Education Act in the thinly-peopled parts of the Highlands. For example, they show that six average Highland and Insular parishes, with an annual valuation of only £28,823, will have to erect 37 schools and maintain and carry on 54 schools for the accommodation of 3879 scholars; while twelve agricultural parishes, with an annual valuation of £193,110, will have to erect only nine new schools, and to support only 41; while seven mining parishes, with an annual valuation of £132,568, will need only 9 new schools in addition to 15 existing schools; and thirteen pastoral parishes in the Lowlands, with an annual valuation of £203,864, and 4153 children to provide for, will need only 10 new in addition to 38 existing schools. The Highland school boards allege, too, that the attendance of children at their schools must be irregular, and that therefore only a small proportion of the grants under the Code will come to them. It is shown that there will be a difficulty in finding qualified teachers for the small Highland schools, and a special arrangement for them is recommended. It is shown that, without special arrangements for the Highland parishes, in addition to those made in regard to building grants, the education rate will be intolerably heavy.

It is stated that inconvenience has arisen in several cases through the absence of provision in the Education Act for filling up vacancies in school boards caused by death, and of provision as to the resignation or disqualification of members. The provision of the Act reserving the rights of parochial teachers, has also given rise to questions which the Courts have been solving, not always consistently. It is shown *seriatim* in the case of the large towns, that the compulsory provisions of the Act have already largely increased the attendance at school, and it is said they have had a beneficial effect in the rural districts also. The warning of the board officer or a notice from the school board has usually secured compliance with the law. The number of prosecutions in 1874 was 156, one being the prosecution of an employer; convictions were obtained in 110 cases. The cost of the prosecutions was £259, an average of £1, 13s. 4d. for each. It is suggested that such prosecutions should, to save expense, be dealt with summarily in the police courts of burghs, and in counties in the justice of peace courts. The number of parents who applied to parochial boards for assistance to pay their children's school fees during the year, was 3139; 2088 applications were granted, and 1051 refused. The parochial boards are the sole judges of the parents' need of assistance; and in one case, that of South Leith, the parish declines to pay school fees, offering instead free education at a school it maintains for pauper children. The school boards have in most cases shown great forbearance in the exercise of their compulsory powers; the Board's advice to them has been, that these powers should not be exercised in a harsh or vexatious manner. The provisions as to factory children are said to be working very unsatisfactorily. It is suggested that the Legislature should provide, that "after, say, three years from this date, no persons under 14 years of age shall be employed either in factories or otherwise, or allowed to earn wages in any form, until they have obtained a certificate that they have passed a satisfactory examination in at least the fifth standard of the Scottish Code." The interest of parents would then be to accelerate the progress of their children at school.

In the year ended 31st December 1874, the produce of the school rate in Scotland was £223,433. There were 2303 public schools under school boards in the kingdom, conducted by 2529 principal teachers (2027 male and 502 female), assisted by 277 male and 316 female assistants, 1122 sewing mistresses, and 2475 pupil-teachers and monitors. On the rolls of these schools there were 290,873 scholars, and the average attendance was 212,206. In these figures are included 204 temporary schools carried on by school boards until permanent accommodation can be provided, with 31,637 scholars on the roll, and 22,577 in average attendance; and 124 evening schools, with

11,071 scholars on the roll, and 7040 in average attendance. The sum realized from school fees was £114,383. The building grants received by the school boards amounted to £4790, and the annual grants under the Code to £81,077. The total salaries and emoluments of teachers reached £317,824, and the salaries of the school board officials, clerks, treasurers, and compulsory officers amounted to upwards of £30,000.

At the date of the Report, the proposals of 232 school boards were undisposed of; and in a good many cases, school boards whose schemes had been sanctioned had, in consequence of unexpected obstacles, not been able to carry their schemes into effect.

ENDOWED SCHOOLS AND HOSPITALS.

The Third Report of the Royal Commissioners appointed to inquire into Endowed Schools and Hospitals in Scotland, is dated 15th February 1875, and contains the observations and recommendations of the Commissioners upon the matters inquired into by them (the two previous Reports consisting of evidence only). The Commission under which the inquiry was made was issued on the 12th of September 1872. The Commissioners were Sir Thomas Edward Colebrooke, the Earl of Rosebery, Mr Charles Stuart Parker, Mr J. Ramsay of Kildalton, and Messrs Lancaster and Sellar, advocates, and Mr S. S. Laurie acted as secretary. The Commissioners were directed to inquire "into the nature and amount of all endowments in Scotland, the funds of which are wholly or in part devoted, or have been applied, or which can rightly be made applicable, to educational purposes," which had not been reported upon by the Commissioners under the Universities (Scotland) Act, 1858; and also into the administration and management of hospitals and schools supported by such endowments, and the system and course of study respectively pursued therein; and to report whether any and what changes in the administration and use of such endowments are expedient.

The Commissioners found that there were in Scotland (1) hospital endowments, with an annual revenue of £79,245; (2) school endowments, with an annual income of £59,529 (£16,550 mainly in connexion with burgh and grammar schools, and other schools in which higher instruction is chiefly given, and £42,979 mainly in connexion with parochial (now public) and other schools in which elementary instruction is chiefly given); (3) general endowments, not appropriated to any particular institution, with an annual income of £17,118; (4) mixed endowments, partly charitable, partly educational, with an annual income applicable to education, estimated at £18,640. The total annual income of such endowments applicable to education was therefore £174,532; and, besides this, the university endowments established since 1808 amounted to £22,020. The annual income of hospital endowments in Edinburgh and its vicinity was £59,770; of hospital endowments in Aberdeen, £9646; of hospital endowments in Dundee, £3500; of other hospital endowments, £6329. Of the endowments in schools chiefly elementary, Aberdeen, Dundee, Edinburgh, and Glasgow had £19,090 a year, and the rest of Scotland, £23,889 a year. Of the endowments in secondary schools, schools in burghs had £10,793 a year, and schools in rural districts, £5757 a year. The general endowments were the Dick Bequest, £4300 a year; the Philp Bequest, £2380; the Milne Bequest, £1900; the Maclean Bequest, £670; the Society for Propagating Christian Knowledge, £6500; the Bell Bequest Residue, £770; other funds, £598 a year. The mixed endowments were Hutcheson's Hospital (Glasgow), with £14,000 a year; the Stirling Hospitals, with £3660 a year; Gillespie's Hospital, with £1700 a year; the Ferguson Bequest, with £16,080 a year; the Hutton Bequest, with £900 a year; and while the part of their income devoted to education was estimated at £18,640 a year, their total annual income was £36,340. The University endowments made since 1808 were distributed as regards objects, as follows:—foundation of chairs, £8133 a year; fellowships, scholarships, and prizes, £7211 a year; bursaries, £6676 a year; and between the universities as follows:—St Andrews, £1448 a year; Glasgow, £6306 a year; Aberdeen,

£3986 a year; Edinburgh, £8748 a year; common to more than one university, £1532 a year. Excluding the four largest towns, the counties of Aberdeen, Ayr, and Fife possess about a fourth of the endowments existing in elementary schools. The income of the secondary school includes the payments made from the "common good" of burghs—which have been made perpetual by the Education Act of 1872; and of the total, £16,550, nearly two-thirds belong to eleven institutions, viz., the High Schools of Edinburgh, Dundee, and Glasgow, the Grammar School of Aberdeen, Neilson's Institution, Paisley, Dollar Institution, Wallace Hall Academy, Dumfries-shire, the Madras Colleges of St Andrews and Cupar-Fife, Morison's Academy, Crieff, and Milne's Institution, Fochabers. Of the general endowments, the Dick Bequest is confined to the counties of Aberdeen, Banff, and Moray, and is designed to "elevate the literary character of the parochial schoolmasters and schools" in those counties; the Milne Bequest is confined to the county of Aberdeen, and is mainly applied in the payment of fees of poor scholars; the Philp Bequest is devoted to a small district of Fife near Kirkcaldy, and is applied to the support of elementary schools, and the clothing of scholars; while the Society for Propagating Christian Knowledge makes payments to schoolmasters in poor districts throughout Scotland. Of the total revenue (£174,532, excluding University endowments), about £112,000 are localized in and about the four principal towns, Edinburgh, Glasgow, Dundee, and Aberdeen.

The age of admission to most of the hospitals is, as in the case of Heriot's, from seven to ten, and that of dismissal is fourteen, hopeful scholars being sometimes kept a year or two longer. The children of petty tradesmen and skilled artisans constitute the great mass of hospital foundationers; the only hospitals which provide for poverty in a higher social grade being the Merchant Company's Hospitals, John Watson's Institution, and Fettes College (the last of which has, by the trustees of Sir W. Fettes, been organized on the model of an English public school, and the first have recently been so reorganized as to place them in a different category from the other hospitals). Of the 1510 children at present on the hospital foundations of Scotland, 950 are fatherless. In almost all the hospitals the children selected are subjected to some sort of examination, but this does not seem to weigh much for or against their reception. The Commissioners were satisfied that the educational results of the hospitals were unsatisfactory, and that this was mainly attributable to the paralyzing effect of a secluded life upon the foundationers, while they found the cost to be large—averaging (Fettes College and various other institutions, as being organized so as to obviate the objections taken to the hospital system, being omitted from the calculation) £34 per head, or, including the value of grounds and buildings moderately estimated, about £44 per head. They think that in every case a child, before being admitted to a foundation, should be required to show such proficiency as may be expected from his years, while not recommending competition for the selection, but recommending that the selection should be left with the governing bodies. They are also of opinion that the number of charity foundationers should be restricted; that they should, as far as possible, be boarded out, and be educated, up to thirteen, at the public elementary schools; and that their relatives should, as a rule, be required to make contributions towards their support. Boarding-houses on a limited scale might be kept for the children who could not be boarded out, and to these boarding-houses paying pupils might be admitted. These arrangements, they believe, would give a considerable money saving, and with the funds thus available scholar foundationers might be admitted, the admission being by competition, and occurring at the age at which secondary instruction usually begins. And the secondary instruction provided for the foundationers should be thrown open to all paying pupils. They think that in the Heriot free schools—which are deemed the best elementary schools in Edinburgh—only a limited number of non-paying pupils should be received, and that all willing to pay should be received, and as this would entitle the schools to government grants, they reckon that a saving to the foundation of about £2660 a year might thus be made. The abolition of apprentice allowances also would, in the case of Heriot's Hospital,

save a considerable sum; and their opinion is that a portion of the surplus funds of this Hospital should (this being in accordance with the apparent views of the founder) be applied to the foundation of bursaries, open to competition, in the Universities of Edinburgh and St Andrews, while, with the remainder, a secondary school on the model of the German Real-schulen—adapted to the wants of the industrial and commercial classes—should be established. Of secondary instruction of this kind (they say) the country is much in need; in fact, it is losing ground in competition with continental nations in manufacturing and trading for the want of it; while of secondary schools of the ordinary type, there is an ample supply in Edinburgh, now that the Merchant Company's Schools are open on payment to all comers. To some of these any pupils might be sent to whom it was thought desirable to give secondary instruction of the ordinary kind. They think that the benefits of John Watson's Institution, now extended to orphan boys and girls, should be restricted to orphan girls (the Fettes College making a sufficient provision for boys belonging to the professional and upper mercantile classes); that the orphan girls admitted to the foundation should be boarded out; and that the hospital school should then be converted into an upper school for the higher instruction of girls, open to qualified foundationers gratuitously, and to all who choose to take advantage of it at a reasonable fee.

The ordinary school endowments, amounting to £59,529 a year, are distributed as follows:—Endowed schools chiefly for elementary instruction, £21,583 (of which, in the four principal towns, £11,726, exclusive of the Heriot free schools in Edinburgh); addition to salaries of teachers chiefly in parochial schools, £4557; payment of fees for poor children in parochial and other schools, £4738; school bursaries and prizes partly for higher instruction, £3864; educational purposes generally, such as maintenance of building, purchase of books, apparatus, etc., £1436—total in schools chiefly elementary £36,178; not yet in operation, partly for elementary, partly for higher instruction, £6800; endowed schools chiefly for higher instruction, £16,550. The endowments in the schools which are chiefly elementary, have been to a large extent made unnecessary by the establishment of public schools. It is true that they are to a great extent applied in giving instruction gratuitously, but the Education Act provides for the instruction of really necessitous children, and the Commissioners satisfied themselves that, in other cases, gratuitous education, besides being pauperizing, did not work well, people not valuing what they do not pay for, and not caring to make their children attend so regularly as they do when they pay fees. They think the community has, at any rate, a right to exercise supervision over the schools possessing such endowments, and they suggest that the claims for free teaching should be strictly limited, according to the intention of the founders, to cases of merit or of unavoidable misfortune; that the schools should be thrown open to all children on payment of a moderate fee, which would give them a right to government grants; and that the portion of the endowments thus made available for new uses should be applied to giving the highest efficiency to elementary teaching, and to promoting a higher instruction in the schools. The governors might be empowered, as suggested by the Endowed Schools Commissioners for England, to found exhibitions for meritorious scholars, to enable them to prolong their period of instruction, to provide lending libraries or improved apparatus, to give evening lectures or classes, to aid the games and exercises of the scholars; and the first of these objects especially, the Commissioners think, would be a most beneficial application of the endowments. It is observed that secondary schools, in the proper sense of the term—*i.e.*, schools which begin the instruction of their pupils where the elementary schools end, and prepare them for the Universities and the Civil Service Examinations—can scarcely be said to exist in Scotland; the burgh schools nearly all giving elementary instruction, and many of them extremely little of the secondary instruction. One of the results is, that the universities have to take their pupils in an unprepared state, and to teach them, which they are not well fitted to do, what secondary schools should have taught. The main cause of this is the scantiness of the endowments of burgh and grammar schools—the endow-

ments furnishing for all the teachers and assistant teachers only an average of £42 a year. Only fifty such schools possess endowments, the amount of these, excluding bursaries and scholarships, being only £14,143, and including bursaries and scholarships, £16,550. The Education Act has converted certain schools, which, before its passing, combined elementary with secondary instruction, into Higher Class Public Schools, to be managed with a view to promoting the higher education of the country, and these may be relieved of the necessity of giving elementary instruction, and their funds made applicable to secondary instruction only. The Act, by providing for the distribution of the school fees between the teachers by the school board, puts an end to the competition for pupils between the masters of different departments in such schools, which is said to have operated mischievously, and it also enables school boards to provide for the examination of such schools. It does nothing, however, to remedy the evil which lies at the root of their defects, the want of endowments. The Commissioners say that for this, reliance must chiefly be placed on local efforts and individual benefactions; but they think that contributions may reasonably be looked for from the wealthy foundations of the country. The locality in which a foundation has been established once provided for, they think it legitimate to apply its surplus funds to the higher education of poor boys in other localities. They also say that steps should be taken to institute a system of open bursaries or scholarships from the public elementary to the secondary schools, and from the latter to the universities. A bursary of about £25 a year should suffice for the maintenance of a boy at a secondary school in a provincial town. The nucleus of a bursary system exists already in the Scotch schools, not less than £6000 a year being available, distributed pretty equally between elementary and secondary schools. It would be indispensable that all the bursaries should be open to competition—the effects of a close bursary system in the schools, where it exists, having been found to be decidedly bad.

Among the general endowments, it is said that the operation of the Dick Bequest has been specially beneficial. It keeps the teaching of secondary instruction in the parochial schools in the counties to which it extends at a comparatively high level. The payments made vary from about £23 to about £50 a year, the teachers being divided into three classes, and advanced or degraded in class, or deprived of the grant altogether, according to merit from year to year. The Milne Bequest is less beneficial, because the trustees have no power to graduate their payments, but only to give or not to give £20 a year. Hitherto, this sum has been paid in consideration of a certain number of poor scholars being taught gratuitously, but the education of such children being now otherwise provided for under the Education Act, the trustees have resolved to pay it only for teaching gratuitously the higher branches. The Education Act has also to a great extent superseded the present application of the Philp Fund, and the Commissioners recommend that a portion of it should be used in paying for the education in public elementary schools of poor children of the district to which it is applicable; another portion in educating children of the same district in a higher school at Kirkcaldy; while the remainder might be employed either to encourage the higher education by bursaries at Kirkcaldy, or to supplement the salaries of the best teachers in the country schools. After discussing the history and present position of the Ferguson Bequest, they conclude that education has a strong equitable claim to a third of its income, and say that even £5000 a year from the Bequest, met with an equal amount from local sources, and judiciously administered, would so equip the burgh schools throughout the counties to which the bequest is applicable, that they would afford as good an example of higher education in towns, as the Aberdeenshire schools furnish of elementary and higher education in rural districts. They discuss the remaining general endowments also, and make suggestions for their application.

As to the mixed bequests, partly charitable, partly educational, the Commissioners think that, in determining for the future the amount to be set aside for each of these objects, regard should be had to the purposes of the founder so far as they can be fairly carried out in the present circumstances

of society; and that any authority to whom may be entrusted the duty of revising the educational endowments of Scotland should be empowered, with the consent of the governing bodies, to apply a portion of purely charitable funds to education, whenever they are applied to purposes which, in the opinion of such authority, are, from change of circumstances, unsuited to the present day, or are insignificant compared with the magnitude of the endowment. They extend this remark to charitable bequests generally, whether education is or is not at present one of their objects. With respect to the endowments of Stirling, as to which much local difference of opinion was found to exist, they suggest that, the executive authority having decided what portion of those which are charitable bequests should be applied to education, that portion should be administered by a mixed body of trustees with a view to the advancement of secondary education in the burgh and its vicinity; and that, as to those which are educational, two-thirds of their present income should be applied to the support and education of young persons coming under the principle of the original bequests, and the remaining third applied to the foundation of open bursaries, to be competed for in the schools of Stirling, with a view to enable boys to prosecute the study of the higher branches of learning.

The bursaries in the universities are of two classes—"competition" bursaries, and "presentation" bursaries, the former given on the result of an examination (but in some cases restricted to particular schools or localities, or with preferences to names), the latter in the gift of patrons. The annual value of the competition bursaries is £8067, distributed as follows:—St Andrews, £881; Glasgow, £2038; Aberdeen, £2905; Edinburgh, £1678; more than one university, £565: and that of the presentation bursaries, £5497, distributed as follows:—St Andrews, £645; Glasgow, £1212; Aberdeen, £2009; Edinburgh, £1275; more than one university, £356. In this division the bursaries in the gift of the Aberdeen Town Council, being in fact awarded on the result of the annual competition at the university, are classed as competition bursaries. The Commissioners have had forced on them the conviction that, so far as the true interests of education are concerned, the £5500 a year given in presentation bursaries is greatly wasted, and is not merely negatively mischievous, but tends to lower the teaching at the universities. This is said not to be the case at Aberdeen, where the presentation bursars are said to be much on the level of ordinary students, but that is attributed to the excellence of the education in the districts from which that university is mainly supplied—an excellence greatly owing to the stimulus of the competition for bursaries—and to the fact that at Aberdeen presentation bursars are subjected to a matriculation examination, which ensures their being up to the average level. It did not appear to the Commissioners that the presentation system is so worked as to be a boon to the poor. The Commissioners say, as to presentation bursaries which are in the gift of public bodies, like town councils, that there can be no doubt that such bodies are trustees for the public, and should be required to bestow the bursaries in their gift according to approved merit, and the best way of doing this is to throw them open to competition. The case of bursaries in the gift of private individuals is, they say, of more difficulty; but where the endowments are of such small amount as to be practically useless as a means of acquiring academical education, and are therefore worthless to the patrons, they consider that they should be united into larger bursaries and thrown open to competition—all under £10 annual value being thus dealt with; and, again, where the funds of an endowment have increased beyond what is necessary, they think the surplus should be applied to establishing competition bursaries. Some of them were of opinion that all presentation bursaries should be thrown open to competition, being unable to see why a distinction should be made between public bodies and private patrons in regard to what they consider as the execution of a trust, or why a distinction should be made between bursaries under and bursaries above £10 a year. The aggregate value of competition bursaries in the universities, restricted within local limits, including restrictions to particular schools, is £2784, and preferences to localities, which tend to operate as restrictions, affect bursaries to the amount of £850 a year additional. Preferences to particular names, and to

the kin of the founder, it is said, are practically of little or no effect in the bursary competitions at Aberdeen and Glasgow, and probably at the other universities also. As to the restriction of bursaries to particular localities, a difference of opinion prevailed among the Commissioners, some of them thinking that they only called for notice when the area was too narrow to admit of a real competition. They all agreed that, in that case, power should be given to extend the area. The others were of opinion that, if the founders' destination were to be interfered with at all, it would be well to disregard the restrictions altogether. The Commissioners think that bursaries attached to particular schools, and managed and awarded by the school authorities, should receive no university notice or recognition. They also are of opinion that the number of small bursaries is far too great, that these should be combined into bursaries of larger amount, and that none should be of less value than £20 a year; and that it would be well to reserve certain bursaries for second year's students. And they observe that, should there be any funds available for the purpose, the foundation of scholarships or fellowships to be competed for by graduates—of £80 to £100, a year in value, and tenable for a short term of years—would supply a great want. They point out that the existing bursaries, scholarships, fellowships, and pecuniary prizes taken together furnish an annual income of £23,100 (distributed as follows:—St Andrews, £2206; Glasgow (including the Clark endowment), £7075; Aberdeen, £5982; Edinburgh, £6275), and they say that this, if thrown open and wisely administered, is sufficient to put within the reach of every able boy the means of obtaining by his own exertions the best education the country can afford, and of gaining a provision which will support him during the first years of his start in life. As to three chairs in the University of St Andrews, the patronage of which is in private hands, they recommend that the right of presentation should be transferred to the University Court or to the Crown—the question of compensation to the private patrons being left for the consideration of the Legislature.

The following is given in the Report as a summary of the general recommendations agreed to by the Commissioners:—

I. With regard to hospitals:—(1) Charity foundationers should in general be boarded out in families; and for those who cannot advantageously be placed in families, provision should be made in boarding-houses, (2) Hospital schools should be thrown open to all, at moderate fees, as day schools, the instruction being adapted to the circumstances of the locality in which each foundation is placed. Where convenient, foundationers should attend public or other elementary schools. (3) The number of charity foundationers should generally be reduced, and in some cases contributions towards their maintenance should be required. (4) A considerable proportion of the places on each foundation should be thrown open to competition among boys who have completed a course of primary instruction, whether in schools connected with the foundation or elsewhere.

II. With regard to endowments in connexion with elementary schools:—(1) Pupils paying fees should be admitted to all endowed elementary schools, a sufficient number of places being reserved for necessitous cases. The endowment should generally be applied so as to give advanced instruction in the school; and promising scholars, who without assistance might not be able to prolong their school life, should be enabled by means of the endowment to continue their attendance. (2) In all parishes in which the rate does not exceed 3d. in the pound, it should be made imperative on school boards to apply endowments held in connexion with public elementary schools to the purposes indicated in the 46th section of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, viz., to increase the efficiency of the school, by raising the standard of education or otherwise. (3) Endowments for the payment of fees in elementary schools should be employed to a moderate extent in aiding persons who find great difficulty in defraying the cost of their children's elementary education; but where any endowment so employed bears an undue proportion to the population, some part of that endowment should be applied to promote higher instruction in the district to which it belongs. (4) Trustees of educational endowments not specially connected with public schools, and therefore not falling under section 46 of the Education (Scot-

land) Act, 1872, should be empowered to depart from the strict letter of the trust, with a view to promote higher instruction.

III. With regard to endowments for higher instruction:—(1) Inasmuch as provision has been made by law for elementary, but not for secondary schools, where the reasonable objects of any foundation can be attained without expending the whole revenue, the surplus should be applied to promote higher instruction in the vicinity of the foundation, either by directly aiding secondary schools, such as the higher-class public schools scheduled in the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872; or by the establishment of bursaries to be held at such schools; or by improving the higher instruction in public schools in the country districts. (2) Bursaries tenable at secondary schools should be the reward of merit. When a trust-deed specially favours poverty, this condition will in most cases be best observed by limiting the competition to pupils of public schools; but others should be admitted to competition on the parents satisfying the trustees that they require assistance in the education of their children. Small bursaries should be combined.

IV. *Mixed Endowments.*—With regard to mixed endowments—that is to say, endowments partly charitable and partly educational,—the proportion to be set apart for charity and education respectively should be clearly defined. Any executive body to whom may be entrusted the duty of revising the educational endowments of Scotland should be empowered, with the consent of trustees, to apply purely charitable funds to education, wherever these have been destined, or are applied to purposes which, from change of circumstances, are unsuited to the present day, or are insignificant compared with the magnitude of the endowment.

V. With regard to university endowments:—(1) Bursaries in the patronage of public bodies should be thrown open to competition. (2) Bursaries in the gift of private individuals under £10 annual value should be combined, so as to form bursaries or scholarships of higher value, and these should be open to competition. (3) For all other bursaries in private hands, or locally restricted, the universities should be empowered to prescribe the standard of qualification; and in the event of no qualified candidate presenting himself, the bursary should be, for that turn, thrown open to competition. [It is added that some of the Commissioners were of opinion that all presentation and restricted bursaries should be thrown open.]

VI. The trustees of all endowments should be relieved from restrictions in favour of particular names. Restrictions in favour of persons having kindred with the family of the founder should be subject to a statutory limitation.

VII. All endowed educational institutions and schools should be periodically examined and reported on by qualified inspectors appointed by the education department or by the universities, and the accounts of the trusts should be annually rendered to the accountant appointed under the Education (Scotland) Act, 1872, who should transmit an abstract of the same to the Scottish Education Department.

VIII. The accounts of educational and of mixed charities generally should be annually examined and audited, and where the funds amount to more than £50 a year, a balance-sheet should be made public through a local newspaper, or otherwise.

IX. There should be a public register of all endowments wholly or partly educational.

X. With regard to governing bodies:—Power should be given to modify the constitution of trusts in cases where the trustees are too many or too few. In reconstituting trusts, regard should be had to the representation of local interests; but in all trusts where the benefits extend over a considerable district, or where the education is secondary, the governing body should be constituted partly of members independent of local influence, and in general should include *ex officio* members, or assessors appointed by them.

XI. Powers should be given to combine trusts, and to transfer them to school boards, with the consent of the trustees.

XII. Power should be given to relieve trustees from injunctions in deeds forbidding the access to a school of members of a particular denomination,

or requiring that members of only one church shall be eligible for the office of teacher in schools which are open to all.

XIII. To carry out these and other reforms, it is recommended that an Act be passed conferring the necessary powers on a temporary executive commission. Extended powers of dealing with trusts should also be conferred upon the Court of Session.

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Eighteenth Report of the Inspector appointed, under the provisions of the Act 5 and 6 Will. IV. c. 38, to visit the certified Reformatory and Industrial Schools of Great Britain, is for the year 1874.

REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

The number of institutions certified under the Act 17 and 18 Vict. c. 86, in Great Britain, for the reformation of young offenders, on the 31st December 1874, was 65, viz., 45 (37 in England and 8 in Scotland) for boys only; 20 (16 in England and 4 in Scotland) for girls only. Of these 65 reformatories, 54 were Protestant (44 in England and 10 in Scotland), 10 were Roman Catholic (8 in England and 2 in Scotland), and 1 in England (the North-Eastern in Northumberland) received boys of both denominations. Of the 54 Protestant reformatories, 38 were for boys (31 in England and 7 in Scotland), and 16 for girls (13 in England and 3 in Scotland). Of the 10 Roman Catholic reformatories, 6 were for boys (5 in England and 1 in Scotland), and 4 for girls (3 in England and 1 in Scotland). The number of young offenders under sentence of detention in reformatories in Great Britain at the close of the year was, 6671 in 1872, 6778 in 1873, and 6787 in 1874. The admissions for the year 1874 were 1693 (being a decrease of 11 upon the previous year), viz., 1373 boys and 320 girls. Of those under sentence of detention at the close of the year, 15 were in prison, 107 were at large, having absconded, and 977 (817 boys and 160 girls) were out on license, preparatory to discharge; so that the number of actual inmates of reformatory schools was 5688 (boys 4545, girls 1143). The inmates, at the end of 1874, were distributed as follows: in English schools, 4614 (boys, Protestant, 2726, Roman Catholic, 991; girls, Protestant, 687, Roman Catholic, 210); in Scotch schools, 1074 (boys, Protestant, 656, Roman Catholic, 172; girls, Protestant, 151, Roman Catholic, 95). The number of new admissions in the Scotch schools in 1874, was 316 (boys, Protestant, 216, Roman Catholic, 42; girls, Protestant, 35, Roman Catholic, 23). Of the 1373 boys received in 1874 into the reformatories of Great Britain, 16 were under 10 years of age, 255 between 10 and 12, 495 between 12 and 14, and 607 from 14 to 16 years of age. Of the 320 girls received, 3 were under 10, 40 between 10 and 12, 138 between 12 and 14, and 119 between 14 and 16 years of age. 725 boys and 242 girls had not been convicted before, 462 boys and 70 girls had been once previously convicted, 137 boys and 4 girls twice, 37 boys and 4 girls three times, and 12 boys four times and upwards. The number of discharges in 1874 was 1685 (boys, 1363; girls, 322). 674 were placed in service or employment in Great Britain, and 496 were placed out with the aid of relatives, 117 (of whom 8 were girls) emigrated, 234 went to sea, 18 enlisted, 56 died in the schools, 24 were discharged on account of disease and 8 as incorrigible, 58 had absconded and had not been recovered.

Of 3758 boys and 863 girls discharged from reformatories in the years 1871-73 (2988 boys and 688 girls from English, 770 boys and 175 girls from Scotch reformatories), 94 boys and 28 girls have died, 2697 boys and 608 girls were doing well, 94 boys and 71 girls were of doubtful character, 532 boys and 62 girls had been convicted, 341 boys and 94 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 82·63 per cent. of boys and 79·61 per cent. of girls were doing well, 3·82 per cent. of boys and 5·83 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 9·92 per cent. of boys and 9·70 per cent. of girls had been convicted, and 3·63 per cent. of boys and 4·86 per cent. of girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 64·76 per cent. of boys and 83·58 per cent. of girls were doing well, 5·24 per cent. of boys and 3 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 30 per cent. of boys and 7·46 per cent. of girls had been convicted, and 6·0 per cent. of girls were unknown. The number of persons in prison in 1874 who were found to have been trained in a reformatory school was, in England, 503 (456 males and 47 females), and in Scotland, 148 (130 males and 18 females)—total, 651.

The following Table shows, for each of the Reformatories certified in Scotland, the date of its certification, the average number of inmates, the average cost of the inmates per head for maintenance and management, for food, and for clothing, and the net cost per head, including rent and expenses of disposal, and deducting industrial profit, or adding industrial loss; also the amount of industrial profit or loss (the latter indicated by the sign — prefixed), at each reformatory, in the year 1874:—

The total expenditure upon Reformatories in Great Britain for 1874 amounted to £136,060. This included rent £2809, cost of disposal £5444, building expenses £9482, and loss on industrial departments £347. The average cost per head for food and for clothing for the year 1874 was:—English boys' schools, food, £8, 1s. 3d.; clothing, £2, 9s. 5d.; English girls' schools, food, £7, 12s. 10d., clothing, £2, 0s. 8d.; Scotch boys' schools, food, £7, 9s. 2d., clothing, £2, 9s. 7d.; Scotch girls' schools, food, £6, 12s. 10d., clothing, £1, 19s. 0d.

The total receipts of Reformatory Schools in Great Britain in 1874 amounted to £138,001, made up as follows:—Treasury payments, £87,019; subscriptions, legacies, etc., £5624; contributions from rates, £20,567; contributions from voluntary associations, £222; hire of labour, £3910; sundries, £3309; profit on industrial departments, £17,347.

The next Table shows the ordinary charges, the extraordinary charges, the total receipts, the sums received from parliamentary grants, and the payments from rates for the Reformatories in Scotland, certified under the 17 and 18 Vict. c. 86, during the year 1874:—

CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The number of Certified Industrial Schools in Great Britain at the end of 1874 was 110; but two schools (in Scotland) have long ceased to be in operation. Three new schools were opened in England during the year, and one, also in England, was closed. Of the 108 schools now inspected 83 were in England, and 25 were in Scotland. It is stated that a new and separate boys' school is being erected at Ayr, and that separate premises have been fitted near Leith for the girls of the Edinburgh Original Industrial School—which puts an end to the mixed system in these schools, and is, the Inspector thinks, an important improvement. A similar movement is being made in respect of the Dundee Schools, and a site for a farm school for boys has been obtained there. Of the English schools 65 were for Protestants (30 being for boys, 22 for girls, and 13 being mixed schools), and 18 were for Roman Catholics (10 for boys, and 8 for girls); of the Scotch schools, 23 were for Protestants (4 for boys, 5 for girls, and 14 mixed), and 2 for Roman Catholics (1 for boys, and 1 for girls). The number of children under order of detention at the close of 1874 was 12,265 (boys 9364, girls 2901). 499 boys and 181 girls, however, were out on license, and 163 boys and 13 girls were absent from the schools, having absconded and not been recovered. The number actually in the schools at the close of 1874, therefore, was 11,409 (8702 boys and 2707 girls), with 11 boys and 17 girls whose sentences were expired and who were retained until employment could be found for them. The inmates under detention at the end of the year were distributed as follows:—in English schools, 7919 (boys, Protestant, 4794, Roman Catholic, 1425; girls, Protestant, 1078, Roman Catholic, 622); in Scotch schools, 3490 (boys, Protestant, 2191, Roman Catholic, 292; girls, Protestant, 845, Roman Catholic, 162). The admissions, for the year 1874, excluding transfers, were 2871 (2335 boys and 536 girls). The admissions in the Scotch schools were 880 (boys, Protestant, 603, Roman Catholic, 75; girls, Protestant, 164, Roman Catholic, 38). The discharges for the year amounted to 2414—boys 1931, girls 483. 708 boys and 319 girls were placed in service or situations, 454 boys and 109 girls were assisted to employment through their relatives, 102 boys and 4 girls emigrated, 369 boys were sent to sea, 38 enlisted, 33 boys and 8 girls were discharged on account of disease, 50 boys and 5 girls were committed to reformatory schools, 92 boys and 30 girls died, and 85 boys and 8 girls had absconded and not been recovered. Of the 2871 children admitted in 1874, 126 boys and 71 girls were from 6 to 8 years old; 427 boys and 119 girls between 8 and 10; 1062 boys and 202 girls between 10 and 12; and 720 boys and 144 girls between 12 and 14 years old. 131 of the children were illegitimate; 230 had lost both, and 977 one, of their parents; 273 had been deserted by their parents; and one or both parents of 296 were destitute or criminal.

The number discharged from industrial schools during the years 1871-73 was 5182 (boys 4086, girls 1096). 125 of the boys and 27 of the girls have died; and 96 boys and 14 girls had been sent to reformatory schools; 2997 boys and 845 girls were doing well, and 176 boys and 83 girls were doubtful, 212 boys and 30 girls had been convicted, and 480 boys and 97 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 74·82 per cent. of the boys and 85·4 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 3·82 per cent. of the boys and 4·14 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 3·82 per cent. of the boys and 3·16 per cent. of the girls had been convicted, and 17·54 per cent. of the boys and 7·30 per cent. of the girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 81·46 of the boys and 91·4 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 1·96 per cent. of the boys and 3·23 per cent. of the girls were doubtful, 10·73 per cent. of the boys and 4·30 per cent. of the girls had been convicted, and 5·85 per cent. of the boys and 1·07 per cent. of the girls were unknown.

The total expenditure upon industrial schools in 1874, including rent, disposal, cost of building, and industrial loss (£220), was £252,845. The receipts amounted to £258,785, of which £134,333 was derived from the Treasury, £20,651 from rates, £48,607 from subscriptions, legacies, etc., £19,925 from school boards, £7371 as payment for voluntary inmates, £7518 from sundries, and £17,152 from industrial profit. The average cost per head, allowing for the results of the industrial departments, was in the English schools for boys only, £16, 6s. 10d.; in ships in England, £17, 5s. 0d.; in English schools for girls only, £17, 11s. 5d.; in mixed English schools for boys and girls, £13, 15s. 1d.

In Scotland the average cost per head was, for boys' schools, £14, 2s. 6d.; ship schools, £19, 3s. 4d.; girls' schools, £12, 18s. 0d.; and mixed schools, £11, 6s. 7d.

The sums received by the Treasury during the year from the parents of children under detention, and for Scotch industrial schools from parochial boards, were—for reformatory schools, £4936 (Scotland, £123); for industrial schools, £9093 (Scotland, £3233); total, £14,030.

The following list of schools in Scotland, certified under the Act 17 and 18 Vict. c. 74, shows also the average attendance and the total ordinary expenditure of each in 1874:—

The Edinburgh Burghal Industrial School, Poorhouse, Forrest Road (1856), and the Govan Parochial School, Govan Poorhouse (1854), hold licenses, but have ceased to be in operation.

THE SCIENCE AND ART DEPARTMENT.

The Twenty-second Report of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education upon the Science and Art Department is for the year 1874. The number of persons receiving instruction in science and art applicable to industry increased from 48,546 in 1873 to 53,050. The number of persons instructed in art increased from 290,176 in 1873 to 345,382, or nearly 18 per cent. The lectures at the South Kensington Museum were attended by 6303 persons in 1874, or 2717 less than in 1873. There were in 1874, at the Royal School of Mines, 24 regular and 167 occasional students; at the Royal College of Chemistry, 294 students; and at the Metallurgical Library, 48 students. The evening lectures at the Royal School of Mines were attended by 1612 persons; and 49 science teachers attended special courses of lectures provided for their instruction in the new Science Schools at South Kensington. At the Royal College of Science, Ireland, there were 26 regular and 34 occasional students; and 2193 persons attended the courses of lectures delivered in connexion with the department in Dublin. The attendance at the evening popular lectures which were delivered in the Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art, in 1873-74, was 2026. The total number of persons who

received instruction as students, or by means of lectures, in connexion with the Science and Art Department in 1874, was nearly 411,228, a total exceeding that of the previous year by 54,728, or nearly 15 per cent. The museums and collections under the superintendence of the department in London, Dublin, and Edinburgh, were visited in 1874 by upwards of 2,292,864 persons, showing a decrease of 113,476, or about 4 per cent., on the number in the preceding year. The attendance at the Art and Educational Libraries at South Kensington, and at the Library of the Royal Dublin Society, reached a total of 63,558 in 1874, being 1713 more than in 1873. The returns of the number of visitors at various local Art and Industrial Exhibitions to which objects were contributed from the South Kensington Museum, showed an attendance of upwards of 451,489. The expenditure of the department, during the financial year 1874-75, exclusive of the vote for the Geological Survey, was £237,156, or £3077 more than in 1873-74.

The area surveyed by the *Geological Survey of the United Kingdom* was 2906 square miles, as compared with 3149 square miles in the previous year. 1402 square miles were surveyed in England, 600 in Scotland, and 904 in Ireland. The falling off in the work done is attributed to the incompleteness of the staff in England and Scotland, and to the early setting in of winter. The return for Scotland shows a decrease of 105 square miles as compared with the previous year. The staff was concentrated in the southern division of Scotland, so as to complete the survey of the whole of the kingdom south of the Tay and Forth. The only portions of that division yet to be surveyed, are the south-western half of Roxburghshire, small parts of Berwickshire and of Eakdale in Dumfriesshire, and a portion of Kirkcudbrightshire. These districts will probably be done with by the close of 1875, and then the central and northern portions of Scotland will be proceeded with. The expenditure on the Geological Survey in the financial year 1874-75 had been £21,553; the expenditure on the Scotch branch of the survey being £3545.

The second portion of the building of the *Edinburgh Museum of Science and Art* had been completed during the year, so that the collections are now more available for public observation. The lectures to artisans have had to be discontinued, owing to the inadequate remuneration given to the lecturers. The number of visitors to the Museum in 1874 was 337,036, being 497 more than in 1873, and 25,174 above the average of the five preceding years. The expenditure on the Museum in the year ended 31st March 1875 was £9591; viz., salaries and wages, £3614; occasional assistance, £245; purchase of specimens, books, etc., £2011; repairs, fittings, etc., £2597; cleaning and materials, £168; travelling expenses, £199; police, £609; incidents, £144.

The number of Science Schools—which, in 1873, was 1182, with 48,546 persons under instruction—was, in 1874, 1336, comprising 4432 different classes, with 53,050 under instruction. 27,513 students of these classes came up for examination in May 1874, besides 2878 self-taught students and pupils of classes not under certificated masters. The number of papers worked by the 27,513 students from science schools was 61,796, and the number passed was 38,198. The number of students from science schools examined in 1873 was 24,674; the number of papers worked was 56,577, and the number of papers passed was 35,100. The number of first classes, 8782 in 1873, increased to 10,896 in 1874. In addition, 755 students came up in honours, of whom 319 were successful. The examinations were held at 922 centres, of which 79 were in London. The number of teachers who received payments according to results was 1422; the average payment to each was about £26; and the sum paid (£36,769) was at the rate of 13s. 10d. for each person under instruction. Grants amounting to £853 were made towards the purchase of apparatus, diagrams, and examples. The Schools were distributed as follows: 1080 in England, 109 in Scotland, and 185 in Ireland. The number of students in May 1874 was 39,893 in England, 6036 in Scotland, and 7527 in Ireland. In the schools classed as science schools, in some cases there is only a single class for instruction in one subject; in others there is a more or less complete course of study in different branches of science.

At the National Art Training School during the year ended 31st July 1874, 44 students in training to become art-teachers, and 15 national scholars in training to become designers, or art-workmen, received allowances to enable them to study in the school and museum. 7 students in training received appointments as masters in local schools of art. 22 students gained certificates of the third grade (giving qualification as instructors in schools of art). In addition to the students

maintained, 22 were admitted on payment of half fees, and 116 were instructed gratuitously. The whole number of students in the year was 721 and the fees paid amounted to £2552. Eight new schools of art were established during the year (one in Scotland, at Dollar). There are now 11 schools of art, giving instruction to 24,138 students, an increase in the year of 770. At the annual examination in April 1874, 13,306 students submitted 92,058 drawings or models; 10,328 were students of the industrial classes on whose account payments were made to the committees of the schools. In the elementary examinations of the second grade, 5190 students were successful. The amount of fees paid in schools of art was £24,836 in 1871; £25,944 in 1873, and £27,213 in 1874. The number of night classes increased from 613 in 1873 to 653 in 1874; the number of students attending them from 20,352 in 1873 to 21,851 in 1874. The number of schools for the poor in which drawing is taught increased from 2074 in 1873 to 2373 in 1874; and the number of children taught drawing in these schools, from 237,733 in 1873 to 290,451 in 1874. 711 teachers of elementary schools obtained certificates for drawing at the examination of the schools in November 1874, as against 636 in the preceding year.

The amount of the grants in aid of the purchase of examples and apparatus was, in 1874, £1855, paid on 516 requisitions. These grants are supplemented by payments from local committees. The amount of aid given by the department towards art instruction in 1874 was, to schools of art, £15,082; to night classes, £6539; to diocesan and other training colleges, £855; to schools for the poor, £17,523; to science classes, £271; to schools not entitled to receive payment on results (for prizes, examples, fittings, etc.), £131; total, £40,405. The corresponding total was, in 1873, £38,689, and in 1872, £31,716.

The chief details concerning *Schools of Art* in Scotland, during the year ended 31st July 1874, are collected in the following tabular statement (the amount of aid granted by the department including gratuities to teacher, cost of prizes, etc.):—

APPEALS FROM THE COURT OF SESSION TO THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

The number of appeals from the Court of Session, presented to the House of Lords, in the year 1874, was 16, of which 2 were in matters of real property, 8 in matters of personal property, 2 in matters of real and personal property, and 4 in matters of a miscellaneous kind. 3 causes were withdrawn, and 4 causes were dismissed for want of prosecution.

The number of judgments delivered in 1874, including causes heard in previous sessions and standing over for judgment, was 10. In 8 causes the judgment appealed from was affirmed; in 2 the judgment appealed from was reversed. The number of causes heard during the session of 1874, including causes standing over for judgment, was 11 (one of which was upon the question of competency, the appeal being dismissed as incompetent). The number of effective causes remaining for hearing was 8. The amount of fees was £500, 17s. 6d.

The 52 banks, on the 20th November 1874, had 52 unpaid and 191 paid officers. The amount of security given by the unpaid officers was £13,010; by the paid officers, £40,880. The salaries and allowances of the paid officers amounted to £13,381. The annual expenses of management, inclusive of all payments and salaries, amounted to £19,448, being at the rate of 7s. 10d. per cent. on the capital of the banks. The total amount invested with the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt (exclusive of the surplus fund) was £4,941,687; the balance in the hands of the treasurer,

£40,881; the surplus fund in the hands of the Commissioners, £2662. The average rate of interest paid to depositors was £2, 19s. 5d.

The number of Savings Banks which, under the provisions of 26 Vict. c. 14, or otherwise, had been closed in the United Kingdom, and had transferred their funds, or any part thereof, to Post-office Savings Banks, up to 20th November 1874, was 179 (156 in England and Wales, 7 in Scotland, and 16 in Ireland). The number of depositors' balances on 20th November previous to date of notice of these banks to close was 170,290 (162,253 in England and Wales, 2469 in Scotland, and 5568 in Ireland). The amount of such balances was £4,136,453 (£3,939,490 in England and Wales, £23,516 in Scotland, and £173,446 in Ireland). The number of accounts transferred to Post-office Savings Banks was 89,307 (87,405 in England and Wales, 238 in Scotland, and 1664 in Ireland). The amount of the accounts transferred (*viz.*, by *transfer certificates*, excluding £219,805 estimated to have been paid in *cash* by about 11,475 of the depositors in these closed banks to the Post-office Savings Banks) was £2,287,872 (£2,231,430 in England and Wales, £634 in Scotland, and £55,807 in Ireland). The amount of compensation paid to officers of these closed banks, under the Act 26 Vict. c. 14, was £32,611.

FISHERIES.

The herring fishery of 1873 had been the largest up to that date recorded; but, large as it was, it was exceeded by that of 1874. The fishery of 1874 exceeded that of any previous year, alike in cure, in export, and in branding. The cure of 1874 was 1,000,561 barrels, the export 737,314½ barrels, the quantity branded 517,558½ barrels, yielding £8625, 19s. 6d. of brand fees. There was an excess over 1873 of 61,327½ barrels in the quantity cured, of 69,306½ barrels in the quantity exported, of 82,284 barrels in the quantity branded, and of £1371, 8s. in the brand fees. There was an excess over the average of the seven years 1867-73 of 216,386½ barrels in the quantity cured, of 233,282½ barrels in the quantity exported, of 192,497½ barrels in the quantity branded, and of £3208, 5s. 10d. in the amount of brand fees; showing in 1874, as compared with the average of the seven years preceding, an increase of 27 per cent. in the quantity cured, of 46 per cent. in the quantity exported, and of 59 per cent. in the quantity branded and the amount of brand fees. The increase occurred on both the east and west coasts; the Fraserburgh, Peterhead, Aberdeen, Montrose, and Eyemouth stations on the former coast, and the Loch Carron district on the other showing a marked increase. The early herring fishing off the Hebrides, however, was not generally successful; the fishing of the Inveraray district, which includes Loch Fyne, also proved deficient; and the winter herring fishing was very deficient, as well in the estuaries as on the open coast. In the sprat fishing, the quantity caught and the money return proved better than in the previous year.

The Meteorological Society of Scotland continued during the year its observations as to the effect of the temperature of the sea and other meteorological conditions on the migrations of the herring. These observations show that "during the periods when good or heavy catches were taken, the barometer

was, in the great majority of cases, high and steady, the winds light or moderate, and electrical phenomena wanting;" and, on the other hand, that low catches occurred with "a low barometer, strong winds, unsettled weather, and thunder and lightning."

The *Cod, Ling, and Hake* Fishery of the year 1874 produced 143,466½ cwt. cured dried, and 6754½ barrels cured in pickle, as compared with 160,716½ cwt. cured dried, and 12,381½ barrels cured in pickle, in 1873. There was thus a decrease of 17,250½ cwt. cured dried, and of 5627½ barrels cured in pickle. There was exported in 1874, 60,913 cwt. cured dried, being a decrease of 9188½ cwt. upon 1873. The number of fish taken in 1874 was 4,541,089, being 453,515 less than in the previous year.

723 applications for the registering of fishing boats under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, were made during 1874, and the number of registers examined and indorsed during the year was 6420. These numbers, the highest yet returned, are taken as showing that the owners and masters of boats are getting to observe the requirements of the Act habitually as among the obligations attaching to their employment.

Besides the 48,270 fishermen, curers, and coopers employed in 1874, it is estimated that 40,488 other persons were employed in the fisheries in the same year. The tonnage of the boats was 105,577 tons. 4927 of the boats were of the first class (30 feet keel and upwards), 4535 of the second class (from 18 to 30 feet keel), and 5385 of the third class (under 18 feet keel).

The number of barrels of herrings salted or cured in the several districts, during the year 1874, was as follows: Eyemouth, 52,060; Leith, 704;

THE TWEED FISHERIES ACTS.

The Special Commissioners appointed to inquire into the operation of the Tweed Fisheries Acts (Mr Spencer Walpole, inspector of salmon fisheries in England and Wales, and Mr Archibald Young, advocate, commissioner of Scottish salmon fisheries), held inquiries at Berwick, Kelso, Galashiels, Hawick, Jedburgh, and Peebles. They found that since 1857 there has been a rapid and continuous increase in the assessable value of the Tweed fisheries, which had risen from £4920 in that year to £11,224 in 1874. At the same time, figures which had been put before them showed that between the years mentioned, the take of fish in the Tweed had considerably decreased. It appeared from these figures that in the five years 1854-58 the average annual take on the Tweed amounted to 10,520 salmon, 26,965 grilse, and 31,976 trout. In the five following years, 1859-63, the average fell to 9222 salmon, 20,118 grilse, and 26,895 trout. The average of the next quinquennial period, 1864-68, was 9141 salmon, 18,549 grilse, and 35,518 trout; and the six years following, 1869-74, showed a further decrease, the annual average being reduced to 10,532 salmon, 15,456 grilse, and 28,841 trout. Thus, while in the first of the four periods noticed, the gross annual take amounted to 69,461 fish, in the last of the four periods, it was only 54,829 fish. These figures (prepared by Mr Robertson, a director of the Berwick Salmon Fisheries Company) were not put forward as perfectly accurate, but were generally believed in the district to be nearly correct. Assuming them to be correct, the assessable value of the fisheries had increased by more than 120 per cent. during a period in which the take of fish had diminished by more than 20 per cent.; and while the former fact seemed to show that recent legislation for the fisheries had been highly beneficial, the latter indicated that it had been of no benefit whatever. The explanation given on the Tweed was that the selling price of salmon has increased since 1857, so as more than to counteract the falling-off in the number of fish taken; but it appeared that there had practically been no rise except in the price of trout, and the Commissioners could not accept this as accounting for the increase in the assessment. The real explanation they thought to be, that in 1857 the fisheries were, for purposes of assessment, greatly undervalued, while they now seem to be assessed at their maximum value, and that there has been since that time a great increase of competition for the fishings. Keeping these things in view, they think that Mr Robertson's figures must be accepted, and that the legislation proposed in 1857, to restore the Tweed to the productiveness which it displayed in a former generation, has not only failed to do this, but has not prevented the yield of the river from being further reduced. They think that this is in a great measure attributable to three causes: (1) the increasing pollution of the Tweed and its tributaries; (2) the wholesale poaching which is practised on the river, and which is encouraged or endured by the great mass of the population; and, (3) the great use now made of land drainage in the highly farmed districts through which the river flows. Trout require less water, and run in less water, than grilse or salmon, and the land drainage, the effect of which is to charge the entire rainfall in a

few hours into the river, and keep it in flood for a very short time, after which it falls rapidly, has accordingly done less to decrease the number of trout than that of grilse and salmon. For land drainage there can be no direct remedy, but the Commissioners think that if the Tweed Acts have failed to compensate the fisheries for the loss sustained through it, it is because of the increasing pollution of the river—against which, the River Commission has hitherto struggled in vain—and the wholesale poaching which is practised, encouraged by the unpopularity of the Tweed Acts. On the lower part of the river the complaints made against the Acts are chiefly directed against the 45th, 50th, and 51st sections of the Act of 1857—against the prohibition of fishing, during the annual close-time, with pout-nets or “nets of any other kind or description whatever,” in the river (including under the Acts a considerable portion of the adjacent seas), which prevents fishermen from fishing for herrings or other sea-fish; and against the provisions which forbid unlicensed persons within five miles of the river from having in their possession any net or engine such as is used for the taking of salmon, and authorize the searching of dwelling-houses for illegal nets. The first complaint, it is said, proceeds on a misapprehension—only nets similar to pout-nets being really prohibited. Though the second infers that fishermen cannot fish for salmon within five miles of the coasts of Northumberland and Berwickshire, from the northernmost boundary of the county of Berwick to a point in Northumberland seven miles south of the mouth of the Tweed, the Commissioners think that the practical effect of it is only slight, and as the provision objected to has existed for eighty years, since 1797, no living person can be injured by its continuance, while the proprietors of the salmon fishings would find their property depreciated by its repeal. They think the third complaint to a certain extent well-founded, and suggest that, the section complained of (the 51st) being retained, the Tweed Commissioners should be authorized to allow any net fishermen, licensed to fish within the limits of any other fishery district, to possess a net for catching salmon on conditions to be named by them. Higher up the river the complaints made referred chiefly to the section of the Act of 1857 which prohibits the capture of kelts or unclean fish, and to the section of the General Scotch Salmon Fisheries Act which prohibits the use of roe. The former provision, it is said, practically prohibits anglers in the upper waters from taking any salmon at all; but the Commissioners say that if it were legal to take kelts with the rod, the possession of kelts must be made legal, and that if this were so, kelts would be taken by other means than angling. The use of roe is said to be necessary to give anglers in the upper waters their fair share of the produce of the river, while though attractive to trout, salmon do not readily take to it; but the Commissioners think the permission of the use of roe would be too dangerous, and suggest that, instead of it being permitted, the sale of it should be made illegal, and also the possession of roe prepared for the purposes of fishing. Grave objection was taken at all parts of the river to the powers possessed by water-bailiffs under the Acts, and to the manner in which they are exercised, to the employment of the police in the protection of the river, and to the provision authorizing magistrates to convict on the evidence of one credible witness—usually a water-bailiff or policeman—or in default of the appearance of the accused. It was urged, too, that alleged offenders should be tried before the sheriff, and at the instance of the procurator-fiscal; that the cost of maintaining convicted persons and their families should be borne by the Fishery Commissioners and not thrown upon the rates; and that the penalties imposed ought not to go to the Commissioners, but to the county rates. The Commissioners say that the penalties do not defray the cost of prosecution; also that, speaking generally, they have not been very severe, but that cases have occurred in which penalties which were evidently excessive have been imposed, and they accordingly suggest amendments in the law as to penalties. The Commissioners also discuss the subject of the annual and weekly close-time, and the provisions relative to stake and bag nets, mill-dams, and other permanent obstructions to the run of salmon in the river; and, in conclusion, they recapitulate the recommendations they have to make as follows:—

1st, That the annual close-time for nets should be extended to the 28th February, commencing as it does now on the 15th September. 2d, That the annual close-time for rods should commence on the 15th November, and extend to the 28th February. 3d, That there should be a close-time for river trout, which should commence on the 1st October and terminate on the 28th February. 4th, That the sale and possession of trout during this period should be made illegal. 5th, That no bait or lure except the artificial fly should be used in angling for salmon from the 14th September to the 1st May. 6th, That the Commissioners should have power to raise the statutory assessment from 20 to 30 per cent. 7th, That the Commissioners should have power to impose licenses not exceeding £1 on the main river below the cauld at Walkerburn, and not exceeding 10s. on the main stream above that point and on all the tributaries, on all persons angling for salmon. 8th, That the Commissioners should be compelled, on being furnished with funds for the purpose by any proprietor or proprietors of fisheries, to put in force the provisions of section 56 of the Act of 1857 with respect to caulds. 9th, That hecks or gratings should be placed at the intake of every mill-lade, and also at the exit of every tail-lade, during such periods of each year as shall be determined by the Commissioners. 10th, That the prohibition of persons fishing during close-time with pout-nets or nets of any other kind or description whatsoever, shall not apply to persons fishing for white fish in the sea. 11th, That the Commissioners should be empowered to authorize sea fishermen to possess nets for the capture of salmon, and to prescribe the conditions on which such nets should be possessed. 12th, That the possession and sale of fish roe, prepared for the purposes of fishing, should be made illegal. 13th, That the 69th section of the Act of 1857 should be repealed, and that "the intent to fish" should be proved in ordinary course of law. 14th, That accused persons should not be convicted, in default of appearance, without proof. 15th, That the power of arrest should be confined to offences committed at night, and to the more serious offences committed in the day-time. 16th, That the water-bailiffs and police should have statutory powers of searching the baskets, etc., of persons suspected of having illegal fish in possession. 17th, That, in the case of first offences, the amount of the fine and the period of imprisonment should be left, in every case, to the discretion of the Court. 18th, That the Court should not be bound to inflict a greater penalty than £2, 10s. for any second, or than £5 for any third or later offence. 19th, That unauthorized persons fishing for trout and capturing a salmon should be bound to return such salmon into the river, in lieu of delivering it to the owner or occupier of the fisheries; and that section 73 of the Act of 1857 should be repealed. 20th, That the 76th section of the Act of 1857 should be altered, so as to include the provisions of the 23d and 24th Vict. cap. 45 (an Act to extend the Fresh Water Fisheries (Scotland) Act). 21st, That stake-nets and bag-nets should not be used in conjunction with each other, and that no additional fixed nets should be erected. They add that they are strongly of opinion that section 65 of the Tweed Fisheries Act of 1857 relative to pollutions has proved totally inoperative, and that the pollutions of the Tweed and its tributaries are annually increasing. They hesitate to recommend the introduction of any remedy for this serious evil in a Fishery Act; but they desire to record their conviction, "that the Salmon Fisheries of the Tweed can neither be improved nor maintained unless some stringent legislation on the subject of river pollution, in the interest of public health, is sanctioned by Parliament."

Of the 13,927,205 tons of coal, cinders, and patent fuel exported from the United Kingdom in 1874, there were exported 2,370,661 tons of the declared value of £1,876,158 to France; 2,057,029 tons of the declared value of £1,626,665 to Germany; 883,765 tons of the declared value of £772,137 to Russian ports; 662,289 tons of the declared value of £523,138 to Denmark; 601,279 tons of the declared value of £518,265 to Sweden; 447,621 tons of the declared value of £386,016 to Holland; 581,613 tons of the declared value of £582,469 to Spain and the Canaries; 966,138 tons of the declared value of £833,147 to Italy; 311,991 tons of the declared value of £280,350 to Turkey; 639,276 tons of the declared value of £596,282 to Egypt; 382,433 tons of the declared value of £330,560 to British India (continental territories); 187,410 tons of the declared value of £139,138 to British North America; 136,577 tons of the declared value of £110,242 to British West Indies; 289,475 tons of the declared value of £249,825 to Foreign West Indies; 41,881 tons of the declared value of £48,184 to the United States ports on the Atlantic; 71,902 tons of the declared value of £56,114 to United States ports on the Pacific; 210,772 tons of the declared value of £171,695 to Chili; 386,357 tons of the declared value of £396,648 to Brazil; 180,442 tons of the declared value of £175,636 to Uruguay; 128,141 tons of the declared value of £122,029 to Peru.

THE ORDNANCE SURVEY.

In the Report of Major-General Sir Henry James on the progress of the Ordnance Survey, it is stated that the survey on the scale of 6 inches to a mile is to be abandoned, except for the uncultivated parts of the country. Maps of Ireland on this scale had been found of immense importance for the valuation of the country, and it was thereupon resolved to adopt that scale in Great Britain: and in England, Yorkshire and Lancashire; in Scotland, Wigtownshire, Kirkcudbrightshire, Edinburghshire, Haddingtonshire, Fifeshire, Kinross-shire, and the Isle of Lewis, were surveyed on the 6-inch scale. It was soon found, however, that in Great Britain, the absence of townlands, the areas of which were engraved upon the plans of Ireland, rendered the 6-inch scale plans of far less value than they were in Ireland;

and it was ultimately decided that the scale of 1-2500, or 1 inch to 1 acre, should be adopted for all the cultivated parts of Great Britain. The zincographed plans on the 1-2500 scale are reduced by photography to the 6-inch scale, and the plans of the whole United Kingdom are being engraved on copper on this one uniform scale.

The survey of the whole of the mainland of Scotland was finished in 1873, and all the plans have now been drawn. In 1874, the survey was confined to the islands on the north-west coast, but the progress of it had been interfered with by the excessive amount of rain which fell during the autumn. The islands of Mull and Skye, however, have been finished, leaving only the islands of Jura and Islay, with the small group of islands called the Long Island, to be dealt with. The Orkney and Shetland Islands also have yet to be surveyed. The 1-inch plan of Scotland (as also that of Ireland) has been made; and the map of any part between Berwick-on-Tweed and John o' Groat's can now be had, excepting that of the very mountainous parts of Argyllshire and Ross-shire. Fac-similes of a series of documents, consisting chiefly of royal and other charters and important state papers relating to Scotland, have been made, and published in three volumes.

The area surveyed in England up to the end of 1874, was 26,358 square miles (the area of the country being 58,000 square miles); of which 1456 square miles were surveyed in 1874.

The area surveyed in Scotland up to the end of 1874, was 28,858 square miles (the area of the country being 30,000 square miles); and of this, 1029 square miles were surveyed in 1874. The survey of Ireland was completed several years ago, and the maps are now being revised.

The plans of parishes in Scotland on the 1-2500 scale had been published for the cultivated portions of the counties of Aberdeen, Ayr, Banff, Berwick, Bute, Caithness, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Elgin, Forfar, Kincardine, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairn, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling, and for the mainland of Argyllshire and Inverness-shire. The publication is now in progress for Ross, Cromarty, and Sutherland. The area published in 1874 was 296 square miles; and the total area published on this scale amounted at the end of the year to 10,908 square miles.

The six-inch maps had been published of the following counties in Scotland: viz., Aberdeen, Ayr, Banff, Berwick, Bute, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Edinburgh, Elgin, Forfar, Fife, Haddington, Kincardine, Kinross, Kirkcudbright, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairn, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling, Wigtown, and the Isle of Lewis; and the maps of Argyllshire, Caithness, Inverness-shire, Ross and Cromarty, and Sutherland, were in progress of engraving. The area published during 1874 was 1610 square miles, making a total area of 19,850 square miles published on this scale.

Of the one-inch map of Scotland, two sheets, including 864 square miles, were published during 1874, making the area published on this scale 14,394 square miles.

The survey of the towns in Scotland is complete. With a few exceptions, the maps of towns in Scotland are on the 1-500 or *ten feet* scale.

The sale of the Ordnance Maps of Scotland (including £772, the value of those supplied to public departments, and under the provisions of the Copyright Act), during the year 1874, yielded the sum of £2001 (viz., one-inch maps, £315; six-inch maps, £658; 1-2500 scale maps, with area books, £867; town maps on various scales, £159).

AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS.

In his Report prefixed to the Agricultural Returns for 1874, Mr Valpy states that the total number of returns obtained in Great Britain in 1874 was 561,185—422,443 for England, 57,735 for Wales, and 81,007 for Scotland; 2297 more were obtained from the Isle of Man, and 3778 from the Channel Islands. The number of holdings returned in Ireland was about 600,000. The holdings were not in 1874 classified according to their size.

The total number of acres of cultivated land returned in 1874 as under crops, bare fallow, or grass, was, for the whole of the United Kingdom, 47,143,000 acres—for Great Britain, 31,267,000; Ireland, 15,752,000; Isle of Man, 94,000; and the Channel Islands, 30,000 acres; 2,187,000 acres were returned as under woods in Great Britain, and 325,000 acres in Ireland. The returns show a gradual increase year by year in the land under cultivation. This increase amounted in the six years from 1868 to 1874 to 970,000 acres, or 4·2 per cent., in England; 175,000 acres, or 7 per cent., in Wales; 166,000 acres, or 3·8 per cent., in Scotland; and to 1,311,000 acres, or 4·3 per cent., for the whole of Great Britain. A large allowance must be made for an increase of the accuracy of returns, but it is stated to be beyond question that several thousands of acres of fresh land are annually brought under the plough or improved for pasturage. The reclamation of waste land was mentioned in 1874 as having added to the cultivated acreage in 10 English, 8 Welsh, and in as many as 14 Scotch counties. Between 1868 and 1872 the increased acreage returned was chiefly for arable lands; but in 1873 and 1874, there was a falling-off of arable acreage, and a more decided increase in the acreage of permanent pasture. The number of agricultural labourers, though it may still be more than equal to the demand for them, diminished considerably between 1861 and 1871 in Great Britain. In 1871, according to the Census Returns, the total number of persons engaged in the management and working of the soil (including farmers and graziers, farm bailiffs, labourers, indoor farm servants, and shepherds) was 1,246,000 in England and Wales, 220,000 in Scotland, and 931,706 in Ireland. In England, with 56 per cent. of acreage under the plough, 100 acres were managed and worked on an average by 4·8 persons, while in Ireland, with only 33 per cent. of arable acreage, there were 6 persons employed on every 100 acres.

The total acreage returned as under cultivation in 1874 in the United Kingdom (including the Islands), 47,143,000 acres, was as nearly as possible equally divided into arable land and permanent pasture—the proportions being 49·8 of the former to 50·2 of the latter. There were in England 56·5 acres arable to 43·5 of pasture; in Wales, 39 acres arable to 61 of pasture; in Scotland, 75·8 acres arable to 24·2 of pasture; in Ireland, 33·5 acres arable to 66·5 of pasture. It is to be noted that heath and mountain land, though used largely for sheep-runs in connection with arable farms in Scotland, is not included as ordinary pasture land in the returns. The arable land returned for the United Kingdom in 1874, amounting to 23,463,000 acres, was apportioned to the principal classes of crops in the proportion of 48 per cent. for corn crops, 21 per cent. for green crops (including potatoes), 3 per cent. for bare fallow, and 27 per cent. for artificial grasses, leaving a small proportion over for hops and flax. In England rather more than one half, or 55 per cent., of the arable acreage was occupied by corn crops, 20 per cent. by green crops, and 19 per cent. by artificial grasses. In Wales, the proportion of the arable land devoted to corn crops was large, being about one half, or 49 per cent.; the proportion for green crops was only about 12 per cent., and artificial grasses had as much as 35 per cent. In Scotland, the corn crops did not take more than 40 per cent. of the arable acreage, the green crops reached 20 per cent., and the artificial grasses had as much as 39 per cent. In Ireland, the corn crops were only upon about one third, or 36 per cent., of the arable acreage, the green crops (including potatoes) upon 25 per cent., and the artificial grasses upon 36 per cent.

The extent of land under wheat in the United Kingdom in 1874 amounted to 3,830,000 acres, and although this was more by 160,000 acres than in 1873, it was below the total in 1872 by 9000 acres. The 3,830,000 acres under wheat in Great Britain in 1874 was 140,000 acres more than in 1873, and about 30,000 above the acreage in 1872, but 58,000 acres below the acreage in 1869, the year of the largest wheat acreage yet returned. In England in 1874, 3,391,000 acres were under wheat, a higher acreage than in 1873 by 138,000 acres, and by 54,000 acres than in 1872, but 26,000 acres below the total for 1869. The wheat crop was the only corn crop for which there was a larger acreage in the United Kingdom in 1874 as compared with 1873. The total acreage under barley in 1874 was in Great Britain 2,288,000 acres, or 48,000 less than in 1873, and in Ireland 212,000 acres, or 19,000 less than in 1873.

The acreage of the barley crop in Great Britain in 1874 was smaller than in any year since 1869. The total acreage under oats in 1874 was in Great Britain 2,596,000 acres, or nearly 80,000 less than in 1873, and in Ireland 1,480,000 acres, or 30,000 less than in 1873. The acreage for oats in 1874 is the smallest that has been returned for Great Britain, and it was below that for 1869 by 186,000 acres. In Ireland, during the same period, the decrease in the acreage under oats exceeded 200,000 acres, and an annual reduction in the quantity of land cultivated with this corn crop continues to be shown by the returns.

The potato crop in Great Britain occupied 520,400 acres in 1874, against 514,600 acres in 1873, showing a difference of only about 5000 acres in favour of 1874. The crop in that year, however, was 44,000 acres less than in 1872, and 107,000 below what it was in 1871. The potato disease was very prevalent in 1872. Allowing for a moderate acreage under potatoes in Wales, about two thirds of the potato crop of Great Britain are grown in England, and one third in Scotland. The acreage under potatoes in Ireland has fallen greatly of late years. For some years previous to 1872 it rather exceeded 1,000,000 acres. In 1874 it was no more than 892,000 acres. Turnips and swedes show a small increase of 11,000 acres in Great Britain in 1874 over 1873. In England the increase amounted to 20,000 acres. But the total of 2,133,000 acres under these roots in Great Britain in 1874, although above the totals for 1873 and 1872, was 77,000 acres below that for 1870.

In the acreage for hay, there was in Great Britain in 1874, as compared with 1873, a decrease of 93,000 acres in land under clover and rotation grasses, and of 136,000 acres in land under permanent pasture; and, as compared with 1872, a decrease of 255,000 acres of clover and rotation grasses, and of 298,000 acres of permanent pasture. In 1872, however, the acreage for hay was much above that of 1871 and of 1870. In 1874, the decrease occurred altogether in England; there being in Wales little variation from the previous year, while in Scotland there was a small increase in the acreage for clover hay. The acreage reserved for hay is said to fluctuate more in England than in Wales or Scotland, and this is ascribed to a greater liability to drought in England. The total acreage of the land used for artificial grasses in Great Britain in 1874 was smaller than in 1873 by 26,000 acres. There was an increase in the total acreage returned as under permanent pasture in Great Britain in 1874 of 262,000 acres over 1873, and 603,000 acres over 1872.

The number of horses returned in Great Britain was larger in 1874 than in 1873 by 35,000, the increase being chiefly in the class of mares for breeding, and unbroken horses. The number of horses of these descriptions (in which occurs the chief part of the addition annually made to the general stock of horses in this country) has advanced from 301,000 in 1870 to 367,000 in 1874, showing an increase in five years of 66,000, or nearly 22 per cent. A large part of this increase occurred in the last two years, and a larger part in 1874 than in 1873, which shows that high prices have had the natural effect of encouraging the breeding of horses. The licences for horses in Great Britain increased between 1870 and 1873 from 841,000 to 865,000.

The number of horses returned as used solely for agriculture, was large in 1874 than in the three preceding years, although smaller than in 1870. The number of horses returned in Ireland was smaller in 1874 than in 1873. The number of horses imported from abroad into the United Kingdom was 17,800 in 1873, and the number exported from the United Kingdom was 2800. In the first ten months of 1874, the number imported was 10,600, and the number exported was 2650. So far as can be judged by official returns the stock of horses in the United Kingdom is increasing in numbers, though perhaps not so quickly as the demand in the case of some descriptions of horses. The stock of cattle in Great Britain was larger in 1874 than in 1873 by 161,000. This was an increase much smaller than that of the previous year; but there were 788,000 or 15 per cent. more cattle in 1874 than in 1871. The increase in 1874 was chiefly noticed in cattle above two years old. It was only in England that the number of young cattle was greater in 1874 than in 1873; in Wales there was no change, and in Scotland there was a decrease in cattle under two years old. The beef-yielding stock increase

in Scotland by 17,000 in 1874. The number of cattle in Ireland was less in 1874 than in 1873, but greater than in the years preceding 1873. The stock of sheep in Great Britain was larger in 1874 than in 1873 by 886,000; it was larger in 1873 than in 1872 by 1,506,000. The dry weather of 1874 told less upon sheep than upon lambs, causing as it did more lambs to be killed early in the season. The increase of sheep was 671,000 in 1874 against 817,000 in 1873, but lambs only increased by 215,000 in 1874 against 689,000 in 1873. The number of sheep in Ireland shows a decrease in 1874 of 49,000, but in the first ten months of the year 66,000 more sheep were exported to Great Britain than in the same period of 1873. The supplies of foreign cattle and sheep do not increase, being not greater now than they were ten years ago. In round numbers the imports may be stated at about 200,000 head of cattle of all ages, and 800,000 sheep. There were not so many pigs kept in Great Britain in 1874 by 78,000 as in 1873, and not so many by 349,000 as in 1872. Dearness of feeding stuffs prevailed both in 1874 and 1873, and disease also reduced the numbers in 1873. In Ireland, the number of pigs was larger by 52,000 in 1874 than in 1873.

The following Table shows, for each division of the United Kingdom, and for the United Kingdom (including the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands), the population in 1871, the total area (in statute acres), the abstract of acreage under all kinds of crops, bare fallow, and grass; under corn crops (including beans and pease); under green crops; under bare fallow; under grass, clover, etc., under rotation, and under permanent pasture; and also the percentage of acreage under each description of crop (stated exclusively of the small percentages for flax and hops), in each of the years 1873 and 1874. [In this and the succeeding tables the first row of figures placed opposite to each particular, consists of the figures for 1873; the second row, of the figures for 1874.]

In Great Britain there were 9394 acres under flax in 1874, against 14,683 in 1873. In Scotland there were 259 acres under flax in 1874, against 741 in 1872. In Ireland there were 106,886 acres under flax in 1874, against 129,432 acres in the previous year. There were, in 1874, eight counties in Scotland in which flax was more or less grown, but only four counties in which the land under this crop amounted to 12 acres. There were, in 1874, 18 acres under flax in Ayrshire, 32 in Dumbartonshire, 63 in Lanarkshire, and 129 in Stirlingshire.

The next Table gives the abstract of live stock returned, and the proportionate number of live stock to every 100 acres under crops, fallow, and grass in each division of the United Kingdom, and the totals for the United Kingdom (including the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands) for the years 1873 and 1874; also the number of persons from whom returns were obtained for the year 1874. In Great Britain only horses used for agriculture, unbroken horses, and mares kept solely for breeding, are included in the returns. In Ireland all descriptions of horses are included. The proportionate number of horses for 100 acres in Great Britain in 1874 would be increased from 4.2 to 7.1 per cent by adding to the number included in the Agricultural Returns, 915,000 for the number of all other descriptions of horses.

For Great Britain, the total number of acres in 1875 under wheat was 3,342,481, against 3,630,300 in 1874; under barley, 2,509,701 in 1875, against 2,287,987 in 1874; under oats, 2,664,009, against 2,596,384; under rye, 54,903, against 47,228; under beans, 564,181, against 559,044; and under pease, 316,375, against 310,547. In all, there were under corn crops in 1875 in Great Britain 9,451,650 acres, against 9,431,490 in 1874. There was a diminution in the breadth under wheat of 287,819 acres, but an increase of 221,714 acres under barley, and of 67,615 acres under oats.

The total acreage under green crops in Great Britain in 1875 was 3,664,104 acres, against 3,581,270 acres in 1874. Of potatoes, there were 522,653 acres, against 520,430 in 1874; turnips and swedes, 2,142,698 acres, against 2,133,336; mangold, 361,615 acres, against 322,614; cabbage, kohl, etc., 189,733 acres, against 169,285; vetches, lucerne, etc., 432,469 acres, against 421,678; flax, 6751 acres, against 9394; hops, 69,203 acres, against 65,805; clover, sanfor, and grasses under rotation, 4,354,071 acres, against 4,340,742; permanent pasture, meadow, or grass not broken up in rotation, 13,313,486 acres, against 13,178,012 in 1874.

The number of horses in Great Britain returned by occupiers of land in 1875 was 1,340,129, against 1,311,739 in 1874; of cattle, 6,012,824, against 6,125,491; of sheep, 29,166,139, against 30,313,941; and of pigs, 2,229,918, against 2,422,832. It thus appears that while the number of agricultural horses had increased by 28,390, the number of cattle was reduced by 112,667, of sheep by 1,147,802, and of pigs by 192,914.

PRICES OF GRAIN.

WRECKS AND CASUALTIES.

The wreck statistics are now made up for the year from the 1st July to the 30th June, instead of as formerly for the year ending 31st December. It is expected that the change will enable the abstracts of wrecks, casualties, and collisions to be presented to Parliament early in the session; and it will bring together in one publication all wrecks and casualties that happen in one winter.

The number of wrecks, casualties, and collisions from all causes on and near the coasts of the United Kingdom (in waters within 10 miles from the shores of the United Kingdom, in waters within any bays or estuaries, in waters around any outlying sandbanks which are dry at low water, in the seas between Great Britain and Ireland, and between the Orkney and Shetland and Western Islands and the mainland of Scotland), reported during the year ended 30th June 1874 was 1803—401 more than the number reported during the year 1872-73. The annual average number of wrecks and casualties during the five years (1869-1873-74, omitting the first six months of 1873) was 1790½. In the wrecks, casualties, and collisions of 1873-74, 506 lives were lost on 130 vessels. Of the casualties in 1873-74, about 1 in 14 resulted in loss of life. The number of ships lost or damaged in the 1803 casualties of 1873-74 was 2191—501 fewer than in the year 1872-73—and their tonnage was upwards of 507,000 tons; 1609 of those vessels are known to have belonged to Great Britain and its dependencies, with British certificates of registry, 151 (with a tonnage of 29,740 tons) to have been British vessels not registered under the Merchant Shipping Acts, and 363 to have belonged to foreign countries, while the country and employment of the remaining 68 are unknown. Of the British vessels, 1170 were employed in the coasting trade, and 590 in the (over-sea) foreign and home trade. 9 of the foreign vessels were employed in the British coasting trade. The number of collisions was 381, and of wrecks and casualties other than collisions, 1422. Of these 1422, 346 resulted in total loss, and 1076 in partial damage. The number of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, reported in the year 1872-73 was 1732, 310 more than the number

in 1873-74. The annual average of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, for the 18½ years ended June 1874, was 1238½ — total losses 464½, and partial damage 774½. Of the 381 collisions which occurred in 1873-74, 62 resulted in total loss, and 319 in partial damage; the averages of the ten years ended in June 1874 were, total losses 82, partial damage 314½. Taking the losses and casualties not caused by collisions, of the 346 total losses, 128 are said to have been caused by stress of weather, 93 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, 30 by defects in the ships or their equipments (19 vessels foundering from unseaworthiness); of the other 1076 casualties, 525 were caused by stress of weather, 180 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, and 91 by defects in the ships or their equipments. In the year 1872-73 52 vessels were lost and 133 sustained damage through defects in the ship or her equipments. In the ten years ended 30th June 1874, 558 ships appear to have been lost, and 852 to have been damaged, from defects in the ships or their equipments. In 1873-74, there were on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom 165 wrecks and casualties to smacks and other fishing vessels. Of the remaining vessels which suffered wreck or other casualty during the year, 2026 in number, nearly a half, 919, belonged to the class of colliers and vessels carrying ores, chiefly employed in the coasting trade. The life lost in 1873-74 was distributed as follows:—In fishing smacks, 76; in vessels of the collier class, 195; and in other vessels, 235. 182 wrecks and casualties happened in 1873-74 to nearly new ships; 354 to ships from three to seven years old; 481 to ships from seven to fourteen years old; 615 to ships from fifteen to thirty years old; 302 to old ships from thirty to fifty years old; 41 to ships between fifty and sixty; 13 to ships between sixty and seventy; 6 to ships between seventy and eighty; 5 to ships between eighty and ninety; 2 to ships between ninety and a hundred; and 2 to ships over a hundred years old. The ages of 188 vessels were unknown. Of the 2191 vessels lost or damaged in 1873-74, 270 were steam-ships, 92 were rigged as ships, 609 were schooners, 216 brigs, 288 barques, 212 brigantines, and 151 smacks, the remainder being small vessels rigged in various ways. 1022 of them did not exceed 100 tons burthen, 660 were from 100 to 300 tons, 323 from 300 to 600, and only 186 were above 600 tons burthen. Of the 270 steamers, 226 were built of iron; and of the 1921 sailing vessels, 42 were built of iron, and 8 were composite. Of the wrecks and casualties of all kinds which occurred in the year 1873-74, 716 occurred on the east coast (from Dungeness to Duncansbay Head), 241 on the south coast, 545 on the west coast (from the Land's End to the Mull of Cantyre), 66 on the north and west coast of Scotland (from the Mull of Cantyre to Duncansbay Head, including Orkney and Shetland, the Hebrides, etc.), 213 on the Irish coast. 1002 happened when the wind was at force 6 or under, that is to say, when it did not exceed a strong breeze in which the ship could carry single reefs and top-gallant sails; 314 with the wind at forces 7 and 8, that is, with a moderate to fresh gale; and 423 with the wind at force 9 and upwards, that is to say, from a strong gale to a hurricane. Of the 130 vessels on which life was lost during 1873-74, 87 were laden, 40 in ballast, and it is unknown whether the others were laden or light; 95 were entirely lost. 61 lives were lost in vessels that foundered, 76 through collisions, 200 in vessels stranded or cast ashore, and 101 in missing vessels. 9 of the lives lost included in the return, were lost before 1873, but reported during that year. The total number of casualties in rivers in the United Kingdom reported in 1873-74 was 397, of which 26 were total losses. Of these casualties, collisions numbered 223, founderings 6, strandings 106, and miscellaneous 62; 365 were casualties to British sailing-vessels, 235 to British steam-vessels, 53 to foreign sailing-vessels, and 12 to foreign steam-vessels. The number of lives reported to have been lost in casualties in rivers was 20. 20 of the 381 collisions off the coasts of the United Kingdom were between two steam-ships both under weigh, and 29 of the 223 in harbours and rivers were also between two steam-ships both under weigh. There were during the year 6 accidents to the machinery of steamships which caused damage to the vessel, 4 being total losses; and 210 small accidents which caused no damage to the vessel.

Of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, which occurred on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the number reported in 1873-74 (some of which may have occurred in the previous year) was 782; 667 to British vessels, of which 368 were totally lost, and 299 partially damaged; 115 to foreign vessels, of which 50 were totally lost, and 65 partially damaged. Of vessels lost or damaged in collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the number reported was 84; 65 were British vessels (of which 9 were lost, and 56 were partially damaged), and 19 foreign vessels (all of which sustained partial damage). The tonnage of the 418 vessels totally lost was 108,657, viz., British vessels 82,491 tons, foreign vessels 26,166 tons; the tonnage of the 364 vessels partially damaged was 188,565, viz., British vessels 111,389 tons, foreign vessels 37,176 tons. The number of lives lost was 569, viz., on British vessels 548, on foreign vessels 21; the number of lives imperilled but saved was 6819, viz., on British vessels 5505, on foreign vessels 1118. The number of wrecks, etc., other than collisions, which occurred to British vessels on foreign coasts or at sea in 1873-74 was 2117, of which 495 involved total loss, and 1622 partial damage; and the number of vessels lost or damaged in collisions was 245, of which 17 were lost, and 228 sustained partial damage. The tonnage of vessels totally lost was 210,072 tons, and the tonnage of vessels partially damaged was 809,879 tons. The number of lives lost was 3465, and the number of lives imperilled but saved was 38,965. The total number of wrecks, casualties, or collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and other British Possessions abroad, and to British vessels on foreign coasts and at sea, in 1873-74 was 3228, 3094 of which occurred to British vessels, and 134 to foreign vessels; and the total number of lives lost was 4034, of which 4013 were lost on 331 British vessels, and 21 on 4 foreign vessels. A great and heavy loss of life is due to the loss of two ships employed in the coolie trade. 150 vessels, not heard of after sailing or being spoken at sea, are reckoned as lost, 2381 lives being supposed to have been lost in them. Of these missing vessels, 115 belonged to the United Kingdom, involving the loss of 1959 lives, and 35 belonged to British Possessions abroad, involving the loss of 370 lives. 72 of those vessels sailed from ports in the United Kingdom, 37 from ports in British Possessions abroad, and 41 from foreign ports. 126 were laden vessels, 8 were vessels in ballast, 11 were fishing vessels, and in 5 cases it is unknown whether the vessels were laden or in ballast. Many of the missing vessels, however, sailed previously to July 1873. Of the 3094 British vessels lost or damaged on the coasts of the Channel Islands and other British Possessions abroad, on foreign coasts, and at sea, 2090 belonged to the United Kingdom (456 lost and 1634 partially damaged), and 1004 to British Possessions (433 lost and 571 partially damaged).

The sum paid by the Board of Trade, out of the Mercantile Marine Fund, for providing apparatus for saving life on the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year ended 30th June 1874 was £8773; the expenditure on this account, between March 1855 and June 1874, had been £152,435, besides £1325 paid by the Admiralty on account of life-belts. At the end of June 1874 there were on the coasts of the United Kingdom 289 sets of rocket and mortar apparatus provided by the Board of Trade (40 in Scotland). The number of life-boats was 267, of which 235 belonged to the National Life-Boat Institution, and 32, of which 6 were subsidized by the Board of Trade, were under other management (33 life-boats at stations in Scotland). 531 stations (38 in Scotland) were supplied with Captain Ward's life-jackets for the use of the coast-guard. The number of volunteer life-brigades was 7, and the number of volunteer life-companies 157; 2 of the brigades and 32 of the companies were in Scotland. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year ended 30th June 1874 was 3060—310 being saved by life-boats, 175 by rocket and mortar apparatus, lines, etc., 309 by luggers and coast-guard and other boats, 516 by ships and steam-boats, 1525 by ships' own boats, and 225 by other means. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom between March 1855 and June 1874 was 74,081.

MILITIA.

Of supernumeraries, there were in certain regiments, 4 officers, 34 sergeants, 1 corporal, and 926 privates; there were of supernumeraries, 8 sergeants, 1 corporal, and 167 privates in Scotch militia regiments. The numbers wanted to complete the militia force of the United Kingdom at the training of 1874—the difference, that is, between the numbers enrolled and the establishment—was 561 officers, 625 sergeants, 851 corporals, 74 drummers, and 25,143 privates.

RAILWAYS.

At 31st December 1874 the amount of railway capital authorized was, in England and Wales, £583,506,210 (£429,350,196 by shares and £154,156,014 by loans); in Scotland, £84,131,393 (£62,673,149 by shares and £21,458,244 by loans); in Ireland, £36,700,696 (£26,956,905 by shares and £9,743,791 by loans); in the United Kingdom, £704,338,299 (£518,980,250 by shares and £185,358,049 by loans). At the same date the amount of paid up stock and share capital was, in England and Wales, £374,597,721 (ordinary, £209,048,115; guaranteed, £63,607,582; preferential, £101,942,024); in Scotland, £52,462,090 (ordinary, £23,705,327; guaranteed, £7,332,812; preferential, £21,423,951); in Ireland, £22,399,059 (ordinary, £15,774,799; guaranteed, £267,086; preferential, £6,357,174); in the United Kingdom, £449,458,870 (ordinary, £248,528,241; guaranteed, £71,207,480; preferential, £129,723,149). The amount of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at the same date was, in England and Wales, £134,128,707 (by loans, £32,893,320; by debenture stock, £101,235,387); in Scotland, £18,865,050 (by loans, £13,343,764; by debenture stock, £5,521,286); in Ireland, £7,443,304 (by loans, £3,028,986; by debenture stock, £4,414,318); in the United Kingdom, £160,437,061 (by loans, £49,266,070; by debenture stock, £111,170,991). The total of stock and share capital paid up and of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at 31st December 1874 was, in England and Wales, £508,726,428; in Scotland, £71,327,140; in Ireland, £29,842,363; in the United Kingdom, £609,895,931. The amount of subscriptions made by railway companies to other companies at the same date was, in England and Wales, £17,184,430; in Scotland, £1,524,051; in Ireland, £490,855; in the United Kingdom, £19,199,336.

In the year ended 31st December 1874 the total gross receipts of railway companies from all sources were, in England and Wales, £50,210,136 (passenger traffic and mails, £21,128,179; goods traffic, £27,014,263; miscellaneous, £2,067,694); in Scotland, £6,480,780 (passenger traffic and mails, £2,350,593; goods traffic, £3,884,424; miscellaneous, £245,763); in Ireland, £2,564,799 (passenger traffic and mails, £1,414,843; goods traffic, £1,107,196; miscellaneous, £42,760); in the United Kingdom, £59,255,715 (passenger traffic and mails, £24,893,615; goods traffic, £32,005,883; miscellaneous, £2,356,217). The total working expenditure (including all expenses) was, in England and Wales, £27,534,723; in Scotland, £3,634,963; in Ireland, £1,443,026; in the United Kingdom, £32,612,712. The net receipts were, in England and Wales, £22,675,413; in Scotland, £2,845,817; in Ireland, £1,121,773; in the United Kingdom, £26,643,003. The number of miles of railway open at the end of 1874 was, in England and Wales, 11,622; in Scotland, 2700; in Ireland, 2127; in the United Kingdom, 16,449. In the United Kingdom the total capital received by railway companies, including loans and debenture stock, up to the end of 1874, was at the rate of £37,078 per mile of railway constructed. In 1874 the gross receipts from passenger traffic in the United Kingdom were 42·01 per cent., and the gross receipts from goods traffic, 54·01 per cent. of the total gross receipts; the gross receipts, exclusive of the miscellaneous receipts, were at the rate of £3459 per mile of railway constructed, and at the rate of 5s. 8d. per train mile; the total working expenditure was 55 per cent. of the total receipts; and the net receipts were 4·37 per cent. of the total capital received (including loans and debenture stock). The total expenditure was 55 per cent. of the total receipts (55 in England, 56 in Scotland, and 56 in Ireland).

CAPITAL PROPOSED TO BE RAISED BY RAILWAY AND OTHER BILLS, 1875.

The number of railway and other private bills brought before Parliament in the session of 1875 was 236. The amount of capital proposed by these bills to be raised was £49,944,307, of which £29,746,194 was to be raised by shares, and £20,198,113 by loans. The number of such bills in 1866, was 634; in 1867, 321; in 1868, 228; in 1869, 212; in 1870, 244; in 1871, 280; in 1872, 304; in 1873, 334; and in 1874, 281. The capital proposed to be raised was, in 1866, £175,490,646—by shares £125,638,785, by loans £49,851,861; in 1867, £42,638,775—by shares £24,947,447, by loans £17,691,328; in 1868, £25,207,356—by shares £15,269,990, by loans £9,937,366; in 1869, £29,221,706—by shares £17,756,335, by loans £11,465,371; in 1870, £23,676,499—by shares £14,202,271, by loans £9,474,228; in 1871, £29,719,190—by shares £18,827,365, by loans £10,891,825; in 1872, £86,444,831—by shares £57,803,590, by loans £28,641,241; in 1873, £86,893,943—by shares £60,112,250, by loans £26,781,693; in 1874, £63,365,240—by shares, £43,763,000, by loans £19,602,240. The aggregate balance in the hands of treasurers at Whitsunday 1873 was £112,530; the aggregate balance due to treasurers at the same date was £10,630. During the year 1873-74, the revenue derived from fines was £1; from incidental receipts, £9559; from money borrowed on security of tolls, £182. The expenditure for manual labour was £78,262; for carriage of materials, £14,249; for materials for surface repairs, £20,135; for land purchased, £2; for damage done in obtaining materials, £549; for tradesmen's bills, £6583; for salaries of treasurers, £1735; for salaries of clerks, £4000; for salaries of surveyors, £7509; for law charges, £1307; for interest of debt, £19,653; for annuities, £12,10s.; for improvements, £8594; for watering roads, £170; for debts paid off, £7726; for incidental expenses, £9663. The amount of bonded or mortgage debts was £1,039,219; of floating debts, £15,233; of unpaid interest, £694,078; of balances due to treasurers at Whitsunday 1874, £12,831. The arrears of tolls for the current year of the account amounted to £740; the arrears of other receipts for the current year to £298; the arrears of former years to £5280; and the balances in the hands of treasurers at Whitsunday 1874 to £124,783.

MISCELLANEOUS.

The Army Estimates.—The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of Her Majesty's land forces (exclusive of Her Majesty's British forces on the East Indian establishment, 62,840 in number) provided for in the Army Estimates for the year ending 31st March 1876, was 129,281 (viz., officers 7076, non-commissioned officers 13,260, drummers and trumpeters 3134, rank and file 105,811). This includes the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India; the general and departmental staff (viz., general staff, 88 officers; paymaster's department, 199; chaplain's department, 78; medical department, 558; and control department, 437—in all, 1360 men); 120 officers, 458 non-commissioned officers, 2 drummers and trumpeters, and 89 rank and file—in all, 669 men—employed in various establishments connected with the army; and the number of non-commissioned officers, etc., of the regular army to be added to the staff of the brigade depots

which are to be formed from the staff of the auxiliary forces (viz., 2561 non-commissioned officers, and 630 drummers and trumpeters—in all, 3191 men). The strength of the regiments on the British establishment, provided for in the Estimates, including the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India, was 123,971 (viz., 5596 officers, 10,151 non-commissioned officers, 2502 drummers and trumpeters, and 105,722 rank and file). The number of horses provided for (exclusive of officers' horses) was 15,162. The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of the reserve forces, for which provision was made in the Army Estimates for 1875-76, was, militia (including permanent staff), 118,000; yeomanry cavalry (including permanent staff), 12,500; volunteers (including staff), 161,150; army reserve, class 1, 10,000; class 2, 22,000. The estimated charge was, for effective services, £12,450,000 (viz., regular forces, £4,869,500; reserve forces, £1,323,100; commissariat and ordnance establishments and services £5,062,800; works and buildings, £799,700; and various other services, £394,900); and for non-effective services, £2,227,700—total, £14,677,700; from which, however, was to be deducted the estimated Exchequer extra receipts, £1,189,500; making the net charge for army services in 1875-76, £13,488,200. The estimated charge for the reserve forces was distributed between the forces as follows:—Militia pay and allowances, £685,300; yeomanry cavalry, £78,900; volunteer corps, £437,200; army reserve corps, £121,700. The estimate for the volunteer corps was made up as follows:—Pay, etc., of 272 adjutants of volunteer corps, £54,760; pay, etc., of sergeant-instructors, £59,158; capitation grants to volunteer corps, etc. (30,827 artillery volunteers, 400 light horse, 5842 engineers, 132 mounted rifles, 122,542 rifle volunteers, and the permanent staff, 1407 in number, in all 161,150 men, at 30s. each, £241,730; travelling allowance, at 5s. each, for attendance at united drill or gun practice, £19,000; special capitation allowance of £2, 10s. for officers and sergeants, £35,400), £296,130; miscellaneous charges for volunteer corps, £27,200.

The Army in the Colonies.—The amount included in the Army Estimates of 1875-76 for military purposes in the Colonies is £1,752,535, and the amount that will be repaid by the several colonies as colonial contributions in aid of military expenditure in the same year was estimated at £233,100. The whole of the last-mentioned sum was expected from the South African Colonies (the Cape and Natal), from China (Hong-Kong and the Straits Settlement), Ceylon, and the Mauritius.

The Army Purchase Commission.—The sum to be voted for defraying the expenditure of the Army Purchase Commission in the financial year 1875-76 was £150,000.

The Navy Estimates.—The number of officers, seamen, boys, and marines proposed to be voted for the service of Her Majesty's Navy for the year ending 31st March 1876, was 60,000 (or 58,900, deducting 1100, the number of the officers and crews of Indian troop ships), viz., 46,000 officers, seamen, and boys for the fleet and coastguard service, and 14,000 marines. The estimated charge was £10,784,644, made up as follows:—For effective services, £8,758,033; for non-effective, £1,854,521; for conveyance of troops, £172,090. On the 1st December 1874, the number of ships in commission effective for general service was 115 (viz., 4 line-of-battle ships, all armour-plated; 12 frigates or corvettes armour-plated, and 26 not armour-plated; 73 sloops and smaller vessels not armour-plated, of which 67 were steamers and 6 were sailing vessels). There were also in commission 9 first reserve ships (seven armour-plated, and all steamers); of gunnery and training ships, stationary, receiving, and depot ships (including royal yacht), surveying vessels, troop ships, store ships, and drill ships for the royal naval reserve, there were 47 (29 sailing vessels and 18 steamers), exclusive of Indian troop ships; and of tenders (including late coastguard cruisers) there were 71 (30 sailing vessels and 41 steamers). There were in all 242 vessels (65 sailing vessels, and 177 steamers, 23 of the latter being armour-plated) in commission.

The Cost of the Colonies.—The cost of the several colonies of the British Empire to the British Exchequer was £2,745,980 in the financial year 1869-70; £2,228,304 in 1870-71; £1,911,007 in 1871-72; and £1,817,471 in 1872-73. The principal saving occurred in the American colonies—the expenditure upon Canada being £434,223 in 1869-70, and only £3552 in 1872-73, and that upon Nova Scotia (the Halifax station) being £208,795 in the former year, and £149,616 in the latter.

Reduction of the National Debt.—It is estimated that, under the operation of the plan applying a fixed sum of £28,000,000 annually to the interest and reduction of the National Debt, the debt will be reduced in the thirty years between 1875-76 and 1904-5 by £231,701,300—stock to the amount of £192,485,300 being purchased out of the £28,000,000, and stock to the amount of £39,219,000 out of surplus revenues (assumed to be £500,000 a year), and the amount of stock cancelled for life annuities and land tax (£770,000 a year). The estimate allows, so far as can be foreseen, for the increase of the debt (on account of fortifications, localization of forces, etc.) within the next few years. The stock to be purchased out of the £28,000,000 in the year 1904-5 is estimated at £12,995,300.

The Cost of the Census.—The cost of the Census in 1871 was, for England and Wales, £119,977; for Scotland, £27,104; and for Ireland, £38,594. Per 1000 of the population enumerated, it was £5, 5s. 7³/₄d. in England, £8, 1s. 4d. in Scotland, and £7, 2s. 7d. in Ireland. 35,428 persons were employed upon the census in England (627 superintendent registrars, 2196 registrars of births, etc., and 32,605 enumerators), and the cost incurred at the central office was £41,674. 9476 persons were employed in Scotland (118 sheriff and town clerks, 1016 registrars of births, etc., and 8342 enumerators), and the cost incurred at the head office was £6339. 4963 persons were employed in Ireland (sub-inspectors of constabulary, inspectors of Dublin police, and enumerators), and the cost incurred at the central office was £35,527. The cost of the census per 1000 of population in England was £5, 9s. in 1841, £5, 4s. in 1851, and £4, 15s. 5d. in 1861. In Scotland, in 1861, it was £7, 14s. 8d. per 1000 of the population. In Ireland, it was £4, 7s. 2d. in 1851, and £4, 19s. 11d. in 1861.

Register of Sasines, Edinburgh.—The number of writs recorded in the year ending 1st May 1873, was 21,742; the number in the year ending 1st May 1874, was 23,396. The total number of searches for incumbrances made by the official searchers during the year ending 1st May 1873 was 1887, and the total number during the year ending 1st May 1874 was 2054. The total fees derived from the searches made by the official searchers in the year ending 1st May 1873 was £7110, 11s. 2d., and the total fees in the year ending 1st May 1874 was £6155, 19s. 9d. That a smaller sum was received for a greater number of searches was caused by the reduction of fees from 1st April 1873, as sanctioned by the Treasury. The average cost of a search cannot be given so as to afford any useful information, because the cost varies extremely according to the length of the period for which the search is made, and the extent and situation of the lands over which it is required. Most of the large estates in Scotland are not confined to one county, but are situated in several; and consequently, if a search is made over any one of these estates for the full prescriptive period of 40 years, the labour and expense of the search must be very considerable. About one-seventh of the searches are required for that time; but the greater proportion of the searches made are mere continuations of a previous search, going back only a few years or months, and occasionally even days, for which the charge may be but a few shillings. Again, the cost of a search is lessened where the property searched against is under the value of £500, in which case the fees of searching are reduced one half. In the year ending 1st May 1874, however, the number of searches made being 2054, and the fees received for them £6155, 19s. 9d., the average cost of each search was about £3. The expense of a great proportion of the searches made, especially those over small properties, was very much less. The fees received from non-official searches are entered in a book of "Miscellaneous Fees," which

include the fees paid for all searches made by others, whether for incumbrances or for examining deeds, processes, or books of record. The total fees received for these miscellaneous searches for the year ending 1st May 1873 were £977, 5s. 10d., and for the year to 1st May 1874, £554, 3s. 8d. The diminution of the respective amounts of these fees has also been caused by the general reduction of fees above mentioned. The printed abridgments and indices have been distributed to all the counties, and the amount of fees for inspection of them received between 26th June 1871 and 31st March 1874 was £7, 12s. 9d. The indices of the series of abridgments prepared under the superintendence of the deputy clerk register have not been distributed, being all in MS. only. In the two years 1872 and 1873, the amount of fees received at the register of sasines was £59,353, and the expenses of the office were £29,719; so that the surplus fees amounted to £29,634.

Science Teaching in the Scottish Universities.—The Royal Commission on Scientific Instruction and the Advancement of Science has reported that the efficiency of science teaching in the Scottish Universities is greatly hampered by the insufficiency of the provision made for supplying the Professors with skilled assistants, and the apparatus necessary for carrying on experimental research, and, in the case of the Edinburgh University especially, by the want of suitable laboratories and class-rooms. It has recommended, with regard to the University of Edinburgh, that increased assistance be given, both in the form of a capital sum in aid of a well-considered scheme of extension, and in that of an annual grant sufficient to enable the University—(1) to increase the number, and, in some cases, the emoluments of assistants; (2) to make more ample provision of apparatus for teaching; and (3) to revise the salaries of the scientific Professors, regard being had to the disparity of their endowments, and the income which they derive from fees; and also that the grant of any capital sum be contingent upon the receipt of substantial contributions from private sources. With regard to the University of Glasgow, it has recommended—(1) that the Chair of Natural History (the holder of which has at present to discharge duties which in practice are found incompatible with each other, the teaching of zoology to medical students, and the teaching of geology to engineering students) be divided in the manner most advantageous to the University, and that provision be made out of moneys voted by Parliament for endowing a new Professorship; (2) that the Government grant be augmented sufficiently to enable the University to make an increase in the payments on account of assistants to the scientific Professors, and to revise the salaries of the scientific Professors, regard being had to the disparity of their endowments, and to the income they derive from fees. With regard to the University of St Andrews, also, it has recommended an increase of the Government grant sufficient to enable the University to provide the Professors with an adequate staff, and with proper appliances for instruction in science, and a revision of the salaries of the scientific Professors. No recommendation has been made as to the University of Aberdeen, that University having declined to avail itself of the opportunity offered it of tendering evidence before the Commission. The Commission has further recommended that an account of the expenditure of any annual grant made to the Universities be submitted to Parliament; and also that for the future two classes be recognised in the Natural Science Honours List, which at present, under the statutes passed by the Universities (Scotland) Commission of 1858, consists of a single class.

Loans out of the Public Exchequer.—The amount, so far as can be made out, “of all loans advanced for the relief of trade or of individuals, for the employment of labour, the promotion of public works, or for other local purposes,” between the 5th January 1792 and the 31st March 1874 (by the Board of Treasury, the West India Relief Commissioners, the Public Works Loans Commissioners, the Commissioners of Public Works, Ireland, and the Vice-Treasurer, Paymaster of Civil Services, and Paymaster-General, Ireland) was £66,961,526, viz.:—for English purposes, £27,454,399; for Scotch purposes, £3,669,589; for Irish purposes, £32,727,197; for Colonial purposes, £3,110,339. The total amount paid into the Exchequer in repayment of interest and principal of the loans aforesaid, was £55,174,326. The sums

that were remitted were, for English purposes, £249,020; for Scotch purposes, £196,549; for Irish purposes, £8,497,431; for Colonial purposes, £463,028—total remitted, £9,406,029. The total amount of the said loans outstanding in 1875 was £15,563,493, and the portion of this amount estimated to be recoverable was £12,741,323. For English purposes, there was outstanding £7,875,512, recoverable £7,532,782; for Scotch purposes, outstanding, £1,100,876, recoverable £955,418; for Irish purposes, outstanding, £6,099,072, recoverable £4,169,821; for Colonial purposes, outstanding, £488,032, recoverable £83,301. The amount of principal and interest repaid (£55,174,326) and the amount estimated to be recoverable (£12,741,323) taken together (£67,915,650) exceeds the amount advanced (£66,961,526) by £954,123. Supposing the estimate of the amount outstanding which can be recovered correct, the State will receive back the amount it has advanced, and also will receive upon the whole of its loan transactions during eighty years, a sum representing interest of £954,000. This gives little more than a nominal rate, being scarcely more than the interest on the loans outstanding in the last two years.

Banks of Issue.—The amount of the authorized circulation of banks of issue (excluding the Bank of England) in England at 1st January 1875, was £6,498,597, and their actual circulation was £4,802,514. The authorized circulation of banks in Scotland at the same date was £2,749,271, and their actual circulation on the first Saturday in January 1875 was £6,215,554. The authorized circulation of banks in Ireland at 1st January 1875 was £6,354,494, and their actual circulation on the first Saturday of the same month was £6,881,737. At 1st January 1865 the authorized circulation of the English banks was £7,439,103, while that of the Scotch and Irish banks was the same as at 1st January 1875. The actual circulation of the English banks at 1st January 1865 was £5,614,717, and on the first Saturday of January 1875 the actual circulation of the Scotch banks was £4,299,186, and that of the Irish banks, £5,698,375.

The Revenue from Spirits, Wine, and Tobacco.—The net amount of duty paid on spirits, home-made, foreign, and colonial, in the year ended 31st March 1875, in the United Kingdom, was £20,576,812; viz., customs duty on foreign and colonial spirits, £5,681,337; excise revenue, £14,895,475. For England it was £13,206,641 (customs, £4,847,247; excise, £8,350,394); for Scotland, it was £4,041,419 (customs, £550,581; excise, £3,490,838); for Ireland, it was £3,328,752 (customs, £283,509; excise, £3,045,243). The net amount of duty paid on malt in the United Kingdom in the same year, was £7,746,412 (of which £38 paid in England was customs duty on malt imported). In England it was £6,946,358; in Scotland it was £368,721; in Ireland it was £431,333. In the same year, in the United Kingdom, the net amount of customs duty paid on wine was £1,709,856 (England, £1,429,134; Scotland, £113,858; Ireland, 166,864); of customs duty paid on beer, £3360 (England, £3072; Scotland, £287; Ireland, £1); of excise duty on sugar used in brewing, £471,918 (England, £436,572; Scotland, £3749; Ireland, £31,597); of duty paid on excise licenses, £1,827,838 (England, £1,518,715; Scotland, £143,912; Ireland, £165,211). The net amount of duty paid on tobacco in the year ended 31st March 1875, in the United Kingdom, was, £7,421,315 (England £5,798,445; Scotland, £648,286; Ireland, £974,584). The total net revenue derived from spirits, malt, wine, etc., and from tobacco, in the year ended 31st March 1875, was, for the United Kingdom, £39,757,511; of which £29,338,937 was derived from England; £5,320,232 from Scotland; and £5,098,342 from Ireland. In the statement given above, the revenue from spirits is apportioned in accordance with the quantities of spirits delivered for consumption in England, Scotland, and Ireland, respectively.

Excise Licenses in Burghs.—The population of royal and parliamentary burghs in Scotland in 1871 was 1,494,046, and the number of excise licenses granted from Whitsunday 1874 to Whitsunday 1875 was 7560, viz.:—for grocers' shops, 2795; for hotels and public-houses, 4765. A return of excise licenses for the year 1861-62 was called for, but in consequence of the records in a great many places having been destroyed, the totals are useless for purposes of comparison. The population of royal and parliamentary burghs in

1861 was 1,262,063, and the number of excise licenses shown by the return is 5796, viz. :—for grocers' shops, 1853; for hotels and public-houses, 3943.

Dwellings of the Labouring Classes.—The amount of moneys advanced between the 1st January 1871 and the 31st December 1874 for improving the dwellings of the labouring classes was £83,550. This amount was lent by twenty separate advances, eight of which were made in 1873, and seven in 1874. There has been no case of the liability on account of a loan advanced by the Public Works Loans Commissioners for improving the dwellings of the labouring classes being compounded or forgiven.

Unseaworthy Ships.—The number of vessels surveyed by order of the Board of Trade under the 12th section of the Merchant Shipping Act 1873, between the 5th of August 1873 and the 30th June 1875, for alleged defects in hull, equipments, or machinery, was 550 (27 iron steamers and 522 wooden sailing vessels, and 1 iron sailing vessel), 16 vessels (3 steamers and 13 sailing vessels) were found seaworthy; 515 (24 steamers and 491 sailing vessels) were found unseaworthy; and in the case of 19 sailing vessels, the survey was pending when the return was made up. 31 of the vessels were dismantled or broken up after survey. The number of alleged cases of overloading or improper loading inquired into during the same period was 58 (those of 50 steamers and 8 sailing vessels); all the vessels were found to be unseaworthy, and all were lightened or reloaded to the satisfaction of the Board of Trade surveyors. In no instance in which the Act had been put in force had the allegation of overloading or improper loading been found groundless. Of vessels examined for alleged defects in hull, equipments, or machinery, 505 were reported by Government officers, 17 by the crews, and 28 by other persons. Of the 58 vessels surveyed for alleged overloading, 55 were reported by Government officers, and 3 by other persons.

Scotch and Irish Paupers.—On the 2d of January 1875, there were in Ireland 100 paupers born in Scotland who were in receipt of parochial relief, 99 receiving relief in workhouses, and 1 receiving out-door relief. On the 3d of July 1875, there were in Ireland 98 paupers born in Scotland who were in receipt of parochial relief, 97 receiving relief in workhouses, and 1 receiving out-door relief. The number of pauper lunatics (additional to the above) born in Scotland, who were in Irish lunatic asylums on the 31st December 1874 was 14, and the number was the same on the 30th of June 1875. On the 31st December 1874, there were in Scotland 7341 paupers born in Ireland with 6169 dependants, who were in receipt of parochial relief; 1505, with 334 dependants, receiving relief in poorhouses, and 5836, with 5835 dependants, receiving out-door relief. On the 30th of June 1875, there were in Scotland 6984 paupers born in Ireland, with 6026 dependants, who were in receipt of parochial relief; 1325, with 271 dependants, receiving relief in poorhouses, and 5659, with 5755 dependants, receiving out-door relief. The number of pauper lunatics (additional to the above) born in Ireland, who were in Scotch lunatic asylums, or otherwise disposed of with the sanction of the General Board of Lunacy, was 487 at the 31st December 1874, and 467 at 30th June 1875.

Ministers' Stipends in Scotland.—The total amount of ministers' stipends in Scotland (excepting those of 14 parishes or parliamentary charges from which no returns were received) for the year ended Whitsunday 1874 was £275,562, of which £235,759 was derived from teinds, £23,502 from other local sources, and £16,300 from the Exchequer. The sum legally payable for communion elements in Scotland in the same year was £5395; the annual value of manse was £24,733; and the annual value of glebes was £24,681,—so that the total annual value of all livings in Scotland (14 excepted) from all sources was £330,372.

Emigration.—The number of emigrants from the United Kingdom to various destinations, in the year 1874, was 241,014. 25,450 went to the American Colonies; 148,161 to the United States; 53,958 to the Australian Colonies and New Zealand; and 13,445 to other places. The number of emigrants from the United Kingdom was 310,612 in 1873; 295,213 in 1872; and 252,435 in 1871. The number of emigrants to the United States (148,161 in 1874) was 233,073 in 1873; 233,747 in 1872; and 198,843 in 1871.

CHRONICLE, 1874-75.

1874. *November 17.* The emigrant ship "Cospatrick," bound for New Zealand, burnt at sea, and 474 lives lost.

December 29. At Murviedro, province of Valencia, Spain, General Martinez Campos, at the head of two battalions, proclaimed Prince Alphonso, son of ex-Queen Isabella, King of Spain. Subsequently the troops at Santander and other towns made a similar proclamation. On the 14th January 1875, the prince entered Madrid in state, and received an enthusiastic welcome as Alphonso XII.

1875. *January 1.* Great snowdrift throughout Scotland, occasioning a serious block on several railways, and snowing up passenger trains.

13. Mr Gladstone intimated his resignation of the leadership of the Liberal party in Parliament.

February 5. The second session of the ninth Parliament of Queen Victoria opened by Royal Commission.

6. The Theatre-Royal, Edinburgh, destroyed by fire.

March 14. The Southminster Theatre, Edinburgh, burnt.

April 23. Dr Kenealy moved in the House of Commons that an address be presented to Her Majesty, praying for the appointment of a Royal Commission to inquire into certain matters connected with the trial "The Queen v. Castro." The House divided, when there voted for the motion, 1; against, 433.

May 7. The Hamburg steamship "Schiller," from New York, wrecked on the Retarrier Ledges, near the Bishop Rock Lighthouse, Scilly Islands, and 343 persons drowned.

28. Captain Boyton left Cape Grisez, France, with the intention of paddling his way across the English Channel in the Merriman patent life-saving dress, and after being 23 hours and 28 minutes in the water, he landed at Fan Bay, near Folkestone.

29. H.M. ships "Alert" and "Discovery," commanded by Captains G. S. Nares and H. F. Stephenson, sailed from Portsmouth on a voyage of discovery in the Arctic regions.

June 23, 24. Great floods in the south of France, caused by the Garonne overflowing its banks; about 3000 lives lost, and much property destroyed.

July 15. Floods in the west of England and in Wales, occasioning loss of life and property.

27. The Forty-eighth Annual Show of the Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland opened at Glasgow.

August 3. The Forty-third Annual Meeting of the British Medical Association met at Edinburgh, under the presidency of Sir Robert Christison, Bart.

13. Parliament prorogued.

18. The royal yacht "Alberta," when conveying Her Majesty the Queen from Osborne to Gosport, *en route* for Scotland, ran down the schooner-yacht "Mistletoe," occasioning the deaths of three persons.

25. Captain Webb accomplished the unparalleled feat of swimming, unaided by any mechanical appliance, from Dover to Calais; the time taken being 21 hours and 45½ minutes.

25. The Forty-fifth Annual Congress of the British Association for the Advancement of Science met at Bristol, under the presidency of Sir John Hawkshaw, C.E., F.R.S.

September 1. H.M. ship "Iron Duke" collided with H.M. ship "Vanguard," during a dense fog, off the Kish Bank, in the Irish Channel; the latter vessel foundered, but no lives were lost.

27. The fiftieth anniversary of the opening of the first railway for passenger traffic (the Stockton and Darlington line) celebrated at Darlington with great ceremony.

October 6. The National Association for the Promotion of Social Science met at Brighton, under the presidency of Lord Aberdare.

11. H.R.H. the Prince of Wales left England, *en route* for India, and arrived at Bombay on 8th November, where he met with a most enthusiastic reception.

November 12. The large factories of Messrs Robertson and Company, and Messrs Young, Strange, and Company, Glasgow, destroyed by fire, causing damage estimated at £300,000.

19. Lieutenant V. Lovet Cameron arrived at Loanda, Lower Guinea, after traversing the continent of Africa from east to west. He left the eastern coast, near Zanzibar, on 24th March 1873.

December 6. The German mail

steamship "Deutschland," from Bremen to New York, with emigrants, wrecked on the Kentish Knock, off the mouth of the Thames, and 67 lives lost.

6. Explosion at the Swaithe Main Colliery, near Barnsley, by which about 150 miners were killed.

17. The Right Hon. the Earl of Derby installed Rector of the University of Edinburgh. On the following day he was presented with the freedom of the city.

OBITUARY, 1874-75.

1874. *December 24.* At Edinburgh, aged 74, Alexander Leighton, author of "A Tangled Yarn," etc., and writer of the greater part of the work known as "Wilson's Tales of the Border."

THE MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE GARTER

Was instituted by Edward III. in 1347. The habit and insignia are, *The Garter*, of dark-blue velvet, inscribed with the motto, *Honi soit qui mal y pense*; *The Mantle*, of blue velvet; *The Hood and Surcoat*, of crimson velvet; *The Hat*, of black velvet; *The Collar*, of gold; *The George*, or figure of St George, suspended from a broad dark-blue riband; and *The Star*, of silver. The number of knights is restricted to twenty-five, exclusive of the Sovereign, princes of the blood royal, and foreign princes.

THE MOST ANCIENT AND MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE THISTLE.

The Most Ancient Order of the Thistle appears to have been projected by King James V. about 1540, but he died before the design could be carried out. It was renewed by King James VII., who created eight Knights in 1687. After an abeyance of fifteen years, the Order was restored by Queen Anne in 1703. It consists of the Sovereign, and sixteen knights. THE MOST HONOURABLE ORDER OF THE BATH,

Established in 1399, was revived by King George I. in 1725, enlarged in 1815, and enlarged and remodelled in the month of April 1847. It consists of the Sovereign, of a Great Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal, descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one thousand one hundred and forty-eight Companions or Members, divided into the three classes following, each class being subdivided into two sections, Military and Civil: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, seventy-five in number, of whom not more than fifty shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major-General in the army, or Rear-Admiral in the navy; 2d, Knights Commanders, one hundred and eighty-three in number, of whom not more than one hundred and twenty-three shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Colonel in the army, or Captain in the navy; 3d, Companions, eight hundred and ninety in number,

of whom (except under special and temporary exigencies) not more than six hundred and ninety shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major in the army, or Commander in the navy, whose services shall have been marked by the especial mention of their names in despatches. The qualification of members of the civil divisions of each of these three classes is no otherwise limited than that, by their personal services to the Crown or by the performance of public duties, they shall have merited the Royal favour; and that no person shall be appointed to one class who is not qualified for the other and higher classes. Honorary members, being foreigners, may be appointed in such numbers as the Sovereign shall think fit. For each class and division, appropriate insignia are appointed by the Statutes of the Order, enacted by Her Majesty the Queen, and published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 1st June 1847. Enlarged June 1861.

THE VICTORIA CROSS, OR ORDER OF VALOUR.

This naval and military decoration was instituted by an instrument under the sign-manual of the Queen, dated the 29th of January 1856, "for the purpose of rewarding individual instances of merit and valour." It is ordained that the distinction shall be styled "The Victoria Cross;" that it shall consist of a Maltese cross of bronze, with her Majesty's royal crest in the centre, and, on an escroll underneath, the inscription "For Valour;" that the Cross shall be suspended from the left breast by a blue riband for the navy, and by a red riband for the army; that the names of those upon whom her Majesty may be pleased to confer the decoration shall be published in the London Gazette; that any one who, after having received the Cross, shall again perform an act of bravery, which if he had not received such Cross would have entitled him to it, shall have such farther act recorded by a Bar attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, an additional Bar being added for every additional act; that the Cross shall be awarded to those officers or men only who have served the Queen in the presence of the enemy, and have there performed some signal act of valour or devotion to their country; that with the view of placing all persons on a perfectly equal footing of eligibility for the decoration, neither rank nor long service nor wounds nor any other circumstance or condition whatsoever, save the merit of conspicuous bravery, shall be held to establish a sufficient claim to the honour; and that every warrant officer, petty officer, seaman, or marine, or non-commissioned officer or soldier who shall have received the Cross shall be entitled to a special pension of ten pounds a year, each additional bar carrying with it an additional pension of five pounds a year.

THE MOST EXALTED ORDER OF THE STAR OF INDIA.

This order of knighthood was instituted by the Queen, in February 1861, and enlarged and remodelled in March 1866, by letters patent under the great seal, in order to afford to the princes, chiefs, and people of the Indian Empire, a public and signal testimony of Her Majesty's regard; to commemorate Her Majesty's resolution to take upon herself the government of the territories in India; and to enable Her Majesty to reward conspicuous merit and loyalty. The order is to be called "The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India." It is now to consist of the Sovereign, a Grand Master, and two hundred and five Ordinary Companions or Members, divided into three classes: 1. Twenty-

five Knights Grand Commanders; 2. Sixty Knights Commanders; 3. One hundred and twenty Companions; together with such Extra and Honorary Knights as the Sovereign may appoint. The Sovereign shall be the King or Queen regnant of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Grand Master, first and principal Knight Grand Commander of the Order, shall be the Viceroy and Governor-General of India for the time being. The Sovereign may confer the dignity of a Knight Grand Commander of the Order upon such native princes and chiefs of India as shall have entitled themselves to the Royal favour, and upon such British subjects as have, by important and loyal services rendered by them to the Indian Empire, merited such Royal favour. No person shall be nominated a Knight Commander, or a Companion, who shall not, by his conduct and services in the Indian Empire, have merited the Royal favour.

THE MOST DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF SAINT MICHAEL AND SAINT GEORGE

Was instituted in 1818, for natives of the Ionian Islands and of Malta, and for such other British subjects as should be distinguished in connexion with the said islands, or with H.M. service in the Mediterranean. By certain statutes, bearing date 4th December 1863, Her Majesty was pleased to enlarge and re-organize the Order, so as to extend it to such natural-born subjects of the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as might be persons of conspicuous merit, or have rendered important services to the Crown, within or in connexion with any of Her Majesty's colonial possessions; and a supplementary statute, bearing date 3d April 1869, ordains that naturalized foreigners may be admitted in like manner as if they were natural-born subjects of the British Crown. The Order consists of the Sovereign, of a Grand Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one hundred and eighty-five Members, divided into three classes, viz.: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, twenty-five in number; 2d, Knights Commanders, sixty in number; 3d, Companions, one hundred in number.

REGULATIONS FOR THE GRANTING OF COMMISSIONS IN
THE ARMY.

CAVALRY AND INFANTRY.

I.—FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

Medical Examination.—All candidates will be inspected by a Medical Board; and no candidate will be allowed to proceed to examination by the Civil Service Commissioners unless certified by the Board to be free from any bodily defects or ailments, and in all respects, as to height and physical qualities, fit for Her Majesty's service. Cases of exceptional shortness of stature will be referred to the War Office for special consideration.

Age.—The limits of age for candidates for admission by competition, Queen's cadets, Queen's honorary cadets, Indian cadets, and pages of honour, will be from 17 to 20; for students of the universities who shall have passed the interim examination as specified below (c), from 17 to 21; for graduates of the universities who shall have passed the examination for the degree of B.A. or M.A., from 17 to 22; and for lieutenants from the militia, from 19 to 22. Officers who entered the militia between 16th February and 1st November 1871 inclusive may be admitted up to the age of 24. Candidates who desire to compete for commissions in West India regiments may be admitted up to the age of 24. All candidates must produce a certificate of age, and that they are of good moral character.

Examinations.—The examinations will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and will take place twice a year, in the months of December and July. The number of trials allowed will not exceed three.

1. *Sub-Lieutenants.*—A commission as sub-lieutenant in the army may be given:—

- (a) To a successful candidate at a competitive examination in general subjects, to be held under such regulations as may be issued from time to time.
- (b) To the cadets styled Queen's cadets, honorary Queen's cadets, Indian cadets, and to the pages of honour. Queen's cadets are appointed by the Secretary of State on the recommendation of the Commander-in-Chief or First Lord of the Admiralty. Indian cadets are nominated by the Secretary of State for India in Council. These cadets and pages of honour shall pass such a qualifying examination in general subjects as may be fixed from time to time.
- (c) To a student from the University of Oxford, Cambridge, Durham, London, Dublin, Edinburgh, St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, or the Queen's University, Ireland, who has passed "Moderations" at Oxford, the "Previous Examination" at Cambridge, or the corresponding examination at the other universities, under such regulations as may be issued from time to time.
- (d) To a lieutenant of militia who shall have served for two annual trainings with his militia regiment, and be recommended by his commanding officer, confirmed by the officer commanding the sub-district and the general officer commanding the district, and who shall pass such a professional examination as may be fixed, and produce a certifi-

cate of qualification similar to that prescribed for Queen's and Indian cadets, or possess a university certificate.

- (e) To a non-commissioned officer who is in possession of a first-class certificate of education, including English history and general geography, and who shall pass such a professional examination as may be fixed from time to time.
- (f) To a quartermaster recommended for promotion. He will be required to pass the examination prescribed for non-commissioned officers.

II.—PROMOTION.

2. Sub-lieutenants, in order to qualify for the rank of lieutenant, shall be required to serve satisfactorily with one of our regiments for such period as shall from time to time be determined by the Secretary of State, and either before or after such service (except in the case of non-commissioned officers promoted to be sub-lieutenants), shall go through such a course of study and pass such a professional examination as may be fixed from time to time.

3. Sub-lieutenants will be removed from the service for moral or physical unfitness, or if they fail to pass the examination at the military college within two years from the date of their commissions as sub-lieutenants.

4. *Lieutenants.*—(a) Sub-lieutenants, promoted from the rank of non-commissioned officers, will, after twelve months' satisfactory service with a regiment, be promoted to the rank of lieutenant. They will not be called upon to pass any examination.

(b) Other sub-lieutenants will be promoted as laid down in article 2.

5. *Captains.*—Lieutenants, before they are eligible for promotion to the rank of captain, will be required to pass such professional examination as shall be prescribed from time to time; and if they fail to do so within five years from the date of their commissions as lieutenants, they will be removed from the service. Officers who received their first commissions before August 26, 1871, will be under a special arrangement.

6. *Field Officers.*—Captains, before they are eligible for promotion to be field officers (whether substantive or brevet), will be required to pass such examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Captains who obtained their rank prior to October 30, 1871, may be appointed majors without examination, if approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

ARTILLERY AND ENGINEERS.

Cadets.—Admission to the Royal Military Academy as cadets will be granted to the successful candidates at an open competitive examination. The examinations will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and will be held twice a year, usually in December and July. The limits of age will be from 16 to 18. Before proceeding to examination, the candidate will require to produce a certificate from a Medical Board that he is free from any bodily defect or ailment, and in all respects as to height and physical qualities, fit for Her Majesty's service. He must also produce a certificate of his age, and that he is of good moral character.

I. FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

Lieutenants.—Appointments to the commission of lieutenant will be conferred upon cadets who shall have passed through a course of instruction at the Royal Military Academy in a satisfactory manner, as evidenced at a test examination in the subjects of instruction. If a cadet fail to come up to the required standard at two examinations, or be unable to qualify for a commission within three years, or to acquire sufficient proficiency in military exercises, he will be removed.

II. PROMOTION.

1. *Captains.*—Officers, before they are eligible for promotion to the rank of captain, will be required to pass such professional examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Every officer appointed after October 30, 1871, is required to pass the above examination within five years from the date of his commission as lieutenant, or he will be liable to be removed from the service. Lieutenants of Engineers who completed five years' service previous to October 30, 1871, may be promoted without examination if specially approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

2. *Field Officers.*—Captains, before they are eligible for promotion to be field officers (whether substantive or brevet), will be required to pass such professional examination as may be prescribed from time to time. Captains who attained their rank previous to October 30, 1871, may be promoted without examination if specially reported on and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

* * Officers serving with their regiments at distant foreign stations may be provisionally promoted to vacancies previous to passing the prescribed examination, but such promotion will be cancelled should the officer fail in his examination.

Note.—The public will receive any information regarding the above regulations on application in writing to the Military Secretary, Horse Guards, War Office, London.

RETIREMENT.

"A lieut.-colonel shall retire upon full pay from the command of a regiment or battalion on attaining the age of 60 years, unless it shall be reported to our commander-in-chief by the general officer inspecting the regiment or battalion that it would be for the good of our service that the said officer should continue in command. If the officer has attained the rank of colonel, he shall retain his right to succeed in his turn (if qualified) to the establishment of general officers."—*Extract from Royal Warrant, 24th February 1873.*

SECTION II.—ENGLAND.

ENGLAND AND WALES.

EXTENT, ETC.—The length of England and Wales, from Portland Bill, Dorsetshire, in lat. $50^{\circ} 31' N.$, to Berwick-on-Tweed, in lat. $55^{\circ} 46' N.$, is 363 miles; the extreme breadth, from the North Foreland, Kent, in long. $1^{\circ} 26' E.$ to the Land's End, Cornwall, in long. $5^{\circ} 41' W.$ is 320 miles. The area of England is 56,933 square miles, or 32,597,398 acres; that of Wales, 7378 square miles, or 4,721,823 acres; that of England and Wales, 58,311 square miles, or 37,319,221 acres. Of the 52 counties into which they are divided, England contains 40, Wales, 12. The number of parishes in England and Wales in 1871 was 14,793. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act in 1815 was, in England and Wales, £51,898,423; in 1851, £94,809,106; in 1861, £114,058,538; in 1865, £131,341,499; in 1867, £110,696,900;* in 1873, £127,271,923. The rateable rental of property in England and Wales assessed to the Poor's Rate was £71,840,271 in 1856; £100,612,734 in 1868; £112,317,603 in 1873. The gross estimated rental in 1873 was £132,453,670.

POPULATION, ETC.—The population of England and Wales (including the soldiers, sailors, and merchant seamen at home, belonging to England and Wales) from 1801 to 1871, as ascertained by decennial census, is shown in the following Table :—

Education.

UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

This ancient University consists of a union of Colleges and Halls devoted to the purposes of study and education, and incorporated under the style or title of "The Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford." There are at present twenty-one Colleges, each having a mansion for the residence of members of the foundation, and for the reception of students. These Colleges may be said to be an institution peculiar to England, as none exist in foreign universities, nor even in Scotland. They are bodies corporate, independent of the University, being governed, as to their own concerns, by their respective statutes; and each has in connexion with it numerous valuable fellowships, scholarships, and exhibitions. The four Academical Halls at Oxford are places in which students reside, under discipline and instruction, and pass through the curriculum to their several degrees in precisely the same manner as the student inmates of the Colleges. The term Hall, however, implies also a Society, and in this sense there is an important difference between Halls and Colleges, inasmuch as the former are not incorporated, have no endowments for fellows, and have all their property held in trust for them by the University. The recent foundation of the Keble College was established in 1870 from funds collected by private subscription, and suitable buildings have been erected. In pursuance of the Oxford University Act, 1854, Private Halls have been instituted for the purpose of affording a cheaper education than is to be had at the Colleges. The scholars are subject to the laws of the University, partake of its privileges, and are admissible to its degrees in the same way as the other students.

By a recent decree of the authorities at Oxford, students may be admitted members of the University without belonging to any College or Hall. Such students are called *Scholares non ascripti*, or unattached students, and keep terms by residing at Oxford, either with their parents or in licensed lodging-houses. They are under the control of certain delegates.

There are four terms for academical exercises in each year, but for many Professors' lectures and some other purposes, the third and fourth together count as only one. Two of the four can be kept by six weeks' residence, and two by three weeks'. The ordinary residence in the College extends to twenty-six weeks in the year. Candidates for admission to the University are required to pass a preliminary examination at their respective Colleges or Halls.

The degrees conferred by the University upon students are those of Bachelor and Master in Arts, and of Bachelor and Doctor in Music, and in the three superior faculties of Civil Law, Medicine, and Divinity. Twelve terms of residence are required for the degree of B.A. No further residence is necessary for any degree. Thus the education of a young man at Oxford is spread over about three years; but in the case of candidates for the higher honours, a degree is seldom taken in less than four years.

Candidates for the degree of B.A. are required to pass three distinct examinations—viz., 1. Responsions before the masters of the schools; 2. First Public Examination before the moderators; 3. Second Public Examination before the public examiners. For this last there are now six schools of honours, called the schools of *Literæ Humaniores*, *Scientiæ Mathematicæ et Physicæ*, *Scientia Naturalis*, *Jurisprudentia*, *Historia Moderna*, and *Theologia*, and one mixed school for passmen, divided into several groups of subjects. At the responsions, candidates are examined in Latin and Greek grammar, one Latin and one Greek author, arithmetic, and either Euclid or algebra. The examination is conducted partly in writing, partly *viva voce*.

Candidates at the first public Examination are examined either in logic or in algebra, together with three books of Euclid, in the four Gospels in Greek, and in portions of three classical authors, there being a higher examination both in Classics and Mathematics for candidates for honours.

All candidates at the second public Examination are required to offer themselves in Divinity also; but candidates not members of the Church of England may substitute an equivalent amount of other matter for examination. The term "Divinity" comprises the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, the Old and New Testaments, the Thirty-nine Articles, and the Evidences of the Christian Religion. In the mathematical school candidates are examined either in the first six books of Euclid or in the first part of algebra. In the school of natural science they are examined in the principles of mechanical philosophy, chemistry, physiology, and further in some one of the particular sciences dependent on mechanical philosophy. In the school of law and modern history every candidate must offer himself for examination in English history and law. In all the schools there are examinations for honours as well as the ordinary or "pass" examination. A fifth school of theology was instituted in 1870, and the school of law and modern history was, in 1873, separated into two distinct schools.

For the degree of M.A., no further examination or exercise is required; but a B.A. cannot obtain the degree of M.A. until the expiry of the twenty-sixth term from his matriculation, provided he has had his name on the books of some College or Hall during that period.

UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

This University, like that of Oxford, is a union of Colleges or Societies devoted to the study of the liberal arts and sciences. There are seventeen such Colleges at Cambridge, each being a body corporate, maintained by the endowments of benefactors, and governed by its own laws, but controlled by the paramount statutes of the University.

The terms of the academical year are three,—viz., 1. Michaelmas, beginning on the 1st of October and ending on the 16th of December; 2. Lent, extending from the 13th of January to the Friday before Palm Sunday; and 3. Easter, commencing on the Friday after Easter-day, and closing on the last Friday but one in June. Students are admitted, either by a personal examination before the tutor and some of the College officers, or by sending to the tutor a recommendatory certificate from some M.A. of the University, stating the qualifications, etc., of the person applying for admission, and at the same time transmitting the caution-money, which varies from £10 to £50, according to the social status of the candidate. If this certificate be deemed satisfactory, the student is admitted, and his name placed on the boards which hang in the butteries of the several Colleges. The day after the division of any of the terms is the time fixed for matriculation, i. e., enrolment of the student's name in the University books. At Cambridge, as at Oxford, persons may be admitted as students, and have degrees conferred upon them, without the necessity of their being members of any College or Hall.

Undergraduates are required to give a constant attendance on lectures and, yearly or half-yearly, undergo an examination in those subjects to which their attention has been devoted. By this course they are prepared for those *public* examinations which must be passed before the degree in Arts can be obtained. What is called "The Previous Examination" is held towards the end of the Michaelmas term, and is open to all who have kept two terms at least, and entered upon their third. The subjects of this examination are, one of the four Gospels in Greek, Evidences of Christianity, Latin and Greek Grammar, one Greek and one Latin author, the Elements of Euclid, and Arithmetic. No student can be examined for the degree of B.A. who has not previously kept eight terms; and a B.A. "may be admitted *ad incipiendum in artibus* at any time after three academical years have passed from the completion of his Bachelor's degree. The inceptors in every year become complete Masters of Arts by creation on the Commencement Day, i. e., on the last Tuesday but one in June." No one has a vote in the Senate until after creation.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.

Unlike other universities, this confers its degrees upon the results of its examinations only. It was founded in 1836 "for the purpose of ascertaining, by means of examination, the persons who have acquired proficiency in literature, science, and art, and other departments of knowledge," by the pursuit of a regular and liberal education at University College and King's College, London, or at any of the other colleges and houses of learning named in the royal charter; "and of rewarding them by academical degrees and certificates of proficiency, as evidence of their respective attainments, and marks of honour proportioned thereto." But by later charters, students from any or no college are admissible to all examinations but those in Medicine and Surgery.

There are two examinations for matriculation in each year; one commencing on the second Monday in January, and the other on the last Monday in June; they are held at the new University Buildings, Burlington Gardens, London, and also, under special arrangement, in various cities, towns, and colleges, of the United Kingdom and the Colonies. Candidates must produce a certificate showing that they have completed their sixteenth year. The subjects of the examination which they must pass are—Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Latin, English, two of the languages, Greek, French, and German, and Outlines of English History and Modern Geography. The matriculation fee is £2.

For each of the degrees of B.Sc. and B.A., two examinations besides the one at matriculation require to be passed—the first on the third Monday in July, and the second on the fourth Monday in October. The fee payable at each examination is £5. No candidate is admitted to the examination for the degree of M.A. until after the expiration of one academical year from the time of his passing that for B.A., nor unless he can show evidence that he has completed his twentieth year. A fee of £10 is exacted for the M.A. examination.

The highest degree in the Faculty of Arts in this University is D.Lit.,

or Doctor of Literature. A candidate who is only B.A. must pass two examinations at an interval of at least a year; but Masters of Arts who have taken their degree in classics need pass only the second examination. The former of these is in the Greek and Latin classics generally, with prose composition in Greek, Latin, and English, and in history to the end of the eighteenth century; the second examination is in the English language, literature, and history, and in any two of the following subjects, provided that either French or German be one of these:—French; German; Anglo-Saxon, with Icelandic; Sanskrit; Arabic; Hebrew, with Syriac. These examinations are conducted by means of printed papers. A fee of £10 is payable at each examination.

The degree of D.Sc. (Doctor of Science) is open to all Bachelors of Science of two years' standing; who may elect to be examined in any one of sixteen branches of science. The fee is £10.

By the late Reform Act, the University of London returns one member to serve in Parliament; the constituency (about 1500) is composed solely of "Members of Convocation;" which comprises all graduates of certain standing who have chosen to secure their privileges by payment of a trifling fee.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, LONDON, FOUNDED 1826.

Re-incorporated by Act of Parliament, passed 24th June 1869.

The purpose of the foundation of this College, as expressed in the Act, is, "To afford, at a moderate expense, the means of education in Literature, Science, and the Fine Arts, and in the knowledge required for admission to the medical and legal professions; and, in particular, for affording the means of obtaining the education required for the purpose of taking the degrees now, or hereafter to be, granted by the University of London." The subjects taught are at present classed under (I.) The Faculty of Arts and Laws, including the department of the Fine Arts, (II.) The Faculty of Science, to which belongs the department of Engineering, and (III.) The Faculty of Medicine, and are specified below. Students are admitted without previous examination. The session commences early in October, and terminates towards the end of June. In connexion with University College, and occupying portions of its buildings, there is a school for boys under sixteen years of age.

KING'S COLLEGE, LONDON,

Was founded in 1828, upon the following fundamental principle:—"That every system of general education for the youth of a Christian community ought to comprise instruction in the Christian religion as an indispensable part, without which the acquisition of other branches of knowledge will be conducive neither to the happiness of the individual, nor to the welfare of the state." The subjects taught are enumerated below, and are comprised under the following departments:—I. General literature and science; II. The applied sciences; III. Theology; IV. Medicine. V. The Evening Classes; VI. The School. In the first-named department, new students are subjected to an examination, that it may be ascertained whether they are competent to take advantage of the College classes. The course of study pursued in department II. is practical in its nature, and is designed "for the large class of young men who, in after life, are likely to be engaged in commercial and agricultural pursuits, or in professional employments, such as civil and military engineering, surveying, architecture, and the higher branches of manufacturing art." The whole course occupies three years. Candidates for admission as students in theology must be twenty-one years of age, and be recommended by the clergyman of their parish; they must also pass an examination in Greek, Latin, English literature, the Church Catechism, etc. The course must be continued for at least six terms (two years) before students can offer themselves for final examination. No degrees are conferred by King's College, but its students are privileged to graduate at the University of London.

The academical year consists of three terms, as at Cambridge; and students are admitted at the commencement of each term.

There is accommodation within the walls of the College for only a limited number of matriculated students.

Classes for evening instruction are conducted from October to March and from April to July in each year.

King's College School (for boys from eight to sixteen years of age) consists of two divisions—viz., the division of Classics, Mathematics, and General Literature; and the division of Modern Instruction.

DURHAM UNIVERSITY.

This University was founded in 1832, and incorporated by royal charter in 1837, for the purpose of securing to the inhabitants of the north of England a sound, yet not expensive education. The system of uniting domestic discipline with efficient lectures and instruction is maintained here in some-

what the same manner as at Oxford and Cambridge. With the view of placing the advantages of such a system within the reach of persons of limited means, a Hall, named after Bishop Hatfield, was opened in 1846. All the arrangements of this Hall are made on an economical scale, and students in every Faculty are received in it as in the College—are subject to the same discipline, under the same tutors, and, for the most part, are eligible to the same endowments. In the year 1870 a regulation was passed by which students are admitted to be members of the University without becoming members of any College, Hall, or House. The house or lodging in which they reside must be approved by the Warden and Proctors, and in all matters of University discipline, tuition, and eligibility to endowments, they are placed upon the same footing as students of the College or Hall.

The academical year at Durham consists of three terms, viz., Michaelmas, Epiphany, and Easter. The qualifications of students to enter on the course of education pursued in the several Faculties of Arts, Theology, Physical Science, and Medicine, are ascertained by examination before admission.

For the degree of B.A., or the licence in Theology, a residence of two years is required, the period of residence in the year being six months in both cases. A graduate may proceed to a licence in Theology after one term's residence, and a Licentiate may proceed to a Degree after one term's residence, the term, in either case, being of eight weeks; but this may also be done by keeping two short terms of five weeks each. Terms kept by students in Theology are allowed to count in part towards the degree of B.A., and *vice versa*. A graduate may proceed to the degree of M.A. when he is of the standing of nine terms from his admission to that of B.A.

No student is obliged to attend the services of the Episcopal Church unless he belongs to that church; and no religious test or subscription is required from any member of the University except he be studying in the Faculty of Theology.

The College of Medicine at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, which has for many years been in connexion with the University, is now a college of the University; and the year of residence in Arts at Durham hitherto required of candidates proceeding to degrees in Medicine or Surgery may now, at their option, be spent either in Durham or at Newcastle.

A *College of Physical Science* was founded at Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1871 by the joint co-operation of the University and the leading landed proprietors and employers of skilled labour in the north of England. Professors of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geology, and Biology have been appointed. All information respecting the college may be obtained from the secretary Theo. Wood Bunning.

EXTENT, ETC.—The length of Ireland, from Cork Harbour, in lat. 51° 51' N., to Malin Head, Donegal, in lat. 55° 23' N., is 244 miles; the breadth, from Howth Head, Dublin, in long. 6° 5' W. to Slyne Head, Galway, in long. 10° 11' W. is 168 miles. Its area is 31,754 square miles, or 20,322,641 acres. It is divided into four provinces, and subdivided into 32 counties. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act was £11,767,810 in 1854, £12,893,829 in 1860, and £12,920,373 in 1873. The rateable annual valuation of property was £13,417,922 in 1873. Dublin, the capital, had in 1871 a population of 267,717.

Scotland.

EXTENT AND POPULATION.

The length of the mainland of Scotland, from the Mull of Galloway, in Wigtonshire, in lat. $54^{\circ} 39' N.$ to Dunnet Head, in Caithness-shire, in lat. $58^{\circ} 40' N.$ is 278 miles; the breadth, from Buchan-ness, in Aberdeenshire, in long. $1^{\circ} 47' W.$ to the most westerly point in Ross-shire, in long. $5^{\circ} 52' W.$ is 150 miles. The area, including the islands, is 30,463 square miles, or 19,496,132 statute acres.

The number of counties is thirty-three. The number of parishes in 1871 was 18. The old valued rent of the counties, as ascertained in 1674, was £3,656,408 Scots, or £319,281 sterling [see the Almanac for 1857, pp. 252, 253]: the new valued rent of the counties (including Burghs and Railways), in 1858-9, was £12,836,522 [see the Almanac for 1861, pp. 335, 337]. In 1872-73 the gross annual value was £18,698,804.

The following Table shows the area of each county in square miles, and the number of persons to each square mile; the gross amount of property and profits assessed to Property and Income Tax for the year 1870-71; and the population in 1871.

LIST OF THE PEERAGE OF SCOTLAND,

AS IT STOOD ON THE 1ST MAY 1707; ORDERED TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HOUSE OF LORDS 22D DECEMBER 1707.

[By this document, commonly called *The Union Roll*, it is understood that the order of precedence among the Peers of Scotland is regulated; and, with certain amendments, it is that called at all elections of their representatives, though it cannot be looked on as a complete list, such as should exclude claims to Peerages not entered in it. By the Act 11 and 12 Vict. c. 52, it is ordered that, until otherwise directed by the House of Lords, the Lord Clerk Register, or the Clerks of Session officiating at elections in his name, shall not call the title of any Peerage on *The Union Roll* in right of which no vote has been received or counted since the year 1800. It is farther provided by the Act 14 and 15 Vict. c. 87, that after every election the titles of Peerages in right of which no vote has been received or counted for fifty years or upwards, shall be transmitted to the

Clerk of Parliament, and on an order to that effect being issued from the House of Lords such titles shall not be called at future elections, until the House of Lords shall otherwise direct.

The Roll, as originally framed, contained 154 Peers; namely, 10 Dukes, 3 Marquesses, 75 Earls, 17 Viscounts, and 49 Barons; and there have been subsequently enrolled 9 Peers; namely, 1 Duke, 2 Marquesses, 1 Earl, and 5 Barons. These are distinguished by the letters *ad.* and a date (that of their enrolment) placed after their names. The dates of the creations have been prefixed; Peerages which are attainted, extinct, or dormant, are printed in italics; the date of the attainder, extinction, or abeyance, being added; and an asterisk * has been placed after the names of those who are likewise Peers of England, of Great Britain *by special creation* (all Peers of Scotland being, in terms of the Act of Union, Peers of Great Britain), or of the United Kingdom.]

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THE COMMISSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Meets on the first day after the dissolution of the Assembly, if there be any business left over by the Assembly, and on the second Wednesday of August, third Wednesday of November, and first Wednesday of March, at 12 noon.

REGULATIONS FRAMED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY
OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, TO BE OBSERVED IN THE ELECTION
AND APPOINTMENT OF MINISTERS.

I. Upon Vacancy occurring, Moderator of Kirk-Session to be appointed.—Upon a vacancy occurring in the ministry of any parish, the moderator shall summon a meeting of the presbytery, and the presbytery shall at that meeting appoint, out of their own number, a moderator of the kirk-session of such parish, provided that in collegiate charges, and in cases of assistant and successor, such appointment of a moderator shall not be made unless desired by the parish minister. At all meetings of the congregation held in connection with the vacancy, the moderator of kirk-session thus appointed shall preside, and the roll of the congregation, as hereinafter defined, shall be in his hands.

II. Roll of Congregation to be made up on occurrence of Vacancy.—The member of presbytery appointed to intimate the vacancy shall at the same time intimate that the kirk-session are to proceed to make up a roll of the congregation, for the purpose of determining the persons entitled to take part in the election of a minister, and that any person claiming to be placed on said roll as an adherent of the church is to give in a claim to the kirk-session on or before a day to be then specified, being not less than seven or more than fourteen days thereafter; and intimation shall be further made that the kirk-session will meet on a day and at an hour then named, for the purpose of considering such claims as may be lodged. The intimation may be in the form of Schedule A hereto annexed, and the claim shall be in the form of Schedule B.

III. Roll of Congregation.—The roll of the congregation shall include—
1. As communicants, all persons not being under church discipline, whose names appear upon the roll of communicants, and who have not ceased to be members of the congregation by receiving certificates of transference, or otherwise; 2. As adherents, only such other persons, being parishioners of full age, as have claimed to be enrolled as members of the congregation, and have shown to the satisfaction of the kirk-session that they desire to be considered as connected with the congregation, and in regard to whom no reason appears to the kirk-session for refusing to admit them to the communion if they should apply.

IV. Claims of Persons to be Admitted as Adherents of the Church.—The kirk-session, at their meeting intimated as aforesaid, shall consider the claims of persons to be enrolled as members of the congregation *qua* adherents. Thereafter a list of the names and designations of those persons whom it is proposed by the kirk-session to place on the roll as communicants and adherents respectively shall be made up, and shall be open to inspection for such time as the kirk-session shall appoint, and shall be revised and adjusted on a day to be named by them, when any party having an interest may be heard; after which the roll of the congregation shall be made up therefrom, and shall be attested by the moderator and clerk; and the roll so made up and attested shall be held to be the roll of the congregation for the purposes of these regulations, and a certified copy thereof shall be transmitted to the presbytery of the bounds.

V. Congregation to meet and Committee to be appointed.—When the roll of the congregation has been made up, the moderator of kirk-session shall summon a meeting of the congregation for the election of a committee by edict (in the form of Schedule C hereto annexed), served from the pulpit of the vacant church, such meeting being not less than seven or more than fourteen days from the date of citation. At the meeting, summoned as aforesaid, or any adjournment thereof, the congregation shall appoint a committee to select one or more persons whose names are to be submitted to the congregation with a view to the appointment of a minister. But

before proceeding to the appointment of the committee, the meeting shall determine the number of persons who shall constitute such committee.

VI. Procedure in case of Appointment of an Assistant and Successor.—Whenever the presbytery shall have determined that the appointment of an assistant and successor ought to be made in any parish, the procedure towards the appointment shall, subject to the qualification in section first, be the same as if a vacancy had occurred in the ministry of the parish. Provided that in the case of a charge, which is stated to be in a position requiring the appointment of an assistant and successor, the presbytery shall not proceed to the appointment of a moderator of kirk-session, or take any other step until they have come to a finding, after due citation of the parishioners and all concerned, that in consequence of the mental or bodily incapacity of the minister, or other lawful and sufficient cause, to be specified in the deliverance, it is necessary that steps be taken for the appointment of an assistant and successor.

VII. Congregation to meet to hear Report and to proceed to Election.—When the committee are prepared to report, the convener thereof shall communicate with the moderator of the kirk-session, who shall call a meeting of the congregation, to be held at least seven days after intimation from the pulpit, in terms of Schedule D. The report of the committee shall be read from the pulpit when the meeting is intimated. At the meeting called for the purpose, after hearing the report of the committee, a vote shall be taken—"approve," or "delay." If it be carried "delay," it shall be remitted to the committee to report to an adjourned meeting of the congregation, with or without further special instructions. If it be carried "approve," then, if the committee have nominated only one person, he shall be declared duly elected, appointed, and called by the congregation; if more than one shall have been nominated by the committee, or shall have been mentioned in the report as having been proposed for nomination, it shall be competent for any one on the roll of the congregation to move that any one so nominated or mentioned be elected and called. Thereafter, if required, a vote shall be taken. In the event of the majority of electors present voting in favour of any one of the persons, such person shall be held to have been elected and called; and in such case, or in the case of only one having been proposed and unanimously agreed to, a minute of the meeting to that effect, signed by the moderator and attested by two witnesses, shall be sent to the moderator of presbytery, to be laid before the next meeting of that court, and shall be held to be a valid appointment and call. At any such meeting, when an election and appointment has been made, a call previously prepared, in the form of Schedule E, with the name left blank, shall be filled up with the name of the minister elected, and shall be forthwith signed. If no person has a majority of votes of the electors present, then the whole matter shall be remitted to the committee, or a new committee may be appointed to report to an adjourned meeting of the congregation, with or without special instructions. The call shall be left with the session-clerk, or other suitable person to be named by the meeting, for not less than ten days, to be signed by any members of the congregation who may not have had an opportunity of voting, or by any other inhabitant of the parish who may desire an opportunity of expressing concurrence in the call.

VIII. Utterior proceedings for the Settlement of the Minister.—That so soon as the presbytery have found the appointment valid by sustaining the election and call, they shall proceed to the ordination of the minister (if a probationer) and his induction, according to the ordinary laws of the church.

IX. Appeals not to sist Procedure.—No appeal or complaint from any judgment with respect to the calling and appointment of a minister in any parish shall sist procedure therein, but the proceedings shall continue up to, but not including, the fixing a day for, the admission of the minister so called and appointed, in order that the whole case may be ripe for the judgment of the General Assembly.

X. *Parties not to appear by Counsel or Agents.*—It shall not be competent for any one to be represented by counsel or agents at any of the meetings of the congregation referred to in this Act.

XI. *Provision for Insular Parishes.*—In insular parishes, where, from special causes, any congregational meeting has been prevented from taking place, it shall be in the power of the moderator to summon another meeting of the congregation, to be intimated from the pulpit not less than seven days after the date of citation.

XII. *Cases under Interim Regulations.*—That all vacancies occurring prior to 1st January 1875, and all vacancies in which it was competent to the congregations to proceed to the appointment before the meeting of this General Assembly, shall be regulated by the Interim Regulations framed by the Commission, and these present regulations shall apply to all other vacancies.

[The Thirty-fifth General Assembly of the Free Church convened at Edinburgh on 20th May 1875, when, among other proceedings, they prepared an Address to the Queen, and passed the following Act of Legislation:—Act anent Representative Elders in Newly Sanctioned Charges; as well as the following Acts, important for the general use of the Church:—Act anent the Sustentation Fund, declaring the Dividend payable to all Ministers on the Platform of the Equal Dividend to be £157, with an additional Dividend of £36, and one of £18, to those Ministers whose Congregations, besides having contributed £60 and upwards, have contributed at the rate of 10s. and 7s. 6d. respectively per Communicant to the Sustentation Fund during the last year; Act anent Existing Relations of Church and State; Act anent the Congregation of Lauder; Act anent Union with Reformed Presbyterian Church; Act anent College Matters; Act anent the Platform of the Equal Dividend; Act anent Collections, appointing the fifth Sabbath of January for a Collection for the Continent, the third Sabbath of February for the College Fund, and the third Sabbath of April for the Home Mission; Act anent Sales and Transference of Property; Act appointing Commission of Assembly; Act appointing the Meeting of next Assembly to be at Edinburgh, on 18th May 1876.]

The annual accounts of the Free Church show the whole sums raised for its various objects during the year ending 31st March 1875 to be £525,424, 12s. 1d.]

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SECT. III.—EDUCATIONAL AND LITERARY ESTABLISHMENTS.

THE UNIVERSITIES OF SCOTLAND.

The four Scottish Universities—at St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh—were in the year 1858 reorganized, and as far as possible assimilated. The Universities (Scotland) Act of that year made “provision for the better government and discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and improving and regulating the course of study therein.” Since then the four Universities have possessed a constitution and arrangement nearly uniform. Each is now governed by three internal bodies, called respectively the General Council of the University, the University Court, and the Senatus Academicus. The official Heads of each University are:—the Chancellor (who nominates a Vice-chancellor for conferring degrees in his absence), chosen for life by the General Council; the Rector, chosen every three years by the matriculated students; and the Principal (at St Andrews, Senior Principal) or resident Head of the University, who is President of the Senatus.

The General Council consists of the Chancellor, who is President of the Council; the Rector, who is President of the University Court; the Principal and Professors; the Graduates of the University; four Assessors nominated to sit in the University Court by the Chancellor, Rector, General Council, and Senatus. Failing the Chancellor, the Rector presides; whom failing, the Principal; whom failing, the senior Professor present.

The University Court is a court of appeal from the Senatus, and consists of the Rector, Principal, and Assessors. In Edinburgh, two additional members of the Council and Court are the Lord Provost of the city, and an Assessor nominated by the Town Council; and in Glasgow, one additional member is the “Dean of Faculties”—an extra representative of the Senatus.

The Senatus Academicus, which consists of the Principal and Professors, is entrusted with the superintendence of the teaching and discipline, and, subject to the control of the University Court, with the administration of the revenues and property of the University.

Two members of Parliament are returned by the four Universities. One of these represents Edinburgh and St Andrews; the other Glasgow and Aberdeen. The electors are the members of the General Councils. The Vice-Chancellor is empowered to superintend the election. The Vice-Chancellors at Edinburgh and Glasgow are the Returning Officers.

Each University has considerable endowments for its distinguished students and graduates. They are applied in the form of Prizes (Class and University); Bursaries; Scholarships, and Fellowships. Edinburgh possesses a great number of valuable Scholarships and Fellowships; Glasgow also is rich in Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries; and there is a good Bursary organization in Aberdeen. The Scholarships and Fellowships are confined to those who have passed the three ordinary examinations necessary for a degree in Arts.

Open to all the Scottish Universities are—

I. THE SIX FERGUSON SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1860 by the Trustees of the late John Ferguson, Esq. of Cairnbrock. They are each of the value of £80 per annum, and tenable for two years. Three are offered for competition every year,—one in Classics, one in Mathematics, and one in Mental Philosophy. The competitions take place in Glasgow in the month of October, and are open to all who have passed the last of the examinations required for the degree of Master of Arts in one of the Universities of Scotland (whether taking the degree at the same time or not) within the two years immediately preceding the competition, and who have not already gained one of these scholarships, or

competed more than once previously for any of them. The Scholarships are adjudged upon the report of the Examiners. Candidates are enrolled, not later than 1st September in each year, at the office of the Trustees, 66 George Square, Glasgow, where all necessary information may be obtained.—*Secretary, M. S. Tait.*

II. THE SHAW FELLOWSHIP IN MENTAL PHILOSOPHY,

Founded in 1867 by contributors to a Memorial of Sir James Shaw, Bart. It is of the annual value of £170, tenable for five years, and is in the patronage of the Senatus Academicus of the University of Edinburgh. It is destined for the encouragement of the study of Logic, Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and the History of Philosophy,—studies for which the Scottish Universities have long been celebrated in Europe. It is awarded after competitive examination on these subjects, and is open to graduates in Arts of any of the Scottish Universities, and to those who have passed the examinations for that degree, of not more than five years' standing at the time of the competition. The present Shaw Fellow was appointed in December 1873.

III. THE SCOTTISH UNIVERSITIES CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1875, awarded by competitive examination in Greek and Latin Literature, and open to Graduates in Arts in any of the Scottish Universities, whose course of study for the Degree of Master of Arts shall have commenced within seven years and two months of the time of competition, of the annual value of £100, and tenable for three years. The examinations in rotation at Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and St Andrews.

The Degrees conferred by each of the Universities are the following:—Master of Arts (M.A.); Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master in Surgery (C.M.), Doctor of Medicine (M.D.); Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.), Bachelor of Law (B.L.);* Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.); and the two honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) and Doctor of Divinity (D.D.);—together with some which are confined to Edinburgh, viz., Bachelor and Doctor in Natural and Physical Science; in the Department of Public Health; and in Engineering (B.Sc. and D.Sc.); Doctor in Mental Science (D.Sc.); Doctor in Philology (D.Sc.).

The Professorships are distributed (except at St Andrews, where Law is not taught) under the four Faculties of Arts, i.e., Literature, Philosophy, and Science; Medicine; Law; Theology.

The Professorships in the Faculty of Arts are concerned with the leading branches of liberal education, required for general culture, or needed as a preparatory discipline for the three professional Faculties. The province of the latter Faculties—Medicine, Law, Theology—is special, namely, to train in the professional studies.

The Faculty of Arts is the basis of University education. It embraces three departments:—viz., (1) Latin and Greek; (2) Mental Philosophy, including Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and Rhetoric and English Literature; (3) and Mathematics, with various branches of Experimental Physics and Physical Science. A degree in Arts is a pass to any of the other three Faculties. The possession of it exempts from all preliminary examination on general subjects any one desirous of entering the Medical or Legal professions, or the Church, and the principal departments of the Public Service.

To obtain the degree of Master of Arts entails a University course of Four Winter Sessions, or (if an entrance examination in Latin and Greek is passed) of Three Winter Sessions. Attendance on the classes of Humanity (Latin), Greek, Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, Rhetoric and English Literature, Mathematics, and Natural Philosophy, is required of

all candidates for this Degree. The examinations to be gone through for the M.A. degree are in the three Departments, viz., Classics; Mental Philosophy; and Mathematics (including Natural Philosophy and Experimental Physics). These three examinations may be all passed at the conclusion of the curriculum; or any one or two of them at an earlier period—provided that the classes corresponding to the subjects of examination have been previously attended. When a student has passed all the examinations, he may at once proceed to take his degree, or, with a view to attaining greater distinction in the Honours examinations, he may pursue his studies further for a year. The names of those who graduate with Honours are published in alphabetical order, in Classes of the First and Second rank; and Honours may be taken in each of the three Departments—Classics; Mental Philosophy; Mathematics and Experimental Physics; also in Natural Science.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ST ANDREWS,

The most ancient of the Scottish Universities, was founded in 1411 by Wardlaw, Bishop of the diocese. Two years later, on petition of James I., the Bishop, and others, the foundation, with benefactions annexed to it, was sanctioned, and privileges and immunities were secured to it, by Papal bull of Benedict XIII. From the first there existed the Faculties of Arts, Theology, and Canon Law. In 1430, a pedagogium was erected for the Faculty of Arts. The University has undergone numerous changes of constitution. In the sixteenth century it came to comprise three distinct corporate colleges:—1. *St Salvator's College*, founded in 1455; 2. *St Leonard's College*, founded in 1512; 3. *The College of St Mary*, founded in 1537.

In 1747, the colleges of St Salvator and St Leonard were united by Act of Parliament, and called the United College of St Salvator and St Leonard. The University now "consists," to quote the Calendar, "of three distinct corporations, viz.:—The United College of St Salvator and St Leonard, with its Principal and nine Professors; St Mary's College with its Principal, who is also Primarius Professor, and three Professors; and the University, comprising the members of both colleges, and of which the senior Principal (senior according to priority in office) is also president."

The session in the *United College* opens in the first week of November, and closes towards the end of April. In *St Mary's College*, it commences about ten days later, and closes in the end of March.

The *General Council* meets twice a year, on the last Thursday of March and the last Thursday of November. The election of Rector takes place every third year, on the last Thursday of November.

The aggregate annual value of the prizes, bursaries, and fellowships at St Andrews is about £2000.

In 1875 the number of students who matriculated was 143; the number who graduated was 21—viz.: in Arts, M.A., 9; in Medicine, 12. Members of the General Council, 1528. The number of those who voted for the M.P. returned in December 1868 was 1126. There was no contest at last election.

THE UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW

Was founded by Bull of Pope Nicholas V., obtained by King James II. at the instigation of Bishop Turnbull in 1450. From the beginning it taught Canon and Civil Law, Theology, and the Arts, and was empowered to confer degrees in all Faculties. In its earlier days, its educational labours are said to have been carried on near the cathedral, in a building now in ruins, still pointed out as the "Old Pedagogy;" while the General Congregations of the University and of the Faculties met in the chapter-house of the cathedral. In 1459, James, first Lord Hamilton, granted the site occupied by the buildings recently abandoned to the Faculty of Arts, which thenceforward grew in importance.

In 1577, King James VI. granted increased funds in a charter called the *Nova Erectio*.

By this charter provision was made for the support of a Principal, who was to teach Theology, and three Regents in Philosophy. From this small beginning the University continued to make progress till the era of the Restora-

tion, at which time it had, besides the Principal, eight Professors and Regents in Theology, Medicine, and Arts. The restoration of the Episcopal Church deprived it of a considerable portion of its revenues, and in consequence several of the Professorships fell into abeyance, but after the Revolution it began again to prosper. In the first twenty years of last century, six new Professorships were founded, and another in 1760. The remaining twelve Professorships have been founded during the present century.

Among the eminent men who have adorned this University during the last and present centuries, may be mentioned the names of Hutcheson, Adam Smith and Reid, Black and Cullen, Robert Simson, John Millar, Meor and Sandford.

The University occupied the site which it has lately quitted, for upwards of four hundred years, and its late buildings for upwards of two hundred years. In 1864 these buildings and adjacent lands were sold, and extensive and handsome new buildings, designed by Sir G. Gilbert Scott of London, have been erected on an admirable site in the west end of Glasgow. The new buildings, of which the foundation-stone was laid by the Prince and Princess of Wales in October 1868, and which were formally opened for the purposes of the University on the 7th November 1870, are estimated to cost, when completed, upwards of £350,000; and in aid of their erection subscriptions have already been received, chiefly in Glasgow and the neighbourhood, to the amount of above £150,000.

The winter session commences on the first Tuesday of November, and ends on May 1st. The Medical classes open a week earlier, and close in the beginning of April. There is also a Medical summer session from the beginning of May till the end of July.

The Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries, founded in this University, amount in annual value to about £5000. The most valuable of these are the George A. Clark Scholarships, four in number, each about £200 in annual value, and the Snell Exhibitions, ten in number, and each £108 in annual value, the object of which is to assist Scottish students in prosecuting their studies in Oxford University. These exhibitions have been held by not a few who afterwards became distinguished, among whom may be mentioned Adam Smith, Sir William Hamilton, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, and the present Lord President of the Court of Session.

The University Library contains an extensive and valuable collection of books, which is always increasing by donations and by a grant of £707 per annum from the Treasury as compensation for the loss of the Stationers' Hall privilege.

The Hunterian Museum was founded by the eminent William Hunter, M.D., who, by his will dated 1783, bequeathed to the University his valuable collection of books, manuscripts, coins, paintings, anatomical preparations, zoological and mineral specimens, and archæological relics.

The number of matriculated students in the session 1874-75 was:—In the Faculty of Arts, 904; Divinity, 60; Medicine (summer, 28), 367; Law, 153: total, 1484.

Matriculated Students, in voting for the Rector, are divided into four nations:—

Natio Glottiana (those born in Lanarkshire); *Natio Transforthana* (those born in the counties lying north of the Forth); *Natio Rothseiana* (those born in the counties of Renfrew, Bute, or Ayr); *Natio Loudoniana* (those not already included).

This election takes place every three years on the 15th (or 16th, if the 15th be a Sunday) of November.

The graduates in 1874-75 were as follows: D.D., 6; B.D., 6; LL.D., 3; LL.B., 1; B.L., 5; M.D., 12; M.B., 34; C.M., 33; M.A., 39.

The General Council meets twice a year, on the Wednesday immediately preceding the opening, and on the Wednesday immediately preceding the closing, of the winter session.

Members of the General Council on the Register for 1875, 2759; the number who voted for the M.P. at the election in November 1869 was 2026. There was no contest at last election.

THE UNIVERSITY OF ABERDEEN

Was, until 1860, two Universities and Colleges. The one, the *University and King's College of Aberdeen*, was founded in 1494 by Elphinstone, Bishop of the diocese, and sanctioned by a Papal bull obtained by James IV.; the other, *Marischal College and University of Aberdeen*, was founded in 1593, under a charter ratified by Parliament, by George Keith, Earl Marischal.

The Universities (Scotland) Act, 1858, includes (as mentioned in the preamble) "The union of the two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen;" which union the Commissioners appointed by Parliament dated from Sept. 15, 1860. Among the other Scottish Universities, that of Aberdeen now ranks from the foundation of 1494. It consists now of but one University, having its classes for Arts and Divinity in what was King's College, and its classes of Law and Medicine in what was Marischal College. Both Colleges had classes in all four Faculties.

In the election of Lord Rector, the matriculated students are divided, according to their birthplace, into four "nations"—Mar, Buchan, Moray, and Angus; and each nation chooses a procurator to vote for the Rector; and, in case of a tie, the Chancellor (failing him, the Principal) has a casting vote.

In *Arts*, the session commences on the Tuesday before the last Monday of October, and closes on the first Friday of April. In *Divinity*, the session commences on the first Monday after the October Synod, and closes after lasting four months. In *Law*, the session extends from the first Monday of November to the end of March. In *Medicine*, the winter session commences in the last week of October, and extends over six months; and the summer session commences on the first Monday of May, and extends over three months. The *General Council* meets twice a year—on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of April, and on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of October. The number of Matriculated Students in the winter session of 1874-75 was 635; in the summer session of 1875, 162. The Graduates in 1875 were as follows:—M.A., 44; M.D., 33; M.B., 59; C.M., 57; B.D., 3; D.D., 2; LL.D., 4.

The registered members of the General Council for the year 1875 numbered 2296. The number who voted at the election in November 1869 was 1710. The last election was not contested.

THE UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH.

This, though the youngest of the Scottish Universities, annually enrolls the largest number of students. Although founded by James VI. in 1582, and entitled *Academia Jacobi VI.*, or "King James's College," it originated in a bequest made in 1558 by Reid, Bishop of Orkney, to the Town-Council of Edinburgh, for the erection of a College. The money was at first retained by the Abbot of Kinloss. After a delay of five years, the Council, on the faith of ultimately obtaining the bequest, purchased part of the present site of the University. Queen Mary lent her assistance, granting a charter of presentation to some confiscated church property; but building was not commenced until 1581. In the following year, King James incorporated the University by Royal Charter; increasing the grants of Queen Mary.

The title of Edinburgh University to the various rights, privileges, and immunities possessed by the other Universities of the kingdom, rests on an Act of the Scottish Parliament passed in 1621, and on subsequent ratifications made in the Treaty of Union and in the Act of Security.

The work of teaching began in 1583, under Robert Rollock, who was at first called Regent. Other Regents were subsequently appointed, and Rollock became Principal. At first the student was carried through his whole course by the same teacher.

The University of Edinburgh has long been famous, especially in Medicine and in Metaphysics. Its Medical fame, which rose under Dr Alexander Monro in 1720, is second to no other university in Europe; and as a School of Mental Philosophy it can boast, as students and professors, of the names of David Hume, Ferguson, Stewart, Brown, Mackintosh, and Hamilton, with Dalziel, Playfair, Leslie, and Forbes, in other departments of the Faculty of Arts.

Until 1858, the Town-Council had a large share of the patronage of the University. The appointments to such chairs as the Town-Council were patrons of is now in the hands of seven Curators—four of them elected by the Town-Council, and the remaining three by the University.

The University Library contains nearly 160,000 volumes and many valuable MSS. The new Museum of Science and Art is connected with the University.

The aggregate annual value of the Fellowships and Scholarships (all founded since 1858) is about £3600. Eight of these are given for eminence in Classics; seven in Mental Philosophy; twelve in Mathematics and the Experimental Sciences; and two in Divinity. There are also above a hundred Bursaries in connexion with the Faculty of Arts, of the aggregate annual value of considerably more than £2000, with an annual Bursary Competition in the University at the beginning of each winter session, and twenty-four in the Faculty of Divinity, worth annually nearly £400. There are several newly founded Bursaries in Law and Medicine.

University Certificates in Arts for women are given after examination to candidates who have studied in the classes of the Edinburgh Ladies' Educational Association.

Local examinations of schools, corresponding to those of Oxford and Cambridge, are held by the University annually, in June.

The University, by an arrangement with the War Office, holds special examinations which qualify for admission to the Army.

The present University building is a large, modern, quadrangular edifice, covering the site of the "Kirk o' Field," the scene of the murder of Darvel. The architect was Mr Adam, who also designed the Register House. The foundation-stone was laid in 1789, on the site of the old buildings; but, from want of funds, it remained only half completed till after 1815. It is still unfinished. The magnificent dome, designed to rise above the grand entrance, has never been erected. The interior of the quadrangle is very handsome, in the Grecian style. The accommodation in the present buildings, however, is very inadequate to the rapid growth of the University, under the Universities Act (1858), and measures are in progress for a large extension of the accommodation in new buildings.

There are two sessions—the winter session, opening in the beginning of

November, and closing in the end of April; the summer session, opening in the beginning of May, and closing in the end of July. In the winter session, the classes in all the four Faculties are assembled; in summer, only those of Law and Medicine, with tutorial classes in Arts.

The number of matriculated students for 1874-75 was 2076, viz., in the Faculty of Arts, 793; in the Faculty of Divinity, 66; in the Faculty of Law, 318; in the Faculty of Medicine, 899.

The Public Ceremonial of Graduation in Arts, Divinity, Law, and Science is in April, and in Medicine in August. The number of Degrees conferred in 1875, after examination, numbered 261,—viz., in Arts (M.A.), 70; Science, 0; Divinity (B.D.), 5; Law, 2 (LL.B. 1, B.L. 1); Medicine and Surgery, 74,—viz., 18 M.D. 86 M.B., and 70 C.M.

The *General Council* meets twice a year, on the first Tuesday after the 14th of April, and on the last Friday of October. The membership of the Council is about 3700; the number of those who voted at the election of the M.P. in December 1868 was 3263. The last election was not contested.

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[This Society was originally incorporated in 1786 by Act of Parliament, by the name and style of "The British Society for Extending the Fisheries and Improving the Sea Coasts of this Kingdom," to enable the members, when incorporated, to subscribe a joint-stock, and therewith to purchase lands, and build thereon free towns, villages, and fishing stations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, and for other purposes. The Society accordingly acquired an extensive property at Pulteneytown, on the Bay of Wick, and founded a settlement, at which they erected a harbour about the year 1806, for the accommodation of vessels used in the coasting trade, particularly in connexion with the herring fishing; and a new outer harbour, with alterations on the old one, was completed in 1834. In the session of Parliament 1857 an Act was obtained incorporating the Society of new, and conferring special powers for the erection of an additional harbour in the Bay of Wick, according to plans prepared by Messrs Stevenson, engineers, for the farther accommodation of boats frequenting the herring fishing, and to serve as a harbour of refuge for vessels overtaken

The Sheriff and Commissary Courts for the County, and the Sheriff Small Debt Court, are held at Selkirk weekly during Session, the former on Friday and the latter on Wednesday. Circuit Sheriff Small Debt Court held at Galashiels on the second Mondays of February, April, and June, last Monday of July, first Monday of October, and second Monday of December.

SHETLAND.

The Shetland Islands are above 100 in number, of which only 23 are inhabited. They have a total area of 325 square miles, or 208,579 acres, and, along with the Orkney Islands, form a county. The valued rent in 1674 was £27,452 Scots, or £2288 sterling; the new valuation for 1875-76 is £34,337, of which £6977 applies to the burgh of Lerwick. The assessment for 1875-76 is, for county general assessment 3d., and for prison and valuation expenses 1½d. per pound. Under the Zetland Roads Act, 6d. per pound was assessed upon the owners of land in the islands of Mainland and Yell, and a supplementary assessment of 2d. per pound was laid on properties in the Mainland for the "county" roads for the year 1875, houses being assessed at a half of these rates. Certain other islands are assessed at one-half, and others at one-fourth of these rates. The population in 1871 was 31,608; the inhabited houses, 5667. The parliamentary constituency in 1875-76 is 358. The chief town is Lerwick, a burgh of regality; population in 1871, 3516.

IV. c. 65, and 31 & 32 Vict. c. 48. These 15 Parliamentary Burghs (distinguished in the following pages by *) are, Airdrie, Bannockburn, Falkirk, Galashiels, Greenock, Hamilton, Hawick, Kilmarnock, Leith, Musselburgh, Oban, Paisley, Peterhead, Port-Glasgow, and Portobello. In the Union of England and Scotland, there were 70 Royal Burghs in Scotland, but *four* of them in the county of Fife—Auchtermuchty, Earlsferry, Kirkcaldy, and Newburgh—which had not for some time sent members to the British Parliament, were not included in the classes of burghs then formed to send representatives to the British Parliament. Their constituencies, in accordance with the Act 1832, now vote in the election of a representative in Parliament for the county of Fife. Besides these *four*, there are other *two* Royal Burghs (distinguished in the following pages by †) which had (as burghs) a parliamentary representation from the Union till 1832, viz. Peebles and Beresford. Their constituencies now vote in the election of representatives for counties within which they are situated. The population and inhabited houses are given according to the census of 1871; the value of real property is that within the parliamentary boundaries, as ascertained under the Valuation of Lands and Heritages Act (17 and 18 Vict. c. 91.)]

SECTION I.—MUNICIPAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY,

AS DEFINED IN ACT 2D AND 3D WILLIAM IV. CAP. 65.

[The Municipal Boundaries are the same as the Parliamentary.]

From a point on the road from Leith to Queensferry, which is distant 400 yds. (measured along such road) to the west of the point at which the same meets the Inverleith road at the house called Golden Acre, in a straight line to the north-western corner of the enclosure of John Watson's Institution; thence in a straight line to the second stone bridge, marked No. 2, on the Union Canal; thence in a straight line to the point at which the western wall of the enclosure of the Lunatic Asylum at Morningside meets the Jordan or Pow Burn; thence down the said burn to a point which is

distant 150 yards (measured along such burn) below the arch over the same on the Carlisle road; thence in a straight line to the summit of Arthur Seat; thence in a straight line to the point at which the feeder enters the western side of Lochend Loch; thence in a straight line to the point at which Pilrig Street joins Leith Walk; thence along Pilrig Street and the Bonnington Road to the point at which the same meets the road from Leith to Queensferry; thence along the road from Leith to Queensferry to the point first described.

PARLIAMENTARY POLLING DISTRICTS AND MUNICIPAL WARDS OF THE CITY,

AS DEFINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED UNDER "THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS AMENDMENT (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1868."

Place, London Street, and Broughton Street, to the point first mentioned.

From a point on the parliamentary boundary at Golden Acre opposite the centre of the high road to Canonmills Bridge, westward along the road leading from Leith to Queensferry, in the line of the said boundary; thence south-westward along said boundary to the centre of the road leading from Edinburgh to Queensferry by the Dean Bridge; thence eastward and southward along the centre of the said road to the Dean Bridge, at a point immediately above the centre of the Water of Leith; thence north-eastward along the centre of said Water of Leith to the bridge over the Water of Leith at Stockbridge; thence south-eastward along the centre of the road in front of Glanville Place and Kerr Street, North-West Circus Place, and South-East Circus Place, to the foot of Howe Street; thence northward and eastward along the centre of St Vincent Street and Fettes Row to North Pitt Street; thence northward along the centre of North Pitt Street, Brandon Street, and the high road by Canonmills Bridge, to the point first mentioned.

From the point where the parliamentary boundary intersects the road leading from Edinburgh to Queensberry by the Dean Bridge, eastward and southward along the centre of said road, to the Dean Bridge at a point immediately above the centre of the Water of Leith; thence northward along the centre of the Water of Leith to the bridge over the Water of Leith at Stockbridge; thence southward along the centre of the street in front of Glanville Place and Kerr Street to Church Street; thence southward along the centre of said street to Gloucester Place; thence eastward along the centre of Gloucester Place to India Street; thence southward along the centre of India Street to Heriot Row; thence westward along the centre of Heriot Row to Wemyss Place; thence southward along the centre of Wemyss Place to Queen Street; thence westward along the centre of Queen Street to North Charlotte Street; thence southward along the centre of North Charlotte Street, the street on the east side of Charlotte Square, and South Charlotte Street, to Princes Street; thence eastward along the centre of Princes Street to St David Street; thence northward along the centre of South St David Street, the street on the west side of St Andrew Square, and North St David Street, to Queen Street; thence westward along the centre of said street to Hanover Street; thence northward along the centre of the road between Queen Street Gardens to Heriot Row; and thence westward along the centre of Heriot Row to the point first mentioned.

V. ST STEPHEN'S WARD.

From a point opposite the foot of Church Street, in the centre of the high road leading from the Stockbridge south-eastward, along the centre of said road to the foot of Howe Street; thence northward and eastward along the centre of St Vincent Street, Fettes Row, and Royal Crescent, to Scotland Street; thence southward along the centre of Scotland Street, the street in front of the east quadrants of Drummond Place, and Dublin Street, to Abercromby Place; thence westward along the centre of Abercromby Place and Heriot Row to India Street; thence northward along the centre of said street to Gloucester Place; thence westward along the centre of Gloucester Place to Church Lane; and thence northward along the centre of Church Lane and Church Street to the point first mentioned.

VI. ST LUKE'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of the street at the west end of Heriot Row, opposite the centre of Wemyss Place, southward along the centre of Wemyss Place to Queen Street; thence westward along the centre of Queen Street to North Charlotte Street; thence southward along the centre of North Charlotte Street, the street on the east side of Charlotte Square, and South Charlotte Street, to Princes Street; thence eastward along the centre of Princes Street to St David Street; thence northward along the centre of South St David Street, the street on the west side of St Andrew Square, and North St David Street, to Queen Street; thence westward along the centre of said street to Hanover Street; thence northward along the centre of the road between Queen Street Gardens to Heriot Row; and thence westward along the centre of Heriot Row to the point first mentioned.

VII. ST ANDREW'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of Princes Street opposite the centre of St David Street, eastward along the centre of Princes Street to Leith Street; thence north-eastward and northward along the centre of said street, Catherine Street, and Broughton Street, to London Street; thence westward, south-westward, and southward, along the centre of London Street, the street in front of the south-eastern quadrant of Drummond Place, and Dublin Street, to Abercromby Place; thence westward along the centre of Abercromby Place to the east end of Heriot Row; thence southward along the centre of the road between Queen Street Gardens to Queen Street; thence eastward along the centre of Queen Street to North St David Street; thence southward along the centre of said street, the street on the west side of St Andrew Square, and South St David Street, to the point first mentioned.

VIII. CANONGATE WARD.

From a point where the London Road is intersected by the parliamentary boundary, westward along the centre of said road and Regent Road to Regent Arch, Waterloo Place, at a point immediately above Low Calton; thence southward and eastward along the centre of Low Calton and the North Back of Canongate to New Street; thence southward along the centre of New Street to Canongate; thence westward along the centre of Canongate to St Mary Street; thence south-

ward along St Mary Street and the Pleasance to Salisbury Street; thence eastward along the centre of Salisbury Street to Dumbiedykes Road; thence northward along the centre of said road to a point at the entrance to the Queen's Park at the foot of Arthur Street; thence south-eastward along the boundary wall of the said park to the point at which it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary; and thence northward along said boundary to the point first mentioned.

IX. ST GILES' WARD.

From a point in the centre of Waterloo Place at the Regent Arch, at a point immediately above Low Calton, westward along the centre of Waterloo Place and Princes Street to the Lothian Road; thence southward along the centre of said road to the road leading to King's Stables; thence south-eastward and southward along the centre of last-mentioned road to the West Port; thence eastward by the southern wall of the Old Corn Market, and the centre of the Grassmarket, to the Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence eastward along the centre of the road last mentioned, Lothian Street, South College Street, and Drummond Street, to Pleasance; thence northward along the centre of the Pleasance and St Mary Street to Canongate; thence eastward along the centre of Canongate to New Street; thence northward along the centre of New Street to North Back of Canongate; thence westward and northward along the North Back of Canongate and Low Calton to the point first mentioned.

X. ST CUTHBERT'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of the Lothian Road opposite the road leading to King's Stables, southward along the centre of the Lothian Road to Port Hopetoun; thence westward along the centre of St Anthony Place, Tobago Street, Morrison Street, and the road leading to Coltbridge to the point where it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary; thence southward along said boundary to the point on the Union Canal where it is intersected by said boundary; thence north-eastward along the canal to the bridge at Fountainbridge Street; thence eastward along the centre of said street and West Port to the east end of the West Port; thence north-westward along the centre

of the street and road leading by King's Stables to the Lothian Road to the point first mentioned.

XI. GEORGE SQUARE WARD.

From a point in the centre of the high road at Tollcross opposite Earl Grey Street, north-westward along the centre of Earl Grey Street to Fountainbridge; thence north-eastward along the centre of Fountainbridge, West Port, and the Grassmarket, to Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence eastward along the centre of said road, Lothian Street, and South College Street, to Nicolson Street; thence southward along the centre of Nicolson Street, St Patrick Street, and Clerk Street, to a point in the centre of the last-mentioned street opposite the footpath on the north side of Hope Park Chapel [Newington Church]; thence westward along the centre of said footpath to a point opposite the same in the centre of the high road to Causewayside; thence southward along the centre of said road to a point opposite the entrance to the southern Meadow Walk; thence westward along the centre of said Walk, and by the northern boundary of Bruntsfield Links to the centre of the Wright's Houses Road; and thence northward along the centre of Leven Street and Home Street to the point first mentioned.

XII. ST LEONARD'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of Nicolson Street opposite Drummond Street, eastward along the centre of Drummond Street to the Pleasance; thence southward along the centre of the Pleasance to Salisbury Street; thence eastward along the centre of Salisbury Street to Dumbiedykes Road; thence northward along the centre of said road to a point opposite the entrance to the Queen's Park at the foot of Arthur Street; thence eastward to the boundary wall of the park at said entrance; thence south-eastward along said wall to Gibbet Loan; thence south-westward along the centre of said Loan to the Dalkeith Road; thence northward along the centre of last-mentioned road and St Leonard's Street to Rankellor Street; thence westward along the centre of said street to Clerk Street; and thence northward along the centre of Clerk Street, St Patrick Street, and Nicolson Street, to the point first mentioned.

XIII. NEWINGTON WARD.

From a point in the centre of the road at Tollcross opposite Earl's Street, northward along the centre of said street to Fountainbridge; thence westward along the centre of the street last mentioned to the bridge over the Union Canal, where it intersects said street; thence southward along the canal to the point where it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary; thence south-eastward, southward, and north-eastward along said boundary to the point where it intersects the boundary wall of the Queen's Park; thence north-westward along said wall to Gibbet Loan; thence north-westward along the centre of said Loan to the Dalkeith Road; thence northward along the centre of last-men-

tioned road and St Leonard's Street to Rankeillor Street; thence along the centre of said street to Clerk Street; thence southward along the centre of Clerk Street to a point opposite the footpath on the north side of Hope Park Chapel; thence westward along the centre of said footpath to a point opposite the same in the centre of the high road to Causewayside; thence southward along the centre of said road to a point opposite the entrance to the southern Meadow Walk; thence westward along the centre of said Walk, and by the northern boundary of Bruntsfield Links to the centre of the Wright's Houses Road; and thence northward along the centre of Leven Street and Home Street to the point first mentioned.

WITHIN THE PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDS OF THE CITY.

I. ST GEORGE'S DISTRICT.

From a point in the centre of the Canongate Road opposite St John's Chapel, along the centre of the road leading to King's Stables; thence eastward and southward along the centre of the Grassmarket, Candlemaker Row, and Forrest Road, to Lauriston; thence westward along the centre of the high road by Lauriston to Tollcross; thence northward and westward along the centre of Earl Grey Street and Fountainbridge to the Union Canal; thence southward along the north bank of said canal to the parliamentary boundary; thence northward and eastward by said boundary to Golden Acre; thence southward along the centre of Inverleith Row and Canonmills to London Street; thence westward along the centre of said street to the north quadrant of Drummond Place; thence northward and westward along the centre of said quadrant, Scotland Street, Royal Crescent, and Fettes Row, to St Stephen's Church; thence southward along the centre of St Vincent Street to the foot of Howe Street; thence north-westward by the centre of the Royal Circus and North-West Circus Place to Church Street; thence southward to Gloucester Place; thence eastward and southward along the centre of Gloucester Place and India Street to Heriot Row; thence westward and southward along the centre

of Heriot Row and Wemyss Place to Albyn Place; thence westward by Albyn Place to North Charlotte Street; thence southward along the centre of North Charlotte Street, the street on the east side of Charlotte Square, and South Charlotte Street, to Princes Street; thence westward along the centre of Princes Street to the point first mentioned; and the landward part of the parish of St Cuthbert's, comprising all houses within the parish beyond the municipal boundaries.

II. ST ANDREW'S DISTRICT

Comprehends the following Parliamentary and Municipal Wards of the city, viz.:—The 1st, or Calton Ward; the 2d, or Broughton Ward, excepting that part westward of the centre of Huntly Street, Canonmills, Bellevue Crescent, and Mansfield Place; the 5th, or St Stephen's Ward; the 6th, or St Luke's Ward; the 7th, or St Andrew's Ward.

III. CANONGATE DISTRICT

Comprehends the following Parliamentary and Municipal Ward of the city, viz.:—The 8th, or Canongate Ward; and the landward part of the parish of Canongate; also that part of the 9th, or St Giles' Ward eastward of North and South Bridges.

IV. ST GILES' DISTRICT.

From a point in the centre of Princes Street opposite the North Bridge, westward along the centre of Princes Street

to the Lothian Road; thence southward along the centre of said road to the road to King's Stables; thence south-eastward and southward along the centre of last-mentioned road to the West Port; thence eastward by the southern wall of the Old Corn Market, and the centre of the Grassmarket, to the Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence westward and southward along the centre of the high road by Lauriston, Portland Place, Tollcross, Home Street, and Leven Street, to the northern boundary of Bruntfield Links at the Barclay Church; thence eastward by said boundary, and the centre of the south-

ern Meadow Walk, to a point in the centre of the high road opposite Summerhall Brewery; thence northward along the centre of the high road leading to Buccleuch Street, to the foot-path on the north of Newington Church; thence eastward along the centre of said path to a point opposite the same in the centre of Clerk Street; thence northward along the centre of said street, St Patrick Square, Nicolson Street, and South and North Bridges, to the point first mentioned.

V. NEWINGTON DISTRICT

Comprehends the following Parliamentary and Municipal Wards of the city, viz.:—The 12th, or St Leonard's Ward; the 13th, or Newington Ward.

PAROCHIAL DIVISIONS OF THE CITY.

ANCIENT ROYALTY.

I. TOLBOOTH PARISH.

Castle-hill, both sides, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the Lawnmarket, down to and including the west side of Bank Street and the Bank of Scotland. Both sides of the new west approach as far west as the Castle Wynd.

II. HIGH CHURCH PARISH.

The east side of Bank Street, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of the North Bridge.

III. TRINITY COLLEGE PARISH.

The east side of the North Bridge, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of Leith Wynd.

IV. OLD CHURCH PARISH.

All buildings and closes on the south side of the High Street and Head of Canongate from South Gray's or Mint Close down to St John's Cross; thence along the boundary of the ancient royalty to the South Back of Canongate; thence westward by the foot of St Mary Street and the middle of the Cowgate to the foot of South Gray's or Mint Close. The eastside of said close.

V. TRON CHURCH PARISH.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street from the head of South Gray's or Mint Close to the west side of the Tron Church. The east side of Blair Street and the north side of the Cowgate from the foot of said street downwards to the foot of and including the west side of said close.

VI. NEW NORTH PARISH.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street and north side

of the Cowgate, from and including the west side of Blair Street and Hunter Square, to and including the east side of George IV. Bridge.

VII. ST JOHN'S PARISH.

From the Castle Wynd, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket and the Cowgate, to the centre of George IV. Bridge; thence northward to the Lawnmarket; westward, along the middle of the Lawnmarket and the back of the new west approach, to the Castle Wynd; and southward, along the centre of said wynd.

VIII. WESTER OR NEW GREYFRIARS' PARISH.

That portion of the ancient royalty on the north side of the Grassmarket, and westward from the centre of the Castle Wynd. From the extremity of the city at the foot of the Vennel, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket, to the centre of the Candlemaker Row; thence southward along the said row to the City Wall at the entrance to the Charity Workhouse grounds; and from thence along the boundary of the city at the back of the Workhouse and George Heriot's Hospital to the foot of the Vennel.

IX. EASTER OR OLD GREYFRIARS' PARISH.

From Bristo Port, eastward along the City Wall to the street on the west side of the College, down the centre of said street, and along North College Street to the head of the College Wynd, down the centre of said wynd, thence westward along the middle of the Cowgate to the centre of the Candlemaker Row, thence southward along the said row to Bristo Port.

X. LADY YESTER'S PARISH.

The College Wynd, east side. The south side of the Cowgate from said wynd to the Cowgate Port; thence along the City Wall east of Surgeons' Square,

and by the back of the Royal Infirmary and the south side of the College, to the street on the west side of the College, including the east side of said street.

EXTENDED ROYALTY.**I. ST ANDREW'S PARISH**

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the east of a line drawn from the southern boundary of said Royalty at the Earthen Mound, through the centre of Hanover Street, to the centre of Queen Street; and to the south of a line from thence eastward along the centre of Queen Street, York Place, and Picardy Place, and down Leith Walk to the extremity of the Royalty at the bottom of Elm Row. [Part of this parish has been allocated to form that of Greenside. See below, No V.]

II. ST GEORGE'S PARISH

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the west of a line drawn from the southern boundary of said Royalty at the Earthen Mound through the centre of Hanover Street to the centre of Queen Street, and to the south of a line from thence westward along the centre of Queen Street to the western boundary of the Extended Royalty.

The lands of West Coates and part of East Dalry, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, will, when feued and built upon, fall to be added to St George's Parish.

III. ST MARY'S PARISH

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the east of a line drawn from the northern boundary of said Royalty through the centre of Pitt and Dundas Streets to a point in the centre of Queen Street opposite to Hanover Street, and on the north of a line from that point eastward through the centre of Queen Street, York Place, and Picardy Place, and Leith Walk, to

the boundary of said Royalty at a point in Leith Walk opposite to Union Street. The lands of Logie-green, Broughton Park, Blandfield, and Park of Powderhall, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, will, when feued and built upon, fall to be added to St Mary's Par.

IV. ST STEPHEN'S PARISH

Comprehends those portions of the Extended Royalty to the west of a line drawn from the northern boundary of said Royalty through the centre of Canonmills Road opposite to Brandon, Pitt, and Dundas Streets, to a point in the centre of Queen Street opposite to Hanover Street, and on the north of a line from that point westward through the centre of Queen Street to the boundary of the Royalty at St Colme St. The Deaf and Dumb Institution, New Academy, and Feus of Heriot's Hospital as far east as Brandon Street, which are included in this description, being within the Extended Royalty, fall to be included in St Stephen's Par.

V. GREENSIDE PARISH

Comprehends that part of the Parish of St Andrew's on the east side of a line commencing at a point in Catherine Street, opposite to the entry to Nottingham Place, and running down the centre of Leith Walk to the boundary of the Royalty at the foot of Elm Row, and from thence round the south-east and south boundary of the said Parish of St Andrew's to the foot of the Stair leading to the Calton Hill, and from thence by the present boundary of said Parish to the point first mentioned, including also as much of Norton Place and of the adjacent grounds as lie within the Royalty.

FORMER MUNICIPAL WARDS**OF THE ANCIENT AND EXTENDED ROYALTY.**

[These are still observed in the election of Managers of the Poor for the burghal parish of Edinburgh.]

I.—That part of the Ancient Royalty situate south of the High Street and Canongate from the Castle Hill Esplanade to St John's Cross, bounded on the south, east, and west, by the boundary line of the Royalty running from St John's Cross to the South Back of the Canongate, the Street of South Back of Canongate to the Cowgate Port, and thence by the line of the Old

Town Wall, by the west end of the Grassmarket to the Castle Hill; also that part of the Ancient Royalty lying north of the High Street from the Castle Hill Esplanade to Bank Street, bounded on the east, north, and west by Bank Street, Mound Place, and the Princes Street Gardens.

II.—Those parts of the Ancient and Extended Royalty comprehended with-

in the following limits; viz. from Bank Street along the High Street to the head of Leith Wynd, down Leith Wynd, round by the back of the College Kirk-yard, and including the houses of Shakspeare Square [the site of which is now occupied by the New Post-Office] and both sides of Waterloo Place; and then along the boundary line of the Royalty that intersects the Register House, West Register Street, the Royal Bank, and Elder Street, to the foot of the Catholic Chapel Lane, at Broughton Street; thence along York Place, North and South St David Streets, Princes Street, west side of the Earthen Mound, Mound Place, and Bank Street.

III.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the east end of York Place at the intersection of Broughton Street, along York Place and Queen Street to Hanover Street, down Dundas Street and Pitt Street, along East Fettes Row, Royal Crescent, Kirk Lane at Canonmills, the high road from Canonmills to Broughton, Broughton Street, to the place where it is intersected by the line of the Royalty; thence along the line of the Royalty intersecting Forth Street and Hart Street, East Broughton Place, along Union Street, across Leith Walk, down Elm Row, along the northern boundary of the Royalty intersecting Windsor Street, and from the eastern extremity of that boundary round the Calton Hill, including the west end of Regent Terrace, Blenheim Place, Leopold

Place, Hillside Crescent, and part of Windsor Street; and thence along Greenside and Broughton Streets to the east end of York Place.

IV.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the intersection of Fettes Row and Pitt Street, along Pitt Street, Dundas Street, Queen Street, North St David Street, west side of St Andrew Square, South St David Street, Princes Street, Frederick Street, Howe Street, St Vincent Street, West Fettes Row, and their irregular boundary line of the Royalty running from Fettes Row to St Vincent Street; also the ground formerly called the Distillery Park, upon which Henderson Row, the Edinburgh Academy, and the Deaf and Dumb Institution, are now built.

V.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the intersection of South Frederick Street and Princes Street, along Frederick Street, Howe Street, to near the foot of St Vincent Street; thence along the line of the Royalty intersecting Circus Lane, India Street, India Place, Mackenzie Place, Moray Place, St Colme Street, Glenfinlas Street, and Charlotte Place, to Queensferry Street; and then along that street and Princes Street to the point first mentioned. This Ward includes also the Princes Street Gardens, St John's Chapel, and Cunningham's Feu at Coates, upon which Walker Street, Manor Place, and parts of Coates Crescent, William Street, and Melville Street, are built.

ARRANGEMENT OF WARDS for the Election of MANAGERS of the POOR for the Combined Parishes of St Cuthbert's and Canongate.

WARD I. comprehends the portion of St Cuthbert's parish within the Broughton Municipal Ward, including the detached portions of St Cuthbert's parish at Old Broughton, West Register Street, East Register Street, Leith Street, Catherine Street, Little King Street, St James' Square, and St James' Street, York Place and Albany Street, in St Andrew's and Calton Wards; together with those portions of St Cuthbert's parish lying within the burgh of Leith.

WARD II. comprehends the whole of that part of St Cuthbert's parish within St George's Municipal Ward; along with the portion of said parish within St Bernard's Municipal Ward; and the portion of said parish within St Stephen's Ward.

WARD III. comprehends Newington

Ward to the west of a line beginning at the municipal boundary of George Square Ward at the east end of Bruntsfield Links, running southward along the east boundary of Warrender Park, along the middle of Kilgraston Road to Grange Loan, then eastward to the avenue to Blackford House, thence southward in a straight line to Jordan Burn, and also including the whole of the part of St Cuthbert's parish within St Cuthbert's Municipal Ward; and a detached portion of the Canongate parish on Castlehill within St Giles' Municipal Ward.

WARD IV. comprehends the whole of the landward part of St Cuthbert's from the Powburn, at the foot of the Causewayside, lying to the south and west of the municipal boundaries of Edinburgh and Leith, to a part where

the municipal boundary of Leith touches the boundary of the parish of Cramond.

WARD V. comprehends the whole of the portion of St Cuthbert's and Canongate parishes within George Square Ward, as well as the detached portions of St Cuthbert's and Canongate, in Lothian Street, Brighton Street, and Bristo Place, lying within St Giles' Ward; and that portion of Newington Municipal Ward lying to the east of Bruntsfield Links, Warrender Park, and Kilgraston Road, then eastward along Grange Loan to the avenue to Blackford House, thence along said avenue in a straight line to Powburn, terminating at Powburn; together with the detached por-

tion of St Cuthbert's at Echobank to the east of the municipal boundary

WARD VI. comprehends the whole of Canongate parish and the St Cuthbert's parish within the Canongate Municipal Ward; including that portion of the Canongate parish lying between Leith Wynd and New Street within St Giles' Ward; as also a detached portion of St Cuthbert's parish on the south side of Waterloo Place to the west of High Calton, and also the portions of same parish between the Cowgate and Drummond Street, also in St Giles' Ward; also including the whole of St Leonard's Ward, and the portions of St Cuthbert's and Canongate parishes lying to the east of the municipal boundary.

SECTION III.

EDUCATIONAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

HIGH SCHOOL OF EDINBURGH, REGENT ROAD.

The date of the foundation of the High School is unknown, but it appears to have existed as early as the beginning of the twelfth century. From that time to the Reformation, "the Grammar School of Edinburgh," as it was then called, was under the control of the Canons of Holyrood. In 1598 it was remodelled on a more comprehensive plan, and from the patronage vouchsafed to it by James VI., it received the name of *Schola Regia Edimburgensis*. The course of study has since, from time to time, been extended and improved, so as to meet the advancing demands of the age. Although at first a merely classical seminary, it now furnishes systematic instruction in all the departments of a *Commercial* as well as of a *Liberal* Education. The English Language and Literature, including Reading, Orthography, Recitation, Grammar, and Composition, together with the History of Great Britain, form prominent parts of the system; while the entire curriculum of study—which occupies six years—embraces the Latin, Greek, French, and German languages, History, Geography, Physiology, Chemistry, Natural Philosophy, Zoology, and Botany, with Writing, Arithmetic, Algebra and Geometry, Drawing, Fencing, Gymnastics and Military Drill. There is a Library containing nearly 7000 volumes selected by the Rector and Masters, to which all the pupils have access.

The High School originally stood in the Old Town, near the site of the present Infirmary. It was rebuilt on nearly the same spot in 1777. As this situation had become unsuitable, from the great extension of the city northwards, and as the accommodation had proved inadequate to the rapidly increasing number of pupils, the present splendid structure was founded in 1825, on the south slope of the Calton Hill, which was deemed more convenient for the inhabitants of the city. The edifice, which cost £30,000, and was designed by the late Thomas Hamilton, architect, was completed in 1829.

The main building, 270 feet in length, has a magnificent hexastyle Doric portico in the centre, which is united to the wings by two corridors, the entablatures of which are supported by twelve columns, also of the Doric order. There is ample accommodation for conducting the various branches of study. The playground, a portion of which is roofed over, is spacious, extending to nearly two acres, and commands a picturesque view of the ancient city and surrounding country.

The High School is now under the management of the Edinburgh School Board.

EDINBURGH ACADEMY, HENDERSON ROW.

The Edinburgh Academy, which was established in 1824, and incorporated by royal charter from George IV., is under the superintendence of a Board of fifteen Directors, three of whom are elected annually from the body of subscribers. The education is conducted by a Rector, who exercises constant supervision over all the classes, besides instructing those under his immediate care; four Classical Masters; a Master of French; a Master of German; two Mathematical Masters; a Master of English and Elocution; and Masters of Writing, Fencing, Drawing, Fortification, and Military and Civil Engineering. Each class is taught in the classical department by the same master exclusively for the first four years. At the commencement of the fifth it comes under the tuition of the Rector, assisted by the same master, and continues under them during the sixth and seventh years. In the three junior classes all the boys in each class are instructed together in the various branches. But for the fourth and subsequent years of the course, each class is separated into two Divisions: one of these—"The Classical School"—is adapted for boys destined for the learned professions, or who desire a thorough classical training; the other—"The Modern School"—is intended for boys who are to enter upon the civil or military service, or upon mercantile pursuits. The other branches (with the exception of German, which is introduced in the fifth year) are begun with the youngest class, and are continued without interruption during the whole course. The complete course extends to seven years, and combines a thorough classical education with systematic instruction in English, French, and German, Writing, Ancient and Modern History, Geography, and the various branches of Mathematics. There are certain additional classes which are recognised as voluntary. The Academy is situated to the N.E. of the Royal Circus. It is a handsome building, after a design by Mr Burn, and cost upwards of £16,000.

FETTES COLLEGE, COMELY BANK.

Sir William Fettes, Bart., of Comely Bank, who was born in 1750, and died in 1836, left the residue of his estate for an endowment for the education, maintenance, and outfit of young persons whose parents have died without leaving sufficient funds for that purpose, or who, from innocent misfortune during their own lives, are unable to give suitable education to their children. For the purposes of the endowment, a building called "The Fettes College" has been erected on the grounds of Comely Bank, part of the trust property, according to plans by David Bryce, Esq., R.S.A., architect, and was opened in October 1870. The number of boys to be admitted on the foundation, and maintained and educated in the College at the expense of the endowment, is not at any one time to exceed fifty; but such a number of boys as the Trustees may from time to time determine, will be received as day scholars, or boarders, from whom such fees will be exacted as shall be fixed by the Trustees. For the accommodation of non-foundations, and in connexion with the College, there are three Boarding-Houses, one capable of receiving fifty-two boys, and the

other two each capable of receiving thirty boys. The largest is under the superintendence of Mr Cotterill, and the other two under that of Mr Blaikie and Mr Heard. The system adopted is that of the English Public Schools, and the education given is in the full sense of the word liberal, and includes English, Latin, Greek, Modern Languages, Mathematics, scientific and artistic instruction.

GEORGE HERIOT'S HOSPITAL, LAURISTON.

George Heriot was born at Edinburgh about the year 1563. He followed his father's trade of a goldsmith, and in 1597 was appointed goldsmith to Anne of Denmark, the queen of James VI. Shortly afterwards he was nominated jeweller and goldsmith to the king, and when the court was removed to London, in 1603, Heriot followed in its train. He died there February 12, 1634, having, by a will dated in the previous year, bequeathed the residue of his property, amounting to £23,625, to the erection of an hospital, "for the maintenance, reliefe, bringing upp, and education of poore fatherlesse boyes, freemen's sonnes of the towne of Edinburgh."

The foundation stone was laid July 1, 1628, but owing to the civil war and other causes, the building was not opened till April 11, 1659. The expense of the erection exceeded £30,000 sterling.

The management is vested in the Lord Provost, Magistrates, and Town Council of the city, and in the Established Clergy of Edinburgh,—in all fifty-four in number.

One hundred and eighty boys are maintained in the Hospital—one hundred and twenty resident, and sixty non-resident. The age of admission is between seven and ten; in exceptional cases, non-residents may be admitted between ten and twelve. The boys leave at fourteen, unless they pass examination as "hopeful scholars." They are taught English, French, Latin, and Greek, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, geography, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, and dancing. Those who manifest talents and a desire for the learned professions are sent to the University of Edinburgh, with an allowance for four sessions of £30 a year; and there are several apprentices who receive bursary allowances to forward them in their calling. Ten out-door bursaries of £20 a year are likewise bestowed on deserving students in the College. On leaving the Hospital, the boys are provided with clothes and suitable books; such of them as become apprentices for five years or upwards receive £50, divided into equal annual payments during the term of their apprenticeship, besides a sum of £5 at the end of their apprenticeship as a reward for good behaviour. Those who are apprenticed for a shorter term than five years, receive a correspondingly less allowance than £50. One of the teachers resides in the House, all the others are non-resident. The House Governor also resides in the House.

The revenue of the Hospital in 1874 amounted to £20,266, 18s.

THE HERIOT FOUNDATION SCHOOLS.—*Inspector*, F. W. Bedford, LL.D., D.C.L.

By Act of Parliament (6th and 7th William IV. cap. 25), the Governors of the Hospital were empowered to erect, from the surplus revenues, elementary schools within the city, for educating, free of all expense, 1st, The children, in poor circumstances, of deceased burghesses and freemen; 2d, The children of burghesses and freemen who are unable to provide for their support; and, 3d, The children of poor citizens and inhabitants of Edinburgh residing within the boundaries of the city. They were also empowered "to allow to any of the boys, in the course of their education at such schools, being sons of burghesses and freemen, such uniform fixed sum of money in lieu and place of maintenance, and such uniform fixed sum for apprentice fee, after their education at the said schools is completed, as shall be determined." There are now seventeen Heriot Schools, namely, eleven juvenile and six infant schools, attended by upwards of 4400 boys and girls. There are also eight schools open for gratuitous evening instruction in Reading, Writing, Arithmetic, Grammar, French, and Drawing. These classes are attended by about 1300 young men and young women.

THE EDINBURGH MERCHANT COMPANY SCHOOLS.

1. THE EDINBURGH EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTION
(FOR YOUNG LADIES), WEST END OF QUEEN STREET.

This Institution was founded in 1695 by the Company of Merchants, and Mary Erskine, widow of James Hair, druggist in Edinburgh, as an hospital for girls, and was known as the Merchant Maiden Hospital. The Governors were incorporated by an Act of Parliament in 1707. The original edifice was situated in Bristo Street; but having become insufficient for its object, the foundation-stone of a new building was laid in Lauriston in 1816; and the erection, which was designed by Mr Burn, was completed in 1818, at the cost of £12,250. Up to 1870 this building continued to be used as an hospital for the board and education of the foundationers, but in that year it was converted, under a provisional order, into a day-school, and opened as such in September 1870. It having been sold to the governors of George Watson's Hospital, the governors of this institution purchased extensive buildings in Queen Street for the purposes of the institution, and they were opened in October 1871. The institution provides a high-class education, the course of study embracing English, French, German, Latin, lectures on literature and science, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, pianoforte, drill, calisthenics, dancing, needlework, and cookery. The governors had the right of presenting thirty-four foundationers to the hospital, but the provisional order directs that this number be reduced to twenty, and that at least one fourth of these—as well as of presentations belonging to private parties—shall be elected by competitive examination from girls attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Girls attending the institution may obtain, by competition, the following benefits, viz., 1. A presentation to the foundation, tenable for six years; 2. A bursary on leaving the institution of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100; 3. And thereafter a scholarship of £100 a year, tenable for three years, equal to £300. Besides the above benefits, a large number of school bursaries is awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are maintained in a boarding-house belonging to the governors, with the exception of those who are boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted to the foundation, the girls must be of the age of nine and under that of sixteen years. A number of the presentations were formerly limited to the daughters or grand-daughters of such as were of the order or calling of merchant burgesses of Edinburgh, or ministers thereof, or suburbs of the same, or had been benefactors to the hospital or governors of the same; but the provisional order removes this limitation, and declares that the patrons shall be at full liberty to present such girls as they consider most suitable. On leaving, the girls receive £9, 6s. 8d. each.

2. GEORGE WATSON'S COLLEGE-SCHOOLS.

(1.) FOR BOYS.—LAURISTON.

George Watson, born at Edinburgh about 1650, served an apprenticeship to a merchant in the city, and, after a short residence in Holland, entered into the service of Sir James Dick, a wealthy trader in Edinburgh. This employment he gave up in 1695, on being appointed accountant to the Bank of Scotland. He

died in April 1723, and by his will bequeathed £12,000 to endow an hospital for the maintenance and instruction of the male children and grandchildren of decayed merchants in Edinburgh; and by the statutes of his trustees a preference was given to the sons and grandsons of members of the Edinburgh Merchant Company. An hospital for the board and education of the foundationers was founded in the year 1738, and opened in June 1741, and it continued to be used for this purpose until 1870, when the governors of the four hospitals connected with the Merchant Company, taking advantage of the powers given by the Endowed Institutions (Scotland) Act, applied for and obtained provisional orders empowering them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and they were opened as such in September 1870. This building was, however, sold to the corporation of the Royal Infirmary in 1871, and the building formerly called the Merchant Maiden Hospital was acquired for and is now being occupied as George Watson's College-Schools for Boys. Another house adjoining has since been purchased for the extension of the Schools. The design of the schools is to provide boys with a liberal education, qualifying them for commercial or professional life, the civil service, and for the universities, etc. The course of study includes English, Latin, Greek, French, German, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, botany, natural history, natural philosophy, chemistry, drill, gymnastics, and fencing. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to sixty, and that at least one-fourth of these shall be elected by competitive examination from boys attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Boys attending the College-Schools may obtain, by competition, the following benefits—viz., 1. A presentation to one of the foundations of this or Daniel Stewart's Institution, tenable for six years; 2. A bursary on leaving the schools of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100; 3. And thereafter a scholarship of £100 a year, tenable for three years, equal to £300. Besides the above benefits, a large number of school bursaries is awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are maintained in a boarding-house belonging to the governors, with the exception of those who have been boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted as foundationers, they must be of the age of nine and under that of fourteen years. On leaving, each foundationer is allowed £7 for clothes; he receives for five years £10 annually; and on attaining the age of twenty-five, a further sum of £50 to enable him to commence business in Edinburgh.

(2.) FOR YOUNG LADIES.—GEORGE SQUARE.

The governors have also, in virtue of power given them in the provisional order, established a school for girls called George Watson's College-Schools (for Young Ladies). The course of study is the same as that of the Edinburgh Educational Institution for Young Ladies (see before), and girls attending the school may obtain by competition the same benefits as those attending that institution.

3. DANIEL STEWART'S INSTITUTION (FOR BOYS), DEAN.

Daniel Stewart of the Exchequer, who died in 1814, left the residue of his property, amounting (after the erection and endowment of a free school in his native parish of Logierait) to upwards of £13,000, to accumulate for the purpose of building and endowing an hospital for the maintenance and educa-

tion of boys, the children of honest and industrious parents, whose circumstances in life do not enable them suitably to support and educate their children at other schools. Taking advantage of the powers given by a provisional order obtained in 1870, the hospital was opened as a day-school in September of that year. This institution provides boys with a superior education, and the course of study is similar to that in George Watson's College-Schools (for Boys). Instruction is also given in Technical Education. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to forty, and that at least one half of them shall be elected from the day scholars of this institution, George Watson's College-Schools, and James Gillespie's Schools. Boys attending the institution have the same benefits open for their competition as those attending George Watson's College-Schools for Boys.

The boys, on admission to the foundation, must be of the age of nine and under that of fifteen years.

4. JAMES GILLESPIE'S SCHOOLS (FOR BOYS AND GIRLS),

BRUNTSFIELD LINKS.

This Institution was founded by James Gillespie of Spylaw, merchant and tobaccoist in Edinburgh, who, by his will dated in the year 1796, destined the greater part of his property to the endowment of a charitable school, and of a hospital for the aliment and maintenance of old men and women. The edifice, which was designed by Mr Burn, was founded in 1801, and opened in 1802. The free school was founded in 1801, and opened in 1803. Up to 1870 the hospital continued to be occupied by old persons, of whom about 40 were maintained in it. In that year the governors obtained a provisional order empowering them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and it was opened as such in September 1870. These schools are established as primary schools, and the course of instruction includes English in all the branches, writing, arithmetic, vocal music, and drill. The boys are also taught mechanical drawing, and the girls sewing and knitting. Boys and girls attending these schools may obtain by competition the same benefits as pupils of the other Merchant Company Schools.

Those entitled to the benefits of the hospital as aged foundationers are persons, first, of the name of Gillespie, whatever part of Scotland they may come from; and, second, persons belonging to Edinburgh and its suburbs above the age of 55; failing these, persons from Leith, Newhaven, and other parts of Mid-Lothian; whom failing, persons from any part of Scotland of the age of 55. By the provisional order, the governors have power, instead of maintaining the foundationers in the then present or any other building, to allow them a pension of not less than £10 and not exceeding £25 a year.

THE MAIDEN HOSPITAL, MEADOWS,

FOUNDED BY THE CRAFTSMEN OF EDINBURGH AND MARY ERSKINE.

This Institution was founded in 1704, by the Freemen of the Incorporated Trades, aided by Mary Erskine, widow of Jas. Hair, druggist. The governors were incorporated by statute in 1707.

The management is in the Deacons of the thirteen Incorporations, two Trades-Councillors, two persons of the name of Erskine, the Preses of the Society of Barbers, and nine persons elected by the other Governors,—in all, twenty-seven. Forty-eight girls are maintained in the Institution. Those eligible for admission are, “the children or grandchildren of craftsmen, which failing, any others presented by the incorporations,”—the girls being children belonging to one of the Incorporations of the city of Edinburgh or Society of Barbers. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of seven, and under that of eleven years: they are not retained above the age of seventeen. They are instructed in the English language and grammar, in French and music, in writing, arithmetic, geography, history, sewing, and laundrywork. On leaving, each girl receives £10 and a Bible.

THE ORPHAN HOSPITAL, DEAN.

This Institution was projected in 1727 by Andrew Gairdner, merchant in Edinburgh; and in 1733 a house was hired, and thirty children received into it. In 1735 an edifice was erected near the Trinity College Church; but by the increase of the city this situation being rendered unhealthy, the present building was founded in June 1831, and finished in October 1833, from the designs of the late Mr Thomas Hamilton. The revenue is derived from voluntary contributions and legacies, in addition to the interest on accumulated donations since its foundation.

About 160 boys and girls, including boarders, are maintained in the Institution, the benefits of which are not confined to any district of Scotland. When admitted they must be of the age of seven, and not above ten years: they are taught reading, writing, arithmetic, and geography. Boarders from any part of the United Kingdom are now received into the Hospital at £16 per annum for boys, and £14 for girls, which include all expenses of whatever kind.

JOHN WATSON'S INSTITUTION, DEAN.

In the year 1759, John Watson, writer to the signet, bequeathed the residue of his estate to certain Trustees, by them to be applied "to such pious and charitable uses within the City of Edinburgh as they shall think proper." In the year 1822 an Act of Parliament was obtained, empowering the Trustees to establish and endow "an hospital for the maintenance and education therein of destitute children, and bringing them up to be useful members of society; and also for assisting in their outset in life such of them as may be thought to deserve and require such aid."

The edifice, which was designed by Mr William Burn, was founded in 1825, and completed in 1828. About 100 children are maintained in it, who must be fatherless, and of the better classes, such as clergymen, officers in the army and navy, legal or medical practitioners, and such like; when admitted, they must have completed the seventh year of their age, and be under the age of nine. They are not retained after the age of fourteen. They are instructed in English, Latin, French, mathematics, drawing, vocal and instrumental music, drawing, drill, etc.

The establishment is under the management of fifteen directors,—the Keeper and Deputy-keeper of the Signet, the Treasurer of the Institution, and twelve Commissioners of the Writers to the Signet. The fund, which in 1781 amounted to less than £5000, has been largely increased by the care and attention of the Trustees.

CAUVIN'S HOSPITAL, DUNDEE.

This Institution was founded by Louis Cauvin, Teacher of French in Edinburgh, and afterwards farmer at Dundee, who died in 1825, bequeathing his property for the erection and endowment of "an Hospital for the relief, maintenance and education of the sons of respectable but poor teachers; the sons of poor but honest farmers; *whom failing*, the sons of respectable master-printers or booksellers, and the sons of respectable servants in the agricultural line." This settlement was explained and modified, and the Governors incorporated, by a parliamentary statute in 1827.

The management is in the survivor of certain individuals nominated by the founder, and others assumed by them, and in the following *ex officio* trustees, viz., the Lord Provost of the City, the Principal of the University, the Rector of the High School, the Ministers of Dundee, Liberton, and Newton, the Proprietor of the estate of Niddrie, and the Factor of the Duke of Abercorn.

The Institution, which is situated at Dundee, was opened in 1833. Twenty-six boys are maintained in it. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of six, and not more than eight years; and are retained for six years. They are taught the ordinary branches of education, and Latin, Greek, French, German, and Mathematics.

DONALDSON'S HOSPITAL, GLASGOW ROAD.

This Hospital was founded by James Donaldson of Broughton Hall, printer, who died at Edinburgh in October 1830, bequeathing the greater part of his property, amounting to about £200,000, to trustees, for the endowment and erection of an hospital for the maintenance of poor boys and girls, after the plan of the Orphan Hospital in Edinburgh and John Watson's Institution.

The building can accommodate 150 boys and 150 girls: it contains at present 17 children (109 boys and 98 girls), of whom 106 (61 boys and 45 girls) are deaf and dumb. Those eligible for admission are declared to be, "1st, Poor children of the name of Donaldson or Marshall, if appearing to the governors to be deserving; 2d, Such poor children as shall appear to be in the most destitute circumstances and the most deserving of admission." None are received whose parents are able to maintain them. The children are clothed and maintained in the Hospital, and taught such useful branches of a plain English education as will fit the boys for trades and the girls for domestic service. The age of admission is from seven till nine, and that of leaving the Hospital fourteen years.

The building, which occupies a commanding position at the west end of the city, is a large and beautiful quadrangular structure, in the Elizabethan style, from a design by the late W. H. Playfair.

One hundred and twenty others have an annual allowance of £10 each. The benefits of the endowment are destined to "burgesses, their wives or children, not married, nor under the age of fifty years." Ten others have pensions of £10 each, out of the funds mortified to the Hospital by the late William Lennie, Esq.

CAB FARES.

By Distance.—A party not exceeding two grown-up persons, and without any luggage other than a carpet-bag or the like, entering a carriage at a stance, or when driving along disengaged, to be driven half a mile for 6d., and if they return, another 6d. The driver shall draw up to either side of the pavement when called, and if detained more than five minutes before starting, he shall be entitled to 6d. for waiting. *N.B.*—This rule shall not apply to fares from railway stations.

The charges in the table of fares, which every driver must exhibit when required, to include going from the nearest stance to the hirer's residence and waiting ten minutes. But if the carriage be detained before starting more than ten minutes, a charge of waiting at the rate of 6d. for each quarter of an hour, or part thereof, after the expiry of the ten minutes, shall be allowed; and if the place where the hirer is to be lifted be beyond a mile from the stance whence the carriage is taken, there shall be a charge of 6d. extra.

When the fare to any place cannot be ascertained, it shall be 1s. for a distance from the stance not exceeding a mile and a quarter, and 6d. for every additional half mile, or part thereof. Half fare returning.

When parties return, and the fare going is 1s., the carriage shall wait ten minutes without any charge; when 1s. 6d., fifteen minutes; when 2s. and upwards, twenty minutes. If detained

longer, a charge of 6d. for every additional twenty minutes, or part thereof.

When a carriage is called but not used, 6d. if the place be under half a mile from the stance; if more, 1s.

By Time.—For the first hour or part thereof, 2s.; for every additional quarter of an hour or part thereof, 6d.

For an airing into the country within seven miles from the Cross, and returning either by the same or a different road, 3s. for the first hour, or part thereof, and 1s. for every additional twenty minutes, or part thereof.

Whether by Distance or Time, the hirer pays tolls.

If more than four grown persons, 6d. extra for each additional one, or for each two children above six and under twelve years of age. No additional charge for one child above six to twelve (years) or children under six years of age.

Luggage under 100 lbs. free, above 100 lbs. 6d.

From eleven at night till seven morning, double fare, except when the hiring begins before eleven and ends at or before fifteen minutes past eleven.

On Sunday the charge for such cabs as shall have been previously ordered or engaged, or hired elsewhere than on the public streets' stances, shall be fare and half.

The driver should deliver to the party hiring a reference ticket when demanded, on pain of forfeiting his hire.

FIRST WARD.

CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

JOHN WATT'S HOSPITAL.

The late Mr John Watt, merchant in Leith, by his trust-disposition and settlement, dated in 1827, bequeathed the residue of his means and estate to trustees, with directions to expend such part thereof as they might consider proper in the erection of an hospital in Leith, to be called "John Watt's Hospital," for the reception and maintenance of men and women in destitute circumstances of 55 years of age and upwards, in the following order of priority: 1st, Persons of the name of Watt; 2d, Natives of the parish of South Leith of whatever name; 3d, Persons of whatever name who have constantly resided in the parish of South Leith, at least ten years preceding their admission; and 4th, Natives of, or persons who have constantly resided in, the city of Edinburgh or county of Mid-Lothian; provided such persons are not pensioners or in receipt of an allowance from any charitable institution except the Parochial Board of South Leith. The trustees acquired what was formerly the Golf House and Ground at the south-west corner of Leith Links, and built an Hospital, which was opened in the beginning of 1862.

MEMORANDUM.

Penalties for acting as a Solicitor, etc., or as a Conveyancer, without having an Attorney Certificate.

By 33 and 34 Vict. cap. 97, § 59, it is enacted that every person who, in any part of the United Kingdom, directly or indirectly, acts or practises in any Court as a solicitor, etc., or as a notary public, without having in force at the time a duly stamped certificate, or who, on applying for such certificate, does not truly specify the facts and circumstances upon which the amount of duty chargeable upon his certificate depends, shall forfeit the sum of £50, and shall be incapable of maintaining any action or suit for the recovery of any fee, reward, or disbursement on account of any act done or taken by him in any such capacity.

By section 60 of the same Act, it is enacted that every person who (not being a serjeant-at-law, barrister, or a duly certificated solicitor, etc.), either directly or indirectly, for or in expectation of any fee, gain, or reward, draws or prepares any instrument relating to real or personal estate, or any proceedings in law or equity, shall forfeit the sum of £50. The term "instrument" in this section does not include wills or other testamentary instruments, agreements under hand only, letters or powers of attorney, and transfers of stock containing no trust or limitation thereof.

No Christmas Boxes or other gratuities are allowed to be taken by the Officers of the Bank. The Bank takes the agency of Joint-Stock Banks, Private Bankers, and other parties residing at a distance. 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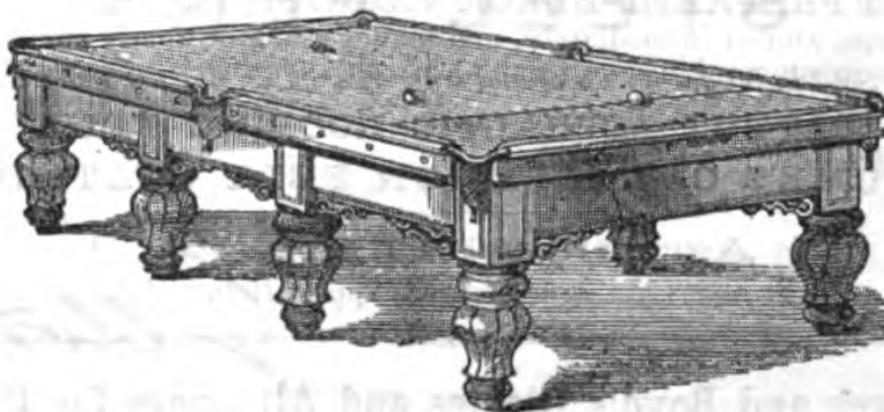
