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

**ECLIPSES OF THE SUN AND MOON IN 1878.**

*February 2.*—An annular eclipse of the Sun, invisible at Edinburgh.  
*February 17.*—A partial eclipse of the Moon, invisible at Edinburgh.  
*July 29 and 30.*—A total eclipse of the Sun, invisible at Edinburgh.  
*August 12 and 13.*—A partial eclipse of the Moon, visible at Edinburgh. First contact with shadow, 12th, 10h. 42·9m. A. Middle of the eclipse, 13th, 0h. 8·5m. M. Last contact with shadow, 13th, 1h. 34·1m. M. Magnitude of the eclipse (Moon's diameter = 1), 0·590.

*May 6.*—A transit of Mercury across the Sun's disc, partly visible at Edinburgh. External contact at ingress, 3h 12m. 41s. A. Least distance of centres, 4' 47·0", 7h. 0m. 20 s. A. External contact at egress, 10h. 47m. 59s. A.

## FARMER'S AND GRAZIER'S KALENDAR.

*January.*—In fresh weather, where the soil is moderately dry, the plough may be kept in motion.—To make the feeding of cattle remunerative, it is necessary that the most unremitting attention be paid to the animals. Whether they are fed in courts, byres, or boxes, they ought to be kept warm and comfortably littered, whilst their food, of whatever description, ought to be regularly supplied at stated hours. Crushed grains, and artificial food given in addition to stored roots, will be found a profitable mode of feeding, and chopped straw may also be given as a healthy and economical addition to their diet. Cows require succulent roots or food prepared by steam or hot water, to yield milk copiously. Shelter new-dropt lambs, and give their dams roots, hay, and bruised grain, or oil-cake.

*February.*—Frost being a powerful agent in obtaining mould for covering seeds, plough grass and other lands intended to produce a crop. Whether turnip be folded or carried from the field, plough the land as the crop is removed, and wheat-sowing may follow. Beans and oats may be sown; but it is only rich dry soils which can be seeded so early with prospect of success. In mild weather thorn hedges may be dressed, and new ones planted. Lay up stores of seed-corn, put implements into working trim, and execute many little jobs, that no interruption may be experienced in sowing-time.—Animals about to bring forth merit particular attention,—the supply of milk and strength of offspring being affected by the dam's treatment previous to birth. Keep calves warm, clean, and dry; give hay and sliced roots in addition to liquid food to such as are rearing.

*March.*—Finish wheat-sowing about the middle of the month. Sow beans, oats, and barley as soon as the weather and soil admit,—reserving cold wet lands till the season advances. The seeds of clover and ryegrass should now be sown amongst autumnal-sown wheats, and the surface lightly harrowed or rolled to ensure the seed germinating. Particular fields intended for barley or potatoes may receive a second ploughing. Prepare composts and manures for turnip. Should the weather be favourable, potatoes may be planted after the middle of this month. This is the best time for planting hedges.—In altering the diet of fattening animals, always let the change be to one more nutritious. Fattening cattle may be allowed bruised grain or oil cake. If there be a scarcity of turnip for cattle intended for grass, give a small allowance of bruised grain, cake, or hay.

*April.*—No favourable opportunity should now be lost to sow grain crops. Store the residue of the turnip crop, to preserve the bulbs and prevent the exhaustion of soil. Drain lands intended for green crop where previously neglected. Continue the planting of potatoes in favourable situations. Finish planting thorn hedges.—On store farms, this is the chief lambing season, and the shepherd's utmost attention is necessary. Cease folding turnip, and either feed sheep on stored roots, or restrict them to grass. Should the pastures be late, give sheep grains or prepared cakes. Fattening lamb-hogs require good pasture, being unable to eat turnip freely, from shedding teeth. When there is a scarcity of keep at the homestead, lean cattle may be allowed to roam over permanent pastures. Seedling grasses will seldom admit of being depastured with cattle.

*May.*—Conclude the sowing of grain crops; and, with the advance of the season, use early varieties. From necessity, barley and pease may be sown up to the end of the month; but full crops cannot be counted upon from such late sowing. Prepare soils for turnip, and use every means to produce a fine tilth. Swedish turnips may be sown from the middle of this month to the end of it. Finish potato-planting. Give a second ploughing to summer fallow, and never allow vegetation to make progress at this season on its surface.—Fattening cattle may be continued on well-kept Swedish turnip and potatoes. When there is a sufficiency of grass, and the soil becomes dry, stock pastures with all descriptions of cattle. In cold and wet evenings, shelter milch cows and fat cattle in courts. Wean early calves, and turn late ones out to pasture.

*June.*—This is the month for sowing turnips. Where Swedes could not be sown during May, they may still be planted during the first days of June. All other varieties may be sown in course of the month. Drilled crops require attention. Weeds are most easily destroyed when young; and, as a general rule, use hand and horse hoes as soon as the crops admit of the operations. Earth up early-planted potatoes. Haymaking commences in early situations. Mow grasses



## GARDENER'S KALENDAR.

*January.*—When the frost is not severe, trench, manure, and turn up in ridges all vacant ground, and prepare hotbeds. In open and dry weather, sow in mild exposures, for a succession, a few early-frame pease, common beans, short-topped radishes, lettuces, carrots, onions, spinach, and curled parsley, protecting them from the frost by mats or straw; and, in hotbeds, sow cauliflowers, melons, cucumbers, small salading, early cabbages, and kidney-beans. Plant, prune, and train standard and wall fruit-trees, gooseberry, raspberry, and currant bushes. Edge beds, form new flower-gardens, and shelter from frost tender evergreens, tulips, ranunculuses, &c. Pot choice dahlias, placing them in a stove or hotbed. Air and keep dry carnations and stage auriculas. Plant snowdrops, crocuses, irises, &c.

*February.*—Make ready all the ground intended for early crops; and, when the weather is favourable, continue to sow every fortnight pease, beans, onions, spinach, savoys, lettuces, celery, cauliflowers, carrots, parsnips, and radishes, as directed in the kalendar for the preceding month. Start and cut early kidney-potatoes for seed, and put them into the stove or hotbed in order to planting out. Clean shrubberies, roll walks and lawns, and plant out evergreens and shrubs of all kinds, particularly roses. Put cuttings into rich light soil in well-sheltered borders, and plant stocks of the common wild rose for standards on which to bud the Chinese and other fine varieties. Protect all tender plants from the effects of frost, and air greenhouse and stage auriculas and polyanthus frames. Top-dress all fine auriculas and polyanthuses in pots or boxes. Strike dahlias from roots in hotbeds, and sow balsams, cockscombs, tricolors, amaranths, sensitive and ice plants, as well as other tender annuals. Plant carnation-layers, ranunculuses, anemones, and bulbous roots, and divide the roots of herbaceous plants.

*March.*—The principal crops of vegetables should be put into the ground this month. Sow asparagus, celery, cauliflower, Brussels sprouts, beets, brocoli, spinach, onions, Dutch turnips, carrots, and beans, savoys, parsnips, and turnip-rooted radishes. Plant red cabbage, sea-kale, kidney-beans, and cauliflowers from frames; and sow cucumbers and melons in hotbeds. Finish pruning, dress borders and strawberry beds. Strike verbenas, calceolarias, heliotropes, senecias, petunias, scarlet geraniums, fuchsias, salvias, Chinese chrysanthemums, &c. Plant gladioluses. This is the best time to graft fruit-trees, and the China, perpetual, moss, and noisette roses, on the common brier or blush China rose, and to propagate them by layers. Pot dahlias that have pushed, and also cuttings from the offsets, placing them in a moderate heat. Protect tender plants and blossoms, and sow polyanthus, auricula, and almost every kind of perennial, biennial, and annual seeds.

*April.*—Sow whatever was omitted last month, and plant out such of the pot-herbs as are ready for that purpose. Continue to sow brocoli, asparagus, nasturtiums, sea-kale, Dutch turnips, German greens, and savoys, and plant out rhubarb, artichokes, sea-kale, German greens, and small salading. Earth up pease, tie up lettuces, and in very dry weather water seedling beds. Finish the grafting of fruit-trees, and train and clean walks and edgings. Sow annuals, biennials, and perennials. Plant evergreens, and propagate by cuttings jasmine, lavender, sage, rosemary, rue, &c., and all the woody kitchen shrubs. Sow dahlias, carnations, pinks, hollyhocks, Cape, Brompton, and German stocks, China asters, and all kinds of hardy annuals. Pot the flowers struck last month. Destroy the green-fly on roses, and preserve the bloom of stage auriculas from sun and rain. Top-dress all flowers in pots by removing withered leaves, and put in fresh earth. Hoe and rake gravel-walks, cut box-edgings, and mow grass plots.

*May.*—Sow capsicums, cauliflowers, carrots, lettuces, spinach, pease, cucumbers, red beet for pickling, and a full crop of kidney and French beans. Transplant cabbages, winter-greens, lettuces, cauliflowers, and celery. Hoe and stake pease, water newly-planted crops, and propagate aromatic plants by slips or cuttings. Plant out the flowers potted last month, if there be no appearance of frost; and protect from wind and rain choice tulips, ranunculuses, and anemones. Propagate herbaceous plants by dividing the roots: wallflowers, sweetwilliams, lychnis, and rockets, by slips; and China roses, mimuluses, &c., by cuttings. Put out into the open border pelargoniums, with other greenhouse plants; also Neapolitan violets, and such other hardy annuals as were sown last month. Sow biennials and perennials, if formerly omitted.

*June.*—Continue sowing the vegetables directed last month, and also turnips for autumn use. Plant out brocoli, cabbages, savoys, celery, cauliflowers in shady borders, leeks, lettuces, cucumbers for pickling, and kidney-beans. Watering is requisite in dry weather both evening and morning; and also the hoeing of potatoes, cabbages, and pease. Thin out onions, carrots, parsnips, and early turnips. Gather and preserve kitchen-herbs. Shade and air melon-plants, and strike by cuttings double-wallflowers, rockets, scarlet lychnis, and stocks. Transplant annuals, biennials, and perennials, and seedling pinks into a bed. Lift all hyacinths, tulips, and other bulbs that have ceased flowering. Cut off the foliage an inch above the stem, and before putting by lay them in sand a fortnight. Re-pot auriculas, polyanthuses, &c. Mow and roll grass walks and plots once a fortnight during this and the other summer months.

empted from specie payments. The notes then became depreciated; but under arrangements consequent on "Peel's Act," 1819, the exchange of notes for gold was resumed in 1821.

The concessions to the Bank of England included a restriction, in 1708, of the partners in other English banks to six, which continued until 1826, when joint-stock banks of issue were allowed in places beyond the metropolitan district; and in 1833, when the Bank charter was renewed, and one-fourth of its capital repaid by Government, non-issuing joint-stock banks were allowed within the metropolitan district. The monopoly of the Bank of Ireland was similarly broken up in 1824. The joint-stock banks thus established were all mainly constituted upon the Scottish system. No other change occurred until the introduction of the existing regulations in 1844.

*Existing Regulations.*

The bank issues consist in England of notes for £5 and upwards of the Bank of England (which still monopolizes the circulation within 65 miles of London), and of numerous provincial banks; and in Scotland and Ireland of notes for £1 and upwards, all regulated so as to conform to a gold currency. New banks of issue are prohibited; and existing banks are limited in their issues, except against specie, of which one-fifth may be silver; while a publication is required of their circulation and specie, and an annual registration of their partners.

The Bank of England was, from August 31, 1844, divided into two entirely separate departments of issue and banking, and notes for £14,000,000 were transferred from the former to the latter, against special securities lodged with the Government, including £11,015,000 due by it to the Bank, all bearing 3 per cent. interest. Beyond this £14,000,000 no notes could be issued, except against coin or bullion lodged in the issue department. But the Bank was empowered to increase its issues upon securities to the extent of two-thirds of that withdrawn by any English provincial bank, and its authorized issue has been thus increased to £15,000,000—the profit of this increased issue, however, going to the Government. The actual circulation averages £25,000,000, issued about two-thirds from London, and one-third from 11 branches. Notes may be demanded from the issue department in exchange for gold bullion at the rate of 77s. 9d. per oz., and they are payable in coin at the mint rate of

77s. 10½d. per oz. Payment of those issued in London can be demanded there only, but branch notes are payable either at the London office, or at the branches where issued. Otherwise the notes are a legal tender except in Scotland and Ireland.

The English Provincial Banks of issue have a maximum circulation fixed at the average of the twelve weeks to April 27, 1844. The issues must be at certain licensed places, and no union can take place between a joint-stock bank and a private bank, or between two joint-stock banks of issue, without one of them, at least, losing its circulation. The opening of new branches of issue is also restrained. The aggregate fixed issues, originally £8,631,647, have declined to £6,460,985 and the average actual circulation is only about £5,000,000, spread over 113 private and 54 joint-stock banks. The specie held is not published, the notes being payable in Bank of England paper, and no power being possessed to issue against specie in excess of the fixed circulation.

In Scotland, banks of issue are confined to those which existed in the year to May 1, 1845; and the issue of each is restricted to the amount of its average circulation in that year, and of the specie held at its head office, where the notes are payable. Should two banks join, the united bank may issue to the amount of their separate circulations. The aggregate authorized circulation, originally £3,087,209, is now £2,749,271. The average amount of specie held is about £4,000,000, and of actual circulation about £5,500,000, issued by 11 joint-stock banks, with about 900 branches.

In Ireland the authorized circulation is arranged as in Scotland; the issues of two banks which unite are also given to the united bank; but if any bank discontinues its issue, and circulates notes of the Bank of Ireland, the circulation of the latter may be to an equal amount increased. The notes are demandable in gold at the branches where issued; but the specie held against the circulation in excess of that authorized must be held at the head office, or certain licensed places. The total authorized circulation is still, as at first, £6,354,494. The average specie held is nearly £3,000,000, and of actual circulation about £7,000,000, issued by six joint-stock banks.

Under four distinct arrangements, a general system is thus established which gives to all these banks a collective action analogous to that of a



revenue, &c., lodging the revenue as collected, and the pay-office, &c., withdrawing it for public purposes; while, quarterly, the dividends are paid on the national debt, the stocks constituting which are besides recorded and transferred at the bank. The (*h*) "public deposits" (which include chancery and savings banks' funds) increase through revenue receipts until the dividend terms in January, April, July, and October; but in order to lessen the inconvenience of so much capital being withdrawn from use, certain special advances are, in the latter part of each quarter, made out of these deposits to the discount-houses and others, which are repayable when the dividends on stock become due.

The banking account is separately debited with (*f*) the fixed capital of £14,553,000, and (*g*) the "rest," a variable surplus, increased by accrued profits until April 5, and October 10, when the bank dividends are paid to the proprietors. The other debits, beside (*h*) the public deposits already noticed, are (*i*) "other deposits," which comprise those of bankers, merchants, and others,—from £3,000,000 to £5,000,000, being those of London bankers. (*k*) The "seven days' bills" includes the outstanding bank post bills.

The credit side embraces (*l*) "government securities," a safe and readily convertible investment; (*m*) "other securities," composed of bills discounted, and stocks, bonds, &c., on which advances have been made; and (*n*, *o*) the reserve of notes and coin immediately available for advances on payments. The note reserve may be viewed as merely an arithmetical expression for the bullion in the issue department available for the banking department, as by consolidating the two accounts, and eliminating the unissued notes, an equivalent sum in bullion or coin will be found in excess of that required by the Act of 1844.

*The Government of the Bank* is vested in a governor, deputy-governor, and 24 directors, whose qualifications in stock are £4000, £3000, and £2000 respectively. The court or board meets every Thursday, when the weekly account is presented. The two governors have the chief administration, and attend daily, and the court is divided out into six regular committees:—1. The committee of treasury, virtually the governor's council, composed of the two governors, the former governors, and directors elected by the court; 2. The Committee of daily waiting, composed of three directors in rota-

tion, who discount or reject bills, take in or decline bullion, examine securities, &c.; and committees of, 3. Branches and lawsuits; 4. House, clerks, &c.; 5. Inspection of accountants' offices; and 6. Inspection of cashiers' offices. Subject to the court, the three departments of issue, banking, and national debt, are worked by two head officers,—*first*, the chief accountant, with cognizance of all the accounts; *second*, the chief cashier, with charge of all money matters. There is also a subordinate control of each office by a principal and deputy principal, besides, in the larger offices, superintendents. The early theory of the bank was to keep the divisions of accounts and cash entirely separate; and, though now much blended, the distinction is still mainly preserved, and the two check each other. Including branch clerks, mechanics, &c., upwards of 1000 persons are employed, about 400 being in the national debt department; and the annual charge is nearly £240,000, besides £20,000 in pensions. The bank building covers nearly 4 acres, and bears an estimated rental of £40,000.

*The Business Regulations*, though precise, comprehend little that is peculiar. Any person respectably introduced may keep a drawing account, provided it shall be remunerative to the bank,—a condition usually fulfilled by maintaining an adequate balance, though in some cases by an annual payment proportionate to the work. No interest is allowed, nor is an over-draft permitted; but the bank is always ready to discount approved bills for their customers, and to make advances on approved securities. The limit of the *échéance* of bills discounted is 90 days; but advances on bills of even six months are granted to parties who transact all their business with the bank. The rates charged are various, yet never below the advertised "minimum rate of discount" by which the bank's ordinary transactions are regulated. The bank will also buy or sell, or take charge of securities, and receive dividends; and will also remit money to or from her branches; and from one branch to another. At London are issued bank-post bills drawn at 7 days, and notes at 60 days, for transmission to India, &c.

*The General Management* of the bank does not, in principle, differ from that of any other well-conducted bank. The directors must always look to their present liabilities, their present reserve, and the impending demands on the latter. In respect to investments,—

#### GOLD AND SILVER STANDARDS, ETC.

The fineness of gold is expressed in carats, the unit of reference being divided into 24, and its quality denoted by the number consisting of pure or fine gold. The carat is divided into 4 grains. The British standard for gold coin is 22 carats, *i.e.*, 22 parts are fine, and 2 parts alloy. The fineness of silver is similarly denoted by the number of ounces and pennyweights fine in 1 lb. troy; and the money standard is 11 oz. 2 dwts., *i.e.*, 222 parts are fine, and 18 parts alloy. These standards, often now expressed decimally in 1000th parts or milliemmes, as in France, are 916½ and 925 respectively.

Plate, excepting small articles, &c., is of regulated fineness. The standards for gold until 1854 were 22 carats and 18 carats; but, to meet the competition of foreign jewellers, it is now also stamped of 15, 12, and 9 carats (17 & 18 Vict. c. 96). The standards for silver are 11 oz. 2 dwts. and 11 oz. 10 dwts.; the latter, called "new-sterling," is almost in disuse. Provisions are likewise made for five "marks" of verification:—

1. The *Standard mark*, for plate of the fineness of coin, is, in England, a lion passant; in Scotland, a thistle (6 and 7 Will. IV. c. 69); in Ireland, a harp crowned. But in England, since 1844, gold of 22 and 18 carats is separately distinguished by a crown (7 and 8 Vict. c. 22): the lower standards of 15, 12, and 9 carats bear only the numbers denoting their fineness in carats and milliemmes. Silver of 11 oz. 10 dwts. has a Britannia. Articles of all standards likewise bear—2. The *Maker's mark* or initials; 3. The *Date mark*, a variable letter; 4. The *Hall mark*, or device of the district assay office—that of the London Goldsmiths' Company being a

\* Corn is now also sold by weight, and by weight and measure combined, but there is a perplexing diversity of units and denominations. In Glasgow the boll of wheat is 240 lbs., of barley 320 lbs., and of oats 264 lbs. In Ireland the barrel of wheat, etc., equals 280 lbs.; of barley, etc., 224 lbs.; of oats, 196 lbs. In Liverpool, etc., the cental of 100 lbs. is now in partial use for wheat and flour.

## SECTION II.—FIARS-PRICES OF SCOTLAND.

STATE OF THE FIARS-PRICES  
OF THE SEVERAL COUNTIES OF SCOTLAND FOR THE CROPS AND  
YEARS FROM 1870 TO 1876 INCLUSIVE.

The Fiars are the average prices, yearly ascertained by the Sheriff, with the help of a jury, of the several kinds of grain of the growth of his county, in the preceding crop. Their origin is obscure: it has been referred to the year 1627, when, it is said, they were for the first time ascertained in the county of Haddington; but they appear to have been struck in some other counties in the end of the previous century. The forms of procedure are regulated by the Acts of Sederunt, 21st December 1723, and 29th February 1728.

The Tables have been prepared from official documents in the Teind-Office. The average is that of the period of Seven Years; but in a few cases, distinguished by an asterisk, that of Six Years only. Where blanks of more than one year occur, no average is stated, the Fiars not having been regularly struck.

The Grain is computed by the Imperial Quarter; the Meal by the Boll of 140 Imperial Pounds.

**DRAWBACKS, ABATEMENTS, AND ALLOWANCES.**

1. BEER exported: for every 36 gallons, and so in proportion for any greater quantity, made by any licensed brewer for sale in the U. K. from worts which be-

the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, by distillation or otherwise, and the strength of the British liqueurs ascertained by such examination, after making a deduction of five degrees from the degrees of such strength, shall, in the construction of the provisions of the said Act for the purposes of this section, be deemed to be the strength as denoted or indicated by Sykes's hydrometer.

(2.) If the quantity of spirits in any cask of British liqueurs shall, upon such examination as aforesaid, be found to be less than the quantity of spirits as specified in the warehousing entry or note, no drawback or allowance whatever shall be paid in respect of the British liqueurs contained in such cask.

(3.) British liqueurs warehoused in any customs or excise warehouse shall not be removed to any other warehouse or be delivered out otherwise than for exportation or for ships' stores directly from the warehouse on board the vessel

in which the same are to be exported or used as stores.

Allowance is now made for the natural waste of spirits in warehouse; it being provided by the Act 27 Vict. c. 12, sec. 7, that duty shall be charged only on the actual quantity of spirits delivered from bond, unless there be reasonable ground for believing that the deficiency either in whole or in part has been the result of fraud.

5. WORTS (SOLIDIFIED) exported (Act 29 and 30 Vict. c. 64): for worts made and solidified by any licensed brewer for sale in the U. K., from malt or sugar, or malt and sugar on which full duties of excise and customs have been charged or paid, *a drawback at the rate of the duty payable on one bushel of malt, with the addition of 1½d. for every 28 lbs. avoirdupois of such wort.*

**NOTE.**—By the Act 32 and 33 Vict. c. 103, sect. 4, foreign spirits and wine of which an account has been taken by the proper officer of customs may, upon the prescribed bond being given, without payment of duty, be removed to any excise warehouse, and be removed from thence to any other excise or customs warehouse or for exportation, or for use as ships' stores, and may, upon payment of the proper duties of customs, be delivered for home consumption. And by the Act 38 Vict. c. 23, sect. 10, tinctures or medicinal spirits may be warehoused upon drawback by a licensed rectifier or compounder of spirits, in any customs or excise warehouse, under the like provisions under which British liqueurs may be so warehoused.

### III. STAMP\* AND LEGACY DUTIES, ETC.

The following is a list of Stamp Duties according to the schedule of the Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97 (amended by 34 Vict. c. 4, and 34 and 35 Vict. c. 103, and other Acts), with the Duty on Policies of Sea Insurance, Letters Patent, Patent Medicine, and Plate, and Inventory, Legacy, and Succession Duties, which remain under the former Acts. Generally, the items are given in the words of the schedule. New matter is put within brackets. When the sections are merely cited without the Act, they are the sections of 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97. All items in the schedule of the Act relating solely to England and Ireland are excluded. In the same session were passed the Acts 33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, Stamp Duties Management, and 33 and 34 Vict. c. 99, repealing certain enactments relating to the Stamp Duties.

The Act 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97, came into operation on 1st January 1871, and by § 3 the exemptions in other Acts in force are preserved.

A security for the payment or repayment of money to be lent, advanced, or paid, or which may become due upon an account-current, either with or without money previously due, is to be charged, where the total amount secured or to be ultimately recoverable is in any way limited, with the same duty as a security for the amount so limited.

*If not limited, available for sum stamp will cover.*—(2.) Where such total amount is unlimited, the security is to be available for such an amount only as the *ad valorem* duty impressed thereon extends to cover.

*Advances for insurance not liable.*—(3.) Provided that no money to be advanced for the insurance of any property comprised in any such security against damage by fire, or for keeping up any policy of life insurance comprised in such security, or for effecting in lieu thereof any new policy, or for the renewal of any grant or lease of any property comprised in such security upon the dropping of any life whereon such property is held, shall be reckoned as forming part of the amount in respect whereof the security is chargeable with *ad valorem* duty.

*Security for repayment of a sum by periodical payments, mortgage for sum.*—§ 108. A security for the payment of any rent charge, annuity, or periodical payments, by way of repayment, or in satisfaction or discharge of any loan, advance, or payment intended to be so repaid, satisfied, or discharged, is to be charged with the same duty as a similar security for the payment of the sum of money so lent, advanced, or paid.

*Proviso as to policies.*—Provided as follows—

- (1.) Where, in the case of a policy of insurance, no provision is made for keeping up the policy, the *ad valorem* duty is to be charged only on the value of the policy at the date of the instrument.

The exemptions from duty in Acts not otherwise relating to stamp duties remain in force (§ 3).

#### INVENTORY DUTY.

**PROPERTY LIABLE TO THE DUTY.—**

*Generally*—All personal property (heritable securities are personal property, which include bonds of annual rent and bonds of annuity, and real burdens on land, but not securities by absolute disposition qualified by back bond) belonging to the deceased in the United Kingdom, heritable securities, and bonds excluding executors, and also money secured by *ex facie* absolute disposition.—(48 Geo. III. c. 149, § 38, etc.; 55 Geo. III. c. 184, Schedule, Part III.; 21 and 22 Vict. c. 56, §§ 9, 12, 13, etc.; 16 and 17 Vict. c. 59, § 8; 31 and 32 Vict. c. 101, §§ 3 and 117; 37 and 38 Vict. c. 94, § 30; and 23 and 24 Vict. c. 80.)

*Personal Property—Absolute power of disposal.*—Personal estate which a person, dying after 3d April 1860, shall have disposed of by will, under any authority enabling such person to dispose of the same as he shall think fit, shall be deemed personal

a § 128. (2.) Every person who writes or executes any such request, authority, or notice, not being duly stamped, and every purser or other officer of any such company who in any manner obeys, complies with, or gives effect to any such request, authority, or notice, not being duly stamped, shall forfeit £20.

or movable estate of the person so dying, for the purpose of payment of inventory, probate, or administration duty.—(23 Vict. chap. 15, § 4.)

*Indian Promissory Notes—Ships.*—Indian Government promissory notes and certificates issued, or stock in lieu thereof, being assets of a deceased person, the interest of which shall be payable in London, registered in London, or enforced in India for the purpose of such registration before the death of the owner; also Indian Government promissory notes, with coupons attached, in the same circumstances as to registration, and certificates issued, or stock created in lieu thereof, shall be personal estate, and *bona notabilia* in England of the deceased person (23 Vict. c. 5, § 1); also any *ship*, or any share of a ship, belonging to a deceased person, registered in any port in the United Kingdom, notwithstanding such ship at the time of the death may have been at sea, or elsewhere out of the United Kingdom, shall be deemed to be at the port at which she may be registered (27 and 28 Vict. c. 56), and liable to inventory, probate, or administration duty.

*Specialty Debts.*—For probate and administration duty, debts and sums of money due from persons in the United Kingdom to a deceased on obligation or other specialty, shall be estate and effects of the deceased within the jurisdiction of Her Majesty's Court of Probate in England or Ireland, in which the same would be if they were debts upon simple contract, without regard to the place where the obligation or specialty shall be at the time of the death.—(25 Vict. c. 22, § 39.)

*Foreign Bonds and Stocks.*—Documents of the debts of foreign governments and foreign companies which pass from hand to hand are property where the documents may be. Debentures or bonds by foreign companies and governments, and the title to stocks of foreign companies and governments, are property in this country, if in the possession of any person in this country, and can be sold in the market, and the title of the purchasers completed to them in this country.—See *Attorney-General v. Bouwens*, 4 Meeson and Welsby, 171.

*Rents of Heritage.*—If the deceased survive Whitsunday, one moiety of

the rents of the crop of that year is personal estate. If he survive Martinmas, the whole rents of that crop fall into the executy. In addition, from and after 1st August 1870, the Act 33 & 34 Vict. 1870, c. 35, would seem to give the executor a proportion of the rents from the term preceding the date of death to the date of death. That Act would also seem to give a proportion of the term's rents of quarries, minerals, and houses, and also feu-duties current at the death. The executor's right to house-rents would not therefore be to the half-year's rents current at death, but to a proportion only to the date of death.

#### MODES IN WHICH DUTY MAY BE PAID.

##### *When deceased domiciled in Scotland.*

—In the case of a person dying domiciled in Scotland, having personal property in Scotland, England, and Ireland, and also heritable securities excluding executors, and personal bonds excluding executors, duty in respect of the whole may be paid on the inventory required to be recorded in the Sheriff Court; or inventory duty may be paid on the personal property situated in Scotland, including heritable securities made movable by the Act 31 and 32 Vict. c. 101, § 117, and duty may be paid on a "special inventory" of the heritable securities excluding executors and personal bonds excluding executors, and probate or administration may be obtained in England and Ireland in respect of the personal estate in these countries, and duty paid in respect of such on these instruments.

*When deceased domiciled furth of the U. K.*—In case of a person dying domiciled furth of the United Kingdom leaving personal estate in Scotland, England, and Ireland, an inventory must be given up in Scotland, probate or administration taken out in England and Ireland, and duty paid on such in respect of the property in each country.

In the case of estates not exceeding £150, if intestate, the widow, or any one or more of the children, or, in the case of a widow dying intestate, any one or more of her children, and if testate the executor nominated in the will, may apply to the Commissary (or Sheriff) Clerk, and he shall prepare an inventory and oath, and record the inventory and expedite confirmation according to statutory forms.—(38 and 39 Vict. c. 41, and 39 and 40 Vict. c. 24.)

**Exemptions.**—Inventory of the estate of any common seaman or soldier dying in service.

Additional inventory when duty on the whole estate does not exceed that already paid on former inventory.

### RETURN OF INVENTORY DUTY.

The inventory duty and probate and administration duty are paid on the whole personal property, without deduction of debts; but the Act 5 & 6 Vict. c. 79, § 23, provides for a return being given on proof of the constitution and payment of the debts. This return must be claimed within three years; but the time will be prolonged on application to the Board of Inland Revenue. No return to be granted in respect of a voluntary debt due from a person dying after 28th June 1861, expressed to be payable on death of such person, or payable under an instrument which shall not have been *bona fide* delivered to the donee three months before the death of such person. (24 and 25 Vict. c. 92, § 3.)

**Note.**—Regulations for return of inventory duty, may be obtained at the Legacy Duty Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh.

The husband or wife of the deceased is not chargeable with duty. If the legatee's husband or wife is of nearer consanguinity than the legatee, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship. (16 & 17 V. c. 51, § 11.)

This duty is payable for every legacy out of the personal or movable estate, or out of or charged upon the real or heritable estate of the deceased, or out of any estate which he has power to dispose of, or out of any moneys to arise by the sale, mortgage, or other disposition of the deceased's real or heritable estate,

or any part thereof: Also for the clear residue (after deducting debts, funeral expenses, legacies, and other charges first payable thereout) of the personal or movable estate, whether the title to such residue shall accrue by virtue of any testamentary disposition, or upon a partial or total intestacy: And also for the clear residue of the moneys to arise from the sale, mortgage, or other disposition of any real or heritable estate, directed to be sold, mortgaged, or otherwise disposed of by any will or testamentary instrument.

Annuities commencing to be payable on the death of persons dying after 19th May 1853, are valued for legacy duty according to tables annexed to the Succession Duty Act (16 and 17 Vict. c. 51); and annuities commencing to be payable previous to that date, by the tables annexed to the Legacy Duty Act (36 Geo. III. c. 52).

Duty is not exigible on legacies or residues under £20; but if a legatee take two or more legacies, under any testament, which shall together be of the amount of £20, each shall be charged with duty, though each or either may be separately under that amount.

Duty on legacies and residues in arrears, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

Printed forms and regulations for payment of the legacy duty may be obtained gratis, on application at Legacy Duty Office, Inland Revenue, Edinburgh; and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

The duty commenced on the death of persons dying after the 19th May 1853, and seems to be imposed on all property, both heritable and movable, passing by death, not liable to the duty on legacies and successions to personal estate upon intestacy—the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts.

The duty on HERITABLE PROPERTY is charged on the annual value, after allowance of the necessary outgoings (§ 22), as an annuity for the life of the successor (§ 21), which is to be valued by tables annexed to Act.

PERSONAL PROPERTY is liable to duty according to the value of the succession; and money charged on heritage—heritable securities—is charged as personalty (§ 1).

### RATES OF SUCCESSION DUTY.

Lineal issue or lineal ancestor of the predecessor . . . . . £1 per cent.  
 Brothers and sisters of the predecessor and their descendants, £3 per cent.  
 Brothers and sisters of the father or mother of the predecessor and their descendants . . . . . £5 per cent.  
 Brothers and sisters of a grandfather or grandmother of the predecessor and their descendants . . £6 per cent.  
 Any other person . . . . . £10 per cent.

The husband or wife of predecessor is not chargeable with duty (§ 18), and if successor's husband or wife shall be of nearer consanguinity than the successor, duty is payable according to such nearer relationship (§ 11).

The following are also *exemptions* from the succession duty:—

1. Successions from the same predecessor, passing on any death, not amounting in principal value to £100 (§ 18).
2. Any succession of less value than £20 in the whole (*ib.*).
3. Legacies and personal property charged with legacy duty, in respect of the same acquisition (*ib.*).

Duty on successions in arrear, interest thereon at the rate of 4 per cent. is payable (31 and 32 Vict. c. 124, § 9).

*Note.*—Forms of the accounts may be obtained at the Legacy Duty Office, Edinburgh, and at the offices of distributors of stamps in the country.

### ADHESIVE STAMPS.

*Instruments for which Adhesive Stamps may be used, and person by whom to be cancelled, etc., also mode of cancellation.*

AGREEMENT—6d. duty.

Cancellation by person by whom it is first executed (§ 36).

BILL OF EXCHANGE.—Fixed duty of 1d.

Cancellation by person who signs it before he delivers it out of custody (§ 50).

BILL payable on demand.—If presented unstamped, person to whom presented may affix and cancel and deduct duty from sum in paying; but not to relieve person who may have incurred penalty (§ 54).

BILLS OR NOTES.—Drawn or made out of United Kingdom.

Person before he presents bill or note for payment, negotiates or pays it, to affix and cancel. Provided—

(a.) If at time it comes to hands of *bona fide* holder a stamp is on it and cancelled, it shall be deemed duly cancelled, although not affixed and cancelled by proper person.

(b.) If a stamp shall be on it and not

duly cancelled, *bona fide* holder may cancel it, and it shall be deemed duly stamped (§ 51).

Person not relieved of penalty incurred by him for not cancelling adhesive stamp (*ib.*).

**CHARTER-PARTY.**—Cancellation by person by whom it is last executed, or by whose execution it is completed as a binding contract (§ 66).

**CONTRACT NOTE.**—Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 69).

**CERTIFIED COPIES OF EXTRACTS FROM REGISTERS OF BIRTHS, etc.**—Cancellation by person signing before he delivers same out of his hands (§ 80).

**DELIVERY ORDERS and WARRANT for GOODS.**—Cancellation by the person by whom made (§ 89).

**LEASE for any definite term less than a year of—**

(1.) Dwelling-house, etc., at a rate not exceeding £10 per annum.

(2.) Any furnished house or apartments, also a duplicate of such instrument.

Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 99).

Person who executes or prepares lease, the duty on which may be denoted by adhesive stamp, and which is not, at or before execution, duly stamped, penalty £5 (§ 100, 1).

Penalty not incurred in respect of letters and correspondence (§ 100, 2).

**NOTARIAL ACT and PROTEST of a Bill or Promissory Note.**—Cancellation by notary (§ 116).

**POLICY of INSURANCE ON LIFE, and compensation for accident.**—Cancellation by person who first executes (§ 119).

**PROXY and VOTING PAPER**—liable to duty of 1d. Cancellation by person by whom first executed (§ 102, 2).

**RECEIPT.**—Cancellation by person who gives (§ 121).

**REQUEST to PURSER or OFFICER of MINING COMPANY on cost book system to enter or register transfer of share or part of share on notice of such transfer.** Cancellation by person who writes (§ 128).

**GENERAL DIRECTION AS TO THE CANCELLATION OF ADHESIVE STAMPS.**

§ 24. (1.) An instrument, duty upon which is required, or permitted by law, to be denoted by an adhesive stamp, is not to be deemed duly stamped with an adhesive stamp unless the person required by law to cancel such adhesive stamp cancels the same by writing on or across the stamp his name or initials, or the name or initials of his firm, together with the true date of his so writing, so that the stamp may be effectually cancelled,

and rendered incapable of being used for any other instrument, or unless it is otherwise proved that the stamp appearing on the instrument was affixed thereto at the proper time.

*Penalty for neglect or refusal, £10.*—

(2.) Every person, who, being required by law to cancel an adhesive stamp, wilfully neglects or refuses duly to do so in manner aforesaid, shall forfeit the sum of £10.

*Penalty for frauds in relation to adhesive stamps, or to any duty, £50* (§ 25).—Any person who—

(1.) Fraudulently removes or causes to be removed from any instrument any adhesive stamp, or affixes any adhesive stamp which has been so removed to any other instrument, with intent that such stamp may be used again;

(2.) Sells or offers for sale, or utters, any adhesive stamp which has been so removed, or utters any instrument having thereon any adhesive stamp which has to his knowledge been so removed as aforesaid;

(3.) Practises or is concerned in any fraudulent act, contrivance, or device not specially provided for, with intent to defraud Her Majesty, her heirs or successors, of any duty;

shall forfeit, over and above any other penalty to which he may be liable, the sum of £50.

#### STAMPING INSTRUMENTS AFTER EXECUTION.

**ARTICLES of CLERKSHIP.**—Duly stamped articles in order to admission in inferior court may be stamped with duty to make up £60, and shall then be sufficiently stamped for admission into Court of Session, etc. (§ 42).

With this exception, articles of clerkship are not to be stamped after the expiration of six months from the date, except on payment of the penalties as follows:—

(1.) If brought to be stamped within one year after date, £10.

(2.) If so brought after one year and within five years after date; for every year, and also for any additional part of a year, elapsed since the date, £10.

(3.) In every other case, £50 (§ 43).

**BILLS and NOTES** having an impressed stamp of sufficient amount but improper denomination may be stamped, if not then payable, penalty £2; if payable, penalty £10. With these exceptions, not to be stamped after execution (§ 53).

**CHARTER PARTY.**

Within seven days after first execution, penalty 4s. 6d.

After seven days, and within a month, penalty £10.

In any other case, cannot be stamped (§ 68).

If executed abroad, any party to it may, within ten days after receipt in U. K., affix and cancel adhesive stamp (§ 67).

**ATTESTED COPIES, OR EXTRACTS** of or from—(1.) An instrument chargeable with duty; (2.) An original will, testament, or codicil; (3.) The probate or probate copy of a will or codicil; (4.) Letters of administration, or a confirmation of a testament; may be stamped within fourteen days after date of attestation or authentication, without penalty (§ 79).

**FOREIGN SECURITIES.**—The Board of Inland Revenue may at any time, without reference to date, allow them to be stamped without penalty upon being satisfied they were not made or issued, and have not been transferred, assigned, or negotiated, and no interest paid on them, within the United Kingdom (§ 115).

**POLICY OF INSURANCE** made or executed out of U. K., but enforceable in U. K., may be stamped within two months after it has been first received in U. K., without penalty (§ 117, 2).

**POLICY OF SEA INSURANCE**, by which separate and distinct interests of two or more persons are insured, stamped in respect of aggregate of such interests, but not duly stamped in respect of each of such interests, may be stamped with additional duty within one month after last risk declared.—39 Vict. c. 6, § 1.

See after as to unstamped or insufficiently stamped sea policy produced in court of civil judicature.

**RECEIPT** may be stamped with impressed stamp—

1. Within fourteen days after given, penalty £5.

2. After fourteen days, and within a month, penalty £10.

In any other case, not to be stamped (§ 122).

**INSTRUMENTS as to which no express provision to prohibit.**

*Instruments on payment of duty and penalty of £10; if duty exceeds £10, also interest on it (§ 15, 1).* Except where express provision to the contrary is made by this or any other Act, any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument may be stamped after the execution thereof, on payment of the unpaid duty, and a penalty of £10, and also by way of further penalty, where the unpaid duty exceeds £10, of interest on such duty, at the rate of £5 per centum per annum, from the day upon which the instrument was first executed up to the time when such interest is equal in amount to the unpaid duty.

And the payment of any penalty or penalties is to be denoted on the instrument by a particular stamp.

*Proviso.*—(2.) Provided as follows:—

*Instruments executed abroad within two months after being received in United Kingdom without penalty.*—

(a.) Any unstamped or insufficiently stamped instrument, which has been first executed at any place out of the U. K., may be stamped at any time within two months after it has been first received in the U. K., on payment of the unpaid duty only.

*Board may remit penalties within twelve months.*—(b.) The Commissioners may, if they think fit, at any time within twelve months after the first execution of any instrument, remit the penalty or penalties, or any part thereof.—(See Note a.)

*Unstamped or insufficiently stamped instruments produced in Court, if duty and penalty be paid to officer of Court, may be received in evidence.*—

§ 16. (1.) Upon the production of an instrument chargeable with any duty as evidence in any court of civil judicature in any part of the United Kingdom, the officer whose duty it is to read the instrument

α Instruments to have stamps impressed are received at the Cashier's Office, No. 3 Inland Revenue, Edinburgh, to be stamped, if within two months of the first date (the solicitor may in certain circumstances receive them within two months of the last date), on payment of the duty; if beyond that date, they are received at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5 Inland Revenue, on payment of the duty and penalty. Persons applying will be furnished with a schedule, which, after being filled up, is to be presented, along with the instrument. The amount of duty sought to be impressed is to be inserted in the schedule by the applicant before being presented, and the duty is to be paid at the time of the application.

Agreements liable to the duty of 6d. must be lodged within fourteen days of their date, in order to be stamped without penalty.

shall call the attention of the judge to any omission or insufficiency of the stamp thereon, and if the instrument is one which may legally be stamped after the execution thereof, it may, on payment to the officer of the amount of the unpaid duty, and the penalty payable by law on stamping the same as aforesaid, and of a further sum of £1, be received in evidence, saving all just exceptions on other grounds. By 39 Vict. c. 6, § 2, similar provision applies to sea policies, but penalty £100, and a further sum of £1.

*The officer of the Court to account for duties and penalties.*—(2.) The officer receiving the said duty and penalty shall give a receipt for the same, and make an entry in a book kept for that purpose of the payment and of the amount thereof, and shall communicate to the commissioners the name or title of the cause or proceeding in which, and of the party from whom, he received the said duty and penalty, and the date and description of the instrument, and shall pay over to the Receiver-General of Inland Revenue, or to such other person as the commissioners may appoint, the money received by him for the said duty and penalty.

*Commissioners to stamp instrument.*—(3.) Upon production to the commissioners of any instrument in respect of which any duty or penalty has been paid as aforesaid, together with the receipt of the said officer, the payment of such duty and penalty shall be denoted on such instrument accordingly.

#### ADJUDICATION.

##### DOUBTS AS TO SUFFICIENCY OF STAMPS MAY BE REMOVED.

*The commissioners may be required to express their opinion as to duty. Mode and effect of proceeding.*—§ 18.

(1.) Subject to such regulations as the commissioners may think fit to make, the commissioners may be required by any person to express their opinion with reference to any executed instrument upon the following questions:

- (a.) Whether it is chargeable with duty;
- (b.) With what amount of duty it is chargeable.
- (c.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is not chargeable with any duty, such instrument may be stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is not chargeable with any duty.
- (3.) If the commissioners are of opinion that the instrument is chargeable with duty, they shall assess the

duty with which it is in their opinion chargeable, and if or when the instrument is duly stamped in accordance with the assessment of the commissioners, it may be also stamped with a particular stamp denoting that it is duly stamped.

(4.) Every instrument stamped with the particular stamp denoting either that it is not chargeable with any duty, or is duly stamped, shall be admissible in evidence, and available for all purposes, notwithstanding any objection relating to duty.

(5.) Provided as follows:—

(a.) *Instrument to be stamped according to opinion.*—An instrument upon which duty has been assessed by commissioners shall not, if it is unstamped or insufficiently stamped, be stamped otherwise than in accordance with assessment of commissioners.

(b.) *Securities without limit not to be adjudicated.*—Nothing in this section contained extends to any instrument chargeable with duty, and made as a security for money or stock without limit.

(c.) *Also instruments which cannot be stamped.*—Nothing in this section contained shall be deemed to authorize the stamping after the execution thereof of any instrument prohibited by law from being so stamped.

*Person dissatisfied may appeal.*—§ 19.

(1.) Any person who is dissatisfied with the assessment of the commissioners made in pursuance of the last preceding section may, within twenty-one days after the date of such assessment, and on payment of duty in conformity therewith, appeal against such assessment to H.M. Court of Exchequer in England, Scotland, or Ireland, according to the country in which the case has arisen, and may for that purpose require the commissioners to state and sign a case, setting forth the question upon which their opinion was required, and the assessment made by them.

*Mode of proceeding.*—(2.) The commissioners shall thereupon state and sign a case accordingly, and deliver the same to the person by whom it is required, and on his application such case may be set down for hearing in the proper court.

(3.) Upon the hearing of such case (due notice of which is to be given to the commissioners) the court shall determine the question submitted, and, if the instrument in question is in the opinion of the court chargeable with any duty, shall assess the duty with which it is so chargeable.

(4.) If it is decided by the court that

the assessment of the commissioners is erroneous, any excess of duty which may have been paid in conformity with such erroneous assessment, together with any penalty which may have been paid in consequence thereof, shall be ordered by the court to be repaid by the commissioners to the appellant, together with the costs incurred by him in relation to the appeal.

(5.) But if the assessment of commissioners is confirmed by court, the costs incurred by commissioners in relation to the appeal shall be ordered by the court to be paid by appellant to the commissioners.

*The commissioners may call for and refuse to proceed without evidence.*—§ 20. (1.) In any case of application to the commissioners with reference to any instrument, the commissioners may require to be furnished with an abstract of the instrument, and also with such evidence as they may deem necessary, in order to show to their satisfaction whether all the facts and circumstances affecting the liability of the instrument to duty, or the amount of the duty chargeable thereon, are fully and truly set forth therein, and may refuse to proceed upon any such application until such abstract and evidence has been furnished accordingly.

*Affidavit not to be used otherwise.* *Person paying full duty relieved of penalty, etc., for omission to state truly in instrument.*—(2.) Provided that no affidavit or statutory declaration made in pursuance of this section shall be used against any person making the same in any proceeding whatever, except in an inquiry as to the duty with which the instrument to which it relates is chargeable; and every person by whom any such affidavit or declaration is made shall, on payment of the full duty with which

the instrument to which it relates is chargeable, be relieved from any penalty, forfeiture, or disability he may have incurred by reason of the omission to state truly in such instrument any of the facts or circumstances aforesaid. (*See Note a.*)

#### DENOTING STAMP.

DUPLICATES (§ 93).—CONVEYANCE ON SALE (§ 76).—SETTLEMENT (§ 126), etc. § 14. Where the duty with which an instrument is chargeable depends in any manner upon the duty paid upon another instrument, the payment of such last-mentioned duty shall, if application be made to the commissioners for that purpose, and on production of both the instruments, be denoted in such manner as the commissioners think fit upon such first-mentioned instrument. (*See Note b.*)

#### LICENSE TO SELL STAMPS.

Persons selling stamps must have a license from the Commissioners of Inland Revenue. Applications for license may be addressed to the Comptroller of Stamps and Taxes for Scotland, at Edinburgh. License to specify Christian name and surname and place of abode, and specify shop or shops where stamps are to be sold. Bond to be granted. Not to sell but at shops licensed, and not hawk (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, §§ 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11). Persons in the employment of the Post Office to sell postage stamps without license, and carry them about for sale (*ib.* § 12).

#### DISCOUNT ON THE PURCHASE OF STAMPS.

Upon the sale of stamps such discount shall be allowed to the purchaser thereof as the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall direct (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98, § 13).

*a* Instruments are received for adjudication at the Solicitor's Office, Inland Revenue Office, Edinburgh, on the same conditions as to duty and penalty as instruments to be stamped merely. The schedule (the duty to be impressed not being inserted), the instrument after execution, and an abstract giving the names and addresses of the parties to it, the substance of the provisions, particularly dates and sums, and a reference to the part of the deed on which each commences, are to be left at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5, on Mondays and Wednesdays, between 10 and 2 o'clock. Between 10 and 12 o'clock on Thursday following, a person, who can give explanation, must call; and he should be prepared to pay the proper duty and penalty, if any, to the Cashier, No. 3, Lobby.

*b* Instruments requiring to be impressed with the denoting stamp to render them valid may be lodged at the Solicitor's Office, No. 5 Inland Revenue, Edinburgh, between 10 and 2 o'clock on Monday and Wednesday. The principal instrument, as well as the subordinate instrument, must be lodged, and both must appear to be properly stamped.

[The Treasury have authorized the following rates of discount, viz.:

Purchasers of stamps (except receipt and postage stamps) at London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, under the value of £10 each, but to the value of £30 or upwards in whole, are allowed discount at the rate of 30s. per cent. on every complete sum of £5. The like discount is allowed to any person lodging at Edinburgh, paper or forms containing printed matter only, to be impressed with stamp duties under the value of £10 each, but to the value of £30 or upwards in whole.

To persons who at one time shall produce at the office of Inland Revenue in London (Edinburgh) or Dublin, paper to be stamped with, or shall purchase at the office in London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, stamps to the amount of £2 or upwards, or of any distributor of stamps at any place not within *ten* miles from the said offices, stamps to the amount of £1 or upwards, denoting any duty not exceeding 1s. on bills of exchange, except adhesive foreign bill stamps, drafts or orders, or promissory notes, or stamps, for denoting the duty of 1d. (except postage-stamps), an allowance shall be made of 10d. for every 20s. of the duties denoted by such stamps (23 & 24 Vict. c. 111, § 3). No person selling such stamps shall charge for the paper whereon the same are impressed: penalty, £10. (17 & 18 Vict. c. 83, § 25.)]

Purchasers of postage stamps, comprising all or any kinds (except post cards in sheets), at the office of Inland Revenue at London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, or at the office of any distributor (except Glasgow) or sub-distributor of stamps, to the amount of £10 or upwards, at one time, are allowed discount at the rate of 1 per cent. (No discount allowed on fractions of £5.) The like discount is allowed on forms lodged, at one time, at London, Edinburgh, or Dublin, to be stamped to the amount of £10 or upwards. A discount of 2s. is allowed on each quarter ream of post cards in sheets, the duty on which amounts to £10, 10s.

### EXCHANGING SPOILED STAMPS.

STAMP DUTIES MANAGEMENT ACT, 1870 (33 and 34 Vict. c. 98).

*Allowance for Spoiled Stamps.*—§ 14. The commissioners may make regu-

lations regarding allowance for stamps spoiled in the following cases, viz. :—

*Instruments not executed.*—(1.) Inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled, obliterated, or by any means rendered unfit for the purpose intended :

*Adhesive stamps.*—(2.) Any never used nor affixed to any material, but inadvertently and undesignedly spoiled or rendered unfit for use :

*Bills and Notes.*—(3.) Signed by the drawer, but not delivered out of his hands to the payee, or any person on his behalf, or deposited with any person as a security for the payment of money, or in any way negotiated, issued, or put in circulation, or made use of in any other manner whatever, and which being a bill has not been accepted by the drawee, and does not bear any signature intended as or for the acceptance :

(4.) Signed by or on behalf of the drawer thereof, but which from any omission or error has been spoiled or rendered useless, although the same, being a bill of exchange, may have been presented for acceptance or accepted or endorsed, or, being a promissory note, may have been delivered to the payee, provided that another completed and duly stamped bill or note is produced identical in every particular, except in correction of such error or omission as aforesaid, with the spoiled bill or note :

(5.) The following *executed* instruments—

(a.) Presentation to an ecclesiastical benefice not followed by institution :

(b.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found to be absolutely void in law from the beginning :

(c.) Executed by any party thereto, but afterwards found unfit by reason of any error or mistake therein for the purpose originally intended :

(d.) Executed by any party thereto, but which, by reason of the death of any person by whom it is necessary that it should be executed, without having executed the same, or of the refusal of any such person to execute the same, or to advance any money intended to be thereby secured, cannot be completed so as to effect the intended transaction in the form proposed :

(e.) Executed by any party thereto, which, for want of the execution thereof by some material and necessary party, and his inability or refusal to sign the same, is in



## IV. INHABITED HOUSE DUTY.

On each inhabited dwelling-house of the annual value of £20 or upwards, occupied as a farm-house, or any shop or warehouse, being part of a dwelling-house, where goods are exposed for sale and sold in

the front and basement story, or any house which is licensed for the sale of liquors by retail, or which is occupied as a hotel, although not licensed for the sale of liquors, a duty of 6d. per pound; all others, 9d.

*Exemptions.*—Any house occupied for the purpose of trade only, or as a warehouse for the sole purpose of lodging goods, or used as a shop or counting-house, where a servant may dwell for the protection thereof.

## V. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

**SCHEDULE A.**—(*Real Property.*) On each 20s. of annual value of lands, tenements, and heritages, in respect of the property . . . . . 3d.

**SCHEDULE B.**—(*Occupancy of Real Property.*) On each 20s. of annual value of lands, tenements, and heritages (other than a dwelling-house separate from a farm), in Scotland, in respect of the occupancy . . . . . 1½d.

**SCHEDULE C.**—(*Public Funds.*) On each 20s. of annual amount of profits from interest, annuities, dividends and shares of annuities, payable out of the public revenue . . . . . 3d.

**SCHEDULE D.**—(*Trades and Professions.*) On each 20s. of annual amount of gains, profits, or returns, from trades, professions, employments, or vocations, or from personal or other property not included in Schedules A, B, C, or E . . . . . 3d.

**SCHEDULE E.**—(*Public Salaries.*) On each 20s. of annual amount of salaries, pensions, or annuities, paid out of the public revenue, or for public offices or employments . . . . . 3d.

*Exemption and Abatement.*—Under the Act 39 Vict. c. 16, sect. 8, persons

whose whole incomes from every source are less than £150 a year are exempted. Persons whose incomes amount to £150 a year, but to less than £400 a year, are entitled to an abatement equal to the duty upon £120 of their income.

*Deductions.*—Deduction is allowed, when claimed, of any annual premium (not exceeding one-sixth part of the claimant's income from every source) paid for insurance, or deferred annuity, on the claimant's own or his wife's life, to any insurance company in existence on 1st November 1844, or registered pursuant to Act 7 and 8 Vict. c. 110; or of any annual payment made under Act of Parliament to a widows' or children's fund.

By the Act 19 and 20 Vict. c. 80, landlords in Scotland are entitled to relief (either by abatement or by repayment) from any amount of Income Tax which may be assessed upon them in respect of the annual value of such rates, taxes, assessments, and public burdens, as may be charged upon them and not charged upon landlords in England.

A supply of forms of affidavits is kept at the Inland Revenue Office, and by the distributors and sub-distributors of stamps; and claimants may attend at the Inland Revenue Office and have the affidavits taken; or they may take the oath before a justice of the peace, and shortly afterwards lodge the affidavits and the stamps with any of the above officers. If not brought within ten days or a fortnight afterwards the stamp will not be allowed without a fresh affidavit. If the claim be admitted at Edinburgh, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the new stamps after the next Monday, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If the claim be lodged with a distributor or sub-distributor, a ticket is issued stating that application is to be made for the said stamps after a specified date, and within six weeks from the date of the ticket. If application not made within that time, the claim will be forfeited, and no excuse will be accepted.

The stamps must be presented for allowance *within six months* after being spoiled.

A letter weighing more than 12 oz. is liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce. Example, 16 oz. would be 1s. 4d. Unpaid Letters are charged double, and deficient postage double the deficiency. Letters may not exceed in size 18×9×6 inches, unless to or from Government offices. On re-directed letters the charge for re-direction is the same whether prepaid or collected on delivery.

**LATE LETTERS**, posted at the provincial offices, are received till within 5 minutes of the despatch of the mails on being prepaid one penny additional, and posted in the proper box, or handed over the counter. For letters posted at Edinburgh, see p. 137.

Letters, when once posted, cannot be given back upon any pretence whatever, but must be forwarded to the person to whom they are addressed.

Letters containing articles of a perishable or dangerous nature, or anything that might prove injurious to the other letters, are not forwarded, but sent to the Returned Letter Office.

**REGISTRATION.**—Any letter, book-packet, etc., can be registered on the payment of a fee of 2d. in addition to the postage on such letter or packet, and it must be presented half-an-hour before the closing of the box, otherwise it is liable to a late fee of 4d. It is recommended that all letters of value should be registered; as any letter discovered unregistered in course of transit, supposed to contain coin, watches, or jewelry, is registered, and an extra fee charged on delivery. A letter marked "registered" put into a letter-box, instead of being presented for registration and a receipt obtained, is also charged an extra fee, any additional stamps on it above the postage being allowed for off that amount. In the event of a registered letter containing an enclosure of intrinsic value, or its contents, being lost while passing through the post, the department under certain regulations makes good the value of the contents up to £2. Letters containing money will however only get the benefit of this regulation, if enclosed in the Special Registered-Letter Envelopes, sold by the Post Office for the purpose.

#### NEWSPAPERS.

All newspapers registered at the General Post-Office, London, printed and published in the United Kingdom at intervals not exceeding seven days, and on a sheet, or sheets, unstitched, may be sent by post, singly or in a packet, within the United Kingdom, for a postage of one half-penny for each newspaper. A newspaper packet posted either unpaid or insufficiently paid, will be charged with the unpaid rate applicable to book packets. The title and date of every publication must be printed at the top of every page, and it must be folded in such a manner that the title may be readily inspected. It must either have

no cover, or be in a cover open at the ends. It must contain no enclosure, except the supplement belonging to it. A newspaper which has any letter, written in it or upon its cover, will be charged letter rate. No packet of newspapers must exceed 14 lb. in weight, 2 feet in length, and 1 foot in width or depth.

Registration for inland circulation includes registration for transmission abroad.

#### INLAND BOOK POST.

The rate of postage is one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction thereof.

If not sufficiently paid, double the deficiency will be charged; and if sent unpaid, a double rate is charged. All letters or sealed enclosures in a book packet are forbidden. If this rule is infringed, the entire packet will be treated as a letter. If any letter is written on a book or its cover, it will be charged unpaid letter postage. (Entries, however, merely stating who sends the book, etc., or to whom it is given, are not regarded as a letter.)

A book packet may contain any number of separate books, maps, or prints, and any quantity of paper, vellum, or parchment, and may be either printed, written, or plain, or any mixture of the three;—further, all legitimate binding, mounting, or covering of the same, whether loose or attached; also rollers in the case of prints; markers, whether paper or otherwise, in books; in short, whatever is necessary for the safe transmission of literary or artistic matter, or usually appertains thereto; but every packet must be open at both ends, and put up in such a manner as to admit of the contents being easily withdrawn for examination; otherwise it will be treated as a letter.

Circulars require to be in identical terms, the whole or greater part of which must be printed, engraved, or lithographed, notwithstanding such may be letters or communications of the nature of a letter.

A book packet in dimensions must not exceed 6 inches in depth, 9 inches in width, 18 inches in length, and 5 lb. in weight.

It is forbidden to forward by post any indecent or obscene print, painting, photograph, lithograph, engraving, book or card, or any other indecent or obscene article, or any letter, newspaper, publication, packet, or card having thereon any words, marks, or designs of an indecent, obscene, libellous, or grossly offensive character.

**PRINTED PARLIAMENTARY PAPERS.**  
—Same as Book Post rate, but there is no limitation as to weight. They must be without covers, or in covers open at the ends. The words "Parliamentary Proceedings" must be written or printed on the cover of the packet, otherwise it will be treated as an ordinary book packet. Prepayment is optional. Petitions and addresses forwarded to her Majesty pass free. Members of Parliament may receive petitions and addresses to her Majesty, or petitions to either House, free, if not exceeding 2 lb., and sent without covers, or in covers open at the ends.

**POSTAGE AND TELEGRAPH STAMPS,  
WRAPPERS, ENVELOPES, ETC.**

Postage labels are of the respective values of  $\frac{1}{2}$ d., 1d.,  $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., 2d.,  $2\frac{1}{2}$ d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 8d., 10d., 1s., 2s., and 5s. Telegraph labels, 1d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 1s., 3s., 5s., 10s., £1, and £5. Stamped forms, 1s. Books, 20s. 2d.

Inland Post Cards are 7d. and 8d. per dozen, Foreign  $1\frac{1}{2}$ d. each; and newspaper wrappers at the rate of 8 for

4 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. The public can also obtain these wrappers uncut in  $\frac{1}{4}$  reams of 120 sheets, of 14 wrappers on each sheet, by making special application at any post office.

Stamped Envelopes are made of four sizes—viz.,  $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{3}{8}$  in.,  $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3$  in.,  $4\frac{3}{4} \times 2\frac{1}{2}$  in., and  $4\frac{3}{4} \times 3\frac{1}{8}$  in. (square shaped), and are sold at 2s. 2d., and the square shaped 2s. 3d. per packet of 24.

**REGISTRATION-LETTER** Envelopes, including the registration fee, are issued of the following dimensions—viz.,  $5\frac{1}{2} \times 3\frac{1}{2}$  in. and  $6 \times 3\frac{3}{8}$  in., and sold at 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each, or 2s. 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for a packet of 12. The postage must be paid by affixing the necessary stamps.

Any embossed or impressed stamp cut out or otherwise separated from any cover, paper, or card, on which it was embossed, cannot be used for postage. Postage stamps are purchased from the public at the Money Order Office, G.P.O., Branch Offices, and the Receiving-Offices, at a charge of  $\frac{1}{4}$ d. on the value of 1s. 8d. and under, and 1d. on 3s. 4d. value, and so on, being at the rate of 2 $\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

**POST-OFFICE TELEGRAPHS.**

The charge for telegrams throughout the United Kingdom, including the Channel Islands, Isle of Man, Orkney and Shetland Islands, but excepting the Scilly, is one shilling for the first twenty words, and threepence for each additional five words or part of five words. The charge to the Scilly Islands is 2s. 6d. for five words, and 6d. for every additional word; and 6d. for every additional word above ten in the addresses, plus the ordinary inland rate. Telegrams may be repeated at the request of the sender, if he desires to adopt this extra security against risk of error, by being sent back from the office at which they are received to the office from which they are forwarded. The charge for repetition is one-half the ordinary tariff, fractions of threepence being reckoned as twopence. The cost of a reply to a telegram may be prepaid. Copies of a telegram directed to more than one firm or person in the same free delivery, will be delivered separately at an additional charge of threepence per copy. Telegrams may be redirected from town to town at an extra charge

of *one-half* the ordinary tariff, fractions of threepence being reckoned as twopence. When the addressee does not reside within the limit of one mile of the terminal telegraphic office, or within the limit of the town postal delivery of that office, if it is a head office, and when the sender desires to have his telegram delivered by special foot-messenger, sixpence per double mile or any part thereof will be charged. A sum of one shilling per double mile will be charged for the delivery of telegrams by mounted messenger, except in Ireland, where it is usually 8d. per double mile. If the telegram is to be forwarded by post or train from the terminal telegraph office, it must bear instructions to that effect.

A deposit of 5s. is required upon all telegrams addressed to persons on board ship (unless lying in dock), to cover any expense incurred in delivery—but the surplus will be refunded on application.

## GENERAL REGULATIONS, COLONIAL AND FOREIGN POST.

A letter posted unpaid or insufficiently prepaid, directed to go by a route by which prepayment is compulsory, is returned to the sender unless the letter can be sent by a route by which prepayment is not required.

Letters, however, for Australia and New Zealand, posted insufficiently prepaid, are not returned if prepaid one rate, but are forwarded, charged the deficient postage, and an additional rate.

Letters containing coin, jewelry, articles of value, or anything liable to customs duties, are not permitted to circulate in the countries comprised in the General Postal Union. Such articles sent to Costa Rica and Peru are liable to confiscation, and if sent to the colonies of Canada, Cape of Good Hope, and Queensland, are liable to be detained until the customs duties have been paid, and are liable to be forfeited if sent to Victoria.

FOREIGN POST CARDS are issued under the same regulations as for inland circulation, for countries comprised in the General Postal Union, except British India, the charge on which is half the letter rate.

NEWSPAPERS for foreign countries and the colonies are subject to the same general regulations as for inland circulation; excepting that for foreign transmission a newspaper may be published at intervals of 31 days, and that it (but not its supplement) may be printed on sheets stitched together. It must be posted within eight days from the date of publication, including the day of publication.

BOOK POST.—To the colonies and most foreign countries printed paper may be sent under the same regulations as the Inland Book Post, and the name and address of the sender may be written on the book; but to some foreign countries there must be no writing or manuscript marks except the name and address of the person to whom it is sent.

INDIAN PARCEL POST.—Parcels can be sent through the Indian Parcel Post Agency\* to any part of British India.—Offices in London: 122 Leadenhall St., E.C., and 25 Cockspur St., S.W. The rate is 1s. per lb. or fraction thereof. The maximum weight, size, and value of a parcel, is 50 lb.; two feet long by one foot broad and deep; and £20 respectively. Jewelry, watches, precious stones, liquids, or articles of a dangerous or damaging nature are forbidden. The parcel must be securely closed and packed. A letter of advice stating particulars of parcel should be sent to the London office.

COLONIAL AND FOREIGN PATTERN POST.—The Pattern and Sample Post is restricted to *bona fide trade patterns or samples of merchandise*.

Patterns or samples, when practicable, must be sent in covers open at the ends, and so as to be easy of examination. But samples of seeds, drugs, and such like articles, which cannot be sent in covers of this kind,—but such articles only,—may be posted enclosed in boxes or in bags of linen or other material, fastened in such a manner that they may be readily opened; or in bags entirely closed, provided such closed bags are transparent, so as to enable the officers of the Post-Office readily to satisfy themselves as to the nature of the contents.

Samples of intrinsic value must not be sent to any foreign country.

There must be no writing or printing upon any packet except the address of the person for whom it is intended, the address of the sender, a trade mark or number, and the price of the articles.

LIMITATIONS of packets as to size and weight, see page 145.

REGISTRATION OF LETTERS, ETC.—Letters, Newspapers, Book, and Pattern Packets may be registered to the colonies and to most foreign countries for a fee of 2d. under the same regulations as for inland letters, etc.

## SHIP-LETTERS, ETC.

Letters intended to be sent by private ship must be so addressed—"By Private Ship,"—and if by a particular vessel, the name of the ship must be added, but no letters are forwarded to New York by private ship. The ship postage—To the Continent of EUROPE, Azores, Madeira, British Possessions in North America and United States, is 2½d. per ¼ oz.; British West Indies (except Demerara, Jamaica, and Trinidad), 3d. per ¼ oz.; St Helena, 4d. per ¼ oz.; to all other places, 6d. per ½ oz. or part thereof. Letters may be sent unpaid to the countries named above, and to Cape of Good Hope, Falkland Islands, Gambia, Gold Coast, India, Lagos, and Sierra Leone, and if so sent are charged an additional rate; and to Cape de Verds, Bermuda, Ceylon, Demerara, Hong Kong, Jamaica, Mauritius, and Trinidad, an additional half-rate per ¼ oz.: to all countries not named prepayment is compul-

sory. Unpaid letters inward are charged in the same manner as unpaid letters outward. Newspapers by private ship must be prepaid 2d. each per 4 oz. Book packets and packets of patterns must be prepaid the Mail Packet rates of postage.

LETTERS for non-commissioned officers, bandmasters, army schoolmasters (if not superintendents of schoolmasters, or schoolmasters of the 1st class), schoolmistresses, private soldiers, or seamen belonging to H.M. ships, whether serving on sea or on land, either in a British possession or foreign country, as also enrolled pensioners in Canada, can be sent and received, under ½ oz., by direct packet or vessel of war for a postage of 1d.; but if any such letters have to pass through a foreign country, they are subject in addition to the foreign rate.

PASSED IN THE SESSION OF PARLIAMENT 40TH AND 41ST VICTORIA, WITH  
ABSTRACTS OF THE PRINCIPAL ENACTMENTS.\*

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**PUBLICANS' CERTIFICATES AMEND-  
MENT ACT.**

*CHAP. 3. To amend the Publicans' Certificates (Scotland) Act, 1876. March 23, 1877.*

(1.) Short title: "The Publicans' Certificates (Scotland) Act, 1876, Amendment Act, 1877." (2.) Repeals subsection 1 of section 7 of the recited Act which provided for the election of county licensing committees in August 1876, and each subsequent year at the April quarter sessions, and in place thereof it enacts that such yearly elections shall take place at the quarter sessions to be held in March annually, excepting the year 1877. (3.) Continues every county licensing com-

mittee already appointed till another committee is appointed at the meeting of quarter sessions in March 1878.

**CUSTOMS AND INLAND REVENUE  
(DUTIES ON OFFICES AND PENSIONS).**

*CHAP. 10. To continue the Charge heretofore payable on certain Offices Annuities, Pensions, and Allowances. May 17, 1877.*

Continues the duties of 1s. 6d. and 4s. per £1, payable on certain pensions and other allowances charged on public revenue (where not directed to be assessed by the Commissioners of Land-tax) under the Acts 7 Geo. I. stat. 1, c. 27; 49 Geo. III. c. 32; 6 Geo. IV. c. 9; 6 and 7 Wm. IV. c. 97.

\* The abstracts have been made on the principle of abridging very considerably such provisions as regulate the conduct of official persons, who may be presumed to look for information to the Acts themselves; while those laws which affect the public in general have been abstracted with much anxiety to give a distinct though brief view of their application. The chapters affecting the appropriation of the revenue, and diplomatic matters, as well as the Mutiny and other annual Acts, though they may be said to apply to the inhabitants of Scotland as much as to the other citizens of the empire, are, for obvious reasons, omitted. The numbers within parentheses refer to the sections of the Acts.

## JUDGES—RATES.

*CHAP. 11. To make Provision with respect to judicial Proceedings in certain Cases relating to Rating May 17, 1877.*

(1.) No judge shall be incapable of acting in his judicial office in any proceeding by reason of his being one of several ratepayers, or as one of any other class of persons liable in common with others to contribute or to be benefited by any rate which may be increased, or diminished, or affected by such proceeding. (2.) Acts of judges before the Act not to be invalidated on this ground. (3.) *Interpretation Clause:* "Judge" means "As to Scotland, any judge of the High Court of Session;" "Rate" means any rate, tax, duty, or assessment, whether public, general, or local, and also any fund formed from the proceeds of any such rate, etc., or applicable to the same or like purposes.

## CUSTOMS, INLAND REVENUE, AND SAVINGS BANKS.

*CHAP. 13. To grant certain Duties of Customs and Inland Revenue, and to amend the Laws relating to Customs, Inland Revenue, and Savings Banks. June 11, 1877.*

(1.) Short title: "The Customs, Inland Revenue, and Savings Banks Act, 1877."

**PART I. Customs.**—(2.) Tea duty to be 6d. per lb. from 1st August 1877 to 1st August 1878. (3.) The provisions of sec. 102 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, which prohibits warehoused or drawback goods to be shipped for exportation on Sundays or holidays, except by special permission, or from any place except a legal quay, nor until entry and clearance, to apply to all other goods, except so far as relates to their entry and clearance before shipment. (4.) The time within which actions may be brought against officers of customs, contemplated in sec. 272 of the Customs Consolidation Act, 1876, extended to two months. (5.) In all informations and proceedings at the suit of the Crown under the Customs Acts, the same rule as to costs to be observed as in suits or proceedings between subject and subject.

**PART II. Taxes.**—Income-tax for

the year from 6th April 1877 to be 3d. for every 20s. of annual value or profits under schedules A, C, D, or E. For every 20s. of annual value of the occupation of lands, etc. under schedule B, in England one penny halfpenny, and in Scotland and Ireland one penny farthing. (7.) Provisions of Income-tax Acts to apply to sec. 32 of 5 and 6 Vict. c. 35, and sec. 6 of 23 and 24 Vict. c. 14, revived and to apply. Provisions of Income-tax Acts to apply for succeeding year. (9.) With respect to the assessment of income-tax under schedules A and B, and of the inhabited house duties for the year 1877-8, the following provisions to have effect:—1. The inspectors or surveyors of taxes to be the assessors, and in lieu of the poundage granted to be divided between the assessors and collectors, there shall be paid a poundage of three halfpence to the collectors. 2. The sum charged as the annual value of any property in the assessment of income-tax for the year commenced on 6th April 1876, and the sum charged as the annual value of every inhabited house in the assessment made thereon for the same year, shall be taken as the annual value for the duties granted by this Act.

**PART III. Excise.**—(10.) Refers to Ireland.

**PART IV. Stamps.**—(12.) After 1st October 1877, all inventories of personal or movable estate of deceased persons exhibited and recorded in Scotland, to be transmitted with the oaths by the commissary-clerks or sheriff-clerks as often as required to the controller of legacy and succession duties in Edinburgh, in place of the solicitor of inland revenue, and all inventories to be lodged in conformity with the Act 23 and 24 Vict. c. 80, to be lodged with the controller instead of the solicitor, and the said solicitor to transmit to the controller inventories which have been filed. (13.) Duties on appointments to benefices, under 33 and 34 Vict. c. 97, abolished.

**PART V. Savings Banks.**—(14.) Payment to be made into Exchequer of surplus interest from Post-Office Savings Bank Fund. (15.) When the account of the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt shows that in the year for which the account has been made up, the interest accrued from the securi-

ties standing in their names to the credit of the fund for the bank for savings exceeded the interest paid and credited to the trustees of savings banks, together with a sum to be determined by the Treasury to provide against depreciation in the value of the securities, the surplus to be paid into Exchequer. (16.) Contains a similar enactment in regard to the fund for Friendly Societies. (17.) The said Commissioners annually to make out accounts of interest accrued, and interest paid and credited in respect of Post-Office Savings Banks Funds, Funds for Banks of Savings, and Fund for Friendly Societies. These accounts to be paid before 30th April each year, or if Parliament is not sitting, within one week after the next meeting of Parliament. The accounts for the Post-Office Savings Banks for the year ending 31st December 1876, and the other accounts for the year ending 20th November 1876, to be laid before Parliament within one month after the passing of the Act.

#### REMOVAL OF WRECKS.

*CHAP. 16. To Facilitate the Removal of Wrecks obstructing Navigation.*  
June 28, 1877.

(1.) Short title: "Removal of Wrecks Act, 1877." (2.) Act not to apply to Her Majesty's ships. (3.) Interpretation clause: "Harbour" to include harbours natural or artificial, estuaries, navigable rivers, piers, jetties, and other works in which ships can obtain shelter, or ship and unship goods or passengers. "Tidal water" means any part of the sea, and any part of a river within the ebb and flow of the tide at ordinary spring tides, not being a harbour. "Harbour authority" includes all persons having the power of constructing, improving, managing, regulating, maintaining, or lighting a harbour. "Conservancy authority" includes all persons having the duty or power of conserving, maintaining, or improving the navigation of a tidal water. "General lighthouse authority" to have the same meaning as in the Merchant Shipping Act, 1854. (4.) Where any vessel is sunk, stranded, or abandoned in any harbour or tidal water under the jurisdiction of a harbour or conservancy authority, or in or near any approach

thereto, so as to be, or likely to become, an obstruction or danger to navigation, the authority may take possession, remove or destroy the whole or any part of the vessel, and may light or buoy the same till removal, and may sell in such manner as they think fit any vessel or part so raised, and any other property recovered in the exercise of their powers under the Act, and reimburse themselves for expenses, and hold the surplus on trust for the persons entitled thereto—*Provided*—1 (Except in the case of perishable property, or which would deteriorate in value by delay), a sale shall not take place till after seven clear days' notice in a local newspaper; and 2, At any time before a sale the owner shall be entitled to delivery on payment to the authority of the fair market value, to be ascertained by agreement between the authority and the owner, or failing such agreement, by some person to be named by the Board of Trade, and the sum paid to be deemed to be the proceeds of a sale. (5.) When any vessel is sunk, stranded, or abandoned in any fairway or on the seashore in the United Kingdom, the Channel Islands, or the Isle of Man, or any of the adjacent seas or islands, and there is not any harbour or conservancy authority having power to remove, the general lighthouse authority for that part of the United Kingdom in or near which the vessel is situate shall have the powers. All expenses incurred by the general lighthouse authority not reimbursed to be paid out of the Mercantile Marine Fund. (6.) The powers of removal to extend to tackle, equipments, cargo, etc., as if included in the term vessel, and the proceeds of vessel, cargo, etc., to be regarded as a common fund. (7.) Any questions between a harbour or conservancy authority on the one hand, and a general lighthouse authority on the other, as to their respective powers in relation to any place being in or near an approach to a harbour or tidal water, to be referred to the Board of Trade, whose decision to be final. (8.) The powers given by the Act to be in addition to any other powers for the like object.

GENERAL POLICE ACT, 1862, AMENDMENT.

*CHAP. 22. To Amend the General*

*Police and Improvement (Scotland) Act, 1862. July 12, 1877.*

(1.) Short title: "The General Police and Improvement (Scotland) Act, 1862, Amendment Act, 1877." (2.) Act to be construed with the Act of 1862 and Amendment Act. (3.) "Court of Session" and "Court" to mean either Division, or, in vacation, Lord Ordinary on Bills. (4.) When in any burgh, the boundaries of which have been determined in terms of the Act of 1862, it has either before or after the passing of this Act, from a failure to observe any of the provisions of the Act of 1862, or from any other cause, been found impossible to proceed with the adoption or carrying out, as the case may be, of the Act of 1862, the following provisions shall have effect:—1. It shall be lawful for seven householders within the burgh to present a petition to the Court of Session, setting forth the failure or other cause, and praying the Court to pronounce an order in terms of this Act. 2. The petition to be intimated in the *Edinburgh Gazette* in such manner as the Court may appoint. 3. Court may, on considering evidence, pronounce any order which, in their opinion, will enable the proceedings for the adoption or carrying out of the Act of 1862 to be continued as nearly as possible as if the said failure or other cause had not taken place, and such order shall be final, and shall be recorded in the Sheriff Court books of the county. 4. As soon as any directions in the order have been complied with, the proceedings for adoption or carrying out of the Act may proceed as nearly as possible as if there had been no failure or other cause. 5. The Court may pronounce any order as to expenses of the petition and proceedings following thereon, and as to the persons or assessments against which the same shall be chargeable. Such order shall be final. (5.) Sec. 14 of the Act of 1862 to be read as if for the words "two years" therein the words "one year" were substituted.

## COMPANIES ACTS AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 26. *To amend the Companies Acts of 1862 and 1867. July 23, 1877.*

Preamble: The Act passed to re-

move doubts whether the power given by the Companies Act, 1867, to a company of reducing its capital extends to paid-up capital.

(1.) Short title: "Companies Act, 1877." (2.) The Act, so far as consistent with its tenor, to be construed as one with the Acts of 1862 and 1867. The Acts may be referred to as "The Companies Acts, 1862, 1867, and 1877." (3.) The word "capital," as used in the Companies Act, 1867, shall include paid-up capital; and the power to reduce capital shall include a power to cancel any lost capital or any capital unrepresented by available assets, or to pay off any capital which may be in excess of the wants of the company; and paid-up capital may be reduced either with or without extinguishing or reducing the liability (if any) remaining on the shares of the company, and to the extent to which such liability is not extinguished or reduced, it shall be deemed to be preserved, notwithstanding anything in the Companies Act, 1867. (4.) The provisions of the Act of 1867, as amended by this Act, shall apply to any company reducing its capital in pursuance of this Act, and of the Companies Act as amended by this Act: Provided that the reduction of capital does not involve either the diminution of any liability in respect of unpaid capital or the payment to any shareholder of any paid-up capital. 1. The creditors of the company shall not, unless the Court otherwise direct, be entitled to object, or required to consent to the reduction. 2. It shall not be necessary before presenting the petition for confirming the reduction to add, and the Court, if it thinks it expedient, may dispense altogether with the addition of the words "and reduced" as mentioned in the Act of 1867.

In any case the Court may require the company to publish the reasons for reduction, or such other information as the Court may think expedient, to give proper information to the public in relation to the reduction of the company's capital, or the causes which led to it.

The minute required to be registered in the case of reduction of capital shall show, in addition to the other particulars required, the amount (if any) at the date of registration of the minute proposed to be

deemed to have been paid up on each share.

(5.) Any company limited by shares may so far modify the conditions in its memorandum of association, if authorized to do so by its regulations as originally framed or as altered by special resolution, as to reduce its capital by cancelling any shares which at the date have not been taken or agreed to be taken by any person, and the provisions of the Act of 1867 shall not apply to any reduction of capital made under this section. (6.) Any certificate of the incorporation of any company given by the registrar, or by any assistant registrar, to be received in evidence as if it were the original certificate; and any copy of, or extract from, any of the documents kept and registered at any of the offices for the registration of joint-stock companies in England, Scotland, or Ireland, if duly certified by the registrar or an assistant registrar, shall, in all legal proceedings, civil or criminal, and in all cases whatsoever, be received in evidence as of equal validity with the original document.

GAME LAWS.

CHAP. 28. *To amend the Laws relating to Game in Scotland.* August 2, 1877.

(1.) Short title: "The Game Laws Amendment (Scotland) Act, 1877." (2.) Act to come into operation on 1st January 1878. (3.) Interpretation clause: 1. The word "lessor" to mean the granter of any lease of land for any term not less than two years. 2. The word "lessee" to mean the grantee in leases for two years and upwards. 3. "Sheriff" to include Sheriff-substitute. 4. "Game" to include all the animals included in the Game Acts or any of them. 5. "Crops" to include grass, whether intended for hay or pasture, except where grown upon moorlands. (4.) Where under any lease made after the commencement of the Act, or by presumption of common law under any such lease, the lessor shall retain the sole right of hunting, killing, or taking rabbits, hares, or other game; the lessee shall be entitled to compensation for the damage done to his crops in each year, in excess of such sum as may be set forth in the lease as the annual damage, for

which it is agreed that no compensation shall be due, and if no such sum shall be set forth in the lease then in excess of 40s. During the currency of any lease, the parties may from time to time, by agreement in writing, increase or diminish the estimated sum. (5.) In the event of the lessee being of opinion that the damage done to his crops in any one year (such year being reckoned from Whitsunday to Whitsunday) has exceeded the estimated sum or 40s., he shall intimate his opinion to the lessor in writing, stating at the same time that it is his intention, failing agreement as to the amount of such excess of damage, or a reference to arbiters, to take steps to recover the amount in the form provided by this Act. (6.) When a lessor or lessee agree in writing to refer a claim of damage to arbitration, or have agreed to do so in any lease made after "the passing of this Act," the following provisions shall have effect:—1. Either party having in writing named an arbiter, and given notice to the other party, and called on him to name an arbiter, and the other party having for fourteen days after such call failed to comply therewith in writing, the arbiter named may settle the claim as if appointed by both, and his award shall be final. The office of every such arbiter to endure until the Whitsunday next after the date of his appointment, and thereafter until he shall have given his award with reference to all claims for any damage during the year ended at the same term. 2. Where two arbiters are named by the parties, the arbiters, before proceeding to arbitrate, to name an oversman in writing. 3. The reference, the claim, the nomination of an arbiter or oversman, and the award, may be validly made by any writing, however informal, admitted or proved to be genuine. 4. No proceedings under this section shall be void for want of form. In an arbitration, the course of procedure and the inquiry shall be such as the person or persons acting therein shall direct, and the award shall be final, and though informal, may be enforced by action in any court of law. 5. Any notice under this section to be in writing, and may be served personally or by leaving it for the person at his last known place of abode in Scotland, or by sending

it by post in a registered letter addressed to him there. If sent by post, to be deemed to have been served at the time when the letter would be delivered in ordinary course; and it shall be sufficient to prove that the letter was properly addressed and posted, and that it contained the notice. (7.) With regard to actions for recovery of damages, the following provisions shall have effect:—1. No such action at the instance of a lessee against a lessor shall be competent unless the lessee shall have given notice in writing of his intention to bring the same in the case of damage to growing crop, except grass for pasture, at least three weeks before the crop is reaped or raised, and in the case of damage to crop reaped or raised at least one week before it is removed from the land, and in the case of damage to pasture at least fourteen days before any person to be called as a witness by the lessee to value the damage shall inspect the crop. 2. Any such action may be brought in the Sheriff's Small Debt Court of the county within which the lands or any part are situate, provided the sum sued for shall not exceed £50, exclusive of expenses, and all the provisions of the Small Debt Acts shall apply, provided that the Sheriff-substitute shall, whenever required to do so by either party, take and record the evidence, in which case an appeal shall lie to the Sheriff, whose judgment shall be final. 3. Where the amount sued for exceeds £50, the action to be brought in the ordinary Sheriff Court. (8.) After the commencement of the Act, any lessee in the actual occupation of lands, and having the right of killing hares thereon, by himself, or by any person directed or authorized by him in writing, according to the form in Schedule II. annexed, or to the like effect, may kill hares upon such land without a game certificate. (9.) Provided that no lessee shall be authorized to grant or continue authority to kill hares to more than one person at the same time upon the land occupied by him in any one parish. The lessee to intimate to the lessor, or to his factor, or to any one to whom he may have instructed the lessee to transmit such intimation, the name of the person so authorized. (10.) Prosecutions under the Game Acts to be subject to the following provi-

sions:—1. Any prosecution at present competent before the Sheriff or the Justices of the Peace for the county shall, after the passing of this Act, be competent only before the Sheriff. 2. Any prosecution at present competent only before the Justices of the Peace for the county shall be competent only before the Sheriff; and all forms, procedure, and provisions applicable to prosecutions before the Justices to apply to prosecutions before the Sheriff. 3. In counties where there is more than one Sheriff-substitute, prosecutions to be brought before the Sheriff-substitute of the district where the offence is alleged to have been committed, or before the Sheriff sitting in that Court. 4. Offences now cognisable only by the Court of Justiciary to be prosecuted only before that Court. (11.) Any person who has been or shall be prosecuted for any act constituting an offence under any Game Act, shall not be liable to be prosecuted for the same act as constituting an offence under any other Game Act; provided that nothing in this section shall apply to any prosecution under any Act relating to Inland Revenue. (12.) The Act not to affect any lease of land, or any lease or agreement about game existing at the date of the Act.

#### MARRIED WOMEN'S PROPERTY.

CHAP. 29. *For the protection of the Property of Married Women in Scotland.* August 2, 1877.

(1.) Act to commence on January 1, 1878. (2.) To extend to Scotland only. (3.) The *jus mariti* and right of administration of the husband

shall be excluded from the wages and earnings of any married woman, acquired or gained by her after the commencement of this Act, in any employment or trade in which she is engaged, or in any business which she carries on under her own name; and shall also be excluded from any money or property acquired by her after the commencement of the Act, through the exercise of any literary, artistic, or scientific skill; and such wages, earnings, money or property, and all investments thereof, and her receipts, shall be a good discharge for such money, property, or investments. (4.) In any marriage, after the commencement of this Act, the liability of the husband for the antenuptial debts of his wife to be limited to the value of any property he shall have received through his wife at, before, or subsequent to the marriage; and any court in which a husband shall be sued for such debt shall have power to direct any inquiry it may think proper to ascertain the nature, amount, and value of such property. (5.) The Act not to affect rights conferred on a married woman by the Conjugal Rights Amendment Acts, 1861 and 1874. (6.) Short title: "The Married Women's Property (Scotland) Act, 1877."

REGISTRATION OF LEASES.

CHAP. 36. *To amend the Registration of Leases (Scotland) Act, 1857.* August 6, 1877.

(1.) Sec. 19 of the Act 20 and 21 Vict. c. 26, anent the registration of long leases, to be read as if the word "commissary" occurred therein immediately after the word Sheriff. (2.) Nothing in this Act to affect the Act 49 Geo. III. c. 42, for the better regulating of the public records.

TRADE MARKS.

CHAP. 37. *To extend the time for the registration of Trade Marks in so far as relates to Trade Marks used in Textile Industries.* August 6, 1877.

Whereas, by reason of the difficulties attending the registration of trade marks used in the textile industries, it has been found impossible to complete the registration of such trade marks within the time specified in sec. 1 of the Trade Marks Regis-

tration Amendment Act, 1876; Be it enacted, (1.) In so far as relates to the registration of trade marks used in the textile industries, the time to be extended from 1st July 1877 to 1st January 1878, or such further time as Her Majesty by Order in Council may determine. (2.) "Trade marks used in the textile industries" means the trade marks relating to goods comprised in classes 23 to 35, both inclusive, of Schedule I. to the Rules under the Trade Marks Registration Acts, 1875-76, dated September 1876.

BOARD OF EDUCATION CONTINUANCE.

CHAP. 38. *To continue for one year the Board of Education in Scotland.* August 6, 1877.

(1.) The Board of Education in Scotland to endure with all its powers until August 6, 1878. (2.) This Act to be read and construed together with the Education Act, 1872, 35 and 36 Vict. c. 62.

FACTORS ACTS AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 39. *To amend the Factors Acts.*

Preamble sets forth that it is expedient to remove doubts, and to amend the Factors Acts for the better security of persons buying or making advances on goods, or documents of title to goods, in the usual and ordinary course of mercantile business. (1.) In this Act the expression "the principal Acts" means the following Acts: 4 Geo. IV. (1823), c. 83; 6 Geo. IV. (1825) c. 94; 5 and 6 Vict. (1842), c. 39; and the said Acts and this Act may be cited as the Factors Acts, 1823 to 1877. (2.) Where any agent or person has been entrusted with, and continues in, the possession of any goods or documents of title to goods within the meaning of the principal Acts as amended by this Act, any revocation of his entrustment or agency shall not prejudice or affect the title or rights of any other person who, without notice of such revocation, purchases such goods, or makes advances upon the faith or security of such goods or documents. (3.) Where any goods have been sold, and the vendor, or any person on his behalf, continues, or is in possession of the documents of title thereto, any sale, pledge, or other disposition of the goods or

documents made by such vendor, or any person or agent entrusted by the vendor with the goods or documents, within the meaning of the principal Acts as amended by this Act, so continuing or being in possession, shall be as valid as if such agent or person were an agent or person entrusted by the vendee, provided the person to whom the sale, pledge, or other disposition is made, has not notice that the goods have been previously sold. (4.) Where any goods have been sold or contracted to be sold, and the vendee, or any person on his behalf, obtains possession of the documents of title from the vendor or his agents, any sale, pledge, or disposition of such goods or documents by such vendee so in possession, or by any other person or agent entrusted by the vendee with the documents within the meaning of the Acts, shall be as valid and effectual as if such vendee or other person were an agent or person entrusted by the vendor with the documents within the meaning of the Acts, provided the person to whom the sale, etc., is made, has not notice of any lien or other right of the vendor in respect of the goods. (5.) Where any document of title has been lawfully endorsed, or otherwise transferred, to any person as a vendee or owner of the goods, and such person transfers such document by endorsement (or by delivery when the document is by custom or by its express terms transferable by delivery, or makes the goods deliverable to the bearer) to a person who takes the same *bona fide* and for valuable consideration. The last-mentioned transfer shall have the same effect for defeating any vendor's lien or right of stoppage *in transitu* as the transfer of a bill of lading has for defeating the right of stoppage *in transitu*. (6.) This Act shall apply only to acts done and rights acquired after the passing of this Act.

#### REGISTERED WRITS EXECUTION.

CHAP. 40. *To amend the form of Warrant of Execution on certain extracts of Writs registered in the books of Council and Session, and Sheriff Court books in Scotland; and to provide for the authentication of certain extracts of Writs.* August 10, 1877.

(1.) In all extracts of writs which

contain a clause of registration for preservation and execution, registered in the register of deeds and probative writs and protests in the books of Council and Session, the keeper shall insert a warrant for execution in the form in schedule annexed to the Act. The warrant for execution inserted in the extracts of all protests of bills, promissory notes, or voucher notes or certificates of judgment registered for execution under the Judgments Act, 1868, shall be as nearly as may be in the form of the said schedule.

(2.) In all extracts of writs containing a clause of registration for preservation and execution registered in the Sheriff Court books, and in all extracts of protests of bills, notes, or bankers' notes registered in the Sheriff Court books, the Sheriff-clerk shall insert a warrant of execution in the form in said schedule. (3.) It shall be lawful by virtue of the warrant inserted in any extract under sec. 1 and 2 to arrest the readiest goods, debts, etc., of the debtor or obligant in payment and satisfaction; also, to charge the debtor or obligant to pay or perform within the appropriate days of charge, under the pain of poinding and imprisonment, so far as competent, the terms of payment or implement being first come and bygone, and if he fail to obey, then, so far as competent, to apprise, poind, and distrain, and if necessary for effecting said poinding, to open shut and lock-fast places.

(4.) It shall not be competent to challenge the validity of extracts of writs or of protests of bills, etc., or of certificates of judgment registered as aforesaid, containing warrants of execution, and issued prior to the commencement of this Act from the offices of the Register of Deeds, Probative Writs, and Protests, in the books of Council and Session or Sheriff-clerks, on the ground that the forms of such warrants are not conform to the Act 1 and 2 Vict. c. 114. (5.) Extracts of writs registered in the books of Council and Session shall be equivalent to the registered writs themselves, except where any writ shall be offered to be improved, and such extracts shall be signed on the last page by the keeper or assistant-keeper; and extracts of writs registered in and issued from the office of the General Registrar of Sasines shall be signed on last page

by the keeper, or by a deputy duly commissioned by him to that effect. Each sheet of all such extracts shall be impressed by an office seal or stamp. Marginal additions to be authenticated by the signature of the officer certifying. (6.) Where any writ containing a procuratory or clause of registration for preservation and execution shall have been registered in the General Register of Sasines upon a warrant of registration for preservation, but not for execution, it shall be competent to present for registration an extract of such registered writ, having a warrant of registration written thereon, bearing that such extract is to be registered for preservation and execution, and a warrant and an extract may be issued with warrant of execution in terms of schedule B annexed to the Land Registers (Scotland) Act, 1868, and every such warrant of execution shall have all the like force and effect as any warrant of execution issued in terms of sec. 12 of said Act. (7.) After transmission of volumes of records of books of Council and Session to the Lord Clerk Register, the deputy-keeper of records may issue extracts of deeds recorded in such volumes. (8.) Act to take effect from October 1, 1877.

FISHERIES (OYSTERS, CRABS, AND LOBSTERS).

CHAP. 42. *To amend the Law relating to the Fisheries of Oysters, Crabs, and Lobsters, and other Sea Fisheries.* August 10, 1877.

(1.) Short title: Fisheries (Oyster, Crab, and Lobster Act), 1877. (2.) Act to commence September 1, 1877.

PART I. *Oysters.*—(3.) This part of the Act not to apply to Ireland, or to any oyster bed or bank within the jurisdiction of the Inspectors of Irish Fisheries. (4.) A person shall not sell, expose for sale, consign for sale, or buy for sale: 1. Any oysters known at the passing of this Act in the oyster trade as "deep-sea oysters," between June 15 and August 4 in any year; or 2. Any other description of oysters between May 14 and August 4. Every person contravening to be liable to a fine not exceeding £2 for first offence, and £10 for the second or any subsequent offence, and to forfeit the oysters.

Provided that a person shall not be guilty of an offence if he satisfies the Court that the oysters, 1, were taken from the waters of some foreign state; or, 2, were preserved in tins or otherwise cured; or, 3, were intended for the purpose of oyster cultivation within the same district in which the oysters were taken, or were taken from any place for cultivation with the sanction of the Board of Trade. The Thames estuary, bounded by a line drawn from Oxford Ness to the North Foreland, shall be deemed to be a district, and also any other area for the time being constituted a district for the purposes of this section by a Lord of the Board of Trade, and also where the place at which the oysters are taken is not within any such district, so much of the area within ten miles of the place where the oysters are taken as is not included in any such district; and the Board of Trade may from time to time make and alter orders for this purpose. (5.) Power to Board of Trade, on local application, to prohibit, during a limited period, not exceeding one year, either entirely, or subject to exceptions and regulations, the dredging for and taking of oysters on any oyster bank. Board may provide for enforcing the order by fines not exceeding £20 for each offence. Board of Trade may from time to time renew, for a period not exceeding one year, such orders, and may at any time revoke the same. Nothing in such order to apply to a several right of fishery in any oyster bed or bank which shall be the subject of a grant or regulation order under Part III. of the "Sea Fisheries Act, 1868," or any Acts amending the same. (6.) An application to the Board of Trade for an order may be made by any persons appearing to the Board of Trade to represent the fishermen of any locality, or by any of the following authorities, if they appear to be locally interested in the fisheries, viz.:—1. The justices of a county and quarter sessions. 2. A town council, or other urban sanitary authority. 3. A rural sanitary authority; and, 4. Any body corporate, persons or person being, or claiming to be, proprietors of or entrusted with the duty of improving, managing, maintaining, or regulating any harbour. (7.) Where an order of the Board of Trade under Part III. of the

"Sea Fisheries Act, 1868," either is limited to the grant of a right of fisheries for a period not exceeding 21 years over an area not exceeding five acres, or amends a previous order, without extending the area to which that order applies, and a petition against the order by any local authority or persons affected thereby is not within one month after the first publication of the order received by the Board of Trade, or, if received, is withdrawn, the Board may, if they think fit, submit the scheme to Her Majesty in Council, and, if confirmed, it shall have full operation, as if confirmed by Parliament; provided that Her Majesty in Council may at any time, on the representation of the Board, cancel the order, and the grantee shall not be entitled to any compensation.

**PART II. Crabs and Lobsters.—(8.)** A person shall not take, have in his possession, sell, expose for sale, consign for sale, or buy for sale:—1. Any edible crab which measures less than four inches and a quarter across the broadest part of the back; or, 2. Any edible crab carrying any spawn attached to the tail, or other exterior part of the crab, whether known as "berried crab," "seed crab," "spawn crab," or "sea crab," or by any other name; or, 3. Any edible crab that has recently cast its shell, whether known as "caster," "white crab," "white-footed crab," "white-livered crab," "soft crab," "glass crab," or by any other name. Every person contravening to be liable to a fine not exceeding £2 for the first offence, £10 for every subsequent offence, and to forfeit the crabs. Provided that a person shall not be guilty if he satisfies the Court that the edible crabs were intended for bait. (9.) A person shall not take, have in his possession, sell, expose for sale, consign for sale, any lobster which measures less than eight inches from the tip of the beak to the end of the tail, when spread as far as possible flat. Penalties and forfeiture as in sec. 8. (10.) Board of Trade may by order restrict or prohibit entirely, or subject to regulations, the taking of edible crabs or lobsters within the area named in the order during such period of years, or during such period either in every year, or in such number of years as may be limited by the order, and may, by the order,

provide for enforcing by fines not exceeding £20. The Board may from time to time vary or revoke such orders; nothing in such order to apply to a several right of fishery.

**PART III. Supplemental.—(11.)** All offences against the Act or orders may be prosecuted, and fines recovered on summary conviction before a court of summary jurisdiction, in manner provided by the Summary Jurisdiction Acts. For all purposes of execution, and incidental to the jurisdiction of any court, or of any constable, the offence shall be deemed to have been committed either in the place in which it was committed, or in any place in which the offender may, for the time being, be found. (12.) Oysters, crabs, and lobsters prohibited may be searched for, seized, condemned, destroyed, and disposed of by any authority lawfully acting under any Act, as if such oysters, etc., were found to be unfit for the food of man. (13.) Interpretation clause: "Summary Jurisdiction Acts" means, . . . 2. as regards Scotland, "The Summary Procedure Act, 1864." Court of Summary Jurisdiction means, . . . 6. as regards Scotland, the Sheriff, or his substitute. The expression "person" includes a body corporate. (15.) Temporary revival of 6 and 7 Vict. c. 79, intituled "An Act to carry into effect a Convention between Her Majesty and the King of the French concerning the Fisheries in the Sea between the British Islands and France," so far as regards French fishermen and French sea-fishing boats.

*CHAP. 44. To make Provision respecting the Superannuation Allowance of Officers whose Salaries were formerly payable out of the Mercantile Marine Fund, August 10, 1877.*

#### SHERIFF COURTS.

*CHAP. 50. To Amend the Law in regard to the appointment of Sheriff's-substitute, Procurators-fiscal in Scotland; to extend the jurisdiction of and amend the procedure in the Sheriff Courts of Scotland, and for certain other purposes connected therewith. August 14, 1877.*

(1.) Short title: "Sheriff Courts (Scotland) Act, 1877." (2.) Act to commence Oct. 1, 1877. From after

the passing of this Act the right of appointing to the salaried office of Sheriff-substitute heretofore belonging to Sheriffs to be transferred to Her Majesty on the recommendation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. (4.) Sec. 9 of the Act 6 Geo. IV. c. 23 repealed from and after the passing of this Act. No person to be appointed to the office of salaried Sheriff-substitute who shall not be an advocate or a law-agent within the meaning of the Act 36 and 37 Vict. c. 63, provided that such advocate or law-agent shall not be of less than five years' standing. (5.) Salaried Sheriffs-substitute and Procurators-fiscal not to be removable from office except by one of the Principal Secretaries of State for inability or misbehaviour upon a report by the Lord President of the Court of Session and the Lord Justice-Clerk. (6.) Appointments of Procurators-fiscal to be made by the Sheriff, with the approval of one of the Principal Secretaries of State. Procurators-fiscal (except as after provided) not to be removable from office except in the manner provided by sec. 5: Provided that no appointment of a Procurator-fiscal shall fall by reason of the Sheriff ceasing to hold office. The appointment of any person to act as Procurator-fiscal *ad interim* or in the absence of the Procurator-fiscal in any Sheriff Court, to cease after the commencement of this Act. (7.) Except as hereinbefore provided, no Sheriff shall have power to appoint any person to perform the duties of Procurator-fiscal, but it shall be lawful for a Procurator-fiscal, with the leave of the Lord Advocate and Sheriff expressed in writing, to grant a deputation to one or more persons to be named in such writing, for whose actings he shall be responsible, to sign writs, to appear in court, and to conduct prosecutions and inquiries in his name. In the event of vacancy in the office of Procurator-fiscal, any depute or deputies appointed in terms of this section shall discharge the duties until such vacancy is filled up. (8.) The jurisdictions of Sheriffs and Sheriffs-substitute are extended to:—1. All actions (including actions of declarator, but excluding actions of adjudication, save in so far as now competent, and excluding actions of

reduction) relating to a question of heritable right or title where the value of the subject in dispute does not exceed the sum of £50 by the year or £1000 value. 2. Actions of declarator for the purpose of determining any question relating to the property in, or right of succession to, moveables where the value of the subject in dispute does not exceed the sum of £1000. 3. Actions of division of commony, and division, or division and sale, of common property where the value of the subject does not exceed £50 per year or £1000 value: Provided that the Act 1695 concerning the dividing of commonities shall for the purposes of the Act, and subject to the limitations hereof, be read as if it conferred jurisdiction upon Sheriffs and Sheriff-substitute. 4. Any action against a foreigner: Provided, 1, that such action would be competent in the Sheriff Courts against a Scotsman subject to the jurisdiction thereof; and 2, that a ship or other vessel belonging to such foreigner, or of which he is part owner or master, shall have been arrested within the sheriffdom. Actions relating to questions of heritable right or title, or to division of commonities, or division, or division and sale, of common property, raised in a Sheriff Court, shall be raised in the Sheriff Court of the county in which the property is situate, and all parties against whom any such action may be brought shall be subject in such action to the jurisdiction of the Sheriff and Sheriff-substitute, nothing herein to derogate from any jurisdiction or power now possessed by the Sheriff and Sheriff-substitute. (9.) In regard to every action brought under the preceding section in the Sheriff Court, the following provisions shall have effect:—1. If a defender shall at any time before an interlocutor closing the record is pronounced, or within six days after, lodge a note in process in the following terms—"The defender prays that the process may be transmitted to the Court of Session.

"[Signed by the Defender  
or his law-agent.]

"[Date.]"

it shall be the duty of the Sheriff-clerk forthwith to transmit the process to the Keeper of the Rolls of the First Division of the Court of Ses-

tion who shall, under the directions of the Lord President, mark on the petition the division and the Lord Ordinary before whom it shall depend, and shall transmit the process to the depute-clerk of such Lord Ordinary, and the process shall thereafter proceed as if raised in that court. 2. The Court of Session, or either Division, or any Lord Ordinary, if of opinion that the action might have been properly tried in the Sheriff Court, may allow the defender who removed the action to the Court of Session, in the event of his being successful, such expenses only as they may consider he may have been entitled to in the Sheriff Court. Enactments excluding appeal to the Court of Session in respect of the value of a cause in the Sheriff Court not to apply to actions brought under the preceding section. (10.) Any question as to the value of the subject in dispute in any action brought in the Sheriff Court under this Act to be determined by the Sheriff or Sheriff-substitute after inquiry (in such way as he may think expedient), and his determination to be final as regards the competency of bringing the action in the Sheriff Court. If it appears to the Sheriff or Sheriff-substitute that the value exceeds the amount specified in this Act, he may dismiss the action with or without expenses as he shall see fit, or, on the motion of the pursuer, if he shall see fit, order the sheriff-clerk to transmit the process to the Keeper of the Rolls of the First Division, who shall, as before provided, mark on the petition the Division and Lord Ordinary, and transmit the process to the depute-clerk of the Lord Ordinary, and the process shall proceed in the Court of Session. (11.) When in any action competent in the Sheriff Court a deed or writing is founded on by either party, all objections thereto may be stated by way of exception without the necessity of bringing a reduction, provided that if any objection to a liquid document of debt now maintainable only by way of reduction shall be maintained by way of exception, the objector shall find such caution or make such consignation as the Sheriff may direct. (12.) After the passing of this Act, sec. 7 of "The Bankruptcy Act, 1860," and so much of sec. 51 of

"The Lands Clauses Scotland Act, 1864," as provides for the payment of remuneration to Sheriffs and Sheriff-substitutes shall be repealed and all payments to Sheriffs and Sheriff-substitutes in respect of the discharge of their official duties, and the expenses mentioned in the last-recited section, shall cease: Provided that the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury may grant such compensation as they shall think fit in respect of the operation of this section, regard being had to the terms of the commission under which the Sheriff or Sheriff-substitute holds office, and the conditions, if any, which may have been attached to any salary or increase of salary granted to such Sheriff or Sheriff-substitute.

#### PRISONS.

*CHAP. 53. To Amend the Laws relating to Prisons in Scotland.*  
August 14, 1877.

*Preliminary.*—(1.) Short title: "The Prisons (Scotland) Act, 1877." (2.) Act to come into operation on 1st April 1878. (3.) Act not to extend to England or Ireland, but to apply in Scotland to all persons hereinafter defined.

#### PART I. TRANSFER AND ADMINISTRATION OF PRISONS.

*Transfer of Prisons.*—(4.) Expense of the maintenance of prisons to which this Act applies, to be defrayed out of moneys provided by Parliament. (5.) Prisons and their furniture and the management of prisons to be transferred to one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State. (6.) All rules for prisons in Scotland certified under the hand of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, in pursuance of "The Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860," which have not been superseded by this Act, or by rules made as after provided, shall continue to be rules for prisons in Scotland: Provided that such may be altered by writing under the hand of a Secretary of State. A copy of all rules for the time being in force shall be posted in a conspicuous place in every prison to which they relate.

#### ADMINISTRATION OF PRISONS.

*Prison Commissioners.*—(7.) For the purpose of aiding the Secretary of

State in carrying the Act into effect, Her Majesty may appoint persons (not exceeding three) to be Prison Commissioners during Her Majesty's pleasure; also the Sheriff of the county of Perth and the Crown Agent for Scotland are to be Commissioners *ex officio*. The Commissioners to be a body corporate, and to be styled "The Prison Commissioners for Scotland." The Secretary of State may appoint one of the commissioners to be chairman. Any act authorized to be done by the Prison Commissioners may be done by any one or more of them, as the Secretary of State may by general or special rule direct. (8.) The commissioners to be assisted by such number of inspectors, storekeepers, accountants, other officers and servants, as Secretary of State (with the sanction of the Treasury as to number) may direct. Inspectors to be appointed by the Secretary of State, the other officers and servants by the prison commissioners, subject to his approval. (9.) Any two of the prison commissioners may receive such salary for their services as the Secretary of State may with the consent of the Treasury determine, who shall fix also salaries to inspectors, etc. (10.) The general superintendence of such prisons vested in the prison commissioners subject to control of Secretary of State. The Secretary of State to appoint the governors, matrons, and medical officers of prisons, being medical practitioners duly registered under the Medical Act; and he shall also appoint to each prison a chaplain, being a minister or licentiate of the Church of Scotland. The prison commissioners to appoint all other officers or persons (hereinafter called subordinate officers), such appointments to be for general prison service. The commissioners shall also make contracts, and do all other acts necessary for the maintenance of the prisons and prisoners within their jurisdiction. Subject to the control of the Secretary of State, the commissioners, by themselves or their officers, shall visit and inspect the prisons, and shall examine the state of the buildings, so as to form a judgment as to repairs or additions, and shall examine into the conduct of the respective officers and the treatment and conduct of prisoners, the means of setting them to work, the amount

of their earnings, and the expenses attending the prison. (11.) Commissioners to make reports at such times as the Secretary of State may direct, and an annual report as to every prison to be laid before Parliament. (12.) Whereas it is expedient that the expense of maintaining, in prison, prisoners who have been convicted of crime, should in part be defrayed by their labour during imprisonment, and that, with a view to defraying such expenses, and also of teaching prisoners modes of gaining honest livelihoods, means should be taken for promoting in prison the exercise of, and instruction in, useful trades and manufactures, so far as may be consistent with a due regard on the one hand to the maintenance of the penal character of the prison discipline, and on the other to the avoidance of undue pressure on or competition with any particular trade or industry. Be it enacted that the annual report shall state the various manufacturing processes carried on in each of the prisons, with such particulars as to the kind and quantities of, and as to the commercial value of, the labour or the manufactures, as to the number of prisoners employed, and otherwise as may in the opinion of the Secretary of State be best calculated to afford information to Parliament. (13.) A yearly return to be made to Parliament of all punishments inflicted within each prison, and the offences for which inflicted.

*Visiting Committee.*—(14.) A visiting committee to be appointed annually for every ordinary prison under this Act, consisting of such number of persons, being Commissioners of Supply, or justices of peace of counties and magistrates of burghs, to be appointed in such manner and to be chosen at such time as the Secretary of State may from time to time by any general or special rule prescribe. The Commissioners of Supply of any county shall appoint members of a visiting committee at such general or special meeting as may be prescribed by the Secretary of State, and the magistrates of a burgh shall hold a special meeting at such time as may be prescribed by Secretary of State for the purpose of appointing any members of a visiting committee they may be required to appoint. Nothing in this Act, or in

any rules to be made under this Act, shall restrict any member of the visiting committee for any prison from visiting the prison at any time; and any such member shall at all times have free access to every part of the prison, and to every prisoner therein. (15.) The Secretary of State to make rules with respect to the duties of the visiting committee. The members of such committee shall from time to time, and at frequent intervals, visit the prison and hear any complaints which may be made to them by the prisoners, and, if asked, privately. They shall report on any abuses, and also on any repairs which may be urgently required, and shall take cognizance of any matters of pressing necessity, and do such acts and perform such duties as may be required by the Secretary of State. Visiting committee to report to the Secretary of State any matters which they consider expedient. (16.) Any sheriff or justice of peace having jurisdiction in the place where a prison is situate, or in the place where the offence in respect of which any prisoner may be confined was committed, may, when he thinks fit, enter into and examine the condition of such prison and of the prisoners; and he may enter observations in reference to the condition of the prison or abuses therein in the visitors' book, to be kept by the governor; but he shall not be entitled, in pursuance of this section, to visit any prisoner under sentence of death, or to communicate with any prisoner except in reference to his treatment in prison, or to some complaint that such prisoner may make as to such treatment.

**PART II. SUPPLEMENTAL PROVISIONS.—***As to obligation to maintain prisons.*—(17.) After April 1, 1878, obligation of any prison authority or any county or burgh to maintain or provide prisons shall cease. (18.) Where at that date any prison authority has no prison of its own, or has not a prison adequate to the accommodation of its prisoners, it shall pay into Exchequer £120 in respect of each prisoner for whom cell accommodation has not at such date been provided by such authority in a prison of its own. Any sum so payable shall be a debt by the prison authority to the Crown, and may be recovered from the county and burgh or burghs at the passing of this Act,

within the jurisdiction thereof, subject to the allocation hereinafter provided. Where one prison authority has contributed a sum toward the construction by another prison authority of cell accommodation for the prisoners of the former, and such cell accommodation has been provided, a proportionate deduction is to be allowed in assessing the former. Any such sum payable by a prison authority shall be allocated on the county and burghs within its jurisdiction in proportions to be fixed by the Secretary of State, having regard to the respective valuations. Any sum so allocated upon a county shall be a charge upon the county general assessment, and upon a burgh shall be a charge upon such municipal or police assessment, or upon the yearly proceeds of the common good and revenues of the burgh as the magistrates may determine. The Commissioners of Supply of a county, and the magistrates of a burgh, may borrow, and the Public Works Loan Commissioners may advance by way of loan, with interest at such rate per cent. as the Treasury may determine to be sufficient to prevent loss to the Exchequer, such sum as may be required, so that the whole amount so borrowed be discharged within a period not exceeding 35 years. (19.) Where, before January 1, 1877, any prison authority having more than sufficient cell accommodation has contracted with another for receiving prisoners from the latter, and has in the performance of such contract provided cell accommodation, therefor there shall be paid to the former, out of moneys provided by Parliament, any loss it may have sustained in relation to such contract through the passing of this Act, so that the expense of providing cell accommodation for any one prisoner shall not in any case be held to have exceeded £120. For the purposes of this section, any public department which has made contracts with respect to prisoners shall be included in the term "prison authority." Where a prison authority has provided more than adequate accommodation for prisoners, it shall be entitled to compensation to the extent of £120 for each additional cell above the number required for the average maximum number of prisoners maintained by such authority in its own prisons



death, or for any purpose relating thereto; and in any prison in which sentence of death is required to be carried into effect on any prisoner, the magistrates shall, for the purposes of carrying that sentence into execution, be deemed to have the same jurisdiction with respect to such prison as they would have had with respect to the prison within their burgh if this Act had not passed.

*As to Discontinuance of Prisons.*—(39.) The Secretary of State may discontinue any prison. (40.) Secretary of State may direct discontinued prison to be sold, and balance of price, after paying expenses and £120 to Exchequer in respect of each prisoner maintained by the prison authority to whom such prison originally belonged, for whom cell accommodation was provided in such discontinued prison at the time of the passing of this Act, to be paid to the Commissioners of Supply and magistrates of burghs within the jurisdiction of prison authority in proportion to valuation. The Commissioners of Supply or magistrates may purchase discontinued prison, and afterwards sell the same, provided that the price shall be in the first instance applied in extinction of any sums borrowed under this Act. Surplus may be applied as such commissioners or magistrates may think fit. Where any discontinued prison forms part of, or is immediately contiguous to, any buildings belonging to Commissioners of Supply or magistrates, they may require Secretary of State to sell the same at the advertised upset price. For this purpose such commissioners or magistrates may borrow from Public Works Loan Commissioners, at such rate of interest as Treasury may determine, sufficient to prevent loss to Exchequer, loan to be repayable within a period not exceeding 35 years. For the purposes of this section the cell accommodation provided by a prison authority in all its prisons may be calculated, and if it appears that sufficient accommodation has been provided in other prisons, no sum shall be payable under this section in respect of the discontinued prison, and a deduction shall be allowed in the event of any partial accommodation in other prisons in excess of that required.

*Status of Officers.*—(41, 42.) Posi-

tion and duties of existing officers of prisons. (43.) Superannuation of officers and abolition of offices.

*As to Miscellaneous Matters.*—(44.) A court of law having jurisdiction to sentence to imprisonment may also sentence to hard labour, either for the whole or a portion of the sentence; and the Secretary of State may make regulations in regard to carrying out sentences of hard labour, and in doing so he shall have regard to the previous convictions, the industry, and the conduct of the prisoners. (45.) Whereas it is expedient that a clear difference shall be made between the treatment of persons unconvicted of crime, and in law presumably innocent, during the period of their detention for safe custody, and the treatment of convicted prisoners; and that in order to secure the observance of such difference there shall be in every place in which prisoners are confined for safe custody only, special rules regulating their confinement in such manner as to make it as little as possible oppressive, due regard only being had to their safe custody, to the necessity of preserving order and good government in the place, and to the physical and moral well-being of the prisoners themselves; Secretary of State to make special rules: 1. With respect to the retention by a prisoner of the possession of any books or papers in his possession at the time of his arrest, and which may not be required as evidence against him, and are not reasonably suspected of forming part of property improperly acquired by him, or are not for some special reason required to be taken from him for the purposes of justice. 2. To secure to such prisoner as unrestricted and private communication between him, his solicitor, and friends as may be possible, having regard only to the necessity of preventing any tampering with evidence, and any plans for escape, or other like considerations. 3. With respect to arrangements whereby prisoners may provide themselves with articles of diet, or may be furnished with a sufficient quantity of wholesome food, and may be protected from being called upon to perform any unaccustomed tasks or offices; also any matter which the Secretary of State may think conducive to the amelioration of the condition of a prisoner who has not been

amending Act, a board, to be called the District Board of Lunacy, the number of members whereof shall be fixed by the General Board of Lunacy, who shall also fix the number of the members to be elected by the Commissioners of Supply and magistrates of burghs respectively in each county within such district as nearly as may be in proportion to their valuations. The members to be elected annually by the Commissioners of Supply and magistrates of burghs at time to be fixed by General Board of Lunacy. Vacancies by death or resignation to be filled up by the same body by whom the vacating member was elected. Such district boards shall meet at such times and places as shall be fixed by the general board from time to time, and shall have power to adjourn, and to appoint a chairman, who, in case of an equality, shall have a casting vote, and committees, to whom may be delegated all or any part of the powers by the recited Act committed to such district boards. Three shall be a quorum of a district board. (62.) When there is no district asylum, the clerk of the district board shall divide the total expenses incurred by the board between the landward part of the county and the burghs situated therein, according to the total value of lands and heritages in the valuation rolls of such county and burghs respectively, and shall transmit to the convener of the county, and the chief magistrate of each burgh, a notification of the total amount of such expenses, and of the proportion to be paid by the landward part and by each burgh. (63.) Where assessments under any Act of Parliament may be imposed, levied, and recovered in the same way as the assessments imposed and levied under the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860, such assessments may be levied in the same way and with the like powers as any other assessment which may be levied by the Commissioners of Supply within any county, or the magistrates within any burgh, upon heritages within the same as appearing on the valuation roll: provided that in a county such assessments shall be payable wholly by the owner, and that in a burgh such assessments shall be payable, one-half by the owner and one-half by the tenant or occupier, but the whole of such last-

mentioned assessments may be levied from the tenant, who, on production of a receipt by the collector, may deduct one-half from the rent. Commissioners of Supply may exempt, on the ground of poverty, owners of heritage not exceeding £2 annual value. Magistrates may exempt from the whole or any part of the assessment occupiers of heritages in burghs under the annual value of £5. In bankruptcy, assessments to be preferable to private debts. Nothing in this Act to prejudice the power of levying any assessments in any other way not affected by the repeal of certain provisions of the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860. (64.) The Lands Clauses Act, 1845 (excepting sec. 116), and amending Acts, incorporated to enable prison commissioners to acquire lands: provided that the clauses of said Acts, with respect to the acquiring of lands otherwise than by agreement, shall not be incorporated except for the purpose of acquiring lands adjoining or adjacent to a prison for the purpose of enlarging, improving, or isolating a prison. (65.) The clerk of every court, judge, sheriff, magistrate, justice of peace, or other judicial officer, by whom any warrant of imprisonment or penal servitude is pronounced, shall make a return thereof to the Prison Commissioners at such time, and in such form, and under such penalty, as the Secretary of State may determine.

*Judicial Statistics.*—(66.) The Prison Commissioners shall be the department of judicial statistics, under the Judicial Statistics (Scotland) Act, 1869. Secretary of State shall appoint a superintendent of the said department, at such salary as may be determined, with consent of the Treasury.

*Reformatories and Industrial Schools.*—(67.) The Commissioners of Supply of any county, or the magistrates of any burgh, may resolve to contribute to any reformatory or industrial school in any part of Scotland, certified under the Act 17 and 18 Vict. chap. 86, "For the better Care and Reformation of Youthful Offenders in Great Britain," or the Industrial Schools Act, 1866, or any amending Act; and on such resolution being transmitted to the Secretary of State for the Home Department, being one of H.M. Principal Secretaries of State, he shall intimate

whether he approves or not. If he approves, such commissioners or magistrates may from time to time pay over such sum as they may think fit to the directors and managers of such reformatory or industrial school, and such sum shall be a charge on the county general assessment, or on any municipal or police or other assessment of any burgh. At any time, Secretary of State, by withdrawing his approval, may stop contribution.

*Arrangement and Arbitration.*—(68.) The Secretary of State on the one hand (with the assent of the Treasury so far as any public moneys are concerned), and a prison authority on the other, may, with a view to carry the purposes of the Act into effect, compromise any matter, or settle any difference, or refer to a single arbiter any matter or difference.

*Definitions.*—(69.) Definition of "furniture and effects belonging to a prison." (70.) A "prisoner," for the purposes of this Act, means any person committed to prison for trial, safe custody, punishment, or otherwise, and the "maintenance of a prisoner" includes all expenses incurred with respect to a prisoner from the time the order for his committal is made until his death or discharge; with this proviso, that nothing in this Act shall exempt a prisoner from payment of any costs or expenses in respect of his conveyance to prison or otherwise which he would have been liable to pay if this Act had not passed. Nothing in this Act to alter the law with respect to the aliment of civil prisoners, or with respect to the powers at present possessed by the sheriff of a county or magistrates of a burgh with respect to applications and proceedings for aliment and for liberation of civil prisoners. For the purposes of this Act, sufficient accommodation for the prisoners belonging to a prison authority shall, as nearly as may be ascertained, be deemed to be the average daily number of prisoners maintained at the expense of such authority in its own prisons, or in the prison of another prison authority, during the five years preceding 1st January 1877. (71.) In the construction of this Act the word "county" shall not include county of a city. Orkney and Zetland shall be taken to be separate

counties. The northern prison district and the southern of the county of Lanark, as defined by 31 and 32 Vict., c. 50, shall be taken to be separate counties, and the duties, rights, and obligations arising under this Act shall be discharged as nearly as may be in conformity with the provisions of last-mentioned Act: provided that after the commencement of this Act no district prison board shall be elected for either prison district of the said county. "Burgh" shall include and apply to the cities, burghs, and towns which are royal burghs, or which send, or contribute as burghs to send, a member to Parliament. For the purposes of this Act, the boundaries of a burgh shall be the boundaries at the passing of this Act, for prison purposes, under the provisions of the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860. "Magistrates" shall include the magistrates and town councils of burghs. "Sheriff" shall include sheriffs-substitute. "Prison authority" shall mean a county prison board appointed in terms of the Prisons Administration Act, 1860. "Prison" shall include all legal prisons in Scotland, but shall not include military prisons, or, except as expressly provided, police cells or other places of detention. Provided that it shall include any land or building bought or contracted to be bought before the Act for the purpose of enlarging or altering a prison, but Secretary of State may direct any part of such land to be reconveyed to prison authority if not necessary at the passing of the Act. Payment from public funds may be made for any portion retained. "Ordinary prison" shall mean all legal prisons except General Prison at Perth, or any prison hereafter declared to be a general prison by Her Majesty in Council. "Civil prisoner" shall include prisoners for civil debts to subjects: prisoners for debts or taxes to the Crown, not being fines or penalties for offences; prisoners on *meditatione fugæ* warrants; prisoners *ad factum præstandum*; prisoners under the Employers and Workmen Act, 1875; and prisoners until they find caution for law-burrows. "Criminal prisoner" shall include all prisoners who are not civil prisoners. "Governor" shall mean the chief male officer of a prison. "Matron"

shall mean the chief female officer. (72.) Acts in Schedule repealed to the extent stated, but the repeal shall not affect the execution after the commencement of this Act of any of the Acts repealed by this section so far as necessary to give effect to any of the provisions of this Act. Schedule: Acts repealed, 23 and 24 Vict., c. 105 (except secs. 72 to 75); 26 and 27 Vict., c. 109, sec. 2; 27 and 28 Vict., c. 53 (The Summary Procedure Act, 1864), secs. 36 and 37; 28 and 29 Vict., c. 84, the whole Act; 32 and 33 Vict., c. 35, the whole Act.

PUBLIC LIBRARIES ACT AMENDMENT.

CHAP. 54. *To amend the Public Libraries Acts.* August 14, 1877.

The preamble sets forth that the mode of adopting the Public Libraries Acts (30 and 31 Vict. c. 37), for Ireland, England, and Scotland, by public meeting, has in many cases been found to be "a most incorrect and unsatisfactory mode, and fails to indicate the general opinion of the ratepayers," and that it is desirable to ascertain these opinions more correctly. (1.) It shall be competent for the prescribed local authority, in any place which has the power to adopt one of the Acts, to ascertain the opinions of the ratepayers, either by the prescribed public meeting or by the issue of a voting paper to each ratepayer. (2.) In addition to the simple vote "Yes" or "No" to the adoption of the Act, such voting paper may stipulate that its adoption shall be subject to a limitation to some lower rate of assessment than the maximum allowed by the Act; and such lower limit, if once adopted, shall not be altered except by public vote similarly taken. (3.) "Ratepayer" shall mean every inhabitant who would have to pay assessment if Act adopted. (4.) Short title: Public Libraries Amendment Act, 1877.

COLONIAL STOCK.

CHAP. 59. *To amend the Law with respect to the transfer of Stock forming part of the Public Debt of any Colony, and the Stamp Duty in such transfer.* August 14, 1877.

*Application of Act.*—(1.) "Where provision has been made by the legislature of a colony and otherwise, for the inscription and transfer in a

register kept in the United Kingdom by some bank, colonial officer, or person (which bank, officer, or person is in this Act referred to as the registrar) of any stock forming the whole or part of the public debt of such colony, and the Government of such colony cause a declaration under the seal of such colony, or by some person in that behalf authorized under that seal, stating such provision, and identifying the stock with respect to which it has been made, to be left with the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, those Commissioners, upon payment of the proper fee, shall record the same; and such record and declaration shall be open to inspection at all reasonable times" on payment of the proper fee. Upon such declaration being recorded, this Act shall apply to the stock specified in the declaration. (2 to 18.) Provisions as to Stamp Duty—Transfers and Dividends Register. (19.) The declaration respecting colonial stock to which this Act applies, recorded with the Commissioners of Inland Revenue, and the document containing the conditions of the issue of the stock, and every prospectus and notice inviting persons to subscribe for stock, and every stock certificate to bearer, and every coupon and dividend warrant, and every other certificate and document issued to a stockholder in relation to stock held by him, shall state that the revenues of the colony alone are liable in respect of the stock and dividends, and that the consolidated fund of the United Kingdom and the Commissioners of H. M. Treasury are not responsible. A declaration not in conformity with this section shall not be recorded, and every person publishing, or issuing, or entering in the register any such document, prospectus, notice, stock certificate, coupon, warrant, certificate, or document as aforesaid, not in conformity with this section, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding £50.

BUILDING SOCIETIES.

CHAP. 63. *To amend the Building Societies Act, 1874.* August 14, 1877.

(1.) This Act to be construed as one with "The Building Societies Act, 1874 (herein termed "the principal Act"), and the Building Societies

Act, 1875, and may be cited as "The Building Societies Act, 1877," or together with the said Acts, as "The Building Societies Acts." (2.) Any society under the principal Act may change its chief office in the manner its rules direct, or if there be no such direction, then, at a general meeting specially called for the purpose, in the manner set forth in the rules; and no alteration of rule shall be necessary upon such change, nor shall sec. 18 of the principal Act apply to such change. Notice of such change to be given by the secretary to the registrar within seven days after, and shall be registered by him. (3.) Sec. 27 of the principal Act to be read as if the word "now" were omitted therefrom. (4.) All rights of action and other rights and interests in real and personal estate whatsoever, held on trust for any society heretofore incorporated under the principal Act, shall, on the passing of this Act, vest in the society, without any conveyance or assignment thereof, except in the case of stocks and securities in the public funds of Great Britain and Ireland, and estates in copyhold or customary hereditaments, the title to which cannot be transferred without admittance. (5.) The registration of notice of the union of any societies, or of the transfer of the engagements of any society to another in terms of sec. 33 of the principal Act, shall operate as a conveyance of the uniting societies to the united society from the date of registration, except in the case of stocks in the public funds, etc., which cannot be transferred without admittance. Such union or transfer not to affect the rights of creditors of the society uniting or transferring.

#### FISHERIES (DYNAMITE).

CHAP. 65. *To prohibit the Use of Dynamite or other Explosives for the purpose of catching or destroying Fish in public Fisheries.* August 14, 1877.

(1.) Short title: "The Fisheries (Dynamite) Act, 1877." (2.) Any person who uses dynamite or other explosive substance to catch or destroy fish in a public fishery, shall be liable, on summary conviction, either to a fine not exceeding £20, or, on the discretion of the Court, to be

imprisoned, with or without hard labour, for a term not exceeding two months. 3. Any offence committed on the sea-coast, or at sea, within one marine league of the coast, shall be deemed to be committed in a public fishery; and if beyond the ordinary jurisdiction of any court of summary jurisdiction, shall be deemed either to have been committed on the land abutting on such sea-coast, or adjoining such sea, or to have been committed in any place where the offender is found, and may be tried and punished accordingly. 4. "Summary conviction" in this Act means, as to Scotland, a conviction under "The Summary Procedure Scotland, Act, 1864."

#### DESTRUCTIVE INSECTS.

CHAP. 68. *For preventing the Introduction and spreading of Insects destructive to Crops.* August 14, 1877.

(1.) The Privy Council may make orders for preventing the introduction into Great Britain of the insect designated as *Doryphora decemlineata*, and commonly called the Colorado Beetle. Any such order may prohibit or regulate the landing in Great Britain of potatoes, or of the stalks and leaves of potatoes, or other vegetable substance or other article, brought from any place out of Great Britain, the landing whereof may appear to the Privy Council likely to introduce the said insect into Great Britain, and may direct or authorize the destruction of any such article if landed. If any person lands, or attempts to land, any article in contravention of an order, such article shall be forfeited in like manner as goods prohibited by the Acts relating to Customs, and the person offending shall be liable, according to those Acts, to such penalties as are imposed on persons importing or attempting to import goods prohibited by these Acts. (2.) The Privy Council may make such orders as they think expedient for preventing the spreading in Great Britain of the said insects. And such order may direct or authorize the removal or destruction of any crop of potatoes, or other crop or substance, on which the said insect in any stage of existence is found, or to or by means of which the said insect may appear to the Privy

Council likely to spread, and the entering on lands for this purpose, or for examination, or for any other purpose of the order. Any such order may prohibit the keeping, selling, or exposing or offering for sale, or the keeping of living specimens of the said insect in any stage of existence, or the distribution, in any manner, of such specimens. Such orders may impose penalties not exceeding £10 for any offence. Penalties to be recoverable with costs, on summary conviction before two justices of the peace, and shall be applied as penalties recovered under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869. (3.) Where an order directs the removal or destruction of a crop, the Privy Council may direct or authorize payment by the local authority of compensation, and the local authority shall pay the same subject according to the following provisions:—1. In the case of a crop on which the insect in any stage of existence is found, the compensation not to exceed one-half of the value of the crop. 2. In every other case the compensation shall not exceed three-fourths of the value of the crop. 3. The value of the crop to be taken to be the value which, in ordinary circumstances, the crop would have had at the time of its removal or destruction. 4. The local authority may require the value of the crop to be ascertained by their officers or by arbitration. 5. The local authority may withhold compensation, if in relation to the crop the owner, or the person having the charge thereof, has, in their judgment, done anything in contravention of, or failed to do anything in

compliance with, any order. (4.) The local authorities under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, 1869, with their respective districts, local rates, clerks and committees, shall be in like manner local authorities for the purposes of this Act. The Privy Council may require a local authority to carry into effect any order of the Privy Council under this Act.

Expenses incurred and compensation paid by a local authority, to be paid out of the local rate.

Every local authority shall keep a record relative to proceedings under any order, stating the date of the removal or destruction of a crop, etc., and other particulars, which record shall be admitted in evidence. (5.) Every order of the Privy Council (if it relates to Scotland) shall be published in the *Edinburgh Gazette*, save that when order applies only to specified lands, the insertion of a notice of the making of the order shall be sufficient. Order to be published by the local authority as the Privy Council may direct, or, in the absence of such direction, so as to ensure publicity. (6.) Powers of the Privy Council may be exercised by two or more Lords, or others of the Privy Council; and as regards orders as to specified lands, by the Lord President, or one of the Principal Secretaries of State. (8.) Every order to be laid before both Houses of Parliament within ten days after the making thereof, or ten days after Parliament meets. (9.) The expenses of the execution of the Act, other than expenses and compensation paid by local authorities, shall be paid out of money voted by Parliament.

## ABSTRACTS OF LEADING CASES IN THE SUPREME COURTS,

*From the Beginning of the Winter Session 1876-77, till the End of the Summer Session 1877.\**

### EDUCATION ACT—SCHOOL FEES.

*Callachan v. Paterson*, Sept. 2, 1876.  
(Stirling Circuit.)

Where a parochial board had refused to pay the school fees of a child on the ground that they were "not satisfied of the inability of the parent to pay such fees," it was held, in an appeal to Circuit from the Sheriff-Court, that an action against the

parochial board for recovery of the fees could not be sustained.

### LEASE—NOTICE TO REMOVE.

*Dunlop & Co. v. Meiklem*, Oct. 24, 1876.

Circumstances in which a tenant, who had given his landlord to understand that he was to remove, and had allowed him to act on that belief, was held barred from pleading want of notice to remove.

VICENNIAL PRESCRIPTION OF  
RETOURS.

*Rocca v. Catto's Trustees*, Nov. 2, 1876.

A singular successor may plead the vicennial prescription in defence of a service as heir obtained by his deceased predecessor. It was at one time doubted whether the plea was not personal to the heir served.

WILL—TESTING CLAUSE.

*Millar v. Birrell*, Nov. 8, 1876.

Where a testamentary deed, with a testing clause not filled up, was produced in a process, after the death of the testator, by a party not founding upon it, the Court allowed the testing clause to be completed, and afterwards held the deed to be valid.

EVIDENCE—HEARSAY.

*Macpherson v. Ross*, Nov. 17, 1876.

In questions of pedigree, the deliberate statement of a deceased person as to propinquity may be proved, if it can be shown that he had special means of knowledge, but not otherwise.

CHARITY.

*Burnet's Trustees*, Nov. 17, 1876.

In this case the Court approved of a new scheme for the management of an educational charity established by Gilbert Burnet, Bishop of Salisbury, who died in 1714, for the purpose of adapting it to the altered requirements of the times.

POOR—SETTLEMENT—LUNATIC.

*Inspector of Annan v. Inspector of Cramond*, Nov. 21, 1876.

Held that a woman imbecile from infancy had, from the time of her father's death, which happened after her majority, a derivative settlement from her father in the parish of his birth.

SALE—MERCANTILE LAW AMENDMENT ACT, SEC. 1.

*M'Mecken v. Ross*, Nov. 22, 1876.

Sec. 1 of the Mercantile Law Amendment Act, 1856, which prevents goods sold and not delivered from being attached by the seller's creditors, only applies in cases where

the buyer acquires a right to a specific subject of which the seller retains possession.

Held that it did not apply to a contract where a shipbuilder sold all the scrap iron in his yard, and what should be produced within a certain time.

SALE—REPUDIATION—DAMAGES.

*Waren & Craven v. Forrester*,  
Nov. 30, 1876.

Where a buyer repudiates a sale, the measure of the seller's damage is the difference between the contract price and the market price at the date of repudiation.

JOINT-STOCK COMPANY—DIRECTOR.

*Huntingdon Copper and Sulphur Co., Limited, v. Henderson*, Jan. 12, 1877.

An original director of a limited company, who received £10,000 from the vendors of certain mines sold to the company, was held bound to pay that sum to the company, although the contract between the vendors and him had been made before the company was formed. Lord Young (whose judgment was adhered to by the First Division), in deciding the case as Lord Ordinary, said, when an agent or other trustee takes money from a person with whom he contracts for his constituents, the law assumes that he takes it at the cost of his constituents, and admits of no evidence to the contrary. His Lordship also observed that when a constituent finds that he has been defrauded by an agent or factor by means of a secret agreement between the agent and the seller, his remedy is not confined to compelling the agent to give up what he has received, but he may repudiate the purchase and seek complete redress against both the seller and the agent.

EDUCATION ACT—COMPULSORY  
EDUCATION.

*Campbell v. Jameson*, Feb. 23, 1877.  
[Justiciary Court.]

In a prosecution of a parent before the Sheriff for neglecting the education of a child of five years, it was proved that the parent resided in a highland parish at a distance of three and a half miles from the nearest school, and that he was

unable to provide otherwise for the child's education. Held that the facts proved were not sufficient in point of law to justify the Sheriff in holding that the parent had failed "grossly and without reasonable excuse" in the sense of sec. 70 of the Act to provide for the child's education.

MINERALS—DAMAGES.

*Wilson v. Waddell*, Dec. 1, 1876.  
[House of Lords.]

When the owner of minerals conducts his mining operations properly, he is not responsible for damage that may be caused by his operations to neighbouring properties, as by rain water flowing through the mines instead of being carried off by the surface, as formerly.

GENERAL POLICE ACT, 1862—DEAN OF GUILD—JURISDICTION OF POLICE MAGISTRATES.

*Tainsh v. Magistrates of Hamilton*,  
Jan. 24, 1877.  
[Outer House.]

In this case, it was held by Lord Curriehill that under sec. 408 of the General Police Act, 1862, the magistrates of police of Hamilton, a burgh of regality which had adopted the Act, possessed the powers and jurisdiction relative to buildings of the magistrates or dean of guild of a royal burgh.

TRUST INVESTMENT.

*Dow v. Kilgour's Trustees*,  
Jan. 31, 1877.

When testamentary trustees are directed to make an investment for a beneficiary in such terms as would give him unlimited control over the sum invested, the Court will not enforce implement of the direction. The Lord Justice-Clerk said the ground on which we proceed is that recognised in England as well as here, that an act which, if done, can be at once undone by the person having interest, will not be directed by the Court to be done.

HARBOUR—PILOT.

*Holman v. Irvine Harbour Trustees*,  
Feb. 1, 1877.

A vessel was injured in entering

Irvine Harbour by the fault of a person sent out as pilot by the harbour trustees. The Court held the trustee liable for the damage, on the ground that the person so employed was not acting as a licensed pilot, but merely as the servant of the trustees, and paid by them, the harbour trustees themselves receiving the pilotage dues.

MASTER AND SERVANT—REPARATION.

*Woodhead v. The Gartness Mineral Co.*, Feb. 10, 1877.

A miner, in the employment of a person who had contracted to drive a level in a mine belonging to a company whose manager and underground manager were in charge of the mine, was killed owing to the negligence of the underground manager.

In an action at the instance of the miner's father against the company, it was held that the company were not liable, on the ground that the miner, by working in the mine, had taken upon himself the risk of injury from other miners engaged in the same undertaking, without claim for redress except against the person in fault.

It was held that the rule of law which imposes upon a master responsibility for damage, caused by the fault of his servant while employed in his service, applies only in cases where the person injured is a stranger not connected with the work in which the servant is engaged, and that in other cases the master is only responsible for personal fault.

AGENT—FRAUD.

*Clydesdale Banking Co. v. Paul*,  
March 8, 1877.

A stockbroker's clerk entered into speculative transactions for his own behoof in his principal's name, and for which the principal was liable, the clerk having a general authority to represent him. On settling-day, the clerk cashed a forged cheque at a bank, and applied the proceeds to pay the balance due on the principal's account arising from these transactions. The Court held that the principal was bound to repay to the bank the amount of the forged cheque, on the ground that the money had been obtained by the

fraud of his representative, and that the principal had benefited by the fraud to that extent. It was observed that he would not have been liable on the first ground alone.

**BANKRUPTCY COMPENSATION BILL.**

*M'Kinnon v. Armstrong Brothers*,  
March 22, 1877.  
[House of Lords.]

Where certain bills were discounted by indorsees for value and subsequently retired by them at maturity after the bankruptcy of the acceptor, it was held that they were entitled to plead compensation upon them against a debt due by them to the bankrupt, although they held a guarantee from a third party against loss upon the bills.

**TRUSTEE.**

*Aberdeen University v. Aberdeen Town Council*, March 23, 1877.  
[House of Lords.]

In 1797 the Magistrates and Town Council of Aberdeen exposed for sale certain lands held by them under mortification for behoof of certain professors in Marischal College and University. The lands were then bought by a person acting as agent for the Town Council. The Corporation subsequently, as proprietors of the lands, applied for and obtained from the Crown a grant of salmon fishings in the sea *ex adverso* of the lands.

In an action brought in 1873 by the University of Aberdeen against the Town Council, it was held that the sale was null, and that both the lands and fishings belonged to the original trust for behoof of the University.

The House of Lords affirmed the judgment.

**NUISANCE—INTERDICT.**

*Fraser's Trustees v. Cran*, June 1, 1877.

In this case interim interdict was granted against a manure manufacturer carrying on his works (which had been commenced in 1870) so as to cause a nuisance by polluting the air.

**TRUST—ALIMENTARY PROVISION.**

*White's Trustees v. Whyte*, June 1, 1877.

Testamentary trustees were di-

rected to pay an annuity, which was declared to be alimentary and not assignable. The residuary legatee and the annuitant concurred in asking the trustees to denude, the former offering to grant a bond over heritage in favour of the annuitant, with a clause declaring it to be alimentary and not assignable. Held that the alimentary provision could only be secured by means of a trust, and that the annuitant had no power to grant a discharge.

**PROOF BY WRIT OR OATH—TRUST.**  
Act 1696, c. 25.

*Horne v. Morrison*, June 13, 1877.

A sued B for half the profits on a sale of heritage, alleging that both parties had entered into a joint adventure, and that B, after buying the property for the joint adventure, had without authority taken the title in his own name. B denied these averments, and pleaded that the proof was limited to his writ or oath by the Act 1696, c. 25. The Court held that as it was averred that the title had been taken in B's name without authority, this was not an averment of trust, and that the mode of proof was not limited.

**MUTUAL GABLE.**

*Glasgow Royal Infirmary v. Wylie*,  
June 15, 1877.

A person, who had acquired separately two adjoining building stances in a town, built a house upon one of them. He afterwards disposed both stances to different persons. Held that the purchaser of the stance with the house acquired with it a right to demand half the cost of the mutual gable, when the proprietor of the adjoining lot should take the use of it.

**EDUCATION ACT—COMPULSORY CLAUSE.**

*France v. Procurator-Fiscal of Aberdeenshire*, June 29, 1877.

When a school board resolves to prosecute a parent under sec. 70 of the Education Act for failing to provide elementary education for a child, the board must grant a written certificate that "he has been and is grossly and without reasonable excuse failing to discharge the duty of providing elementary education" for the child, and transmit it to the fiscal.

SHIP—DEMURRAGE.

*Harris v. Haywood Gas Coal Co.,*  
July 3, 1877.

A charter party stipulated that the merchants should receive three days' notice "before the steamer is ready at Granton." Notice was given, but the steamer arrived at Granton one day behind the date notified, and in consequence of the delay failed to get a loading-berth for three days. In an action for demurrage, held that the three days

were not to be included in the lay days.

BANKRUPT—HERITABLE CREDITOR—  
POINDING OF THE GROUND.

*Royal Bank v. Bain, July 6, 1877.*

Held that a heritable creditor of a bankrupt who executed a poinding of the ground after sequestration, but before confirmation of the trustee, had a preferable right to the trustee over the moveables upon the ground.

Statement of the estimated amount of Taxes Repealed or Reduced, and of Taxes Imposed or Increased in each of the years 1875 and 1876:—

The amount of taxes repealed or reduced from 1862 to 1876 was £36,502,615: viz., Customs, £14,263,282; Excise, £1,381,000; Property and Income-tax, £17,158,000; other taxes, £1,272,933; Stamps (including Succession Duty), £2,427,400. The amount of taxes imposed from 1862 to 1876 was £9,817,534, viz., Customs, £11,034; Excise, £1,870,000; Property and Income-tax, £7,916,000; Stamps, £20,500. Actual diminution from 1862 to 1876, £26,685,081.

## REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE OF BRITISH INDIA.

The gross REVENUE of British India, during the year ending 31st March 1876 was £51,310,063, of which £21,503,742 was derived from Land Revenue; £726,188 from Tributes and Contributions from Native States; £672,528 from Forests; £2,493,232 from Excise on Spirits and Drugs; £510 from Assessed Taxes; £2,721,389 from Customs; £6,244,415 from Salt; £8,471,425 from Opium; £2,835,368 from Stamps; £110,489 from the Mint; £763,597 from the Post-Office; £309,040 from Telegraphs (including £17,122 in England); £315,992 from Law and Justice; £227,887 from the Marine Department; £561,189 (including England, £36,273) from Interest; £749,166 from receipts in aid of Superannuation, retired and compassionate allowances (including England, £92,999); Gain by Exchange on transactions with London, £395,365; from Miscellaneous sources (including England, £18,833), £281,768; from the Army (including England, £107,148), £1,045,612; from Public Works ordinary, £73,929; from Works of Irrigation, £517,720; from State railways, £289,512.

The *Ordinary EXPENDITURE* during the year amounted to £48,665,808 (including England, £8,179,740), made up as follows:—Refunds and drawbacks, £336,324; Cost of realization of Revenue: Revenue from Land, £2,509,427; from Forests, £402,520; Excise on Spirits and Drugs, £82,855; Customs, £185,731; Salt, £507,410; Opium, £2,218,565; Stamps, £106,394; Mint, £107,626; Post-Office, £822,079; Telegraphs, £490,624; Allowances and assignments under Treaties, etc., £1,713,724. Total of the direct claims and demands upon the Revenues, including charges of collection and cost of salt and opium, £9,483,279; Interest on permanent and floating debt, £5,178,108; Interest on service funds and other obligations, £385,860; administration, £1,697,365; minor departments, £309,399; Law and Justice, £2,336,477; Marine, £627,702; Ecclesiastical, £158,058; Medical, £181,928; Political Agencies, £429,535; Superannuation, etc., £1,939,305; Loss by Exchange on transactions with London, £1,429,658; Miscellaneous, £186,761; Civil Furlough and absentee allowances, £229,199; Allotments for Provincial services, £5,153,652; Army, £15,308,460; Public Works, £2,824,482; Guaranteed Railways—Supervision and cost of Land, £83,313; State Railways, £214,713; Famine relief, £508,554. The sum payable as guaranteed interest on the capital of Railway and other Companies (after deducting the net receipts), was £975,310. Total of ordinary expenditure and guaranteed interest, £49,641,118. The Extraordinary Expenditure on Public Works was £4,270,629. Total expenditure in 1875-76, £53,911,747.

The excess of Income over Expenditure, including guaranteed interest but excluding Public Works Extraordinary, was £1,668,945, and the excess of the whole Expenditure, including Public Works Extraordinary, over Income was £2,601,684.

The gross Revenue of India for the year ended 31st March 1877 was estimated at £50,291,713; the Expenditure (including Public Works Extraordinary, £3,764,614) at £55,914,485; which would leave an excess of ordinary Expenditure including guaranteed interest over income of £1,858,158, and an excess of total Expenditure over Income of £5,622,772.

At 31st March 1876, the Funded Debt of the United Kingdom was—capital of Unredeemed Funded Debt (inclusive of unclaimed stock and unclaimed dividends), £713,657,517; estimated capital of Terminable Annuities, £51,911,227—total, £765,568,744; and the Unfunded Debt was £11,401,800 (including bonds—Suez Canal—to the amount of £4,000,000). Total of National Debt at 31st March 1876, £776,970,544. At 31st March 1877, the Funded Debt was—capital of Unredeemed Funded Debt, £712,621,355; estimated capital of Terminable Annuities, £49,308,558—total, £761,929,913; and the Unfunded Debt was £13,943,800 (including bonds—Suez Canal—to the amount of £3,990,000). Total of National Debt at 31st March 1877, £775,873,713.

IMPORTS AND EXPORTS.

The total number of boats registered in Scotland under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, at the close of 1876 was 14,140, of which 2782 were boats of fifteen tons and upwards, with a tonnage of 47,743 tons. 1505 boats were registered at Lerwick, 1977 at Inverness, 1574 at Greenock, 1194 at Wick, 1001 at Kirkwall, 1316 at Banff, 1167 at Peterhead, and 807 at Stornoway. Of boats of fifteen tons and upwards, 62 were registered at Lerwick, tonnage, 2887 tons; 153 at Inverness, tonnage, 2364 tons; 24 at Greenock, tonnage, 415 tons; 878 at Wick, tonnage, 5994 tons; 107 at Kirkwall, tonnage, 1722 tons; 749 at Banff, tonnage, 11,770 tons; 582 at Peterhead, tonnage, 9491 tons; 70 at Stornoway, tonnage, 1053 tons; 135 at Leith, tonnage, 2783 tons; and 250 at Kirkcaldy, tonnage, 4186 tons. The number of boats, the certificates of which were endorsed in 1876, was 11,891, and the number of men and boys employed in them was 50,771. The number of men and boys constantly employed in fishing in Scotland was

24,475, and the number of persons other than regular fishermen, occasionally employed in fishing, was 22,577.

During the year 1876, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, there were built at Aberdeen, 15 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 7515; 9 of them sailing vessels (8 of iron, and 1 of wood), and 6 steamers (all of iron). At Alloa, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 325. At Arbroath, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 197 tons. At Ardrrossan, 6 sailing vessels (of wood), aggregate tonnage, 427. At Banff, 16 sailing vessels (of wood), aggregate tonnage, 3055. At Borrowstounness, 3 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 1231; 1 sailing vessel and 2 steamers (all of iron). At Dundee, 22 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 14,198; 18 sailing vessels (12 of iron and 6 of wood), and 4 steamers (3 of iron and 1 of wood). At Fraserburgh, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 79 tons. At Glasgow, 127 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 95,115; 67 being sailing vessels (65 iron and 2 composite), and 60 steamers (of iron). At Greenock, 25 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 12,950; 16 being sailing vessels (11 of iron and 5 of wood), and 9 steamers (of iron). At Irvine, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 61 tons. At Kirkcaldy, 5 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 1645; 3 being sailing vessels (1 of iron and 2 of wood), and 2 iron steamers. At Kirkwall, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), tonnage, 84 tons. At Montrose, 5 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 675 tons; 2 being sailing vessels (1 of iron and 1 of wood), and 3 iron steamers. At Perth, 4 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 225 tons; 3 being sailing vessels, and 1 a steamer (all of wood). At Peterhead, 4 sailing vessels (of wood), tonnage, 838. At Port-Glasgow, 53 vessels, aggregate tonnage, 27,406; 22 being sailing vessels (of wood), and 31 iron steamers. At Troon, 1 sailing vessel (of wood), of 130 tons. At Wigtown, 1 wooden sailing vessel of 58 tons. The number of ships built at ports in Scotland in 1876, exclusive of vessels built for foreigners, was 292, tonnage, 166,214; of which 174 were sailing vessels (121 of iron, and 51 of wood, and 2 composite, and 118 were steamers (116 of iron, and 2 of wood). There were built for foreigners, for mercantile purposes, 1 steamer of 120 tons at Dundee; 13 sailing vessels and 10 steamers, aggregate tonnage, 7198 tons, at Glasgow; (3 vessels (all steamers), aggregate tonnage, 1768 tons, at Greenock; and 4 vessels (1 sailing vessel and 3 steamers), aggregate tonnage, 731 tons at Port-Glasgow. No vessels of war were built for foreigners in Scotland in 1876. The total number of vessels built at ports in Scotland in 1876 was 313, tonnage, 176,031 tons, of which 178 were sailing vessels, tonnage 122,469 tons, and 135 steamers, tonnage 53,562 tons.

#### THE CUSTOMS.

The Twenty-first Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Customs on the Customs is for the year (ended 31st December) 1876. They state that the year was marked by a want of commercial enterprise, naturally caused by absence of confidence in the probability of profitable return for investments of capital. There are no sufficient data, they say, to show to what extent trade suffered from this inactivity; for though the statistics of our external trade suffice for comparing its advance or decline in each successive year, there is—excepting the estimate that may be made of the return from agricultural industry—little accurate information as to our home trade. In 1876 there was a great deficiency in the harvest, and this necessarily affected severely the well-being of the people. There were large stocks of grain in the country, the importation of the previous year, and this prevented the price of wheat from rising materially till near the end of the year; but our farmers suffered heavy losses, and their misfortunes must have reacted to some extent on their customers. Some indication of the course of home trade can be gathered from the statistics of our railways as well as from the yield of the harvest; and those indicated that the state of trade was almost stationary in 1876, showing an increase of only 9 per cent. as against 8·8 per cent. in the preceding year. The value of our imports and exports (including bullion, but excluding transshipments, £698,449,631 in 1876) showed a decrease of 2·5 per cent. upon the previous year, and there was only a nominal increase (7 per cent.) in the

revenue derived from customs; and these circumstances, considered along with the existence of depression in both commerce and agriculture, seem (it is observed) to indicate that there must have been a diminution in the aggregate amount of weekly wages paid to the industrial classes. A diminution which occurred both in the amount of pauperism and in the amount of emigration pointed, however, to an opposite conclusion. In 1875, as compared with 1874, there was a diminution of about 30,000 in the number of those receiving poor-law relief in the United Kingdom; and there was a further diminution of nearly 56,000 in 1876. As regards emigration, there was so nearly a balance in 1876 between it and immigration that, probably for the first time in the century, a year passed without any diminution of the population from this cause.

The most marked feature in the trade of the year was the unprecedented excess in the total value of the imports over that of the exports (including in either case the value of bullion). It was £125,968,263, or 44 per cent. of excess. The value of the imports during 1876 (£412,208,947) was the greatest ever recorded, while the value of the exports (£286,240,684) was considerably under the value recorded in any of the preceding five years. The Report points out that, taking the imports and exports of the last nineteen years, the imports had, excepting in four years, constantly increased, and that their value in the last of the years, 1876, was by £24,054,903, more than double of the value in the first of those years, 1858; while the exports had in eight years shown a decline from the year immediately preceding, and their value in the last of the years wanted £32,582,626 of being double their value in the first. After discussing at some length why the value of the imports is normally higher than that of the exports in the case of Great Britain, the Report observes that the large increase in the percentage of excess of imports over exports which occurred in 1876, and the three preceding years, was caused by a general and increasing want of confidence on the part of British owners of capital residing at home in the security of investments in foreign countries. This want of confidence, by preventing capital from being sent for investment abroad, diminished the exports; and, on the other hand, by causing capital to be withdrawn from abroad, it augmented the imports.

The value of our imports in 1876 (£375,154,703, exclusive of bullion) was greater by £1,215,126 than their value in 1875. There had been but a slight variation in their value in the four years ended 1876; though during those years there had been fluctuations in the quantities imported, these had been nearly compensated by fluctuations in prices—diminished quantities having been accompanied by increased prices, and increased quantities by reductions in price. [See Imports and Exports, p. 189 *et seq.*] The value of our imports in 1873 was £371,287,000.

The value of foreign produce imported in 1876 (£290,822,000), and the value of colonial produce imported (£84,332,000), was in either case almost identical with the corresponding value for 1875. Under the head of Russia there was in 1876 a falling-off of £3,000,000, attributable principally to a decrease in the supply of wheat and oats. Sweden and Norway showed an increase of £1,800,000, the total amount being £10,700,000 against £8,900,000. From these countries we imported grain of the value of £2,124,000; iron, wrought and unwrought, value, £1,264,000; and wood and timber, value, £5,740,000. Neither Germany nor Denmark presented any difference worthy of note; and Holland, though showing an apparent increase of nearly two millions, was mainly indebted for this to a transit trade. An increase in the case of Belgium is similarly explained. France showed in 1876 a decrease of £1,420,000 as compared with 1875, and of £1,218,000 as compared with 1874, the principal articles which showed a falling-off being cattle, corn, gloves, and sugar; while there were conspicuous increases in butter, brandy, wine, and woollen manufactures. Since 1871 the value of butter imported from France had risen from £1,636,000 to £3,732,000; the value of eggs from £916,000 to £1,864,000; the value of brandy from £1,871,000 to £2,595,000; and the value of wine from £2,185,000 to £2,904,000. The United States showed an increase of £6,309,000 in 1876—of which nearly four millions was derived from Indian corn alone; while bacon, petroleum, tallow, and tobacco were the other main contributors to it. There was a decrease of two millions on wheat, and of two millions more on raw cotton. The imports from India, including Ceylon and the Straits Settlements (£35,800,000), showed a decrease of £1,866,000, or 4·7 per cent.; while those from the Australian colonies (£21,961,929) showed a small increase of £1,400,000.

1876 was the fourth consecutive year in which there was a decrease in the value of British and Irish exports. The total value of those exports in 1876 (£200,539,204) showed a decrease of 10·2 per cent. upon the value of 1875 (£223,465,963), and a decrease of nearly fifty-six millions, or not less than 22 per cent.—equal to the value of the export trade for about 3½ months at the present rate of exportation—upon the value of 1872 (£256,257,327). It is pointed out, however, that a great decline in value had taken place in almost every article of importance included in the export list; and that, on the other hand, there had been a decline in value of many articles of raw material which we import. The iron and steel manufactures of the country had suffered out of all proportion to the loss which had accrued on fabrics made from materials imported from abroad, and this accounted for 31 per cent. (£16,993,829) of the whole decline (£54,525,399) which had occurred in the value of our exports since 1873. In 1873 the value of iron was one-seventh of the whole value of the exports, and in 1876 it was only about one-tenth. The following are several of the variations in the price of exported articles which occurred between 1872 and 1876:—Pig-iron, £5, 0s. 11d. per ton in 1872, £3, 2s. 10d. per ton in 1876; bar-iron, £11, 11s. 8d. per ton in 1872, £8, 10s. 9d. per ton in 1876; railroad-iron of all sorts, £10, 16s. 1d. per ton in 1872, £8, 19s. 2d. per ton in 1876; cotton piece goods, 4d. per yard in 1872, 3½d. per yard in 1876—and shipments had frequently taken place of cotton goods valued as low as a penny per yard; woollen cloths, 3s. 5d. per yard in 1872, 3s. 2d. per yard in 1876; worsted stuffs, 1s. 2½d. per yard in 1872, 10d. per yard in 1876; cotton yarn, 1s. 7d. per yard in 1872, 1s. 1½d. per yard in 1876; coals, 15s. 9½d. per ton in 1872, and 10s. 11½d. in 1876. The value of our exports to foreign countries (£135,779,980) in 1876 showed, as compared with the previous year, a decline of £16,593,820, or nearly 11 per cent.; and the value of our exports to British Possessions (£64,859,224) a decline of £6,232,939, or 9 per cent. The decline in the former case was very generally spread over all the countries affected, but the case of the United States was conspicuous. The value of our exports to that country fell off from £21,868,279 in 1875 to £16,833,517 in 1876—a decline of more than five millions, or 23 per cent. And in 1872 the value had been £40,736,597. Much of this falling-off is attributed to the influence of the protective tariff of the United States, but the trade of that country had fallen into a state of great depression. The decrease in the value of our exports to Russia in

1876 amounted to £1,876,000, and it chiefly arose from a diminished trade in iron and machinery. Germany showed a decrease (from a previously decreased amount) of £3,200,000 in 1876, mostly arising upon arms, etc., coals, cotton yarn, cotton piece goods, fish (herrings), iron, linen yarn, machinery, woollen and worsted yarn, and worsted stuffs. The exports to France increased about £730,000 in value in 1876. Those to Holland decreased in value by about 1½ millions. There were large increases in the values exported to Ecuador, Bolivia, and Uruguay, but other South American states showed a diminution. Of the deficiency in the exports to British Possessions, the trade with India accounted for £1,836,921, the trade with Australia for £1,809,580, the trade with Canada for £1,511,376, the trade with the Cape of Good Hope for £371,430, and the trade with Hong-Kong for £520,000, and there were also decreases in the values exported to Natal, the Channel Islands, the West African settlements, and the West Indian islands.

The total value of our exports of Foreign and Colonial produce in 1876 (£56,137,398) showed a decrease upon 1875 of £2,008,962, or 3·5 per cent. There was a decrease of £1,736,779 in the value of such produce exported to foreign countries, and a decrease of £272,183 in the value exported to British Possessions.

The total value of the imports of gold and silver in 1876 was £37,054,000 (gold £23,475,975, silver £13,578,269) against £33,264,000 in 1875, being an increase of £3,790,000; and the total value of gold and silver exported in 1876 was £29,464,000 (gold £16,515,748, silver £12,948,334) against £27,628,000 in 1875, an increase of £1,836,000. The importation of gold was practically at the same point in both years, and the importation of silver was greater in 1876 by £3,454,000 than in 1875; while the export of gold was less by £2,133,000, and the export of silver greater by £4,000,000 in 1876 than in 1875. The excess of imports over exports in 1876, taking gold and silver together, was £7,590,000 in 1876, and amounted to £13,230,000 for the two years 1875 and 1876.

The value of merchandise transhipped in the United Kingdom in 1876 (£10,815,548) showed a decrease of £1,321,516, or 10·9 per cent., upon the previous year.

The total value of our imports in 1876, including gold and silver bullion, was £412,208,947; the total value of our exports, gold and silver bullion similarly included, was £286,240,684; and the total value of our import, export, and transhipment trade was £709,265,179, against £728,581,795 in the preceding year.

The net customs revenue was £19,903,932 in 1875, and £20,054,698 in 1876, showing an increase in 1876 of £150,766. The gross customs revenue was £20,005,433 in 1875, and £20,156,308 in 1876, showing an increase in 1876 of £150,875. The payments out of revenue on account of drawbacks and repayments (£101,610 in 1876) in 1876 exceeded those of 1875 by £109.

The rate per cent. of the *charges of collection on the gross produce* of the customs revenue of the United Kingdom (including therein the gross amount of duty collected on British spirits deposited in customs warehouses, £23,769,523) was £3, 7s. 6d. in the financial year 1875-76, being a decrease upon the rate in the previous year, £3, 9s. 6d. The rate per cent. of collection on the *net produce* (including duty on British spirits as aforesaid, £23,623,003) was £3, 7s. 11d. in the financial year 1875-76, against £3, 9s. 10d. in the previous year.

The gross receipt of customs revenue in 1876 (amounting, without including the duty on customs goods delivered out of excise warehouses, to £19,299,800) was divided among the different ports as follows:—London, £9,981,020; Liverpool, £2,979,240; other ports in England, £2,841,744; ports in Scotland, £1,667,915; ports in Ireland, £1,829,881. There was an increase, as compared with 1875, of £40,881 at London, of £59,821 at Liverpool, a decrease of £62,364 in the other ports of England, an increase of £70,052 in Scotland, and of £74,394 in Ireland—in all, an increase of £182,784.

The revenue from British spirits collected by the Customs Department in 1876, and handed over to the Inland Revenue Department, amounted to £3,394,895, being an increase on the previous year of £61,040. The amount of duty collected by the Inland Revenue Department on customs goods

delivered from excise warehouses was £894,000 in 1876, as against £925,730 in the preceding year.

### THE POST-OFFICE.

The Twenty-third Report of the Postmaster-General on the Post-office is for the fifteen months ended 31st March 1877. Hereafter the Postmaster's yearly Report will be upon the financial year ending at 31st March.

The number of post-offices in the United Kingdom was increased during 1876 by 221, so that there were, at the close of 1876, 13,447, of which 896 were head-offices. The number of road letter-boxes was increased from 10,186 in 1875 to 10,724 in 1876. Thus the whole number of postal receptacles in the United Kingdom was 24,171 by the end of 1876, as compared with

16,835 ten years before, and with little more than 4500 before the establishment of penny postage in 1840. In London alone there were, in 1876, 1803 such receptacles. Deliveries were established for the first time at 481 places during the year, and the deliveries at 417 other places were increased in number or otherwise improved. The number of pouches delivered by apparatus from the travelling post-offices during 24 hours at the close of 1876 was 521, and the number received 478, being 999 in all, as against 978 exchanged per diem in 1875. There are now volunteer fire-brigades in the Circulation Department of the General Post-Office, and fire-brigades had also been formed, or were at the date of the Report about to be formed, at 28 other offices.

*Letters, Post-Cards, Book-Packets, and Newspapers.*—In 1876 there passed through the post-office 1,018,955,200 letters (England, 856,042,400; Ireland, 71,792,100; Scotland, 91,120,700); 92,935,700 post-cards (England, 78,412,100; Ireland, 4,883,500; Scotland, 9,640,100); and 298,790,800 book-packets and newspapers (England, 241,866,100; Ireland, 24,146,600; Scotland, 32,778,100). As compared with 1875, there was an increase of 1·0 per cent. in letters, of 6·7 per cent. in post-cards, and of 6·8 per cent. in book-packets and newspapers. In letters there was an increase of 1·1 per cent. in England, of 1·7 per cent. in Ireland, and of 0·2 per cent. in Scotland; in post-cards, an increase of 6·9 per cent. in England, of 7·5 per cent. in Ireland, and of 4·7 per cent. in Scotland; in book-packets and newspapers, an increase of 6·7 per cent. in England, of 3 per cent. in Ireland, and of 10·9 per cent. in Scotland. The total estimated number of newspapers was 125,065,800. The average number of letters delivered to each person in the population in 1876 was 35 in England, 26 in Scotland, 13 in Ireland, and 81 in the United Kingdom. The number of registered letters in the United Kingdom in 1876 was 5,095,116—about 1 in 200 of the total number of letters, or, excluding the official remittance letters, 1 in 241. It is stated that the average daily number of remittances from the head-office to post-masters of postage and telegraph stamps, post-cards, wrappers, and embossed envelopes, which are forwarded as registered packets, is 700, weighing in the aggregate from 2 to 3 tons, and occasionally over 4 tons. The number of letters received in the Returned Letter Office in the fifteen months ended 31st March 1877 was 5,897,724—an estimated increase per annum on the numbers received in 1875 of 371,890—or about 1 in 216 of the total number of letters. Nearly nine-tenths of these were re-issued to corrected addresses or returned to the writers. In the Returned Letter Office the number of inquiries dealt with was about 89,000. In addition to the Returned Letter Offices of London, Edinburgh, and Dublin, branch offices have been established at Birmingham, Glasgow, Liverpool, Manchester, and Leeds. Miscellaneous articles, numbering 14,346, reached the Returned Letter Office during the year wholly destitute of covers, which, in a large number of cases, was owing to covers of too flimsy material having been used. Upwards of 33,100 letters were posted without any address in the fifteen months—an estimated annual increase of 1000 on the number in 1875—(of which 832 contained in the aggregate nearly £390 in cash and notes, and nearly £5000 in cheques), and 78,575 postage stamps were found loose in different offices. The number of newspapers for places abroad detained for insufficient postage or other cause was 203,335 in the fifteen months, being at the rate of 162,668 per annum—an improvement upon 1875, when the number was 166,000.

*Telegraphs.*—The telegraph business during the fifteen months fell considerably short of the increase in previous years. The number of messages (exclusive of messages for newspapers) was 26,440,439, an increase of 960,000 over the number in the preceding fifteen months. In the number of postal telegraph offices there was an increase of 4, which raised the number to 3734. 1636 railway stations also were open for telegraph business. It is stated that a considerable mileage of overground line has been, in consideration of the inconvenience caused by storms, replaced by underground wires. The mileage of underground wires had increased during the existence of the postal telegraphs from 1928 miles to 8014. The

revenue from private wires rose from £52,884 in the year ending 31st March 1876 to £58,942 in the year ending 31st March 1877. The depression of trade had led an unusual number of renters to terminate their agreements; nevertheless, new contracts had been entered into, bringing in an additional rental of £707. The amount of matter transmitted for the press was about the same in the fifteen months as in the fifteen months previous, the number of words transmitted being upwards of 220,000,000. Distinctive stamps for telegraph messages were introduced in 1876. A system of giving receipts for messages was also introduced, but had been very little used. It being no longer necessary to maintain the engineering staff of the Telegraph Service at the strength which was required for some time after the transfer of the telegraphs to the State, a scheme for its reduction had been nearly matured when a Committee of the House of Commons was appointed to inquire into the organization and financial system of the Telegraph Department. This scheme, after having had the benefit of Parliamentary criticism, is now being carried out. It was suggested to the Committee—with a view to obviating the loss on press messages—that each message requiring separate transmission and delivery should be charged for separately, and, since 1st January 1877, this has been done. At the same time, a system of continuous counting, hitherto confined to press associations, has been extended to the press generally. A recommendation made by the Committee, that a profit and loss account for the Telegraph Service, on the principle of a commercial undertaking, should be annually prepared and presented to Parliament, is being acted upon; and the account has been made out for the year ended 31st March 1876. There has been a rigid examination of all the establishments, and considerable reductions have been made. The area of the country to be supervised by officers of the Royal Engineers has been enlarged, and henceforth 160 Royal Engineers will be employed within a district comprising the whole of the south of England from the mouth of the Thames to the Land's End. Since 1st January 1876—in consequence of arrangements suggested at a conference held at St Petersburg in the preceding summer—messages between the United Kingdom and places out of Europe have been charged for by the word, and not by the message of 20 words.

*Money Orders.*—During the fifteen months, 238 additional money-order offices were opened, making the whole number in the United Kingdom 5498. In the year ended 31st March 1877, the number of inland money-orders issued in the United Kingdom was 17,822,921, an increase of 1,337,260 or about  $8\frac{1}{10}$  per cent. on the number in the year ended 31st December 1875; and the amount for which they were issued was £27,516,698, an increase upon the year 1875 of  $3\frac{3}{10}$  per cent. In England, the number issued was 15,197,704, an increase of  $2\frac{2}{10}$  per cent. upon 1875, and the amount was £23,166,935, an increase of 3·4 per cent.; in Scotland, the number was 1,465,177, an increase of  $7\frac{1}{10}$  per cent., and the amount was £2,403,932, an increase of 4 per cent.; in Ireland, the number was 1,160,040, an increase of  $7\frac{2}{10}$  per cent., and the amount £1,945,831, an increase of  $8\frac{1}{10}$  per cent. The number of colonial and foreign money-orders in the year ended 31st March 1877, counting the issues both in this country and abroad, was 357,001 (viz., colonies 145,838, the number in the year 1875 having been 161,226; foreign countries, 211,163, an increase upon the year 1875 of 22 per cent.); and the amount for which they were issued was £1,185,677 (viz., colonies £572,752, a considerable decrease; foreign countries £612,925, an increase of 12·8 per cent.). The average amount of inland money-orders was about £1, 10s. 10d.; and the proportion of inland money-orders to population was in England 62·9 to 100 persons, in Scotland 41·7 to 100 persons, in Ireland 22·3 to 100 persons, and in the United Kingdom 53·9 to 100 persons. In 1839, the first year of the money-order system, the proportions for the three kingdoms were, England 0·9, Scotland 0·6, Ireland 0·4 per 100 persons. It is stated that the large increase which has taken place in the number of inland money-orders for small amounts, the commission on which does not cover the cost, has at length resulted in a net loss on the money-order business as a whole. This loss was for the quarter ended 31st March 1877, at the rate of £10,000 a year, and it is observed, that no doubt it would rapidly increase. Since (it is observed) the business ought not to be carried on at

a loss, a readjustment of the rates of commission will be necessary, and a fresh scale had been prepared by a Treasury Committee; but it had been deemed desirable not to introduce that scale until facilities for the cheaper remittance of small sums had been given by means of a "Postal notes" scheme, proposed by Mr Chetwynd of the Post-office. This scheme provides for the issue of money-orders for certain fixed sums—2s. 6d., 5s., 10s., and £1—which are to be payable to the order of the payee, or to bearer on signature, as the remitter may desire, and to be payable at any post-office, and which are to cost, in the case of the two former sums, a 1d. each order, and, in the case of the latter two sums, 2d. each order. It is observed that as these post-office notes will not be a legal tender, they will not form a paper currency; and, besides being restricted to the small sums mentioned, their period of currency will be restricted to twelve months. The postal note will, in fact, be a money order for a fixed small sum payable at any post-office to the order of the holder or person designated therein, and not requiring a letter of advice. Both the postal notes and the revised scale of money-order commission were shortly to be introduced. £472,156 was, in the year ended 31st March 1877, sent by money-orders from the colonies to the U. K., against £100,596 sent from the U. K.; and £342,924 was sent by money-orders to the U. K. from foreign countries, against £270,001 sent to foreign countries from the U. K.

*Post-office Savings Banks.*—The number of depositors in post-office savings banks (1,777,103 at the end of 1875) was at the end of 1876 1,702,374. The amount of the deposits (£25,187,345 at the end of 1875) had risen to £26,996,550 at the end of 1876. The number of depositors in post-office savings banks and old savings banks combined (3,255,266 at the end of 1875) was 3,195,761 at the end of 1876. The diminution in the number of accounts open at post-office savings banks at the close of 1876, as compared with the former year, was apparent only, and was caused by the transfer to a "dormant" ledger of many accounts carrying but small balances, and on which no operation had taken place for a considerable time. Had these accounts not been specially treated, the number of depositors' accounts would have shown, instead of a decrease, an increase of 92,648. On the amounts deposited (exclusively of those transferred to "dormant" ledgers), there was an increase in 1876 of £1,809,205 on the total of the previous year. The number of deposits made in post-office savings banks during 1876 was 3,166,136, and the amount deposited was £8,982,350 (an average per deposit of £2, 16s. 9d.). The amount of interest credited to depositors at the end of the year was £619,331, an increase of £47,747 on the previous year. The number of withdrawals was 1,195,603, and the amount withdrawn was £7,792,477 (an average per withdrawal of £6, 10s. 4d.). The average amount at the credit of each depositor was £15, 17s. 1½d. Had the accounts which have been transferred to the "dormant" ledgers been included, the average would have been only £14, 8s. 9½d., but even this was an increase of 5s. 3¾d., as compared with the previous year. The charges of management in 1876 amounted to £125,912, being 9s. 3¾d. per cent. on the funds in possession of the banks; and the average cost of each transaction was 6·9d., or, including postage, about 7½d., as compared with about 1s. in the old savings banks. The total sum standing to the credit of the post-office savings banks on the books of the National Debt Commissioners at the close of 1876 was £28,004,732, and the balance in the hands of the Postmaster-General at the same date, less amount required to meet interest warrants issued but not cashed, was £106,833; and the total sum applicable to the payment of depositors at the close of the year was £28,111,565. The number of post-office savings banks in the United Kingdom at the end of 1876 was 5448; the number of post-office and old savings banks, taken together, was 5912. 153 new offices were opened during the year in England, 23 in Scotland, and 12 in Ireland. The number of the old savings banks in the United Kingdom was 466 at the end of 1876. The proportion of the depositors in post-office savings banks at the end of 1876 to the population, excluding the accounts carried to "dormant" ledgers, was, for the United Kingdom, about 1 to 19; 1 to about 15 in England, 1 to about 71 in Scotland, and 1 to about 87 in Ireland. The total amount received from depositors, including interest, from

the commencement of business to 31st December 1876, was £90,999,151, and the amount withdrawn was £64,002,600. At the end of 1876, the assets of the post-office savings banks exceeded their liabilities by £1,104,531, of which about £149,000 accrued in the year 1876. It is stated that, of the total number of deposits and withdrawals in 1876, 26½ per cent. were made at offices other than those at which the accounts were opened.

*Post-office Annuities and Life Insurances.*—The number of immediate annuities subsisting at the close of 1876 in the United Kingdom was 6319, and the amount of the annuities was £76,655. The number of immediate annuities granted during the year was 729, the purchase-money was £110,389, and the amount of the annuities, £10,013. The whole number of immediate annuities granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1876 was 7380; the amount of the purchase-money of those annuities was £944,420; and the amount of the annuities, £89,353. The number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money not returnable, subsisting at the end of 1876, was 160, and their amount £2862; the number of deferred annuities and monthly allowances, money returnable, was 203, and their amount £3871. Of the former 8, the amount of which was £96, of the latter 21, the amount of which was £367, were granted in 1876. The amount of purchase-money and instalments of premiums received in 1876 was £2691 (money not returnable, £963; money returnable, £1728). The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money not returnable, granted from 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1876, was 180, on account of which there had been paid £13,451, and the amount of which was £3315. The whole number of deferred annuities, etc., money returnable, granted in the same period, was 345, on account of which there had been paid £21,892, and the amount of which was £6878. The number of contracts of life insurance entered into with the post-office, current at the end of 1876, was 3970; the amount insured was £315,211. The amount received during the year on contracts was £9288. The number of payments made on account of contracts during the year was 101, and the amount paid on death or surrender was £4379. The number of new contracts entered into during the year was 270, and the amount insured by them £22,875. The whole number of contracts of life insurance entered into by the post-office, from the commencement of business on 17th April 1865 to 31st December 1876, was 5118, and the amount insured was £398,877.

*Licenses.*—The number of licenses issued in the year ended 31st March 1877 by the post-office, on behalf of the Board of Inland Revenue, was 1,130,241, of which 847,609 were for keeping dogs. The revenue produced was £463,000.

*Force, Expenditure, and Revenue.*—The following Table shows the force or numbers of persons employed in the post-office (exclusive of officers employed in the telegraphs and post-office savings banks, and distinguishing effective from pensioners or non-effective); the cost of collection and delivery, of management, and of money-order business; the cost of conveyance of mails (distinguishing conveyance by coaches, carts, and omnibuses from conveyance by railways and conveyance by ships and packets); and the total cost of the post-office service, in each of the years 1874 and 1875, and for the year ended 31st March 1877 :—

In the year ended 31st March 1877 the cost of the manufacture of postage stamps, post-cards, and stamped newspaper wrappers, was £92,191; of stationery, £48,925; of buildings and repairs, rents, rates, taxes, fuel, and light, £206,483; of supply and repair of mail-bags and boxes, tolls and ferryage, and other charges, £24,241; of the conveyance of mails over the Isthmuses of Suez and Panama, and in other foreign parts, £16,823. The staff of officers engaged exclusively on telegraph duties at the end of 1876 (who are not included in the table given above), consisted of 21 chief-engineers and other superior officers, 6656 clerks, subordinate engineers, etc., and 4977 messengers: total, 11,654. The total number of persons in the employ of the post-office at home and abroad (including certain officers partly engaged in telegraph and partly in other duties) at the close of 1876 was 45,024.

The next Table shows the gross and net revenue of the post-office, from postage and money-orders, in the years 1874 and 1875, and the year ended 31st March 1877:—

The gross postal revenue as given above includes for 1876-77, £5731, the amount of unclaimed money-orders. It is stated that the total postal revenue for that year, as above stated—greater by £202,000 than the revenue in 1875—presents an unduly favourable aspect, through a change in the system of preparing the Australian accounts having caused a delay in paying balances of postage due to the Australian colonies. The expenditure of 1876-77 shows an increase of £149,000 as compared with 1875; but this was in part owing to the sum of £60,859 having been paid towards purchase of the site of a new post-office at Manchester. On the cost of the packet services an economy of £56,000 has been made, partly due to new arrangements for carrying the American, West Indian, and Pacific mails. The net revenue for the year 1876-77 (1,947,000) showed an increase of £53,000 upon 1875. If the several departments of government had been charged with postage, both the gross and net revenue from postage would have been increased by £104,000. During the five years, 1867-71, the average net revenue of the post-office was £1,385,399; and during the five years, 1872-76, it was £1,731,899.

The gross earnings of the Telegraph Service in the year ended 31st March 1877 amounted to £1,313,107—an increase of £36,000 upon the previous financial year. It was made up as follows:—From messages and wires rented by cable companies, £1,474,814; news produce and special wire rentals, £65,041; private wire rentals, £58,942; miscellaneous, £8253; extra receipts, £14,549—total revenue collected, £1,621,599; from which there had to be deducted—payments to cable companies, £306,592; and on account of portorage and message money refunded, £1900; balance, being the total telegraph revenue, £1,313,107. The expenditure during the year charged to the Telegraph vote was £1,123,357, an increase of £91,000 upon the previous financial year. This did not include the telegraph expenditure incurred by the Office of Works, but it did include £30,429 paid on account of a new post-office at Manchester, and £24,717 in respect of payments for the delivery of messages beyond one mile, which payments were treated as charges on the Telegraph revenue up to 31st January 1876—both of which are to be allowed for in estimating the growth of expenditure during the year. The true financial results of the Telegraph business for the year are to be looked for in the profit and loss account prepared for presentation to Parliament.

## LUNACY.

The "Nineteenth Annual Report of the General Board of Commissioners in Lunacy for Scotland" is dated 24th February 1877.

The number and distribution of the insane in Scotland on 1st January 1876 (exclusive of unreported lunatics maintained in private dwellings from private sources, of whom the Commissioners have no official cognisance or control), is shown in the following Table:—

It thus appears that the whole number of insane persons of whom official cognisance was had at 1st January 1876, was 8509, and of these 1497 were maintained from private sources; 6958 by parochial rates; and 54 (criminal lunatics) at the expense of the State. On the 1st of January 1875, the corresponding numbers were 1476, 6700, and 49. There was, in 1875, an increase of 25 in the number of private, and of 251 in the number of pauper lunatics registered (the inmates of training schools, not being necessarily certified to be lunatics, are registered separately). The Commissioners estimate the number of unreported insane at nearly 2000, of whom the greater number belongs to the classes little removed from pauperism. In 1875, there was, in royal and district asylums, an increase of 32 private, and 124 pauper patients; in private asylums, a decrease of 33 private, and of 4 pauper patients; in parochial asylums, an increase of 101 pauper patients; in lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 36 pauper patients; in training schools for imbeciles, a decrease of 4 private and an increase of 7 pauper patients; in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, an increase of 3 male and 2 female patients; and in private dwellings, an increase of 26 private, and a decrease of 6 pauper patients.

It appears from this Table that of the 8862 insane of whom official cognisance was had at 1st January 1877, 1566 were maintained from private sources, 7239 by parochial rates, and 57 at the expense of the State. In 1876, there was in Royal District Asylums an increase of 53 private and 25 pauper patients; in private asylums, an increase of 18 private and a decrease of 2 pauper patients; in parochial asylums, an increase of 177 pauper patients; in lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 42 pauper patients; in the lunatic department of the General Prison, an increase of one male and two female patients; in training schools for imbeciles, an increase of 5 private and 2 pauper patients; and, in private dwellings, a decrease of 7 private and an increase of 37 pauper patients. The whole increase of registered lunatics during the two years with which the Report deals (1875 and 1876) was made up of 89 private and 530 pauper patients.

Between 1st January 1858 and 1st January 1877, the number of lunatics officially known to the Board has risen from 5823 to 8862. There has been an increase of 2856 in the numbers in royal and district asylums, a decrease of 540 in the private asylums, an increase of 850 in the parochial asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses, an increase of 31 in the lunatic department of the Central Prison at Perth, a decrease of 282 in the number left in private dwellings, and an increase of 124 in the schools for imbecile children. These figures show that, of the increase of 3861 which has taken place in the number of patients in public and parochial asylums, in the lunatic wards of poorhouses, in the lunatic department of the Central Prison, and in schools for imbeciles, 540 may arise from the decrease in private asylums, and 282 from the decrease in private dwellings; leaving an increase of 3039, representing either

a growth of lunacy, or simply an increased number of lunatics placed in asylums. Comparing the numbers at 1st January 1858 and 1st January 1877, there has been an increase since 1858 of 2820 in the number of pauper patients placed in establishments, and of 345 in the number of private patients similarly disposed of; a decrease of 366 in the number of pauper lunatics in private dwellings; and an increase of 84 in the number of private lunatics in ordinary dwellings.

It is remarked that the number of pauper lunatics at 1st January in each year may be taken as indicating the persistent pauper lunacy of each county, the number chargeable during the year being in many cases very much greater.

The ratio of lunatics officially known (pauper and private) to the general population at the 1st of January in each year was, per 100,000 of the population (at the middle of each year), 191 in 1858, 211 in 1868, 227 in 1873, 228 in 1874, 230 in 1875, 236 in 1876, and 243 in 1877—the ratio for 1877 being made up of 200 in establishments and 43 in private dwellings.

The proportions indicate a progressive increase in the number of lunatics under cognisance of the Board, but do not show whether this is due to a greater prevalence of lunacy, or simply to a growing disposition to concentrate lunatics in asylums. The proportion of pauper lunatics to paupers was 6800 per 100,000 in 1861, and was 11,138 per 100,000 in 1877. While the proportion of registered paupers to population was 2555 per 100,000 in 1861, and had fallen to 1813 per 100,000 by 1877, the proportion of pauper lunatics to population had risen between the same years from 171 to 202 per 100,000. The proportion of pauper lunatics to population was far from being the same in all the counties of Scotland—certain counties steadily maintaining a high, and other counties as steadily a low, proportion. Thus, at 1st January 1877, the proportion of pauper lunatics per 100,000 of the population was 162 in Lanark; 160 in Renfrew; 145 in Linlithgow; and, on the other hand, 371 in Argyll; 300 in Perth; and 285 in Inverness. Taking the whole numbers of lunatics relieved during the year in those counties, the results are somewhat different, the proportion of lunatics relieved during the year to those chargeable at 1st January being for Lanark, 137 to 100; for Renfrew, 131 to 100; for Linlithgow, 131 to 100; and, on the other hand, for Argyll, only 119 to 100; for Perth, 116 to 100; and for Inverness, 112 to 100. Rather more than seven-tenths of all the pauper lunatics are now in asylums, and rather less than three-tenths in lunatic wards of poorhouses and private dwellings. The proportion in lunatic wards of poorhouses is about an eleventh of the whole. The yearly number of pauper lunatics placed in establishments rose between 1858 and 1876 from 1042 to 1835—a growth of 76 per cent., while the population has only increased by 16 per cent. There was an unusually great increase in the number admitted to asylums in 1875 and 1876, and in the number of private patients admitted—535 in 1876—as well as in the number of pauper. The number of pauper patients admitted to establishments has increased steadily. The number of private patients has not exhibited any steady tendency towards increase; but in 1875 and in 1876 it was higher than in any previous year, and in 1876 it showed an increase of 31 per cent. on the admissions of 1858. The Commissioners think it possible that the increase in the numbers only express the result (1) of increased facilities of obtaining gratuitous treatment in asylums; (2) of a diminished dislike to asylums; (3) of increased readiness to adopt the more costly forms of treatment, owing (a) to the greater wealth of the country, and (b) to the relief given to local taxation for pauper lunatics from imperial sources; and (4) of an alteration in medical and general opinion as to what constitutes lunacy, and especially as to what constitutes that degree or kind of lunacy which can be certified as indicating fitness for asylum treatment. It is suggested, too, that the government grant on account of lunatics may have augmented the numbers of pauper lunatics in 1875 and 1876. Of every 100 patients sent to establishments on an average of the ten years 1867-76, 23 were private, and 77 pauper. There seems a greater

tendency to increase among pauper than among private patients. In the five years 1867-71, 2191 private patients were admitted to establishments against 6757 pauper patients; whereas in the five years, 1872-76, the corresponding numbers were 2292 and 8249.

The number of voluntary patients admitted to asylums in 1876 was 45. In 1875, it was 50, and, in 1874, 43. The whole number of them at the date of the Report was 37. The number of voluntary patients received into asylums in the 15 years, 1862-76, was 418 (265 males and 153 females), and the number of them discharged in the same period was 381 (243 males and 138 females). It is only since 1866 that the state of the law has been such that voluntary patients have been willing to claim admission, and the number of them has been increasing. It averaged 31 during the five years 1867-71, and 43 during the five years 1872-76. But voluntary patients do not usually stay long. Of those admitted from 1862 to 1876 inclusive, 103 or 27 per cent. resided in the asylum for less than a month, and 209 or 54·9 per cent. for less than three months.

The admissions to establishments in 1876, excluding transfers, were 2370 (535 private and 1835 pauper). The number removed, recovered, was 1092 (189 private and 903 pauper), the number removed, not recovered, was 389 (152 private and 237 pauper); the removals by death were 585 (124 private and 461 pauper)—total removals, 2066 (465 private and 1601 pauper). [The training schools for imbeciles and the lunatic department of the General Prison are not included in this statement.] In the ten years, 1867-76, the number of admissions into establishments was 19,489. The whole number of removals during the same period was 17,522—excess of admissions over removals, 1967. Of 100 patients discharged recovered during the ten years 1867-76, 21 were private and 79 pauper—so that the ratio of recoveries among private and pauper patients is in tolerably close accordance with the number of admissions. The average rate of recovery is highest in parochial asylums, probably because they receive a high proportion of patients labouring under the ephemeral forms of insanity. The discharges of the unrecovered are much more frequent among private than among pauper patients, being as 40 to 60, while the admissions are as 23 to 77. The average annual mortality is also highest in parochial asylums.

At 1st January 1876, 50 patients had been absent from asylums on probation. Of these, 26 were finally discharged as recovered, 6 were sent back, 17 were under the care of friends, and 1 had died. In the course of 1876, 120 patients were discharged on trial; of these, 28 have been finally discharged as recovered, 1 had died, 19 remained under the care of friends, 23 had been returned to asylums, and 49 remained on probation. It is stated that the number of probationary discharges varies greatly in different asylums. The total number of probationary discharges, since they were authorized in 1862 to the close of 1876, was 1805. Of this number, 297 had been replaced in asylums before the expiry of the period of probation.

272 escapes were intimated in 1876. All the runaways except 29 were brought back within the currency of the Sheriff's order; of the 29, 2 were ultimately removed from the register as recovered, and 26 as improved, while 1 committed suicide. 13 accidents ended fatally in 1876; and 29 were attended with broken bones. The whole number of accidents reported in 1876 was 117.

The subjoined Table (in continuation of similar Tables in former Almanacs) shows for each county, and for the whole of Scotland, the number of pauper lunatics chargeable on the 1st January 1876, and the total expenditure on account of pauper lunatics, and the average daily expenditure (exclusive of the cost of medical certificates, of transport to asylums, etc.) for each pauper lunatic, during the year ended 14th May 1876:—

Of the £165,261 spent upon pauper lunatics in the year ended 14th May 1876, £62,637 was contributed by the imperial exchequer, and £8018 was contributed by relatives. The total number of pauper patients relieved during that year was 8420 (3856 males and 4564 females), and the number of days for which relief was granted was 2,502,811, of which 68·7 per cent. was given in asylums, 11·2 per cent. in licensed wards of poorhouses, and 20·1 per cent. in private dwellings.

The whole number of lunatics resident in asylums and lunatic wards of poorhouses at 1st January 1876 having been 6817 (1286 private and 5531 pauper) during 1876, the number admitted, including transfers, was 2952

(562 private and 2390 pauper); the number discharged recovered was 1092 (189 private and 903 pauper); the number discharged not recovered, also including patients transferred, was 971 (179 private and 792 pauper); the number transferred from one establishment to another was 582 (27 private and 555 pauper); and the number who died during the year was 585 (124 private and 461 pauper).

### THE POOR LAWS.

The Thirty-first Annual Report of the Board of Supervision for the Relief of the Poor in Scotland, is for the year ended 14th May 1876.

During the year the number of parishes in Scotland in which assessments are levied for the relief of the poor was 817; and in 69 parishes the poor were relieved by means of voluntary contributions. In 20 of the assessed parishes the assessment was made according to local usage. In 608 parishes the assessment was made equally upon owners and occupants respectively, and in 189 parishes there was a classification of occupants, in terms of the 36th section of the Act 8 and 9 Vict. c. 83. During the year six parishes, which had previously raised the funds for the relief of the poor by voluntary contributions, resolved to raise those funds by assessment. One parish abandoned assessment according to established usage for the first mode of assessment prescribed by the statute (the only mode now legal).

*Receipt and Expenditure.*—The sum received from all sources for the relief and management of the poor was, in the year 1873-74, £853,432; in the year 1874-75, £849,945; and, in the year 1875-76, £879,436. The sum expended during the year ended 14th May 1876, for the relief and management of the poor (including £2963 expended on buildings not being authorized poor-houses, £37,029 expended on authorized poorhouse buildings, and £9459 on repairs and furnishings) was £847,252. In the preceding year the expenditure for the same purposes was £835,306. There was thus an increase in the expenditure of £11,945. The parochial boards also disbursed during the year £8448 in repayment of advances from banks and payment of interest on over-drafts. In previous years such payments had been wrongly included in charges for management.

In the following Table are shown the amount and details of the poor-law expenditure in each of the three years, ended 14th May, 1874-76, together with the rate per head of the population (calculated on the census of 1871); and also the averages of the same items for the ten years ending in 1876:—

It is stated that the cost of maintaining the lunatic poor continues to increase. In 1866-67 it amounted to £108,172, and in 1875-76 it was £157,266, an increase of £49,093. The increase in 1875-76 over the previous year was £367. Between 1868-69 and 1875-76, the expenditure on pauper lunatics increased by £32,453, while the total expenditure, exclusive of cost of buildings and lunatics, decreased by £55,837; so that, had the cost of lunatics decreased proportionally to the cost of maintaining the other poor during this period, or had it even remained stationary, the total expenditure in 1875-76 would have been materially different. It is remarked that, owing to the conditions attending lunacy, and the continuous increase in the number of lunatic paupers, the expenditure upon that class of poor is much less under control than any of the other heads of expenditure in the administration of the poor laws.

The following Table exhibits the number of paupers of all classes in receipt of relief on the 14th of May in each year, the ratio per cent. of persons in receipt of parochial relief to population, and the average annual cost of each individual and of each registered pauper to the parish, for the years 1859, 1869, and the three years 1874-76:—

The number of paupers of all classes, including dependants, in receipt of relief on 14th May 1876 (104,162, 1443 fewer than on the same day in the preceding year) was 2·9 per cent. of the estimated population. The number, both of registered and casual poor in receipt of relief, during each of the years 1874-76, was smaller than it had ever been since the Act of 1845 came into operation, notwithstanding a considerable increase to the population during the interval. The number relieved in 1875-76 reached a lower point than that of any preceding year. Of the increase in the expenditure in that year (£11,945), £9062 was attributable to outlay on buildings, and was, therefore, properly speaking, an expenditure of capital. The cost of the Registered Poor, however, increased in that year by £1589, which was to a large extent due to the increased cost of living—the average annual cost of maintaining each pauper lunatic having been £9, 12s. 6½d., while in 1859 it was £6, 10s. 7½d. The cost of relieving the casual poor was £1595 less in 1875-76 than in the preceding year, so that, on the total cost of relief, there was a decrease of £6. There was an increase of £1964 in the cost of medical relief—an item of expenditure, it is observed, which may be expected to grow; a decrease of £2530 in the cost of management—due, however, to certain items improperly charged against management having been struck out, and there was an increase of £2455 in law expenses, which, however, was entirely confined to eight parishes, and was to be regarded as exceptional. In the greater number of parishes there had been a decreased charge for law expenses. The Board are of opinion that a still further diminution of the total expenditure might be safely and beneficially effected by a due and strict administration of the law.

In 1875-76, 46 paupers, having 13 dependants, were, either voluntarily or by warrant of the Sheriff or Justices, removed to England; and 106, having 88 dependants, were similarly removed to Ireland; 1042 paupers, having 838 dependants, were either judicially or otherwise removed from one parish to another in Scotland; 3478 persons were refused relief during the year; and the number of poor relieved under order (final or interim) of the Sheriff was 173.

The number of lunatic poor relieved in the year 1875-76 was 8664. In the immediately preceding year it was 8287; in 1866 it was 6457. Of those relieved in 1875-76, 1688 died or were cured, or ceased to receive relief; so that the number at 14th May 1876 was 6976, being an increase, as compared with the number at the same date in the preceding year (6737), of 239. Of these 4440 were in asylums, 1123 in licensed wards of poorhouses, and 1413 were in private dwellings.

The number of orphan and deserted children chargeable during the year was 7304; but the number on one day (14th May) was only 6052. Of these 4138 were orphans, and 1914 deserted.

24,274 pauper children were receiving education during the year, at a cost for the year to the parishes of £14,284. 5163 children, for whom application had been made under section 69 of the Education Act, were also receiving education during the year, at a cost to the parishes of £2617. The expenditure from the poor's funds on account of education, exclusive of the cost of education in Industrial Schools, Deaf and Dumb Institutions, and other similar places, was therefore £16,901. 3528 applications were made to Parochial Boards under the 69th section of the Education Act during the year; 2276 were granted, 969 refused, and 283 had not been disposed of when the return was made up or had been withdrawn.

The number of applications complaining of inadequate relief presented to the Board during the year ended 30th June 1876 was 262. In the immediately preceding year the number was 244. In 1875-76, the complaint was in 1 case withdrawn or stopped by death, and in 25 cases the ground of complaint was removed; in no case was a minute issued finding that the applicant had a just cause of action. The whole number of such applications made to the Board from 1845-46 to 1875-76 was 16,601. In 3925 of those cases the ground of complaint was removed; in 107 the complaint was withdrawn or stopped by death; and in 30 cases a minute was issued declaring that the applicant had a just cause of action.

In the year ended 30th June 1875, the total number of applications to Sheriffs, on the ground that relief had been improperly refused, was 371 (but defects of registration have to be allowed for). Interim orders of relief were granted in 178 cases, and final orders in 33 cases. The average annual number of such interim orders in the ten years ended at the above date was 325, and of such final orders 88. The number of prosecutions under the 79th and 80th sections of the statute in the year ended 30th June 1875 was 91, and the number of convictions 50. The average annual number of such prosecutions in the ten years then ended was 105, and of convictions 58.

*Poorhouses.*—The number of poorhouses on 1st August 1876 was 62 (with accommodation for 14,358 inmates) for 411 parishes, having a population of 2,429,167. The number of poorhouses in progress was 3, for 15 parishes, having a population of 51,153; so that, when the latter are completed, there will be 65 poorhouses for 426 parishes, having a population of 2,480,320. The Board during the year approved of the rates for boarding paupers belonging to 178 parishes in the poorhouses of other parishes or combinations. The approval of such rates has to be asked for every year. There are 189 parishes, with a population of 485,449, which have a right to send paupers to poorhouses belonging to other parishes; but some of these are in combinations for proposed poorhouses, or propose to have poorhouses of their own. The population to which poorhouse accommodation was available was therefore 2,914,616. The total population of the parishes (286 in number) to which poorhouse accommodation is still not available is 445,402. The number of poor receiving in-door relief was 8189 at 1st January 1874, 8653 at 1st January 1875; and 8354 at 1st January 1876; 7769 at 14th May 1874, 7673 at 14th May 1875; and 7586 at 14th May 1876; 7318 at 1st July 1874, 7289 at 1st July 1875; and 7618 at 1st July 1876. The number of poor who received in-door relief (including readmissions) during the half-year ended 31st December 1875 was 17,506, of whom 9152 were discharged, or died during the half-year. There were 7540 on the sick-list during the half-year, and 1005 died. The number of lunatics who were inmates of poorhouses during the half-year was 1598; the number of children at school at 1st January 1876 was 929. In the half-year ended 30th June 1876, the number of

inmates in poorhouses (including readmissions) was 19,142, of whom 11,524 were discharged or died; the number on the sick-list was 8291, of whom 1204 died; the number of lunatic inmates was 1546; and the number of inmates at school at 1st July 1876 was 879. The average weekly cost per head of inmates of all the poorhouses of Scotland for food, fuel, clothing, light, and all other necessities of maintenance, was, for the half-year ended 31st December 1875, 3s. 3½d.; it was 3s. 5d. in the half-year ended 30th June 1876. The average weekly expenditure per head of ordinary inmates for whom there was accommodation in the poorhouse, on account of salaries of officials, feu-duties, insurance, repairs, etc., was 10d. in the first half-year, and the same in the second; on account of estimated rent it was 8½d. in the first, the same in the second half-year; on account of medical attendance, medicine, etc., it was 1½d. in the first half-year, and the same in the second. The poorhouses in progress at 4th August 1876 were the Lanark Combination (10 parishes, with a population of 27,339 in 1871); the Lanark poorhouse (single parish, with a population of 7841); and the Long Island Combination (4 parishes), with a population of 15,973).

*Number of Poor and Amount of Expenditure in each County.*—The next Table shows the number of permanent and casual poor in each county (distinguishing the number of assessed and unassessed parishes) relieved during the years ended on 14th May 1875 and 14th May 1876; and the amount of money expended for their relief during the same period, distinguishing the amount for permanent poor from the amount for casual poor:—

Of the 86,881 poor on the roll or registered during the year 1875-76, 26,880 were males and 60,501 were females.

*Church Collections, Voluntary Contributions, and Mortifications.*—The whole sum derived from church collections in assessed parishes during the year ending 14th May 1876, was £18,748, of which £10,002 is stated to have been expended on relief of the poor. Of this sum £336 was handed over to the parochial boards. It would appear, therefore, that the sum of £9666 derived from church collections was actually applied by the kirk-sessions to the relief of persons in their parishes who required assistance. "But these funds," the Report intimates, "are generally employed to afford aid to persons who have fallen into temporary difficulties, with a view to prevent them from becoming chargeable to the parish as paupers; and it is probable that few of the persons so assisted have also been chargeable to the funds raised by assessment." The whole amount derived from voluntary contributions and church collections for the relief of the poor (not including the sum expended by kirk-sessions in assessed parishes) in 1876 was £9168. The corresponding amount in 1874 was £10,727. The amount derived from grants for medical relief, lunatics, mortifications, and all other sources (assessments, voluntary contributions, and church collections excepted), in 1876, was £99,285.

*Paupers in the United Kingdom.*—The following Table shows (1.) the number of paupers (exclusive of vagrants) in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in the unions and parishes under boards of guardians in England and Wales, on the 1st of January in each of the three years 1875-77; (2.) the number of paupers in receipt of relief (distinguishing out-door from in-door) in unions in Ireland at the close of the first week of January in each of the same years; and (3.) the number of paupers and their dependants (exclusive of casual poor) in receipt of relief in parishes in Scotland, on the 14th of May in each of the three years 1874-76:—

The total amount of poor-rates received in England in 1876 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £12,905,395 (the annual value of rateable rental having been, in 1875, £119,079,589), and the amount expended in actual relief of the poor was £7,335,858. The total amount of poor-rates received in Ireland in 1876 (year ended Lady-day), including receipts in aid of poor-rates, was £1,044,396, and the amount expended in the relief and management of the poor was £1,001,400.

*The Public Health Act.*—The number of parishes in which, during the year ended 14th May 1876, money was received or expended under the Act was 608; in the year preceding it was 587. The total receipts were £143,755; of which £69,736 was derived from assessment, £98 from penalties, £144 from authors of nuisances, £11,199 from other sources, and £62,575 from loans on the security of rates or property. The total expenditure under the Act amounted to £152,917. £10,742 had been expended upon drainage; £58,905 on water supply; £7581 on removal of nuisances; £32,074 on hospital accommodation; £27,834 on other purposes; and £14,979 in repayment of money borrowed. The "other purposes" include vaccination, burials, disinfectants, salaries, and heads of miscellaneous expenditure. The sums stated do not represent the whole receipts and expenditure in Scotland for sanitary purposes, as in many places important sanitary operations have been carried on under the provisions either of local Acts or of the General Police Acts, and none of these operations are embraced in the returns under the Public Health Act. The total expenditure under the Public Health Act, from the passing of the Act (15th August 1867) to the 14th May 1876, amounted to £541,625; of which £76,933 was expended upon drainage, £184,587 upon water supply, and, within the last four years, £77,009 upon hospital accommodation.

## BIRTHS, DEATHS, AND MARRIAGES.

The Twenty-second Annual Report of the Registrar-General contains statistics of the Births, Deaths, and Marriages registered in Scotland during the year 1876.

The following Table shows the number of Births, of Deaths, and of Marriages registered in each Registration County, and in each Group of Registration Counties, in Scotland, in the year 1876, and also in the years 1874 and 1875, distinguishing the number of males and the number of females for the year 1876. For the population of the Registration Counties according to the Census of 1871, see Almanac for 1873, page 320. In most cases it differs somewhat from the population of the civil or proper counties, by reason that parishes which lie partly within one county, partly within another, are held, for the purposes of the Registration of Births, Deaths, and Marriages, to lie wholly within the county in which the parish church is situated.

The number of *Births* registered in 1876 (126,749) was at the rate of 359 births in every 10,000 of the estimated population; it was 354 per 10,000 in 1875. The birth-rate was highest in the large towns (441 per 10,000 persons). In the small towns it was at an exceptionally high rate (372 per 10,000 persons). In the principal towns it was a little lower than usual. In the mainland-rural and insular-rural districts it was somewhat in excess of the rates of 1875. Of the 126,749 children whose births were registered in 1876, 64,927 were males, and 61,822 were females, so that there were born 105 males to every 100 females. The largest proportion of male births was in the insular-rural districts, where it was 110·3 to every 100 females born, while in the principal and large towns the male and female births were in the proportion of only 104·6 to 100. Births were most frequent in the month of May, when, on an average, 381 per day were registered; and least frequent in December, when the average was only 324.

For every thousand of estimated population there were, in 1876, 35·9 births, 21·0 deaths, and 7·5 marriages. It is observed that, apart from the disturbing influences of emigration and immigration, the increase of the population of Scotland must have been great in 1876; and that the frequency of marriages during that and the four preceding years rendered it probable that the increase would be sustained. The birth-rate was unusually high; the death-rate was the lowest experienced since 1861, and far within the average of the preceding ten years; and the marriage-rate, though lower than it was in 1873 and 1874, considerably exceeded the average of the preceding ten years.

In nineteen counties, between six and twelve per cent. of the births were illegitimate; and in eight counties the rate of illegitimacy exceeded twelve per cent.; while in six other counties it was under six per cent. The north-eastern and southern parts of the country furnish the greatest proportion of illegitimate births; the proportion is far less formidable in the north-western and west-midland parts.

The *Death-rate* in 1876 (210 deaths per 10,000 persons) was, as has been said, a very moderate one. The amount of epidemic disease prevalent in the principal towns during the year was remarkably small, and consequently the number of deaths, particularly at early ages, was unusually low. The total deaths in February averaged 242 per day, but in October there were only 166 per day. The death-rate in the large towns (258 per 10,000 persons) was far below that recorded for the years 1854 and 1855. The death-rate in the principal towns (234 per 10,000 persons) was much below the average of previous years. In the small towns, mainland-rural and insular-rural districts, the proportions were 210, 173, and 164 per 10,000, the figures indicating in each case a mortality less severe than that of 1875, or even that of 1874—though the difference in favour of 1876 was far more marked in the cases of the large towns and principal towns.

The number of *Marriages* recorded in 1876 (26,563) gives a rate (75 per 10,000) considerably above the average of former years, and which has only twice been exceeded in the past twenty-one years, viz., in 1873 and 1874. It is observed that this must be taken as indicating a fair amount of commercial prosperity in the country. As in former years, the frequency of marriage was proportionate to the aggregation of the population in the various registration districts. There were, for every 10,000 persons, 90 marriages

in the principal towns (which was a trifle below the rate which occurred in them in 1874), 89 in the large towns, 72 in the small towns, 60 in the main-land-rural districts, and 48 in the insular-rural districts. In each case, excepting that of the principal towns, the rate of marriage in 1876 considerably exceeded that observed in 1875.

It is observed that the proportion of illegitimate births to the number of unmarried women and widows capable of bearing children will convey some idea of the relative frequency of illegitimate births among those classes of women; and that the percentage of illegimitates furnished by possible mothers seems, at least, as fair a test of immorality as the percentage of illegimitates to total births. Of the children born in the eight towns (44,245 in number), 22,617 were males, and 21,628 were females, being at the rate of 104·6 boys for every 100 girls, which has been about the average rate for those towns of late years. The birth-rate of the eight towns was at the rate of 370 per 10,000 persons. It was highest in Greenock (407 per 10,000 persons), and lowest in Edinburgh (327 per 10,000 persons), and the same had been the case in the two previous years. The proportion of illegitimate births to the total births was lowest in Leith and Greenock (5·1 and 6·3 per cent. respectively, and highest in Aberdeen (11·2 per cent.). The proportion of illegitimate births to the number of possible mothers was lowest in Edinburgh (1·66 per cent.), and highest in Aberdeen (2·57 per cent.)

The death-rate of the principal towns in 1876 (234 per 10,000 of the estimated population) was far below that of 1875, when the rate was 264 per 10,000, and still more decidedly below the average of the ten years ended in 1875, which was 278·5 per 10,000. The mortality in the various towns did not vary so much as usual; and the average mortality was exceeded (but only slightly) in the case of Perth alone. In the other seven towns it was much lower than usual. In Glasgow, Edinburgh, Dundee, and Greenock it was lower than it had been in any of the ten years ended in 1875. The averages of these years were, for Glasgow, 3·02 per cent.; Edinburgh, 2·50 per cent.; Dundee, 2·77 per cent.; Aberdeen, 2·30 per cent.; Greenock, 2·95 per cent.; Paisley, 2·88 per cent.; Leith, 2·38 per cent.; and Perth, 2·37 per cent.

Of the persons who died in the eight towns, 14,253 were males, and 13,720 were females. Of the persons who died, there were, under five years of age, 34·4 per cent. in Perth, 35·5 per cent. in Edinburgh, 36·8 per cent. in Aberdeen and in Paisley, 45·3 per cent. in Dundee, 45·6 per cent. in Glasgow, 46·0 per cent. in Greenock, and 47·2 per cent. in Leith. Of every 1000 children under five years of age in each, there died in 1876, in Aberdeen 56·2, in Edinburgh 58·7, in Perth 69·1, in Leith 70·7, in Greenock 71·0, in Paisley 73·2, in Dundee 73·6, and in Glasgow 84·3. It is observed that the latter figures seem to be the more instructive as regards the infant mortality of the towns.

From the vaccination returns it appears that of 123,651 children born in 1875, 87·42 per cent. were successfully vaccinated; 0·979 per cent. had their vaccination postponed from ill health or other causes, 0·154 per cent. were found insusceptible of vaccination from constitutional insusceptibility, 0·001 per cent. insusceptible from having had an attack of smallpox, and 0·204 insusceptible from their mothers or nurses having previously vaccinated them. 9·16 per cent. died under the age of six months unvaccinated; while 2·082 per cent. (2575 persons) were removed from the districts before vaccination could be enforced, or were otherwise unaccounted for. Deducting from the children born during the year the number who died under the age of six months, it appears that, of the living children, 112,325 in number, 96·285 per cent.

(108,096 persons) were successfully vaccinated, while 1·078 per cent. had their vaccination postponed. Adding the number of those known to have been irregularly but successfully vaccinated (252), it appears that 96·459 per cent. of the children born in 1875 have received the protection which vaccination affords. The number of cases in which a certificate of insusceptibility from some constitutional peculiarity was granted was 190 (0·169 per cent.). It is remarked that the insusceptibility thus certified merely indicates that, from some cause or other, two attempts at vaccination had, in a given case, been abortive, and that it is all but certain that the so-called insusceptibility would in most of the cases not be a life-long condition. The proportion of children who, by being removed from the district of their birth, or from any other unknown cause, were not vaccinated, or not known to be vaccinated, was per 100 of children alive at the age of six months, 2·528 in 1865, 2·551 in 1866, 2·370 in 1867, 2·363 in 1868, 2·683 in 1869, 2·395 in 1870, 2·433 in 1871, 2·164 in 1872, 2·406 in 1873, 2·556 in 1874, and 2·293 in 1875. On the average of the ten years 1865-74, it was 2·444 per cent.

The number of deaths from smallpox was 1309 in 1855; 1306 in 1856; 845 in 1857; 332 in 1858; 682 in 1859; 1495 in 1860; 766 in 1861; 426 in 1862; 1646 in 1863; 1741 in 1864; 383 in 1865; 200 in 1866; 100 in 1867; 15 in 1868; 64 in 1869; 114 in 1870; 1442 in 1871; 2446 in 1872; and is estimated at 866 for 1873, 661 for 1874, 93 for 1875, and 28 for 1876.

The Report insists on the importance of reducing the period within which vaccination has to be performed from six to four months after birth, with a view to the more successful attainment of the object sought by the law. It points out that, adding to the numbers of children presumed to be unvaccinated because unaccounted for to the Registrars the cases of so-called constitutional insusceptibility, there were 2765 of the children born in 1875 who were not known to have been vaccinated, and that this indicates a failure of the existing Vaccination Act to the extent of 2·462 per cent. of the children alive at the age of six months.

The strength of the police establishments of Scotland in 1876, including officers, was 3356 men (counties 1235, burghs 2121). This included 34 chief constables (2 in burghs), 78 superintendents (36 in counties, 42 in burghs), 42 lieutenants (in burghs), 118 inspectors (61 in counties, 57 in burghs), 303 sergeants (128 in counties, 175 in burghs), and 78 detective officers (8 in counties, 70 in burghs). The authorized forces, however, amounted to only 3249 (counties 1229, burghs 2020), and the actual strength of forces at the date of the Return was 3304 (counties 1219, burghs 2085). 31 officers were

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sick, and there were 21 vacancies (14 in counties, 7 in burghs). The total cost of the police establishments in Scotland, in 1876, was £282,801 (counties £115,534, burghs £167,266), and the sum contributed by the Treasury for their maintenance during that year was £115,250 (counties £43,644, burghs £71,606).

The average annual total expenditure for current expenses in the five years ended 1876 was in the County Prisons of Scotland, £49,904; and in the General Prison, Perth, £19,300—total, £69,204. The average annual net profit on the labour of prisoners during the same period was, in County Prisons £4217, and in the General Prison, Perth, £3413—total, £7630. The average annual cost per prisoner during that period was, in County Prisons, £23, 12s. 0d., and in the General Prison, £26, 2s. 2d., and, on County Prisons and the General Prison taken together, £24, 4s. 5d.; while the average annual earnings per prisoner was, in County Prisons, £1, 19s. 5d., in the General Prison, £4, 12s. 3d., and on County Prisons and the General Prison taken together, £2, 13s. 3d. The net average annual cost per prisoner during the five years was therefore, in County Prisons, £21, 12s. 7d., in the General Prison, Perth, £21, 9s. 11d., and in all the prisons of Scotland, £21, 11s. 2d.

The number of criminal prisoners in Scottish prisons at the close of 1875

was 2845 (1812 males and 1033 females). The number of prisoners received during the year 1876, not including cases of recommitment of the same individual, was 30,055 (21,206 males and 8849 females). The whole number of criminal prisoners in confinement during the year, including cases of recommitment, was 47,534. The number of criminal prisoners at the close of 1876 was 2733 (1748 males and 985 females). The average daily number of criminal prisoners was 2843 in the first quarter of 1876; 2964 in the second quarter; 3140 in the third quarter; and 2920 in the fourth quarter. The number of revenue prisoners in Scotland in 1876, imprisoned until payment of fine or penalty, was 20 (18 males and 2 females). There was no escape from prison nor recapture in 1876. There were 3 cases of suicide.

*Civil Prisoners.*—The average daily number of *civil* prisoners in the prisons of Scotland in 1876 was 75 (73 males and 2 females). The total number of civil prisoners in 1876, including those in custody at the beginning of the year, was 757 (727 males and 30 females). The date of committal of the civil prisoner who had been longest in prison at the end of 1876, was the 12th December 1873.

*Current Yearly Expenses of County Prisons.*—The expenditure under the prison boards of the several counties, chargeable on the general fund for current annual expenses, was, for the year 1876, as follows:—Aberdeenshire, £2167; Argyllshire, £806; Ayrshire, £4010; Banffshire, £397; Berwickshire, £344; Bute, £490; Caithness-shire, £318; Clackmannanshire, £521; Dumbartonshire, £984; Dumfriesshire, £697; Edinburghshire, £9627; Elginshire, £436; Fifeshire, £1687; Forfarshire, £4788; Haddingtonshire, £532; Inverness-shire, £1539; Kincardineshire, £322; Kinross-shire, £131; Kirkcudbrightshire, £535; Lanarkshire, North, £20,132; Lanarkshire, South, £4167; Linlithgowshire, £652; Nairnshire, £156; Orkney, £193; Peeblesshire, £301; Perthshire, £1775; Renfrewshire, £5108; Ross and Cromarty, £623; Roxburghshire, £915; Selkirkshire, £521; Stirlingshire, £1810; Sutherlandshire, £281; Wigtownshire, £674; Zetland, £163. Total, £67,805; of which there was paid for prisons, £52,935; for prisoners in prisons of other counties, £281; for removal of prisoners to government prisons, £1081; for removal to reformatories and industrial schools, £207; for general management, £2668; for retired allowances, £1327; for interest, £292; for miscellaneous purposes, £3875; for materials and implements of work, £5136. The total receipts in 1876 were as follows:—From the assessment for current expenses, £45,444; from Exchequer—for maintenance of prisoners, £6093; in reimbursement for escort and conveyance of prisoners, £355—total, £6949; for maintenance of military, naval, and revenue prisoners, £1095; for prisoners from other counties, £256; from sales of old prison stores, £105; from interest, £99; from other sources, £11,658; from employers and purchasers of work, £11,474. Total receipts for 1876, £77,081. The balances at the credit of boards at 31st December 1875 amounted to £7455, and the balances at the debit of boards to £15,846. The balances at the credit of boards at 31st December 1876 amounted to £8229, and the balances at the debit of boards to £7343.

*Assessments imposed by Prison Boards.*—The amount of assessments imposed by County Prison Boards was, in 1876, for current expenses, £44,991; and for building expenses, £6778—total, £51,770. On the average of the five years ended 1876, it was, for current expenses, £43,159; and for building expenses, £9830—total, £52,989. The amount of the assessments in 1876 was distributed between landward and burghal districts as follows:—Current expenses, landward, £23,560, burghal, £21,431; buildings, landward, £1517, burghal, £5260—totals, landward, £25,078, burghal, £26,692.

One office in the Outer House has still made no returns for 1874 and 1875, and made returns for 1876 which were defective, and not suitable for publication in the Tables. Of the 835 final judgments returned as delivered in the Outer House in 1876, 720 were on process initiated by summons, 53 on process initiated by petition, and 62 on process initiated by writ other than summons or petition. 363 followed on procedure requiring closed records, and 472 on procedure not requiring closed records. The returns for the Outer House for 1874, 1875, and 1876 being defective, quinquennial averages could not be stated. Of the 479 final judgments pronounced in the Inner House in 1876, 168 were on process initiated by reclaiming note, 139 on process initiated by petition, and 172 on process initiated by appeal or other writ. 229 were in proceedings initiated in the Inner House, 192 in proceedings brought from the Outer House, and 58 in proceedings otherwise brought before the Court. 166 were judgments on decisions pronounced in the Outer House; and of the decisions, 118 were adhered to, 12 were repeated but the grounds of decision altered, 27 were reversed, and 9 were partially adhered to and partially reversed. In the five years ended 1876, the average net total of causes before the Inner House was 806 (viz., 152 in dependence at the commencement of the year, and 654 initiated within the year); and the average number of final judgments was 507 (viz., 168 on process initiated by reclaiming note, 157 on process initiated by petition, and 182 on process initiated by appeal or other writ).

In 774 of the 1041 appeals decided by the Sheriff in 1876, the original judgment was sustained; in 162 it was reversed, and in 105 there were mixed judgments. The miscellaneous and administrative business disposed of in the Sheriff Courts in 1876 was as follows:—2996 applications, etc., under the Bankruptcy Act, 642 under the Poor Law Acts, 2339 under the Lunacy Acts, 785 under the Registration of Births, etc., Acts, 241 under the Education Act of 1872, 49 under the Master and Servants Act, 54 petitions for admission, suspension, etc., of sheriff-officers, 609 petitions for service of heirs, 32 appointments of tutors or curators to minors, 112 applications by prisoners for aliment, 76 applications under the Sanitary Act, 36 under the Merchant Shipping Acts, 95 for *fugæ* warrants, 14 for lawburrows, 1129 for admission to the Poor Roll, 3287 decrees in absence from Ordinary Court, and 1577 miscellaneous applications—total number of matters dealt with, 14,073; the corresponding average for the four years 1873–76 being 13,266. The number of applications in 1876 for *cessio bonorum* was 212. The average number for the five years ended in 1876 was 180.

In the Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts in 1876, there were 17 reponings at the pursuer's instance, 86 at the defender's instance. Of the 1061 primary decrees *in foro*, 87 were pronounced by the Sheriff, and 974 by the Sheriff-substitute. The number of appeals from the Sheriff-substitute to the Sheriff was 165. The decision appealed against was affirmed in 98 cases, and altered in 29, while 12 appeals were withdrawn, and 26 were in

dependence at the end of the year. The amount carried by reversals or alterations on appeal from the Sheriff-substitute to the Sheriff was £97; viz., in favour of pursuers, £75, and in favour of defenders, £22. 5 appeals to the Court of Session were in dependence during the year. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Debts Recovery Courts was 4641 in 1876, it was 4313 in 1875, 3886 in 1874, 3530 in 1873, 3451 in 1872, and 3964 on the average of the five years 1872-76.

In the Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts in 1876, there were 88 reponings on decrees in absence pronounced in the previous year at the defender's instance, and 45 of the decrees were reversed; there were 29 such reponings at the pursuer's instance, whereof 25 were decided in his favour. On decrees pronounced within the year, there were 524 reponings at the defender's instance, and 252 of the decrees were reversed; there were 255 at the pursuer's instance, whereof 172 were decided in his favour. Of the £165,073 claimed in causes decided by decree, £137,069 consisted of claims for debt, £10,576 of claims of damages, £14,511 of claims made in sequestrations for rent, and £2916 of other claims. While the total number of causes in dependence in Sheriffs' Small Debt Courts was 47,043 in 1876, it was 45,949 in 1875, 44,529 in 1874, 43,455 in 1873, 43,196 in 1872, and 44,834 on the average of the five years 1872-76.

In the Justice of Peace Small Debt Courts in 1876, the number of sales under poindings was 77; the principal sums in the decrees of poindings amounted to £160; the total expenses in decrees of poindings to £14; the free proceeds of the sales to £134; the total expenses of poinding and sale to £67; and the total of surpluses paid to debtors to £4, 7s. 9d. Of the £24,939 claimed in causes decided by decree, £24,365 consisted of claims of debt, £190 of claims of damages, and £383 of other claims. While the total number of causes in Justice of Peace Courts was 14,776 in 1876, it was 14,112 in 1875, 13,620 in 1874, 12,340 in 1873, 12,873 in 1872, and 13,544 on the average of the five years 1872-76.

## V. JUDICIAL RECORDS.

### (1.) *Bankruptcy.*

The number of bankruptcies in dependence in Scotland at the commencement of the year ended 31st October 1875 was 2571; the number awarded during the year, 441; and 5 were reopened during the year—total, 3017. The number awarded was 490 in 1871, 368 in 1872, 391 in 1873, and 382 in 1874—the average number for the five years 1871-75 being 414. The total number in dependence was 2898 in 1871, 2869 in 1872, 2895 in 1873, and 2903 in 1874—the average number for the five years 1871-75 being 2916. The number disposed of in 1875 was 284, viz., wound up by final division and discharge, 167; by composition, 84; by deed of arrangement, 16; otherwise wound up, 17. The time between awarding and discharge in 11 cases was 6 months and under a year; in 26, a year and under 18 months; in 28, 18 months and under 2 years; in 27, 2 years and under 3; in 23, 3 years and under 4; in 14, 4 years and under 5; and in 39 it was 5 years and upwards. Of the 441 bankruptcies awarded during the year, 98 were awarded by the Court of Session and remitted to Sheriffs, and 343 were awarded by Sheriffs of counties. The number of the bankrupts was 497, 393 in sole sequestrations, and 104 in joint or partnership sequestrations. Of the bankrupts, 369 were traders, 58 manufacturers, 22 farmers, 9 lawyers, 2 medical practitioners, 7 persons not acquiring income by any occupation, and 30 were of other descriptions.

In the 167 bankruptcies concluded by final division and discharge in 1875, the amount of gross estates, per inventory and valuation by trustees, was £348,298; the amount of the debts was £742,513; the amount of the sums recovered by the trustees during the period of the sequestration was £285,147. The amount of expenses was £55,433 (viz., allowances to bankrupts, £794; trustees' commission, £13,458; law expenses, £18,521; miscellaneous expenses—ordinary, £6973; extraordinary, £15,684); the amount divided among the creditors was £229,146 (viz., secured creditors, £54,846; unsecured, £174,299); and the amount of surpluses paid to bankrupts or their representatives, less overpayments made by trustees in certain sequestrations, was £567.

(2.) *Judicial Factories.*

The number of bonds by judicial factors at 30th September 1874 was 845; in the year ended 30th September 1875, 116 bonds were lodged with the accountant—total bonds in accountant's hands during the year ended 30th September 1875, 961; of which 422 were by factors *loco tutoris*, 476 by factors *loco absentis*, 63 by *curators bonis*. The total number of bonds was, in 1871, 938, in 1872, 929, in 1873, 929, and, in 1874, 967—the average number for the five years 1871-75 being 945. In 1874-75, in 107 cases the estate was wound up or the appointment recalled; the number of bonds remaining at 30th September 1875 was therefore 854. In the year ended 30th September 1875, 846 accounts were rendered; 114 were not rendered, as not being due before the end of the year; 1 due at that date had not been rendered within the year. The personal estate dealt with by judicial factors, ascertained and estimated, was £2,280,668; the value of the lands and heritages under their charge was not ascertained. The revenue of estates under judicial factors in the year ended 30th September 1875 was £196,391; the expenditure was £102,416, viz., on maintenance of wards, £80,920; factors' commission, £12,638; accountants' charges, £1434; law agents' charges, £7428.

(3.) *Judicial Records kept at Edinburgh.*

At the Register of Deeds Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1876 was 3439. 3124 were entries of original writs, and 315 second extracts of writs previously recorded. The fees received amounted to £3989. The average of entries was 3098, and of fees £3621, in the five years ended 1876.

The number of protests entered in the Register of Protests on bills and notes in 1876 was 484. The number of persons protested against was 601; the amount of the sums protested for was £35,761. The average number of protests was 425, and the average amount protested for, £37,320, in the five years ended 1876.

The number of certificates entered under 31 and 32 Vict. c. 54, in "The Register for English and Irish Judgments," in 1876, was 45—42 from England, and 3 from Ireland.

At the Register of Adjudications Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1876 was 666. 469 were mercantile sequestrations, 1 for recovery of specified debt, the amount being £47, and 196 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £53.

At the Register of Inhibitions Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1876 was 1110. 485 were mercantile sequestrations; 167 were for recovery of specified debts; and 458 were for other purposes. The fees received during the year amounted to £180. The average number of entries was 992, in the five years ended 1876.

At the Register of Hornings Office, the number of entries in the presentment book in 1876 was 199. The fees received amounted to £31.

The business which passed through the Bill-Chamber in 1876 was as follows:—Suspensions, interdicts, and liberations, 224; bills for loosing arrestments, 18; petitions for sequestration under Bankrupt Act, 95; other petitions, etc., 99. Total, 436—the average number for the five years ended 1876 being 405.

At the Register of Sasines Office, the number of entries in the presentment book during the year 1876 was 32,245. The amount of fees received was £30,341. The average number of entries was 26,948, and the average amount of fees £28,450, in the five years ended 1876.

The whole number of registered protests on bills and notes (including those entered in the General Register stated above, along with those entered in district registers) in 1876 was 2213. The whole number of persons protested against was 2591; the amount of the sums protested for was £106,072. The number registered was 2034, and the amount protested for £101,205, on the average of the five years ended 1876.

## PRISONS.

The "Thirty-eighth Report on Prisons in Scotland, being (in continuation of the Reports of the late General Board of Prisons) the Sixteenth Annual Report of the Managers appointed under the Prisons (Scotland) Administration Act, 1860," is for the year 1876.

The Report states the accommodation for prisoners at the disposal of the Managers during the year 1876 as follows: in the Penal Department of the General Prison at Perth, cells for 372 males and 328 females—700 persons, exclusive of the Hospitals, which, on an average, contain 12 males and 19 females—31 persons—in all, accommodation for 731 persons; in the Lunatic Department of the General Prison, accommodation for 40 males and 18 females—58 persons; in the prison of Ayr, cells for 80 female convicts; in the prison of Paisley, cells for 62 male convicts. The daily average number of prisoners throughout the year was, in the Penal Department of the General Prison, 650 (342 males and 308 females); in the Lunatic Department, 54 (39 males and 15 females); total daily average in General Prison, 704 (381 males and 323 females). The number of prisoners in the Penal Department at the commencement of the year was 686—of whom 434 (308 males and 126 females) were under sentence of imprisonment, and 252 (45 males and 207 females) under sentence of transportation or penal servitude; and the number at the end of the year was 700—422 (320 males and 102 females) under sentence of imprisonment, and 278 (45 males and 233 females) under sentence of penal servitude. The number in the Lunatic Department at the commencement of the year was 54 (40 males and 14 females), and the number at the end of the year was 57 (41 males and 16 females). The number of female convicts in Ayr prison at the commencement of the year was 52, and 24 were admitted during the year. The number in custody there at the end of the year was 3. The number of male convicts in Paisley prison at the commencement of the year was 48, and the number admitted during the year was 67. The number in custody there at the end of the year was 6. A general decrease in the number of female convicts made room for all the female convicts in the General Prison, and the female convicts in Ayr prison, excepting the sick, were accordingly removed thither in November 1876. The male convicts in Paisley prison, excepting the sick, were in the same month removed to the prison of Pentonville, that the surplus accommodation might be made available for Glasgow, where the prison was overcrowded.

New hospital accommodation, thoroughly satisfactory to the Managers, was completed in course of the year, and there being now more of it than is usually required, the Managers suggest that the hospitals should be used for the treatment of prisoners from other prisons. Additional room for male prisoners was procured during the year by a re-arrangement of the building.

In Mr Burton's Report on the miscellaneous duties of the Staff of the Department of Prisons and Judicial Statistics, it is stated that the new Code of rules of county prisons in Scotland, which came into operation on 1st July 1874, had led to correspondence between the Department and the Home Office, but that the correspondence dropped on measures being initiated for the reorganization of prison management in Scotland.

The daily average of criminal prisoners in the prisons of Scotland, which had been 2851 (1762 males and 1089 females) in 1874, and 2969 (1861 males and 1108 females) in 1875, was 2966 (1893 males and 1073 females) in 1876. The daily average during the first quarter of 1877 was 2769 (1806 males and 963 females), being a decrease of 80 on the corresponding period of 1876; in the second quarter of 1877 it was 2863 (1821 males and 1042 females), a decrease of 110 on the corresponding quarter of 1876; in the third quarter of 1877 it was 3043 (1924 males and 1119 females), being a decrease of 105 on the corresponding quarter of 1876.

The expenditure under the charge of the Prison Managers was in 1876 as follows:—Expenses of management, £1518; expenses of General Prison at Perth (exclusive of fuel, light, rates, and taxes), £17,222; expense of female convicts in Ayr prison, £1479; expense of male convicts in Paisley prison, £1484; escort and conveyance of prisoners, £1728: total, £28,434. There was otherwise expended on prisons in Scotland in 1876, £12,298—viz., maintenance of prisoners in local prisons, £5895; expenditure by the Board of Works on the General Prison, for repairs, rates, fuel, and light, £2246; expenditure for special works at the General Prison, £4101; expenditure for rent, fuel, and light for chamber of department, £54—making the total expenditure on Prisons in Scotland, in 1876, £35,732.

### POLICE.

The Nineteenth Report upon the Constabulary of Scotland is for the year ending 15th March 1877. The Inspector of Constabulary, the Hon. Charles Carnegie, reports that the police of all the counties of Scotland is in an efficient state, and that of all the burghs except the following: Annan, Ardrossan, Kelso, Kirriemuir, Maxwelltown, and Pulteneytown. These burghs have, for some years past, been reported as inefficient, and the Inspector considers it desirable that they should be, by legislative enactment, compelled either to unite with their respective counties or to maintain efficient forces. He states, however, that the burgh of Ardrossan, in which the inefficiency of the police is most flagrant, will before very long be obliged to become part of the county of Ayr, as it is constituted under a private Act which will soon expire. He suggests, in reference to a matter which had been much misunderstood with the result of irregularities being committed, that the Secretary of State should issue a circular stating with unmistakable plainness, that everything, whether an addition to the numbers of the police or an increase in the scale of police pay, which may add to the amount of the government grant, should be submitted to the Home Office for approval; and that, unless this be done, the additional amount of grant will not be paid.

During the year 1876-77, 24 men were added to the county forces, and 50 men to the burgh forces. There were 183 changes in the county forces, and 543 in the burgh forces, as compared with 228 and 494 in the previous year, being an increase on the whole of 4. The Inspector says that most of the counties and burghs are now paying their men liberally; and that the scale of pay laid down by a Home Office circular has been so constantly departed from that it would be desirable to cancel the circular, especially as in such matters the Secretary of State can exercise control in each separate case. He remarks that in many forces where the scale of pay is otherwise liberal enough, the pay of the head of the force has remained unchanged, and ought to be increased. The diversity of practice as to promotion, he says, continues. He believes the plan of limiting the classes to be a mistake. He found the clothing of most forces of fair quality; but there had been more clothing of second-rate quality and workmanship than in the previous year. As to house accommodation, after noting the existing diversity of practice, he repeats that it is important that in the large towns the men should be lodged together, in order that they might be assembled at short notice in case of emergency.

The Inspector found the station-houses and cells in the counties generally satisfactory, though there were very few in which prisoners could properly be detained for more than a night or two. The counties in which those buildings had been most defective had been making improvements during the year; and though there remained in use in counties

many inferior lock-ups, they were in places where prisoners were rare. He speaks of the police cells of the city of Perth as utterly detestable and disgraceful, but he had been assured that their improvement was only a matter of time; he says, too, that many of the cells at Ayr are abominably bad, and that at Greenock and Hawick there had at times been a degree of overcrowding, which would not have been tolerated by the sanitary authorities, except in buildings under the control of the municipality.

It is stated that no appointments, involving other than strictly police duties, are now held by members of police forces, which they are not authorized to hold by the Home Office circular, unless it be the office of Inspector under the Explosive Acts; and the expediency of allowing the police to perform this duty was being considered. Referring to extra duties, which occupy much of the time of the police, he observes that in large burghs, where the head of the police acts as procurator-fiscal (and, though in a less degree, where he acts as sanitary inspector), he has so much occupation in this capacity that it is impossible he should exercise proper supervision over his men, and suggests that in such cases there should be a deputy-superintendent who should be chargeable with maintaining the discipline of the force.

The Inspector remarks upon the importance of establishing a system of superannuation for the police; the inconvenience of burgh constables having no power to act outside the burgh boundaries; the desirableness of clearing up a point in the Pawnbrokers Act, viz., whether the police have power to inspect the books of pawnbrokers whose premises are outside the boundaries of a burgh; and the importance of securing for police telegrams a priority over private messages. He calls attention to a custom of liberating persons apprehended as drunk and incapable, or as drunk and disorderly, when they become sober, without taking them before a magistrate, which, he says, is of very questionable legality. Such persons are liberated by the police on their sole responsibility. He says that the scarcity of magistrates in many parts of Scotland makes this or some similar practice almost necessary; but it would be better to legalize some plan by which the obligation for taking prisoners before a magistrate in such cases might be dispensed with, than in any way to violate the law. He suggests that power should be given by statute to any constable, authorized to do so by the chief constable, to release such prisoners, summoning them to appear before the sheriff on a named day. This summons would enable any person who had a real grievance against the constable, either for taking him unjustly into custody, or for his conduct to him whilst in his charge, to state such complaint in open court. The Inspector further states that serious inconvenience has arisen from it being in some cases difficult to have prisoners, in transit from the place of their apprehension to the place where they are to be examined, lodged for the night in police cells, and suggests that the necessary powers should be given by Parliament.

The total number of vagrants, tinkers, and unlicensed hawkers reported by the police in the Scotch counties during the year 1876 was 43,893, an increase of 670 as compared with the previous year. The total number of pedlars' certificates for the year 1876 was, in counties, 14,300 (3564 granted and 10,736 endorsed), and in burghs 2763 (638 granted and 2125 endorsed). 65 applications for certificates were refused in counties, and 52 in burghs. On the whole, there were 2646 certificates and 2875 endorsements fewer than in the preceding year.

In addition to the numbers of the police given above, the River Tweed Commissioners pay for 3 constables in the county of Berwick, and 19 constables are paid for by other fishery boards. There are also 35 constables in counties paid for by companies and private persons, in terms of the 7th section of the General Police Act. In the burghs there are 171 constables employed by Harbour Boards, and 22 employed by companies or individuals.

## EMIGRATION AND IMMIGRATION.

The statistical tables relating to emigration for the year 1876 show a great falling-off in the number of emigrants, together with a large immigration; and, for the year, the net loss of population to the United Kingdom, so far as the records extend, was inconsiderable. The total emigration was 138,222, and the total immigration was 91,647; so that the excess of emigrants over immigrants was 46,575—the smallest excess ever recorded, and probably the smallest that has occurred—though this is merely matter of probability, the records of immigration having been most imperfect before 1870—since the Irish exodus began. The figures given above include foreign as well as native emigrants and immigrants. Deducting, in either case, the number of foreigners—which can be done for the first time for 1876, the number of foreign immigrants having been noted in that year, excepting for a small number landed at Plymouth—it appears that the number of emigrants of British origin in 1876 was 109,469, and the number of such immigrants, 71,404—so that the excess of British-born emigrants over British-born immigrants—that is, the apparent net loss of population to the United Kingdom—was only 38,065. This, however, does not allow for the fact that some of the foreign immigrants might be coming to the United Kingdom for permanent settlement. It is to be borne in mind, too, that the records of emigration and immigration are most incomplete, since they only deal with the movement of population between the United Kingdom and places out of Europe. Of the movement of population between the United Kingdom and places in Europe there is no record, and on that there may be a loss or gain which would qualify, in an important manner, the inferences to be drawn from the figures which are available. As regards persons of British origin, there was, in 1876, no excess of emigrants to the United States, and a very slight excess to British North America, but a considerable excess to Australasia. The account for the year stands as follows: emigrants to the United States, 54,554; immigrants from ditto, 54,697—excess of immigrants, 143; emigrants to British North America, 9335; immigrants from ditto, 6629—excess of emigrants, 2706; emigrants to Australasia, 32,196; immigrants from ditto, 2579—excess of emigrants, 29,617; emigrants to all other places, 13,384; immigrants from all other places, 7499—excess of emigrants, 5885. Practically, therefore, the only emigration of natives of the United Kingdom in 1876 was to Australasia, and this seems to have been the case for one or two years before, though the fact cannot be shown statistically, the immigrants having been distinguished as British and foreign for the first time in 1876.

The following Table shows the *total* emigration from the United Kingdom to, and the total immigration into the United Kingdom from, the United States, British America, and Australasia respectively, in each of the four years 1873-76, and the excess of emigrants over immigrants in each case:—

Of the 138,222 emigrants of 1876, 41,900 were cabin passengers, and 96,322 were steerage passengers. 112,560 sailed from English ports; 12,769 from Scotch ports (12,767 from Glasgow and Greenock, and 2 from other ports); and 12,893 from Irish ports. 84,200 were males, and 54,022 were females. 112,782 were adults (70,663 males and 42,119 females), and 18,290 of the men and 18,769 of the women were married persons; 19,229 were children between one and twelve years of age; 4256 were infants; and 1955 were not distinguished as to age. Of the total number of adults (112,782) no less than 63,860, or 57 per cent., went to the United States, which is much beyond the share of the United States in the total emigration. On the other hand, 25,971 adults, or 23 per cent. of the total number of adults, went to Australasia, which is much below the share of Australasia in the total emigration. This is taken as indicating that a much smaller proportion of emigrants contemplated permanent settlement in the former case than in the latter; and it is added that the emigration to North America for permanent settlement has fallen to the smallest dimensions, if it has not been altogether suspended—the records of 1876, as regards North America, being the records of a movement of passengers to and fro, and not real emigration. The British-born emigrants who went to other places than North America and Australasia, went mostly to the Cape of Good Hope and Natal, and to South America.

Of the emigrants of British origin in 1876, 67 per cent. were English, 9 per cent. were Scotch, and 24 per cent. were Irish. In the five years 1871–75, the Irish emigration formed 34 per cent. of the whole, and the average annual number of Irish emigrants was 66,000, while there were less than 26,000 Irish emigrants in 1876. The annual average number of Irish emigrants in the ten years 1861–70 was 81,858, or 52 per cent. of the whole number of British-born emigrants. In the three years 1853–55, the Irish emigration was 61 per cent. of the whole number of British-born emigrants, and averaged over 140,000 annually.

In the period 1815–52 (38 years), the whole number of emigrants from the United Kingdom was 3,463,592, of whom 2,064,581 went to the United States; 1,036,714 to British North America; 310,836 to Australasia; and 51,461 to all other places. In the period 1853–76 (24 years), the whole number of emigrants from the United Kingdom was 4,961,350, of whom 3,402,494 went to the United States; 512,296 to British North America; 854,792 to Australasia; and 191,768 to all other places. In the latter period the number of emigrants of British origin was 3,963,518, of whom 2,667,043 went to the United States; 374,468 to British North America; 804,272 to Australasia; and 117,735 to all other places. In the six years 1871–76, the number of emigrants of British origin was 1,079,006, of whom 728,821 went to the United States; 120,750 to British North America; 171,607 to Australasia; and 57,828 to all other places.

The amount remitted by settlers in the United States and Canada to their friends in the United Kingdom in 1876 (so far as ascertained) was

£334,643. The whole amount of such remittances (so far as ascertained) in the twenty-nine years 1848-76 was £19,685,068.

In the ten years 1861-70, the average annual number of emigrants of British origin was 0·52 per cent. of the estimated population. It was 0·60 per cent. of the estimated population in the five years 1871-75. It was 0·42 per cent. in 1876.

### INLAND REVENUE.

The Nineteenth Report of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Inland Revenue on the Inland Revenue is for the year ended 31st March 1876. The receipts for the year showed a net increase upon those of the preceding year of £569,910. There was an increase of £315,190 on excise, derived mainly from the spirit duties and from railways—the increase in the latter case being owing to a judgment in favour of the Crown in a long-protracted dispute with the railway companies; an increase of £475,645 on stamps; an increase of £52,315 on taxes; and a decrease of £273,240 from income tax, consequent upon a reduction of the rate of duty from 3d. to 2d. in the pound during the previous year.

#### I. EXCISE DUTIES.

The following Table exhibits the net receipts of the duties of excise in the United Kingdom in the years ended 31st March 1875 and 1876. The duties on railways and racehorses (the latter now repealed) were levied in Great Britain only, and the duty on chicory in England only.

*Spirits.*—The number of gallons of spirits charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the financial year 1874-75 was 30,644,750 (viz., England, 13,488,938; Scotland, 9,226,312; Ireland, 7,929,500); in the year 1875-76 it was 31,219,042 gallons, viz., England, 13,668,944; Scotland, 9,171,002; Ireland, 8,379,096). In the latter year there was therefore an increase of 180,006 gallons (1·33 per cent.) in England; a decrease of 55,310 (0·59 per cent.) in Scotland; an increase of 449,596 gallons (5·66 per cent.) in Ireland; and in the United Kingdom, an increase of 574,292 gallons (1·87 per cent.) The number of gallons consumed as beverage in the United Kingdom in 1874-75 was 29,821,574 (viz., England, 16,737,366; Scotland, 6,990,170; Ireland, 6,094,038); in 1875-76 it was 30,303,129 gallons (viz., England, 16,749,140; Scotland, 6,856,534; Ireland, 6,697,455). The increase of consumption in the latter year in the United Kingdom was therefore 481,555 gallons, or 1·61 per cent. In England it was 11,774 gallons (0·07 per cent.), and in Ireland it was 603,417 gallons (9·90 per cent.), while in Scotland there was a decrease of 133,636 gallons (1·91 per cent.) The quantity consumed per head of the population in 1875-76 was, in England, 0·699 gallons; in Scotland, 1·961 gallons; in Ireland, 1·264 gallons; in the United Kingdom, 0·925 gallons. The number of gallons of foreign and colonial spirits charged with duty in the United Kingdom in the financial year 1875-76 was 11,935,263 (viz., England, 9,949,674; Scotland, 1,346,211; Ireland, 639,378).

In the year ended 31st December 1866 it was 7,797,470 (viz., England, 6,881,796; Scotland, 589,679; Ireland, 325,995); and in the year ended 31st December 1871 it was 8,926,619 (viz., England, 7,770,181; Scotland, 668,287; Ireland, 488,151). In the year ended 31st December 1875, the corresponding total for the United Kingdom was 11,779,729 gallons. The consumption in the United Kingdom of foreign and colonial spirits in the year 1876 was per head of the population, 364 gallons (in England, 415 gallons; in Scotland, 385 gallons; in Ireland, 120 gallons); and the consumption of British spirits per head was 925 gallons (in England, 699 gallons; in Scotland, 1961 gallons; in Ireland, 1264 gallons): total consumption of spirits per head in the United Kingdom, 1289 gallons (in England, 1114 gallons; in Scotland, 2346 gallons; in Ireland, 1384 gallons). In the year 1866 the total consumption of spirits per head in the United Kingdom was 963 gallons (viz., foreign and colonial spirits, 259 gallons; and British spirits 704 gallons); and in the year 1871 it was 1064 gallons (viz., foreign and colonial spirits 283 gallons; and British spirits, 781 gallons). The Report states that there was not, in 1875-76, any real decrease in the consumption of British spirits in Scotland, though there was an apparent decrease of nearly two per cent. (133,636 gallons). In estimating the consumption of spirits, the quantity methylated is, among other items, deducted from the quantity charged with duty; and it had been ascertained that a large quantity (207,000 gallons at least) of foreign spirits which had paid duty to the customs, and formed no part of the quantity charged by the Inland Revenue Department, was in 1875-76 used for methylation, so that the number of gallons deducted by the Department on account of methylation was much too great. It is added, that within the financial year 1876-77 there was in the United Kingdom a continuous, though slight, falling off in the consumption of British spirits, and that, considering the state of the trade of the country, there seemed no reason to expect an increase, unless a rise in the price of foreign spirits should lead to a greater consumption of British. The quantity of British spirits deposited in bonded stores continued to increase in 1875. At the close of 1874 it was 26,249,079 gallons, and at the close of 1875 it was 28,392,752 gallons. Three-fourths of the whole increase occurred in Scotland, where, at the close of 1875, the quantity of spirits in bonded stores was 14,630,106 gallons. Notwithstanding the advance in the manufacture of spirits, there has been scarcely any variation in the number of distilleries for some years past. The number in 1875 was 152 (England 9, Scotland 113, Ireland 30). The quantity of plain foreign spirits (unenumerated and not sweetened) entered for home consumption in 1875-76 was greatly in excess of the quantity entered in 1874-5, the increase amounting to 72 per cent. It was 1,092,019 gallons in 1874-5, and it was 1,883,848 gallons in 1875-76. It is stated that the plain spirits came almost exclusively from Germany, and that they had recently been imported at such low prices, and of such good quality, as to alarm the British distillers. The amount of duty received the financial year, 1875-76, in respect of foreign spirits and wines stored in excise warehouses, was, in England, spirits £512,216, wines £133,055; in Scotland, spirits £196,239, wines £12,475; in Ireland, spirits £95,569, wines £23,442; in the United Kingdom, spirits £804,025, wines £168,974. The amount received in the United Kingdom in the preceding year was, spirits £565,861, wines £149,578. The quantity of British spirits exported was 1,133,089 gallons in 1875-76 against 1,144,890 gallons in 1874-75. The quantity of spirits methylated in the year 1874-75 was 1,180,055 gallons (England 742,296, Scotland 437,759); in the year 1875-76 it was 1,262,734 (England, 814,567, Scotland 438,323, Ireland 9,844). The number of detections of illicit distillation in 1875-76 was 805 (England 8, Scotland 1, Ireland 796). This showed an increase of 67 on the previous year, the increase in Ireland being 65. Five of the detections in England arose from the illicit distillation of cider dregs.

*Malt.*—The number of bushels of malt charged with duty in the United Kingdom was, in the year 1874-75, 59,722,561, and in the year 1875-76 it was 58,993,409, showing a decrease in the latter year of 729,152 bushels, or 1.22

per cent. The decrease is mainly ascribed to the malting season having begun later than usual, and having been interfered with by the weather of October and November 1875. The quantity of malt made in the United Kingdom, free of duty for distillation or exportation, was, in the former year, 6,204,643 bushels (viz., for exportation 27,131, for distillation 6,177,512 bushels), and in the latter year, 6,693,665 bushels (for exportation 29,981, for distillation 6,663,663 bushels). The quantity of malt exported on drawback, or used in beer exported on drawback, in the United Kingdom, in the year 1874-75, was 1,777,306 bushels (viz., malt exported 409,860, used in beer exported 1,367,446 bushels); in 1875-76 it was 1,704,343 bushels (viz., malt exported 468,010, used in beer 1,236,333 bushels). The quantity of malt charged by weight in the United Kingdom in 1874-75 was 2,187,988 bushels, the average weight per bushel being  $49\frac{5}{8}$  lbs., the quantity charged by gauge 2,335,116 bushels, and the duty surrendered £19,954; the quantity charged by weight in 1875-76 was 6,093,965 bushels, the average weight being  $50\frac{3}{8}$  lbs., the quantity charged by gauge 5,776,029 bushels, and the duty surrendered £43,120. The quantity of malt charged by weight depends to a great extent on the character of the harvest, and the amount charged in 1875-76—more than double the average of the preceding five years—was sufficiently accounted for on that ground. The diminution in the quantity of malt used in beer exported on drawback—amounting to nearly 10 per cent.—is attributed to the general diminution of exports in the latter half of the financial year. The Report states that in the period 1856-66, the quantity of malt charged with duty in the United Kingdom was 438,270,824 bushels, and the quantity exported on drawback, 1,353,132 bushels—balance, 436,917,692 bushels. The quantity used by licensed brewers in the same period was 406,699,419 bushels—so that there was left for use by private brewers, and by vinegar and yeast makers, 30,218,273 bushels. In the period 1866-76, the whole quantity charged was 540,051,363 bushels, and the amount exported on drawback, 4,183,609 bushels—balance, 535,867,754 bushels. Of this, 531,359,909 bushels were used by licensed brewers, so that there was left for use by private brewers, and by vinegar and yeast makers, only 4,507,845 bushels. It is inferred that the practice of private brewing has been rapidly declining. The consumption of beer as supplied by licensed brewers per head of the population in the year ended 31st March 1866 was, in England, 37·322 gallons; in Scotland, 13·284 gallons; in Ireland, 7·866 gallons; in the United Kingdom, 29·214 gallons. In the year ended 31st March 1876 it was, in England, 43·056 gallons; in Scotland, 12·312 gallons; in Ireland, 14·238 gallons; and, in the United Kingdom, 35·1 gallons.

*Sugar used in Brewing.*—The quantity of sugar used in brewing in the United Kingdom was 97,321,654 lbs. in 1874-75, and 98,484,808 lbs. in 1875-76. The increased use of sugar in brewing is attributed to the inferior quality of malt during the year.

*Chicory.*—The quantity of chicory charged with duty in 1874-75 was 5550 cwts.; in 1875-76 it was 5072 cwts.—decrease, 478 cwts. The growing of chicory is now confined to the neighbourhood of York. The continued decrease in the home production of chicory is attributed to the competition of the Continental roots.

*Licenses.*—The numbers of licenses issued in Great Britain in the year ended 31st December 1875 were as follows:—Male servants, 256,585 (Scotland, 21,201), duty, £132,439; carriages with four wheels and weighing four cwts., 153,352 (Scotland, 14,267), duty, £322,039; carriages with less than four wheels or weighing less than four cwts., 289,775 (Scotland, 23,880), duty, £217,331; armorial bearings on carriages, 20,182 (Scotland, 1602), duty, £42,382; armorial bearings otherwise used, 38,736 (Scotland, 2998), duty, £40,673; dogs, 1,302,158 (Scotland, 148,542), duty, £325,540. The number of game licenses issued in the United Kingdom in the year 1875-76 was 68,670 (Scotland, 7260), duty, £186,810; the number of licenses to deal in game was 2938 (Scotland, 328), duty, £5876, and the number of gun licenses was 152,610 (Scotland, 13,844), duty, £76,300.

The number of dogs charged is now more than three times the highest number charged under the assessed taxes; but, in spite of very numerous prosecutions, the tax is enormously evaded, and the Commissioners think they may have to propose to delegate some of their powers of instituting proceedings to the police authorities, with a view to the more effectual and the more convenient levying of the tax. The Irish constabulary are said to have given efficient aid in the collection of the gun-license duty in Ireland; but in Great Britain it is still found difficult to enforce it against offenders of good position; while it is constantly enforced, in consequence of information given to the officers of the department, against persons who might be more properly proceeded against for trespassing in pursuit of game. The Commissioners say that this state of things cannot be tolerated, and that some change of system will probably be necessary ere long.

## II. STAMPS.

The net receipts from stamps in the year ended 31st March 1876 was £11,023,774; in the previous financial year it was £10,547,729. The probate, legacy, and succession duties contributed largely to the increase. The principal items in the year 1875-76 were as follows:—Deeds and other instruments, £2,204,252; bills of exchange and promissory notes, £852,350; patents for inventions, £165,506; probates of wills, letters of administration, and testamentary inventories, £2,253,842 (Scotland, £212,291); legacy and succession duty, £3,531,142 (Scotland, £404,375); receipts, drafts, and other 1d. Inland Revenue stamps, £781,906; bankers' notes and composition for do., £141,241 (Scotland, £27,377); licenses and certificates, £139,879 (Scotland, £29,183); patent medicines, £117,649; marine assurances, £119,259; fee stamps, £625,246. The chief increases occurred in probates of wills, letters of administration, and testamentary inventories (£100,045); legacy and succession duty (£130,767); deeds and other instruments (£208,460); receipt, draft, and other stamps (£34,605); on patent medicines (£8412); patents for inventions (£9667); fee stamps (£38,275). There was a decrease on bills of exchange and promissory notes of £51,028, and on marine insurances of £5475. It is stated that the decrease on bills of exchange and promissory notes continued in the financial year 1876-77, and that the increase under the head of deeds and other instruments has not been sustained.

## III. LAND AND ASSESSED TAXES.

The produce of the land tax was £1,078,363 in the year 1874-75, and £1,090,395 in the year 1875-76, an increase of £12,032. The produce of the inhabited house duty was £1,380,770 in 1874-75, and £1,421,053 in 1875-76; an increase of £40,283. The total produce of land and assessed taxes in 1875-76 was £2,511,448. In 1874-75 it was £2,459,133. Net increase in 1875-76, £52,315. The annual value of houses charged with house duty for 1873-74 (year ended 5th April) was, in Great Britain, £43,903,113; for 1874-75 it was £44,781,652. There was thus an increase in the annual value of houses charged of £878,539. There was an increase in the number of houses charged of 13,932, and an increase in the gross amount of duty of £30,677. The total annual value charged with inhabited house duty in 1874-75 (£44,781,652) is less than a moiety of the total annual value contained in the income tax

assessments, schedule A (£91,056,223); and the number of houses charged with inhabited house duties was 864,548 only out of a total of 5,112,110 dwelling-houses, messuages, and tenements accounted for in the income tax assessments. The number and annual value of the dwelling-houses, etc., accounted for in the latter, and not charged with house-duties, were as follows:—Under £10, annual value, £16,253,802, number 3,000,370; £10 and under £15, annual value, £6,809,935, number 590,383; £15 and under £20, annual value, £5,544,176, number 331,326; houses belonging to Her Majesty and houses occupied by foreign ambassadors, annual value £52,142, number 201; hospitals, schools, and houses for the relief of poor persons, annual value £356,539, number 7322; total annual value, £29,016,594, total of numbers 3,929,602. There were also messuages, and tenements not used as dwelling-houses, annual value £17,816,961, number 350,123. Total annual value of houses, etc., accounted for in the income tax assessments and not charged with house duties, £46,833,555; total number of such houses 4,279,725.

#### IV. PROPERTY AND INCOME TAX.

The net receipts from property and income tax in the years ended 31st March 1875 and 1876, appropriated to schedules, are shown in the following Table:—

The tax was levied at the rate of 2d. in the pound, both in 1874-75 and 1875-76, but the arrears collected in the former year were at the rate of 3d. in the pound, and this served to augment the produce of the tax in the former year. The assessments for the year ended 5th April 1875 exhibited an increase of £17,258,000 over those of the preceding year, the amounts being, for 1873-74, £481,002,000, and for 1874-75, £498,260,000. The increase was in England £14,929,000 or 3·63 per cent.; in Scotland, £2,215,000 or 5·13 per cent.; and in Ireland, £114,000 or 0·42 per cent. Under Schedule A there was an increase of £2,150,000, distributed as follows:—England, £1,636,000; Scotland, £503,000; Ireland, £11,000. Under the head of lands there was an increase of £219,000 in England, a decrease of £4000 in Scotland, and an increase of £116,000 in Ireland; under the head of houses there was an increase of £1,305,000 in England, of £502,000 in Scotland, and of £28,000 in Ireland. Under Schedule B there was, in the year 1874-75, exhibited only a slight variation from the figures of the preceding year. Under Schedule D there was an increase in the assessments of £17,064,000—£14,588,000 or 6·79 per cent. in England, £2,120,000 or 8·38 per cent. in Scotland, and £356,000 or 3·64 per cent. in Ireland. The increase on the assessments on trades and professions was £6,311,000 or 4·42 per cent. in England, £1,005,000 or 6·0 per cent. in Scotland, and £223,000 or 3·07 per cent. in Ireland.

The Commissioners got during the year the means of comparing the income tax assessments under Schedule A with the assessments for the poor-rates, and they find that, in England and Wales generally, the annual value of the property is greatly under-estimated for the purposes of the poor-rates. In the metropolis the assessments for both the income tax and the poor-rates are regulated by the same valuation list; in Ireland the income-tax assessments are made according to the poor-law valuation; and in Scotland, the value in the valuation roll is, generally speaking, binding for both purposes. Taking England and Wales outside the metropolis, it

appears that the value charged in the income tax assessments under Schedule A is £107,639,995, whereas the gross estimated value—from which for the purposes of assessment large deductions are made—was only £97,812,540. In the Welsh counties of Anglesey and Carnarvon, the excess of the Schedule A assessment over the rateable value in the poor-rate reaches 43·71 and 41·81 per cent.

In the year 1874-75, 439,456 persons—378,692 in England, 41,855 in Scotland, and 18,909 in Ireland—claimed abatement of taxation in respect of incomes under £300 a year, being 25,342 more than in the preceding year; and the amount of income exempted from taxation in consequence of the abatement was, in England, £30,671,571; in Scotland, £3,660,661; in Ireland, £1,501,098—total, £35,833,330. It is stated that 11,823 persons obtained repayment of duty under the same provision of the law, and that this makes an addition of £945,840 to the amount of income relieved from duty. The result of the allowance of £80 on incomes under £300 on the assessments for 1874-75 was therefore to afford relief from the incidence of the income tax to an amount of about £36,779,170, which was 7·38 per cent. of the total amount charged in that year. It appears, too, that during the year 45,691 persons had the benefit of allowance on premiums for life insurance to the amount of £1,671,382.

The net receipt of property and income tax levied in Scotland was £354,093 in 1874-75, and £354,270 in 1875-76. The total obtained from land and assessed taxes and property and income tax in Scotland was £477,326 in 1874-75, and £480,508 in 1875-76.

The next Table shows the amount of property and income charged under each schedule of the Income Tax Act in Scotland and in the United Kingdom for the years ended 5th April 1874 and 1875, and the amount of duty in the United Kingdom:—

When this sheet was prepared for the press, the report of the Commissioner of Inland Revenue for the year ended 31st March 1877 had not been issued. From other sources we give the principal facts relative to the produce of the Inland Revenue during that year. The amount of net receipts within the year (after deducting drawbacks, repayments, etc.), was:—Excise, £27,681,522; stamps, £10,877,063; land tax and house duty, £2,538,173; income tax, £5,284,091; total, £46,380,851. The net receipt from excise was made up as follows:—Spirits, £14,873,164; malt, £8,040,378; railways, £728,717; licenses, £3,548,557; chicory, £2942; sugar used in brewing, £487,762. The net receipt from stamps comprised the following items:—Deeds, etc., £2,091,550; probates of wills and letters of administration, £2,184,979; legacies and successions, £3,675,802; bills of exchange, bankers' notes, and composition for duty on bills and notes, £910,162; receipt and other 1d. stamps, £789,129; fee stamps (Register House, Scotland, £43,443), £595,502. The net receipt from land-tax was £1,078,068; from house-duty, £1,460,105. The net produce of the income-tax as distributed between the different schedules is approximately stated as follows:—Schedule A, £1,676,592; B, £199,830; C, £460,783; D, £2,643,652; E, £303,234.

## SPIRITS.

The number of gallons of proof spirits distilled in the United Kingdom in 1876 was 38,878,592, viz., in England, 9,509,199; in Scotland, 17,882,307; in Ireland, 11,487,086. The number of gallons on which duty was paid was 30,897,638, viz., in England, 13,443,483; in Scotland, 9,195,848; in Ireland, 8,258,307; the amount of duty so paid (at ten shillings a gallon) was £15,448,831, viz., in England, £6,721,747; in Scotland, £4,597,924; in Ireland, £4,129,159. The number of gallons consumed was 29,950,288, viz., in England, 16,438,135; in Scotland, 6,971,138; in Ireland, 6,541,015. The number of gallons removed from England to Scotland was 6566 duty free, 32,947 duty paid; from England to Ireland, 163,310 duty free, 33,982 duty paid; from Scotland to England, 2,316,728 duty free, 2,005,066 duty paid; from Scotland to Ireland, 798,457 duty free, 20,581 duty paid; from Ireland to England, 1,888,711 duty free, 1,590,924 duty paid; from Ireland to Scotland, 30,206 duty free, 163,956 duty paid. The number of gallons delivered duty paid from distillers' stocks was 5,000,546, viz., in England, 3,768,770; in Scotland, 1,117,796; in Ireland, 113,960. The number of gallons put into bond in the year ended 31st December 1876 was 33,434,606, viz., in England, 5,629,622; in Scotland, 16,564,840; in Ireland, 11,240,144. The number of gallons in bonded stores on the 31st December 1876 was 32,271,405, viz., in England, 5,042,261; in Scotland, 11,461,438; in Ireland, 15,767,706. The number of gallons permitted from distillers' stocks and duty-free warehouses for exportation in 1876 was 1,258,433, viz., in England, 326,148; in Scotland, 744,379; in Ireland, 187,906. These figures show the spirits exported as merchandise, for use as ships' stores, and mixed with foreign spirits, as furnished by the Customs Department. The quantities permitted from distillers' stocks do not show the export trade of the country, as spirits permitted to Customs warehouses may now be taken out for home consumption. The number of gallons of British compounded spirits permitted from rectifiers' stocks to customs warehouses for exportation, ships' stores, and home consumption in 1876, was 383,115, viz., in England, 240,553; in Scotland, 140,121; in Ireland, 2441.

The supply of methylic alcohol by the Excise was discontinued from the 1st January 1869. The number of gallons of methylated spirits sent out by persons licensed to sell the same in 1876, under 18 and 19 Vict. c. 38, was 958,312, viz., in England, 697,966; in Scotland, 249,197; in Ireland, 11,149.

The number of gallons, at proof strength, of foreign and colonial spirits received into rectifiers' stocks for rectification in 1876 was 1,150,852, viz., 875,895 gallons of foreign spirits and 274,957 gallons of colonial spirits. In England 766,008 gallons foreign spirits, and 274,056 gallons colonial spirits, were received into rectifiers' stocks; in Scotland, 109,887 gallons foreign spirits and 463 gallons colonial; in Ireland, 448 gallons colonial spirits. 570,682 gallons of proof British brandy were permitted out of rectifiers' stocks, viz., in England, 553,077 gallons; in Scotland, 15,805 gallons; in Ireland, 1800 gallons.

The number of gallons at proof strength of British spirits in Customs bonded stores in the United Kingdom at 31st December 1876 was 6,586,928, viz., in England, 2,907,354; in Scotland, 1,213,226; in Ireland, 2,466,348. The number of gallons at proof strength of British spirits removed during the year 1876 from and to Customs warehouses was, from England to Scotland, 3049, and from England to Ireland, 13,229; from Scotland to England, 76,736, and from Scotland to Ireland, 2007; from Ireland to England, 716,078, from Ireland to Scotland, 14,715.

## EDUCATION.

The Report of the Committee of Privy Council on Education for England and Wales, dated 9th June 1877, shows that in England and Wales, in the year ending 31st August 1876, 14,273 day-schools, to which annual grants were made, were visited by Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools. These schools contained 20,782 departments under separate teachers, and furnished accommodation for 3,426,318 scholars. There were on the registers of those

schools the names of 2,943,774 children, of whom 1,041,219 were under seven years of age, 1,799,785 were between seven and thirteen, and 102,770 were above thirteen. 2,412,211 scholars were present on the day of inspection, while 1,984,573 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 1,783,303, having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to bring grants to their schools, 501,497 without individual examination, and 1,281,806 on passing a satisfactory examination in reading, writing, and arithmetic. 1,142,612 were actually presented for such examination, and while 666,303 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects, 87·09 scholars out of every 100 examined passed in reading, 79·42 in writing, and 70·15 in arithmetic. The inspectors also visited 602 schools which do not fulfil the conditions on which annual grants are made. In these schools 36,088 children were present on the day of inspection. The night-schools visited during the year were 1474 in number; 49,858 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; 48,001 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances; 39,076 were actually examined, and out of every 100 scholars so examined, 88 passed in reading, 70·94 in writing, and 58·66 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 23,053 certificated teachers at work in the aided schools which they examined, with 3173 assistant-teachers, and 32,231 pupil-teachers. The number of students in the 40 training colleges in 1876 was 3007. In 1877 there were in these colleges 3027 students,—1546 of the first year, and 1481 of the second year. Besides most of the students of the training colleges, 1659 acting teachers were examined for certificates in December 1876. Since 1869 additional school accommodation for 1,660,374 children in inspected schools has been provided in England and Wales, so that there was in such schools in 1876 accommodation for 3,426,318 scholars, or 14·13 per cent. of the estimated population. Since 1869, accommodation has been provided in 1596 board schools for 556,150 children (average attendance in these schools, 328,071), and in voluntary schools for 1,104,224 children, an increase of 62·52 per cent. (average attendance increased by 593,503, or 55·83 per cent.). During five years (1871 to middle of year 1876) the population between the ages of three and fifteen increased 414,010, or 6½ per cent.; and during the same period, additional school accommodation was provided in efficient public elementary schools for 1,413,639 scholars, being an increase of 70 per cent. The average attendance in aided schools (day and night) increased from 1,225,764 in 1870 to 2,034,431 in 1876. But of 1,041,219 children under seven years of age on school registers, only 501,497 had made the number of attendances required to bring grants to their schools, while only 467,423 were presented to the inspectors and reported upon. Of these, 195,782 were in schools attended by older children, while 271,641 were taught in separate departments by certificated teachers of their own. A hope is expressed that the provision made by school boards for the instruction of infants will materially increase the number of this latter class of scholars. Of 1,902,555 children above seven borne on the registers of aided schools (day and night) in 1876, 1,281,806 (or 67·37 per cent.) had made the requisite attendances; but only 1,142,612 (or 60 per cent.) were actually presented for examination. The Report points out that these represent the two and a half millions of children who, according to the tables of the Registrar-general, should be found in elementary schools, and who might reasonably be expected to make the requisite number of attendances, seeing that the maximum number of such attendances can be completed in twenty-five weeks. It also points out that, out of 1,142,612 scholars examined, 560,708 being above ten years of age, ought to have been examined in Standards 4–6 of the Code now in force, while only 229,087 of them were presented in these standards. While the total number of scholars on the register increased in 1876 by 7 per cent., the scholars above ten years of age increased by 9 per cent., and amounted to 30 per cent. of all the scholars on the books of inspected schools. The proportion of those above ten presented for examination was 49 per cent. of the whole number examined. The statistics of the year show the following results, the corresponding

results in Scotland being, for purposes of comparison, given in brackets:—For every 100 scholars in average attendance—i. 55 (54) were boys, 45 (46) were girls; ii. 35 (23) were infants, *i.e.*, below seven years of age; 35 (39) were between seven and ten; 30 (38) were above ten; iii. 25 (15) infants had attended 250 times and upwards, of whom 23 (13) were presented to H.M. inspectors; iv. 64 (76) scholars, above seven, had made the requisite number of attendances, and 57 (64) were presented to H.M. inspectors, of whom 28 (34) were above ten years of age, while of these only 11·5 (13) were presented in Standards 4–6. v. Each scholar presented to H.M. inspectors made, on an average, 2·4 (2·6) passes in the standard examination. vi. Of children between five and thirteen years of age in England and Wales (3,835,372 in number), only 64·24 per cent. were enrolled on the registers of aided schools. These results are pronounced unsatisfactory, showing that a large number of children are not known to be attending efficient schools; that the number of those who are in such schools who attend regularly is small; that a large proportion of those last are not presented for examination; and that a meagre amount of instruction has been acquired by many of those who are examined. Only 89 (84) per cent. of the scholars qualified for examination were presented to the inspectors, and not more than 40 (38) per cent. of children above ten were presented in standards appropriate to their age. It has to be borne in mind, however, that the introduction of compulsory school attendance has brought many children previously uncared for into the schools. While 35 per cent. of the (756,230) scholars examined in Standards 1–3 in voluntary schools in England are above ten years of age, the corresponding proportion for board schools (of 151,739 scholars) was 42 per cent. In voluntary schools, 15 per cent. of those examined in Standard 1 are above ten, and the corresponding proportion in board schools is 22 per cent.; while in Standard 2 the proportions are 37 and 50 per cent., and in Standard 3, 68 and 77 per cent. respectively in voluntary and board schools. These figures show the large number of new scholars now found in board schools. Of 234,643 children presented under Standards 4–6, however, 89,186 were examined in one or more “specific subjects,” of whom 66,026 passed successfully, and 28,574 (out of 55,590 examined) passed in two subjects, and 190 (out of 374 examined) in three subjects. Military drill was systematically taught to the boys attending 1056 day schools. The number of certificated teachers *actually engaged in teaching* at the end of 1876 in England and Wales, the Isle of Man, and Channel Islands, was 23,328 (10,701 males and 12,627 females); the number of assistant-teachers, 2921 (1062 males and 1859 females); the number of pupil-teachers, 30,626 (11,143 males and 19,483 females). An addition of 2942 was made to the number of certificated teachers at Christmas 1876, consisting of 673 male and 781 female students of training colleges of the second year; and 368 male and 1120 female acting teachers. The training colleges alone now furnish a yearly supply of about 1500 teachers who have been trained for two years, and it is observed that that, with the large number of qualified candidates for certificates who enter the teaching profession through other channels recognised by the Code, leaves no doubt that the supply of teachers will, before long, be found sufficient to meet the requirements of the country. Success in the science examinations of the Science and Art Department is now taken into account in determining the students’ places in the class list of candidates for certificates as teachers of public schools, and languages now enter into the course of study in all the training colleges for masters, and in most of those for mistresses.

The advance made in school accommodation and in other respects in England and Wales up to 31st August 1873, was mainly the result of voluntary effort; but since that date school boards have made considerable additions to the school supply of the country. At 31st August 1876 there were 1604 board schools, with accommodation for 556,539 children, and attended on the average by 333,234 scholars. Besides London, which was provided for by statute, 123 boroughs (out of 223) in England and Wales have school boards (all except eighteen voluntarily established), and there are 1667 school boards in parishes, comprising 2346 parishes (out of 14,094).

The population under school boards in 1877 is stated at 12,829,381, the whole population of England and Wales in 1871 having been 22,712,266. The inquiries preliminary to a further compulsory application of the school-board system had not been completed at the date of the Report. By-laws for enforcing attendance at school had been sanctioned for London, for 109 municipal boroughs, and for 612 civil parishes, or, in all, for a population of 11,221,363. Compulsory attendance at school was therefore the law for 50 per cent. of the population of England and Wales, and for about 84 per cent. of the whole borough population. 78 boards in England and 10 in Wales paid the fees of children under the 25th section of the Act of 1870, during the year ended 31st August 1876. The whole sum thus paid was £6685 in 1875-6, and fees were paid for 9196 children attending schools connected with the National Society or the Church of England, 1709 attending British, Wesleyan, and other schools not connected with the Church of England, and 4593 attending Roman-catholic schools. The 25th section of the Act of 1870 was repealed by the Elementary Education Act of 1876, which transferred the duty of paying the school-fee of a child whose parent, though not a pauper, was unable to pay them, from the School Board to the Board of Guardians. Under the Act of 1876 there is to be a School Attendance Committee for every borough and parish for which a School Board has not been elected. Time sufficient has not elapsed to enable this new organization to take much action as regards the duties entrusted to it; but committees had been appointed in all but 3 out of the 106 boroughs which are without school boards, and in 412 out of 587 unions.

The expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, in the year ended 31st March 1876, was as follows:—On schools connected with the Church of England, £879,945; on British, Wesleyan, and other schools, £253,816; on Roman-catholic schools, £81,110; on board schools, £173,778; on parochial union schools, £120; on administration (including administration for Scotland, except cost of inspection), £140,050; on organization of districts under the Education Act of 1870, £3404; grants to school boards under section 97 of the Education Act of 1870, £384: Total, £1,532,610. The whole expenditure from education grants in England and Wales, from 1839 to 31st March 1876, was £17,520,036.

The expenditure under the Commissioners of National Education in *Ireland*, during the year ending 31st March 1877, was £626,158. The number of schools in operation at the close of the year 1876 was 7334. The average daily attendance of children for the year was 416,586; while the total number of children at any time on the rolls for the year was 1,032,215 (but this was greater than the number of individual pupils enrolled—children who had left school and gone back again being counted more than once), and the number who had made any attendance within fourteen days of the school examinations was 596,427. Of the whole number registered, 9 per cent. were Episcopalians, 10·8 per cent. were Presbyterians, 79·4 per cent. were Roman-catholics, and 8 per cent. of other persuasions. The average attendance was greater by 26,625 than in 1875; the number on the rolls and in attendance at some part of the year was higher by 20,416 than in 1874; and the number who attended within fourteen days of the school examinations was higher by 18,886 than in 1875. There were, at the end of 1876, 2127 vested schools, of which, however, 165 were not yet in operation, and 5207 non-vested schools. The teaching staff at the end of 1876 consisted of 7072 principal teachers, and 3205 assistant-teachers, making 10,277 persons, of whom 3459 had been trained in the Normal establishment. There were, besides, 307 work-mistresses and 127 junior literary assistants. These numbers do not include the conductors of convent schools paid by capitation.

The Third Annual Report of the Committee of Privy Council on Education in Scotland is for the year ended 31st August 1876. The Report states that in the year ending 31st August 1876 the inspectors visited 2817 day-schools in Scotland to which annual grants were made, containing 3051 departments under separate teachers, and furnishing accommodation, at 8 square feet of superficial area per child, for 456,428 scholars. There were on the registers the names of 433,749 children, of whom 98,789 were

under 7 years of age; 306,234 were between 7 and 13; and 28,726 were above 13. Of these scholars 376,647 were present on the day of the inspector's visit to their respective schools, while 329,083 were, on an average, in daily attendance throughout the year; 300,195, having made the requisite number of attendances, were qualified to be examined, 49,631 (under seven) collectively, and 250,564 (above seven) individually, in reading, writing, and arithmetic; 212,157 were actually presented for individual examination, and while 154,890 passed the prescribed test without failure in any one of the three subjects, 94.05 scholars out of every 100 examined passed in reading, 88.51 in writing, and 81.47 in arithmetic. The inspectors also visited 95 schools which do not fulfil the conditions on which annual grants are made. In these schools 5577 scholars were present on the day of inspection. The night-schools examined during the year were 258 in number; 15,354 scholars above twelve years of age were, on an average, in attendance each night; 14,186 scholars were qualified for examination by having made the required number of attendances during the night-school session. Of these, 10,867 were actually examined, and out of every 100 scholars so examined 94.76 passed in reading, 83.6 in writing, and 77.76 in arithmetic. The inspectors found 4140 certificated teachers at work in the aided schools which they visited, while the seven training colleges, from which the supply of such teachers is mainly recruited, were attended in 1876 by 1023 students. These students (with very few exceptions), and 173 acting teachers, were examined for certificates in December 1876; and at mid-summer 1876, 808 candidates for admission to the 529 vacancies declared in the training colleges were examined; of these, 646 were successful, and 519 were, in 1877, in their first year of residence, along with 502 students of the second year.

The Report points out that, according to the figures of the census, there ought to be about 477,360 children (out of 561,600 from 5 to 13 years of age) daily under instruction in public schools. The returns made to the Committee show (1) that between 1839 and 31st December 1876, grants to the amount of £290,549 had been paid in aid of building 487 residences for teachers, and of building 770 new schools for 162,924 scholars, and enlarging or improving 330 schools for 32,309 scholars, or for 195,233 scholars in all. For 72,081 of these scholars accommodation was provided by voluntary effort in 420 new and 131 improved schools, at a cost to the promoters of £230,122, and to the State of £109,411. Since the passing of the Act of 1872, provision had been made for 123,152 scholars in 350 new and 199 improved public schools, at a cost to the rates of £882,700, and to the State of £181,138. During 1876 the number of departments actually inspected increased by only 105, while the accommodation increased by 64,890 places, which shows the extent to which new and improved buildings are taking the place of those formerly occupied. The greater part of the additional school accommodation shown above was provided in 1876, in which year the Education Department paid grants to the amount of £151,262 to meet an outlay from local rates of £757,880. This expenditure provided 207 teachers' residences, and accommodation for 102,321 children in 292 new and 164 enlarged or improved schools. The Returns show (2) that the schools under inspection in 1872 (1902 in number) provided accommodation for 281,688 scholars (many of these schools have been discontinued, or transferred to school boards), while the schools under inspection in 1876 (2817 in number) provided accommodation for 456,428 children—an increase having occurred in the last four years of 62 per cent. Of the 1902 schools to which grants were made in 1872, 1311 (including the parish schools) belonged to the Established Church, 523 to the Free Church, 46 to the Episcopal Church, and 22 to the Roman-catholic Church. Of the 2817 schools aided in 1876, 2091 were public schools, 420 Church of Scotland schools, 134 Free Church schools, 70 Episcopal schools, and 102 Roman-catholic schools. By the 31st December 1873, when the time for applying for building grants expired, 1685 applications for such grants had been received, the applications relating to the provision of school-room for about 250,000 children, and of 1083 residences for teachers. At 1st April 1877, 1430 of these applications had been granted, 54 refused, and 108 withdrawn by the

school boards, leaving 93 undecided; and in 1128 cases, grants had been announced to the amount of £419,833, and 691 grants, to the amount of £215,622, had been paid. As to school attendance, it is stated that the boards are using their compulsory powers vigorously and with success, the result being seen in the fact that the average attendance in aided schools, which in 1871 was 203,054, was, in 1876, 329,083. The parochial boards paid as school fees on account of the children of poor (not pauper) parents, £5419, the number of children paid for being 11,074; of whom 7816 attended public schools, 1726 schools connected with the Church of Scotland, 326 Free Church schools, 134 Episcopal schools, and 1072 Roman-catholic schools. The total number of children on the registers of schools in Scotland in 1876 (410,319) was 55.65 per cent. of the total number of children in the population between five and fourteen years of age.

While there was an increase of 31,116 scholars on the registers, of 25,547 in average attendance, and of 33,495 individually examined, in 1876, as compared with 1875, the Report notices, with an expression of regret, the large number (38,407) of scholars who, though qualified by attendance for individual examination, were not presented to the inspectors; and the small number (42,670) of scholars above 10, presented in the upper standards out of the total number on the register (164,373) qualified by age for examination in those standards, of whom as many as 62,906 were over 12, and 11,734 above 14 years of age. Out of 212,157 scholars examined, 111,837, being over 10 years of age, ought to have been presented in Standards 4-6, while only 42,670 were so presented; and the others were presented in standards suitable to children of seven, eight, and nine years of age. The comparison as to the results of instruction between England and Scotland has been given above; and though there has been an increase in the attendance, and in the numbers presented for examination, the results in Scotland, as in England, are declared unsatisfactory. But in Scotland, as in England, the effect of compulsion in bringing masses of children previously uncared for into the schools, has to be allowed for. Of 18,760 scholars presented in subjects beyond the examination standard, however, 793 were examined, and 577 passed in three such subjects; 9828 were examined, and 5983 passed in two such subjects; and 7808 passed in one subject. In 1874 (the first year of the operation of the Scotch Code), only 4407 scholars were presented to the inspectors in special subjects, and only 103 of these took three special subjects. The inference is made that the Code is not (as has been maintained) lowering the standard of instruction in the inspected schools. It is admitted that some changes in the Code may be necessary for securing instruction in other than elementary subjects, and it is stated that such changes were in course of being made; but the Committee were of opinion that no serious alteration in the Code would be found to be called for. The special subjects most in favour were English Literature (taken by 10,009 scholars), Physical Geography (8848 scholars), Latin (3309 scholars), Physiology (3097 scholars), Mathematics (1196 scholars), and French (1282 scholars). The Committee urge that no general improvement in the standard of instruction is likely to be made until more attention is paid to the instruction of children under seven years of age, and to the provision of special schools in which such children should be instructed.

The number of certificated teachers *actually engaged in teaching* in Scotland at 31st December 1876 was 4261 (2744 males, and 1517 females). There were, besides, 152 assistant-teachers (48 males, and 104 females); and there were 4475 pupil-teachers (1819 males, and 2656 females). An addition of 629 was made to the number of certificated teachers as the result of the examinations of Christmas 1876—169 male and 310 female students of the second year from the training colleges, and 74 male and 76 female acting teachers; 24 students of the first year also left the training colleges to take charge of elementary schools. Certificates had been granted to 494 male and 107 female teachers, on whose schools the inspectors had reported favourably; and provisional certificates (holding good till the teacher reaches the age of twenty-five) had been granted to 16 male and 24 female pupil-teachers. The training colleges furnish a yearly supply of 500 teachers, and, looking to the number likely to enter the profession through

the universities and other channels, the Committee do not doubt that the supply of teachers will ere long be sufficient. The system of combining attendance at university classes with professional training was being tried with some success, and proposals for an extended use of it made by the universities were under consideration. The extent to which the training colleges have contributed to the existing supply of efficient teachers in Scotland is shown by the fact that of 2656 masters employed in schools reported on in 1875-76, 1354, or 51 per cent., had been trained for two years; 345, or 13 per cent., for one year, and 125 or 4·7 per cent. for less than one year; while 832, or 31·3 per cent., were untrained. In like manner, of 1484 schoolmistresses, 998, or 67·2 per cent., had been trained for two years; 139, or 9·3 per cent., for one year; and 21, or 1·5 per cent., for less than one year; while 326, or 22 per cent., were untrained.

The expenditure from the Parliamentary grant in Scotland during the year ended 31st March 1876, was, public schools, £224,577; on schools connected with the Established Church, £55,544 (being an increase on the previous year of £3024); on schools connected with the Free Church, £25,484 (a decrease of £1224); on schools connected with the Episcopal Church, £5749 (an increase of £278); on Roman-catholic schools, £13,509 (an increase of £5117); on administration (viz., inspection and poundage on Post-office orders only), £17,975; expenses of Education Board not otherwise provided for, £5059; grants to school boards under section 62 of the Education Act, £1120: total, £349,021, being an increase of £139,491 upon the previous year. The whole expenditure upon schools in Scotland from 1839 till 31st March 1876 was £2,540,315, viz., on public schools, £334,437; Established Church schools, £1,172,907; on Free Church schools, £773,709; on Episcopal Church schools, £98,986; on Roman-catholic schools, £83,921; on administration (inspection and poundage on Post-office orders from 1873-74), £57,663; grants to school boards under sect. 67 of the Education Act, £1618; towards expenses of Education Board, £17,072. The expenditure from the Parliamentary grant on Normal Schools in Scotland in the year ended 31st March 1876 was £24,500.

The returns received from inspected schools show that the average cost of the maintenance of the schools per child in average attendance in the year ended 31st August 1876 was—in board schools, England, £2, 1s. 4½d.; in board schools, Scotland, £1, 19s. 7½d.; in voluntary schools, England, £1, 13s. 5½d.; in voluntary schools, Scotland, £1, 14s. 1½d. The charges were met in board schools—by the ratepayers, England, £1, 2s. 2½d., Scotland, 14s. 9½d.; by the children, England, 9s. 1½d., Scotland, 11s. 11½d.; by endowment, England, ¾d., Scotland, 6½d. The charges were met in voluntary schools—by subscribers, England, 8s. 8½d., Scotland, 6s. 9½d.; by the children, England, 10s. 6½d., Scotland, 12s. 11½d.; by endowment, England, 1s. 2½d., Scotland, 1s. 7d. The remainder of the expenses (with the exception of a few pence per child) was met in either case by the grants earned in the previous year, which were per child in average attendance as follows:—Board schools, England, 11s. 5½d., Scotland, 13s. 6d.; voluntary schools, England, 12s. 9½d., Scotland, 12s. 11½d. In the year 1875-76, the grants earned were of greater amount, being, in board schools, England, 13s. 0½d., Scotland, 14s. 4½d.; and, in voluntary schools, England, 13s. 3½d., Scotland, 14s. 1½d. The grants in Scotland were higher per child than in England, because until the latter part of the year 1875-76, the conditions of the Scotch Code were more favourable to the schools than those of the English Code, and because there is a larger percentage of infants in the English schools than in the Scotch (35 per cent. against 23 per cent.). It is pointed out that, both in board schools and in voluntary schools, the average sum (12s. 3½d.) paid by children in Scotland considerably exceeds the average sum (10s. 3½d.) paid by children in England and Wales, and it is suggested that the fees of the latter ought to approach more nearly to those paid by the former. 60·06 per cent. of the English children paid less than threepence a week as against 39·55 per cent. in Scotland, and only 34 per cent. paid between threepence and sixpence a week as compared with 51·69 per cent. in Scotland. Not only, however, are there fewer infants in the Scotch schools than in the English, but they are attended by children of a better class.

The Fourth Annual Report of the Scottish Education Board, dated 29th June 1877, is for the year 1876. At 31st December 1876, there were in Scotland 2430 public schools—2118 in parishes, and 312 in burghs—an increase on the previous year of 101 (of which 14 were added in Ross, 21 in Inverness, and 26 in Lanarkshire), and they contained accommodation for 380,215 scholars. Altogether, 1055 new schools—932 in parishes, and 123 in burghs—had been sanctioned by the Board, and at the close of 1876, 646 had been built, leaving 409 still to be provided—375 in parishes, and 34 in burghs. The Board had also sanctioned the enlargement of 512 schools, and 398 had been enlarged, leaving 114 cases in which it remained to act upon the sanction—104 in parishes, and 10 in burghs. There were on school rolls, at the close of 1876, 345,791 children, and in average attendance during the year, 263,785—an increase over 1875 of 37,836 enrolled, and of 30,655 in average attendance. The percentage of the average attendance to the number enrolled increased from 75·703 in 1875 to 76·285 in 1876, but this was entirely due to increased regularity of attendance in the burghs, and there had actually been less regularity of attendance in the parishes. In the burghs the percentage in average attendance was 77·525, and in the parishes it was 75·738. At the close of 1875 the Board had disposed of the schemes submitted by the school boards of 825 parishes and burghs—769 of the former, and 56 of the latter). 94 additional schemes were sanctioned in 1876, and, moreover, a large number of those formerly sanctioned, re-submitted for alteration and amendment, were dealt with. The reports of 65 parishes and burghs remained to be disposed of at the end of the year. Two of these relate to the burghs of Haddington and Renfrew. The others did not, as might have been expected, mostly relate to parishes in remote parts of the country. 11 of those parishes were in Perthshire, 8 in Fife, 5 in Aberdeenshire and 5 in Ayrshire, 4 in Dumfriesshire and 4 in Kirkcudbrightshire, 3 in Berwickshire and 3 in Roxburghshire, and 2 in each of the following counties:—Sutherland, Banff, Dumbarton, Linlithgow, and Edinburgh. The delay in those cases had been due to such causes as local disputes, difficulties arising out of proposed combinations, the unwillingness of school boards to provide the accommodation considered necessary, the need for considering what was done by neighbouring parishes, and, in the case of mineral districts, to their rapidly changing circumstances. It is stated that the Board has not sufficient powers to prevent delay in cases where combination for the accommodation of the adjacent parts of parishes is proposed and would be useful.

Not a few parishes whose schemes had been sanctioned had failed to carry out their schemes. The election of new school boards led, in some cases, to a change of plans; and, in others, conflicting interests or feelings had caused the non-execution of work after it had been agreed upon. But the high price of labour and materials, and, in remote districts of the Highlands and Islands, the difficulty of obtaining workmen, were the main causes of delay; and, in some cases, proprietors refused the sites which had been fixed upon. In Sutherlandshire the school boards have done little, because they have been in hopes of being allowed the exceptional building grants given to some other northern counties. The twelve parishes of Shetland, however, presented the most striking instance of neglect; for, in them, of 50 schools sanctioned, only 10 had been erected at the close of 1876, and of 5689 children of school age, the average attendance was only 1031. The circumstances of those parishes were such that the Board had been averse to resort to compulsion; and the opinion is expressed that, for them, and for some other parts of the Highlands and Islands, exceptional arrangements will have to be made as regards not only the building of the schools but their maintenance.

During the year 1876, the Board disposed of applications for the merging of the following towns or burghs in their respective parishes:—Annan, Bathgate, Campbeltown, Dalkeith, Girvan, Haddington, Kilsyth, Linlithgow, and Renfrew. Only one of the applications was sanctioned, that of the burgh of Annan.

While, on the whole, the school boards were working satisfactorily, serious difficulties had arisen in some cases, for which the Education Act

has provided no remedy. Non-attendance of members, for example, has prevented some school boards from acting; and the resignation of members has had the same effect in other cases. In one case, three members having resigned, it was reported to the Board that the school board had become defunct; and the Lord Advocate had given his opinion that a new election could not be held immediately, and that the case was unprovided for by the Statute. The reluctance of school boards to carry out the recommendations of the Board had also, in a few instances, caused much trouble; and, in one of those cases, legal compulsion had to be resorted to.

During 1876, 26,697 children (13,517 in parishes, 13,180 in burghs) had been brought to school through the compulsory clauses of the Education Act. 8246 parents had been summoned before school boards, and notices had been sent to 684 employers; 225 parents and 2 employers had been prosecuted; and 178 of the former were convicted, of whom 139 were fined, and 19 were imprisoned. The fines and expenses amounted to £142, 11s. 4d., and the cost of the prosecutions, less the amount of fines, and expenses recovered, was £395, 7s. 11½d. Applications for payment of school fees were made to parochial boards on behalf of 4138 children, and 3142 of these were granted. It is in the manufacturing and mining districts that compulsion is most required, and, accordingly, in the counties of Lanark, Ayr, Renfrew, and Midlothian, 4815 parents were summoned before school boards, and these counties furnished 16,785—considerably more than half—of the children brought to school. There was great diversity in the working of the clauses in the agricultural and pastoral districts. Thus, 275 parents were charged with neglecting the education of their children in Caithness, 240 in Ross and Cromarty, 132 in Inverness, 292 in Argyll, and 522 in Banff—in the five counties, 1461; while in eleven other counties—Elgin, Nairn, Kincardine, Perth, Kinross, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Bute, Berwick, Peebles, and Selkirk—the whole number so charged was only 387. Adding to these the four border counties, Roxburgh, Dumfries, Kirkcubright, and Wigtown, the whole number charged was less than half those charged in the five counties first mentioned. It is observed that strict supervision will be required to prevent parents in rural districts from withdrawing their children from school during the summer and autumn. The cost of prosecutions, as an obstacle to the enforcement of the compulsory clauses, is again insisted upon.

During 1876 the Board sanctioned the transference of 13 schools to school boards, which made the total number that had been transferred 504,—402 in parishes and 102 in burghs. Seven combinations of school boards for the maintenance of joint schools were also sanctioned, in terms of the 42d section of the Education Act, but the 17th section of the Act had not been acted upon during the year; and had throughout been practically inoperative. During the year the Board sanctioned applications from 168 school boards to borrow money for providing or enlarging school buildings and teachers' houses to the amount of £323,139 (£211,789 borrowed by rural and £111,350 by burghal school boards), which, with the loans effected in previous years, made the total sum borrowed to the close of 1876, £1,851,350.

The Bonnington Park School, Peebles, and the Hamilton Academy had been converted into higher-class schools, and the number of such schools was thus made 16 (but one of them, the Haddington Burgh School, is closed). In these schools, the proportion of scholars taking really higher-class studies to those taking the ordinary branches of a commercial education showed no improvement in 1876, and as regards mathematics there was a decline. The financial position of those schools had improved, but this was chiefly attributable to an expenditure on their behalf—much of it of doubtful legality—from the school funds of several burghs. The Board advises that an expenditure from the rates upon these schools should be made legal. As to the higher subjects, for the teaching of which in elementary schools grants are provided, it is stated that they were taught more or less in 1542 out of 2430 schools in 1876; the number of scholars studying them (what has already been given is the number examined for grants) being 37,148, or 14.08 per cent. of the average attendance at all the public schools in Scotland. The subjects most in favour were English literature (taken by 16,211 scholars),

physical geography (15,117 scholars), Latin (11,053 scholars), French (7330 scholars), domestic economy (5872 scholars), animal physiology and physics (5141 scholars), and mathematics (4795 scholars). It is pointed out that the numbers examined for grants differ very largely from the numbers studying certain specific subjects. Only about 16 per cent. of those studying Latin and mathematics were presented for examination, while about 40 per cent. of those studying literature or science were presented. It is inferred that the former subjects are studied very slightly, and that, under the influence of the pecuniary inducements held out by the Code, the lighter and more superficial of the specific studies authorized were ousting the more solid and educative from the schools. The Board urge that Latin and mathematics should receive such pecuniary acknowledgment as would put them on an equality with the easier subjects. They also press once more the scheme for the training of pupil-teachers—more intellectual than that adopted by the Department—which they submitted in 1873, remarking that no adjustment of the inducements for teaching higher subjects can avail to prevent the steady depression of these subjects, and of the character of the schools in Scotland, unless measures are taken to provide teachers fully qualified to give instruction in the higher branches of education.

### REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The Twentieth Report of the Inspector appointed, under the provisions of the Act 5 and 6 Will. IV. c. 38, to visit the certified Reformatory and Industrial Schools of Great Britain, is for the year 1876.

#### REFORMATORY SCHOOLS.

The number of institutions certified under the Act 17 and 18 Viet. c. 86, in Great Britain, for the reformation of young offenders, on the 31st December 1876, was 65, viz., 45 (37 in England and 8 in Scotland) for boys only; 20 (16 in England and 4 in Scotland) for girls only. Of these 65 reformatories, 54 were Protestant (44 in England and 10 in Scotland), 10 were Roman Catholic (8 in England and 2 in Scotland), and 1 in England (the North-Eastern in Northumberland) received boys of both denominations. Of the 54 Protestant reformatories, 38 were for boys (31 in England and 7 in Scotland), and 16 for girls (13 in England and 3 in Scotland). Of the 10 Roman Catholic reformatories, 6 were for boys (5 in England and 1 in Scotland), and 4 for girls (3 in England and 1 in Scotland). The number of young offenders under sentence of detention in reformatories in Great Britain at the close of the year was, 6787 in 1874, 6665 in 1875, and 6614 in 1876. The admissions for the year 1876 were 1520 (being an increase of 77 upon the previous year), viz., 1266 boys and 254 girls. Of those under sentence of detention at the close of the year, 19 were in prison, 90 were at large, having absconded, and 871 (739 boys and 132 girls) were out on license, preparatory to discharge; so that the number of actual inmates of reformatory schools was 5634 (boys 4579, girls 1055). The inmates, at the end of 1876, were distributed as follows: in English schools, 4601 (boys, Protestant, 2785, Roman Catholic, 986; girls, Protestant, 666, Roman Catholic, 164); in Scotch schools, 1033 (boys, Protestant, 651, Roman Catholic, 157; girls, Protestant, 122, Roman Catholic, 103). The number of new admissions in the Scotch schools in 1876, was 257 (boys, Protestant, 165, Roman Catholic, 51; girls, Protestant, 23, Roman Catholic, 18). Of the 1266 boys received in 1876 into the reformatories of Great Britain, 14 were under 10 years of age, 194 between 10 and 12, 491 between 12 and 14, and 567 from 14 to 16 years of age. Of the 254 girls received, 1 was under 10, 17 were between 10 and 12, 107 between 12 and 14, and 129 between 14 and 16 years of age. 702 boys and 220 girls had not been convicted before, 417 boys and 27 girls had been once previously convicted, 103 boys and 7 girls twice, 29 boys three times, and 15 boys four times and upwards. The number of discharges in 1876 was 1566 (boys, 1268; girls, 298); 706 were placed in service or employment in Great Britain, and 501 were placed out with the aid of relatives, 45 emigrated, 168 went to sea, 26 enlisted, 57 died in the schools, 19 were discharged on account of disease, and 8 as incorrigible, 36 had absconded, and had not been recovered.

The total admissions to reformatory schools to 31st December 1876, excluding transfers from one school to another, amounted to 30,982, viz., 25,005 boys, and 5977 girls. The total discharges to the same date amounted to 24,363, viz., 19,601 boys and 4762 girls.

Of 3797 boys and 888 girls discharged from reformatories in the years 1873-75, 83 boys and 19 girls had died, leaving 3714 boys and 869 girls to be reported on (2977 boys and 665 girls discharged from English, 737 boys and 204 girls from Scotch reformatories). 2755 boys and 658 girls were doing well, 100 boys and 53 girls were of doubtful character, 544 boys and 68 girls had been convicted, 315 boys and 90 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 82·7 per cent. of boys and 75·2 per cent. of girls were doing well, 3·1 per cent. of boys and 4·5 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 11·4 per cent. of boys and 14·3 per cent. of girls had been convicted, and 2·8 per cent. of boys and 6 per cent. of girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 74·4 per cent. of boys and 83·1 per cent. of girls were doing well, 3·6 per cent. of boys and 2·8 per cent. of girls were doubtful, 21·5 per cent. of boys and 11·3 per cent. of girls had been convicted, and 5 per cent. of boys and 2·8 per cent. of girls were unknown. The number of persons in prison in 1876 who were found to have been trained in a reformatory school was, in England, 536 (488 males and 48 females), and in Scotland, 180 (153 males and 27 females)—total, 716.

The following Table shows, for each of the Reformatories certified in Scotland, the date of its certification, the average number of inmates, the average cost of the inmates per head for maintenance and management, for food, and for clothing, and the net cost per head, including rent and expenses of disposal, and deducting industrial profit, or adding industrial loss; also the amount of industrial profit or loss (the latter indicated by the sign — prefixed), at each reformatory, in the year 1876:—

The total expenditure upon Reformatories in Great Britain for 1876 amounted to £137,660. This included rent £3941, cost of disposal £4249, building expenses £12,643, and loss on industrial departments £93. The average net cost per head for maintenance, including rent and expenses in disposal, and setting off the profit from labour, was, boys' reformatories in England, £18, 19s. 11d., and in Scotland, £17, 8s. 3d.; girls' reformatories in England, £19, 3s., and in Scotland, £13, 14s. 10d.

The total receipts of Reformatory Schools in Great Britain in 1876 amounted to £143,127, made up as follows:—Treasury payments, £86,581; subscriptions, legacies, etc., £9954; contributions from rates, county, £12,647, and borough, £7971; voluntary contributions, £94; hire of labour, £4524; sundries, £1514; profit on industrial departments, £19,839.

The next Table shows the ordinary charges, the extraordinary charges, the total receipts, the sums received from parliamentary grants, and the payments from rates for the Reformatories in Scotland, certified under the 17 and 18 Vict. c. 86, during the year 1876:—

#### CERTIFIED INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

The number of Certified Industrial Schools at 31st December 1876 was 118, but of these three (two of which are in Scotland, viz., the Burzhal (Parochial Board) School at Edinburgh, and the Parochial Board School at Govan) are practically not in operation, and are not inspected. Three new schools were certified, and the certificates of two schools were resigned, during the year. Two of the newly certified schools were in Scotland, at Ayr and at Stirling, at both which places the boys were removed from the previously existing schools to new ones. A separation of boys and girls, it is stated, was to be shortly effected at Aberdeen and at Dundee. The Inspector states that, in his opinion, the school at Arbroath is unfit for an industrial school; and that such a school, so near to Dundee, where there are large industrial schools, is unnecessary, and should be given up.

Of the 115 schools in operation, 86 were in England, and 29 in Scotland. Of the English schools 68 were for Protestants (39 being for boys, 22 for girls, and 7 being mixed schools), and 18 were for Roman Catholics (10 for boys, and 8 for girls); of the Scotch schools, 26 were for Protestants (7 for boys, 8 for girls, and 11 mixed), and 3 for Roman Catholics (2 for boys, and 1 for girls). (The United Industrial School in Edinburgh, the school ships, and some others, receive children of both denominations.) The number of children under order of detention at the close of 1876 was 13,475 (boys 10,499, girls 2976). 634 boys and 156 girls, however, were out on license, and 108 boys and 22 girls were absent from the schools, having absconded and not been recovered. The number actually in the schools at the close of 1876, therefore, was 12,555 (9757 boys and 2798 girls), with 23 boys and 21 girls whose sentences were expired, and who were retained until employment could be found for them. The inmates actually in the schools at the end of the year were distributed as follows:—in English schools, 8626 (boys, Protestant, 5548, Roman Catholic, 1391; girls, Protestant, 1184, Roman Catholic, 503); in Scotch schools, 3929 (boys, Protestant, 2537, Roman Catholic, 281; girls, Protestant, 928, Roman Catholic, 183). The admissions, for the year 1876, excluding transfers, were 3463 (2809 boys and 654 girls). The admissions in the Scotch schools were 1273 (boys, Protestant, 878, Roman Catholic, 85; girls, Protestant, 257, Roman Catholic, 53). The discharges for the year amounted to 2670—boys 2084, girls 586. 811 boys and 418 girls were placed in service or situations, 570 boys and 110 girls were assisted to employment through their relatives, 27 boys and 2 girls emigrated, 401 boys were sent to sea, 54 enlisted, 43 boys and 4 girls were discharged on account of disease, 37 boys and 8 girls were committed to reformatory schools, 84 boys and 40 girls died, and 57 boys and 4 girls had absconded and not been recovered. Of the 3463 children admitted in 1876, 148 boys and 118 girls were from 6 to 8 years old;

533 boys and 167 girls between 8 and 10; 1220 boys and 205 girls between 10 and 12; and 888 boys and 164 girls between 12 and 14 years old. 181 of the children were illegitimate; 229 had lost both, and 1298 one, of their parents; 162 had been deserted by their parents; and one or both parents of 244 were destitute or criminal; 1349 had both parents alive and able to take care of them.

The total number of admissions to industrial schools up to the close of 1876 was 32,019—boys 24,770, girls 7249; and the total number of discharges up to the same date was 18,500—boys 14,248, girls 4252.

The number discharged from industrial schools during the three years 1873-75 was 6432 (boys 5096, girls 1336). 141 of the boys and 37 of the girls have died; and 94 boys and 14 girls had been sent to reformatory schools; 4044 boys and 1057 girls were doing well, and 183 boys and 111 girls were doubtful, 257 boys and 17 girls had been convicted, and 471 boys and 114 girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Protestant schools, 79 per cent. of the boys and 84 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 3 per cent. of the boys and 1 per cent. of the girls had been convicted or recommitted, and 12 per cent. of the boys and 10 per cent. of the girls were unknown. Of those discharged from Scotch Roman Catholic schools, 80 per cent. of the boys and 89 per cent. of the girls were doing well, 10 per cent. of the boys had been convicted or recommitted, and 3 per cent. of the boys and 2 per cent. of the girls were unknown.

The total expenditure upon industrial schools in 1876, including rent, disposal, cost of building, and industrial loss (£93), was £292,170. The receipts amounted to £284,940, of which £138,310 was derived from the Treasury, £20,870 from rates, £50,556 from subscriptions, legacies, etc., £30,966 from school boards, £210 from parochial authorities, £8076 as payment for voluntary inmates, £9107 from sundries, £4709 from boys' labour, and £22,132 from industrial profit. The net average cost per head for maintenance, allowing for the results of the industrial departments, was in the English schools for boys only (on 40 schools), £18, 4s. 10d.; in English schools for girls only (on 26 schools), £17, 12s. 3d.; in mixed English schools for boys and girls (on 14 schools), £15, 19s. 4d. In Scotland the average cost per head was, for boys' schools (on 6 schools), £15, 8s. 4d.; girls' schools (on 6 schools), £14, 6s. 4d.; and mixed schools (on 13 schools), £12, 0s. 8d.

The sums received by the Treasury during the year from the parents of children under detention, and for Scotch industrial schools from parochial boards, were—for reformatory schools, £6741 (Scotland, £247); for industrial schools, £13,797 (Scotland, £4662).

The following list of schools in Scotland, certified under the Act 17 and 18 Vict. c. 74, shows the date of certification, and also the average attendance and the total ordinary expenditure of each in 1876:—

The Edinburgh Burghal Industrial School, Poorhouse, Forrest Road (1856), and the Govan Parochial School, Govan Poorhouse (1854), hold licenses, but have ceased to be in operation.

#### THE SCIENCE AND ART DEPARTMENT.

The Twenty-fourth Report of the Committee of the Privy Council on Education upon the Science and Art Department is for the year 1876. The number of persons receiving instruction in schools and classes of science was 57,988, as against 52,669 in the previous year. The number of persons instructed in art was 530,412, an increase upon the previous year of 80,723, or more than 17 per cent. The lectures at the South Kensington Museum were attended by 5739 persons in 1876. There were in 1876, at the Royal School of Mines, 31 regular and 164 occasional students; at the Royal College of Chemistry, 294 students; and at the Metallurgical Laboratory, 75 students. The evening lectures at the Royal School of Mines were attended by 1766 persons. At the Royal College of Science, Ireland, there were 22 regular and 36 occasional students; and 3251 persons attended the courses of lectures delivered in connexion with the department in Dublin. The total number of persons who received instruction as students, or by means of lectures, in connexion with the Science and Art Department in 1876, was 600,168, a total exceeding that of the previous year by 84,744, or about 16 per cent. The museums and collections under the superintendence of the department in London, Dublin, and Edinburgh, were visited in 1876 by upwards of 2,989,047 persons, showing an increase of 696,981 on the number in the preceding year. The attendance at the Art and Educational Libraries at South Kensington, and at the Library of the Royal Dublin Society, continued to increase, and reached a total of 67,218 in 1876. The returns of the number of visitors at various local Art and Industrial Exhibitions to which objects were contributed from the South Kensington Museum showed an attendance of 988,162. The expenditure of the department, during the financial year 1876-77, exclusive of the vote for the Geological Survey, was £278,200, or £15,549 more than in 1875-6.

The area surveyed by the *Geological Survey of the United Kingdom* in 1876 was 3073 square miles, an increase of 433 square miles on the area surveyed in 1875. 1827 miles were surveyed in England and Wales, 500 in Scotland, and 746 in Ireland. In Scotland the survey of the high and wild district of Galloway has been completed, and the Canonbie coal-field, together with the adjoining districts of Roxburghshire and Dumfriesshire, have also been surveyed. There remained for survey in the south of Scotland the high ground at the head of the Borthwick and Teviot waters, comprising about 180 square miles, much of which was not easily accessible, and presented considerable geological difficulties. The survey of the Old Red Sandstone on the south of the Highlands, and also on the north, was being carried on, and also that of the great valley of Strathmore, to the south of the Grampians. As the work in the southern counties drew to a close, the officers engaged there were to be successively transferred to the ground on the north of the Highlands, and thus a chain of stations would be established on both sides of the Grampian range. Besides the ordinary work of the Palæontological Department, much time had been given to the naming and labelling a large series of specimens illustrative of the geology and palæontology of the basin of the Forth, which was being arranged in the Museum of Science and Art in Edinburgh. The expenditure on the Geological

survey in the financial year 1876-77 had been £22,967; the expenditure on the Scotch branch of the survey being £3915.

At the Edinburgh *Museum of Science and Art*, the attendance during the year amounted to 350,656, a falling-off as compared with the preceding year, which it is said is partly accounted for by the great depression in trade. The staff of the Museum was, at the date of the report, below its normal strength. Many interesting additions had been made to the Museum by purchase or donation during the year. The expenditure on the Museum in the year ended 31st March 1877 was £10,211; viz., salaries and wages, £3944; occasional assistance, £194; purchase of specimens, books, etc., £2935; fittings, furniture, glass-cases, etc., £2196; cleaning and materials, £158; travelling expenses, £81; police, £634; incidents, £65.

The number of Science Schools—which, in 1875, was 1299, with 52,669 persons under instruction—was, in 1876, 1426, comprising 4931 different classes, with 57,988 under instruction. 30,108 students of these classes came up for examination in May 1876, besides 3181 self-taught students and pupils of classes not under certificated masters. The number of papers worked by the 33,289 persons examined was 69,162, and the number passed was 46,332. The number of students examined in 1875 was 30,685; the number of papers worked was 62,308, and the number of papers passed was 43,192. The number of first classes, 13,565 in 1875, decreased to 12,453 in 1876. In addition, 1080 students came up in honours, of whom 65 passed in the first class and 184 in the second. The examinations were held at 1051 centres, of which 128 were in London. The number of teachers who received payments according to results was 1601; the average payment to each was about £26, 10s.; and the sum paid (£42,591) was at the rate of 14s. 8d. for each person under instruction. Grants amounting to £842 were made towards the purchase of apparatus, diagrams, and examples. The Schools were distributed as follows: 1149 in England, 112 in Scotland, and 165 in Ireland. In the schools classed as science schools, in some cases there is only a single class for instruction in one subject; in others there is a more or less complete course of study in different branches of science. It was proposed to erect a building for Science and Art Classes at Kilmarnock.

At the National Art Training School during the year ended 31st July 1876, 36 students in training to become art-teachers, and 16 national scholars in training to become designers, or art-workmen, received allowances to enable them to study in the school and museums. 3 students in training received appointments as masters in local schools of art. 28 students gained certificates of the third grade (giving qualification as instructors in schools of art). In addition to the students maintained, 20 were admitted on payment of half fees, and 100 (including 21 men of the Royal Engineers) were instructed gratuitously. The whole number of students in the year was 843, and the fees paid amounted to £3500, of which £276 was paid by evening students. Three new schools of art were established during the year (one of them at Elgin). There were, in 1877, 141 schools of art, giving instruction to 27,973 students, an increase in the year of 1389. At the annual examination in April 1876, 17,069 students submitted 122,553 drawings of models; 13,789 being students of the industrial classes, on whose account payments were made to the committees of the schools. In the elementary examinations of the second grade, 4789 students were successful, and 1137 obtained prizes. The amount of fees paid in schools of art was £27,213 in 1874, £30,338 in 1875, and £32,933 in 1876. The number of night classes increased from 779 in 1875 to 883 in 1876; the number of students attending them from 25,359 in 1875 to 31,158 in 1876. The number of schools for the poor in which drawing is taught increased from 2994 in 1875 to 3335 in 1876, and the number of children taught drawing in these schools, from 387,640 in 1875 to 460,961 in 1876. 609 teachers of elementary schools obtained certificates for drawing at the examination of the schools in November 1876, as against 706 in the preceding year.

The amount of the grants in aid of the purchase of examples and apparatus was, in 1876, £2243, paid on 580 requisitions. These grants are supplemented by payments from local committees. The amount of aid given by the department towards art instruction in 1876 was, to schools of art, £18,253:

to night classes, £7315; to diocesan and other training colleges, £1557; to schools for the poor, £24,895; to science classes, £538; to students in training and national scholars at South Kensington, £2535; to schools not entitled to receive payment on results (for prizes, examples, fittings, etc.), £250; total, £55,346. The corresponding total was, in 1875, £45,099; in 1874, £40,405; and in 1873, £38,689.

The chief details concerning *Schools of Art* in Scotland, during the year ended 31st July 1876, are collected in the following tabular statement (the amount of aid granted by the department including gratuities to teacher, cost of prizes, etc.):—

The total number of bushels of malt made in the United Kingdom in the year 1876, was 60,929,633, viz., in England, 54,655,274 bushels; in Scotland, 2,927,753 bushels; and in Ireland, 3,346,606 bushels; and the amount of duty charged thereon was £8,262,746. The quantity of barley imported into the United Kingdom in 1876 was 9,772,945 cwts., equivalent to 2,736,425 quarters.

#### SAVINGS BANKS.

The first Table shows the amount received from depositors in Savings Banks not being Post-office Savings Banks, the amount paid to depositors, and the computed capital of Savings Banks at the end of the year, as well in Scotland as in the United Kingdom, in each of the years 1874, 1875, and 1876:—

The 53 banks, on the 20th November 1876, had 52 unpaid and 191 paid officers. The amount of security given by the unpaid officers was £13,190; by the paid officers, £43,420. The salaries and allowances of the paid officers amounted to £14,949. The annual expenses of management, inclusive of all payments and salaries, amounted to £19,315, being at the rate of 6s. 9d. per cent. on the capital of the banks. The total amount invested with the Commissioners for the Reduction of the National Debt (exclusive of the surplus fund) was £5,695,291; the balance in the hands of the treasurer, £24,646; the surplus fund in the hands of the Commissioners, £3555. The average rate of interest paid to depositors was £2, 19s. 4d.

The number of Savings Banks which, under the provisions of 26 Vict. c. 14 or otherwise, had been closed in the United Kingdom, and had transferred their funds, or any part thereof, to Post-office Savings Banks, up to 20th November 1876, was 191 (167 in England and Wales, 7 in Scotland, and 17 in Ireland). The number of depositors' balances on 20th November previous to date of notice of these banks to close was 192,192 (183,949 in England, and Wales, 2469 in Scotland, and 5774 in Ireland). The amount of such balances was £1,644,916 (£1,442,264 in England and Wales, £23,516 in Scotland, and £179,134 in Ireland). The number of accounts transferred to Post-office Savings Banks was 104,197 (102,295 in England and Wales, 238 in Scotland, and 1664 in Ireland). The amount of the accounts transferred (*viz.*, by *transfer certificates*, excluding £229,050 estimated to have been paid in *cash* by about 12,573 of the depositors in these closed banks to the Post-office Savings Banks) was £2,602,371 (£2,545,929 in England and Wales, £634 in Scotland, and £55,807 in Ireland). The amount of compensation paid to officers of these closed banks, under the Act 26 Vict. c. 14, was £33,376.

### FISHERIES.

The Scotch herring fishery in 1876 promised good returns, there being shoals of herrings on most parts of the coast, but bad weather destroyed it beyond recovery, and the yield was the smallest there had been since 1859. There was also during the fishing season an extraordinary influx of dog-fish, which committed ravages upon the fishery, and often compelled crews who used cotton nets to refrain from fishing altogether. The returns for the year were, barrels cured, 598,197½; barrels exported, 400,423½; barrels branded, 252,979½; brand fees, £4216, 6s. 6d. The returns for the two previous years had been, barrels cured, in 1875, 942,980; in 1874, 1,000,561; barrels exported, in 1875, 660,970½; in 1874, 737,314½; barrels branded, in 1875, 523,789½; in 1874, 517,558½; brand fees, £6729, 16s. 6d. in 1875, and £8625, 19s. 6d. in 1874. The decrease in the quantity cured in 1876, as compared with 1875, was 344,782 barrels. On the west coast, there was a net decrease of 16,155 barrels, there being a decrease of 42,580 barrels in the Stornoway, Loch Carron, Fort William and Ballantrae districts, and an increase of 26,425 barrels in those of Loch Broom, Inveraray, Rothesay, Greenock, and Campbeltown. Among the districts which showed an increase were Inveraray, Rothesay, and Campbeltown, in which trawling or seining for herrings prevails; and, in Inveraray, where trawling is more practised than in any other district in Scotland, the fishing was the largest there had been since 1869. On the east coast, there was a decrease in nearly every district, Findhorn, Helmsdale, Lybster, and Shetland being the only exceptions, and showing a joint increase of only 10,545 barrels. The decrease at the other stations amounted to 339,170 barrels. The decrease was specially remarkable at Peterhead (where it was 94,740 barrels), and Fraserburgh (where it was 162,850 barrels), being at these places almost unparalleled in the history of the Scotch herring fishery; and, in these districts, it is known not to have been occasioned by any of the exceptional modes of fishing to which objection has been taken. It is pointed out that the circumstances of the year appear to impress strongly the necessity for caution in interfering with freedom of fishery, at any rate, until the biological conditions of the herring be fully made out. The herrings were not, in 1876, either on the east coast or on the west, quite equal in quality to those of some previous years. In certain districts there were more maties and spent fish than usual. At Wick, Lybster, and Helmsdale, however, the proportion of full herrings was considerably above an average; and, in Loch Fyne, the herrings were of prime quality, and realised high prices.

The observations made for the Meteorological Society of Scotland were continued in 1876. They entirely bore out the conclusion, stated provisionally in previous years, that, during the fishing season, high sea temperatures are accompanied by diminished catches, and low sea temperatures by increased catches. The heat received by the bodies of the herrings during strong sunshine also appears to exert a powerful influence on the movements of the fish, particularly as determining their depth below the surface. There were other matters, as to which observations had been made, which would in due course be reported upon by the Society.

The disposition to substitute first-class boats for second-class boats, and to employ the former at the line or white fishery, as well as the herring fishery, has for some years past been steadily spreading; and, in the Anstruther district, a mutual insurance boat-club has been established, and is offering the benefit of insurance, through agencies, to the other fishing stations on the east coast.

The *Cod, Ling, and Hake* Fishery of the year 1876 produced 111,457 cwt. cured dried, and 6109 barrels cured in pickle, as compared with 187,788½ cwt. cured dried, and 8593½ barrels cured in pickle, in 1875. There was thus a decrease of 76,331½ cwt. cured dried, and of 2394½ barrels cured in pickle. There was exported in 1876, 59,866 cwt. cured dried, being a decrease of 22,914½ cwt. upon 1875. The number of fish taken in 1876 was 3,454,198, being 2,337,189 less than in the previous year. There was a decrease in 1876 in both the coast and the deep-sea fishing, but the greater part of the decrease of the year arose upon the former. The decrease of export affected chiefly the export to Ireland, the export to the Continent having been nearly the same in 1876 as in 1875.

768 applications for the registering of fishing boats under the Sea Fisheries Act, 1868, were made during 1876; the number of registers issued was also 768; and the number of registers examined and indorsed during the year was 6233. The statistics show a decrease in 1876 in the number of boats employed in the fisheries, as compared with 1875; but an increase in the number of fishermen, fishcurers, and other persons employed in the fisheries, and an increase of nearly £30,000 in the value of the boats. The decrease in the number of boats has been owing to the employment of better boats.

Besides the 48,501 fishermen, curers, and coopers employed in 1876, it is estimated that 42,212 other persons were employed in the fisheries in the same year. The tonnage of the boats was 106,440 tons. 4880 of the boats were of the first class (30 feet keel and upwards), 4394 of the second class (from 18 to 30 feet keel), and 5273 of the third class (under 18 feet keel).

The number of barrels of herrings salted or cured in the several districts, during the year 1876, was as follows: Eyemouth, 27,662; Leith, 475; Anstruther, 2648; Montrose, 32,116; Aberdeen, 72,054; Peterhead, 110,565; Fraserburgh, 121,431½; Banff, 12,498; Buckie, 3740; Findhorn, 7151; Cromarty, 1261; Helmsdale, 16,110; Lybster, 18,293; Wick, 77,408½; Orkney Isles, 6153; Shetland Isles, 3828; Stornoway, 19,270; Loch Broom, 2144; Loch Carron and Skye, 2269; Fort-William, 1975; Campbelton, 11,411; Inveraray, 31,183½; Rothesay, 6296; Greenock, 3694; Ballantrae, 6561.

Of the 16,299,077 tons of coal, cinders, and patent fuel exported from the United Kingdom, in 1876, there were exported 3,250,564 tons of the declared value of £1,604,716 to France; 2,278,905 tons of the declared value of £1,122,666

to Germany; 1,187,020 tons of the declared value of £698,527 to Russian ports; 779,822 tons of the declared value of £407,353 to Denmark; 767,079 tons of the declared value of £440,845 to Sweden; 381,538 tons of the declared value of £199,092 to Norway; 480,891 tons of the declared value of £272,863 to Holland; 372,746 tons of the declared value of £189,901 to Belgium; 762,569 tons of the declared value of £460,841 to Spain and the Canaries; 1,213,614 tons of the declared value of £638,235 to Italy; 290,455 tons of the declared value of £162,413 to Turkey; 545,337 tons of the declared value of £323,852 to Egypt; 492,943 tons of the declared value of £298,348 to British India (continental territories); 229,559 tons of the declared value of £112,347 to British North America; 177,253 tons of the declared value of £94,673 to British West Indies; 283,333 tons of the declared value of £158,997 to Foreign West Indies; 38,599 tons of the declared value of £31,554 to the United States ports on the Atlantic; 161,198 tons of the declared value of £87,165 to United States ports on the Pacific; 177,968 tons of the declared value of £96,595 to Chili; 326,552 tons of the declared value of £317,347 to Brazil; 120,872 tons of the declared value of £74,687 to Uruguay; 92,538 tons of the declared value of £59,756 to Peru; 49,825 tons of the declared value of £47,672 to the Argentine Republic.

#### THE ORDNANCE SURVEY.

In his Report on the progress of the Ordnance Survey, Major-General Cameron states, that a reduction in the number of assistants employed in the survey was made early in 1876, and that the amount of work done was consequently somewhat less in that year than it had been in the preceding one. The force employed in England had been scattered over different parts of the country, in order to give precedence to the mineral districts, but these had been nearly all surveyed, except the Staffordshire, Shropshire, and Leicestershire, and the Bristol coal-fields; and, at the end of 1877, all the survey divisions, except the one in Cornwall, would probably be concentrated within the space roughly marked by lines joining the towns of Shrewsbury, Nottingham, Bedford, and Bristol. This district completed, the survey of Wales and the eastern counties would be taken up. In 1877, two survey parties were to be employed in Derbyshire, and a third in North Staffordshire, which last would also undertake the survey on the scale of 1-500th of Oldham in Lancashire. Two divisions were employed in South Wales; the sixth was to continue the survey of Cornwall; and the three remaining divisions were to be employed in Hertfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Oxfordshire, and Berkshire. In Scotland the survey had been in progress, in 1876, in the Orkney and Shetland Isles, and the work had been much retarded by bad weather and the extraordinary length of the coast line. It was expected that the survey of the Shetlands would be completed during the first part of 1877; after that, the survey was to be withdrawn to the Orkneys, and it was hoped that the survey of these Islands, completing the survey of the whole of Scotland, would be overtaken during the winter 1877-78. In Ireland (where the survey is completed), a portion of the 6-inch map of the county of Cavan, and of some towns covering 231 square miles, was revised during 1876, and maps of 193 estates (157,548 acres) were made for the Landed Estates Commissioners. Among extra work, done for payment by the survey staff, was a revision of the five-foot plans of Edinburgh. This had been completed in MS. in 1876, but the engraving remained to be done. The publication of the cadastral maps on the 1-2500th and 1-500th scales had kept pace with the progress of the survey. The 6-inch maps of Kent and Hampshire had been nearly completed, and considerable progress had been made with those of Denbigh, Flint, and Cheshire. In Scotland the 6-inch map of Ross-shire (the only county remaining to be dealt with) had been commenced; and in Ireland, the engraved maps of the counties of Cavan and Westmeath were in hand. All the bill engravers of the Department were occupied in completing the bills on the Scotch and Irish 1-inch maps.

The operation of obtaining the length of Kater's pendulum with reference

to the national standards of measure had been completed. The length of the pendulum at 62° Fahrenheit is in inches  $39\cdot4654237 + \cdot0000076$ .

The area surveyed in England up to the end of 1876, was 28,654 square miles (the area of the country being 58,000 square miles); of which 1190 square miles were surveyed in 1876.

The area surveyed in Scotland up to the end of 1876, was 30,421 square miles (the area of the country being 31,000 square miles); and of this, 451 square miles were surveyed in 1876.

The plans of parishes in Scotland on the 1-2500 scale had been published for the cultivated portions of the counties of Aberdeen, Ayr, Banff, Berwick, Bute, Caithness, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Elgin, Forfar, Kincardine, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairn, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Ross and Cromarty, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling, Sutherland, and for the mainland of Argyllshire and Inverness-shire. The area published in 1876 was 242 square miles; and the total area published on this scale amounted at the end of the year to 11,349 square miles.

The six-inch maps had been published of the following counties in Scotland: viz., Aberdeen, Ayr, Banff, Berwick, Bute, Clackmannan, Dumbarton, Dumfries, Edinburgh, Elgin, Forfar, Fife, Haddington, Kincardine, Kinross, Kirkcubright, Lanark, Linlithgow, Nairn, Peebles, Perth, Renfrew, Roxburgh, Selkirk, Stirling, Wigtown, and the Isle of Lewis; and the maps of Argyllshire, Caithness, Inverness-shire, Ross and Cromarty, and Sutherland, were in progress of engraving. The area published during 1876 was 1135 square miles, making a total area of 22,467 square miles published on this scale.

Of the one-inch map of Scotland, three sheets, including 958 square miles, were published during 1876, making the area published on this scale 16,908 square miles.

The survey of the towns in Scotland is complete. With a few exceptions, the maps of towns in Scotland are on the 1-500 or *ten feet* scale.

The sale of the Ordnance Maps of Scotland (including £235, the value of those supplied to public departments, and under the provisions of the Copyright Act), during the year 1876, yielded the sum of £1385 (viz., one-inch maps, £341; six-inch maps, £521; 1-2500 scale maps, with area books, £131; town maps on various scales, £87).

#### AGRICULTURAL STATISTICS, 1876 AND 1877.

In his Report prefixed to the Agricultural Statistics of 1876, Mr Giffen states that, having had on his appointment to office the advantage of examining without any previous prejudice into the way in which the statistics are compiled, he has formed a decided opinion as to their substantial accuracy in all the most essential points. There is no doubt, he says, that the total acreage of all the various crops in the country, and the total numbers of the various kinds of live stock, are what they are stated to be in the returns, the percentage of wrong returns, or of wrong estimates in the absence of returns, being quite insignificant—almost the only doubt arising in connexion with the distinction between grass under rotation and permanent pasture, which in some cases is lost sight of.

The total quantity of land returned in 1876 as under crops, bare fallow, and grass was, for Great Britain, 31,544,000 acres; for Ireland, 15,725,000 acres; for the Isle of Man, 93,000 acres; and for the Channel Islands, 31,000 acres—in all, 47,393,000 acres—and this is exclusive of heath and mountain pasture land, and of woods and plantations. This total exceeded that of 1875 by 80,000 acres. Between the years 1869 and 1876, 1,293,000 additional acres were returned as under cultivation in the United Kingdom. This increase occurred mainly in Great Britain. There was an increase of 824,000 acres for England; 181,000 for Wales; and 200,000 for Scotland. Reclamations of land are known to be steadily effected in many of the counties, and especially in the northern counties of Scotland; while, on the other hand, railways and buildings are diminishing slightly the cultivated acreage near large towns.

The acreage under wheat in the United Kingdom in 1876 was 3,124,000 acres, being 11 per cent. less than in 1875, and 22 per cent. less than in 1869: in which year the area under that crop was greater than it has been in any subsequent year. In Great Britain the decrease from 1875 was 10 per cent., and the decrease from 1869 was 19 per cent. The decrease in 1876 was mainly attributable to a bad seed-time. But in almost every county there has been a tendency to substitute the breeding of stock for corn-growing, as being more remunerative. The acreage under barley in 1876 both in Great Britain and Ireland corresponded pretty closely to that of 1875, but oats were grown in Great Britain on 125,000 acres more than in the previous year, a larger acreage than in any year since the agricultural returns were collected. This, it is observed, may be accounted for by the relatively high price of oats during the past year, and also by their being sown on a large area of land intended for wheat for which the seed-time was unfavourable. Of the remaining corn and pulse crops there was, in 1876, a small increase in rye and a large decrease in beans and pease, bringing up the total decrease in corn crops, as compared with 1875, in Great Britain to more than a quarter of a million acres, or about 3 per cent., and in Ireland to 68,000 acres, or  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent.

The decrease under green crops, as compared with 1875, was considerable in Great Britain, amounting to 90,000 acres, or  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. In Ireland there was little change, a larger extent of turnips and mangold almost making up for a diminished acreage of potatoes. The acreage under potatoes in the United Kingdom is now considerably less than at any time in the past decade—the fear of disease being alleged as the reason for a steady falling off in the crop. Of the other green crops in Great Britain turnips showed a small increase in 1876, mangold a decrease of about 4 per cent., cabbage a decrease of about 5 per cent., and vetches, lucerne, etc., of about 12 per cent.

Bare fallow was much larger in 1876 than in the previous year, owing to the wet and unfavourable seed-time. In artificial grasses the year showed an increase of more than 4 per cent., and the total of 4,540,000 acres was the largest ever recorded. Permanent grass for hay showed little variation from 1875—for which, however, the figures were exceptionally large. In permanent grass not for hay there was, in 1876, an increase of 193,000 acres.

There was a considerable increase in both the classes of horses enumerated in the returns,—agricultural horses, and brood mares, and foals,—there being about 17,000 more of each than in 1875. High prices have, it is observed, contributed to this. They have induced a rise in the import of horses from abroad, the numbers having been, in 1874, 12,033; in 1875, 25,757; and, in 1876, 40,763. The export of British horses was 3050 in 1874; 3135 in 1875; and 2700 in 1876. Notwithstanding the increased acreage under permanent and artificial grasses, the stock of cattle in Great Britain fell off in 1876. It was  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less than in 1875, and  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. less than in 1874. The decrease was most noticeable in young cattle, in which class it was nearly 6 per cent., as compared with 2 per cent. in cows, and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. in cattle of two years old. It is stated that, in some counties, the hay crop of 1875, which was short, proved insufficient for the consumption of the succeeding winter, which was long: while, at the same time, butcher-meat commanded tempting prices. There was also considerable apprehension respecting foot-and-mouth disease in some counties. There was a still larger decrease in sheep, the stock of which was in 1876 less by a million than in 1875, and less by more than two millions than it was in 1874. This is attributed to the scarcity of keep, and to the severity of the spring. The stock of sheep decreased in Ireland by nearly a quarter of a million, or  $5\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. On the other hand, the number of pigs increased both in Great Britain and in Ireland, though it is still nearly half a million less in Great Britain than it was in 1872.

In 1877, the collection of the agricultural statistics in Great Britain was expedited, being made on the 4th of June instead of on the 24th or 25th; and while a summary of the returns was issued on the 21st of August, it was found possible to issue the complete tables and report for the year at the end of September, nearly four months earlier than was formerly the

case. The change in the date of collection affected the returns for purposes of comparison with former years very slightly, and the earlier date, occurring at a time when farmers have not entered on the hay harvest, is said to have been in some degree favourable to the filling up of the returns. The number of occupiers of land from whom returns were received in 1877 was 556,962, while in the previous year it was 557,341, and the number of owners of live stock who made returns was 5235 in 1877, as compared with 5487 in the previous year. There was thus, in either case, a slight falling off in the number of returns; but, substantially, there was an improvement—the acreage obtained by estimate being 2,036,931 acres in England, as against 2,178,515 acres in 1876; 3554 acres in Wales, as against 5641 acres in 1876; and 49,274 acres in Scotland, as against 53,376 acres in 1876.

The total quantity of land returned in 1877 as under crops, bare fallow, and grass, was, for Great Britain, 37,711,000 acres; for Ireland, 15,427,000 acres; for the Isle of Man, 94,433 acres; for the Channel Islands, 30,204 acres—in all, 47,263,000 acres, exclusive of heath and mountain pasture-land, and of woods and plantations. In Great Britain the cultivated area increased in 1877 by 160,000 acres, and in that year exceeded by 1,372,000 acres the acreage of 1869. The increase since 1869 had been, for England, 942,000 acres, for Wales, 200,000, and for Scotland, 230,000. Allowing for increased accuracy in the returns, it is considered certain that the greater part of these increases has been caused by reclamation of marsh and mountain land. Ireland showed in 1877 a decrease of 297,000 acres in the cultivated area; but the decrease was apparent only, and due to a separate heading being, for the first time, put into the returns, for "Barren Mountain Land," which in previous years was often included under the head of "Grass." The conversion of arable land into pasture in Great Britain continues to go on. Some collectors stated that, in 1877, it had been checked by the large importation of American meat; but most of the collectors reported that it was in progress, under the influence of the scarcity of labour and the high price of meat.

The area under wheat in the United Kingdom in 1877, 3,321,000 acres, showed an increase of 6 per cent. upon the previous year. The acreage under barley in Great Britain showed a decrease of 4 per cent., while the acreage under oats showed little variation either in Great Britain or in Ireland. The variations in the other corn crops of 1877 were unimportant; and the total acreage under corn was almost the same as in 1876. Since 1869, however, the acreage under corn in the United Kingdom had decreased by 897,000 acres, or about 8 per cent. Among green crops, potatoes showed a slight increase in Great Britain in 1877 over 1876, but the acreage was still lower than it had been in any other year since 1867; and in Ireland, there was a further decline upon the reduced acreage of late years. Turnips and swedes were grown in Great Britain in 1877 on 72,000 acres less than in 1876, and on a smaller acreage than in any of the previous ten years—the decrease being ascribed by some collectors to the erroneous exclusion of land intended for turnips, but not sown at the date of the returns, and, by others, to the uncertainty of the crop. Other green crops in Great Britain showed a considerable increase in 1877—as much as 25 per cent. for vetches and tares; and, on the whole, the acreage under green crops in 1877 showed very close agreement with the previous year. Owing to the more favourable seed-time of 1877, there was less land under bare fallow than in the previous year. Clover and rotation grasses in Great Britain showed a decrease of 47,000 acres, or 1 per cent.; but in permanent pasture for hay there was an increase of 138,000 acres, and in pasture not for hay, an increase of 75,000 acres. The scarcity of keep during the winter 1876-77 is said to have induced farmers to devote as much land as possible to the hay crop. In Ireland, permanent pasture was less by 362,000 acres in 1877 than in 1876; but this decline has already been accounted for as due to improved returns.

The number of agricultural horses in 1877 showed only a trifling increase, and collectors stated that the employment of steam cultivation now enables farmers in some counties to economise in the number of their horses. Brood mares and young horses were in 1877 more numerous by 3 per cent. than in 1876, and by 7 per cent. than in 1875. Our stock of horses had, it is said,

been augmented by importations from abroad, 40,763 having been imported in 1876, and 24,379 in the first eight months of 1877, while our export of horses was only 2700 in the former, and 1479 in the latter period. In the number of horned cattle in Great Britain there was again a large decrease in 1877—1 per cent. in cows, 6 per cent. in other cattle above two years of age, 1 per cent. in young cattle, and, in all kinds of cattle,  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. Scarcity of keep, foot-and-mouth disease, and fear of cattle plague, were mentioned by collectors as among the causes of this decrease; and the restrictions on importation and removal were also stated to have affected the numbers of cattle. In some counties, too, many farms were said to have changed hands, and some to have remained untenanted. In Ireland also, cattle decreased by about 3 per cent. A small decline occurred in the stock of sheep in Great Britain in 1877—ascribed to scarcity of keep. The number of lambs increased, however, and the total number of sheep and lambs differed very slightly from the number in 1876, though less by more than two millions, or nearly 7 per cent., than the number in 1874. It is stated that the returns of cattle, and, still more, those of sheep and lambs, were, in particular counties, affected by the early date of the returns in 1877, according as it is the habit in each county to breed, or to buy, stock for the summer's feed. Pigs in Great Britain showed an increase of 8 per cent. in 1877. The collectors stated in some cases that more pigs were kept instead of sheep and cattle, and also that pigs had for two years been free from disease; and it was also remarked that the earlier date of the returns would bring into the account many young pigs which at the former date of the returns would have been sold to cottagers, and have been unrecorded.

The following Table shows, for each division of the United Kingdom, and for the United Kingdom (including the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands), the population in 1871, the total area (in statute acres), the abstract of acreage under all kinds of crops, bare fallow, and grass; under corn crops (including beans and pease); under green crops; under bare fallow; under grass, clover, etc., under rotation, and under permanent pasture; and also the percentage of acreage under each description of crop (stated exclusively of the small percentages for flax and hops), in each of the years 1875, 1876, and 1877. [In this and the succeeding tables the first row of figures placed opposite to each particular, consists of the figures for 1875; the second row, of the figures for 1876; and the third row, of the figures for 1877.]

In Great Britain there were 7481 acres under flax in 1877, against 7641 in 1876, and 6751 in 1875. In Scotland there were 243 acres under flax in 1877, against 239 in 1876, and 150 in 1875. In Ireland there were 123,362 acres under flax in 1877, against 132,878 in 1876, and 101,248 acres in 1875. There were, in 1877, eight counties in Scotland in which flax was more or less grown, but only four counties in which the land under this crop amounted to 12 acres. There were, in 1877, 24 acres under flax in Ayrshire, 48 in Lanarkshire, 16 in Linlithgowshire, and 143 in Stirlingshire.

#### CATTLE PLAGUE AND IMPORTATION OF LIVE STOCK.

The Report of the Select Committee of the House of Commons appointed (on 24th April 1877) to inquire into the causes of a recent outbreak of cattle plague, and the measures taken for its repression; and into the effect which the importation of live foreign animals has upon the introduction of disease into this country, and upon the supply and price of food, is dated 25th July 1877. The members of the Committee were Sir H. Selwin Ibbetson (chairman), Mr W. E. Forster, Mr Chaplin, Mr Jacob Bright, Mr Wilbraham Egerton, Colonel Kingscote, Mr James Corry, Mr Pease, Sir G. Jenkin, Mr Chamberlain, Sir Rainald Knightley, Mr Murphy, Mr Elliot, M.

della, Mr Cameron of Lochiel, Mr Arthur Peel, Mr Ritchie, Mr John Holms, Mr Torr, Mr Anderson, Major Allen, Mr Norwood, Mr Assheton, Mr French, Mr King-Harman, Mr Dease, and Mr M'Lagan. The minutes of the evidence taken before the Select Committee on Contagious Diseases (Animals) in the session of 1873 were referred to the Committee, which also examined witnesses at great length on the matters submitted for inquiry.

It was found that the outbreak of cattle plague which led to the appointment of the Committee was due to the importation of diseased animals from Hamburg at a time when the existence of the cattle plague at that place was unknown to the authorities in England. The Committee report that the evidence showed that cattle plague may, under proper regulations, be stamped out in a short time; but that the existing provisions, whether for its prevention or for its suppression, require considerable improvement. In the case of a country like Germany, with a long exposed frontier, nothing short of prohibition of the importation of cattle would give the necessary security against introduction of the disease; while as to other countries, it is necessary that their Governments should impose stricter regulations on the export trade in cattle, and especially that they should provide for notice of any outbreak of cattle plague being immediately given by telegraph to the authorities of this country. With regard to home arrangements, it was found that the system under which the powers of dealing with the disease are, in the first instance, given to the local authority, does not work satisfactorily, and the Committee are of opinion that it should be the duty of the local authority to give immediate notice of an outbreak of the malady to the Privy Council, with a view to its powers being exercised at the earliest moment. The Committee are also of opinion that further inducement (in the shape of increased compensation for animals slaughtered on suspicion) should be held out to owners of stock to report the first appearance of cattle plague among their stock; and that all compensation for the slaughter of animals on account of cattle plague should in future be defrayed out of imperial funds. A change in the incidence of the charge is, they say, a necessary consequence of the transfer of powers from local authorities to the central authority, and the charge may, they add, be deemed a cheap insurance against what might become a national misfortune.

Since the passing of the Act of 1869, however, the ravages of cattle plague, and the effects of apprehension of it on the extent of the breeding herds of the kingdom, have been as nothing compared with the losses inflicted, and the enterprise checked, by pleuro-pneumonia and foot-and-mouth disease. One witness, Mr Gebhart, was of opinion that our stock of cattle is already almost as great as the country is capable of supporting; but witnesses of practical experience assured the Committee that, if those two scourges were got rid of, there would be an increase of our breeding herds, which, in course of time, would make up for any diminution of the foreign supply which the necessary restrictions on importation might occasion. Both diseases are said to be of foreign origin; and, at any rate, the risk of introducing them is inseparable from the importation of foreign cattle. At the same time, they both exist so largely in this country, that no restrictions on the foreign trade would give any hope that they might be eradicated, unless new restrictions were put on the home trade also. As to those diseases, therefore, the first question to be considered was, whether the farmers of this country were prepared to submit to the inconvenience of stringent regulations. As all the agricultural witnesses, with one exception, were confident that the farmers would accept the necessary home regulations, provided there was an assurance against the introduction of disease from abroad, the Committee state that they can hardly resist the conclusion that this would be the case. Uniform rules, applicable to the whole country, would, they say, be necessary; but they are of opinion that the Privy Council could not undertake the work of local inspection, and that the appointment of the inspector should rest with the local authority, he being made subject to the supervision of the Privy Council. It being assumed that farmers would submit to the regulations that would be found necessary, various methods of guarding against the introduction of disease from abroad fell to be considered; but, on the whole, the Committee are of opinion that, as a statutory arrangement, the importation of all animals from Russia, and all

cattle from Germany (with the exception of Schleswig-Holstein) and Belgium, should be prohibited; and that these last two countries as to other animals, and the rest of Europe as to all animals, should be added to the list of scheduled countries, with power to the Privy Council to forbid the importation of animals from other countries if they think fit. All fat cattle imported therefrom to be slaughtered at the port, such ports being defined, of debarkation; and all store or dairy cattle to be quarantined for fourteen days at certain defined ports of lading. Such stock, on removal, to be registered as to where sent, and there to be under restraint and immovable for two months.

The question remained how far the combined restrictions at the ports and inland would affect the supply of meat to the country, and especially to the large towns. The foreign importers and salesmen represented that any such interference with the present established trade as was proposed, would drive the foreign trade to other markets, and would thus, until the promised increase in the home stocks had been realized, raise unduly the price of meat in inland towns. Many practical witnesses, on the other hand, were of opinion that the establishment of a rule making slaughter at the port of debarkation compulsory, would, on the whole, be favourable to the foreign exporter, since it would remove uncertainties now affecting his trade, and that it would increase the number and the quality of the animals sent. It was objected that the difficulty of transporting dead meat in hot weather would deprive inland towns of much of their present supply, particularly in foreign sheep; and the butchers from northern towns declared that their trade could not be carried on unless they were able to bring the animals alive to their slaughter-houses as they were wanted. The Committee, however, after considering the evidence on these points, are of opinion that there is no real difficulty about the transportation of dead meat—there is already, they point out, a dead-meat trade from Deptford market to all parts of the country, and the Aberdeen supply of dead meat to the London market averages from 60 to 70 tons even in the hot weather—and that compulsory slaughter at the port of debarkation would not discourage foreign importation, nor diminish the supply of our large towns, nor generally raise the price of meat. The American trade in dead meat, they say, is at present in too uncertain and experimental a state to justify reliance upon it for an unfailing supply. But the evidence regarding it was to the effect that there are hardly any limits to the amount of meat which can be brought from America; that in cool weather the meat can be delivered in perfect order, and that with greater care in packing, and better arrangements for storage here, it can be brought over in the hottest months.

The Committee think there is need of a searching inquiry into the subject of the transit of cattle from Ireland to the ports of the United Kingdom, into the provision made for their reception at the ports of departure and of arrival, and into their treatment during the voyage.

The Report concludes with the following recommendations:—

1. That as a statutory arrangement the importation of all animals from Russia, and of cattle from Germany (except Schleswig-Holstein) and Belgium, be prohibited, whilst that of other animals from these last two countries, and of all animals from the rest of Europe, should be subject to the provisions of the same schedule; power being reserved to the Privy Council to prohibit the importation of animals from other countries if they think fit. An exception, however, should be made in favour of store and dairy animals, provided they remain in quarantine for fourteen days, and afterwards are placed under inspection for two months.

2. That the Privy Council should be empowered to deal directly with the cattle plague whenever it appears in this country, and that for this purpose it should receive from the local authority immediate notice of every outbreak.

3. That the power to order the slaughter of animals suspected of cattle plague should extend to animals in premises adjoining to the infected premises.

4. That whilst the compensation for the slaughter of animals affected by cattle plague should remain as it is at present, the compensation for the slaughter of animals suspected of that disease should be the full value (not however exceeding £40).

5. That all compensation for the animals so slaughtered, whether diseased or suspected, should be defrayed from imperial funds.

6. That in case of pleuro-pneumonia or foot-and-mouth disease breaking out, the Privy Council should have power to fix the limits of the district which is to be treated as infected.

7. That uniform rules applicable to all districts declared infected should be issued by the Privy Council, but should be enforced by the local authority, subject to the supervision of the Privy Council.

8. That in the case of pleuro-pneumonia, the compensation for the slaughter of animals, whether suspected or diseased, should be at the same rate as in the case of cattle plague, but should be payable out of local funds.

9. The stock exposed in Islington Market should not be allowed to leave the metropolitan district alive.

10. That, in the metropolis and large towns, dairy and cattle sheds should be subject to registration, inspection, and regulations.

11. That the restrictions applicable to Great Britain should be extended to Ireland and the Channel Islands, or else that ports should be specified in Great Britain by the Privy Council, to which alone importation of live animals from Ireland and the Channel Islands should be lawful, the animals not being permitted to be taken inland unless examined and passed by a Privy Council inspector at the port of debarkation.

12. The Committee are of opinion that no further restrictions should be placed on the importation of foreign animals in respect to foot-and-mouth disease and pleuro-pneumonia, unless at the same time orders be enforced throughout Great Britain, that in every district where either pleuro-pneumonia or foot-and-mouth disease exists, and which has been declared by the Privy Council to be infected, all movement of cattle be prohibited except under license; that fairs and markets be under similar restrictions, and that absolute prohibition of movement be enforced against infected farms for periods varying from two months in pleuro-pneumonia, to twenty-eight days in outbreaks of foot-and-mouth disease.

13. That, where required, effect should be given by the Legislature to these recommendations.

*Sheep killed by Dogs.*—A return, procured by Sir G. Douglas, shows the number of sheep killed by dogs in each of the counties of Mid-Lothian, Linlithgow, Haddington, Peebles, Selkirk, Dumfries, Roxburgh, Berwick, Kirkcubright, and Wigtown during each of the years ending 15th May 1875, 1876, and 1877; and also the number of cases in which the owners of the dogs have been discovered and found liable during each of those years. The number of sheep and lambs killed by dogs in the ten counties was 403 (in 122 cases) in 1875; 639 (in 210 cases) in 1876; and 973 (in 301 cases) in 1877—total of the three years, 2015 sheep and lambs killed in 633 cases. In 408 out of the 633 cases, involving a loss of 1104 sheep and lambs, the owner of the dog was not discovered; in 134 cases, involving a loss of 583 sheep and lambs, the owner of the dog was discovered, but no compensation was ascertained to have been made. In 91 out of the 633 cases, involving the loss of 328 sheep and lambs, the owner of the dog was discovered, and compensation was ascertained to have been made.

*Importation of Live Stock.*—The total number of cattle imported into Great Britain in the year ended 31st March 1875 was 202,887 (viz., 129,124 oxen and bulls, 38,481 cows, and 35,282 calves), and the number of sheep and lambs imported was 792,702—aggregate of cattle, sheep, and lambs, 995,589. In the year ended 31st March 1876, the total number of cattle imported was 271,807 (178,211 oxen and bulls, 54,393 cows, and 39,203 calves), and the number of sheep and lambs imported was 1,029,127—aggregate of cattle, sheep, and lambs, 1,300,934. In the year ended 31st March 1877, the total number of cattle imported was 262,687 (163,106 oxen and bulls, 56,217 cows, and 43,364 calves), and the number of sheep and lambs imported, 1,012,892—aggregate of cattle, sheep, and lambs, 1,275,579. The number of cargoes of cattle and sheep landed at ports in Great Britain in the three years ended 31st March 1877, was 12,380; and 1458 of those cargoes included diseased animals. There was one cargo affected by cattle plague; 13 cargoes were affected by pleuro-pneumonia, and 1381 by foot-and-mouth disease; and 2 cargoes were affected by sheep-pox, and 61 by sheep-scab.

WRECKS AND CASUALTIES.

The wreck statistics are now made up for the year from the 1st July to the 30th June, instead of as formerly for the year ending 31st December. The change enables the Board of Trade to present the abstracts of wrecks, casualties, and collisions to Parliament early in the session; and it brings together in one publication all wrecks and casualties that happen at home in one winter.

It is explained that the apparent increase in the numbers of wrecks, casualties, and collisions near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year reported upon—1875-76—is owing to a class of casualties being included which previously were not thought important enough to be noticed; and to the fact that casualties are much more carefully and certainly reported than in former years. It is not so easy, and not so important, to obtain reports of minor casualties from distant parts of the world; and this is the chief part of the explanation of the fact that the wrecks, casualties, and collisions occurring elsewhere than on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom show a comparatively small increase. The casualties involving partial damage are now divided into two classes, the "serious" and the "minor;" it being considered that the former arrangement, in which casualties amounting almost to total loss, and casualties involving the loss of a sail or a spar were classed together, was likely to be misleading. Upwards of 400 casualties of a minor kind, besides about 450 cases of loss of anchors and chains, in all about 850 casualties of a kind formerly not reported, have been included in the returns for 1875-76. The increase shown in the year in the whole number of wrecks, casualties, and collisions is more than accounted for by the increase there has been—250—in the number of reports received respecting loss of anchors and chains. The Report dwells upon the fact that only a small number out of the large totals of wrecks, casualties, and collisions is attended with loss of life. Of the

casualties of all kinds, at home and abroad, contained in the returns for 1875-76, only 5.57 per cent. were fatal to human life.

The following Table shows the number of vessels reported as wrecked, or as having met with casualties, or been in collision, at home and abroad, for the year ended 30th June 1876, and the number of lives lost thereon (including missing ships and lives taken as lost thereon):—

The returns still keep the home and foreign wreck registers distinct for purposes of comparison.

The number of wrecks, casualties, and collisions from all causes on and near the coasts of the United Kingdom (in waters within 10 miles from the shores of the United Kingdom, in waters within any bays or estuaries, in waters around any outlying sandbanks which are dry at low water, in the seas between Great Britain and Ireland, and between the Orkney and Shetland and Western Islands and the mainland of Scotland), reported during the year ended 30th June 1876 was 3757—167 more than the number reported during the year 1874-75. Against the increase of 167 is to be put the increase of 250 in the number of reports of loss of chains and anchors. The annual average number of wrecks and casualties during five years (1871-1875-76, omitting the first six months of 1873) was 2536½. Of the 3757 wrecks, casualties, and collisions, 502 involved total loss, against 472 and 408 respectively for the two previous years. Of the cases involving parti

damage, 1076 were cases of "serious" casualty, and 2179 were "minor" casualties. In the wrecks, casualties, and collisions of 1875-76, 778 lives were lost on 171 vessels; 580 being lost on 143 British vessels, and 198 on 28 foreign vessels. Of the casualties at home in 1875-76, about 1 in 22 resulted in loss of life. The number of ships lost or damaged in the 3757 casualties of 1875-76 was 4554—295 more than in the year 1874-75—and their tonnage was upwards of 1,028,000 tons; 3602 of those vessels are known to have belonged to Great Britain and its dependencies, with British certificates of registry, 152 (with a tonnage of 17,388 tons, including five of H.M. ships) to have been British vessels not registered under the Merchant Shipping Acts, and 720 to have belonged to foreign countries, while the country and employment of the remaining 80 are unknown. Of the British vessels, 2678 were employed in the coasting trade, and 1076 in the (over-sea) foreign and home trade. 25 of the foreign vessels were employed in the British coasting trade. The number of collisions was 775, and of wrecks and casualties other than collisions, 2982. Of these 2982, 425 resulted in total loss, 851 in serious damage, and 1706 were minor accidents. The number of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, reported in the year 1874-75 was 2931—51 less than the number in 1875-76. The annual average of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, for the 20½ years ended June 1876, was 1406½—total losses 459½, and partial damage 946½, as against 425 total losses, and 2557 cases of partial damage in 1875-76. Of the 775 collisions which occurred in 1875-76, 77 resulted in total loss, 225 in serious damage, and 473 in minor damage; the averages of the ten years ended in June 1876 were, total losses 79½, partial damage 382½. Taking the losses and casualties not caused by collisions, of the 425 total losses, in 1875-76, 176 are said to have been caused by stress of weather, 111 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, 29 by defects in the ships or their equipments (19 vessels seeming to have foundered from unseaworthiness); of the 851 casualties resulting in serious damage, but not total loss, 357 were caused by stress of weather, 202 by inattention, carelessness, and neglect, and 94 by defects in the ships or their equipments; of the 1706 minor accidents, 1099 were caused by stress of weather, 221 by carelessness, and 86 by defects in the ships or their equipments. In the year 1874-75, 33 vessels were lost and 129 sustained serious damage, and 59 minor casualties through defects in the ship or her equipments. In 1875-76, there were on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom 345 wrecks and casualties to smacks and other fishing vessels. Of the remaining vessels which suffered wreck or other casualty during the year, 4209 in number, 2092 belonged to the class of colliers and vessels carrying ores, chiefly employed in the coasting trade. The life lost in 1875-76 was distributed as follows:—In fishing smacks, 113; in vessels carrying heavy cargoes in bulk, 334; and in other vessels, 331. 347 wrecks and casualties happened in 1875-76 to nearly new ships, and 639 to ships from three to seven years old; 1032 to ships from seven to fourteen years old; 1414 to ships from fifteen to thirty years old; 611 to old ships from thirty to fifty years old; 80 to ships between fifty and sixty; 41 to ships between sixty and seventy; 12 to ships between seventy and eighty; 12 to ships between eighty and ninety; 2 to ships between ninety and a hundred; and 2 to ships over a hundred years old. The ages of 362 vessels were unknown. Of the 4554 vessels lost or damaged in 1875-76, 525 were steam-ships, 139 were rigged as ships, 1317 were schooners, 533 brigs, 497 barques, 505 brigantines, and 199 smacks, the remainder being small vessels rigged in various ways. 2024 of them did not exceed 100 tons burthen, 1561 were from 100 to 300 tons, 623 from 300 to 600, and only 346 were above 600 tons burthen. Of the 502 vessels totally lost, 37 are known to have been built of iron, of which number 31 were steamers. Of the wrecks and casualties of all kinds which occurred in the year 1875-76, 2119 occurred on the east coast (from Dungeness to Duncansbay Head), 427 on the south coast, 822 on the west coast (from the Land's End to the Mull of Cantyre), 83 on the north and west coast of Scotland (from the Mull of Cantyre to Duncansbay Head, including Orkney and Shetland, the Hebrides, etc.), 275 on the Irish coast. 1929 happened when the wind was at force 6 or under, that is to say, when it did not exceed a strong breeze in which the ship could carry single reefs and top-

gallant sails; 745 with the wind at forces 7 and 8, that is, with a moderate to fresh gale; and 977 with the wind at force 9 and upwards, that is to say, from a strong gale to a hurricane. Of the 171 vessels on which life was lost during 1875-76, 121 were laden, 49 in ballast, and it is unknown whether the remaining vessel was laden or light; 134 were entirely lost. 73 lives were lost in vessels that foundered, 166 through collisions, 325 in vessels stranded or cast ashore, and 158 in missing vessels. The remaining lives were lost through various causes, being washed overboard, etc. 9 of the lives lost, included in the return, were lost before July 1875, but reported during the year. Of the 171 vessels in which lives were lost, 143 were British, involving the loss of 580 lives. The total number of casualties to sea-going vessels in rivers in the United Kingdom reported in 1875-76 was 1011, of which 39 were total losses, 286 were serious casualties, and 686 were minor casualties. Of the casualties, collisions numbered 610, foundering 18, strandings 189, and miscellaneous 194. The 1011 casualties caused the loss of or damage to 1704 vessels, of which 987 were British sailing-vessels, 553 British steam-vessels, 129 foreign sailing-vessels, and 35 foreign steam-vessels. The number of lives reported to have been lost in casualties in rivers was 28. 41 of the 775 collisions off the coasts of the United Kingdom were between two steam-ships both under way, and 79 of the 610 in harbours and rivers were also between two steam-ships both under way. There were during the year 9 accidents to the machinery of steam-ships, which caused damage to the vessel and the loss of two lives, 1 being a total loss, and 1 other involving serious damage; and 300 small accidents which caused no damage to the vessel, but involved the loss of ten lives.

Of wrecks and casualties, other than collisions, which occurred on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the number reported in 1875-76 (some of which may have occurred in the previous year) was 629; 544 to British vessels, of which 256 were totally lost, and 157 seriously damaged, while 131 met with minor casualties; 85 to foreign vessels, of which 45 were totally lost, and 29 seriously damaged, 11 meeting with minor casualties. Of vessels lost or damaged in collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and the British Possessions abroad, the number reported was 142; 124 were British vessels (of which 10 were lost, and 36 were seriously damaged), and 18 foreign vessels (of which none were lost, but 9 were seriously damaged). The tonnage of the 311 vessels totally lost was 71,950, viz., British vessels 55,310 tons, foreign vessels 16,640 tons; the tonnage of the 231 vessels seriously damaged was 81,992, viz., British vessels 64,980 tons, foreign vessels 17,012 tons; the tonnage of the 229 vessels which met with minor casualties was 103,457, viz., British vessels 92,080, foreign vessels 11,377. The number of lives lost was 316, viz., on British vessels 311, on foreign vessels 5; the number of lives saved was 4106, viz., on British vessels 3307, on foreign vessels 799; and the number of those who remained on board in safety was 9781, viz., on British vessels 8770, on foreign vessels 1011. The number of wrecks, etc., other than collisions, which occurred to British vessels on foreign coasts or at sea in 1875-76 was 2329, of which 319 involved total loss, 870 serious, and 1140 minor damage; and the number of vessels lost or damaged in collisions was 344, of which 16 were lost, 96 sustained serious, and 232 minor damage. The tonnage of vessels totally lost was 146,776 tons, the tonnage of vessels seriously damaged was 459,873 tons, and that of vessels which met with minor casualties 595,137 tons. The number of lives lost was 1392, the number of lives saved was 5348, and the number of those who remained on board in safety was 39,420. The total number of wrecks, casualties, or collisions on the coasts of the Channel Islands and other British Possessions abroad, and to British vessels on foreign coasts and at sea, in 1875-76, was 3444, 3341 of which occurred to British vessels, and 103 to foreign vessels; and the total number of lives lost was 1708, of which 1703 were lost on 220 British vessels, and 5 on 3 foreign vessels. 101 British vessels, not heard of after sailing or being spoken at sea, are reckoned as lost, 1101 lives being supposed to have been lost in them. Of these missing vessels, 81 belonged to the United Kingdom, involving the loss of 855 lives, and 20 belonged to British Possessions abroad, involving the loss of 246 lives. 4 were steam-ships, involving

loss of 103 lives. 62 of those vessels sailed from ports in the United Kingdom, 22 from ports in British Possessions abroad, and 17 from foreign ports. 83 were laden vessels, 5 were vessels in ballast, and 13 were fishing vessels. 36 were classed at Lloyd's, in Liverpool, or in the Veritas, and were missing, with 631 lives; whilst 65 were unclassified, missing, with 470 lives. Many of the missing vessels sailed previously to July 1875. Of the vessels reported as lost or damaged on the coasts of the Channel Islands and other British Possessions abroad, on foreign coasts, and at sea in 1875-76, 2366 belonged to the United Kingdom (290 lost, 795 seriously damaged, and 1281 which met with minor casualties), 975 to British Possessions (311 lost, 364 seriously damaged, and 300 which met with minor casualties), and 103 belonged to foreign countries.

The sum paid by the Board of Trade, out of the Mercantile Marine Fund, for providing apparatus for saving life on the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year ended 30th June 1876 was £14,447; the expenditure on this account, between March 1855 and June 1876, had been £177,893, besides £1347 paid by the Admiralty on account of life-belts. At the end of June 1876 there were on the coasts of the United Kingdom 280 sets of rocket and mortar apparatus provided by the Board of Trade (39 in Scotland). The number of life-boats was 276, of which 250 belonged to the National Life-Boat Institution, and 26 to harbour authorities, etc. (34 life-boats at stations in Scotland). 561 stations (41 in Scotland) were supplied with Captain Ward's life-jackets for the use of the coast-guard. The number of volunteer life-brigades was 4, and the number of volunteer life-companies 166; 30 of the companies were in Scotland. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom in the year ended 30th June 1876 was 4358—461 being saved by life-boats, 301 by rocket and mortar apparatus, lines, etc., 508 by luggers and coast-guard and other boats, 967 by ships and steam-boats, 1859 by ships' own boats, 9 by individual exertion, and 253 by other means. The number of lives saved on or near the coasts of the United Kingdom between March 1855 and June 1876 was 82,276.

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#### APPEALS FROM THE COURT OF SESSION TO THE HOUSE OF LORDS.

The number of appeals from the Court of Session, presented to the House of Lords, in the year 1876, was 17, of which 5 were in matters of real property, 7 in matters of personal property, 1 in matters of real and personal property, and 4 in matters of a miscellaneous kind. 4 causes were dismissed for want of prosecution.

The number of judgments delivered in 1876, including causes heard in previous sessions and standing over for judgment, was 14. In 11 causes the judgment appealed from was affirmed with variations; in 1 the judgment was reversed; and in 2 it was reversed with a declaration, direction, or finding. The number of causes heard during the session of 1876, including causes standing over for judgment, was 14. The number of effective causes remaining for hearing was 2. The amount of fees was £518, 11s.

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#### RAILWAYS.

At 31st December 1876 the amount of railway capital authorized was, in England and Wales, £611,412,535 (£449,973,593 by shares and £161,438,942 by loans); in Scotland, £92,725,357 (£71,595,107 by shares and £21,130,250 by loans); in Ireland, £37,664,635 (£27,527,005 by shares and £10,137,630 by loans); in the United Kingdom, £741,802,527 (£549,095,705 by shares and £192,706,822 by loans). At the same date the amount of paid-up stock and share capital was, in England and Wales, £404,183,932 (ordinary, £216,207,544; guaranteed, £70,272,152; preferential, £117,704,236); in Scot-

land, £63,817,373 (ordinary, £29,560,892; guaranteed, £10,185,999; preferential, £24,070,572); in Ireland, £22,915,517 (ordinary, £16,240,477; guaranteed, £321,610; preferential, £6,353,513); in the United Kingdom, £490,916,875 (ordinary, £202,008,883; guaranteed, £80,779,671; preferential, £148,128,321). The amount of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at the same date was, in England and Wales, £140,648,027 (by loans, £18,393,426; by debenture stock, £122,254,601); in Scotland, £18,900,035 (by loans, £11,561,444; by debenture stock, £7,338,591); in Ireland, £7,749,899 (by loans, £2,597,545; by debenture stock, £5,152,294); in the United Kingdom, £167,297,901 (by loans, £32,552,415; by debenture stock, £134,745,486). The total of stock and share capital paid up and of capital raised by loans and debenture stock at 31st December 1876 was, in England and Wales, £544,831,959; in Scotland, £82,717,408; in Ireland, £30,665,409; in the United Kingdom, £658,214,776. The amount of subscriptions made by railway companies to other companies at the same date was, in England and Wales, £19,948,604; in Scotland, £1,467,369; in Ireland, £355,102; in the United Kingdom, £21,771,075.

In the year ended 31st December 1876 the total gross receipts of railway companies from all sources were, in England and Wales, £52,476,319 (passenger traffic and mails, £22,162,423; goods traffic, £28,341,729; miscellaneous, £1,972,167); in Scotland, £6,965,091 (passenger traffic and mails, £2,557,243; goods traffic, £4,119,700; miscellaneous, £288,148); in Ireland, £2,774,365 (passenger traffic and mails, £1,443,885; goods traffic, £1,292,888; miscellaneous, £37,592); in the United Kingdom, £62,215,775 (passenger traffic and mails, £26,163,551; goods traffic, £33,754,317; miscellaneous, £2,297,907). The total working expenditure (including all expenses) was, in England and Wales, £28,466,366; in Scotland, £3,597,993; in Ireland, £1,471,150; in the United Kingdom, £33,535,509. The net receipts were, in England and Wales, £24,009,953; in Scotland, £3,367,096; in Ireland, £1,303,215; in the United Kingdom, £28,680,266. The number of miles of railway open at the end of 1876 was, in England and Wales, 11,989; in Scotland, 2726; in Ireland, 2157; in the United Kingdom, 16,872. In the United Kingdom the total capital received by railway companies, including loans and debenture stock, up to the end of 1876, was at the rate of £39,012 per mile of railway constructed. In 1876 the gross receipts from passenger traffic in the United Kingdom were 42.05 per cent., and the gross receipts from goods traffic, 54.25 per cent. of the total gross receipts; the gross receipts, exclusive of the miscellaneous receipts, were at the rate of £3551 per mile of railway constructed, and at the rate of 5s. 6½d. per train mile; the total working expenditure was 54 per cent. of the total receipts; and the net receipts were 4.36 per cent. of the total capital received (including loans and debenture stock). The total expenditure was 54 per cent. of the total receipts in England, 52 in Scotland, and 53 in Ireland.

The *ordinary capital* of new companies, the lines of which were in course of construction in 1876, and no dividends earned, amounted in the United Kingdom to £3,217,166 (Scotland, £664,794); and the ordinary capital of constructed lines upon which no dividend was paid to £35,674,344 (Scotland, £4,084,952). Of other ordinary capital of railways in the United Kingdom, £12,916,914 (Scotland, £2,535,335) received dividends of not more than one per cent.; £4,296,158 (Scotland, £393,527), dividends of from one to two per cent.; £9,970,842 (Scotland, £1,641,137), of from two to three per cent.; £26,864,038 (Scotland, £4,418,906), of from three to four per cent.; £26,751,213 (Scotland, £6,682,960), of from four to five per cent.; £70,210,846 (Scotland, £296,340), of from five to six per cent.; £44,686,124 (Scotland, £8,588,566), of from six to seven per cent.; £21,050,549 (Scotland, £196,355), of from seven to eight per cent.; £537,918 (Scotland, *nil*), of from eight to nine per cent.; £885,326 (Scotland, £58,000), of from nine to ten per cent.—being the highest dividends paid on ordinary capital in Scotland); £1,059,380, of from ten to eleven per cent.; £3,857,065, of from eleven to twelve per cent.; and £30,000, of from twelve to thirteen per cent.

The aggregate balance in the hands of treasurers at Whitsunday 1875 was £116,359; the aggregate balance due to treasurers at the same date was £15,044. During the year 1875-76, the revenue derived from fines was *nil*; from incidental receipts, £9273; from money borrowed on security of tolls, £316. The expenditure for manual labour was £76,378; for carriage of materials, £10,725; for materials for surface repairs, £22,153; for land purchased, £106; for damage done in obtaining materials, £416; for tradesmen's bills, £6506; for salaries of treasurers, £1404; for salaries of clerks, £4455; for salaries of surveyors, £7721; for law charges, £1269; for interest of debt, £19,220; for annuities, *nil*; for improvements, £8194; for watering roads, £1567; for debts paid off, £3349; for incidental expenses, £10,429. Of supernumeraries, there were in certain regiments, 74 officers, 201 sergeants, and 1674 privates; there were of supernumeraries, 2 officers, 10 sergeants, 1 drummer, and 360 privates in Scotch militia regiments. The numbers wanted to complete the militia force of the United Kingdom at the training of 1876—the difference, that is, between the numbers enrolled and the establishment—was 260 officers, 170 sergeants, 427 corporals, 13 drummers, and 18,132 privates.

## MISCELLANEOUS.

*The Army Estimates.*—The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of her Majesty's land forces (exclusive of Her Majesty's British forces on the East Indian establishment, 62,652 in number, and including the staff of the militia forces) provided for in the Army Estimates for the year ending 31st March 1878, was 133,720 (viz., officers 7153, non-commissioned officers 13,375, drummers and trumpeters 3593, rank and file 109,599). This includes the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India; the general and departmental staff (viz., general staff, 91 officers, and 90 non-commissioned officers; army accountants, 2880; chaplain's department, 78; medical department, 531; and commissariat, transport, and ordnance store departments, 448—in all, 1526 men): 105 officers, 462 non-commissioned officers, 2 drummers and trumpeters, and 97 rank and file—in all, 666 men—employed in various establishments connected with the army; and the staff of militia regiments (viz., artillery, 32 officers, 510 non-commissioned officers, and 165 drummers and trumpeters—707 men; and infantry, 264 officers, 2904 non-commissioned officers, and 1056 drummers and trumpeters—4224 men). The strength of the regiments on the British establishment, provided for in the Estimates, including the depots in the United Kingdom of regiments in India, was 126,597 (viz., 5316 officers, 9409 non-commissioned officers, 2370 drummers and trumpeters, and 109,502 rank and file). The number of horses provided for (exclusive of officers' horses, and exclusive of India) was 15,148. The number of officers, non-commissioned officers, and rank and file of the reserve forces, for which provision was made in the Army Estimates for 1877-78, was, militia (including permanent staff), 115,000; yeomanry cavalry (including permanent staff), 11,600; volunteers (including staff), 174,241; army reserve, class 1, 15,000; class 2, 21,000. The estimated charge was, for effective services, £12,643,900 (viz., regular forces, £4,885,200; reserve forces, £1,209,100; commissariat and ordnance establishments and services, £5,286,400; works and buildings, £828,700; and various other services, £434,500); and for non-effective services, £1,894,800—total, £14,538,700; from which, however, was to be deducted the estimated Exchequer extra receipts, £603,500; making the net charge for army services in 1877-78, £13,935,200. [The sum contributed from Indian revenues to meet the home and non-effective charges for the regular troops serving in India was, for the first time, taken into account in aid of the estimates in 1877-78, and diminishes the charge as compared with previous years by a sum estimated at £1,000,000. The estimated charge for the reserve forces was distributed between the forces as follows:—Militia pay and allowances, £534,000; yeomanry cavalry, £74,400; volunteer corps, £468,700; army reserve corps, £132,000. The estimate for the volunteer corps was made up as follows:—Pay, etc., of 268 adjutants of volunteer corps, £60,800; pay, etc., of sergeant-instructors, £63,000; capitation grants to volunteer corps, etc. (32,393 artillery volunteers, 444 light horse, 6856 engineers, 106 mounted rifles, 132,970 rifle volunteers, and the permanent staff, 1472 in number, in all 174,241 men, at 30s. each, £261,362; travelling allowance, at 5s. each, for attendance at united drill or gun practice, £19,500; special capitation allowance of £2, 10s. for proficient officers and sergeants, £38,813), £319,675; miscellaneous charges for volunteer corps, £25,200.]

*The Army in the Colonies.*—The amount included in the Army Estimates of 1877-78 for military purposes in the Colonies is £1,769,057, and the amount that will be repaid by the several colonies as colonial contributions in aid of military expenditure in the same year was estimated at £236,650. The whole of the last-mentioned sum was expected from the South African Colonies (the Cape, Natal, and Mauritius), from China, etc. (Hong-Kong, Ceylon, and the Straits Settlement), and from Malta (£5000).

*The Army Purchase Commission.*—The sum to be voted for defraying the expenditure of the Army Purchase Commission in the financial year 1877 was £500,000.

*The Auxiliary Forces.*—The numbers of the militia regiments present at training in 1876 in Great Britain amounted (including 2242 officers and 4192 non-commissioned officers) to 76,487, and the numbers of those regiments absent with leave (including 310 officers and 43 non-commissioned officers) to 2226—total number accounted for, 78,713. The yeomanry present at inspection in the same year numbered 9585 (including 642 officers and 1261 non-commissioned officers), and the numbers of yeomanry absent with leave (including 146 officers and 95 non-commissioned officers) amounted to 1427—total force accounted for, 9687. The number of efficient volunteers in the same year (including 6660 officers and 12,833 non-commissioned officers) was 174,184. Grand total of the auxiliary forces of all arms in 1876, 263,909. The total male population of Great Britain between 15 and 35 years of age being estimated in 1876 at 4,150,789, it follows that a number equal to 6·36 per cent. of those between 15 and 35 years of age were employed in the auxiliary forces in that year. The number of the militia officers who had received certificates of efficiency was 558, and the number of volunteer officers who had received certificates of proficiency for 1876 was 4937. The total number of volunteers, exclusive of those serving in 1876 (and not including volunteers who have passed through certain corps which had been disbanded) who had joined and passed through the force between its establishment in 1859 and 1876 was 632,911, viz., light horse, 515; artillery, 124,897; engineers, 20,739; mounted rifles, 262; and rifle volunteers, 486,498.

*The Navy Estimates.*—The number of officers, seamen, boys, and marines proposed to be voted for the service of Her Majesty's Navy for the year ending 31st March 1878, was 60,000 (or 58,700, deducting 1300, the number of the officers and crews of Indian troop ships), viz., 46,000 officers, seamen, and boys for the fleet and coastguard service, and 14,000 marines. The estimated charge was £10,979,829, made up as follows:—For effective services, £8,890,832; for non-effective, £1,920,717; for conveyance of troops, £168,280. On the 1st December 1876, the number of ships in commission effective for general service was 123 (viz., 4 line-of-battle ships, all armour-plated; 13 frigates or corvettes armour-plated, and 80 not armour-plated; 76 sloops and smaller vessels not armour-plated, of which 65 were steamers and 11 were sailing vessels). There were also in commission 9 first reserve ships (seven armour-plated, and all steamers). Of gunnery and training ships, stationary, receiving, and depot ships (including royal yachts), surveying vessels, troop ships, store ships, and drill ships for the royal naval reserve, there were 47 (30 sailing vessels and 17 steamers), exclusive of Indian troop ships; and of tenders (including late coastguard cruisers) there were 69 (27 sailing vessels and 42 steamers). There were in all 248 vessels (68 sailing vessels, and 180 steamers, 24 of the latter being armour-plated) in commission.

*Local Taxation.*—The total amount raised by direct and indirect local taxes for the purposes of local expenditure in the United Kingdom, in the year 1873-4, was £29,247,595 (viz., in England, £23,879,029; in Scotland, £2,372,557; in Ireland, £2,996,009), which was at the proportion of 18s. 3d. per head of the population of the United Kingdom. The taxes actually received at the Exchequer in the same year (less stamps in lieu of fees) amounted to £65,353,000. This, added to the amount of local taxation, gives £94,600,595 as the total taxation of the United Kingdom in 1873-74, which, therefore, was at the rate of £2, 18s. 11d. per head of the population. The total receipts for local expenditure in the United Kingdom in the year 1873-74 amounted to £45,533,815 (England, £37,731,193; Scotland, £3,202,714; Ireland, £4,599,908). The amount of local expenditure in the same year was £44,523,720 (England, £36,750,554—of which, for the metropolis, £7,653,157; Scotland, £3,157,542; Ireland, £4,615,624). The figures for Scotland, partly estimated, were as follows:—Receipts, from taxes, £2,372,557 (of which, from rates, £1,908,210, and from tolls, dues, etc., £464,347); from sales or rents of property, £323,201; from government contributions, £160,751; from loans, £149,494; from miscellaneous sources, £196,711—total, £3,202,714; and expenditure, poor relief, £851,365; town authorities, £1,176,000; county assessments (police, prisons, etc.), £258,000; turnpike trusts, £180,158; school-boards, £327,847; other purposes, £364,172—total, £3,157,542.

*Grants in Aid of Local Taxation.*—The grants in aid of local taxation, and charges transferred from local to imperial funds, for which provision was made in the Civil Service Estimates for the year 1877-78, amounted, for England and Wales, to £2,391,498; for Scotland, to £344,313; for Ireland, to £1,576,080; for the United Kingdom, to £4,311,891—an increase upon the provision made in the previous financial year, per Appropriation Act, 1876, of £44,656 (England and Wales, £33,365; Scotland, £4260; Ireland, £7031). The grants proposed for Scotland for 1877-78 were as follows:—Payments and contributions in lieu of rates on government property, £12,000; rates on telegraph wires, etc., £2; medical relief—proportion of the expense in the various parishes, £10,000; vaccine lymph (excluding salary, etc., of medical officer in charge) £100; contribution in aid of maintenance of pauper lunatics, £65,000; criminal proceedings—Sheriff's accounts and criminal prosecutions, etc., in Sheriff Courts, £31,000; Procurators-fiscal—salaries, £25,135; Sheriff Court-houses—one-half of cost of erecting or improving (exclusive of grants for maintenance), £1209; contributions towards the charge of pay and clothing of police forces, £121,000; maintenance of prisoners in county prisons, £8000; maintenance of county prisoners in Perth General Prison, £9767; removal of convicts from county prisons (excluding cases of revocation or forfeiture of license), £1600; maintenance of children in Reformatory Schools, £16,000; maintenance of children in Industrial Schools, £43,500 (£4500 to be recovered from parochial boards under the two last heads); grants to School Boards under 35 and 36 Vict., c. 62, s. 67, £2000. The largest items in the list of grants proposed for Ireland were the following:—Dublin Metropolitan Police, £127,930; Irish Constabulary, £1,085,280. The largest items in the list of grants proposed for England were, similarly—contribution towards the charge of pay and clothing of police forces, £735,000; contributions towards the cost of the Metropolitan Police Force, £431,892. The salaries of the stipendiary magistrates in London and in Ireland, and certain educational and charitable grants which might perhaps have been included, have been omitted from the list of grants in aid of local taxation.

*The Profits of the Telegraph Service.*—A balance-sheet prepared for the purpose of exhibiting the financial position of the telegraph service on the hypothesis (so far as it can be applied) that the capital has been raised and the business conducted on a commercial basis shows, for the year ended 31st March 1876, a profit on the service of £196,800, equal to 2.06 per cent. on the amount of estimated capital (£9,520,466). The account is made up as follows:—(1) Revenue—from messages, private wire rentals, etc., £1,250,246; value of services rendered to government departments without payment, £9694; extra receipts (including old materials sold by Office of Works, £15 and waste-paper sold by the Stationery Office, £1252), £27,683—total receipts, £1,287,623; (2.) Expenditure—salaries, wages, maintenance, etc., £1,077,533; contribution to a depreciation fund to replace submerged cables, £13,290—total, £1,090,823:—Balance of profit, £196,800. The amount stated for salaries, etc., does not include the capital expenditure which is charged to the telegraph vote, but includes the telegraph expenditure borne on the votes of the Office of Works and the Stationery Office. It was arrived at as follows: Amount charged to telegraph vote, £1,031,527, amounts charged on account of telegraphs to vote of Office of Works, London, £18,908, to vote of Office of Works, Dublin, £3097, to Stationery Office vote, £39,968: estimated cost of manufacture of stamps (charged to vote of Inland Revenue), £5550; estimated cost of auditing telegraph accounts (charged against Exchequer and Audit department), £1811—total, £1,100,861; from which fell to be deducted, cost of telegraph extensions charged to the telegraph vote, £18,000, and cost of purchase of sites and buildings also so charged, £5328—balance, £1,077,531. The sum brought to account in the books of the Post-office as expended on capital, up to 31st December 1876, was £9,366,670. To this has been added—to get the true amount of the capital expended on the service—the cost of extensions up to 31st March 1876, charged year by year against the telegraph vote, £82,594; cost of sites and buildings to same date, similarly charged, £41,214; sums charged to Office of Works, London, to same date, £13,616; and sums charged to Office of Works, Dublin, £16,372;

which raise the amount of capital to £9,520,466. The expenditure for 1875-76, given above, includes £23,000 paid to railway companies in respect of their telegraph rights, and £13,000 on account of annuities paid to officers of the late telegraph companies. Had the former payments been commenced at 20 years' purchase, and the latter for 10 years' purchase, and their value paid out of capital, the balance of profit in 1875-76 would have been so far increased that it would have been equal to a dividend of 2·3 per cent. The ordinary telegraph accounts laid annually before Parliament charge expenditure of every description, excepting that incurred for the purchase of undertakings and the commutation of pensions, to the revenue of the year.

*The Teaching of Gaelic in Highland Schools.*—In consequence of a memorial having been addressed to the Lord President of the Council by the Gaelic School Society, praying that special grants might be made by the Scotch Education Department to encourage the teaching of Gaelic in certain parts of the Highlands, a circular was issued by the Department to the school-boards of the districts in question, inquiring (1) Whether they were disposed to support the application of the Society; (2) Whether there was difficulty in getting the services of teachers acquainted with Gaelic to the extent considered necessary; and (3) In what schools, under the school-boards aforesaid, and for what number of children in each, special provision for Gaelic teaching was required. The circular was sent to 103 school-boards, and answers (in many cases, however, not complete answers) were received from 90 of these. 65 school-boards were in favour of instruction in Gaelic being given in their schools, and 25 were against it being given; 53 school-boards stated that Gaelic teachers could be obtained by them without difficulty, and 14 that they could not. The number of public schools returned as likely to take advantage of special provisions in favour of Gaelic teaching was 208, and the number of children in those schools, so far as returned, was 16,331.

*The Parliamentary Constituencies of the United Kingdom.*—A return to an address of the House of Commons, dated 9th February 1877 (procured by Sir C. W. Dilke), gives, with respect to each parliamentary constituency in the United Kingdom, the total number of electors on the register at that date in force. The total number of parliamentary electors was, in England and Wales, 2,377,761 (viz., counties, 850,587; boroughs, 1,514,716; universities, 12,458); in Ireland, 231,265 (viz., counties, 173,919; boroughs, 53,953; university, 3393); and in Scotland, 302,313 (viz., counties, 88,594; burghs, 202,852; universities, 10,867).

*Capital Sentences.*—The number of persons convicted of murder and sentenced to death in England and Wales was 18 in 1873, 25 in 1874, 33 in 1875, and 32 in 1876. The capital sentence was carried out in 11 cases in 1873, in 16 in 1874, in 18 in 1875, and in 22 in 1876. Two women were executed in 1873, one in 1874, one in 1875, and none in 1876. There were 3 convictions for infanticide in 1873, 4 in 1874, 2 in 1875, and 3 in 1876. No woman was executed during the three years for the murder of her illegitimate child.

*Provisional Orders.*—The number of provisional orders and provisional certificates granted by the Departments of the Government under statutory authority (to be afterwards submitted to Parliament, and confirmed, or modified, or rejected) in the year 1876 was 167; of these, 155 were confirmed without opposition; 1 was opposed, but confirmed without amendment; 10 were opposed, but confirmed with amendment; and 1 was withdrawn. In the seven years 1870-76, the total number of such provisional orders granted was 776; of these, 647 were confirmed without opposition; 6 were opposed, but confirmed without amendment; 35 were opposed, but confirmed with amendment; 10 were not confirmed; and 78 were withdrawn or dropped. Only one order was withdrawn in the last three of the seven years.

*Salaries of Sheriffs of Counties in Scotland.*—The salaries of the Sheriffs of counties in Scotland (now paid wholly out of the Consolidated Fund) are as follows:—Sheriff, Aberdeen and Kincardine, £1000; Argyll, £700; Ayr, £700; Banff, Elgin, and Nairn, £700; Caithness, Orkney, and Zetland, £700;

Dumfries and Galloway, £900; Fife, £725; Forfar, £1000; Inverness, £700; Lanark, £2000; Linlithgow, Clackmannan, and Kinross, £650 (and £50 a-year additional to the present Sheriff as convener of the Sheriffs); Mid-Lothian and Haddington, £1700; Peebles, £500; Perth, £900; Renfrew and Bute, £950; Ross, Cromarty, and Sutherland, £850; Roxburgh, Berwick, and Selkirk, £750; Stirling and Dumbarton, £800. The salaries of the Sheriffs of Perth, and Renfrew and Bute, and Ross, Cromarty, and Sutherland, stated above, cover the duties performed by those officers as *ex officio* members of the Board of Supervision. Sheriffs have no allowance for travelling or personal expenses while visiting their counties.

*Salaries of Sheriff-substitutes in Scotland.*—The following shows the salaries of the Sheriff-substitutes in the several counties of Scotland:—Aberdeen and Kincardine, two Sheriff-substitutes at £1000 a year each; Ayr, two Sheriff-substitutes (one at Ayr, one at Kilmarnock), at £800 a year each; Argyll, Sheriff-substitutes at Campbelton, £500 a year; at Inveraray, £650; at Tobermory, £525; Sheriff-substitute, Banff, £550 a year; Berwick, £650; Bute, £525; Caithness, £600; Clackmannan, £525; Dumbarton, £600; Dumfries, £800; Edinburgh, two Sheriff-substitutes, one at £1300 a year, and one at £1100; Elgin Sheriff-substitute, £600 a year; Fife Sheriff-substitute at Cupar, £700; at Dunfermline, £600; Forfar, Sheriff-substitute at Forfar, £700, at Dundee, £1000; Haddington Sheriff-substitute, £600; Inverness, Sheriff-substitute at Inverness, £800, at Portree, £535, at Lochmaddy, £500, at Fort-William (for Inverness and Argyll), £550; Kinross, Sheriff-substitute, £500; Kirkcudbright, £550; Lanark, five Sheriff-substitutes at Glasgow, one at £1400 a year, one at £1200, one at £1000, one at £900, and one at £800, and Sheriff-substitute for Hamilton district, £700, for Airdrie district, £650, and for the upper ward, £500; Linlithgow, Sheriff-substitute, £550; Nairn, £500; Orkney, £525; Peebles, £500; Perth, Sheriff-substitute at Perth, £900, at Dunblane, £500; Renfrew, Sheriff-substitutes at Paisley and at Greenock, £800 each; Ross-shire, Sheriff-substitute at Dingwall, £600, at Stornoway, £500; Sheriff-substitute, Roxburgh, £650; Selkirk, £550; Stirlingshire, at Stirling, £700, at Falkirk, £700; Sutherland, £600; Wigtown, £650; Zetland, £500.

*Licensed Houses in Parliamentary Burghs in Scotland.*—The population of the Scotch Parliamentary Burghs was 1,152,037 in 1851, and 1,479,391 in 1871. The total number of licensed houses in such burghs was 7126 in 1854 (viz., 569 hotels, 4830 public-houses, and 1727 licensed grocers' shops); and in 1876 it was 6737 (viz., 541 hotels, 3798 public-houses, and 2398 grocers' shops). In the twenty-two years between 1854 and 1876—the population of the burghs having increased by 327,354 between 1851 and 1871—the number of licensed houses decreased by 389. There was a decrease of 28 in the number of hotels, and a decrease of 1032 in the number of public-houses; but an increase of 671 in the number of licensed grocers. The return from which the figures here given have been taken contains no information as to licensed houses from three Parliamentary burghs—Leith, Annan, and Inverurie.

*Grocers' and Public-House Licenses in Scotland.*—In the year ended 31st March 1876, the revenue derived from grocers' licenses was £37,167, 6s. 9d., and the revenue derived from public-house licenses was £81,664, 11s. 3½d.; and, in the year ended 31st March 1877, the revenue from grocers' licenses was £38,391, 11s. 4d., and the revenue from public-house licenses was £83,858, 6s. 10d.

*Intoxicating Liquors Licenses.*—A return procured by Sir W. Cunninghame shows for each county, and for each royal and parliamentary burgh, in Scotland, the number of convictions for breach of certificate of license to sell excisable liquors in the year from Whitsunday 1861 to Whitsunday 1862, and also in the year from Whitsunday 1874 to Whitsunday 1875. One county (Inverness) made no return; five burghs made no return (Annan, Inverurie, Kirkcaldy, Leith, and Whithorn); and of six burghs which were unable to make returns for the year 1861-62, three (Falkirk, Hawick, and Nairn), made, and the other three (Anstruther Wester, Burntisland, and Kilrenny) did not make a return of the convictions for 1874-5.

In counties there were, in the year 1861-62, 74 convictions against hotels and public-houses, 18 against grocers' shops, and 2 against ale and beer-houses; and, in the year 1874-75, 121 convictions against hotels and public-houses, 49 against grocers' shops, and 5 against ale and beer-houses. In burghs, the convictions returned were, for the year 1861-62, 147 against hotels and public-houses, 24 against grocers' shops, and 1 against an ale and beer house; and, for the year 1874-75, 133 against hotels and public-houses, 46 against grocers' shops, and 8 against ale and beer houses.

*Shebeen Prosecutions.*—In Edinburgh, the number of persons taken into custody in shebeens was 66 (62 males and 4 females) in 1874, 32 (29 males and 3 females) in 1875, and 24 (21 males and 3 females) in 1876; and the number of persons so taken into custody who were convicted was 64 in 1874, 27 in 1875, and 24 in 1876. In Glasgow, the number so taken into custody was 122 (78 males and 44 females) in 1874, 84 (55 males and 29 females) in 1875, and 81 (60 males and 21 females) in 1876; and the numbers convicted were 101 in 1874, 65 in 1875, and 69 in 1876. In Dundee, 21 persons (14 males and 7 females) were taken into custody in shebeens in 1874, 13 (all males) in 1875, and 5 (all males) in 1876; and 17 were convicted in 1874, 11 in 1875, and 1 in 1876. The number of persons taken into custody in shebeens in Aberdeen was 10 (9 males and 1 female) in 1874, 31 (29 males and 2 females) in 1875, and 3 (males) in 1876; 10 were convicted in 1874, 31 in 1875, and 3 in 1876. The number of persons summoned before magistrates for selling or dealing in exciseable liquors without a license was, in Edinburgh, 92 in 1874, 86 in 1875, and 83 in 1876; in Glasgow, 162 in 1874, 189 in 1875, and 181 in 1876; in Dundee, 89 in 1874, 82 in 1875, and 84 in 1876; in Aberdeen, 10 in 1874, 20 in 1875, and 9 in 1876. The number of such persons convicted was, in Edinburgh, 84 (26 males and 58 females) in 1874, 79 (26 males and 53 females) in 1875, and 78 (21 males and 57 females) in 1876; and in Glasgow, 106 (38 males and 68 females) in 1874, 136 (47 males and 89 females) in 1875, and 131 (49 males and 82 females) in 1876. In Dundee, it was 51 (24 males and 27 females) in 1874, 49 (19 males and 30 females) in 1875, and 53 (18 males and 35 females) in 1876; while in Aberdeen it was 5 (1 male and 4 females) in 1874, 13 (2 males and 11 females) in 1875; and 7 (1 male and 6 females) in 1876.

1876. *December 23.* Proclamation of the new Ottoman Constitution.

23. The Plenipotentiaries of the Great Powers and of Turkey met in conference at Constantinople.

1877. *January 1.* Queen Victoria proclaimed Empress of India at Delhi in presence of a large assemblage of native princes, presided over by Lord Lytton, the Viceroy.

18. The Turkish Grand Council rejected the proposals of the Plenipotentiaries of the Great Powers as being contrary to the integrity, independence, and dignity of the Empire.

*Feb. 8.* The fourth session of the

ninth Parliament of Queen Victoria opened by Her Majesty in person.

*March 1.* Conditions of Peace between Turkey and Servia signed.

5. Rutherford Burchard Hayes and William A. Wheeler installed President and Vice-President respectively of the United States of North America.

19. The first Turkish Parliament opened by the Sultan in person.

31. A protocol concerning the Eastern Question signed in London by the representatives of Great Britain, Germany, Austro-Hungary, France, Italy, and Russia.

*April 3.* The Queen's Theatre, Edinburgh, destroyed by fire.

12. The annexation to Britain of the Transvaal Territory, South Africa, proclaimed at Pretoria.

23. Suspension of diplomatic relations between Russia and Turkey.

23. Shock of earthquake felt at Oban and other places on the west coast of Argyllshire.

24. Russia declared war against Turkey.

30. Her Majesty the Queen's proclamation of neutrality in the war between Russia and Turkey published.

*May 9.* Roumania proclaimed her independence of Turkey.

11. Battle between the Russians and Turks near Batoum, in which the latter were victorious.

25. Constantinople declared to be in a state of siege.

*June 20.* The greater part of St John, New Brunswick, destroyed by fire.

20. About 300,000 African slaves emancipated in Madagascar.

21. A Russian force of about 3000 men crossed the Lower Danube.

27. The Grand Duke Nicholas, at the head of the Eighth Russian Army Corps, crossed the Danube near Simnitsa, driving the Turks from their positions at Sistova and the surrounding heights.

*July 3.* A general council of Presbyterian deputies from various parts of the world met at Edinburgh.

9. Osman Pacha entered Plevna.

16. Nicopolis captured by the Russians.

18-19. The Russians repulsed in attempting to take Plevna.

24. The Fiftieth Annual Show of the Highland and Agricultural Society of Scotland opened at Edinburgh.

30-31. The Russians again defeated in attacking the Turks at Plevna.

*August 1.* The House of Commons sat continuously for 26½ hours.

14. Parliament prorogued.

15. The Forty-seventh Annual Congress of the British Association for the Advancement of Science met at Plymouth, under the presidency of Professor Allen Thomson of Glasgow.

18-21. Extraordinary rainfall in Midlothian and other parts of

Scotland, occasioning floods and severely damaging crops and other property.

28. Severe rain-storm and floods in Great Britain, causing loss of life and very great destruction of property.

31. The freedom of the City of Edinburgh presented to General Grant, ex-President of the United States. On 13th September he received a similar compliment in Glasgow.

*September 11.* The ship "Forest of Windsor" ran into the ship "Avalanche" off Portland, when both vessels foundered and 108 persons drowned.

11. Storming of two redoubts in front of Plevna by the Russians under General Skobelev. Next day they were recaptured by the Turks, with a loss to the Russians of 15,000 men.

19. The Twenty-first Annual Congress of the Social Science Association met at Aberdeen, under the presidency of the Earl of Aberdeen.

*October 12.* The central tower of Inveraray Castle, seat of the Duke of Argyll, destroyed by fire.

15. Disastrous defeat of the Turks in an engagement with the Russians at Aladja Dagh, Armenia.

22. Upwards of 200 lives lost by fire-damp explosion at Messrs Dixon & Co's. Colliery, High Blantyre, near Hamilton.

*November 4.* Battle between the Turks and Russians eastward of Erzeroum, Armenia, in which the former were routed, with severe loss.

18. The Turkish fortress of Kars, Armenia, taken by storm by the Russians.

*December 3.* Mount-Stuart House, Isle of Bute, seat of the Marquess of Bute, destroyed by fire.

10. Osman Pacha, the defender of Plevna, attempted to break through the Russo-Roumanian line of investment; but after a sanguinary conflict for about five hours, in which he was wounded, was compelled with his whole army to surrender unconditionally to the Russians.

14. Servia declared war against Turkey.

19. Seven persons lost their lives by an accident resulting from a destructive fire at Greenside Street, Edinburgh.

By the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Queen, Defender of the Faith, Empress of India. Her Majesty, the only child of His Royal Highness Edward, Duke of Kent (*b.* Novem. 2, 1767, *d.* Jan. 23, 1820, *m.* May 29, 1818, Victoria-Mary-Louisa, *b.* Aug. 17, 1786, *d.* March 16, 1861, daughter of Francis, Duke of Saxe-Coburg), fourth son of King George III., was born on the 24th May 1819, succeeded to the Crown on the demise of her uncle, his late Majesty William IV., on the 20th June 1837; married Feb. 10, 1840, His Royal Highness Francis Albert-Augustus-Charles-Emanuel, Duke of Saxe, Prince of Coburg and Gotha, afterwards declared Prince Consort, who was born August 26, 1819, and died December 14, 1861, and has issue,

THE MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE GARTER

Was instituted by Edward III. in 1347. The habit and insignia are, *The Garter*, of dark-blue velvet, inscribed with the motto, *Honi soit qui mal y pense*; *The Mantle*, of blue velvet; *The Hood* and *Surcoat*, of crimson velvet; *The Hat*, of black velvet; *The Collar*, of gold; *The George*, or figure of St George, suspended from a broad dark-blue riband; and *The Star*, of silver. The number of knights is restricted to twenty-five, exclusive of the Sovereign, princes of the blood royal, and foreign princes.

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### THE MOST ANCIENT AND MOST NOBLE ORDER OF THE THISTLE.

The Most Ancient Order of the Thistle appears to have been projected by King James V. about 1540, but he died before the design could be carried out. It was renewed by King James VII., who created eight Knights in 1687. After an abeyance of fifteen years, the Order was restored by Queen Anne in 1703. It consists of the Sovereign, and sixteen knights. The badges are, *The Star*, of silver, inscribed with the motto, *Nemo me impune lacessit*; *The Jewel*, or figure of St Andrew, suspended from a green riband; and *The Collar*, of gold.

### THE MOST HONOURABLE ORDER OF THE BATH,

Established in 1399, was revived by King George I. in 1725, enlarged in 1815, and enlarged and remodelled in the month of April 1847. It consists of the Sovereign, of a Great Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal, descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of one thousand two hundred and eighteen Companions or Members, divided into the three classes following, each class being subdivided into two sections, Military and Civil: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, seventy-five in number, of whom not more than fifty shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major-General in the army, or Rear-Admiral in the navy; 2d, Knights Commanders, two hundred and three in number, of whom not more than one hundred and twenty-three shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Colonel in the army, or Captain in the navy; 3d, Companions, nine hundred and forty in number, of whom (except under special and temporary exigencies) not more than six hundred and ninety shall belong to the military division, being officers of or above the rank of Major in the army, or Commander in the navy, whose services shall have been marked by the especial mention of their names in despatches.

The qualification of members of the civil divisions of each of these three classes is no otherwise limited than that, by their personal services to the Crown or by the performance of public duties, they shall have merited the Royal favour; and that no person shall be appointed to one class who is not qualified for the other and higher classes. Honorary members, being foreigners, may be appointed in such numbers as the Sovereign shall think fit. For each class and division, appropriate insignia are appointed by the Statutes of the Order, enacted by Her Majesty the Queen, and published in the Edinburgh Gazette of 1st June 1847. Enlarged June 1861.

### THE VICTORIA CROSS, OR ORDER OF VALOUR.

This naval and military decoration was instituted by an instrument under the sign-manual of the Queen, dated the 29th of January 1856, "for the purpose of rewarding individual instances of merit and valour." It is ordained that the distinction shall be styled "The Victoria Cross;" that it shall consist of a Maltese cross of bronze, with her Majesty's royal crest in the centre, and, on an escroll underneath, the inscription "For Valour;" that the Cross shall be suspended from the left breast by a blue riband for the navy, and by a red riband for the army; that the names of those upon whom her Majesty may be pleased to confer the decoration shall be published in the London Gazette; that any one who, after having received the Cross, shall again perform an act of bravery, which if he had not received such Cross would have entitled him to it, shall have such farther act recorded by a Bar attached to the riband by which the Cross is suspended, an additional Bar being added for every additional act; that the Cross shall be awarded to those officers or men only who have served the Queen in the presence of the enemy, and have there performed some signal act of valour or devotion to their country; that with the view of placing all persons on a perfectly equal footing of eligibility for the decoration, neither rank nor long service nor wounds nor any other circumstance or condition whatsoever, save the merit of conspicuous bravery, shall be held to establish a sufficient claim to the honour; and that every warrant officer, petty officer, seaman, or marine, or non-commissioned officer or soldier who shall have received the Cross shall be entitled to a special pension of ten pounds a year, each additional Bar carrying with it an additional pension of five pounds a year.

### THE MOST EXALTED ORDER OF THE STAR OF INDIA.

This order of knighthood was instituted by the Queen, in February 1861, and enlarged and remodelled in March 1866, by letters patent under the great seal, in order to afford to the princes, chiefs, and people of the Indian Empire, a public and signal testimony of Her Majesty's regard; to commemorate Her Majesty's resolution to take upon herself the government of the territories in India; and to enable Her Majesty to reward conspicuous merit and loyalty. The order is to be called "The Most Exalted Order of the Star of India." It is now to consist of the Sovereign, a Grand Master, and two hundred and forty-six Ordinary Companions or Members, divided into three classes: 1. Thirty Knights Grand Commanders; 2. Seventy-two Knights Commanders; 3. One hundred and forty-four Companions; together with such Extra and Honorary Knights as the Sovereign may appoint. The Sovereign shall be the King or Queen regnant of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland. The Grand Master, first and principal Knight Grand Commander of the Order, shall be the Viceroy and Governor-General of India for the time being. The Sovereign may confer the dignity of a Knight Grand Commander of the Order upon such native princes and chiefs of India as shall have entitled themselves to the Royal favour, and upon such British subjects as have, by important and loyal services rendered by them to the Indian Empire, merited such Royal favour. No person shall be nominated a Knight Commander, or a Companion, who shall not, by his conduct and services in the Indian Empire, have merited the Royal favour.

**THE MOST DISTINGUISHED ORDER OF SAINT MICHAEL AND SAINT GEORGE**

Was instituted in 1818, for natives of the Ionian Islands and of Malta, and for such other British subjects as should be distinguished in connexion with the said islands, or with H.M. service in the Mediterranean. By certain statutes, bearing date 4th December 1868, Her Majesty was pleased to enlarge and re-organize the Order, so as to extend it to such natural-born subjects of the Crown of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland as might be persons of conspicuous merit, or have rendered important services to the Crown, within or in connexion with any of Her Majesty's colonial possessions; and a supplementary statute, bearing date 3d April 1869, ordains that naturalized foreigners may be admitted in like manner as if they were natural-born subjects of the British Crown. A supplementary statute, of date 30th May 1877, increased the number of Members of the Order, which consists of the Sovereign, of a Grand Master (being a Prince of the Blood Royal descended of the body of King George I., or other exalted personage named by the Sovereign), and of three hundred and fifty-five Members, divided into three classes, viz.: 1st, Knights Grand Cross, thirty-five in number, in addition to such Extra or Honorary Members as the Sovereign may appoint; 2d, Knights Commanders, one hundred and twenty in number; 3d, Companions, two hundred in number.

## REGULATIONS FOR THE GRANTING OF COMMISSIONS IN THE ARMY.

### CAVALRY AND INFANTRY.

#### FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

1. *Second Lieutenants.*—A commission as second lieutenant in the cavalry or infantry of the army may be given:—

- To a cadet who after a year's course of instruction at the Royal Military College (see below) shall pass thereat a satisfactory examination in the field and on paper.
- To a lieutenant of one of the regiments of militia (see below, paragraph 3), or to a lieutenant in the Royal Malta Fencible Artillery, under such regulations as may be issued from time to time by the Secretary of State. These officers shall pass such an examination as may be fixed from time to time by the Secretary of State before they receive a commission as second lieutenant.
- To a non-commissioned officer who is recommended for promotion by the Commander-in-Chief, and who shall pass such a professional examination as may be fixed from time to time by the Secretary of State.

2. *Lieutenants.*—A second lieutenant in the cavalry or infantry of the army may, on the occurrence of a vacancy, receive a commission as lieutenant under such regulations as may be fixed from time to time.

3. *Militia.*—On and after the 1st January 1879, the present system of permitting officers commanding militia regiments to nominate lieutenants of their regiments for commissions in the army will be discontinued, and any subaltern officer of a militia regiment who may wish to become a candidate for an army commission will, subject to the conditions prescribed, be allowed to compete for a commission in an examination in military subjects. These competitive examinations will be held twice a year, and candidates will not be allowed more than three trials, which trials must take place at consecutive examinations.

### ROYAL MILITARY COLLEGE, SANDHURST.

1. *Object of the College.*—The Royal Military College is maintained for the purpose of affording a special military education to candidates for commissions in the cavalry and infantry. Candidates for first appointments to the army will, with the exception of lieutenants of militia, and non-commissioned officers recommended for promotion, be required in future to pass through a course of instruction as cadets at the Royal Military College.

2. *Regulations for Admission.*—Admission to the Royal Military College as cadets will be granted:—

- (a) To a successful candidate at a competitive examination in general subjects to be held under such regulations as may be issued from time to time.
- (b) To a graduate in arts at the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, Durham, London, Dublin, Edinburgh, St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and the Queen's University, Ireland, or to a student who has passed "Moderations" at Oxford, the "Previous Examination" at Cambridge, the "Final Examination of the Senior Freshman year" at Dublin, "the first year's Examination" at Durham, "the first University Examination in Arts or in Engineering" at Queen's University, Ireland, the "Examination for Candidates for the Army" at Scotch universities, and the "First Examination" for the degrees of B.A., LL.B., B.Sc., or M.B., at London University; subject in each case to the competitive examination prescribed in the Regulations.
- (c) To cadets styled "Queen's Cadets," "Honorary Queen's Cadets," "Indian Cadets," and to Pages of Honour.

The number of cadets admitted to the college will vary, according to the requirements of the service. The dates of admission will be the 10th February and 1st September in each year.

The examinations of candidates for admission to the Royal Military College as cadets will be conducted by the Civil Service Commissioners, and will take place twice a year, in the months of December and July. Notice will be given from time to time of the day and place of the examinations, and of the number of vacancies open to competition at each periodical examination. The number of trials allowed will not exceed two in the case of university candidates, and three in that of other candidates.

All candidates will be inspected by a Medical Board; and no candidate will be considered eligible for a commission unless certified by the Board to be free from any bodily defects or ailments, and in all respects, as to height and physical qualities, fit for Her Majesty's service. Cases of exceptional shortness of stature will be referred to the War Office for special consideration.

The limits of age for candidates for admission to the Royal Military College by competition, for Queen's cadets, Queen's honorary cadets, Indian cadets, and pages of honour, will be from 17 to 20; for students of the universities who shall have passed the interim examination as specified in paragraph (b), from 17 to 21; and for graduates of the universities who shall have passed the examination for the degree of B.A. or M.A., from 17 to 22.

Competitors who desire to obtain commissions in West India regiments may be admitted up to the age of 24. This extension of the limit of age will not apply to university candidates.

Candidates will receive information as to the examination by competition on application to the Military Secretary, Horse Guards, London.

## ROYAL ARTILLERY AND ROYAL ENGINEERS.

### FIRST APPOINTMENTS.

Commissions as lieutenants in the Royal Artillery or Royal Engineers will be conferred upon cadets who qualify at the Royal Military Academy at Woolwich (see below).

The commissions of such lieutenants as are recommended by the governor of the Academy, and afterwards pass through their practical course at Woolwich and Chatham in a satisfactory manner, will be antedated six months.

## ROYAL MILITARY ACADEMY AT WOOLWICH.

*Object of the Academy.*—The Royal Military Academy is maintained for the purpose of affording a preparatory education to candidates for the Royal Artillery and Royal Engineers; this education will be chiefly technical and will in no obligatory subject be carried beyond the point useful to the corps alike.

## GOVERNORS-GENERAL OF INDIA SINCE 1772.

## SECTION II.—ENGLAND.

## ENGLAND AND WALES.

**EXTENT, ETC.**—The length of England and Wales, from Portland Bill, Dorsetshire, in lat.  $50^{\circ} 31' N.$ , to Berwick-on-Tweed, in lat.  $55^{\circ} 46' N.$ , is 363 miles; the extreme breadth, from the North Foreland, Kent, in long.  $1^{\circ} 26' E.$  to the Land's End, Cornwall, in long.  $5^{\circ} 41' W.$  is 320 miles. The area of England is 50,933 square miles, or 32,597,398 acres; that of Wales, 7378 square miles, or 4,721,823 acres; that of England and Wales, 58,311 square miles, or 37,319,221 acres. Of the 52 counties into which they are divided, England contains 40, Wales, 12. The number of parishes in England and Wales in 1871 was 14,793. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act in 1815 was, in England and Wales, £51,898,423; in 1851, £94,809,106; in 1861, £114,058,538; in 1865, £131,341,499; in 1867, £110,696,900;\* in 1874, £131,084,816; 1875, £132,720,684. The rateable rental of property in England and Wales assessed to the Poor's Rate was £71,840,271 in 1856; £100,668,698 in 1868; £112,317,603 in 1873; £115,646,631 in 1874, £119,079,589 in 1875.

**POPULATION, ETC.**—The population of England and Wales (including the soldiers, sailors, and merchant seamen at home, belonging to England and Wales) from 1801 to 1871, as ascertained by decennial census, is shown in the following Table:—

## Education.

## UNIVERSITY OF OXFORD.

This ancient University consists of a union of Colleges and Halls devoted to the purposes of study and education, and incorporated under the style or title of "The Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford." There are at present twenty-one Colleges, each having a mansion for the residence of members of the foundation, and for the reception of students. These Colleges may be said to be an institution peculiar to England, as none exist in foreign universities, nor even in Scotland. They are bodies corporate, independent of the University, being governed, as to their own concerns, by their respective statutes; and each has in connexion with it numerous valuable fellowships, scholarships, and exhibitions. The four Academical Halls at Oxford are places in which students reside, under discipline and instruction, and pass through the curriculum to their several degrees in precisely the same manner as the student inmates of the Colleges. The term Hall, however, implies also a Society, and in this sense there is an important difference between Halls and Colleges, inasmuch as the former are not incorporated, have no endowments for fellows, and have all their property held in trust for them by the University. The recent foundation of the Keble College was established in 1870 from funds collected by private sub-

scription, and suitable buildings have been erected. In pursuance of the Oxford University Act, 1854, Private Halls have been instituted for the purpose of affording a cheaper education than is to be had at the Colleges. The scholars are subject to the laws of the University, partake of its privileges, and are admissible to its degrees in the same way as the other students.

By a statute passed in the year 1868, students may be admitted members of the University without belonging to any College or Hall. Such students are called *Scholares non ascripti*, or unattached students, and keep terms by residing at Oxford, either with their parents or in licensed lodging-houses. They are under the control of certain delegates.

There are four terms for academical exercises in each year, but for many Professors' lectures and some other purposes, the third and fourth together count as only one. Two of the four can be kept by six weeks' residence, and two by three weeks'. The ordinary residence in the College extends to twenty-six weeks in the year. Candidates for admission to the University are required to pass a preliminary examination at their respective Colleges or Halls.

The degrees conferred by the University upon students are those of Bachelor and Master in Arts, and of Bachelor and Doctor in Music, and in the three superior faculties of Civil Law, Medicine, and Divinity. Twelve terms of residence are required for the degree of B.A. No further residence is necessary for any degree. Thus the education of a young man at Oxford is spread over about three years; but in the case of candidates for the higher honours, a degree is seldom taken in less than four years.

Candidates for the degree of B.A. are required to pass three distinct examinations—viz., 1. Responsions before the masters of the schools; 2. First Public Examination before the moderators; 3. Second Public Examination before the public examiners. For this last there are now six schools of honours, called the schools of *Literæ Humaniores*, *Scientiæ Mathematicæ et Physicæ*, *Scientia Naturalis*, *Jurisprudentia*, *Historia Moderna*, and *Theologia*, and one mixed school for passmen, divided into several groups of subjects. At the responsions, candidates are examined in Latin and Greek grammar, one Latin and one Greek author, arithmetic, and either Euclid or algebra. The examination is conducted partly in writing, partly *viva voce*.

Candidates at the first public Examination are examined either in logic or in algebra, together with three books of Euclid, in the four Gospels in Greek, and in portions of three classical authors, there being a higher examination both in Classics and Mathematics for candidates for honours.

All candidates at the second public Examination are required to offer themselves in Divinity also; but candidates not members of the Church of England may substitute an equivalent amount of other matter for examination. The term "Divinity" comprises the four Gospels and the Acts of the Apostles in Greek, the Old and New Testaments, the Thirty-nine Articles, and the Evidences of the Christian Religion. In the mathematical school candidates are examined either in the first six books of Euclid or in the first part of algebra. In the school of natural science they are examined in the principles of mechanical philosophy, chemistry, physiology, and further in some one of the particular sciences dependent on mechanical philosophy. In the school of law and modern history every candidate must offer himself for examination in English history and law. In all the schools there are examinations for honours as well as the ordinary or "pass" examination. A fifth school of theology was instituted in 1870, and the school of law and modern history was, in 1873, separated into two distinct schools.

For the degree of M.A., no further examination or exercise is required; a B.A. may proceed to the degree of M.A. on the expiry of the twenty-sixth term from his matriculation, provided he has had his name on the books of some College or Hall during that period.

## UNIVERSITY OF CAMBRIDGE.

This University, like that of Oxford, is a union of Colleges or Societies devoted to the study of the liberal arts and sciences. There are seventeen such Colleges at Cambridge, each being a body corporate, maintained by the endowments of benefactors, and governed by its own laws, but controlled by the paramount statutes of the University.

The terms of the academical year are three,—viz., 1. Michaelmas, beginning on the 1st of October and ending on the 16th of December; 2. Lent, extending from the 13th of January to the Friday before Palm Sunday; and 3. Easter, commencing on the Friday after Easter-day, and closing on the last Friday but one in June. Students are admitted, either by a personal examination before the tutor and some of the College officers, or by sending to the tutor a recommendatory certificate from some M.A. of the University, stating the qualifications, etc., of the person applying for admission, and at the same time transmitting the caution-money, which is £15 in the case of an ordinary student intending to join a college, and £2 in the case of a non-collegiate student. If this certificate be deemed satisfactory, the student is admitted, and his name placed on the boards which hang in the butterie of the several Colleges. The day after the division of any of the

is the time fixed for matriculation, *i. e.*, enrolment of the student's name in the University books. At Cambridge, as at Oxford, persons may be admitted as students, and have degrees conferred upon them, without the necessity of their being members of any College or Hall.

Undergraduates are required to give a constant attendance on lectures and, yearly or half-yearly, undergo an examination in those subjects to which their attention has been devoted. By this course they are prepared for those *public* examinations which must be passed before the degree in Arts can be obtained. What is called "The Previous Examination" is held towards the end of the Michaelmas and Easter terms, and is open to students in their first term of residence. Exemption from this examination may be gained by students who have shown sufficient merit in the University Local Examinations, or in an examination at school conducted by the Oxford and Cambridge Schools' Examination Board. The subjects of this examination are, one of the four Gospels in Greek, Paley's Evidences of Christianity, Latin and Greek Grammar, one Greek and one Latin author, the Elements of Euclid, Algebra, and Arithmetic. No student can be examined for the degree of B.A. who has not previously kept nine terms; and a B.A. "may be admitted *ad incipiendum in artibus* at any time after three academical years have passed from the completion of his Bachelor's degree. The inceptors in every year become complete Masters of Arts by creation on the Commencement Day, *i. e.*, on the last Tuesday but one in June." No one has a vote in the Senate until after creation.

UNIVERSITY OF LONDON.

Unlike other universities, this confers its degrees upon the results of its examinations only. It was founded in 1836 "for the purpose of ascertaining, by means of examination, the persons who have acquired proficiency in literature, science, and art, and other departments of knowledge," by the pursuit of a regular and liberal education at University College and King's College, London, or at any of the other colleges and houses of learning

in the royal charter; "and of rewarding them by academical degrees and certificates of proficiency, as evidence of their respective attainments, and marks of honour proportioned thereto." But by later charters, students from any or no college are admissible to all examinations but those in Medicine and Surgery.

There are two examinations for matriculation in each year; one commencing on the second Monday in January, and the other on the last Monday in June; they are held at the new University Buildings, Burlington Gardens, London, and also, under special arrangement, in various cities, towns, and colleges, of the United Kingdom and the Colonies. Candidates must produce a certificate showing that they have completed their sixteenth year. The subjects of the examination which they must pass are—Mathematics, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Latin, English, two of the languages Greek, French, and German, and Outlines of English History and Modern Geography. The matriculation fee is £2.

For each of the degrees of B.Sc. and B.A., two examinations besides the one at matriculation require to be passed—the first on the third Monday in July, and the second (B.Sc.) on the third, and second (B.A.) on the fourth Monday in October. The fee payable at each examination is £5. No candidate is admitted to the examination for the degree of M.A. until after the expiration of one academical year from the time of his passing that for B.A., nor unless he can show evidence that he has completed his twentieth year. A fee of £10 is exacted for the M.A. examination.

The highest degree in the Faculty of Arts in this University is D.Lit., or Doctor of Literature. A candidate who is only B.A. must pass two examinations at an interval of at least a year; but Masters of Arts who have taken their degree in classics need pass only the second examination. The former of these is in the Greek and Latin classics generally, with prose composition in Greek, Latin, and English, and in history to the end of the eighteenth century; the second examination is in the English language, literature, and history, and in any two of the following subjects, provided that either French or German be one of these:—French; German; Anglo-Saxon, with Icelandic; Sanskrit; Arabic; Hebrew, with Syriac. These examinations are conducted by means of printed papers. A fee of £10 is payable at each examination.

The degree of D.Sc. (Doctor of Science) is open to all Bachelors of Science of two years' standing; who may elect to be examined in any one of sixteen branches of science. The fee is £10.

By the late Reform Act, the University of London returns one member to serve in Parliament; the constituency (about 1700) is composed solely of "Members of Convocation;" which comprises all graduates of certain standing who have chosen to secure their privileges by payment of a trifling fee

## UNIVERSITY COLLEGE, LONDON, FOUNDED 1826.

*Re-incorporated by Act of Parliament, passed 24th June 1869.*

The purpose of the foundation of this College, as expressed in the Act, is, "To afford, at a moderate expense, the means of education in Literature, Science, and the Fine Arts, and in the knowledge required for admission to the medical and legal professions; and, in particular, for affording the means of obtaining the education required for the purpose of taking the degrees now, or hereafter to be, granted by the University of London." The subjects taught are at present classed under (I.) The Faculty of Arts and Laws, including the department of the Fine Arts, (II.) The Faculty of Science, to which belongs the department of Engineering, and (III.) The Faculty of Medicine, and are specified below. Students are admitted without previous examination. The session commences early in October, and terminates towards the end of June. In connexion with University Col-lege, and occupying portions of its buildings, there is a school for boys under sixteen years of age.

## KING'S COLLEGE, LONDON,

Was founded in 1828, upon the following fundamental principle:—"That every system of general education for the youth of a Christian community ought to comprise instruction in the Christian religion as an indispensable part, without which the acquisition of other branches of knowledge will be conducive neither to the happiness of the individual, nor to the welfare of the state." The subjects taught are enumerated below, and are comprised under the following departments:—I. General literature and science; II. The applied sciences; III. Theology; IV. Medicine. V. The Evening Classes; VI. The School. In the first-named department, new students are subjected to an examination, that it may be ascertained whether they are competent to take advantage of the College classes. The course of study pursued in department II. is practical in its nature, and is designed "for the large class of young men who, in after life, are likely to be engaged in commercial and agricultural pursuits, or in professional employments, such as civil and military engineering, surveying, architecture, and the higher branches of manufacturing art." The whole course occupies three years. Candidates for admission as students in theology must be twenty-one years of age, and be recommended by the clergyman of their parish; they must also pass an examination in Greek, Latin, English literature, the Church Catechism, etc. The course must be continued for at least six terms (two years) before students can offer themselves for final examination. No de-

degrees are conferred by King's College, but its students are privileged to graduate at the University of London.

The academical year consists of three terms, as at Cambridge; and students are admitted at the commencement of each term.

There is accommodation within the walls of the College for only a limited number of matriculated students.

Classes for evening instruction are conducted from October to March and from April to July in each year.

King's College School (for boys from eight to sixteen years of age) consists of two divisions—viz., the division of Classics, Mathematics, and General Literature; and the division of Modern Instruction.

## THE UNIVERSITY OF DURHAM.

This University was founded in 1832, and incorporated by royal charter in 1837, for the purpose of securing to the inhabitants of the north of England a sound, yet not expensive education. The system of uniting domestic discipline with efficient lectures and instruction is maintained here in somewhat the same manner as at Oxford and Cambridge. With the view of placing the advantages of such a system within the reach of persons of limited means, a Hall, named after Bishop Hatfield, was opened in 1846. All the arrangements of this Hall are made on an economical scale, and students in each Faculty are received in it as in University College, are subject to the same discipline, under the same tutors, and, for the most part, are eligible to the same endowments. In the year 1870 a regulation was passed by which students are admitted to be members of the University without becoming members of any College, Hall, or House. The house or lodging in which they reside must be approved by the Warden and Proctors, and in all matters of University discipline, tuition, and eligibility to endowments, they are placed upon the same footing as students of the College or Hall.

The academical year at Durham consists of three terms, viz., Michaelmas, Epiphany, and Easter. The qualifications of students to enter on the course of education pursued in the several Faculties of Arts, Theology, Physical Science, and Medicine, are ascertained by examination before admission.

For the degree of B.A., or the licence in Theology, a residence of two years is required, the period of residence in the year being six months in both cases. A graduate may proceed to a licence in Theology after one term's residence, and a Licentiate may proceed to a Degree after one term's residence, the term, in either case, being of eight weeks; but this may also be done by keeping two short terms of five weeks each. Terms kept by students in Theology are allowed to count in part towards the degree of B.A., and *vice versa*. A graduate may proceed to the degree of M.A. when he is of the standing of nine terms from his admission to that of B.A.

No student is obliged to attend the services of the Church of England unless he belongs to that Church; and no religious test or subscription is required from any member of the University except he be studying in the Faculty of Theology.

The College of Medicine at Newcastle-upon-Tyne, which has for many years been in connexion with the University, is now a college of the University. All information respecting the College may be obtained from the Secretary, Dr Byrom Bramwell.

A College of Physical Science was founded at Newcastle-upon-Tyne in 1871 by the joint co-operation of the University and the leading landed proprietors and employers of skilled labour in the north of England. Professors of Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geology, and Biology have been appointed. All information respecting the college may be obtained from the secretary, Theo. Wood Bunning.

**EXTENT, ETC.**—The length of Ireland, from Cork Harbour, in lat. 51° 51' N., to Malin Head, Donegal, in lat. 55° 23' N., is 244 miles; the breadth, from Howth Head, Dublin, in long. 6° 5' W. to Slyne Head, Galway, in long. 10° 11' W. is 168 miles. Its area is 31,754 square miles, or 20,322,641 acres. It is divided into four provinces, and subdivided into 32 counties. The annual value of real property assessed under the Property and Income Tax Act was £11,767,810 in 1854, £12,893,829 in 1860, and £12,994,735 in 1875. The rateable annual valuation of property was £13,520,296 in 1876. Dublin, the capital, had in 1871 a population of 267,717.

**POPULATION, ETC.**—The population of Ireland (excluding men in the army and the navy) in each decennial period from 1801 to 1871 is shown in the following Table:—

# PART FOURTH.

## Scotland.

### EXTENT AND POPULATION.

THE length of the mainland of Scotland, from the Mull of Galloway, in Wigtownshire, in lat. 54° 39' N. to Dunnet Head, in Caithness-shire, in lat. 58° 40' N. is 278 miles; the breadth, from Buchan-ness, in Aberdeenshire, in long. 1° 47' W. to the most westerly point in Ross-shire, in long. 5° 52' W. is 150 miles. The area, including the islands, is 30,463 square miles, or 19,496,132 statute acres.

The number of counties is thirty-three. The number of parishes in 1871 was 918. The old valued rent of the counties, as ascertained in 1674, was £3,656,408 Scots, or £319,281 sterling [see the Almanac for 1857, pp. 252, 253]: the new valued rent of the counties (including Burghs and Railways), in 1858-9, was £12,836,522 [see the Almanac for 1861, pp. 335, 337].

The following Table shows the area of each county in square miles, and the number of persons to each square mile; the gross amount of property and profits assessed to Property and Income Tax for the year 1873-74; and the population in 1871.

## LIST OF THE PEERAGE OF SCOTLAND,

AS IT STOOD ON THE 1ST MAY 1707; ORDERED TO BE LAID BEFORE THE HOUSE OF LORDS 22D DECEMBER 1707.

[By this document, commonly called *The Union Roll*, it is understood that the order of precedence among the Peers of Scotland is regulated; and, with certain amendments, it is that called at all elections of their representatives, though it cannot be looked on as a complete list, such as should exclude claims to Peerages not entered in it. By the Act 11 and 12 Vict. c. 52, it is ordered that, until otherwise directed by the House of Lords, the Lord Clerk Register, or the Clerks of Session officiating at elections in his name, shall not call the title of any Peerage on *The Union Roll* in right of which no vote has been received or counted since the year 1800. It is farther provided by the Act 14 and 15 Vict. c. 87, that after every election the titles of Peerages in right of which no vote has been received or counted for fifty years or upwards, shall be transmitted to the

Clerk of Parliament, and on an order to that effect being issued from the House of Lords such titles shall not be called at future elections, until the House of Lords shall otherwise direct.

The Roll, as originally framed, contained 154 Peers; namely, 10 Dukes, 3 Marquesses, 75 Earls, 17 Viscounts, and 49 Barons; and there have been subsequently enrolled 10 Peers; namely, 1 Duke, 2 Marquesses, 1 Earl, and 6 Barons. These are distinguished by the letters *ad.* and a date (that of their enrolment) placed after their names. The dates of the creations have been prefixed; Peerages which are attained, extinct, or dormant, are printed in italics; the date of the attainder, extinction, or abeyance, being added; and an asterisk \* has been placed after the names of those who are likewise Peers of England, of Great Britain *by special creation* (all Peers of Scotland being, in terms of the Act of Union, Peers of Great Britain), or of the United Kingdom.]

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**THE COMMISSION OF THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY**

Meets on the first day after the dissolution of the Assembly, if there be any business left over by the Assembly, and on the second Wednesday of August, third Wednesday of November, and first Wednesday of March, at 12 noon.

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**REGULATIONS FRAMED AND ENACTED BY THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND, TO BE OBSERVED IN THE ELECTION AND APPOINTMENT OF MINISTERS.**

*I. Upon Vacancy occurring, Moderator of Kirk-Session to be appointed.*—Upon a vacancy occurring in the ministry of any parish, the presbytery shall, at a meeting to be held within ten days of the occurrence of the vacancy coming to the knowledge of the moderator or clerk, appoint, out of their own number, a moderator of the kirk-session of such parish, provided that in collegiate charges, and in cases of assistant and successor, such appointment of a moderator shall not be made unless desired by the parish minister. At all meetings of the congregation held in connection with the vacancy, the moderator of kirk-session thus appointed, or if no appointment has been made, the moderator of kirk-session shall preside, and the roll of the congregation, as hereinafter defined, shall be in his hands.

*II. Roll of Congregation to be made up on occurrence of Vacancy.*—The minister appointed to intimate the vacancy shall at the same time intimate that the kirk-session are to proceed to make up a roll of the congregation, for the purpose of determining the persons entitled to take part in the election of a minister, and that any person claiming to be placed on said roll as an adherent of the Church is to give in a claim to the kirk-session on or before a day to be then specified, being not less than seven or more than eleven days thereafter; and intimation shall be further made that the kirk-session will meet on a day and at an hour then named, for the purpose of considering such claims as may be lodged. The intimation shall be in the form of Schedule A hereto annexed, and the claim shall be in the form of Schedule B.

*III. Roll of Congregation.*—The roll of the congregation shall include—  
 1. As communicants, all persons not being under church discipline, whose names appear upon the roll of communicants, and who have not ceased to be members of the congregation by receiving certificates of transference, or otherwise; 2. As adherents, only such other persons, being parishioners of not under twenty-one years of age, as have claimed to be enrolled as members of the congregation, and have shown to the satisfaction of the kirk-session that they desire to be considered as connected with the congregation, and in regard to whom no reason appears to the kirk-session for refusing to admit them to the communion if they should apply.

IV. *Claims of Persons to be admitted as Adherents of the Church.*—The kirk-session, at their meeting intimated as aforesaid, shall consider the claims of persons to be enrolled as members of the congregation *que* adherents. Thereafter a list of the names and designations of those persons whom it is proposed by the kirk-session to place on the roll as communicants and adherents respectively shall be made up, and shall be open to inspection for such time as the kirk-session shall have appointed, being not less than three free days, and shall be revised and adjusted at the meeting appointed to be held for the purpose, when any party having an interest may be heard; after which the roll of the congregation shall be made up therefrom, and shall be attested by the moderator and clerk; and the roll so made up and attested shall be held to be the roll of the congregation for the purposes of these regulations, and a certified copy thereof shall be forthwith transmitted to the presbytery of the bounds. If, after the roll has been made up and attested, any communicant, on his own application, and before an election has taken place, receive a certificate of transference, the session-clerk shall give intimation of such transference to the moderator, and the name of the communicant to whom such certificate has been granted shall thereafter be removed from the roll of the congregation.

V. *Congregation to meet and Committee to be appointed.*—When the roll of the congregation has been made up, the moderator of kirk-session shall summon a meeting of the congregation for the election of a committee by edict (in the form of Schedule C hereto annexed), served from the pulpit of the vacant church, such meeting being not less than seven or more than fourteen days from the date of citation. At the meeting, summoned as aforesaid, or any adjournment thereof, the congregation shall appoint a committee to select one or more persons whose names are to be submitted to the congregation with a view to the appointment of a minister. But before proceeding to the appointment of the committee, the meeting shall determine the number of persons who shall constitute such committee.

VI. *Procedure in case of Appointment of an Assistant and Successor.*—Whenever the presbytery shall have determined that the appointment of an assistant and successor ought to be made in any parish, the procedure towards the appointment shall, subject to the qualification in section first, be the same as if a vacancy had occurred in the ministry of the parish. Provided that in the case of a charge, which is stated to be in a position requiring the appointment of an assistant and successor, the presbytery shall not proceed to the appointment of a moderator of kirk-session, or take any other step until they have come to a finding, after due citation of the parishioners and all concerned, that in consequence of the mental or bodily incapacity of the minister, or other lawful and sufficient cause, to be specified in the deliverance, it is necessary that steps be taken for the appointment of an assistant and successor. The date of such finding by the presbytery shall be held to be the date of the commencement of the vacancy.

VII. *Provision if Committee do not Report within specified time.*—If the committee shall not have reported within four months of the occurrence of the vacancy, the moderator, on the requisition of any six members of the congregation, shall call a meeting of the congregation, when special instructions may be given to the committee, or a new committee may be appointed.

VIII. *The Congregation to meet to hear Report and to proceed to Election.*—When the committee are prepared to report, the convener thereof shall communicate with the moderator of the kirk-session, who shall call a meeting of the congregation, to be held at least seven days after intimation from the pulpit, in terms of Schedule D. The report of the committee shall be read from the pulpit when the meeting is intimated. At the meeting called for the purpose, after hearing the report of the committee, a vote shall be taken—"proceed," or "delay." If it be not carried "proceed," it shall be remitted to the same committee, or to a new committee to be then appointed, with or without special instructions to report to an adjourned

meeting of the congregation. If it be carried "proceed," then, if the committee have nominated only one person, his name shall be put to the meeting, and, if approved of by a majority of electors voting, he shall be declared duly elected and appointed by the congregation, and a minute of the meeting to that effect, signed by the moderator and attested by two witnesses, shall be held to be a valid appointment. If more than one shall have been nominated by the committee, or shall have been formally proposed for nomination, and voted upon in the committee, it shall be competent for any elector present to move that any one so nominated or proposed be elected. If more than one such motion shall be made and seconded, successive votes shall be taken, striking off the nominee with the smallest number of votes until the list of nominees be reduced to two, and, on a final vote between them, the nominee for whom a majority of votes is given shall be declared duly elected and appointed, and a minute of the meeting to that effect, signed by the moderator and attested by two witnesses, shall be held to be a valid appointment. If no election is made, then the whole matter shall be remitted to the committee, or a new committee may be appointed, with or without special instructions, to report to an adjourned meeting of the congregation. At any meeting, when an election and appointment has been made, a call previously prepared, in the form of Schedule E, with the name left blank, shall be filled up with the name of the minister elected, and shall be forthwith signed. The call shall be left with the session-clerk, or other suitable person to be named by the meeting, for not less than ten days, to be signed by members of the congregation or by any inhabitants of the parish who may desire an opportunity of expressing concurrence in the call. A concurrence, in the form of Schedule F, may at same time be signed. In the event of any adjournment of the meeting, the same action and intimation required for the original meeting shall be made with reference to the adjourned meeting.

IX. *Ulterior Proceedings for the Settlement of the Minister.*—The congregational minutes, the report of the committee, and the minute of election and appointment, shall be forthwith transmitted by the moderator of kirk-session to the moderator or clerk of the presbytery, along with information as to the address of the person in whose hands the call has been left for additional signatures, and the length of time for which it has been so left. On receiving the above documents, the moderator and clerk of the presbytery shall take steps as directed in the Act of the General Assembly on the induction of ministers. If the presbytery have refused to sustain the appointment, or if, having sustained it, they have afterwards found reason for resolving not to proceed with the settlement of the minister-elect, intimation shall be made by the moderator of the kirk-session to a meeting of the congregation to be called as soon as convenient, when the congregation shall either re-appoint the same committee, or appoint a new committee to proceed as before directed.

X. *Appeals not to sist Procedure.*—No appeal or complaint from any judgment with respect to the calling and appointment of a minister in any parish shall sist procedure therein, but the proceedings shall continue up to, but not including, the fixing a day for the admission of the minister so called and appointed, in order that the whole case may be ripe for the judgment of the General Assembly.

XI. *Parties not to appear by Counsel or Agents.*—It shall not be competent for any one to be represented by counsel or agents at any of the meetings of the congregation referred to in this Act.

XII. *Provision for Insular Parishes.*—In any, but particularly in insular parishes, where, from special causes, any congregational meeting has been prevented from taking place, it shall be in the power of the moderator to summon another meeting of the congregation, to be intimated from the pulpit, to be held not less than ten days after the date of citation.

XIII. *Direction for Existing Vacancies.*—In cases where proceedings for supplying a vacancy have been commenced before the date of the enactment of these regulations, the proceedings shall, after such date, be regulated by the regulations now enacted, so far as the same may be applicable.

### THE FREE CHURCH OF SCOTLAND.

[The Thirty-seventh General Assembly of the Free Church convened at Edinburgh on 24th May 1877, when, among other proceedings, they prepared an Address to the Queen, and passed the following Act of Legislation:—Act anent the Time of Election of Commissioners by Presbyteries; also the following Acts, important for the general use of the Church:—Act anent the Sustentation Fund, declaring the Dividend payable to all Ministers on the Platform of the Equal Dividend to be £157, with an additional Dividend of £36, and one of £18, to those Ministers whose Congregations, besides having contributed £60 and upwards, have contributed at the rate of 10s. and 7s. 6d. respectively per Communicant to the Sustentation Fund during the last year; Act anent the Platform of the Equal Dividend; Act anent the Termination of the Existing Connection between Church and State; Act anent the General Presbyterian Council; Act anent Collections, appointing for those yet to fall due the fourth Sabbath of January for a Collection for the Continent, the third Sabbath of February for the College Fund, and the third Sabbath of April for the Home Mission; Act appointing the Commission of Assembly; Act appointing the Meeting of next Assembly to be at Glasgow, on the 23d May 1878.

The annual accounts of the Free Church show the whole sums raised for its various objects during the year ending 31st March 1877 to be £565,195, 10s. 3d.]

## SECT. III.—EDUCATIONAL AND LITERARY ESTABLISHMENTS.

### THE UNIVERSITIES OF SCOTLAND.

The four Scottish Universities—at St Andrews, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and Edinburgh—were in the year 1858 reorganized, and as far as possible assimilated. The Universities (Scotland) Act of that year made “provision for the better government and discipline of the Universities of Scotland, and improving and regulating the course of study therein.” Since then the four Universities have possessed a constitution and arrangement nearly uniform. Each is now governed by three internal bodies, called respectively the General Council of the University, the University Court, and the Senatus Academicus. The official Heads of each University are:—the Chancellor (who nominates a Vice-chancellor for conferring degrees in his absence), chosen for life by the General Council; the Rector, chosen every three years by the matriculated students; and the Principal (at St Andrews, Senior Principal) or resident Head of the University, who is President of the Senatus.

The General Council consists of the Chancellor, who is President of the Council; the Rector, who is President of the University Court; the Principal and Professors; the Graduates of the University; four Assessors nominated to sit in the University Court by the Chancellor, Rector, General Council, and Senatus. Failing the Chancellor, the Rector presides; whom failing, the Principal; whom failing, the senior Professor present.

The University Court is a court of appeal from the Senatus, and consists of the Rector, Principal, and Assessors. In Edinburgh, two additional members of the Council and Court are the Lord Provost of the city, and an Assessor nominated by the Town Council; and in Glasgow, one additional member is the “Dean of Faculties”—an extra representative of the Senatus.

The Senatus Academicus, which consists of the Principal and Professors, is entrusted with the control of the teaching and discipline, and, subject to review of the University Court, with the administration of the revenues and property of the University.

Two members of Parliament are returned by the four Universities. One of these represents Edinburgh and St Andrews; the other Glasgow and Aberdeen. The electors are the members of the General Councils. The Vice-Chancellor is empowered to superintend the election. The Vice-Chancellors at Edinburgh and Glasgow are the Returning Officers.

Each University has considerable endowments for its distinguished students and graduates. They are applied in the form of Prizes (Class and University); Bursaries; Scholarships, and Fellowships. Edinburgh possesses a great number of valuable Scholarships and Fellowships; Glasgow also is rich in Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries; and there is a good Bursary organization in Aberdeen. The Scholarships and Fellowships are confined to those who have passed the examinations necessary for the degree of Master of Arts.

Open to all the Scottish Universities are—

#### I. THE SIX FERGUSON SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1860 by the Trustees of the late John Ferguson, Esq. of Cairnbrock. They are each of the value of £80 per annum, and tenable for two years. Three are offered for competition every year,—one in Classics, one in Mathematics, and one in Mental Philosophy. The competitions take place in Glasgow in the month of October, and are open to those who have passed the examinations required for the degree of Master of Arts of the Universities of Scotland within the two years immediately pre-

the competition. Candidates are enrolled, not later than 1st September in each year, at the office of the Trustees, 66 George Square, Glasgow, where all necessary information may be obtained.—*Secretary, M. S. Tait.*

## II. THE SHAW FELLOWSHIP IN MENTAL PHILOSOPHY.

Founded in 1867 by contributors to a Memorial of Sir James Shaw, Bart. It is of the annual value of £170, tenable for five years, and is in the patronage of the Senatus Academicus of the University of Edinburgh. It is destined for the encouragement of the study of Logic, Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and the History of Philosophy,—studies for which the Scottish Universities have long been celebrated in Europe. It is awarded after competitive examination on these subjects, and is open to those who have passed the examinations for the degree of Master of Arts in any of the Scottish Universities not more than five years before the time of competition. The present Shaw Fellow was appointed in December 1873.

## III. THE SCOTTISH UNIVERSITIES CLASSICAL SCHOLARSHIPS,

Founded in 1875, awarded by competitive examination in Greek and Latin Literature, and open to Graduates in Arts in any of the Scottish Universities, whose course of study for the Degree of Master of Arts shall have commenced within seven years and two months of the time of competition, of the annual value of £100, and tenable for three years. The examinations in rotation at Edinburgh, Glasgow, Aberdeen, and St Andrews.

The Degrees conferred by each of the Universities are the following:—Master of Arts (M.A.); Bachelor of Medicine (M.B.), Master in Surgery (C.M.), Doctor of Medicine (M.D.); Bachelor of Laws (LL.B.), Bachelor of Law (B.L.);\* Bachelor of Divinity (B.D.); and the two honorary degrees of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) and Doctor of Divinity (D.D.):—together with some which are confined to Edinburgh, viz., Bachelor and Doctor in Natural and Physical Science; in the Department of Public Health; and in Engineering (B.Sc. and D.Sc.); Doctor in Mental Science (D.Sc.); Doctor in Philological Science (D.Sc.)

The Professorships are distributed (except at St Andrews, where Law is not taught) under the four Faculties of Arts, *i.e.*, Literature, Philosophy, and Science; Medicine; Law; Theology.

The Professorships in the Faculty of Arts are concerned with the leading branches of liberal education required for general culture, and needed as a preparatory discipline for the three professional Faculties. The province of the latter Faculties—Medicine, Law, Theology—is special, namely, to train in the professional studies.

The Faculty of Arts is the basis of University education. It embraces three departments:—viz., (1) Latin and Greek; (2) Mental Philosophy, including Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, and Rhetoric and English Literature; (3) Mathematics, with various branches of Experimental Physics and Physical Science. A degree in Arts is a pass to any of the other three Faculties. The possession of it exempts from preliminary examination on general subjects any one desirous of entering the Medical or Legal professions or the Church, and the principal departments of the Public Service.

To obtain the degree of Master of Arts entails a University course of Four Winter Sessions, or (if an entrance examination in Latin and Greek is passed) of Three Winter Sessions. Attendance on the classes of Humanity (Latin), Greek, Logic and Metaphysics, Moral Philosophy, Rhetoric and English Literature, Mathematics, and Natural Philosophy, is required of all candidates for this Degree. The examinations to be gone through for the M.A. degree are in the three Departments, viz., Classics; Mental

\* Bachelor of Laws and Bachelor of Law are not conferred at St Andrews.

Philosophy; and Mathematics (including Natural Philosophy and Experimental Physics). These three examinations may be all passed at the conclusion of the curriculum; or any one or two of them at an earlier period—provided that the classes corresponding to the subjects of examination have been previously attended. When a student has passed all the necessary examinations, he may either at once proceed to take his degree, or, with a view to attaining distinction in the Honours examinations, he may pursue his studies further for a year. The names of those who graduate with Honours are published in alphabetical order, in Classes of the First and Second rank. Honours may be taken in each of the three Departments—Classics; Mental Philosophy; Mathematics and Experimental Physics; also in Natural Science.

### THE UNIVERSITY OF ST ANDREWS,

The most ancient of the Scottish Universities, was founded in 1411 by Wardlaw, Bishop of the diocese. Two years later, on petition of James I., the Bishop, and others, the foundation, with benefactions annexed to it, was sanctioned, and privileges and immunities were secured to it, by Papal bull of Benedict XIII. From the first there existed the Faculties of Arts, Theology, and Canon Law. In 1430, a pedagogium was erected for the Faculty of Arts. The University has undergone numerous changes of constitution. In the sixteenth century it came to comprise three distinct corporate colleges:—1. *St Salvator's College*, founded in 1455; 2. *St Leonard's College*, founded in 1512; 3. *The College of St Mary*, founded in 1537.

In 1747, the colleges of St Salvator and St Leonard were united by Act of Parliament, and called the United College of St Salvator and St Leonard. The University now "consists," to quote the Calendar, "of three distinct corporations, viz.:—The United College of St Salvator and St Leonard, with its Principal and nine Professors; St Mary's College with its Principal, who is also Primarius Professor, and three Professors; and the University, comprising the members of both colleges, and of which the senior Principal (senior according to priority in office) is also president."

The session in the *United College* opens in the first week of November, and closes towards the end of April. In *St Mary's College*, it commences about ten days later, and closes in the end of March.

The *General Council* meets twice a year, on the last Thursday of March and the last Friday of November. The election of Rector takes place every third year.

The aggregate annual value of the prizes, bursaries, and fellowships at St Andrews is about £2000.

In 1877 the number of students who matriculated was 158; the number who graduated was 27—viz.: in Arts, M.A., 12; in Medicine, 11; in Divinity, B.D., 4. Members of the General Council, 1528. The number of those who voted for the M.P. returned in December 1868 was 1126. There was no contest at last election.

#### THE UNIVERSITY OF GLASGOW

Was founded by Bull of Pope Nicholas V., obtained by King James II. at the instigation of Bishop Turnbull in 1450. From the beginning it taught Canon and Civil Law, Theology, and the Arts, and was empowered to confer degrees in all Faculties. In its earlier days, its educational labours are said to have been carried on near the cathedral, in a building now in ruins, still pointed out as the "Old Pedagogy;" while the General Congregations of the University and of the Faculties met in the chapter-house of the cathedral. In 1459, James, first Lord Hamilton, granted to the Faculty of Arts, which thenceforward grew in importance, the site occupied by the buildings recently abandoned.

In 1577, King James VI. granted increased funds in a charter called the *Nova Erectio*.

By this charter provision was made for the support of a Principal, who was to teach Theology, and three Regents in Philosophy. From this small beginning the University continued to make progress till the era of the Restora-

on, at which time it had, besides the Principal, eight Professors and Regents in Theology, Medicine, and Arts. The restoration of the Episcopal Church deprived it of a considerable portion of its revenues, and in consequence several of the Professorships fell into abeyance, but after the Revolution began again to prosper. In the first twenty years of last century, five new Professorships were founded, and another in 1760. The remaining fourteen Professorships have been founded during the present century.

Among the eminent men who have adorned this University during the past and present centuries, may be mentioned the names of Hutcheson, Adam Smith and Reid, Black and Cullen, Robert Simson, John Millar, Moor and Sandford.

The University occupied the site which it has lately quitted, for upwards of four hundred years, and its late buildings for upwards of two hundred years. In 1864 these buildings and adjacent lands were sold, and extensive and handsome new buildings, designed by Sir G. Gilbert Scott of London, have been erected on an admirable site in the west end of Glasgow. The new buildings, of which the foundation-stone was laid by the Prince and Princess of Wales in October 1868, and which were formally opened for the purposes of the University on the 7th November 1870, are estimated to cost, when completed, upwards of £470,000; and in aid of their erection subscriptions have already been received, chiefly in Glasgow and the neighbourhood, to the amount of above £150,000.

The winter session commences on the first Tuesday of November, and ends on May 1st. The Medical classes open a week earlier, and close in the beginning of April. There is also a Medical summer session from the beginning of May till the end of July.

The Exhibitions, Scholarships, and Bursaries, founded in this University, amount in annual value to about £5000. The most valuable of these are the George A. Clark Scholarships, four in number, each about £200 in annual value, and the Snell Exhibitions, ten in number, and each £108 in annual value, the object of which is to assist Scottish students in prosecuting their studies in Oxford University. These exhibitions have been held by not a few who afterwards became distinguished, among whom may be mentioned Adam Smith, Sir William Hamilton, the present Archbishop of Canterbury, and the present Lord President of the Court of Session.

The University Library contains an extensive and valuable collection of books, which is always increasing by donations and by a grant of £707 per annum from the Treasury as compensation for the loss of the Stationers' Hall privilege.

The Hunterian Museum was founded by the eminent William Hunter, M.D., who, by his will dated 1783, bequeathed to the University his valuable collection of books, manuscripts, coins, paintings, anatomical preparations, zoological and mineral specimens, and archæological relics.

The number of matriculated students in the session 1876-77 was:—In the Faculty of Arts, 1113; Divinity, 66; Medicine (summer, 40), 435; Law, 159: total, 1773.

Matriculated Students, in voting for the Rector, are divided into four nations:—

*Natio Glottiana* (those born in Lanarkshire); *Natio Transforthana* (those born in the counties lying north of the Forth); *Natio Rothseiana* (those born in the counties of Renfrew, Bute, or Ayr); *Natio Loudoniana* (those not already included).

This election takes place every three years on the 15th (or 16th, if the 15th be a Sunday) of November.

The graduates in 1876-77 were as follows: D.D., 7; B.D., 7; LL.D., 5; B.L., 6; M.D., 21; M.B., 47; C.M., 42; M.A., 46; B. Sc., 2.

The *General Council* meets twice a year, on the Wednesday immediately preceding the opening, and on the Wednesday immediately preceding the closing, of the winter session.

Members of the General Council on the Register for 1877, 2939; the number who voted for the M.P. at the election in November 1876 was 2264.

## THE UNIVERSITY OF ABERDEEN

**Vas**, until 1860, two Universities and Colleges. The one, the *University and King's College of Aberdeen*, was founded in 1494 by Elphinstone, Bishop of the diocese, and sanctioned by a Papal bull obtained by James IV.; the other, *Marischal College and University of Aberdeen*, was founded in 1593, under a charter ratified by Parliament, by George Keith, Earl Marischal.

The Universities (Scotland) Act, 1858, includes (as mentioned in the preamble) "The union of the two Universities and Colleges of Aberdeen;" which union the Commissioners appointed by Parliament dated from Sept. 15, 1860. Among the other Scottish Universities, that of Aberdeen now ranks from the foundation of 1494. It consists now of but one University, having its classes for Arts and Divinity in what was King's College, and its classes of Law and Medicine in what was Marischal College. Both Colleges had classes in all four Faculties.

In the election of Lord Rector, the matriculated students are divided, according to their birthplace, into four "nations"—Mar, Buchan, Moray, and Angus; and each nation chooses a procurator to vote for the Rector; and, in case of a tie, the Chancellor (failing him, the Principal) has a casting vote.

In *Arts*, the session commences on the second last Monday of October, and closes on the first Friday of April. In *Divinity*, the session commences on the first Monday after the October Synod, and closes after lasting four months. In *Law*, the session extends from the first Monday of November to the end of March. In *Medicine*, the winter session commences in the last week of October, and extends over six months; and the summer session commences on the first Monday of May, and extends over three months. The *General Council* meets twice a year—on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of April, and on the Wednesday after the second Tuesday of October. The number of Matriculated Students in the winter session of 1876-77 was 630; in the summer session of 1877, 47. The Graduates in 1877 were as follows:—M.A., 43; M.D., 31; M.B., 41; C.M., 41; D.D., 2; B.D., 5; LL.D., 2.

The registered members of the General Council for the year 1877 numbered 2449. The number who voted at the election in November 1876 was 1916.

## THE UNIVERSITY OF EDINBURGH.

This, though the youngest of the Scottish Universities, annually enrolls the largest number of students. Although founded by James VI. in 1582, and entitled *Academia Jacobi VI.*, or "King James's College," it originated in a bequest made in 1558 by Reid, Bishop of Orkney, to the Town-council of Edinburgh, for the erection of a College. The money was at first retained by the Abbot of Kinloss. After a delay of five years, the Council, on the faith of ultimately obtaining the bequest, purchased part of the present site of the University. Queen Mary lent her assistance, granting a charter of presentation to some confiscated church property, but building was not commenced until 1581. In the following year, King James incorporated the University by Royal Charter, increasing the grants of Queen Mary.

The title of Edinburgh University to the various rights, privileges, and immunities possessed by the other Universities of the kingdom rests on an Act of the Scottish Parliament passed in 1621, and on subsequent ratifications made in the Treaty of Union and in the Act of Security.

The work of teaching began in 1583, under Robert Rollock, who was at first called Regent. Other Regents or Professors were appointed in the following year, and Rollock became Principal.

The University of Edinburgh has long been famous, especially in Medicine and in Metaphysics. Its Medical fame, which rose under Dr Alexander Monro in 1720, is second to no university in Europe; and as a School of Mental Philosophy it can boast, as students and professors, of the names of David Hume, Ferguson, Stewart, Brown, Mackintosh, and Hamilton, with Dalziel, Playfair, Leslie, and Forbes, in other departments of the Faculty of Arts.

Until 1858, the Town-Council had a large share of the patronage of the University. The appointments to such chairs as the Town-Council were patrons of are now in the hands of seven Curators—four elected by the Town-Council and three by the University.

The University Library contains 160,000 volumes and many valuable MSS. The new Museum of Science and Art is connected with the University.

The aggregate annual value of the Fellowships and Scholarships (all founded since 1858) is about £3800. Eight of these are given for eminence in Classics; seven in Mental Philosophy; twelve in Mathematics and the Experimental Sciences; and two in Divinity. There are also above a hundred Bursaries in connexion with the Faculty of Arts, of the aggregate annual value of considerably more than £2000, with an annual Bursary Competition in the University at the beginning of each winter session; also twenty-four in the Faculty of Divinity, worth annually about £400. There are several newly founded Bursaries in Law and Medicine.

University Certificates in Arts for women are given after examination to candidates who have studied in the classes of the Edinburgh Ladies' Educational Association.

Local examinations of schools, corresponding to those of Oxford and Cambridge, are held by the University annually, in June.

The University, by an arrangement with the War Office, holds special examinations which qualify for admission to the Army.

The present University building is a large, modern, quadrangular edifice, covering the site of the "Kirk o' Field," the scene of the murder of Darnley. The architect was Mr Adam, who also designed the Register House. The foundation-stone was laid in 1789, on the site of the old buildings; but, from want of funds, it remained only half completed till after 1815. It is still unfinished. The magnificent dome, designed to rise above the grand entrance, has never been erected. The interior of the quadrangle is handsome, in the Grecian style. The accommodation, however, is very inadequate to the rapid growth of the University, under the Universities Act (1858), and measures are in progress for a large extension in new buildings.

There are two sessions—the winter session, opening in the beginning of November, and closing in the end of April; the summer session, opening in

the beginning of May, and closing in the end of July. In the winter session the classes in all the four Faculties are assembled; in summer, only those of Law and Medicine, with tutorial classes in Arts.

The number of matriculated students for 1876-77 was 2351, viz., in the Faculty of Arts, 894; in the Faculty of Divinity, 70; in the Faculty of Law, 317, in the Faculty of Medicine, 1070. The attendance during the current Session, 1877-78, is already about 300 higher than last year, and higher than it has been in the whole past history of the University.

The Public Ceremonial of Graduation in Arts, Divinity, Law, and Science is in April; in Medicine in August. The number of Degrees conferred in 1877, after examination, numbered 354,—viz., in Arts (M.A.), 76; Science, 24; Divinity (B.D.), 6; Law, 4 (LL.B. 2, B.L. 2); Medicine and Surgery, 244,—viz., 34 M.D., 109 M.B., and 101 C.M.

The Degrees of Doctor of Divinity and of Doctor of Laws are conferred *tantum honoris causa*.

The *General Council* meets twice a year, on the first Tuesday after the 14th of April, and on the last Friday of October. The membership of the Council is about 4000; the number of those who voted at the election of the M.P. in December 1868 was 3263. The last election was not contested.

Full particulars regarding matriculation, the curriculum of study in each of the Faculties, and degrees, are contained in the "Edinburgh University Calendar," published annually in May.

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**THE BRITISH FISHERIES SOCIETY.**

RE-INCORPORATED BY "THE PULTENEY HARBOUR ACT, 1857."

[This Society was originally incorporated in 1786 by Act of Parliament, by the name and style of "The British Society for Extending the Fisheries and Improving the Sea Coasts of this Kingdom," to enable the members, when incorporated, to subscribe a joint-stock, and therewith to purchase lands, and build thereon free towns, villages, and fishing stations in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, and for other purposes. The Society accordingly acquired extensive property at Pulteneytown, on the Bay of Wick, and founded a settlement, at which they erected a harbour about the year 1806, for the accommodation of vessels used in the coasting trade, particularly in connexion with theerring fishing; and a new outer harbour, with alterations on the old one, was completed in 1834. In the session of Parliament 1857 an Act was obtained incorporating the Society of new, and in 1862 another Act was obtained to authorize the Society to construct piers or breakwaters, and other works in connexion with Pulteney Harbour.]

# PART FIFTH.

## City and County of Edinburgh.

### SECTION I.—MUNICIPAL ESTABLISHMENTS.

#### PARLIAMENTARY BOUNDARIES OF THE CITY,

AS DEFINED IN ACT 2D AND 3D WILLIAM IV. CAP. 65.

[The Municipal Boundaries are the same as the Parliamentary.]

From a point on the road from Leith to Queensferry, which is distant 400 yds. (measured along such road) to the west to the point at which the same meets the Leith road at the house called Golden Acre, in a straight line to the north-western corner of the enclosure of John Watson's Institution; thence in a straight line to the second stone bridge, marked No. 2, on the Union Canal; thence in a straight line to the point at which the western wall of the enclosure of the Lunatic Asylum at Morningside meets the Jordan or Pow Burn; thence down the said burn to a point which is

distant 150 yards (measured along such burn) below the arch over the same on the Carlisle road; thence in a straight line to the summit of Arthur Seat; thence in a straight line to the point at which the feeder enters the western side of Lochend Loch; thence in a straight line to the point at which Pilrig Street joins Leith Walk; thence along Pilrig Street and the Bonnington Road to the point at which the same meets the road from Leith to Queensferry; thence along the road from Leith to Queensferry to the point first described.

#### PARLIAMENTARY POLLING DISTRICTS AND MUNICIPAL WARDS OF THE CITY,

AS DEFINED BY THE COMMISSIONERS APPOINTED UNDER "THE MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS AMENDMENT (SCOTLAND) ACT, 1868."

##### I. CALTON WARD.

From the point where the London Road is intersected by the parliamentary boundary, westward along the centre of said road, Regent Road, and Waterloo Place; thence north-eastward along the centre of Leith Street and Leith Walk to the point where Leith Walk is intersected by the parliamentary boundary at Pilrig Street; and thence eastward and southward along said boundary to the point first mentioned.

##### II. BROUGHTON WARD.

From the head of Leith Walk, along the centre of said Walk, to the point where it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary at Pilrig Street; thence along said boundary northward and westward to a point opposite the centre of the high road from Golden Acre to Canonmills Bridge; and thence southward and westward along the centre of said high road by Canonmills Bridge, Brandon Street, and North Pitt Street, to Fettes Row; thence eastward and southward along the centre of Fettes Row, Royal Crescent, Scotland Street, the street in front of the northern quadrant of Drummond

Place, London Street, and Broughton Street, to the point first mentioned.

##### III. ST BERNARD'S WARD.

From a point on the parliamentary boundary at Golden Acre opposite the centre of the high road to Canonmills Bridge, westward along the road leading from Leith to Queensferry, in the line of the said boundary; thence south-westward along said boundary to the centre of the road leading from Edinburgh to Queensferry by the Dean Bridge; thence eastward and southward along the centre of the said road to the Dean Bridge, at a point immediately above the centre of the Water of Leith; thence north-eastward along the centre of said Water of Leith to the bridge over the Water of Leith at Stockbridge; thence south-eastward along the centre of the road in front of Glanville Place and Kerr Street, North-West Circus Place, and South-East Circus Place, to the foot of Howe Street; thence northward and eastward along the centre of St Vincent Street and Fettes Row to North Pitt Street; thence northward along the centre of North Pitt Street, Brandon Street, and the high road by Canonmills Bridge, to the point first mentioned.

ard along St Mary Street and the Pleasance to Salisbury Street; thence eastward along the centre of Salisbury Street to Dumbiedykes Road; thence northward along the centre of said road to a point at the entrance to the Queen's Park at the foot of Arthur Street; thence south-eastward along the boundary wall of the said park to the point at which it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary; and thence northward along said boundary to the point first mentioned.

From a point in the centre of Waterloo Place at the Regent Arch, at a point immediately above Low Calton, westward along the centre of Waterloo Place and Princes Street to the Lothian Road; thence southward along the centre of said road to the road leading to King's Stables; thence south-eastward and southward along the centre of last-mentioned road to the West Port; thence eastward by the southern wall of the Old Corn Market, and the centre of the Grassmarket, to the Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence eastward along the centre of the road last mentioned, Lothian Street, South College Street, and Drummond Street, to Pleasance; thence northward along the centre of the Pleasance and St Mary Street to Canongate; thence eastward along the centre of Canongate to New Street; thence northward along the centre of New Street to North Back of Canongate; thence westward and northward along the North Back of Canongate and Low Calton to the point first mentioned.

#### X. ST CUTHBERT'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of the Lothian Road opposite the road leading to King's Stables, southward along the centre of the Lothian Road to Port Hopetoun; thence westward along the centre of St Anthony Place, Tobago Street, Morrison Street, and the road leading to Coltbridge to the point where it is intersected by the parliamentary boundary; thence southward along said boundary to the point on the Union Canal where it is intersected by said boundary; thence north-eastward along the canal to the bridge at Fountainbridge Street; thence eastward along the centre of said street and West Port to the east end of the West Port; thence north-westward along the centre

of the street and road leading by King's Stables to the Lothian Road to the point first mentioned.

#### XI. GEORGE SQUARE WARD.

From a point in the centre of the high road at Tolleross opposite Earl Grey Street, north-westward along the centre of Earl Grey Street to Fountainbridge; thence north-eastward along the centre of Fountainbridge, West Port, and the Grassmarket, to Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence eastward along the centre of said road, Lothian Street, and South College Street, to Nicolson Street; thence southward along the centre of Nicolson Street, St Patrick Street, and Clerk Street, to a point in the centre of the last-mentioned street opposite the footpath on the north side of Hope Park Chapel [Newington Church]; thence westward along the centre of said footpath to a point opposite the same in the centre of the high road to Causewayside; thence southward along the centre of said road to a point opposite the entrance to the southern Meadow Walk; thence westward along the centre of said Walk, and by the northern boundary of Bruntsfield Links to the centre of the Wright's Houses Road; and thence northward along the centre of Leven Street and Home Street to the point first mentioned.

#### XII. ST LEONARD'S WARD.

From a point in the centre of Nicolson Street opposite Drummond Street, eastward along the centre of Drummond Street to the Pleasance; thence southward along the centre of the Pleasance to Salisbury Street; thence eastward along the centre of Salisbury Street to Dumbiedykes Road; thence northward along the centre of said road to a point opposite the entrance to the Queen's Park at the foot of Arthur Street; thence eastward to the boundary wall of the park at said entrance; thence south-eastward along said wall to Gibbet Loan; thence south-westward along the centre of said Loan to the Dalkeith Road; thence northward along the centre of last-mentioned road and St Leonard's Street to Rankeilior Street; thence westward along the centre of said street to Clerk Street; and thence northward along the centre of Clerk Street, St Patrick Street, and Nicolson Street, to the point first mentioned.



to the Lothian Road; thence southward along the centre of said road to the road to King's Stables; thence south-eastward and southward along the centre of last-mentioned road to the West Port; thence eastward by the southern wall of the Old Corn Market, and the centre of the Grassmarket, to the Cowgatehead; thence southward along the centre of Candlemaker Row and Forrest Road to the road in front of Teviot Row; thence westward and southward along the centre of the high road by Lauriston, Portland Place, Tollcross, Home Street, and Leven Street, to the northern boundary of Bruntsfield Links at the Barclay Church; thence eastward by said boundary, and the centre of the south-

ern Meadow Walk, to a point in the centre of the high road opposite Summerhall Brewery; thence northward along the centre of the high road leading to Buccleuch Street, to the footpath on the north of Newington Church; thence eastward along the centre of said path to a point opposite the same in the centre of Clerk Street; thence northward along the centre of said street, St Patrick Square, Nicolson Street, and South and North Bridges, to the point first mentioned.

#### V. NEWINGTON DISTRICT

Comprehends the following Parliamentary and Municipal Wards of the city, viz.:—The 12th, or St Leonard's Ward; the 13th, or Newington Ward.

## PAROCHIAL DIVISIONS OF THE CITY.

### ANCIENT ROYALTY.

#### I. TOLBOOTH PARISH.

Castle-hill, both sides, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the Lawnmarket, down to and including the west side of Bank Street and the Bank of Scotland. Both sides of the new west approach as far west as the Castle Wynd.

#### II. HIGH CHURCH PARISH.

The east side of Bank Street, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of the North Bridge.

#### III. TRINITY COLLEGE PARISH.

The east side of the North Bridge, and all buildings and closes on the north side of the High Street down to and including the west side of Leith Wynd, now Cranston Street.

#### IV. OLD CHURCH PARISH.

All buildings and closes on the south side of the High Street and Head of Canongate from South Gray's or Mint Close down to St John's Cross; thence along the boundary of the ancient royalty to the South Back of Canonate; thence westward by the foot of St Mary Street and the middle of the Cowgate to the foot of South Gray's or Mint Close. The east side of said close.

#### V. TRON CHURCH PARISH.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street from the head of South Gray's or Mint Close to the west side of the Tron Church. The east side of Blair Street and the north side of the Cowgate from the foot of said street downwards to the foot of and including the west side of said close.

#### VI. NEW NORTH PARISH.

All closes and buildings on the south side of the High Street and north side

of the Cowgate, from and including the west side of Blair Street and Hunter Square, to and including the east side of George IV. Bridge.

#### VII. ST JOHN'S PARISH.

From the Castle Wynd, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket and the Cowgate, to the centre of George IV. Bridge; thence northward to the Lawnmarket; westward, along the middle of the Lawnmarket and the back of the new west approach, to the Castle Wynd; and southward, along the centre of said wynd.

#### VIII. WESTER OR NEW GREYFRIARS' PARISH.

That portion of the ancient royalty on the north side of the Grassmarket, and westward from the centre of the Castle Wynd. From the extremity of the city at the foot of the Vennel, eastward along the middle of the Grassmarket, to the centre of the Candlemaker Row; thence southward along the said row and Bristo Place to the eastern point of Teviot Place; and from thence westward along the ancient boundary of the city, viz., Teviot Place and back of George Heriot's Hospital; then northward to the foot of the Vennel.

#### IX. EASTER OR OLD GREYFRIARS' PARISH.

From Bristo Port, eastward along the City Wall to the street on the west side of the College, down the centre of said street, and along North College Street to the head of the College Wynd, down the centre of said wynd, thence westward along the middle of the Cowgate to the centre of the Candlemaker Row, thence southward along the said row to Bristo Port.

in the following limits; viz. from Bank Street along the High Street to the head of Leith Wynd, down Leith Wynd, round by the back of the College Kirk-yard, and including the houses of Shakspeare Square [the site of which is now occupied by the New Post-Office] and both sides of Waterloo Place; and then along the boundary line of the Royalty that intersects the Register House, West Register Street, the Royal Bank, and Elder Street, to the foot of the Catholic Chapel Lane, at Broughton Street; thence along York Place, North and South St David Streets, Princes Street, west side of the Earthen Mound, Mound Place, and Bank Street.

III.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the east end of York Place at the intersection of Broughton Street, along York Place and Queen Street to Hanover Street, down Dundas Street and Pitt Street, along East Fettes Row, Royal Crescent, Kirk Lane at Canonmills, the high road from Canonmills to Broughton, Broughton Street, to the place where it is intersected by the line of the Royalty; thence along the line of the Royalty intersecting Forth Street and Hart Street, East Broughton Place, along Union Street, across Leith Walk, down Elm Row, along the northern boundary of the Royalty intersecting Windsor Street, and from the eastern extremity of that boundary round the Calton Hill, including the west end of Regent Terrace, Blenheim Place, Leopold

Place, Hillside Crescent, and part of Windsor Street; and thence along Greenside and Broughton Streets to the east end of York Place.

IV.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the intersection of Fettes Row and Pitt Street, along Pitt Street, Dundas Street, Queen Street, North St David Street, west side of St Andrew Square, South St David Street, Princes Street, Frederick Street, Howe Street, St Vincent Street, West Fettes Row, and their irregular boundary line of the Royalty running from Fettes Row to St Vincent Street; also the ground formerly called the Distillery Park, upon which Henderson Row, the Edinburgh Academy, and the Deaf and Dumb Institution, are now built.

V.—Those parts of the Extended Royalty comprehended within the following limits; viz. from a point at the intersection of South Frederick Street and Princes Street, along Frederick Street, Howe Street, to near the foot of St Vincent Street; thence along the line of the Royalty intersecting Circus Lane, India Street, India Place, Mackenzie Place, Moray Place, St Colme Street, Glenfinlas Street, and Charlotte Place, to Queensferry Street; and then along that street and Princes Street to the point first mentioned. This Ward includes also the Princes Street Gardens, St John's Chapel, and Cunningham's Feu at Coates, upon which Walker Street, Manor Place, and parts of Coates Crescent, William Street, and Melville Street, are built.

#### ARRANGEMENT OF WARDS for the Election of MANAGERS of the POOR for the Combined Parishes of St Cuthbert's and Canongate.

WARD I. comprehends the portion of St Cuthbert's parish within the Broughton Municipal Ward, including the detached portions of St Cuthbert's parish at Old Broughton, West Register Street, East Register Street, Leith Street, Catherine Street, Little King Street, St James' Square, and St James' Street, York Place and Albany Street, in St Andrew's and Calton Wards; together with those portions of St Cuthbert's parish lying within the burgh of Leith.

WARD II. comprehends the whole of that part of St Cuthbert's parish within St George's Municipal Ward; along with the portion of said parish within St Bernard's Municipal Ward; and the portion of said parish within St Stephen's Ward.

WARD III. comprehends Newington

Ward to the west of a line beginning at the municipal boundary of George Square Ward at the east end of Bruntsfield Links, running southward along the east boundary of Warrender Park, along the middle of Kilgraston Road to Grange Loan, then eastward to the avenue to Blackford House, thence southward in a straight line to Jordan Burn, and also including the whole of the part of St Cuthbert's parish within St Cuthbert's Municipal Ward; and a detached portion of the Canongate parish on Castlehill within St Giles' Municipal Ward.

WARD IV. comprehends the whole of the landward part of St Cuthbert's from the Powburn, at the foot of the Causewayside, lying to the south and west of the municipal boundaries of Edinburgh and Leith, to a part where

Notes.—(a) The Liferent Annuities are stated at the amounts as restricted by the Act, being three-fourths of their original amounts, and the sum set down as principal is the assumed value as at 1838.

(b) £385,035, 16s. 8d. is the amount of Debt in respect of which Bonds of Annuity (of 3 per cent.) have been issued. The Debts ranked on the City's Estate amounted to £391,911, 9s. 2d., of which £6875, 12s. 6d. was paid by composition, or provided for otherwise than by Bonds of Annuity. The Debts ranked were exclusive of £13,119 due to the College, and secured on the Ale-duty, and of £228,374, 9s. 8d. due to the Treasury, and secured on the Leith Harbour and Docks Estate, with regard to both of which the Act made special provision.

(c) Under the Act 33 and 34 Vict. cap. 87, the Annuity of £4200 was redeemed, as at Martinmas 1870, by payment to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners of £56,500, and this sum was advanced to the Corporation by the Public Works Loan Commissioners, to be repaid by half-yearly instalments within ten years, with interest at 3½ per cent. per annum. The three temporary annuities, of £600 each, lapsed in the year 1866.

## EDINBURGH ACADEMY, HENDERSON ROW.

The Edinburgh Academy, which was established in 1824, and incorporated by royal charter from George IV., is under the superintendence of a Board of fifteen Directors, three of whom are elected annually from the body of subscribers. The education is conducted by a Rector, who exercises constant supervision over all the classes, besides instructing those under his immediate care; four Classical Masters; a Master of French; a Master of German; two Mathematical Masters; a Master of English and Elocution; and Masters of Writing, Fencing, Drawing, Fortification, and Military and Civil Engineering. Each class is taught in the classical department by the same master exclusively for the first four years. At the commencement of the fifth it comes under the tuition of the Rector, assisted by the same master, and continues under them during the sixth and seventh years. In the three junior classes all the boys in each class are instructed together in the various branches. But for the fourth and subsequent years of the course, each class is separated into two Divisions: one of these—"The Classical School"—is adapted for boys destined for the learned professions, or who desire a thorough classical training; the other—"The Modern School"—is intended for boys who are to enter upon the civil or military service, or upon mercantile pursuits. The other branches (with the exception of German, which is introduced in the fifth year) are begun with the youngest class, and are continued without interruption during the whole course. The complete course extends to seven years, and combines a thorough classical education with systematic instruction in English, French, and German, Writing, Ancient and Modern History, Geography, and the various branches of Mathematics. There are certain additional classes which are recognised as voluntary. The Academy is situated to the N.E. of the Royal Circus. It is a handsome building, after a design by Mr Burn, and cost upwards of £16,000.

## FETTES COLLEGE, COMELY BANK.

Sir William Fettes, Bart., of Comely Bank, who was born in 1750, and died in 1836, left the residue of his estate for an endowment for the education, maintenance, and outfit of young persons whose parents have died without leaving sufficient funds for that purpose, or who, from innocent misfortune during their own lives, are unable to give suitable education to their children. For the purposes of the endowment, a building called "The Fettes College" has been erected on the grounds of Comely Bank, part of the trust property, according to plans by the late David Bryce, Esq., R.S.A., architect, and was opened in October 1870. The number of boys to be admitted on the foundation, and maintained and educated in the College at the expense of the endowment, is not at any one time to exceed fifty; but such a number of boys as the Trustees may from time to time determine will be received as day scholars, or boarders, from whom such fees will be exacted as shall be fixed by the Trustees. For the accommodation of non-foundations, and in connexion with the College, there are three Boarding-Houses, one capable of receiving fifty-two boys, and the other two each capable of receiving thirty boys. The largest is under the

THE HERIOT FOUNDATION SCHOOLS.—*Inspector*, F. W. Bedford, LL.D., D.C.L.

By Act of Parliament (6th and 7th William IV. cap. 25), the Governors of the Hospital were empowered to erect, from the surplus revenues, elementary schools within the city, for educating, free of all expense, 1st, The children, in poor circumstances, of deceased burgesses and freemen; 2d, The children of burgesses and freemen who are unable to provide for their support; and, 3d, The children of poor citizens and inhabitants of Edinburgh residing within the boundaries of the city. They were also empowered "to allow to any of the boys, in the course of their education at such schools, being sons of burgesses and freemen, such uniform fixed sum of money in lieu and place of maintenance, and such uniform fixed sum for apprentice fee, after their education at the said schools is completed, as shall be determined." There are now nineteen Heriot Schools, namely, twelve juvenile and seven infant schools, attended by upwards of 5100 boys and girls. There are also nine schools open for gratuitous evening instruction in Reading, Writing, Book-keeping, Arithmetic, Grammar, French, Drawing, and Shorthand. These classes are attended by upwards of 1000 young men and young women.

died in April 1723, and by his will bequeathed £12,000 to endow an hospital for the maintenance and instruction of the male children and grandchildren of decayed merchants in Edinburgh; and by the statutes of his trustees a preference was given to the sons and grandsons of members of the Edinburgh Merchant Company. An hospital for the board and education of the foundationers was founded in the year 1738, and opened in June 1741, and it continued to be used for this purpose until 1870, when the governors of the four hospitals connected with the Merchant Company, taking advantage of the powers given by the Endowed Institutions (Scotland) Act, applied for and obtained provisional orders empowering them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and they were opened as such in September 1870. This building was, however, sold to the corporation of the Royal Infirmary in 1871, and the building formerly called the Merchant Maiden Hospital was acquired for and is now being occupied as George Watson's College for Boys. Another house adjoining has since been purchased for the extension of the Schools. The design of the schools is to provide boys with a liberal education, qualifying them for commercial or professional life, the civil service, and for the universities, etc. The course of study includes English, Latin, Greek, French, German, writing, arithmetic, book-keeping, algebra, mathematics, drawing, vocal music, botany, natural history, natural philosophy, chemistry, drill, gymnastics, and fencing. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to sixty, and that at least one-fourth of these shall be elected by competitive examination from boys attending this and the other Merchant Company Schools. Boys attending the College may obtain, by competition, the following benefits—viz., 1. A presentation to one of the foundations of this or Daniel Stewart's Institution, tenable for six years; 2. And a bursary on leaving the schools of £25 a year, and tenable for four years, equal to £100. Besides the above benefits, a large number of school bursaries is awarded at the end of each session, equal in value to the cost of the successful competitor's class-fees for the following year.

The foundationers are maintained in a boarding-house belonging to the governors, with the exception of those who have been boarded in families in Edinburgh. When admitted as foundationers, they must be of the age of nine and under that of fourteen years. On leaving, each foundationer by favour is allowed £7 for clothes; he may receive for five years £10 annually; and on attaining the age of twenty-five, a further sum of £50 to enable him to commence business in Edinburgh.

(2.) COLLEGE FOR LADIES.—GEORGE SQUARE.

The governors have also, in virtue of power given them in the provisional order, established a school for girls called George Watson's College for Ladies. The school buildings were in 1876 largely added to and improved by the Governors, so as to make them more commodious, and in every respect suitable as a Young Ladies' Institution. The course of study is the same as that of the Edinburgh Educational Institution Ladies' College (see before), and girls attending the school may obtain by competition the same benefits as those attending that institution.

3. DANIEL STEWART'S INSTITUTION (FOR BOYS), DEAN.

Daniel Stewart of the Exchequer, who died in 1814, left the residue of his property, amounting (after the erection and endowment of a free school in his native parish of Logierait) to upwards of £13,000, to accumulate for the

purpose of building and endowing an hospital for the maintenance and education of boys, the children of honest and industrious parents, whose circumstances in life do not enable them suitably to support and educate their children at other schools. Taking advantage of the powers given by a provisional order obtained in 1870, the hospital was opened as a day-school in September of that year. This institution provides boys with a superior education, and the course of study is similar to that in George Watson's College for Boys. Instruction is also given in Technical Education. The provisional order directs that the number of foundationers shall be reduced to forty, and that at least one half of them shall be elected from the day scholars of this institution, George Watson's College, and James Gillespie's Schools. Boys attending the institution have the same benefits open for their competition as those attending George Watson's College for Boys.

The boys, on admission to the foundation, must be of the age of nine and under that of fifteen years.

#### 4. JAMES GILLESPIE'S SCHOOLS (FOR BOYS AND GIRLS), BRUNTSFIELD LINKS.

This institution was founded by James Gillespie of Spylaw, merchant and tobacconist in Edinburgh, who, by his will dated in the year 1796, destined the greater part of his property to the endowment of a charitable school, and of an hospital for the aliment and maintenance of old men and women. The edifice, which was designed by Mr Burn, was founded in 1801, and opened in 1802. The free school was founded in 1801, and opened in 1803. Up to 1870 the hospital continued to be occupied by old persons, of whom about 40 were maintained in it. In that year the governors obtained a provisional order empowering them to convert the hospital into day-schools, and it was opened as such in September 1870. These schools are established as primary schools, and the course of instruction includes English in all the branches, writing, arithmetic, vocal music, and drill. The boys are also taught mechanical drawing, and the girls sewing and knitting. Boys and girls attending these schools may obtain by competition the same benefits as pupils of the other Merchant Company Schools.

Those entitled to the benefits of the hospital as aged foundationers are persons, first, of the name of Gillespie, whatever part of Scotland they may come from; and, second, persons belonging to Edinburgh and its suburbs above the age of 55; failing these, persons from Leith, Newhaven, and other parts of Mid-Lothian; whom failing, persons from any part of Scotland of the age of 55. By the provisional order, the governors have power, instead of maintaining the foundationers in the then present or any other building, to allow them a pension of not less than £10 and not exceeding £25 a year.

**THE MAIDEN HOSPITAL, MEADOWS,**

FOUNDED BY THE CRAFTSMEN OF EDINBURGH AND MARY ERSKINE.

This Institution was founded in 1704, by the Freemen of the Incorporated Trades, aided by Mary Erskine, widow of Jas. Hair, druggist. The Governors were incorporated by statute in 1707.

The management is in the Deacons of the thirteen Incorporations, two Trades-Councillors, two persons of the name of Erskine, the Preses of the Society of Barbers, and nine persons elected by the other Governors,—in all, twenty-seven. Forty-eight girls are maintained in the Institution. Those eligible for admission are, “the children or grandchildren of craftsmen, which failing, any others presented by the incorporations,”—the girls being children belonging to one of the Incorporations of the city of Edinburgh or Society of Barbers. They are required, when admitted, to be of the age of seven, and under that of eleven years: they are not retained above the age of seventeen. They are instructed in the English language and grammar, in French and music, in writing, arithmetic, geography, history, sewing, and laundrywork. On leaving, each girl receives £10 and a Bible.

**THE ORPHAN HOSPITAL, DEAN.**

This Institution was projected in 1727 by Andrew Gairdner, merchant in Edinburgh; and in 1733 a house was hired, and thirty children received into it. In 1735 an edifice was erected near the Trinity College Church; but by the increase of the city this situation being rendered unhealthy, the present building was erected in 1833, from the designs of the late Mr Thomas Hamilton. The revenue is derived from voluntary contributions and legacies, in addition to the interest on accumulated donations since its foundation.

About 120 boys and girls, including presentees and boarders, are maintained in the Institution, the benefits of which are not confined to any district of Scotland. When admitted they must be of the age of seven, and not above ten years: they are taught reading, writing, arithmetic, and geography. Boarders from any part of Scotland are now received into the Hospital at £16 per annum for boys, and £14 for girls, which include all expenses of whatever kind.

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**DONALDSON'S HOSPITAL, COLTBRIDGE.**

This Hospital was founded by James Donaldson of Broughton Hall, printer, who died at Edinburgh in October 1830, bequeathing the greater part of his property, amounting to about £200,000, to trustees, for the endowment and erection of an hospital for the maintenance of poor boys and girls, after the plan of the Orphan Hospital in Edinburgh and John Watson's Institution.

The building can accommodate 150 boys and 150 girls: it contains at present 225 children (128 boys and 97 girls), of whom 119 (74 boys and 45 girls) are deaf and dumb. Those eligible for admission are declared to be, "1st, Poor children of the name of Donaldson or Marshall, if appearing to the Governors to be deserving; 2d, Such poor children as shall appear to be in the most destitute circumstances and the most deserving of admission." None are received whose parents are able to maintain them. The children are clothed and maintained in the Hospital, and taught such useful branches of a plain English education as will fit the boys for trades and the girls for domestic service. The age of admission is from seven till nine, and that of leaving the Hospital fourteen years.

The building, which occupies a commanding position at the west end of the city, is a large and beautiful quadrangular structure, in the Elizabethan style, from a design by the late W. H. Playfair.

#### CAB FARES.

*By Distance.*—A party not exceeding two grown-up persons, and without any luggage other than a carpet-bag or the like, entering a carriage at a stance, or when driving along disengaged, to be driven half a mile for 6d., and if they return, another 6d. The driver shall draw up to either side of the pavement when called, and if detained more than five minutes before starting, he shall be entitled to 6d. for waiting. *N.B.*—This rule shall not apply to fares from railway stations.

The charges in the table of fares, which every driver must exhibit when required, to include going from the stance or stable to the hirer's residence and waiting ten minutes. But if the carriage be detained before

starting more than ten minutes, a charge of waiting at the rate of 6d. for each quarter of an hour, or part thereof, after the expiry of the ten minutes, shall be allowed; and if the place where the hirer is to be lifted be beyond a mile from the stance or stable whence the carriage is taken, there shall be a charge of 6d. extra.

When the fare to any place cannot be ascertained, it shall be 1s. for a distance from the stance not exceeding a mile and a quarter, and 6d. for every additional half mile, or part thereof. Half fare returning.

When parties return, and the fare going is 1s., the carriage shall wait ten minutes without any charge; when 1s. 6d., fifteen minutes; when 2s. and upwards, twenty minutes. If detained

and is all invested in Securities within the United Kingdom, yielding, for many years past, an average interest of  $4\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. per annum.

**II.—By the Sufficiency of the Premiums charged.**

If the Rate of Interest for the future, and other elements entering into calculation, could be definitely ascertained beforehand, there would be no harm in fixing the Premiums on a scale which would exactly meet the claims; but that being impossible, the only prudent course is to take a moderate and cautious estimate of what will be realized, charge the Premiums in accordance with it, and return to the Policyholders such overplus as may actually arise. This College was opened for the eighth Session on 1st October 1877. The entrances are from Archibald Place and the Meadows.

The Course of Study includes the English, Latin, Greek, French, and German Languages; Writing, Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Algebra, Mathematics, Drawing, Vocal Music, Botany, Natural History, Natural Philosophy, Chemistry, Drill, Gymnastics, and Fencing.

There are three Departments in the Schools—an Elementary, a Junior, and a Senior—each of which is divided into Classes. There is a Classical and a Modern or Commercial Side.

The Institution provides Young Ladies with an Education of the Highest Class.

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
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
