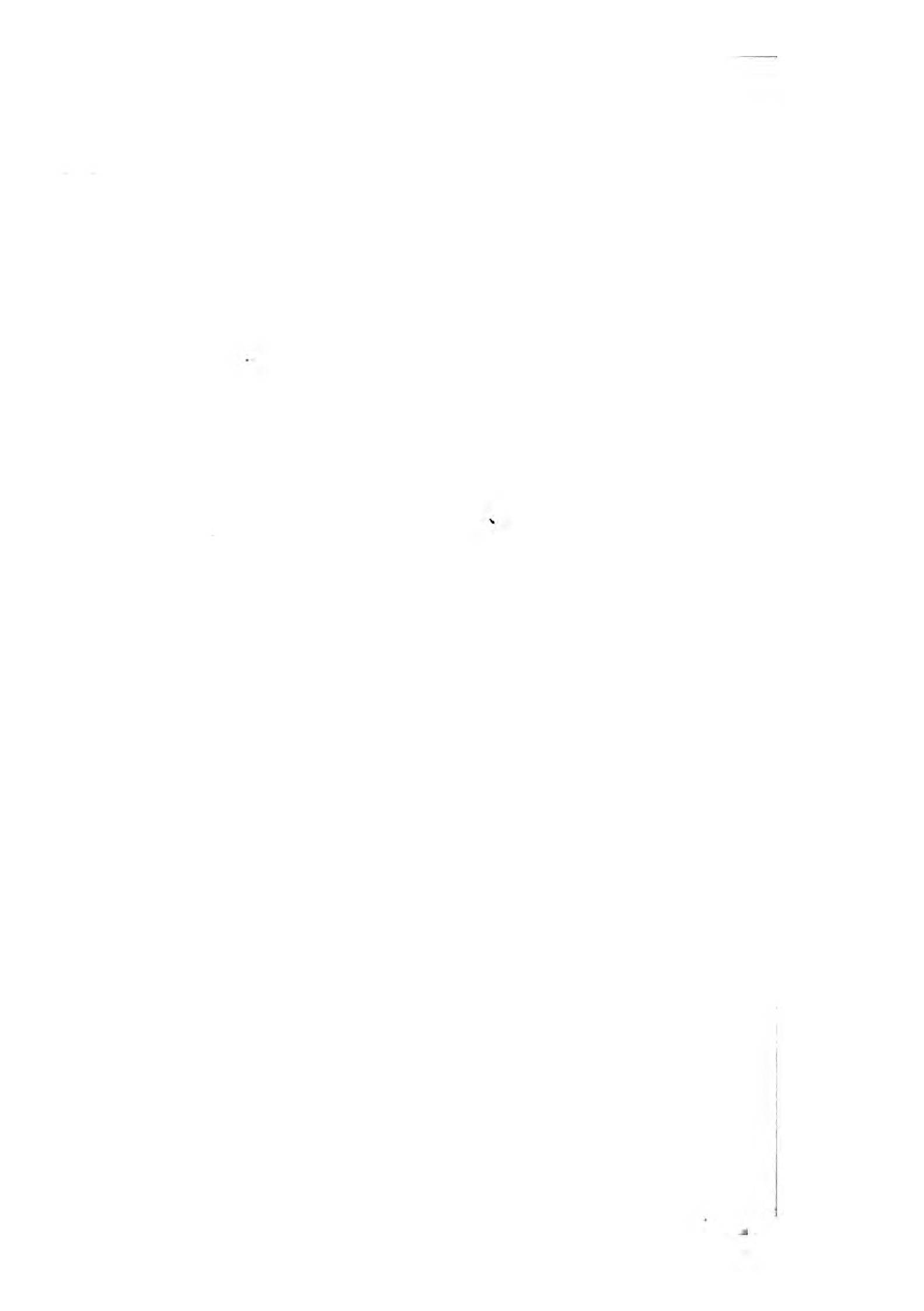

## P R E F A C E.

It was often suggested to the compiler of the following pages, that, as Southampton had ceased to be a mere fashionable town, and is now filled with a permanently resident population principally engaged in commercial pursuits, a Directory of Southampton and its neighbourhood would be serviceable, and that the utility of such a work would be enhanced if some method were adopted of describing the Post Office Delivery in which each house in the neighbourhood of this town is situated. In consequence of these suggestions the compilation of the Post Office Directory was undertaken, and it was designed, principally, to afford facilities for that extensive correspondence which now takes place between Southampton and its neighbourhood.

A complete List is furnished of Villages, Hamlets, and the principal Gentlemen's Seats, in the county of Hants, with the Post Towns to which letters for those places should be directed, to prevent persons having correspondents in Hampshire posting letters with incomplete addresses, which oftentimes causes delay in such letters reaching their destination. The local and general Post Office Regulations have been condensed, and for the especial accommodation



of persons residing in Southampton and its vicinity they have been rendered as clear and brief as possible.

In consequence of the great curiosity which has often been manifested respecting the nature and duties of the Ordnance Survey Department, recently established at the Military Asylum in this town, an account has been furnished in the Directory of that Department, showing the great national object which will be accomplished by its labours. It was thought, also, that an account of the progress of the Southampton Artesian Well would be read with interest; but it was found difficult to give that account without touching on those topics which have been the source of disputation among the inhabitants. To prevent giving offence, the Artesian Well has been considered principally as an object of scientific curiosity, and interesting to the inhabitants of this town as a work of great magnitude originating with an elective public body formed of their fellow townsmen, and rendered absolutely necessary through the growing importance of Southampton.

The rise of Southampton into magnitude as a commercial Town has been singularly rapid. It is now an undoubted fact, that, from the proximity of Southampton to London and its Railway Communication with the Metropolis, it must always remain unrivalled as a provincial Port for Steamers conveying passengers to and from the Channel Islands, the West Indies, the Continent (more especially in a few months hence when the railroad is completed between Rouen and Paris), the Peninsula, Mediterranean, East Indies, and China. The realisation of

this good fortune has caused and must cause the number of Inhabitants in Southampton to increase to a remarkable extent. Houses and even Streets rise up as if by magic in this prosperous and highly-favoured Town, thereby rendering any enumeration of the Names of its Inhabitants continually incomplete. It is confidently believed, however, that the Post Office Directory will prove a most convenient and valuable work of reference for a very long period.

The whole contents of the following pages have been compiled within the last two months. This is not mentioned as an apology for errors and imperfections but to convey an idea of the assistance the compiler has received, and to afford him an opportunity of expressing to those gentlemen who have kindly furnished him with information his grateful and respectful acknowledgements for their politeness and condescension.

### SOUTHAMPTON POST OFFICE.

#### *Extent of the Official District of the Postmaster of Southampton.*

THE Official District of the Postmaster of Southampton comprehends the Town of Southampton and a circle of between six and seven miles round it. In this district one general office and 25 receiving houses are situated, employing a postmaster, 6 clerks, 25 receivers of letters, and 24 letter carriers. The principal office is situated in Hanover Buildings.

#### *Hours of Business.*

The principal office opens for official business at 7 in the morning, and closes at 11 at night.

At the Receiving House at Mr. WEBB'S, confectioner, 41, High-street, the letter box closes at 8 in the morning for the London (day) mail; at half-past 12 at noon for the Bath and Isle of Wight mails; at 5 in the afternoon for the Channel Islands' ship letter bags; and at half-past 8 at night for the London (night) and Bristol mails.

*Hours for Closing the Letter Box at the other Receiving  
Houses.*

*Regulations after the Letter Box is closed at the Office  
in Hanover Buildings.*

When the letter box is closed at the office in Hanover Buildings no letter put into the unpaid letter box, and whose route is by the mail about to be despatched, can be sent forward towards its destination until the next departure. Persons desirous of sending by the mail about to be despatched must apply at the office window within a certain period after the letter box is closed, as described in the next paragraph, and, by the payment of a stated fee, such letters, except in specified instances, can be forwarded.

*Fees for Letters after the Letter Box is closed.*

A fee of one penny is charged for letters to be sent by the Bath mail, for the first 15 minutes after the box is closed for that mail, after that period no letters can be sent.

A fee of one penny is charged for letters to be sent by the Bristol or London (night) mails, for the first 30 minutes after the box is closed for those mails, and two-pence for the second half-hour. No letters can be sent by the London (day) and Isle of Wight mails after the box is closed for such mails.

*Departure of Mails from Southampton.*

A mail leaves Southampton for Exeter, at half-past 12 at night; for London, at a quarter-before 2 in the morning; for Bishop's Waltham and Romsey, at a quarter-past 2 in the morning; for Portsmouth, at a quarter-before 3 in the morning; for Lymington, at a quarter-past 3 in the morning; for the Isle of Wight, viz., Newport and Cowes, at 6 in the morning; for London, at a quarter-before 9 in the morning; for Bath, at half-past 1 in the afternoon; for the Isle of Wight, at a quarter-before 3 in the afternoon; and for Bristol, at 11 at night.

*Departure of District Post Bags from Southampton.*

A mail arrives from London, at 12 at midnight; from Bristol, at a quarter to 3 in the morning; from the Isle of Wight (viz., Cowes and Newport), at half-past 10 in the forenoon; from London (day mail), at 2 in the afternoon; from Bath, at 6 in the evening; from the Isle of Wight (viz., from Cowes and Ryde in summer, and from Cowes and Newport in winter), at 6½ in the evening; from the Isle of Wight (viz., from Newport and Cowes in the summer season only) at 8 in the evening; from Lymington, at 10 at night; from Portsmouth, Bishop's Waltham, and Romsey, at 11 at night.

*Routes of Letters by London and Cross Post from Southampton.*

Letters for Ireland (except Dunmore and Waterford), Scotland, the North of England, and Wales, and the Eastern English Counties, are sent by the London mails. Letters for places on the line of the Great Western Railway, between Bristol and Taunton, as well as those for Devonshire and Cornwall, are sent by the Bath mail. Letters for Cornwall, the South of Devon, and the Coast of Dorset, are sent by the Exeter mail.

*Route of Letters by the District Post.*

Letters for Bartley, are conveyed in the Totton bag; for Nursling, in the bag for Redbridge; for Exbury, in that for Fawley; and letters for Bittern and Hamble, are conveyed in the Itchen Ferry bag; a bag for Bishop's Waltham, is also sent with the Botley letter bag.

*Letter Bags conveyed by each Mail.*

The Exeter Mail conveys letter bags for Ringwood, Wimborne, Blandford, Dorchester, Weymouth, Bridport, Lyme, Axminster, Honiton, and Exeter. The Bishop's Waltham mail, one for Bishop's Waltham. The Romsey mail, one for Romsey. The London (night) mail bags for Winchester, Basingstoke, Hartfordbridge, Farnham, Bagshot, Guilford, Ripley, Chertsey, Staines, Esher, Kingston-upon-Thames, and London. The Portsmouth mail bags for Fareham, Gosport, Portsmouth, Havant, Emsworth, and Chichester. The Lymington mail bags for Millbrook, Redbridge, Totton, Lyndhurst, and Lymington. The London (day) mail bags for Winchester, Basingstoke, and London. The Bath mail bags for Romsey, Salisbury, Warminster, and Bath. The Isle of Wight (morning) mail conveys bags for Newport and Cowes, from Newport and Cowes in the forenoon, for Newport, Cowes, and Ryde, in the afternoon in summer, and for Newport and Cowes in winter. The Isle of Wight mail in the evening, also conveys bags from Newport, Ryde, and Cowes in summer, and from Newport and Cowes only in winter. The Bristol mail conveys letter bags for Romsey, Salisbury, Warminster, Frome, Bath, and Bristol.

*Route of Letters from Southampton on Saturdays.*

On Saturday nights no letter bag is made up for London at Southampton, and all letters for Scotland, Ireland, Wales, and the following Counties:—viz., Cheshire, Cumberland, Derbyshire, Durham, Lancashire, Nottinghamshire, Northumberland, Shropshire, Staffordshire, Warwickshire, Westmoreland, and Yorkshire are sent by the Bristol mail. Bags for Winchester, Basingstoke, Hartfordbridge, Farnham, Bagshot, Guilford, Ripley, Chertsey, Esher, and Kingston-on-Thames, are made up as usual.

*Morning Mails from London.*

Letters for the following places, if posted at Southampton before 10 o'clock at night, are despatched by morning mails from London:—viz., Abingdon, Accrington, Banbury, Bangor, Berkhemstead, Birmingham, Blackburn, Brackley, Bradford (Yorkshire), Brighton, Buckingham, Burnley, Burton (Westmoreland), Canterbury, Carlisle, Carnarvon, Chatham, Cheltenham, Chester, Cirencester, Clitheroe, Cokermonth, Conway, Coventry, Cuckfield, Dartford, Daventry, Dover, Farringdon, Fenny Stratford, Feversham, Gateshead, Gloucester, Gravesend, Halifax, Haydon Bridge, Hemelhempstead, Hexham, Holywell, Huddersfield, Kendall, Kirby Lonsdale, Lancaster,

Leamington, Lechlade, Leighton Buzzard, Lewes, Liverpool, Maidenhead, Maidstone, Manchester, Margate, Maryport, Milnthorpe, Mold, Newcastle-on-Tyne, Newport Pagnell, Northampton, North Shields, Oxford, Penkridge, Penrith, Preston, Preston Brook, Pwlhelli, Ramsgate, Reading, Reigate, Rochdale, Rochester, Rugby, Settle, Sittingbourne, Slough, Shoreham, South Shields, St. Asaph's, St. Alban's, Stafford, Stockport, Stoney Stratford, Stratford-on-Avon, Stroud (Gloucester), Sunderland, Towcester, Tring, Ulverstone, Uxbridge, Wallsall, Warrington, Warwick, Watford, Weedon, Whitehaven, Wigan, Wigton, Wolverhampton, Workington, Worthing, and to all parts of Ireland and Scotland.

*Places to which Letter Bags are sent from Southampton more than once a day—viz.,*

To Bath, Basingstoke, Bishop's Waltham, Cowes, Newport, Salisbury, Warminster, Winchester, twice daily; and to Romsey three times a day.

*By what mails Letters for Post Towns in Hampshire are sent.*

Letters for Alton, Basingstoke, Hartfordbridge, Odiham, Overton, and Winchester, are sent by the London mail. For Andover, Fordingbridge, Romsey, Stockbridge, and Whitchurch, by the Bath and Bristol mails. For Emsworth, Fareham, Gosport, Havant, Petersfield, and Portsmouth, by the Portsmouth mail. For Christchurch and Ringwood by the Exeter mail. For Lymington, Lyndhurst, Stoney Cross, and Yarmouth, by the Lymington mail. For Cowes, Newport, and Ryde, by the Isle of Wight mail. Letters for Romsey are also sent by the Romsey mail; and for Bishop's Waltham, by the Bishop's Waltham mail, and also by the Botley messenger.

*Letters for Havre.*

Letters for all parts of France, posted at Southampton, are sent to that country through London and Calais, with the exception of those for Havre. Mails are made up in Southampton for Havre, and sent by the steamers which run between those ports. Such mails are only intended to convey letters posted in Southampton, and directed to parties living in Havre. The postage of a letter to Havre, provided it does not exceed half an ounce, is 8d., &c.: the postage need not be prepaid. A mail is made up in the Havre post office also, and sent by the same vessels, for letters posted at Havre, and directed to parties living in Southampton. Letters posted in France for America, *via* Liverpool, or by any of the private steamers bound for America, can be sent *via* Havre and Southampton.

*Letters for the Channel Islands.*

Letters for the Channel Islands, *via* Weymouth, must be posted before 10 at night on Tuesdays and Fridays. A letter bag is made up in Southampton for Guernsey and Jersey, and sent by the steamers that



ply between the Channel Islands and Southampton. Letters intended for this route, should be addressed "per private steamer," and posted before 6 in the evening. The postage on such letters is one penny each, provided they do not exceed half an ounce in weight. There is a postage on newspapers sent by this route of one penny each paper. The pre-payment of the postage is optional.

### *Letters by Private Ships.*

Letters which are intended to be sent by private ships, should be addressed "per private ship," and if by any particular ship, the name of the ship, and the port from which she will sail, should be stated on the address. The packet stations for foreign letters are Falmouth, London, Liverpool, Dover, and Hull; no vessel sailing, therefore, from any other port, can be a packet vessel. The "Great Western" and "British Queen" steam vessels carry letters as private ships, and persons wishing to send letters by such steamers should write the words "per Great Western," &c., on the direction of their letters. The postage of a letter sent by a private vessel to any place abroad is 8*d.*, provided it does not exceed half an ounce. The postage must be prepaid.

### *Rates of Postage.*

The postage on a letter posted in this country, for any part of the United Kingdom, is one penny, if its weight do not exceed half an ounce. Two-pence, if its weight be above the half ounce, and do not exceed one ounce. Fourpence above one ounce, and not exceeding two ounces, &c. The above are the rates of postage for prepaid letters. If letters are not prepaid, such rates are doubled. An easy method of reckoning the postage on heavy letters, is to ascertain between what two number of ounces a packet weighs; for double the highest number of ounces is the amount in pence of prepaid postage chargeable on such packet, and quadruple the same number is the amount in pence chargeable on a packet if the postage have not been prepaid. Thus, if the weight of a letter be between six and seven ounces, twice seven is the amount in pence of prepaid postage, and four times seven is the amount in pence chargeable when the postage is paid on delivery.

### *Rules for charging Foreign Letters, single and double Rates.*

For every letter directed to a place abroad, a single rate of *British* postage is charged, provided the letter does not weigh above half an ounce. Above the half ounce and under one ounce, a double rate, &c. A single rate of French postage is charged when a letter weighs *under* a quarter of an ounce; if it weigh a quarter of an ounce a double rate is charged; if it weigh half an ounce, a treble rate, &c. When, therefore, the British and Foreign postage is prepaid for a letter directed to France, Switzerland, Sardinia, Central Germany, or for any part the route of which is through France, if the letter weigh a quarter of an ounce, *one* British rate is charged, and *two* foreign

rates is chargeable on such letter. Thus, if a person wish to prepay a letter to Paris, to its destination, which weighs a quarter of an ounce, a single rate of British postage is 10*d.*, and a single rate of French postage is also 10*d.*; but such a letter is chargeable with one British rate, or 10*d.*, and two French rates, or 1*s.* 8*d.*, making in the whole 2*s.* 6*d.*

*Postage on Foreign Letters posted at Southampton.*

VIA FALMOUTH.—The British postage on a letter not exceeding half an ounce in weight to Portugal, is 1*s.* 9*d.*; to Cadiz and Vigo, 2*s.* 2*d.*; to Gibraltar, Malta, Ionian Islands, 1*s.*; to Greece and Egypt, 2*s.* 5*d.*; to Madeira, *via* Lisbon, 1*s.* 9*d.*; to Brazil, 2*s.* 9*d.*; to Buenos Ayres and Monte Video, 2*s.* 7*d.*; to Chili and Peru, 1*s.*; to Antigua, Barbadoes, Cariacou, Dominica, Grenada, Jamaica, Montserrat, Nevis, St. Kitt's, St. Lucia, St. Vincent, Tobago, Tortola, Trinidad, Bahamas, Berbice, Demarara, Essequibo, 1*s.*; to Curacoa, Martinique, Guadaloupe, St. Croix, St. Martin's, St. Thomas, Porto Rico, Cape Haytien (Hayti), St. Juan (Porto Rico), 1*s.* 5*d.*; to Honduras, Chagres, 1*s.*; to Carthagen, Havanna, La Guayra, Puerto Cabello, Santa Martha, St. Jago de Cuba, Tampico, Vera Cruz, 2*s.* 3*d.*

VIA LIVERPOOL.—To the United States, 1*s.*; to Prince Edward's Island, Canada (with the exception of Halifax, the postage to which is 1*s.*), Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, 1*s.* 2*d.*; to Bermuda and Newfoundland, 1*s.*

VIA LONDON.—To France, 10*d.*; to Italy, Turkey, Spain, and Portugal, *via* France, 1*s.* 7*d.*; to Switzerland, *via* France, 1*s.* 2*d.*; to Germany, *via* France, 1*s.* 4*d.*; to Turkey, Italy, and the Mediterranean, if addressed "per French packet," a British rate of 10*d.*, and a foreign rate of 1*s.* 10½*d.*; to India, if addressed "per French packet," British rate, 1*s.* 10*d.*, and a foreign rate, 1*s.* 10½*d.*; to Malta, Ionian Islands, Greece, Syria, and Egypt, "*via* Marseilles," a British rate of 10*d.*, and a foreign rate of 10*d.*; to India, *via* Marseilles," a British of 1*s.* 10*d.*, and a foreign rate of 10*d.*; to Holland and Belgium, 1*s.* 6*d.*; to Hamburgh, Cuxhaven, and Lubeck, 6*d.*; to Germany, Russia, Prussia, Deumark, Austria, Sweden, Norway, 1*s.* 10*d.*; to Heligoland, 1*s.*

*Soldiers' and Seamen's Letters.*

Letters can be sent abroad to any part to which there are packet boats from this country, and to St. Helena, East Indies, and New South Wales, to non-commissioned officers, captains, stewards, soldiers, and seamen, for one penny each, provided they do not exceed half an ounce each, and the name of the soldier or sailor, his class or description, and the name of the ship or regiment, corps, or detachment, to which he belongs, be specified. The postage must be prepaid.

Such soldiers' or sailors' letters, if sent by a private ship, are charged 3*d.* each. Three-pence postage is charged for soldiers' and seamen's letters to the following places: *viz.*, to the River Gambia, Sierra Leone, Goree, Senegal, Isle of Ascension, and China.

*How Letters for India and the Mediterranean, via Falmouth, must be addressed.*

Letters for India, Egypt, Greece, Ionian Isles, and Malta, must have the words "*via Falmouth*" written on the address, if intended to be sent by that route.

*Prepayment of the Postage on Foreign Letters.*

The prepayment of the postage on letters is optional to places abroad, belonging to the British, to which there are packet boats sent, except on letters for India and for places in the Mediterranean, *via* France.

*Prepayment of Postage for Letters to France.*

On letters for France, the prepayment of postage is optional, or the British postage only can be prepaid, or the British and foreign postage can be prepaid.

*Places abroad to which the British and Foreign Postage on Letters can be paid in this country.*

The British and foreign postage on letters can be prepaid to France, Central Germany, Sardinia, and to Austria and Italy, as far as the French frontier towns of Huninguen, Forbach, and Sarzane.

When the whole of the postage to the above places is prepaid, the single British rate is 10*d.* only.

*When Foreign Letters should be posted at Southampton.*

Letters should be posted before 10 at night on the 1st and 15th of every month, for the British and Foreign Possessions in the West Indies (excepting Honduras): when the 1st or 15th happens on a Sunday, letters should be posted on the 2nd or 16th. Before 10 at night, on the 1st of every month, for Mexico, Honduras (Belize), Chagres, and the Isthmus of Panama, Carthagena, Santa Martha, La Guayra, Puerto Cabello: when the 1st happens on a Sunday, letters should be posted on the 2nd. Before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the morning on the 3rd and 18th of every month (excepting in the months of December, January, February, and March, and then only on the 3rd) for the United States, Bermuda, Halifax (Nova Scotia), Newfoundland, and British North America: when the 3rd or 18th happens on a Sunday, letters should be posted on the 4th and 19th. Before 10 at night, every Saturday, for Lisbon, Madeira, Spain, and Gibraltar. Before 10 at night on the Saturday nearest the middle of the month, and on the last day of the month, for Malta, Greece, and Corfu, *via* Falmouth. Before 10 at night on the last day of every month, for Egypt and India, *via* Falmouth. Before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the morning on the 4th of every month, for India, Malta, Ionian Isles, Greece, Egypt, and Syria,

*via* Marseilles. Before 10 at night on the first Tuesday in every month, for Madeira, Brazils, and Buenos Ayres. Before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the morning every day, except Sundays, and before 10 at night every day, except Saturdays, for France. Before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the morning on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, for Belgium. Before  $\frac{1}{2}$  past 8 in the morning, every Tuesday and Friday, for Holland, Hamburg, Sweden, and Norway.

*Letters for the Mediterranean, by French Packets.*

Letters for the following places can be sent by French Packets, which leave Marseilles on the 1st, 11th, and 21st of every month: viz., Leghorn, Civita, Vecchia, Naples, Malta, Syria, Athens, Smyrna, Constantinople, and Alexandria.

*Newspapers for Foreign Parts.*

Newspapers can be sent by packet boats, free of postage, to the following places abroad:—viz., Aden, Antigua, Bahama, Barbadoes, Berbice, Bermuda, Brazil, Bremen, Buenos Ayres, Canada, Caraccas, Colombia, Cuxhaven, Demarara, Denmark, Dominica, East Indies (*via* Falmouth), France, Gibraltar, Greece, Grenada, Halifax, Hamburg, Hayti, Heligoland, Honduras, Ionian Islands, Jamaica, La Guayra, Lubeck, Malta, Montserrat, Nevis, New Brunswick, Newfoundland, Nova Scotia, Peru, Quebec, St. Kitt's, St. Lucia, St. Vincent's, Spain (*via* Falmouth), Tobago, Tortola, Trinidad.

Twopence each must be prepaid on newspapers to the following places:—viz., Cuba or Havannah, Egypt, Guadeloupe, Martinique, St. Croix, St. Martin, St. Thomas, Surinam, Syria, United States, the continent of Europe (with the exception of those places to which it has been previously stated that newspapers can be sent free); to India, *via* Marseilles; to South America, excepting Brazil, Buenos Ayres, Peru, Caraccas, Colombia, La Guayra. Newspapers can be forwarded to British colonies by private ships, on the prepayment of one penny each. Also to the following places for the same postage, *via* Cape of Good Hope, Mauritius, Sydney, New South Wales, Van dieman's Land, Swan River, South Australia, Chili, Peru, Guatemala, and the Western Coast of Africa, including St. Mary's River, Gambia, Sierra Leone, Cape Coast Castle, Fernando Po, Isle of Ascension. To China, 2*d.* each. All newspapers directed to places abroad must be posted within seven days from the date of publication.

Newspapers printed and posted in the British colonies are delivered free in this country.

Newspapers from Foreign parts, to which English newspapers can be sent free, are delivered in this country free of postage, France excepted,  $\frac{1}{2}$ *d.* each being charged on newspapers from that country. From all other parts abroad 2*d.* each is charged.

Newspapers need not be sent by post.

Newspapers must be printed in the language of the country in which they are posted, to be entitled to the above mentioned privileges, with the exception of Galignani's Messenger.

*Prices' Current.*

The following Lists of Prices' Current can be sent abroad for one penny postage, the prepayment of which is optional, provided they are posted within seven days from the date of publication, and contain no writing: viz., Annual Supplement to Prices' Current; British ships entered inwards and cleared outwards, from, and to, places within the limits of the East India Company's Charter; Commercial Daily List; Lloyd's List; London New Price Current; London Mercantile Price Current; Mercantile Journal; Nicholson's New Price Current; Prince's Price Current; Sound List; Trades' List; Universal Corn Reporter; Whitenhall's Court of Exchange.—The word "Price Current" must be written or printed over the address.

The postage of one penny is charged for printed Prices' Current and Commercial Lists from China, France, and British Colonies, either brought by packet or private ship. From all other places, the postage is two-pence. From the British Colonies, passing through England, two-pence each, which must be prepaid; and those passing through France, two-pence each also. The Lists just mentioned, if stamped, are treated as newspapers.

*Printed Votes and Proceedings of Parliament.*

Printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, and of the Colonial Legislatures, pass through the post at the following rates: viz., under 4 oz., one penny; above 4 and under 8 oz., two-pence, &c. The prepayment of the postage is optional. Such votes and proceedings are sent for the above rates to any part of the United Kingdom, or to the Colonies, by packet. To places where there are no packets, they are sent by private ships, at double the above rates. They are charged letter postage to the East Indies, *via* Falmouth and Alexandria.

*Adhesive Labels.*

The postage on letters and newspapers can be prepaid by affixing labels of sufficient value. Stamps, however, will not free letters to this country, when posted abroad. If letters are posted with stamps of insufficient value, double the amount deficient is charged to the receiver. If stamps of insufficient value are placed on letters for places abroad, to which prepayment is compulsory, such letters are not sent. Stamps of sufficient value to cover the foreign postage can free letters abroad. Labels, &c., are sold at every Post Office and Receiving House, at the following prices: viz., 1*d.* Labels, one penny each; 2*d.* Labels, two-pence each.—The prices of penny envelopes are as follows: twelve, 1*s.* 1½*d.*; eight, 9*d.*; six, 6¾*d.*; four, 4½*d.*; two, 2¼*d.*—The prices of two-penny envelopes are: twelve, 2*s.* 2*d.*; nine, 1*s.* 7½*d.*; six, 1*s.* 1*d.*; three, 6½*d.*

*Limitation as to the weight of Letters passing through the Post.*

Letters or packets, above the weight of 16 ounces, cannot be sent through the post, excepting such letters or packets as the following:

viz., Parliamentary Petitions; Addresses to Her Majesty; Letters and Packets addressed to, or received from, places abroad; Letters and Packets to, and from, Public Departments; Deeds, if sent open, or in covers, open at their sides.

*Petitions to Parliament and Addresses to Her Majesty.*

Addresses to Her Majesty are sent through the post, free of postage. Parliamentary Petitions are sent, free of postage, if under the weight of 32 ounces, and without covers, or in covers open at the sides.

*Post Office Money Orders.*

The period for granting and paying money orders at the Post Office is from 9 in the morning until 6 in the evening, excepting during the time that the letter box is closed for the despatch of mails. Money orders can be drawn for sums not exceeding 5*l.* on the Postmasters of the principal Post Towns in the United Kingdom. A charge of 3*d.* is made for granting orders for sums not exceeding 2*l.*, and 6*d.* for sums between 2*l.* and 5*l.* Parties applying for Post Office orders must state the names of the persons to whom the orders are to be made payable, the names of the Post Towns at which the orders are to be paid, with the christian and surname, address, and occupation of the individuals sending the money. Orders are not cashed, unless they are signed by the persons in whose names they were made payable. If a person to whom an order has been made payable, cannot attend at the Post Office himself, he must sign the order, and instruct his messenger as to the christian and surname, address, and occupation of the sender. Persons wishing to send orders to London can have them drawn on the Postmasters of the following branch offices, for the convenience of their correspondents in the metropolis: At the *Borough Branch*; *Charing Cross*; *Old Cavendish-street*; *Battle Bridge*, 1, Pleasant Row; *Bloomsbury*, 1, Broad-street; *Brompton*, 5, Brompton-place; *Camberwell Green*; *Camden Town*, 98, High-street; *Chelsea*, 79, Paradise Row; *City Road*, 36, near Old-street; *Dockhead*, No. 11, *Gray's Inn Lane*, 43, Upper North-place; *Hackney*, 8, Church-street; *Islington*, 86, Upper-street; *Kennington Cross*, No. 2; *Kingsland Road*, 4, Orchard-place; *Lambeth*, 33, Mount-street; *Limehouse*, 44, Three Colt-street; *Old Kent Road*, 9, Northampton-place; *Oxford street*, No. 210; *Piccadilly*, No. 65; *Pimlico*, 28, Queen's Row; *Ratcliffe*, 77, Broad-street; *Strand*, 180, Corner of Norfolk-street; *Tottenham Court Road*, No. 103; *Upper Baker Street*, No. 54; *Whitechapel*, No. 1, Whitechapel-road.

If a money order be lost, application must be made to the Postmaster General before a duplicate can be obtained. The Postmaster General will also, on application to him, allow the payment of an order to be transferred from one office to another, or from one person to another once only. If the drawer of an order wishes the amount to be refunded to him, he must apply to the Postmaster General. The amount charged for commission is in such cases not returned.

*Registered Letters.*

A letter can be registered at the Post Office, which means that the Postmaster acknowledges receiving the letter, by giving the person posting it a printed receipt, on which the address of the letter is copied. The Postmasters through whose hands the letter passes, take unusual precautions to enable it to reach its destination safely. The party to whom a registered letter is addressed, acknowledge its receipt to the Postmaster who delivers it. Letters to be registered must be posted half an hour before the letter box closes for the despatch of the mail by which such letter is to be sent. Foreign, colonial, or ship letters can only be registered so far as the English port from which they are despatched, with the exception of letters for France, or whose route is through France. The French government undertakes to provide for the security of letters, as long as they are in the French territory. The charge for registration for letters directed to any part of the United Kingdom, is only one shilling, besides the postage. The same charge is made for registered foreign, ship, and colonial letters, with the exception of those for France, or that pass through France. The charge made for a registered letter directed to any part of the French dominion, is a fee of one shilling, the English rate to France, and double the French postage. The registration fee cannot be paid by stamps, but must be paid in money. Letters can be registered at Receiving Houses.

*Illegal conveyance of Letters.*

Letters, under the following circumstances, can be conveyed otherwise than by post:—A letter sent by a private friend, if he deliver it to the party to whom it is addressed, without charge; letters sent by a messenger on purpose; letters sent out of the country by a private vessel; letters concerning goods, sent by common carriers, delivered with such goods, without charge; letters of merchants, of owners of vessels, or of the cargo in them, provided the letters be sent by such vessels, or in charge of parties employed by those merchants and owners, and delivered to the persons to whom the letters are addressed, without charge. Letters under any other circumstances but those mentioned must be sent by post.

*Ship Letters brought by Commanders of Vessels, Passengers, &c.*

Commanders of vessels that arrive from beyond seas, must, as soon as they arrive off the coast of Great Britain, collect all letters on board (excepting letters for owners, charterers, and consignees of the vessels, or the owners, consignees, and shippers of goods on board such vessels), to be in readiness to be sent on shore by the first conveyance. The crew or passengers render themselves liable to a penalty of 5*l.* for every letter found in their possession after the commander's letters have been sent to the Post Office.

*Letters containing Dangerous and Explosive Substances*  
Cannot be sent through the post.

*Postage on Re-directed Letters.*

Letters when re-directed are subjected to additional postage, but the rates are not doubled if the postage be paid on delivery.

*Letters cannot be returned after once posted.*

Letters when posted, can under no circumstances be returned to the writers or persons posting them, until they have been sent to where they are addressed.

*Letters posted without a Direction.*

Letters posted without a direction are immediately forwarded to the General Post Office, where they are opened and returned to the writers.

---

## POST OFFICE GOLDEN RULES.

The following Rules if strictly attended to would prevent much inconvenience which the public at present sustain :—

- 1.—Never send coin in letters.
- 2.—Always register letters which contain articles of value.
- 3.—Persons sending bank notes or cheques, payable at sight, without registering them, should cut them in halves, and the second half should not be sent until the first had been acknowledged. The number, date, and amount of such enclosure should also be taken.
- 4.—Never seal foreign letters with wax.
- 5.—Never put a single adhesive label on letters for France or any other foreign part, when it is not intended to prepay the postage on such letters.
- 6.—If the postage on letters be prepaid by adhesive labels, always place the label above the address in the right hand corner.
- 7.—Always make the name of the Post Town in the delivery in which a correspondent's residence is situated a part of the address on a letter.
- 8.—Write every portion of the address of a letter as distinctly as possible.
- 9.—In addressing a letter write the name of the party for whom the letter is intended, the name of the street, or house in which he resides, with the name of the Post Town in which the house or street is situated, in separate lines.
- 10.—In writing a letter no one should omit mentioning the number of the house, the name of the street or village, and post town in which he resides, and, in answering that letter, correspondents should not fail placing those particulars on the address.
- 11.—In writing to Postmasters requesting letters to be re-directed state distinctly the particulars relative to the manner in which your correspondents direct your letters.



12.—In sending newspapers by post write the addresses on the margins of the newspapers, particularly on those directed to be sent abroad.

13.—Persons living at a distance from Post Towns, and expecting or requesting Post Office money orders from correspondents, should advise the latter as to the name of the Post Town at which they wish to receive the amount of the order; or, if they live in London, they should be particular in advising as to the name of the branch office at which they desire the order should be made payable.

14.—Before applying for a Post Office order, it would be advisable to present the Postmaster with a *written* memorandum mentioning the name of the person to whom the order is to be made payable, the name of the town at which it is to be paid, together with the christian and surname, address, and occupation of the sender.

15.—In directing letters at Southampton for the following places in the neighbourhood of London: viz., Acton, Brentford, Brompton (Middlesex), Bushy Park, Chelsea (except Sloane-street, Sloane-terrace, and Cadogan-place), Chiswick, Ham, Hammersmith, Hampton, Hampton Court, Hampton Wick, Isleworth, Kew, Kensington, Petersham, Richmond, Shepherd's Bush, Sunbury, Teddington, Twickenham, and Turnham Green, as well as the Barracks, Halfway, Kent, and Kingston Houses, South Place, and Serpentine and Trevor-terraces in Knightsbridge, the word London should not be placed on the address.

16.—If the Post Town to which a letter is directed be Aldborough, Bampton, Bradford, Burnham, Caistor, Newport, Richmond, St. Helen's, St. Ives, Stoke, Stratton, Stroud, Wellington, Wells, Whitchurch, Yarmouth, the name of the county in which such town is situated should invariably be added.

## SOUTHAMPTON PIER AND HARBOUR.

### HARBOUR DUES.

All British vessels loading or unloading at the Quays or in the Roads are to pay a Tonnage Duty of Two-pence per register Ton each voyage. Foreign vessels double.

Colliers, Coasters, and short Traders may compound at One Shilling per register ton per annum, payable in advance.

Boomage duty to be paid by all Vessels, Hoys, Boats, Barges, Lighters, or other Craft (not belonging to Southampton), each time on coming within Calshot Castle, and navigating in the water called Southampton Water and the rivers thereto belonging, as far as the tide flows therein: viz., under 50 tons, 1s. 6d.; 50 and under 100 tons, 2s. 6d.; 100 tons and upwards, 5s.: foreign ships double.

By the Southampton Dock Act, page 79, all ships and vessels entering into, or loading, or unloading at the Docks are subject to the

several regulations, and liable to the duties of Tonnage and Boomage, and other duties to which they are subject or liable in the Port of the Town of Southampton, as if the same ships and vessels had loaded or unloaded at the public Quays of the Commissioners for the Pier and Harbour.

#### PIER DUES.

All Goods, Wares, Merchandize, Articles, and Commodities whatsoever, imported into or intended to be exported out of, or brought or intended to be carried coastwise out of the Port of the Town of Southampton, are subject to Warfage rates or duties, varying according to the kind or sort of goods. A few are enumerated which will serve as a guide to the general scale of charges.

Linen, Cotton, and woollen manufactures are charged *3d.* per cwt. if the receiver and exporter can agree as to weight, otherwise they are charged by the length, as entered at the Customs.

Copper, Brass, Tin, and Iron Manufactures in general, and Hardware are charged *2d.* per cwt.

THE ORDNANCE  
SURVEY ESTABLISHMENT.

---

THE government building contiguous to the Avenue in this town, and which was formerly an Asylum for the Orphan Female Children of Soldiers, is now occupied by the Trigonometrical Department of the Ordnance Survey of Great Britain.

This survey, which is a great national undertaking of the highest importance, was instituted by the British Government, established by Act of Parliament, and is supported by an annual Parliamentary Grant of money. The survey is under the control of the Honourable the Board of Ordnance, and its immediate superintendence is delegated to Colonel Colby, LL.D., F.R.S., of the Royal Engineers, a highly-talented officer, who has for many years superintended the Ordnance Surveys.

The objects of the survey are, principally, the determination of the exact area of the empire and of each of its various sub-divisions—the delineation of county, parochial, and all other boundaries—the construction of engraved maps, on a scale of six inches to a statute mile, on which all the physical features of the country will be shown with perfect accuracy—the furtherance of mathematical science—and to furnish precise data for a general valuation of property.

The benefits which will result from the attainment of these objects, in the equalization of local and general taxation—in fixing the boundaries and value of property—in forwarding the construction of railroads, &c., are incalculable.

The survey is conducted by officers of the Royal Engineers, who have under their direction upwards of 1000 civilians, and a great number of soldiers from the corps of Royal Sappers and Miners. This force is employed variously as engravers, draughtsmen, clerks, surveyors, computers, accountants, levellers, and mechanics. The officers are gentlemen of the highest scientific attainments. A large proportion of the civilians are individuals of superior talent, especially those engaged as artists and computers, and the soldiers engaged on the survey are, generally speaking, clever men, and far superior in education, conduct, and position to the soldiers of the line.

The method adopted in the Trigonometrical Survey of the country is as follows:—Two or three lines, each ten or twelve miles in length, are measured with the utmost mathematical precision: from these lines a series of very large triangles are spread over the country, the angles of which are observed by the most perfect mathematical instrument now in use (the great theodolite), and the sides obtained by computation. Each of these triangles is subdivided into smaller ones by means of lesser theodolites, and again each of these triangles is divided into still smaller ones, and their areas ascertained. The country is thus covered, as it were, with a net work of small triangles, and from these the areas of every county, parish, &c., are exactly determined, as well as the latitude and longitude of every prominent object, and its height above the level of the sea. These triangles are then filled in with every detail, and from them maps are constructed and engraved.

Portions of the survey force are in different parts of the country. The northern counties of York, Lancashire,

and Westmoreland are at present in the course of being surveyed, and offices for that purpose are established at Preston, York, Liverpool, Manchester, and Skipton. The Engraving Department has not yet commenced its labours on account of the survey not having, at the present time, made sufficient progress.

The duties of the department in Southampton will be confined to the triangulation of the country and to map engraving. This department contains two divisions respectively under the direction of Lieutenants Yolland and Cameron, of the Royal Engineers. The division under Lieutenant Yolland was originally located in the Tower of London; but, on the removal of the orphan children from the Military Asylum, the Board of Ordnance ordered the division to be removed to that building. The late lamentable fire in the Tower accelerated its removal. The division under Lieutenant Cameron was formerly employed on the survey in Ireland, and was transferred to the English survey in November, 1841. The whole force at present in Southampton is civilians, 83; military, 31: of the former there are 9 engravers, 5 draughtsmen, 4 clerks, 60 computers, 1 printer, 2 messengers, 2 labourers: of the latter there are 2 officers, 2 sergeants, 26 privates, 1 bugler. The number of civilians will be increased as the survey progresses, and the military force will receive augmentation in the winter when the severity of the season renders field-work with delicate mathematical instruments impracticable.

The establishment of the Survey Department in Southampton will be of considerable advantage to the town. All the civilians, with the exception of three who live in the Asylum, reside in Southampton. Many of them enjoy lucrative situations, and a great number are talented individuals of studious and religious habits.

The history of Territorial Surveys is curious and interesting. One of the earliest as well as most minute of

these national undertakings is that transmitted under the name of the Doomsday Book. This ancient record was not laid down on map or paper, but was a mere catalogue of property. For this survey commissions were sent into the counties with authority to impanel a jury in each hundred, from whose presentments and verdicts the necessary information was obtained. Inquiry was made by this commission into the extent of each estate—its division into arable, pasture, meadow, and wood land—the names of the owners, tenants, and sub-tenants—their condition, whether free or servile—the nature and obligation of tenures and the estimated value.

A partial survey of Ireland took place under the authority of the celebrated Lord Stafford, in the reign of Charles the First. A more extensive one by Sir Wm. Petty, in 1654. This survey was laid down with the chain and with wonderful accuracy considering the period at which it was executed. It consisted of county maps, containing the boundaries of baronies and parishes, copies of which are now in the Royal Library of Paris. Another partial survey was made of Ireland in the reign of William III. Yet these surveys became in time imperfect, and local taxation in consequence apportioned so unequally, that complaints of that inequality were repeatedly made in the Irish Parliament.

In Bavaria, Savoy, and Naples, scientific surveys took place during the last century. The grand territorial survey of France was projected in 1763. Thirty years after that period those profound mathematicians, Lagrange, Laplace, and Delambre, were consulted by the French government as to the best means for carrying it into effect. In 1808, it began and was carried on at a cost of £120,000 a year. A survey commenced in England about the year 1793, under the direction of the then Duke of Richmond, who was Master-General of the Ordnance at the time. This survey, however, was not sufficiently extensive to answer all the designs contemplated in its establishment.

The present trigonometrical survey of the United Kingdom, of which the chief department is stationed at Southampton, began in Ireland, in 1825, and when it approached completion, which was very recently, it commenced in this country. Nothing is omitted in this survey to make it an undertaking worthy a rich and enlightened nation, and creditable to the scientific celebrity of the present age. All the resources of science and art will be put in requisition to make the perfection of its execution commensurate with its lasting utility.

Maps, beautifully engraved, will be published from the survey, which will contain an accurate delineation of cities, towns, villages, seats, parks, commons, rivers, lakes, woods, &c., and will be sold in parts at a comparatively trifling expense.

The Ordnance Survey Department was transferred from the Tower of London to Southampton on the 12th November, 1841. It is entitled to receive and send letters by post, on the business of the survey, without limitation as to weight.



# THE ARTESIAN WELL,

ON SOUTHAMPTON COMMON.

~~~~~

GEOLOGISTS have discovered that the upper crust of the earth is formed of beds or layers resting one upon another in undulating masses, and that when any portion of a porous layer reaches the surface the rain, dew, and snow that fall on such portion filter through the whole mass of that particular layer, and form large volumes of water, by filling hollows and fissures. The water that fills such cavities is of the purest and most wholesome description, especially in particular layers, such as that of chalk, on account of the nature and magnitude of the bed through which it filters.

These discoveries, which have been substantiated by numerous experiments, have made it evident that if the operation of boring into the earth be carried on perpendicularly from the surface, or from the bottom of a shaft or well, through geological strata into the fissure of some porous bed, that large supplies of water of the purest quality can be obtained. The process of boring in the manner just described forms what is called an Artesian Well, and such wells are now generally resorted to, or are considered desirable, to furnish supplies of water to large establishments and towns.

A few years ago the chief supply of water to the inhabitants of Southampton and the shipping that frequented this port was from surface drains and springs on the Common. This supply was considered inadequate for a larger

number of ships and an increasing population. The Commissioners of Water Works for the town therefore engaged Mr. Clark, of Tottenham, in the autumn of 1837, to make an experimental boring in the vicinity of Southampton, to ascertain from what depth a very large supply of water could be found. The spot selected for this purpose was on the Common, on the west side of the main road to Winchester, near the race-course and within the boundary of the borough.

The boring was carried down to the depth of 480 feet below the surface, and at that depth Mr. Clark reported that an unfailing and almost unlimited supply of water could be found. A contract was soon afterwards entered into with the Commissioners for sinking a shaft and forming an artesian well, on a scale of magnitude such as had, perhaps, never before been attempted.

This shaft has been sunk to the extraordinary, and, for the purpose of obtaining water, unequalled depth of 560 feet. The diameter of the excavation is 16 feet, from the surface to the depth of 160 feet; 14 feet, from 160 to 210 feet; below which the diameter is again reduced, until, at the entrance of the chalk, it is diminished to 8 feet 6 inches. From the commencement of the chalk to the termination of the shaft, the diameter of the excavation is 7 feet. From the surface to the depth of 480 feet the shaft is protected by cast iron cylinders, and brickwork set in hydraulic cement, which prevents the water from the upper soils flowing into the well. The boring commenced at the depth of 560 feet, and the depth through which it has passed, up to the present time, amounts to 350 feet, thus making the whole depth attained by excavating and boring to be upwards of 900 feet. The depths of the different strata through which the excavations passed before reaching the chalk was as follows: viz.,

Fossiliferous shells, petrified wood, layers of limestone, sandstone, and pebbles were met with during the process of excavating. The shells were of the same description as those found in the London basin. The pebbles were much worn and rounded, and the layers of limestone were of an exceedingly hard nature.

It is deserving of notice that the large supplies of water from artesian wells are often found at the junction of two contiguous beds or strata. In the instance of the artesian well on the Common, however, when the plastic clay was penetrated a thin layer of green sand alone intervened between the clay and the chalk.

The excavations were all performed by manual labour, and the water which accumulated in the shaft was pumped out by means of steam power. Extraordinary difficulties attended the formation of the shaft, and the means taken to protect it. Many layers of stone, several feet thick, were encountered and passed through. Irruptions of sand often happened, and during a long period the choking of pumps and the breaking of rods, shafts, and other parts of the steam engines made use of were of frequent occurrence.

The steam power employed consisted of two engines, each of 24-horse power. They were necessarily used for a long period to prevent the accumulation of water from interrupting the progress of the formation of the shaft. The water the engines pumped from the well flowed into the reservoirs during the years 1839, 1840, and 1841, by which means the supply from the reservoirs to the town was very considerably increased. The boring from the bottom of the shaft commenced at the beginning of the present year, and the machinery for that purpose was situated at about 40 feet below the surface, which was above the maximum water level of the shaft. The situation at which the machinery was placed rendered the water in the well no longer an hindrance to the labour of the workmen; but, in consequence of the dearth of water and the dread

of fire during last summer, upwards of 1,250,000 gallons were pumped from the shaft, and which flowed into the reservoirs at intervals between the 17th of October and the 25th of November last.

In almost every part of the kingdom artesian wells have been sunk or their formation has been contemplated. In London and its neighbourhood they are exceedingly numerous, supplying water to the large metropolitan breweries and nursery grounds. Wells of this description have been formed in the garden of the Horticultural Society—before the episcopal palace at Fulham—at the Duke of Northumberland's, at Chiswick—at Brentford and Hammersmith, in Middlesex—at Mitcham, Staines, Tooting, and Mortlake, in Surrey—at Watford and St. Albans, in Hertfordshire—at Sheerness, Gravesend, Dover, and various other parts of Kent—in the Dockyard and White Swan Fields, at Portsmouth, and at Weovil and Farlington, near that town. In all these places artesian wells have furnished inexhaustible supplies of the purest water, and especially when they have been sunk in the chalk stratum. So favourable is the chalk formation for supplying water, that such towns as Arundel, Brighton, Deal, Walmer, Canterbury, and Winchester, situated where that stratum can be easily reached, have been celebrated for possessing a profusion of one of the indispensable necessities of life. Sixty years ago the progress of a tunnel through Portsdown Hill, which is an insulated mass of chalk, near Portsmouth, was stopped owing to the quantity of water that flowed into it, and that mass of chalk has, for the last twenty-five years, supplied the Water Works at Farlington, the machinery of which is capable of raising water at the rate of 1078 gallons a minute. A boring carried 80 feet into the chalk at Watford, in Herts, supplied a London Water Company. The large town of Brighton is supplied with water from private wells, and from the well about a mile from the town, all of which are sunk in the chalk. At 16 feet from

the bottom of the latter mentioned well there are four adits or tunnels carried from the sides of the well east, west, north, and south, each about 40 feet in length and six feet square. The water rushes into these adits from numerous fissures in the chalk in immense abundance. At Winchester, near the Barracks, a well has been sunk 170 feet into the chalk, and near the bottom there are cavities through which the water rushes like a torrent. At Sir Wm. Heathcote's Merdon estate the chalk has been penetrated to the depth of 331 feet, and the water passes across the bottom like a river with a rapid current. At the large well near Brighton the water rises to within nine feet of the surface. At Chiswick, where the boring has been carried 620 feet into the chalk, the water rises four feet above the surface. At the Fulham artesian well the water rises to the surface, and discharges 12,000 cubic feet in twenty-four hours. From many of the Brentford wells the water rushes up several feet above the surface. An artesian well has been sunk in the chalk at the Winchester railroad station which has never been exhausted. During the formation of the well at Watford 1,500,000 gallons of water daily were pumped up—a quantity sufficient to supply 150,000 persons with ten gallons a day. Attempts were made, during the dry summer of 1834, to exhaust the artesian well in Portsmouth Dockyard, which is sunk in the sand overlaying the chalk, but the quantity could not be diminished lower than 21 feet from the bottom. At the formation of an artesian well at Messrs. Reid's brewery, in London, this year, after the shaft had been sunk in the chalk, and water was approached, several driftways were driven laterally for a considerable distance along the faults and veins of flint in the chalk, to collect the water and convey it to the main shaft, by which means nearly 300,000 gallons a day were raised. Artesian wells, indeed, have furnished immense supplies of water even in the hottest and driest summer, and, when sunk in the chalk, those

supplies are increased, and invariably of an unexceptionable quality.

It has been already stated, that, for the purpose of obtaining water, in no part of England has there been a shaft sunk to such a depth as on the Southampton Common, viz., 560 feet, and two most interesting and extraordinary facts have been made evident by that shaft.

It is well known that the chalk stratum appears at the surface a few miles northward of Southampton, and there forms the Winchester hills, and again appears southward in the neighbourhood of Carisbrook, in the Isle of Wight. It was conjectured, by an eminent geologist, that the chalk described a curve beneath the earth from Winchester to the Isle of Wight, and that this curve formed, as it were, a basin on which rested alluvial deposits and London and plastic clay, each stratum of a particular depth at the centre of the basin, cropping out thinner towards the edges. The sinking of the shaft on the Common has confirmed the accuracy of this conjecture in a very remarkable degree.

Again, it is well known that the chalk which appears at the surface at the southern part of the Isle of Wight has been disturbed by some internal convulsion, and, instead of touching the surface in a position approaching to an horizontal one, has been fractured and driven up in a vertical direction; but to what distance that fracture extended it was impossible to say. To those persons who have descended the shaft of the Southampton artesian well it is very evident, from the compactness of the chalk, and the almost perfect horizontal position of the layers of which it is composed, that the fracture could not have extended so far in the direction of Southampton. The chalk beneath the earth, at the works on the Common, has remained unbroken since its formation.

From the magnitude of the shaft and the depth which has been attained at the well near this town, the operations for finding water have become an object of the greatest

interest and curiosity to the scientific portion of the community. Some of the most eminent geologists in this country, including Professor Buckland, Mr. Lyell, and Sir William De la Beche have visited those operations. A number of individuals belonging to scientific bodies in the metropolis have also been attracted to Southampton to examine the well, and all have expressed the utmost anxiety to see it completed.

In many respects the Southampton well bears a resemblance, particularly in the nature of the soils through which the excavations and boring have passed, to the celebrated artesian well in Paris. This well, which has a shaft, however, no way comparable in extent to the one at Southampton, is of the depth of 1700 feet, and many have supposed that the water is forced up from that enormous depth by volcanic agency. Apart, therefore, from considering the Southampton artesian well as a stupendous undertaking, pursued through innumerable difficulties, that great practical benefits are anticipated from it in its supplying an abundance of wholesome water to a rapidly increasing population, and to a vast quantity of yachts, merchant ships, and steamers that leave this port for all parts of the world, no lover of science or inhabitant of Southampton can help viewing an undertaking near this town with curiosity and pleasure, which will, in all probability, when completed, rival the wonder of the French capital in magnitude, interest, and importance.

It would be an obvious injustice if this notice omitted saying, that the superintendent of the works on the Common, Mr. THOMAS DOCWRA, has proved himself to possess a mind most fertile in resources by which he has triumphed over the many obstacles he has encountered, and which will enable him to bring the extraordinary undertaking he superintends to a successful termination.

The Southampton artesian well is situated at an elevation of 120 feet above the level of the sea, which is of a

sufficient height to allow water to flow from the surface into the present reservoirs.

The water from the well has often been analyzed, and proved to be of an excellent quality. The following are the reports of analyses by Messrs. RANDALL and OSBORN, chemists of this town, which were made during the delivery of the water into the reservoirs for the supply of the town about two months since.

Analysis by Mr. RANDALL.—No. I. Water pumped from the well :—One pint imperial contained two grains of solid matter, consisting of carbonate of lime, sulphate magnesia, and chloride sodium. This water is far from objectionable, and I should think perfectly wholesome as a beverage, and not liable to become foul by being kept for any reasonable time.—No. II. As it runs out of the reservoir :—The composition of this sample is similar to No. I. so far as ascertained, but contains less than one-half of solid contents. It is decidedly superior, and in every way fitted for every purpose, domestic or otherwise.

The following is an analysis of the water from the well, since it has been supplied to the town, by Mr. HENRY OSBORN, chemist :—Solid contents in one imperial pint,  $1\frac{3}{4}$  grains ; carbonate of lime, muriate of soda or chloride of sodium, iron, a trace. The iron contained in the above analysis evidently proceeds from a spring, and from the minute quantity that exists, is not sufficient to render it the least injurious to the constitution by its daily use. The non-existence of all sulphates renders the water unusually soft and better adapted for all domestic purposes. It is also found incapable of acting upon lead when kept in tanks composed of that metal, which is of much greater consequence to the public than its actual purity.

The temperature of the water in the well increases proportionably as the earth is penetrated from the surface.
