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

Partial Eclipse of the Moon, visible at Greenwich, October 4; begins 9.39 p.m., ends 11.49 p.m. An Annular Eclipse of the Sun, partly visible at Greenwich, October 19; begins 4.12 p.m., greatest Eclipse 5.9 p.m.

FREEHOLDERS. Of 40s. per annum above rents and charges.—Copyholders. For life or larger estate of the yearly value of £10 above rents and charges.—Leaseholders. Lessee of £10 clear yearly value for not less than sixty years, occupied or not. Lessee of £50 clear yearly value for not less than twenty years.—Occupiers, bond fide liable to a yearly rent of not less than £50.

Purchasers of Freehold or Copyhold property must obtain complete possession on or before January 31st to entitle them to be registered in July next as county voters.

CITIES AND BOROUGHS.

Owners or tenants actually occupying any house, shop, &c., of £10 yearly value, or of such value, together with land of which they are owners, or which they hold under the same landlord; or of premises held in immediate succession. Joint occupiers when premises are of such value as to give £10 yearly to each occupier. The electoral year commences on the 31st July. Occupation of premises must therefore commence on or before that day in 1863 in order to qualify the occupier to be on the Borough Register for 1865. New occupiers of £10 houses, &c., in boroughs should take care that their names are properly inserted on the first poor-rate made after this date.—Freemen.

POST-OFFICE INFORMATION.

RATES OF POSTAGE.—INLAND LETTERS (the Channel Islands included), not exceeding half-an-ounce, are charged one penny. Exceeding half-an-ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, two-pence. Exceeding one ounce, but not exceeding two ounces, four-pence. Exceeding two ounces, but not exceeding three ounces, sixpence; and so on, an additional two-pence for every additional ounce. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped double the amount of such insufficiency. Re-directed letters are charged only a second pre-paid rate of postage.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 8 oz. or fraction thereof 2d., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets may contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. Book packets to India and New South Wales must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight.

STAMPS.—At a post-office—Labels, 1d., 2d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., & 1s.; covers, 2s. 3d. per 2 doz. Colonial and Foreign Letters.—All sent outwards, with few exceptions, must be prepaid by stamps: and those going by private ship must be marked "Ship Letter."

POST-OFFICE ORDERS.—Money orders are granted and paid at every post town in the United Kingdom. The amount for which a single money order can be issued is limited to £10. The following table shows the rates of commission charged on inland and colonial money orders; viz.:—For sums not exceeding £2 (if payable in the United Kingdom), 3d.; not exceeding £5, 6d.; not exceeding £7, 9d.; and not exceeding £10, 1s. To Canada, Victoria, Western and South Australia, Queensland, Cape of Good Hope, and New Zealand, four-fold those sums; to Malta or Gibraltar three-fold. Any money order, issued and payable in the United Kingdom, not applied for before the expiration of the second calendar month after that in which it was issued, becomes lapsed and a new order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the order be not paid within a twelvemonth all claim to the money will be forfeited.

POST-OFFICE SAVINGS' BANK REGULATIONS.

1. Open every day, Sundays excepted.

2. Even shillings to any amount from one shilling upwards may be put in; but not more than £30 in a year, nor more than £150 altogether.

3. No charge made for depositors' books (except when lost), then is, will be charged for replacing.

4. Interest 2½ per cent., i.e. ½d. per pound per month direct Government security.
5. Friendly and Charity Societies and Penny Banks may deposit to any amount.

- 6. Other savings' banks (not being post-office savings' banks) may be required to transfer accounts to this post-office savings' bank.
- 7. This post-office savings' bank may be required to transfer accounts to other savings' banks which are not post-office savings' banks.

8. Persons opening an account at one bank may take their books and make deposits at any other post-office savings' bank, or withdraw deposits.

- 9. No charge made for the postage of correspondence with the chief savings' bank at the London post-office.
- 10. All or any part of the amount deposited can be withdrawn in a few days after application.

11. Provision is made for deposits by trustees, minors, and married women.

12. Officers of the post-office are strictly prohibited against disclosing the name of any depositor, or any amount paid in or taken out.

RIGHT HON. LORD BRAYBROOKE.

Braybrooke, 5th Baron (Gt. Brit.). Created 1788.—Charles Cornwallis Neville, second son of the third Baron, by the eldest daughter of the second Marquis of Cornwallis (she died 1856). Born at Billingbear 1823; married, 1849, the third daughter of the third Viscount Hawarden; succeeded his brother 1861; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex 1845, and Vice-Lieut. March, 1861; patron of six livings; Visitor of Mag. Coll.. Cambridge, as owner of Audley End. The first Baron was fourth Lord Howard De Walden, who obtained the barony of Braybrooke, with remainder, in default of male issue, to his cousin, the grandfather of the present peer; the third Baron assumed the name of Griffin; but his issue bear the name of Neville. Residences -Audley End, Saffron Walden; Heydon House, Royston, Herts; Billingbear, Wokingham, Berks. Town Residence—42, Upper Brook-street.

Heir presumptive, his brother, Hon. and Rev. Latimer; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

Braybrooke, Dowager Lady (Peer's widow).—Charlotte Sarah, fifth daughter of the second Lord Norbury, by the only daughter and heir of William Brabazon, Esq., of New Park, county Mayo. Born 1826; married, 1852, the fourth Lord Braybrooke, who died 1861.

RIGHT HON. VISCOUNT MAYNARD.

MAYNARD, 3rd Viscount. Created 1766; Baron Maynard, 1766 (Gt. Brit.); Bart., 1681 (Eng.).—Henry Maynard, son of the Rev. Henry Maynard (2nd son of the 1st Viscount), born 1786; married 1810 the only daughter of the late Reginald Rabett, Esq., of Bramfield Hall, Suffolk (she died 1857); succeeded his uncle in 1824; is Lord-Lieutenant and Vice-Admiral of Essex; patron of six livings. The pedigree is clearly traced to the Conquest, and the family at first resided in Devonshire. The present peer is descended from Sir Henry Maynard, secretary to Lord Treasurer Burleigh, whose eldest son was created a baron, which title became extinct with the sixth possessor; that peer, however, obtained another barony and

viscounty with remainder to the present Viscount's grandfather. Residences—38, Grosvenor-square, London, W; Easton Lodge, Dunmow.

Heir, his son Hon. Charles Henry, born 1814; married first, 1840, Lady Frances Julia, youngest daughter of 1st Baron Glenlyon, and sister of the 6th Duke of Athole (she died 1858); secondly, 1860, the second daughter of Henry Fitzroy, Esq., of Salcey Lawn, Northamptonshire; was appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant for Essex in 1844; Colonel of

the Essex Rifles, 1854; was formerly a Lieutenant Royal Horse Guards.

RIGHT HON. LORD PETRE.

Petre, 12th Baron (Eng.). Created 1603.—William Bernard Petre, son of the eleventh Baron, by his first wife, the eldest daughter of Sir Richard Bedingfield, Bart. (she died 1822). Born at Thorndon, 1817; married, 1843, the eldest daughter of the Hon. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. The first Baron represented Essex in parliament; he was only son of Sir William Petre, Secretary of State, temp. Henry VIII., Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth. Residences—57, Portland-place, W.; Thorndon-hall, near

Heir, his son, the Hon. William Joseph, born at Learnington 1847.

RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh. Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard

Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Baroness was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Seat—Terling Place, Witham.

Heir, his son, Hon. John William, born at Langford Grove, Nov. 12, 1842; Deputy-Lieutenant and Magistrate for Essex, 1864.

THE LORD BISHOP OF ROCHESTER.

ROCHESTER, 96th Bishop of. Founded 604.—Right Rev. Joseph Cotton Wigram, D.D., son of the late Sir Robert Wigram, first Baronet, by his second wife, the youngest daughter of John Watts, Esq. Born at Walthamstow, 1798; married, 1837, the daughter of Peter Arkwright, Esq., of Willersley, Matlock (she died 1864). Educated by private tuition, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he obtained a scholarship; ordained 1822; priest 1823; appointed Secretary to the National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor 1827; Preacher-Assistant at St. James', Westminster, 1827; Rector of East Tisted, Hants, 1839; Archdeacon of Winchester, 1845; Rector of St. Mary's, Southampton, 1850; and 96th Bishop of Rochester, 1860; has published pamphlets, sermons, charges in the archdeaconry, &c.; patron of the archdeaconries and 60 livings. The diocese includes the Archdeaconry of Rochester, with the counties of Essex and Herts; annual value £5,000. Residences-5, Montagu-street, London, W.C.; 15, Grosvenor-square, London, W.; and Danbury Palace, near Chelmsford.

THE DOWAGER COUNTESS WALDEGRAVE.

Waldegrave, Dowager Countess (Peer's Widow).—Frances Elizabeth Anne, daughter of Mr. John Braham, the well-known vocalist. Married, first, John James Waldegrave, Esq., of Navestock; secondly, 1840, the seventh Earl Waldegrave, who died 1846; thirdly, 1847, George Granville Vernon-Harcourt, Esq., who died 1861: fourthly, 1863, the Hon. Chichester Samuel Fortescue, M.P. for Louth county. Residences-Dudbrook House, Navestock; Strawberry-hill, Twickenham; and 7, Carlton Gardens, London, S.W.

ABDY, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1849.—Sir Thomas Neville Abdy, only son of the late Captain Anthony Abdy, E.N., by the daughter of Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Born 1810; marred, 1841, the second daughter of Rowland Alston, Esq., of Pishiobury, Herts.; was educated at St. John's Coll. Cam., where he graduated B.A. 1833; was M.r. for Lyme Regis from 1847 to 1852; was an unsuccessful candidate for Maldon in 1841. The Baronet's grandfather, the Rev. Thomas Abdy Rutherforth, assumed the surname of Abdy, in lieu of his patronymic, on inheriting, through his mother, the estate of Sir JohnAbdy, the fourth Baronet, of Albyn's, whose title, created in 1660, became extinct in 1759. Seat—Albyn's, Romford. Heir—His son William Neville, born in Eaton Place, London, 1844.

BROWN, Sir William, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1863.—Born 1784; married, 1810, Sarah, second daughter of Andrew Gihon, Esq., of Ballymena, Antrim. Seate—Richmond Hill, Liverpool; and Sampford Hall, Braintree. Heir—His grandson, William Richmond, born 1840.

BUXTON, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1840.—Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, M.A., son of Sir E. N. Buxton (late M.P. for South Essex), the second Baronet, by the second daughter of Samuel Gurney, Esq., of Ham House. Born 1837; succeeded his father in 1858; educated at Harrow, and at Trinity College, Cambridge; is a partner in the brewery of Truman, Hanbury, and Co.; Major 1st Bn. Tower Hamlets R.V.; a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk 1859, and of Essex 1860; married, June 12, 1862, Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl and Countess of Gainsborough. The first Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the abolition of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 1625. Residences—Colne House, near Cromer, Norfolk; Warlies, Waltham Abbey. Heir pres.—His brother Samuel Gurney, born 1838.

DE CRESPIGNY, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1805.—Sir Claude William CHAMPION DE CRESPIGNY, son of Captain Augustus James Champion de Crespigny, R.N., by the daughter of Sir William Smijth, Bart. Born in Grosvenor-square 1818; married, 1843, the second daughter of Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1829; educated at Winchester School, and at Trinity College, Cambridge (M.A. 1840); appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852; Captain 6th Essex Volunteer Rifles 1859;

Lieutenant-Colonel 1st Bn. ditto 1860. The present Baronet's great grandfather received his title after an entertainment given to the Prince of Wales, and being created a Baronet resumed the prefix of "de," which anciently belonged to the family. His successor was M.P. for Southampton, and married a sister of the last Earl of Plymouth (extinct). This family was founded in England by Claude Champion, Sieur de Crespigny, in Normandy, who quitted France at the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Residence—Wyvenhoe Hall,

Colchester. Heir-His son Claude, R.N., born in Cadogan Place 1847.

FOSTER, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Rev. Sir Cavendish Hervey Foster, second son of the late Right Hon. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; educated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842; has been rector of Thoydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Thoydon Garnon Rectory; and 5, Whitehall-yard. Heir—Hisson, John Frederic, born 1847.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1813.—Sir Brydges Powell Hen-NIKER, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas. Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1849; appointed Ensign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854; Lieutenant 1855; Captain 1858; retired 1859; a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1858; Captain West Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieutenant-General in the army. Seat-Newton Hall, near Danmow. Heir-His son, Frederick Brydges Major, born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Frederick William HEYGATE, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmurdo. Esq., of Upper Clapton, Middlesex (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent. 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena, county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1844; M.A. 1847; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. The family is descended from the Heygates of Rendlesham, in Suffolk, and Feering, in Essex, subsequently, about the middle of the 16th century, seated at Hayes, in Middlesex. Residences—Southend; Roecliffe, Leicestershire; Bellarena, county Londonderry. Heir—His son Frederick Gage, born at Bellarena, 1854.

KEY, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom:) Created 1831.—Sir Kingsmill Grove Key, only

surviving son of Sir John, the first Baronet, by the youngest daughter of Francis Green, Esq., of Denmark Hill, and of Dorking, Surrey. Born 1815; married first, 1842, the second daughter of G. H. Hahn, Esq., of The Orchard, Wandsworth; secondly, 1859, the fourth daughter of the late Joseph Armstrong, Esq., of Manchester (she died same year); succeeded his father in 1858; appointed Captain 21st Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1862; is a partner in the firm of Burgess and Key, of the Victoria Works, Brentwood.

The first Baronet was a London Alderman, Lord Mayor in 1830-31, &c.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Len-NARD, son of the late Thomas Barrett-Lennard, Esq. (who died 1856), by his second wife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Aldham Hall, Suffolk. Born 1826; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1860. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Belhus, Aveley; Aldham Hall, Suffolk; Clones, county Monaghan; 7, Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9, Hyde-park-terrace. Heir—His son, Thomas, born 1853.

LESLIE, 7th Bart. (Scotland.) Created 1665.—Sir Charles Henry Leslie, only son of Sir Norman, the sixth Baronet, by the third daughter of the late Major Robert Wood Smith, of the 6th Bengal Light Cavalry. Born at Lahore, in Bengal, 1848; succeeded his father in 1857; is at Dreghorn College, near Edinburgh; appointed Cornet Essex Yeomanry Cavalry, 1863; is descended from the third Earl of Rothes. Heir pres.-His.

granduncle Thomas Leslie, of the War Office; born at Findrassie.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Henry Bouverie Pauler ST.-John Mildman, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavalry 1861; High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed the name of Mildmay. Residence—Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir—His son, Henry Paulet St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 3rd Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795 .- Sir RICHARD DIGBY NEAVE, son of Sir Thomas, the second Baronet, by the daughter of the late Very Rev. William Digby. Dean of Durham. Born 1793; married, 1827, the youngest daughter of the ninth Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849); succeeded his father in 1848; educated at St.

Mary's Hall, Oxford (B.A. 1815); is author of "Four Days in Connemara." Residence—Daguam Park, Romford. Heir—His son Arundell Neave, born 1829; appointed Captain

3rd Dragoon Guards 1857.

SELWIN, 6th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1748.—Sir John Thomas Selwin, fourth son of the late Sir James Ibbetson, second Baronet (who died 1795), by the daughter of J. Caygill, Esq., of Shaw House, Yorkshire. Born 1784; married, 1825, daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks (she was born 1803); succeeded his nephew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1825. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat—Down Hall, Harlow. Heir—His son Henry John, born 1826; married, 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord Lyndhurst.

SMLJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir William Bowyer-Smijth, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (now Dowager Lady Bowyer-Smijth). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took honors in 1837; appointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of three livings. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Resistences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk. Heir—His son William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.

SOAME, 8th Bart. (England.) Created 1697.—Sir John Buckworth Herne-Soame, second son of the sixth Baronet, by the daughter of Stephen Simperingham, Esq., of Cambridge. Succeeded to the title on the death of his brother 1860. Seat—Heydon House, near Saffron Walden. Heir pres.—His brother Charles.

TYRELL, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1809.—Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, son of first Baronet, by the only daughter and heir of William Tyssen, Esq., of Waltham House, Herts. Born 1795; married, 1819, eldest daughter and co-heir of the late Sir Thomas Pilkington, Bart. (from whom he is divorced); succeeded his father in 1832; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex, and was Colonel of the West Essex Militia from 1831 to 1852; was M.P. for Essex in 1830; was unsuccessful in 1831, but sat from 1832 to 1857. This family is said to be descended from Sir Walter Tyrell, temp. William Rufus. Residence—Boreham House, Chelmsford.

WAKE, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1621.—SIR WILLIAM WAKE, son of Sir Charles, the 10th baronet, by his second wife, Charlotte, second daughter of Crawford Tait, Esq., of Harriestown, N.B. Born 1823; married, 1844, Margaret Anne, eldest daughter of Henry Tricker, Esq., of Southampton; succeeded his father 1864; is a magistrate for the county; was appointed captain Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1864. Archbishop Wake, of Canterbury, was a younger son of this family, being descended from William Wake, uncle to the 1st baronet. Seat—Courteenhall, Northampton. Heir—His son, Herewarld. WESTERN, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1864.—Sir Thomas Burch Western,

Created 1864.—Sir Thomas Burch Western, son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Western, k.t.s., of Tattingstone Place, Suffolk, by Mary, daughter of Thomas Burch, Esq., of Bermuda. Born 1795; was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1818, M.A. 1824; married, 1819, Margaret Letitia, third daughter of William Bushby, Esq., of Kirkmichael, county Dumfries; succeeded in 1844 to the estates of his relative, the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct; is magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex; was High Sheriff of Essex in 1850. The family is descended from Lady Anne Plantagenet, wife of Bourchier, Earl of Ewe, and grand-daughter of Edward III.; was settled in London temp. Henry VII.; and Samuel Western was baron of the Cinque Ports temp. William III. Seats—Felix Hall, Kelvedon; Tattingstone, Suffolk. BENEVOLENT INSTITUTIONS, &c.

ESSEX REFORMATORY SCHOOL.

This Institution is in the parish of Harlow, but a distance from the town, in the neighbourhood of Moor Hall, the seat of J. Perry Watlington, Esq., M.P., who is chairman of the Board of Managers, and the chief mover in the opening of this retreat, where the wild young criminals of the county, when caught by the law, may be tamed and trained by religious and industrial discipline into good citizens. A meeting of the gentlemen of the county was held in 1855 for the purpose of establishing the school, and a subscription was entered into for that object. The Institution was opened in the year following. It has thus been in operation eight years; and it must be added, in justice to its philanthropic founders, that it has made a visible impression upon juvenile crime in the county, as the calendar and commitments testify. The nature of the school would not be perceived by a casual passer by. There is nothing of the character of a gaol about it. The house itself is of red brick, surrounded by a well-kept garden, inclosed with low palings. Thorough cleanliness and order reign within. There are upon the ground floor a kitchen and a laboratory, and a day, dining, and school room for the boys. Above the mantelpiece of the latter is a respect board, on which the names of the most worthy and wellconducted are inscribed as a mark of honor, and an encouragement to othersthe system of government being based more upon a desire to train and strengthen the good qualities of the boys than upon terror, though, of course, punishments are at times necessary, and a dark cell is provided for the refractory. The apartments of Mr. Chaplin, the superintendent, and of the matron, are so provided that an observant eye can at any moment be brought speedily upon their charge. The sleeping room for the boys is a large and light apartment, rows of narrow iron bedsteads running down each side, ready means of surveillance being also here provided. There are 40 acres of land attached, and the boys, allowing them due time for school and other duties, are employed in its cultivation, thus assisting in their own support, as well as being properly trained for labor in after life. The number of boys in the school in January, 1864, was 24. From its foundation it has received 68, several of whom have been placed in situations in the colonies. The income of the school, derived from annual subscriptions, is about £70, and last year its farm account yielded £202 9s. 4d.

ESSEX COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

This Institution stands a short distance out of Brentwood, on the brow of the hill, leading up from that town to Warley. It is a fine building, in the mediæval style, of the Tudor period, and its pinnacles and the spire of its chapel give it a very picturesque appearance. The first stone was laid in 1851, and it was opened in September, 1853, the total cost of the erection being £89,557; but further sums have since been voted for the purchase of land and extensions. The money was borrowed by the county, to be repaid by instalments in 30 years. The sum paid last year by the different Unions for their patients was £12,774 10s. 11d., and the total receipts, including the produce of the garden and farm, was £13,68512s.51d.; the expenditure £13,552 7s. 0d. The present number of patients is 548-230 males, and 318 females. Accommodation for 75 patients was obtained in 1863 by the erection of three cottages, with a spacious dining-hall, at a cost of about £9,000.

In order that the cause of those who require relief may be examined and dealt with by persons locally acquainted with them, courts are held in the different districts defined by the charter, viz., Brentwood, Colchester, Saffron Walden, Dunmow, Ware, and St. Alban's; and besides these, an annual court is held at Chelmsford in October, at which the accounts are audited, and the surplus of the year is given to the most destitute applicants. There is also an exhibition fixed for the sons of poor clergymen during their residence at one of the universities. Every subscriber of 5s. is a member of the charity, may attend the courts, and give his advice and vote in the distribution of its funds. There is a steward of the charity in every rural deanery, who will at all times be thankful to receive subscriptions, and forward to each subscriber an annual report, which may also be obtained from Mr. S. W. Maryon, the secretary, at Chelmsford, who receives subscriptions, and will supply all further particulars.

CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighbouring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828, at a cost of £57,289 17s. 03d., and enlarged and arranged, 15 years ago, at a further outlay of £36,000; and here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighbourhood; but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church, in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel, apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the county Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice, and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad, with the Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal—a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it, we believe, a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of 3,000 volumes.

COLCHESTER is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Parliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23,815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactures except the silk factory of Mr. Brown, which employs about 250 hands, and the large wholesale tailoring establishments of Messrs. Hyem, Messrs. Moses, Mr. Hurst, Mrs. Hammond, Messrs. Fraser and King, and Mr. Stickney, there being about 2,500 women and 200 men employed in this trade. It has good communication both by land and by water, the Great Eastern line running within a mile of the town; while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 tons. This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are now all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdomthe veritable Camulodunum and the traces of the imperial rulers with which the soil teems, together with the relics of them, in the shape of coins, urns, and remnants of their buildings of late years brought to light, have given substantial confirmation to a fact time had otherwise left in some mistiness. Legend, too, claims the town, though with less appearance of probability, as the birth-place of St. Helena, the mother of the first christian emperor; while descending to the era of better authenticated history, it is certain the place flourished under the Normans, and the protection of Eudo Dapifer, to whose share among the Conqueror's retinue it fell. These associations, and the memorable siege it stood from the army of Fairfax in 1648, which partially demolished many of its old buildings, and ended with the execution of Sir Charles I was and Sir George Light in the Castle Bailey have left it Charles Lucas and Sir George Lisle in the Castle Bailey, have left it rich with spots full of historic interest and old ruins—the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archæological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the pastwhich may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. The borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. It is now governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, 18 Councillors, a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £450; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £800; making a total annual income of about £2,550. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough rate. The expenditure last year exceeded £4,000. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed by law to the Corporation; and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it some-times amounting to £14,000 a year The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I.; and its fairs are also of very ancient date

The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, gives to it an air of military life, and the martial activity will be largely increased when the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Europe, are completed. At present they are partly erected, and occupied by a detachment of the 16th (Queen's) Lancers, which are expected to proceed in the course of this year for service in India. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. The handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000: a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension; the Cattle Market, which was removed from the High-Street a year ago to North Hill, having also greatly increased. Nor among its public buildings must we forget its healing and almost holy institutions—the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, now exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 patients. A fine new white brick-built railway station, with station master's residence in the upper story, is in the course of erection for the Great Eastern Railway Company, by Messrs. Perry and Judson, contractors, of Stratford. The new building is on the site of the old station on the down side.

HARWICH-a hamlet to the parish of Dovercourt-is a borough and sea-port town, situate on a peninsula, on the coast of Essex, near the estuaries of the Stour and Orwell, in the hundred of Tendring. It is $42\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.E. by E. from Chelmsford, and 714 miles N.E. by E. from London. It has been a place of some trading importance from very early times, and has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The town was made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II .- the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen, and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is annually chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the clift above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, and a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821, at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses, the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The railway runs up to the town from the main line, and a regular traffic in goods and in foreign cattle for the London market is carried on as well as a good passenger traffic. This has caused so vast an increase to the traffic on this branch that it is said an extra line of rails is to be added. The Great Eastern Railway Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Several steamboats ply between here and Ipswich daily, and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer, and upwards of 150,000 people paid a visit to this delightful watering place during the summer of 1864. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vaux, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

MALDON is a neat little borough town, with a look of antiquity about it, though the hand of improvement, especially in its shop fronts, has somewhat altered its character of late years. It stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river navigable for vessels of 70 or 80 tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. Its income altogether, including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port is free, and the ruling powers levy no tolls on vessels coming into it. The

borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and in that limit a number of fishing boats are employed, but the practice of the corporation granting licences to them for this purpose, which at one time prevailed, has fallen into disuse. Within the borough and the precincts round about there are various objects of interest to be visited. The old Town-hall itself, if not for the beauty of its architecture, at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Priory of Carmelite Friars. And, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing many rare works, left to the town by Dr. Plume.

At the fast rising village of Heybridge are the extensive agricultural engineering works of Mr. E. H. Bentall, occupying a large extent of ground, covered with fine ranges of shops for foundry, turning, and fitting purposes. From these are turned out machines which are sent to all parts of Europe and the far distant colonies. In connexion with the works there is one building particularly deserving of notice, namely, the warehouse for the reception of finished machines, especially constructed for the export trade. This fine building is about 300 feet long, four stories high, and capable of holding from 12,000 to 15,000 machines ready for delivery. The number of hands employed at these works is about 300. The spirited proprietor has raised, entirely at his own expense, an engineer corps numbering 120, a cadet corps of 80, and a brass band of 30 performers, and of which he is the captain; he has erected a spacious hall for the purposes of drill, to which are attached an armoury and reading-room for those employed at the works. There is also a school for the children of the workmen, with a certificated master and schoolmistress, supported solely by the proprietor.—[See advertisement, pages 34-38.]

SAFFRON WALDEN

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

Number of Burgesses on the roll 841

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the pre triest little towns in the county, takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it here has ceased for a century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensive scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with antiquities, the remnant of the castle, the earth works on the south, and the curious work in the chalk on the Common, attesting its importance in old times, the appearance of the place itself shows that there is modern life and spirit in it. The streets, of which there are several, have been much inproved

of late years by good shops and buildings. A convenient cattle market has been provided. A handsome Corn-exchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town-hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected in the town, built by money left for the purpose by the late H. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke. The design was prepared by Mr. W. Beck, architect, and the builders were Messrs. W. Bell and Son, of Cambridge. The contract was £4,206. The hospital has accommodation for 26 beds. In the market place is a handsome Drinking Fountain, lately erected, the gift of Mrs. Gibson and G. S. Gibson, Esq. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley-end, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. There are few mansions in the county so profusely rich in the paintings of the first and finest masters. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 years. It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

Braintree and Bocking are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, which, as the capital of the Northern Division of Essex, is the place where the election of Members of Parliament for the district takes place. It is here, too, that the petty sessional and other official business of South Hinckford is transacted. The town itself is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and, in the time of Elizabeth, Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited by cloth-makers. The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great firm of Messrs. Courtauld employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighbourhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of FOR 1865

rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the wellknown suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn-exchange, erected in 1839, at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

This is a town which has been much improved and extended since the opening of the railway; and the Lunatic Asylum and Warley Barracks, in the immediate vicinity, give it a county importance. It is a place of very ancient note, and in Roman Catholic times was a halting place for pilgrims to the shrine of St. Thomas à Becket, and the little chapel in the town was built partly for their This was once the assize town for Essex. COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

This town stands pleasantly on the banks of partly on a declivity-Sunny-hill, as it was called in old times-and, with the memories which belong to the old Abbey of white monks, founded by Maud and King Stephen, and the remnants still scattered about, is a place of interest to the antiquarian. It is, as a manufacturing town, however, that in modern times it owes its importance. The Flemings settled here, and Coggeshall was celebrated for their cloths. Fortunes of hundreds of thousands of pounds were made by this branch of industry. Silk is now its staple manufacture, a large number of the population being employed in its production; but there are other factories, and a large number in the town and neighbourhood are engaged in the tambour trade. The chief mansion of the parish is Oldfield Grange, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, Esq.—one of the Abbey Granges, converted, in the 16th century, into the home of a country gentleman. The church is a noble

building, and has of late years been thoroughly restored.

DUNMOW, which has a celebrity, almost world-wide, from its flitch, is a clean and quiet little town, with three principal streets, branching off as from a centre to Stortford, Walden, and Chelmsford. EPPING AND HARLOW.

These two towns, lying four miles apart, have been literally hewn out of the forest, by which they are still partially surrounded; and they occupy a very picturesque part of the county. Epping, whose sausages used to be a substantial matter of manufacture and profit in the locality, but are now a mere tradition, stands upon high ground which commands fine views over the country and the adjacent forest. It has several places of interest to the antiquarian in its vicinity, among them Amersbury Banks, alleged to have been the scene of Boadicea's great battle with the Romans; while the fine mansion of Copt Hall lies about a mile on the road to London; and The Grove and other good mansions are scattered around. Before railways it was a town of considerable traffic, lying on the high road to Newmarket and Cambridge; and Stokes' posting-house at Epping Place still lingers in the minds of some old members of the turf and the university; but the navvies are now completing a line to the town to bring back part of the life they took away.

Harlow is a clean little town above the vale of the Stort, with still something of that ancient character about it to which it can lay claim, but with some good modern inns, and a few handsome houses. With its interesting church, restored with liberality and good taste, the beautiful mansion, grounds, and park of Moor Hall, the seat of J. W. Perry Watlington, Esq., a mile to the eastward, and the Reformatory School, the parish has attractions for the lover of the picturesque and the philanthropist. Bush Common, at Potter-street, where the great cattle fairs are held, and the Essex Archery Society has its meeting and its assembly rooms, is a hamlet two miles and a half from the

town.

HALSTED

Is pleasantly situated on a hill side; there is as much progress and improvement visible in it as in any other town in the county. Much of this is attributable to the spirit with which it has secured railway connexion. has a good Institute and a Public Hall. The mother church has been restored, and two new ones erected in outlying districts a few years ago; and it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street, founded by Lady Mary Ramsey in 1594, in which, under the new Chancery scheme, the number of free scholars is about 100. A considerable part of the working population are engaged in the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighbourhood, but not to any great extent. The market, which has recently been restored, was once a royal one, as belonging to the King, and was held on the hill in Saxon times. The town has been recently paved, at a cost of £1,200, by the Local Board, who have also expended upwards of £5,000 in providing water supply and drainage.

HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and as such was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornchurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, and an Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849, at a cost of £7,000, on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV.

The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering, and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford, and is a pleasant rural village, commanding from its position extensive and beautiful views over parts of the county. It has some good mansions, among others Pyrgo Park, which was the residence of several of the Queens, being held by them as dowry; and there are few who will not feel interest in a visit to the little brick parish church, which is reputed to be the olden royal palace.

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ONGAR (CHIPPING AND HIGH) AND GREENSTED.

CHIPPING ONGAR is a pleasant little town, the head of the Hundred, and, as its name implies, was the ancient market place of the district, though it appears to have greatly declined in population and traffic to what it was of old. It was a Roman station, a market town in Saxon times; and the remains of the old feudal castle of Richard de Lucy, which lie near the town at the back of Mr. Coe's farm, attest it to have been of no slight importance under the Norman lords. SOUTHEND AND PRITTLEWELL.

PRITTLEWELL is, from its position on a hill-top above the Thames, a very picturesque village. It has a fine church-"the fairest in the Hundred," as it was described of old; and the Priory near by, the seat of Daniel Scratton, Esq., is a handsome mansion, standing upon the site of the old monastery. But Prittlewell is chiefly important as being the parent parish of the delightful wateringplace of Southend, on the banks of the river a mile off, with Sheerness opposite, and the mouth of the Thames a short distance below. WEST HAM.

CHURCH-STREET WARD.

(COMPRISING CANNING TOWN, FOREST GATE, AND UPTON.)

This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaistow Wards. There are also five divisions for ecclesiastical purposes, and others are in contemplation; these are rendered necessary from the erection of a number of district churches. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow bridge, under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was built by Matilda, the wife of Henry I., who is represented by the old historians as a woman of great piety, and who, having been endangered by crossing the ford, had a bridge erected, and gave to the abbey of Barking certain lands and a mill to keep the same in repair. The abbey at Stratford was not then founded. At a subsequent period the abbot of Stratford bought the lands and mill of the abbot of Barking and undertook the charge of the bridge. The bridge is rendered historical also from being the first arched bridge built in England. The old bridge was pulled down and a new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12,000. The establishment of large ship-building works on the banks of the Thames; the Victoria Docks; the extensive works of the Great Eastern Railway at Stratford, besides other large commercial undertakings, have rendered West Ham one of the most important and improving parishes in the eastern suburbs of the metropolis. The population exceeds 44,000.

WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times when the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of Essex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the soldiers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and was first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew off to what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was at one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the Grove being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavon-street, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.

Purchasers of Freehold or Copyhold property must obtain complete possession on or before January 31st to entitle them to be registered in July next as county voters.

Owners or tenants actually occupying any house, shop, &c., of £10 yearly value, or of such value, together with land of which they are owners, or which they hold under the same landlord; or of premises held in immediate succession. Joint occupiers when premises are of such value as to give £10 yearly to each occupier. The electoral year commences on the 31st July. Occupation of premises must therefore commence on or before that day in 1865 in order to qualify the occupier to be on the Borough Register for 1866. New occupiers of £10 houses, &c., in boroughs should take care that their names are properly inserted on the first poor-rate made after this date.—Freemen.

Exceeding two ounces, but not exceeding two and a half ounces, fivepence; and so on.

an additional half penny for every additional ounce. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped double the amount of such insufficiency. Re-directed letters are charged only a second pre-paid rate of postage. If

coin be enclosed in a letter, the letter will be registered and charged double.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 8 oz. or fraction thereof 2d., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets may contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. Book packets to India and New South Wales must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight.

STAMPS.—At a post-office—Labels, 1d., 2d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., & 1s.; covers, 2s. 3d. per 2 doz. POST-OFFICE ORDERS.—Money orders are granted and paid at every post town in the United Kingdom. The amount for which a single money order can be issued is limited to £10. The following table shows the rates of commission charged on inland and colonial money orders; viz.:—For sums not exceeding £2 (if payable in the United Kingdom), 3d.; not exceeding £5, 6d.; not exceeding £7, 9d.; and not exceeding £10, 1s. To Canada, Victoria, Western and South Australia, Queensland, Cape of Good Hope, and New Zealand, four-fold those sums; to Malta or Gibraltar three-fold. Any money order, issued and payable in the United Kingdom, not applied for before the expiration of the second calendar month after that in which it was issued, becomes lapsed and a new order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the order be not paid within a twelvemonth all claim to the money will be forfeited.

Persons opening an account at one bank may take their books and make deposits at any other post-office savings' bank, or withdraw deposits.—9. No charge made for the postage of correspondence with the chief savings' bank at the London post-office.—10. Officers of the post-office are strictly prohibited against disclosing the name of any depositor, or any amount paid in or taken out.

PEERAGE AND BARONETAGE OF ESSEX. RIGHT HON. LORD DACRE.

DACRE, 22nd Baron (England). Created 1307.—Thomas Crosbie William Trevor, eldest son of the twenty-first Baron by the second daughter of the late Hon. and Rev. Dr. Crosbie, Dean of Limerick (she died 1844). Born 1808; educated at Christ Church, Oxford; married, 1837, Susan Sophia, eldest daughter of the first Lord Chesham (she was born 1817, and was for several years a bed-chamber woman to the Queen); was an unsuccessful candidate for North Essex in 1832, and for Lewes in 1837; was M.P. for Herts from 1847-52; succeeded his father 1853; Lord-Lieutenant of Essex 1865; is a Deputy-Lieutenant for Herts, patron of two livings, and co-heir to the barony of Fitzhugh. The first Baron was a distinguished military commander temp. Edward II. and III.; the daughter of the 6th Baron married Sir Richard Fiennes, and carried the title into that family; the sister of the 10th Baron carried the title into the Lennard family; a descendant of hers married the daughter of the fifteenth Lord Dacre, who succeeded as Baroness Dacre; and their representative in the female line, Henry Otway, twenty-first Baron, in 1824 assumed the surname of Trevor in lieu of Brand; the fifteenth Lord Dacre was created Earl of Sussex, a title

which expired with him. Residence—The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts.

Heir presumptive, his brother Hon. Henry Bouverie William Brand; born 1814;
married, 1838, Eliza, daughter of Lieut.-General Ellice; was for some time private secretary to Sir George Grey; was a Lord of the Treasury from 1855-58; is a magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Sussex, and Keeper of the Privy Seal to H.R.H. the Prince

of Wales; has been M.P. for Lewes since 1852.

RIGHT HON. LORD BRAYBROOKE.

Braybrooke, 5th Baron (Gt. Brit.). Created 1788.—Charles Cornwallis Neville, second son of the third Baron, by the eldest daughter of the second Marquis of Cornwallis (she died 1856). Born at Billingbear 1823; married, 1849, the third daughter of the third Viscount Hawarden; succeeded his brother 1861; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex 1845, and Vice-Lieut. from 1861-5; patron of six livings; Visitor of Mag. Coll., Cambridge, as owner of Audley End. The first Baron was fourth Lord Howard De Walden, who obtained the barony of Braybrooke, with remainder, in default of male issue, to his cousin, the grandfather of the present peer; the third Baron assumed the name of Griffin; but his issue bear the name of Neville. Residences -Audley End, Saffron Walden; Heydon House, Royston, Herts; Billingbear,

Wokingham, Berks. Town Residence—42, Upper Brook-street.

Heir presumptive, his brother, Hon. and Rev. Latimer Neville; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

Braybrooke, Dowager Lady (Peer's widow).—Charlotte Sarah, fifth daughter of the second Lord Norbury, by the only daughter and heir of William Brabazon, Esq., of New Park, county Mayo. Born 1826; married, 1852, the fourth Lord Braybrooke, who died 1861.

RIGHT HON. LORD PETRE.

Petre, 12th Baron (Eng.). Created 1603.—William Bernard Petre, son of the eleventh Baron, by his first wife, the eldest daughter of Sir Richard Bedingfield, Bart. (she died 1822). Born at Thorndon, 1817; married, 1843, the eldest daughter of the Hon. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. The first Baron represented Essex in parliament; he was only son of Sir William Petre, Secretary of State, temp. Henry VIII., Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth. Residences-57, Portland-place, W.; Thorndon-hall, near

Heir, his son, the Hon. William Joseph, born at Leamington 1847.

RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh. Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Baroness was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Seat—Terling Place, Witham.

Heir, his son, Hon. John William, born at Langford Grove, Nov. 12, 1842; Deputy-Lieutenant and Magistrate for Essex, 1864; Senior Wrangler and 1st Smith's prizeman

for 1865.

THE LORD BISHOP OF ROCHESTER.

Rochester, 96th Bishop of. Founded 604.—Right Rev. Joseph Cotton Wigram, D.D., son of the late Sir Robert Wigram, first Baronet, by his second wife, the youngest daughter of John Watts, Esq. Born at Walthamstow, 1798; married, 1837, the daughter of Peter Arkwright, Esq., of Willersley, Matlock (she died 1864). Educated by private tuition, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he obtained a scholarship; ordained 1822; took priest's orders 1823; appointed Secretary to the National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor 1827; Preacher-Assistant at St. James', Westminster, 1827; Rector of East Tisted, Hants, 1839; Archdeacon of Winchester, 1845; Rector of St. Mary's, Southampton, 1850; and 96th Bishop of Rochester, 1860; has published pamphlets, sermons, charges in his archdeaconry and diocese; patron of the archdeaconries and 60 livings. The diocese includes the Archdeaconry of Rochester, with the counties of Essex, except the deanery of Barking, and Herts; annual value £5,000. Residences—5, Montagu-street, London, W.C.; 15A, Grosvenor-square, London, W.; and Danbury Palace, near Chelmsford.

THE DOWAGER COUNTESS WALDEGRAVE.

Waldegrave, Countess (Peer's Widow).—Frances Elizabeth Anne, daughter of Mr. John Braham, the well-known vocalist. Married, first, John James Waldegrave, Esq., of Navestock; secondly, 1840, the seventh Earl Waldegrave, who died 1846; thirdly, 1847, George Granville Vernon-Harcourt, Esq., who died 1861; fourthly, 1863, the Right Hon. Chichester Samuel Fortescue, M.P. for Louth county (he was born 1823). Residences—Dudbrook House, Navestock; Chewton Priory, Somersetshire; Red House, Ardee, Ireland; Strawberry-hill, Twickenham; and 7, Carlton Gardens, London, S.W.

ABDY, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1849.—Sir Thomas Neville Abdy, only son of the late Captain Anthony Abdy, R.N., by the daughter of Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Born 1810; married, 1841, the second daughter of Rowland Alston, Esq., of Pishobury, Herts.; was educated at St. John's Coll., Cam., where he graduated R.A. 1833; was M.P. for Lyme Regis from 1847 to 1852; was an unsuccessful candidate for Maldon in 1841. The Baronet's grandfather, the Rev. Thomas Abdy Rutherforth, assumed the surname of Abdy, in lieu of his patronymic, on inheriting, through his mother, the estate of Sir John Abdy, the fourth Baronet, of Albyns, whose title, created in 1660, became extinct in 1759. Seat—Albyns, Romford. Heir—His son William Neville, born in Eaton Place, London, 1844.

BUXTON, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1840.—Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, M.A., son of Sir E. N. Buxton (late M.P. for South Essex), the second Baronet, by the second daughter of Samuel Gurney, Esq., of Ham House. Born 1837; succeeded his father in 1858; educated at Harrow, and at Trinity College, Cambridge; is a partner in the brewery of Truman, Hanbury, and Co.; Major 1st Bn. Tower Hamlets R.V.; M.P. for Lynn; a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk 1859, and of Essex 1860; married, June, 1862, Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough. The first Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the abolition of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 1625. Residences—Colne House, near Cromer, Norfolk; Warlies, Waltham Abbey. Heir—His son T. Fowell Victor, born April 8, 1865.

DE CRESPIGNY, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1805.—Sir CLAUDE WILLIAM CHAMPION DE CRESPIGNY, son of Captain Augustus James Champion de Crespigny, E.N.,

by the daughter of Sir William Smijth, Bart. Born in Grosvenor-square 1818; mar. ied. 1843, the second daughter of Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1829; educated at Winchester School, and at Trinity College, Cambridge (M.A. 1840); appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852; Captain 6th Essex Volunteer Rifles 1859; Lieutenant-Colonel 1st Bn. ditto 1860. The present Baronet's great grandfather received his title after an entertainment given to the Prince of Wales, and being created a Baronet resumed the prefix of "de," which anciently belonged to the family. His successor was M.P. for Southampton, and married a sister of the last Earl of Plymouth (extinct). This family was founded in England by Claude Champion, Sieur de Crespigny, in Normandy, who quitted France at the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Residence—Wyvenhoe Hall, Colchester. Heir-His son Claude, born in Cadogan Place 1847.

FOSTER, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Rev. Sir Cavendish Hervey Foster, second son of the late Right Hon. Sir Augustus Foster, by Lady Albinia Jane. sister of the fifth Earl of Buckinghamshire. Born 1817; married, 1844, the youngest daughter of the late Rev. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; educated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842; has been rector of Thoydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Thoydon Garnon Rectory; and 5, Whitehall-yard. Heir—His

son, John Frederic, born 1847.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1813.—Sir Brydges Powell Hen-NIKER, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1840; appointed Ensign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854; Lieutenant 1855; Captain 1858; retired 1859; a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1858; Captain West Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieutenant-General in the army. Seat-Newton Hall, near Dunmow. Heir-His son, Frederick Brydges Major, born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.-Sir Frederick William HEYGATE, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmurdo, Esq., of Upper Clapton, Middlesex (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent. 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena. county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1844; M.A. 1847; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. The family is descended from the Heygates of Rendlesham, in Suffolk, and Feering, in Essex, subsequently, about the middle of the 16th century, seated at Hayes, in Middlesex. Residences—Southend; Roecliffe, Leicestershire; Bellarena, county Londonderry. son Frederick Gage, born at Bellarena, 1854.

KEY, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.-Sir KINGSMILL GROVE KEY, only surviving son of Sir John, the first Baronet, by the youngest daughter of Francis Green, Esq., of Denmark Hill, and of Dorking, Surrey. Born 1815; married first, 1842, the second daughter of G. H. Hahn, Esq., of The Orchard, Wandsworth (she died 1855); secondly, 1859, the fourth daughter of the late Joseph Armstrong, Esq., of Manchester (she died same year); thirdly, 1862, Mary Anne, daughter of J. Kershaw, Esq., M.P.; succeeded his father in 1858; appointed Captain 21st Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1862; is a partner in the firm of Burgess and Key, of the Victoria Works, Brentwood. The first Baronet was a London Alderman, Lord Mayor in 1830-31, &c. Heir-His son,

by first marriage, John Kingsmill, born 1853.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Lenwife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Aldham Hall, Suffolk. Born 1826; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1860; Sheriff for 1865. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Bellus, Aveley;

7, Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9, Hyde-park-terrace. Heir—His son, Thomas, born 1853.

LESLIE, 7th Bart. (Scotland.) Created 1665.—Sir Charles Henry Leslie, only son of Sir Norman, the sixth Baronet, by the third daughter of the late Major Robert Wood Smith, of the 6th Bengal Light Cavalry. Born at Lahore, in Bengal, 1848; succeeded his father in 1857; educated at Dreghorn College, near Edinburgh; appointed Cornet Essex Yeomanry Cavalry, 1863; is descended from the third Earl of Rothes. Heir pres.—His granduncle Thomas Leslie, of the War Office; born at Findrassie.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Henry Bouverie Pauler St.-John Mildman, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavalry 1861; High Charles are Hants 1861; The first Parent was descended as terrally formally High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed

the name of Mildmay. Residence-Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir-His son, Henry Paulet

St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 3rd Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795 .- Sir Richard Digby Neave, son of Sir Thomas, the second Baronet, by the daughter of the late Very Rev. William Digby, Dean of Durham. Born 1793; married, 1827, the youngest daughter of the ninth Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849); succeeded his father in 1848; educated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford (B.A. 1815); is author of "Four Days in Connemara." Residence—Dagnam Park, Romford. Heir—His son Arundell Neave, born 1829; appointed Captain

3rd Dragoon Guards 1857.

PELLY, 3rd Bart. (England.) Created 1840.—Sir Henry Carstairs Pelly, eldest son of the second Baronet by his first wife, Johannah Jane, youngest daughter of the late John Carstairs, Esq., of Stratford Green, and Woodhurst, Hunts (she died 1856). Born at Balls Park, Herts, 1844; educated at Harrow; entered the army as ensign Royal Scots Greys 1861; lieutenant 1863; succeeded his father 1864. The first Baronet was Governor of the Bank of England and of the Hudson's Bay Company. Residences-Upton House, West Ham; Warnham Court, Horsham, Sussex; Union Club, S.W. Heir presump-

tive-His brother Charles Raymond, born 1845.

SELWIN, 6th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1748.—Sir John Thomas Selwin, fourth son of the late Sir James Ibbetson, second Baronet (who died 1795), by the daughter of J. Caygill, Esq., of Shaw House, Yorkshire. Born 1784; married, 1825, daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks (she was born 1803); succeeded his nephew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1825. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat-Down Hall, Harlow. Heir-His son Henry John, born 1826; married, 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord

Lyndhurst (she died 1865.)

SMIJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir WILLIAM BOWYER-SMIJTH, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (now Dowager Lady Bowyer-Smijth). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took honors in 1837; appointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of three livings. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Residences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk. Heir—His son William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.
SMITH, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1804.—Sir Charles Cunliffe Smith,

son of the second Baronet, by his second wife, second daughter of William Gosling, Esq., of Roehampton. Born in Norfolk-street, Park-lane, 1827; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1855, the youngest daughter of Capel Cure, Esq., of Blake Hall; succeeded his father in 1831; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852, in which year he was Sheriff. The first Baronet, Sir Drummond Smith, was brother to Sir John Burges, Bart., who assumed that name in lieu of his patronymic, and whose title became extinct at his own death in 1803. Seat—Sutions, Romford. Heir—His son Drummond Cunliffe, born in Grosvenor-street 1861.

ESSEX COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

This Institution stands a short distance out of Brentwood, on the brow of the hill, leading up from that town to Warley. It is a fine building, in the mediæval style, of the Tudor period, and its pinnacles and the spire of its chapel give it a very picturesque appearance. The first stone was laid in 1851, and it was opened in September, 1853, the total cost of the erection being £89,557; but further sums have since been voted for the purchase of land and extensions. The money was borrowed by the county, to be repaid by instalments in 30 years. The sum paid last year by the different Unions for their patients was £13,243 11s. 11d., and the total receipts, including the produce of the garden and farm, was £14,053 3s. 0d.; the expenditure £14,236 16s. 5d. The present number of patients is 559—243 males and 316 females. Accommodation for 75 patients was obtained in 1863 by the erection of three cottages, with a spacious dining-hall, at a cost of about £9,000.

TRINITY CHURCH SCHOOL, SPRINGFIELD,

FOR THE SONS OF CLERGYMEN AND PROFESSIONAL GENTLEMEN.

REPORT

Presented to the Visitor by the Head Master.

TRINITY CHURCH SCHOOL was established in January, 1857, with a view to provide for the Sons of Clergymen and Professional Gentlemen a sound Classical and General Education, based upon the principles of the Church of England. It is attached to the Chapel of the Holy Trinity, in the parish of Springfield, where the Boys attend on Sunday. Daily Morning and Evening Prayers are said in the Private Chapel of the School.

Since the first establishment of the School 83 Boys have been admitted. In no case has a boy been received after misconduct at a former School. 59 Boys have come from home, or from preparatory Schools, and 24 from the following large and important Colleges and Schools-viz., 2 from Westminster School, I from Dulwich College (Upper School), I from St. Andrew's College, Bradfield, 2 from Brighton College, 2 from Cheltenham College, 2 from Sydney College, Bath, 1 from Liverpool College, 1 from St. John's College, Hurstpierpoint, 2 from the Royal Naval School, 2 from Tunbridge School, 1 from Felsted School, 3 from Brentwood Grammar School, 2 from All Saints' Grammar School, Bloxham, 1 from Sudbury Grammar School, and 1 from Wellesley

Of the 83 Boys who have been received 50 have left. 6 have passed on to the University of Oxford, and 26 to the following public and other large Schools—viz., 3 to Winchester, 2 to Eton, 1 to Westminster, 3 to Rugby, 1 to Merchant Taylors', 1 to King's College, London, 1 to King's College School, London, 4 to Marlborough College, 1 to Brighton College, 1 to Haileybury College, 1 to St. Nicolas' College, Lancing, 2 to Rossall School, 1 to the Royal Medical College, Epsom, 1 to Durham School, 2 to the Royal Naval School, 1 to Tunbridge School. In addition to these 1 has entered the Indian Army, 1 the Royal Navy, 1 has been received on board

H.M.S. "Worcester," I has left school without entering into any profession or occupation, I has gone to a private tutor, I is now engaged in the Bank of England, I has emigrated to New Zealand, I has passed the preliminary Law examination, 2 have left from family circumstances over which the parents had no control, I has been withdrawn on advice. This leaves 7 who have passed to other schools. It ought, however, to be distinctly understood that Boys are not received with a view to prepare them for any other schools than such as have been mentioned.

The following Honors have been gained in the University of Oxford by pupils of this School—viz., an Exhibiton at St. Edmund's Hall, an Exhibition at Lincoln College, a Scholarship at Wadham College, and a place in the Class List in the First Public Examination. One Boy has been elected, after competition by examination, to a King's Scholarship at Durham School, and prizes

have been gained at other schools to which boys have passed.

The following encouragements to industry and learning have been offered. In addition to the prizes distributed in July, a Scholarship of the value of Fifty Shillings was annually awarded until the year 1862. At that time a Scholarship of the yearly value of £105 was substituted for it. Four Exhibitions of the value of £10, £12, £15, and £35 respectively have been given privately, as well as a nomination to King's College School of the annual value of £2 2s.

The School has been indebted to one who takes a deep interest in its welfare for an annual donation of £5 towards the purchase of prizes and for the use of a playground, to another gentleman for a donation of £3 3s. for a prize, and to another friend for a gift of £5 towards the windows of the Dining Hall. It is impossible here to omit an acknowledgment of the very handsome determination of two of the parents of the Boys to pay a much higher rate of fees than that which has been fixed for the school. At their request their names are at

present reserved.

While great attention has been paid to the Classics and Mathematics, as the foundation of all sound acquisition of knowledge, Modern Languages and Literature have been carefully cultivated, and Boys have been prepared in the subjects required for Special Examinations. Facilities are also afforded for learning Music and Drawing. It is important to be observed that no attempt is made to produce superficial and unsound knowledge by cramming, or to accomplish in a short time that which can only be obtained by the care and industry of years. In several cases the opinion expressed upon this subject in this school has been verified when the Boys have made the attempt elsewhere.

The Boys are regularly trained to drill of every kind, including that of the rifle, consent having been given under the hand and seal of two Magistrates "to the training or drilling to the use of arms, or for the purpose of practising

military exercises, movements, or evolutions."

In 1863 a Private Chapel was attached to the School, the Boys still continuing to attend the parish services on Sundays and Saints' Days. On other days the services are chorally conducted in the Private Chapel, one of the Boys acting as organist. A sermon is preached once a month in the evening with a special view to the religious and personal education of the Boys.

A conviction that a school of this kind would supply a want in the Church led to its establishment. It was set on foot as a matter of private enterprise. It is hoped when the labor and anxiety consequent on the first promotion of such an undertaking are over, and the School and its work have become more generally known, that the School may be established on some firmer basis, and eventually become one of those institutions dedicated to God's honor and service, where by the blessing of that Holy Trinity whose name it bears Boys may begin to serve God in Church and State, and where whatsoever tends to the advancement of True Religion and Useful Learning may for ever flourish and abound.

TOWNS' DIRECTORY.

CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighbouring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828 at a cost of £57,289 17s. 03d., and enlarged and arranged 15 years ago at a further outlay of £36,000; here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head-quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighbourhood, but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the county Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad, with the Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal-a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it, we believe, a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of 3,000 volumes. A silk factory, built a few years since, was closed for some time, but has now been re-opened, and two very extensive maltings have recently been erected, in addition to four others that previously existed, indicating that this trade is increasing in the neighbourhood.

COLCHESTER is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Parliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I.—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23,815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactures except the silk factory of Mr. Brown, which employs about 250 hands, and the large wholesale tailoring establishments of Messrs. M. and S. Hyam, Messrs. Moses, Mr. Hurst, Mrs. Hammond, Messrs. Fraser and King, and Messrs. B. Hyam and Son, there being about 2,500 women and 200 men employed in this trade. It has good communication both by land and by water, the Great Eastern line running within a mile of the town; while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are now all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdomthe veritable Camulodunum-and the traces of the imperial rulers with which the soil teems, together with the relics of them in the shape of coins, urns, and remnants of their buildings of late years brought to light, have given substantial confirmation to a fact time had otherwise left in some mistiness. Legend, too, claims the town, though with less appearance of probability, as the birth-place of St. Helena, the mother of the first christian emperor; while, descending to the era of better authenticated history, it is certain the place flourished under the Normans, and the protection of Eudo Dapifer, to whose share among the Conqueror's retinue it fell. These associations, and the memorable siege it stood from the army of Fairfax in 1648, which partially demolished many of its old buildings, and ended with the execution of Sir Charles Lucas and Sir George Lisle in the Castle Bailey, have left it rich with spots full of historic interest and old ruins-the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archæological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the past, which may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. The borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. It is now governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, 18 Councillors, a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £450; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £800; making a total annual income of about £2,550. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough The expenditure last year exceeded £4,000. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed

by law to the Corporation, and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it sometimes amounting to £14,000 a year. The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I., and its fairs are also of very ancient date. The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, give to it an air of military life, and the martial activity has been largely increased since the completion of the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Europe. At present they are occupied by the regiment of the 17th Lancers, "Death or Glory," which arrived in May of last year from India, where it was engaged throughout the mutiny. It also led the gallant Light Brigade in the celebrated Balaclava Charge in the Crimean War. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. The handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000; and a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension. Nor among its public buildings must we forget the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, now exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 patients. A fine white brick-built railway station, with station-master's residence in the upper story, has been erected on the site of the old station on the down side.

HARWICH—a hamlet to the parish of Dovercourt—is a borough and sea-port town, situate on a peninsula, on the coast of Essex, near the estuaries of the Stour and Orwell, in the hundred of Tendring. It is $42\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.E. by E. from Chelmsford, and $71\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.E. by E. from London. It has been a place of some trading importance from very early times, and has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The town was made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II.—the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen, and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is annually chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the clift above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich, and several martello towers on the Suffolk side, the whole mounting guns of heavy calibre. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821, at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses, the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The railway runs up to the town from the main line, and a regular traffic in goods and in foreign cattle for the London market is carried on as well as a good passenger traffic. This has caused so vast an increase to the traffic on this branch that it is said an extra line of rails is to be added. The Great Eastern Railway Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Several steamboats ply between here and Ipswich daily, and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer, and nearly 200,000 people paid a visit to this delightful watering place during the summer of 1865. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vaux, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

Maldon is a neat little borough town, with a look of antiquity about it, though the hand of improvement, especially in its shop fronts, has somewhat altered its character of late years. It stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river navigable for vessels of 70 or 80 tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. Its income altogether, including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port is free, and the ruling powers levy no tolls on vessels coming into it. The borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and in that limit a number of fishing boats are employed, but the practice of the corporation granting licences to them for this purpose, which at one time prevailed, has fallen into

disuse. Within the borough and the precincts round about there are various objects of interest to be visited. The old Town-hall itself, if not for the beauty of its architecture, at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Priory of Carmelite Friars. And, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing

many rare works, left to the town by Dr. Plume. At the fast rising village of Heybridge are the extensive agricultural engineering works of Mr. E. H. Bentall, occupying a large extent of ground, covered with fine ranges of shops for foundry, turning, and fitting purposes. From these are turned out machines which are sent to all parts of Europe and the far distant colonies. In connexion with the works there is one building particularly deserving of notice, namely, the warehouse for the reception of finished machines, especially constructed for the export trade. This fine building is about 300 feet long, four stories high, and capable of holding from 12,000 to 15,000 machines ready for delivery. The number of hands employed at these works is about 300. The spirited proprietor has raised, entirely at his own expense, an engineer corps numbering 120, a cadet corps of 80, and a brass band of 30 performers, and of which he is the captain; he has erected a spacious hall for the purposes of drill, to which are attached an armoury and reading-room for those employed at the works. There is also a school for the children of the workmen, with a certificated master and schoolmistresses, supported solely by the proprietor.

SAFFRON WALDEN

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

Number of Burgesses on the roll 813

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the prettiest little towns in the county, takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it here has ceased for a century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensi e scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with antiquities, the remnant of the castle, the earthworks on the south, and the curious work in the chall: on the Common attesting its importance in old

times, the appearance of the place itself shows that there is modern life and spirit in it. The streets, of which there are several, have been much improved of late years by good shops and buildings. A convenient cattle market has been provided. A handsome Corn-exchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town-hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected in the town, built by money left for the purpose by the late W. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley-end, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

Braintree and Bocking are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, which, as the capital of the Northern Division of Essex, is the place where the election of Members of Parliament for the district takes place. It is here, too, that the petty sessional and other official business of South Hinckford is transacted. The town itself is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and, in the time of Elizabeth, Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited by cloth-makers. The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great firm of Messrs. Courtaild employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighbourhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the wellknown suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn-exchange erected in 1839 at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

This town stands pleasantly on the banks of the partly on a declivity-Sunny-hill, as it was called in old times-and, with the memories which belong to the old Abbey of white monks, founded by Maud and King Stephen, and the remnants still scattered about, is a place of interest to the antiquarian. It is as a manufacturing town, however, that in modern times it owes its importance. The Flemings settled here, and Coggeshall was celebrated for their cloths. Fortunes of hundreds of thousands of pounds were made by this branch of industry. EPPING AND HARLOW.

The mother church has been restored, and two new ones were erected in outlying districts a few years ago; it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street, founded by Lady Mary Ramsey in 1594, in which, under the new Chancery scheme, provision is made for about 100 scholars. A large part of the working population are engaged in

the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighbourhood, but not to any great extent. The market, which has recently been restored, was once a royal one, as belonging to the King, and was held on the hill in Saxon times. The town has been recently paved at a cost of £1,200 by the Local Board, who have also expended upwards of £5,000 ia providing water supply and drainage.

HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and as such was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornchurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, and an Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849 at a cost of £7,000 on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV.

The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering, and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the

site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford. and is a pleasant rural village, commanding from its position extensive and beautiful views over parts of the county. It has some good mansions, among others Pyrgo Park, which was the residence of several of the Queens, being held by them as dowry; and there are few who will not feel interest in a visit to the little brick parish church, which is reputed to be the olden royal palace.

ONGAR (CHIPPING AND HIGH) AND GREENSTED.

SOUTHEND AND PRITTLEWELL.

PRITTLEWELL is, from its position on a hill-top above the Thames, a very picturesque village. It has a fine church-"the fairest in the Hundred," as it was described of old; and the Priory near by, the seat of Daniel Scratton, Esq., is a handsome mansion, standing upon the site of the old monastery. But Prittlewell is chiefly important as being the parent parish of the delightful wateringplace of Southend, on the banks of the river a mile off, with Sheerness opposite, and the mouth of the Thames a short distance below. Southend is a hamlet of Prittlewell, but has a church of its own, and is a separate ecclesiastical district. This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaistow Wards. There are also five divisions for ecclesiastical purposes, and others are in contemplation; these are rendered necessary from the erection of a number of district churches. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow bridge, under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was built by Matilda, the wife of Henry I., who is represented by the old historians as a woman of great piety, and who, having been endangered by crossing the ford. had a bridge erected, and gave to the abbey of Barking certain lands and a mill to keep the same in repair. The abbey at Stratford was not then founded. At a subsequent period the abbot of Stratford bought the lands and mill of the abbot of Barking and undertook the charge of the bridge. The bridge is rendered historical also from being the first arched bridge built in England. The old bridge was pulled down and a new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12,000. The establishment of large ship-building works on the banks of the Thames; the Victoria, now amalgamated with and known as "The London and St. Katharine's Docks," carried on under one proprietary; the extensive works of the Great Eastern Railway at Stratford New Town; the numerous chemical factories (including one where the finest quinine is manufactured), sugar bakeries, and other large commercial and manufacturing establishments. furnish employment to thousands of artisans. The land in various parts of the parish has been purchased by Land Societies, and apportioned out for building sites, realising as much, in some instances, as £700 per acre, or more than five or six times its original cost. Houses which had been erected in the marsh district near the Thames but a few years since, and which were considered of little or no value, have now become highly remunerative to the owners. The proximity of the parish to the metropolis, with a direct water communication with all parts of the world, has unquestionably rendered it highly desirable for commercial and manufacturing enterprise. The demand and progressive increase of the value of land and house property in many parts of this parish may be taken as a fair inference of the prosperity of the neighbourhood, which now ranks as one of the most important and populous in the eastern suburbs of the metropolis. The population exceeds 44,000.

WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times when the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of Essex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the soldiers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and was first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew off to what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was at one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the Grove being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavon street, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.

To find the time of high water at any of the local and other ports above for any day throughout the year:—Take out the time of High Water at London Bridge from the table above for the given day, and add to or substract from this the hours and minutes opposite the name of the place. If, in adding, the result give an amount beyond 12 hours, take away that quantity and the time of the high tide next after the one calculated from will remain; or if, in subtracting, the number to be subtracted is greater than that from which it is to be taken the latter must be increased by 12 hours, and the difference will be the time of high water of the preceding evening. If the night tide be required at any place, add together the time of the day tide and that for the next day, and divide the sum by 2, when the quotient will be the exact time of the night tide.

Spring tides are the highest, and occur at or about New and Full Moon. Neap Tides are the lowest, and occur at the first and last quarter. Ebb tide is that between high and low water, lasting on an average 7½ hours, and Flood Tide is that between low and high water, lasting about 5½ hours. During strong north-westerly gales, the tide rises earlier, but does not rise to its usual height, while the ebb tide runs out longer and falls lower; but upon the gales abating, and weather moderating, they are later, higher, and stronger. A southwesterly gale has a contrary effect, and an easterly gives some additional water.

This outlaying, however, is often required to uphold breakage; hence the best calculation is at twelve inches, for the purpose of making a purchase to suit the quantity to be drained.

The Table contains the usual distances betwixt drains, which are fixed upon according to the sloseness or openness of the subsoil, and in view of those who have the manage-

ment of the drainage funds.

COUNTIES.

FREEHOLDERS. Of 40s. per annum above rents and charges.—Copyholders. For life or larger estate of the yearly value of £10 above rents and charges.—Leaseholders. Lessee of £10 clear yearly value for not less than sixty years, occupied or not. Lessee of £50 clear yearly value for not less than twenty years.—Occupiers, bond fide liable to a yearly rent of not less than £50.

Purchasers of Freehold or Copyhold property must obtain complete possession on or before January 31st to entitle them to be registered in July next as county voters.

CITIES AND BOROUGHS.

Owners or tenants actually occupying any house, shop, &c., of £10 yearly value, or of such value, together with land of which they are owners, or which they hold under the same landlord; or of premises held in immediate succession. Joint occupiers when premises are of such value as to give £10 yearly to each occupier. The electoral year commences on the 31st July. Occupation of premises must therefore commence on or before that day in 1866 in order to qualify the occupier to be on the Borough Register for 1867. New occupiers of £10 houses, &c., in boroughs should take care that their names are properly inserted on the first poor-rate made after this date.—Freemen.

RATES OF POSTAGE.—INLAND LETTERS (the Channel Islands included), not exceeding half-an-ounce, are charged one penny. Exceeding half-an-ounce, but not exceeding one ounce, two-pence. Exceeding one ounce, but not exceeding one and a half, threepence. Exceeding one and a half, and not exceeding two ounces, four-pence. Exceeding two ounces, but not exceeding two and a half ounces, fivepence; and so on. an additional half penny for every additional ounce. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped double the amount of such insufficiency. Re-directed letters are charged only a second pre-paid rate of postage. If

coin be enclosed in a letter, the letter will be registered and charged double.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 8 oz. or fraction thereof 2d., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets may contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. Book packets to India

and New South Wales must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight.

STAMPS.—At a post-office—Labels, 1d., 2d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., &1s.; covers, 2s. 3d. per 2 doz. POST-OFFICE ORDERS.—Money orders are granted and paid at every post town in the United Kingdom. The amount for which a single money order can be issued is limited to £10. The following table shows the rates of commission charged on inland and colonial money orders; viz.:—For sums not exceeding £2 (if payable in the United Kingdom), 3d.; not exceeding £5, 6d.; not exceeding £7, 9d.; and not exceeding £10, 1s. To Canada, Victoria, Western and South Australia, Queensland, Cape of Good Hope, and New Zealand, four-fold those sums; to Malta or Gibraltar three-fold. Any money order, issued and payable in the United Kingdom, not applied for before the expiration of the second calendar month after that in which it was issued, becomes lapsed and a new order will be necessary, for which a second commission will be charged; and if the order he not paid within a twelvementh all claim to the money will be forfeited. order be not paid within a twelvemonth all claim to the money will be forfeited.

Other savings' banks (not being post-office savings' banks) may be required to transfer accounts to this post-office savings' bank.—7. This post-office savings' bank may be required to transfer accounts to other savings' banks which are not post-office savings' banks.—8. Persons opening an account at one bank may take their books and make deposits at any other post-office savings' bank, or withdraw deposits.—9. No charge made for the postage of correspondence with the chief savings' bank at the London post-office.—10. All or any part of the amount deposited can be withdrawn in a few days after application.—11. Provision is made for deposits by trustees, minors, and married women.—12. Officers of the post-office are strictly prohibited against disclosing the name of any depositor, or any amount paid in or taken out.

PEERAGE AND BARONETAGE OF ESSEX.

RIGHT HON. EARL OF ROSSLYN.

Rosslyn, 4th Earl of (United Kingdom). Created 1801.—Francis Robert St. Clair-Erskine, only son of the third Baron by Frances, daughter of Lieut.-Gen. William Wernyss (she died 1857). Born 1833; educated at Eton and Merton College, Oxford—B.A. 1852, M.A. 1855; succeeded 1866 and married November 8, 1866, Blanche Adelaide (widow of the Hon. Col. Maynard), second daughter of Henry Fitzroy, Esq., of Salcey Lawn, Northamptonshire; is patron of 1 living, a J.P. and D.L. for county Fife, and Lieut. 1st Fifeshire Mounted Rifles. The first Earl was Lord Chancellor and represented a younger branch of the family of the Earl of Buchan. Residences—Easton Lodge, near Dunmow; Dysart House, near Kircaldy, Fifeshire, N.B.

RIGHT HON. LORD DACRE.

DACRE, 22nd Baron (England). Created 1307.—Thomas Crosbie William Trevor, eldest son of the twenty-first Baron by the second daughter of the late Hon. and Rev. Dr. Crosbie, Dean of Limerick (she died 1844). Born 1808; educated at Christ Church, Oxford; married, 1837, Susan Sophia, eldest daughter of the first Lord Chesham (she was born 1817, and was for several years a bed-chamber woman to the Queen); was an unsuccessful candidate for North Essex in 1832, and for Lewes in 1837; was M.P. for Herts from 1847-52; succeeded his father 1853; Lord-Lieutenant of Essex 1865; is a Deputy-Lieutenant for Herts, patron of two livings, and co-heir to the barony of Fitzhugh. The first Baron was a distinguished military commander temp. Edward II. and III.; the daughter of the 6th Baron married Sir Richard Fiennes, and carried the title into that family; the sister of the 10th Baron carried the title into the Lennard family; a descendant of hers married the daughter of the fifteenth Lord Dacre, who succeeded as Baroness Dacre; and their representative in the female line, Henry Otway, twenty-first Baron, in 1824 assumed the surname of Trevor in heu of Brand; the fifteenth Lord Dacre was created Earl of Sussex, a title

which expired with him. Residence—The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts.

Heir presumptive, his brother Hon. Henry Bouverie William Brand; born 1814;

married, 1838, Eliza, daughter of Lieut.-General Ellice; was for some time private
secretary to Sir George Grey; was a Lord of the Treasury from 1855-58; is a magistrate
and Deputy-Lieutenant for Sussex, and Keeper of the Privy Seal to H.R.H. the Prince

of Wales; has been M.P. for Lewes since 1852.

RIGHT HON. LORD BRAYBROOKE.

Beaybrooke, 5th Baron. (Gt. Brit.) Created 1788.—Charles Cornwallis Neville, second son of the third Baron, by the eldest daughter of the second Marquis of Cornwallis (she died 1856). Born at Billingbear 1823; married, 1849, the third daughter of the third Viscount Hawarden; succeeded his brother 1861; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex 1845, and Vice-Lieut. from 1861-5; patron of six livings; Visitor of Mag. Coll., Cambridge, as owner of Audley End. The first Baron was fourth Lord Howard De Walden, who obtained the barony of Braybrooke, with remainder, in default of male issue, to his cousin, the grandfather of the present peer; the third Baron assumed the name of Griffin; but his issue bear the name of Neville. Residences Audley End, Saffron Walden; Heydon House, Royston, Herts; Billingbear,

Wokingham, Berks. Town Residence—42, Upper Brook-street.

Heir presumptive, his brother, Hon. and Rev. Latimer Neville; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

Braybrooke, Dowager Lady (Peer's widow).—Charlotte Sarah, fifth daughter of the second Lord Norbury, by the only daughter and heir of William Brabazon, Esq., of New Park, county Mayo. Born 1826; married, 1852, the fourth Lord Braybrooke, who died 1861.

RIGHT HON. LORD PETRE.

Petre, 12th Baron (Eng.). Created 1603.—William Bernard Petre, son of the eleventh Baron, by his first wife, the eldest daughter of Sir Richard Bedingfield, Bart. (she died 1822). Born at Thorndon, 1817; married, 1843, the eldest daughter of the Hon. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. The first Baron represented Essex in parliament; he was only son of Sir William Petre, Secretary of State temp. Henry VIII., Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth. Residences—57, Portland-place, W.; Thorndon-hall, near Brentwood.

Heir, his son, the Hon. William Joseph, born at Leamington 1847.

RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh. Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Baroness was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Seat—Terling Place, Witham. Town Residence—United University, Pall Mall East.

Heir, his son, Hon. John William, born at Langford Grove, Nov. 12, 1842; Deputy-Lieutenant and Magistrate for Essex, 1864; educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge; Sheepshanks Exhibitioner 1864, Senior Wrangler and 1st Smith's prizeman for 1865, Fellow of his college 1866.

THE LORD BISHOP OF ROCHESTER.

ROCHESTER, 96th Bishop of. Founded 604.—Right Rev. Joseph Cotton Wigram, D.D., son of the late Sir Robert Wigram, first Baronet, by his second wife, the youngest daughter of John Watts, Esq. Born at Walthamstow, 1798; married, 1837, the daughter of Peter Arkwright, Esq., of Willersley, Matlock (she died 1864). Educated by private tuition, and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he obtained a scholarship; ordained 1822; took priest's orders 1823; appointed Secretary to the National Society for Promoting the Education of the Poor 1827; Preacher-Assistant at St. James', Westminster, 1827; Rector of East Tisted, Hants, 1839; Archdeacon of Winchester, 1845; Rector of St. Mary's, Southampton, 1850; and 96th Bishop of Rochester, 1860; has published pamphlets, sermons, charges in his archdeaconry and diocese; patron of the archdeaconries and 60 livings. The diocese includes the Archdeaconry of Rochester, with the counties of Essex, except the deanery of Barking, and Herts; annual value £5,000. Residences—5, Montagu-street, London, W.C.; 15A, Grosvenor-square, London, W.; and Danbury Palace, near Chelmsford.

FRANCES COUNTESS WALDEGRAVE.

Walderave, Countess (Peer's Widow).—Frances Elizabeth Anne, daughter of John Braham, Esq. Married, first, John James Waldegrave, Esq., of Navestock; secondly, 1840, the seventh Earl Waldegrave, who died 1846; thirdly, 1847, George Granville Vernon-Harcourt, Esq., who died 1861; fourthly, 1863, the Right Hon. Chichester Samuel Parkinson Fortescue, younger son of the late Lt.-Col. Chichester Fortescue, brother and heir presumptive to Lord Clermont, and M.P. for Louth county (he was born 1823). Residences—Dudbrook House, Navestock; Chewton Priory, Somersetshire; Red House, Ardee, Ireland; Strawberry-hill, Twickenham; and 7, Carlton Gardens, London, S.W.

ABDY, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1849.—Sir Thomas Neville Abdy, only son of the late Captain Anthony Abdy, E.N., by the daughter of Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Born 1810; married, 1841, the second daughter of Rowland Alston, Esq., of Pishbury, Herts.; was educated at St. John's Coll., Cam., where he graduated B.A. 1833; was M.P. for Lyme Regis from 1847 to 1852; was an unsuccessful candidate for Maldon in

1841. The Baronet's grandfather, the Rev. Thomas Abdy Rutherforth, assumed the surname of Abdy, in lieu of his patronymic, on inheriting, through his mother, the estate of Sir John Abdy, the fourth Baronet, of Albyns, whose title, created in 1660, became extinct in 1759. Seat—Albyns, Romford. Heir—His son William Neville, born in Eaton Place, London, 1844.

BUXTON, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1840.—Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, M.1., son of Sir E. N. Buxton (late M.P. for South Essex), the second Baronet, by the second daughter of Samuel Gurney, Esq., of Ham House. Born 1837; succeeded his father in 1858; educated at Harrow, and at Trinity College, Cambridge; is a partner in the brewery of Truman, Hanbury, and Co.; Major 1st Bn. Tower Hamlets R.V.; M.P. for Lynn; a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk 1859, and of Essex 1860; married, June, 1862, Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough. The first Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the abolition of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 1825. Residences—Colne House, near Cromer, Norfolk; Warlies, Waltham Abbey. Heir—His son T. Fowell Victor, born April 8, 1865.

DE CRESPIGNY, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1805.—Sir Claude William Crampion de Crespigny, son of Captain Augustus James Champion de Crespigny, r.n., by the daughter of Sir William Smijth, Bart. Born in Grosvenor-square 1818; married, 1848, the second daughter of Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1829; educated at Winchester School, and at Trinity College, Cambridge (M.A. 1840); Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852; is also a magistrate; Captain 6th Essex Volunteer Rifles 1859; Lieut.-Col. 1st Bn. ditto 1860. The present Baronet's great grandfather received his title after an entertainment given to the Prince of Wales, and being created a Baronet resumed the prefix of "de," which anciently belonged to the family. His successor was 1.1. for Southampton, and married a sister of the last Earl of Plymouth (extinct). This family was founded in England by Claude Champion, Sieur de Crespigny, in Normandy, who quitted France at the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Residence—Wyvenhoe Hall, Collecter. Heir—His son Claude, born in Cadogan Place 1847.

FOSTER, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Rev. Sir Cavendish Hervey Foster, second son of the late Right Hon. Sir Augustus Foster, by Lady Albinia Jane, sister of the fifth Earl of Buckinghamshire. Born 1817; married, 1844, the youngest daughter of the late Rev. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; educated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842; has been rector of Thoydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Thoydon Garnon Rectory; and 5, Whitehall-yard. Heir—His 500, John Frederic, born 1847.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1813.—Sir Brydges Powell Henniker, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; educated at Eton; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1849; Ensign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854, Lieutenant 1855, Captain 1858, retired 1859; beputy-Lieut. of Essex 1858; Capt. West Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieutenant-General in the army. Seat—Newton Hall, near Dunmow. Heir—His son, Frederick Brydges Major, born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Frederick William Hergate, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmurdo, Esq., of Upper Clapton, Middlesex (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent, 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena, county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; E.1. 1844; M.A. 1847; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. Born 1815; married first, 1842, the second daughter of G. H. Hahn, Esq., of The Orchard, Wandsworth (she died 1855); secondly, 1859, the fourth daughter of the late Joseph Armstrong, Esq., of Manchester (she died same year); thirdly, 1862, Mary Anne, daughter of J. Kershaw, Esq., M.P.; succeeded his father in 1858; appointed Captain 21st Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1862; is a partner in the firm of Burgess and Key, of the Victoria Works, Brentwood. The first Baronet was a London Alderman, Lord Mayor in 1830-31. Residences—Thornway, Glocestershire; Manor Park, Streatham, S. Heir—His son by first marriage, John Kingsmill, born 1853.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Len-LARD, son of the late Thomas Barrett-Lennard, Esq. (who died 1856), by his second wife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Saling Grove, Essex. Born 1826; educated at Cambridge; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the late Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; Deputy-Lieut. of Essex 1860; Sheriff for 1865. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Belhus, Aveley; 7, Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9, Hyde-park-terrace. Heir—His son, Thomas, born 1853.

LESLIE, 7th Bart. (Scotland.) Created 1665.—Sir Charles Henry Leslie, only son of Sir Norman, the sixth Baronet, by the third daughter of the late Major Robert Wood Smith, of the 6th Bengal Light Cavalry. Born at Lahore, in Bengal, 1848; succeeded his father in 1857; educated at Dreghorn College, near Edinburgh, and Royal Military College, Sandhurst; is descended from the third Earl of Rothes. Heir pres.—His granduncle Thomas Leslie, of the War Office; born at Findrassie.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Heney Bouverie Paulet St.-John Mildmay, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavalry 1861; High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed the name of Mildmay. Residence—Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir—His son, Henry Paulet St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 3rd Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795.—Sir Richard Digby Neave, son of Sir Thomas, the second Baronet, by the daughter of the late Very Rev. William Digby. Dean of Durham. Born 1793; married, 1827, the youngest daughter of the ninth Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849); succeeded his father in 1848; educated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford (B.A. 1815); is author of "Four Days in Connemara." Residence—Dagnam Park, Romford. Heir—His son Arundell Neave, born 1829; appointed Captain 3rd Dragoon Guards 1857; Captain Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1866.

PELLY, 3rd Bart. (England.) Created 1840.—Sir Henry Carstairs Pelly, eldest son of the second Baronet by his first wife, Johannah Jane, youngest daughter of the late John Carstairs, Esq., of Stratford Green, and Woodhurst, Hunts (she died 1856). Born at Balls Park, Herts, 1844; educated at Harrow; entered the army as ensign Royal Scots Greys 1861; lieutenant 1863; succeeded his father 1864. The first Baronet was Governor of the Bank of England and of the Hudson's Bay Company. Residences—Upton House, West Ham; Warnham Court, Horsham, Sussex; Union Club, S.W. Heir presumptive—His brother Charles Raymond, born 1845.

SELWIN, 6th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1748.—Sir John Thomas Selwin, fourth son of the late Sir James Ibbetson, second Baronet (who died 1795), by the daughter of J. Caygill, Esq., of Shaw House, Yorkshire. Born 1784; married, 1825, daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks (she was born 1803); succeeded his nephew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1825. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat—Down Hall, Harlow. Heir—His son Henry John, born 1826; married, 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord Lyndhurst (she died 1865.)

SMIJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir William Bowyer-Smijth, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (now Dowager Lady Bowyer-Smijth). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took honors in 1837; appointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of three livings. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Residences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk. Heir—His son William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.

SMITH, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1804.—Sir Charles Cunliffe Smit, son of the second Baronet, by his second wife, second daughter of William Gosling, Esq. of Roehampton. Born in Norfolk-street, Park-lane, 1827; educated at Trinity College. Cambridge; married, 1855, the youngest daughter of Capel Cure, Esq., of Blake Hall; succeeded his father in 1831; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852, in which year he was Sheriff. The first Baronet, Sir Drummond Smith, was brother to Sir John Burges, Bart., who assumed that name in lieu of his patronymic, and whose title became extinct at his own death in 1803. Seat—Suttons, Romford. Heir—His son Drummond Cunliffe, born in Grosvenor-street 1861.

TYRELL, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1809.—Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, son of first Baronet, by the only daughter and heir of William Tyssen, Esq., of Waltham House, Herts. Born 1795; married, 1819, eldest daughter and co-heir of the late Sir Thomas Pilkington, Bart. (from whom he is divorced); succeeded his father in 1832; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex, and was Colonel of the West Essex Militia from 1831 to 1852; was M.P. for Essex in 1830; was unsuccessful in 1831, but sat from 1832 to 1857. This family is said to be descended from Sir Walter Tyrell, temp. William Rufus. Residesce-Boreham House, Chelmsford.

WESTERN, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1864.—SIR THOMAS BURCH WESTERN, son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Western, k.r.s., of Tattingstone Place, Suffolk, by Mary, daughter of Thomas Burch, Esq., of Bermuda. Born 1795; was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1818, M.A. 1824; married, 1819, Margaret Letitia, third daughter of William Bushby, Esq., of Kirkmichael, county Dumfries; succeeded in 1844 to the estates of his relations the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct. of his relative, the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct; is magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex; was High Sheriff of Essex in 1850; elected L.P. for North Essex in 1865. The family is descended from Lady Anne Plantagenet, wife of Bourchier, Earl of Ewe, and granddaughter of Edward III.; was settled in London temp. Henry VII.; and Samuel Western was baron of the Cinque Ports temp. William III. Seats—Felix Hall, Kelvedon; Rivenhall Place, Witham; Tattingstone, Ipswich, Safak. Heir—His son, Thomas Sutton; born 1821; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1848, Giulietta Romana, daughter of Sir Edward Beller, Bart., of Dilhorne, county Stafford, M.P. for North Staffordshire (she died 1850); was the Liberal M.P. for Maldon from 1857 to 1865; is a Deputy Lieutenant for Suffolk; Hon. Colonel of the Essex Rifles Militia, 1866; J.P. and Deputy Lieutenant for Essex.

WOOD, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1837.—Sir Francis Wood, eldest son of the Rev. Sir John Page Wood, by Emma Caroline, daughter of Sampson Michell, Esq., Ly., an admiral in the Portuguese service. Born at Cressing, 1834; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1854, the eldest daughter of R. Hodgson, Esq., of Appleshaw, and granddaughter of the late General Hodgson; succeeded his father in February, 1866. The first Baronet was an Alderman of London and twice Lord Mayor; also M.P. for London. Seat—Rivenhall Place, Witham. Heir—His son Matthew.

ESSEX COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

This Institution stands a short distance out of Brentwood, on the brow of the hill, leading up from that town to Warley. It is a fine building, in the mediaval style, of the Tudor period, and its pinnacles and the spire of its chapel give it a very picturesque appearance. The first stone was laid in 1851, and it was opened in September, 1853, the total cost of the erection being £89,557; but further sums have since been voted for the purchase of land and extensions. The money was borrowed by the county, to be repaid by instalments in 30 years. The sum paid last year by the different Unions for their patients was £13,933 7s. 9d., and the total receipts, including the produce of the garden and farm, was £14,784 17s. 4d.; the expenditure £14,920 16s. 8d. The present number of patients is 559—243 males and 316 females. Accommodation for 75 patients was obtained in 1863 by the erection of three cottages, with a spacious dining-hall, at a cost of about £9,000.

Six have passed on to the University of Oxford, and one to Trinity College, Cambridge; and 29 to the following public and other large schools—viz., 3 to Winchester, 2 to Eton, 1 to Westminster, 2 to Harrow, 3 to Rugby, 1 to Merchant Taylors', 1 to King's College, London, 1 to King's College School, London, 4 to Marlborough College, 1 to Brighton College, 1 to Haileybury College, 1 to St. Nicholas' College, Lancing, 2 to Rossall School, 1 to the Royal Medical College, Epsom, 1 to Durham School, 2 to the Royal Naval School, 2 to Tunbridge School. In addition to these 1 has entered the Indian Army, 1 the Royal Navy, 1 has been received on board H.M.S. "Conway," 1 on board H.M.S. "Worcester," 1 has passed the preliminary law examination. It ought to be distinctly understood that Boys are not received with a view to prepare them for any other schools than such as have been mentioned.

The following Honors have been gained in the University of Oxford by pupils of this school—viz, an Exhibition at St. Edmund's Hall, an Exhibition at Lincoln College, a Scholarship at Wadham College, and a place in the Class List in the First Public Examination. One Boy has been elected, after competition by examination, to a King's Scholarship at Durham School, and prizes have

been gained at other schools to which boys have passed.

While great attention has been paid to the Classics and Mathematics, as the foundation of all sound acquisition of knowledge, the Modern Languages and Literature have been carefully cultivated, and Boys have been prepared in the subjects required for Special Examinations. Facilities are also afforded for learning Music and Drawing.

The Boys are regularly trained to drill of every kind, including that of the rifle, consent having been given under the hand and seal of two magistrates "to the training or drilling to the use of arms, or for the purpose of practising

military exercises, movements, or evolutions."

In 1863 a Private Chapel was attached to the School, where the services are

chorally conducted, one of the Boys acting as organist.

A conviction that a school of this kind would supply a want in the Church led to its establishment. It was set on foot as a matter of private enterprise. It is hoped when the labor and anxiety consequent on the first promotion of such an undertaking are over, and the School and its work have become more generally known, that the School may be established on some firmer basis, and eventually become one of those institutions dedicated to God's honor and service, where by the blessing of that Holy Trinity whose name it bears Boys may begin to serve God in Church and State, and where whatsoever tends to the advancement of True Religion and Useful Learning may for ever flourish and abound.

CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighbouring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828 at a cost of £57,289 17s. 01d., and enlarged and arranged 15 years ago at a further outlay of £36,000; here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head-quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighbourhood, but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad, with the Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal—a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it, we believe, a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of 3,150 volumes. A Temperance Hotel has recently been erected on part of the site where in days of ancient coaching stood the famous road hostel—the old Black Boy; and in Moulsham an excellent improvement has been effected by the widening of the road and the building of a handsome inn, at Baddow-lane corner—a spot before proverbially dangerous. The malting trade is now carried on to some extent in the neighborhood.

COLCHESTER is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Parliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I.—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23,815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactures except the silk factory of Mr. Brown, which employs about 250 hands, and six wholesale tailoring establishments, which employ about 2,700 people. It has good communication both by land and by water, the Great Eastern line running within a mile of the town; while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 tons. This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are now all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdom—the veritable Camulodunum—and the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archæological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the past, may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. The borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. It is now governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, 18 Councillors, a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £450; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £800; making a total annual income of about £2,550. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough The expenditure last year exceeded £4,000. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed by law to the Corporation, and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it some-times amounting to £14,000 a year. The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I., and its fairs are also of very ancient date. The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, give to it an air of military life, and the martial activity has been largely increased since the completion of the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Europe. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. The handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000; and a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension. Nor among its public buildings must we forget the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden-road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 patients. A fine white brick-built rallway station, with stationmaster's residence in the upper story, has been erected on the site of the old station on the down side.

HARWICH—a hamlet to the parish of Dovercourt—is a borough and sea-port town, situate on a peninsula, on the coast of Essex, near the estuaries of the Stour and Orwell, in the hundred of Tendring. It is 42³/₄ miles N.E. by E. from Chelmsford, and 713 miles N.E. by E. from London. It has been a place of some trading importance from very early times, and has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The town was made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II.—the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the cliff above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich, and several martello towers on the Suffolk side, the whole mounting guns of heavy calibre. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821 at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses, the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The railway runs up to the town from the main line, and a regular traffic in goods and in foreign cattle for the London market is carried on as well as a good passenger traffic. The Great Eastern Railway Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Steamboats ply between here and Ipswich daily, and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vanz, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

MALDON.

(PARLIAMENTARY AND MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

MALDON is a neat little borough town, containing three parishes, and has a look of antiquity about it, though the hand of improvement, especially in its shop fronts, has somewhat altered its character of late years. It stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river navigable for vessels of 70 or 80 tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge Basin a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. The large and clear saltwater river, of considerable breadth at high water, procures for the town somewhat of the character of a watering-place, and visitors from a distance during the summer season frequently come to enjoy the bathing. Of so maritime a character is it that seaweeds grow close up to the town, and even beyond it. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. Its income altogether,

including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port has hitherto been free, but an Act of Parliament called "The Maldon Harbour Act," has recently been granted for widening and deepening the river, and to levy tolls on all ship-ping coming within the jurisdiction of the commissioners, but vessels loading and unloading in Heybridge Basin are still free. The borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and in that limit a number of fishing boats are employed, but the practice of the corporation granting licences to them for this purpose, which at one time prevailed, has fallen into disuse. Within the borough and the precincts round about there are various objects of interest to be visited. The old Town-hall itself, if not for the beauty of its architecture, at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Priory of Carmelite Friars. And, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing many rare works, left to the town by Dr. Plume.

SAFFRON WALDEN

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

796 Number of Burgesses on the roll

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the prettiest little towns in the county, takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it here has ceased for a century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensive scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with antiquities, the remnant of the castle, the earthworks on the south, and the curious work in the chall: on the Common attesting its importance in old times the appearance of the place itself shows that there is modern life and spirit in it. The streets of which there are several, have been much improved of late years by good shops and buildings. A convenient cattle market has

been provided. A handsome Corn-exchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town-hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected in the town, built by money left for the purpose by the late W. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke, and it is now opened for the reception of patients, being supported by voluntary contributions. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley-end, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, which, as the capital of the Northern Division of Essex, is the place where the election of Members of Parliament for the district takes place. It is here, too, that the petty sessional and other official business of South Hinckford is transacted. The town itself is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and in the time of Elizabeth Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited by cloth-makers. The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great

firm of Messrs. Courtauld employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighbourhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the well-known suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn-exchange, erected in 1839 at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

This is a town which has been much improved and extended since the opening of the railway, and the Lunatic Asylum and Warley Barracks, in the immediate vicinity, give it a county importance. It is a place of very ancient note, and in Roman Catholic times was a halting place for pilgrims to the shrine of St. Thomas à Becket, and the little chapel in the town was built partly for their This was once the assize town for Essex, but the old building called the Assize-house has been pulled down and a handsome new Town Hall erected on the site. Some handsome new almshouses in connexion with the same property have been erected at South Weald. Brentwood was a hamlet of South Weald, but a new church was erected in the town in 1835 at a cost of £3,500; it has been since enlarged. A small Roman Catholic chapel was built in 1837, but this is not now in use, and a much larger chapel close to it was opened in 1861.

COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

This town stands pleasantly on the banks of the Blackwater, partly on a declivity—Sunny-hill, as it was called in old times—and, with the memories which belong to the old Abbey of white monks, founded by Maud and King Stephen, and the remnants still scattered about, is a place of interest to the antiquarian. EPPING AND HARLOW.

THESE two towns, lying four miles apart, have been literally hewn out of the forest, by which they are still partially surrounded; and they occupy a very picturesque part of the county. Epping, whose sausages used to be a substantial matter of manufacture and profit in the locality, but are now a mere tradition, stands upon high ground which commands fine views over the country and the adjacent forest. It has several places of interest to the antiquarian in its vicinity, among them Amersbury Banks, alleged to have been the scene of Boadicea's great battle with the Romans; while the fine mansion of Copt Hall lies about a mile on the road to London; and The Grove and other good mansions are scattered around. Before railways it was a town of considerable traffic, lying on the high road to Newmarket and Cambridge; and Stokes' posting-house at Epping Place still lingers in the minds of some old members of the turf and the university.

HALSTED

Is pleasantly situated on a hill side; there is as much progress and improvement visible in it as in any other town in the county. Much of this is attributable to the spirit with which it has secured railway connexion. It has a good Institute and a Public Hall. The mother church has been restored, and two new ones were erected in outlying districts a few years ago; it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street, founded by Lady Mary Ramsey in 1594, in which, under the new Chancery scheme, provision is made for about 100 scholars. A large part of the working population are engaged in the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighbourhood, but not to any great extent. The market, which has recently been restored, was once a royal one, as belonging to the King, and was held on the hill in Saxon times. The town has been recently paved at a cost of £1,200 by the Local Board, who have also expended upwards of £5,000 in providing water supply and drainage. The rateable value of the parish is £22,069. The district under the Local Board is no longer co-extensive with the parish boundaries, an Act of Parliament passed in 1866 having limited the district to within a radius of 1,000 yards from the Town-bridge. A new Corn Exchange in Bridge-street was opened in September last; it cost between £1,300 and £1,400, and is charged upon the local rates by a vote of the parishioners. In July last a handsome new Congregational church was opened for public worship. It occupies the site of the old Meeting-house, Parson's-street, and is built of Kentish rag with Caen stone dressings in the decorated style of English Gothic; on the west side is a stone spire 110 feet high. The cost of the building, with internal fittings, was £4,600, exclusive of the old materials; and a new organ has been purchased at an additional cost of £253.

HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is, the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and as such was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornchurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, and an Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849 at a cost of £7,000 on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV.

The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering, and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford, and is a pleasant rural village. Its mansions are Havering Park, occupied by David McIntosh, Esq.; Pyrgo Park, Joseph Bray, Esq.; Bower House, C.P. Matthews, Esq.; The Grange, S. C. Hope, Esq.; Bedfords, Charles Barber, Esq.; Round House, Mrs. Barnes; The Hall, W. P. Barnes, Esq.; The Parsonage, Rev. R. R. Faulkner. King James of blessed memory attended divine service in this church, then the royal chapel, when Bishop Hall preached before the court.

SOUTHEND AND PRITTLEWELL.

PRITTLEWELL is, from its position on a hill-top above the Thames, a very picturesque village. It has a fine church—"the fairest in the Hundred," as it was described of old; and the Priory near by, the seat of Daniel Scratton, Esq., is a handsome mansion, standing upon the site of the old monastery. But Prittle-well is chiefly important as being the parent parish of the delightful watering-place of Southend, on the banks of the river a mile off, with Sheerness opposite, and the mouth of the Thames a short distance below. Southend is a hamlet of Prittlewell, but has a church of its own, and is a separate ecclesiastical district. Efforts were first set on foot to make it in 1768 "a place convenient for bathing," and since then it has continued to grow gradually. A pier was built in 1835; and since the opening of the railway a new town has sprung up. It is a very healthful spot, with pleasant walks around it; and the artillery station of Shoeburyness, where some of the most important experiments in gunnery have been made, lies a few miles down the shore.

THAXTED

Is an ancient town. At the time of the dissolution of the monasteries it was described as "a great and populous town, and a market, and thoroughfare town," but this would not very well apply to it in the present day. It was formerly a borough, and had its mayor, recorder, and court of quarter session; but the whole was extinguished by one of the many quo warrantos of Jas. II. CHURCH-STREET WARD.

(COMPRISING CANNING TOWN, FOREST GATE, AND UPTON.)

This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaistow Wards. There are also five divisions for ecclesiastical purposes, and others are in contemplation; these are rendered necessary from the erection of a number of district churches. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow bridge, under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was built by Matilda, the wife of Henry I., who is represented by the old historians as a woman of great piety, and who, having been endangered by crossing the ford, had a bridge erected, and gave to the abbey of Barking certain lands and a mill to keep the same in repair. The abbey at Stratford was not then founded. At a subsequent period the abbot of Stratford bought the lands and mill of the abbot of Barking and undertook the charge of the bridge. The bridge is rendered historical also from being the first arched bridge built in England. The old bridge was pulled down and a new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12,000. The establishment of large ship-building works on the banks of the Thames; the Victoria, now amalgamated with and known as "The London and St. Katharine's Docks," carried on under one proprietary; the extensive works of the Great Eastern Railway at Stratford New Town; the numerous chemical factories (including one where the finest quinine is manufactured),

sugar bakeries, and other large commercial and manufacturing establishments, furnish employment to thousands of artisans. Estates in various parts of the parish have been purchased by Land Societies, and apportioned out for building sites, realising as much, in some instances, as £700 per acre, or more than five or six times its original cost. Houses which had been erected in the marsh district near the Thames but a few years since, and which were considered of little or no value, have now become highly remunerative to the owners. The proximity of the parish to the metropolis, with a direct water communication with all parts of the world, has unquestionably rendered it highly desirable for commercial and manufacturing enterprise. The demand and progressive increase of the value of land and house property in many parts of this parish may be taken as a fair inference of the prosperity of the neighbourhood, which now ranks as one of the most important and populous in the eastern suburbs of the metropolis. The population numbers from 60,000 to 65,000.

WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of sex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the diers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and a first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew off what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the ve being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly

dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavon-

street, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.

To find the time of high water at any of the local and other ports above for any day throughout the year:—Take out the time of High Water at London Bridge from the table above for the given day, and add to or substract from this the hours and minutes opposite the name of the place. If, in adding, the result give an amount beyond 12 hours, take away that quantity and the time of the high tide next after the one calculated from will remain; or if, in subtracting, the number to be subtracted is greater than that from which it is to be taken the latter must be increased by 12 hours, and the difference will be the time of high water of the preceding evening. If the night tide be required at any place, add together the time of the day tide and that for the next day, and divide the sum by 2, when the quotient will be the exact time of the night tide.

Spring tides are the highest, and occur at or about New and Full Moon. Neap Tides are the lowest, and occur at the first and last quarter. Ebb tide is that between high and low water, lasting on an average 7½ hours, and Flood Tide is that between low and high water, lasting about 5½ hours. During strong north-westerly gales, the tide rises earlier, but does not rise to its usual height, while the ebb tide runs out longer and falls lower; but upon the gales abating, and weather moderating, they are later, higher, and stronger. A south-westerly gale has a contrary effect, and an easterly gives some additional water.

Note.—The above has been calculated as the distance or length of drill which ought to be manured by a single bushel of bone, or stone of guano, at the rates of manuring commonly in use among practical farmers. Some excellent agriculturists approve much of using part of bone and part of guano; the general proportion used is ten bushels of bone manure with one hundred-weight and a half of guano.

Note.—Tiles for Drainage are generally twelve inches long; but as they are neither very neatly cut nor quite square, they in general lay about thirteen inches on an average. This outlaying, however, is often required to uphold breakage; hence the best calculation is at twelve inches, for the purpose of making a purchase to suit the quantity to be drained.

The Table contains the usual distances betwixt drains, which are fixed upon according to the eloseness or openness of the subsoil, and in view of those who have the management of the drainage funds.

Exceeding one ounce, but not exceeding one and a half, threepence. Exceeding one and a half, and not exceeding two ounces, four-pence. Exceeding two ounces, but not exceeding two and a half ounces, fivepence; and so on, an additional half penny for every additional ounce. Unstamped letters are charged double postage on delivery. Those insufficiently stamped double the amount of such insufficiency. Re-directed letters are charged only a second pre-paid rate of postage. If coin be enclosed in a letter, the letter will be registered and charged double.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 8 oz. or fraction thereof 2d., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets mey contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. Book packets to India and New South Wales must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight. STAMPS.—At a post-office—

Labels, 1d., 2d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., 10d., 1s., 2s., and bs.; covers, 2s. 3d. per 2 doz. POST-OFFICE ORDERS.—The amount for which a single money order can be issued is limited to £10. The following table shows the rates of commission charged on inland and colonial money orders; viz.:—For sums not exceeding £2 (if payable in the United Kingdom), 3d.; not exceeding £5, 6d.; not exceeding £7, 9d.; and not exceeding £10, 1s. To Canada, Victoria, Western and South Australia, Queensland, Cape of Good Hope, and New Zealand, four-fold those sums; to Alexandria, Bahia, Buenos Ayres, Constanting C tinople, Gibraltar, Malta, Monte Video, Pernambuco, and Rio Janeiro three-fold the commission on inland money orders. Any money order, issued and payable in the United Kingdom, not applied for before the expiration of the second calendar month after that in which it was issued, becomes lapsed; and if the order be not paid within a twelvemonth all claim to the money will be forfeited.

This post-office savings' bank may be required to transfer accounts to other savings' banks which are not post-office savings' banks.—8. Persons opening an account at one bank may take

their books and make deposits at any other post-office savings' bank, or withdraw deposits.—9. No charge made for the postage of correspondence with the chief savings' bank at the London post-office.—10. All or any part of the amount deposited can be withdrawn in a few days after application.—11. Provision is made for deposits by trustees, minors, and married women.—12. Officers of the post-office are strictly prohibited against disclosing the name of any depositor, or any amount paid in or taken out.

PEERAGE AND BARONETAGE OF ESSEX.

RIGHT HON. EARL OF ROSSLYN.

ROSSLYN, 4th Earl of (United Kingdom). Created 1801.—Francis Robert St. Clair-Erskine, only son of the third Baron by Frances, daughter of Lieut.-Gen. William Wemyss (she died 1857). Born 1833; educated at Eton and Merton College, Oxford—B.A. 1852, M.A. 1855; succeeded 1866 and married November 8, 1866, Blanche Adelaide (widow of the Hon. Col. Maynard), second daughter of Henry Fitzroy, Esq., of Salcey Lawn, Northamptonshire; is patron of 1 living, a J.P. and D.L. for county Fife, and Lieut. 1st Fifeshire Mounted Rifles. The first Earl was Lord Chancellor and represented a younger branch of the family of the Earl of Buchan. Residences—Easton Lodge, near Dunmow; Dysart House, near Kircaldy, Fifeshire, N.B.

RIGHT HON. LORD DACRE.

DACRE, 22nd Baron (England). Created 1307.—Thomas Crosbie William Trevor, eldest son of the twenty-first Baron by the second daughter of the late Hon. and Rev. Dr. Crosbie, Dean of Limerick (she died 1844). Born 1808; educated at Christ Church, Oxford; married, 1837, Susan Sophia, eldest daughter of the first Lord Chesham (she was born 1817, and was for several years a bed-chamber woman to the Queen); was an unsuccessful candidate for North Essex in 1832, and for Lewes in 1837; was M.P. for Herts from 1847—52; succeeded his father 1853; Lord-Lieutenant of Essex 1865; is a Deputy-Lieutenant for Herts, patron of two livings, and co-heir to the barony of Fitzhugh. The first Baron was a distinguished military commander temp. Edward II. and III.; the daughter of the 6th Baron married Sir Richard Fiennes, and carried the title into that family; the sister of the 10th Baron carried the title into the Lennard family; a descendant of hers married the daughter of the fifteenth Lord Dacre, who succeeded as Baroness Dacre; and their representative in the female line, Henry Otway, twenty-first Baron, in 1824 assumed the surname of Trevor in lieu of Brand; the fifteenth Lord Dacre was created Earl of Sussex, a title Residence—The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts. which expired with him.

Heir presumptive, his brother Hon. Henry Bouverie William Brand; born 1814; educated at Eton, married, 1838, Eliza, daughter of Lieut.-General Ellice; was for some private secretary to Sir George Grey; was a Lord of the Treasury from 1855-58; is a magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Sussex, and Keeper of the Privy

Seal to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales; has been M.P. for Lewes since 1852.

RIGHT HON. LORD BRAYBROOKE.

Braybrooke, 5th Baron. (Gt. Brit.) Created 1788.—Charles Cornwallis Neville, second son of the third Baron, by the eldest daughter of the second Marquis of Cornwallis (she died 1856). Born at Billingbear 1823; married, 1849, the third daughter of the third Viscount Hawarden; succeeded his brother 1861; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex 1845, and Vice-Lieut. from 1861-5; patron of six livings; Visitor of Mag. Coll., Cambridge, as owner of Audley End. The first Baron was fourth Lord Howard De Walden, who obtained the barony of Braybrooke, with remainder, in default of male issue, to his cousin, the grandfather of the present peer; the third Baron assumed the name of Griffin; but his issue bear the name of Neville. Residences

—Audley End, Saffron Walden; Heydon House, Royston, Herts; Billingbear, Wokingham, Berks. Town Residence—42, Upper Brook-street.

Heir presumptive, his brother, Hon. and Rev. Latimer Neville; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

RIGHT HON. LORD HENNIKER.

HENNIKER, 4th Baron Henniker, of Stratford-upon-Slaney (Ireland). Created 1800, Bart. 1765 (Great Britain), Baron Hartismere 1866 (United Kingdom).— John Henniker-Major, eldest son of John Minet, 3rd Baron, by Mary, daughter of the late Rev. Wm. Chafy, Canon of Canterbury. Born at Stratford, Essex, 1801; educated at Eton and St. John's College, Cambridge (M.A. 1822); called to the bar at Lincola's Inn 1826; succeeded his father 1832; married, 1837, Anne, eldest daughter of the late General Sir Edward Kerrison, Bart. (she was born 1813); is a magistrate and Deputy Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex, and patron of six livings; was M.P. for East Suffolk 1832—47, and 1856-66; was High Sheriff of Suffolk in 1853. The 1st Bart. was John Major, M.P. for Scarborough, who accompanied Capt. Anson in his voyage round the world, and whose title was entailed on his son-in-law John Henniker, of Stratford House and Newton Hall, Essex, M.P. for Dover, and 1st Lord Henniker; the 3rd Baron assumed the name of Major in 1822. Residences:—Thornham Hall, Eye, Suffolk; Worlingworth Hall, Framlingham, Suffolk; 36 Grafton-street, W.; Athenæum and Carlton Clubs, S.W.

Heir, his son, Hon. John Major Henniker-Major, born 1842; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge (n.a. 1862, m.a. 1866); Lieut. 10th Suffolk R.V. 1860; J.P. and D.L. for Suffolk, m.P. for East Suffolk 1866; married, 1864, Lady Alice Mary, only daughter of the 3rd Earl of Desart. Has issue Albert Edward John, born 1865, to

whom the Prince of Wales stood sponsor.

RIGHT HON. LORD PETRE.

Petre, 12th Baron (Eng.). Created 1603.—William Bernard Petre, son of the eleventh Baron, by his first wife, the eldest daughter of Sir Richard Bedingfield, Bart. (she died 1822). Born at Thorndon, 1817; married, 1843, the eldest daughter of the Hon. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. The first Baron represented Essex in parliament; he was only son of Sir William Petre, Secretary of State temp. Henry VIII., Edward VI., Mary, and Elizabeth. Seat—Thorndon-hall, near Brentwood. Town Residence—57 Portland-place, W.

Heir, his son, the Hon. William Joseph, born at Leamington 1847.

RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh. Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Baroness was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Seat—Terling Place, Witham. Town Residence—United University, Pall Mall East.

Heir, his son, Hon. John William, born at Langford Grove, Nov. 12, 1842; Deputy-Lieutenant and Magistrate for Essex, 1864; educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge; Sheepshanks Exhibitioner 1864, Senior Wrangler and 1st Smith's prizeman for 1865, Fellow of his college 1866.

THE LORD BISHOP OF ROCHESTER.

Rochester, 97th Bishop of. Founded 604.—Right Rev. Thomas Legh Claughton, D.D., son of the late Thomas Claughton, Esq. — Born 1808; married, 1842, Hon. Julia Susanna, daughter of the 10th Baron Ward, and sister of the Earl of Dudley (she was born 1818); educated at Rugby and Trinity College, Oxford, where he was scholar, fellow, and tutor, and where he graduated in 1831, taking a first class in classics; gained the prize for Latin verse in 1828, the "Newdegate" in 1829, and the Chancellor's prize for Latin essay in 1832; ordained deacon 1834, priest 1836, in which year he was appointed public examiner; Vicar of Kidderminster 1841; Hon. Canon of Worcester Cathedral 1845; Professor of Poetry at Oxford 1852—57; Bishop of Rochester 1867; patron of the archdeaconries and above 60 livings. The diocese includes the Archdeaconry of Rochester, with the counties of Essex (except the deanery of Barking) and Herts; annual value £5,000. Residences — Danbury Palace, near Chelmsford; 28 Great George-street, Westminster.

FRANCES COUNTESS WALDEGRAVE.

Waldegrave, Countess (Peer's Widow).—Frances Elizabeth Anne, daughter of John Braham, Esq. Married, first, John James Waldegrave, Esq., of Navestock; secondly, 1840, the seventh Earl Waldegrave, who died 1846; thirdly, 1847, George Granville Vernon-Harcourt, Esq., who died 1861; fourthly, 1863, the Right Hon. Chichester Samuel Parkinson Fortescue, younger son of the late Lt. Col. Chichester Fortescue, brother and heir presumptive to Lord Clermont, and M.P. for Louth county (he was born 1823). Residences—Dudbrook House, Navestock; Chewton Priory, Somersetshire; Red House, Ardee, Ireland; Strawberry-hill, Twickenham; and 7 Carlton Gardens, London, S.W.

ABDY, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1849.—Sir Thomas Neville Abdy, only son of the late Captain Anthony Abdy, s.v., by the daughter of Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Born 1810; married, 1841, the second daughter of Rowland Alston, Esq., of Pishobury, Herts.; was educated at St. John's Coll., Cam., where he graduated B.A. 1833; was M.P. for Lyme Regis from 1847 to 1852; was an unsuccessful candidate for Maldon in 1841. The Baronet's grandfather, the Rev. Thomas Abdy Rutherforth, assumed the surname of Abdy, in lieu of his patronymic, on inheriting, through his mother, the estate of Sir John Abdy, the fourth Baronet, of Albyns, whose title, created in 1660, became extinct in 1759. Seat—Albyns, Romford. Heir—His son William Neville, born in Reter Place London 1844.

BUXTON, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1840.—Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, M.A., son of Sir E. N. Buxton (late M.P. for South Essex), the second Baronet, by the second daughter of Samuel Gurney, Esq., of Ham House. Born 1837; succeeded his father in 1858; educated at Harrow, and at Trinity College, Cambridge; is a partner in the brewery of Truman, Hanbury, and Co.; Major 1st Bn. Tower Hamlets R.V.; M.P. for Lynn; a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk 1859, and of Essex 1860; married Lynn, 1869. Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough. The ried, June, 1862, Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough. first Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the abolition of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 1625. Residences—Colne House, near Cromer, Norfolk; Warlies, Waltham Abbey. Heir—His con T. Fowell Victor, born April 8, 1865.

DE CRESPIGNY, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1805.—Sir Claude William CEAMPION DE CRESPIGNY, son of Captain Augustus James Champion de Crespigny, R.N., by the daughter of Sir William Smijth, Bart. Born in Grosvenor-square 1818; married, 1843, the second daughter of Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1829; educated at Winchester School, and at Trinity College, Cambridge (M.A. 1840); Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852; is also a magistrate; Captain 6th Essex Volunteer Rifles 1859; Lieut.-Col. 1st Bn. ditto 1860. The present Baronet's great grandfather received his title after an entertainment given to the Prince of Wales, and being created a Baronet resumed the prefix of "de," which anciently belonged to the family. His successor was M.P. for Southampton, and married a sister of the last Earl of Plymouth (extinct). This family was founded in England by Claude Champion, Sieur de Crespigny, in Normandy, who quitted France at the revocation of the Edict of Nantes. Residence—Wyvenhoe Hall,

Colchester. Heir—His son Claude, born in Cadogan Place 1847.

This family is descended from the ancestor of the ancient Earls of Desmond, and the 1st Baronet was created by Charles II. in consideration of losses suffered during the Commonwealth. The 9th Bart. assumed the surname of Dalton and the arms quarterly on inheriting the Dalton estates in Lancashire. Residences—Bigods Hall, Great Dunmow; Ishen Castle, Cork;

Thurnham Hall, Lancaster.

FOSTER, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Rev. Sir Cavendish Hervey
FOSTER, second son of the late Right Hon. Sir Augustus Foster, by Lady Albinia Jane, sister of the fifth Earl of Buckinghamshire. Born 1817; married, 1844, the youngest daughter of the late Rev. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; educated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842; has been rector of Thoydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Thoydon Garnon Rectory; and 5, Whitehall-yard. Heir—His

80n, John Frederic, born 1847.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1813.—Sir Beydges Powell Hen-NIMER, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; educated at Eton; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1849; Ensign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854, Lieutenant 1855, Captain 1858, retired 1859; J.P. for Essex 1857; Deputy-Lieut. 1858; Capt. West Essex Yeomanry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieutenant-General in the army. Seat-Newton Hall, near Dunmow. Heir-His son, Frederick Brydges Major,

born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Frederick WILLIAM HEYGATE, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmurdo, Esq., of Upper Clapton, Middlesex (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent, 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena, county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1844; M.A. 1847; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. The family is descended from the Heygates of Rendlesham, in Suffolk, and Feering, in Essex, subsequently, about the middle of the 16th century, seated at Hayes, in Middlesex. Residences-Southend; Roecliffe, Leicestershire; Bellarena, county Londonderry. Heir-His son Frederick Gage, born at Bellarena, 1854.

KEY, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Kingsmill Grove Key, only surviving son of Sir John, the first Baronet, by the youngest daughter of Francis Green, Esq., of Denmark Hill, and of Dorking, Surrey. Born 1815; married first, 1842, the second daughter of G. H. Hahn, Esq., of The Orchard, Wandsworth (she died 1855); secondly, 1859, the fourth daughter of the late Joseph Armstrong, Esq., of Manchester (she died same year); thirdly, 1862, Mary Anne, daughter of J. Kershaw, Esq., M.P.; succeeded his father in 1858; appointed Captain 21st Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1862; is a partner in the firm of Burgess and Key, of the Victoria Works, Brentwood. The first Baronet was a London Alderman, Lord Mayor in 1830-31. Residences—Thornbury, Glocestershire; Manor Park, Streatham, S. Heir—His son by first marriage, John

Kingsmill, born 1853.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Len-NARD, son of the late Thomas Barrett-Lennard, Esq. (who died 1856), by his second wife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Saling Grove, Essex. Born 1826; educated at Cambridge; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the late Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; J.P. for Essex 1857, Deputy-Lieut. 1860; Sheriff for 1865. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Belhus, Aveley; 7 Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9 Hyde-park-

Heir-His son Thomas, born 1853.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Henry Bouverie Pauler St.-John Mildman, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavalry 1861; High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed the name of Mildmay. Residence—Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir—His son, Henry Paulet St. John, horn in Enton-source 1853

St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 3rd Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795.—Sir Richard Digby Neave, son of Sir Thomas, the second Baronet, by the daughter of the late Very Rev. William Digby. Dean of Durham. Born 1793; married, 1827, the youngest daughter of the ninth Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849); succeeded his father in 1848; educated at St. Mary's Hall, Oxford (B.A. 1815); is author of "Four Days in Connemara." Residence— Dagnam Park, Romford. Heir—His son Arundell, born 1829; appointed Captain 3rd Dragoon Guards 1857; Captain Essex Yeomanry Cavalry 1866.

PELLY, 3rd Bart. (England.) Created 1840.—Sir Heney Carstairs Pelly, eldest son of the second Baronet by his first wife, Johannah Jane, youngest daughter of the late John Carstairs, Esq., of Stratford Green, and Woodhurst, Hunts (she died 1856). Born at Balls Park, Herts, 1844; educated at Harrow; entered the army as ensign Royal Scots Greys 1861; lieutenant 1863; succeeded his father 1864; appointed extra A.D.C. to the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, qualified as magistrate for Essex, and exchanged into the 2nd Life Guards, 1867. The first Baronet was Governor of the Bank of England

and of the Hudson's Bay Company, and Deputy Master of the Trinity House, London-Residences—Upton, West Ham; Warnham Court, Horsham, Sussex; Union Club, S.W. Heir presumptive—His step brother Alwyn, born 1861.

SELWIN, 6th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1748.—Sir John Thomas Selwin, fourth son of the late Sir James Ibbetson, second Baronet (who died 1795), by the daughter of J. Caygill, Esq., of Shaw House, Yorkshire. Born 1784; married, 1825. daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks (she was born 1803): succeeded his naphew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1865. 1803); succeeded his nephew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1825. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat—Down Hall, Harlow. Heir—His son Heary John, born 1826; married, firstly 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord Lyndhurst (she died 1865); secondly, 1867, Eden, widow of Sir Chas. Ibbetsen. Bart., of Denton Park, Yorkshire, he having previously assumed the name of Ibbetsen. See "Parliamentary Representation."

SMIJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir William Bowyer-Smijth, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (now Dowager Lady Bowyer-Smijth). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, weekere he took honors in 1837; appropriated Liver and 1821. pointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of three livings. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Residences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk. Heir—His son William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.

SMITH, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1804.—Sir Charles Cunliffe Smith, son of the second Baronet, by his second wife, second daughter of William Gosling, Esq., of Rochampton. Born in Norfolk-street, Park-lane, 1827; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1855, the youngest daughter of Capel Cure, Esq., of Blake Hall; succeeded his father in 1831; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852, in which year he was Sheriff. The first Baronet, Sir Drummond Smith, was brother to Sir John Burges, Bart., who assumed that name in lieu of his patronymic, and whose title became extinct at his own death in 1803. Seat—Suttons, Romford. Heir—His son Drummond Cunliffe, born in Grosvenor-street 1881.

TYRELL, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1809.—Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, son of first Baronet, by the only daughter and heir of William Tyssen, Esq., of Waltham House, Herts. Born 1795; married, 1819, eldest daughter and co-heir of the late Sir Thomas Pilkington, Bart. (from whom he is divorced); succeeded his father in 1832; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex, and was Colonel of the West Essex Militia from 1831 to 1852; was M.P. for Essex in 1830; was unsuccessful in 1831, but sat from 1832 to 1857. This family is said to be descended from Sir Walter Tyrell, temp. William Rufus. Residence-Boreham House, Chelmsford.

WESTERN, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1864.—SIR THOMAS BURCH WESTERN, son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Western, k.r.s., of Tattingstone Place, Suffolk, by Mary, daughter of Thomas Burch, Esq., of Bermuda. Born 1795; was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1818, M.A. 1824; married, 1819, Margaret Letitia, third daughter of William Bushby, Esq., of Kirkmichael, county Dumfries; succeeded in 1844 to the estates of his relative, the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct; is magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex; was High Sheriff of Essex in 1860; elected M.P. for North Essex in 1865. The family is descended from Lady Anne Plantagenet, wife of Bourchier, Earl of Ewe, and granddaughter of Edward III.; was settled in London temp. This Institution stands a short distance out of Brentwood, on the brow of the hill, leading up from that town to Warley. It is a fine building, in the mediæval style, of the Tudor period, and its pinnacles and the spire of its chapel give it a very picturesque appearance. The first stone was laid in 1851, and it was opened in September, 1853, the total cost of the erection being £89,557; but further sums have since been voted for the purchase of land and extensions. The money was borrowed by the county, to be repaid by instalments in 30 years. The sum paid last year by the different Unions for their patients was £15,178 0s. 11d., and the total receipts, including produce of garden and farm, were £16,155 1s. 7d.; the expenditure £16,194 2s. 2d. The present number of patients is 593—260 males and 333 females. Accommodation for 75 patients was obtained in 1863 by the erection of three cottages, with a spacious dining-hall, at a cost of about £9,000.

TRINITY CHURCH SCHOOL was established in January, 1857, with a view to provide for the Sons of Clergymen and Professional Gentlemen a sound Classical and General Education, based upon the principles of the Church of England.

Boys have been admitted from home, from preparatory schools, and from the following large and important Colleges and Schools—viz., Westminster School, Dulwich College (Upper School), St. Andrew's College, Bradfield, Brighton College, Cheltenham College, St. Nicholas College, Lancing, Sydney College, Bath, Liverpool College, St. John's College, Hurstpierpoint, Royal Naval School, &c.

The greater number of the boys have passed on to the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge; and to the following public and other large schools, —viz., Winchester, Eton, Westminster, Harrow, Rugby, Merchant Taylors', King's College, London, King's College School, London, Marlborough College, Brighton College, Haileybury College, St. Nicholas' College, Lancing, Uppingham School, Rossall School, the Royal Medical College, Epsom, Durham School, the Royal Naval School, and Tunbridge School. It ought to be distinctly understood that Boys are not received with a view to prepare them for any other schools than such as have been mentioned.

The following Honours have been gained in the University of Oxford by pupils of this school—viz, an Exhibition at St. Edmund's Hall, an Exhibition at Lincoln College, a Scholarship at Wadham College. Places in the Lists of Honours at the several examinations have been obtained both at Oxford and Cambridge, and a Scholarship at Magdalen Hall. One Boy has been elected, after competition by examination, to a King's Scholarship at Durham School, and prizes have been gained at other schools to which boys have passed.

While great attention has been paid to the Classics and Mathematics, as the foundation of all sound acquisition of knowledge, the Modern Languages and Literature have been carefully cultivated. Facilities are also afforded for learning Music and Drawing.

Special arrangement has been made for preparing Candidates for the Preliminary Examinations for the Army, Navy, the Incorporated Law Society, and the Royal College of Surgeons.

The Boys are regularly trained to drill of every kind, including that of the rifle, consent having been given under the hand and seal of two magistrates "to the training or drilling to the use of arms, or for the purpose of practising military exercises, movements, or evolutions."

In 1863 a Private Chapel was attached to the School, where the services are chorally conducted, one of the Boys acting as organist.

A conviction that a school of this kind would supply a want in the Church led to its establishment. It was set on foot as a matter of private enterprise. It is hoped when the labor and anxiety consequent on the first promotion of such an undertaking are over, and the School and its work have become more generally known, that the School may be established on some firmer basis, and eventually become one of those institutions dedicated to God's honor and service, where by the blessing of that Holy Trinity whose name it bears Boys may begin to serve God in Church and State, and where whatsoever tends to the advancement of True Religion and Useful Learning may for ever flourish and abound.

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CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighboring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828 at a cost of £57,289 17s. 04d., and enlarged and arranged 16 years ago at a further outlay of £36,000; here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head-quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighborhood, but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad, with the Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal—a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of 3,150 volumes. A Temperance Hotel has been erected on part of the site where in days of ancient coaching stood the famous road hostel—the old Black Boy; and in Moulsham an excellent improvement has been effected by the widening of the road and the building of a handsome inn, at Baddow-lane corner—a spot before proverbially dangerous. The malting trade is now carried on to some extent in the neighborhood.

Colchester is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Paliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I.—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23,815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactures except the silk factory of Mr. Brown, which employs about 250 hands, and several wholesale tailoring establishments, which employ about 2,700 people. It has good communication both by land and by water, railways running close up to the town, the Great Eastern having now been extended into it to St. Botolph's Station, the terminus of the Tendring Hundred Railway, while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 tons. This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are now all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdom—the veritable Camulodunum; and the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archæological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the past, may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. It is now governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, 18 Councillors, a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £450; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £300; making a total annual income of about £2,550. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough rate. The expenditure last year exceeded £2,700. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed by law to the Corporation, and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it in good seasons amounting to £14,000 a year. The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I., and its fairs are also of very ancient date The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, give to it an air of military life, and the martial activity has been largely increased since the completion of the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Europe. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. The handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000; and a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension. Nor among its public buildings must we forget the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden-road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 patients. The Great Eastern has erected a fine white brick railway station, with station-master's residence in the upper story, on the site of the old station on the down side.

HARWICH.

(PARLIAMENTARY AND MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

This sea-port borough, on the furthest point of the Essex coast, has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The town was made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II.—the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I., and it has since enjoyed this right, but the new Reform Bill has shorn it down to one representative. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the cliff above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich, and several martello towers on the Suffolk side, the whole mounting guns of heavy calibre. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821 at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses, the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The port at the beginning of the present century was one of the great outlets of England, and during the old French war it was a place of thrifty business and naval importance. A cloud afterwards came over it, but the railway has brought back much of its commercial importance. The Great Eastern Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Steamboats ply between here and Ipswich daily, and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vaux, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

MALDON, now a neat and modernised little town, for which some have claimed the honor of being the Roman Camulodumun, stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river or rather arm of the sea, navigable for vessels of seventy or eighty tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge Basin a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. The large and clear saltwater river, of considerable breadth at high water, procures for the town somewhat of the character of a watering-place, and visitors from a distance during the summer season frequently come to enjoy the Of so maritime a character is it that seaweeds grow close up to the town, and even beyond it. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. It is one of those which come under the pruning knife of the

Reform Bill, and will hereafter return only one member. Its income altogether, including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port has hitherto been free, but an Act of Parliament called "The Maldon Harbour Act," has recently been granted for widening and deepening the river, and to levy tolls on all shipping coming within the jurisdiction of the commissioners, but vessels loading and unloading in Heybridge Basin are still free. The borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and a Fishery and Oyster Company about to be brought into operation is likely to promote the importance and prosperity of the town. Within the borough and the precincts round about there are various objects of interest to be visited. The old Town-hall itself, if not for the beauty of its architecture at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the habitable remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Friary, for Carmelite brethren. And, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing many rare works and a few ancient portraits, left to the town by Dr. Plume. certain yearly amount is set apart from the Plume's Library Fund for the purchase of books, by which a valuable accession of modern works has been secured by the librarian, the Rev. E. R. Horwood.

SAFFRON WALDEN.

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the prettiest little towns in the county, takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it here has ceased for a century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensive scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with antiquities, the remnant of the castle, the earthworks on the south, and the curious work in the chalk on the Common attest its importance in old times. A convenient cattle market has been provided, and a handsome Cornexchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town-hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected, built by money left for the purpose by the late W. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke, and it is supported by voluntary contributions. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley-end, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 years. It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

Braintree and Bocking are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, which, as the capital of the Northern Division of Essex, is the place where the election of Members of Parliament for the district takes place. It is here, too, that the petty sessional and other official business of South Hinckford is transacted. The town itself is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and in the time of Elizabeth Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay by cloth-makers. trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great firm of Messrs. Courtaild employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighbourhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the wellknown suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn-exchange, erected in 1839 at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

This is a town which has been much improved and extended since the opening of the railway, and the Lunatic Asylum and Warley Barracks, in the immediate vicinity, give it a county importance. It is a place of very ancient note, and in Roman Catholic times was a halting place for pilgrims to the shrine of St. Thomas à Becket, and the little chapel in the town was built partly for their use. This was once the assize town for Essex, but the old building called the Assize-house has been pulled down and a handsome new Town Hall erected on the site. COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

THIS town stands pleasantly on the banks of the Blackwater, rtly on a declivity—Sunny-hill, as it was called in old times—and, with the mories which belong to the old Abbey of white monks, founded by Maud I King Stephen, and the remnants still scattered about, is a place of interest the antiquarian. It is as a manufacturing town, however, that in modern

times it owes its importance. The Flemings settled here, and Coggeshall was celebrated for their cloths. Fortunes of hundreds of thousands of pounds were made by this branch of industry. Silk is now its staple manufacture, a large number of the population being employed in its production, but there are other factories, and a large number in the town and neighbourhood are engaged in the tambour trade. The chief mansion of the parish is Oldfield Grange, the seat of Osgood Hanbury, Esq.—one of the Abbey Granges converted in the 6th century into the home of a country gentleman. EPPING AND HARLOW.

These two towns, lying four miles apart, have been literally hewn out of the forest, by which they are still partially surrounded; and they occupy a very picturesque part of the county. HALSTED

Is pleasantly situated on a hill side; there is as much progress and improvement visible in it as in any other town in the county. Much of this is attributable to the spirit with which it has secured railway connexion. It has a good Institute and a Public Hall. The mother church has been restored, and two new ones were erected in outlying districts a few years ago; it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street, founded by Lady Mary Ramsey in 1594, in which, under the new Chancery scheme, provision is made for about 100 scholars. A large part of the working population are engaged in the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighbourhood, but not to any great extent. The market, which has recently been restored, was once a royal one, as belonging to the King, and was held on the hill in Saxon times. The town has been recently paved at a cost of £1,200 by the Local Board, who have also expended upwards of £5,000 in providing water supply and drainage. The rateable value of the parish is £22,069. The district under the Local Board is no longer co-extensive with the parish boundaries, an Act of Parliament passed in 1866 having limited the district to within a radius of 1,000 yards from the Town-bridge. In 1866 a handsome new Congregational Church was opened for public worship. It occupies the site of the old Meeting-house, Parson's-street, and is built of Kentish rag with Caeu stone dressings in the decorated style of English Gothic; on the west side is a stone spire 110 feet high. The cost of the building, with internal fittings, was £4,600, exclusive of the old materials; and a new organ has been purchased at an additional cost of £253.

HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and as such was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornehurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, and an Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849 at a cost of £7,000 on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV.

The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering, and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford, and is a pleasant rural village. Its mansions are Havering Park, occupied by David McIntosh, Esq.; Pyrgo Park, Joseph Bray, Esq.; Bower House, C.P. Matthews, Esq.; The Grange, S. C. Hope, Esq.; Bedfords, Charles Barber, Esq.; Cromwell House, John Gladding, Esq.; Round House, Mrs. Barnes; The Hall, W. P. Barnes, Esq.; The Parsonage, Rev. R. R. Faulkner. King James of blessed memory attended divine service in this church, then the royal chapel, when Bishop Hall preached before the court.

CHIPPING ONGAR is a pleasant little town, the head of the Hundred, and, as its name implies, was the ancient market place of the district, though it appears to have greatly declined in population and traffic from what it was of old. There is now a railway terminus, and with an increasing population it promises to be a rising town. It was a Roman station, a market town in Seven times, and the remains of the old fendel costle of Richard de Lucy. town in Saxon times; and the remains of the old feudal castle of Richard de Lucy, which lie at the back of Mr. Coe's farm, attest it to have been of no slight importance under the Norman lords. A mile away is the beautiful little church of Greensted-the shrine of St. Edmund, in which the body of the saint rested; it has been of late years carefully and tastefully restored, and no stranger pilgrim in those parts ought to forego a visit to it. SOUTHEND AND PRITTLEWELL.

PRITTLEWELL is, from its position on a hill-top above the Thames, a very picturesque village. CHURCH-STREET WARD.

(COMPRISING CANNING TOWN, FOREST GATE, AND UPTON.)

This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaiston Wards. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow bridge under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was pulled down and new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12 000. The Great Metropolitan Series Bridge, in the High-street, Stratford, is nearly 1,500 feet in length and present a fine specimen of engineering skill, embracing all the modern improve

ments in that particular branch of mechanical science. Under this bridge passes a portion of the Metropolitan Sewage, which is conveyed by two monster tunnels to the outfall works at Barking Creek. The repairing and lighting of this bridge is defrayed by the Metropolitan Board of Works. At West Ham Abbey the works of the pumping station connected with the Great Metropolitan Sewer are now rapidly progressing, and it is anticipated that by Midsummer of the current year (1868) they will be so far completed for pumping operations to commence. The magnitude of these works combined with the engineering skill and ingenuity shown in their construction cannot, fail to attract the notice and elicit the admiration of all by whom they have been inspected. Among the improvements worthy of notice in this neighborhood may be mentioned the Congregational Church on the north side of Stratford Grove, erected at a cost of £12,000. It has a fine and noble exterior, possessing considerable pretensions to architectural design and beauty in its composition. The London and County Bank on the south side of St. John's church, erected at a cost of about £4,000, from the design of F. Chancellor, Esq., of Chelmsford, is a commanding and imposing structure, the architectural embellishments being especially deserving of commendation. The hotel accommodation at Stratford has been increased by the erection of the Commercial Hotel at a cost of nearly £4,000. The site chosen for the new Town Hall in the Broadway facing the high road and abutting on West Ham-lane is probably the best that could have been selected. Besides providing the necessary offices for conducting the parochial business accommodation will be afforded for the magistrates holding petty session, the present police court being only a small and inconvenient room contiguous to the Great Eastern Railway Mechanics' Institute. The West Ham Board of Health have been empowered under a Local Act to expend a sum not exceeding \$20,000 on the purchase of the site and erection of the building. It may now be reasonably assumed that the new Town Hall will have been erected before the close of the year 1868. Among the designs for the building sent in for the approval of the board, and for which a prize of £100 has been awarded, that of Mr. John Giles, of 38 Craven-street, Strand, and Mr. Lewis Angell the surveyor to the board, joint competitors, has been selected. The population of West Ham is now computed at 78,000.

WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times when the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of Essex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the soldiers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and was first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew off to what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was at one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the Grove being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavonstreet, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.

WYVENHOE

Is 55 miles from London and four and a half south-west of Colchester, situate on the river Colne, which is navigable for ships of considerable tonnage. To find the time of high water at any of the local and other ports above for any day throughout the year:—Take out the time of High Water at London Bridge from the table above for the given day, and add to or substract from this the hours and minutes opposite the name of the place. At those places where the high water precedes that of London Bridge the contraction "sub" for substract is affixed, and where the times of high water are later than at London Bridge the word "add" is attached. If, in adding, the result gives an amount beyond 12 hours, take away 12 and the time of the high tide next before the one calculated from will remain; or if, in subtracting, the number to be subtracted is greater than that from which it is to be taken the latter must be increased by 12, and the difference will be the time of high water of the preceding evening. If the night tide be required at any place, add together the time of the day tide and that for the next day, and divide the sum by 2, when the quotient will be the exact time of the night tide.

Spring tides are the highest, and occur at or about New and Full Moon. Near Tides are the lowest, and occur at the first and last quarter. Ebb tide is that between high and low water, lasting on an average 7½ hours, and Flood Tide is that between low and high water, lasting about 5½ hours. During strong north-westerly gales, the tide rises earlier, but does not rise to its usual height, while the ebb tide runs out longer and falls lower; but upon the gales abating and weather moderating, they are later, higher, and stronger. A south-westerly gale has a contrary effect, and an easterly gives some additional water.

than 20 years, of the clear yearly value of not less than £50.

Occurrens.—Occupiers of lands or tenements of the rateable value of £12 and upwards, who on last day of July in any year and during the twelve months preceding have been rated to poor rates, and have before the 20th July in same year paid all poor rates up to preceding 5th January.

BOROUGHS.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding for in weight, ld.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 4 oz. or fraction thereof ld., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets may contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. RIGHT HON. EARL OF ROSSLYN.

Rosslyn, 4th Earl of (United Kingdom). Created 1801.—Francis Robert St. Clair-Erskine, only son of the third Baron by Frances, daughter of Lieut.-Gen. William Wemyss (she died 1857). Born 1833; educated at Eton and Merton College, Oxford—B A. 1852, M.A. 1855; succeeded 1866 and married November 8, 1866, Blanche Adelaide (widow of the Hon. Col. Maynard), second daughter of Henry Fitzroy, Esq., of Salcey Lawn, Northamptonshire; is patron of 1 living, a J.P. and D.L. for county Fife, and Lieut. 1st Fifeshire Mounted Rifles. The first Earl was Lord Chancellor. Residences—Easton Lodge, near Dunmow; Skeffington Vale, Leicester; Dysart House, near Kircaldy, Fifeshire, N.B.

Issue: Lady Millicent Fanny St. Clair Erskine, b. Oct. 20, 1867.

RIGHT HON. LORD DACRE.

DACRE, 22nd Baron (England). Created 1307.—Thomas Crosbie William Trever, eldest son of the twenty-first Baron by the second daughter of the late Hon. and Rev. Dr. Crosbie, Dean of Limerick (she died 1844). Born 1808; educated at Christ Church, Oxford; married, 1837, Susan Sophia, eldest daughter of the first Lord Chesham (she was born 1817, and was for several years a bed-chamber woman to the Queen); was an unsuccessful candidate for North Essex in 1832, and for Lewes in 1837; was M.P. for Herts from 1847—52; succeeded his father 1853; Lord-Lieutenant of Essex 1865; is a Deputy-Lieutenant for Herts, patron of two livings, and co-heir to the barony of Fitzhugh. The first Baron was a distinguished military commander temp. Edward II. and III.; the daughter of the 6th Baron married Sir Richard Fiennes, and carried the title into that family: the sister of the 10th Baron carried the title into the Lennard family; a descendant of hers married the daughter of the fifteenth Lord Dacre, who succeeded as Baroness Dacre; and their representative in the female line, Henry Otway, twenty-first Baron, in 1824 assumed the surname of Trevor in lieu of Brand; the fifteenth Lord Dacre was created Earl of Sussex, a title which expired with him. Residence-The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts. Town residence-9 Hereford-street, Park-lane.

Heir presumptive, his brother Hon. Henry Bouverie William Brand; born 1814; educated at Eton, married, 1838, Eliza, daughter of Lieut.-General Ellice; was for some time private secretary to Sir George Grey; was a Lord of the Treasury from 1855-58; is a magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Sussex, and Keeper of the Privy Seal to H.R.H. the Prince of Wales; M.P. for Lewes 1852-68; for Cambridgeshire 1868.

RIGHT HON. LORD BRAYBROOKE.

BRAYBROOKE, 5th Baron. (Gt. Brit.) Created 1788.—Charles Cornwallis Neville, second son of the third Baron, by the eldest daughter of the second Marquis of Cornwallis (she died 1856). Born at Billingbear 1823; married, 1849, the third daughter of the third Viscount Hawarden; and has issue Augusta, b. Jan. 19, 1860; succeeded his brother 1861; educated at Magdalene College, Cambridge; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1845, and Vice-Lieutenant from 1861-5; patron of seven livings; Visitor of Magdalene College, Cambridge, as owner of Audley End. The first Baron was fourth Lord Howard De Walden, who obtained the barony of Braybrooke, with remainder, in default of male issue, to his cousin, the grandfather of the present peer; the third Baron assumed the name of Griffin; but his issue bear the name of Neville. Residences -Audley End, Saffron Walden; Heydon House, Royston, Herts; Billingbear, Wokingham, Berks. Town Residence-42, Upper Brook-street.

Heir presumptive, his brother, Hon. and Rev. Latimer Neville; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of

Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

RIGHT HON. LORD FITZWALTER.

FITZWALTER of Woodham Walter, co. Essex, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1868, Bart. 1718 (Great Britain).—Brooke William Bridges, elder son of the 4th Bart. by his wife Eleanor, daughter of John Foote, Esq. Born 1801; educated at Winchester and Oriel College, Oxon (B.A. 1822, M.A. 1827); succeeded his father 1829; married, 1834, Fanny, eldest daughter and heir of the late Lewis Cage, Esq., of Milgate, Kent; Capt. of the East Kent Yeomanry Cavalry 1830-53; conservative M.P. for East Kent Feb.-July, 52 and 1857-68; is a patron of four livings, and J P. and D.L. for Kent. The father of the 1st baronet was auditor of the treasury, and the present baron established his claim as one of the coheirs, if not sole heir, to the barony of Fitzwalter 1295, which is in abeyance since 1756. Seat-Goodnestone Park, Kent. Town residence-National Club, Whitehall Gardens.

Heir presumptive to the baronetcy, his brother the Rev. Brook George Bridges, b. 1802, educated at Winchester and Oriel Coll., Oxon (B.A. 1825); rector of Orlingbury, Northamptonshire, 1827-53; rector of Blankney, Lincolnshire, since 1853; married 1832 Louisa, daughter of the late Charles Chaplin, Esq., of Blankney.

RIGHT HON. LORD HENNIKER.

HENNIKER, 4th Baron Henniker, of Stratford-upon-Slaney (Ireland). Created 1800, Bart. 1765 (Great Britain), Baron Hartismere 1866 (United Kingdom).-John Henniker-Major, eldest son of John Minet, 3rd Baron, by Mary, daughter of the late Rev. Wm. Chafy, Canon of Canterbury. Born at Stratford, Essex, 1801; educated at Eton and St. John's College, Cambridge (M.A. 1822); called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn 1826; succeeded his father 1832; married, 1837, Anne, eldest daughter of the late General Sir Edward Kerrison, Bart. (she was born 1813); is a magistrate and Deputy Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex, and patron of six livings; was M.P. for East Suffolk 1832-47, and 1856-66; was High Sheriff of Suffolk in 1853. The 1st Bart. was John Major, M.P. for Scarborough, who accompanied Capt. Anson in his voyage round the world, and whose title was entailed on his son-in-law John Henniker, of Stratford House and Newton Hall, Essex, M.P. for Dover, and 1st Lord Henniker; the 3rd Baron assumed the name of Major in 1822. Residences:—Thornham Hall Eye, Suffolk; Worlingworth Hall, Framlingham, Suffolk; 36 Grafton-street, W.; Athenaum and Carlton Clubs, S.W.

Heir, his son, Hon. John Major Henniker-Major, born 1842; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge (B.A. 1862, M.A. 1866); Lieut. 10th Suffolk R.V. 1860; J.P. and D.L. for Suffolk, M.P. for East Suffolk 1866; married, 1864, Lady Alice Mary, only claughter of the 3rd Earl of Desart. Has issue Albert Edward John, born 1865, to whom the Prince of Wales stood sponsor.

RIGHT HON. LORD PETRE.

Petre, 12th Baron (Eng.). Created 1603.—William Bernard Petre, son of the eleventh Baron, by his first wife, the eldest daughter of Sir Richard Bedingfield, Bart. (she died 1822). Born at Thorndon, 1817; married, 1843, the eldest daughter of the Hon. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. The first Baron represented Essex in parliament; he was Mary, and Elizabeth. Seat—Thorndon-hall, near Brentwood. Town Residence— 57 Portland-place, W.

Heir, his son, the Hon. William Joseph, born at Learnington 1847.

RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Barones was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended

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from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Seat-Terling Place, Witham. Town residence—United University, Pall Mall East.

Herr, his son, Hon. John William, born at Langford Grove, Nov. 12, 1842; Deputy-Lieutenant and Magistrate for Essex, 1864; educated at Harrow and Trinity College, Cambridge; Sheepshanks Exhibitioner 1864, Senior Wrangler and 1st Smith's prizeman for 1865, Fellow of his college 1866.

THE LORD BISHOP OF ROCHESTER.

ROCHESTER, 97th Bishop of. Founded 604.—Right Rev. Thomas Legh Claughton, D.D., son of the late Thomas Claughton, Esq. — Born 1808; marned, 1842, Hon. Julia Susanna, daughter of the 10th Baron Ward, and sister of the Earl of Dudley (she was born 1818); educated at Rugby and Trinity College, Oxford, where he was scholar, fellow, and tutor, and where he graduated in 1831, taking a first class in classics; gained the prize for Latin verse in 1828, the "Newdegate" in 1829, and the Chancellor's prize for Latin essay in 1832; ordained deacon 1834, priest 1836, in which year he was appointed public examiner; Vicar of Kidderminster 1841; Hon. Canon of Worcester Cathedral 1845; Professor of Poetry at Oxford 1852—57; Bishop of Rochester 1867; patron of the archdeaconries and above 60 livings. The diocese includes the Archdeaconry of Rochester, with the counties of Essex and Herts; annual value £5,000, Residence—Danbury Palace, near Chelmsford.

FRANCES COUNTESS WALDEGRAVE.

Waldegrave, Countess (Peer's Widow).—Frances Elizabeth Anne, daughter of John Braham, Esq. Married, first, John James Waldegrave, Esq., of Navestock; secondly, 1840, the seventh Earl Waldegrave, who died 1846; thirdly 1847, George Granville Vernon-Harcourt, Esq., who died 1861; fourthly, 1863, the Right Hon. Chichester Samuel Parkinson Fortescue, younger son of the late Lt.-Col. Chichester Fortescue, brother and heir presumptive to Lord Clermont, M.P. for Louth county (he was born 1823), secretary for Ireland 1868, with a seat in the cabinet. Residences—Dudbrook House, Navestock; Chewton Priory, Somersetshire; Red House, Ardee, Ireland; Strawberry-hill, Twickenham; and 7 Carlton Gardens, London, S.W.

ABDY, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1849.—Sir Thomas Neville Abdy, only son of the late Captain Anthony Abdy, R.N., by the daughter of Admiral Sir Thomas Rich. Born 1810; married, 1841, the second daughter of Rowland Alston, Esq., of Pishobury, Herts.; was educated at St. John's Coll., Cam., where he graduated B.A. 1833; was M.P. for Lyme Regis from 1847 to 1852; was an unsuccessful candidate for Maldon in 1841. The Baronet's grandfather, the Rev. Thomas Abdy Rutherforth, assumed the surname of Abdy, in lieu of his patronymic, on inheriting, through his mother, the estate of Sir John Abdy, the fourth Baronet, of Albyns, whose title, created in 1660, became extinct in 1759. Seat—Albyns, Romford. Town residence—68 Inverness-terrace. Heir—His son William Neville, born in Eaton Place, London, 1844.

BUXTON, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1840.—Sir Thomas Fowell Buxton, M.A., son of Sir E. N. Buxton (late M.P. for South Essex), the second Baronet, by the second daughter of Samuel Gurney, Esq., of Ham House. Born 1837; succeeded his father in 1858; educated at Harrow, and at Trinity College, Cambridge; is a partner in the brewery of Truman, Hanbury, and Co.; Major 1st Bn. Tower Hamlets R.V.; was M.P. for Lynn; a Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant of Norfolk 1859, and of Essex 1860; married, June, 1862, Victoria, youngest daughter of the Earl of Gainsborough. The first Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the abolition of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 1625. Residences—Colne House, near Cromer, Norfolk; Warlies, Waltham Abbey; 23 Upper Brook-street, W. Heir—His son T. Fowell Victor, born April 8, 1865.

FITZGERALD, 10th Bart. (Ireland.) Created 1644.—Sir Gerald Richard Dalton Fitzgerald, second son of Sir James, the 8th Bart., by Augusta, 2nd daughter of Vice-Admiral Sir Thomas Fremantle, G.C.B. Born 1832; married, 1861, Agnes Georgiana, 2nd daughter of Geo. Wildes, Esq., of Elm Bank, Manchester; late Lieut. R.N.; is a magistrate for Essex; succeeded his brother 1867. This family is descended from the ancestor of the ancient Earls of Desmond, and the 1st Baronet was created by Charles II. in consideration of losses suffered during the Commonwealth. The 9th Bart. assumed the surname of Dalton and the arms quarterly on inheriting the Dalton estates in Lancashire. Residences—Bigods Hall, Great Dunmow; Ishen Castle, Cork; Thurnham Hall, Lancaster; 42 Grosvenor Place, W.

FOSTER, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Rev. Sir Cavendish Hervey Foster, second son of the late Right Hon. Sir Augustus Foster, by Lady Albinia Jane, sister of the fifth Earl of Buckinghamshire. Born 1817; married, 1844, the youngest daughter of the late Rev. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; educated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842; has been rector of Theydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Theydon Garnon Rectory; 5 Whitehall-yard; Clyde Court, co. Louth, Ireland. Heir—His son, John Frederic, born 1847, educated at Marlborough and Magdalene Coll., Camb.; is now in the 13th Hussars.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1813.—Sir Brydges Powell Henniker, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; educated at Eton; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1849; Ensign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854, Lieutenant 1855, Captain 1858, retired 1859; J.P. for Essex 1857; Deputy-Lieut. 1858; Capt. West Essex Yeomanry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieutenant-General in the army. Seat—Newton Hall, near Dunmow. Heir—His son, Frederick Brydges Major, born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Frederick William Heygate, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmardo, Esq., (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent, 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena, county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1844; M.A. 1847; High Sheriff of Londonderry 1855, and of co. Donegal 1857; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. The family is descended from the Heygates of Rendlesham, in Suffolk, and Feering, in Essex, subsequently, about the middle of the 16th century, seated at Hayes, in Middlesex. Residences—Southend; 43 Euton-square, S.W.; Bellarena, county Londonderry. Heir—His son Frederick Gage, born at Bellarena, 1854.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Lennard, son of the late Thomas Barrett-Lennard, Esq. (who died 1856), by his second wife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Saling Grove, Essex. Born 1826; educated at Cambridge; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the late Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; J.P. for Essex 1857, Deputy-Lieut. 1860; High Sheriff 1865. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Belhus, Aveley; 7 Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9 Hyde-parkterrace. Heir—His son Thomas, born 1853.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Henry Bouverie Pauler St.-John Mildmay, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; appointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavalry 1861; High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed the name of Mildmay. Residence—Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir—His son, Henry Paulet St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 4th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795.—Sir Arundell Neave, son of Sir Richard Digby, 3rd Bart., by the daughter of the 9th Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849). Born 1829; educated at Eton; Cornet 3rd Dragoon Guards 1851, Lieutenant 1856, and Captain 1857; retired 1863; Captain West Essex Yeomanry Cavalry, 1866; retired 1868; succeeded his father 1868; is patron of one living. Residences—Dagnam Park, Romford; 36 St. James's-street, S.W. Heir presumptive—his brother Reginald.

O'MALLEY, 2nd Bart. Created 1804. Sir William O'Malley, clost son of Sir Samuel, 1st Bart., by Jane, daughter of the late J. Reilly, Esq., of Newark. Born 1816; married 1860 Louisa Mary, 2nd daughter of the late Rev. Henry Du Cane, of the Grove, Witham; was High Sheriff of co. Mayo, 1838; succeeded his father 1864; was formerly a Captain in the 7th Royal Fusitiers, and Lieut. Col. North Mayo Militia; is barrack-master of Colchester Garrison. The family is of long standing in Mayo, and has held the manor of Carramore over 900 years. Seat—Kilboyne Manor, Mayo. Resident —Witham. Heir presumptive—His brother Henry, b. 1819; called to the bar; married 1858 Blanche Alice, daughter of D. Robertson, Esq.

PELLY, 3rd Bart. (England.) Created 1840.—Sir Henry Carstains Pelly, eldest son of the second Baronet by his first wife, Johannah Jane, youngest daughter of the later John Carstairs, Esq., of Stratford Green, and Woodhurst, Hunts (she died 1856). Bore at Balls Park, Herts, 1844; educated at Harrow; entered the army as ensign Royal

Scots Greys 1961; lieutenant 1863; succeeded his father 1864; appointed extra A.D.c. to the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, qualified as magistrate for Essex, and exchanged into the 2nd Life Guards, 1867. The first Baronet was Governor of the Bank of England and of the Hudson's Bay Company, and Deputy Master of the Trinity House, London. Addresses—Horse Guards and Union Club, S.W. Heir presumptive—His step brother Alwyn, born 1861.

SELWIN, 6th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1748.—Sir John Thomas Selwin, fourth son of the late Sir James Ibbetson, second Baronet (who died 1795), by the daughter of J. Caygill, Esq., of Shaw House, Yorkshire. Born 1784; married, 1825, daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks (she was born 1803); succeeded his nephew in 1861; assumed the name of Selwin in 1825. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat—Down Hall, Harlow. Heir—His son Henry John, born 1826; married, firstly 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord Lyndhurst (she died 1865); secondly, 1867, Eden, widow of Sir Chas. Ibbetson, Bart., of Denton Park, Yorkshire, he having previously assumed the name of Ibbetson. [See "Parliamentary Representation."]

SMIJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir William Bowyer-Smijth, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (she died 1868). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took honors in 1837; appointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of three livings. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Residences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk; Carlton, S.W. Heir—His son William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.

SMITH, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1804.—Sir Charles Cunliffe Smith, son of the second Baronet, by his second wife, second daughter of William Gosling, Esq., of Roehampton. Born in Norfolk-street, Park-lane, 1827; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1855, the youngest daughter of Capel Cure, Esq., of Blake Hall; succeeded his father in 1831; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852, in which year he was Sheriff. The first Baronet, Sir Drummond Smith, was brother to Sir John Burges, Bart., who assumed that name in lieu of his patronymic, and whose title became extinct at his own death in 1803. Seat—Suttons, Romford. Heir—His son Drummond Cunliffe, born in Grosvenor-street 1861.

TYRELL, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1809.—Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, son of first Baronet, by the only daughter and heir of William Tyssen, Esq., of Waltham House, Herts. Born 1795; married, 1819, eldest daughter and co-heir of the late Sir Thomas Pilkington, Bart. (from whom he is divorced); succeeded his father in 1832; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex, and was Colonel of the West Essex Militia from 1831 to 1852; was M.P. for Essex in 1830; was unsuccessful in 1831, but sat from 1832 to 1857. This family is said to be descended from Sir Walter Tyrell, temp. William Rufus. Residences—Boreham House, Chelmsford; 2 Lower Grosvenor-place, Pimlico, S.W.

WESTERN, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1864.—Sir Thomas Burch Western, son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Western, k.t.s., of Tattingstone Place, Suffolk, by Mary, daughter of Thomas Burch, Esq., of Bermuda. Born 1795; was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1818, M.A. 1824; married, 1819, Margaret Letitia, third daughter of William Bushby, Esq., of Kirkmichael, county Dumfries; succeeded in 1844 to the estates of his relative, the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct; is magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex; was High Sheriff of Essex in 1850; M.F. for North Essex 1865–68. The family is descended from Lady Anne Plantagenet, wife of Bourchier, Earl of Ewe, and granddaughter of Edward III.; was settled in London temp. Henry VII.; and Samuel Western was baron of the Cinque Ports temp. William III. Seats—Felix Hall, Kelvedon; Rivenhall Place, Witham; Tattingstone, Ipswich, Suffolk. Heir—His son, Thomas Sutton; born 1821; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1848, Giulietta Romana, daughter of Sir Edward Buller, Bart., of Dilhorne, county Stafford, M.F. for North Staffordshire (she died 1850); was the Liberal M.F. for Maldon from 1857 to 1865; is J.P. and D.L. for Essex and Suffolk; Hon. Colonel of the Essex Rifles Militia, 1866; has issue Thomas Charles Callis, b. 1850.

WOOD, 4rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1837.—Sir Matthew Wood, only son of the late Sir Francis, by Louisa, eldest daughter of R. Hodgson, Esq., of Appleshaw. Born 1857. The 1st Baronet was M.P. for London and twice Lord Mayor. Seal—Rivenhall Place, Witham. Heir presumptive—His uncle, Charles Page Wood, b. 1836.

ESSEX COUNTY LUNATIC ASYLUM.

This Institution stands a short distance out of Brentwood, on the brow of the hill, leading up from that town to Warley. The first stone was laid in 1851, and it was opened in Sept., 1853, the total cost of the erection being £89,557; but further sums have since been voted for the purchase of land and extensions. The money was borrowed by the county, to be repaid by instalments in 30 years. The sum paid last year by the different Unions for their patients was £16,080 13s. 2d., and the total receipts, including produce of garden and farm, were £17,067 8s. 3d.; the expenditure £16,765 1s. 11d. The present number of patients is 599—260 males and 339 females. Accommodation for 75 patients was obtained in 1863 by the erection of three cottages, with a spacious dining-hall, at a cost of about £9,000. New buildings are in course of erection for 250 female patients.

TOWNS' DIRECTORY.

CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighboring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828 at a cost of £57,289 17s. 03d., and enlarged and arranged 17 years ago at a further outlay of £36,000; here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head-quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighborhood, but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad. The Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal—a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of 3,150 volumes. A Temperance Hotel has been erected on part of the site where in days of ancient coaching stood the famous road hostel—the old Black Boy; and in Moulsham an excellent improvement has been effected by the widening of the road and the building of a handsome inn, at Baddow-lane corner—a spot before proverbially dangerous. The malting trade is now carried on to some extent in the neighborhood. In connexion with the Board of Health and its works the whole sewage of the town is conveyed by means of iron pipes to Barnes Farm, Springfield, for the purpose of irrigation; the works have been in operation now two years and with the most successful results.

COLCHESTER is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Paliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I.—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23.815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactories except that of Mr. Brown, silk throwster, who employs about 250 hands, and more recently that of the Britannia sewing machine, besides several wholesale tailoring establishments, which employ about 2,700 people. It has good communication both by land and by water, railways running close up to the town, the Great Eastern having been extended into it to St. Botolph's Station, the terminus of the Tendring Hundred Railway, while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 tons. This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdom-the veritable Camulodunum; and the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archeological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the past, may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. The borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. It is governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, 18 Councillors, a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £450; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £800; making a total annual income of about £2,550. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough rate. The expenditure last year exceeded £2,700. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed by law to the Corporation, and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it in good seasons amounting to £14,000 a year. The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I., and its fairs are also of very ancient date. The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, gives to it an air of military life, and the martial activity has been largely increased since the completion of the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Enrope. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000; and a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension. Nor among its public buildings must we forget the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden-road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 patients.

HARWICH.

This sea-port borough, on the furthest point of the Essex coast, has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The town was made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II.—the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I., and it has since enjoyed this right, but the new Reform Bill has shorn it down to one representative. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the cliff above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich, and several martello towers on the Suffolk side, the whole mounting guns of heavy calibre. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821 at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses. the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The port at the beginning of the present century was one of the great outlets of England, and during the old French war it was a place of thrifty business and naval importance. A cloud afterwards came over it, but the railway has brought back much of its commercial importance. The Great Eastern Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Steamboats ply between here and Ipswich daily, and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vaux, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

MALDON, now a neat and modernised little town, for which some have claimed the honor of being the Roman Camulodunum, stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river or rather arm of the sea, navigable for vessels of seventy or eighty tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge Basin a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. It returns one member to parliament under the new Reform Bill. Its income altogether, including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port has hitherto been free, but an Act of Parliament called "The Maldon Harbour Act," has recently been granted for widening and deepening the river, and to levy tolls on all ship-ping coming within the jurisdiction of the commissioners, but vessels loading and unloading in Heybridge Basin are still free. The borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and a Fishery and Oyster Company about

to be brought into operation is likely to promote the importance and prosperity of the town. The old Town-hall, if not for the beauty of its architecture at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the habitable remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Friary for Carmelite brethren. And, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing many rare works and a few ancient portraits, left to the town by Dr. Plume. A certain yearly amount is set apart from the Plume's Library Fund for the purchase of books, by which a valuable accession of modern works has been secured by the librarian, the Rev. E. R. Horwood. The Grammar School, which is also held in St. Peter's Church, was founded by Ralph Breeder, in 1608, and augumented by Dr. Plume. This school is now in active operation, and in its renovated character supplies the hitherto great local want of an educational establishment in accordance with the requirements of modern education.

SAFFRON WALDEN.

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the prettiest little towns in the county takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it has ceased for century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensive scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with

antiquities, the remnant of the castle, the earthworks on the south, and the curious work in the chalk on the Common attest its importance in old times. A convenient cattle market has been provided, and a handsome Cornexchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town-hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected, built by money left for the purpose by the late W. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke, and it is supported by voluntary contributions. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley-end, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 years. It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

Braintree and Bocking are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, where the election of Members of Parliament for the district used to take place, but has been transferred to Colchester. The town is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and in the time of Elizabeth Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited by cloth-makers. The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great firm of Messrs. Courtauld employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighbourhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the wellknown suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn-exchange, erected in 1839 at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

This is a town which has been much improved and extended since the opening of the railway; the Lunatic Asylum and Warley Barracks, in the immediate vicinity, give it a county importance. By the new arrangement the election of Members of Parliament for the Southern Division of the county is held here. It is a place of very ancient note, and in Roman Catholic times was a halting place for pilgrims to the shrine of St. Thomas à Becket, and the little chapel in the town was built partly for their use. This was once the assize town for Essex, but the old building called the Assize-house has been pulled down and a handsome Town Hall erected on the site. It has a Grammar School, built and endowed by Sir Anthony Browne in 1557, and considerable improvements in the way of additional buildings have recently been made, the principal of which is a handsome chapel. Brentwood was a hamlet of South Weald, but a new church was erected in the town in 1835 at a cost of £3,500; it has been since enlarged. A small Roman Catholic chapel was built in 1837, which has been converted into an orphan asylum, supported by Miss Helen A. Tasker, of Middleton Hall, Shenfield. The present chapel was opened in 1861.

COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

This town stands pleasantly on the banks of the Blackwater, partly on a declivity—Sunny-hill, as it was called in old times—and, with the memories which belong to the old Abbey of white monks, founded by Maud and King Stephen, and the remnants still scattered about, is a place of interest to the antiquarian. It is as a manufacturing town, however, that in modern times it owes its importance. The Flemings settled here, and Coggeshall was celebrated for their cloths. HALSTED

Is pleasantly situated on a hill side; there is as much progress and improvement visible in it as in any other town in the county. Much of this is attributable to the spirit with which it has secured railway connexion. It has a good Institute and a Public Hall. The mother church has been restored, and two new ones were erected in outlying districts a few years ago; it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street. A large part of the working population are engaged in the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighbourhood, but not to any great extent. HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and as such was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornchurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, and an Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849 at a cost of £7,000 on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV. The Board of Health propose to apply the severe of the town to the irrigation of Brittain's Farm, Dagenham, at a cost not to exceed £20,000; but a petition having been presented against the scheme, and a Government iquiry innstituted, the matter at present remains in abeyance. The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering,

and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford, and is a pleasant rural village. Its mansions are Havering Park, occupied by David McIntosh, Esq.; Pyrgo Park, Joseph Bray, Esq.; Bower House, C. P. Matthews, Esq.; The Grange, S. C. RAYLEIGH

WEST HAM.

This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaistow Wards. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow bridge, under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was pulled down and a new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12,000. The Great Metropolitan Sewer Bridge, in the High-street, Stratford, is nearly 1,500 feet in length and presents a fine specimen of engineering skill, embracing all the modern improvements in that particular branch of mechanical science. Under this bridge passes a portion of the metropolitan sewage, which is conveyed by two monster tunnels to the outfall works at Barking Creek. The repairing and lighting of this bridge is defrayed by the Metropolitan Board of Works. At West Ham Abbey the works of the pumping station connected with the Great Metropolitan Sewer have been in operation for several months past. The magnitude of these works combined with the engineering skill and ingenuity shown in their construction cannot fail to attract notice and elicit admiration. Among the improvements in this neighborhood may be mentioned the Congregational Church on the north side of Stratford Grove, erected at a cost of £12,000. The London and County Bank on the south side of St. John's church, erected at a cost of about £4,000, from the design of F. Chanceller, Esq., of Chelmsford, is a commanding and imposing structure. The site chosen for the new TownHallinthe Broadway facing the high road and abutting on West Ham-lane is probably the best that could have been selected. WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times when the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of Essex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the soldiers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and was first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew off to what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was at one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the

Grove being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavon-

street, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.

To find the time of high water at any of the local and other ports above for any day throughout the year:—Take out the time of High Water at London Bridge and add to or subtract from this, as the case may be, the hours and minutes opposite the name of the place. Subtraction is made for places where high tide is earlier than at London Bridge; where it is later the hours and minutes are added. If, in adding, the result gives an amount beyond 12 hours, take away 12 and the time of the high tide next before the one calculated from will remain; or if, in subtracting, the number to be subtracted is greater than that from which it is to be taken the latter must be increased by 12, and the difference will be the time of high water of the preceding evening. If the night tide be required at any place, add together the time of the day tide and that for the next day, and divide the sum by 2, when the quotient will be the exact time of the night tide.

Spring tides are the highest, and occur at or about New and Full Moon. Neap Tides are the lowest, and occur at the first and last quarter. Ebb tide is that between high and low water, lasting on an average 7½ hours, and Flood Tide is that between low and high water, lasting about 5½ hours. During strong north-westerly gales, the tide rises earlier, but does not rise to its usual height, while the ebb tide runs out longer and falls lower; but upon the gales abating. and weather moderating, they are later, higher, and stronger. A south-westerly gale has a contrary effect, and an easterly gives some additional water.

Note.—Tiles for Drainage are generally twelve inches long; but as they are neither very neatly cut nor quite square, they in general lay about thirteen inches on an average. This outlaying, however, is often required to uphold breakage; hence the best calculation is at twelve inches, for the purpose of making a purchase to suit the quantity to be drained.

The table contains the usual distances betwixt drains, which are fixed upon according to the closeness or openness of the subsoil, and in view of those who have the management of the drainage funds.

REGISTRATION.—By the prepayment in money of 4d. over and above the postage any letter or other packet may be registered to any place in the United Kingdom, Colonies, U. S., Italy, and German States. The P. O. is not responsible for the safe delivery of registered packets, but registration makes the packets much more secure.

Books, or packets of books, unstamped newspapers, or other printed matter, not exceeding two feet in length, in a cover open at the ends (by inland post), not exceeding 4 oz. in weight, 1d.; not exceeding 8 oz., 2d.; and for every additional 4 oz. or fraction thereof 1d., the postage to be pre-paid by affixing stamps. Book packets may contain MS., rollers, markers, and other book furniture, but no written letter, either sealed or open. Book packets to the East Indian and Australasian colonies four times the above rate; to the other British colonies three times the above rate. Book packets to India and New South Wales must not exceed 3 lbs. in weight. Stamps.—At a post-office—Labels, 1d., 2d., 3d., 4d., 6d., 9d., 10d., 1s., 2s., and bs.; covers, 2s. 3d. per 2 doz.

POST-OFFICE ORDERS.—The amount for which a single money order can be issued is limited to £10. To find the time of high water at any of the local and other ports about for any day throughout the year:—Take out the time of High Water at London Bridge and add to or subtract from this, as the case may be, the hours minutes opposite the name of the place. Subtraction is made for place where high tide is earlier than at London Bridge; where it is the hours and minutes are added. Latimer Neville; born 1827; married, 1853, the eldest daughter of John Le-Marchant Thomas, Esq., of Sea View, Isle of Wight; educated at Magdalen College, Cambridge; appointed Master there 1854; Rector of Heydon and Little Chishall, 1851; has been Vice-Chancellor of Cambridge.

RIGHT HON. LORD DACRE.

DACRE, 21st Baron (England). Created 1307. — Thomas Crosbie William Trevor, eldest son of the twentieth Baron. Born 1808; was an unsuccessful candidate for North Essex in 1832; Lord-Lieutenant of Essex 1865, resigned 1869. Residence—The Hoo, Welwyn, Herts.

Chafy, Canon of Canterbury. Born at Stratford, Essex, 1801; educated at Eton and St. John's College, Cambridge (M.A. 1822); called to the bar at Lincoln's Inn 1824; succeeded his father 1832; married, 1837, Anne, eldest daughter of the late General Sir Edward Kerrison, Bart. (she was born 1813); is a magistrate and Deputy Lieutenant for Suffolk and Essex, and patron of six livings; was M.P. for East Suffolk 1832—47, and 1856-66; was High Sheriff of Suffolk in 1853. The 1st Bart. was John Major, M.P. for Scarborough, who accompanied Capt. Anson in his voyage round the world, and whose title was entailed on his son-in-law John Henniker, of Stratford House and Newton Hall, Essex, M.P. for Dover, and 1st Lord Henniker; the 3rd Baron assumed the name of Major in 1822. Charles Thomas Clifford, of Irnham Hall, Lincolnshire (she was born 1823); succeeded his father in 1850; is patron of four livings; and a Deputy-Lieut. of Essex. RIGHT HON. LORD RAYLEIGH.

RAYLEIGH, 1st Baron (United Kingdom). Created 1821.—John James Strutt, only son of Joseph Holden Strutt, Esq. (for 36 years M.P. for Maldon), by the fifth daughter of first Duke of Leinster, who was created Baroness Rayleigh. Born in Harley-street, 1796; married, 1842, eldest daughter of the late Richard Vicars, Esq., of King's County, Ireland; succeeded his mother in 1836; educated at Oriel College, Oxford, where he graduated B.A. 1818, M.A. 1821. The Baroness was raised to the peerage in consideration of the military services of her husband, in command of different regiments of Essex militia; he was said to be descended from Sir Godfried Strutz de Winkelred, of Under Walden, who lived in 1240. Maynard), second daughter of Henry Fitzroy, Esq., of Salcey Lawn, Northamptonshire; is patron of one living, a J.P. and D.L. for county Fife, and Lieut. 1st Fifeshire Mounted Rifles. The first Earl was Lord Chancellor. Residences—Easton Lodge, near Dunmow; Skeffington Vale, Leicester; Dysart House, near Kircaldy, Fifeshire, N.B.

The rst Baronet was long distinguished as the leading advocate of measures for the aboliton of slavery. He was descended from William Buxton, who died at Great Coggeshall 325. Sir Augustus Foster, by Lady Albinia Jane, 1861 ster of the fifth Earl of Buckinghamshire. Born 1817; married, 1844, the youngest 1861 unghter of the late Rev. John Todd, of Hales Owen; succeeded his brother in 1857; ucated at Eton and Magdalene College, Cambridge, where he graduated B.A., 1842;

has been rector of Theydon Garnon since 1843. The baronetcy was conferred for diplomatic services. Residences—Theydon Garnon Rectory; 5 Whitehall-yard; Clyde Court, co. Louth, Ireland. Heir—His son, John Frederic, born 1847, educated at Mariborough and Magdalene Coll., Camb.; is now in the 13th Hussars.

HENNIKER, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1812.—Sir BRYDGES POWELL HENNIKER, son of the third Baronet, by his second wife, the fourth daughter of the third Lord Henniker. Born at Thornham, Suffolk, 1835; educated at Eton; married, 1860, daughter of Thomas Hughan, Esq., of Airds; succeeded his father in 1849; Knsign 68th Foot 1853; Cornet Royal Horse Guards 1854, Lieutenant 1855, Captain 1858, retired 1859; J.P. for Essex 1857; Deputy-Lieutenant 1858; Captain West Essex Yeomanry 1861. The first Baronet was the youngest son of the first Lord Henniker, and a Lieut-General in the army. Seat—Newton Hall, near Dunmow. Heir—His son, Frederick Brydges Major, born at Newton Hall, 1862.

HEYGATE, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1831.—Sir Ferderick William Heygate, son of the first Baronet, by the fourth daughter of Edward Longdon Macmurde, Esq. (she died 1859). Born at Holwood, Keston, Kent, 1822; married, 1851, only daughter and heir of the late Conolly Gage, Esq., of Bellarena, county Derry; succeeded his father in 1844; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1844; M.A. 1847; High Sheriff of Londonderry 1855, and of co. Donegal 1857; has been M.P. for the county of Londonderry since May, 1859. The family is descended from the Heygates of Rendlesham, in Suffolk, and Feering, in Essex, subsequently, about the middle of the 16th century, seated at Hayes, in Middlesex. Residences—Southend; 43 Eaton-square, S. W.; Bellarena, county Londonderry. Heir—His son, Frederick Gage, born at Bellarena, 1854.

LEEKE, Knt. Bachel. Created 1835; K.C.B. (Military) 1858; K.H. 1836.—Sir Henri John Leeke, eldest surviving son of the late Samuel Leeke, Esq., of St. John's, Isle of Wight, and Havant, Hants. Born at St. John's, Isle of Wight; married, first, 1818, the second daughter of James Dashwood, Esq., of Forest Lodge, Windsor (she died 1861); secondly, 1863, the only daughter of the late Rev. Geoffrey Hornby; entered the navy 1804; while a midshipman and lieutenant of the Voluntaire frigate bore an active part at the capture and destruction of a French convoy in the Bay of Rosas, for which be received with others the thanks of both Houses of Parliament and a medal; commanded the Myrmidon on the coast of Africa, and rescued 4,365 slaves, among whom was Samuel Crowther, the well-known native bishop; was appointed superintendent of the Indian navy during the Burmese war; was a Lord of the Admiralty for a short time in 1859; commander-in-chief at the bombardment of Bushire, the storming of Fort Reshire 1856, and taking of the Island of Karrak, for which he received a medal; was M.P. for Dover from May, 1859, to July, 1865; is an Admiral of the white, a Deputy-Lieutenant for Hants, and a J.P. for Essex. Residences—5 Euston-place, Leamington; Theydon Park, Essex.

LENNARD, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1801.—Sir Thomas Barrett-Lennard, son of the late Thomas Barrett-Lennard, Esq. (who died 1856), by his second wife, the only daughter and heir of the late Bartlett Bridger Shedden, Esq., of Saling Grove, Essex. Born 1826; educated at Cambridge; married, 1853, Emma, 4th daughter of the late Rev. Sir J. P. Wood, Bart.; succeeded his grandfather in 1857; J.P. fer Essex 1857, Deputy-Lieut. 1860; High Sheriff 1865. The first Baronet was son and testamentary heir of the 17th Lord Dacre, whose surname and arms he assumed by sign manual. Residences—Belhus, Aveley; 7 Lewes Crescent, Brighton; 9 Hyde-parkterrace. Heir—His son, Thomas, born 1853.

MILDMAY, 5th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1772.—Sir Henry Bouverie Pauler St.-John Mildmay, son of the fourth Baronet, by the eldest daughter of the Hon. Bartholomew Bouverie. Born 1810; married, 1851, the second daughter of the first Viscount Eversley; succeeded his father in 1848; patron of four livings; entered the army 1828; became Captain 2nd Dragoon Guards 1837; retired from the army as Major 1859; sppointed Deputy-Lieutenant of Hants 1848; Lieut.-Col. Hants Yeomanry Cavahry 1861; High Sheriff of Hampshire 1862. The first Baronet was descended paternally from William St.-John, of the family of Baron St. John and Viscount Bollingbroke, who lived temp. William the Conqueror; the third Baronet assumed the name of Mildmay. Residence—Dogmersfield Park, Hants. Heir—His son, Henry Paulet St. John, born in Eaton-square 1853.

NEAVE, 4th Bart. (Great Britain.) Created 1795.—Sir Abundell Neave, son of Sir Richard Digby, 3rd Bart., by the daughter of the 9th Lord Arundell of Wardour (she died 1849). Born 1829; educated at Eton; Cornet 3rd Dragoon Guards 1851, Lieutenant 1856, and Captain 1857; retired 1863; Captain West Essex Yeomanry Cavalry, 1866; retired 1868; succeeded his father 1868; is patron of one living. Residences—Dagnam Fork, Romford; 36 St. James's-street, S.W. Heir presumptive—His brother, Reginald.

O'MALLEY, 2nd Bart. Created 1804. Sir WILLIAM O'MALLEY, eldest son of Sir Samuel 1st Bart., by Jane, daughter of the late J. Reilly, Esq., of Clonlost. Born 1816; married

1860 Louisa Mary, 2nd daughter of the late Rev. Henry Du Cane, of the Grove, Witham; was High Sheriff of co. Mayo, 1838; succeeded his father 1864; was formerly a Captain in the 7th Royal Fusiliers, and Lieut.-Col. North Mayo Militia. This family is descended from Bryan McCormick O'Malie, of Murrisk and Strade Abbey, who was in the service of Queen Elizabeth and Ambassador at Vienna, and is of long standing in Mayo, and has held the manor of Carramore over 900 years. Seat—Kilboyne Manor, Mayo. Residence—Witham.

PELLY, 3rd Bart. (England.) Created 1840.—Sir Henry Carstairs Pelly, eldest son of the second Baronet by his first wife, Johannah Jane, youngest daughter of the late John Carstairs, Esq., of Stratford Green, and Woodhurst, Hunts (she died 1856). Born at Balls Park, Herts, 1814; educated at Harrow; entered the army as ensign Royal Scots Greys 1861; lieutenant 1863; succeeded his father 1864; appointed extra A.D.C. to the Lord-Lieutenant of Ireland, qualified as magistrate for Essex, and exchanged into the 2nd Life Guards, 1867. The first Baronet was Governor of the Bank of England and of the Hudson's Bay Company, and Deputy Master of the Trinity House, London. Addresses—Horse Guards and Union Club, S.W. Heir presumptive—His step brother, Alwyn, born 1861.

SELWIN-IBBETSON, 7th Bart. (Great Britain). Created 1748.—Sir Henry John Selwin-Ibbetson, son of the late Sir John Thomas Selwin, the 6th Bart., by the daughter of the late General John Leveson Gower, of Bill Hill, Berks. Born 1826; married, firstly, 1850, Hon. Sarah Elizabeth, eldest daughter of the late Lord Lyndhurst (she died 1865); secondly, 1867, Eden, widow of Sir Charles Ibbetson, Bart., of Denton Park, Yorkshire; succeeded his father in 1869; assumed the name of Ibbetson in addition to Selwin on his second marriage; Magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Essex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1865, to November, 1868; and has sat for West Essex since that date. The first Baronet was so created for having raised a corps of 100 men at his own expense during the rebellion of 1745. Seat—Down Hall, Harlow. Town residences—14 James-street, Buckingham Gate, S.W.; Carlton Club. [See "Parliamentary Representation," page 30.]

SMIJTH, 11th Bart. (England.) Created 1661.—Sir William Bowxer-Smijth, son of the late Sir Edward, the tenth Baronet, by the daughter of John Weyland, Esq., of Woodeaton, Oxfordshire (she died 1868). Born 1814; married, 1839, the second daughter of Sir Henry Meux, Bart.; succeeded his father in 1850; educated at Eton and at Trinity College, Cambridge, where he took honors in 1837; appointed Lieutenant 19th Essex Rifle Volunteers 1860, resigned 1861; is now a private in the 2nd (South) Middlesex; was M.P. for South Essex from July, 1852, to April, 1857; patron of one living. This family is descended from John Smijth, of Saffron Walden, who was Sheriff of Essex and of Herts. temp. Henry VIII.; the tenth Baronet obtained a licence in 1839 for himself and issue to assume the name of Bowyer. Residences—Hill Hall, Epping; Attleburgh Hall, Norfolk; Carlton, S.W. Heir—His son, William, born September 1, 1840; educated at Eton; unpaid attaché at Paris from 1859 to 1863; appointed 3rd Secretary to her Majesty's Legation at Washington September, 1863.

SMITH, 3rd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1804.—Sir Charles Cunliffe Smith, son of the second Baronet, by his second wife, second daughter of William Gosling, Esq., of Roehampton. Born in Norfolk-street, Park-lane, 1827; educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1855, the youngest daughter of Capel Cure, Esq., of Blake Hall; succeeded his father in 1831; appointed a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex 1852, in which year he was Sheriff. The first Baronet, Sir Drummond Smith, was brother to Sir John Burges, Bart., who assumed that name in lieu of his patronymic, and whose title became extinct at his own death in 1803. Seat—Suttons, Romford. Heir—His son, Drummond Cunliffe, born in Grosvenor-street 1861.

TYRELL, 2nd Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created '1809.—Sir John Tyssen Tyrell, son of first Baronet, by the only daughter and heir of William Tyssen, Esq., of Waltham House, Herts. Born 1795; married, 1819, eldest daughter and co-heir of the late Sir Thomas Pilkington, Bart. (from whom he is divorced); succeeded his father in 1832; is a Deputy-Lieutenant of Essex, and was Colonel of the West Essex Militia from 1831 to 1852; was M.P. for Essex in 1830; was unsuccessful in 1831, but sat from 1832 to 1857. This family is said to be descended from Sir Walter Tyrell, temp. William Rufus. Residences—Boreham House, Chelmsford; 2 Lower Grosvenor-place, Pimlico, S.W.

WESTERN, 1st Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1864.—SIR THOMAS BURCH WESTERN, son of Rear-Admiral Thomas Western, K.T.S., of Tattingstone Place, Suffolk, by Mary, daughter of Thomas Burch, Esq., of Bermuda. Born 1795; was educated at Trinity College, Cambridge; B.A. 1818, M.A. 1824; married, 1819, Margaret Letitia, third daughter of William Bushby, Esq., of Kirkmichael, county Dumfries; succeeded in 1844 to the estates of his relative, the late Lord Western, whose title then became extinct; is Lord-Lieutenant of Essex; magistrate and Deputy-Lieutenant for Suffolk; was High Sheriff of Essex in 1850; M.P. for North Essex 1865-68. The family is descended from Lady Anne Plantagenet, wife of Bourchier, Earl of Ewe, and granddaughter of Edward III.; was settled in

London temp. Henry VII.; and Samuel Western was baron of the Cinque Ports temp. William III. Seats—Felix Hall, Kelvedon; Rivenhall Place, Witham; Tattingstone, Ipsnich, Suffolk. Heir—His son, Thomas Sutton; born 1821; educated at Eton and Trinity College, Cambridge; married, 1848, Giulietta Romana, daughter of Sir Edward Buller, Bart., of Dilhorne, county Stafford, M.P. for North Staffordshire (she died 1850); was the Liberal M.P. for Maldon from 1857 to 1865; is J.P. and D.L. for Essex and Suffolk; Hon. Colonel of the Essex Rifles Militia, 1866; has issue Thomas Charless Callis, b. 1850.

WILSON, 9th Bart. (England.) Created 1660-1.—Sir John Maryon Wilson, brother of the 8th Baronet, and son of the 7th Baronet, by the daughter of Captain James Smith, R.N. Born at Lewisham, Kent, 1802; married, 1825, the seventh daughter of George Wade, Esq., of Dunmow; succeeded his brother in 1869; is patron of seven livings; J.P. for Essex, Hertfordshire, and Kent; Deputy-Lieutenant for Essex. Seats—Charlton House, Kent; Searles, Sussex; and Fitzjohns, Great Canfield. Heir—Spencer Maryon Wilson, R.N.

WOOD, 4th Bart. (United Kingdom.) Created 1837.—Sir Matthew Wood, only son of the late Sir Francis, the 3rd Baronet, by Louisa, eldest daughter of R. Hodgson, Esq., of Appleshaw. Born 1857. The 1st Baronet was M.P. for London and twice Lord Mayor. Seat—Rivenhall Place, Witham. Heir presumptive—His uncle, Charles Page Wood, b. 1838.

CHELMSFORD

(COUNTY TOWN).

CHELMSFORD is situate 29 miles from London, on the main line of the Great Eastern Railway, the station being in King-street, and it has water communication by means of the Chelmer and Blackwater Navigation with Maldon, through which considerable trade is carried on. As the county town it concentrates within itself most of the official public business of Essex, for which its central situation admirably adapts it. Here are held the Assizes and the Sessions, to which cases from Harwich on one side, and from the borders of Hertfordshire on the other, are sent for trial. In the neighboring parish of Springfield is the county gaol, completed about 1828 at a cost of £57,289 17s. 03d., and enlarged and arranged in 1849 at a further outlay of £36,000; here, too, are the residence of the Chief Constable and the head-quarters of the police. The population of the parish, with its hamlet of Moulsham, from which, however, it is now separated for ecclesiastical purposes, is 8,407, the ladies at the last census having a majority of full 500. Here and there the footprints of the Romans have been discovered in the neighborhood, but what may be called the historic period of Chelmsford may be said to commence in the year 1,100, when the Bishop of London built the bridge over the Cann, and made the place the great thoroughfare for these counties. But if the visitor to Chelmsford cannot be led over old ruins and battle-fields, he can be shown a noble church in the Perpendicular style, with an arch on the north side of the chancel, apparently the work of Norman hands, part of which has within the last few years been judiciously restored under the superintendence of Mr. Chancellor, and enriched with finely stained windows, memorial and otherwise; a handsome new font has also been added, and the edifice is now being re-seated. The attention of the stranger can also be directed to the Shire-Hall, standing at the head of the High-street, completed in 1791, and containing the courts of justice and a noble ball-room, 80 feet long and 45 broad. The Russian gun, a trophy from Sebastopol, placed in front of the building in 1858. In the adjacent square is Baily's statue of the Lord Chief Justice Tindal-a Chelmsford worthy, whom the Grammar School proudly ranks among its old pupils. Near by is the Corn-Exchange, which has elsewhere been held up as a model, erected in 1856 by a company, who raised £10,000, and have found it a profitable undertaking. The Chelmsford and Essex Museum, too, in Bridge-street, may well command a visit, containing as it does many objects of interest, and the finest collection of shells in this part of the kingdom. There is, besides, a Literary Institute, in the New London-road, with about 700 members, a lecture hall and reading room, and a library of between 3,000 and 4,000 volumes. Funds are being raised for the establishment of an Infirmary in connexion with the Chelmsford Dispensary, the site selected being nearly opposite the Friars, in Moulsham. A Temperance Hotel has been erected on part of the site where in days of ancient coaching stood the famous road hostel—the old Black Boy; and in Moulsham an excellent improvement has been effected by the widening of the road and the building of a handsome inn at Baddow-lane corner—a spot before proverbially dangerous. The malting trade is now carried on to some extent in the neighborhood. In connexion with the Board of Health and its works the whole sewage of the town is conveyed by means of iron pipes to Barnes Farm, Springfield, for the purpose of irrigation; the works have been in operation now three years and with the most successful results.

COLCHESTER is the most populous, and, to all appearance, the most ancient town in the county. It is a borough returning two members to Parliament, having exercised this privilege since the 23rd of Edward I.—a time at which even the City of London was unrepresented in the Senate. Its present Parliamentary and Municipal boundaries include sixteen parishes, four of them being outlying or rural; and the number of inhabitants was at the last census 23,815. The majority are engaged in the usual occupations of a country town, there being no manufactories except that of Mr. Brown, silk throwster, who employs about 250 hands, and more recently that of the Britannia sewing machine, besides several wholesale tailoring establishments, which employ about 2,700 people. It has good communication both by land and by water, railways running close up to the town, the Great Eastern having been extended into it to St. Botolph's Station, the terminus of the Tendring Hundred Railway, while it has a commodious port at the Hythe, the Colne being navigable to this point for ships of 160 tons. This does not, however, represent its commercial capabilities, as its port may be said practically to extend to Wyvenhoe, to which place there is now a railway, and where ships of much larger burden can come up. As to the antiquity of the place, learned antiquarians are all pretty well agreed that this was the chief seat of the Roman power in this district of the kingdom—the veritable Camulodunum; and the remains of the ancient Castle, now containing the museum of the Essex Archæological Society, St. Botolph's Priory, St. John's Abbey, and other scenes sanctified by the past, may well tempt a visit even from those heedless of antiquarian lore. The borough rights of Colchester originated before the time of the Confessor. The Corporation, by which it is governed, consists of 24 Members, six Aldermen, and 18 Councillors, out of which the Mayor is chosen; a High Steward, whose office is honorary, and a Recorder. The Corporation property consists of rent of farms, £1,300; market tolls, about £600; and from the Colne Osyter Fishery, £800; making a total annual income of about £2,700. The expenditure varies according to circumstances; the deficiency is made up by a borough The expenditure last year exceeded £2,700. The oyster fishery of the Colne has often been assailed by other parties, but is now fully confirmed by law to the Corporation, and it affords employment to a considerable number of men and boats, the value of the celebrated "natives" sold from it in good seasons amounting to £14,000 a year. The market, held on Saturday, existed before the time of Richard I., and its fairs are also of very ancient date. The camp, to the south of the town, usually containing about 2,000 soldiers, gives to it an air of military life, and the martial activity has been largely increased since the completion of the extensive cavalry barracks, said to be the finest in Europe. The town altogether has been greatly improved of late years. The handsome Town-hall was erected in 1844 at a cost of £6,000; and a new Corn-Exchange, two years after, at an outlay of £4,000, which now requires extension. Nor among its public buildings must we forget the Idiot Asylum, near the railway station, exclusively devoted to the Eastern Counties; and the Essex and Colchester Hospital, on the Lexden-road, originally erected in 1820, and generally containing 50 in-patients and about 300 out-patients.

HARWICH.

(PARLIAMENTARY AND MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

This sea-port borough, on the furthest point of the Essex coast, has many antiquarian associations of a maritime character connected with it. The townwas made a borough and corporation in the reign of Edward II.—the charter was dated in the year 1318. A new charter with more ample privileges was granted by James I., which was confirmed by Charles II. The corporation consists of four aldermen and 12 councillors, from whom a mayor is chosen. The power of returning two members to parliament, which had been discontinued from the 17th of Edward III., was restored by James I., and it has since enjoyed this right, but the new Reform Bill has shorn it down to one representative. The population, including Dovercourt, amounts to 5,070, many of them being connected with maritime pursuits. Its harbour is the finest along this part of the coast, affording room for 800 or 900 sail of shipping, and the entrance is protected by a redoubt on the cliff above the town, and Landguard Fort on a point of land running from the opposite Suffolk shore; also by a 15-gun battery recently erected at Shotley, on the Suffolk side, a 4-gun battery on the east of the town of Harwich, and several martello towers on the Suffolk side, the whole mounting guns of heavy calibre. Perhaps the most noticeable things in Harwich are the Church of St. Nicholas, a spacious building erected in 1821 at a cost of £20,000, the lighthouses, the breakwater, and the esplanade, the latter affording a delightful walk to Dovercourt, a mile distant, with its pretty villas, promenades, and terraces. The circular redoubt is also worthy of a visit. The port at the beginning of the

present century was one of the great outlets of England, and during the old French war it was a place of thrifty business and naval importance. A cloud afterwards came over it, but the railway has brought back much of its commercial importance. The Great Eastern Company have had several splendid boats built for passengers, and also for cattle and goods, and a spacious hotel has been erected to accommodate the continental trade. Steamboats ply between here and Ipswich dail, y and communication by water with London brings large numbers of visitors to Harwich in summer. Here also ship-building is carried on by Mr. John Vanz, at the Royal Naval Yard, where about 100 men and boys are employed, and from this yard some fine specimens of naval architecture have been turned out.

MALDON, now a neat and modernised little town, for which some have claimed the honor of being the Roman Camulodunum, stands upon a hill, at the foot of which runs a river or rather arm of the sea, navigable for vessels of seventy or eighty tons, while ships of a much larger burden can reach its port of Heybridge Basin a mile away, and its water traffic runs inland as far as Chelmsford. A line from the trunk at Witham connects it with the network of county railways. The population of the three parishes numbers 4,785, and the borough is ruled over by a corporate body of very ancient origin, now composed of a mayor, four aldermen, and twelve councillors, with a town clerk. It returns one member to parliament under the new Reform Bill. Its income altogether, including rates, is generally under £1,000 a year, as the port has hitherto been free, but an Act of Parliament called "The Maldon Harbour Act," has recently been granted for widening and deepening the river, and to levy tolls on all shipping coming within the jurisdiction of the commissioners, but vessels leading and unloading in Heybridge Basin are still free. The borough waters extend by the charter down to the Knowl Sand, and a Fishery and Oyster Company about to be brought into operation is likely to promote the importance and prosperity of the town. The old Town-hall, if not for the beauty of its architecture at least for its age, may command a passing glance. It was built in the reign of Henry VI., and was at one time called D'Arcy's Tower. A mile to the westward stand the habitable remains of Beeleigh Abbey, once a seat of religious pomp and power, and the burial place of personages of historic import in connexion with the county. On the south stood a Friary for Carmelite brethren; and, perhaps, what may be considered more practical and to the purpose, in the building at St. Peter's Church will be found a library of 6,000 volumes, containing many rare works and a few ancient portraits, left to the town by Dr. Plume. A certain yearly amount is set apart from the Plume's Library Fund for the purchase of books, by which a valuable accession of modern works has been secured by the librarian, the Rev. E. R. Horwood. The Grammar School, which is also held in St. Peter's Church, was founded by Ralph Breeder, in 1608, and augumented by Dr. Plume. This school is now in active operation, and in its renovated character supplies the hitherto great local want of an educational establishment in accordance with modern requirements.

SAFFRON WALDEN.

(MUNICIPAL BOROUGH.)

WALDEN, which is a borough, and one of the prettiest little towns in the county, takes the description of Saffron usually prefixed to it from the cultivation of that article formerly around it; but the growth of it has ceased for a century, and has given place to maltings and breweries, several of which are carried on upon an extensive scale. While the neighbourhood is rich with antiquities, the remnant of the Castle, the earthworks on the south, and the curious work in the chalk on the Common attest its importance in old times. A convenient cattle market has been provided, and a handsome Corn Exchange, in the Italian style, built in 1848, stands close to the Market-hill, on another side of which is the Town Hall, in which the public business is transacted. A Hospital has been recently erected, built by money left for the

purpose by the late W. G. Gibson, Esq., on a site presented by Lord Braybrooke, and it is supported by voluntary contributions. On the top of the hill on the side of which the town stands, is one of the most beautiful parish churches in England, containing the altar-tomb of the Lord Chancellor Audley; and just at the outskirts of the town, fast by the ruins of the castle, a public hall with museum has been erected, which is the oldest and best supported, and boasts the largest collection of coins, antiquities, and specimens of natural history in the county. Close to the town is Audley End, the noble seat of Lord Braybrooke, which takes its name from Lord Audley, the Chancellor of Henry VIII., and was once the residence of Charles II. Walden has never returned members to parliament, but it has existed as a corporation, first in the shape of a Guild, for nearly 500 It has now a mayor, four aldermen, and 12 councillors, the jurisdiction of the corporation being co-extensive with the parish.

BRAINTREE AND BOCKING.

Braintree and Bocking are so intimately connected as really to blend the two into one town, where the election of Members of Parliament for the district used to take place, but has been transferred to Colchester. The town is of very ancient date, and has always borne a manufacturing character. At the conquest it was one of the most important towns in the county; as early as 1389 woollen cloths were made here; and in the time of Elizabeth Bocking was described as having been for a long time inhabited by cloth-makers. The fugitive Flemings settled here, and carried on the bay trade to a large extent; this decayed, and the silk weavers succeeded, the great firm of Messrs. Courtauld employing some thousands of hands at their various works in the neighborhood; besides which there are several other firms, including that of Messrs. Walters, the first in the kingdom in the manufacture of rich damasks, brocatelles, and tissued satins for furniture purposes. The church of Braintree, which is celebrated in law records and political annals by the well-known suit on church-rates, was built about 1349; it has been recently restored. The market dates from 1199; and there is a good Corn Exchange, erected in 1839 at a cost of £3,000.

BRENTWOOD.

This is a town which has been much improved and extended since the opening of the railway; the Lunatic Asylum and Warley Barracks, in the immediate vicinity, give it a county importance. By the new arrangement the election of Members of Parliament for the Southern Division of the county is held here. It is a place of very ancient note, and in Roman Catholic times was a halting place for pilgrims to the shrine of St. Thomas à Becket, and the little chapel in the town was built partly for their use. This was once the assize town for Essex, but the old building called the Assize-house has been pulled down and a handsome Town Hall erected on the site. It has a Grammar School, built and endowed by Sir Anthony Browne in 1557, and considerable improvements in the way of additional buildings have recently been made, the principal of which is a handsome chapel. Brentwood was a hamlet of South Weald, but a new church was erected in the town in 1835 at a cost of £3,500; it has been since enlarged. A small Roman Catholic chapel was built in 1837, which has been converted into an orphan asylum, supported by Miss Helen A. Tasker, of Middleton Hall, Shenfield. The present chapel was opened in 1861. Handsome and commodious National schools for boys and girls have during the past year been erected at a cost of £1,060.

COGGESHALL, GREAT AND LITTLE.

HALSTED

Is pleasantly situated on a hill side; there is as much progress and improvement visible in it as in any other town in the county. Much of this is attributable to the spirit with which it has secured railway connection. It has a good Institute and a Public Hall. The mother church has been restored, and two new ones were erected in outlying districts a few years ago; it has a Grammar School in the centre of the principal street. A large part of the working population are engaged in the crape manufacture, there being several considerable factories in the parish; and hops are grown in the neighborhood, but not to any great extent. The market was once a royal one, as belonging to the King, and was held on the hill in Saxon times. The town has been recently paved at a cost of £1,200 by the Local Board, who have also expended upwards of £5,000 in providing water supply and drainage. The rateable value of the parish is £22,069. The district under the Local Board is no longer co-extensive with the parish boundaries, an Act of Parliament passed in 1866 having limited the district to within a radius of 1,000 yards from the Town-bridge. some Congregational Church, opened in 1866, occupies the site of the old Meeting-house, Parson's-street, and is in the decorated style of English Gothic; on the west side is a stone spire 110 feet high. The building cost £4,600, and a new organ has since been purchased for £253.

HAVERING-ATTE-BOWER, LIBERTY OF.

ROMFORD is the head of the ancient Liberty of Havering, the Bower being once a palace of our kings; and, as such, was possessed of many important privileges and immunities. It is still a special jurisdiction, independent of the county, having its own High Steward, Magistrates, Clerk of the Peace, Coroner, and Quarter Session for the trial of offences committed in the three parishes of Romford, Hornchurch, and Havering, over which the Liberty extends. The town consists principally of one main street, with others, however, branching from it; it has a Town Hall, Corn Exchange, and Assembly-room, some very good shops, and the largest cattle market in the county, the rail bringing down many London butchers, who purchase largely here for the supply of the metropolis. The fine church of Romford, in the middle pointed Gothic style, stands near the centre of the town; it was erected in 1849 at a cost of £7,000 on the site given to the inhabitants for a sacred edifice by Henry IV. The Board of Health have just completed a scheme to apply the sewage of the town to the irrigation of Brittain's Farm, Dagenham, at a cost of £16,000.

The Liberty itself includes also the parishes of Hornchurch and Havering, and on the southward it extends down to the Thames. Hornchurch, which comprises nearly 7,000 acres of land, lies in an eastward direction from Romford. It was the mother parish, a place of good trade in very early times—the site of the Horned Monastery, from which it takes its name—and is still a large and populous village, though as the capital of this peculiar jurisdiction it

has long since been superseded by Romford.

Havering, which contained the royal palace, some remnants of which may still be traced at the church, is situated three miles to the north of Romford, and is a pleasant rural village. Its mansions are Havering Park, occupied by David McIntosh, Esq.; Pyrgo Park, Joseph Bray, Esq.; Bower House, C.P. Matthews, Esq.; The Grange, S. C. SHOEBURYNESS

Is situated four miles distant from Southend, along the cliffs, and at high tide is an agreeable walk. A water tower is here erected—a circular building of shafts. 50 feet high which support a cistern capable of holding 52,000 gallons of water, and to the east of the tower stands the new powder magazine. To the left of the church lies the artillery volunteer encamping ground, and to the right the staff officers' quarters are situated. Turning again to the left, and passing the battery officers' quarters, will be found the barracks, occupying altogether between three and four acres of ground; the building will accommodate 1,000 troops. The spacious drill hall is capable of holding 1,500 people, around the interior of which are placed guns of the largest calibre for the use of the school of instruction in wet weather. From 150 to 200 officers and non-commissioned officers are instructed here annually in courses extending over from three to twelve months, and who are drawn regularly from all parts of the world where the Royal Artillery are stationed for that purpose. To the south of this, on the beach, are carried on all the scientific experiments in gunnery; here are guns representing the ideas of the most prominent artillerists of the day, from the tiny mountain gun—used so effectively in the late Abyssinian campaign—to the monster 600-pounder; the Whitworth, with its seven mile range; the latest great fact, the Moncrieff; and the American Rodman. Going west are the sections of iron clads, representing most of the ships in her Majesty's Here stood once the fort, or castle, erected by the Danes, but was probably washed away by the sea, part of the ditch and embankment of which still remain. The floating targets are situate on the Maplin Sands. artillery range, where practice from big guns is daily carried on, is the finest in England, extending over four miles. A branch railway from Southend is in contemplation, which, if carried out, will add to the convenience of the station.

WEST HAM.

This is one of the most extensive and populous parishes in the county, and is divided into three wards known as Stratford, Church-street, and Plaistow Wards. Essex is separated from the metropolitan county by Bow-bridge, under which passes the River Lea. The old bridge was pulled down and a new one erected in 1839 at a cost of £12,000. The Great Metropolitan Sewer Bridge, in the High-street, Stratford, is nearly 1,500 feet in length and presents a fine specimen of engineering skill, embracing all the modern improvements in that particular branch of mechanical science. Under this bridge passes a portion of the metropolitan sewage, which is conveyed by three monster tunnels to the outfall works at Barking Creek. The repairing and lighting of this bridge is defrayed by the Metropolitan Board of Works. At West Ham Abbey the works of the pumping station connected with the great metropolitan sewer have been in operation for some time past. The magnitude of these works, combined with the engineering skill and ingenuity shown in their construction, cannot fail to attract notice and elicit admiration. Among the improvements in this neighborhood may be mentioned the Congregational church on the north side of Stratford-grove, erected at a cost of £12,000. The London and County Bank on the south side of St. John's church, erected at a cost of about £4,000, from the design of F. Chanceller, Esq., of Chelmsford, is a commanding and imposing structure. The New Town Hall at Stratford was opened on July 7, 1869, by Sir Thomas Burch Western, Bart., Lord Lieutenant of the county. This building has been erected by the Local Board of Health from the designs of Mr. Lewis Angell, Fellow of King's College, London, surveyor to the board, and Mr. John Giles, M.S.B.A. of Craven-street, as joint architects. It is situated at the corner of West Ham-lane and Stratford Broadway, having a frontage of about 100 feet either way. The style is classic freely treated. The portico and the circular corner is enriched with polished red granite columns. The tower is 100 feet high The building is ornamented or surmounted by figures and groups of statuar. including the Arts, Science, Agriculture, Commerce, Industry, Justice, Mercy. Prudence, Fortitude, Temperance, St. George, and Britannia. The lower part of the building contains a large vestibule and suites of public offices, board rooms, and other apartments. On the first floor there is a large hall for public meetings, &c., 72 feet long, 50 feet wide, and 30 feet high, and is richly and artistically decorated. The whole cost, including site and furniture, is estimated at £20,000. Mr. Thomas Ennor, of Commercial-road-east, is the builder. The population of West Ham parish is computed at 65,000.

WITHAM.

This is one of the quiet old towns whose origin runs back to the times when the fierce ancestors of our Princess of Wales ravaged the coast of Essex and held possession of some of the inland fortresses. It was built by the soldiers of Edward in 913, while he was expelling the Danes from Maldon, and was first erected at Chipping-hill, though afterwards the inhabitants drew of to what had been the old highway of the Romans. The cloth manufacture was at one period carried on largely here, and goodly fortunes were made by it, the Grove being built by one of the cloth lords of that day; but it is now chiefly dependent for its prosperity on its local trade and the surrounding agriculturists. Part of the church at Chipping-hill is very ancient; the new one, in Guithavorstreet, was built in 1842 at a cost of £5,000, raised by subscription.
