PREFACE.

In presenting the first volume of the "Annual Register of Nottingham," it may be justly demanded, what are the principles it contains, and the objects it seeks to promote; to the former we reply, Commercial and Historical, but not Sectarian or Political; to the latter, a book of reference, particularly adapted to the requirements of professional or trading gentlemen, who may reside in, or are in the habit of visiting the town.

The following is the plan: it will be divided into two parts, first general, second local.

1st. General. This will contain an enlarged Almanack, with Sunday lessons, length of days, and other matter, not found in any but the best London Almanacks. Besides this, there will be a review of the markets, and the entire trade and commerce of the Empire. A Chronicle of the Sessions of Parliament, and remarkable events of the year in the kingdom and the world.

2nd. Local. This department will embrace a comprehensive but succinct history of the town and county for the past year, under the following particulars. 1st. A Record of benevolent, charitable, and religious contributions, specifying the name, place, and object of each; 2nd. Statistics of education, specifying the number of scholars under tuition so far as the same can be ascertained

in the town, and through the county at large. 3rd. Statistics of Crime. 4th. Average price of Food. 5th. Mechanical inventions and list of patents sealed on behalf of persons resident in the town and county. 6th. State of Trade. 7th. Remarkable events of the year, and 8th, an enlarged and corrected Directory.

The favours of advertising friends are particularly requested to this medium, that the object proposed may be effected, as the present price will not be advanced, though it is so inadequate to the expense of publication. the matter presented this year, the reader is respectfully referred to the contents of the volume, which we hope will prove both useful and interesting. Faults have been found with the errors of other Directories, and may, no doubt, justly be found with this; but when it is recollected, that six years have elapsed since the last Directory of Nottingham was published, so great have been the changes, that scarcely one house of trade in twenty is in every respect the same as it was at that time. The whole, therefore, has necessarily been re-constructed, and it was almost impossible to secure perfect accuracy the first time.

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

GENERAL POST OFFICE, LONDON.

A Treasury Minute, dated Nov. 12, 1839, contains the following directions for the regulation of the postage. The regulations as to weight are to be permanent, but the rate is to be reduced as soon as practicable to one penny.

All letters posted on or after the 5th December next shall be

subject to the following regulations:-

General post letters shall be charged by weight, as follows:-

Letters not exceeding ½ oz., one postage

Do. 1 oz., two postages
Do. 2 oz., four postages
Do. 3 oz., six postages;

and so on, adding two postages for every ounce up to 16 ounces, beyond which no packet subject to postage shall be received.

All letters and packets exceeding the weight of one ounce to be pre-paid and delivered in at the window; if not so pre-paid and delivered, to be charged double postage.

Foreign letters and packet letters will be charged according to

the preceding scale of weights.

Letters to and from the British West Indies to be charged 1s. per single rate; the same charge to attach to letters from and to Gibraltar, Malta, and the Ionian Isles, conveyed by packet, and not transmitted through France.

London District Post, including 2d. and 3d. delivery:-

All letters not exceeding ½oz., provided the postage be pre-paid,

to be charged one penny.

No further alteration to be made in the charges leviable in the London district post, nor with respect to newspapers, franked letters, or parliamentary papers.

The Trains at 6, 8, $8\frac{3}{4}$, $9\frac{1}{2}$, and 11 a. m., and at 81 p.m., are in conjunction with the Grand Junction Railway; those at 83 and 11 a.m., and 82 p.m., with the North Union; and those at 6 and 83 a.m., and 2 p.m., with the Birmingham and Derby Junction, sufficient time being allowed at Birmingham for refreshment, Only those Trains at 8 a.m. and 2 p.m. take up and set down passengers at all the stations; the others only call at first-class stations. The Sunday Trains leave at 8 (calling at all the stations) and $9\frac{1}{2}$ a.m., and $8\frac{1}{2}$ p.m., the two latter carrying the mails, and the first and last being 'Mixed.' There is also a Mixed Train to Wolverhampton at 6 p.m. All these (except the last) are in conjunction with the Grand Junction Railway, and the Mails with the North Union Railway also.—The stations are at Euston Square, Harrow, Watford, Boxmoor, Berkhampstead, Tring, Aylesbury, Leighton Buzzard, Bletchley, Wolverton, Roade, Blisworth, Weedon, Crick, Rugby, Brandon, Coventry, Hampton, Birmingham.

For life or lives of the yearly value of 40s. above rents and charges, occupied by such freeholders; or, although not occupied, which would have entitled them to vote on the 7th of June, 1832; or acquired after that time by marriage, devise, or by promotion to a benefice or office.

Freeholds for life may be acquired in right of a benefice or an office-as clergymen, parish clerks, dessenting ministers, &c. with salaries derived from lands, the freehold of which is in the voter, or in other parties subject to a trust, in writing, entitling the voter to receive the salary either for life, or for an indefinite period; they may also arise from tithes, rent-charges, &c.

2. COPYHOLDERS.—[See 19th sec. of Act, supra.]

For life or larger estate of copyhold, or any other tenure except freehold, of the yearly value of 10l. above rents and charges.

3. Leaseholders.—[See 20th sec.]

Lessee of 101. clear yearly value, above rents and charges, for not less than sixty years, occupied or not.

Lessee of 50l. clear yearly value, above rents and charges, for not less than twenty years.

Assignee of the residue of such terms.

Sub-lessee, or his Assignee, of such terms-if occupying.

Tenant actually occupying lands, &c. at a yearly rent of not less than 501.

Freeholders and copyholders must have been in possession or in receipt of their profits for six calendar months, and leaseholders for twelve months; and tenants must have occupied twelve months, before the last day of July in each year—except in cases of descent, devise, marriage, or promotion.

1. Owners or tenants actually occupying any house, shop, &c., of 10*l*. yearly value; or of such value, together with land of which they are owners, or which they hold under the same landlord; or of premises held in immediate succession.

Joint occupiers of such premises, and of such value, as shall

give 10l. yearly to each occupier.

The premises must be occupied for twelve calendar months, and the voter have resided for six months before the last day of July, in the borough, or within seven miles. He must have been rated for the poor during such twelve months, and must have paid the rates due to the 6th of April preceding on or before 20th of July. If persons otherwise qualified are not rated, a claim may be made upon the overseers to put their names on the rate; and thereupon, and on payment or tender of the rates, they are to be deemed rated from the date of the then existing rate. Should they be again omitted in the next rate, the claim must be repeated.

2. Freemen made after the 1st of March, 1831, if by any other right than birth or servitude, are not to be registered; nor in right of birth, unless it was derived from a freeman entitled before that time, or thereafter becoming a freeman by servitude.—[See sec.

3. A saving of the rights of persons otherwise entitled to vote on the 7th June, 1832 (the passing of the Act).

REGISTRATION.

By sec. 37 the overseers are required, on the 20th of June, to give notice to persons entitled to vote to send in their claims, according to a form in schedule H—see it, in the Companion to the British Almanac for 1833, p. 144)—but after the formation of the register, no person shall be required thereafter to make any claim while he retains the same qualification and remains in the same abode.

By sec. 39, every person registered, or who has so claimed, may object to any other person as not entitled on the last day of July preceding; but he must give notice on or before the 25th August, according to schedule H, or to the like effect (see Companion for 1833, supra, p. 145), to the overseers, and also give to the person objected to, or leave at his abode, a notice, according to schedule H, or to the like effect.

Notice.—Each person, upon sending in his claim, is to pay 1s. (sec 56). The form in the notice is the preferable one to be adopted; but any notice in writing, sufficiently descriptive of the property and abode of the party claiming, to enable the overseers to make out their list, will satisfy the statute.

CITIES AND BOROUGHS.

Persons omitted are to give notice on or before 25th of August to the overseers, according to the form No. 4, schedule I. (see Companion for 1833, p. 145), or to the like effect; and persons registered may object to others, as not entitled on the last day of July, preceding, giving notice as before.—[See sec. 47.]

- 20. A dinner was given this evening to Mr. Macready on his retirement from the lesseeship of Covent Garden Theatre. The Duke of Sussex presided, and the company consisted of numerous gentlemen of rank and talent.
- Snenton New Church, opened by the Lord Bishop of Lincoln.
- On this day the British army in India, which marched from Candahar in four divisions on the 27th, 28th, and 29th of May, and the 3rd of June, was concentrated at Nanee, I2 miles from Ghizny. At two o'clock on the morning of the 23rd, the troops under the command of Sir J. Keane, commenced an attack on the citadel of Ghizny (one of the strongest places in Asia), defended by a garrison of 3,500 men, and commanded by a son of the exking of Cabul. At three o'clock the gates were blown in by the artillery, and under cover of a heavy fire the infantry forced their way into the place, and succeeded at five o'clock in fixing the British colours on the tower of the citadel. Five hundred of the

garrison were killed, and the remainder, with their commander, made prisoners. The loss on the English side was 191 killed and wounded. When the news of this event reached Cabul, Dost Mahomed sallied forth with 13,000 (?) men, but was shortly deserted by the greater part of his army, and compelled to fly with only 300 men, abandoning his artillery, ammunition, baggage, &c. Shah Soojoh restored to the sovereignty of Cabul,

purporting to come from a friend who was staying with his Lordship, in which the particulars of the accident, and consequent death, were detailed. The whole was discovered to be a hoax, but by whom contrived remains a mystery.

Sept. 29. St. Mary's Church in Nottingham re-opened, after in-

ternal improvements, by the Lord Bishop of Lincoln.

Nov. 4. Attack on Newport by the Chartists. In the course of the 3rd (Sunday), the Chartists collected from the mines and collieries in the neighbourhood about 10,000 men, most of whom were armed with guns, pikes, &c. At 10 o'Clock on Monday morning they divided themselves into two bodies, one of which, under the command of Mr. John Frost, an ex-magistrate, proceeded down the principal street of Newport; whilst the other, headed by Mr. Frost's son, took the direction of Stowe Hill. They met in front of the Westgate Hotel, where the magistrates were assembled with about 30 soldiers of the 45th regiment, and several special constables. The rioters commenced breaking the windows of the house, fired on the inmates, by which the Mayor, Mr. Phillips, and several other persons were wounded. The soldiers now made a sortie, and succeeded in dispersing the mob, which, with its leaders, fled from the city, leaving about 20 rioters dead and others dangerously wounded. A detachment of the 16th Royal Hussars having arrived from Bristol, the city became tranquil. Frost was apprehended on the following day, together with his printer, and other influential persons among the Chartists.

9. Sir Chapman Marshall assumes the office of Lord Mayor; the customary procession and dinner being provided.

CHRONICLE OF THE SESSION OF PARLIAMENT.

[2 and 3 Victoria, 1839.]

Feb. 5. PARLIAMENT was opened by the Queen in person. (LORDS.) The address was moved by the Earl of Lovelace and seconded by Lord Vernon. After a speech from Lord Brougham, the address was agreed to.

(Commons.) The address was moved by Mr. Edward Buller,

and seconded by Mr. G. W. Wood.

Feb. 11. (Lords.) Viscount Melbourne presented to the House various papers on the subject of Canada, including Lord Durham's

Report.

(Commons.) A discussion took place on the subject of the Corn Laws, particularly with respect to Mr. Villier's notice, that evidence should be heard at the bar of the House. The same evening Lord Palmerston explained the chief provisions of the treaty concluded with Austria and Turkey.

Feb. 12. (Lords.) Lord Brougham called the attention of their Lordships to what he conceived to be the impropriety of Dr.

Lushington, a judge of the Admiralty Court, sitting in the House of Commons.

(Commons.) The chief business of the day was Lord John Russell's statement of the intention of government with respect to education. It had resolved, he said, to constitute a Board of Education, to consist of five privy counsellors, over whom the President of the Council would preside. No salary was to be given; the members of the Board would be such individuals only as held other offices to which salaries were attached. This Board would have-the distribution of the money annually voted by Parliament (30,000l. was to be asked for this year), and its first efforts were to be directed to the establishment of Normal schools. Infant schools were also to be established.

15. Lord Mahon moved "that in the trial of controverted elections, the objects of justice, uniformity, and dispatch would be best attained by a tribunal not consisting of members of Par-

liament." The motion was rejected by 177 to 63.

18. (Lords.) After the presentation of a great number of petitions in favour of and against the repeal of the Corn Laws. Lord Brougham earnestly entreated their lordships to allow evidence as to the injurious effects of those laws to be heard at the bar of the House. The motion was opposed by Viscount Melbourne and other lords, and ultimately negatived without a division.

22. (Lords.) The State of the Navy was discussed at con-

siderable length.

25. (Commons.) The Factories Bill was read a second time, its object being to give greater security and protection to the children employed in factories, and to prevent various frauds which had been used to defeat the operation of the existing law.

28. (Commons.) Mr. O'Connell moved for leave to bring in a bill "to assimilate the franchise of Parliamentary electors in England, Wales, and Ireland, and to render the same more ex-

tensive." Negatived by 155 to 92.

March 7. (Commons.) Mr. Villiers moved "that the House resolve itself into a Committee of the whole House, to take into consideration the Act regulating the importation of Foreign Corn." The motion was defeated by 342 to 195.

14. (Lords.) Earl Fitzwilliam moved "that the Corn Act had failed to secure that steadiness in the price of grain which is essential to the best interests of the country." Negatived by 224 to 20.

19. (Commons.) Mr. Hume moved for leave to bring in a bill to extend the elective suffrage to all householders and rate-

payers. Negatived by 85 to 50.

April 9. (Commons.) Mr. Labouchere obtained leave to bring in a bill "to make temporary provision for the government of Jamaica," during a proposed suspension of its constitution for five years.

15. (Commons.) Lord John Russell moved "that it is the

opinion of this House that it is expedient to persevere in those principles which have guided the Executive Government of Ireland of late years, and which tended to the effectual administration of the law, and the general improvement of that part of the United Kingdom." The object of this resolution was of course to counteract the effect of that passed by the Lords on the 19th of March. The debate continued five days, when Lord John Russell's resolution was carried by 318 to 296.

23. (Commons.) On the motion of Mr. Harvey, a standing order of the House was adopted, to the effect that in all bills for the enclosure of waste or common lands, space should be set apart

for the exercise and recreation of the people.

26. (Commons.) Sir Robert Peel's Bill for the trial of election

petitions was considered in committee.

29. (Commons.) In Committee on the Prisons Regulation Bill, Lord John Russell said he should propose a grant of money

for the erection of a model prison.

May 1. (Commons.) Mr. Serjeant Talfourd having proposed that the House should go into committee on the Copyright Bill, Mr. Warburton and other members, on the ground that it ought to be considered in a full House, proposed its adjournment. Neither party would yield, and no less than twenty divisions took place on the motion; ultimately the clauses objected to were postponed, and the others passed.

3. (Commons.) The Speaker, Mr. Abercromby, announced his intention of retiring from the chair of the House after the

Whitsuntide recess.

6. (Commons.) Discussion on Jamaica Bill resumed on the motion for going into committee, which Sir Robert Peel, Mr. Goulburn, Lord Stanley, Messrs. Hume and Grote opposed, considering the bill to interfere unnecessarily with the constitution of Jamaica, and that further time should be granted to the House of Assembly. Lord John Russell, Mr. O'Connell, and Sir S. Lushington, looked upon the measure as indispensable to the safety and the well-being of the enfranchised black population. The motion was carried by 294 to 289, leaving only a majority of 5. In consequence of this vote—

7. (Lords.) Viscount Melbourne said he not only considered the success of the measure was out of the question, but that Government itself did not appear to possess the confidence of a great proportion of the members of the House of Commons; the Min-

istry had, therefore, resigned.

(Commons.) A similar announcement was made by Lord John

Russell

13. (Commons.) Sir Robert Peel addressed the House on the subject of the events of the preceding week. He said that he had been sent for to the Queen, when her Majesty stated, that "in all respects her late Ministers had entirely given her satisfaction; but that it became necessary, in consequence of their resignation, that her Majesty should take steps for the formation of

a new Administration;" and therefore inquired whether he was willing to undertake the duty. He had answered in the affirmative, and immediately addressed himself to the necessary arrangements. On proposing to consult with her Majesty on the subject of the principal appointments held by ladies in the household, her Majesty had informed him that it was her pleasure to reserve those appointments in her own hands, conceiving the course proposed "to be contrary to usage," whilst it was certainly "repugnant to her feelings." The right hon. baronet, on his part, considering he had a strict right over those appointments, and that its exercise was indispensable, in order that her "Majesty's confidential servants might have the advantage of a public demonstration" of her Majesty's "full support and confidence," had in consequence resigned the trust committed to his charge. Lord John Russell defended her Majesty's objection to Sir Robert Peel's proposition, as being "contrary to usage," and stated that, on the right hon. baronet's resignation, her Majesty had sent for him, and inquired whether, in his opinion, she was justified in what she had done; he had replied that he thought her Majesty was justified: upon this her Majesty had requested the support of him and his colleagues. A cabinet council had been accordingly held, at which it was agreed, "That for the purpose of giving to the Administration that character of efficiency and stability, and those marks of the constitutional support of the Crown, which are required to enable it to act usefully to the public service, it is reasonable that the great officers of the Court, and situations in the household, held by Members of Parliament, should be included in the political arrangements made in a change of the Administration; but they (the Ministers) are not of opinion that a similar principle should be applied or extended to the offices held by ladies in her Majesty's household."

14. (LORDS.) Communications of a precisely similar character were made by Viscount Melbourne and the Duke of Welling-

ton. House adjourned to the 27th instant.

15. (COMMONS.) Mr. Abercromby resigned the Speakership, and took his leave of the House in a short address. House adjourned to the 27th instant.

27. (COMMONS.) Mr. Hindley proposed Mr. Shaw Lefevre as Speaker; Mr. Wynn proposed Mr. Goulburn. The former was

chosen by 317 to 299.

May 30. (COMMONS.) Mr. Labouchere obtained leave to bring in a bill to "provide for the enactment of certain laws in the island of Jamaica," as a substitute for the measure on which Ministers

had resigned.

June 3- (Lords.) Lord Brougham moved, and the Duke of Wellington seconded, the second reading of a bill to amend the beer-law, its chief object being to repeal the clause enabling beer sellers to sell beer to be drunk on the premises, Motion affirmed and bill referred to a committee.

June 11. (LORDS.) A conversation took place on the subject

of the circulars issued to the lords lieutenants of counties, for the encouragement of armed associations to repress the disturbances

than prevailing in many parts-

- 14. (COMMONS.) Lord John Russell moved that the House resolve itself into a committee of supply, in order that he might propose a vote of £30,000, for educational purposes. Lord Stanley moved, as an amendment, that her Majesty be pleased to revoke the order in council appointing a committee of education. After a long debate the question was adjourned until the 19th.— Mr. T. Attwood, the same day, presented a petition signed by 1,280,000 persons, who, he said, demanded universal suffrage, annual parliaments, vote by ballot, the abolition of property qualifications, and the payment of members. [The petition, it is said, was a cylinder of parchment, about the diameter of a coachwheel, and was literally rolled into the House.]

- (Lords.) The Archbishop of Canterbury moved an address to the Queen to rescind the order in council appointing the educational committee. A debate ensued, and the motion was
- carried by 229 to 118.
- (Commons.) Mr. Spring Rice, in making his financial statement, moved "to reduce the postage charged on letters to one uniform rate of one penny, charged upon every letter of a weight to be hereafter fixed by law; Parliamentary privileges of franking to be abolished, and official franking strictly regulated: the House pledging itself at the same time to make good any deficiency of revenue which may be occasioned by such alteration of the rates of the existing duties." Resolution agreed to; Sir Robert Peel, however, reserving the right of future opposition, as he did not approve of the concluding pledge.

10. The Metropolitan Police Bill passed through the Committee.

12. (Lords.) The House, on the motion of Lord Brougham, by 41 to 34, passed the following resolution; "With a view to the improvement and happiness of the people, and the good order of the community, it is expedient, as speedily as possible, to place all the beer-houses on the same footing as the houses of licensed victuallers, in all respects whatever."

(Commons.) Mr. T. Attwood moved for a Committee to consider the "National Petition," presented on the 14th June. Ne-

gatived by 235 to 46.

15. (Commons.) The City of London Police Bill passed the House with a clause, that excited some discussion, to prevent the Commissioners sitting in Parliament.

16. (Lords.) The Birmingham riots formed the subject of conversation. The Duke of Wellington said he had been in many towns taken by storm, but never had such outrages occurred in them, as were committed in Birmingham in one night.

17. (Commons.) Lord John Russell detailed the circum-

stances connected with the riots at Birmingham.

20. (Commons) Mr. Darby moved an instruction to the committee on the Poor Law Continuance Bill, to authorize Boards of Guardians to allow out-door relief to labourers married before the passing of the law, In spite of Lord John Russell's opposition, this was carried by 69 to 46. This resolution was, however, rescinded a few days after.

22. (Commons.) Lord John Russell announced the intention

of Government to increase the army by 5,000 men.

24. (Commons.) Lord John Russell brought in a bill "for the establishment of County and District Constables by authority of Justices of the Peace for England and Wales." It was not intended to make the measure universal or imperative, but to authorize magistrates to establish them where necessary.

25. (Lords.) In Committee on the Irish Corporation Bill, Lord Lyndhurst moved that the franchise should be raised from

81. to 101.; carried by 93 to 50.

26. (Lords.) The Lower Canada Government Bill passed the committee, after some discussion.

29. (Commons.) The Penny Postage Bill passed this day.

Aug. 1. (Lords.) The Earl of Minto moved the second reading of the Bill for the suppression of the Portuguese Slave Trade. The Duke of Wellington opposed the motion, which was defeated by 38 to 32. On the following day however,

2. (Lords.) Lord Brougham moved an Address to be presented to the Queen, praying her Majesty to take effectual measures for the suppression of the Portuguese Slave Trade, and promising the support of the house in such a course. Agreed to.

5. (Lords.) Viscount Melbourne moved the second reading

of the Postage Bill.

- 6. (Lords.) Lord Brougham spoke on the administration of justice in Ireland, condemned the indiscriminate elemency of the Marquis of Normanby, and ended by moving various resolutions, expressive of the principles that should direct the executive. The Marquis of Normanby defended his conduct, and pointed to the improved condition of the country under his administration. The resolutions were carried by 86 to 52.
- 16. (Lords.) A new bill was introduced for the suppression of the Portuguese Slave Trade.
- 19. (Lords.) The Manchester and Bolton Police Bills were read a second time,
- 27. (Lords.) Close of the Sessions. Her Majesty in person prorogued Parliament, Her Majesty read the Address.

RESPONSIBILITIES OF CARRIERS.


By I William IV., cap. 68, it is enacted that mail contractors, coach proprietors, and carriers, shall not be liable for the loss of any parcel containing coin, gold or silver manufactured or unmanufactured, jewellery, watches, clocks, &c.; bills, bank-notes, or securities for the payment of money, maps, writings, title-deeds, paintings, plated articles, glass, china, manufactured or unmanufactured silks, furs, or lace, where the value of such parcel exceeds 10L, unless delivered as such, and an increased charge be paid and accepted for the same, of which charge notice is to be affixed in offices and warehouses. Carriers, &c. are to give receipts, acknowledging such increased rate; and in case of neglecting to give a receipt or affix notice, the party not to be entitled to the benefit of this act. The publication of notices is not to limit the liability of proprietors, &c., in respect of any other goods conveyed. Every office used to be deemed a receiving-house; and any one coach proprietor or carrier liable to be sued. Nothing in this act extends to annul, or in any wise affect any special contract between such mail contractor, stage-coach proprietor, or common carrier, and any other parties, for the conveyance of goods. This act does not protect any mail contractor, stage-coach proprietor, or other common carrier, from liability to answer for loss or injury to any goods arising from the felonious acts of any coachman, guard, book-keeper, or other servant, nor to protect any such coachman, servant, &c., from liability, for any loss or injury occasioned by his own neglect or misconduct.

BYE LAWS OF THE TOWN OF NOTTINGHAM.

ENACTED

At a Meeting of the Council of the Town, held on Thursday the 18th August, 1836; present T. Wakefield, Esq., Mayor, and Thirty-six Councillors. It was Resolved,

I. That every person duly qualified who shall be elected to the Office of Alderman, Councillor, Auditor, or Assessor of this. Town, and who shall neglect or refuse to accept, and take upon himself such office, to which he shall have been elected, shall pay a fine of £25; and every Alderman or Councillor, who shall be elected to the office of Mayor of this Town, and who shall neglect, or refuse to accept, and take upon himself such last-mentioned office, shall pay a fine of £100.

II. That every Person occupying within this Town, any House, Shop, Warehouse, or other Building, adjoining to a Public Street, or Highway, who shall permit the Water from the Eaves of the Roofs, or from the Spouts, to fall upon or over the Causeway of such Street, or Highway; or who shall permit Meat, or other Goods, to be exposed for sale, or for any other purpose, in such manner as to project over, or rest upon the Causeway of such Street, or Highway, shall, for each and every such offence, pay a fine of 10s.

III. That if any Butcher, Fishmonger, or other person, shall expose for sale, or sell any unwholesome Meat, or Fish, not fit for Human Food (the unfitness whereof shall be in the decision of the Justices adjudicating upon the complaint thereof), every

such Person shall forfeit and pay a fine of 20s.

IV. That every Person who shall empty any Privy, or Dusthole, or suffer any Cart or Waggon containing the Soil or Manure, to remain in any Street within this Town, between the hours of seven in the morning and eleven at night, from the first of March to the thirtieth of October, and between the hours of nine in the morning and ten at night, during the remainder of the year; every owner of any Cart or Waggon from which the Soil, or Manure shall be wilfully or negligently spilt or scattered along any Street within this Town, and every person who shall have adjoining to any Street within this Town, any Privy, Manure, or Dusthole, or any place causing a noisome or noxious stench or vapour, not fenced and shut out from public view, shall for each, and every the said offences, pay a fine of 10s.

Further Bye Laws enacted on Tuesday 5th day of March, 1839.

I. That if any person or persons occupying a Butcher's Shop in the Market Place, or Shambles of this Town, for the Sale of Meat, or a Stall, Table, Bench, Chair, Seat, or Standing, in the said Market Place, for the Sale of any Goods, Wares, or Chattels, in the Saturday Market, shall, after the hour of half-past eleven at night by the Exchange Hall Clock, sell or expose for sale within the said Shambles, or Market, any such Meat, Goods, Wares, or Chattles, or shall not before twelve at night, by the same clock, close his, her, or their Shop, or shall not before that time remove and clear away his, her, or their Stall, Table, Chair, Seat, Standing, Goods, Wares, and Chattels, from and out of the said Market Place, he, she, or they so offending shall respectively forfeit, for each such offence, any sum not exceeding 10s.

II. That instead of the fine of 10s. imposed by the Second Bye Law passed by this Council on the 18th day of August, 1836, there shall henceforth be paid for each and every offence therein

set forth, a fine not exceeding 10s.

III. That instead of the fine of 20s. imposed by the Third

Bye Law passed by this Council on the 18th day of August, 1836, there shall henceforth be paid for each and every offence therein

set forth, a fine not exceeding 20s.

IV. That instead of the fine of 10s. imposed by the Fourth Bye Law passed by this Council on the 18th day of August, 1836, there shall henceforth be paid for each and every offence therein set forth, a fine not exceeding 10s.



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OBSERVATIONS.

COMPANIES formed for the Assurance of Life and against Loss by Fire, are divided into three Classes, viz.:

FIRST CLASS.—Companies having Capitals, wherein the Assurers do not participate in the Profits; such as the Sun, Royal Exchange, London Assurance Corporation, Globe, Albion, and Eagle; the Phænix Fire and Pelican Life, British Fire and Westminster Life, Imperial, Hope, and West-of-England Fire, Star Life, and York and London Offices.

SECOND CLASS.—Companies wherein there is no Proprietary, and where the Contributors are consequently mutual Assurers and Participators in a division of Profits; such as the Hand-in-Hand and Westminster Fire Offices, the Amicable, Equitable, and London Life Association, and the Norwich and National Union Fire and Life Offices.

THIRD CLASS.—Companies wherein the Assured and the Proprietary participate in Profits, under certain regulations; such as the NOTTINGHAMSHIRE and DERBYSHIRE, the GUARDIAN, the UNION, the ATLAS, the COUNTY FIRE and PROVIDENT LIFE, the IMPERIAL, ROCK, HOPE, ECONOMIC, ATLAS, ALLIANCE, PALLADIUM, LAW, CROWN, CLERICAL, EUROPEAN LIFE, and the MANCHESTER for FIRE and LIFE.

The Third Class combines the security of the First with the beneficial character of the Second; under this denomination the NOTTINGHAMSHIRE and DERBYSHIRE is placed, where it tenders all the benefits of the Equitable, the Amicable, the London Life, the Norwich, &c., without their perils and yields a security equivalent to the Sun, the Royal Exchange, Phænix,

&c.

These advantages are mainly derivable from a numerous located Co-partnership, with the Establishment of Committees arising thereout at the principal towns of the two Counties, distinguishing the Nottinghamshire and Derbyshire from all other institutions; and by an influence thus exerted and a powerful interest necessarily involved, its progress in public estimation must lead to prosperous results.
