No application can be entertained for compensation for alleged injury from the non-payment of a Money Order at the expected time ; and the Post Office is not liable under any circumstances to more than one payment of a Money Order, even when, notwithstanding the precautions that are taken, the Order has been paid to a person not entitled to receive the same.

**Applications to Return Letters.**—A Letter when it has once been posted cannot be returned to the writer, but must be forwarded to the person to whom it is addressed.

**Change and Bad Money.**—No Postmaster is bound to give change, or is authorised to demand change ; and when any money is paid at the Office, whether as change or otherwise, no question as to its right amount, goodness or weight can be entertained after it has been removed from the counter.

**INLAND POSTAGE RATES, &c.**

**Letters** between places in the United Kingdom, the Isle of Man, the Orkney, Shetland, Scilly and Channel Islands: Prepaid—Not exceeding 1 oz. 1d. ; 2 oz. 1½d. ; 4 oz. 2d. ; 6 oz. 2½d. ; and so on, ½d. being added for every 2 oz. A Letter exceeding 12 oz. 1d. for each oz. Not prepaid, double these rates.

**Stout Post Cards**, which bear a  $\frac{1}{2}d.$  impressed stamp may be obtained at all Post Offices, price  $8d.$  for 12; **thin ditto**,  $7d.$  for 12. The *address only* must appear on the front; the communication must be written or printed on the back.

**Books and Newspapers.**—*A Book Packet* may contain paper or other substance in ordinary use for writing or printing, photographs when not on glass or in frames containing glass, also circulars (to the exclusion of letters, sealed or open, or anything which is sealed or closed to inspection), and such book, &c., may be printed, written or plain. The postage is  $\frac{1}{2}d.$  for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz., to be prepaid by stamps. *Newspapers*, whether posted singly or in a packet,  $\frac{1}{2}d.$  each; but a packet containing two or more *registered* newspapers is not charged at a higher rate than a book packet. Not prepaid, double the book rates. Every packet to be sent without a cover, or in a cover open at the ends, but the packet may be tied at the ends. No Book Packet may be above 5 lbs. in weight, nor above 18 in. long, 9 in. wide, or 6 in. deep, unless sent to or from a Government Office.

**REGISTERED LETTERS, January 1st., 1878.**—A Letter, Book, or other Packet, on which the postage has been prepaid in Stamps can be registered to any part of the United Kingdom for a fee of TWOPENCE. The times for Registration are stated in the foregoing Table, headed "Despatch of Letters, &c."

For the convenience of persons living in country places, where no Post Office is near, Letters will be Registered by Rural Post Messengers, who will receive Letters for Registration on their outward and on their inward walks, whenever it is practicable for them to do so.

In the event of a Registered Letter containing an enclosure of intrinsic value, or its contents, being lost while passing through the post, the department will, under certain regulations, make good the value of the contents up to £2. These Regulations will be published shortly.

Registered Letter Envelopes bearing a  $2d.$  stamp for the payment of the Registration Fee, will be sold at all Post Offices, and by Rural Messengers.

A Letter intended to be registered must not be dropped into a Letter Box, but must be given to an agent of the Post Office to be registered.

Inland Letters containing Coin, Jewellery, or Watches, cannot be sent Unregistered. If dropped into a Letter Box, they will, as heretofore, be registered by the Post Office, and charged on delivery with a Registration fee of  $8d.$ ; a similar fee of  $8d.$  will be charged on Letters (without regard to their contents) marked "Registered," but posted Unregistered instead of being given to a Post Office servant.

No Letter containing Coin, Jewellery, or Watches, can be sent, even if registered, to any Foreign Country.

The Postmaster-General hopes that when Registration is made so cheap and so easy, the Public will altogether abstain from sending Letters containing enclosures of value through the Post Unregistered.

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## VILLAGES 10 MILES ROUND CAMBRIDGE.

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**Abington, Little** is 8 miles S.E. of Cambridge. The Church of S. Mary the Virgin is old, and has chancel, nave, and a tower containing 1 bell. Rev. Edward Lynch Pearson, M.A., Vicar. Thomas Oslar Kent, Churchwarden.

**Arrington** is 10 miles S.W. from Cambridge, and is entirely the property of the Earl of Hardwicke, who is lord of the manor. The Church is small, and is dedicated to S. Nicholas. Rev. Edward Lyon Fellows, Vicar. Rev. John Wisken, Curate. James Meyers, Churchwarden.

**Babraham** is 7 miles S.E. from Cambridge, and is situated at the foot of the Gog Magog Hills. Babraham House is the country seat of Earl Cadogan, whose London residence is Chelsea House, Cadogan Place, S.W. The church is dedicated to S. Peter. Rev. Joseph Singleton, M.A., Vicar. Samuel Webb, Churchwarden.

**Balsham** is about  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles S.E. of Cambridge. There is a large school for 300 children, with master's residence in the parish. The Baptists and Independents have chapels. The Post Office, Money Order Office and Savings Bank, are at Mr. J. Bragg's, jun. The Church of Holy Trinity is a handsome building, with square tower containing 5 bells. Rev. John Joseph Halcombe, M.A., Rector, Rural Dean for the 1st Division of Cambs. G. Potter and J. Symonds, Churchwardens.

**Barrington** is a village on the River Cam, 7 miles above Cambridge, one mile from Foxton Station on the Great Northern Railway. The distinguishing feature of the place is the extensive village green, a favourite resort of cricketers from some distance round. The Church of All Saints, is free and open, and the embattled Tower contains a peal of 6 bells, among the best in the county. In the Church is also a very interesting iron bound chest, dating from the 10th century. The population is chiefly employed in coprolite digging. Rev. Edward Conybeare, Vicar. Thomas Smith and Thomas Titchmarsh, Churchwardens. There is an Independent Chapel in the parish.

**Barton** is a parish about  $4\frac{3}{4}$  miles from Cambridge, and, like several others in this district, yields a good supply of coprolites. The Church of S. Peter is an ancient one, and contains brasses in the chancel, whose dates are 1593 and 1613. Rev. Alfred Wm. Monkhouse, M.A., Vicar. Richard Rowley Holben and Thomas Baker, Churchwardens.

**Bottisham** is situated about 6 miles to the east of Cambridge, and possesses besides the fine old parish Church, a place of worship for the Independents. In 1871, the population (including Bottisham Lode, Long Meadow), was 1,653. There are schools under the management of a School Board, Money and Telegraph Office, &c. The County Magistrates hold petty sessions at the Police Station, every alternate Wednesday. Bottisham Park is the seat of George Jenyns, Esq., J.P., who is lord of the manor. The Church of the Holy Trinity, one of the finest specimens of early decorated architecture in the county, is remarkable for a Galilee Porch. It now contains a fine



memorial east-window and reredos to the memory of Col. Jenyns, one of the "Six Hundred" at Balaklava. Rev. John B. Mc Clennan, M.A., (late Fellow Trinity College), Vicar. Edward Newman and John King, jun., Churchwardens.

**Bottisham Lode.** Long Meadow and the Fen, were formed into a separate ecclesiastical parish in 1863, under the name of Bottisham Lode. In this parish are some interesting remains of a Priory, which was dedicated to Our Lady and S. Nicholas. The Church, which is dedicated to S. James, was consecrated in 1853. Rev. Armitage Bonser, M.A., Vicar. William King and Charles Parker, Churchwardens.

**Bourn** is situated 9 miles W. of Cambridge, and is very picturesque. Bourn Hall is the seat of the Right Hon. the Earl De La Warr, and occupies the site of an old Castle, the history connected with which goes back to the time of the conquest. Earl De La Warr's London address is the Carlton Club, S.W. The Church is now dedicated to S. Mary, (but formerly to S. Helena). It is in the early English style, and was re-opened after restoration as far as funds would admit, in August, 1876. Rev. John Dowell Ridout, M.A., Vicar. George Dawson and Joshua Harradine, Churchwardens. The Wesleyans have a chapel here.

**Boxworth** is 8 miles N.W. of Cambridge. There is a school for boys and girls. The Church is dedicated to S. Peter, and was thoroughly restored a few years ago. Rev. John Pardoe, M.A., Rector. Samuel Kirby and James Murfin, Churchwardens.

**Brinkley** is about 10 miles to the E. of Cambridge, and possesses an endowed school for boys and girls. The Church, which is dedicated to S. Mary, was restored in 1874, under the direction of Mr. Frederick Thomson, architect. The living is in the patronage of S. John's College, Cambridge. Rev. Francis Drake Thomson, M.A., Rector. R. W. King and Thomas Hart, Churchwardens.

**Burwell** is about 9 miles N.E. of Cambridge. Besides the parish Church and S. Andrew's Mission Church, situated at the upper end of the village, there are places of worship for Baptists, Independents, and Wesleyans. There is also a good school, and some interesting Antiquarian remains. The parish Church is dedicated to S. Mary; it has a Tower (with 5 bells), the restoration of which is rapidly progressing. A new reredos has been erected, the chancel screen has been restored, and a new organ has been placed in the chancel. Rev. J. W. Cockshott, M.A., Vicar. Rev. Richard Shaw, B.A., Curate. Thomas Mason and Isaac Anderson, Churchwardens.

**Caldecot** is 8 miles W. from Cambridge. The Church of S. Michael, was restored in 1861. The living is a vicarage consolidated with the Rectory of Toft. Rev. Edward Arnett Powell, M.A., Vicar. William Poole, Churchwarden.

**Caxton** is situated about 12 miles W. of Cambridge. It was formerly a market town, but the market has long been discontinued, and Caxton is now but a village. The Church, which was completely restored in 1873, is dedicated to S. Andrew, and contains some interesting memorials. Rev. H. M. Smythe, Vicar. John Giles and H. F. L. White, Churchwardens.

**Cherryhinton** is about  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles S.E. from Cambridge. The Church (S. Andrew), is a fine old building in the early English style, and has a tower with 5 bells. The chancel is divided from the nave by a fine carved oak screen. The whole pile is about to be restored, under the superintendence of Mr. G. Gilbert Scott, architect. The estimated cost of restoration is nearly £5,000. Towards this the Restoration Committee have in hand—or promised—rather more than £4,000, including £1,500, raised in memory of the late Dr. Cookson, and available for the church. Contributions for this interesting work will be thankfully received at any of the Cambridge Banks. Rev. William Samuel Parish, M.A., Vicar. Charles Cullum and James E. Preston, Churchwardens.

**Chesterton** is a village adjoining Cambridge, and a large portion is included in the Parliamentary Borough. In this parish are several schools; the County Gaol is also situated here, but the new part of Chesterton is so intimately connected with the town of Cambridge, that an account of the Church (S. Luke's) services, and of those of the Chapels, will be found amongst the town information. Old Chesterton Parish Church is an old building in the perpendicular style, dedicated to S. Andrew, and possesses many points of interest. The porch is extremely picturesque. There is a tower (with spire), containing a sweet toned peal of bells. The interior of the Church is about to undergo a thorough internal restoration, and it is hoped that the work may be begun very shortly. A branch of the Church of England Temperance Society, meets in the National School Room, on the first Tuesday in every month, at 8 o'clock. Rev. S. E. Perry, M.A., Vicar. Rev. G. Hale, M.A., Curate of S. Luke's District. Rev. T. H. Orpen, B.A., and Rev. C. W. E. Body, B.A., Curates Parish Church. T. H. Naylor, M.A. and J. Foster, Churchwardens.

**Comberton** is  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles W.S.W. of Cambridge. The Church, which is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin, is a stone building in the perpendicular style. The restoration of the chancel has been undertaken by the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and a very handsome oak roof substituted for the original ceiled one. Upwards of £500 is to be expended on the works: the Ecclesiastical Commissioners have also granted  $\frac{3}{4}$  of an acre of ground for the enlargement of the churchyard. A handsome Vicarage has been built here, and the value of the living raised £10 per annum by the Patrons, Jesus College, Cambridge. Rev. William J. Tillbrook, M.A., S. John's College, Oxon, Vicar. John Bennett and John Mann, Churchwardens.

**Connington** is 10 miles N.W. from Cambridge. The Church of S. Mary possesses a lofty spire and 4 bells. There is a National School for boys and girls. Rev. Favill J. Hopkins, Rector. John Phillips and Philip Kirby, Churchwardens.

**Coton** adjoins Cambridge, and possesses a National School for boys and girls. The Church (dedicated to S. Peter), is in the early English and perpendicular styles, with a Norman chancel. Rev. George Bentley Morley, M.A., Rector. Richard Hobson and William Bailey, Churchwardens.

**Cottenham** is a large village  $6\frac{1}{2}$  miles N. from Cambridge. The chief streets are paved and lighted. A School Board is established, and new schools have been built. There are Reading Rooms, and other signs of a rising place. The population in 1871 was 2,496. The Church of All Saints is in the perpendicular style, and has a lofty tower, containing six bells. Partial restoration has

been carried out, and some interesting objects are to be found in the interior of the Church. Rev. Samuel Banks, M.A., Rector. Thomas Ivatt and Osborn Cross, Churchwardens. There are two Dissenting Chapels, one for the Baptists, and one for the Wesleyans. The Dissenters have also a separate burial ground.

**Dry Drayton** is a parish  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. from Cambridge. There are two manors, (Coventry and Crowlands), in the parish. The Church is a stone Gothic building, dedicated to S.S. Peter and Paul. Rev. F. A. Walker, M.A., Rector. Thomas Wilson and Thomas Reynolds, Churchwardens.

**Dullingham** is 10 miles E. of Cambridge, and is a station upon the Great Eastern Railway. There is an endowed school, a Wesleyan Methodist Chapel, and various endowed charities in the parish, which in 1871 had a population of 818. The parish Church is dedicated to S. Mary, and contains many points of interest, amongst which may be mentioned its curious old font, and a handsome monument to the memory of Lieut.-General Christopher Jeffreson. Rev. S. H. Banks, L.L.D., Vicar.

**Duxford** is 9 miles S. of Cambridge. Formerly Duxford comprised two parishes (S. Peter and S. John), but these have been for some time united for civil purposes, and recently, both the Rectory of S. Peter, and the Vicarage of S. John, have been consolidated. There are some very interesting remains of an ancient Priory, to be seen at the "Red Lion" Inn, which was formerly the house of a monastic order. A chapel, formerly belonging to the Priory, is now used as a barn. S. Peter's Church is partly in the Norman style, has a tower and one bell; S. John's Church is similar, and has Chantry Chapel and fine Norman Tower, containing 5 bells. Rev. H. J. Carter, M.A., Rector. Thomas Holiday and Samuel G. Jonas, Churchwardens. The Independents have also a chapel.

**Elsworth** is 10 miles N.E. from Cambridge. There are national schools and almshouses in the parish. The Church, which is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, is a peculiar building of the thirteenth century. Rev. George Shaw, M.A., Rector. Charles Witherow and James Witherow, Churchwardens.

**Eversden** (Great) is 5 miles S.W. from Cambridge. Coprolites have been dug in this parish for many years. The Independents have a large chapel, and there is a British School under their superintendence. The parish Church is a plain edifice, of mixed styles of architecture, dedicated to S. John. Rev. Thomas York, B.D., Vicar. Henry Green and P. Hagger, Churchwardens.

**Eversden** (Little) is 7 miles W. from Cambridge; it has a national school for boys and girls. The living is a Rectory, which is held with the Vicarage of Great Eversden by an Incumbent. The parish Church is dedicated to S. Helen. Rev. Thomas York, B.D., Rector. W. Porter and H. J. King, Churchwardens.

**Fen Ditton** is a parish  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.E. of Cambridge. It possesses a good school, under the management of a certificated governess. The old Church of S. Mary is of considerable interest, dating back probably to the 11th century. The interior has lately been restored, and several improvements made, with a fund of which the Rev. C. H. Cross was Treasurer. The Tower, with its peal of five bells, is in a sadly ruinous condition, but great efforts are being made to

restore it. The late Rector, who held the living for 33 years, died on the 20th August, 1877. The curate in charge, the Rev. G. A. Tweedie, took the management of the parish, until the appointment of the present Rector. Rev. — Cox, Rector. T. Banyard, Churchwarden.

**Fen Drayton** is  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. of Cambridge. The Church (to whom dedicated is not known), is a small building, in various styles of architecture. The Master and Fellows of Christ's College, Cambridge, are the Tithe Impropiators. Rev. Frederick Shaw, M.A., Oxon. Vicar. Frederick Phillips and Samuel Johnson, senr., Churchwardens.

**Foulmire** is 9 miles S. of Cambridge. There is a fine National School in the parish, under the superintendence of a certificated master, Mr. Thomas H. Quarry. The Church of S. Mary the Virgin, is a fine old stone structure, with a lofty Tower. Rev. Henry Martyr Lower, M.A., Rector. Henry Dean and Charles Papworth, Churchwardens. The Independents have a chapel.

**Foxton** is about 7 miles S. of Cambridge. The Church of S. Lawrence, erected in the 13th century, is a very interesting one, and retains many of the old benches, but like the chancel, stands much in need of restoration. The nave roof, originally a very handsome one, has been repaired, but those of the aisles are in a bad state. There are some beautiful fragments of stained glass in the windows. Rev. George Robson, Vicar. Alfred Sanxter and John Roads, Churchwardens.

**Fulbourn** is 5 miles S.E. from Cambridge. The County Lunatic Asylum is situated in this parish; it is a fine pile of buildings in the Elizabethan style, capable of accommodating upwards of 300 patients. Dr. Bacon is the medical superintendent. The seat of Charles Watson Townley, Esq., J.P., the Lord Lieutenant of the County, is also in this village. There were formerly two parishes (All Saints and S. Vigir's), in Fulbourn, but these have recently been united. The Church of S. Vigir, which was restored in 1869, is in the perpendicular style, and contains many objects of interest to the Ecclesiologist. The services are as follows:—Holy Communion, Sundays and Thursdays, and Holy Days at 8.15 a.m. Daily Mattins at 9. Daily Evensong at 7. Sundays, Divine Service at 11, 3, and 6.30. Rev. J. V. Durrell, Rector and Vicar. Rev. W. S. Reece, Curate. C. W. Townley and J. L. Campling, Churchwardens.

**Girton** adjoins Cambridge in the N.W., and is well known for the Ladies College, which is situated in the parish. The College was established for the higher education of women, and to obtain admission for its students to the Examination for Degrees in the University of Cambridge. Miss Bernard is the Matron. The Church of S. Andrew was restored in 1858. The living is a Rectory. Rev. G. B. F. Potticary, M.A., Rector. Rev. G. A. Cuxson, M.A., Curate. Wm. Cockerton and Chas. Saunderson, Churchwardens.

**Gransden** (Little) is about 14 miles W. from Cambridge. There is a National School for boys and girls in the village, and also several charities. The foundation of the Parish Church, which is dedicated to S.S. Peter and Paul, was as far back as the 12th century. Of late years, the fabric has been well cared for and restored, and a stained glass window has been inserted by the present Rector. Rev. Alfred Newby, M.A., Rector. Nathaniel Fortescue and Thomas Wakefield, Churchwardens.

**Grantchester** is a village  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles S.W. from Cambridge, and is situated on the site of an old Roman city. The River Granta flows from here to Cambridge, and upon its waters as well as through the fields, and by the well-kept roads, many Cambridge people make their way to this pretty little village. The Church of S. Andrew is a fine building, and contains many interesting objects. The edifice is now undergoing restoration. Rev. William Martin, M.A., Vicar. Rev. Arthur Lukyn Williams, B.A., Curate. F. W. Lilley and H. J. Banyard, Churchwardens. S. Mark's temporary wooden church upon the Barton road, is in this parish. Rev. Arthur Willink, M.A., Curate-in-charge.

**Haddenham** is about 15 miles N. from Cambridge; its population in 1871 was 2,055, including Aldreth South and Hill Row West Hamlets. There is a church and two chapels, (one Baptist and one Wesleyan), and two burial grounds. The Church, which is dedicated to the Holy Trinity, was formerly re-opened, (after having been undergoing restoration for the past six years), on May 17th, 1877, by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese. The architect is Mr. Richard Reynolds Rowe, Cambridge, and the contractor, Mr. W. Elworth, Upwell and Wisbeach. £6,000 has been spent upon the fabric; but £200 more are wanted to complete the spire, and finish the body of the church. Rev. Charles Watson Bond, M.A., Vicar. Rev. John Freeman, M.A., Curate. Henry John Porter and Richard Clay, Churchwardens. There is a Post, Money and Telegraph Office and Savings' Bank.

**Hardwick** is a parish situated 6 miles W. of Cambridge. There is a school room, with teacher's house adjoining in the village. Hardwicke or Hardwick, in Domesday Survey, Hardwic: a Rectory value in the King's Books, £8 14s. 2d.

"There is a small neat Church, dedicated to S. Priary, with tower, and stone spire, nave, chancel, and south porch, all perpendicular. There is also an open timber roof, a lancet tower arch, and a curious octagonal Font."—See G. R. Boissier's Notes, on the Cambridgeshire Churches, 1827.

"In 970, King Edgar re-established the monastery of Ely, and appointed Brithnoth, Prior of Winchester, first Abbot. In 991, Duke Brithnoth, marching against the Danes, previously to the Battle of Malden, was hospitably entertained in the Abbey; he gave them sundry manors, Croxton, Fulbourn, Hardwick, Impington, Pampisworth, Teversham, Triplow-Pittensaries, on condition, that if he should be slain in battle, they should bring off his body, and bury it at Ely, which was done."—See Ely Diocesan Calendar.

"In the reign of Henry III. a small manor in Comberton, called the Heveds, belonged to Robert de Herdewyk, who held it on condition supplying a hot simnel, or cake, every day, to the Royal table."—See Lyson 168-9.

Rev. James Smith Brown, M.A., Rector. John Hodson, Churchwarden.

**Harlton** is 6 miles S.W. from Cambridge, and its soil yields a large quantity of coprolites. The Church of S. Mary is in the perpendicular style, and a very interesting description of it is to be found in "the Churches of Cambridgeshire," a book published for the Cambridge Camden Society. Rev. Osmond Fisher, Rector. John Whitehead and Thomas Pyke, Churchwardens.

**Harston** is situate 5 miles S.S.W. from Cambridge. There is a School under the management of a School Board in this parish. The Church of All Saints, is a fine old building in the perpendicular style. The interior was restored in 1870. Jesus College, Cambridge, takes the unimpropriated tithes, which go to the support of the Rustat Fellowships and Scholarships. The

Bishop of Ely is patron of the Vicarage. Rev. F. J. Durbin, M.A., Vicar. Rev. George Ash, Curate. Thomas Smith and Thomas Hays, Churchwardens. The Baptists have a Chapel in the parish.

**Haslingfield** is  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles S.W. from Cambridge. There is a large school in the parish, governed under a scheme propounded by the Charity Commissioners. A new School Room has recently been built. Earl de la Warr is lord of the manor and principal landowner. The Church of All Saints, which was erected in 1352, has recently undergone partial restoration. Rev. George C. Clements, M.A., Vicar. W. B. Coxall, Churchwarden.

**Hauxton** is 4 miles S.W. from Cambridge. The living is a discharged Vicarage, annexed to Newton. The Parish Church is dedicated to S. Edmund, and is a brick building of various styles. Rev. G. Williams, M.A., Vicar. Churchwardens.

**Hildersham** is 9 miles S.E. from Cambridge. The Church of the Holy Trinity, is a beautiful structure, the Tower is of late 12th century work, the nave, two aisles, and chancel, chiefly of the date of the 14th century. Effigies of Sir Robert Busteler and his wife in oak, lie in the Busteler Chapel, and memorials of their successors, as Lords of the Manor and descendants. The Paris family in brass lie in the chancel. In the north aisle, are beautiful specimens of painted glass of the decorated period, and in the chancel and chapel, some interesting glass of the 13th century. The noble east window is filled with rich early English glass, by Clayton Bell, of London, in memory of the late Rector and his wife. Rev. Robert Goodwin, M.A., Rector and Rural Dean of South Camps. Thomas Webb and Major General Inglis, Churchwardens.

**Hinxton** is  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles S. from Cambridge. There is a good Day School in the village, managed by a committee, of which the Vicar is the chairman. Charles Herbert Nash, Esq., of the Grange, is lord of the manor, and chief proprietor. The Church is in the early English style, and is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin and S. John. Rev. Charles Thornton Foster, M.A., late Fellow Jesus College, Cambridge, Vicar. John Andrews, jun. and Charles Herbert Nash, Churchwardens.

**Histon** is a village 3 miles N.W. of Cambridge. There is an endowed School in the parish, and a school house for the master. The Baptists and Wesleyans have Chapels. The parish Church of S. Andrew, is a cruciform building, and has recently been extensively restored and beautified. The late Mrs. Sumpter, (Lady of the Manor), largely contributed to this as to other good works in the parish. Rev. Charles White Underwood, M.A., Rural Dean of Chesterton, and Hon. Canon of Ely, Vicar. Charles Papworth and Smith Howlett Rowley, Churchwardens.

**Horningsea** is about 4 miles N.E. of Cambridge. There is a National School for boys and girls, supported by voluntary contributions, in the village, the population of which in 1871 was 433. The Church is an old Gothic building, dedicated to S. Peter. Rev. A. F. Torry, Vicar. Rev. W. Griffiths, Curate. S. Fison and W. Banyard, Churchwardens.

**Ickleton** is 11 miles S. of Cambridge, and has a population of 387. The Church of S. Mary, has chancel, nave, aisle, porch, and square centre tower containing a fine peal of bells. The Rev. J. Amps is Vicar.

**Impington** is situated  $2\frac{1}{2}$  miles N. of Cambridge, and is only a very short distance from the Histon Station. Impington Hall, is a magnificent mansion, now the property, and in the occupation of W. B. Caldwell, Esq. Both the Hall and grounds surrounding it have been restored, and greatly improved by their present owner. The Church of S. Andrew, is a curious little Gothic building, with square tower and three bells. Rev. Edward Bushby, B.D., the late Vicar, died October 8th, 1877. Rev. F. W. Whitehead, M.A., Curate. William Saunders and John French, Churchwardens.

**Kingston** is 8 miles S.W. of Cambridge, and was formerly a market town. The Earl of Hardwicke is lord of the manor, and one of the chief landowners in the village. The Church is dedicated to All Saints and S. Andrew, and the living is held by the Rev. D. D. Sampson, Rector.

**Knapwell** is a small parish, about 8 miles from Cambridge. The Church of All Saints (which in 1866, was partly re-built), is an unpretentious building. Rev. David Craig, Rector. Rev. James Law Challis, Curate-in-charge. James Whaler, Churchwarden.

**Landbeach** is 5 miles N.E. from Cambridge. The Parish comprises the two Manors of Chamberlains' and Bray. Of the former, the Lords are the Master and Fellows of Corpus Christi College, Cambridge; of the latter, the Worts' Trustees (the Masters of St. John's, Christ's, Corpus, Pembroke and Emmanuel), who apply the profits to purposes specified in the will of William Worts, Esq., who died in 1709, and particularly to the maintenance of the Library of the University. The Church is dedicated to All Saints, and is an old Gothic building. There is a good School in the village. Rev. Bryan Walker, LL.D., Rector. William Wilson Hall and William Cole Ambrose, Churchwardens.

**Linton** is a small town, 11 miles S.E. from Cambridge. The place possesses Schools for boys, girls and infants, a small Literary Institute, a Union, Police Station, where the Magistrates hold their sittings every Wednesday, 2 Dissenting Chapels, and a fine old Parish Church, which is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin. There are two fairs held annually in Linton, one on the 20th of July, and the other on Holy Thursday. The former is one of the largest sheep fairs in the county. Rev. Herbert Hall, M.A., Vicar. John Reeve and Daniel P. Day, Churchwardens.

**Lolworth** is about 7 miles N. of Cambridge. The parish Church is dedicated to All Saints, and is a stone building, with chancel, nave, square tower and south porch. On the 13th of October, 1877, there was a large fire at Redland's Farm, where everything was burnt, except the furniture of the house. Rev. Joseph Pepys Roberts, Rector. John Doggett and Jacob Frohock, Churchwardens.

**Long Stanton** is  $9\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. of Cambridge, and is divided into two parishes (All Saints and S. Michaels). All Saints Church is an old building in the decorated style, it has a tower, with a lofty spire and three bells. Rev. Henry Smith, Vicar. William Doggett and William Pypers, Churchwardens. S. Michael's Church is a plain building, with a thatched roof. The living is in the gift of Magdalen College, Cambridge. Rev. W. M. Cecil, A.M., Rector. Rev. G. N. Ash, Curate. William Pypers and Salmon Linton, Churchwardens.

**Long-stowe** is a village situated 12 miles S.W. from Cambridge. Long-stowe Hall, is the seat of Sidney Stanley, Esq., J.P., who is lord of the manor. The Hall is surrounded by an extensive park, and the grounds are laid out with much taste and care; they have been greatly improved by the present proprietor. The parish possesses a good school, to which is attached a Master's house. The Church is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin, and was re-built in 1863-4. Rev. James Rushton, M.A., Rector. James Carter and William Wright, Churchwardens.

**Madingley** is  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.W. from Cambridge. It was at Madingley Hall, that His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales resided, whilst as an Undergraduate, he was connected with Trinity College, Cambridge. The Manor House is the residence of Henry Hurrell, Esq., who is lord of the Manor. The Church is situated in the Park, and is dedicated to S. Mary. Rev. Edward G. King, Vicar. H. Hurrell and J. Allen, Churchwardens.

**Melbourn**, in the Deanery of Shingay, is a large village, about 10 miles S.W. of Cambridge. There is a Police Station, where petty sessions are periodically held. The Church is a noble structure of the 14th century, and is dedicated to All Saints. There are endowed and other schools, and two roomy Chapels in the parish. The Independent Chapel is capable of seating 800 persons. The population in 1871 was 1,759. Rev. James Hamilton, M.A., Vicar. R. W. Hitch and A. Coningsby, Churchwardens.

**Meldreth** is about 10 miles S.W. of Cambridge, having a population of 757. The village is supplied with gas, from the works at Melbourn. The father of Andrew Marvel was born here. Besides the parish Church of the Holy Trinity, which has an embattled Tower containing four bells, there are Chapels for the Independents and Wesleyans. Rev. Edward William Cory, Vicar. Charles Roads and Charles Ellis, Churchwardens.

**Milton** is a village about 3 miles N.E. of Cambridge. The Church, which has recently been restored, is dedicated to All Saints, and contains monuments by Chantrey and Flaxman, a fine new brass in memory of Judge Coke, and some stained glass windows, one of which is by Hardman, of Birmingham. Rev. John Chapman, M.A., Rector. Rev. J. G. Clark, Curate. John Wilson and Thomas Gunnell, Churchwardens.

**Newton**, (near Cambridge), is 6 miles S.W. of Cambridge. There is an endowed public School in the parish, the chief benefactor of which was C. Pemberton, Esq., of Cambridge. The Church of S. Margaret, is in the early English style. The living is annexed to that of Hauxton, and is held by the Rev. G. Williams, M.A., Vicar.

**Oakington** is 7 miles N.W. from Cambridge. Its true name is Hockington, being named after Hocings, one of the royal tribes of Frisia. The Church is a large stone edifice, comprising a chancel, nave, aisles, and square embattled tower, containing four bells. The living is a Vicarage in the gift of Queens College, Cambridge. The Baptists and Primitive Methodists have chapels here. Westwick is a hamlet, half a mile N.E., in 1871, it had a population of 81. Rev. William George Searle, M.A., Vicar. John Linton and James Papworth, Churchwardens.

**Orwell** is situate 8 miles S.W. of Cambridge. The Church is a fine old building, dedicated to S. Andrew, it has a tower and 5 bells, and contains a



monumental effigy of Jeremiah Radcliffe, one of the translators of the Bible in 1611. There are two good schools, one of which is a handsome building, and the other is endowed by a former Vicar. Willmotts Down lies N.E., and Holback, half a mile S.W. of this parish. Rev. Henry Taylor, Rector James Smith and Thomas Russell, Churchwardens.

**Over** is a village 9 miles N.W. from Cambridge. The Church, which is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin, has of late years been partly re-built and thoroughly restored. There are British and National Schools; and Chapels for the Baptist and Primitive Methodist connections. Rev. William Dixon, M.A., Vicar. Robert Hall and Richard Few, Churchwardens.

**Pampisford** is a pretty little village 8 miles S. of Cambridge. There is a good school, built by W. Parker Hamond, Esq., J.P., who is lord of the manor, owner of most of the parish, and whose seat is at Pampisford Hall, a brick building, recently re-modelled by G. Goldie, Esq. The interior has been most artistically and elaborately decorated by Messrs. Favell Ellis and Son, of Cambridge, in the domestic Italian style. The ceiling in the drawing-room is particularly beautiful and worthy of notice. In the surrounding picturesque and extensive grounds, is to be found a superb collection of ferns and shrubs of all kinds, and magnificent gardens. The lord of the manor affords any who desire it, ample opportunities of inspecting the house and grounds. The Church of S. John the Baptist has been restored, and has many interesting points. There is a rood-screen, in a good state of preservation. The living is at present vacant. William Parker Hamond and William Scruby, Churchwardens.

**Papworth S. Agnes** is about 14 miles W. from Cambridge. The sole land owner of the village, is Arthur Sperling, Esq., J.P., who is patron of the living, and whose family have long been associated with this part of the county. The Church of S. John the Baptist, which was handsomely restored in 1854, has several memorial windows to the Sperling family. The Post-town of the parish is S. Ives. Rev. F. H. Sperling, M.A., Rector. Arthur Sperling, Churchwarden.

**Papworth Everard** is a parish about 12 miles from Cambridge, its post town is S. Ives, Hunts. A school and home for mistress, was erected by the late W. H. Cheere, Esq., of Papworth Hall. The Church of S. Peter is small, but picturesque, being partly covered with ivy. Rev. James Law Challis, M.A., Rector. Rev. Edward Cheere, Churchwarden.

**Quy.** See Stow-cum-Quy.

**Rampton** is 7 miles N. of Cambridge. There is a School in the parish, under the management of a School Board. The Baptists have a chapel. The old Parish Church is a small Gothic building, with a partly thatched roof. The living is a Rectory, but the Incumbent's health necessitates his absence. Rev. F. Strong, B.A., Rector. Rev. J. M. Nixon, M.A., Curate. Mr. Charles E. Ivatt, Churchwarden.

**Sawston** is a large parish, 7 miles to the south of Cambridge. In the Parish is a mansion belonging to Ferdinand Huddleston, Esq., re-built in the reign of Mary, the former mansion having been burnt, on the occasion of a visit of that Queen to the parish. There are also extensive factories of paper,

parchment, and aerated waters. There is an old market cross still standing, showing that the village was formerly a market town. Owing to the factories, the population has largely increased of late years. In 1831, it contained 942 inhabitants, but in 1871, the number had risen to 1,729. The living is a Vicarage, of the value of £204 per annum. The Church has been restored in the early English style; and it contains several ancient brasses. Vicar. William Christopher Burrell and George Turney, Churchwardens.

**Shelford Great** is 4 miles S. of Cambridge. In this village are the wells, which supply Cambridge with much of its water. The Church of S. Mary, which was built in 1837, was partially destroyed by a storm, at the beginning of the present century, and has in recent years been internally restored. The value of the Vicarage is £82 net per annum, no glebe; Impropiators, Master and Fellows of Jesus College, Cambs, value £800 per annum. Rev. Alexander Thomas Chrisford, M.A., Vicar. Peter Grain and Swann Hurrell, Churchwardens. The Baptists have a large Chapel here.

**Shelford Little** is 5 miles S. of Cambridge. Shelford Hall, is the seat of Col. Robert Gregory Wale, of the Cambridgeshire Militia and University Volunteers, whose family has been long associated with the history of the County of Cambs. The Church of All Saints, is in the decorated style, and has a Tower, containing five bells. Rev. James E. Law, M.A., Rector. Robert Gregory Wale and Arthur Austin, Churchwardens.

**Shepreth** is 8 miles S.W. from Cambridge, and is remarkable from the fact that there are four Manors in the parish. There is a small free school for boys and girls, and the Independents have a chapel. The Church of All Saints, has lately been restored, and is in good order. Rev. B. Hale Wortham, B.A., Oxon. Vicar. W. F. Nash Woodham and Chapman Woollard, Churchwardens.

**Stapleford** is 4 miles S.E. of Cambridge. There is a School, under the management of a School Board, of which the Duchess of Leeds is a member. Gog-Magog Hills, one of the seats of His Grace the Duke of Leeds, is in this parish. The Duke's London address is at the Junior United Service Club. The Church is an interesting structure, with tower and spire, containing five bells. It is dedicated to S. Andrew. Rev. C. W. T. Wyer Dow, Vicar. E. Rawngs and W. Sayer Shreeve, Churchwardens.

**Stetchworth** is about 10 miles E. of Cambridge. The village has a good parochial School, and there are several endowed Charities in the parish. The Church of S. Peter, has chancel, nave, and tower containing five bells, also several handsome monuments. Rev. J. Lukin, Vicar.

**Stow-cum-Quy** is 5 miles E. of Cambridge. There is a Chapel for Wesleyans, and a school in the parish. The Parish Church is dedicated to S. Mary, and the living is in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. Rev. Edward Ventris, Vicar. Rev. Dennis Hall, Curate. Richard Ellis and Josiah Crisp, Churchwardens.

**Swaffham Bulbeck** is about 6 miles N.E. from Cambridge. The parish Church is an old Gothic stone building, dedicated to S. Mary, and has chancel nave, aisles, and tower, containing six bells. There is a National School, and

various endowed Charities in the parish. Rev. Thomas Fleetwood, LL.B., Vicar. Herbert Isaac Wilkinson and Benjamin G. Giblin, Churchwardens.

**Swaffham Prior** is about 8 miles N.E. of Cambridge, and is remarkable in having two Churches standing in one churchyard. The one dedicated to S. Mary, is now a picturesque ruin, the other is a handsome Gothic stone building, dedicated to S. Cyriac, and has been within late years restored. The parish possesses schools for boys and girls, and a reading room, erected to the memory of the late Miss Marianne Allix. Rev. Thomas Preston, M.A., Vicar. Charles Cole Ambrose and W. Ambrose, Churchwardens.

**Swavesey** is about 12 miles N.W. from Cambridge, and is celebrated for the good fishing it affords in summer, and for its capital skating fields in winter. In 1871 its population numbered 1,335. The Church is dedicated to S. Andrew, and originally belonged to a Priory, founded in the time of Edward the Confessor. Rev. Henry I. Sharp, Vicar. J. Mitham and R. Watson, Churchwardens. There are Chapels for Baptists and Unitarians.

**Teversham** is a parish  $3\frac{1}{2}$  miles E. of Cambridge. It has a school for boys and girls. The Baptists have a Chapel. The Church is a stone building, dedicated to the Holy Trinity. It was thoroughly restored in 1863. Rev. Robert Rashall, M.A., Rector. William P. Fison and Alexander Webb, Churchwardens.

**Toft** is a parish 6 miles S.W. from Cambridge. A school for boys and girls, endowed with £21 yearly, is otherwise supported by the Rector. The Church is dedicated to S. Andrew, and was thoroughly restored in 1863. Rev. Edward Arnett Powell, M.A., Rector. William Holben, Churchwarden.

**Triplow** is a village 8 miles S. from Cambridge. The Church of S. George, which is now under restoration, was desecrated and despoiled by William Dowsing, an agent of the Parliamentary Party, on March 13th, 1643. The living is in the gift of the Bishop of Ely. Peterhouse, Cambridge, takes the great tithes. There is a Church of England School, under the Education Department. Mistress, Miss Harris. Rev. John Watkins, M.A., Vicar. Thomas S. Welch and Henry Perkins, Thriplow Place, Churchwardens.

**Trumpington** adjoins Cambridge on the S., and is a pretty village, possessing (in 1871) 814 inhabitants. There are good Schools for boys, girls, and infants, and several endowed Charities. Trumpington Hall, is a handsome building, surrounded by extensive grounds, in the occupation of H. W. Pemberton, Esq., J.P. Anstie Hall, is another ancient building, and is the residence of E. B. Foster, Esq., J.P. The Church which has recently been extensively restored, is dedicated to either SS. Mary and Michael or S. Peter. The Rev. John Kempthorne, Vicar. H. W. Pemberton and Samuel Witt, Churchwardens.

**Waterbeach** is  $5\frac{1}{2}$  miles N.E. of Cambridge, and in 1871 contained a population of 1,619. The Parish is rich in Educational advantages, having four schools, capable of accommodating no less than 270 children in all. Mr. J. Vines is Master of the Boys School, (Church); Miss Steward is Mistress of the

Girls School, (Church); Miss Wilson is governess of the Infant's (Board) School, and the School Board also provides another mixed school, under a mistress. It was in this Parish that Mr. Spurgeon commenced his ministry, and he now not unfrequently preaches here. The Dissenters have Chapels for Baptists, Wesleyans, and Primitive Methodists. The parish Church is a stone building, dedicated to S. John the Evangelist, and has of late years undergone a considerable amount of restoration. Rev. H. C. D. Chandler, M.A., Vicar. Rev. Heaton E. von Stürmer, Curate. John Stacy Youngman and Edward Mason, Churchwardens.

**Wendy** is about 10 miles S.W. from Cambridge. The village possesses a School, endowed with £30 per annum. The parish Church, All Saints, has been re-built (1866), partly of materials of old All Saints Church, Cambridge. The Vicarage was formerly Wendy-cum Shingay, but is now separate, and Shingay is unprovided for. The population of Wendy in 1871 was 120. Rev. John Conder, LL.D., Vicar. William Jackson Russell and James Richman, Churchwardens.

**West Wrattling** is situated about 10 miles to the S.E. of Cambridge. The living is a Vicarage, with that of West Wickham annexed. There is a National School, and the Independents have a Chapel. The Church is dedicated to S. Andrew, and is a very ancient building, with a square tower containing five bells. Rev. John Lowder Laycock Lees, Vicar. Harry Frost and Thomas Purkis, Churchwardens.

**Westley** is about 9 miles E. of Cambridge, possessing a good School, which was erected at the expense of W. H. Hall, Esq. The Church is dedicated to S. Mary the Virgin, and contains some interesting brasses, &c. Rev. — Fordham, Rector.

**Weston Colville** is about 10 miles S.E. of Cambridge. There is a parochial school, erected to the memory of the late J. Hall, Esq., which has recently been enlarged. The Church is dedicated to S. Mary, in the tower are five bells. Rev. Thomas Cooke Kemp, Rector. W. J. Beeton and William Leonard, Churchwardens.

**Whaddon** is a parish situated about 10 miles S.W. of Cambridge, possessing a very handsome Church, dedicated to S. Mary. It is a Gothic building, and has a carved oak ceiling, oak screen, and some monumental brasses. It was beautifully restored in 1869 and 1870. In 1876 and 1877, the Vicarage was enlarged, and greatly improved at a considerable outlay. There is a school, which was built in 1875, in the parish, and the teacher's house was then made a good one. Rev. J. Ormsby Powell, M.A., Vicar. J. H. Beaumont and Jabez Ablett, Churchwardens.

**Whittlesford** is 7 miles S. of Cambridge. The Railway Station is about a mile from the village, in which there is a Working Men's Institute, and other provisions for the social well-being of the inhabitants. Near the Station is the "Red Lion" Inn, well known to many Cambridge people, as a pleasant retreat, kept by Mr. Jackson, in and about which are several interesting remnants of the Monastic times. The Church (S. Barnabas), has recently been restored, and

contains a font, which is supposed to belong to the Saxon period. Rev. Arthur C. Jennings, M.A., Vicar. A. Maynard and J. Bone, Churchwardens. There is also a Primitive Methodist Chapel, and an Independent Chapel in the place.

**Wicken** is about 12 miles N.E. of Cambridge. In the curious old Gothic Church, dedicated to S. Lawrence, there is a vault, in which were buried several members of Oliver Cromwell's family. There is a large endowed School, under government inspection, for boys and girls, and Spinney Abbey, (now a farm house), stands in this village. Rev. K. Peers Hardman is Vicar. J. A. Aspland and F. A. Johnson, Churchwardens.

**Wilbraham (Great)** is 7 miles N.E. from Cambridge. There is a National School in the village, and the Baptists have a Chapel. The old Parish Church is dedicated to S. Nicholas, and has a tower with five bells. The living is in the gift of Edward Hicks, Esq., J.P., of Wilbraham Temple, who is Lord of the Manor. Rev. Francis William Hudson, M.A., Vicar. Robert Dawson and Shradrack Livermore, Churchwardens.

**Wilbraham (Little)** is a village 6 miles E. from Cambridge. The Church is dedicated to S. John the Evangelist, has a chancel, nave, north aisle and tower, in which are three bells. Rev. William Duguid Stephen, M.A., Rector. Henry King, Churchwarden. Six Mile Bottom is a hamlet in this village.

**Wilburton** is about 13 miles N. of Cambridge, having a population in 1871 of 546. The Church of S. Peter is a Gothic structure, of the 15th century. Rev. R. P. Prichard, M.A., Oxon, Vicar. W. N. Saberton and W. Mitchell, Churchwardens.

**Willingham** is 10 miles to the N.W. of Cambridge. There are several endowed Charities in the parish, amongst which may be mentioned a School, which dates as far back as the year 1600. A School Board has been established, and there are Chapels for the Baptists and Wesleyans. The Parish Church with its lofty Tower, is large and handsome. There appears to be some uncertainty as to whom it is dedicated, some think to All Saints, others to S. Mary, but probably the local clergy are right in their belief, that the Church was dedicated to S. Michael and All Angels. Rev. Robert Phelps, D.D., Rector. Rev. E. J. T. Laughlin, M.A., Curate. John Osborn and Walter Frohock, Churchwardens.

**Wimpole** is 9 miles S.W. of Cambridge, and is the country seat of the Right Hon. the Earl of Hardwicke, whose mansion, Wimpole Hall, is a large brick building, of the 17th century. In front of the mansion is a fine avenue, almost three miles long, and surrounding is a deer park, consisting of 300 acres. The town address of Earl Hardwicke, is 38, Hertford Street, W. The Church of S. Andrew contains many marble monuments to former lords of the manor. Rev. Edward Lyon Fellowes, Rector. Robert Elliston, Churchwarden.

## REGISTRATION OF BIRTHS, MARRIAGES AND DEATHS.

Every infant should be registered within six weeks of its Birth. If the Registrar be required to attend at the residence of the informant to register birth or death he is entitled to a fee of 1s.

Marriages are registered at the time of their occurrence.

Notice of death should be given to the district Registrar within 5 days of its occurrence.

### NOTES.

When a **birth** takes place, personal information of it must be given to the Registrar within 42 days, and the register signed in his presence by one of the following persons:—(1) The father or mother of the child ; (2) the occupier of the house in which the birth happened ; (3) a person present at the birth ; or (4), the person having charge of the child. In default of due notice being given, the above persons become liable to a penalty of 40/-. No charge is made for registration.

**Foundlings.** In the case of a living new born child found exposed the persons required to give information are as follows—(1) any person finding such child : (2) Any person in whose charge such child may be placed.

Still-born children not to be registered : but if a child is born alive and dies soon after birth both the birth and death must be registered.

It is important to persons of all classes to be able to prove their age and the place of their birth, the only legal proof of these is afforded by the civil registers which the law now requires to be made as above described.

When a **death** takes place, personal information of it must be given to the Registrar within five days, and the register signed in his presence by one of the following persons:—(1) The nearest relative of the deceased present at the death, or in attendance during the last illness ; (2) some other relative of the deceased in the same district ; (3) a person present at the death, or the occupier of the house in which the death happened ; or (4) (if all the above

fail) an inmate of the house, or the person causing the body to be buried. In default of due notice being given, the above become liable to a penalty of 40/-.

Upon receipt of a written notice, the Registrar may attend at the house where the death happened, when a fee of 1s. is payable.

A careful attention to these provisions is likely to be of the highest importance to the surviving relatives and friends of deceased persons.

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**TO FRIENDLY SOCIETIES AND  
TRADE UNIONS.**

No registered Society or Trade Union may pay any sum of money upon the death of a member except upon the production of a special certificate of such death, to be supplied by the Registrar for 1/-.

No Society, or number of Societies, shall pay on the death of a child under five years of age any sum or sums exceeding £6, or on the death of a child under ten years of age any amount exceeding £10. No certificate may be granted unless the cause of death has been registered on the certificate of a Coroner or of a registered medical practitioner who attended deceased child during its last illness, or equivalent satisfactory evidence. It is an offence under the Friendly Societies' Act, 1875, for any Society to pay money on the death of a child under ten years of age, except upon the production of a proper certificate of such death. It is also an offence for any parent or personal representative of deceased child to obtain money from any Society or Societies without production of proper certificate.
