P R E F A C E .

AS no Directory for Maidstone and the neighbouring Villages is extant, apart from the bulky and expensive "Directory of the Six Home Counties," the publisher of the present unpretending little work believes that no apology will be necessary in introducing it to public notice.

There has been no attempt at originality, but the utmost care has been taken to secure the important point—accuracy—and, with the exception of such changes as have occurred during its progress through the press, it is hoped that the Directory will be found reasonably correct and complete within its assigned limits: the publisher will however be glad to receive notice of any such changes, or of any unintentional omissions, as it is probable that new editions of the work will be issued from time to time.

It has been thought desirable to omit in most instances the designations "Esquire" and "Mr.," but from the arrangement of the names, and the fullness of the information given, no difficulty in that respect will arise in the use of the Directory.

The Census Tables of 1871 not having as yet been published in a complete form, the Village Populations have, with few exceptions, been taken from the Returns of 1861: it may be interesting, however, to notice here that the Population of the County on the 3rd April, 1871, was 847,507 (exclusive of those portions which are included in the Metropolis), being an increase of 113,620 since 1861; and that the number of Inhabited Houses was 151,171, as against 126,221 in 1861.

The publisher desires to acknowledge very thankfully the kindly readiness with which the needful information has been furnished to him; and he is not without hope that his attempt to produce a useful and reliable Directory will meet with general encouragement.

MAIDSTONE,

THE Capital of Mid Kent, is a Municipal and Parliamentary Borough, and the Assize Town of the county. Its situation, on the river Medway, at the base of a noble range of chalk hills, is one of great natural beauty, and the surrounding districts present scenery of a fine and very diversified character. It is 34 miles S.E. from London, 27 W. from Canterbury, $13\frac{1}{2}$ N. from Cranbrook, 19 N.W. from Ashford, 18 E. from Sevenoaks, 8 S. from Rochester and Chatham, 11 S.W. from Sittingbourne, 18 N.W. from Tenterden, 15 E. by N.E. from Tonbridge, by road; and by railway—43 miles from London, 10 from Paddock Wood Junction, 32 from Ashford, 46 from Canterbury, 52 from Dover, 47 from Folkestone, 19 from Gravesend, 66 from Margate, 62 from Ramsgate, 12 from Strood, and 16 from Tonbridge. There are two branches of the South Eastern Railway, one of which communicates with the main line at Paddock Wood, and the other with the North Kent Railway at Gravesend.

The Population of the town by the census of 1871 was 26,198, being an increase since 1861 of 3182; and the number of inhabited houses 4682, as against 4111 in 1861. The area is 4420 acres. It returns two Members to Parliament, and is the place of Election for Mid Kent. It is in the Lathe of Aylesford, Diocese of Canterbury, Archdeaconry of Maidstone, and Deanery of Sutton.

The Union, to which it gives name, consists of the following parishes, viz., Barming, Bearsted, Boughton Monchelsea, East and West Farleigh, Hunton, Linton, Loose, Maidstone, Marden, Nettlested, Otham, Staplehurst, Teston, and Yalding. The town is governed by a Mayor, 6 Aldermen, and 18 Councillors, and is divided into four Wards. A Recorder, elected by the Corporation, presides over the Quarter Sessions, which are held in the Town Hall; where also the Borough Magistrates hold their Petty Sessions every Tuesday and Saturday. A Corn and General Market is held every Thursday, and a Cattle Market on the Second and Fifth Tuesday in the month. A Market for Fish, Fruit, and Vegetables, is open daily, under the Corn Exchange; and Fairs are held on Feb. 13, May 12, June 20, and Oct. 17, the largest being that in October.

The Church accommodation of the town has been much extended within a recent period, and may now be considered as good and adequate.

All Saints' Church is an ancient structure, and the date of its erection is not known. The steeple was destroyed by lightning in 1730, and has not been re-built. It has a square tower, with a peal of 10 bells; and the interior, which consists of nave, aisles, and chancel, has been restored and fitted with open seats. There are several handsome stained-glass windows, which have been put in as

memorials, at different dates; the most recent of which is one representing the Ascension, erected to the memory of the late Alexander Randall, Esq., by his nephews. The benefice, a rectory, is in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and is at present held by the Rev. David Dale Stewart, M.A.

Trinity Church was erected in 1826, and is a plain, but large and commodious edifice, situate in Church Street. The living (a perpetual Curacy) is in the gift of the Archbishop of the Diocese, the present Vicar being the Rev. E. T. Yates, M.A.

St. Peter's Church West Boro' was originally a portion of an ancient Hospital. It was restored and enlarged in 1839, and in 1859 was re-seated with open seats, and furnished with a stone pulpit. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Archbishop of Canterbury, and is held by the Rev. W.A. Hill, M.A.

St. Paul's Church, Perryfields, was erected in 1859, by subscription, and is a handsome stone building, in the style of the fourteenth century, consisting of tower with spire, nave, aisle, and chancel. The perpetual curacy, which is in the gift of the Archbishop, is held by the Rev. H. W. Dearden, M.A. In connection with the Church, a branch Chapel has been recently erected, in St. James' Street.

St. Philip's Church, Kingsley, is a neat stone building, which was opened for public worship, in 1858. The perpetual curacy is held by the Rev. Henry Collis, M.A., and is in the gift of the Archbishop.

St. John's Church, Mote Park, is a small stone edifice, erected by subscription. It is endowed by the Earl of Romney, who presented the site, and in whose gift is the living, a perpetual curacy, held by the Rev. R. Baxendale, L.L.B.

St. Stephen's Church, Tovil, is about a mile from the town, southward, and is a stone building, the foundation of which was laid in 1839. The living is a perpetual curacy, and is held by the Rev. A. Sedgwick.

There are about ten Dissenting Places of Worship, some of which present architectural features of no mean order, and the Society of Friends have a meeting house in Wheeler Street.

The Cemetery is situate on the Sutton road about a mile from the town, and is an extensive enclosure, with two Chapels, for the use of members of the Church of England, and Dissenters respectively.

The Railway Station is in West Borough.

The Town Hall, in High Street, a plain building, erected in 1764, possesses no outward features worthy of notice, but the interior arrangements and decorations are excellent.

The Corn Exchange is entered by an archway in the High Street, opposite the Town Hall, and is a commodious building. It is open as a Corn Market every Thursday, from 3 to 5 in the summer months, and from 2 till 4 in winter. In addition to its use as a Corn Exchange, it serves for Lectures, Concerts, and other Entertainments, and the rooms attached are in the occupation of the Literary and Mechanics' Institution, and the Kent Law Society.

The County Lunatic Asylum, at Barming Heath, is a most extensive building, and has been enlarged at various times. It is capable of accommodating 1264 patients, and is at the present time nearly full.

The County Gaol was built in 1818, and occupies a large area. In the Sessions House, which is erected in front of this building, are held the County Assizes, and Quarter Sessions for the Western Division of the County.

The Barracks form one of the largest Cavalry Depôts in England, and are situate on the Sandling Road. The Head Quarters of the West Kent Militia are at Maidstone, the Stores being situate in Union Street. The First Kent Rifle Volunteers have their Head Quarters at the Star Hotel.

The West Kent Infirmary, in Marsham Street, is a valuable institution, supported by voluntary contributions, and has been considerably enlarged since the date of its erection.

The Kent County Ophthalmic Hospital, in Church Street, affords invaluable aid, without letters of recommendation, to a large number of persons afflicted with painful diseases of the Eye and Ear, and depends also upon voluntary contributions.

The Public Baths and Wash-houses were erected in 1852, on a very complete scale, but the wash-houses have been discontinued, in consequence of the little use which was made of them by the class for whose benefit they were intended; and it is feared that the baths also will have to be given up, unless they are better appreciated and used than hitherto.

The Maidstone Museum and Public Library was founded in 1858, and is held at Chillington Manor House, St. Faith Street. The building possesses great interest, both from an archæological and historical point of view—its history dating back nearly six centuries. The chief portion, however, is of the Tudor period, and is a good specimen of the larger Manor House of that time. The west wing of the building is in course of restoration, and when completed will be devoted to the Natural History and Ethnographical Collections, recently given to the Museum by Julius Brenchley, Esq., and to the Public Library. This wing was re-purchased and presented jointly, by the late Alexander Randall, Esq., Richard and Samuel Mercer, Esqs., and Julius Brenchley, Esq. The latter gentleman has also bought 4 or 5 acres of ground in the rear of the building, which originally formed the orchard and garden attached to the Manor House, and is being laid out and planted as a Public Garden. The collection in the Museum consists of Saxon, Roman, and English Antiquities; specimens of ancient Furniture; Fossils, illustrating the geology of the district; Pictures, Prints, Drawings, China, &c. The Library contains the rare and valuable works bequeathed by the late Thomas Charles and Edward Pretty, Esqs., together with the old Parochial Library. The whole forms a noble gift to the town—rich in old associations; admirable as an educator of taste; and interesting alike to the student, the antiquary, and the sight-seer.

The Literary and Mechanics' Institution, is held in rooms at the Corn Exchange. The reading room and Library are open from 10

till 10, and Concerts, and Lectures of a high class are provided free to members.

The Church of England Young Men's Society, at 86 Week Street, has a Reading-room, Class-rooms, Smoking-rooms, and an excellent Library.

The Gas Company's Works, are situate in St. Peter's Street, and the Waterworks are at East Farleigh.

The Grammar School, has been recently removed from Earl Street to a new and handsome building, on the Tonbridge Road, erected from the designs of E. W. Stephens, Esq. There are Scholarships attached to this School, and it is under very able management.

The Blue Coat Charity Schools, in Knightrider Street, provide free Education for 100 children; and Sir Charles Booth's School, in Brewer Street, for 70 children.

All Saints' College was founded by Archbishop Boniface, in 1260, for poor travellers. In 1395, it was given to the Church, and the College and buildings, were erected by Archbishop Courtenay. The remains are still extensive, including the ivy-mantled tower, which is almost entire. The School of Art classes are held here.

A Public Drinking Fountain, of an elegant design, was erected in 1862, at the top of High Street. and forms an attractive object. The expense was defrayed entirely by the late Alexander Randall, Esq.

There are four Newspapers published in the Town, viz., the South Eastern Gazette on Tuesdays, by Messrs. F. W. and H. R. Cutbush Week Street.

The Maidstone and Kentish Journal, on Mondays, by Mr. E. B. Smith, Middle Row, High Street.

The Kent Messenger and Maidstone Telegraph, on Saturdays, by Messrs. W. R. & F. Masters; and The Weald of Kent Mail, on Saturdays, by Mr. W. West, High Street.

The Manufacture of Paper, is extensively carried on in the Town and neighbourhood, and the Mills of Messrs. Hollingworth, (Turkey Mills,) and of Messrs. Balston & Co., (Springfield,) produce the finest papers that are made.

The Stone Quarries in the district are numerous and important, the Kentish Rag Stone, being used for a variety of building purposes. In a quarry belonging to Messrs. W. H. Bensted & Son, was discovered the well known fossil Iguanodon, which is now in the British Museum.

There are many objects of interest in the immediate vicinity, which will be more particularly noticed in the Village Directory; and visitors will find in all directions delightful walks, affording picturesque views and peeps, which are equal to anything in the whole range of English rural scenery. To such also, the Map which accompanies this work will be found of essential service, as it has been accurately drawn from the Ordnance Survey,—the roads being clearly laid down, and the churches prominently marked.

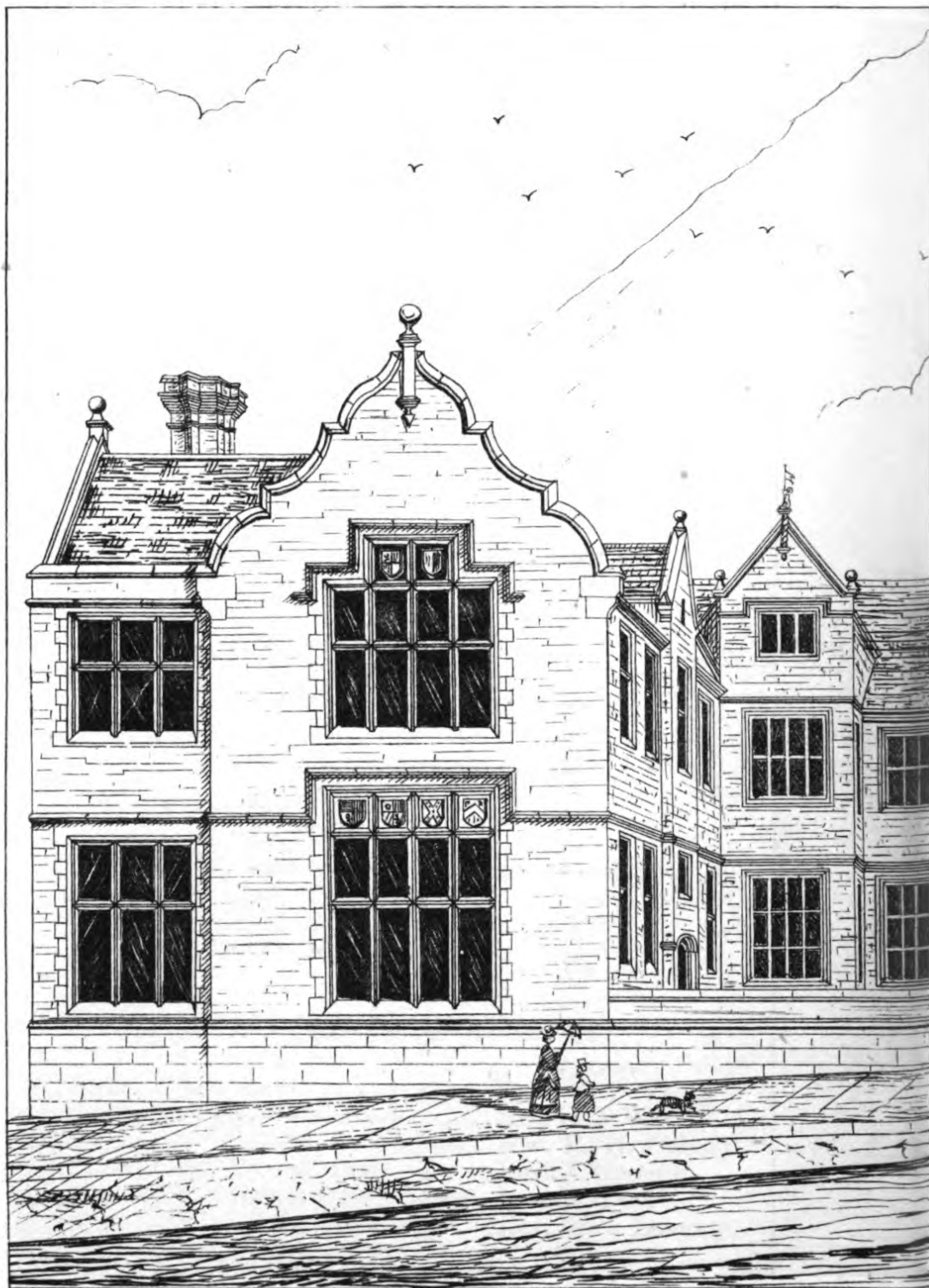

Any letter exceeding the weight of 12 oz. will be liable to a postage of 1d. for every ounce, beginning with the first ounce. A letter, for example, weighing between 14 and 15 ounces, must be prepaid fifteen-pence.

If not prepaid, the postage is double the foregoing; and if the payment in advance is insufficient, double the deficiency is charged. On re-directed letters the charge for re-direction is the same, whether prepaid or collected on delivery.

No letter may exceed the dimensions of one foot six inches in length, nine inches in width, and six inches in depth.

POST CARDS.

The Post Cards, which bear a halfpenny impressed stamp, are available for transmission between places in the United Kingdom only.

The front (or stamped) side is intended for the address only. There must be no other writing or printing on it, nor must there be any writing or printing across the stamp. On the reverse side, any communication, whether of the nature of a letter or otherwise, may be written or printed, but such communication must not extend to the front side. Nothing whatever may be attached; nor may the card be folded, cut, or otherwise altered. If any of these rules be infringed, the card will be placed in a cover, and charged on delivery as an insufficiently-paid letter.

No card, other than one of those issued by the Government, will pass under the halfpenny stamp, if it bear on it a written communication of the nature of a letter.

NEWSPAPERS.

Prepaid Rate.—On each newspaper, whether posted singly or in a packet, One Halfpenny. But a packet of two or more registered newspapers not chargeable with a higher rate of postage than that chargeable on a book packet of the same weight, viz., one halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of 2 oz.

No newspaper can be sent through the post a second time for the original postage; for each transmission a fresh postage must be prepaid, except that in the case of re-direction the amount chargeable may be collected on delivery. Newspapers for places abroad must not be more than eight days old at the time of posting.

THE BOOK POST.

Book Packets may be sent by post to any part of the United Kingdom, if prepaid in full, by postage stamps affixed as follows:—One Halfpenny for every 2 oz. or fraction of that weight.

Every packet must be sent open at the ends, but may be tied with string. No packet may be written in, except the names of the parties sending and the person to whom sent, under penalty of double letter postage rate.

An Inland Book Packet is limited to the same dimensions as an Inland letter, and must not exceed 5 lbs. in weight.

REGISTERED LETTERS.

Letters, &c., may be registered to any place within the United Kingdom, on payment of fourpence in addition to the postage, and must be tendered half an hour before the box closes. All inland letters which unquestionably contain coin, even though they may be posted without registration, are treated as registered, and charged on delivery with a double registration fee of eightpence, in addition to the ordinary postage; and any such letters which cannot be registered in time to be forwarded by the mail for which they are posted, are detained for the next despatch.

THE POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANK

is open daily, from nine o'clock in the morning till six in the evening, and on Saturdays from nine till eight, during which time deposits may be made of any amount, from one shilling upwards, provided they do not amount to more than £30 in any one year. Interest will be allowed for deposits at the rate of sixpence per year, or one half-penny per month, for every complete pound deposited, which will be calculated to the 31st December in every year, and then added to and become part of the principal. Postmasters are forbidden to disclose the names of depositors, or the amounts they may deposit, to any one but the Postmaster-General and his officers in London.

POST OFFICE TELEGRAPHS.

The charge for the transmission of Messages by Telegraph throughout the United Kingdom is one shilling for the first twenty words, and threepence for each additional five words or part of five words. The names and addresses of the sender and receiver are not charged for.

The sums charged for the transmission of Telegrams cover the costs of delivery by Special Foot Messenger within one mile of the Terminal Telegraphic Office, or within the limit of the Town Postal Delivery of that Office, when it is a Head Office, and the Town Postal Delivery extends for more than a mile from it.

When the addressee does not reside within the above-described limits, and the sender has not filled up either of the Forms of Request on the face of the Message, the Telegram will, in the ordinary way, if for a place within three miles of the Terminal Office, be delivered by Foot Messenger, at a charge of sixpence per double mile, or any part thereof. The distance being reckoned from the Postal Telegraph Office, and not from the limits of free delivery, the lowest charge for delivery by special Foot Messenger is one shilling. If the Telegram be for a place beyond three miles from the Terminal Office, it will, unless otherwise directed, be sent out by Cab, Fly, or Horse express, and one shilling per double mile will be charged for delivery.

As most of the Postal Telegraph Offices, and nearly all Railway Stations, close for Telegraph business at 8 p.m., the sender of a message who hands it in between 7 and 8 p.m. should always inquire whether such message is likely to be delivered the same night.

CAB FARES, &c.

Extracts from Bye Laws made by the Town Council, for the better Regulation of Hackney Coaches within the Borough.

There are four places within the Borough of Maidstone appointed as Public Stands for Hackney Coaches, which are under the regulation and direction of the Police: Stand No. 1, for 6 Cabs, in the upper part of High street, near the Town Hall. Stand No. 2, for 4 Cabs, in the lower part of High street, near the Russian Gun. Stand No. 3, for 4 Cabs, in the West Borough, opposite Rocky Hill Terrace. Stand No. 4, for 4 Cabs, in Week Street, opposite the Sessions House.

FARES TO BE TAKEN.

“That for any distance not exceeding one mile, no Owner or Driver of any Hackney Coach shall charge or take for a fare or fares (not exceeding two persons) a greater sum than one shilling; and for any distance exceeding one mile at the rate of sixpence for every additional half mile, and for every part of a half mile not completed. And every person using such Hackney Coach shall be allowed a reasonable quantity of luggage, without extra charge. When more

than two persons are carried by any Hackney Coach, the fare to be sixpence for each person above the number of two for the whole hiring, in addition to the fare for two persons. Two children, under ten years of age, to be counted as one adult. And any Owner or Driver of any Hackney Coach, demanding, charging, or taking for any fare or fares a greater sum than the sum hereby fixed, shall for every such offence forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding ten shillings."

PROPERTY LEFT IN CABS.

"That whenever property of any description shall be accidentally left in any Hackney Coach by any person who may have hired or used the same, such property shall be immediately taken and delivered up to the person who may have so left the same, if known, or otherwise shall be forthwith taken, in the state in which such property was found, to the Police Station in the said Borough, and there deposited. And any Hackney Coachman, or other person, who shall make default in compliance with this Bye Law, shall, for such offence, forfeit and pay a sum not exceeding twenty shillings."

The extensive quarries and chalk pits teem with geological remains.

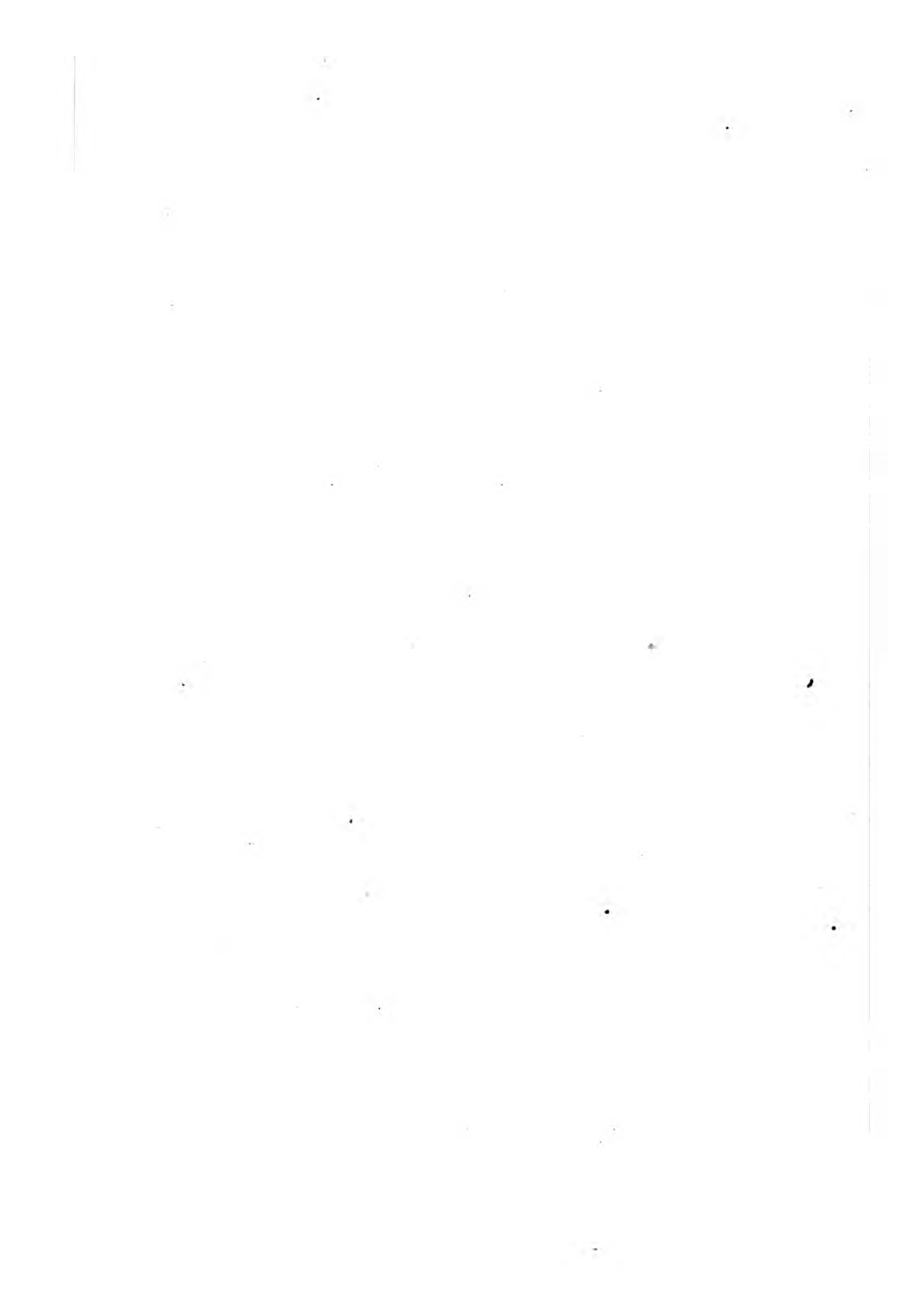
BARMING

The Church of All Saints has an ancient porch, square tower with 6 bells, nave, chancel, and side aisles; and the monuments are of a very interesting character. The living—a vicarage—is in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Rochester. Boxley Abbey was founded in 1144, for Cistercian Monks, and was once a place of pious resort, owing to its containing the “Rood of Grace,” a famous image, which was supposed to have miraculous powers. Some remains of the ancient building are still in existence. Penenden Heath, in this parish, has an interesting history, as the meeting place of the county.

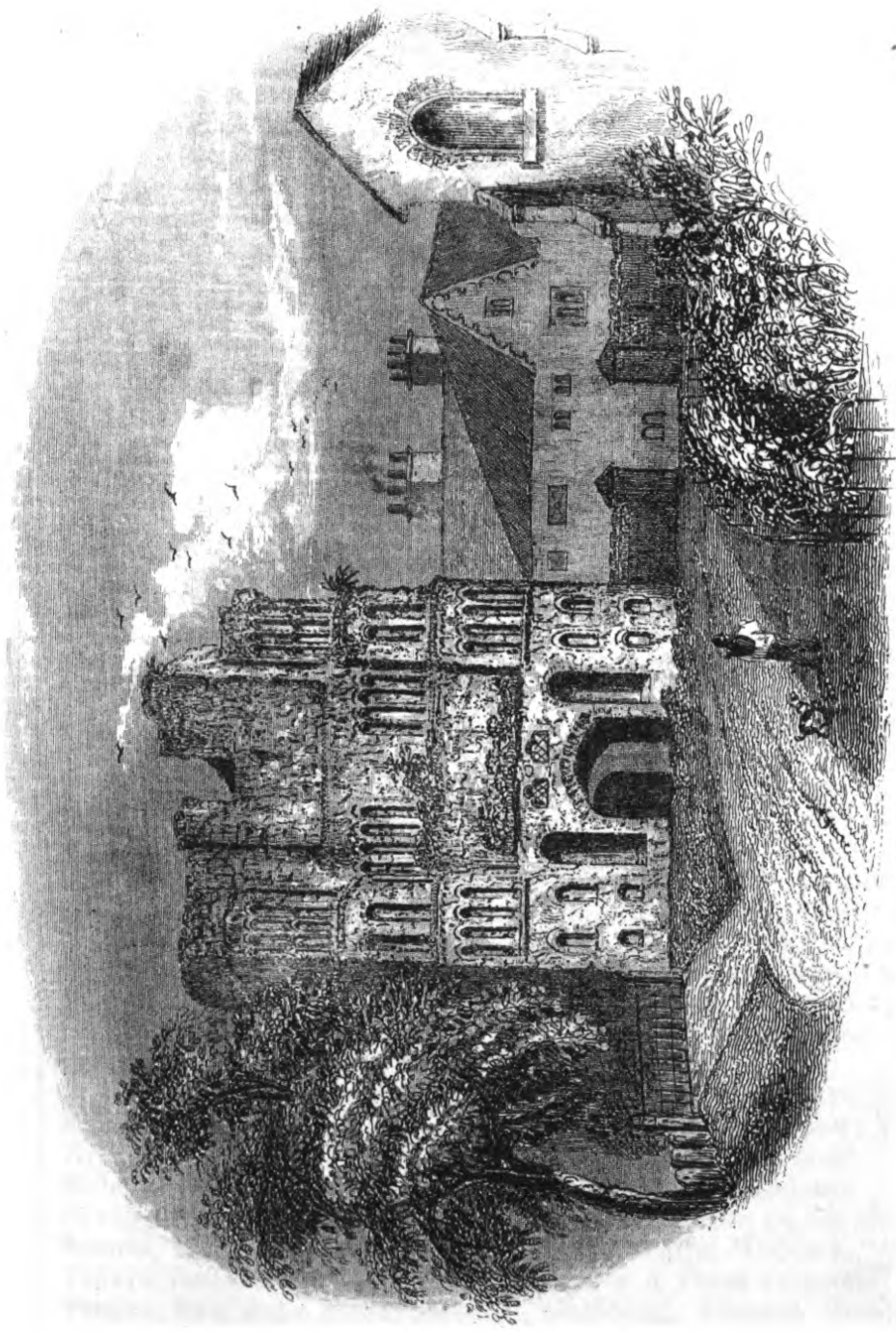

Wouldham, and Wrotham. It is in the Diocese of Canterbury, and the population in 1871 was 2006 (exclusive of those in the Workhouse), the area being 1366 acres. The village is lighted with gas, a Corn Market is held every Monday evening, at the Swan Hotel, and there are Fairs on the 12th Aug., 2nd Oct., and 17th Nov. The Petty Sessions for the Division are held on the 1st Monday in each month. The Church was restored in 1788; and the living is a vicarage, in the gift of W. Lawson, Esq. The ruins of Malling Abbey are interesting, and the woods and heaths in the neighbourhood extend for many miles.

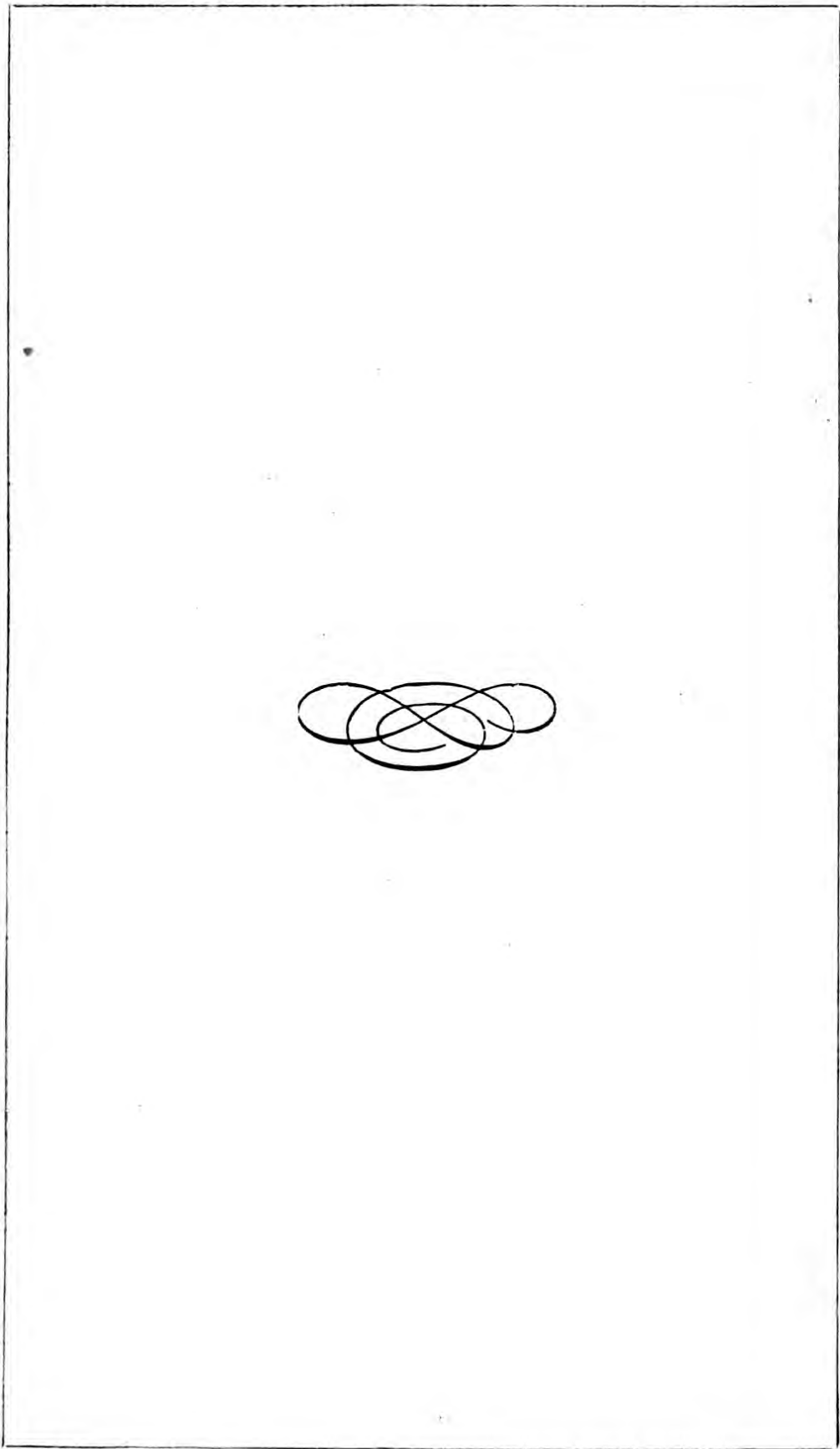
