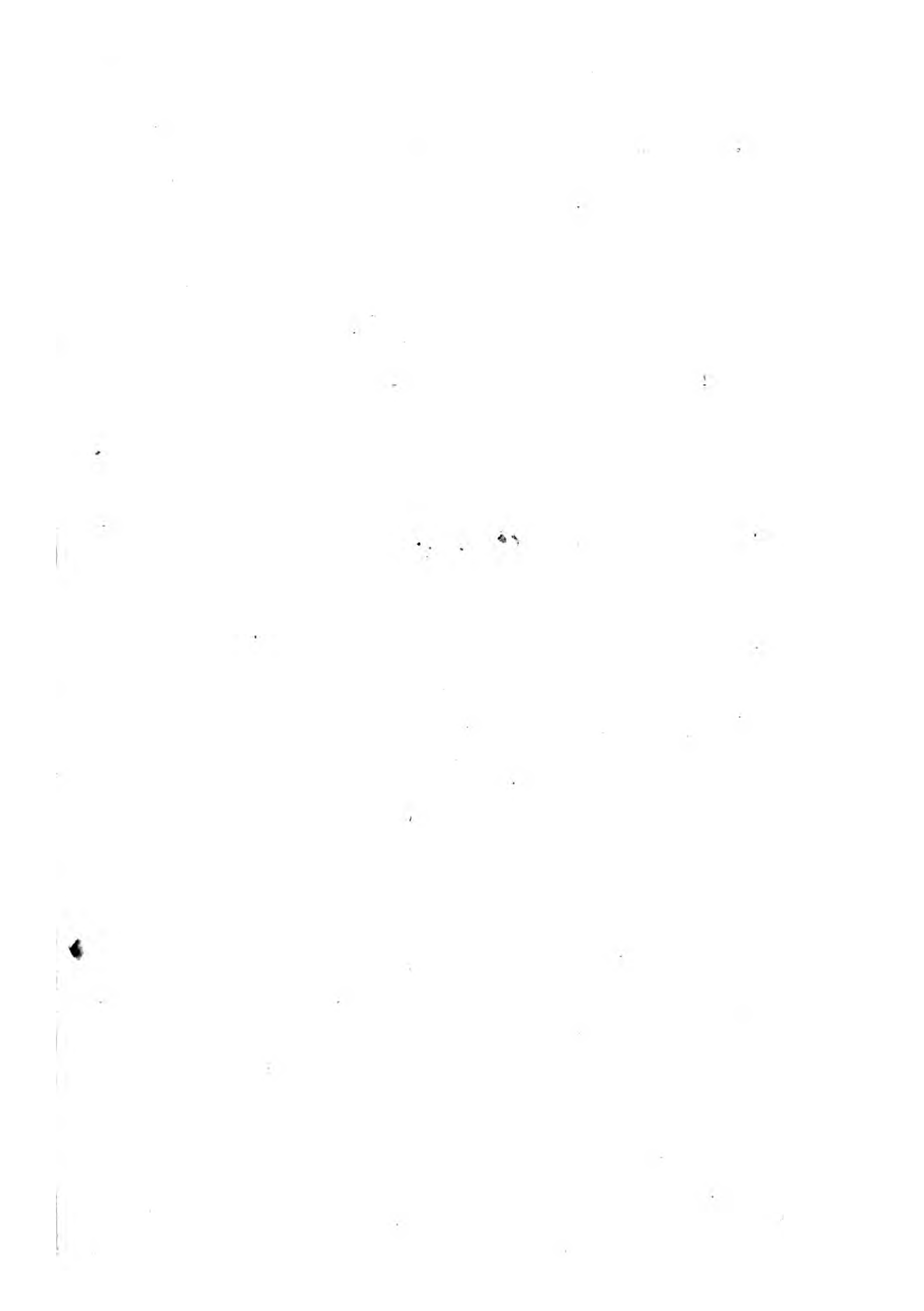

## ADVERTISEMENT.

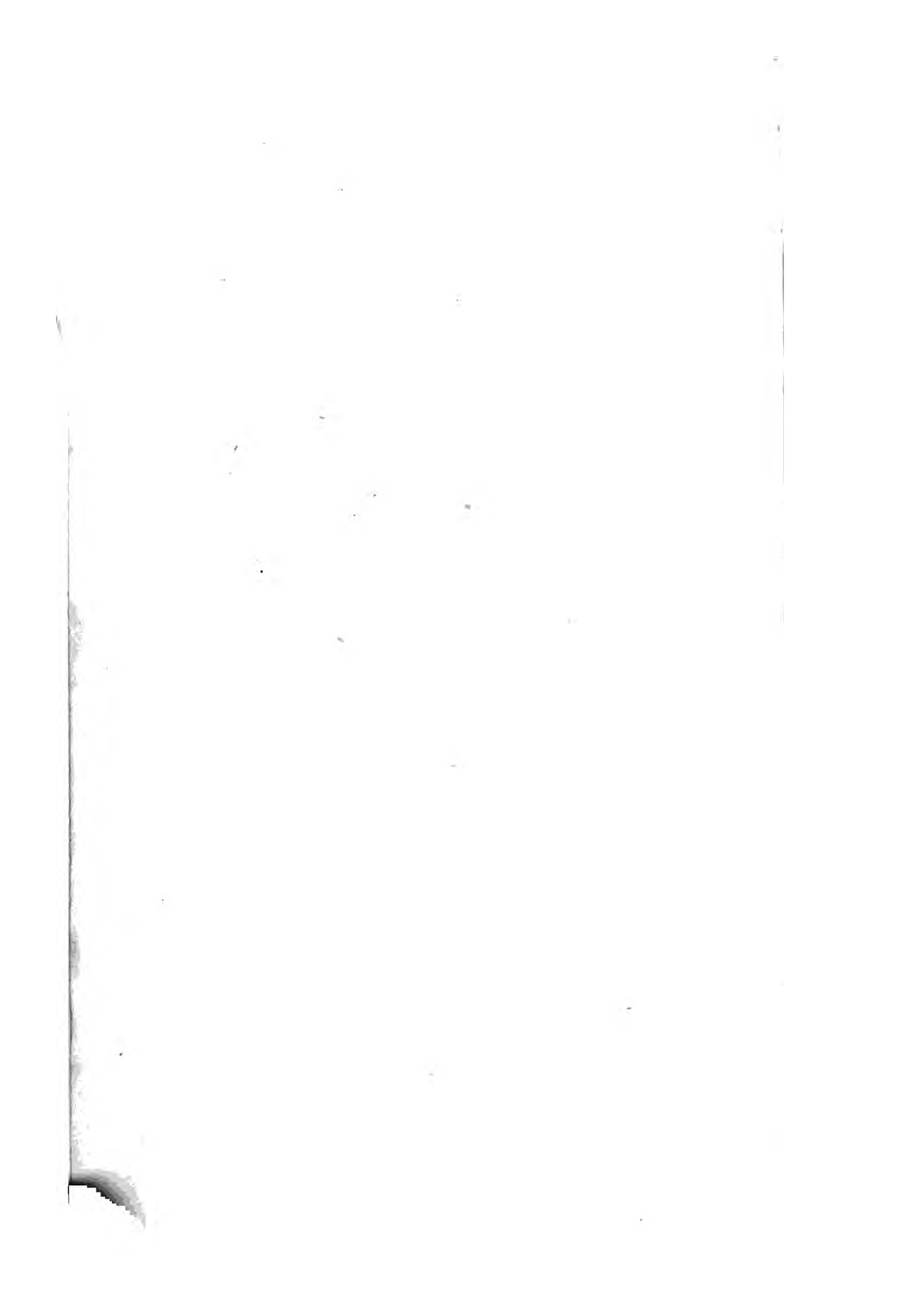

Should such have been the case, the favor of a correction is respectfully requested in order that the mistake may be rectified in a subsequent edition.

## INTRODUCTION.

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It may be said of the Isle of Wight that there is not, perhaps, in the whole kingdom of Great Britain, any spot of ground, of the same extent, which produces such a variety of soil and surface. It is joined to the Coast and County of Hampshire, notwithstanding it is separated from the general outline of the Southern Coast by the Channel, known by the name of the Solent Sea. Its form has been justly compared to that of an heraldic lozenge, extending from east to west about 23 miles, and 13 miles in its extreme length.

The most distinguished feature of the Island, in point of interest to the visiter, is its picturesque and varied landscape, which falls upon the eye of the traveller in quick succession, as he rises and descends the hills, which undulate the surface on every side—beauty succeeding beauty—and

“ Each, more beauteous than the former,”

terminating at length in bold and sublime grandeur, where the projecting precipice and rocky chasms form the boundary of its southern edge, and the wild

precipitous and impending cliffs rise in majestic splendour to the immense height of 300 feet above the level of the rolling waters beneath.

Its wild and interesting chimes involuntarily attract attention, and cast over the mind a mixture of astonishment, admiration, and delight, more easy to be conceived than to be described. Thus, its extreme diversity of surface adds to its sylvan sweetness, and constitutes much of its natural attractions, wild, imposing, and sublime.

In fact, within the short space of a few miles the most astonishing cliffs and towering precipices, together with extensive marine views and vernal luxury, surround the traveller at every turn.

It is this variety which renders the Island so exceedingly productive in the necessaries and comforts of life.

Of the vallies and sloping declivities of the Island, the soil is in general so rich and luxuriant, that the crops of grain, particularly wheat, are beyond all comparison with almost all other countries, plentiful and abundant. In many parts the richness of the ground is very manifest, and perceptible from the colour and fineness of its surface; and to strangers the necessity of ocular demonstration will be manifest to form a true and proper judgment of its produce. Nothing short of this kind of evidence can possibly convey an adequate idea of its fertility.

Marl, brick earth, gravel, tobacco pipe and potter's clay, with fuller's earth, and some red and yellow ochre, are also met with; there is likewise some good

stone, and a peculiar kind of white sand towards the south-west part of the island, at Freshwater, far superior to any other in Great Britain. Of this great quantities are shipped off, and sent to London, Bristol, and Worcester, for the glass and porcelain manufactories. Great quantities of alum are also met with at Alum Bay, to the north of the Needles, from whence it takes its name. Of stone there are various quarries, which may be applied to different uses; and those near Quarr Abbey, in particular, were formerly in high estimation. With these the Cathedral of Winchester was built, and for a series of years it continued to be in the highest estimation. Though it is not known to supply any minerals, the appearances of the sea beach and cliffs afford presumptive manifestations that it is not wholly destitute. The face of the island and the general stratum, is a close black clay, which forms apparently the basis of the Island. There are strong indications in favour of the opinion (and from similarity of circumstances it is extremely probable) that the very necessary and essential article of coal might be found in the Island; and though some attempts have been made to obtain it, without sufficient proof of a successful result, it is not altogether certain that the more internal parts would not repay any cost and enterprise that might be exerted.

From the nature of several springs, which are met with in several parts of this island, there can be no doubt of the existence of other minerals. Amongst these we may reckon iron, some of which has been

found, but of a very coarse quality; yet are the waters which pass through them strongly impregnated, and properly deserve the name of Chalybeates. At Black Gang, round the south point of the Island, under Chale Cliff, is a strong chalybeate spring, which is supposed to contain more of the mineral than the celebrated water of Tunbridge. To the eastward of this last, in the same parish, is a spring, which is supposed to abound with sulphur, though it is purely clear and transparent whilst it flows from the spring; but the common water of the Island is, for the most part, extremely good, and not inferior to that of Bristol, where it issues from the chalky hills.

We cannot say much of the timber of the Island, which is probably not more than is necessary for its own consumption; though it is not to be doubted that heretofore it was more plentiful, which has been diminished by the supplies it has contributed to the Dock Yard at Portsmouth.

It was also remarkably well stocked with game in preceding times, and perhaps at present contains a great quantity. It is certain, however, that it is not so abundant, in general, as formerly, of the wild or predatory species of animals. It has been remarked by former writers that neither fox, badger, or pole-cat, were found in it.

Of fish and fowl it also affords plentiful supplies, not only for the consumption of its own inhabitants, but for the demands of places out of the Island. The shipping at Spithead and Portsmouth Harbour, and

all which take their departure from thence generally furnish themselves with both live and dead poultry from it; and attention to the breeding, it is natural to be concluded, will usually keep pace in proportion to the demand.

Those fish also are common to the coast of this Island, which are found on the coasts of the main land of the country. It has also a peculiar kind of eel, called the *Ammodytes*, or Sand Eel, from its natural property of burying itself in the sand and is taken by turning up the sand immediately on the ebbing of the tide; we give it the name of sand sprats, but on what account it is not perhaps so easy to determine; this Island is also famous for its crabs and other shell fish, but particularly those which are caught in such quantities near the village of Niton, off the south promontory of the Island, that from thence it has obtained the name of Crab Niton.

There is one thing more to be remarked—the wonderful and numerous assemblage of birds which resort in the breeding months to the high cliffs near Freshwater and Bembridge, which are nearly the extremities of the Island, where they usually continue from about May to August before they disappear; they are met with in great numbers, swimming about upon the water or flying about from rock to rock, off the Needles, which are high pinnacle rocks projecting from the western point of the Island.

In speaking of the general stratum of the Island, we should have observed that it appears very plainly on

the coast, near Mottistone, at low water, and is called plotnore or platnore, by the inhabitants, and is so firm that when it has been exposed to the air for some time, it can be appropriated to the purpose of a wet-stone.

We should be highly remiss in the discharge of that duty to which we have pledged ourselves in the public estimation, if we were to neglect any notice of the numerous plants and herbs in this Island; almost every species of which are met with here, a circumstance which must be extremely agreeable to the philosophic mind, and grateful to the botanist and man of science, they abound in quantity as well as in variety; so that persons are annually employed in the summer season to collect those of a medicinal nature, by professional and other gentlemen, who visit the Island for that purpose. The satyrion, or bee orchis, in particular, is found in the environs of Carisbrooke Castle, which in Linnæus, and other botanical authors, is found under the name of ophrys.

It will be no less gratifying to the naturalist and professional man to be informed, that formerly vipers were found in surprising quantities in the Island, a fact of much importance to medical gentlemen, from their known efficacy in many disorders to which the human frame is incident. Truffles are also found in the Island. About Bath, and at Clarendon woods, in Wiltshire, the bee orchis is met with in great abundance, and truffles also are found near the latter place; but on matters of this nature it is not our intention to enlarge.

## NEWPORT.

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NEWPORT, from its local advantages, and its commercial importance, is generally termed the capital of the Isle of Wight. It is situated rather nearer the north than the south; but as regards the east and west, its position is central. The population of the borough and its environs, may be estimated at about 7000, and it sends two members to Parliament. A Corporation was founded in the reign of Charles II., consisting of a Mayor, Recorder, ten Aldermen, and twelve burgesses, but by the Municipal Act, passed 9th September, 1835, in the reign of William IV., to provide for the regulation of Municipal Corporations in England and Wales, which brought it under the regulations of that Act, it is governed by a Mayor, six Aldermen, and eighteen Councillors:—nine for the South and nine for the North Ward.

The river Medina, which falls into the sea at Cowes, contributes much towards facilitating the commerce of



the town, being navigable to and from Cowes, but only at high water, and an endeavour is being made to form a Company to deepen and clear the river, so as to enable vessels of any description to travel to and from the Quay, at all times and tides. Should the contemplated project be accomplished, the mercantile and general interest of the town will be greatly improved.

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**PUBLIC**

**BUILDINGS AND INSTITUTIONS.**

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**ST. THOMAS'S CHURCH.**

This Church is dedicated to St. Thomas á Becket, and was built in the year 1172, at the close of the reign of Henry II. Since that period it has undergone many alterations, particularly the north and south aisles.

The principal object of interest to the stranger is a curiously carved oaken pulpit, which bears the date

1636, displaying two rows of figures, emblematic of the Cardinal virtues, and of the sciences. The pews and altar piece are also of oak, bearing the date of 1630. Just within the screen is a brass plate bearing the following inscription :—

“ Underneath, in a lead coffin, rest<sup>e</sup><sub>y</sub> remains of Elizabeth, second daughter of King Charles the Second ; obit September 8, 1650, Ætat, 14.”

She died a prisoner in Carisbrooke Castle, about a year and a half after her father's execution.

The next prominent sepulchral memorial is that to Sir Edward Horsey, Knt., who was Captain of the Island in the reign of Queen Elizabeth.

### THE NEW CHURCH.

A new church, dedicated to St. John, has been erected, as a chapel of ease to the parish of Carisbrooke ; it is situated at the extremity of the town, on Node-hill. Its structure is that of the modern Gothic, extremely neat, and void of all superfluous embellishment. It is built of free stone, and the church and its burial-place is enclosed by a stone wall.

There are, besides the churches described, the following places of worship :—two independent chapels, one on Node-hill, and one in St. James-street ; a primitive methodist chapel, situated in Holyrood-street, a Wesleyan chapel in Pyle-street ; a Unitarian chapel

in High-street ; a Baptist chapel in Castle-hold ; and a Roman Catholic chapel in Pyle-street.

### THE GUILDHALL AND MARKET-HOUSE.

The Guildhall, under which is the market-house, is situated between Quay-street and the centre of High-street, presenting a very imposing appearance. It was finished at the cost of £10,000 in the year 1816. The design was given by John Nash, Esq. There are rooms appropriated to the use of the town clerk ; the Petty Jury, meetings of the Freemasons, &c. The magistrates meet on Saturday and Monday in each week ; on Saturday holding a general petty session, and on Monday a Borough Petty Session. The adjourned sessions for the county, and the Borough Quarter Sessions are held here ; also a Court of Requests for the recovery of sums not exceeding £5, and a relic of the feudal time, called the Knights' Court, in which the governor's deputy, called the steward, is chairman. This court has jurisdiction under the value of 40s., and its power extends over the whole island, the borough of Newport alone excepted.

### THE ISLE OF WIGHT INSTITUTION.

As an architectural adornment to the town of Newport, the Isle of Wight Institution stands conspicuous.

It was erected at the cost of £3,000, which sum was raised by subscription in the year 1811. The architect was Mr. Nash. It is supported by the resident nobility, gentry, and principal inhabitants, and has a good reading room, which is well supplied with newspapers and periodical publications, an excellent library, and a museum. The subscription of each member is two guineas per annum.

#### MECHANICS' INSTITUTION, PYLE STREET,

This institution was established in the year 1825; and, like others of the same description, for the purpose of diffusing a knowledge of the arts and sciences. It has a library, and lectures are given by members of the Society, and occasionally by professional and public lecturers.

#### PARKHURST PRISON

Is situated about one mile from Newport, on the Cowes road. The building was formerly the hospital to the Albany barrack, but after undergoing considerable alterations in 1837, it took its present title. Its purport is one of a most beneficial nature, which is the reformation of juvenile male offenders.

The prisoners are taught various trades under the direction of experienced workmen, and are occasion-

ally employed in the cultivation of land, which supplies the prison with vegetables. The officers consist of a governor, task-master, and wardens.

The provisions are supplied by contract; the number of offenders at this time (May 20th, 1839) under confinement is 95, and the prison will afford ample room for 320.

### THE ALBANY BARRACKS

Are situated near the Parkhurst Prison, and originally took its name from the same tract of land, namely Parkhurst Forest, but, out of compliment to the late Duke of York and Albany, when that distinguished personage was Commander-in-Chief of the British forces, it received its present name. The building of these Barracks was commenced in the year 1798, and occupy, together with its hospital, an area of about one hundred acres, and possess every accommodation, but for some years they have not been occupied.

### THE HOUSE OF INDUSTRY

Is situated near the Albany Barracks, on the opposite side of the road. This building was erected as a house of reception for the whole Island, pursuant to an Act of Parliament, in 1770, and is capable of holding 1000 paupers. Mr. Pike is the governor.

There is a Bridewell, and a small Theatre, both of which are situated in Holyrood-street, a Free Grammar School, situated in Lugley-street; a National School on the top of Castle-hold; and a Lancasterian School, on Node-hill, and many very excellent private establishments.

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## RYDE.

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THIS much-favoured and fast improving watering-place is built on a hill which rises gracefully from the beach.

The town of Ryde was originally an insignificant and unimportant village, but time and the spirit of enterprize and improvement, combined with its natural and local advantages, have made it the favoured resort of the beau-monde. It is particular for its neatness; the streets are wide, well-arranged and paved. It boasts many elegant and well-erected buildings, terraces, cottages, &c. built in the various architectural styles; among others may be found the Gothic, the Swiss, and the rustic. The pier is of considerable length, and affords a delightful promenade treat to the visiter, as the view from its elevated and peculiar position extends over to the opposite coasts of Hants and Sussex. The view embraces Portsmouth, Spithead, Southampton water, the Solent channel, and its varied and surrounding beautiful banks.

This commanding and extended structure is built of wood, and cost £12,000, which sum was raised in shares of fifty pounds each. The first stone was laid on the 29th of June, 1813, and the pier was opened to the public in the year 1814. Passengers and goods can be landed at all times of the tide; the sum of two pence being demanded from each passenger at the lodge-gate.



## PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND INSTITUTIONS.



### TOWN HALL AND MARKET-HOUSE.

THIS building is situated on a rising piece of ground on the north side of Lind-street. It has an attractive appearance, and does honor to the spirit of the inhabitants; its area is occupied on market days by the dealers in the various necessaries and luxuries of life, all of which are supplied in abundance. The upper portion of the building consists of a commodious hall, which is occasionally divided, in which the commissioners of the town meet in accordance with the act of parliament passed in 1829.

**ST. THOMAS'S CHAPEL.**

Ryde being in the parish of Newchurch, is seven miles distant from the parish church; St. Thomas's Chapel must therefore be considered a chapel of ease to its parochial church. The present structure was erected by George Player, Esq., upon the site of the old chapel, in the year 1827. It is built of stone, and its style of architecture is that of the modern Gothic. The interior is elegant, yet unpretending.

**ST. JAMES'S CHAPEL.**

Is also a chapel of ease to the parish church; it is smaller in its dimensions than St. Thomas's, although built in the same style of architecture. The interior is strikingly superb, and the exterior is far from inelegant and may be styled neat.

The other places of a religious description and worship are a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, in Spencer-street; and an Independent Chapel in George-street.

The charitable institutions are the Free School and the Sunday School of St. James, Sunday School of the Independents, and the Sunday School of the Methodists.

**THE ROYAL VICTORIA ARCADE**

Stands in Union-street, and is considered an ornament to the town. It contains fourteen shops and a



commodious room for the exhibition of works of art and taste.

### THE THEATRE.

This building was originally intended for a Market-house, but circumstances prevented its completion. Unlike other country Theatres, its situation is prominent and commanding. The season generally commences in July and finishes in September.

The Baths are near the Pier, in Pier-street, and are known by the name of Kemp's and Rayner's.

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### WEST COWES.

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Previous to the erection of the Pier at Ryde, Cowes was the principal landing-place to the island. The town of West Cowes is situated on a gentle acclivity, rising from the Solent sea, at the mouth of the river Medina. Its harbour is one of the best on the English coast, and has the appearance of a small bay, which when filled by its variety of shipping, presents a very interesting and animating appearance. The districts on each side are distinguished by the title of West and East Cowes, and with

the beautiful foliage and rising woods, which decorate the surrounding banks, charm the eye on every side. The gaiety and splendour of Cowes is fully displayed at or about the end of August, at which period the annual Regatta generally takes place.

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**PUBLIC**

**BUILDINGS AND INSTITUTIONS.**

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**THE TOWN HALL,**

With respect to its structure, does not demand more than a cursory notice. In it the commissioners of the place hold weekly meetings. The market-house is below; and the whole was built in the year 1816, an act of parliament having been passed for the purpose.

**THE CUSTOM HOUSE**

is a plain building, and situated in the Medina Road.

**THE CHURCH OR CHAPEL**

is a dependancy to that of Northwood, in which parish Cowes is situated. It is not dedicated to any particular saint, and was built in the year 1653, during

the protectorship of Oliver Cromwell, but was not consecrated in consequence of the spirit of the time, by the bishop of the diocese until nine years after—in the year 1662. The tower, a modern erection, is peculiar in its appearance, and it is considered by some that the architect, John Nash, Esq., has not displayed his usual taste in its formation. There are one or two monuments worthy the inspection of every visitor.

### THE CHURCH AND CHAPEL OF THE HOLY TRINITY.

This is a beautiful edifice, and does infinite honor to the architect, Mr. Bramble, of Portsmouth. It was consecrated June the 21st, 1832. The inhabitants are beholden for this munificent building to a Mrs. Goodwin, who had it erected at her own sole expence.

The other religious edifices consist of

A WESLEYAN CHAPEL in the Medina Road,  
very plain and unadorned,

A ROMAN CATHOLIC CHAPEL in Carvel-lane,  
and

AN INDEPENDENT CHAPEL on Sun-hill.

The Religious and Benevolent Institutions consist of  
A National School erected in 1821; a Ladies' Bible Association, several Sunday Schools, a parochial Lending Library, a Seaman's Library, and a Dispensary, &c. &c. &c.

THE ROYAL YACHT SQUADRON-HOUSE,

stands prominently on the parade, and viewed, either from the water, or the shore, is to be known by its semaphore and necessary apparatus for the display of signals to the vessels in roadstead. The squadron was established in 1812.



EAST COWES.



East Cowes faces West Cowes, and is approached by a ferry, by the payment of one halfpenny. East Cowes has its hotels, baths, &c. Its principal attraction is Norris Castle, and East Cowes castle. The parish church is Whippingham, situated two miles and a half from the shore. A new church was built by subscription, for the convenience of the inhabitants, and is situated near East Cowes castle. J. Nash, esq., the architect, giving the ground. It is very plain in its structure, and small in dimensions. An independent chapel may also be found at East Cowes.

EAST COWES CASTLE

Is the property of the Earl of Shannon. It is situated

on the brow of the hill overlooking West Cowes, and is generally visited by strangers to the island.

### NORRIS CASTLE

stands in bold relief either viewed from the coast, or from the entrance to the harbour. It was erected by Sir John Wyatville, then Mr. Wyatt, for the late Lord Henry Seymour. A contemplated change renders it unnecessary particularly to describe this singular building. A short time will elapse and the walls which have received within their limits the lordly suite and its cotterie of fashion will be levelled with the ground, or transformed into an hotel. A Mr. Bell and Alderman Harmer, of London, have become its proprietors, and in accordance with the spirit and enterprize of the age, propose at an enormous outlay of capital to improve East Cowes, by transforming East Cowes Castle into an hotel, and on its wide extended grounds to build a new church, terraces, &c. To carry out the object in view to its full extent, it is also proposed to build a pier of considerable magnitude, extending into the Solent sea. Should these improvements be accomplished, the combined attractions of West and East Cowes will together constitute no inconsiderable feature among the beauties of the Isle of Wight.

THE  
TOURIST'S GUIDE

TO

THE ISLE OF WIGHT,

BEING A SLIGHT SKETCH OF SOME OF ITS MOST  
PROMINENT AND ATTRACTIVE SPOTS.

---

IN commencing our Tour, we shall start from West Cowes for the central town of Newport, a distance of five miles. The road is pleasingly diversified, particularly at high water. On leaving West Cowes on the left of the road will be perceived the castle at East Cowes—the harbour and its beautiful scenery—the river Medina—and its surrounding landscape of hill and valley, backed by the very elevated mounds of Pan Down and Mount Joy. The buildings on the road particularly worthy of note are the Albany Barracks, the Juvenile Prison, and the House of Industry, all of



which are situated about one mile from Newport; a short description of which will be found on reference to pages 11, 12. Descending a hill from these buildings, the traveller approaches Newport by a grove of trees, and passing over a small bridge. The borough of Newport is a well situated and pleasing town, having many handsome shops and public buildings; it is well paved and lighted with gas: in its immediate vicinity the ivy-mantled walls of Carisbrooke Castle stand elevated above the little village of Carisbrooke. [The reader is referred to pages 7, 8.]

Passing over Coppings Bridge, we find ourselves on the road to Ryde, seven miles distant, and ascending a steep hill; where, on reaching its top, on a clear day, the general surface of the Island is plainly visible.

Passing on we arrive at the elegant residence of S. Saunders, Esq., Fern Hill; then gently descending, enter the rural and picturesque village of Wootton Bridge, which, when surrounded by its waters at high tide, may be compared to one of the many beautiful scenes found in Cumberland. An excellent road, though somewhat hilly, three miles and a half in length, brings us to the fashionable and well-arranged watering place—Ryde, a brief account of which is given at page 13;

after resting here and surveying the various attractions which offer themselves to notice, we leave Ryde by taking a turn to the west about one mile on the road, passing Saint John's, the seat of E. Grossmith, Esq.; proceeding onwards two miles, we meet with another noble structure called the Priory; we then pass St. Helens, and crossing the Ferry, arrive at Bembridge hotel and village, situated about five miles from Ryde; leaving Bembridge we proceed to Yaverland, from thence to Sandown, where the traveller will be delighted with the view of an enchanting bay. Here, also, if he need rest and refreshment, accommodation will be found at a respectable inn called the King's Head. Leaving Sandown, we pass the village of Lake, and at the termination of about two miles, arrive at that deservedly famed and much-admired village Shanklin; here the stranger will receive all the gratification his most sanguine imagination may have painted. The towering cliff that rises in bold and imposing grandeur on the south, its extensive marine prospect and its inlaid beauties, surrounded as it is with elms of the most luxuriant description, its deeply interesting chine, its cheerful hotels and neat cottages, charm the eye and call forth admiration and delight;

while wandering through the mazes of this garden of loveliness, the words of the immortal poet live in our imagination, and rush upon the memory, with him we involuntarily exclaim—

These are thy glorious works, Parent of good !  
Almighty ! thine this universal frame,  
Thus wondrous fair ; thyself how wondrous then !

After traversing these pleasing scenes, should the tourist need refreshment, the old-established Shanklin hotel will be found at the head of the chine, where every attention is paid to the comfort of the visiter. Another house for the entertainment and accommodation of strangers and visitors is situated at the entrance of Shanklin, commanding an extensive marine prospect, and affording every advantage and attendance. Both of these houses have post-horses and carriages for hire. Proceeding on our journey one mile and a half, the next point of attention is Luccombe Chine, which although not so extended or so imposing as the gigantic fissure at Shanklin, possesses points of great interest and beauty, and is by some enthusiastically admired. Progressing about one mile, East End next rises upon the view, generally termed the commencement of the Undercliff, which as regards the diversity of scenic display and luxury of landscape,

stands preeminent. Continuing through Bonchurch the traveller passes about six miles of ground, surrounded on all sides by a luxuriant display of Nature's wildest freaks: at one moment may be seen terrific landslips of the most extensive description, with ponderous masses lying in mountainous hillocks along the coast, and garnished over with trees and shrubs; and in the next the ocean and its wide expanse of waters, dashing with angry waves upon the beach, or mildly laving with gentle sway the shingles upon its sands. In the vicinity of this varied scene, Ventnor is situated. (See page 122). The visiter may be accommodated at this home of the invalid, as in the spots of beauty and attraction situated in other parts of the island, with every necessary and luxury of life, either at the hotel, under the direction and management of Mr. Fisher, or that under Mr. Wild; the former is situated about a quarter of a mile from the church, and the latter more in the centre of the village of Ventnor. On leaving Ventnor, the traveller reaches Steeplehill, the most admired part of the Undercliff. The Earl of Dysart resided here for many years in a neat rustic cottage, the site of which is now occupied by an elegant building styled Ham-

borough castle, the seat of John Hamborough, esq., situated on an acclivity in the centre of a grove of trees overlooking the sea; the situation involuntarily commands attention, and the castle ranks among the most elegant structures in the Island. The next point of interest, situated about one mile distant, is St. Lawrence's church and cottage, the latter belonging to Earl Yarborough, and the former remarkable on account of its extremely small dimensions.

The next place of note is Niton, but nothing besides its quiet and sequestered character attracts the visiter; on leaving Niton, the eye will fall upon an elegant villa, known by the name of West Cliff, the garden of which is laid out with much taste.

Leaving Niton behind we proceed to that rural spot of elegant retirement, the Royal Sandrock Hotel, which is surrounded on all sides by nature's choicest gifts; its shrubberies, walks, marine view, and sheltered landscape, unite in forming a retreat, where, free from the pomp of court or city, the mind can dwell in soft repose, and revel in the luxury of nature's works. This house was originally built for a private dwelling, and affords accommodation of a superior description. It is only necessary to add that her present Majesty

Queen Victoria, with her distinguished mother the Duchess of Kent, have twice honoured this spot with their presence.

Bidding adieu to the Sandrock Hotel, we pass on to the Chalybeate Spring, which was discovered in 1809, by Mr. Waterworth, of Newport, surgeon, who has since built a dispensary on the spot.

The traveller is now approaching a most tremendous chasm; a most wondrous work of the all-governing hand of divine power. Black Gang Chine here terminates the Undercliff, and is by some considered the most interesting and attractive feature of the Island. The extreme edge of St. Catherine's Hill overhangs this ponderous and natural excavation, and is from eight to nine hundred feet above the level of the sea; from this immense height, in fine weather, the coast of Dorset is plainly visible. Elevated above the waters, and looking down upon the dread abyss below, the spectator views the surrounding wild and terrific masses with awe and admiration. Frowningly the rocks seem to warn the foundering mariner from its gloomy shores, but in vain; the desolating and destroying winds will force upon these frightful rocks, the shattered bark, where destruction but too often

waits the hapless crew ; the most recent event of this nature and most heart-rending in its result, was that of the ill-fated " Clarendon," which, with her crew and passengers, was entirely destroyed in 1836. A well built and substantial house has, within two or three years, been built at the head of the Chine ; its situation is very picturesque, and the visiter will be sure to meet, in the Black Gang Chine Hotel, with domestic comfort and general accommodation. The tourist on leaving the Chine will pass Chale Common, leaving the immediate vicinity of the coast for the villages of Chale, Shorwell, and Northcourt, comprising a journey of seven miles, to Brixton, at which place will be found a convenient inn, styled the New Inn : as a resting place, or otherwise, it will be found to possess every accommodation. On leaving Brixton (or Brightstone as it is sometimes called) the traveller will meet with nothing particularly worthy of note until arriving at Freshwater Downs, which is gained by ascending a chalky hill, a short distance from the main road. From this elevated spot the eye can wander over an extensive tract of land and water. On one side is seen the wide expanse of ocean, and on the other Yarmouth, Lymington, and their surrounding

landscapes, divided only by the narrow tract of water, which separates the Island from the main land. Having gained the summit of the hill, we soon descend to the beach at Freshwater Gate, which is a bleak, wild, and uncultivated spot, sheltered only by the Freshwater Downs at the back of the hotel. Its vicinity boasts one or two features of attraction, among others its arch and stag rock, upon which time is making great inroads, and its far-famed caves each in their turn surprising and pleasing the eye of the stranger.

We are now fast approaching the most attractive spot of this part of the Island,—the Needle Rocks and Alum Bay—a view of which may be obtained either by hiring a boat at Freshwater Gate, or making a short land trip across the country, where every accommodation offers itself at a commodious and flourishing establishment, known by the name of Groves' Needles Hotel, which is surrounded by a pleasing arrangement of shrubs, and delightfully sheltered by the neighbouring hills, thus standing in beautiful contrast with the neighbouring craggy shores. Descending to the beach, we reach Alum Bay, remarkable for the variegated colour of its clift, produced by layers of sand of different hues and colours, extending nearly a



quarter of a mile in length. An excellent view is here obtained of the Needles rocks, and the visiter can here hire a boat should he wish to have a closer view of these remarkable projecting rocks and the cliffs surrounding. Passing the extreme point of the little river Yar, after a journey of six miles, the traveller reaches the small borough town of Yarmouth, formerly sending two members to Parliament. It is a quiet unpretending town, and is situated on the banks of the river Yar, commanding a fine view of the opposite coast, embracing Lymington and the New Forest. On the opposite side of the river Yar is Norton, a beautiful sequestered spot, rich in marine views and pleasantly situated villas. It would add to the prosperity of this neighbourhood were Yarmouth and Norton united by a bridge, the cost would not be great, and the saving of time in passing from Freshwater, through Norton, to Yarmouth would be considerable. Before leaving Yarmouth we should advise the stranger to view a beautiful piece of marble sculpture, which is to be found in a small chapel in the Church, which can be seen on applying to the clerk of the parish.—(The reader is requested to look under the head of Yarmouth for particulars.) The George

Inn and Hotel at Yarmouth is of considerable size and its visitors may rely on meeting with the best of accommodation within its walls. The Bugle Inn, although not so large as the George, is worthy of patronage. On leaving Yarmouth the traveller will find himself on the route to Newport, eleven miles distant from Yarmouth, passing through Thorley, Calbourne and Carisbrooke (see page 120), from thence to the capital of the Island, Newport, where ample accommodation is to be obtained by visitors at the various inns.



It is to be understood that the purport and general nature of this work prevents us from giving an enlarged or full description of the objects worthy of attention in the Island, the tourist and reader will therefore discover that we have been compelled, in some instances, entirely to pass over many places of attraction and general interest. Among the spots omitted in our sketch is Appuldurcombe House, the seat of Lord Yarborough, which is sometimes made the object of a distinct trip. It is situated about seven miles from Newport and is well worthy of a visit.

## CARISBROOKE.



THIS ancient village is situated about one mile from Newport, and presents a picturesque and delightful aspect, particularly when viewed from its surrounding hills, on one of which Carisbrooke Castle uplifts its ancient walls, rising in mouldering majesty and decaying grandeur, over the spot beneath. The now village of Carisbrooke was once the capital of the Island; its Castle having been the residence of the Lords in "Days lang syne." Whether this architectural relic is of Roman or Saxon origin, remains a matter of controversy. The supposition is that the older portion of the building, including the keep was begun by William Fitz Osbourne, its first Lord. Considerable additions have been made from time to time. The small entrance gate was erected in the reign of Queen Elizabeth, as is shewn by its date 1598, and the initials marked thereon. In Elizabeth's reign, also, the outer wall was enlarged—alterations made—and in the interior buildings erected. Amongst others, the chamber, shewn as the place wherein King Charles was confined, with the window through which he attempted to escape, bear evident impress of the times in which it was built.

CARISBROOKE CHURCH.

Is of great antiquity, and is said to have been founded in 1064, and of Saxon origin. The tower is beautifully built, and presents a rich specimen of Gothic architecture. The only monument of public interest is that to the memory of the lady of Sir William Wadham, who lived in the reign of Henry VII., and was Captain of the Island.



YARMOUTH

IMMEDIATELY faces the town of Lymington, on the opposite coast of Hampshire, and is situated about 10 miles west of Newport. It is a small but ancient borough; formerly sending two members to parliament, and is neat, salubrious, and compact. The river Yar divides it from the pleasant village of Norton, where may be found several handsome gentlemen's villas. The market-house is a plain brick building, and was built in 1763, in the reign of George the Third, by the Right Honourable Thomas Lord Holmes. The George Inn, kept by Philip Bright, affords every accommodation and comfort, and demands particular notice from the fact of its having formerly been the residence of Lord Holmes—there are two other inns and several comfortable lodging houses.

### THE CHURCH

Is a plain building, presenting no particular feature in its structure, being simple and unadorned. Its new tower was raised in 1831, and the church repaired at the same time at the expense of D. Alexander, Esq. The interior is neat and sufficiently commodious; near the chancel is a small chapel, containing a well preserved and excellently chiselled piece of sculpture in marble of Sir Robert Holmes, governor of the Isle, who died November 18th, 1692. A Latin inscription hands down to posterity the deeds of this warrior, and the favours he received at the hands of his sovereign, Charles the Second, as a reward for his loyalty and patriotism.



### VENTNOR,

THIS fast improving and favoured spot is situated at the undercliff, and has become the resort of the invalid, and those whose constitutions require mildness of climate, an opinion having been promulgated by medical men that the softness of the air immediately surrounding the undercliff was favourable to the valetudinarian and to those whose complaints required a mild, yet

bracing temperature. As a healthy residence and a retreat from the wintry blast, Ventnor is most advantageously situated. It has its church and other places of worship.



## BRADING.

BRADING claims notice from the circumstance of its being one of the earliest established towns in the Island, and has, to the present day, remains of its old privileges and institutions; it is situated about four miles S.E. of Ryde. The principal interesting feature of Brading is its church, which was built in 704; having, at the present date (1839), braved the destructive hand of time 1135 years. It has latterly undergone some repairs and improvements, and to all appearance, will bear up against the effects of age for a considerable number of years.

South of Brading are the Culver Cliffs, which terminate the beautiful bay of Sandown, presenting a splendid majestic appearance. Altogether, Brading bears a cheerful aspect, and is surrounded with extensive woods, belonging to the ancient seat of Sir W. Oglander, bart. It has two respectable Inns—the Wheatsheaf and the Red Lion.

## BEMBRIDGE

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Is a small village, situated on the east part of the island. Its chief attraction is the harbour, and its surrounding scenery. The village is fast improving, and contains a population of near 1000. There are excellent bathing machines, and every accommodation offered by the inhabitants for the encouragement and comfort of the visitors. A boat, called the Lady Sherborne, leaves Bembridge for Portsmouth at 8 o'clock every morning, and returns from Portsmouth each day for Bembridge at 3 o'clock. Also a fly bridge and ferry-boat across the haven to St. Helens. There are three licensed houses; the principal of which is the hotel kept by Johana Stuart. There is a Chapel of Ease at Bembridge.
